Dear Governor Dayton:

The Department of Public Safety, Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) is pleased to submit the *Minnesota Crime Information-2012* report for your review. This report is in accordance with Minnesota State Statute 299C.18.

In 2012 Minnesota recorded a 1.4% increase in Part 1 crimes. The violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) increased 3.8% and property crimes (burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson) increased 1.2%.

This report provides statistics to law enforcement, members of state government and the general public for their use in analyzing crime in Minnesota. In addition, the data has been submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

These statistics have been compiled from data submitted by the Minnesota police chiefs and sheriffs. Their continued contributions allow the BCA to provide what is currently the most comprehensive picture of crime in Minnesota.

PREFACE

In 1935, the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension was given the responsibility to collect activity information from the law enforcement agencies throughout the State of Minnesota. Biennially, reports were completed and forwarded to the concerned parties as required by State Statute. In 1972, the publications began to be printed annually.

This report measures the amount of criminal activity within the State as collected and prepared from data submitted by individual law enforcement agencies. The criminal activity consists of measurements involving offenses, clearances, and arrests.

Along with the collection of crime statistics, other statutory requirements are included in this publication. Among those requirements are sections that provide information on the number of law enforcement officers killed or assaulted; firearms discharges by police officers; missing children reports; police pursuits, and bias offenses.

Limited information is also available on law enforcement personnel.

Comparisons with previous years' statistics will be presented for trend changes that might be of use to the evaluator. Individual comparisons on specific measurements will be left to the evaluator for use as required by the individual's need.

The *Minnesota Crime Information – 2012* publication is compiled from crime statistics that were provided by Minnesota's police and sheriffs. Notations are provided on Table 46, *Offenses, Clearances, Percent Cleared and Crime Rate by Agency-2012*, to agencies not submitting 12 months worth of data. Any comparisons with previous years should be viewed with caution.

The Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Bureau of Criminal Apprehension wishes to express its thanks to the cooperating law enforcement agencies whose assistance provide the success of this publication.

NOTICE

The data presented in this report are those submitted by law enforcement agencies in Minnesota. Each agency is responsible for the accuracy, completeness and timeliness of the data the agency chooses to submit. Agency policy on what to submit for certain types of incidents may vary and those variances are reflected in the data and statistics presented. The submitted data are used to create the statistics presented in this report.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES CONTRIBUTING

To assure an accurate interpretation of the data presented in this report, the exact number of law enforcement agencies submitting information must be indicated. Specifically, reports are collected for urban places (cities and towns) and rural areas according to the definitions of Uniform Crime Reporting. The police departments report information for cities while the sheriff's departments collect information for the rural areas.

The Department of Public Safety requests that information from all reporting agencies be submitted regularly. Since 1936, the average percent of sheriff's and police departments forwarding information has been at least 94 percent. The 99 percent contribution figure for 2012 is further evidence of the high degree of cooperation reflected by those agencies submitting information.

* After 2007 F.B.I. Population Estimates were derived differently than previous years. Rather than applying the state population rate of growth uniformly to all agencies, the UCR staff computed individual rates of growth from one year to the next for every city/town and county for a seven year period (2000-2006). Each agency's rates of growth were averaged and that average was applied and added to its Census population figure to derive the current year population estimates.

CRIME INFORMATION

BACKGROUND

The State of Minnesota, since 1936, has participated in the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Program. The statistics that have been generated each year are not only of vital concern to national figures, but are equally important to the State as a whole. In 1972, Minnesota began collecting crime related data as part of a computerized statewide Criminal Justice Reporting System program. The benefits derived from such an automated program are indicated in a modernistic approach to the collection of Uniform Crime Reports.

The responsibility and authority for collecting and disseminating the UCR information was mandated to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension through applicable State Statutes. The State Statutes are as follows:

MINNESOTA STATE STATUTES, CHAPTER 299C

299C.05 DIVISION OF CRIMINAL STATISTICS.

There is hereby established within the bureau a division of criminal statistics, and the superintendent, within the limits of membership herein prescribed, shall appoint a qualified statistician and one assistant to be in charge thereof. It shall be the duty of this division to collect, and preserve as a record of the bureau, information concerning the number and nature of offenses known to have been committed in the state, of the legal steps taken in connection therewith from the inception of the complaint to the final discharge of the defendant and such other information as may be useful in the study of crime and administration of justice. The information so collected and preserved shall include such data as may be requested by the United States Department of Justice, at Washington, under its national system of crime reporting. To the extent possible, the superintendent must utilize a nationally recognized system or standard approved by the Federal Bureau of Investigation to collect and preserve crime data.

299C.06 DIVISION POWERS AND DUTIES; LOCAL OFFICERS TO COOPERATE.

It shall be the duty of all sheriff's, chiefs of police, city marshals, constables, prison wardens, superintendents of insane hospitals, reformatories and correctional schools, probation and parole officers, school attendance officers, coroners, county attorneys, court clerks, the liquor control commissioner, the commissioner of highways, and the state fire marshal to furnish to the division statistics and information regarding the number of crimes reported and discovered, arrests made, complaints, information and indictments filed and the disposition

made of same, pleas, convictions, acquittals, probation granted or denied, conditional release information, receipts, transfers, and discharges to and from prisons, reformatories, correctional schools and other institutions, paroles granted and revoked, commutation of sentences and pardons granted and rescinded, and all other data useful in determining the cause and amount of crime in this state and to form a basis for the study of crime, police methods, court procedure, and penal problems. Such statistics and information shall be furnished upon the request of the division and upon such forms as may be prescribed and furnished by it. Unless otherwise required or permitted by the superintendent of the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, an agency or person furnishing information under this section must utilize a nationally recognized system or standard approved by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for reporting statistics and information. The division shall have the power to inspect and prescribe the form and substance of the records kept by those officials from which the information is so furnished.

299C.12 RECORDS KEPT BY PEACE OFFICERS; REPORTS.

Every peace officer shall keep or cause to be kept a permanent written record, in such form as the superintendent may prescribe, of all felonies reported to or discovered by him within his jurisdiction and of all warrants of arrest for felonies and search warrants issued to him in relation to the commission of felonies, and shall make or cause to be made to the sheriff of the county and the bureau, reports of all such crimes, upon such forms as the superintendent may prescribe, including a statement of the facts and a description of the offender, so far as known, the offender's method of operation, the action taken by the officer, and such other information as the superintendent may require.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The primary goal of the UCR program in Minnesota is to provide statistical information on the volume and affect of crime. To better assist concerned individuals and agencies to solve the state crime problem, a more encompassing approach involving all aspects of criminal activity was needed. With this in mind, and examining the recommendations of the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice, the UCR program became one aspect of the computerized State Criminal Justice Reporting System.

The major objectives of Minnesota's UCR Program include:

1. Statistics on crime in Minnesota to be used by the Governor, Legislature, Crime Control Planning Board, and other concerned individuals within the State.
2. Statistics on crime for administrative and operational use by law enforcement administrators.
3. Statistics on specific criminal offenses to be used in the FBI's national crime reports.
4. Statistics involving the age, sex and race of offenders to determine the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement.
5. Statistics on crime for researchers to assist in the formation of the causes of crime within a biological, sociological and/or psychological framework.
6. Statistics on crime to measure the workload and effectiveness of the 'current' state criminal justice system.
7. Statistics on crime for personnel employed by the criminal justice system to help assist them in improving the efficiency and performance of criminal justice agencies.

