A MESSAGE FROM MINNESOTA TRANSPORTATION COMMISSIONER THOMAS K. SOREL

The economic recession had a profound effect on Minnesota's transit systems in 2009. In a statewide referendum in 2006, Minnesotans voted to dedicate 100 percent of the motor vehicle sales tax to transportation. Of this, 25.5 percent was dedicated to transit in state fiscal year 2008, with a graduated increase of up to 40 percent by state fiscal year 2012 and beyond.

The recession, however, led to a reduction in the number and value of motor vehicle purchases, so even though the percentage of motor vehicle sales tax dedicated to transit was increasing, the actual revenue was decreasing. The recession also placed a great deal



of pressure on the state's general fund, which is the source of a significant amount of funding for Greater Minnesota transit. These factors were reflected in the outcome of the 2009 legislative session in which the percentage of motor vehicle sales tax dedicated to transit in fiscal years 2010 and 2011 was increased above the original ramp-up rates. This change partially counteracted the revenues lost through the reduction in car sales and a reduction in state general fund dollars appropriated for transit.

The recession undoubtedly affected transit ridership as well. Fuel prices were not as volatile in 2009 as they were in 2008, but most of the riders gained during 2008's high prices appear to have remained transit users in 2009. This may be an illustration of the good transportation value these people enjoyed when becoming transit users.

In Greater Minnesota (outside the seven-county Twin Cities metropolitan area), transit ridership was at an all-time high in 2008, with 11.2 million trips. In the Twin Cities, Metro Transit provided nearly 82 million trips, its highest ridership since 1981. Of this, more than 10 million trips were on the Hiawatha Light Rail Transit line, which continues to enjoy growing ridership. Overall in the Twin Cities metropolitan area, nearly 95 million trips were taken on transit in 2008.

Also related to the economic recession, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (the federal economic stimulus package) will result in \$94 million in new buses, transit facilities and other transit infrastructure in Minnesota. These are entirely federal funds, with no local match required.

Three major transit infrastructure projects made significant strides in 2009. The Central Corridor LRT project will advance to the final design phase in early 2010 and is scheduled for completion in 2014. The St. Paul Union Depot moved closer to becoming a multi-modal hub with agreements achieved on real estate transactions for the concourse and head house. Starting in 2012, Amtrak plans to make the Depot its Twin Cities stop for the Empire Builder train running between Chicago and the Pacific Northwest. And the Northstar Corridor Rail project opened in November with commuter rail between Big Lake and downtown Minneapolis and an extension of the Hiawatha LRT line to the Minneapolis Northstar terminus and new Twins baseball park, Target Field.

The 2009 Transit Report highlights financial and operational information of the publicly funded transit systems in Minnesota. It provides a better understanding of the efforts to meet the mobility needs of communities across the state.

Transit Report Background

The 2009 transit report summarizes key financial information and operating statistics for Minnesota's publicly assisted transit systems. Published since 1983, the transit report is an annual document that provides a comprehensive view of transit in Minnesota for public officials, planners, transit planners, and other interested persons. The report is structured in the following manner:

The **Program Summary** provides an overview of public transportation in the State of Minnesota including prior year funding allocations by local, state, and federal sources, transit services by program types in both Greater Minnesota and the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area, and a review of prior year transit events.

The **Fact Sheets** provide more detailed information on each transit system in the state including operating and financial statistics. The Fact Sheets include Greater Minnesota systems and Twin Cities Metro Area systems. Included at the end of this section is a list of other organizations that receive funding for vehicles through the Elderly and Persons with Disabilities Capital Program (Section 5310).

The **Financial Information** provides detailed information on funding sources, costs, and expenditures for both operating and capital projects.

The **Operating Statistics** provide data on ridership, costs, and miles and include trend analysis.

The **Glossary** provides a listing of important terms used throughout the Transit Report.

Transit Report Legislation and Purpose

Minnesota Statute 174.247 requires the Commissioner of Transportation to submit a report to the Legislature on transit services outside the metropolitan area by February 15th of each year. The Metropolitan Council and any public transit system receiving assistance under section 174.24 are required to assist with this annual transit report. At a minimum, the report must include the following:

- Descriptive overview of public transit in Minnesota;
- Descriptive summary of funding sources and assistance programs;
- Summary of each public transit system receiving assistance under section 174.24;
- Data that identifies use of volunteers in providing transit service;
- Financial data that identifies operating costs, capital costs, and funding sources for each public transit system and for each transit system classification under section 174.24, subdivision 3b; and
- In each odd-numbered year, beginning in 2009, a calculation of the amounts of surplus or insufficient funds available for 1) paying the state share of transit operating costs under section 174.24, subdivision 3b, and 2) paying capital and operating costs to fully implement the transit service needs implementation plan under section 174.24, subdivision 1a.

