Letter from the Chairman Dr. Joe Bouvette



Getting It Done

The recent groundbreaking ceremonies for the Northstar Agri Industries canola processing plant in Hallock provided an opportunity for federal, state and local dignitaries to comment on the importance of economic development. Senator Al Frankin, Governor Mark Dayton, Representative Collin Peterson's staff, Senator Leroy Stumpf, Representative Dan Fabin, Representative Dave Olin, County Board Chair Dr. Joe Bouvette, Mayor Paul Clay, Hallock, Mayor Todd Truedson, Kennedy and Northstar President, Neil Juhnke all praised the efforts of the local investors who maintained their commitment to the project; a project that will bring critical jobs to our area.

Todd Johnson, Northstar Board of Directors, offered an opening prayer and during the ceremonies pointed out the other individuals and organizations who were also a part of this success, including: local officials, the NWRDC, investors from the Red River Valley, Minnesota and the United States and the various state agencies and federal office who contributed or approved needed permits. All these individuals, agencies and organizations worked together to overcome expected and unexpected barriers that might have derailed this business start-up.

I commented that we have made investments in many approaches to economic development (some that worked and some that did not), but that this new plant represents our determination to create the employment opportunities that will keep the next generation at home and bring back those who would want to return. This is a common theme in Northwest Minnesota: the ability to get the job done by sticking to the task, working together at every level, and the understanding that these new jobs will keep our hometowns thriving and prosperous.

Emergency Services Videoconferencing in Northwest Minnesota

The Northwest Emergency Manager's Joint Powers Board, together with Minnesota Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HSEM), were partners toward acquiring funds to provide videoconferencing capabilities to all fourteen counties in Northwest Minnesota.

The State Technology Standards Workgroup, composed of several state departments as well as regional representatives

from across Minnesota, provided guidance and input throughout this process. Region 3's representative was Beryl Wernberg, Emergency Management Director and 911 Communications Supervisor of Beltrami County. Beryl also served as the chair of the workgroup subcommittee. A state-wide report featuring a



videoconferencing-related county by county needs assessment of all emergency management facilities was compiled by the above group, in coordination with individuals throughout every region in Minnesota.

Videoconferencing systems heavily involved county Emergency Management & Information Technology (IT) staff. The set-ups were placed in or near Emergency Operations Centers, as during emergency situations, individuals do not have the time to travel to another location. Emergency situations have usage priority. Other departments are encouraged to direct usage inquiries to their local Emergency Management Director.


Benefits provided by this system include a reduction in travel costs, lessening of travel/overtime hours and an improvement of overall productivity when the technology use is maximized. This new capability is currently being built into current county and regional operations, and is quickly becoming a commonly used technology for both emergency events and scheduled non-emergency meetings.



What The NWRD C is All About . . .

Regional Development Commissions were created by the State Legislature through the Regional Development Act of 1969. The intent of the Act was to create an option for rural units of government to supplement existing public services and coordinate specific activities of mutual concern. Although created by the State, Regional Development Commissions were left in the hands of local representatives to insure that the final design would reflect area needs and preferences.

The Northwest Regional Development Commission was created on February 2, 1973 by the joint actions of local units of government. Programs were set up to reflect priority work items of the time, and relationships were established with the state and federal agencies that could provide assistance with local projects. Programs and work priorities have changed in response to economic

and social trends; but, the central mission of supporting efforts by cities, counties, townships, businesses and individuals to improve living, working and natural resource conditions in Northwest Minnesota has remained the same.

Our services include grants, business loans, technical assistance, grant writing, planning, direct client services, new program development, fiscal agent support, information and referral, creating partnerships and filling the gaps.



INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and general fund of the Northwest Regional Development Commission as of and for the year ended December 31, 2009, which collectively comprise the Commission's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of Northwest Regional Development Commission's management. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Northwest Regional Development Commission's basic financial statements. The other supplementary information presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations, and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements of the Northwest Regional Development Commission. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

AREAAGENCY ON AGING

Purpose: Land of the Dancing Sky Area Agency on Aging is committed to supporting the dignity and independence of older persons of Northwest and West Central Minnesota. Our services include: providing advocacy and leadership in the development and support of community based services to reduce isolation, improving access to services and to help Seniors remain independent and safe in their homes for as long as possible.

Program Funding Sources: Older Americans Act through the Minnesota Board on Aging - \$474,079; Minnesota Board on Aging EDP - \$45,430; RDC Tax Levy - \$62,684; Miscellaneous - \$1,032.

Regrant Funding Sources: Older Americans Act - \$976,370; U.S. Department of Agriculture Nutrition Program - \$167,822; State Nutrition Program - \$118,732; Region 4 AAA Pass Through - \$1,451,212.

Service Priorities: Regrant priorities are: nutrition, congregate and home delivered meals, legal services, housekeeping, chore, home modification, transportation, Disease Prevention/Health Promotion, early memory care, medication management, fall prevention, bone builders, Matter of Balance, chronic disease prevention, respite care and caregiver supports.