REPORTING PROCEDURES

Through Minnesota's crime reporting statutes, participating Minnesota Law Enforcement Agencies are required to submit information as determined by the Department of Public Safety. The required information is tallied from the individual agency's internal record of complaints, investigations, miscellaneous reports and arrests. To help achieve a uniformity of reporting throughout the State, a copy of the FBI's *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook* is offered to each agency. In conjunction with the manuals, numerous training sessions in record and report writing and filing are offered to each agency by field representatives of the Department of Public Safety. Individual contact with agencies experiencing difficulty in any phase of the Criminal Justice Reporting System is also offered by the field representatives. Verification for authenticity of reports that are submitted are handled by staff at the Department of Public Safety or by a special "edit" program written into the computerized Criminal Justice Reporting System. Inconsistencies of report information and minor errors are corrected by telephone or terminal

contact. Major errors in UCR reporting methods are handled exclusively by field representatives.

The Department of Public Safety, along with the FBI, has established their specific program to measure criminal data activity for both state and federal purposes. The result is a tabulation of the number and type of offenses committed, cases cleared or solved, and the persons arrested. A criminal act may involve several crimes, several persons, and several victims; but all that is necessary for such an act to be reported and recorded by the state and federal programs is one violation. If a given criminal act involves more than one offense, only the more serious offense is counted. "Clearance by arrest" indicates that at least one person was arrested. It does not preclude the fact others may have also been involved in the offense. Any additional arrests are purely supplemental and are used for each department's record purposes only and not reported under the program.

Another part of criminal data collection involves juvenile offenses and arrests. When reviewing such data it should be remembered that many times juvenile offenses are handled informally within the different agencies and therefore go unreported. In cases where an offense involves both adults and juveniles, and subsequent arrests are made of both, the crime reporting program will indicate this offense to be cleared by the arrest of the adult. Juvenile arrests are used for clearance purposes only in those instances where juveniles alone are involved.

Clearing an offense by the arrest of a person(s) is but one means of indicating such activity. Another involves the clearing of a reported offense by use of the term "exceptionally cleared". An exceptional clearance exists when some element beyond law enforcement action prevents formal charges against the offender. Such a situation might arise if:

1. The offender commits suicide.
2. A double murder occurs (two persons kill each other).
3. The offender dies after making a confession (dying declaration).
4. The offender is killed by a law enforcement officer.
5. The offender confesses to committing the crime while already in custody for another crime or serving a sentence.

6. The offender is prosecuted in another city for a different crime by federal, state, or local authorities, or for the same offense, and the other jurisdiction refuses to release the offender.
7. Another jurisdiction refuses to extradite the offender.
8. The victim of a crime refuses to cooperate in the prosecution.
9. The offender is prosecuted for a less serious charge than the one for which he was arrested.
10. The offender is a juvenile who is handled by a verbal or written notice to the parents in instances involving minor offenses.

The count of offenses is taken from the record of complaints received by law enforcement agencies from victims, witnesses, other sources or discovered by them during their own operation. Complaints determined by subsequent investigation to be unfounded are eliminated from the court. The resulting number of "offenses actually known to law enforcement agencies" for each crime offense category is reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy, or any other consideration. Reported offenses are recorded by the municipality and county in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise in some manner dispose of the case. Municipal law enforcement agencies report those crimes which occur in the counties outside the city. Law enforcement agencies also report on a periodic basis, supplemental offense information such as the value of property stolen and recovered as well as circumstances surrounding homicides. Additional reports of persons arrested are submitted. These reports provide information concerning the age, sex and race of persons arrested by each individual law enforcement agency. Reports of persons arrested are separated as to adults and juveniles.

Crime data and information submitted by municipal and county law enforcement agencies is collected on a daily and semi-daily basis under the Minnesota Criminal Justice Reporting System program. Once received, it is processed and disseminated for use in state and national reports as well as by the participating agencies themselves (see CJRS-UCR flow chart).

"Crime rate" is a term often used in evaluating criminal statistics. The crime rate represents or equates the number of index crimes per 100,000 in population.

Basically, it refers to the comparison of the number of offenses with the number of potential offenses and the number of persons exposed to the risk of the offense. It does not include other variables which might affect the amount of crime within a given area.

CRIME FACTORS

When the current method of crime reporting is considered, several limitations in its accuracy may be immediately recognizable. Law enforcement agencies are not totally to blame because of their capability to only report that which is known to them. In many instances, the very citizens who are themselves "victims" of a crime fail to inform the law enforcement agency of their occurrence. There is a general tendency among the public to not report minor crimes that are, in their eyes, of little consequence. The public may also feel that the law enforcement agency is of little help to them. They may also feel the threat of blackmail or retaliation for participating in a sex, gambling, or narcotic offense. The public may also feel the threat of embarrassment for being involved in a crime regarded against the norms of society. Given these factors, much crime is never included in the total state evaluation of the crime problem.

Another element of concern is the actual number of law enforcement agencies reporting crime information. Lack of crime information by delinquent agencies can potentially reduce the accuracy of the crime picture as developed from reported information.

The term "selective reporting" also has a bearing on the crime reported by participating agencies. Selective reporting reflects only the crimes for which an agency considers important or necessary to be reported through the system. The information that is utilized from such reporting is slanted and misleading. It does not give an accurate account of the crime problem and it further discredits the time spent in reporting the "selected" activity. Such reporting is immediately recognizable from the output reports and its improper use affects all the information submitted by the contributing law enforcement agencies.

Extraneous conditions beyond the realm of law enforcement also affect the measurement and analysis of crime. These conditions, or CRIME FACTORS, include but are not necessarily limited to:

- A. Legislative changes as to what constitutes a criminal offense.

- B. Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is part.
- C. Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- D. Economic status and mores of the population.
- E. Relative stability of population including commuters, seasonal and other transient types.
- F. Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- G. Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- H. Effective strength of the police force.
- I. Standards governing appointments to the police force.
- J. Policies of each of the law enforcement agencies.
- K. Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.

- L. Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.
- M. The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.


Information provided in the *Minnesota Crime Information 2012*, is as accurate as currently available in the State. Crime and arrest statistics should be interpreted with caution when comparing different law enforcement jurisdictions. **Reported crimes relate to events, while arrests relate to persons.** For any one criminal act there may be multiple crimes, multiple offenders, and multiple victims.

Given the above considerations the total crime picture is indeed influenced by many variables. Opponents of the Uniform Crime Reporting System are often vocal in pointing out the inadequacy of this system. Proponents respond by indicating that at the present time there is no other suitable method of collecting criminal statistics. If a better system is developed, tested, and offered as a replacement, law enforcement will not hesitate to implement it.

A DESCRIPTION OF UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING OFFENSES AND THEIR CLASSIFICATION

The Department of Public Safety/Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, using the reporting techniques recommended by the FBI, records criminal data submitted by the many law enforcement agencies in the State. The criminal data collected contains information regarding Part I Offenses called to the attention of Minnesota Law Enforcement agencies.

Part I Offenses reflect information on eight "serious" crime classifications, and it is generally referred to as the "Crime Index" measurement. Part II Offenses are represented by twenty "less serious" crime classifications.

The eight crimes represented in the Part I Offenses include murder, rape, aggravated assault, robbery, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson. These crimes were chosen because of their uniformity of definition, total volumes, and likelihood of being reported. The crimes of murder, rape, aggravated assault, and robbery are also known as "violent crimes." The crimes of burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson are labeled as "property crimes." The law enforcement agency may become aware of these crimes in several ways; reports of its own officers, citizens complaints, notification from the prosecuting attorney and from information supplied by court officials.

