

# December 2011 General Assistance Caseload: Active Cases and Eligible People

July 2012 Transition to Economic Stability Division Minnesota Department of Human Services

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#### **General Assistance in December 2011**

The General Assistance (GA) program provides monthly cash grants to childless adults and some children that are not living with their parents. Program recipients must have assets of less than \$1,000 and countable net income must be less than the maximum grant amount which is \$203 for most cases. This report provides a snapshot of the household, demographic, and economic characteristics of GA households and eligible people in December 2011.

For this report, GA cases were separated into three categories:

- Community cases were cases where the members resided in their own housing, either alone or with others,
- Residential Facility cases<sup>1</sup> were cases where the members resided in a facility at some point during the month, and
- Children on GA were cases where the eligible person was a child, living either independently or with others but not a legal guardian or parent.

In December 2011 there were 21,704 eligible people receiving GA in 21,580 cases. As seen in Figure 1, December cases increased by 9 percent in the previous year, which is within the normal yearly increase of between 7 and 10 percent. The small decrease between December 2009 and December 2010 (174 cases less) was anomalous and may reflect the end of General Assistance Medical Care (GAMC) in 2010.

The typical GA-eligible person is a 43-year-old white male, who has never married, has a high school diploma, and is a U.S. citizen. Two-thirds of all GA-eligible people were male, but adults in Residential Facility cases were the most likely to be male (76 percent compared to 59 percent in Community cases) and never married (71 percent compared to 60 percent in Community cases). More than two-thirds of GA-eligible adults had at least a high school diploma. More than half of GA-eligible people were white, but blacks and American Indians were over-represented compared to their proportion of the total Minnesota population. According to the 2005 - 2009 American Community Survey (ACS) estimates, blacks made up 4 percent and American Indians made up 1 percent of Minnesota's population. Thirty-one percent of GA-eligible people reported a race of black and 7 percent reported that they identified as American Indian. (Table 1)

Unlike adults receiving GA, 70 percent of the small numbers of GA-eligible children were black and 54 percent were female. In previous reports a higher proportion of GA-eligible children were not U.S. citizens as compared to eligible adults, but the proportions were equal in December 2011. (Table 1)

Thirty-two percent of GA-eligible people had a current Interim Assistance Agreement (IAA)<sup>2</sup>; 38 percent of adults in Community cases had an IAA agreement, compared to 18

percent of Facility cases and none of the Children cases.<sup>3</sup> The percent with an IAA has not changed in recent report years. Seven percent received Medical Assistance (MA) due to a determination by a State Medical Review Team (SMRT) which identifies people likely to qualify for Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Thirteen percent reported homelessness, but this measure is believed to undercount actual homelessness. (Table 2)

The most common GA eligibility reason for people in Community cases was being ill or incapacitated (67 percent) and for Residential Facility cases it was being the resident of a facility (77 percent). Children on GA cases were most likely to be eligible because they were age 16 or 17 and living independently of their parents or guardian (64 percent) or living with an unrelated adult who was not the child's legal guardian (30 percent). (Table 2)

The average General Assistance grant was \$165. The maximum grant for an adult is \$203 and for a child \$250. Overall, 27 percent of cases received only a Personal Needs Allowance of \$89, including 85 percent of Residential Facility Cases and 5 percent of Community Cases. Three-quarters of December 2011 GA cases were also eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program<sup>4</sup> (SNAP) in December 2011. Community cases were mostly likely to be Food Support eligible (92 percent). Facility residents who receive more than half of their meals from the institution are generally ineligible for SNAP with some exceptions. Ninety-three percent of cases had at least one person eligible for Medical Assistance (MA). (Table 3)

The average length of the current spell of GA usage was 17 months and cumulatively over the past nine years the average total time on GA was 25 months. Thirty-seven percent of cases had used 6 months of less of GA in the most current spell and 41 percent had used 12 months or less over the last nine years. (Table 3)