Minnesota Transit Program Administration

Minnesota's public transit systems provide transportation alternatives to driving alone, and allow people to live independently and participate fully in the state's communities and economy. The goals of the state transportation system include providing transit services throughout the state to meet the needs of transit users (M.S. 174.01). These transit services are funded through a financial partnership that includes local, state, and federal participation.

In Minnesota, state and federal funding for public transit systems is administered by the Metropolitan Council and the Minnesota Department of Transportation (Mn/DOT). In the seven-county, Twin Cities metropolitan area, the Transportation Division of the Metropolitan Council is charged with planning, coordinating and administering transit services to meet the needs of the residents of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. Mn/DOT's Office of Transit is responsible for providing financial assistance to public transit systems in Greater Minnesota (80 counties outside the 7-county, metropolitan area).

The transit-related statutory purpose of the Metropolitan Council is to:

- Provide, to the greatest feasible extent, a basic level of mobility for all people in the metropolitan area:
- Arrange, to the greatest feasible extent, for the provision of a comprehensive set of transit and paratransit services to meet the needs of all people in the metropolitan area;
- Cooperate with private and public transit providers to ensure the most efficient and coordinated use
 of existing and future transit resources; and,
- Maintain public mobility in the event of emergencies or energy shortages.

The statutory purpose of Mn/DOT's Public Transit Participation Program is found in Minnesota Statute 174.21:

- Provide access to transit for persons who have no alternative mode of transit available;
- Increase the efficiency and productivity of public transit systems;
- Alleviate problems of automobile congestion and energy consumption and provide desirable land use where such activities are cost-effective;
- Maintain a state commitment to public transportation; and,
- Meet the needs of individual transit systems to the extent they are consistent with the other objectives stated above.

Introduction

Public transportation is a resource that Minnesotans value. Public transportation empowers individuals to be independent, seek and retain employment, access medical care, and gain access to new opportunities. Enhanced personal mobility and improved access to destinations through the use of public transportation means a better quality of life for citizens across the state. Public transportation is critical to Minnesota's economy - for every \$1 invested in public transportation, \$4 is generated in economic returns. Three Minnesotans used public transportation every second of every day in 2008.*

In 2008 (calendar year), public transportation systems funded by Mn/DOT and the Metropolitan Council provided almost 106 million trips statewide with an investment of \$403.6 million. Table I illustrates the breakdown of 2008 total operating costs for public transportation by funding class.

Future Minnesota Transit Needs and Costs

Throughout Minnesota, public transportation service provides residents with enhanced personal mobility and improved access to destinations. In 2008, Greater Minnesota and Twin Cities metropolitan area transit systems provided almost 106 million rides, allowing citizens of Minnesota to experience an enhanced quality of life. However, additional transit service is needed to adequately address transit needs across the state.

Funding gaps for transit exist in both Greater Minnesota and in the Twin Cities Metropolitan area. The *Greater Minnesota Transit Plan 2010-2030* and the *Metropolitan Council 2030 Transportation Policy Plan* discuss the additional need for transit services over the next 20 years in Minnesota and the transit policies and investments to address that additional transit service need. For both Greater Minnesota and the Twin Cities, demographic changes will require an increase in service that equates to an increase in funding, both in terms of operating and capital.


Greater Minnesota

In Greater Minnesota, changing mobility needs of individuals and the workforce will place larger demands on public transit systems over the next 20 years. Greater Minnesota's population is expected to increase by over 30% from 2000 to 2030 with the largest population gains in residents over 65. The changing composition of Minnesota's population through fluctuations in ethnic and racial makeup, poverty rates, and numbers of people with disabilities will make access to transportation even more critical in the future.

The *Greater Minnesota Transit Plan 2010-2030* projects future need for transit service with a target of meeting 80% of projected need. For Greater Minnesota, this transit service target equates to:

- 1.593 million bus service hours in 2020
- 1.728 million bus service hours in 2030

Graph I shows the gap between these transit service targets (line) and projected future transit service levels (bars) out to 2030. Future transit service levels were based on estimated available funding. These estimates assume that the state general fund remains at its base level of \$17.261 million, the Motor Vehicle Sales Tax (MVST) increases by 3% annually, federal funds remain at the 2008 base level and local funds continue to match the other three sources at their 2008 average of 30%. (Note that the local match required by statute is 15% for rural areas and 20% for urban. These are being greatly exceeded.) A widening funding gap for both operating and capital expenses is projected after 2010 due to increasing demand and declining purchasing power of projected revenues.



To reach the 2020 and 2030 bus service hour targets, the current network of bus service will need to be maintained and additional service will need to be provided. The figures in Table III again assume that the state general fund remains at a base level of \$17.261 million, MVST increases by 3% annually after 2013, and federal funds remain at the 2008 base level, but this time, local funds are held at the statutory levels of 15% for rural areas and 20% for urban. It shows the widening gap between available revenues and the cost to meet target service levels. Historically, a portion of that gap has been partially closed by greater than required local match.

