## **Overall Project Outcome and Results**

The key objective: to build and furnish replica structures and to recreate\_land use of the Dakota and pioneers. Assure authenticity by using paintings, observations from the era (Seth Eastman, Samuel Pond, Frank Mayer) and museum originals as models.

- Dakota bark lodge (15ft. X 20ft.) and drying rack: outdoors in a prairie setting, inviting visitors inside. The only historic site in the state allowing visitors to experience the inside of a Dakota bark lodge.
- Two canvas tipi (26 feet diameter), encourage visitor entry.
- Furnishings, 52 + articles as hands-on teaching tools. Furnishings are all hand made replicas. Articles include, men's and women's clothing such as leggings, shirts, skirts, garters, capotes, bison robes and furs. Tools include two sets of utensils for starting fires; sewing; hoeing gardens (all pre-contact/post-contact). One of the best comparisons is the large buffalo shoulder-bone hoe with the post-contact metal hoe.
- Prairie Restorations, Inc. restored 1.3 acres of prairie using Francis Marschner's interpretation of the original land survey notes of 1847. 174 species of plants include grasses like Big and Little bluestem, Switch grass, Indian grass, and wildflower species like Butterfly weed, Yellow coneflower, Prairie onion and Prairie rose.

The significance of a positive, hands-on perspective of a culture that is part of Minnesota's heritage is enormous. Most contemporary people know of Dakota people only through tales of war and deprivation. The Dakota culture is here represented at its best – not just in decline and despair. Some of the most effective learning occurs outside the classroom when a person experiences life in another era. It's the only site in Minnesota showing a period of friendship and cooperation between the in-coming pioneers and the indigenous peoples. It serves as a beacon of hope for cross-cultural understanding for all peoples.

Attendance has increased over last year (20,000); our new marketing plan anticipates reaching its goal of 30,000 visitors.

## Project Results Use and Dissemination

The information gathered during the project has been research focused on building the various structures, their furnishings and use. This <u>information has</u> <u>been used</u> to build the lodges, create furnishings, and implement the plantings of prairie and period landscape.

This information in turn has been disseminated to the public in a number of ways:

- The museum currently offers stand-alone Dakotah tours (sometimes paired with pioneer tours). Experiencing the actual structures i.e. being able to enter a Dakota bark lodge or tipi, is a powerful way of understanding the way the Dakota lived. This experience is unique to the Gibbs Museum. No other historic site in the state allows visitors to enter its Dakota bark lodge.
- 2) Museum interpreter training. The interpreters transmit the information to the visiting public using inter-active and hands-on techniques. The interpreters tailor their presentations to visitors based on age, level of attention, and ability to understand. Since 70% of our visitors are youth and school groups, this is a formative period of time for learning, and museum visits are a powerful tool for learning.
- 3) Printed information distributed at the site in forms of museum visitor's guides, and signage with titles in both Dakota and English.
- 4) The society also publishes a quarterly magazine, which often carries articles on the Dakota culture, and features photographs of the replicas. Examples include "The Two Worlds of Jane Gibbs and the Santee Dakota" Ramsey County History, Vol. 35 #1 or "The Life and Times of Cloud Man" Ramsey County History Volume 36, #1. These are sent to members as a benefit, and available for sale in the museum gift shop and downtown Landmark Center site. (see attached).
- 5) Prairie Restorations Inc. submitted a report summarizing the site history, design considerations, restoration history, planting process, details of the species of plants used, and the long term maintenance requirements. This information is available to the public through interpretive programs, and printed material on the prairie that will be on going for years. In addition, the report is available to the public on request.
- 6) The society's web site has a Dakotah section where viewers can access information about the structures, their furnishings, and the Dakota life style. In the near future the society has plans to include specific information on the Gibbs prairie and heritage trees and landscaping on its web site.
- 7) Future plans for programming the Dakotah Encampment include a Dakotah Day Camp that will use the bark lodge, the tipi, the furnishings, demonstrations (including Dakota games) and the

demonstration areas to present the seasonal Dakotah life style and culture.

8) Additional future plans include an intensive marketing plan. The society has recently completed a marketing plan that focuses on the Gibbs Museum, and the society plans to implement it for the 2002 season. It includes a new name for the museum (the Gibbs Museum of Pioneer and Dakotah Life) and plans for a new logo for the museum that is part of a pro bono contribution by one of the nation's leading design firm, Duffy Design Inc.
