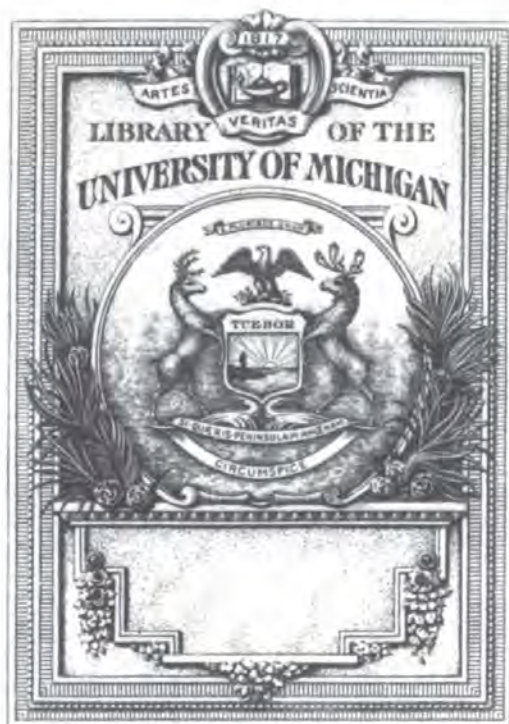

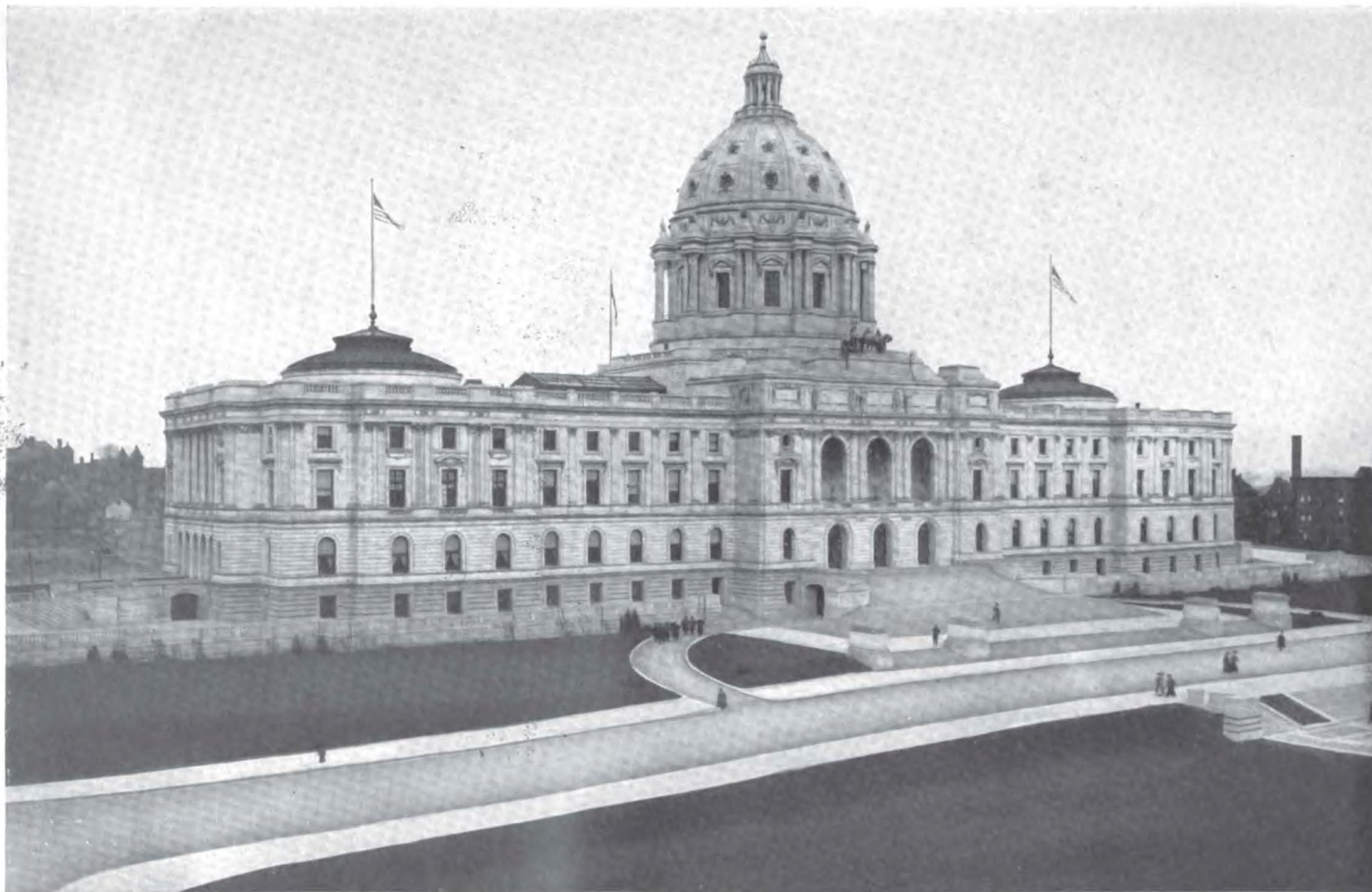

AUTHORITY AND CONTENTS.

The Legislative Manual of nineteen hundred and thirteen is divided as to contents into three parts. Part I contains the state organic act, act authorizing a state government, act of admission, declaration of independence, articles of confederation, constitutions of the State of Minnesota and the United States, territorial and state government, legislative statistics. Part II contains history and growth of state, and review of state departments and institutions. Part III contains roster of officers of state departments and institutions, county officers and federal officers appointed from Minnesota, election returns, population and financial statistics of the state, and such miscellaneous matter as has usually been published in the Manual and that has been considered of general interest.

The publication of this Manual is biennially and is authorized under chapter 34, Revised Laws of 1905.

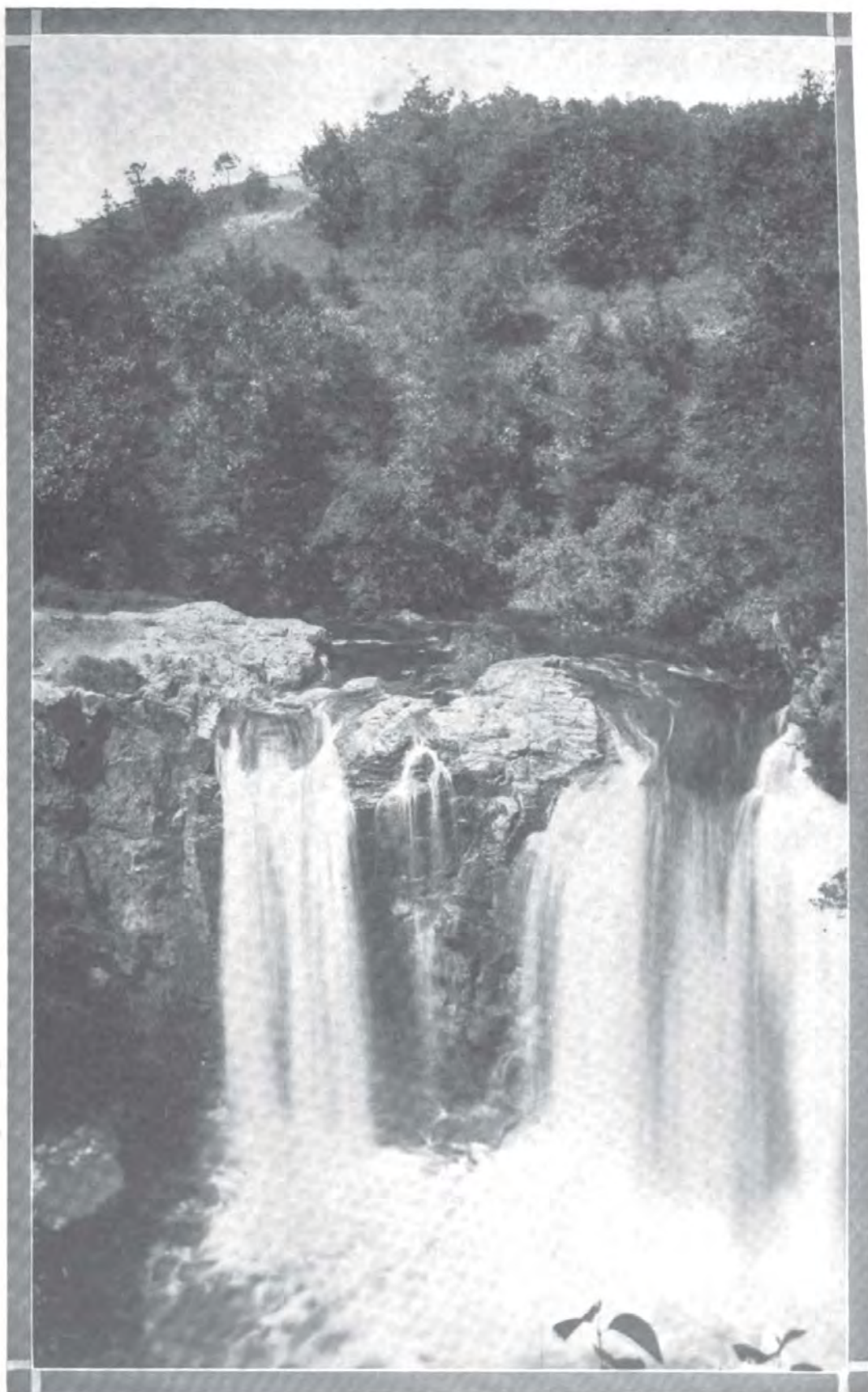

ORGANIC ACT OF MINNESOTA.

An act to establish the Territorial Government of Minnesota.
[Passed March 3, 1849.]

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That from and after the passage of this act, all that part of the territory of the United States which lies within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning in the Mississippi river at the point where the line of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes of north latitude crosses the same; thence running due west on said line, which is the northern boundary of the state of Iowa, to the northwest corner of the said state of Iowa; thence southerly along the western boundary of said state to the point where said boundary strikes the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of White Earth river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the White Earth river to the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain, thence east and south of east along the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain to Lake Superior; thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the state of Wisconsin in Lake Superior; thence along the western boundary line of said state of Wisconsin to the Mississippi river; thence down the main channel of said river to the place of beginning, be and the same is hereby erected into a temporary government by the name of the Territory of Minnesota; *provided,* that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to inhibit the government of the United States from dividing said Territory into two or more territories, in such manner and at such times as congress shall deem convenient and proper, or from attaching any portion of said Territory to any other state or territory of the United States.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That the executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Minnesota shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States. The governor shall reside within said Territory; shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof; shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian affairs. He may grant pardons for offenses against the law of said Territory, and reprieves for offenses against the laws of the United States until the decision of the president can be made known thereon; he shall commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of the said Territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be a secretary of said Territory, who shall reside therein, and hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States; he shall record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly hereinafter constituted, and all the acts and proceedings of the governor in his executive department; he shall transmit one copy of the laws and one copy of the executive proceedings, on or before the first day of December in each year, to the president of the United States, and at the same time two copies of the laws to the speaker of the house of representatives, and the president of the senate for the use of Congress. And in case of the death, removal, resignation, or necessary absence of the governor from the Territory, the secretary shall be and he is hereby authorized and required to execute and perform all the powers and the duties of the governor during such vacancy or necessary absence, or until another governor shall be duly appointed to fill such vacancy.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That the legislative power and authority of said Territory shall be vested in the governor and a legislative assembly. The legislative assembly shall consist of a council and house of representatives. The council shall consist of nine members having the qualifications of voters, as hereinafter prescribed, whose term of service shall continue two years. The house of representatives shall, at its first session, consist of eighteen members, possessing the same qualifications as prescribed for members of the council, and whose term of service shall continue one year. The number of councilors and representatives may be increased by the legislative assembly, from time to time, in proportion to the increase of population; *provided*, that the whole number shall never exceed fifteen councilors and thirty-nine representatives. An apportionment shall be made, as nearly equal as practicable, among the several counties or districts for the election of the council and representatives, giving to each section of the Territory representation in the ratio of its population, Indians excepted, as nearly as may be. And the members of the council and of the house of representatives shall reside in and be inhabitants of the districts for which they may be elected, respectively. Previous to the first election, the governor shall cause a census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the several counties and districts of the Territory to be taken, and the first election shall be held at such time and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and he shall, at the same time, declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties and districts shall be entitled under this act.

The number of persons authorized to be elected having the highest number of votes, in each of said council districts for members of the council, shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected to the council, and the person or persons authorized to be elected, having the greatest number of votes for the house of representatives, equal to the number to which each county or district shall be entitled, shall also be declared by the governor to be duly elected members of the house of representatives; *provided*, that in case of a tie between two or more persons voted for, the

governor shall order a new election to supply the vacancy made by such tie. And the persons thus elected to the legislative assembly shall meet at such place on such day as the governor shall appoint, but thereafter the time, place and manner of holding and conducting all elections by the people, and the apportioning of the representation in the several counties or districts to the council and house of representatives, according to the population, shall be prescribed by law, as well as the day of the commencement of the regular session of the legislative assembly; *provided*, that no one session shall exceed the term of sixty days.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said Territory at the time of the passage of this act, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to any office within the said Territory; but the qualifications of voters and of holding office at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the legislative assembly; *provided*, that the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States and those who shall have declared on oath their intention to become such, and shall have taken an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the legislative power of the Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation, consistent with the Constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act; but no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents. All the laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor shall be submitted to the Congress of the United States, and if disapproved shall be null and of no effect.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That all township, district and county officers, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, in such manner as shall be provided by the governor and legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota. The governor shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council, appoint all officers not herein otherwise provided for, and, in the first instance, the governor alone may appoint all said officers, who shall hold their offices until the end of the next session of the legislative assembly.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That no member of the legislative assembly shall hold or be appointed to any office which shall have been created, or the salary or emoluments of which shall have been increased, while he was a member, during the term for which he was elected, and for one year after the expiration of such term; and no person holding a commission or appointment under the United States, except postmasters, shall be a member of the legislative assembly, or shall hold any office under the government of said Territory.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the judicial power of said Territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts,

and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and who shall hold a term at the seat of government of said Territory annually; and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said Territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such time and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law; *provided*, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute, or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judges thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court, or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of every term of said courts, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said Territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive in all such cases the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin Territory received for similar services.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be appointed an attorney for said Territory, who shall continue in office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall receive the same fees and salary as the attorney of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin received. There shall also be a marshal for the Territory appointed, who shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall execute all processes issuing from the said courts, when exercising their jurisdiction as circuit and district courts of the United

States; he shall perform the duties, be subject to the same regulations and penalties, and be entitled to the same fees as the marshal of the district court of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin; and shall, in addition, be paid two hundred dollars annually as a compensation for extra services.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That the governor, secretary, chief justice and associate justices, attorney and marshal, shall be nominated and by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the president of the United States. The governor and secretary to be appointed as aforesaid shall, before they act as such, respectively, take an oath or affirmation, before the district judge, or some justice of the peace in the limits of said Territory, duly authorized to administer oaths and affirmations by the laws now in force therein, or before the chief justice, or some associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, to support the constitution of the United States, and faithfully to discharge the duties of their respective offices, which said oaths, when so taken, shall be certified by the person by whom the same shall have been taken, and such certificates shall be received and recorded by the said secretary among the executive proceedings; and the chief justice and associate justices, and all other civil officers in said Territory, before they act as such, shall take a like oath or affirmation, before the said governor or secretary, or some judge or justice of the peace of the Territory, who may be duly commissioned and qualified; which said oath or affirmation shall be certified and transmitted, by the person taking the same, to the secretary, to be by him recorded as aforesaid; and afterwards, the like oath or affirmation shall be taken, certified and recorded in such manner and form as may be prescribed by law. The governor shall receive an annual salary of \$1,500 as governor, and \$1,000 as superintendent of Indian affairs. The chief justice and associate justice shall each receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The secretary shall receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The said salaries shall be paid quarter-yearly, at the treasury of the United States. The members of the legislative assembly shall be entitled to receive three dollars each per day during their attendance at the session thereof, and three dollars each for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the said sessions, estimated according to the nearest usually traveled route. There shall be appropriated, annually, the sum of \$1,000, to be expended by the governor to defray the contingent expenses of the Territory; and there shall also be appropriated, annually, a sufficient sum to be expended by the secretary of the Territory, and upon an estimate to be made by the secretary of the treasury of the United States, to defray the expenses of the legislative assembly, the printing of the laws, and other incidental expenses, and the secretary of the Territory shall annually account to the secretary of the treasury of the United States for the manner in which the aforesaid sum shall have been expended.

SEC. 12. *And be it further enacted*, That the inhabitants of the said Territory shall be entitled to all the rights, privileges and immunities heretofore granted and secured to the Territory of Wisconsin and to its inhabitants; and the laws in force in the Territory of Wisconsin at the date

of the admission of the State of Wisconsin shall continue to be valid and operative therein, so far as the same be not incompatible with the provisions of this act, subject, nevertheless, to be altered, modified or repealed by the governor and legislative assembly of the said Territory of Minnesota; and the laws of the United States are hereby extended over and declared to be in force in said Territory, so far as the same, or any provision thereof, may be applicable.

SEC. 13. *And be it further enacted*, That the legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota shall hold its first session in St. Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of government for said Territory, at such place as they may deem eligible; and shall at such time as they shall see proper prescribe by law the manner of locating the permanent seat of government of said Territory by a vote of the people. And the sum of twenty thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated and granted to said Territory of Minnesota, to be applied by the governor and legislative assembly to the erection of suitable public buildings at the seat of government.

SEC. 14. *And be it further enacted*, That a delegate of the house of representatives of the United States, to serve for the term of two years, may be elected by the voters qualified to elect members of the legislative assembly, who shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as are exercised and enjoyed by the delegates from the several other territories of the United States to the said house of representatives. The first election shall be held at such times and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and at all subsequent elections the times, places and manner of holding the elections shall be prescribed by law. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected, and a certificate thereof shall be given accordingly.

SEC. 15. *And be it further enacted*, That all suits, process and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law or in chancery, and all indictments and informations, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the Territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said Territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect, shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said Territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws, in force within said limits, may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions and causes of action may be recovered under this act the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said Territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

SEC. 16. *And be it further enacted*, That all justices of the peace, constables, sheriffs, and all other judicial and ministerial officers, who shall be in office within the limits of said Territory when this act shall take effect,

shall be and they are hereby authorized and required to continue to exercise and perform the duties of their respective offices as officers of the Territory of Minnesota, temporarily, and until they or others shall be duly appointed and qualified to fill their places, in the manner herein directed, or until their offices shall be abolished.

SEC. 17. *And be it further enacted*, That the sum of \$5,000 be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the said governor of the Territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorneys of said Territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 18. *And be it further enacted*, That when the lands in said Territory shall be surveyed under the direction of the government of the United States, preparatory to bringing the same into market, sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in said Territory shall be and the same are hereby reserved for the purpose of being applied to schools in said Territory, and in the state and territories hereafter to be erected out of the same.

SEC. 19. *And be it further enacted*, That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said Territory may define the judicial districts of said Territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said Territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter or modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.

SEC. 20. *And be it further enacted*, That every bill which shall or may pass the council and house of representatives, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the Territory; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated; which shall cause the objections to be entered at large upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall also be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law; but in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislative assembly, by adjournment, prevent it, in which case it shall not become a law.

MINNESOTA STATE SEAL.

The first official record of a state seal is in the message of Governor Ramsey to the first territorial legislature, Sept. 9, 1849, in which he says: "A temporary great seal of the Territory of Minnesota has been adopted, an impression of which will be submitted. I preferred consulting the legislative assembly upon the adoption of a permanent great seal, and I herewith lay before you the design of one, to which I ask your attention, and if you approve it, or suggest its modification, it will be placed in the hands of an artist and engraved, and thenceforward supersede the seal now in use." On October 31st Mr. James M. Boal, from the committee appointed to draft a device for the territorial seal, reported having adopted for "a device, an every-day scene, consisting of an Indian family with their lodge, canoe, etc., and a single white man visting them, with no other protection than the feeling of hospitality and friendship existing between the two people. The white man is receiving from the Indian the pipe of peace," etc. This report was adopted, and an act providing for the use of the seal was duly passed and became a law. But, for some reason, the seal so authorized was never used.

In place of it one was adopted, just how or by whom there is no record now, and which was used as "the great seal of Minnesota" until 1858. It bears the date at the bottom, "1849." The device is much the same as the present state seal. A farmer is plowing in the foreground, but facing to the west. His rifle, powderhorn, etc., are leaning on a stump near him. In the distance, to the left, is the Falls of St. Anthony, and an Indian on horseback riding rapidly *eastward*, towards what appears to be a rising sun. Over the device is the motto, "*Quo sursum velo videre*," the third word a misprint for *volo*, the whole meaning, "I wish to see what lies beyond." This motto was selected by Hon. H. H. Sibley, while delegate in congress, and the engraving of the seal was procured in Washington, by Governor Ramsey, of D. O. Hare, an engraver of that city, at a cost of \$157.

This seal was ridiculed more or less by journalists, who said it represented "a man plowing one way and looking another," or "an astonished Indian and a scared white man," etc. But it was used until 1858.

At the first session of the state legislature the question of a state seal was taken up. Hon. Chas. F. Dowe, a member of the constitutional convention in 1857, had drafted (by Mr. Buechner, an artist of St. Paul) a design for a state seal, which he had hoped that the first state legislature would adopt. It was generally considered very suitable (an engraving is



given of it on page 658 of W. H. C. Folsom's History of the Northwest). Article fifteen of the state constitution, adopted on Oct. 13, 1857, provided that "The legislature shall provide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal." The first legislative session (which assembled Dec. 2, 1857), however, does not seem to have done so, and when the state government came into operation in May, 1858, there was still no "state seal" for use on documents. Governor Sibley authorized the secretary of state to continue the use of the old territorial seal for the present. At the adjourned session of the legislature in June, Governor Sibley referred to the subject, and a special committee was appointed to report the design for a seal, of which W. H. C. Folsom was chairman. This was done on June 30th. Mr. Folsom had secured an elaborate design from an artist of St. Paul, Dr. R. O. Sweeny, fully described in his report. A joint resolution adopting the design was passed, and duly signed, on July 16th.

Several months appear to have elapsed before the new seal was engraved and put into use, and when it was, it was found that the elaborate design proposed in Mr. Folsom's report had not been adopted, but that the device of the old territorial seal had been used, with a little change. The equestrian Indian was represented as riding *westward* and the farmer plowing eastward. No other change was made except the use of the word "state" instead of "territory," and adding the date of its admission, "1858." The motto was "L'ETOILE DU NORD" (the North Star). The "Minnesotian" newspaper ridiculed this latter in a series of vituperative articles, declaring that Governor Sibley had used a French motto simply because he spoke that tongue. But the seal soon came into general use, and has been the only one used officially.

A new die of the same design was made necessary in 1907 by reason of the old one having been worn by excessive use in the rapid growth of business of the state.

ACT

AUTHORIZING A STATE GOVERNMENT.

[Passed Feb. 26, 1857.]

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled,* That the inhabitants of that portion of the Territory of Minnesota which is embraced within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and the British Possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois de Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river, and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin, until the same intersects with the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and the British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning, be and they hereby are authorized to form for themselves a constitution and state government by the name of the State of Minnesota, and to come into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, according to the Federal Constitution.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That the State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state and any state or states now or hereafter to be formed or bounded by the same; and said river or waters leading into the same shall be common highways, and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to all other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That on the first Monday in June next, the legal voters in each representative district then existing within the limits of the proposed state, are hereby authorized to elect two delegates for

each representative to which said district shall be entitled according to the apportionment for representatives to the territorial legislature; which election for delegates shall be held and conducted, and the returns made, in all respects in conformity with the laws of said Territory regulating the election of representatives, and the delegates so elected shall assemble at the capitol of said Territory on the second Monday in July next, and first determine by a vote whether it is the wish of the people of the proposed State to be admitted into the Union at that time; and if so, shall proceed to form a constitution, and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a state government, in conformity with the Federal Constitution, subject to the approval and ratification of the people of the proposed State.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That in the event said convention shall decide in favor of the immediate admission of the proposed State into the Union, it shall be the duty of the United States marshal for said Territory to proceed to take a census or enumeration of the inhabitants within the limits of the proposed State, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, with the view of ascertaining the number of representatives to which said State may be entitled in the Congress of the United States. And said State shall be entitled to one representative, and such additional representatives as the population of the State shall, according to the census, show it would be entitled to according to the present ratio of representation.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted,* That the following propositions be and the same are hereby offered to the said convention of the people of Minnesota for their free acceptance or rejection, which, if accepted by the convention, shall be obligatory on the United States, and upon the said State of Minnesota, to-wit:

First—That sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in every township of public lands in said State, and where either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been sold or otherwise been disposed of, other lands, equivalent thereto, and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to said State for the use of schools.

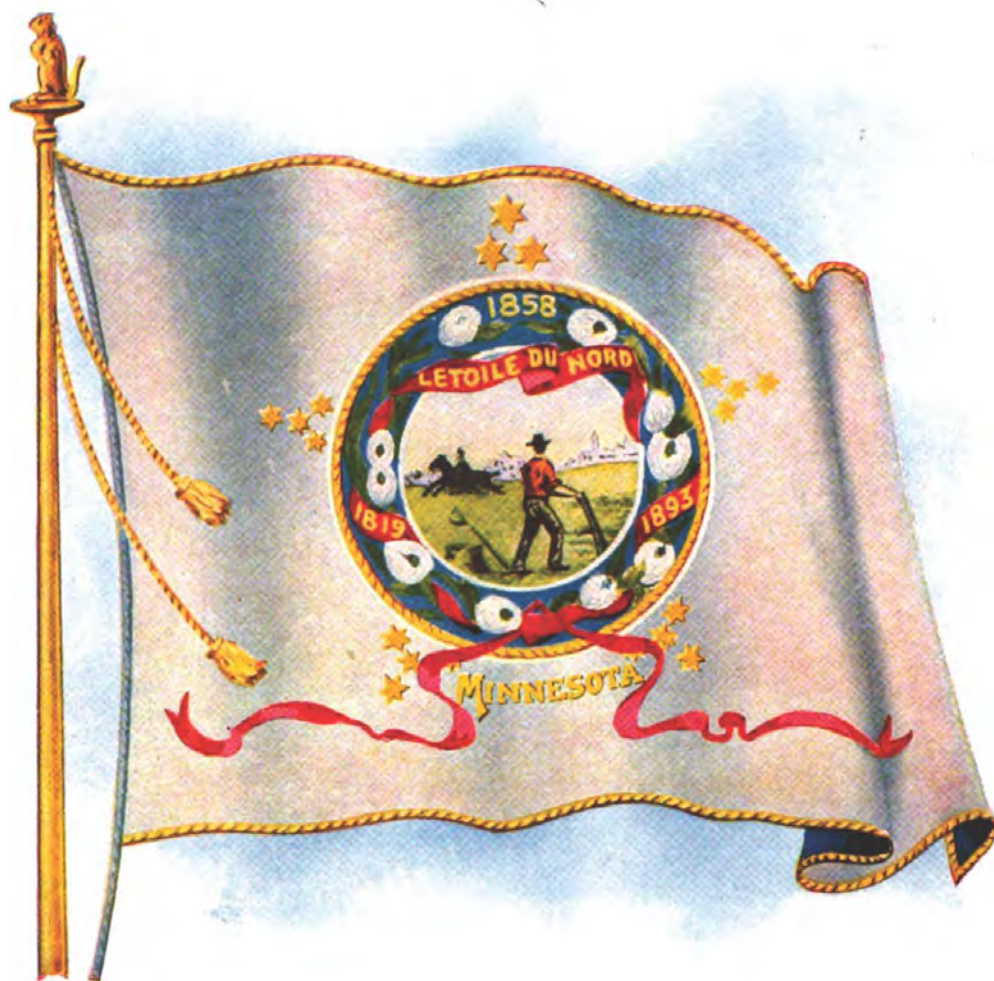
Second—That seventy-two sections of land shall be set apart and reserved for the use and support of a state university, to be selected by the governor of said State, subject to the approval of the commissioner at the general land office, and to be appropriated and applied in such manner as the legislature of said State may prescribe; for the purpose aforesaid, but for no other purpose.

Third—Ten entire sections of land to be selected by the governor of said State, in legal subdivisions, shall be granted to said State for the purpose of completing the public buildings, or for the erection of others at the seat of government, under the direction of the legislature thereof.

Fourth—That all salt springs within said State, not exceeding twelve in number, with six sections of land adjoining or as contiguous as may be to each, shall be granted to said State for its use; and the same to be selected by the governor thereof within one year after the admission of said State, and, when so selected, to be used or disposed of on such terms, conditions

and regulations as the legislature shall direct; *provided*, that no salt spring or land the right whereof is now vested in any individual or in individuals, or which may be hereafter confirmed or adjudged to any individual or individuals, shall by this article be granted to said State.

Fifth—That five per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands lying within said State, which shall be sold by Congress after the admission of said State into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said State for the purpose of making public roads and internal improvements as the legislature shall direct; *provided*, the foregoing propositions herein offered are on the condition that the said convention which shall form the constitution of said State shall provide, by a clause in said constitution, or an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to *bona fide* purchasers thereof; and that no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States, and that in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.



MINNESOTA STATE FLAG.

The state legislature of 1893, by chapter sixteen, provided for the adoption of a state flag.

Mrs. Franklyn L. Greenleaf, Mrs. A. A. White, Mrs. Edward Durant, Mrs. F. B. Clarke, Mrs. H. F. Brower and Mrs. A. T. Stebbins were by this act named and designated a commission to select and adopt an appropriate design for a state flag.

Conformably to the provision of this act, this commission called for designs, and on Tuesday, Feb. 28, 1893, met, selected and adopted the design presented by Mrs. Edward H. Center, of Minneapolis.

Following is a description of the flag: "The ground is of white silk, and the reverse side of blue silk, bordered with bullion fringe. In the center is the state seal, wreathed with white moccasin flowers, on a blue ground. The red ribbon of the seal bearing the motto is continued through the wreath, entwining the blossoms and floating carelessly over the lower portion of the flag. It bears, in gold, the dates 1819, the time of the settlement of Minnesota, and 1893. Above, also in gold, is the date 1858, the time of the admission of Minnesota to the Union. Below the design, in gold letters, is wrought 'Minnesota.' Grouped around the seal are nineteen stars in the design of star points, with the North Star, significant of the North Star State, in a group of three at the top."

The choice of the number nineteen is a peculiarly happy one, as Minnesota was the nineteenth state, after the original thirteen, to be admitted to the Union. The standard to the flag was surmounted by a golden gopher, and tied with a gold cord and tassel. The execution of the design is entirely in needle work.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Under the enabling act of Congress, approved March 3, 1857, a constitutional convention of one hundred and eight members (each council district to elect two for each councilman and representative it was entitled to) was authorized to meet at the capitol on the second Monday in July, to frame a state constitution, and submit it to the people of the territory. The election was held on the first Monday in June. On July 13th the delegates met, but, a disagreement arising in the organization, the Republican members organized one body, and the Democratic members organized separately. Each of these bodies, claiming to be the legal constitutional convention, proceeded with the work of forming an instrument to be submitted to the people. After some days an understanding was effected between them, and, by means of committees of conference, the same constitution was framed and adopted by both bodies. On being submitted to the people October 13th, it was ratified.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

STATE OF MINNESOTA.

Adopted October 13, 1857. Ayes, 30,055; Noes, 571.

Preamble. We, the people of the State of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution:

ARTICLE I.

BILL OF RIGHTS.

Object of government. SECTION 1. Government is instituted for the security, benefit and protection of the people, in whom all political power is inherent, together with the right to alter, modify or reform such government, whenever the public good may require it.

Rights and privileges. SEC. 2. No member of this State shall be disfranchised, or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land, or the judgment of his peers. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the State otherwise than in the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted.

Liberty of the press. SEC. 3. The liberty of the press shall forever remain inviolate, and all persons may freely speak, write and publish their sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of such right.

Right of trial by jury. SEC. 4. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, and shall extend to all cases at law without regard to the amount in controversy, but a jury trial may be waived by the parties in all cases

in the manner prescribed by law; [and the legislature may provide that the agreement of five-sixths of any jury in any civil action or proceeding, after not less than six (6) hours' deliberation, shall be a sufficient verdict therein.]*

No excessive bail or unusual punishments. SEC. 5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor shall excessive fines be imposed; nor shall cruel or unusual punishments be inflicted.

Rights of accused in criminal prosecutions. SEC. 6. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the county or district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which county or district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel in his defense. (a)

Further rights of accused—when bailable. SEC. 7. No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense without due process of law, and no person for the same offense shall be put twice in jeopardy of punishment, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. All persons shall before conviction be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great; and the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when in case of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require.

Redress of injuries or wrongs. SEC. 8. Every person is entitled to a certain remedy in the laws for all injuries or wrongs which he may receive in his person, property or character; he ought to obtain justice freely and without purchase; completely and without denial; promptly and without delay, conformable to the laws.

Treason defined. SEC. 9. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against the same, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

Right against unreasonable searches. SEC. 10. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the person or things to be seized.