The future capital costs for Greater Minnesota transit consist of fleet replacement to maintain existing services along with new fleet for expanded services. Capital has historically been funded at 80% federal and 20% local dollars. The total capital cost will rise to \$34 million in 2020 and \$45 million in 2030. These costs do not take into account future facility costs, which would increase these figures and are typically funded with federal discretionary funds or state bonding dollars.

Twin Cities Metro Area

Similar to the trends projected in Greater Minnesota, transit service needs in the Twin Cities Metro Area are also increasing. Rising fuel costs, growing congestion and the popularity of incentives such as unlimited ride programs are increasing demand for fixed-route transit. The population of the region and the percentage of elderly persons are also projected to grow, increasing demand for both regular route and Americans with Disabilities Act complementary paratransit services.

The *Metropolitan Council 2030 Transportation Policy Plan* projects future costs and revenues to meet the two goals of the plan:

- maintain the existing transit system by continuing to operate the existing transit programs at 2008 service levels and making capital investments that maintain current transit infrastructure.
- doubling transit ridership by 2030 through expansion of the bus system and development of a network of transitways.

Increased operating funding is needed to maintain the existing system and grow the transit system. Assuming that current operating revenues of \$275 million will stay the same, an increase in operating funding of \$75-\$105 million in 2020 and \$195-\$235 in 2030 is needed. Some of this funding to expand the system will come from the County Transit Improvement Board (CTIB) sales tax and from state revenues. The remaining revenues needed on an annual basis - \$40 to \$60 million in 2020, and \$115 to \$150 million in 2030 - are unfunded and a source for funding is still undetermined. (All figures in 2008 dollars.)

Table VI provides a snapshot from 2008 of Twin Cities Area transit operating costs. Operating costs and their federal, state, or local shares are described for the following individual transit systems or grouping of transit systems – Hiawatha Light Rail, Metro Mobility, Contracted Services, Suburban Transit Providers, Community-Based Dial-A-Ride, and Other. More information on Twin Cities Area Transit can be found on page 10.

The Metro Council projects approximately \$70 million a year in capital costs is needed to maintain the existing transit system (2008 dollars). Based on this, approximately \$840 million is needed to maintain the system between 2008 and 2020 and \$700 million between 2020 and 2030. It is projected that these revenues will primarily come from federal formula funds and regional transit capital bonds. Combined with the costs to expand the system, the Metro Council projects total costs between 2008 and 2020 to rise above \$3 billion with similar costs expected for the decade between 2020 and 2030. (All figures in 2008 dollars.)







Local and State Funding

Greater Minnesota Funding Partnerships

Public transportation programs in Greater Minnesota are funded through a federal-state-local partnership. This formula sets a minimum local share of the total operating costs. The share of operating costs consists of a combination of revenue sources, including farebox receipts, auxiliary revenues and local tax levels. The remainder of the operating cost is paid from state and federal sources.

Graph II shows the costs shared by each level of government in Greater Minnesota for the past five years. Since January 1, 1984, all transit systems in Greater Minnesota have received state assistance through a fixed-share funding formula established in Minnesota Statutes, Section 174.24.

For calendar year 2009, the fixed local shares are as follows:


Dedicated Public Funding for Transportation

Transportation is publicly supported in Minnesota with Motor Vehicle Sales Tax (MVST) revenue collected under Minnesota Statutes. Chapter 290B. Since 2003, when MVST replaced Property Tax Replacement Aid, MVST funds have flowed into both the Greater Minnesota transit fund and the Metropolitan area transit fund established in Section 16A.88. In November 2006 voters approved an amendment to the Minnesota Constitution, Article XIV, which governs the Public Highway System. The amendment provides that as of fiscal year 2008 63.75% of MVST revenue is to be apportioned for transportation purposes. This percentage increases each year by 10% until 100% of MVST funds will be apportioned for transportation purposes by fiscal year 2012. In addition, of the MVST funds apportioned for transportation, not more than 60% are to be spent for highway purposes and not less than 40% are to be dedicated for public transit assistance.

State Public Transit Assistance

For fiscal years 2010 and 2011 the legislature appropriated a total of \$494,514,000 for public transit. These funds support:

- Public transit systems in Greater Minnesota
- Public transit systems in the Metropolitan Area



Figures for 2005, 2006, 2007, and 2008 represent actual reported operating costs. 2009 figures are estimates.