PART I OFFENSES (Serious Crime)

Criminal Homicide - The killing of another person.

- a) Murder - Any unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present in the murder.
- b) Manslaughter - Any unlawful killing of a human being without the element of malice aforethought is counted as manslaughter.
- c) Death by Negligence - Any death that occurs because of the negligence of some person other than the victim and that is not in the commission of an unlawful act. These are deaths which police investigation established as primarily caused by gross negligence.

Forcible Rape (does not include Statutory Rape).

- a) Rape by Force - The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will, but excluding statutory rape and other sex offenses.
- b) Assault to Rape-Attempts - All assaults and attempts to rape.

Robbery - A robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of property of another against his will by violence or by putting him in fear. This includes all attempts.

- a) Armed Robbery-Any Weapon - When any object is so employed as to constitute force or the threat of force, it will be considered a weapon. This would include firearms, knives, clubs, brass knuckles, blackjacks, broken bottles, acid, explosives, etc. Cases involving possible pretended weapons or cases involving weapons not seen by the victim but which the robber claims to have with him should be counted in this category.
- b) Strong Arm-No Weapons - This includes muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used by strong-arm tactics are employed to deprive the victim of his property. This definition is limited to hands, arms, fists, feet, etc. Include all attempts.

Aggravated Assault - An Aggravated Assault is an attempt or offer with unlawful force or violence to do physical injury to another. As a general rule all assaults will be classified and scored in this category. Exclude assaults with intent to rob or rape. Excludes simple assault, assault and battery, fighting, etc. These will be scored in the appropriate category.

- a) Gun - Includes all assaults or attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearm. This includes revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, pellet guns, etc.
- b) Knife or Cutting Instrument - Includes all assaults or attempted assaults involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects such as knives or razors, hatchets, axes, cleavers, scissors, glass, broken bottles, daggers, ice picks, etc.
- c) Other Dangerous Weapons - Includes all assaults or attempted assaults when an object other than a gun, knife or cutting instrument

is used. This includes clubs, bricks, jack handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poisons, scalding water, and cases of attempted drowning and burning, etc.

- d) **Hands, Fists, Feet, etc. Aggravated** - Includes all assaults with hands, fists, feet, etc., which could result in an aggravated assault conviction. In order to be classified as aggravated, the victim must suffer great bodily harm.

Burglary - Breaking and Entering - Includes any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. As a general rule, score as one offense, any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any dwelling, attached structure, public building, shop, factory, storehouse, apartment, house, trailer, warehouse, mill, farm, ship, railroad car, etc. For UCR purposes, breaking and entering with larceny is classified and scored only as breaking and entering. This does not include breaking and entering of motor vehicles. These are scored in the larceny category.

- a) **Forcible Entry** - Includes all offenses where force of any kind is used to unlawfully enter a locked structure such as any of those listed above with intent to steal or commit a felony. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluloid, or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building followed by breaking out of the structure should also be scored here.
- b) **Unlawful Entry-No Force** - Includes any unlawful entry when you fail to discover any evidence of forcible entry.
- c) **Attempted Forcible Entry** - Included in this category only when your investigation determines that a forcible entry has been attempted.

Larceny-Theft (does not include Motor Vehicle Theft) - This category includes the unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. This involves all larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting, larceny from auto, larceny of auto parts and accessories, bicycle theft, larceny from buildings, and larceny from any coin operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or any theft that does not result from a breaking and entering shall be scored here. Excludes embezzlements, unlawful conversions,

larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks. Enter all attempted larcenies. Note: when the true or known value of stolen property is not available, estimates based on accepted police methods of property evaluation should be used for the purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting.

Motor Vehicle Theft - This category includes larceny or attempted larceny of motor vehicles. Includes all thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Excludes incidents in which the alleged offender had lawful access to the vehicle as in a family situation or the unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle such as chauffeur, employee, etc.

Arson - Includes all arrests for violation of state law and municipal ordinances relating to arson and attempted arson. This generally includes any willful or malicious burning of a dwelling, church, college, jail, meeting house, public building, ship or other vessel, motor vehicle, aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, goods or chattels, crops, trees, fences, gates, grain, vegetable products, lumber, woods, marshes, meadows, etc. A death resulting from arson will be classified as murder and personal injuries resulting would be classified as assaults.

PART II OFFENSES (Less Serious Crime)

Other Assaults - This classification consists of all assaults and attempted assaults which are simple or minor in nature.

Forgery and Counterfeiting - In this case, place all offenses dealing with the making, altering, uttering or possession with intent to defraud, anything false in a semblance of that which is true. Include altering or forging of public or other records, making, altering, forging or counterfeiting coins, plates, banknotes, checks, etc. Possessing or uttering forged or counterfeited instruments, signing the name of another or a fictitious person with intent to defraud and all attempts to commit any of the above acts.

Fraud - This is defined as fraudulent conversion and obtaining money by false pretense. Include bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

Embezzlement - This is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

Stolen Property-Buying, Receiving, Possessing

- This includes all offenses of buying, receiving, possessing, or concealing stolen property as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

Vandalism-Destruction of Property

- This includes all willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth or any other such means as may be specified by law.

Weapons

- This classification includes violation of weapon laws such as the manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons or silencers, carrying deadly weapons, aliens possessing deadly weapons, and all attempts to commit any of the above offenses.

Prostitution and Commercialized Vice

- Include in this class the sex offenses of a commercialized nature such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, disorderly house, or house of ill repute, pandering, procuring, transporting or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc., and all attempts to commit any of the above.

Sex Offenses

- This includes all sex offenses other than forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice. This encompasses offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like such as adultery and fornication, buggery, incest, indecent exposure, sodomy, carnal abuse (no force), and all attempts to commit any of the above.

Narcotic Drug Laws

- This includes all arrests for the violation of state and local ordinances, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

Gambling

- Includes all charges relating to promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling.

Offenses Against Family and Children

- Includes all charges of non-support, neglect, or abuse of family and children by such acts as desertion, abandonment, or non-support, neglect or abuse of a child, or nonpayment of alimony.

Driving Under the Influence

- This classification is limited to driving or operating any vehicle while under the influence of liquor or narcotic drugs.

Liquor Laws

- With the exception of drunkenness and driving under the influence, all state or local liquor law violations are placed in this class. Excludes federal violations, includes manufacturing, selling, transporting and furnishing as in maintaining unlawful drinking places. Bootlegging, operating a still, furnishing liquor to a minor and the using of a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor are included.

Drunkenness

- No longer reported under the UCR program in Minnesota. This offense was repealed in Minnesota on July 1, 1971 (MSS 340.96; C 90, S2).

Disorderly Conduct-Disturbing the Peace

-This includes all disorderly persons arrested who cannot be classified under Offenses of Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Drunkenness, or Vagrancy.

Vagrancy

- This classification indicates arrests for failure of an individual to give a good account of himself, begging, loitering, etc.

All Other Offenses

- Include in this class every other state or local offense not included, except traffic. This encompasses abduction and compelling to marry, abortion (death resulting from criminal abortion, according to statutes, is a criminal homicide), bastardy and concealing death of a bastard, bigamy and polygamy, blackmail and extortion, bribery, contempt of court, discrimination and unfair competition, kidnapping, offenses contributing to juvenile delinquency, perjury, possession, repair, manufacturing, etc., of burglary tools, possession or sale of obscene literature and unlawful use, possession, etc., of explosives, etc.

Suspicion

- This category is used for unknown incidents when the actual offense has not been determined.