(a) The jury contemplated by article 1, section 6, securing the right to jury trial in criminal cases, is a body of twelve men, and it is error to try a party charged with crime in a justice court, against his objection, with a jury of six. The fact that he may appeal to the district court, on entering into recognizance with sureties, does not change the rule. 14 Minn. 330.

Prohibits *ex post facto* laws, or laws impairing contracts. SEC. 11. No bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, nor any law impairing the obligation of contracts shall ever be passed, and no conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Imprisonment for debt—property exemption. SEC. 12. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in this State, (a) but this shall not prevent the legislature from providing for imprisonment, or holding to bail, persons charged with fraud in contracting said debt. A reasonable amount of property shall be exempt from seizure or sale for the payment of any debt or liability. The amount of such exemption shall be determined by law. [*Provided, however, that all property so exempted shall be liable to seizure and sale for any debts incurred to any person for work done or materials furnished in the construction, repair or improvement of the same, and provided further, that such liability to seizure and sale shall also extend to all real property for any debt incurred to any laborer or servant for labor or service performed.*]*

Private property for public use. SEC. 13. Private property shall not be taken, destroyed or damaged for public use without just compensation therefor, first paid or secured.†

Military power subordinate. SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power, and no standing army shall be kept up in this State in time of peace.

Lands declared allodial—leases, when void. SEC. 15. All lands within the State are declared to be allodial, and feudal tenures of every description, with all their incidents, are prohibited. Leases and grants of agricultural lands for a longer period than twenty-one years hereafter made, in which shall be reserved any rent or service of any kind, shall be void.

Freedom of conscience—no preference to be given to any religious establishment or mode of worship. SEC. 16. The enumeration of rights in this constitution shall not be construed to deny or impair others retained by and inherent in the people. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience shall never be infringed, nor shall any man be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any religious or ecclesiastical ministry, against his consent; nor shall any control of or interference with the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference to be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness, or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the State, nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious societies, or religious or theological seminaries.

No religious test or property qualification to be required. SEC. 17. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification for any office of public trust under the State. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification of any voter at any election in this State; nor shall any person be rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity in consequence of his opinion upon the subject of religion.

No license to peddle. SEC. 18. Any person may sell or peddle the products of the farm or garden occupied and cultivated by him without obtaining a license therefor.*

ARTICLE II.

ON NAME AND BOUNDARIES.

Name and boundaries. SECTION 1. This State shall be called and known by the name of the State of Minnesota, and shall consist of and have jurisdiction over the territory embraced in the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and British possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois des Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence east along the northern boundary of said State to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin until the same intersects the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and British possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning.**

**The northern boundary of the state at the Lake of the Woods is projected beyond the 49th parallel a distance of about twenty miles, making a wedge-shaped jog through the lake until it strikes firm ground on the west bank of the lake; thence in a due south line to the 49th parallel. The explanation of this jog is found in the subjoined paragraphs. In the seventh article of the treaty of Ghent, section 19 reads as follows: Sec. 19. Resolved that the following described (also represented on said map as before mentioned), is, in the opinion of the commissioners, so far as the same extends, the true boundary intended by the before mentioned treaties, namely: * * * thence through the middle of the waters of this bay to the northwest extremity of the same; being the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods, and from a monument in this bay, on the nearest firm ground to the above northwest extremity of said bay, the courses and distances are as follows: 56° W. 1,565½ feet; 2d, N. 6° W. 861½ feet; 3d, N. 28° W. 615.4 feet; 4th, N. 27° 10' W. 495.4 feet; 5th, N. 5° 10' E. 1,322½ feet; 6th, N. 70° 45' W. 493 feet, the variation being 12° east. Jurisdiction on bordering rivers. SEC. 2. The State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and on all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said State, and any other state or states now or hereafter to be formed by the same; and said rivers and waters, and navigable waters leading into the same, shall be common highways and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said State as to other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

Acceptance of propositions in enabling act. SEC. 3. The propositions contained in the act of Congress entitled, "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government, preparatory to their admission into the Union on equal footing with the original states," are hereby accepted, ratified and confirmed, and shall remain irrevocable without the consent of the United States; and it is hereby ordained that this State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same, by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title to said soil to *bona fide* purchasers thereof; and no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States and in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

ARTICLE III.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE POWERS OF GOVERNMENT.

Division of powers. SECTION 1. The powers of government shall be divided into three distinct departments—legislative, executive, and judicial; and no person or persons belonging to or constituting one of these departments shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except in the instances expressly provided in this constitution. (a)

termination of this 6th and last course and distance being the above said most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods, as designated by the seventh article of the treaty of Ghent, and being in latitude 49° 23' 55" north of the equator, and in longitude 95° 14' 38" west from Greenwich. The second article of the convention of 1818 is as follows: Article 2. It is agreed that a line drawn from the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods along the 49th parallel of north latitude, or, if the said point shall not be in the 49th parallel of north latitude, then that a line drawn from the said point due north or south, as the case may be, until the said line shall intersect the said parallel of north latitude, and from the point of such intersection due west, along and with the said parallel, shall be the line of demarkation between the territories of the United States and His Britannic Majesty, and that the said line shall form the northern boundary of the said territories of the United States and the southern boundary of His Britannic Majesty, from the Lake of the Woods to the Stony Mountains. This boundary was re-established and determined by a commission authorized by congress, and the surveys embracing four years were made and reported to congress in 1877.

ARTICLE IV.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

Legislature meets biennially—length of session. SECTION 1. The legislature shall consist of the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall meet biennially at the seat of government of the State, at such time as shall be prescribed by law, but no session shall exceed the term of ninety (90) legislative days; and no new bill shall be introduced in either branch, except on the written request of the governor, during the last twenty (20) days of such sessions, except the attention of the legislature shall be called to some important matter of general interest by a special message from the governor.

Apportionment of members. SEC. 2. The number of members who compose the Senate and House of Representatives shall be prescribed by law, but the representatives in the Senate shall never exceed one member for every 5,000 inhabitants, and in the House of Representatives one member for every 2,000 inhabitants. The representation in both houses shall be apportioned equally throughout the different sections of the State, in proportion to the population thereof, exclusive of Indians not taxable under the provisions of law.

Eligibility of members—quorum. SEC. 3. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and eligibility of its own members; a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as it may provide.

Rules of government. SEC. 4. Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, sit upon its own adjournment, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member; but no member shall be expelled the second time for the same offense.

Officers—journal of proceedings. SEC. 5. The House of Representatives shall elect its presiding officer and the Senate and House of Representatives shall elect such other officers as may be provided by law; they shall keep journals of their proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays, when taken on any question, shall be entered on such journals.

Length of adjournments. SEC. 6. Neither house shall, during a session of the legislature, adjourn for more than three days (Sundays excepted), nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be assembled, without the consent of the other house.

Compensation. SEC. 7. The compensation of senators and representatives shall be three dollars per diem during the first session, but may afterwards be prescribed by law. But no increase of compensation shall be prescribed which shall take effect during the period for which the members of the existing House of Representatives may have been elected.

Privileged from arrest. SEC. 8. The members of each house shall in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses, and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

Restriction as to holding office. SEC. 9. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he is elected, hold any office under the authority of the United States or the State of Minnesota, except that of postmaster, and no senator or representative shall hold an office under the state which has been created or the emoluments of which have been increased during the session of the legislature of which he was a member, until one year after the expiration of his term of office in the legislature.

Bills of revenue to originate in House. SEC. 10. All bills for raising a revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives, but the Senate may propose and concur with amendments as on other bills.

Approval of bills by Governor—action on non-approval. SEC. 11. Every bill which shall have passed the Senate and House of Representatives, in conformity to the rules of each house and the joint rules of the two houses, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the State. If he approve, he shall sign and deposit it in the office of secretary of state for preservation, and notify the house where it originated of the fact. But if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it shall have originated; when such objections shall be entered at large on the journal of the same, and the house shall proceed to reconsider the bill. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered; and if it be approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by adjournment within that time, prevents its return; in which case it shall not be a law. The governor may approve, sign and file in the office of the secretary of state, within three days after the adjournment of the legislature, any act passed during the last three days of the session, and the same shall become a law.

Governor may cut out items of appropriation bills and otherwise approve. If any bill presented to the governor contain several items of appropriation of money, he may object to one or more of such items, while approving of the other portion of the bill. In such case he shall append to the bill, at the time of signing it, a statement of the items to which he objects, and the appropriation so objected to shall not take effect. If the legislature be in session, he shall transmit to the house in which the bill originated a copy of such statement, and the items objected to shall be separately reconsidered.

If, on reconsideration, one or more of such items be approved by two-thirds of the members elected to each house, the same shall be a part of the law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. All the provisions of this section, in relation to bills not approved by the governor, shall apply in cases in which he shall withhold his approval from any item or items contained in a bill appropriating money.

Money appropriations, how made. SEC. 12. No money shall be appropriated except by bill. Every order, resolution or vote requiring the concurrence of the two houses (except such as relate to the business or adjournment of the same) shall be presented to the governor for his signature, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being returned by him with his objections, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the members of the two houses, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

Majority vote of all members-elect to pass a law. SEC. 13. The style of all laws of this State shall be: "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota." No law shall be passed unless voted for by a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature, and the vote entered upon the journal of each house.

Impeachment powers. SEC. 14. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, through a concurrence of a majority of all the members elected to seats therein. All impeachments shall be tried by the Senate; and when sitting for that purpose the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Exclusion from civil rights. SEC. 15. The legislature shall have full power to exclude from the privilege of electing or being elected any person convicted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime.

Protest and dissent of members. SEC. 16. Two or more members of either house shall have liberty to dissent and protest against any act or resolution which they may think injurious to the public or to any individual, and have the reason of their dissent entered on the journal.

Vacancies in legislature. SEC. 17. The governor shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies as may occur in either house of the legislature. The legislature shall prescribe by law the manner in which evidence in cases of contested seats in either house shall be taken.

Punish for disorderly conduct. SEC. 18. Each house may punish by imprisonment, during its session, any person, not a member, who shall be guilty of any disorderly or contemptuous behavior in their presence, but no such imprisonment shall at any time exceed twenty-four hours.

Open sessions. SEC. 19. Each house shall be open to the public during the sessions thereof, except in such cases as in their opinion may require secrecy.

Reading of bills. SEC. 20. Every bill shall be read on three different days in each separate house, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the house where such bill is depending shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed by either house until it shall have been previously read twice at length.

Enrollment of bills. SEC. 21. Every bill having passed both houses shall be carefully enrolled, and shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house. Any presiding officer refusing to sign a bill which shall have previously passed both houses shall thereafter be incapable of holding a seat in either branch of the legislature, or hold any other office of honor or profit in the State, and in case of such refusal, each house shall, by rule, provide the manner in which such bill shall be properly certified for presentation to the governor.

Passage of bills on last day of session prohibited. SEC. 22. No bill shall be passed by either house of the legislature upon the day prescribed for the adjournment of the two houses. But this section shall not be so construed as to preclude the enrollment of a bill, or the signature and passage from one house to the other, or the reports thereon from committees, or its transmission to the executive for his signature.

Census enumeration—apportionment. SEC. 23. The legislature shall provide by law for an enumeration of the inhabitants of this State in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and every tenth year thereafter. At their first session after each enumeration so made, and also at their first session after each enumeration made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall have the power to prescribe the bounds of congressional, senatorial and representative districts, and to apportion anew the senators and representatives among the several districts according to the provisions of section second of this article.

Senatorial districts—term of office of senators and representatives. SEC. 24. The senators shall also be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory, at the same time that members of the house of representatives are required to be chosen, and in the same manner; and no representative district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. The senate districts shall be numbered in a regular series. The terms of office of senators and representatives shall be the same as now prescribed by law until the general election of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight (1878), at which time there shall be an entire new election of all the senators and representatives. Representatives chosen at such election, or at any election thereafter, shall hold their office for the term of two years, except it be to fill a vacancy; and the senators chosen at such election by districts designated as odd numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the second year, and senators chosen by districts designated by even numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the fourth year; and thereafter senators shall be chosen for four years, except there shall be an entire new election of all the senators at the election of representatives next succeeding each new apportionment provided for in this article.

Qualification of legislators. SEC. 25. Senators and representatives shall be qualified voters of the State, and shall have resided one year in the State and six months immediately preceding the election in the district from which they are elected.

Senators to Congress. SEC. 26. Members of the Senate of the United States from this State shall be elected by the two houses of the legislature in joint convention, at such time and in such manner as may be provided by law.

Laws to embrace only one subject. SEC. 27. No law shall embrace more than one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.

Divorces. SEC. 28. Divorces shall not be granted by the legislature.

Oath of office. SEC. 29. All members and officers of both branches of the legislature shall, before entering upon the duties of their respective trusts, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and faithfully and impartially to discharge the duties devolving upon him as such member or officer.

Elections viva voce. SEC. 30. In all elections to be made by the legislature, the members thereof shall vote *viva voce*, and their votes shall be entered on the journal.

Prohibition of lotteries. SEC. 31. The legislature shall never authorize any lottery or the sale of lottery tickets.

Change of form of taxation of railroads to be voted upon. SEC. 32. [a] Any law providing for the repeal or amendment of any law or laws heretofore or hereafter enacted, which provides that any railroad company now existing in this State or operating its road therein, or which may be hereafter organized, shall, in lieu of all other taxes and assessments upon their real estate, roads, rolling stock, and other personal property, at and during the time and periods therein specified, pay into the treasury of this State a certain percentage therein mentioned of the gross earnings of such railroad companies now existing or hereafter organized, shall, before the same shall take effect or be in force, be submitted to a vote of the people of the State, and be adopted and ratified by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the election at which the same shall be submitted to them.

Internal improvement lands—investment of proceeds in bonds. SEC. 32. [b] All lands donated to the State of Minnesota for the purpose of internal improvement, under the eighth section of the act of Congress, approved September fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-one, being "An act to appropriate the proceeds of the sale of the public lands, and to grant pre-emption rights," shall be appraised and sold, in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands, under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight, of the General Statutes, except the modifications hereinafter mentioned. All moneys derived from the sales of said lands shall be invested in the bonds of the United States, or of the State of

Minnesota issued since 1860; and the moneys so invested shall constitute the Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State. All moneys received by the county treasurer under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight (38), aforesaid, derived from the sale of internal improvement lands, shall be held at all times subject to the order and direction of the state treasurer, for the benefit of the fund to which it belongs; and on the fifteenth day of June in each year, and at such other times as he may be requested so to do by the state treasurer, he shall pay over to the said state treasurer all moneys received on account of such fund.

The bonds purchased in accordance with this amendment shall be transferable only upon the order of the governor, and on each bond shall be written "Minnesota Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State, transferable only on the order of the governor."

Principal not to be reduced. The principal sum from all sales of internal improvement lands shall not be reduced by any charges or costs of officers, by fees, or by any other means whatever; and section fifty (50), of title one (1), of chapter thirty-eight (38), of the General Statutes, shall not be applicable to the provisions of this amendment, and wherever the words "school lands" are used in said title, it shall read as applicable to this amendment, "Internal Improvement Lands."

Appropriations therefrom to be voted upon before valid. The moneys belonging to the Internal Improvement Land Fund shall not be appropriated for any purpose whatever until the enactment for that purpose shall have been approved by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the annual general election following the passage of the act. (a)

The force of this amendment shall be to authorize the sale of the internal improvement lands, without further legislative enactment.

Against special legislation. SEC. 33. In all cases when a general law can be made applicable, no special law shall be enacted; and whether a general law could have been made applicable in any case is hereby declared a judicial question, and as such shall be judicially determined without regard to any legislative assertion on that subject. The legislature shall pass no local or special law regulating the affairs of, or incorporating, erecting or changing the lines of, any county, city, village, township, ward or school district, or creating the offices, or prescribing the powers and duties of the officers of, or fixing or relating to the compensation, salary or fees of the same, or the mode of election or appointment thereto, authorizing the laying out, opening, altering, vacating or maintaining roads, highways, streets or alleys; remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures; regulating the powers, duties and practice of justices of the peace, magistrates and constables; changing the names of persons, places, lakes or rivers; for opening and conducting of elections, or fixing or changing the places of voting;

authorizing the adoption or legitimation of children; changing the law of descent or succession; conferring rights upon minors; declaring any named person of age; giving effect to informal or invalid wills or deeds, or affecting the estates of minors or persons under disability; locating or changing county seats; regulating the management of public schools, the building or repairing of schoolhouses, and the raising of money for such purposes; exempting property from taxation, or regulating the rate of interest on money; creating corporations, or amending, renewing, extending or explaining the charters thereof; granting to any corporation, association or individual any special or exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever, or authorizing public taxation for a private purpose. *Provided, however,* That the inhibitions of local or special laws in this section shall not be construed to prevent the passage of general laws on any of the subjects enumerated.

Repeal of existing special laws. The legislature may repeal any existing special or local law, but shall not amend, extend or modify any of the same.

Refers to amendment of 1881, superseded as above. SEC. 34. The legislature shall provide general laws for the transaction of any business that may be prohibited by section one (1) of this amendment, and all such laws shall be uniform in their operation throughout the State.

Against combinations or pools to affect markets. SEC. 35. Any combinations of persons, either as individuals or as members or officers of any corporation, to monopolize the markets for food products in this State, or to interfere with, or restrict the freedom of, such markets, is hereby declared to be a criminal conspiracy, and shall be punished in such manner as the legislature may provide.

City or village may frame its own charter—charter to be submitted to voters. SEC. 36. Any city or village in this State may frame a charter for its own government as a city consistent with and subject to the laws of this State, as follows: The legislature shall provide, under such restrictions as it deems proper, for a board of fifteen freeholders, who shall be and for the past five years shall have been qualified voters thereof, to be appointed by the district judges of the judicial district in which the city or village is situated, as the legislature may determine, for a term in no event to exceed six years, which board shall, within six months after its appointment, return to the chief magistrate of said city or village draft of said charter, signed by the members of said board, or a majority thereof. Such charter shall be submitted to the qualified voters of such city or village at the next election thereafter, and if four-sevenths of the qualified voters voting at such election shall ratify the same it shall, at the end of thirty days thereafter, become the charter of such city or village as a city, and supersede any existing charter and amendments thereof; *provided*, that in cities having patrol limits now established, such charters shall require a three-fourths majority vote of the qualified voters voting at such election to change the patrol limits now established.

Legislature to prescribe general limits of charter—amendment of charter—upon application of 5 per cent of legal voters. Before any city shall incorporate under this act the legislature shall prescribe by law the general limits within which such charter shall be framed. Duplicate certificates shall be made setting forth the charter proposed and its ratification, which shall be signed by the chief magistrate of said city or village and authenticated by its corporate seal. One of said certificates shall be deposited in the office of secretary of state, and the other, after being recorded in the office of the register of deeds for the county in which such city or village lies, shall be deposited among the archives of such city or village, and all courts shall take judicial notice thereof. Such charter so deposited may be amended by proposal therefor made by a board of fifteen commissioners aforesaid, published for at least thirty days in three newspapers of general circulation in such city or village, and accepted by three-fifths of the qualified voters of such city or village voting at the next election, and not otherwise; but such charter shall always be in harmony with and subject to the Constitution and laws of the State of Minnesota. The legislature may prescribe the duties of the commission relative to submitting amendments of charter to the vote of the people and shall provide that upon application of five per cent of the legal voters of any such city or village, by written petition, such commission shall submit to the vote of the people proposed amendments to such charter set forth in said petition. The board of freeholders above provided for shall be permanent, and all the vacancies by death, disability to perform duties, resignation or removal from the corporate limits, or expiration of term of office, shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original board was created, and said board shall always contain its full complement of members.

Mayor and legislative body. It shall be a feature of all such charters that there shall be provided, among other things, for a mayor or chief magistrate, and a legislative body of either one or two houses; if of two houses, at least one of them shall be elected by general vote of the electors.

Articles of amendment may be submitted separately. In submitting any such charter or amendment thereto to the qualified voters of such city or village, any alternate section or article may be presented for the choice of the voters, and may be voted on separately without prejudice to other articles or sections of the charter or any amendments thereto.

General laws for cities by divisions of population. The legislature may provide general laws relating to affairs of cities, the application of which may be limited to cities of over fifty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of fifty and not less than twenty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of twenty and not less than ten thousand inhabitants, or to cities of ten thousand inhabitants or less, which shall apply equally to all such cities of either class, and which shall be paramount while in force to the provisions relating to the same matter included in the local charter herein provided for. But no local charter, provision or ordinance passed thereunder shall supersede any general law of the State defining or punishing crimes or misdemeanors.

ARTICLE V.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Officers in executive department. SECTION 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general who shall be chosen by the electors of the State. (a)

Election returns to be sent to secretary of state. SEC. 2. The returns of every election for the officers named in the foregoing section shall be made to the secretary of state, who shall call to his assistance two or more of the judges of the supreme court, and two disinterested judges of the district courts of the State, who shall constitute a board of canvassers, who shall open and canvass said returns and declare the result within three days after such canvass.

Official term of governor and lieutenant governor—qualifications. SEC. 3. The term of office for the governor and lieutenant governor shall be two years, and until their successors are chosen and qualified. Each shall have attained the age of twenty-five (25) years, and shall have been a *bona fide* resident of the State for one year next preceding his election. Both shall be citizens of the United States.

Powers and duties of governor. SEC. 4. The governor shall communicate by message to each session of the legislature such information touching the state and condition of the country as he may deem expedient. He shall be commander-in-chief of the military and naval forces, and may call out such forces to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion. He may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power, in conjunction with the board of pardons, of which the governor shall be *ex officio* a member, and the other members of which shall consist of the attorney general of the State of Minnesota and the chief justice of the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, and whose powers and duties shall be defined and regulated by law, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction for offenses against the State, except in cases of impeachment. He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint a state librarian and notaries public, and such other officers as may be provided by law. He shall have power to appoint commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds or other instruments in writing, to be used in the State. He shall have a negative upon all laws passed by the legislature, under such rules and limitations as are in this Constitution prescribed. He may on extra-

(a) An executive officer of the state is not subject to the control or interference of the judiciary in the performance of duties belonging to him as an executive officer, and no act done, or threatened to be done, by him in his official capacity can be brought under judicial control or interference by mandamus or injunction, even when the act is purely ministerial. 29 Minn. 555.

ordinary occasions convene both houses of the legislature. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, fill any vacancy that may occur in the office of secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and such other state and district offices as may be hereafter created by law, until the next annual election, and until their successors are chosen and qualified.

Official term of other executive officers. SEC. 5. The official term of the secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general shall be two (2) years. The official term of the state auditor shall be four (4) years, and each shall continue in office until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The further duties and salaries of said executive officers shall each be prescribed by law.

Duties of lieutenant governor. SEC. 6. The lieutenant governor shall be ex officio president of the Senate; and in case a vacancy shall occur, from any cause whatever, in the office of governor, he shall be governor during such vacancy. The compensation of lieutenant governor shall be double the compensation of a state senator. Before the close of each session of the Senate they shall elect a president pro tempore, who shall be lieutenant governor in case a vacancy should occur in that office.

• **Official terms of first State officers—(Obsolete.)** SEC. 7. The term of each of the executive officers named in this article shall commence on taking the oath of office on or after the first day of May, 1858, and continue until the first Monday of January, 1860, except the auditor, who shall continue in office till the first Monday of January, 1861; and until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified; and the same above mentioned time for qualification and entry upon the duties of their respective offices shall extend and apply to all other officers elected under the State Constitution, who have not already taken the oath of office, and commenced the performance of their official duties.

Oath of office to be taken by State officers. SEC. 8. Each officer created by this article shall, before entering upon his duties, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States and of this State, and faithfully discharge the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

(Obsolete.) SEC. 9. Laws shall be passed at the first session of the legislature after the State is admitted into the Union to carry out the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE VI.

JUDICIARY.

Judicial powers. SECTION. 1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish by a two-thirds vote.

Supreme court—jurisdiction and powers—reporter of decisions—clerk of supreme court. SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and two associate justices, but the number of the associate justices may be increased to a number not exceeding four, by the legislature, by a two-thirds vote, when it shall be deemed necessary. It shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity, but there shall be no trial by jury in said court. It shall hold one or more terms in each year, as the legislature may direct, at the seat of government, and the legislature may provide, by a two-thirds vote, that one term in each year shall be held in each or any judicial district. It shall be the duty of such court to appoint a reporter of its decisions. There shall be chosen, by the qualified electors of the State, one clerk of the supreme court, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor is duly elected and qualified, and the judges of the supreme court, or a majority of them, shall have the power to fill any vacancy in the office of clerk of the supreme court until an election can be regularly had.

Election and term of office for judges. SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the State at large, and their term of office shall be six years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

District judges may act where supreme judges are disqualified. Whenever all or a majority of the judges of the supreme court shall, from any cause, be disqualified from sitting in any case in said court, the governor, or, if he shall be interested in the result of such case, then the lieutenant governor, shall assign judges of the district court of the State, who shall sit in such case in place of such disqualified judges, with all the powers and duties of judges of the supreme court.

Judicial districts for district courts—election of judges—term of office and residence. SEC. 4. The State shall be divided by the legislature into judicial districts, which shall be composed of contiguous territory, be bounded by county lines, and contain a population as nearly equal as may be practicable. In each judicial district, one or more judges, as the legislature may prescribe, shall be elected by the electors thereof, whose term of office shall be six years, and each of said judges shall severally have and exercise the powers of the court, under such limitations as may be prescribed by law. Every district judge shall, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district for which he shall be elected, and shall reside therein during his continuance in office. In case any court of common pleas heretofore established shall be abolished, the judge of said court may be constituted by the legislature one of the judges of the district court of the district wherein such court has been so established for a period not exceeding the unexpired term for which he was elected.

The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and four associate justices. G. L. 1881, ch. 141.

Jurisdiction of district courts. SEC. 5. The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds one hundred dollars, and in all criminal cases where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than one hundred dollars, and shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. The legislature may provide by law that the judge of one district may discharge the duties of judge of any other district not his own, when convenience or the public interest may require it.

Qualifications. SEC. 6. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be men learned in the law, and shall receive such compensation at stated times as may be prescribed by the legislature; which compensation shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward for their services.

Probate court—judges to be elected—jurisdiction. SEC. 7. There shall be established in each organized county in the State a probate court, which shall be a court of record, and be held at such time and places as may be prescribed by law. It shall be held by one judge, who shall be elected by the voters of the county for the term of two years. He shall be a resident of such county at the time of his election, and reside therein during his continuance in office; and his compensation shall be provided by law. He may appoint his own clerk where none has been elected; but the legislature may authorize the electon, by the electors of any county, of one clerk or register of probate for such county, whose powers, duties, term of office and compensation shall be prescribed by law. A probate court shall have jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, but no other jurisdiction, except as prescribed by this Constitution.

Justices of the peace to be elected—jurisdiction. SEC. 8. The legislature shall provide for the election of a sufficient number of justices of the peace in each county, whose term of office shall be two years, and whose duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law. *Provided*, That no justice of the peace shall have jurisdiction of any civil cause where the amount in controversy shall exceed one hundred dollars, nor in a criminal cause where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment, or a fine over one hundred dollars, nor in any cause involving the title to real estate.

Judges for other courts to be elected. SEC. 9. All judges other than those provided for in this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of the judicial district, county, or city, for which they shall be created, not for a longer term than seven years.

Vacancies—appointment by governor. SEC. 10. In case the office of any judge become vacant before the expiration of the regular term for which he was elected, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor, until a successor is elected and qualified. And such successor shall be elected at the first annual election that occurs more than thirty days after the vacancy shall have happened.

Prohibition, supreme or district judges to hold other offices or to be voted for office while in office. SEC. 11. The justices of the supreme court and the district courts shall hold no office under the United States, nor any other office under this State. And all votes for either of them for any elective office under this Constitution, except a judicial office given by the legislature or the people, during their continuance in office, shall be void.

Change of judicial districts. SEC. 12. The legislature may at any time change the number of judicial districts or their boundaries, when it shall be deemed expedient; but no such change shall vacate the office of any judge.

Clerk of court. SEC. 13. There shall be elected in each county where a district court shall be held, one clerk of said court, whose qualifications, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law, and whose term of office shall be four years.

Legal pleadings. SEC. 14. Legal pleadings and proceedings in the courts of this State shall be under the direction of the legislature. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Minnesota," and all indictments shall conclude, "against the peace and dignity of the State of Minnesota."

Court commissioner—powers and jurisdiction. SEC. 15. The legislature may provide for the election of one person in each organized county in this State, to be called a court commissioner, with judicial power and jurisdiction not exceeding the power and jurisdiction of a judge of the district court at chambers; or the legislature may, instead of such election, confer such power and jurisdiction upon the judges of probate in the State.

ARTICLE VII.

ELECTIVE FRANCHISE.

Elective franchise. SECTION 1. What persons are entitled to vote:

Residence required. Every male person of the age of twenty-one (21) years or upwards belonging to either of the following classes who has resided in this State six (6) months next preceding any election shall be entitled to vote at such election in the election district of which he shall at the time have been for thirty (30) days a resident, for all officers that now are, or hereafter may be, elective by the people.

Citizens of the United States. *First*—Citizens of the United States who have been such for the period of three (3) months next preceding any election.

Mixed Indians. *Second*—Persons of mixed white and Indian blood, who have adopted the customs and habits of civilization.

Pure Indians having adopted habits of civilization. *Third*—Persons of Indian blood residing in this State, who have adopted the language, customs and habits of civilization, after an examination before any district court of the State, in such manner as may be provided by law, and shall have been pronounced by said court capable of enjoying the rights of citizenship within the State.

Non-eligible. SEC. 2. No person not belonging to one of the classes specified in the preceding section; no person who has been convicted of treason or any felony, unless restored to civil rights; and no person under guardianship, or who may be *non compos mentis* or insane, shall be entitled or permitted to vote at any election in this State.

Residence not lost in certain cases. SEC. 3. For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have lost a residence by reason of his absence while employed in the service of the United States; nor while engaged upon the waters of this State or of the United States; nor while a student in any seminary of learning; nor while kept at any almshouse or asylum; nor while confined in any public prison.

Soldiers and sailors—restriction. SEC. 4. No sailor, seaman or marine in the army or navy of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State in consequence of being stationed within the same.

Civil process suspended on election day. SEC. 5. During the day on which any election shall be held, no person shall be arrested by virtue of any civil process.

Elections by ballots. SEC. 6. All elections shall be by ballot, except for such town officers as may be directed by law to be otherwise chosen.

Right to hold office. SEC. 7. Every person who by the provisions of this article shall be entitled to vote at any election shall be eligible to any office which now is, or hereafter shall be, elective by the people in the district wherein he shall have resided thirty days previous to such election, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, or the Constitution and law of the United States. (a)

Women may vote and be eligible. SEC. 8. Women may vote for school officers and members of library boards, and shall be eligible to hold any office pertaining to the management of schools or libraries.

Any woman of the age of twenty-one (21) years and upward and possessing qualifications requisite to a male voter may vote at any election held for the purpose of choosing any officer of schools or any members of library boards, or upon any measure relating to schools or libraries, and shall be eligible to hold any office pertaining to the management of schools and libraries.

Official year of the State. SEC. 9. The official year for the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Monday in January in each year, and all terms of office shall terminate at that time; and the general election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The first general election for State and county officers, except judicial officers, after the adoption of this amendment, shall be held in the year A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eight-four (1884), and thereafter the general election shall be held biennially. All state, county or other officers elected

at any general election, whose terms of office would otherwise expire on the first Monday of January, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six (1886), shall hold and continue in such offices, respectively, until the first Monday in January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven (1887).

ARTICLE VIII.

SCHOOL FUNDS, EDUCATION AND SCIENCE.

Uniform system of public schools. SECTION 1. The stability of a republican form of government depending mainly upon the intelligence of the people, it shall be the duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools. (a)

Proceeds of school lands to be a perpetual fund. SEC. 2. The proceeds of such lands as are or hereafter may be granted by the United States for the use of schools within each township of this State shall remain a perpetual school fund to the State; and not more than one-third (1-3) of said lands may be sold in two (2) years, one-third (1-3) in five (5) years, and one-third (1-3) in ten (10) years; but the lands of the greatest valuation shall be sold first; *provided*, that no portion of said lands shall be sold otherwise than at public sale. The principal of all funds arising from sales or other disposition of lands or other property, granted or entrusted to this State in each township for educational purposes, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished; and the income arising from the lease or sale of said school land shall be distributed to the different townships throughout the State, in proportion to the number of scholars in each township, between the ages of five and twenty-one years; and shall be faithfully applied to the specific objects of the original grants or appropriations.

Investment of funds. Suitable laws shall be enacted by the legislature for the safe investment of the principal of all funds which have heretofore arisen or which may hereafter arise from the sale or other disposition of such lands, or the income from such lands accruing in any way before the sale or disposition thereof, in interest-bearing bonds of the United States, or of the State of Minnesota, issued after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty (1860), or of such other state as the legislature may, by law, from time to time direct.