2009 Capital Bonding Bill

Despite the fact that 2009 was not a traditional bonding year, the 2009 Legislature provided over \$47 million in state general obligation bonds for these metro projects:

- Transit Capital Improvement \$12.5M
- Central Corridor LRT \$8.5M
- Commuter/Passenger Rail \$26M
- Capitol Area betterments LRT \$313,000

Federal Operating and Capital Program Funding

Federal Programs

Mn/DOT and the Metropolitan Council serve as the recipients and administrators of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds. In general, FTA distrubutes operating and capital program funding based on the population of urban and rural areas. Mn/DOT receives the program and capital funding for all rural areas including Greater Minnesota cities with populations less than 50,000. The Metropolitan Council recieves all of the large urban area program and capital funds. The state is the recipient of planning funds that are distributed to the state's MPOs as well as used for state planning projects.

Mn/DOT and Metropolitan Council are responsible for the administration of state and federal transit assistance funds for Greater Minnesota and the Twin Cities Metropolitan area. These include the following Federal Transit Administration programs:

American Recovery and Reinvestment Act

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) provided new funding for, among many other categories, public transportation projects. Goals of the law include the preservation or creation of jobs and the promotion of an economic recovery through investment in transportation, environmental protection and other infrastructure to provide long-term economic benefits.

Eligible transit capital projects which receive funds under ARRA include: preventive maintenance; acquiring, constructing, supervising, or inspecting equipment or a facility for use in public transportation (including engineering, designing, location surveying, mapping, and acquiring right-of-way); transit-related ITS; purchasing new public transit buses; and rehabilitating buses.

Greater Minnesota Transit Services

The Minnesota Department of Transportation's Office of Transit is responsible for public transportation systems in Greater Minnesota. The Office of Transit manages state and federal transit assistance programs, directs planning and research activities, provides technical assistance, and coordinates statewide bicycle and pedestrian activities.

In 2009, the Office of Transit updated the *Greater Minnesota Transit Plan 2010-2030*, its long-range plan that describes the challenges, policies, and vision for transit in Greater Minnesota. In the upcoming year, the Office of Transit will produce a transit investment plan, which will provide guidance for future transit investments in Greater Minnesota.

The following are a description of Mn/DOT's transit services and programs.

Urban Transit Systems

The cities of Duluth, East Grand Forks, La Crescent, Moorhead, Rochester, and St. Cloud operate both fixed-route and dial-a-ride services within their respective communities. Combined, their fixed-route services provide almost 66 percent of all public transit rides in Greater Minnesota. In addition, their dial-a-ride services for persons with disabilities provide another 2 percent of the rides in Greater Minnesota. Four of these six cities are located on Minnesota's borders and coordinate their services with neighboring communities in North Dakota and Wisconsin.

Greater Minnesota urban transit systems operate a fleet of 194 lift-equipped buses, including 1 trolleybus. The fleets range in size from 1 bus in La Crescent to 72 in Duluth. A record ridership of more than 7.6 million rides was achieved in 2008.

Rural and Small Urban Transit Systems

Greater Minnesota has 41 rural public transit systems that operate demand response and/or deviated route services and supplement their services by utilizing volunteer driver programs. These systems primarily provide countywide of multi-county service but also include service in a few smaller cities with populations less than

2,500. In 2008, rural transit systems provided over 23 percent of all public transit rides in Greater Minnesota. Arrowhead Transit is one of the largest rural systems in the nation; it operates in Northeastern Minnesota with service in 7 counties and annually logs 1.5 million miles.


Small urban systems operate in 13 Greater Minnesota cities with populations between 2,500 and 50,000 and provide more than 8 percent of all rides in Greater Minnesota. Like the rural systems, the small urban systems operate demand response and/or deviated route services with one exception, Mankato. Greater Mankato Transit, the largest small urban system in Greater Minnesota, operates both fixed-route and dial-a-ride services.

Rural system fleet sizes range from a one-bus system in Pine River to 78 buses in Arrowhead. Small urban system fleets range from one-bus systems in Granite Falls and Stewartville to 16 buses in Mankato. Rural and small urban services also reported record setting ridership totals of nearly 3.6 million rides in 2008.

Volunteer Transportation

Many of Greater Minnesota's transit systems supplement their transit services with transportation provided by volunteers. Volunteer drivers are usually utilized to access longer distance destinations. Rural public transit systems administer volunteer transportation in 48 Greater Minnesota counties (See Map IV).

Intercity Bus

Jefferson Lines, Greyhound, and Megabus operate intercity bus services in Minnesota. Of the three, Jefferson is the only Minnesota carrier that applied for and received financial assistance through a federal program administered by Mn/DOT's Office of Transit. Map V (located on page 16) depicts the intercity bus routes operated in 2009.

Intercity bus service is defined as regularly scheduled, fixed-route bus service for the general public, which operates with limited stops between two or more urban areas that are not in close proximity. Intercity bus is capable of carrying baggage and makes a meaningful connection with the national intercity network; it is *not* commuter service.