Aging Highlights

Year in Review • • •

This year we conducted a request for proposal for Title III B, D, and E funds for the Planning and Service Area (PSA). With movement toward providing options for seniors to remain in their homes, our efforts have focused on sustaining and developing lower cost home and community based services in our PSA. Extensive work was done to complete an Essential Community Supports Inventory. Land of the Dancing Sky Area Agency on Aging (LDSAAA) has collaborated with many service providers and the state of Minnesota to implement evidenced based programs in 2010 such as Matter of Balance (MOB) and Chronic Disease Self-Management (CDSMP). We have also expanded some research based caregiver support interventions that include: T-Care, Powerful Tools for Caregivers, and Early Memory Care. We are in the early stages of implementing the evidence informed "Live Well at Home" program. We received additional federal funds for early stage memory care and have worked towards advancing memory care. The "Return to Community" initiative has gone well in our region. This fall MDS 3.0 was introduced where Senior Linkage Line® staff assists individuals

over the phone to create a plan exploring long term options and the possibility of returning to their home from a nursing home setting. We continue to maintain the Senior Linkage Line® phone based assistance to older adults throughout the state of Minnesota regarding Medicare, Health Insurance Counseling and Long Term Care Options Counseling. Through our outreach activity we provide information and education to local communities regarding concerns and issues related to seniors and disabled individuals.

Communities for a Lifetime · · ·

EDP Coordinator and staff continued to present to organizations on Minnesota Transform 2010, which educates communities on the upcoming, baby boomer Age Wave and encourages communities to prepare for the increase in the older adult populations. A major emphasis was placed on 'Communities for a Lifetime' and 'Caregiver in the Workplace'. Thirty-seven (37) presentations have been made to county commissioners, community education and professional organizations and various service clubs which include: the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Clubs, Lions Clubs and the Beltrami Non-profit Coalition.

ElderCare Development Partnership • • •

We are entering our 7th year with the Eldercare Development Partnership within our 21 county PSA. The partnership serves the economic development boundaries of Northwest and West Central Minnesota.

Aging continued ...

This collaborative work agreement provides leadership and technical assistance to local providers; to develop and implement service models that are in line with the priorities and outcomes established by the Minnesota Long-Term Care task force and strategies identified in the 2010 Blueprint. The LDSAAA has already begun work identified in the Themes for Action within the 2010 blueprint. Leadership and technical assistance was provided to communities and agencies to expand and strengthen home and community-based services, promote evidenced-based and research-based programs, strengthen care transitions and promote sustainability to a wide variety of service providers.

Matter of Balance · · ·

One LDSAAA staff is a Master Trainer for "Matter of Balance". We facilitated three leader training sessions of MOB which resulted in thirty-two (32) volunteer lay leaders certified in MOB in 2010. Participants include: Assisted Living providers, Nursing Homes, LAH/BNP, Faith in Action, Senior Coordinators, Parish Nurses and Senior Center staff. In 2010, seven (7) MOB classes were held.

Chronic Disease Self Management · · ·

A strong partnership with Minnesota Extension Service, Otter Tail, Becker, Clay and Wilkin County Public Health Departments and OAKS LAH/BNP in Pelican Rapids has expanded Chronic Disease Self-Management in 2010. We also collaborated with Life Care Center in Roseau, Merit Care clinics and Marshall County LAH/BNP's to develop chronic disease management programs throughout the PSA. We coordinated CDSMP training in December, which resulted in 7 newly trained CDSMP coaches.

Powerful Tools for Caregivers · · ·

We expanded some research-based caregiver support interventions that include: Caregiver Consultant, T-Care assessments and Powerful Tools for Caregivers. We coordinated a Powerful Tools leader training workshop, resulting in 13 new leaders, and have expanded caregiver services within our region with the addition of two Powerful Tools for Caregiver classes. They are located at the Middle River-Thief Lake LAH/BNP and Northwood's Interfaith Caregivers.





Early Identification Alzheimer's • • •

Early stage memory care grants have worked towards advancing memory care in partnership with the Alzheimer's Association, Lake Region Healthcare Clinic in Fergus Falls, Alexandria Clinic, Park Rapids LAH/BNP, St. Josephs Hospital and Innovis Clinic of Park Rapids and Life Care Medical Center in Roseau. The main focus of the project is to identify older adults with memory loss and encourage diagnosis and early intervention. This intervention provides a coach who completes an assessment, and then identifies goals that will empower the caregiver to take action steps toward achieving those goals. Using the tools learned will reduce the day to day stress of caring for a loved one with memory loss.