Swamp lands—division of proceeds. All swamp lands now held by the State, or that may hereafter accrue to the State, shall be appraised and sold in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same less one-third (1-3), as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands under the provisions of title one (1) of

chapter thirty-eight (38) of the General Statutes. The principal of all funds derived from sales of swamp lands, as aforesaid, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished. One-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the proceeds of said principal shall be appropriated to the common school fund of the State. The remaining one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) shall be appropriated to the educational and charitable institutions of the State in the relative ratio of cost to support said institutions.

Public schools in each township to be established. SEC. 3. The legislature shall make such provisions, by taxation or otherwise, as, with the income arising from the school fund, will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools in each township in the State.

Prohibition as to aiding sectarian schools. But in no case shall the moneys derived as aforesaid, or any portion thereof, or any public moneys or property, be appropriated or used for the support of schools wherein the distinctive doctrines, creeds or tenets of any particular Christian or other religious sect are promulgated or taught.

University of Minnesota—location confirmed. SEC. 4. The location of the University of Minnesota, as established by existing laws, is hereby confirmed, and said institution is hereby declared to be the University of the State of Minnesota. All the rights, immunities, franchises and endowments heretofore granted or conferred are hereby perpetuated unto the said university; and all lands which may be granted hereafter by Congress, or other donations for said university purposes, shall vest in the institution referred to in this section.

Permanent school funds may be loaned to districts or counties for school purposes. SEC. 5. The permanent school funds of the State may be loaned upon interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum to the several counties or school districts of the State, to be used in the erection of county or school buildings. No such loan shall be made until approved by a board consisting of the governor, the state auditor and the state treasurer, who are hereby constituted an investment board for the purpose of the loans hereby authorized; nor shall any such loan be for an amount exceeding three (3) per cent of the last preceding assessed valuation of the real estate of the county or school district receiving the same. The state auditor shall annually, at the time of certifying the state tax to the several county auditors, also certify to each auditor to whose county, or to any of the school districts of whose county, any such loan shall have been made, the tax necessary to be levied to meet the accruing interest or principal of any such loan, and it shall be the duty of every such county auditor forthwith to levy and extend such tax upon all the taxable property of his county, or of the several school districts, respectively, liable for such loans—as the case may be—and in all such cases the tax so assessed shall be fifty (50) per cent in excess of the amount actually necessary to be raised on account of such accruing principal or interest. It shall be levied, collected and paid into the county and state treasuries in the same manner as state taxes, and any excess collected over the amount of such principal or interest accruing in any given year shall be credited to the general funds of the respective

counties or school districts. No change of the boundaries of any school district after the making of any such loan shall operate to withdraw any property from the taxation herein provided for; nor shall any law be passed extending the time of payment of any such principal or interest, or reducing the rate of such interest, or in any manner waiving or impairing any rights of the State in connection with any such loan. Suitable laws, not inconsistent with this amendment, may be passed by the legislature for the purpose of carrying the same into effect. (a)

Investment of permanent school and university funds—approval—bonded indebtedness not to exceed 15 per cent, draw not less than 3 per cent, run not less than 5 nor more than 20 years. SEC. 6. The permanent school and university fund of this state may be invested in the bonds of any county, school district, city, town or village of this state, but no such investment shall be made until approved by the board of commissioners designated by law to regulate the investment of the permanent school fund and the permanent university fund of this state; nor shall such loan or investment be made when the bonds to be issued or purchased would make the entire bonded indebtedness exceed fifteen (15) per cent of the assessed valuation of the taxable real property of the county, school district, city, town or village issuing such bonds; nor shall such loans or indebtedness be made at a lower rate of interest than three (3) per cent per annum, nor for a shorter period than five (5) years, nor for a longer period than twenty (20) years, and no change of the town, school district, city, village or of county lines shall relieve the real property in such town, school district, county, village or city in this state at the time of the issuing of such bonds from any liability for taxation to pay such bonds.

ARTICLE IX.

FINANCES OF THE STATE, AND BANKS AND BANKING.

Power of taxation—legislature may authorize. SECTION 1. The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects, and shall be levied and collected for public purposes, but public burying grounds, public school houses, public hospitals, academies, colleges, universities, and all seminaries of learning, all churches, church property, and houses of worship, institutions of purely public charity, and public property used exclusively for any public purpose, shall be exempt from taxation, and there may be exempted from taxation personal property not exceeding in value \$200, for each household, individual or head of a family, as the legislature may determine: *Provided*, that the legislature may authorize municipal corporations to levy and collect assessments for local improvements upon property benefited thereby without regard to a cash valuation, and, provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect, modify or repeal any existing law providing for the taxation of the gross earnings of railroads.

(a) Chapter 193, G. L. of 1887, made the necessary provision for giving effect to this section.

State debt limited—how contracted. SEC. 5. For the purpose of defraying extraordinary expenditures, the State may contract public debts but such debts shall never, in the aggregate, exceed \$250,000; every such debt shall be authorized by law, for some single object, to be distinctly specified therein; and no such law shall take effect until it shall have been passed by the vote of two-thirds of the members of each branch of the legislature, to be recorded by yeas and nays on the journals of each house respectively; and every such law shall levy a tax annually sufficient to pay the annual interest of such debt, and also a tax sufficient to pay the principal of such debt within ten years from the final passage of such law, and shall specially appropriate the proceeds of such taxes to the payment of such principal and interest; and such appropriation and taxes shall not be repealed, postponed or diminished, until the principal and interest of such debt shall have been wholly paid. The State shall never contract any debts for works of internal improvements, or be a party in carrying on such works, except in cases where grants of land or other property shall have been made to the State, especially dedicated by the grant to specific purposes, and in such case the State shall devote thereto the avails of such grants, and may pledge or appropriate the revenue derived from such works in aid of their completion.

Issue of bonds for created debt. SEC. 6. All debts authorized by the preceding section shall be contracted by loan on State bonds of amounts not less than five hundred dollars each on interest, payable within ten years after the final passage of the law authorizing such debt; and such bonds shall not be sold by the State under par. A correct registry of all such bonds shall be kept by the treasurer, in numerical order, so as always to exhibit the number and amount unpaid and to whom severally made payable.

Limitation as to when debt may be contracted. SEC. 7. The State shall never contract any public debt, unless in time of war, to repel invasion or suppress insurrection, except in the cases and in the manner provided in the fifth and sixth sections of this article.

Disposition of funds received for bonds. SEC. 8. The money arising from any loan made, or debt or liability contracted, shall be applied to the object specified in the act authorizing such debt or liability, or to the repayment of such debt or liability, and to no other purpose whatever.

Money drawn from the State treasury. SEC. 9. No money shall ever be paid out of the treasury of this State except in pursuance of an appropriation by law.

Credit of the State prohibited. SEC. 10. The credit of the State shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association or corporation. Nor shall there be any further issue of bonds denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds," under what purports to be an amendment to section ten (10) of article nine (9) of the Constitution, adopted April fifteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-eight, which is hereby expunged from the Constitution, saving, excepting and reserving to the State, nevertheless, all rights, remedies, and forfeitures accruing under said amendment.

Publication of receipts and expenditures by treasurer. SEC. 11. There shall be published by the treasurer, in at least one newspaper printed at the seat of government, during the first week in January in each year, and in the next volume of the acts of legislature, detailed statements of all moneys drawn from the treasury during the preceding year, for what purpose and to whom paid, and by what law authorized; and also of all moneys received, and by what authority and from whom.

State school fund—investment—safe keeping—All State funds to be deposited in name of State. SEC. 12. Suitable laws shall be passed by the legislature for the safe-keeping, transfer and disbursements of the State and school funds; and all officers and other persons charged with the same or any part of the same, or the safe keeping thereof, shall be required to give ample security for all moneys and funds of any kind received by them; to make forthwith and keep an accurate entry of each sum received, and of each payment and transfer; and if any of said officers or other persons shall convert to his own use in any manner or form, or shall loan, with or without interest, or shall deposit in his own name, or otherwise than in the name of the State of Minnesota; or shall deposit in banks or with any person or persons, or exchange for other funds or property, any portion of the funds of the State or the school funds aforesaid, except in the manner prescribed by law, every such act shall be and constitute an embezzlement of so much of the aforesaid State and school funds, or either of the same, as shall thus be taken, or loaned, or deposited or exchanged, and shall be a felony; and any failure to pay over, produce or account for the State school funds, or any part of the same entrusted to such officer or persons as by law required on demand, shall be held and be taken to be *prima facie* evidence of such embezzlement.

General banking law—provisions and restrictions. SEC. 13. The legislature may, by a two-thirds vote, pass a general banking law, with the following restrictions and requirements, viz.:

First—The legislature shall have no power to pass any law sanctioning in any manner, directly, or indirectly, the suspension of specie payments by any person, association or corporation issuing bank notes of any description.

Second—The legislature shall provide by law for the registry of all bills or notes issued or put in circulation as money, and shall require ample security in United States stock or State stocks for the redemption of the same in specie; and in case of a depreciation of said stocks, or any part thereof, to the amount of ten per cent or more on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by additional stocks.

Third—The stockholders in any corporation and joint association for banking purposes, issuing bank notes, shall be individually liable in an amount equal to double the amount of stock owned by them for all the debts of such corporation or association; and such individual liability shall continue for one year after any transfer or sale of stock by any stockholder or stockholders.

Fourth—In case of the insolvency of any bank or banking association, the bill holders thereof shall be entitled to preference in payment over all other creditors of such bank or association.

Fifth—Any general banking law which may be passed in accordance with this article shall provide for recording the names of all stockholders in such corporation, the amount of stock held by each, the time of transfer, and to whom transferred.

Special provision for a loan for hospital bulding for insane. SEC. 14. For the purpose of erecting and completing buildings for a hospital for the insane, a deaf, dumb and blind asylum, the state prison, the legislature may by law increase the public debt of the State to an amount not exceeding \$250,000, in addition to the public debt already heretofore authorized by the Constitution; and for that purpose may provide by law for issuing and negotiating the bonds of the State, and appropriate the money only for the purpose aforesaid; which bonds shall be payable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the date of the same, at the option of the State.

Superseded by section 15 but not repealed in express terms. SEC. 14. The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds or to become indebted in any manner to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed ten per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation; the amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made for the purpose of state and county taxation previous to the incurring of such indebtedness, Nov. 5, 1872.

County, city or township aid to railroads limited. SEC. 15. The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds, or to become indebted in any manner, to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed five (5) per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation. The amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made, for the purpose of state and county taxation, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

State Road and Bridge Fund. SEC. 16. For the purpose of lending aid in the construction and improvement of public highways and bridges, there is hereby created a fund, to be known as the "state road and bridge fund," said fund shall include all moneys accruing from the income derived from investments in the internal improvement land fund, or that may hereafter accrue to said fund, and shall also include all funds accruing to any state road and bridge fund however provided.

The legislature is authorized to add to such fund, for the purpose of constructing or improving roads and bridges of this state, by providing, in

its discretion, for an annual tax levy upon the property of this state of not to exceed in any year one mill on all the taxable property within the state. *Provided*, that no county shall receive in any year more than three (3) per cent. or less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of one (1) per cent of the total fund thus provided and expended during such year.**

ARTICLE X.

OF CORPORATIONS HAVING NO BANKING PRIVILEGES.

Corporations for general purposes. SECTION 1. The term "Corporation," as used in this article, shall be construed to include all associations and joint stock companies having any of the powers and privileges not possessed by individuals or partnerships, except such as embrace banking privileges, and all corporations shall have the right to sue, and shall be liable to be sued in all courts, in like manner as natural persons.

Not to be created by special act. SEC. 2. No corporations shall be formed under special acts, except for municipal purposes.

Liability of Stockholders. SEC. 3. Each stockholder in any corporation excepting those organized for the purpose of carrying on any kind of manufacturing or mechanical business shall be liable to the amount of stock held or owned by him.

Lands may be taken for public use. SEC. 4. Lands may be taken for public way, for the purpose of granting to any corporation the franchise of way for public use. In all cases, however, a fair and equitable compensation shall be paid for such land, and the damages arising from the taking of the same; but all corporations being common carriers enjoying the right of way in pursuance of the provisions of this section, shall be bound to carry the mineral, agricultural and other productions of manufacturers on equal and reasonable terms.

ARTICLE XI.

COUNTIES AND TOWNSHIPS.

County organization. SECTION 1. The legislature may from time to time establish and organize new counties; but no new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any county be reduced below that amount; and all laws changing county lines in counties already organized, or for removing county seats, shall, before taking effect, be submitted to the electors of the county or counties to be affected thereby, at the next general election after the passage thereof, and be adopted by a majority of such electors. Counties now established may be enlarged, but not reduced below four hundred (400) square miles.

**Adopted Nov. 5, 1912.

Cities of 20,000 population may be organized into separate counties. SEC. 2. The legislature may organize any city into a separate county, when it has attained a population of 20,000 inhabitants, without reference to geographical extent, when a majority of the electors of the county in which such city may be situated, voting thereon, shall be in favor of a separate organization.

Township organization. SEC. 3. Laws may be passed providing for the organization for municipal and other town purposes, of any congressional or fractional townships in the several counties in the State, *provided* that when a township is divided by county lines or does not contain one hundred inhabitants, it may be attached to one or more adjoining townships or parts of townships for the purposes aforesaid.

Election of county and town officers. SEC. 4. Provisions shall be made by law for the election of such county or township officers as may be necessary.

Local taxation may be authorized. SEC. 5. Any county and township organization shall have such powers of local taxation as may be prescribed by law.

Money drawn from county or town treasuries. SEC. 6. No money shall be drawn from any county or township treasury except by authority of law.

County of Manomin abolished. SEC. 7. That the county of Manomin is hereby abolished, and that the territory heretofore comprising the same shall constitute and be a part of the county of Anoka.

ARTICLE XII.

OF THE MILITIA.

Militia organization. SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the legislature to pass such laws for the organization, discipline and service of the militia of the State as may be deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XIII.

IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVAL FROM OFFICE.

Impeachment and removal from office. SECTION 1. The governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and the judges of the supreme and district courts, may be impeached for corrupt conduct in office, or for crimes and misdemeanors; but judgment in such case shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit in this State. The party convicted thereof shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 2. The legislature of this State may provide for the removal of inferior officers from office, for malfeasance or nonfeasance in the performance of their duties.

SEC. 3. No officer shall exercise the duties of his office after he shall have been impeached and before his acquittal.

SEC. 4. On the trial of an impeachment against the governor, the lieutenant governor shall not act as a member of the court.

SEC. 5. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he shall have been served with a copy thereof at least twenty days previous to the day set for trial.

ARTICLE XIV.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Amendments to constitution—majority vote of electors voting makes amendment valid. SECTION 1. Whenever a majority of both houses of the legislature shall deem it necessary to alter or amend this Constitution, they may propose such alterations or amendments, which proposed amendments shall be published with the laws which have been passed at the same session, and said amendments shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at any general election, and if it shall appear, in a manner to be provided by law, that a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for and ratified such alterations or amendments, the same shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of this Constitution. If two or more alterations or amendments shall be submitted at the same time, it shall be so regulated that the voters shall vote for or against each separately.

Revision of constitution. SEC. 2. Whenever two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the legislature shall think it necessary to call a convention to revise this Constitution, they shall recommend to the electors to vote at the next general election for members of the legislature, for or against a convention; and if a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for a convention, the legislature shall, at their next session, provide by law for calling the same. The convention shall consist of as many members as the House of Representatives, who shall be chosen in the same manner, and shall meet within three months after their election for the purpose aforesaid.

ARTICLE XV.

MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS.

Seat of government. SECTION 1. The seat of government of the State shall be at the city of St. Paul, but the legislature, at their first or any future session, may provide by law for a change of the seat of government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by Congress for a seat of government to the State; and in the event of the seat of government being removed from the city of St. Paul to any other

place in the State, the capitol building and grounds shall be dedicated to an institution for the promotion of science, literature and the arts, to be organized by the legislature of the State, and of which institution the Minnesota Historical Society shall always be a department.

Residents on Indian lands SEC. 2. Persons residing on Indian lands within the State shall enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizens, as though they lived in any other portion of the State, and shall be subject to taxation.

Uniform oath at elections. SEC. 3. The legislature shall provide for a uniform oath or affirmation to be administered at elections, and no person shall be compelled to take any other or different form of oath to entitle him to vote.

State seal. SEC. 4. There shall be a seal of the State, which shall be kept by the secretary of state, and be used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the State of Minnesota, and shall be attached to all the official acts of the governor (his signature to acts and resolves of the legislature excepted) requiring authentication. The legislature shall provide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal.

State prison location. SEC. 5. The territorial prison, as located under existing laws, shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, be and remain one of the state prisons of the State of Minnesota.

SCHEDULE.

Territorial laws valid in change to State organization. SECTION 1. That no inconvenience may arise by reason of a change from a territorial to a permanent state government, it is declared that all rights, actions, prosecutions, judgments, claims and contracts, as well of individuals as of bodies corporate, shall continue as if no change had taken place; and all process which may be issued under the authority of the Territory of Minnesota previous to its admission into the Union of the United States shall be as valid as if issued in the name of the State.

Territorial laws not repugnant to constitution to be in force. SEC. 2. All laws now in force in the Territory of Minnesota not repugnant to this Constitution shall remain in force until they expire by their own limitation, or be altered or repealed by the legislature.

SEC. 3. All fines, penalties or forfeitures accruing to the Territory of Minnesota shall inure to the State.

Civil rights under territorial government secured in the change to State government. SEC. 4. All recognizances heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from a territorial to a permanent state government shall remain valid, and shall pass to and may be prosecuted in the name of the State; and all bonds executed to the governor of the Territory, or to any other officer or court in his or their official capacity, shall pass to the governor or state authority and their successors in office, for the uses therein respectively expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly;

and all the estate of property, real, personal or mixed, and all judgments, bonds, specialties, choses in action, and claims and debts, of whatsoever description, of the Territory of Minnesota, shall inure to and vest in the State of Minnesota, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner and to the same extent by the State of Minnesota as the same could have been by the Territory of Minnesota. All criminal prosecutions and penal actions which may have arisen, or which may arise before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment and execution in the name of the State. All offenses committed against the laws of the Territory of Minnesota, before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall not be prosecuted before such change, may be prosecuted in the name and by the authority of the State of Minnesota with like effect as though such change had not taken place, and all penalties incurred shall remain the same as if this Constitution had not been adopted. All actions at law and suits in equity which may be pending in any of the courts of the Territory of Minnesota, at the time of a change from a territorial to a state government, may be continued and transferred to any court of the State which shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter thereof.

Territorial officers continued until superseded. SEC. 5. All territorial officers, civil or military, now holding their offices under the authority of the United States, or of the Territory of Minnesota shall continue to hold and exercise their respective offices until they shall be superseded by the authority of the State.

First session of State legislature. SEC. 6. The first session of the legislature of the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Wednesday of December next, and shall be held at the capitol, in the city of St. Paul.

SEC. 7. The laws regulating the election and qualification of all district, county and precinct officers shall continue and be in force until the legislature shall otherwise provide by law.

Constitution submitted to a vote of the people. SEC. 8. The president of this convention shall, immediately after the adjournment thereof, cause this Constitution to be deposited in the office of the governor of the Territory; and if, after the submission of the same to a vote of the people, as hereinafter provided, it shall appear that it has been adopted by a vote of the people of the State, then the governor shall forward a certified copy of the same, together with an abstract of the votes polled for and against the said Constitution, to the president of the United States, to be by him laid before the Congress of the United States.

Representation to congress. SEC. 9. For the purposes of the first election, the State shall constitute one district, and shall elect three members to the House of Representatives of the United States.

First apportionment into legislative districts. SEC. 10. For the purposes of the first election for members of the State Senate and House of Representatives, the State shall be divided into senatorial and representative districts, as follows, viz: First district, Washington county; Second

district, Ramsey county; Third district, Dakota county; Fourth district, so much of Hennepin county as lies west of the Mississippi; Fifth district, Rice county; Sixth district, Goodhue county; Seventh district, Scott county; Eighth district, Olmsted county; Ninth district, Fillmore county; Tenth district, Houston county; Eleventh district, Winona county; Twelfth district, Wabasha county; Thirteenth district, Mower and Dodge counties; Fourteenth district, Freeborn and Faribault counties; Fifteenth district, Steele and Waseca counties; Sixteenth district, Blue Earth and Le Sueur counties; Seventeenth district, Nicollet and Brown counties; Eighteenth district, Sibley, Renville and McLeod counties; Nineteenth district, Carver and Wright counties; Twentieth district, Benton, Stearns and Meeker counties; Twenty-first district, Morrison, Crow Wing and Mille Lacs counties; Twenty-second district, Cass, Pembina and Todd counties; Twenty-third district, so much of Hennepin county as lies east of the Mississippi; Twenty-fourth district, Sherburne, Anoka and Manomin counties; Twenty-fifth district, Chisago, Pine and Isanti counties; Twenty-sixth district, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis, Lake and Itasca counties.

SEC. 11. The counties of Brown, Stearns, Todd, Cass, Pembina and Renville, as applied in the preceding section, shall not be deemed to include any territory west of the State line, but shall be deemed to include all counties and parts of counties east of said line as were created out of the territory of either, at the last session of the legislature.

Apportionment of members. SEC. 12. The senators and representatives at the first election shall be apportioned among the several senatorial and representative districts as follows, to-wit:

SEC. 13. The returns from the Twenty-second district shall be made to and canvassed by the judges of election at the precinct of Otter Tail City.

Judicial districts. SEC. 14. Until the legislature shall otherwise provide, the State shall be divided into judicial districts as follows, viz.

The counties of Washington, Chisago, Manomin, Anoka, Isanti, Pine, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis and Lake shall constitute the First judicial district.

The county of Ramsey shall constitute the Second judicial district.

The counties of Houston, Wiconia, Fillmore, Olmsted and Wabasha shall constitute the Third judicial district.

The counties of Hennepin, Carver, Wright, Meeker, Sherburne, Benton, Stearns, Morrison, Crow Wing, Mille Lacs, Itasca, Pembina, Todd and Cass shall constitute the Fourth judicial district.

The counties of Dakota, Goodhue, Scott, Rice, Steele, Waseca, Dodge, Mower and Freeborn shall constitute the Fifth judicial district.

The counties of Le Sueur, Sibley, Nicollet, Blue Earth, Faribault, McLeod, Renville, Brown, and all other counties in the State not included within the other districts, shall constitute the Sixth judicial district.

SEC. 15. Each of the foregoing enumerated judicial districts may, at the first election, elect one prosecuting attorney for the district.

First State election. SEC. 16. Upon the second Tuesday, the thirteenth day of October, 1857, an election shall be held for members of the House of Representatives of the United States, governor, lieutenant governor, supreme and district judges, members of the legislature, and all other officers designated in this Constitution, and also for the submission of this Constitution to the people, for their adoption or rejection.

Voters at the first election. SEC. 17. Upon the day so designated as aforesaid every free white male inhabitant over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within the limits of the State for ten days previous to the day of said election, may vote for all officers to be elected under this Constitution at such election, and also for or against the adoption of this Constitution.

Vote on the constitution. SEC. 18. In voting for or against the adoption of this Constitution, the words, "For Constitution," or "Against Constitution," may be written or printed on the ticket of each voter, but no voter shall vote for or against this Constitution, on a separate ballot from that cast by him for officers to be elected at said election under this Constitution; and if upon the canvass of the vote so polled it shall appear that there was a greater number of votes polled for than against said Constitution, then this Constitution shall be deemed to be adopted as the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and all the provisions and obligations of this Constitution, and of the schedule thereunto attached, shall thereafter be valid to all intents and purposes as the Constitution of said State.

Election—how conducted. SEC. 19. At said election the polls shall be opened, the election held, returns made, and certificates issued, in all respects as provided by law for opening, closing and conducting elections and

making returns of the same, except as hereinbefore specified, and excepting also that polls may be opened and elections held at any point or points in any of the counties where precincts may be established as provided by law, ten days previous to the day of election, not less than ten miles from the place of voting in any established precinct.

Returns of election. SEC. 20. It shall be the duty of the judges and clerks of election, in addition to the returns required by law for each precinct, to forward to the secretary of the Territory, by mail, immediately after the close of the election, a certified copy of the poll book containing the name of each person who has voted in the precinct and the number of votes polled for and against the adoption of this Constitution.

Canvassing returns. SEC. 21. The returns of said election for and against this Constitution, and for all state officers and members of the House of Representatives of the United States, shall be made, and certificates issued in the manner now prescribed by law for returning votes given for delegates to Congress; and the returns for all district officers, judicial, legislative or otherwise, shall be made to the register of deeds of the senior county in each district, in the manner prescribed by law, except as otherwise provided. The returns for all officers elected at large shall be canvassed by the governor of the Territory, assisted by Joseph R. Brown and Thomas J. Galbraith, at the time designated by law for canvassing the vote for delegates to Congress.

SEC. 22. If, upon canvassing the votes for and against the adoption of this Constitution, it shall appear that there has been polled a greater number of votes against than for it, then no certificate of election shall be issued for any State or district officer provided for in this Constitution, and no State organization shall have validity within the limits of the Territory, until otherwise provided for and until a Constitution for a State government shall have been adopted by the people.

MINNESOTA STATE FLOWER.

The name *Cypripedium* (from Greek words meaning the shoe of Venus), published for this genus in 1737 by Linnæus, and its common English and American popular names, as Lady's Slipper, Moccasin Flower, and Indian Shoe, refer to the saccate and somewhat shoe-like form of the most conspicuous petal (in this *Orchis* family called the lip) of the flower.

About twenty-five species of *Cypripedium* are known, belonging to the north temperate zone and reaching south into Mexico and Northern India. Six species occur in the northern United States and Canada, east of the Rocky Mountains, all of these being found in Minnesota; and about a dozen species in total occur on this continent. They are perennial herbs with perfect, irregular flowers, which are solitary or few, large and showy.

The Minnesota species are as follows: *C. arietinum* R., Br., the Ram's-head Moccasin Flower, with red and whitish veiny lip, as shown in the accompanying plate; *C. candidum* Muhl, the small White Moccasin Flower; *C. parviflorum* Salisb., the small Yellow Moccasin Flower, also shown in this plate; *C. pubescens* Wild, with much larger yellow flowers; *C. spectabile* Sw., with most showy, large flowers, of mingled white and pink-purple color; and *C. acule* Ait., the Stemless Moccasin Flower, with leaves on the ground and a large rose-purple flower on an erect scape nearly a foot high. These plants grow preferably in cold and moist woods and in bogs, flowering from May to July. The first and second are rare or infrequent; but the other four are frequent or common, especially northward.

NOTE.—Minnesota has fourteen genera, including forty-one species, of the *Orchis* family, to which the *Cypripediums* belong. In total, 1,583 species of flowering plants, and sixty-eight ferns and their allies, making together 1,650 species, were tabulated, as known to grow without cultivation in this state, by Warren Upham in the Catalogue of the Flora of Minnesota, published in the Twelfth Annual Report of the Geological and Natural History Survey for the year 1883, (193 pages, with a map showing the areas of forest and prairie). Within the basin of the Minnesota river, according to the report in 1892 by Prof. Conway MacMillan, the state botanist, 1174 species and varieties of flowering plants, including all our *Cypripediums*, are known and have been collected for the Herbarium of the State University. The State Flower is thus chosen from among more than a thousand others which bloom on our prairies, in the northern woods, in their cool bogs, and in our streams and lakes.

STATE FLOWER OF MINNESOTA.

ACT OF ADMISSION INTO THE UNION.

An Act for the admission of Minnesota into the Union.
[Passed May 11, 1858.]

WHEREAS, An act of Congress was passed February twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states;" and, whereas, the people of said Territory did, on the twenty-ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by delegates elected for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and state government, which is republican in form, and was ratified and adopted by the people at an election held on the thirteenth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, for that purpose; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the State of Minnesota shall be one, and is hereby declared to be one, of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states in all respects whatever.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That said State shall be entitled to two representatives in Congress, until the next apportionment of representatives among the several states.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That from and after the admission of the State of Minnesota, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within that State as in other States of the Union; and the said State is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Iowa, shall be established; the judge, attorney and marshall of the United States of the said district of Minnesota shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney and marshal of the district of Iowa; and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the supreme court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be directed by the supreme court of the United States to the district court of the United States for the district of Minnesota, or to the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require; and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same, and to ward mesne or final process therein.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776.

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

WHEN, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time after such dissolutions to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large, for their exercise, the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering, fundamentally, the forms of our government:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has incited domestic insurrections among us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind—enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as FREE and INDEPENDENT STATES, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which INDEPENDENT STATES may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of DIVINE PROVIDENCE, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

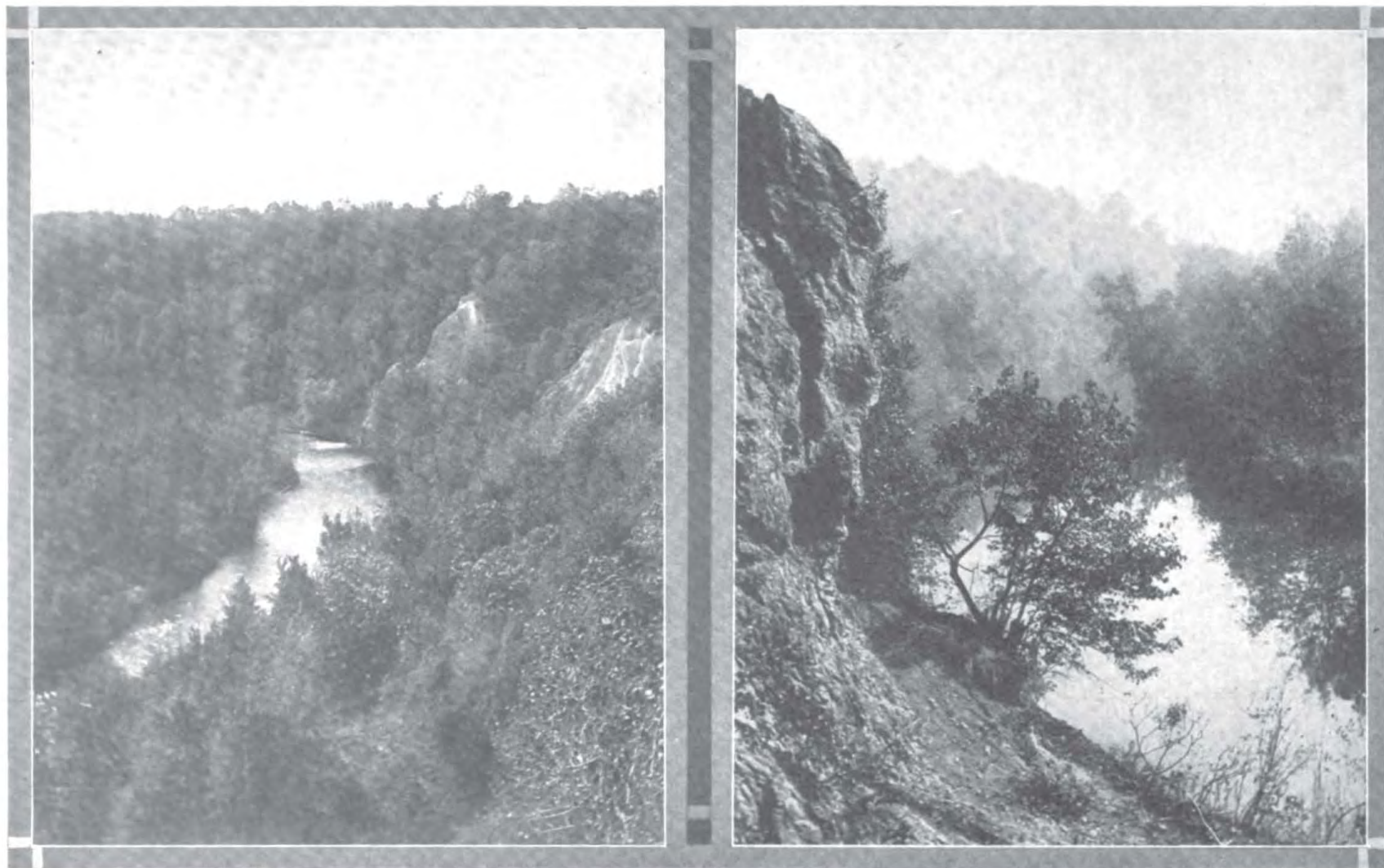

THE ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 9, 1778.

Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union between the States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

ARTICLE 1. The style of this confederacy shall be "THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA."

ART. 2. Each state retains its sovereignty, freedom, and independence, and every power, jurisdiction, and right, which is not by this confederation expressly delegated to the United States in Congress assembled.

ART. 3. The said states hereby severally enter into a firm league of friendship with each other for their common defense, the security of their liberties, and their mutual, and general welfare, binding themselves to assist each other against all force offered to or attacks made upon them, or any of them, on account of religion, sovereignty, trade, or any other pretence whatever.

ART. 4. § 1. The better to secure and perpetuate mutual friendship and intercourse among the people of the different states in this Union, the free inhabitants of each of these states (paupers, vagabonds, and fugitives from justice excepted) shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of free citizens in the several states, and the people of each state shall have free ingress and egress to and from any other state, and shall enjoy therein all the privileges of trade and commerce, subject to the same duties, impositions and restrictions as the inhabitants thereof respectively; *provided*, that such restrictions shall not extend so far as to prevent the removal of property imported into any state, to any other state of which the owner is an inhabitant; *provided, also*, that no imposition, duties, or restriction shall be laid by any state on the property of the United States, or either of them.