According to a study of the state's intercity bus network conducted by Mn/DOT's Office of Transit in 2009, 85% of Minnesota's rural residents live within 25 miles of an existing intercity bus stop. Further analysis through onboard surveys found that the majority of riders were under age 34, traveled by themselves, and had a trip origin of either Minneapolis or Duluth.

Rural Transit Assistance Program (RTAP)

Minnesota's Rural Transit Assistance Program (MN RTAP) promotes the safe and effective delivery of public transportation in non-urbanized areas by providing technical assistance and support services to Greater Minnesota's rural public transit systems.



In 2009 it is estimated that MN RTAP will provide training for over 500 transit drivers with classes in: Passenger Assistance, Defensive Driving, Maltreatment Awareness (for new drivers) and a Driver Refresher Course (for all drivers).

MN RTAP also provides scholarships for transit professionals to attend in-state and out-of-state transportation-related conferences, workshops and training. Among these were the Community

Transportation Association of America's annual Conference and Expo, Substance Abuse Management and Program Compliance, and the Minnesota Public Transit Conference.


MN RTAP funds the annual statewide Minnesota Bus Roadeo. The 2009 roadeo was held in Albert Lea, Minnesota on July 25. Thirty transit organizations from across Minnesota were represented by 49 contestants.

Greater Minnesota Rideshare

The Greater Minnesota Rideshare Program, funded by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), offers technical assistance to employers and employees in Greater Minnesota to promote all modal options including car pools, vanpools, public transit, biking, walking and telecommuting.

Similar to prior years, in 2009 the Commuter Challenge "Try It" program was promoted statewide to encourage people to use alternative transportation options other than driving alone to work. This three-month program was developed for employers in Greater Minnesota to encourage their employees to use alternate forms of transportation. Promotional posters and "how to" guides advertised the different modes and explained how each mode could be utilized. In 2009, promotional events were held in Little Falls, Sauk Centre, Melrose, Rochester, and Duluth. The Duluth Transit Authority (DTA) registered the most Commuter Challenge pledge forms out of all areas in Greater Minnesota.

Metro Area Transit Services

The Metropolitan Council is responsible for Twin Cities public transportation. The Council administers the regional fare structure and coordinates transit funding.

The Met Council continually evaluates all of the public transit services throughout the metro area in an effort to maximize ridership and route efficiency through its Redesign Program.

The Council's Transportation Policy Plan incorporated Transit Redesign recommendations which have been translated into guidelines for service design and evaluation, performance standards and for a transit capital plan. Transit Redesign forms the backbone and foundation for much of the current transit plan adopted in the Council's latest 2030 Transportation Policy Plan.

The following are a description of the Metropolitan Council's transit services.

Regional Fixed Route Services

Regional fixed route services provide over 97 percent of all public transit trips in the region. The balance is Metro Mobility paratransit trips and dial-a-ride trips provided by community based systems and regional transit authorities for safety-net and circulator services. Foremost among fixed route providers is Metro Transit, an operating division of the Metropolitan Council. Its service accounts for about 92 percent of all ridership in the region, including most services in the urban core, a wide network of commuter and express routes and the Hiawatha Light Rail line.

Also under the Council's jurisdiction are eight contracted private, fixed route providers. The remainder of fixed route services in the region are provided by six suburban Transit Replacement or "Suburban Transit Providers" providing local and express bus services in the southern and western suburbs. These providers are City of Maple Grove Transit, City of Plymouth, SouthWest Transit, City of Shakopee, City of Prior Lake and the Minnesota Valley Transit Authority.

Metro Transit

Metro Transit, as the Twin Cities' largest operator of bus and rail transportation, provides about 85 percent of regular route service hours in the Metro region. It operated a fleet of 919 buses and 27 rail cars in 2008 on 120 routes, achieving an annual ridership of nearly 82 million, the highest in 27 years. The fleet operates from five bus garages and a rail operations and maintenance center. It is supported by other facilities, including a bus fleet service center, a dispatch center, a police department, an operations support center and central offices.

With the Hiawatha light rail line and its bus operations, Metro Transit's average weekday ridership in 2008 was 268,000. Metro Transit also provides essential regional services to other providers and the public, including route and schedule information, trip planning, real-time departure information, downtown service coordination, fare collection system coordination, fare media, transit pass sales and reimbursements, Transit Police, and regional safety and security coordination.

Metro Mobility

Metro Mobility, the regional Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Special Transportation Services (STS) paratransit program for people with disabilities, contracts with private operators to provide the majority of its service, particularly in the urban core. Paratransit service is also contracted with two non-profits, two county providers, and a taxi company. While many Metro Mobility trips are demand response and scheduled on an individual basis, other service includes agency contracts covering arranged or repetitive group trips and premium same day taxi service.

In 2008, Metro Mobility successfully implemented a revised service area scheme in order to eliminate ADA capacity denials system wide. Also implemented was a revised fare structure in order to preserve service at present levels.