Curfew and Loitering Law Violation (Juvenile)

- This area shows offenses relating to local curfew or loitering ordinances, where such laws exist. It is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody who have run away from the reporting jurisdiction.

Runaways (Juveniles)

- This classification is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of State Statutes.

Statewide Overview

Crime Index (Serious Crimes)

The eight major criminal offenses are referred to as the *crime index* and they are used to evaluate the changes and trends in amounts of crime over designated periods of time. Following is a summary of the crime index for 2012.

The **crime index** in Minnesota totaled

- 148,330 offenses during 2012, which was an increase of 1.4 percent from the 146,249 offenses occurring in 2011.
- The crime rate* represented 2,775 per 100,000 in population for 2012, while in 2011 the crime rate was registered at 2,757 per 100,000 population, a 0.7 percent increase.
- Of the total crime index offenses reported in 2012, 28 percent were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. In 2011, 26 percent of the total offenses were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared.
- Larceny was the largest category of serious crime reported for Minnesota in 2012 with a total of 102,154 offenses reported. Larceny was also the largest category of serious crime reported for the state in 2011 with 101,636 total offenses reported.

Violent Crimes

Violent crime in Minnesota accounted for 8 percent of all crime index offenses reported in 2012. There were 12,323 murders, forcible rapes, robberies, and aggravated assaults for the year. Compared with the 11,876 total violent crimes reported for 2011, the 2012 figure represents a 3.8 percent increase in violent crime for the state. This compares to a 1.2 percent increase in violent crime for the nation in 2012 based on preliminary figures released by the F.B.I. in May, 2013. The number of violent crimes for the state per 100,000 population for 2012 was 231, while in 2011 there were 224 per 100,000 population.

* Minnesota crime rates per 100,000 are based on a 5,344,861 state population estimate from the F.B.I. for 2012.

- **Murder** - Offenses involving murder totaled 92 in 2012 in Minnesota compared to 73 in 2011, an increase of 26 percent.
- **Rape** - Minnesota registered 2,060 rapes in 2012 and 2,080 in 2011, a decrease of 1.0 percent.
- **Robbery** - There were 3,450 robberies in Minnesota in 2012 compared to 3,359 offenses in 2011, an increase of 2.7 percent.
- **Aggravated Assault** - Offenses involving aggravated assault numbered 6,721 in 2012 compared to 6,364 aggravated assaults in 2011, an increase of 5.6 percent.

Property Crimes

Property crime in Minnesota in 2012 amounted to 92 percent of the crime index offenses for that year. There were a total of 136,007 burglaries, larcenies, motor vehicle thefts, and arsons actually reported in 2012. Compared with the 134,373 offenses reported in 2011, the 2012 figure represents a 1.2 percent increase in property crime for the state. Property crime for the nation in 2012 declined from the 2011 figure, showing a 0.8 percent decrease based on preliminary figures released by the F.B.I. in May, 2013. The number of property crimes for the state per 100,000 population for 2012 was 2,544 and in 2011 it was 2,533.

- **Burglary** - There were 24,829 burglaries in Minnesota in 2012 compared to 25,153 offenses in 2011, a decrease of 1.3 percent.
- **Theft/Larceny** - Offenses involving larcenies in 2012 totaled 102,154 compared to 100,636 offenses in 2011, an increase of 1.5 percent.
- **Motor Vehicle Theft** - In 2012 there were 8,251 offenses of motor vehicle theft in Minnesota, compared to the 7,927 offenses reported in 2011, an increase of 4.1 percent.
- **Arson** - In 2012 there were 773 offenses of arson in Minnesota, compared to the 657 offenses reported in 2011, an increase of 17.7 percent.


TOTAL ARRESTS*

Law Enforcement agencies within Minnesota's 5,344,861 reporting population area accounted for 171,232 total arrests in 2012.


- **ADULT ARRESTS** - Arrests for adults in 2012 totaled 138,476 and in 2011 arrests equaled 142,277.
- **JUVENILE ARRESTS** - The total number of juveniles arrested in 2012 for criminal offenses totaled 32,756 and in 2011 there were 36,192 juveniles arrested.

* Total arrests represent all arrests for adults and juveniles in either a Part I (serious) or Part II (less serious) criminal offense. An arrest in the Uniform Crime Reporting sense refers to a form of detention by depriving an individual of his personal liberties by a form of legal authority.

CRIMINAL HOMICIDE - MURDER

Criminal homicide involves those offenses of murder and non-negligent homicide that are classified as willful felonious deaths as distinguished from deaths caused by negligence. "Attempts to kill" are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Justifiable or excusable homicides, suicides, accidental deaths, and deaths due to negligence are not tabulated in the state homicide total.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- In 2012 there were 120 homicides reported for the state. Of that number, 19 offenses were ruled negligent leaving a murder and non-negligent homicide total of 101 which is reflected in Table 10.
- Of the 101 murder and non-negligent homicides reported in 2012, 9 offenses were listed as unfounded. Of the 9 unfounded homicides, 9 were justifiable.
- There were 92 actual criminal homicides reported for the state, with 73 of these offenses cleared by arrest. This represents a 79 percent clearance rate for that year.
- The crime rate for homicide in 2012 was 2 per 100,000 population.
- Homicide offenses represented 0.7 percent of the total violent crimes, with one averaged approximately every four days.

SUPPLEMENTARY HOMICIDE INFORMATION

Supplementary Homicide Reports are manually submitted to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension by law enforcement agencies reporting homicides during the year. These reports provided additional information on the homicide offenses. The following information was compiled from reports on 92 criminal homicides during 2012.

Relationship of the Victim to the Offender(s)

- 14 homicide victims were killed by a member of their nuclear family.
- 50 homicide victims were killed by a non-nuclear family members or friends/ acquaintances.
- 14 homicide victims were strangers to their assailants. In 24 homicides incidents the relationships were unknown.
-

Firearms Used to Commit Homicides

- 38 of the weapons used in homicide incidents were some type of firearm (40 percent).
 - 3 (3 percent) of the 92 homicide victims were killed by a family member using some type of firearm.
 - 19 (21 percent) homicide victims were killed by person(s) known to them outside of their family using a firearm. 7 (8 percent) were killed by strangers using a firearm and for 14 victims (15 percent) who were killed by some type of firearm, the relationship of victim to offender was unknown.

Figure 3.1: Victim to Offender Relationship Summary - 2012





Figure 3.2 Number of Criminal Homicide Victims by Relationship within Family

(Victim was an/the _____ of the Offender)





Figure 3.4: Victim was Stranger or Relationship was Unknown




Total Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter Criminal Homicide Incidents for 2012 = 83



Criminal Homicide Victims and Offenders 2009 - 2012



Criminal Homicide Circumstances for 2012



Type of Felony Involved - 2012




FORCIBLE RAPES - INCLUDING ATTEMPTS

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female using force and committed against her will. Uniform Crime Reporting needs require rape to be divided into two categories: (1) Rape by force, and (2) Attempted rape. Statutory rape and other sex offenses are excluded from this category. Though UCR only collects information about female victims, Minnesota includes male victims as well. All figures presented will include both male and female victims.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- For the 2,211 rapes reported in 2012, 151 were listed as unfounded.

- Of the 2,060 reported actual rapes that occurred in Minnesota in 2012; 1,900 were by force while 160 were recorded as attempted rapes.
- Of the total rapes occurring in 2012, 829 or 40 percent were cleared by arrest. Of this total, 81 were cleared with the arrest of a juvenile.*
- The crime rate for rape in 2012 represented 39 per 100,000 population.
- The total number of rapes in 2012 represented 17 percent of the total violent crimes with 6 averaged per day.

