RE: Annual Report on Obsolete, Unnecessary, or Duplicative Rules as Required by
Minnesota Statutes Section 14.05, Subdivision 5.

Dear Governor Pawlenty, Senators, Representatives and Revisor Timmons:

Minnesota Statutes, section 14.05, subdivision 5, directs state agencies to report to you by December 1 of each year whether any of their rules are obsolete, unnecessary, or duplicative of other state or federal statutes or rules.

The Minnesota Department of Commerce has reviewed its rules and found that the following rules are obsolete, unnecessary, or duplicative of other federal statutes or rules:

(1) Minnesota Rules Chapter 7635: Residential Energy Conservation Program

These rules provide minimum energy efficiency standards for residential buildings, procedures for energy audits and certification of energy auditors. These rules were intended to implement a federal program that was repealed early in the Reagan Administration. The rules are now out of date. Recent analysis of these rules by an advisory committee representing energy auditors and energy utilities resulted in recommending repeal. Chapter 7635 should be repealed in its entirety.

(2) Minnesota Rules chapter 7655: Energy Audits; Rental Buildings


These rules provide minimum efficiency standards for residential buildings (in particular, rental property), procedures for energy audits and certification of energy auditors. These rules have never been enforced. In the early 1980s, the Department was preparing a proactive enforcement initiative, but a budget shortage prevented implementation. In February 2003, an advisory committee representing energy auditors, rental property owners as well as tenant advocacy groups agreed that is doubtful that these rules have resulted in any energy being saved and that the approach is unreasonable. Chapter 7655 should be repealed in its entirety.

The Department intends to seek approval from the Governor's Office to repeal chapters 7635 and 7655 as part of legislative initiatives for the 2005 Legislative Session. These initiatives will also involve the amendment or repeal of certain related statutory sections.