Metro Mobility was able to maintain an exceedingly high level of service quality (on time performance of 98% and productivity level of over 2 passengers per hour) despite an increase

in ridership of nearly 5%. Total passenger trips delivered for 2008 totaled 1.43 million establishing a new high water mark in ridership. For 2009, Metro Mobility will be implementing the fleet's first electric/hybrid operated buses and increasing the number of automobiles in the fleet to better meet the needs of customers, improve fuel efficiency, decrease tailpipe emissions and improve operating efficiencies.

Implementation of a web based reservation system for Metro Mobility customers allowing them to book and cancel rides on-line occurred in the second quarter of 2009.

The installation and implementation of a fleet camera system allowing for improved monitoring of Metro Mobility service and customer service resolution to incidents, accidents, and disputes on board the bus is scheduled to take place in the first quarter of 2010.

Metro Mobility will also be implementing a fixed route software solution for customers when booking a ride with a reservationist or through the on-line reservation system. This fixed route solution will provide customers with an additional transportation option that may be more convenient than Metro Mobility at a less costly fare.

Lastly, Metro Mobility will pilot test a hydraulic boost bus developed by Eaton Corp. that may improve fuel economy up to 20%.

Community Based Services

The Metropolitan region supports some locally initiated and managed transit systems throughout the region to provide dial-a-ride and circulator services. The state classifies these as rural and small urban systems. Currently 14 systems exist, representing individual cities, counties and joint powers authorities between neighboring cities and non-profits. While many systems specialize in service to seniors and social service recipients, all are open to the public and operate with accessible vans or small buses, many provided under lease from the Council's regional fleet. Local dollars, above and beyond fares, continue to be a funding source for most of these programs.

Travel Demand Management

The Metropolitan Council promotes Travel Demand Management (TDM) strategies and programs for commuters and other travelers in the region. These strategies can reduce vehicle miles traveled, improve air quality and reduce congestion through modifications of travel behavior. Education, marketing incentives, demonstration programs and partnerships with business and public agencies are key. In 2008, the Twin Cities regional TDM program reduced single occupancy vehicle miles traveled by 66 million miles.

Through its Metro Transit division the Metropolitan Council administers a regional rideshare database, Guaranteed Ride Home program, information call center and coordinates commuter and employer outreach with four Transportation Management Organizations (TMO) in the region.

The Anoka County TMO, Minneapolis TMO, St. Paul Smart Trips and the I-494 Corridor TMO provide local contacts for information regarding biking, car/vanpooling, telework, transit and flexible work schedules. The Council coordinates its activities with Mn/DOT.

Regional Transit Capital (RTC)

With the Legislature's periodic authorization, the Metropolitan Council issues bonds to fund transit capital projects. These bonds are used to buy buses; rehab vehicles; build transit hubs, shelters, garages, park-and-ride lots and other facilities and purchase fare collection, communication, and other support systems and equipment. They also provide local match for federal capital project funds. The capital bonds are paid for with a property tax levy within the

Elderly and Persons with Disabilities Capital Program

The purpose of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 program is to meet the special transportation needs of elderly persons and persons with disabilities for whom existing mass transportation services are unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate.

The program seeks to enhance coordination of federally assisted programs and services to encourage the most efficient use of federal resources and to achieve the goal of improved mobility for elderly persons and persons with disabilities.

The State of Minnesota receives Federal Section 5310 funds each year through a lump sum appropriation from the U.S. DOT-FTA. It is Mn/DOT's policy to use Section 5310 funds to purchase lift-equipped vehicles.

Glossary

This glossary contains certain technical terms, which appear in the 2009 Minnesota Transit Report. Many of these terms have multiple definitions; therefore, these terms are defined as they are used in the context of this report.

Accessible Vehicle – A public transportation revenue vehicle that does not restrict access, is usable, and provides allocated space and/or priority seating for individuals who use wheelchairs.

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) – The passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act in July 1991 gave direction to local transit agencies to ensure full access to transportation for persons with disabilities.

American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) – Federal legislation enacted in 2009 that provided additional capital funding for transit.

Base Fare – The price charged to one adult for one transit ride; excludes transfer charges, zone charges, express service charges, peak period surcharges and reduced fares.

Bus Roadeo – A competition in which transit bus drivers demonstrate skills, such as emergency stops and maneuvers.

Capital Cost – The cost of equipment and facilities required to support transportation systems: vehicles, radios, shelters, etc.

Car Pool – An arrangement where people share the use and cost of privately owned automobiles in traveling to and from pre-arranged destinations.

Charter Service – Transportation service offered to the public on an exclusive group basis. It is provided with a vehicle that is licensed to render charter service and engage at a specific price for the trip or a period of time, usually on a reservation or contractual basis.

Commercial Driver's License (CDL) – A special operating license for drivers of certain types of vehicles based on the weight and seating capacity.