Sustainability of Non-Profits · · ·

Due to the economic challenges within our current economy, many non-profit organizations and Title III grantees struggle to keep their doors open due to cuts in their funding base. Therefore, it became crucial to assist these providers with developing a business plan model in order to sustain their programs. Utilizing the DHS on-line Sustainability Curriculum, LDSAAA facilitated training with 39 providers which included: Title III grantees, CSSD grantees and Non-Profit organizations. In addition, the EDP Coordinator provided 1:1 technical assistance to multiple senior provider organizations in the development of basic business planning, managing multiple funding streams, sliding fee for service scales, third party payer's sources and public private subsidies. Further education on utilizing social network marketing as a key strategy to engage the baby boom generation, will be offered to providers in our region.

Community Service Development Grantees · · ·

EDP Coordinator provided 8 agencies with technical assistance to help with development of grant proposals to the Department of Human Services. Many of these applications were for expansion and development of Homemaker and Chore services, which was identified as a gap in service in the Essential Community Services Inventory and the Gaps Analysis. Our PSA was awarded 3 out of the 10 CSSD grants this year.

Senior LinkAge Line® Calls Received •••

In 2010, the Senior LinkAge Line® Specialists from both the Warren and Fergus Falls offices provided assistance to over 15,700 contacts for

assistance with issues such as Medicare Part D plans, problems with accessing services, housing options, etc. Over 18,999 additional contacts were made on the client's behalf by calling prescription plans, resolving issues with insurance companies and getting them connected to the services they needed.

Senior LinkAge Line® Volunteers · · ·

The new Health Care Reform came with changes for many beneficiaries and an increased need for our volunteers to assist seniors in our regions. With 42,000 Medicare beneficiaries in Minnesota losing their advantage plans this fall, our SHIP volunteers have been busy. They attended training sessions to learn about the new Affordable Health Care Act and how to assist seniors in choosing a new advantage plan. We are very grateful for their continued assistance during these enrollment periods and times of change.

Senior Surf, our computer education program, has also continued to be very popular with seniors in our area. We have two regular Senior Surf sites in Bemidji and Park Rapids, and have held classes in Crookston, East Grand Forks and Warren. We offer a sincere thank you to our volunteers for their time and dedication throughout the year!

Presentations · · ·

Two hundred ninety-three (293) presentations, outreach and other events were provided in the 21-county PSA this year to seniors, family members, service providers and caregivers. Topic areas for the presentations included Falls Prevention, "The File" (Summary of records for Estate Management), Medicare A-D, and Long Term Care Partnership. Staff and volunteers also participated in various health fairs providing information on the extra help available for Medicare beneficiaries for their Medicare Part D premiums. Call the Senior LinkAge Line® if you would like a presentation in your community.

Medicare Changes · · ·

Due to the Affordable Health Care Act, changes have been made to Medicare effective January 1, 2011. Presentations have been provided at many of our Senior and Community Centers. In a time of much anxiety, it was good to clarify the changes to let the seniors know that we can help them.

New to Medicare • • •

We have held "New to Medicare" sessions to help prepare seniors as they become Medicare eligible. The sessions help to educate on how and when to sign up for Medicare, different choices of healthcare plans and drug coverage. We have collaborated with surrounding area employers as a nice benefit for employees that are soon approaching Medicare age.

Outreach Sites at Sanford Clinic · · ·

SLL staff collaborate with Sanford Clinic at two outreach sites located in Thief River Falls and Bemidji by providing 1:1 assistance to older adults. We assist seniors with any issues they have regarding Medicare.

Medicare Part D LIS Outreach & Enrollment Assistance with OPTIONS •••


In November and December of 2010, we again collaborated with OPTIONS Resource Center for Independent Living, to provide 1:1 outreach sessions that assist individuals with Low Income Subsidy, Medicare Advantage and Part D enrollment. Events were held in Crookston, Ada, Fosston, Roseau, Karlstad and Mahnomen. Staffs from both agencies were available for individual meetings with Medicare beneficiaries.

Senior Link Age Line® Highlights

Return to Community Initiative (RTC) · · ·

This project provides a staff person to assist private pay individuals with the ability to return home from a nursing home setting. They create a plan that will provide the services they need to remain safely in their home. Target criteria includes the older person expressing a desire to return to the community and/or having a support person. Residents are early in their nursing home stay and still have community ties that fit a community discharge profile.

Community Living Support Plans were completed for 22 consumers that were returned to the community and 1,333 contacts were made to consumers for assistance in their efforts to return to community.

The Northwest Minnesota Arts Council, as a non-profit, and the Regional Development Commission formed a legal Arts Partnership in August, 2010. They will work together to provide staffing and service to serve the needs of artists and arts organizations in our region.

Promotion and Increasing Visibility •••

In 2010, the Arts Council added an e-newsletter with a distribution of 750 people. People can sign up for the newsletter easily by clicking the link on our website home page www.nwrdc.org/arts.htm. The general public was continually informed through our 65+ page web site and our Northwest Arts newsletter (3 editions) reaching 850+ arts constituents.