§ 2. If any person guilty of, or charged with, treason, felony, or other high misdemeanor, in any state, shall flee from justice, and be found in any of the United States, he shall, upon the demand of the governor or executive power of the state from which he fled, be delivered up and removed to the state having jurisdiction of his offense.

§ 3. Full faith and credit shall be given in each of these states to the records, acts and judicial proceedings of the courts and magistrates of every other state.

ART. 5. § 1. For the more convenient management of the general interests of the United States, delegates shall be annually appointed in such manner as the legislature of each state shall direct, to meet in congress on the first Monday in November, of every year, with a power reserved to each state to recall its delegates, or any of them, at any time within the year, and to send others in their stead, for the remainder of the year.

§ 2. No state shall be represented in congress by less than two, nor more than seven, members; and no person shall be capable of being a delegate for more than three years, in any term of six years; nor shall any person, being a delegate, be capable of holding any office under the United States, for which he, or any other for his benefit, receives any salary, fees, or emoluments of any kind.

§ 3. Each state shall maintain its own delegates in a meeting of the states, and while they act as members of the committee of these states.

§ 4. In determining questions in the United States in congress assembled, each state shall have one vote.

§ 5. Freedom of speech and debate in congress shall not be impeached or questioned in any court or place out of congress, and the members of congress shall be protected in their persons from arrests and imprisonments during the time of their going to and from, and attendance on, congress, except for treason, felony, or breach of the peace.

ART. 6. § 1. No state, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, shall send any embassy to, or receive any embassy from, or enter into any conference, agreement, alliance or treaty with, any king, prince or state; nor shall any person holding any office of profit or trust under the United States, or any of them, accept any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever from any king, prince, or foreign state; nor shall the United States in congress assembled, or any of them, grant any title of nobility.

§ 2. No two or more states shall enter into any treaty, confederation, or alliance whatever, between them, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, specifying accurately the purposes for which the same is to be entered into, and how long it shall continue.

§ 3. No state shall lay any imposts or duties which may interfere with any stipulations in treaties entered into by the United States, in congress assembled, with any king, prince, or state, in pursuance of any treaties already proposed by congress to the courts of France and Spain.

§ 4. No vessels of war shall be kept up in time of peace by any state, except such number only as shall be deemed necessary by the United States in congress assembled, for the defense of such state, or its trade; nor shall any body or forces be kept up by any state, in time of peace, except such number only as, in the judgment of the United States in congress assembled, shall be deemed requisite to garrison the forts necessary for the defense of such state; but every state shall always keep up a well regulated and disciplined militia, sufficiently armed and accoutered, and shall provide and constantly have ready for use, in public stores, a due number of field pieces and tents, and a proper quantity of arms, ammunition and camp equipage.

§ 5. No state shall engage in any war without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be actually invaded by enemies, or shall have received certain advice of a resolution being formed by some nation of Indians to invade such state, and the danger is so imminent as not to admit a delay till the United States in congress assembled can be consulted; nor shall any state grant commissions to any ships or vessels of war, nor letters of marque or reprisal, except it be after a declaration of war by the United States in congress assembled, and then only against the kingdom or state, and the subjects thereof, against which war has been so declared, and under such regulations as shall be established by the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be infested by pirates, in which case vessels of war may be fitted out for that occasion, and kept so long as the danger shall continue, or until the United States in congress assembled shall determine otherwise.

ART. 7. When land forces are raised by any state for the common defense, all officers of or under the rank of colonel shall be appointed by the legislature of each state, respectively, by whom such forces shall be raised, or in such manner as such state shall direct, and all vacancies shall be filled up by the state which first made the appointment.

ART. 8. All charges of war, and all other expenses that shall be incurred for the common defense or general welfare, and allowed by the United States in congress assembled, shall be defrayed out of a common treasury, which shall be supplied by the several states, in proportion to the value of all land within each state, granted to or surveyed for any person, as such land and the buildings and improvements thereon shall be estimated, according to such mode as the United States in congress assembled shall, from time to time, direct and appoint. The taxes for paying that proportion shall be laid and levied by the authority and direction of the legislatures of the several states within the time agreed upon by the United States in congress assembled.

ART. 9. § 1. The United States in congress assembled shall have the sole and exclusive right and power of determining on peace and war, except in the cases mentioned in the sixth article; of sending and receiving ambassadors, entering into treaties and alliances; *provided*, that no treaty of commerce shall be made whereby the legislative power of the respective states shall be restrained from imposing such imposts and duties on foreigners as their own people are subjected to, or from prohibiting the exportation or importation of any species of goods or commodities whatsoever; of establishing rules for deciding in all cases what captures on land or water shall be legal, and in what manner prizes taken by land or naval forces in the service of the United States shall be divided or appropriated; of granting letters of marque and reprisal in times of peace; appointing courts for the trial of piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and establishing courts for receiving and determining finally appeals in all cases of captures; *provided*, that no member of congress shall be appointed a judge of any of the said courts.

§ 2. The United States in congress assembled shall also be the last resort on appeal in all disputes and differences now subsisting, or that may hereafter arise, between two or more states concerning boundary, jurisdiction, or any other cause whatever; which authority shall always be exercised in the manner following: Whenever the legislative or executive authority or lawful agent of any state in controversy with another shall present a petition to congress, stating the matter in question, and praying for a hearing, notice thereof shall be given by order of congress to the legislative or executive authority of the other state in controversy, and a day assigned for the appearance of the parties by their lawful agents, who shall then be directed to appoint, by joint consent, commissioners or judges to constitute a court for hearing and determining the matter in question; but if they cannot agree, congress shall name three persons out of each of the United States, and from the list of such persons each party shall alternately strike out one, the petitioners beginning, until the number shall be reduced to thirteen; and from that number not less than seven nor more than nine names, as congress shall direct, shall, in the presence of congress, be drawn out by lot; the persons whose names shall be so drawn, or any five of them, shall be commissioners or judges to hear and finally determine the controversy, so always as a major part of the judges who shall hear the cause shall agree in the determination; and if either party shall neglect to attend at the day appointed, without showing reasons which congress shall judge sufficient, or being present shall refuse to strike, the congress shall proceed to nominate three persons out of each state, and the secretary of congress shall strike in behalf of such party absent or refusing; and the judgment and sentence of the court, to be appointed in the manner before prescribed, shall be final and conclusive; and if any of the parties shall refuse to submit to the authority of such court, or to appear to defend their claim or cause, the court shall nevertheless proceed to pronounce sentence or judgment, which shall in like manner be final and decisive; the judgment or sentence and other proceedings being in either case transmitted to congress and lodged among the acts of congress, for the security of the parties concerned; *provided*, that every commissioner, before he sits in judgment, shall take an oath, to be administered by one of the judges of the supreme or superior court of the state where the cause shall be tried, "well and truly to hear and determine the matter in question, according to the best of his judgment, without favor, affection, or hope of reward;" *provided, also*, that no state shall be deprived of territory for the benefit of the United States.

§ 3. All controversies concerning the private right of soil claimed under different grants of two or more states, whose jurisdiction, as they may respect such lands, and the states which passed such grants are adjusted, the said grants or either of them being at the same time claimed to have originated antecedent to such settlement of jurisdiction, shall, on the petition of either party to the congress of the United States, be finally determined, as near as may be, in the same manner as is before prescribed for deciding disputes respecting territorial jurisdiction between different states.

§ 4. The United States in congress assembled shall also have the sole and exclusive right and power of regulating the alloy and value of coin struck by their own authority, or by that of the respective states; fixing the standards of weights and measures, throughout the United States; regulating the trade and managing all affairs with the Indians, not members of any of the states; *provided*, that the legislative right of any state, within its own limits, be not infringed or violated; establishing and regulating post-offices from one state to another, throughout all the United States, and exacting such postage on the papers passing through the same as may be requisite to defray the expenses of the said office; appointing all officers of the land forces in the service of the United States, excepting regimental officers; appointing all the officers of the naval forces, and commissioning all officers whatever in the service of the United States; making rules for the government and regulation of the said land and naval forces, and directing their operations.

§ 5. The United States in congress assembled shall have authority to appoint a committee, to sit in the recess of congress, to be denominated "*A Committee of the States*," and to consist of one delegate from each state; and to appoint such other committees and civil officers as may be necessary for managing the general affairs of the United States under their direction; to appoint one of their number to preside; *provided*, that no person be allowed to serve in the office of president more than one year in any term of three years to ascertain the necessary sums of money to be raised for the service of the United States, and to appropriate and apply the same for defraying the public expenses; to borrow money or emit bills on the credit of the United States, transmitting every half year to the respective states an account of the sums of money so borrowed or emitted; to build and equip a navy; to agree upon the number of land forces, and to make requisitions from each state for its quota, in proportion to the number of white inhabitants in such state, which requisition shall be binding; and thereupon the legislature of each state shall appoint the regimental officers, raise the men, and clothe, arm and equip them, in a soldier-like manner, at the expense of the United States; and the officers and men so clothed, armed and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled; but if the United States in congress assembled shall, on consideration of circumstances, judge proper that any state should not raise men, or should raise a smaller number than its quota, and that any other state should raise a greater number of men than the quota thereof, such extra number shall be raised, officered, clothed, armed and equipped in the same manner as the quota of such state, unless the legislature of such state shall judge that such extra number cannot be safely spared out of the same, in which case they shall raise, officer, clothe, arm and equip as many of such extra number as they judge can be safely spared, and the officers and men so clothed, armed, and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled.

§ 6. The United States in congress assembled shall never engage in a war, nor grant letters of marque and reprisal in time of peace, nor enter into any treaties or alliances, nor coin money, nor regulate the value thereof, nor ascertain the sums and expenses necessary for the defense and welfare of the United States, or any of them, nor emit bills, nor borrow money on the credit of the United States, nor appropriate money, nor agree upon the number of vessels of war to be built or purchased, or the number of land or sea forces to be raised, nor appoint a commander-in-chief of the army or navy, unless nine states assent to the same; nor shall a question on any other point, except for adjourning from day to day, be determined, unless by the votes of a majority of the United States in congress assembled.

§ 7. The congress of the United States shall have power to adjourn to any time within the year, and to any place within the United States, so that no period of adjournment be for a longer duration than the space of six months, and shall publish the journal of their proceedings monthly, except such parts thereof relating to treaties, alliances, or military operations as in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the delegates of each state, on any question, shall be entered on the journal, when it is desired by any delegate; and the delegates of a state, or any of them, at his or their request, shall be furnished with a transcript of the said journal, except such parts as are above excepted, to lay before the legislatures of the several states.

ART. 10. The committee of the states, or any nine of them, shall be authorized to execute, in the recess of congress, such of the powers of congress as the United States in congress assembled, by the consent of nine states, shall, from time to time, think expedient to vest them with; *provided*, that no power be delegated to the said committee, for the exercise of which, by the articles of confederation, the voice of nine states, in the congress of the United States assembled, is requisite.

ART. 11. Canada acceding to this confederation, and joining in the measures of the United States, shall be admitted into and entitled to all the advantages of this Union; but no other colony shall be admitted into the same, unless such admission be agreed to by nine states.

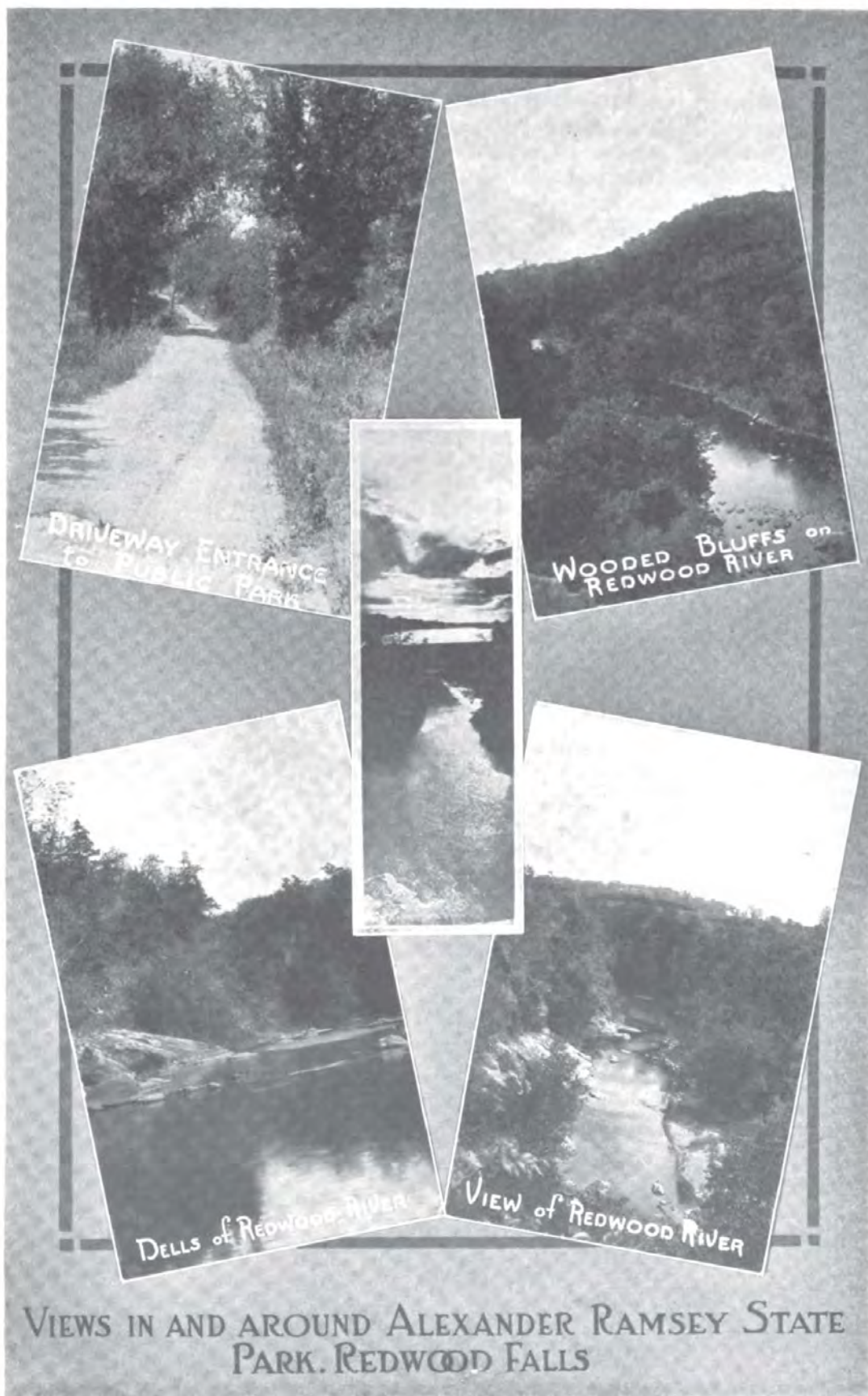
ART. 12. All bills of credit emitted, moneys borrowed, and debts contracted by or under the authority of congress, before the assembling of the United States, in pursuance of the present confederation, shall be deemed and considered as a charge against the United States, for payment and satisfaction whereof the said United States and the public faith are hereby solemnly pledged.

ART. 13. Every state shall abide by the determination of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by this confederation are submitted to them. And the articles of this confederation shall be inviolably observed by every state, and the Union shall be perpetual; nor shall any alteration at any time hereafter be made in any of them, unless such alteration be agreed to in a congress of the United States, and be afterward confirmed by the legislature of every state.

And whereas, it has pleased the great Governor of the world to incline the hearts of the legislatures we respectively represent in congress to approve of and to authorize us to ratify the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, Know ye, that we, the undersigned delegates, by virtue of the power and authority to us given for that purpose, do by these presents, in the name and in behalf of our respective constituents, fully and entirely ratify and confirm each and every of the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, and all and singular the matters and things therein contained. And we do further solemnly plight and engage the faith of our respective constituents, that they shall abide by the determinations of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by the said confederation are submitted to them; and that the articles thereof shall be inviolably observed by the states we respectively represent, and that the Union shall be perpetual. In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands in congress.

Done at Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, the ninth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, and in the third year of the Independence of America.

Ratified by the States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia.

Preamble. We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives.

SEC. 2. The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every 30,000, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose 3; Massachusetts, 8; Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, 1; Connecticut, 5; New York, 6; New Jersey, 4; Pennsylvania, 8; Delaware, 1; Maryland, 6; Virginia, 10; North Carolina, 5; South Carolina, 5; Georgia, 3.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

*SEC. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year; so that one-third may be chosen every second year. *When vacancies happen in the repre-

sentation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

The vice president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their own officers, and also a president *pro tempore*, in the absence of the vice president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments.

When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law.

SEC. 4. The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meetings shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall, by law, appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same; excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation

for their services, to be ascertained by law and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No senator or representatives shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States which shall have been created or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return; in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The Congress shall have power:

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish postoffices and post roads;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times, to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the laws of nations;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

To provide and maintain a navy;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States; and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards, and other needful buildings; and

To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight; but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended unless when, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or *ex post facto* law, shall be passed.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. No preference shall be given, by any regulation of commerce or revenue, to

the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States, and no person holding any office of profit and trust under them shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts laid by any state on imports or exports shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the Congress.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice president, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the Congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

[The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates; and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be appointed, if such a number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of

them for president; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice president.]*

The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president; and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur, and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose ap-

pointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The president shall have power to fill all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall, from time to time, give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice president, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state or the citizens thereof and foreign states, citizens, or subjects.*

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Congress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury, and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

*See the 11th amendment.

SEC. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labor in one state under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States, and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in the Union a republican form of government; and shall protect each of them against invasion, and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which in either case shall be valid, to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided*, that no amendment which may be made prior to the

year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

ARTICLES.

In addition to, and amendment of, the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress and ratified by the Legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original Constitution.

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war and public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court in the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states, respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice president, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president and of all persons voted for as vice president, and of the number of votes for each; which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president; if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states; and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president whenever the

right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of votes as vice president shall be the vice president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then, from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice president of the United States, representatives in Congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in Congress or elector of president and vice president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort

to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each house remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any state, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

NOTE—The Constitution was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, by the unanimous consent of the states present in the convention appointed in pursuance of the resolution of the Congress of the confederation, of the twenty-first of February, 1787, and was ratified by the conventions of the several states, as follows, viz: By convention of Delaware, Dec. 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, Dec. 12, 1787; New Jersey, Dec. 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2, 1788; Connecticut, Jan. 9, 1788; Massachusetts, Feb. 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788. New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789; Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

The first ten of the amendments were proposed at the first session of the First Congress of the United States, Sept. 25, 1789; and were finally ratified by the constitutional number of states Dec. 15, 1791. The eleventh amendment was proposed at the first session of the Third Congress, March 5, 1794, and was declared in a message from the president of the United States to both houses of Congress, dated Jan. 8, 1798, to have been adopted by the constitutional number of states. The twelfth amendment was proposed at the first session of the Eighth Congress, Dec. 12, 1803, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1804, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Sept. 25, 1804.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed at the second session of the Thirty-eighth Congress, Feb. 1, 1865, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1865, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Dec. 18, 1865.

The fourteenth amendment took effect July 28, 1868.

The fifteenth amendment took effect March 30, 1870.

The sixteenth amendment was ratified in 1913.

The country and settlements west of the Mississippi not included in districts 1 and 6.

STANDING RULES OF SENATE. 1913.

CALLING SENATE TO ORDER.

1. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the Senate shall have adjourned, and shall immediately call the members to order, and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall proceed with the regular order of business.

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

2. He shall preserve order and decorum; may speak on points of order in preference to members, and shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. He shall also decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Senate by any member, but such appeal shall be decided by a majority vote of those present and voting thereon.

QUESTIONS—HOW STATED AND DECIDED.

3. He shall rise to put the question, but may state it sitting.
4. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be), say Aye," and after the affirmative voice is expressed, "As many as are of the contrary opinion say No." The president shall declare all votes, but if any member rise to doubt a vote, he shall order a division.

PRESIDENT PRO TEM.

5. The president shall call some member into the chair when the Senate goes into committee of the whole. He shall also have the right to name a member to perform the duties of the chair; but substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. In the absence of the president, except as above, the Senate shall appoint a president pro tem.

FURTHER DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

6. The president of the Senate shall sign all acts, memorials, addresses and resolutions; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the Senate shall be signed by him and attested by the secretary.

7. The president is authorized to administer all oaths required in the discharge of his duties.

DISTURBANCE IN LOBBY.

8. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobbies or galleries, the president or chairman of the committee of the whole shall have power to order the same cleared.

PRIVILEGES OF REPORTERS.

9. Reporters wishing to take down the debates may be admitted by the president, who shall assign them to such places on the floor or elsewhere to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate. But any reporter of any newspaper who shall purposely misrepresent or misreport the proceedings of the Senate shall, during the remainder of the session, be denied admission to the Senate chamber.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

10. The order of business shall be as follows, viz.:

First—Presentation of letters, petitions, remonstrances and other communications.

Second—Resolutions and motions.

Third—Introduction of bills, memorials and joint resolutions.

Fourth—Reports of committees.

A—From standing committees.

B—From select committees.

Fifth—Messages and other executive communications.

Sixth—Messages from the House of Representatives, and amendments proposed by the House to bills and resolutions from the Senate.

Seventh—First reading of House bills.

Eighth—Second reading of Senate bills.

Ninth—Second reading of House bills.

Tenth—Third reading of Senate bills.

Eleventh—Third reading of House bills.

Twelfth—General orders of the day.

PUBLIC BILLS TO HAVE PREFERENCE.

11. Public and joint resolutions of a public nature shall always have the preference of private bills.

REFERRING OF BILLS.

12. All bills shall be referred by the president of the Senate without motion to the proper standing committee, on the first reading, unless otherwise referred by the Senate. And all bills, providing for an appropriation of money, when referred to and reported by any other than the committee on finance, shall, before passage, be referred to the committee on finance.

ORDER IN DEBATE.

13. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Senate, he shall rise to his feet and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate and avoid personality. In discussing any resolution senators shall be limited to five minutes each.

14. Whenever any member is called to order he shall sit down until it is determined whether he is in order or not, and if a member is called to order for words spoken in debate, the words excepted to shall be taken down in writing immediately.

15. When two or more members shall happen to rise at once, the president shall name the member who is to speak.

16. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question on the same day, nor more than once on a motion for commitment, without leave of the Senate.

CONDUCT DURING BUSINESS.

17. When the president is putting any question, or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out or across the room; nor in such case, or when a member is speaking, shall entertain private discourse; nor while a member is speaking, shall pass between him and the chair. Every member shall remain uncovered during the session of the Senate. No member or other person shall proceed to or remain by the secretary's desk while the ayes and noes are calling or ballots counting.

18. Upon a division and count of the Senate on any question no member without the senate chamber shall be counted.

SENATORS TO VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED.

19. Every member who shall be in the Senate when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Senate, for special reasons, shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the Senate divides or before he gives his vote upon a call of the ayes and noes. Any member wishing to be excused from voting may make a brief statement of the reasons for making such request, and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

MOTIONS.

20. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the president; or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the secretary, and read aloud for debate.

21. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing if the president or any member desires it. In such case it must be signed by the member or committee offering it.

22. After a motion is stated by the president or read by the secretary, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

23. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

For the previous question.

(Which three motions shall be decided without debate.)

To commit.

To postpone to a day certain.

To amend, or to postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order; but the previous question having been seconded and the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

A motion to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to postpone indefinitely, or to amend, being decided, shall not again be allowed on the same day, nor at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

MOTION TO ADJOURN.

24. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order; that and the motion to lie on the table shall be decided without debate; but a motion to adjourn, when refused, shall not be renewed until further business shall have been had.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

25. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon all pending amendments in their order, and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the Senate shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered such motion, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.

26. On a previous question there shall be no debate. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

RECONSIDERATION.

27. When a motion or question has been once put and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for a reconsideration thereof, on the same day on which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the Senate thereafter; and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn. A motion for reconsideration being put and lost, shall not be renewed.

DIVISION OF QUESTION.

28. Any member may call for a division of the question, when the same will admit of it. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed to be indivisible. A motion to strike out being lost shall not preclude an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

PETITIONS, ETC.—HOW TO BE PRESENTED.

29. In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance or other communication addressed to the Senate, the members shall only state the general purport of it.

30. Every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee shall be indorsed with its appropriate title, and immediately under the indorsement the name of the member presenting the same shall be written.

CALL OF THE SENATE.

31. Any member may make a call of the Senate, and require absent members to be sent for, but a call of the Senate cannot be made after the voting has commenced; and the call of the Senate being ordered and the absentees noted, the door shall be closed, and no member permitted to leave the room until the report of the sergeant-at-arms be received and acted upon, or further proceedings under the call be dispensed with.

 Public Health and Pure Food, 9 members.
 Public Lands, Mines and Minerals, 9 members.
 Railroads, 19 members.
 Reapportionment, 21 members.
 Roads and Bridges, 9 members.
 State Fair and Agricultural Societies, 9 members.
 State Penal Institutions and Crimes, 11 members.
 State Training Schools, 9 members.
 State Soldiers' Home and Military Affairs, 9 members.
 Taxes and Tax Laws, 19 members.
 Temperance, 9 members.
 Towns and Counties, 9 members.
 University and University Lands, 9 members.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

33. The rules observed in the Senate shall govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings of the Committee of the Whole, except that a member may speak more than twice on the same subject, and that a call for the yeas and nays, or for the previous question, cannot be made.

34. Amendments made in the Committee of the Whole shall be entered on a separate piece of paper, and so reported to the Senate by the chairman standing in his place, which amendment shall not be read by the president, unless required by one or more of the members. On adoption of the report by the Committee of the Whole, all bills, recommended to pass, shall be placed upon the calendar.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

35. Bills, memorials and joint resolutions may be introduced by any member in his place, or by order of the Senate on a report of a committee. Each member so introducing such bill, memorial or joint resolution shall, at the time of such introduction thereof, furnish to the secretary of the Senate two copies thereof, which shall be endorsed "copies."

Every bill, memorial or joint resolution shall have prefixed thereto the name of the person introducing it, and when reported from a committee, the name of said committee shall be endorsed thereon. Every proposed amendment to any bill, memorial or joint resolution, and every committee report shall be in triplicate form and shall be written only on one side of the paper. That hereafter all bills introduced in the Senate shall be so framed that when any section or subdivision or chapter of any existing law is to be amended, or when any section or subdivision or chapter of any existing law is to be repealed, or when any section or subdivision or chapter of any repealed law is to be revived, the said section or subdivision or chapter shall in each case be given in full as it is designed to read when enacted, and all new matter contained in any bill which proposes to amend any section or subdivision of any existing law by inserting or adding such new matter shall be underscored, and when the bill is printed it shall be italicized; and when any bill proposes to amend an existing law by omitting any part thereof, the part proposed to be omitted shall be noted in a memorandum at the end of the bill, and after the last section thereof, and such memorandum shall be printed at the bottom of the bill, with the bill, but shall not be any part of the enrolled bill, and no bill not so framed shall be received or read by the secretary unless otherwise especially ordered by the senate.

READING OF BILLS.

36. Every bill, memorial, order, resolution or vote requiring the approval of the governor shall receive three several readings previous to its passage; the first and third reading shall be at length; and no such bill, memorial, order or resolution shall be read twice on the same day.

COMMITMENT.

37. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it has been once read at length. If objections are made to a bill on its first reading, the question shall be: "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no objection be made or the question to reject be lost, the bill shall go on its second reading.

ALL BILLS, ETC., TO GO TO COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

38. All bills, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in committee of the whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the Senate.

PRINTING OF BILLS.

39. All bills of general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands, shall be printed; provided, that no bills shall be printed until after the same shall have been reported upon favorably by the committee to whom the same shall be referred.

FINAL PASSAGE.

40. The final question upon a bill or other paper requiring action by both houses, after the first and second readings thereof and after the consideration in committee of the whole, shall be upon its final passage.

AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING.

41. No amendment shall be received on third reading except to fill blanks, without the unanimous consent of the Senate. In filling blanks, the largest sum, the longest time and greatest distance shall be first taken.

42. A bill or resolution may be committed at any time, previous to its passage, and if any amendment be reported on such commitment to any other than a committee of the whole, it shall be again read the second time, considered in committee of the whole, and the question for third reading and passage again put.

ENGROSSING AND TRANSMITTING BILLS, ETC., TO THE HOUSE.

43. Every bill, memorial, order or resolution originating in the Senate shall be carefully engrossed in typewriting before being transmitted to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

44. Immediately after the passage of any bill or other paper to which the concurrence of the House of Representatives is to be asked it shall be the duty of the secretary to transmit the same to the House, unless some member of the Senate shall make a motion to reconsider the vote by which the Senate passed the said bill or other paper; in which case the secretary shall not transmit said bill or other paper until a motion to reconsider has been put; and on the concurrence of any bill or other paper of the House of Representatives by the Senate, or on the concurrence or disagreement in any vote of the House, it shall also be the duty of the Senate to notify the House thereof.

MEMORIALS TO CONGRESS.

45. Memorials to Congress, to the president of the United States or the heads of either of the departments shall be considered in committee of the whole before being adopted.

ANY SENATOR MAY DEMAND AYES OR NOES.

46. It shall be competent for any member, when a question is being taken, to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be entered on the journal. A call for the ayes and noes cannot be interrupted in any manner whatever.

COMMITTEE NOT TO BE ABSENT.

47. Committees shall not absent themselves from the Senate, by reason of their appointment, without special permission for that purpose be first obtained.

ENROLLMENT.

48. All bills shall be enrolled in typewriting and it shall be in order for the Committee on Enrollment to report at any time.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

49. The secretary shall keep a correct journal of the proceedings of the Senate, and shall perform such other duties as shall be assigned to him as such secretary. He shall permit no journal, records, accounts or papers to be taken from the table or out of his custody, other than in the regular mode of business. If any paper in his charge shall be missing, he shall report the fact to the president, that inquiry may be made. He shall superintend the recording in the journal of proceedings, the engrossing, transcribing and copying of the bills and resolutions, and generally perform the duties of secretary, under the direction of the president. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the books to be called "Minute Books," in which he shall enter, under the appropriate marginal numbers, all Senate and House bills, and correct notes, with the dates thereof, of the state, condition and progress of each bill pending, until its final passage.

CERTIFICATE FOR MONEY.

50. No certificate authorizing the payment of any money appropriated by the legislature shall be issued by the secretary by virtue of any motion or resolution, unless such a motion or resolution shall be sanctioned by a majority of all members elected to the Senate. And all motions or resolutions authorizing the issuing of certificates by the secretary for the payment of money shall be upon a call of the yeas and nays.

JOURNAL OF EXECUTIVE SESSION.

51. The proceedings of the Senate on executive business shall be kept in a separate book of record to be provided by the secretary of the Senate, and published with the proceedings of the Senate, unless the public good requires secrecy, which shall be determined by a vote of the Senate.

JEFFERSON'S MANUAL.

52. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual shall govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and orders of the Senate, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

HOURS OF MEETING.

53. The standing hour of the daily meeting of the Senate shall be 10 o'clock in the morning, unless the Senate direct otherwise.

ABSENCE OF SENATORS.

54. No senator or officer of the Senate, unless from illness or other cause he shall be unable to attend, shall absent himself from the session of the Senate during the entire day, without having first obtained leave of absence.

PERSONS PRIVILEGED TO THE FLOOR OF THE SENATE.

55. No person shall be admitted within the Senate chamber but the executive or ex-governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the House, heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme and District courts, and members of Congress, and when personally introduced by members of the Senate, those who have been members of Congress or of the State Legislature, or other visitors who are not interested in any claim or directly in any bill pending before the Legislature.

No lobbyist shall be permitted on the floor of the Senate or in the retiring room or corridors during the session of the Senate. The sergeant-at-arms is charged with the duty of strict enforcement of this rule.

AMENDMENTS TO RULES.

56. No rule or order of the Senate shall be amended without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor shall any rule be suspended, except by at least a two-thirds of the full Senate

NOTICE TO DEBATE.

57. Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or other action.

EXECUTIVE SESSION.

58. When in executive session, the Senate, may, in all cases, sit with closed doors, and the Senate chamber may be cleared of all persons except the officers and members of the Senate.

NO SMOKING.

59. No senator or officer of the Senate or other person shall be permitted to smoke in the Senate chamber.

SECRETARY MAY CORRECT ERRORS.

60. The secretary and engrossing clerk, in all proper cases, shall correct all mistakes in numbering the sections and reference thereto, whether such errors occur in the original bill or are caused by amendments thereto.

DUTIES OF THE SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.

61. It shall be the duty of the sergeant-at-arms to execute all orders of the president of the Senate, and to perform all the duties they may assign to him connected with the police and good order of the Senate chamber; to exercise a supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the chamber; to see that messages, etc., are promptly executed; that the hall is properly ventilated and the temperature thereof properly regulated, and open for the use of the members of the Senate at the time fixed; and to perform all other services pertaining to his office.

REPORT ON AMENDED BILLS.

62. No committee nor any member thereof shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject, or is intended to accomplish a different purpose than that of the original bill for which it is reported, or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the Senate is advised that the same is in violation of this rule.