ROBBERY


Robbery involves the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will, by violence or by placing the person in state of fear. The crime of robbery necessitates that a victim be present in order for it to be so classified. As a general rule, robbery differs from larceny in that it is aggravated by the threat and element of force. An attempt to commit a robbery, either armed or strong arm is counted as if the actual offense did occur.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- Of the 3,478 total robberies reported in 2012, 28 offenses were unfounded.

- Of the 3,450 actual robbery offenses that occurred in Minnesota in 2012, 824 or 24 percent were cleared by arrest. Of the 824 offenses that were cleared, 157 were cleared by the arrest of a juvenile.*
- The crime rate for robberies in 2012 amounted to 65 per 100,000 population.
- In 2012, robbery offenses represented 28 percent of the total violent crimes with 9 offenses averaged each day.

Robbery Type For 2012




 Total Value = \$1,488,297




AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

The definition of assault involves an attempt or offer with unlawful force or violence to do physical injury to another. An aggravated assault may be committed with a gun, knife or cutting instrument, other dangerous weapons such as clubs, or through the use hands, fists or feet. Assault with intent to commit murder is also listed as aggravated assault.

All assaults, where no weapon is used, which result in minor injuries are classified as non-aggravated assaults or simple assaults and are not counted in the crime index total.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- Of the 6,814 total aggravated assault offenses reported in 2012, 93 were reported as unfounded.
- For the total 6,721 actual aggravated assaults occurring in Minnesota in 2012, 4,315 or 64 percent were cleared by arrest. Of the 4,315 assaults cleared by arrest, 439 were cleared with the arrest of a juvenile.*
- The crime rate for assaults in 2012 was 126 per 100,000 population.
- In 2012, aggravated assault offenses accounted for 55 percent of the total violent crimes with 18 averaged per day.

BURGLARY

Burglary consists of the unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of a structure to commit a theft or felony, even though no force may have been used to gain entry. Burglary is divided into three separate classes:

- A. Forcible Entry
- B. Unlawful Entry - No Force
- C. Attempted Forcible Entry


Supplementary information is collected that denotes the time and place of occurrence.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- Of the total 25,190 burglary offenses

reported for the state in 2012, 361 offenses were unfounded.

- There were a total of 24,829 actual burglaries that occurred in Minnesota in 2012. Of that total 3,535 offenses were cleared by arrest which amounted to a 14 percent clearance rate. For the total 3,535 offenses cleared by arrest, 294 were cleared with the arrest of a juvenile.*
- The crime rate for burglary in 2012 was 465 per 100,000 populations.
- In 2012, burglaries represented 18 percent of the total property crimes with 68 averaged per day.

By Time of Day, 2008-2012







FIGURE 16

2008-2012




LARCENY

Larceny (theft) is the taking of the personal property of another with intent to permanently deprive him of ownership. Larceny figures will include all those offenses in which a theft (also attempted situations) occurred regardless of monetary loss assigned the stolen property.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS


- Of the total 104,098 larceny offenses reported for 2012, 1,994 were listed as unfounded.
- Of the 102,154 actual larceny offenses that occurred in Minnesota in 2012, 29,856 were cleared by arrest, representing a 29 percent clearance rate. Of the 29,856 larceny offenses that were cleared, 4,696 were cleared by the arrest of a juvenile*.
- Larceny in 2012 represented a crime rate of 1,911 per 100,000 population.
- The total number of larcenies for 2012 amounted to 75 percent of the total property crime figures with 280 averaged each day.

Reported in Minnesota for 2012





Reported in Minnesota for 2012





MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Motor Vehicle Theft is the larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles that can be registered as such. "Joyriding" thefts are included under this category.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- Of the 8,635 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2012, 384 offenses were unfounded.
- In Minnesota during 2012, there were 8,251 actual thefts reported to have occurred. Of that total, 1,334 were cleared by arrest, indicating a clearance rate of 16 percent. Out of the total offenses cleared by arrest, 120 were cleared with the arrest of a juvenile*.

Motor vehicle thefts in 2012 represented a crime rate of 154 per 100,000 population

- In 2012, motor vehicle thefts represented 6 percent of the total property crimes and averaged 23 per day.
- There were 3,788 locally stolen vehicles recovered. In addition, 444 vehicles that were stolen in other jurisdictions were recovered locally.
- Of the 8,251 vehicles reported stolen, 6,419 were automobiles, 655 were trucks/buses and 1,177 were vehicles such as snowmobiles, motorcycles, motorscooters, etc.




ARSON

Arson is defined as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

This crime category is distinctive from other offenses in that all crimes of arson are to be reported, even if they occur in conjunction with another crime. During 2012, 830 offenses were recorded on the Uniform Crime Reports.

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

- Of the total 830 arson offenses reported, 5 were listed as unfounded.
- Of the 825 arson offenses known as having occurred in Minnesota in 2012, 217 or

26 percent were cleared by arrest. Of the 217 arsons cleared by arrest, 59 were cleared by the arrest of a juvenile.*

- The crime rate for arson in 2012 was 15 per 100,000 population, with 2 offenses averaged per day.
- Of the arson offenses, 433 (52 percent) were structural fires, 156 (19 percent) were arsons of mobile property (motor vehicles, airplanes, boats, etc.) and 236 offenses were for arson of other property such as crops, timber, fences, signs, etc. (29 percent).
- Of the 433 structures burned, 98 (23 percent) of the structures were uninhabited.
- The estimated dollar value lost to arson in 2012 totaled \$3,267,396 with structural fires accounting for 72 percent of the loss (\$2,350,016).

MINNESOTA PROPERTY CRIME VALUE INFORMATION - 2012

Information on property stolen and recovered in Minnesota for the offenses of criminal homicide, rape, robbery, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft is reflected in the following tables and figures.

Table 8 indicates that the property type category of Locally Stolen Autos had the highest stolen value of property taken in the state in 2012. The livestock items category showed the lowest amount of stolen value for property taken during that year. The highest recovered value reported was in the

Locally Stolen Autos category while the lowest recovered value reported was household items. Table 9 indicates a more specific itemization of property stolen/recovered and the associated monetary values. Figure 22 shows the average dollar loss to property offenses in Minnesota for the past year. Figure 23 reflects what proportion of an average dollar was lost to the robbery, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft offenses during 2012.

In Minnesota for 2011 – 2012




ADDITIONAL STATEWIDE OFFENSE INFORMATION

In addition to the aforementioned crime index information and property crime values, there are additional sources of offense information included as a part of Minnesota Offense Information.

Table 10 contains statewide summary information for total Part I and Part II offenses for 2012. The first column lists offenses according to crime category, as described in the Crime Information section of this publication. The remaining columns give the number of offenses, unfounded offenses, the crime rate, offenses cleared by arrest, and offenses cleared by arrest of a juvenile.

Table 11 encompasses 2012 statewide data relating to property loss. The first portion of the table

refers to the various property types and the corresponding stolen and/or recovered value. The rest of the table lists the Part I offenses broken down into sub-categories and the value of the property stolen or recovered for each offense.

Table 12 provides summary information including the crime rate, population, crime index and percent cleared for urban-rural, the various State Judicial Districts, and the reporting agencies in Minnesota for 2012.

Table 13 depicts summary Minnesota Crime Index Information for the years 1936-2012 and also includes state population and crime rate.