Grant Writing and Informational Workshops • • •

Staff conducted eight grant writing and informational workshops in 2010.

Artists of Northwest Minnesota Booklets . . .

Several hundred Artists of Minnesota booklets were distributed. The call for entries for the 2nd Edition of the Artists of Northwest Minnesota booklet occurred in the Fall of 2010. Other booklets related to performing arts and literary arts are being organized.

Arts Project Grant Program ...

From January 1, 2010 - December 31, 2010, we regranted \$29,590 to 6 different productions and 5 sponsorship projects throughout the region. Three of the projects were specifically aimed at children. An estimated 10,600 adults and over 2,000 youth were impacted by the grant activity. Grants increased by 20% from 2009.

Artists in the Schools Grant Program •••

In 2010, \$16,210 was regranted to area schools. Ten projects were awarded serving 2,500 students. Schools supported our area's Safari touring childrens' theatre week-long workshop and productions, as well as residencies with other local artists including Trey Everett, Jean Ranstrom and Bruce Flaig. Our granting levels increased by 60% in this category.



Purpose: To assist communities in maintaining the services and infrastructure needed to support a robust economy and an attractive quality of life.

Erskine Asset Analysis · · ·



Participated in the start-up and marketing of the Minnesota Intelligent Rural Communities project operated by the Blandin Foundation in partnership with Minnesota Extension, MN Work Force Centers, Minnesota Colleges and Universities, PCs for People and other partners. The project is intended to promote expansion and increased use of broadband internet services in rural areas, and grow our technology workforce. Provided staff support to the Thief River Falls Demonstration Community in developing new broadband strategies.

Regional Housing Advisory Group · · ·

Participated in quarterly meetings of the Regional Housing Advisory Group to assist in the identification of resources and strategies for housing development. Identified the shortage of workforce housing as a new priority for 2011.

Rail Abandonments · · ·

Assisted the Roseau County Trailblazers and the Red River Snow Runners in developing a plan and financing for the purchase of rail road properties in the abandonment process for use as multi-purpose trails.

Red River Bridges · · ·

Continued work with local units of government and MnDOT to maintain the bridge system across the Red River. Two new bridges were opened this year at Thompson (south of East Grand Forks) and Drayton (south of Hallock). Total cost of the two bridges was 35 million.

Land of the Dancing Sky · · ·

Updated the "visitnwminnesota.org" website, published the Northwest Minnesota Tourism Directory or Redbook, added a virtual brochure rack to the Visit site to support the promotion efforts of local and regional tourism promotion groups and completed a advertising campaign in local newspapers and media.

Regional Promotion · · ·

Participated in and supported regional tourism and promotion activities including: the Riverland Tourism Conference, Highway 75 King of Highways Scenic Byway, Waters of the Dancing Sky Scenic Byway and the Kittson County EDA.

Legacy Funding · · ·

Identified local capacity to access Legacy Amendment funding as a new priority for the region and continued efforts to support potential legacy projects and better understand the funding processes.

Connecting Children and Nature · · ·


The RDC participated in a conference that addressed connecting children with nature. Dave Bennett, manager of Rydell and Glacial Ridge national wildlife refuges, received a federal grant focusing on children and nature. Partnership funds were provided through the NWRDC, Northwest Sustainable Development Partnership, State Health Improvement Program, River Watch, The University of Minnesota Extension and several other non-profit entities to educate the directors of youth about the importance of nature in the development of children.

The featured speaker at the September workshop was Cheryl Charles, co-founder of the Children and Nature Network http://www.childrenandnature.org/, a New Mexico-based nonprofit she formed in 2006 with Richard Louv, author of "Last Child in the Woods." The RDC has distributed this book throughout the region.

Richard Louv's "Last Child in the Woods" tells a story of the growing disconnect between children and nature; a disconnect that research has shown can impede learning abilities. The goal of the workshop aimed to provide resources for educators, parents and others to reconnect children with nature in the era of iPods, text messaging and computers.

Dave Bennett mentioned the goal of the conference is to get the word out not only from a personal level, but by shedding light on studies that show why teaching children about nature is so important.

The children and nature grant will also provide a series of \$500 mini-grants that schools, clubs or other organizations can apply for to improve youth nature-learning opportunities. The RDC will continue to coordinate the financial aspects to this grant and will organize the distribution and organization of the selection process for the mini-grants in 2011. A teachers workshop will be held in February to present more tools for getting children involved in nature based activities.



Economic Development

Purpose: Maintain and increase the population level and job base in the seven counties of Northwest Minnesota.

Program Funding Sources: United States Economic Development Administration (EDA) - \$62,628; RDC Tax Levy - \$64,516.

Service Priorities: Business Development, Labor Force Development, Renewable Energy, Promotion, Planning.