GENERAL ORDERS AND CALENDAR.

63. The secretary shall make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other proceedings of the Senate which are referred to the committee of the whole, and which are not made the order of the day, for any particular day, and to number the same; which lists shall be called the "General Orders of the Day;" and they shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee.

Such general orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the rules or orders of the Senate, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the same shall be considered in committee of the whole.

64. That it shall be the duty of the secretary to make a list of all bills, resolutions and other matters coming before the Senate for final action and place the same upon the calendar in the order in which they may have been acted upon in committee of the whole, and such calendar shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the matters included therein shall be considered.

ADDITIONAL EMPLOYES—GRATUITIES.

65. All propositions for the appointment of employes of the Senate or for expenditures on account of the legislature, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the committee on rules, without debate, and no appointment shall be made or expenses incurred, unless reported upon favorably by said committee, or unless its report be overruled by three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of the whole Senate. Said committee shall report to the Senate the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each employe whose appointment is recommended by it. All propositions for extra compensation or gratuity shall be referred to said committee, and no extra compensation or gratuity shall be paid to any officer, employe or other person unless reported upon favorably by said committee, or unless its report be reversed by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of the whole Senate.

SPECIAL ORDER.

66. It shall require a majority vote of the whole Senate to designate a special order; and when a time has been designated by the Senate, whether by the adoption of a report of a committee or otherwise, for a particular or special order, the Senate shall at such time proceed to the consideration of such order, and shall at such time, so designated, after considering the bill, resolution or measure included therein, unless the same shall be then otherwise disposed of, or the special order postponed to a day certain, immediately proceed to the third reading and final passage of the same, and during the consideration of such special order, Rule No. sixteen (16) shall be suspended and the debate thereon and all proceedings thereunder, including amendments and substitutions, shall be, as nearly as applicable, that of the committee of the whole, except that it shall be competent for any member, when a question is being taken, to call for the yeas and nays, which shall be entered on the journal.

JOURNAL—HOW APPROVED.

67. The journal of each day's proceedings shall be open for correction at any time during the session of the succeeding day, and, unless corrected on that day, shall stand approved.

PRESIDENT'S AUTHORITY OVER EMPLOYES.

68. The president of the Senate shall have full and exclusive authority over, and charge of, all the employes, officers and clerks of the Senate, both elective and appointive. He shall have the sole and exclusive power and authority to assign them to such duties other than for which they were elected or appointed, as he shall see fit. He shall have power to appoint such of said

employees, officers or clerks as he shall deem proper to exercise the powers to him granted by this rule. He may make such rules and regulations for the government of the employees, officers and clerks as he shall see fit and proper. In case of violation of any of the orders of the president of the Senate by any employe, officer or clerk, or in case of any violation of any such rule or regulation made by him by any such employe, officer or clerk, or in case of any misconduct or omission of any such employe, officer or clerk, the president shall refer such complaint to the committee on rules, which shall have the final power to hear such complaint and to discharge any such employe, officer or clerk, or to impose such other punishment by way of fine or otherwise upon such employe, officer or clerk, as to the said committee may seem just and proper.

MISCELLANEOUS.

69. The title to any bill may be amended at any time during its pendency in the Senate.

70. Every bill referred to a Standing Committee, shall be reported therefrom within twenty-five (25) days after its reference to such committee, except all bills referred to the Finance Committee and all bills referred to the Committee on Reapportionment.

A majority of the Senate may at any time recall a bill from any committee or take a bill from the table and place such bill on general orders.

71. All enrolling and engrossing of bills shall be done by Enrolling and Engrossing Clerks and Stenographers regularly in the employ of the Senate and shall not be paid for per folio as heretofore.

72. Joint resolutions not requiring the signature of the Governor need not take the regular course of bills and memorials, but may be acted upon in the same manner as resolutions.

73. The Secretary of the Senate shall be the agent of the Senate for the purchase of supplies. Before making any purchases, however, it shall be his duty to submit to the Rules Committee a list of necessary supplies, together with the prices for which the same can be secured, which supplies shall then be purchased only upon the approval of the Rules Committee.

PERMANENT RULES OF THE HOUSE.

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE.

1. *Hour of Meeting.*

The sessions of the House shall be daily (Sundays excepted) beginning at 10:00 A. M. During the first three weeks of the session, adjournment shall be taken at 12:30 P. M.; and upon the expiration of the said three weeks and thereafter, a recess shall be taken at that hour until 2:00 P. M.

This rule shall be subject to change at any time by a majority vote.

2. *Meeting, Roll Call, Etc.*

The Speaker shall take the Chair at the hour at which the House stands adjourned. The House shall then be called to order, and after prayer by the Chaplain, a roll of the members shall be called and the names of the members present and those excused shall be entered on the Journal of the House.

3. *Reading of the Journal.*

The Journal of the Preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, unless otherwise ordered, and any errors appearing therein may be corrected by the House.

4. *Order of Business.*

After the reading of the Journal, the order of business of the day shall be as follows:

1. Presentation of petitions or other communications.
2. Reports of standing committees.
3. Second reading of House bills.
4. Reports of select committees.
5. Introduction of bills.
6. Motions and resolutions.
7. Consideration of messages from the Senate.
8. First reading of Senate bills.
9. Second reading of Senate bills.
10. Third reading of House bills.
11. Third reading of Senate bills.
12. General Orders.

BILLS—INTRODUCTION, READING, ETC.

5. *Bills—How Introduced.*

A member desiring to introduce a bill shall place the same in the hands of the Speaker before the opening of the session.

All memorials and joint resolutions shall be presented, received and considered in the same manner as bills, and shall be bound in the regular House File Binder, and take the same course as a bill.

Any standing or special committee of the House may introduce a bill as a committee bill, which shall be read the first time, laid over for one day when it shall be read the second time and placed upon General Orders.

No bill shall be introduced after the sixtieth (60th) legislative day of the session except its reception be authorized by a two-thirds (2-3) vote of the House. This rule shall not apply to committee bills nor to bills introduced upon request of the Governor.

Every bill and resolution shall be introduced in triplicate and shall have prefixed thereto the name of the member, members of committee introducing it.

Every bill and resolution, when reported from a Committee, shall have the name of the said Committee and the name of the author endorsed thereupon.

All bills introduced in the House shall be so framed that when any section or subdivision or chapter of any existing law is to be amended, repealed or revised, the said section, subdivision or chapter shall in each and every case be given in full as it is designed to read when enacted; and all new matter contained in any bill which proposes to amend or revise any section, subdivision or chapter of any existing law by inserting or adding such new matter shall be underscored and, when the bill is printed, shall be italicized. If the proposed amendment or revision of any section, subdivision or chapter of any existing law is to be effected by the omission of any part thereof without the substitution therefor of any new matter, the bill proposing such amendment or revision must be identical with the section, subdivision or chapter of the existing law sought to be changed; having the portion or portions of such existing law which it is proposed to omit stricken out by a line or lines drawn through the word or words constituting such portion or portions to be omitted.

The title of every bill shall indicate the subject thereof and not be merely a reference to the page number or section of the existing law sought to be repealed, amended or revised, but the title shall contain such descriptive words as will indicate to what subject the bill refers.

No bill, unless framed as herein provided, shall be received or read by the chief clerk, unless otherwise especially ordered by the House.

6. *First Reading and Reference of Bills.*

All bills, memorials and joint resolutions shall be read at length upon their introduction unless objected to.

If objection is made, the question shall be: "Shall the bill be rejected?"

If no objection be made, or if the question to reject be lost, the bill shall, after reading, go to its appropriate Standing Committee, except when introduced by such Committee.

Every bill introduced, except when introduced by a Committee as above provided, containing an amendment to an existing law of the state, shall first be referred to the appropriate committee of the House appointed with reference to the subject matter contained in the law proposed to be amended.

All bills, whether emanating from the House or the Senate, carrying an appropriation, shall be referred to the Committee on Appropriation for action by the committee before the second reading of the bill; and the fact that the bill carries an appropriation shall be noted by the committee in its report returning the same.

7. *Second Reading of Bills.*

All bills, concurrence reports, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the Governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in a committee of the whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the House. Unless otherwise ordered bills and joint memorials to Congress, only, shall require a second and third reading.

The final question, after consideration in the Committee of the Whole, of a bill or other paper originating in the House shall be: "Shall it be engrossed and read a third time?" And upon every bill or other paper originating in the Senate: "Shall it be read a third time?"

8. *Third Reading of Bills.*

No amendments shall be received on the third reading except to fill blanks or amend titles, without the unanimous consent of the House; and all bills and resolutions may be committed at any time previous to their passage. If any amendment be reported upon such commitment by any other than a

Committee of the Whole it shall again be read a second time, considered in the Committee of the Whole and the question for the third reading and passage then put.

All bills, memorials and joint resolutions on their third readings shall be read at length.

9. *Disposition of Senate Bills.*

When a Senate File has been received by the House, with a message announcing that the same has passed the Senate, such bill shall be referred to the appropriate standing Committee; provided, however, that when a Senate File is received, the provisions of which are stated by a member to be identical with those of a House File which has already been considered by one of the Committees of the House and is on General Orders or the Calendar, such Senate File shall be referred to the Committee on Engrossment for comparison, which Committee shall report forthwith whether the said Senate File is identical with the House File. And, if reported identical, such Senate File may, by a majority vote, be substituted for the House File (the latter, in such case being considered withdrawn) and shall take the place of the House File; provided, however, that the fact that the bills are identical shall be entered in the Journal.

10. *Committee of the Whole.*

When the House has arrived at the General Orders of the day, they shall go into a Committee of the Whole upon General Orders. No business shall be in order unless considered or passed or the Committee arise. And, unless a particular bill is ordered up, the Committee of the Whole shall consider, act upon or pass the General Orders according to order of their reference.

In forming a Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall appoint a Chairman to preside.

Bills committed to the Committee of the Whole House shall, in the Committee of the Whole thereon, be first read through unless the Committee shall otherwise order, and then read and debated by sections, leaving the title to be last considered. All amendments shall be in writing, in duplicate, and reported to the House by the Chairman.

11. *Rules of the House to Apply to Committee of the Whole.*

The Rules of the House shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as may be applicable; except that the yeas and nays shall not be called, the previous question forced and speaking limited.

A motion that the Committee rise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

12. *General Order of the Day.*

The Speaker shall cause the Chief Clerk to make out a list of all bills, resolutions and reports of Committees of the Whole House, and which are not made a Special Order, and to number the same. This list shall be called the "General Orders of the Day"; and items listed thereon shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the Committee. General Orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the Rules or orders of the House, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least two days before the same are to be considered in the Committee of the Whole.

Each member of the House shall leave on or under his desk, each time the House adjourns for the day, his file binder for bills. It shall be the duty of the clerk of the House to have placed in each binder one copy of each bill to be printed under the Rules or orders of the House at least forty-eight hours before the same shall be considered in the Committee of the Whole, and under the first order of business each day, said Clerk shall report to the

House what bills he has placed in the binders. Each member shall then forthwith examine his binder and verify and correct, if necessary, the report of the Clerk.

If progress is reported on a bill by the Committee for three successive days, such bill shall go to the foot of General Orders unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote.

13. *Special Orders.*

Bills may be made the order of the day for a special time. Such bills shall be entered upon a separate list, to be known as "Special Orders." Bills may be made a Special Order by a majority vote of the entire House upon one day's notice. Any bill may also be made a Special Order by a majority vote of the entire House, without notice if any standing Committee, by a two-thirds vote, so recommends.

When the time arrives for the consideration of any Special Order, the House shall proceed to the consideration of the bill or bills upon the said Special Order in the order in which they are respectively listed; and after consideration they shall immediately be read the third time and placed upon final passage.

DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS.

14. *Duties of the Speaker.*

(a) The Speaker shall preside over the House, and be charged with all the powers and duties pertaining to such presiding officers.

(b) He shall preserve order and decorum, and in case of disorderly conduct or disturbance in the galleries or the lobby he, or the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole House, may order the same to be cleared.

(c) He shall have general control, except as provided by Rule or law, of the Hall of the House and of the corridors and passages and of the rooms assigned to the use of the House, until further ordered.

(d) He shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas of, or issued by order of the House; and he shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member.

The Speaker shall not vote on appeals from his own decisions.

15. *Speaker Pro Tempore.*

The presiding officer may call a member to the Chair, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. In the absence of the presiding officer, one of the members shall be elected by a majority vote to preside temporarily, until the return of the regular presiding officer.

16. *Duties of Members.*

When the House adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.

Every member, before speaking, shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the Speaker, but shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the Chair. When two or more members rise at once, the Speaker shall designate which shall speak first.

17. *Explaining or Changing Vote.*

No member shall be allowed to explain his vote or discuss the question while the yeas and nays are being called; and no member shall be allowed to change his vote after the same is announced from the Chair.

18. *Name of Member Offering Bills, Etc., To Go on Journal.*

In all cases where a bill, order, resolution or motion shall be entered on the Journal of the House, the name of the member offering the same shall be entered on the Journal.

19. *Who May Be Admitted on the Floor.*

No person shall be admitted within the Halls of the House except the members themselves, the properly authorized employes, the Executive and ex-Governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the Senate, the heads of Departments of the State Government, judges of the Supreme and District Courts, members of Congress, those properly accredited representatives of the newspaper and press associations hereinafter enumerated, and, when personally introduced by members of the House, those who have been members of Congress or of the State Legislature and who are not interested in any claim or directly in any bill pending before the Legislature.

And it shall not be in order for the Speaker to entertain a request for the suspension of this rule, nor to present from the Chair the request of any member for unanimous consent.

20. *Absence of Members and Officers.*

No member or officer of the House shall, unless from illness or some other sufficient cause he be unable to attend, absent himself from any session of the House during the entire day without having first obtained leave of absence from the Speaker; and no one shall be permitted to draw pay while absent more than one day without leave.

21. *Duties of the Chief Clerk and Assistants.*

Neither the chief clerk nor his assistants shall permit any records or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody otherwise than in the regular course of business. The chief clerk shall report any missing papers to the Speaker. He shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House; shall perform, under the direction of the Speaker, all the duties pertaining to his office, and shall also keep a book showing the situation and progress of all bills, memorials and joint resolutions.

22. *Clerical Corrections to Bill.*

(1) Minor clerical errors in any bill, memorial or resolution, such as errors in orthography or grammar, or the incorrect use of one word for another (as "affect" for "effect"), or wrong numbering or references, whether such errors occur in the original bill or any amendment thereto, shall be corrected by the chief clerk as a matter of course upon the approval of the Chairman of any committee to which the bill was referred.

(2) The chief clerk shall insert the enacting clause in any bill before its passage, if the same shall have been omitted.

(3) Any corrections made by the clerk under this rule shall be noted by him in the Journal.

(4) "Webster's New International Dictionary" shall be the standard authority in matters falling under the above rules.

23. *No One to Remain by the Clerk's Desk.*

No member or other person shall remain by the clerk's desk when the yeas and nays are being called.

24. *Duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.*

It shall be the duty of the sergeant-at-arms to execute all orders of the House or its presiding officer; to perform all the duties that may, from time to time, be assigned to him connected with the police and good order of the House; to exercise supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the chamber; to see that all messages, etc., etc., are promptly executed; that the hall is properly ventilated and open for the use of members from 8:00 A. M. until 11:00 P. M.; and to perform all other services pertaining to the office of sergeant-at-arms.

25. *Smoking Prohibited.*

No person shall be permitted to smoke in the Hall of the House while that body is in session. The sergeant-at-arms is charged with the duty of enforcing observance of this rule.

26. *Order in Debate.*

No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every other member wishing to speak on the pending question shall have spoken.

27. *Motions.*

No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the Speaker before debate, and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any other member requires it.

After a motion has been stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the House, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision; but all motions, resolutions or amendments shall be entered in the Journal unless withdrawn the same day.

28. *Motion to Adjourn.*

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except during rollcall.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state any fact to the House relative to the condition of the business of the House which would seem to render it improper to adjourn at that time. Such statement, however, shall not be debatable and shall not, in any case, occupy more than two minutes.

29. *Precedence of Motions.*

When a motion is under debate, no motion shall be received but:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
(Which three motions shall be decided without debate.)
4. To commit.
5. To postpone to a day certain.
6. To amend.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order; but the previous question having been seconded and the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

30. *The Previous Question.*

(a) The previous question shall be in this form: "The gentleman from moves the previous question. Do ten members second the motion?" If the motion be properly seconded, the question shall be stated as follows: "As many as are in favor of ordering the previous question will say aye; as many as are opposed will say no."

There shall be a motion for the previous question which, being ordered by a majority of all members present, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the House to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions upon which it has been asked or ordered.

The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the Rules or an amendment or amendments; or it may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection.

(b) A call of the House shall not be in order after the previous question is ordered unless it shall appear that a quorum is not present.

(c) When the previous question is decided in the negative, it shall leave the main question under debate for the residue of the sitting unless sooner disposed of by taking a vote on the question or in some other manner.

31. *Incidental Questions of Order.*

All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, during the pendency of such motion or after the House shall have determined that the main question now be put, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

32. *Petitions, Etc., Etc., How Presented.*

Petitions, memorials and other papers presented to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or a member in his place, and a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made verbally and endorsed thereon, together with the name of the member introducing the same.

33. *Every Member to Vote Unless Excused.*

Every member who shall be present before the vote is declared from the Chair shall vote for or against the matter before the House unless the House shall excuse him, or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.

34. *Procedure in Excusing Member from Voting.*

When a member declines to vote on a call of his name, he shall be required to assign his reason therefor; and, having assigned them, the presiding officer shall submit the question to the House: "Shall the member, for the reasons assigned by him, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate. And these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced, and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.

35. *Voting on Questions when Interested.*

No member shall vote on any question in the result of which he is personally interested or involved.

36. *Order During Sessions.*

When the Speaker is putting the question no member shall walk out of or across the House; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member entertain any private discourse or pass between the speaking member and the Chair.

37. *Order of Putting Questions.*

All questions, whether in Committee or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions; and in filling up blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

38. *Division of a Question.*

If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

39. *Questions of Order.*

If any member of the House, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules, the Speaker shall (or any member may) call him to order; in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted on motion of another member to explain, and the House, if appealed to, shall decide in either case without debate. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

40. *Called to Order for Offensive Words in Debate.*

If any member be called to order for offensive words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall report the words excepted to and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's desk; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House, for language used in debate if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exception to them shall have been taken.

41. *Ten Members May Demand Yeas and Nays.*

The yeas and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by ten members, except upon the final passage of bills, joint resolutions and motions directing the payment of money. In these cases the yeas and nays shall be ordered without any demand.

42. *Notice of Intention to Debate.*

Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or other action.

43. *Call of the House.*

Ten members may make a call of the House and require absent members to be sent for; but a call of the House cannot be made after the voting has commenced, and such call being ordered and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed and no member permitted to leave the room until the call be suspended. And, pending the call, no motion shall be in order except it pertains to matters incidental to the call or a motion to suspend further proceedings under the same. After the call of the House has been ordered and proceedings thereunder are suspended, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall not permit any member to leave the Hall or the House unless excused by the Speaker.

The call may be suspended at any time by a vote of the majority of the members present.

44. *Suspension of Rules to Hasten a Bill.*

Every bill shall be read on three different days unless in case of urgency two-thirds of the House deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed until it shall have been read twice at length.

45. *Proceedings on the Passage of Bills.*

No resolution involving the expenditure of money, or joint resolution, shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House, to be determined by a roll call. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of its being an amendment.

No bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto or incorporating therein any other bill or resolution pending before the House.

46. *Amendments to Appropriation Bills.*

No amendment increasing the amount or amounts carried by any appropriation bill shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House.

47. *Motion for Reconsideration.*

When a question has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof; but no action for the reconsidering of any vote shall be in order after a bill, resolution, message, report, amendment or motion upon which the vote was taken shall have gone out of the possession of the House, announcing their decision. Nor shall any motion for reconsideration be in order unless made on the same day upon which the

vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the House thereafter. Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions except the motion to adjourn; provided that when notice of the intention to move such reconsideration shall be given by such member, the clerk of the House shall retain the said bill, resolution, message, report, amendment or motion until after the expiration of the time during which such motion can be made, as hereinbefore provided, unless the same is previously disposed of. A motion for reconsideration having been put and lost shall not be renewed.

48. *Authorized Manual of Parliamentary Practice.*

The rules of parliamentary practice embraced in Jefferson's Manual shall govern the House in all cases where they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing Rules of the House and the joint Rules and Orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

49. *Standing Committees.*

Standing committees shall be appointed by the Speaker as follows:

50. *Committee on Legislative Expense.*

(a) The purchase of supplies and fixtures of whatever nature, and contracts for rentals of telephones, typewriters and such similar fixtures as may be necessary, shall in all cases be made by the Committee on Legislative expense. Every such order shall be made upon a blank furnished for that purpose, in duplicate, signed by the Chairman of the said Committee and countersigned by the chief clerk of the House. All such purchases shall be accompanied by invoices in duplicate, the original to be signed by the Chairman of the said Committee to indicate that it has been favorably acted upon. The said invoice shall then be made a part of the chief clerk's voucher and filed with the State Auditor. The said Committee shall make a report of expenditures to the House every fifteen (15) days, which report shall be entered in the journal.

(b) All such supplies shall be in charge of a store-keeper who shall disburse the same only upon requisitions properly made out and indicating to whom the said supplies are delivered, and shall be countersigned by the chief clerk.

(c) The storekeeper shall keep a record showing the disposition of all supplies purchased and not in his stock, in all instances.

51. *Committee on Engrossment.*

The Committee on Engrossment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed and report the same to the House "Correctly Engrossed" before the third reading. The said Committee may report at any time, and all bills shall be engrossed in typewriting.

The Chairman of the said Committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record showing the hour and date of the receipt and return of all bills referred to the said Committee; and all bills shall be returned in the same order as that in which they are received.

52. *Committee on Enrollment.*

The Committee on Enrollment shall examine all House bills, memorials and joint resolutions, which have passed the two Houses, and when reported "Correctly Enrolled" they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the two Houses for their signatures; and when so signed to the Governor for his approval. The said Committee may report at any time; but it shall not report any bill as correctly enrolled which has words interlined therein or when any words have been erased therefrom; and all bills shall be enrolled in typewriting.

The Chairman of the said Committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record showing the hour and date of the receipt by it of each bill and of its return to the House; and all bills shall be returned in the same order as that in which they are received.

53. *Committee on Public Accounts and Expenditures.*

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Public Accounts and Expenditures to examine into the state of accounts and the expenditures of the State Auditor, the State Treasurer and all other State officers entrusted with the custody or disbursement of any portion of the public moneys, including State institutions; to require and report particularly on or before the twentieth day of February whether the expenditures of each and all of the said officers are justified by law; whether all claims from time to time satisfied and discharged by such officers are supported by sufficient vouchers, establishing their justice both as to character and amounts.

Whether all such claims have been discharged out of funds appropriated therefor, and whether all moneys have been disbursed in conformity with appropriation laws; whether all moneys reported to be on hand are so on hand and to the credit of the various funds as reported; and the notes, bonds and securities in which any portion of the public moneys are reported to be invested are on hand as reported, and whether the same are proper and secure investments and securely kept.

And it shall be, moreover, the duty of the said Committee to report from time to time whether any and what retrenchment can be made in the expenditure of any department or officer of the State without detriment to the public service, and to report from time to time such recommendations and bills as may be necessary to add to the economy and accountability of any officer of the State; and the said Committee shall make such recommendations as to the investment of public moneys and the exchange or sale of any of the bonds or securities held by the State as in their judgment the public interest requires.

54. *Committee on Claims.*

The Committee on Claims shall keep a permanent index record of all claims, in which shall be entered the amount claimed and character of the same, together with all proceedings had by the said Committee and the final action taken by the Committee, upon all claims considered. Such record, together with all files pertaining thereto, shall be filed with the Secretary of State at the close of the session as a permanent record, and used by all subsequent claim Committees and shall be subject to public inspection.

55. *Committee of Conference.*

A Committee of Conference may report at any time.

No Committee except a Committee of Conference and the Committee on Rules shall sit during the sitting of the House without leave.

56. *Special Committees.*

Special Committees, to whom reference shall be made, shall in all cases report a state of facts and their opinion thereupon, to the House.

57. *Meeting of Committees.*

The Committee on Rules shall prepare a schedule of Committee meetings, fixing as far as practicable the date and hour which will be the regular meeting time of each Committee to be first approved by a majority vote of the House. Should it be necessary to hold a special meeting or for any reason change temporarily the regular meeting of a Committee, the notice by the chairman of said committee, of such change shall be read from the desk at least one day in advance thereof, and also posted upon the bulletin board at the same time, or on a majority vote of the House fixing a time therefor at any time.

That the committee on rules referred to in said rule shall read "a committee composed of all chairmen of standing committees."

58. *Records of Committees; How Kept.*

The Chairman, or Acting Chairman, of each Committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record, on which shall be entered:

(a) The time and place of each hearing and of each meeting of the Committee;

(b) The attendance of Committee members at each meeting;

(c) The name of each person, except members of the House and Senate, appearing before the Committee, with the name of the person, persons, association, firm or corporation in whose behalf the appearance is made;

(d) The vote of each member on all bills, resolutions and amendments voted upon.

Such record shall be approved at the next regular meeting of the Committee.

Such record shall be filed with the Chief Clerk during the session of the Legislature and at the expiration thereof shall be filed with the Secretary of State; and such records shall be open to public inspection at all times.

59. *Reports of Committees.*

The Chairman of a Committee reporting the action taken by his Committee upon bills submitted to it shall do so upon the form provided for such reports, stating the date of the meeting when such action was taken, and shall authenticate the same by his signature.

Any number of bills may be embodied in one report; but at the request of any member the report may be divided by excepting any bill therefrom, and if this be done the bill so excepted may be acted upon independently from the report as a whole.

The Chairman shall note in his report the final roll-call of all bills; but this part of the report shall not be entered in the Journal unless ordered by the House. The report of any Committee, or any part thereof, may be laid upon the table for a day and printed in the Journal if so ordered by the House.

In the event of a minority report, the majority and minority reports shall be made separately from the regular Committee reports.

60. *Time Limit for Committee Consideration of Bills.*

Fifteen days after a bill has been referred to a Committee (other than a bill for appropriations, reapportionment or claims) and no report has been made upon the bill by the Committee, any member may request that the bill be returned to the House. The Committee shall then have three days in which to report back the bill requested. If the Committee fails to make a report within three days any member may at any time after the expiration of such three days, during the order of "Motions and Resolutions" demand the return forthwith to the House of the bill in question, which shall constitute the demand of the House and the said bill shall at once be considered to be in the possession of the House, subject, however, to such disposition as the House shall determine. Provided, that the house can recall any bill from any committee at any time, give the same second reading and advance the same to general orders by a majority vote of the members.

61. *Substitution of Bills.*

No standing or special Committee, nor any member or members thereof, shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such Committee, which substitute relates to a different subject or is intended to accomplish a different purpose from that of the original bill for which it is reported, or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the House is advised that the same is in violation of this Rule. This Rule shall not be suspended without the unanimous consent of the House.

EMPLOYEES.

62. *Employees.*

All propositions for the appointment of employees of the House, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. No appointment shall be made unless favorably reported upon by such Committee, or its report be overruled by a three-fourths vote of the House.

The said Committee shall report to the House the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each of the said employees.

63. *Employees Authorized in the House.*

The Speaker shall appoint employees of the House with compensation as follows:

Three janitors at \$5.00 per day.

Six doorkeepers at \$5.00 per day.

Two gallery keepers at \$5.00 per day.

Two keepers of cloak rooms at \$5.00 per day.

One file clerk at \$5.00 per day.

One assistant file clerk at \$3.00 per day.

Six pages at \$3.00 per day.

One messenger at \$3.00 per day.

Two sergeants of committee rooms at \$5.00 per day.

One storekeeper at \$5.00 per day.

One reading clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One clerk for judiciary committee at \$10.00 per day.

One assistant clerk for judiciary at \$5.00 per day.

One clerk for reapportionment committee at \$7.50 per day.

One bookkeeper at \$5.00 per day.

One desk clerk at \$7.00 per day.

One index and revision clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One Speaker's clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One stenographer to Speaker at \$5.00 per day.

One stenographer to chief clerk at \$5.00 per day.

Eight clerks at \$5.00 per day, such clerks to be assigned to committees of the House under direction of the chief clerk.

Eleven stenographers subject to assignment by the Committee of Rules at a salary of \$5.00 per day.

Any employee of the House may be assigned to other duties, suspended or discharged at any time by the Committee on Rules.

Rule 62 shall not be construed as authorizing the employment or appointment of any employee named therein, in case any employee has been appointed or authorized to be appointed or engaged by this House for such position by any rule or resolution heretofore adopted. No clerk shall be appointed for any of the committees named in Rule 62 until the necessity for the same is recommended by the Committee on Rules; and no clerk of said committee and no employee of this House shall receive any pay for any time prior to the date of appointment, and no employee or clerk mentioned in Rule 62 shall receive any pay, compensation, gratuity or reward over and above the salary named therein except upon an approval of a four-fifths vote of the whole House.

All stenographers appointed for service in the House shall furnish, at their own expense, the typewriting machines to be used by them.

No employee shall under any circumstance make or permit to be made any copy or copies of any papers, files or documents in his or her custody or to which he or she has access, except it be upon the request of some member of the House; and in such cases the employee making, or permitting to be made, such copies, shall file a statement with the chief clerk of the House, showing the paper, file or document copied, the number of copies furnished or made, to whom furnished, and by whom made. Violation of this rule shall be ground for instant and summary discharge of the offending employee.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES.

64. *Vote Required to Suspend Rules.*

No Rule of the House shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds (2-3) of the members of the whole House, except Rules 62, 63, 64, which shall require the concurrence of three-fourths of the members of the whole House. But the Committee on Rules may report at any time, and any Rule so reported may be adopted by the majority vote of the House.

65. *Weekly Synopsis of All Entries in Journal.*

After the last session of each week the clerk shall prepare a synopsis of all entries affecting bills in the Journal for the week. Such synopsis shall specify clearly and briefly of the proceedings had and action taken, giving dates:

- H. H. 11. A bill to, etc., etc.
- Jan. 10. Int. by Mr. Doe. Ref. to Jud.
- Jan. 12. Jud. rep., with amdt. pass.
- Jan. 14. On G. O.
- Jan. 15. On Cal.
- Jan. 16. Passed.

The synopsis so prepared shall be of the same size and form as the Journal, and shall be distributed on the desks of the members not later than noon of the following Monday.

66. *Printing of Bills.*

All bills of a general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands shall be printed; provided, that no bill shall be printed until after the same shall have been favorably reported by the committee to which the same shall have been referred, unless ordered printed by a majority vote of the House.

Upon bills received from the Senate, it shall be the duty of the Committee of the House to which the same are referred to make a report to the House as to the advisability or inadvisability of having the same printed.

67. *Newspaper Reporters.*

On account of the limited space available on the floor of the House, the following named daily papers, and none other, shall be permitted to be represented thereupon by one reporter each, viz.:

- The St. Paul Pioneer Press.
- The St. Paul Dispatch.
- The St. Paul Daily News.
- The Minneapolis Journal.
- The Minneapolis Tribune.
- The Minneapolis Daily News.
- The Duluth News-Tribune.
- The Duluth Herald.
- The Volkszeitung.
- The American Press Association.
- The Northwestern Newspaper Union.

68. *Lobbyists.*

No lobbyist shall be permitted on the floor of the House or in the retiring rooms or corridors during the sessions of the House. The Sergeant-at-Arms is charged with the duty of strict enforcement of this rule.

69. *Construction, Rule as to.*

In the construction of the terms "majority vote," "vote of the House," "vote of the whole House" and "vote of the entire House", as used in these rules, the first two phases shall be deemed a majority vote of the members

present at the particular time, and the last two phrases to mean a majority vote of all the members elected to the House at the particular session of the Legislature.

70. *Bulletin Board.*

The Clerk shall prepare a bulletin board, upon which will be posted a list of committee meetings, and any other announcements or notice the House may require.

71. *Topical Index.*

The Clerk shall prepare a topical card index, in which bills may be indexed by number, author, subject, section of the Code amended, the committees and any other subject that will make it a complete and comprehensive index, and be made a permanent file to be used by all succeeding Chief Clerks. The topical card index shall be filed with the secretary of state after the expiration of the session of the Legislature and cards constituting the record shall be retained open for public inspection at all times.