Very few cases had earned income reported in the Department of Human Services administrative database. Two percent of cases reported earned income for December 2011. The average amount of gross income for all cases with reported work was \$459. Eleven percent of all cases had wages reported to Minnesota's Unemployment Insurance (UI) system for the fourth quarter 2011, which included December. Quarterly wages for cases with reported wages averaged \$1,445. (Table 3)

Twenty-four percent of December 2011 GA cases had never received public cash assistance in Minnesota prior to 2011. Most of these new cases (86 percent) were Minnesota residents prior to 2011. (Table 3)



Sixty percent of GA cases live in either Hennepin or Ramsey Counties, Minnesota's core urban counties. (Table 4)

#### **Notes and Definitions**

Case Types. Children on GA cases were determined by being less than 18 years of age in December 2011. Residential Facility cases were cases with an active facility panel in the DHS administrative database (MAXIS) for December 2011 and a facility entry date on or before December 31, 2011, and a facility exit date that was either blank, a December 2011 date greater than the entry date, or greater than December 31, 2011. Cases that spent part of December in a facility, but not the entire month, were considered Residential Facility cases. Community cases were all other cases that did not meet the criteria for a Residential Facility case or Children on GA case.

**Demographic Data.** Data that do not affect program eligibility might not be updated after the initial application. Changes in marital status, citizenship, and education level may be underreported.

One person was missing demographic data.

Previously married includes people who were divorced and legally separated. Married includes those living together and spouses not living together.

**Recipient Characteristics.** The measurement for homelessness is unreliable. People were considered homeless if they had the Homeless Indicator in MAXIS marked "Yes" or had a General Delivery address. These variables are frequently not updated, thus a person who gained housing may still be marked as homeless or a person who had housing and became homeless may still be marked as being housed. This variable does not consider people that are doubled up or otherwise precariously housed as homeless.

Recipients were considered to have a current IAA if they had a current STAT PBEN panel in MAXIS, the state eligibility system, and had an SSI or RSDI application disposition of approved or pending. Previous reports restricted this further by only including those cases in which the SSI or RSDI application was made within the last twelve months, which followed current practice. However, the application could have been made more than twelve months ago and still be an active IAA. The Social Security Administration will accept an IAA that was signed up to a year before the SSI application or anytime after the SSI application was made and it continues in effect as long as the claim is active. The STAT PBEN panel may not be updated to reflect a signing of an IAA or a change in SSI application status.

A recipient was considered to have SMRT Medical Assistance if they had a current STAT DISA panel; a disability start date that was before December 31, 2011, either no disability end date or an end date after December 31, 2011; and a health care disability status that indicated a SMRT review.

The other GA eligibility bases were emancipated minor, family violence, mentally ill or retarded, learning disabled, under protection/court ordered, and family member with no other GA eligibility basis. Some adults have GA eligibility bases that are for minors. This is because their eligibility basis has not been updated since their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. Table 2A is

person-level data for GA eligibility basis; span length and cumulative months were the maximum for the case. Therefore, if a case had two eligible people, the longer length of time was used to describe the case. Only the five most common eligibility types are included.

The other facility types were nursing facilities, intensive care facilities, medical hospitals, non-group residential housing, and adult correctional facilities.

**Economic Characteristics.** Case eligibility for other cash, food, and medical programs was determined by case number. If a member in the case received benefits under a different case number, that person's benefits were not included in this table.

Earned income was self-employment or paid wages reported to MAXIS. Income was either verified retrospective earnings reported in February 2012 for December 2011 or, in the absence of retrospective income, prospective earnings for December 2011.

Unemployment Insurance (UI) wages only include wages that are reported to Minnesota's UI system. Religious, federal government and seasonal or temporary employment are excluded, as well as employment for cash and in other states.

New GA cases in 2011 were December 2011 cases active in a GA case in Minnesota for one or more months in 2011 but receiving no cash in 1992 to 2011 (the period covered by the state administrative database) in MFIP, DWP, GRH, MSA, GA, RCA, AFDC, or Family General Assistance (FGA). The FGA and AFDC programs were replaced by MFIP in 1998. A case could have been active on Food Support or a medical program. Cases new to the state had a 2011 state entry date. Minnesota residents were either lifelong residents or had moved to the state before 2011.