Economic Development Highlights

Business Assistance • • •


Provided approximately 1,100 hours of staff assistance on job creation and retention related projects including: twenty businesses on business planning, referral, financial packaging and loan applications. This work generated over one million dollars in public and private sector investment and the creation of 105 new jobs. Tight credit and general economic pressures appears to slow some type of activity in the region.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy...

Reviewed economic development strategies in the 2010 CEDS. Major strategies were retained with an increased emphasis on renewable bio-mass commercialization, workforce housing and the unmanned aerial vehicle industrial cluster. Targeted an update to the CEDS following release of 2010 Census data.

Thief River Falls Airport/UAF Cluster · · ·


Assisted the City of Thief River Falls with funding applications for airport improvements (funding was approved). Planning for the transition from a city to a regional airport, and to develop an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) maintenance training center as part of the UAV industry cluster growing in the region.

Wind Energy · · ·

Continued work with Juhl Wind, NextEra Energy, Sequoia Energy and local wind developers. Industry factors may slow projects, but a strong base exists for wind energy development.

East Grand Forks · · ·

Provided assistance to the City on the final completion of the EDA industrial park infrastructure grant (\$425,000 Grant approved) and in final resolution of the EDA security in the Riverwalk Mall. River Cinema proceeded with a \$500,000 expansion in the Mall following the resolution. The industrial park project will provide additional space, existing park in full and an estimated 100 jobs.

St. Hilaire Waste to Energy · · ·

Assisted the city and a private developer on the initial stages in planning a waste to energy conversion plant. The plant would use waste products including: sewage sludge, garbage, bio-mass or other sources of carbon to produce electricity. Provided information on available carbon sources in the area from the County energy audits.

Crookston Alternate Energy · · ·

Assisted the City of Crookston in examining renewable energy strategies including wind, energy efficiency, and other renewable sources.

AURI Innovations Project • • •


Identified ways to increase coordination with the Agricultural Utilization Research Institute in relationship to local energy development and the use of local agricultural commodities in local processing/value added operations. This included the identification of specific projects related to bio-mass and potential projects related to the commercialization of advanced technologies.

Local Investors · · ·

Assisted the Kittson Economic Development Authority in the creation of an informal network of local investors to help support local business development. This is part of a region wide effort to encourage private sector groups to become more active in supporting new business start-ups.

Renewable Energy · · ·

Secured \$15,000 in grant funding for training and public information on renewable energy and energy efficiency. A seminar titled "Lets Do Energy" was held at the Kennedy Go Green Business Incubator with approximately 75 individuals, businesses, units of government and agencies in attendance. The seminar was used to identify short and long term strategies for energy related development. Key strategies will include development of local business capacity to do residential and commercial energy audits, creation of bio-mass harvesting and proven technology energy businesses (such as pellets for heating stoves), support for wind energy development, analysis of the commercial feasibility of new energy technologies (such as biomass gasification) and long term development of local ammonia fertilizer production capacity.

Canola Plant • • •

Final planning and financing for the 170 million dollar canola crushing and oil processing plant in Kittson County was completed with a spring 2011 construction start. RDC staff helped organize some additional consultant assistance and started initial planning for possible issues related to the 250 estimated construction jobs for the project. The project will create 50 full time on-site jobs.

Workforce Housing · · ·

Provided support to Digi-Key on strategies and projects to address labor force shortages related to the company's expansion. Assistance included gathering and providing information about available housing in the area, and continuing with labor force efforts described below.

Workforce Training · · ·

Continued participation in Impact 20/20 in partnership with the Northwest Minnesota Foundation and regional business, education and government partners. Focal point for 2010 was the identification of priority business training needs and design of local training programs to address. Mid level supervisory training was the highest business priority.



NWRDC staff are working to address housing shortages related to business expansions.

Enterprise Loan Fund

Purpose: To strengthen and diversify the economy by providing a source of low interest financing to businesses, when credit is not otherwise available from other sources, and to ensure the successful completion of activities to be financed.

Program Funding Sources: Loan Interest and Loan Fees - \$58,872.

Loan Funding Sources: Loan Repayments and Loan Interest - \$42,000.

Service Priorities: Financing for-profit businesses which create or retain jobs, especially for the long term underemployed or unemployed.

2010 Loan Highlights

Slowdown - 2010 was marked by a decided slowdown in business lending activity throughout Northwest Minnesota and the State. Difficulties exhibited in the state and national economies forced many private lenders to adhere to a tightened credit policy brought on by a more rigid regulatory atmosphere. The Enterprise Fund received requests for loan application information from a variety of clients and customers throughout the year, but projects were put on hold until the economic climate improved and credit eased. NWRDC saw many requests for business assistance, including loan restructures, payment term adjustments, loan workouts, and other technical assistance.

Turnaround - Encouraging signs of an economic turnaround included interest in loan funding from area manufacturers and processors, as well as some retail. Opportunities for expansion and new job creation, in the manufacturing and processing sectors appear much brighter for the coming year. As the economy continues to strengthen, the NWRDC anticipates increased requests for loan funding during 2011.