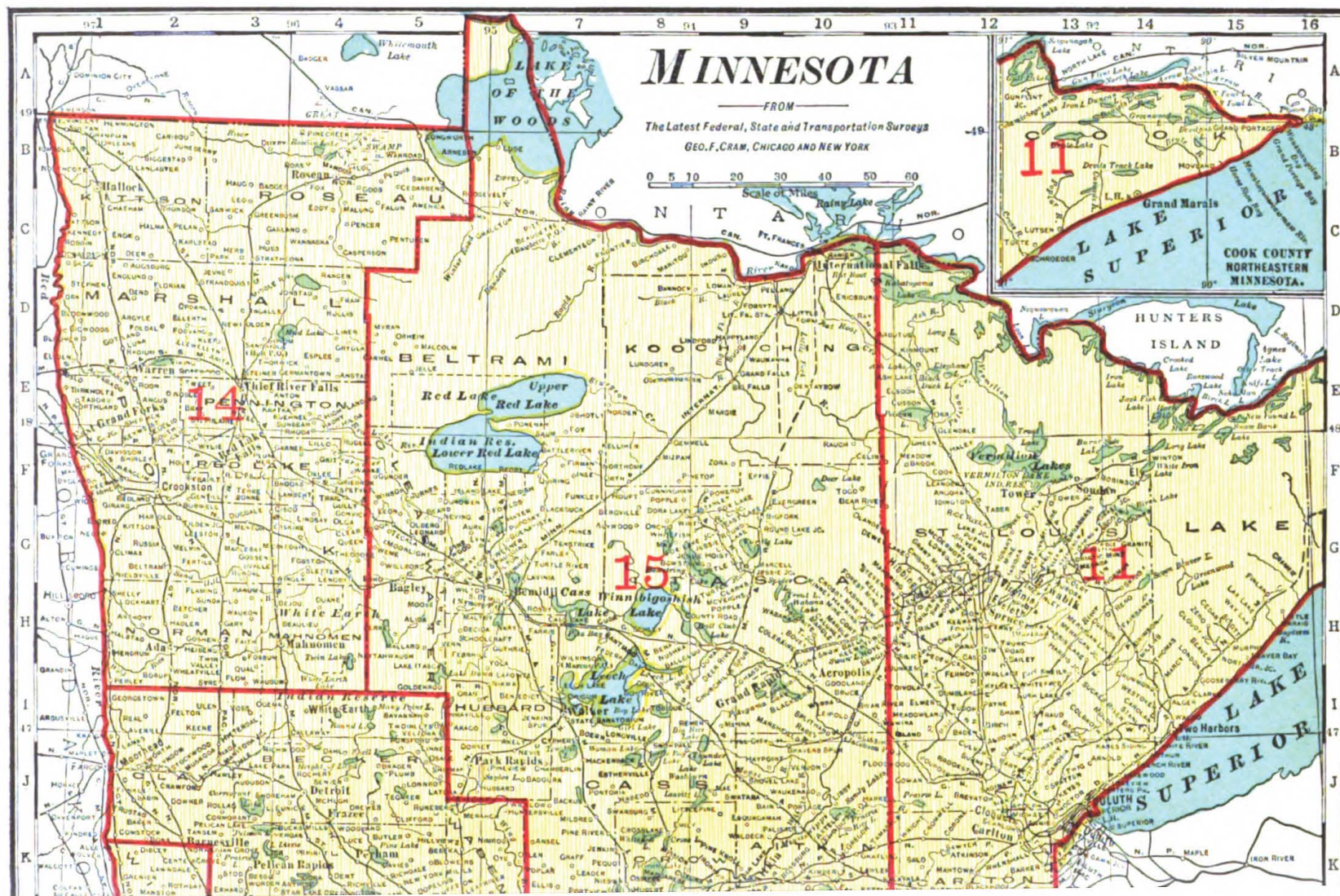
72. *Visiting Public Institutions.*

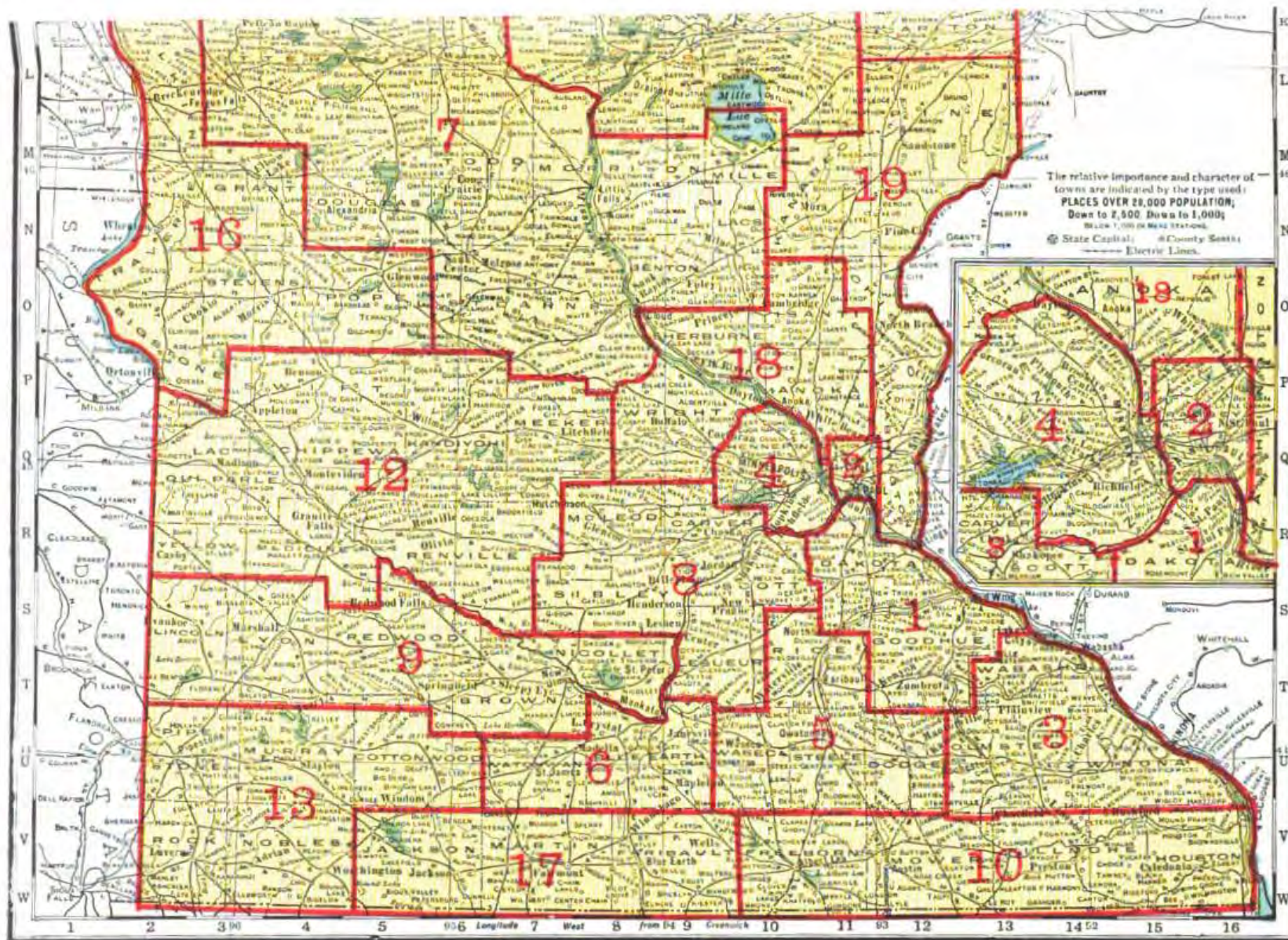
No leave of absence shall be granted any committee, special or standing, to visit any public institution of the State or for any other purpose. Whenever any committee shall report to the House that it is desirable that such committee receive information concerning any public institution, the House may, by a majority vote of all its members, grant a leave of absence to not more than three members of such committee, to be designated by the chairman thereof. Application for a leave of absence of such members of a committee shall be made to the House in writing by the chairman thereof, and such application shall give the name of the institution or institutions to be visited and briefly recite the occasion and necessity for visiting the same, together with the names of the committeemen designated for that purpose and the name of the stenographer to accompany said committeemen, if one be necessary. Such application shall immediately, and without debate, be referred to the Committee on Rules, with instructions to report upon the same on the next legislative day. Said members and their stenographer, if any, shall be allowed their actual expenses.

I.

HISTORY.

MINNESOTA.

The greater part, or about two-thirds, of the territory embraced within the boundaries of Minnesota was included in the Louisiana Purchase, ceded to the United States by France in 1803. The remainder of this state, comprising its northeastern third part, lying east of the Mississippi river, was included in the country surrendered from Great Britain by the treaty of 1783, at the end of the Revolutionary War. In 1805 a grant of land nine miles square, at the confluence of the Mississippi and St. Peter (now Minnesota) rivers, was obtained from the Sioux Indians. A military post was established on the grant in 1819, and in 1820 arrangements were made for the erection of a fort, which was completed in 1822 and named Fort Snelling, after the commanding officer, and the grant has ever since been known as the Fort Snelling Reservation. In 1823 the first steamboat ascended the Mississippi as far as Fort Snelling; and annually thereafter one or two trips of steamboats were made to this isolated post for a number of years.

This territory was held by the Chippewa or Ojibway and the Dakota or Sioux Indians, but adventurous pioneers had penetrated into the country along the streams tributary to the Mississippi river, and in 1836 Wisconsin Territory was organized, comprising all the territory west of Lake Michigan, and including within its limits all the country west of the Great Lakes and north of Illinois, the west boundary of the Territory being the Mississippi river.

In 1837 two important treaties were made with the native tribes of Indians. The first one was made by Gov. Henry Dodge of Wisconsin, with the Ojibways, at Fort Snelling, on the twenty-ninth of July of that year, whereby they ceded to the United States all their pine or agricultural lands on the St. Croix river and its tributaries.

On the twenty-ninth of September of the same year, at the city of Washington, a treaty with the Sioux was made by Joel R. Poinsett, a special commissioner representing the United States, and about twenty chiefs, accompanied by Major Taliaferro, their agent, and Scott Campbell, an interpreter. Through the influence and by the direction of Governor Dodge, this delegation of chiefs had proceeded to Washington for the purpose of making this treaty, by which the Dakotas, or Sioux, ceded to the United States all their lands east of the Mississippi river and all its islands. The Indians were to receive as consideration for the same \$110,000 in cash, to be divided among the mixed bloods, \$90,000 in payment of debts owing by the tribes, and \$300,000 to be invested in five per cent stocks, the interest of which should be paid to them annually.

In 1848 Wisconsin adopted a state constitution, but ignored the enabling act, and made the northern part of the western boundary of the state along the line of the St. Louis and Rum rivers, which was not accepted by the United States government, and the boundary line from the Mississippi river to Lake Superior became fixed, as in the enabling act, on the line of the St. Croix river and in a direct line to the mouth of the St. Louis river.

After the acceptance of the Wisconsin constitution, in May, 1848, the territory north and west of the St. Croix and Mississippi rivers being practically without a government, the Hon. John Catlin, claiming to be still secretary and acting governor of Wisconsin Territory, issued a proclamation for a special election, to elect a delegate to Congress. The election was held October 30th, and Hon. H. H. Sibley was chosen delegate, and after some delay was admitted as such into the Congress of the United States.

On March 3, 1849, Congress passed an act to establish the territorial government of Minnesota. It fixed the seat of government at St. Paul, and established the southern boundary of the territory along the north and west boundary lines of the State of Iowa, from the Mississippi river to the Missouri river, the western boundary through the middle of the channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of the White Earth river, and up the middle of the channel of the White Earth river to the boundary line between the United States and Great Britain, the northern boundary running thence easterly and southeasterly on the international boundary line to Lake Superior, and the eastern boundary running thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the State of Wisconsin, and following the north and west boundary of said state down the St. Croix and Mississippi rivers to the place of beginning. At this time the population of the Territory was mainly in the section east of the Mississippi river, and the settlers almost entirely engaged in lumbering. The territorial government was declared fully organized, June 1, 1849, by Hon. Alexander Ramsey, who had been appointed first territorial governor. The year 1848 was noted as the year of excitement from the discovery of gold in California, and the eyes of many thousands of people throughout the east were turned westward, where opportunities were opening for the growth of new states. Although at the organization of the Territory there were scarcely a thousand people, within a year the census of 1850 gave to the Territory a population of 6,077. Of this number, however, 1,131 residents were credited to the northernmost part of the Territory on the Red River of the North, many of these being half-breeds, and the early pioneers engaged in the fur trade, brought there through the influence of the Hudson Bay Company.

The first territorial election was held on the first day of August, 1849.

The first session of the territorial legislature commenced in St. Paul, Sept. 3, 1849, during which counties were established and a code of laws enacted. The second session was commenced in January, 1851, at which time the capitol was located at St. Paul, the university at St. Anthony, and the state prison at Stillwater.

In 1851 three treaties were made with the Sioux and with the Ojibway bands of Indians, whereby large tracts of lands were relinquished to the United States.

In view of the great extent of country desired, and the importance of the transaction, and the long continued friendship of the Dakota nation, President Fillmore departed from the usual mode of appointing commissioners, and deputed the Hon. Luke Lea, the commissioner of Indian affairs, and Gov. Alexander Ramsey to meet the representatives of the Dakotas, and to conclude with them a treaty for such lands as they might be willing to sell.

On the twenty-seventh of June, 1851, Commissioner Lea arrived in St Paul on the Steamboat Excelsior, and on the twenty-ninth he, in company with Governor Ramsey, landed at Traverse des Sioux, where the great council was to be held and the treaty consummated with the Sisseton and Wahpeton bands of Sioux. Great delay in the proceedings was caused by the non-arrival of certain Sioux chiefs from the upper country, and it was not until the eighteenth of July that the council convened and the preliminaries to the treaty commenced. During this interval of about twenty days they all entertained themselves as best they could with races, dances, suppers, sham fights, and all sorts of fun.

On the eighteenth of July, all the chiefs having arrived, proclamation was made, and being convened in grand council and the pipe of peace having been passed around, the council was opened by an address from Governor Ramsey. On the twenty-third of July the treaty was concluded and signed by the chiefs, by which they ceded to the United States all the lands claimed by these bands east of the Sioux Wood (or Bois des Sioux), and Big Sioux rivers and Lake Traverse to the Mississippi, excepting a reservation one hundred miles long by twenty miles wide, on the upper part of the Minnesota river. By this treaty the Indians were to remove within two years to the reservation; to receive from our government, after removal \$275,000, to enable them to settle up their affairs and to become established in their new home; and \$30,000 was to be expended in breaking land, erecting mills and establishing a manual labor school. They were also to receive for fifty years from that time, an annuity of \$68,000, payable as follows: cash, \$40,000; civilization fund, \$12,000; goods and provisions, \$10,000; education fund, \$6,000.

About a week later on the twenty-ninth of July, Governor Ramsey and Commissioner Lea met the chiefs and leading men of the Medawakanton and Wahpay-koo-tay bands of Sioux at a grand council at Mendota, to negotiate another treaty for the sale of other lands, which was concluded on the fifth of August, being signed by sixty-four chiefs, head men and warriors. In the treaty these bands of Indians ceded and relinquished all their lands in the Territory of Minnesota and State of Iowa, and in consideration thereof the United States was to reserve for them a tract of the average width of ten miles on either side of the Minnesota river, and bounded on the west by the Tehay-tam-bay and Yellow Medicine rivers, on the east by the Little Rock river, and a line running due south

from its mouth to the Waraju river; and to pay them the following sums of money: For settling debts and aid in removal, \$220,000; for erection of buildings and opening farms, \$30,000; civilization fund, to be paid annually, \$12,000; educational fund, paid annually, \$6,000; goods and provisions, annually, \$10,000; cash, \$30,000. The annuities were to continue for fifty years from the date of the treaty.

These two treaties of 1851 at Traverse des Sioux and Mendota acquired for white settlement nearly 24,000,000 acres of the finest lands in the world. The cessions were mostly in Minnesota, but included about an eighth part, or nearly 3,000,000 acres, in the State of Iowa, between the line of the old "neutral ground" and the northern and western boundaries of the State. That tract of country, and generally all lands in Iowa, claimed by the Sioux, were therefore embraced in the articles of cession of both treaties.

The Senate of the United States, on the twenty-third of June, 1852, ratified the treaties, with amendments to each, which amendments were subsequently accepted by the Indians, and on the twenty-fourth of February, 1853, President Millard Fillmore issued his proclamation accepting, ratifying, and confirming each of the said treaties as amended. The total lands in the present State of Minnesota relinquished to the government by these treaties exceeded 19,000,000 acres; and they also ceded about 1,750,000 acres in South Dakota, besides the tract described in Iowa.

The third treaty of 1851 was effected by Governor Ramsey with the Red Lake and Pembina bands of Ojibways at Pembina, by which they ceded certain territory, sixty-five miles in width by one hundred and fifty miles in length, intersected by the Red River of the North. This treaty was not ratified by the government.

After the ratification of the treaties with the Sioux, a great wave of immigration set in from all the eastern states, and an era of speculation started which probably has never been excelled in any portion of the west. A census taken in 1857 gave a population of 150,037.

Notwithstanding there was an abundant supply of good land outside of the limits of the land ceded under these treaties, the adventurous spirit of the pioneers led many of them to settle on the extreme limits of the grant, and in immediate proximity to the Indian settlements. In the southwestern portion of the State, particularly, settlements were made close to the boundary line of Iowa and north and west of Spirit Lake. Some were in Iowa and some were in Minnesota, and all were within the jurisdiction of the Indian agent resident in the Territory of Minnesota. Although the Indians were living on the reservation lands west of these settlements, in their hunting expeditions they were accustomed to return to the ceded lands. In a general way the Indians were civil, and committed only petty depredations; but their visits were at times annoying. Among the Indians there was a single band, under the leadership of Ink-pa-du-ta, or the Scarlet Point, of about fifteen lodges, which had been for many years an independent band and of a thieving, vagabondish character (really outlaws from the Sioux nation, and not represented in the treaties of 1851), who

had taken possession of a strip of land running on both sides of the boundary lines of Iowa and Minnesota, and extending to the Missouri river. In March, 1857, a few of these Indians were hunting in the neighborhood of Rock river, and one of them was bitten by a dog belonging to a white man. The dog was killed by the Indian, and in return the owner of the dog made an assault upon the Indian, and afterward gathered his neighbors, and they went to the Indian camp and disarmed them. The arms were afterward returned to them, and the party moved northeast, arriving at the Spirit Lake settlement about the sixth of March, where they massacred the men and took four women into captivity. Other settlements were attacked, and altogether forty-two settlers were killed. Two of the women were afterward rescued through the efforts of Hon. Charles E. Flandrau, then the Indian agent. An effort was made to punish this band of savages, but all escaped except the oldest son of Ink-pa-du-ta, who had ventured into the camp of other Sioux, near the agency, and was killed in an attempt to capture him.

In 1855 and 1856 town-site speculation became the absorbing thought; and when the panic of 1857 set in, Minnesota was soon in a deplorable condition. The demand for an extensive railroad system and a state government had originated in the flush times of 1856 and 1857, and on Feb. 26, 1857, Congress passed an act authorizing a constitutional convention, and granting a large amount of lands in aid of public schools. On March 3, 1857, an act of Congress was approved making a large grant of lands in aid of railroads.

The election of members of the constitutional convention was held June 1, 1857, and the result was an almost equal division representing the Democratic and Republican parties. So close was this division, and there being some contested seats, when the convention assembled, on July 13, two distinct organizations were made, each proceeding to frame a constitution, but finally, by conference committees, they united in one document, which was submitted to a vote of the people on October 13, and was adopted almost unanimously. By this constitution the boundaries of the State were changed on the west, making the Red River of the North the line, up to the Bois des Sioux, and thence extending along that river and through Lake Traverse and Big Stone lake, and by a direct south line to the north boundary of Iowa.

This constitution provided for an election of State officers at the same time of voting upon the adoption of the constitution, resulting, by a close vote, in the election of the Democratic nominees. The first State legislature was convened on the 2d of December, 1857, and continued in session until March 25, 1858, when a recess was taken until after the State should be admitted. Some doubts were raised as to the legality of the acts of the legislature previous to admission by Congress. The act of admission was passed and approved May 11, 1858. The legislature again assembled in June, and finally adjourned Aug. 12, 1858. During this prolonged session the embryo State was without funds, and a loan of \$250,000 was authorized; but as the acts of the legislature before admission were somewhat irregular, the loan could not be readily negotiated. To tide over the

difficulty State warrants were issued in the form of bank notes, and passed current, with more or less discount, until the summer of 1858, when they were redeemed from the proceeds of the loan consummated after the admission of the State.

The first legislature worked diligently in what they considered the best interest of the State, and as the grant of lands by the United States in aid of railroads within the State had to be turned over to companies, a large part of the session was devoted to railroad legislation. The scheme of further aid to companies who might be willing to undertake the building of railroads was originated, and was commonly denominated the "Five Million Loan Bill," contemplating the loan of the credit of the State, to that amount, in such sums as would be paid upon the grading and final completion of certain miles of road. On a submission of this law to the people it was adopted by a large majority. The opposition at the time of the vote upon this measure was very bitter, and continued after bonds were being issued, and with the dissatisfaction arising from the small amount of work completed and the large amount of bonds issued, threatenings of repudiation advocated by leading men in the State caused a distrust in financial circles and a final collapse of the whole scheme, with the foreclosure of the mortgages taken by the State upon the railroad lands and franchises, and the abandonment of all railroad construction for the time being. The total amount of bonds issued under this provision of the constitution was \$2,275,000. By the foreclosure proceedings the State acquired about 250 miles of graded road, the franchises of the companies and the lands, amounting to five million of acres, as indemnity for this issue of bonds. Notwithstanding the State had acquired all the rights, including the improvements of the railroad companies, the feeling against any settlement of the bonds was strong enough to secure an amendment to the constitution in 1860, prohibiting the passage of any law levying a tax or making other provision for the payment of the principal or interest of these bonds without having the same submitted to a vote of the people and adopted.

The two years following the crash of 1857 were replete with financial disaster and a shrinkage of inflated values in town-sites; but the country was filling up with farmers, and the rich soil of the State was giving abundant harvests.

The political contest of 1859 was bitter, and resulted in the Republican party carrying the State, both for State officers and the legislature.

The census of 1860 gave the State a population of 172,023. During this year there was great hope of a largely increased immigration into the country; but the political situation in the Union, starting with the opening of the presidential campaign of that year, soon indicated a disturbing element throughout the country, and distrust and depression were manifest on all sides, which was not allayed by the result of the presidential election. The war period, commencing with the time of the president's proclamation in April, 1861, to the final close of the rebellion in 1865, did not permit any material growth in the State. About twenty-two thousand of her able-bodied citizens volunteered and were enlisted in the Union army.

The Indian reservation set apart by the treaties of 1851, a tract twenty miles wide on the upper part of the Minnesota river, embracing some of the finest lands in the State, was becoming a barrier to settlements in the upper Minnesota valley. Settlers had taken lands close up to the reservation, and there was considerable complaint that Indians were coming off the reservation and committing petty depredations, and the Indians had more or less complaints to make regarding the extortions practiced by the post traders. The encroachments of the whites were viewed with suspicion by the Indians, and sooner or later, from these causes alone, a conflict would probably have occurred. The War of the Rebellion, calling away so many of the able-bodied men of the State, left the frontier settlements almost defenseless, and doubtless caused the younger portion of the tribes to become more offensive to the settlers and more exacting in their demands.

The lands embraced within the reservation under the treaties of 1851 were in the very heart of Minnesota, and, considering the forests and streams, were the choicest of farming lands. The settlers on the border were anxiously coveting this Garden of Eden. A sentiment was created throughout the State that the Indians should abandon the tribal relations and become civilized. To this end the head men of the Dakota nation were induced, in 1858, to go to Washington, under the charge of Hon. Joseph R. Brown, in whom they had great confidence, for the purpose of negotiating for the whole or a part of this reservation. Treaties were signed ceding the ten-mile strip on the north side of the river, upon the payment of \$140,000, and the government provided that every head of a family or single person over the age of twenty-one adopting a civilized life should secure in fee eighty acres of land. From some cause the payments of \$140,000 were never made, and there was great dissatisfaction on account of this treaty, among those of the tribes who were adverse to accepting the condition of civilization; and from the fact that there was no money divided among them on account of this relinquishment, a bitter dissension arose between the older chiefs and the younger members, the latter claiming that they had been robbed either by the chiefs or by the government, and they proposed to have the settlement, peaceful or otherwise.

This internal strife was augmented from year to year by the withdrawal of families who were willing to accept the civilization fund, the number in three years succeeding the treaty amounting to one hundred and sixty persons. They were, however, still annuity Indians, and claimed the right to be heard in the councils. The annuity Indians, all told, numbered about six thousand two hundred, and the annual cash payment to each person amounted to about fifteen dollars. The Indians were treated as wards of the United States. Two agencies were established, around which were gathered storekeepers to sell the Indians goods in anticipation of the annuity payments; and, usually, the annual payment was simply a settlement of the claims of the traders, who took the risk of furnishing the goods in

advance. That there was injustice practiced upon the Indians is doubtless true; probably not so great as the disaffected Indians imagined. There was enough, however, to make the time of the annual payment an anxious period, for fear of an outbreak. The failure of the government in its attempt to punish the Spirit Lake murderers had a tendency to create a feeling among the leaders of the rebellious spirit that if they could only unite the whole body of Sioux in an uprising they could make a successful attack upon the settlers, and perhaps regain the lands formerly held by the Indians. The War of the Rebellion, starting in 1861, gave renewed energy to the discontent. The Indians were well aware of the reverses of the Union forces during the first year of the war. The calls for troops were taking the able-bodied men from the farms, and many of the half-breeds had volunteered for the army. All these conditions had a disquieting effect, and, added to this, in 1862 the June payment was not made; and as there was no satisfactory answer for the delay, the traders took advantage of the necessities of the Indians and insinuated that perhaps the government would go to pieces, and there would be no further payments. The missionaries endeavored to counteract these evil influences, and, with the aid of the civilized Indians, succeeded in averting deliberate outbreak. The delay in payment of annuities, however, tended to keep up the discontent, particularly among the younger braves, who were the hunters. Their vagabond life brought them into the settlements, and in contact with the whites; and their worthless, lazy habits made them offensive to the families, as beggars of meals or money, or anything that took their fancy.

These are, in brief, the circumstances which led up to the great massacre of 1862, which for a short time threatened the lives of all the settlers on the western boundary of the State. There was no concerted action for the massacre, and to some extent there is an uncertainty as to why the first murders were committed. Four young men or boys are believed to have commenced the massacre, in a spirit of bravado, making a threatening attack first upon a family, driving them from their home, and afterward following them to a neighbor's house, where, after an altercation with the families, they killed three men and two women. These occurrences took place on the seventeenth of August, in the township of Acton, twelve miles west of Litchfield. Realizing that if they remained in the vicinity punishment would soon overtake their murderous acts, they lost no time in going back to camp, relating what they had done, and asking protection. A hasty consultation was had between two of the chiefs; they realized that the murderers must be given up, or the annuities would be stopped, and a war of extermination would be inaugurated. They chose to stand by the murderers, and immediately following there was a general uprising of the entire Sioux bands. So swift were their movements, before any effective resistance could be brought against them, that about eight hundred of the settlers, men, women and children were murdered within a few days. The prompt action of the State authorities, aided by the national government, resulted in the capture of about 2,000 of the belligerent Indians and the withdrawal of the remainder beyond the boundaries of the State, into the wilds of Dakota. Of the captured Indians 303 were found guilty of murder and rape,

and were condemned to death by a military court martial. Of this number 265 were reprieved by President Lincoln, and the remainder, thirty-eight of the most prominent engaged in the massacre, were hung in Mankato on the 26th of December, 1862. The next year the general government authorized an expedition against the Indians who had escaped to the Dakota plains, because of their constant raids in small squads on the frontiers of the State for the purpose of horse-stealing and marauding upon adventurous settlers who might risk going back to their abandoned farms. After two decisive encounters, the Indians retreated beyond the Missouri river, and in 1864 another expedition was sent forward and a final settlement of the Sioux outbreak was accomplished, by a confiscation and surrender of the ponies and arms of most of the bands hostile to the government.

The several tribes of Sioux Indians were engaged in this massacre, and were the representatives of the tribes that had made the cession of lands in 1851, under the first and second treaties of that year. Under these treaties the government had set aside trust funds of \$2,520,000, from which there was paid annually the sum of \$126,000. Settlers who had lost property urged their claims for indemnity, and Congress promptly established a commission to receive all claims and investigate the facts. The commission was duly organized and established headquarters in the city of St. Paul, and carefully examined all the claims presented. The total number filed was 2,940, with damages amounting to \$2,458,795.16. The commission allowed 2,635 claims, and cut down the damages to \$1,370,374. By act of Congress these claims were paid, and the annuities and all further payments to the tribes were stopped. The State was also reimbursed for extraordinary expenses incurred during the period of insurrection.

On the second of October, 1863, a treaty was concluded at the old crossing of Red Lake river, about twelve miles east of the present city of Crookston, by Alexander Ramsey and Ashley C. Morrill, and the chiefs and head men of the Red Lake and Pembina bands of Ojibway Indians, for the cession of a large tract of country, being the same land embraced in one of the treaties of 1851, but not ratified at that time, of which the boundaries are as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the national boundary with the Lake of the Woods; thence in a southwest direction to the head of Thief river; thence following that stream to its mouth; thence southeasterly in a direct line toward the head of Wild Rice river; and thence following the boundary of the Pillager cession of 1855 to the mouth of said river; thence up the channel of the Red river to the mouth of the Sheyenne; thence up said river to Stump lake, near the eastern extremity of Devil's lake; thence north to the international boundary; and thence east on said boundary to the place of beginning. It embraced all of the Red River valley in Minnesota and Dakota, except a small portion previously ceded, and was estimated to contain 11,000,000 acres. This treaty was ratified by the Senate, with amendments, March 1, 1864. The Indians, on the 12th of April, 1864, assented to the amendments, and President Lincoln, by his proclamation of the 5th of May, 1864, confirmed the treaty.

The close of the Civil War in the spring of 1865, and the return of the soldiers, and the assurance of no further depredations from the Sioux Indians, started a new era of prosperity and rapid growth. The legislature, in the meantime, had granted charters on the foreclosed roadbeds and lands to new railroad companies, and the construction of roads was furnishing abundant labor to all who were coming to the State. The population at this time was 250,099, and in 1870 the population had increased to 439,706, nearly doubling in five years. The railroad companies had within the same period constructed nearly 1,000 miles of railroad, and continued their building with even greater vigor until the financial crisis of 1873 brought all public enterprises again to a stand, and produced stagnation in all the growing towns. The farmers had been active in developing the country, and were adding largely to the productions of the state when the grasshopper raids, for the time being, destroyed the growing crops, and caused great financial distress for two or three years.

The census of 1875 gave the State a population of 597,407, still showing a fair increase, but small in comparison with the five years following the close of the rebellion. By 1878 the State had fairly recovered from the financial crash of 1873, but speculation has at no time since 1878 been so reckless as during the two periods ending in 1857 and 1873.

Along with the prosperity of the State, caused so largely by the rapid railroad building, the State pride began to assert itself with more force, and the prominent citizens continued to urge an adjustment of the dishonored railroad bonds. In 1877, a proposition setting aside the proceeds of 500,000 acres for internal improvement lands in settlement was by act of the legislature submitted to a vote at a special election called for the 12th of June, and was voted down by the decisive vote of 59,176 against, to 17,324 votes for, the proposition. This vote was largely owing to the fact that the State at that time had almost an entire new population that had come into the State long after the bonds were issued and had no definite knowledge of the history of the original indebtedness.

In 1881, the legislature enacted a law providing for the adjustment of these bonds, and designating the judges of the supreme court as a commission to make the settlement. The constitutionality of this law was questioned, a writ of injunction was served, and the final determination of the supreme bench was that the law was unconstitutional, as also the amendment of 1860, prohibiting any settlement without a vote of the people. This latter act had previously been determined unconstitutional by the supreme court of the United States. An extra session of the legislature was called in October of the same year, when the final adjustment was authorized by act of the legislature, on a basis of fifty per cent of the amount nominally due, and, after a careful examination of all the claims presented, the bond question was forever set at rest by the issue of adjustment bonds, to the amount of \$4,282,000, to parties entitled to receive them. For the payment of these bonds the proposition of setting aside the proceeds of the 500,000 acres of internal improvement lands was again submitted at the general election in 1881, and by a vote of 82,435 votes in

favor, and 24,526 votes against, the action of the legislature was ratified and the stigma of repudiation removed, which had been fastened upon the State by the popular vote of 1877.

In 1880, the national census gave us a population of 780,773, and the state census of 1885 swelled these figures to 1,117,798, indicating the extraordinary growth of forty-three per cent; but an examination of the figures shows us that the growth was mainly confined to the cities, being nearly eighty per cent of increase, while in the farming community and small towns the percentage of increase was only twenty per cent.

During the ten years between 1880 and 1890 there was a period of great activity in railroad building, and 2,310 miles of road were put in operation. This alone gave great energy to the business of the State, and caused a large increase in the population of the cities, and gradually culminated in a most extravagant real estate boom, and an era of the wildest speculation. In the country the growth was normal over the entire State, although large numbers of farmers in the southern half of the State were attracted to the plains of Dakota, where great activity was being developed by the pushing of railroads into different sections of the territory.

The settlement of the Dakotas and the consequent breaking up of the virgin land, after the year 1885, almost doubled the wheat yield of the north-western states, so that the farmers of Minnesota were soon confronted with the question whether wheat should continue to be their leading staple. In the southern part of the State the wheat return was not enough per acre to yield any profit to the farmer at the reduced prices; and gradually methods have changed, so that the leading agricultural industries now include dairying, stock raising, and a general diversified farming. It seems probable that Minnesota will hold her place as the greatest wheat-producing state, and will also earn a greater reputation as the best all-round farming state in the Union.