MINNESOTA ARREST INFORMATION

GENERAL ARREST INFORMATION

Arrest information for Minnesota in 2012 is presented with a state total concerning age, sex, and race factors. Data has also been tabulated for the specific kinds of narcotic arrests and the individuals involved.

The total number of arrests involving criminal offenses in the state in 2012 was 171,232 with 124,351 males and 46,881 females arrested. There are also significant factors to consider when arrest data is evaluated:

- There can be multiple persons arrested for the same offense.
- An arrest of one or more persons can be reported for an offense that occurred during a previous reporting period.

As a result of the above factors, arrests in most cases will outnumber offenses.

In reporting the arrests of a juvenile, the FBI's instructions state that:

"The UCR Program considers a juvenile to be an individual under 18 years of age regardless of the state definition. An agency must score a juvenile arrest when the circumstances are such that if the individual were an adult, an arrest would have been counted." *

Juveniles (persons under 18 years) constitute 19% (32,756) of all arrests during 2012 and account for 24% (8,238) of the Part I arrests:

9 percent of Murder, 16 percent of Rape, 31 percent of Robbery, 13 percent of Aggravated Assault, 21 percent of the Burglary, 26 percent of the Larceny, 22 percent of the Vehicle Theft, and 54 percent of the Arson arrests.





NARCOTIC ARRESTS IN MINNESOTA

Narcotic arrest information for the state in 2012 involved 18,631 arrest situations, with 14,909 males and 3,722 females arrested. Persons aged 18 comprise the greatest portion of the arrests (1,547) representing eight percent of all narcotics arrests. Persons aged 19 were the next highest with 1,518 arrests. Race information reveals that 73 percent of the narcotics arrests were for persons of the white race.

Number of Narcotics Arrests for 2004-2012



Narcotic Arrests by Type for 2012



URBAN-RURAL AND REGIONAL INFORMATION

COMPARISON OF URBAN-RURAL CRIME OFFENSES/ARRESTS FOR 2012

Urban-rural crime comparison by offense offers information to agencies in evaluating the difference in crime occurring by geographical locations. The information that is available must be interpreted with caution as it gives a general indication of urban-rural crime only and does not represent data that can be applied to any one specific agency. Variations in crime are caused by a multitude of crime factors, which have been listed previously in this report. The information that is presented in this section lists the numbers of specific criminal offenses that have been reported to the appropriate urban or rural law

enforcement authority. Because of jurisdictional reasons, Capitol Security and State Patrol figures are excluded from this section of the report.

Of additional value is the ratio of urban to rural crime offenses for 2012. The ratio is nothing more than the amount of one particular criminal offense for the urban area as compared with the amount of one particular offense for the rural area. A ratio of 7:1 aggravated assaults indicates that for every seven offenses of aggravated assault in an urban area, the rural area experienced one aggravated assault.

CRIME OFFENSES AND ARRESTS FOR STATE JUDICIAL DISTRICTS

The judicial district breakdown of crimes and arrests within Minnesota provides another measurement of the volume of crime based on specific areas. The judicial districts evaluated are based upon the ten judicial districts in the state.

Judicial District 4, which is the most densely populated geographical section for the entire state, recorded the highest number of reported Part I offenses (44,839) and Part II offenses (58,786) of all districts. Thirty percent of the state's Part I offenses occurred in this district, while 27 percent of the Part II offenses were registered from this area. Approximately 40 percent of the state's violent crimes were recorded from this district and 29 percent of property crime was represented by this region. The largest portion of arrests for Part I and Part II offense were also registered from Judicial District 4.

There were 34,267 arrests for Part I violations compared to 132,372 arrests for Part II offenses.

Judicial District 8 recorded the smallest amount of Part I offenses with 2,621. Judicial District 5 registered the second lowest amount of Part I offenses with 5,430. Judicial District 8, with 4,949 offenses, recorded the lowest number of Part II offenses. Judicial District 10 reported the least amount of violent crime (102) and Judicial District 8 the least amount of property offenses (1,541) in the state.

The districts registering the highest clearance rate for Part I offenses in 2012 were Judicial Districts 1 and 7 with 34 percent and Judicial District 9 with 33 percent. The districts with the highest Part II clearance rates were Judicial District 9 with 69 percent and Judicial Districts 1, 7 and 8 showing a 67 percent clearance rate.

JUDICIAL DISTRICTS



MINNESOTA LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEE INFORMATION

Minnesota State Law Enforcement agencies reported a total of 13,537 sworn and civilian employees for 2012. Of that amount, 8,753 were sworn personnel and 4,784 were civilian employees.

The average number of full time law enforcement personnel in 2012 (including sworn and civilian) amounted to 2.3 employees per each 1,000 residents of the state. The average number of sworn personnel (excluding civilian) amounted to 1.6 employees per 1,000 population. The contributing law enforcement agencies averaged one full-time civilian employee to 1.8 full-time sworn personnel. These figures represent the averages as derived from the submitted data and are not the recommended ratios for Minnesota law enforcement agencies. The average ratio of law enforcement personnel for any given community may, and does, vary according to a number of community and policing factors.

In 2012, the reporting sheriff's departments indicated 2,619 sworn personnel employed and 3,284 civilian personnel which amounted to a total of 5,903 employees. This was a 0.5 percent increase in staffing from previous year 2011 with a total of 5,873.

The police departments reported to have 5,401 sworn personnel in 2012, compared with 1,090 civilian employees. The total number of municipal employees equaled 6,491 personnel. Police departments experienced a 0.1 percent increase in personnel, with a 2011 total count of 6,485.

The State Patrol figures indicate 567 sworn personnel and 321 civilian employees for a total of 888 for 2012. The State Patrol experienced a 9 percent increase in personnel from the previous year count of 813. Other zero population non-city agencies (Airport Police, Universities, etc.) reported 166 sworn personnel and 89 civilian employees for a total of 255.

Of the total number of sworn personnel in 2012 (8,753), there were 7,713 males and 1,040 females. Considering the total number of civilian personnel for the same year (4,784), there were 2,078 males compared with 2,706 females. The total number of law enforcement employees for 2012 was 13,537

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED OR ASSAULTED

Vital information other than Uniform Crime Reporting is also collected that evaluates the number of law enforcement personnel who have been assaulted and/or killed. The data from those county (sheriff) and municipal (police) agencies reporting is collected and tabulated annually.

In 2012 Minnesota began the reporting of the assault or killing of law enforcement K-9 police dogs.

There were a total of 401 assaults recorded in Minnesota for 2012. Of that total, 305 involved hands, fists, or feet; 15 were attributed to a firearm; 74 involved some other dangerous weapon, and 7 were committed with a knife or cutting instrument this year. There were 244 assaults in which there was no personal injury to the law enforcement officer, while 156 registered some form of personal injury with one officer killed in the line of duty.

The type of activities most responsible for the assault situations were:

“Responding to "Disturbance Calls" with 139 and
“Attempting Other Arrests” with 67 incidents.

The most frequent time of assaults was indicated as between 4:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m., with 259 confrontations. The type of assignment most frequently registered with assaults during the year 2012 was a one officer vehicle - assisted (166 incidents) followed by two officer vehicle (117 incidents).

There was one law enforcement officer fatality in 2012.

There was one K-9 police dog fatality in 2012.

By Type of Weapon




By Type of Assignment




LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS FIREARMS DISCHARGES

Pursuant to Minnesota State Statute 626.553, Subdivision 2, information is collected concerning firearm discharges by law enforcement officers in Minnesota. 1978 was the first full year that this information was available.