PoDCo, LLC - In 2010, funding was approved for PoDCo LLC, Lancaster, MN, to add to the size of their facility and purchase new equipment to ramp up production to meet the needs of their customers. PoDCo provides a unique dye sublimation process customizable to products and customers, including decorative finishes to a variety of agricultural, recreational, ornamental, and several other commercial product lines. The processes can be used on almost anything imaginable, as PoDCo's customer products include fishing lures, ceiling tile, window trim, paint guns, and office furniture.

Committee - The Enterprise Fund Loan Committee is made up of representatives from each of the Region One seven counties in Northwest Minnesota. The Committee's members include bankers, accountants, government and economic development professionals.

Management - Management duties of the Loan Fund are split between two staff: Cam Fanfulik and Brenda Solberg. Cam's duties include initial client contacts, guiding clients through the application process, shaping the Ioan packages, performing due diligence on applications, presenting the application package to Ioan committee and post-approval Ioan maintenance. Brenda handles the day to day maintenance of Ioan administration, including UCC searches, document/file updating, correspondence, contracts management and several other duties. Brenda also completed a review of the entire Ioan fund portfolio to determine collectability status of written off and inactive Ioans.



Aided in the acquisition and dispersal of grant dollars to aid local, county and regional entities. This includes enhancement of regional, interoperable communications system capacities, support of existing, regional Special Response/SWAT teams in order to sustain & enhance CBRNE (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear & Explosive) capabilities and building on and integrating the capabilities of local Emergency Operations Centers and response facilities.



Transportation

Purpose: To insure safe and efficient movement of people and commodities in the region. Provide an ongoing forum for important transportation issues in the region. Assist Mn/DOT and provide input with it's planning efforts and programs.

Funding Sources: MN Department of Transportation \$64,905; RDC Tax Levy - \$13,313.

Service Priorities: Direction setting, comprehensive regional planning, legislative advocacy, MN/DOT project coordination.

Transportation Highlights

Greater MN Transit Plan

The RDC contracted with Mn/DOT to complete a Greater Minnesota Transit Investment Plan to identify specific priorities for future transit investment. The investment priorities connect the goals of the policy plan that the RDC assisted with in 2009. The Greater Minnesota Transit Investment Plan will help decision makers prepare for the growing transit demand in Minnesota and increase public understanding of Mn/DOT's priorities for future transit investment.

The state legislature passed Minnesota Statute 174.24 to provide direction for the Greater Minnesota Transit Investment Plan that required Mn/DOT to:

- 1. Conduct an analysis of total transit needs in Greater Minnesota
- 2. Calculate the level of service required to meet total transit service needs in Greater Minnesota
- 3. Prepare an analysis of costs and revenues
- 4. Develop a plan to reduce total transit service needs

In addition, the Legislature directed Mn/DOT to specifically identify the passenger levels, levels of service and costs necessary to address the following targets:

- 5. Meet 80 percent of total transit service needs in Greater Minnesota by 2015
- 6. Meet 90 percent of total transit service needs in Greater Minnesota by 2025
- 7. Identify costs of meeting 100 percent of total transit service needs every five years from 2010 to 2030

The public involvement process was a key component in the development of investment priorities. Mn/DOT employed several public involvement strategies to ensure all interested stakeholders had opportunity to comment.

Additionally, the planning process focused more intensive involvement strategies on stakeholders known to have a high interest in transit investments. The Regional Development Commission assisted in the implementation of the public involvement strategies and were instrumental in gathering comments from their communities.

Kittson County has been a recipient of the number one goal of the investment plan which included providing service to the counties that currently lack service. All seven counties in the region now have transit service. This was a big topic of discussion with the stakeholder group.

Three objectives the stakeholders looked at included what to do with increased or decreased federal and state funding in transit services. The group analyzed expansion, preservation, and contraction of services.

Transportation Continued . . .

Thief River Falls Airport ...

The RDC is assisting Pennington County and Thief River Falls with the organization of a regional airport authority. A meeting was organized with Jack Geller, from the University of Minnesota Crookston, to evaluate the benefits adjacent counties have from a regional airport in Thief River Falls. The University collected data on the numbers of people employed in Thief River that lived in Marshall and Red Lake Counties. The estimates state that there are 916 workers who reside in Marshall County who go to TRF each day to work. The total value of wages they bring back to Marshall County is estimated to be \$26,119,200 annually.

There are 399 workers who reside in Red Lake County who go to TRF each day to work. The total value of wages they bring back to Red Lake County is estimated to be \$11,456,400 annually. The City is also investigating the creation of a foreign trade zone at the airport. The creation of a regional airport authority will help make the region more economically competitive in the world wide global market, and serve as a huge boost to the industries in the region.