Coordination – A cooperative arrangement among transportation providers and/or purchasers, which is aimed at realizing, increased benefits through the shared management and/or operation of one or more transportation related function.

Cost Effectiveness – The ratio of the cost of a transit system to the level of service provided. Various measures may be used to determine cost effectiveness, as an example, cost per passenger trip.

Dedicated Funding Source – A funding source, which by law, is available for use only to support a specific purpose, and cannot be diverted to other uses; e.g., the federal gasoline tax can only be used for highway investments and, since 1983, for transit capital projects.

Demand Responsive/ Dial A Ride Service – A transportation service characterized by flexible routing and scheduling of relatively small vehicles to provide door-to-door or point-to-point transportation at the user's demand.

Elderly and Disabled Transportation – Transportation service to persons that are physically disabled and/or elderly and live in areas with a population over 50,000 (Section 5307).

Express Commuter Service – Transit service generally connecting residential areas and activity centers via a high speed, non-stop connection.

Fare – The payment for a ride on a passenger vehicle, whether cash, tokens, transfer or pass.

Fare box – A device that accepts coins, bills, tickets and tokens given by passengers as payment for rides.

Fare box Recovery Ratio – Total fare revenue divided by the total operating cost.

Federal Transit Administration (FTA) – A part of the United States Department of Transportation that administers the federal program of financial assistance to public transit.

Fixed Route – Transportation service operated over a set route or network of routes on a regular time schedule. (Also known as Regular Route).

Flexible Fixed Route – Transportation service that operates on a regular route, but will on demand change the route to meet the user's needs. (See Route Deviation).

Inter City Bus – (over -the-road coach) a large bus with luggage space, used primarily for transportation between cities.

Light Rail Transit (LRT) – A metropolitan electric railway system characterized by its ability to operate single cars or short trains along exclusive right-of-way at ground level, or aerial structures, in subways, or occasionally, in streets.

Marketing – A comprehensive process to induce greater usage of transportation services by determining the needs or demand of the community and potential customers, developing and implementing service on the basis of these needs, pricing the services, promoting the services, and evaluating the services as implemented in relation to customer needs and marketing goals.

Metro Mobility – The metropolitan-wide special transportation service of the Twin Cities.

MVST (Motor Vehicle Sales Tax) – A source of revenue for Minnesota public transit. From July 1, 2008, through June 30, 2009, 27.75 percent of money collected on the purchase price of motor vehicles registered in Minnesota is deposited in the metropolitan area transit account under section 16A.88, 1.75 percent must be deposited in the greater Minnesota transit account under section 16A.88. The Greater Minnesota transit account supports the Public Transit Participation Program in Minnesota Statutes, Section 174.24.

Operating Cost – The recurring costs of providing transit service, i.e., wages, salaries, fuel, oil, taxes, maintenance, depreciation, insurance, marketing, etc.

Operating Deficit – Total operating expenses minus total operating revenue.

Operating Revenue – The total revenue earned by a transit agency through its transit operations. It includes passenger fares, advertising and other revenue.

Paratransit– Flexible forms of public transportation services that are not provided over a fixed-route e.g. demand responsive service.

Park and Ride Facility – A common location (e.g. parking lot) for individuals to transfer from a low to a high occupancy travel mode.

Pass – A means of transit payment, usually a pre-paid card that carries some identification that is displayed to the driver in lieu of paying cash for the fare.

Passengers Per Mile – The total number of passenger trips provided by a transit system divided by the number of miles traveled.

Passenger Trip – One person making a one-way trip from origin to destination. One round trip equals two passenger trips.

Peak Period – The hours when traffic or passenger demand is the greatest.

Point Deviation – Transportation service in which the transit vehicle is required to arrive at designated transit stops in accordance with a prearranged schedule but is not given a specific route to follow between these stops. It allows the vehicle to provide curbside service for those who request it.

Public Transportation – Transportation service that is available to any person upon payment of the fare either directly, subsidized by public policy, or through some contractual arrangement, and which cannot be reserved for the private or exclusive use of one individual or group. "Public" in this sense refers to the access to the service, not to the ownership of the system that provides the service.

Ridesharing – A form of transportation, other than public transit, in which more than one person shares in the use of the vehicle, such as a van or car, to make a trip.

Revenue Vehicle Miles – The total mileage incurred in scheduled service. Excludes non-service mileage (deadhead, training, etc.), charter mileage, exclusive service mileage, and mileage lost due to missed runs.

Revenue Hours – The total number of hours when the vehicle is in revenue service (e.g., the time when a vehicle is available to the general public and there is an expectation of carrying passengers). Excludes deadhead hours, but includes recovery/layover time.

Route Deviation – Transportation service on a non-exclusive basis, that operates along a public right-of-way, on a standard route, from which it may deviate from time to time, in response to a demand for its service or to take a passenger to a destination, after which it returns to its standard route.