The national census of 1890 gave us a population of 1,301,826, an increase of 184,028 in five years, of which amount about 70,000 increase went to the cities and 114,000 to the country districts, showing eighteen per cent increase in the cities and fifteen per cent increase in the country. The state census of 1895 showed an increase of 272,793, or 21.95 per cent, in the preceding five years, giving a total population of 1,574,619.

Minnesota was the first state of the Union to respond to the call of the president for volunteers at the beginning of the war with Spain, in April, 1898. Three regiments, designated as the Twelfth, Thirteenth and Fourteenth Regiments of Minnesota Volunteers, were mobilized at St. Paul, April 29th, and were mustered into the United States service May 7th and 8th. The Fifteenth Regiment was mustered into service, July 18th. In total this State furnished 5,315 officers and enlisted men for the volunteer army. At the close of the war the Twelfth and Fourteenth Regiments returned to Minnesota, and were mustered out of service in November. The Fifteenth Regiment continued in service until March 27, 1899; and the Thirteenth Regiment, after more than a year of service in the Philippine Islands, was mustered out October 3, 1899.

According to the last national census, the population of Minnesota, June 1, 1900, was 1,751,394, showing an increase of 34.5 per cent during the preceding decade.

The enumeration five years later, by the latest State census, June 1, 1905, was 1,979,912, the increase during the five years being 13 per cent. The population of the five largest cities was as follows: Minneapolis, 261,974; St. Paul, 197,023; Duluth, 64,942; Winona, 20,334; and Stillwater, 12,435.

CHRONOLOGICAL.

1635. Jean Nicollet, an explorer from France, who had wintered in the neighborhood of Green Bay, brought to Montreal the first mention of the aborigines of Minnesota.
- 1659-60. Groselliers and Radisson wintered among the Sioux of the Mille Lacs region, Minnesota, being its first white explorers. In a previous expedition, four years earlier, they are thought to have come to Prairie Island, west of the main channel of the Mississippi, between Red Wing and Hastings.
1661. Father Rene Menard left Kewennaw, on Lake Superior, to visit the Hurons, then in northern Wisconsin, and was lost near the sources of the Black and Chippewa rivers. His breviary and cassock were said to have been found among the Sioux.
1679. July 2d, Daniel Greyselon Du Lhut (Duluth) held a council with the Sioux at their principal settlement on the shore of Mille Lacs. Du Lhut, in June, 1680, by way of the St. Croix river, reached the Mississippi and met Hennepin.
1680. Louis Hennepin, after captivity in the village of the Mille Lacs Sioux, first saw the Falls of St. Anthony.
1689. May 8th, Nicholas Perrot, at his Fort St. Antoine, on the Wisconsin shore of Lake Pepin, laid formal claim to the surrounding country for France. He built a fort also on the Minnesota shore of this lake, near its outlet.
1695. Le Sueur built a fort or trading post on Isle Pelee, now called Prairie Island, above Lake Pepin.
1700. Le Sueur established Fort L'Huillier, on the Blue Earth river (near the mouth of the Le Sueur), and first supplied the Sioux with firearms.
1727. The French established a third fort on Lake Pepin, with Sieur de La Perriere as commander.
1728. Great flood in the Mississippi.
1763. By the treaty of Versailles, France ceded Minnesota, east of the Mississippi, to England, and west of it to Spain.
1766. Captain Jonathan Carver visited St. Anthony falls and Minnesota river. He claimed to have made a treaty with the Indians the following spring, in a cave afterward called "Carver's Cave," within the present limits of St. Paul, at which he said they ceded to him an immense tract of land, long known as "Carver's Claim," but never recognized by government.

1796. Laws of the Ordinance of 1787 extended over the Northwest Territory, including the northeastern third of Minnesota, east of the Mississippi river.
- 1798-99. The Northwestern Fur Company established itself in Minnesota.
1800. May 7th, that part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi became a part of Indiana by the division of Ohio.
1803. April 30th, that part of Minnesota west of the Mississippi, for the preceding forty years in possession of Spain as a part of Louisiana, was ceded to the United States by Napoleon Bonaparte, who had just obtained it from Spain.
- 1803-04. William Morrison, the first known white man to discover the source of the Mississippi river, visited Elk lake and explored the streams entering into the lake forming the head of the river.
1805. Lieut. Z. M. Pike visited Minnesota to establish government relations there, and obtained the Fort Snelling reservation from the Dakotas.
1812. The Dakotas, Ojibways, and Winnebagoes, under the lead of hostile traders, joined the British during the war. Red river colony established by Lord Selkirk.
1819. Minnesota, east of the Mississippi river, became a part of Crawford county, Michigan. Fort Snelling established, and a post at Mendota occupied by troops, under command of Col. Leavenworth. Maj. L. Tallaferro appointed Indian agent, arriving April 19th.
1820. Corner stone of Fort Snelling laid September 10th. Gov. Cass visits Minnesota and makes a treaty of peace between the Sioux and Ojibways at Fort Snelling. Col. Josiah Snelling appointed to the command of the latter post.
1823. The first steamboat arrived at Mendota, May 10th, Maj. Tallaferro and Beltrami being passengers. Maj. Stephen H. Long explored Minnesota river, the Red river valley, and the northern frontier. Beltrami explored sources of the Mississippi.
1826. Great flood on the Red river; a part of the colony driven to Minnesota, settling near Fort Snelling.
1832. Schoolcraft explored sources of Mississippi river, and named Lake Itasca (formerly called Elk lake).
1833. First mission established at Leech lake by Rev. W. T. Boutwell.
1834. The portion of Minnesota west of the Mississippi attached to Michigan. Gen. H. H. Sibley settled at Mendota.
1835. Catlin and Featherstonhaugh visited Minnesota.
1836. The territory of Wisconsin organized, embracing the part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi, the part on the west being attached to Iowa. Nicollet visited Minnesota.
1837. Gov. Dodge, of Wisconsin, made a treaty at Fort Snelling, with the Ojibways, by which the latter ceded all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries; a treaty was also effected at Washington with a deputation of Dakotas for their lands east of the Mississippi. These treaties led the way to the first actual settlements within the area of Minnesota.

1838. The treaty ratified by Congress. Franklin Steele makes a claim at St. Anthony falls. Pierre Parrant makes a claim and builds a shanty on the present site of St. Paul.
1839. St. Croix county established.
1841. The "Chapel of St. Paul" built and consecrated, giving the name to the future capital of the State.
1843. Stillwater settled.
1846. August 6th, the Wisconsin enabling act.
1847. The Wisconsin constitutional convention meets. The town of St. Paul surveyed, platted and recorded in St. Croix county register of deeds' office. First improvement of the water power at the Falls of St. Anthony.
1848. May 29th, Wisconsin admitted, leaving the area of Minnesota without a government. August 26th, the "Stillwater convention" held, taking measures for a separate territorial organization, and asking that the new Territory be named Minnesota. October 30th, H. H. Sibley elected delegate to Congress.
1849. January 15th, H. H. Sibley admitted to a seat. March 3d, the bill organizing Minnesota passed. March 19th, its territorial officers appointed. June 1st, Gov. Ramsey declared, by proclamation, the Territory organized. September 3d, the first territorial legislature assembled.
1850. Great flood this year; highest water ever known. Minnesota river first navigated by steamboats. Census shows 6,077 inhabitants.
1851. Location of the capital, university, and penitentiary; another flood. July 23d, treaty of Traverse des Sioux completed and August 5th the treaty of Mendota, opening the territory west of the Mississippi to settlers.
1852. June 23d, the treaties ratified by the United States Senate.
1853. Pierce's administration. W. A. Gorman appointed governor. The capitol building completed.
1854. Celebration of the opening of the Rock Island railroad, the first road to the Mississippi river, by a mammoth excursion, reaching St. Paul June 8th. Large immigration this season and the three succeeding ones, and the real estate mania commences.
1857. Enabling act passes Congress February 26th. Gov. Samuel Medary (appointed by Buchanan), arrives on April 22d. Legislature passes a bill to remove the capital to St. Peter, but it fails to accomplish the object. Ink-pa-du-ta massacre, April. Land grant passes Congress. April 27th, extra session of the legislature to apportion land grant. July 13th, constitutional convention assembles. Real estate speculation reaches its height, and is checked by the financial panic, August 27th. Great revulsions and hard times. Census shows 150,037 population. October 13th, constitution adopted and State officers elected.

- 1858. State loan of \$250,000 negotiated. Five million loan bill passed by the legislature, March 9th; ratified by vote of the people, April 15th. Great stringency in money market. State admitted May 11th. State officers sworn in, May 24th.
- 1859. Hard times continue to intensify. "Wright County War." "Glencoe" and "Owatonna" money issued. Work on the land grant road ceases. Collapse of the five million scheme. First export of grain this fall. Hard political struggle; the Republicans triumph.
- 1860. Another warm political canvass. Federal census, 172,023.
- 1861. April 15th, president's proclamation for troops received; the first regiment recruits at once; June 22d, it embarks at Fort Snelling for the seat of war.
- 1862. Call for 600,000 men. August 17th, massacre at Acton; August 18th, outbreak at Lower Sioux Agency, eight miles east of Redwood Falls; 19th, New Ulm attacked; 20th, Fort Ridgely attacked; 25th, second attack on New Ulm; 30th, Fort Abercrombie besieged; September 2d, the bloody attack at Birch Coulee. September 19th, first railroad in Minnesota in operation, between St. Paul and Minneapolis. September 23d, battle of Wood Lake; 26th, captives surrendered at Camp Release; military commission tries 321 Indians for murder, rape, etc.; 303 condemned to die; December 26th, 38 hung at Mankato.
- 1863. General Sibley's expedition to the Missouri river; July 3d, Little Crow killed; July 24th, battle of Big Mound; July 26th, battle of Dead Buffalo Lake; July 28th, battle of Stony Lake.
- 1864. Large levies for troops. Expedition to Missouri river, under Sully. Inflation of money market. Occasional Indian raids.
- 1865. Peace returns. Minnesota regiments return and are disbanded. In all 22,016 troops furnished by the State. Census shows 250,099 inhabitants.
- 1866-72. Rapid railroad building everywhere; immigration heavy; "good times" prevail, and the real estate inflated.
- 1873. January 7th, 8th, and 9th, polar wave sweeps over the State; seventy persons perish. September, the Jay Coke failure creates another panic. Grasshopper raid begins and continues five seasons.
- 1876. September 7th, attack on bank at Northfield by a gang of armed outlaws from Missouri; three of the latter killed and three captured.
- 1877. Biennial session amendment adopted.
- 1878. May 2d, three flouring mills at Minneapolis explode; eighteen lives lost.
- 1880. November 15th, portion of the hospital for the insane at St. Peter destroyed by fire; eighteen inmates burned to death, seven died subsequently of injuries and fright, and six missing; total loss, \$150,000.
- 1881. March 1st, the state capitol destroyed by fire.
- 1884. January 25th, state prison partially burned.

1886. April 14th, a tornado strikes the cities of St. Cloud and Sauk Rapids, demolishing scores of buildings and killing about seventy people.
1887. Important legislation regarding the liquor traffic, common carriers, and elections.
1889. The legislature enacts the Australian system of voting in cities of 10,000 and over. The first electric street railway started in the State at Stillwater.
1890. United States census shows a population of 1,301,826. July 13th, an excursion steamboat returning from Lake City encampment foundered on Lake Pepin, and 100 people were drowned. July 13th, a tornado swept across Lake Gervais, in Ramsey county, demolishing several buildings and killing six people.
1891. June 15th, a series of tornadoes started in Jackson county, near the town of Jackson, traversing Martin, Faribault, Freeborn, Mower and Fillmore counties, on a line nearly parallel with, but from five to fifteen miles north of, the Southern Minnesota division of the Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, doing a large amount of damages to farms and farm buildings, and causing death to about fifty people along the track of the storm.
1892. June 7th, national convention (Rep.) held at Minneapolis. The Australian system of voting used at the November general election.
1893. The legislature authorizes the appointment of a capitol commission to select a site for a new capitol, and providing a tax of two-tenths of a mill for ten years to pay for the site and the erection of a building. A great financial crisis causes the failure of several banks and many mercantile and manufacturing establishments in the larger cities of the State.
1894. September 1st, forest fires start in the neighborhood of Hinckley, in Pine county, carrying death and destruction over nearly four hundred square miles of territory, destroying the towns of Hinckley and Sandstone, causing the death of four hundred and seventeen people, rendering homeless and destitute twenty-two hundred men, women and children, and entailing a property loss of about one million dollars.
1895. A census of the State was taken during the month of June, and the total population of the State was found to be 1,574,619.
1896. The Red Lake Indian reservation was diminished to about a quarter part of its former area, and on May 15th a large tract of agricultural and timber lands formerly belonging to that reservation was opened for settlement.
1897. July 2d, the monument at Gettysburg to the First Minnesota Regiment was dedicated.
1898. July 27th, the corner stone of the new capitol was laid. Minnesota supplied four regiments for service in the Spanish war, being the first state, May 7th, to respond to the President's call. October 5th, the Pillager Indians attacked United States troops near Sugar Point, Leech lake,

1899. Semi-centennial of the Territory and State celebrated by the Old Settlers' Association, June 1st, and by the Historical Society, November 15th.
1900. Population of Minnesota, shown by the national census, 1,751,394. Death of Senator C. K. Davis, November 27th.
1901. In the Pan-American Exposition, at Buffalo, N. Y., the superior exhibits of wheat, flour, and dairy products of Minnesota caused her to be called "the Bread and Butter State."
1902. August 23rd, the fortieth anniversary of the Sioux war celebrated at New Ulm. Monuments and tablets erected there and at other places in the Minnesota valley.
1903. Tide of immigration into Minnesota, particularly in northern and western sections. April 22d, death of Alexander Ramsey, first territorial governor, later governor of the state, United States senator, and secretary of war.
1904. Louisiana Purchase Exposition. Minnesota exhibits win many first prizes for flour, butter, fruits, iron ores, work of pupils in schools, etc.
1905. January 3d, legislature convenes in the new capitol. The population, according to the State census, June 1st, was 1,979,912.
1906. September 3d, Live Stock Amphitheater on the State Fair ground dedicated, with address by James J. Hill. Attendance at the Fair on that day, 93,199; during the week, 295,000.
1907. Folwell Hall, the new main building for the College of Science, Literature and Arts, of the University of Minnesota, completed at cost of \$410,000 for the building and its equipment. The total number of students of this University enrolled in all departments for the year was 4,145.
1908. The fiftieth anniversary of the admission of Minnesota to statehood was celebrated in connection with the State Fair, its attendance during the week being 326,753.
1909. Death of Gov. John A. Johnson as the result of an operation, at Rochester, Minn., Sept. 21, 1909. Lieut. Gov. Adolph O. Eberhart sworn in as governor by Chief Justice Start, in the Supreme Court retiring room, at 11 o'clock the same day.
1910. Population of Minnesota, shown by the national census, 2,075,708. Death of State Treasurer Clarence C. Dinehart June 8. E. S. Pettijohn appointed to succeed June 11. Forest fires in northern Minnesota during the second and third week in October, results in death to about 30 people and the destruction of about \$20,000,000 of property. Spooner and Baudette wiped out.
1911. The legislature ratified the proposed amendment to the United States Constitution for election of U. S. senators by popular vote. October 18th, George E. Vincent was inaugurated president of the University of Minnesota.
1912. The legislature in special session enacted a new primary election law and "corrupt practices" act. October 19th, the statue of Governor Johnson on the Capitol ground was unveiled.

DESCRIPTIVE

NAME.

Minnesota derives its name from the river which was named "Minisota" by the Dakotas, pronounced "Min-nee-sotah," applied to the stream, in its natural state in the summer season, after the waters were cleared from the roiling caused by the spring floods. Mini, water; sotah, sky-colored. Apparently to secure the correct pronunciation in English letters, the convention called at Stillwater, in 1848, for the purpose of procuring a territorial organization, instructed their delegates to see that the name of the Territory should be written Min-ne-sota.

GEOGRAPHY.

Geographically, Minnesota occupies the exact center of the continent of North America, midway between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, and also midway between Hudson Bay and the Gulf of Mexico. This state is bounded on the south by Iowa, on the west by South and North Dakota, on the north by Manitoba and Ontario, and on the east by Wisconsin. It extends from latitude 43 degrees 30 minutes to 49 degrees 24 minutes, and from 89 degrees 29 minutes to 97 degrees 15 minutes west longitude. From its southern boundary to the northern is about 400 miles, and from its most eastern to the extreme western point about 354 miles. In a foot-note on article 2 of the State constitution the boundaries are fully defined, including a history of the projecting point beyond the forty-ninth parallel, shown upon the map.

AREA.

Minnesota is, in area, the tenth state of the Union. It contains 84,287 square miles, or about 53,943,379 acres, of which 3,608,012 acres are water. In altitude it appears to be one of the highest portions of the continent, as the headwaters of three great river systems are found in its limits, those of streams flowing northward to Hudson bay, eastward to the Atlantic ocean, and southward to the Gulf of Mexico.

About half of this surface, on the south and west, consists of rolling prairie, interspersed with frequent groves, oak openings and belts of hardwood timber, watered by numberless lakes and streams, and covered with a warm, dark soil of great fertility. The rest, embracing the elevated district immediately west and north of Lake Superior, consists mainly of rich mineral ranges and of the pine forests which clothe the headwaters of the Mis-

Mississippi, affording extensive supplies of lumber. There is but a very small percentage of broken, rocky or worthless land in the state. Nearly all is arable.

RIVERS.

Numerous rivers and watercourses give it excellent drainage. But few states are so well watered as Minnesota. Its navigable rivers are the Mississippi, the Minnesota, the St. Croix, the St. Louis, the Red River of the North, and the Red Lake river, all of which, near their sources, have extensive water powers; while a number of smaller streams such as Rum river and Snake river, both valuable for lumbering, the Cannon and Zumbro rivers, the Vermilion, Crow, Blue Earth, Des Moines, Cottonwood, Chippewa, Le Sueur, Root, Elk and Sauk rivers, etc. also furnish fine water powers. These with their tributaries and a host of lesser streams penetrate every portion of the State. Some of the water powers furnished by these streams are among the finest in America, and many of them have been utilized for manufacturing purposes.

LAKES.

The lakes of Minnesota are more numerous and varied in form than in any other state in the Union. Bordering on the northeast corner of the State for one hundred and fifty miles, the waters of the great Lake Superior wash its shores. Within the State there are about ten thousand lakes, the largest of which is Red lake, in the extreme central northern part of the State, bordering partly by dense pine forests, with its overflow through Red Lake river, by a devious course, into the Red River of the North. On the same northern slope, in St. Louis county, is the beautiful Vermillion lake, with its tributaries, at the edge of the great Vermillion iron range, and flowing into Rainy lake, on the northern boundary, and then through Rainy Lake river into the Lake of the Woods, and thence into Lake Winnipeg, and finally into Hudson bay. On the southern slope of the State we have Itasca lake, as the source of the Mississippi, with Cass lake, Lake Winnibigoshish, Leech lake, and other innumerable lakes, all adding volume to the water of the Mississippi, eventually flowing into the Gulf of Mexico. Then we have Mille Lacs, the source of Rum river, and the picturesque Lake Minnetonka. These are the largest lakes in the State. Of these, however, only Minnetonka, White Bear, Bald Eagle and Chisago lakes have so far been much utilized as summer resorts. The incomparable park region, traversed by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads, is the paradise of summer idlers, of hunters and fishermen; but it is not in this portion alone that all the beautiful lakes are found. The northeastern and the southwestern sections each have numerous lakes to attract the summer visitor.

There is an undoubted modification of the climate of the State, caused by these numerous bodies of water, giving a most delightful summer temperature.

Fine varieties of fish are abundant in all these lakes; and the State expends annually thousands of dollars, through a game and fish commission, to improve the varieties, and to prevent their wanton destruction.

ELEVATION.

Surveys with leveling from the sea show that the shore of Lake Superior is the lowest land in the State, 602 feet above sea level. The waters of the northeastern part of the State south of the Mesabi iron range flow into Lake Superior, and are carried to the Atlantic ocean. The Mississippi river, having its chief source in Lake Itasca, at 1,466 feet elevation, runs in a southerly direction, leaving the State at 620 feet above sea level.

The Red River of the North, rising in the north, near Itasca lake, at a height of 1,600 feet above the ocean, after a circuitous route south and west to Breckenridge, in Wilkin county, and then flowing north along its great valley, leaves the State at an elevation of 750 feet. The average elevation of the State is given at about 1,275 feet. The highest elevation is the Misquah hills, in Cook county, 2,230 feet.

CLIMATE.

The elevation of Minnesota above the sea, its fine drainage, and the dryness of the atmosphere give it a climate of unusual salubrity and pleasantness. It has an annual mean temperature of 44 degrees, while its mean summer temperature is 70 degrees, the same as that of middle Illinois and Ohio, southern Pennsylvania, etc. The excessive heats of summer often felt in other states are here tempered by the cooling breezes. Its high latitude gives it correspondingly longer days in summer than states further south, and during the growing season there are two and one-half hours more sunshine than in the latitude of Cincinnati. This, taken in connection with the abundant rainfall of early summer, accounts for the rapid and vigorous growth of crops in Minnesota, and their early maturity. The cool breezes and cool nights in summer prevent the debilitating effects of heat often felt in low latitudes. The winter climate is one of the attractive features of the State. Its uniformity, and prevailing freedom from thaws and excessive spells of cold, severe weather or heavy snow storms, and its dryness, together with the bright sunshine and electrical condition of the air, all tend to enhance the personal comfort of the resident, and make outdoor life and labor a pleasure.

These features tend to make this climate the healthiest in the Union. It gives life and briskness to those performing manual labor, enabling them to do more work than in a damper or duller climate.

STATE PARKS.

ITASCA STATE PARK.

Itasca State Park was established by the Legislature in 1891. Congress acting upon the request of the executive officers of the state, contributed on behalf of the United States all land situated within the limits of the park which had not been granted away prior thereto. The Park is situated chiefly in Clearwater county but includes a strip containing seven sections of land on the east side, in Hubbard county, and four sections on the south, in Becker county. As originally created the Park was seven miles long and five in width. One hundred and sixty acres have been added on the north to include the outlet of the Mississippi river from Lake Itasca, and title thereto has been acquired under condemnation proceedings. A strip of land one-fourth of a mile wide and one and one-half miles long has been added to the Park along the east line, situated in Sections 20 and 29, Township 143, 35. The highway from the new Park house passes over this strip which is heavily wooded with a beautiful stand of Norway pine. The title thereto has not as yet been acquired.

The Park is quite largely timbered with evergreens and deciduous trees, some portions being heavily timbered with beautiful Norway pine. Flora of various kinds abound, including three species of the state flower—the purple, the yellow or Indian, and an intermediate variety.

The Park is now easy of access from Park Rapids, and the park commissioner is amply equipped to furnish accommodations to the public at the new lodge recently erected for the purpose of entertaining the traveling public. This house which was named by ex-Governor Van Sant, "Douglas Lodge," is a log structure consisting of 18 rooms, in part plastered and in part finished in its natural state. Its furnishings are artistic and conveniences for the use of the public modern. It is located in a dense pine forest on a beautiful promontory on the shore of Lake Itasca. The game in the Park has been carefully protected for many years and even the taking of fire-arms therein prohibited. Good fishing exists in the lakes, and wild deer in large numbers can be seen daily by all tourists. Three beaver were placed in the Park a few years ago. Now a number of colonies exist, and their curious work has interested many visitors.

INTERSTATE PARK AT THE DALLES OF THE ST. CROIX.

In 1895 the State of Minnesota, by a legislative act, set aside a tract of about 110 acres in the town of Taylors Falls, Chisago county, as a public park, to be called the State Park of the Dalles of the St. Croix. An act was also passed by the Wisconsin legislature of the same year, which provided a commission to ascertain the probable cost of acquiring a larger tract for a state park on the opposite side of the St. Croix river; and in 1899 and 1901 the State of Wisconsin passed acts for the purchase of lands there, amounting to about 600 acres. The original park on the Minnesota side of the river has been extended to an area of about 150 acres, and plans are under consideration for further extension to a total of about 500 acres in Minnesota. The two states have thus established an Interstate Park, including the grand and picturesque rock gorge called the Upper Dalles of the St. Croix, where the river for a distance of two-thirds of a mile, at and just south of the village of Taylors Falls, flows through a chasm walled by cliffs of rock 75 to 150 feet high.

The first suggestion for devoting this tract of remarkable natural beauty to such public use was made by George H. Hazzard, a pioneer of Minnesota Territory, to members of the Minnesota legislature in 1893. His idea was welcomed with enthusiasm by newspapers, commercial bodies, and the people of the State.

MINNEOPA STATE PARK.

Under Chapter 297, G. L. 1905, provision was made for the purchase of land containing Minneopa Falls, near Mankato, to establish and create a public park, to be known as "The Minneopa State Park." The sum of \$5,000 was appropriated for that purpose. Negotiations for the land, and the perfection of the title consumed much time. On December 4, 1906, the transaction was completed, the title deeds having been duly recorded in the name of the State of Minnesota, and the sum of \$3,500 was paid to the property owner. Under section 3, the general care and supervision of the park, until otherwise provided for, was vested in the state auditor. J. B. Hodge has been appointed superintendent or caretaker of the park.

The Indian word "Minneopa" means water of two falls. Indian lore connects a number of legends with the falls, the names of great Indian chiefs, pow wows and the romantic wooing of the Indian maid.

The state has acquired this beauty spot, and it has been forever dedicated to the use and enjoyment of our people. The park is four miles west of Mankato, easily accessible by railroad and driveways. It includes a tract of about sixty acres, through which runs Minneopa River, the waters of which dash with the beauty of a Minnehaha over a ledge sixty feet to a gorge below. There are two falls, but a few rods apart. The falls are seventy-five feet wide, surrounded by towering hills. The great canyon below the falls is grand and picturesque.

ALEXANDER RAMSEY STATE PARK.

The Ramsey State Park is situated at the junction of the Ramsey creek with Redwood river, just above the point where the Redwood valley opens out into the bottom lands of the Minnesota river, and is adjacent to the town of Redwood Falls in the central southwest portion of the state, 100 miles distant from the Twin Cities.

SCENIC FEATURES.

Although situated outside of the timbered and lake districts and surrounded by the largest prairie area of the state, there is contained in this tract, and in its immediate surroundings, the largest variety of exceptional and strikingly picturesque features to be found in Minnesota or probably in any tract of its size in any state.

The Ramsey falls, at the western end of the tract, similar in appearance and height to Minnehaha, is formed by a perpendicular precipice of solid rock in the path of the stream, while half a mile to the east is the Little falls on the Redwood river, and a few rods around the bend is the Redwood falls, making a group of waterfalls, each being widely different from the others in appearance.

The winding course of the stream is a continuous succession of rapids at the foot of precipitous bluffs and cliffs of great irregular masses of granite, to which cling a profusion of red cedars, with their richly colored evergreen foliage, or are covered with thick growths of mosses, lichens, ferns and trees. The entire tract is covered with timber, most of it being in as wild a state as when first secured by the white settler, and is a succession of abruptly changing views, having in addition to characteristics peculiar to itself, in some parts, similarity to Minnehaha Park, the wooded bluffs of the Mississippi and the Dalles of the St. Croix river.

Near to the centre of the park tract is one of the highest levels along the river, rising to a height of 200 feet above the streams on either side, from which are commanding landscape views of the Ramsey valley, the entire lower Redwood valley, and many miles of Minnesota river bluffs in the farther distance.

SURROUNDINGS.

Adjacent to the Ramsey Park is the city park of Redwood Falls—the two principal features of which are the waterfall from which the town takes its name. and a high, wooded table land and driveway nearly surrounded by and in full view of the most picturesque portions of the Redwood river.

Within ten minutes' walk upstream is Lake Redwood, formed by a concrete dam 30 feet high, making a reservoir extending up the valley four miles, giving opportunity for boating, bathing and fishing.

Following down stream there is a great variety of vari-colored clay cliffs and outcroppings of geologic as well as scenic interest, while along

the zigzag course of the Ramsey creek, above the falls, is an appearance, as if in some distant age the hills and knolls from the surrounding country had been thrown carelessly into a wide deep crevice in the prairie and delightfully overgrown with such profusion of plant and vine and shrub and tree that no other use should be made of it than as a playground for pleasures of this sort. The great variation of levels and exposures and other conditions about this tract has induced nearly every kind of vegetable growth that is native in Minnesota.

ACCESSIBILITY

The Ramsey Park can be reached from the north and west by connecting with the M. & St. L. Ry., and from the south and east via the Northwestern Lines. It is within a half day's auto trip from the Twin Cities, or a four hours' ride by train, while driveways in all directions are almost always in prime condition during the outing season of the year, and the park is situated on a main state road from the Twin Cities to the Dakota state line, and connecting with an interstate roadway to the Black Hills country.

It lies adjacent to and is continuous with the driveways within the corporate limits of Redwood Falls, and is within fifteen minutes' walk of the main business streets of the town.

MEMORIAL TO GOVERNOR RAMSEY.

It is significant that the appropriateness of naming the stream and waterfall in honor of Gov. Ramsey was so early recognized and it is especially fitting that the name is now extended to the park tract.

One of the most important achievements of the official life of Governor Ramsey was the securing of the treaty with the Sioux Indians, opening a large area of the state to settlement and the allotment of a reservation tract along the upper Minnesota river. This Memorial park is situated near to the center of this Indian reservation of early days. The first supply of provisions sent by the government to the Indians was landed from steamboat at the mouth of the Redwood river within sight of this place.

That the governor continued to have a keen interest in this project, and in the welfare of the Indians, was indicated by his taking the time for a trip by boat from St. Paul to the agency headquarters, accompanied by his daughter, who is still living in our capitol city.

HISTORICAL ASSOCIATIONS.

The Ramsey Park is central and convenient to and within an hour's ride of nearly every point of interest connected with one of the most memorable chapters not only of Minnesota history but also of the annals of Indian warfare of this country; the Indian outbreak of 1862.

Beginning with Fort Ridgley, the frontier post of that period, where was stubbornly fought the first engagement of that Indian war; then fol-

lowing up the Minnesota river to the big stone building, which was the principal agency headquarters and is the most important structure of reservation days that still remains standing; the sites of the early trading posts where were one of the principal fur markets of that time; the Indian stone church, built from the ruins of the first mission church of the valley, now in use by a colony of Indians; the Morton monuments erected to the memory of soldiers slain in the battle and to Indians friendly to the whites during the conflict, which Governor Ramsey assisted to dedicate; the Birch Coulie battlefield, Brown's castle and the upper Sioux Agency; and the Wood Lake monument where was fought the closing battle of the Minnesota campaign; not forgetting that from one main view point of the park could have been easily seen the building of the sod stockade erected for protection to the first white settlement on the reservation and which was the beginning of the present town of Redwood Falls.

PARK IMPROVEMENTS.

The Ramsey park requires but little "improvement" as this term is usually understood, for its distinctive attractions need only to be preserved and made accessible.

Commissioner Jo. Tyson, appointed by State Auditor Iverson, to provide for the care and development of the park for public use, is protecting the natural conditions which have been so well maintained to the present time and has constructed the beginning of a series of winding roadways to extend for several miles to all principal points of scenic interest in the park.

The driveways, following the contour of the surface and along the hillsides, continuously changing in their course and from one level to another, with easy auto-riding grades and extending from the highest to the lowest points, and supplemented by foot paths to the more secluded and less accessible glens, gulches and riverside retreats make the most notable scenic exhibit in Minnesota.