Drayton Bridge · · ·

The Drayton Bridge is located between Drayton, ND on state highway 54 and Robbin, MN on state highway 11. Construction of the new Drayton Bridge began in January, 2008. The original steel truss bridge was built in 1954 and was replaced because of the frequent flooding that occurs at this point of the Red River. The new bridge is over 4,000 feet long with a width of 40 feet.

The flooding would often last from 3-6 weeks, creating economic stress for the residents living and working in the area. The Minnesota and North Dakota Departments of Transportation have invested large portions of their district funding to reconstruct new bridges on or adjacent to the Red River. These investments have built "high and dry" bridges that allow the people living along the Red River to have a productive livelihood in Northwestern Minnesota and Northeastern North Dakota. Formation of a Highway 59 Coalition •••


The RDC is looking into the formation of a highway 59 corridor coalition to help address the needs of this corridor as a major shipping route for Northwestern Minnesota. Mn/DOT held a meeting to bring together state highway corridor coalitions and other transportation interests to explore how participants can work more effectively to address corridor issues and challenges.

Specifically, the objectives of the first forum were to: 1) develop a comprehensive summary of corridor issues and challenges, 2) provide attendees with a shared understanding of these issues and challenges, and 3) begin to identify strategies to address these issues and challenges. The next meeting has a preliminary date set in March. Contact the RDC if you have an interest in this regional corridor. A priority of the Transportation Advisory Committee is to have a 24 hour port of entry at Lancaster. The formation of a coalition should help to improve the highway 59 corridor.

Rail Abandonments • • •

There were two railroad abandonments in process this year within the region. Minnesota Northern has abandoned the Warroad to Roseau rail connection in Roseau County and the Perley to Shelly connection in Norman County.

The Roseau County Trailblazers are purchasing the 20-mile corridor between Roseau and Warroad and the Red River Snow Runners are seeking funds to purchase the nearly 20-mile abandonment between Perley and Shelly. Both trail clubs have plans to connect the new trail corridors to existing trail systems, and will be utilized as multi-purpose trails helping to bring economic stimulus to the communities along these corridors.



Special Projects

US FISH AND WILDLIFE CHILDREN AND NATURE

Funding Sources: US Fish and Wildlife Regrant - \$10,769.

Staff: Troy Schroeder

Assisted in the grant writing, grant administration and project organizations with US Fish and Wildlife, Northwest Sustainable Development Partnership, State Health Improvement Program, River Watch, University of Minnesota Extension and several other non-profit entities to educate the directors of youth about the importance of nature in the development of children. The project included a regional workshop presented by Cheryl Charles (co-founder of the Children and Nature Network), a New Mexico-based nonprofit she formed in 2006 with Richard Louv (author of "Last Child in the Woods"). A series of \$500 mini-grants are available to apply for by schools, clubs or other organizations to improve youth nature learning opportunities; and a teachers workshop to present more tools getting children involved in nature based activities.

KITTSON COUNTY - JOBS 2010

Funding Sources: NWMIF - \$13,960; Tax Levy - \$449.

Staff: Leon Heath

Completed a County Development Plan and strategies which included recommendations on moving forward a variety of projects related to job creation. The plan included the identification of seven businesses with job creation potential and approaches for supporting them. High priority businesses were: a diesel repair facility, a homeland security facility, bio-mass energy production and manufacturing expansion. Kittson County Business Expansion - Continued support for business projects identified in the County Development Plan, including assistance in the implementation of a \$40,100 USDA business assistance grant.

NW MN FOUNDATION ENERGY

Funding Sources: NW MN Foundation - \$16,305.

Staff: Cam Fanfulik

NWRDC completed a seven-county study of energy usage and renewable energy resources. The information identifies the "low-hanging fruit"—projects that are the easiest to develop using locally available

sources of renewable energy including: geothermal, wind, solar and biomass. The data was shared with county commissions, businesses, economic developers and the general public through forums held at the GO GREEN Business Incubator in Kennedy. The final goal is to identify and assist individuals and groups that will form businesses for development, marketing and sales of renewable energy for profit.

ENERGY INITIATIVE CATALYST

Funding Sources: NW MN Foundation - \$10,000; Miscellaneous - \$380; Tax Levy - \$537.

Staff: Cam Fanfulik

The REDI Catalyst Program achieved overall goals of expanding outreach and education about renewable energy of all types. At the "Let's Do Energy" Conference in Kennedy, MN, the public was informed about renewable energy systems and energy efficiency measures. Several business and energy consultants participated in the conference to help identify and match the area's renewable energy sources with potential projects for development. This work will continue with the formation of a private investor's group in Kittson County. Energy Audits/Assessments were done on the GO GREEN building; the results and recommendations for improvements were shared with the public in subsequent meetings.

MN TRAIL PLAN

Funding Sources: NW MN Foundation - \$4,761; Tax Levy - \$8,144.