RTAP (Rural Transit Assistance Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that provides funds for training, technical assistance, research and other support services for rural transit providers.

Rural Area – A geographic area with a population of less than 2,500 (Section 5311).

SAFETEA-LU – the **Safe**, **Accountable**, **Flexible**, **Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users**, which was signed into law in August 2005. SAFETEA-LU addresses transportation challenges such as improving safety, reducing traffic congestion, improving efficiency in freight movement, increasing intermodal connectivity and protecting the environment.

Section 5303 (Metropolitan Planning Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that provides financial assistance to metropolitan planning organizations which are responsible for conducting planning activities and technical assistance for public transit services. The program is expected to support the basic transportation planning process underway in urbanized areas, including capital planning, financial planning, and operations-related planning essential to the provision of transit services.

Section 5303/5313 (Consolidated Planning Grant) – The combination of the FTA's planning grant and the Federal Highway Administrations PL Planning program into one consolidated grant.

Section 5307 (Urbanized Area Formula Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that authorizes grants to public transit systems in urban areas over 50,000 populations for both capital and operating projects. Based on population and density figures, these funds are distributed directly to the transit agency from the FTA.

Section 5309 (Capital Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that authorizes discretionary capital assistance for major capital needs, such as fleet replacement and construction of transit facilities.

Section 5310 (Elderly and Persons with Disabilities Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that provides grant funds for the purchase of accessible vehicles and related support equipment for private non-profit organizations to serve elderly and/or disabled people, public bodies that coordinate services for elderly and disabled, or any public body that certifies to the State that non-profits in the area are not readily available to carry out the services.

Section 5311 (Non-urbanized Area Formula Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that authorizes grants to public transit systems in non-urbanized areas (under 50,000 population). The funds initially go to the Governor of each state. In Minnesota, the Minnesota Department of Transportation administers these funds.

Section 5313 (State Planning and Research Program) – The section of the Federal Transit Act of 1991, as amended, that provides financial assistance to the States for purposes of planning, technical studies and assistance, demonstrations, management training, and cooperative research activities.

Section 5316 (Job Access and Reverse Commute (JARC) – A formula-based federally funded program established under SAFETEA-LU and administered by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). The goal of the JARC grant program is to improve access to transportation services to employment and employment related activities for welfare recipients and eligible low-9ncome individuals to transport residents of urbanized areas and nonurbanized areas to suburban employment opportunities.

Section 5317 (New Freedom) – A formula-based federally funded program established under SAFETEA-LU and administered by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). The goal of the New Freedom grant program is to provide additional tools to overcome existing barriers facing Americans with disabilities seeking integration into the workforce and full participation in society.

Service Area – The geographic area that coincides with a transit system's legal operating limits (i.e. urbanized area, city limits, or county boundary).

Service Span – The duration of time that service is made available or operated during the course of the service day e.g., 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Shared Ride Taxi – A demand responsive service in which taxis carry several unrelated passengers with different origins and destinations.

Small Urban – A geographic area with a central city that has a population of between 2,500 and 50,000 (Section 5311).

Special Transportation Services (STS) - Transportation provided by a carrier on a regular basis designed to serve individuals who are elderly, handicapped, or disabled and are unable to use regular types of transportation. In Minnesota, carriers must be certified by the Office of Freight and Commercial Vehicle Operations before providing transportation. Terms and conditions for STS service are in the Minnesota Department of Transportation's Special Transportation Service Rules, Parts 8840.5100 through 8840.6300.

State Public Transit Assistance – Funds appropriated by the Minnesota State legislature to be used to support the day-to-day operational costs of providing transit.

Subscription Service – Transportation service in which routes and schedules are prearranged to meet the needs of riders who sign up for the service in advance.

Suburban Transit Association Providers – Replacement service program in the Twin Cities metro area (see Minnesota Statutes Section 473.388).

System Miles - The miles a transit vehicle travels from the time it goes into revenue service to the time it returns from revenue service. It is often called platform miles. It includes revenue miles and deadhead miles.

Total Operating Cost – The total of all operating costs incurred during the transit system calendar year, excluding expenses associated with capital grants.

Total Passengers – The total of all revenue passengers plus transfer passengers on second and successive rides, and free ride passengers.

Transit – Transportation by bus, rail, or other conveyance, either publicly or privately owned, which provides to the public, general or special service on a regular and continuing basis. Also known as "mass transportation," "mass transit" and "transit." The term includes fixed-route and Para transit services as well as ridesharing.

Transit Dependent – A person who does not have immediate access to a private vehicle, or because of age or health reasons cannot drive and must rely on others for transportation.

Urbanized Area – A geographic area with a central city that has a population of over 50,000 (Section 5307).

Vanpool – A Para transit service by a van on a scheduled or unscheduled basis with at least five persons as occupants.