In 2012 the number of individuals shot and killed from police fire was 8. This total was the same as last year but down from 2009 and 2010. Of the incidents reported, there were 123 shots fired during 35 incidents. There were no incidents where multiple agencies fired shots. There are six general areas of information collected: the Type of Activity the officer was engaged in at the time of the discharge; Type of Weapon Used; Purpose of the Discharge; Results of the Discharge; Time of Day; and the Level of the Incident which precipitated the discharge.

The highest number of discharges by Type of Activity occurred during "Responding to Disturbance Call" with 26 shots fired.

One hundred four (85%) of the shots fired were with a handgun, 16 with a rifle or shotgun and 3 with another firearm. Of the 35 firearms discharge incidents, 27 individuals were fired at while 8 were either accidental discharges or law enforcement officers were not firing at an individual. Of the 27 individuals fire at, 8 were killed and 7 were wounded.

Information on the size of the community served by the departments was also tabulated. 25 shots (20%) were fired in communities under 50,000 population, and 98 (80%) in communities over 50,000 population. Four shots were by a zero population agency, Metropolitan Airport Police.


Of the 123 shots fired, 114 were in felony situations. Eight shots that were fired in the "Other" category were the result of accidental discharges.

By Agency Activity and Weapon Types




POLICE PURSUITS

BACKGROUND:

In 1988, the Legislature passed a law that required all pursuits by peace officers to be reported to the Department of Public Safety. 1989 was the first full year this data was collected. The state statute is as follows:

626.5532 PURSUIT OF FLEEING SUSPECTS BY PEACE OFFICERS.

Subdivision 1. Reports. If a peace officer pursues a fleeing suspect, the officer's department head must file a notice of the incident with the commissioner of public safety within 30 days following the pursuit. A pursuit must be reported under this section if it is a pursuit by a peace officer of a motor vehicle being operated in violation of section 609.487. The notice must contain information concerning the reason for and circumstances surrounding the pursuit, including the alleged offense, the length of the pursuit in distance and time, the outcome of the pursuit, any charges filed against the suspect as a result of the pursuit, injuries and property damage resulting from the pursuit, and other information deemed relevant by the commissioner.

SUMMARY

- Of the 759 reported pursuit incidents, 606 (80%) resulted in the apprehension of the vehicle. In 71 (9%) of the pursuits the decision to terminate was made by the officer or by supervisory discretion. In 82 (11%) pursuits the officer lost sight of the vehicle.
- Traffic pursuits (Other than DUI) were the largest reason for initiating a pursuit, 426 (56%) followed by 70 pursuits (9%) initiated for driving under the influence.
- 249 (33%) of the pursuits resulted in property damage to the violator's vehicle. 104 squad cars sustained damage, while damage to property or other vehicles occurred 124 (16%) of the time. 474 (62%) pursuit incidents reported no property damage.

- 570 (75%) of all pursuits occurred between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. with the most pursuits (181) occurring in a two hour period from midnight to 2:00 a.m. The fewest pursuits (20) occurred between 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m.
- There were two fatalities recorded in 2012. Two violator drivers lost their lives.
- Of the 1029 individuals reported involved in pursuits in 2012, 130 received injuries or possible injuries. 42 of the violators were injured with another 28 receiving possible injuries. Of the 245 passengers in the driver violator's car, 9 received injuries.
- Of the reported 1,548 law enforcement officers involved in the pursuits, 6 (0.4%) received non incapacitating injuries, while 1,404 (91%) received no injury. For 132 (9%) of the officers the injury status was unknown. This officer count includes both initiating and assisting agency law enforcement officers involved in the pursuit.
- Reports indicate 21 unrelated parties, either pedestrians or individuals in unrelated vehicles, were involved in the pursuits. Two received injuries.
- In at least 511 (67%) of the pursuits the driver was charged. In 181 pursuits the charge is unknown.

Initiating Agency Reason for Pursuit - 2012







By Time of Day Pursuit Started - 2012**




BIAS MOTIVATED CRIMES

BACKGROUND:

In 1988, the Legislature passed a law which requires peace officers to report any incidents which were motivated by bias. 1989 was the first full year this information was collected. The state statute reads as follows:

626.5531 REPORTING OF CRIMES MOTIVATED BY BIAS.

Subdivision 1. Reports required. A peace officer must report to the head of the officer's department every violation of chapter 609 or a local criminal ordinance if the officer has reason to believe, or if the victim alleges, that the offender was motivated to commit the act by the victim's race, religion, national origin, sex, age and disability, or characteristics identified as sexual orientation. The superintendent of the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension shall adopt a reporting form to be used by law enforcement agencies in making the reports required under this section. The reports must include for each incident all of the following:

- (1) the date of the offense;
- (2) the location of the offense;
- (3) whether the target of the incident is a person, private property, or public property;
- (4) the crime committed;
- (5) the type of bias and information about the offender and victim that is relevant to that bias;
- (6) any organized group involved in the incident;
- (7) the disposition of the case;
- (8) whether the determination that the offense was motivated by bias was based on the officer's reasonable belief or on the victim's allegation; and
- (9) any additional information the superintendent deems necessary for the acquisition of accurate and relevant data.

Subd. 2. Use of information collected. The head of a local law enforcement agency or state law enforcement department that employs peace officers licensed under section 626.843 must file a monthly report describing crimes reported under this section with the Department of Public Safety, Bureau of Criminal Apprehension. The commissioner of public safety must summarize and analyze the

information received and file an annual report with the Department of Human Rights and the legislature. The commissioner may include information in the annual report concerning any additional criminal activity motivated by bias that is not covered by this section.

SUMMARY

- **There was a 12% increase of bias incidents reported for January-December 2012, (166) compared to the same time period in 2011 (148).**
 - 40 of the offenses were based on the officer's belief that a bias crime occurred, 52 the victim's belief that a bias offense occurred and in 74 of the offenses both the officer and victims believed a bias offense occurred.
 - Of the total 166 bias incidents and 175 offenses reported, the largest type of bias offense reported was racial with 82 (47%) followed by 43 (25%) for sexual orientation and 31 (18%) for religion.
 - Fifty six (34%) of the offenses occurred at a residence followed by twenty three (14%) on a highway/road/alley/street/sidewalk and nineteen (11%) at elementary/secondary schools.
 - 27% of all offenses were assaults (9% aggravated and 18% simple), 19% intimidation, 33% destruction, damage and vandalism.
 - **The number of victims decreased 2.7% from 180 in 2011 to 175 victims in 2012.**
 - Of the 175 reported victims of bias in 2012, 103 were males, 69 females and 3 unknown. Eighty (46%) of the victims were African American, followed by seventy eight (45%) White.
 - 23% of all victims were between the ages of 11-20, followed by 18% between the ages of 21-30.
- The number of offenders increased 12% from 189 in 2011 to 212 in 2012.**
- Of the 212 reported bias offenders in 2012, 127 were males, 26 females and 59 unknown. Eighty five (40%) of the offenders were White, fifty five (26%) African American, while sixty seven (32%) were unknown.
 - The age group with the highest number of offenders was 11- 20 year olds with 30% (63).

In 1984, the Minnesota Legislature enacted what is known as the "Minnesota Missing Children's Act". This Act provides for the commissioner of Public Safety to maintain a missing children program. The law was updated in 2009 to include endangered missing adults. This program requires the Commissioner to: provide the necessary computer systems to allow for the maintaining of data on missing children and endangered persons in the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Crime Information Center; provide a system for broadcasting information on missing children and endangered persons regionally, statewide, multi-state and nationwide; and to annually compile statistical information related to missing children and endangered persons. The statute is as follows:

299C.52 MINNESOTA MISSING CHILDREN AND ENDANGERED PERSONS PROGRAM.

Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** As used in sections 299C.52 to 299C.56, the following terms have the meanings given them:

- (a) "**Child**" means any person under the age of 18 years or any person certified or known to be mentally incompetent.
- (b) "**Endangered**" means that a law enforcement official has received sufficient evidence that the missing person is at risk of physical injury or death.
- (c) "**Missing**" means the status of a person after a law enforcement agency that has received a report of a missing person has conducted a preliminary investigation and determined that the person cannot be located.
- (d) "**NCIC**" means National Crime Information Center.

Subdivision 2. **Establishment.** The commissioner of public safety shall maintain a Minnesota missing children and endangered persons program within the department to enable documented information about missing

Minnesota children and endangered persons to be entered into the NCIC computer.

Subdivision 3. **Computer equipment and programs.** The commissioner shall provide the necessary computer hardware and computer programs to enter, modify, and cancel information on missing children and endangered persons in the NCIC computer. These programs must provide for search and retrieval of information using the following identifiers: physical description, name and date of birth, name and social security number, name and driver's license number, vehicle license number, and vehicle identification number. The commissioner shall also provide a system for regional, statewide, multi-state, and nationwide broadcasts of information on missing children and endangered persons. These broadcasts shall be made by local law enforcement agencies where possible or, in the case of statewide or nationwide broadcasts, by the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension upon request of the local law enforcement agency.

Subdivision 4. **Authority to enter or retrieve information.**

Only law enforcement agencies may enter missing children and endangered persons information into the NCIC computer or retrieve information from the NCIC computer.

Subdivision 5. **Statistical data.** The commissioner shall annually compile and make available statistical information on the number of missing children and endangered persons entered into the NCIC computer and, if available, information on the number located.

Subdivision 6. **Rules.** The commissioner may adopt rules in conformance with sections 299C.52 to 299C.565 to provide for the orderly collection and entry of missing children and endangered persons information and requests for retrieval of missing children and endangered persons information.

Subdivision 7. **Cooperation with other agencies.** The commissioner shall cooperate with other states and the NCIC in the exchange of information on missing persons.

**299C.53 MISSING PERSONS REPORT;
DUTIES OF COMMISSIONER AND LAW
ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES.**

Subdivision 1. **Investigation and entry of information.** A law enforcement agency shall accept without delay any report of a missing person. Upon receiving a report of a person believed to be missing, a law enforcement agency shall conduct a preliminary investigation to determine whether the person is missing, and if missing, whether the person is endangered. If the person is initially determined to be missing and endangered, the agency shall immediately consult the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension during the preliminary investigation, in recognition of the fact that the first two hours are critical. If the person is determined to be missing and endangered, the agency shall immediately enter identifying and descriptive information about the person into the NCIC computer. Law enforcement agencies having direct access to the NCIC computer shall enter and retrieve the data directly and shall cooperate in the entry and retrieval of data on behalf of law enforcement agencies which do not have direct access to the systems.

Subdivision 2. **Location of missing person.** As soon as is practically possible after a missing person is located, the law enforcement agency which located or returned the missing person shall notify the law enforcement agency having jurisdiction over the investigation, and that agency shall cancel the entry from the NCIC computer.

Subdivision 3. **Missing and endangered persons.** If the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension receives a report from a law enforcement agency indicating that a person is missing and endangered, the superintendent may assist the law enforcement agency in conducting the preliminary investigation, offer resources, and assist the

agency in helping implement the investigation policy with particular attention to the need for immediate action. The law enforcement agency shall promptly notify all appropriate law enforcement agencies in the state and, if deemed appropriate, law enforcement agencies in adjacent states or jurisdictions of any information that may aid in the prompt location and safe return of a missing or endangered person.

Subdivision 4. **Federal requirements.** In addition to the provisions of sections 299C.51 to 299C.565, the law enforcement agency and the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension shall comply with requirements provided in federal law on reporting and investigating missing children cases. For purposes of this subdivision, the definition of "child," "children," or "minor" shall be determined in accordance with the applicable federal law.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

The primary goal of the "Minnesota Missing Children and Endangered Persons Program" is to assist in the locating of those children and endangered persons reported missing in the shortest possible time thus insuring their safe return by: requiring investigative action by law enforcement agencies; by requiring the entry of data on the missing child or endangered person; and by requiring an annual compilation of statistical information for evaluation of the missing children and endangered person problem in Minnesota.

The following table reflects the information directly from the Federal Bureau of Investigation's, National Crime Information Center's file for Minnesota.

As of December 31, 2012 there were 471 active missing person records in the FBI/NCIC system for Minnesota.

- (1) **Juvenile** - Used to enter a person who is missing and un-emancipated as defined by the laws of his/her own state and does not meet any of the entry criteria in the other record types listed.
- (2) **Endangered** - Used to enter a person who is missing under circumstances indicating that his/her physical safety is in danger.
- (3) **Involuntary** - Used to enter a person who is missing under circumstances indicating that the disappearance was not voluntary.
- (4) **Disability** - Used to enter a person of proven physical or mental disability, thereby subjecting himself/herself or others to personal and immediate danger.
- (5) **Catastrophe victim** - Used to enter a person who is missing after a catastrophe or natural disaster, such as a tornado or plane crash.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

APPENDIX A

ADULT - For Minnesota Uniform Crime Report purposes, a person 18 years of age or above.

ARREST RATE - The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 100,000. Arrest rates are computed in the same manner as crime rates.

CLEARED BY ARREST - For crime reporting purposes, an offense is cleared by arrest or solved when at least one person is: (1) arrested, or (2) charged with the commission of the offense.

COUNTY - Subdivisions of state, each with its own government which includes a sheriff's department.

CRIME FACTORS - Conditions which affect the amount and type of crime that occurs in a geographical area.

CRIME INDEX - The total number of eight major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of a crime in a given geographical area. Crime classifications used in the index are: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. Each of these offenses is referred to as an "Index Offense".

CRIME RATE - The number of index offenses reported for each unit of population, generally per 100,000 persons. Crime rates are computed for communities with varying populations by dividing the number of Index Crimes by the population and multiplying the answer by 100,000. (Example: 500 Index Offenses divided by 10,000 population X 100,000 = 5,000 Crime Rate).

EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE - A crime solution or clearance recorded when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against an offender.

JUVENILE - For Minnesota Uniform Crime Report purposes, a person under the age of 18.

MUNICIPALITY - City or town that has its own government, including police department.

PART I OFFENSES - The first of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part I offenses are by their nature more serious and occur most frequently. The monthly tabulation of Part I offenses provides a count of "offenses known".

PART II OFFENSES - The second of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part II offenses are generally less serious in nature. Monthly tabulations of Part II offenses are included in Minnesota's crime information report.

POPULATION FIGURES - 2007 F.B.I. Population Estimates used for the 2008 report were derived differently than previous years. Rather than applying the state population rate of growth uniformly to all agencies within the state, the UCR staff computed individual rates of growth from one year to the next for every city/town and county for a seven year period (2000-2006). Each agency's rates of growth were averaged and that average was applied and added to its 2006 Census population figure to derive the 2007 population estimates.

PROPERTY CRIME - Consists of the Index Offenses of Burglary, Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson.

RURAL AREA - Geographical area covered by a Sheriff's Department outside of city limits.

URBAN - Geographical area covered by local police departments within the city limits.

VIOLENT CRIME - Consists of the Index Offenses of Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault.