Staff: Troy Schroeder

This project will create a multi-use trail plan for Northwest Minnesota. Several maps will be created to illustrate both motorized and non-motorized recreational uses, and provide a planning guide for connecting existing trails with new proposals. A steering committee with representation throughout the region helped to develop the plan. Maps will contain facilities for camping, nature hiking, launching canoe, parks, wildlife viewing and staging areas. The mapping objectives will be accomplished with the assistance of local public input of trail clubs, MNDNR, Mn/DOT, counties, cities and other regional organizations that focus on trail development. Law enforcement has provided valuable information to structuring the use of motorized trails, particularly ATV's in Thief River Falls.

Plans and Publications

Plans

2010 Area Plan on Aging - The Area Plan on Aging examines senior input and demographic data to establish priorities for the use of Title III Older Americans Act funds. Includes information on the unique characteristics of our region, demographics, accomplishments, program outcomes and budget information.

CY 2010 NWRDC Work Program - Details the goals and objectives of each of the program areas of the Commission including changes made to address emerging needs in the region, changes in funding levels and changes in program priorities.

2010 CEDS - The Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the seven-county region includes a review of statistical trends, a revision of development strategies, the identification of priority projects and review of individual county development strategies. Key revisions for 2009 included an increased concern about population loss and an emphasis on renewable energy development.

FY 2010-11 Regional Arts Plans - Goals, strategies and work activities for State Arts Funds and McKnight Arts Funds are included in these plans.

Revolving Loan Fund Plan - Describes the program elements and guidelines for the loan fund.

Northern and Western MN Freight Plans - The RDC is participating in freight plans for Northern & Western MN. The purpose of these multi-modal freight plans is to build on prior planning activities by providing a better understanding of the demands of freight on the regional transportation infrastructure and to identify policies, programs, and projects that can accommodate those demands.

Newfolden Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance - The comprehensive plan and zoning ordinances are intended to make the community more attractive to potential residents and identify sites for new housing development.

Rocksbury Township Plan and Zoning Ordinance - The township finalized their comprehensive plan and completed work on a revised zoning ordinance. The new ordinance focuses on planning for Thief River Falls growth needs, supporting rural lifestyles, encouraging higher density housing in existing areas with similar characteristics and reducing the need for zoning permits when there is no change in usage. NWRDC provided staff assistance for writing the plan and ordinance.

Wilkin County All Hazard Mitigation Plan - The Wilkin County All Hazard Mitigation Plan has been substantially completed and is awaiting approval status.





Transportation

Bridge Ceremony - The Thompson Bridge is located about 15 miles southeast of East Grand Forks. The bridge connects Polk County State Aid Highway 9 in Minnesota with Grand Forks County Road 7 in North Dakota. The new bridge cost \$7.4 million; the bridge has a deck elevation that is 13 feet higher than the old structure. Its deck is three feet above the level at which the Red River peaked during the flood of the century in 1997. The bridge has a curb-to-curb width of 40 feet that will provide for much safer conditions, especially for farm equipment and truck traffic. The road realignment provides a straight crossing over the river at the 55 MPH posted speed limit. The old bridge will be removed over the winter months.

The new \$7.4 million "high and dry" bridge has a deck elevation that is 13 feet higher than the old structure. \$7.2 million was paid by the federal economic stimulus package, which was made possible by the hard work put forth by the Polk and Grand Forks County Highway Departments. The bridge wasn't scheduled for replacement until 2014.

Aging

MDS and New Senior LinkAge Line® Staff -

Effective October 1, 2010, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) replaced the current federally prescribed health functional assessment used with nursing home residents, known as the Minimum Data Set (MDS).

The new version of the MDS contains changes to the Section Q (Attachment A) which requires the nursing home to ask each resident at admission, quarterly and annually "Do you want to talk to someone about the possibility of returning to the community?" If the answer is "Yes" the nursing home designated discharge planning staff is required to make a referral to the designated local contact agency, if appropriate. In Minnesota, the local contact agency is the Senior LinkAge Line®.

As the designated agency, the Senior LinkAge Line® staff utilizes long-term care options; counseling and service protocols to ensure the resident receives the assistance requested. This may include helping the nursing home resident develop a comprehensive person-centered discharge care plan in coordination and conjunction with the nursing home discharge planning staff.

Amanda Caillier is our new Senior LinkAge Line® staff and will be performing this counseling.

Economic Development

Northstar Agri-Industries, Inc.- Kittson County - Northstar Agri-Industries, Inc. held a groundbreaking on January 6, 2011 for a fully integrated canola crushing and refining facility, located between Hallock and Kennedy, MN. The plant will process 365,000 tons of canola into 280 million pounds of food-grade canola oil and 195,000 tons of canola meal for the livestock. The project will inject more than \$160 million into the regional economy. It is likely to be the largest privately financed project in the State of Minnesota in 2011-2012. Up to 250 temporary construction jobs will be created and 50 new permanent operations jobs are anticipated with an annual estimated payroll of \$3.5 million.