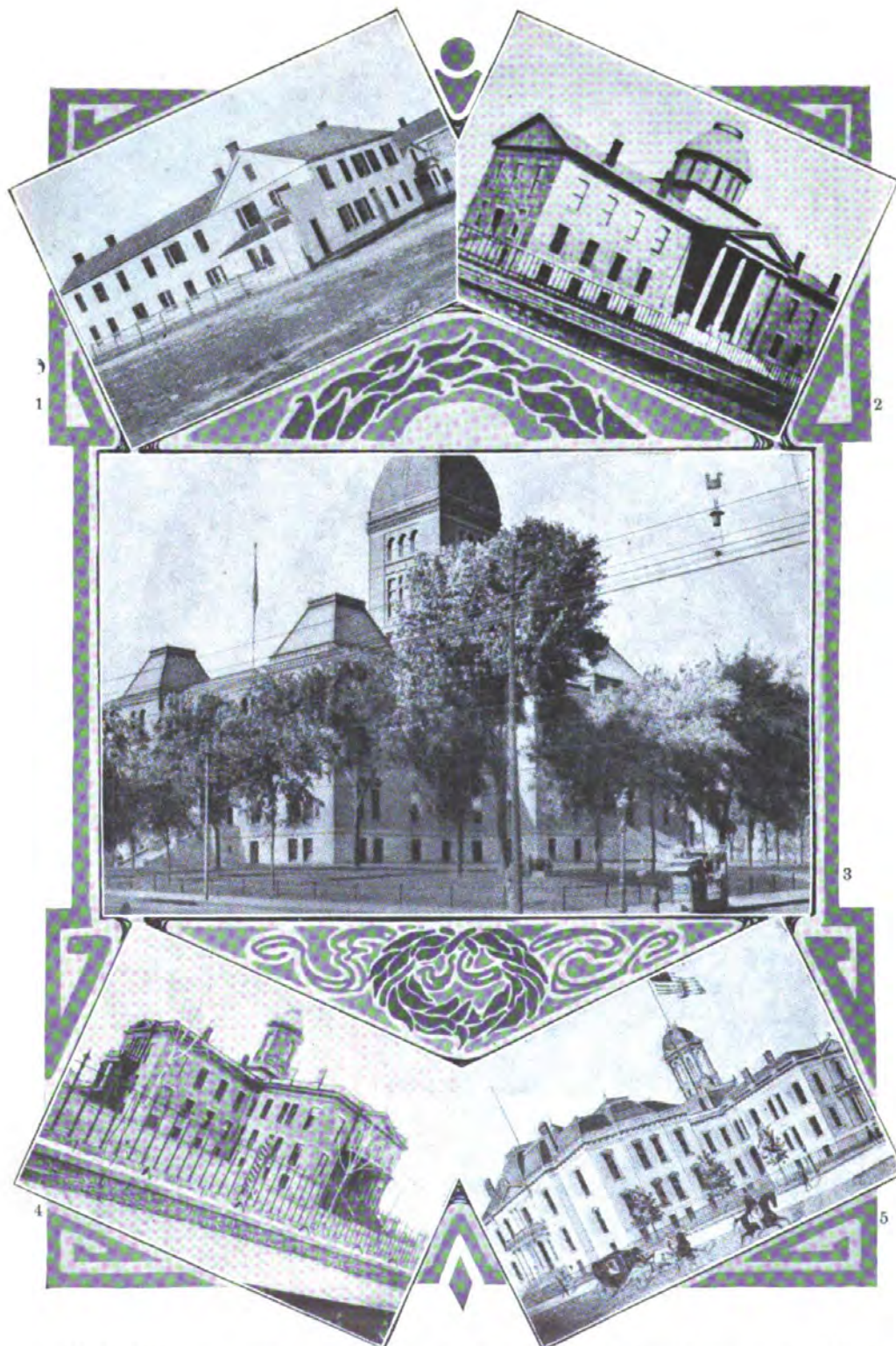

THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Article 5 of the State constitution provides that the executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general, who shall be chosen by the electors of the State.

OFFICERS FOR 1911.

Governor—Adolph O. Eberhart, Blue Earth county.

Secretary of State—Julius A. Schmahl, Redwood county.

Auditor—Samuel G. Iverson, Fillmore county.

Treasurer—Walter J. Smith, St. Louis county.

Attorney General—Lyndon A. Smith, Chippewa county.

The constitution of the State provides that these officers shall be elected for two years, except the state auditor, whose term of office is for four years.

The duties of the governor are prescribed by the constitution and the laws of the State. The office assistants of the governor are a private secretary, executive clerk, two stenographers and executive messenger. Connected with the executive office is the appointment of notaries public.

The lieutenant governor is ex-officio president of the senate, and has no other duties to perform, except in a protracted absence of the governor from the State he may be called to act, and in case of vacancy in the office he becomes governor during said vacancy.

The secretary of state is the recording officer of the State and the official custodian of official papers. All the private and public corporations of the State are recorded, and the official bonds of all state and county officers are filed in this office. He is the custodian of all the volumes of laws and journals and all the legislative records of whatever nature as well as the United States government surveys of Minnesota, recently turned over to the state. The whole machinery of state elections and the final canvassing of votes is carried forward in his office. The preparation of the volumes of law for publication is part of his duty, and the care and disposition of all printed executive documents of the State. For the general purposes of the office, the clerical force is an assistant secretary, a chief clerk, one record clerk, a clerk of government surveys, a document clerk, and two stenographers.

The state auditor has charge of two departments of the government, the auditing department and the land department. The auditing department

is to keep a record of all public accounts, audit all claims presented, and issue warrants in payment. These accounts are not only those of the state departments, but include the pay rolls of state institutions. He has charge of the tax law and prescribes the tax blanks, prepares the abstracts of taxes for the state board of equalization, makes all the drafts for state taxes, and keeps an account of the same, and is required to make a detailed and exhaustive report of the affairs of his office to the legislature, and for the performance of these duties he has a deputy and various clerks.

In the land department, of which the auditor is chief, he has the assistance of four clerks specially detailed. The duties of this department are the care and sale of school, university, agricultural, college and swamp lands, and the sale of grass, cranberries, and maple sugar; the leasing of mineral lands; and the making out and record of all deeds and conveyances for the disposition of lands, besides keeping a classified account of all money transactions connected with these lands.

The treasurer is the receiving and disbursing officer of the State, and has the assistance of a deputy treasurer, six clerks and stenographer to aid in the duties of the office. His duties are defined by law to keep an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements of the treasury, specifying the names of persons from whom received, to whom paid, on what account the same is received and paid out, and the time of such receipt and payment. And for all payments into the state treasury by county treasurers he issues two receipts, one to the treasurer and the other to the county auditor.

The attorney general is the legal adviser of all the departments of State, and counsel for the State or departments in all suits at law; prosecutes all official bonds of delinquent officers; prepares all forms of contracts; receives reports of criminal actions in all the counties of the State from the county attorneys, and makes a biennial report to the legislature. The force in the office is five assistant attorney generals, a clerk and three stenographers.

Upon the east wall of the entry to the Governor's reception room is shown that part of the battle of Corinth participated in by the Fifth Minnesota Regiment as they were ordered to close the gap which had been made in the Union lines by the Confederate troops of Generals Van Dorn and Price. Gen. Lucius F. Hubbard, in command of the Minnesota volunteers, distinguished himself upon this occasion by coolness and military grasp of the situation, and it is commonly affirmed that the "Fifth Minnesota saved the day at Corinth". Archbishop Ireland, who was chaplain of the Regiment, was in the thick of battle, carrying additional supplies to the front.

THE MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Commander-in-Chief.

His Excellency, Adolph O. Eberhart, Governor.

Executive Officer of Department.

Fred B. Wood, Adjutant General.

The active military forces of the State are officially known as the Minnesota National Guard. In time of peace the National Guard is composed of three regiments of infantry and one battalion of artillery (the latter includes three batteries of artillery), formed into one brigade under the command of a brigadier general. The commander-in-chief is authorized to increase this force in time of war. The volunteers furnished by Minnesota during the war with Spain were chiefly recruited from the ranks of the National Guard.

The adjutant general is the executive officer of the department and the custodian of all records relating to the National Guard and to the regiments furnished by this State during the Civil and Spanish wars. Under the commander-in-chief he has general supervision and control of the military forces of this State and of all military property.

It is also the duty of the adjutant general to act as claim agent, without pay or compensation, for all citizens of this State having claims against the government of the United States for pensions, bounty, arrears of pay, etc., arising out of military service for the national government. He also prosecutes the claims of the State of Minnesota against the national government for expenses incurred during the Spanish-American war.

The military storekeeper is the armorer and ordnance officer of the State, and keeps in order the arms and other public property necessarily connected with the ordnance department.

NATIONAL GUARD.

The various sections of the revised laws of 1905, as amended by the legislative session of that year, were further amended by the 1907, 1909 and 1911 sessions of the legislature. Under the new provisions, the brigade is to consist of the brigadier general, an assistant adjutant general, a surgeon, each ranking as major, an assistant inspector general, a brigade quartermas-

ter, a brigade judge advocate, a commissary of subsistence, an inspector of small arms practice, an ordnance officer, one aid-de-camp, each of whom are to rank as captains. Three regiments of infantry and one corps or battalion of field artillery. The minimum membership of a company or battery is to be fixed by the president of the United States.

The officers of each infantry battalion and the number of officers of a company, together with the number of companies to each battalion and the officers, membership and engineers of the artilleries and batteries is also prescribed by the act.

The uniform of the guard shall be the same as that prescribed for the United States army, except that the letters "U. S." are to be omitted from the buttons and collar and the insignia of the state substituted therefor. Changes in the uniform may be made by the governor on recommendation of five officers. Uniforms, etc., are to be provided by the state and shall be issued annually by the adjutant general. The annual per capita allowance is \$7.00 for each officer, non-commissioned officer, musician and other enlisted men, reported as fully uniformed and equipped and this money is to be known as the military fund to be used for the purchase of uniforms, care of armories, etc. The pay of officers, while engaged in any service ordered by the governor, shall be the same as allowed by law to officers of similar rank in the United States army. There is also to be paid annually to officers in actual command of troops for incidental expenses, as follows: To the brigade commander, \$100, and to the commanding officer of each regiment, \$250; to the corps of battalion or artillery, \$150; to the commanding officer of each company and battery and assistant adjutant general of the brigade, each regimental adjutant and to the adjutant of the corps of battalion or artillery, \$100. The adjutant general is to be appointed and commissioned for the term of six years. The first term to commence the first Monday in January, 1907, and Fred B. Wood was appointed for that term and was reappointed in 1913.

THE JUDICIARY DEPARTMENTS.

THE SUPREME COURT.

The constitution provides that the judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts inferior to the supreme court as the legislature may from time to time establish. This latter prerogative the legislature has exercised in the establishment of municipal courts in the larger cities of the State.

The supreme court consists of one chief justice and four associate justices, elected by the people, and holding office for six years, and until successors are elected and qualified. Two terms of court are held in each year, commencing on the first Tuesday of April and October, at the capitol, in St. Paul. This court has original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity.

The clerk of the supreme court is an elective officer, the term of office being four years.

The reporter of the supreme court is an officer appointed by the supreme court to prepare the adjudicated cases for publication in official volumes, entitled, "Minnesota Reports."

Originally the reporter owned the exclusive copyright, and the reports were printed and bound at his expense, the State buying of him 200 copies of each volume at six dollars a volume. In 1881, an act was passed providing that the reporter should have no pecuniary interest in the reports, but that they should be published by contract under his supervision, the publisher to agree to sell the volumes at two dollars a volume and the State to agree to buy 200 copies at that price. The contract price is now \$1. The copyright of the volumes already published vests in the secretary of state for the benefit of the people of the State, but the publisher is permitted to continue the publication and sale of such volumes so long as he complies with the requirements of law as to character and price of volumes. The State now buys 425 copies of each volume at the price last named.

The secretary of state is charged with the distribution of the volumes, one copy to each of the several departments of state, to each judge of the supreme court, and of the several district, probate and municipal courts, and to the clerks of each district court, while the University of Minnesota receives 100 copies for the law department, and the state library receives a sufficient number for exchanges with other states and for the use of the library. The remaining copies stay in the custody of the secretary of state for further distribution by law.

THE LOWER COURTS.

The district courts are created by the legislature, the State being divided into nineteen judicial districts, with one or more judges in a district, as the exigencies of business may require, and the judges are elected for six years. The district courts have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount exceeds \$100, or the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than \$100. Also, in criminal cases where presentments are made by grand juries.

The municipal courts generally have the power of disposing of all criminal cases for infraction of city laws, and for hearing and committing for trial on arrests for violation of state laws. Chap. 146, G. L. 1891, "An act relating to villages of over 3,000 inhabitants, and providing for municipal courts therein." By the provisions of this act a municipal court has jurisdiction in civil actions where amount does not exceed \$500; also, in all cases where a justice court has jurisdiction, and over certain criminal actions. Its jurisdiction is co-extensive with the limits of the county where located.

The probate courts are created by authority of the constitution, one for each county, and the judges to be elected by the people, for two years. The probate court has jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, and the examination and commitment of insane persons to the asylums. The salaries of probate judges are fixed by special law, or in lieu thereof a salary of \$100 for the first 1,000 inhabitants and \$50 for each additional 1,000 inhabitants, limiting the compensation, where by reason of population the sum would be larger, to \$4,000 per annum.

A common school district is controlled by a board of three members; an independent, by one of six members; a special, by a board of six or more members.

Common schools are supervised by a county superintendent; independent and special districts have their own superintendents, and in the main are not subject to the county superintendents.

The state graded and state high schools are subject to a board of five members; the president of the State University, the superintendent of public instruction and president of normal school board are ex-officio members, a city superintendent or high school principal and a fifth member are appointed by the governor.

The normal schools are controlled by a board of nine members; five of these are resident directors; three are appointed for the State at large, and one, the superintendent of public instruction, serves ex-officio.

The university is controlled by a board of twelve regents; the governor, the president of the university and the superintendent of public instruction are ex-officio members, and nine are appointed by the governor.

The public schools of the State are supported by a direct tax upon the property of the school district, by a county one-mill tax, by a state mill tax, and by the income from the permanent school fund, together with small fines that are accredited to this fund.

In addition to these funds, the State of Minnesota distributes annually (provided they attain a high, prescribed standard of excellence) \$125 or \$50 to each rural school, \$250 to each semigraded school of two or three departments; also \$550 to each graded school of four or more departments; and

\$1,500 to each high school that admits all qualified students free of tuition. High and graded schools must meet the requirements of the high school board.

To encourage the establishment and maintenance of school libraries the legislature has appropriated \$15,000 per annum. The State will aid any school district towards the purchase of a library to the amount of \$20 on the first order for each school building, and \$10 annually thereafter, provided that the district raises a like amount, purchases the books from the state contractor and orders from the list prepared by the State Library Board, which is composed of the state superintendent of public instruction and the presidents of the normal schools.

The normal schools are supported by appropriations of the legislature; the university by a direct tax of twenty-three hundredths of a mill upon all the property of the State, by special state appropriations, and by the Federal government under the Morrill act.

The State provides a fund for teachers' institutes and training schools, to be held under the direction of the state superintendent of public instruction. In the year 1905, 42 institutes and training schools were held in different counties of the State, with an enrollment of 5,000 teachers. In 1906, 40 institutes and training schools were held, in which 6,000 teachers were enrolled.

Teachers' certificates are issued by the superintendent of public instruction upon examination or upon indorsement of a university or college diploma, or a diploma from a state normal school.

Certificates are of the following grades: Professional, first and second grade; teachers' state certificates, first and second grade; county certificates, issued in certain cases by the county superintendent and valid for a specified district. A diploma from a Minnesota state normal school is valid as a certificate to teach for two years immediately following graduation. At the expiration of the two years an elementary diploma may be indorsed by the president of the school and the superintendent of public instruction for five years, and an advanced diploma may be made a life certificate. Diplomas from the advanced course of a normal school outside of Minnesota, representing a course of study fully equivalent to the advanced course in Minnesota, may, upon evidence of successful teaching, be indorsed by the superintendent of public instruction for a limited time as a certificate.

Examinations for professional certificates are given twice each year. First, immediately after the close of the University summer school, and second, during the week of the State Teachers' Association. The first is held at the State University and the latter in St. Paul.

Examinations for teachers' state certificates are given at one or more places in each county in February and in August, under the direction of the county superintendent. All manuscript for teachers' certificates is examined and marked under the direction of the superintendent of public instruction.

DESCRIPTION OF DEPARTMENTS.

THE COLLEGE OF SCIENCE, LITERATURE, AND THE ARTS offers a four-year course of study leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts. The work of the first two years is elective within certain limitations as to the range of subjects from which the electives may be chosen. The remaining work of the course is entirely elective, with the provision that a certain number of long courses be selected. The course is so elastic that it permits the student to make the general scope of his course classical, scientific or literary, to suit his individual purpose.

In this college are given also the two years of college work required for entrance to the College of Medicine and Surgery; the first two years of work of the six-year course in Science and Medicine, leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Doctor of Medicine; the one year of college work required for entrance to the College of Law; and various non-professional subjects required in other schools and colleges of the University.

THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING AND THE MECHANIC ARTS offers courses of study, of five years each, in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, leading to the degrees of Civil, Mechanical or Electrical Engineer, the degree of Bachelor of Science in Engineering being conferred at the end of the fourth year. This college also offers work in the Graduate School leading to the degree of Master of Science.

Students in the Civil Engineering course are expected to spend five weeks in camp engaged in survey work as a part of the regular course, in the summer following the junior year.

THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE offers a four-year course in agriculture. The degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture is conferred upon completion of the course. Students in this College may specialize along the line of forestry or of home economics and secure the degree, Bachelor of Science, (in Forestry, or in Home Economics).

THE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE offers a three year course of study and is a training school for practical farm life and in domestic economy. The College of Agriculture is open to graduates of this School who have completed the fourth year of work required for admission to the College.

THE DAIRY SCHOOL offers practical instruction in dairying, specially designed for those who are actually engaged in the manufacture of butter and cheese.

A four-year course in Architecture has just been established leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Architecture. The entrance requirements are the same as for the engineering courses.

THE SHORT COURSE FOR FARMERS is designed to be of the greatest help possible to those actually engaged in farming.

THE CROOKSTON SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE offers a course of study quite similar to that given in the School of Agriculture.

THE COLLEGE OF LAW aims to educate its students by means of the study of Jurisprudence, familiarizing them with the fundamental principles of positive law. Education, and not simply information, is the prime object. The power to think clearly, to reason cogently, to investigate thoroughly, to generalize clearly, and to express thoughts accurately are the prime objects of legal education. The method of work generally pursued consists in the study of reported cases, preparing written analysis of the same, and such lectures as are necessary to give the student a symmetrical view of the science of Jurisprudence. The art of practice is taught so far as possible in the law school. A system of courts embracing a court of the Justice of the Peace, and the District and Supreme Courts of the state is organized and maintained. The students pass through each of these courts in order. Students familiarize themselves with the rules of the District and the Supreme courts of the state. Jury trials are conducted throughout the senior year. Appeals, motions for new trials, arguments, and all the other points of practice in the courts of the state are considered. The degree of Bachelor of Laws is granted upon the completion of the three year day course, or the four year evening course, which degree entitles the holder to admission to the bar without examination.

THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY was organized as a teaching school in 1888; the University Medical Department having been first established in 1883 to examine students and confer degrees.

Medical education has been unified in the State of Minnesota by the absorption of all of the private Medical Colleges; the Hamline University medical department having been merged into that of the University of Minnesota in 1908; and the College of Homeopathic Medicine and Surgery having been discontinued in 1909 and being represented by Chairs of materia medica and therapeutics in the general faculty of the College of Medicine and Surgery.

The requirements for entrance are a four-year's high school course, including two years of Latin; and two years of college work equivalent to that of the College of Science, Literature and the Arts, of this University, and including at least one year each of physics, inorganic chemistry, qualitative analysis, biology, and language. Four years of thirty-six full weeks of laboratory, recitatorial, didactic and clinical work are required in medicine.

The College occupies five modern buildings and five temporary houses upon the University Campus. Two new Laboratory buildings, provided for by the legislature of 1909, will be built upon the new medical campus during the present year.

The Elliott Memorial Hospital is in process of construction at the present time. Pending its completion, four of these temporary buildings are devoted to the hospital service and to the Training School for Nurses. The University Dispensary, which serves as the out-patient department of the Hospital, occupies a building four blocks from the campus.

The University also controls the St. Paul Dispensary.

The Hospitals and Dispensaries of the Twin Cities, with a population approximating 550,000, also provide clinical teaching for the College of Medicine and Surgery.

The College offers the following courses of study:

1. Course leading to the Degree of Doctor of Medicine. Four years of graded study in the College of Medicine and Surgery, open to those presenting the preliminary requirements stated above.

2. Course leading to the Degrees of B. S. and M. D. Two years of required courses in the College of Science, Literature and the Arts, in biology, botany, chemistry, physics, mathematics, language and economics, followed by four years in the College of Medicine and Surgery; the degree of B. S. being given at the end of the fourth year and the degree of M. D. at the close of the sixth year.

3. Course leading to the degrees of B. A. and M. D. Students presenting three years work in the College of Science, Literature and the Arts, including the required subjects mentioned, which leads up to the degree of B. A., may elect the first year in medicine in their senior academic year, receiving the B. A. degree at its close, and the degree of M. D. upon the successful completion of the remaining three years in medicine.

Similar affiliations exist with certain other colleges, whereby the B. A. degree may be conferred by these colleges under the same conditions.

4. The Training School for Nurses, organized in connection with the University Hospital service, is under the control of the Faculty of the College of Medicine and Surgery. (See School Bulletin.)

5. The Embalming School. (See Special Announcement.)

6. Graduate and research work is offered to qualified students.

THE COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY offers a three-year course of study, of nine months each. Upon completion of the prescribed course the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery is conferred. The University now offers an optional six-year course of study. The first three years of the course are given in the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts. The last three years are given in the College of Dentistry. It leads to the bachelor's degree at the end of the first four years and to the degree of doctor of dental surgery at the end of the six year course.

THE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY was organized in 1891 upon request of the Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association. In the organization and conduct of the college, the Board of Regents and the faculty have had and have the co-operation of the pharmacists of the Northwest. The college is of the University grade and maintains a high standard of entrance and graduation requirements. Every effort is made to comply with the demands of the pharmaceutical profession of the Northwest and elsewhere. The college offers a regular course extending over two or three years leading to the degree Bachelor of Pharmacy, and two post-graduate courses, the first requiring at least one additional year of resident work and leading to the degree Master of Pharmacy, and the second requiring one or two additional years of work and leading to the degree Doctor of Pharmacy.

It is now contemplated to add a four-year course to include somewhat more than is now included in the regular two-year course and about two years of academic work. This course will lead to the degree Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy, and will in all respects be at least the equal of similar courses given in other University colleges of pharmacy. The course will probably be inaugurated in 1910. The Board of Regents have also authorized a course somewhat lower than the regular course now given, to comply however with the requirements of the American Conference of Pharmaceutical Faculties. This course probably will not begin until 1911 and will probably not lead to any degree or to the degree Pharmaceutical Graduate.

THE SCHOOL OF MINES was established in 1889. Its buildings and laboratories are located on the grounds of the University of Minnesota. Students of the School of Mines have, therefore, all the opportunities afforded by a large university. Two regular courses of study are offered, namely, mining engineering and metallurgy, leading to the degrees of Engineer of Mines (E. M.) and Metallurgical Engineer (Met. E.), respectively.

Students passing satisfactory entrance examinations in elementary and higher algebra, and plane and solid geometry may graduate in four years. Students presenting high school credentials to the extent indicated on page 58, may graduate in five years.

Courses in the school are designed for the purpose of preparing men to enter their profession with a thorough grounding in mathematics, in the sciences, and in the fundamental principles of mining engineering and metallurgy. The technical courses consist of lecture work in mining, metallurgy and applied subjects supplemented by laboratory work in assaying, chemistry, ore dressing and metallurgy; field work in plane and underground surveying; actual practical mining and metallurgical work in Minnesota and western mining centers. A system of apprenticeship during summer vacations has been inaugurated. This work has become part of the curriculum and is required of all students who are candidates for degrees.

Minnesota's enormous iron ore production continually brings before the public the necessity for trained men to aid in the development of the country's mineral resources. The state has developed its School of Mines with this end in view.

THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION offers a practical and a theoretical training for the prospective high school teachers and principals, for principals of elementary schools, for supervisors of special studies, and for superintendents of school systems.

Students are admitted to the college only after the completion of at least two full years of college work, during which time they should have pursued at least one course in general psychology, and prospective high school teachers should have given especial attention to one or more of the subjects which they expect to teach. The two years' course of study, beginning with the junior year, leads to the degree of Bachelor of Arts in

Education. Preparation for teaching is planned to include a thorough grounding in the correct use of English, an adequate training in general and in educational psychology, in the history and organization of schools, in educational theory, and in the practice of teaching; and also, quite aside from the liberal training of the regular college course, specific preparation in both the subject matter and the methods of those subjects in the secondary curriculum which each candidate proposes to teach. A third year leads to the degree of master of arts, including advanced studies in education and philosophy, and in one or more of the subjects of the secondary curriculum, at the option of the candidate.

In addition to the ordinary academic and professional studies connected with the training of the teacher, the college offers an opportunity for observation and practice teaching under supervision, as well as special facilities in voice culture, public school music, and physical culture, together with elementary and advanced courses in drawing, domestic art and domestic science, manual training and business education:—those specialized forms of the secondary curriculum which are being introduced so rapidly into the public high schools of Minnesota.

THE SCHOOL OF ANALYTICAL AND APPLIED CHEMISTRY offers three courses. Two of these, the Analytical and the five year course in Arts and Chemistry, are designed for those who wish to become teachers of chemistry, analysts and investigators. The four year Analytical course leads to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, while the five year course leads to the degree of Bachelor of Arts after four years and Bachelor of Science in chemistry at the end of the fifth.

The third or Applied course extends over five years, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts at the end of four years and Chemical Engineer at the end of the fifth. These courses aim to give the student a broad foundation in chemistry and some of the allied sciences.

The two buildings occupied by the school contain six large laboratories and about twenty smaller ones well equipped for carrying on a wide range of work.

THE GRADUATE SCHOOL gathers into a single organization and unites for the purposes of administration all the activities of the University in all its schools and colleges in so far as they relate to advanced instruction offered for the second or higher degrees, viz.; Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy conferred for advanced, non-technical study; Master of Science and Doctor of Science for technical study; Master of Laws and Doctor of Civil Law for advanced legal studies. The privileges of this school are in general open to all Bachelors of Arts, of Science, pure and applied, and of Laws, from reputable colleges and universities having courses substantially equivalent to those at this University.

THE UNIVERSITY SUMMER SCHOOL is organized for a six weeks' session in June and July under the direction of the State Department of Public Instruction. In the elementary section courses are given for teachers in all the common school branches and in preparation for the state teacher's certificates. In the college section courses are given for high

school teachers and in preparation for the state professional certificate. Students who desire University entrance credits and credits toward the bachelor's degree may secure these by pursuing not more than two full courses at each session.

SPECIAL COURSES. In practically all of the colleges, students of mature age and adequate preparation are permitted to pursue, under the direction of the faculty, one or two distinct lines of study.

EXTENSION COURSE. The Legislature of 1909 made an appropriation for the biennial period, providing for University Extension work.

The Department of Economics and Political Science, for this period, gives a number of courses in the evening at the University for business men living in the vicinity of the University, and a somewhat similar group of courses by correspondence throughout the state. The Department also offers a series of University Extension lectures in the field of Economics and Political Science at points anywhere in the state. A separate bulletin explaining each of these three kinds of work may be had upon application.

University extension work is conducted by the College of Education in the form (a) of local lectures in series of three to six, where committees are formed for this purpose in various communities; (b) of correspondence courses especially arranged for teachers in the subjects required for the state professional certificate; and (c) of institute lectures for teachers in connection with the various district, county, and local educational associations. A considerable part of the work required for a bachelor's degree may be completed by correspondence.

GOVERNMENT—BY BOARD OF REGENTS.

The University is governed by a board of twelve Regents, consisting of three ex-officio members, the governor of the State, the state superintendent of public instruction and the president of the University, and nine members appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, who hold office for six years.

The regents have absolute control over all University affairs, save in the matter of erection of new buildings, the purchase of fuel and the placing of insurance. These three items are under the supervision of the State Board of Control.

The interior government management of the University is under the direction of the president and various faculties; each faculty having control over its own affairs subject only to supervision of the Board of Regents.

The University Council is an organization made up of the deans of the various colleges, schools and departments and elected representatives. The Council has charge of matters which do not fall directly within the province of any one faculty and such additional matters as may be referred to it by the president of the University. The powers of the council are not specifically determined, but the general scope of its activities is clearly understood.

UNIVERSITY SUPPORT.

The University revenue is derived from four principal sources:

1. From the permanent fund resulting from the sales of public lands granted by Congress for a University endowment, held by the state, which pays the annual interest to the University.
2. Appropriations by Congress under the so-called Morrill, Hatch, Nelson, and Adams bills.
3. The fractional mill tax levied annually by the Minnesota legislature, and occasional direct appropriations, as needed.
4. From student fees, sales of farm produce, and petty miscellaneous receipts.

The income for current expense is therefore from national, state, and local sources, amounting at the present time to about \$775,000 per annum.

Any one desiring fuller information concerning any college or department can secure the same by applying to the Registrar, addressing him, care of the University, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

When Minnesota was organized as a territory March 3, 1849, it was understood that a grant of public lands would be made by Congress for the endowment and support of a university as in the case of all other states carved out of this old northwest territory.

On December 10, 1850, delegate Sibley gave notice of a bill to grant two townships (46,080 acres) which became law on February 19, 1851. Meantime the Minnesota legislature had by Act, Feb. 13, created the University of Minnesota and made over to that corporation the proceeds of all lands which Congress may grant.

The location of the institution was fixed by this law "at or near the Falls of St. Anthony," by virtue of an understanding relating to the distribution of public buildings. A board of twelve regents elected in classes by the legislature had charge till 1860. In the fall of 1851, a preparatory school was opened. In 1856, intoxicated by the boom which was then raging, the regents began the erection of the rear part of the "old main" building. Before it was finished the panic of 1857 came on. The board could not pay the contractors nor meet the interest on the bonds they had been authorized to sell.

In the winter of 1860 the legislature replaced the old board of twelve regents by one of five appointed by the Governor. At the end of four years this board had not been able to put the finances of the university on a sound footing. Senator John S. Pillsbury laid before the legislature of 1864 a plan to pay off the accumulated debt by the sale of less than one-third of the land grant. A special board of three regents, headed by Mr. Pillsbury, was created to make the experiment. At the close of 1866 this board reported the debt substantially liquidated. A debt of gratitude is due to the creditors and bondholders for scaling down their just claims

and accepting sums far below their dues. By means of a small appropriation the special board renovated the building, purchased furniture and appliances, and in November, 1867, opened the preparatory department, to which girls as well as boys were admitted.

This board having accomplished its purpose prepared for the legislature the bill which, enacted into law February 13, 1868, became the actual charter of the university. By far the most important element was that which united with the university endowment proper the expected income from the congressional land grant of 1862 for the support of colleges of Agricultural and Mechanic Arts.

At the close of the college year of 1869 a small company of preparatory students were found ready for college instruction. A faculty of nine professors and instructors was elected and began their work in September. In this year William Watts Folwell was appointed president.

In 1873 two students were graduated at the first commencement. Some twenty years now passed in quiet work and growth, mostly in the academic department. A good beginning was made in that of engineering and mechanic arts, but in spite of most earnest endeavors by the regents the college of agriculture developed slowly. There was little demand for proper agricultural instruction and the pedagogy of that branch had not been developed.

In the year 1870 Congress confirmed to the state a second grant of public land for a state university ingeniously embodied in the enabling act of Feb. 26, 1857, which the departmental authorities at Washington had persistently refused to recognize.

In September, 1884, Cyrus Northrop succeeded to the presidency and not long after began that great development familiar to all.

The Colleges of Law and Medicine were organized. New buildings sprang up, nobly equipped, and the faculties were reinforced as means accumulated. The growth of the College of Agriculture has been remarkable. The congressional appropriations for experiment stations and additional endowment have greatly increased its efficiency and prosperity. The College of Engineering has also enjoyed a rapid and cumulative development. The Colleges of Pharmacy, Dentistry, the School of Mines, Chemistry, Education and the Graduate School have been added in recent years, the result of public demands for special technical training and research.

The total enrollment for the year ending July 31st, 1909, was 5,066. The enrollment for the year ending July 31st, 1910, was 5,369.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

The department of agriculture of the University of Minnesota comprises the experiment station, the college of agriculture, the college of forestry, the school of agriculture, the dairy school, the farmers' short course, the school of traction engineering, the short course for teachers, the school of agriculture and experiment farm at Crookston, the school

of agriculture and experiment farm at Morris and the Northeast experiment farm at Grand Rapids.

The Department has its home on University farm, a tract of 415 acres of land lying midway between St. Paul and Minneapolis and adjoining the State Fair grounds. The buildings occupy a prominent position on the highest ground between the two cities.

The experiment station, which was established in 1887, has for its object the conducting of investigations and experiments in all branches of agriculture and stock-raising which are considered most useful to the farmers of the State; particular attention being given to the class of problems which would be too expensive or require too much expert service for the farmers to solve for themselves. Questions relating to crops, soils, farm animals, horticulture, forestry, dairying, feeding of live stock, entomology, human and animal foods, and the business of farming have been studied and the results published in bulletin form. Bulletins giving results of experiments are issued in editions of eighteen thousand and distributed gratis to the farmers of the state who ask to have their names placed upon the station mailing list.

In common with all the land grant colleges of the country the University of Minnesota has had an agricultural college connected with it since its foundation, but prior to the establishment of the school of agriculture the attendance was very small, and in fact varied for several years from two students to none at all. It was quite evident that in order to get the young farmers of the state into the college of agriculture there must be a connecting link between the college and the district school. This link was established in 1888 in the form of a school of agriculture, similar in grade to a high school, and having a course of study embracing instruction in the different lines of agriculture, horticulture, live stock, manual training, etc. Students were admitted without further preparation than that required in the ordinary district schools. The attendance the first year was a surprise even to the most ardent friends of the movement, and it has steadily grown.

In 1897, girls were admitted to the school on the same terms as the boys, and beside the high school subjects which are taken in common, they are given work in special lines of cooking, sewing, laundering and home-making.

The instruction throughout the course, which covers a period of three terms of six months each, is so given as to bring practice and theory into close relation and to show the reasons for and the most expedient ways of doing things.

The technical and practical training which students receive at such a school gives them the ability to study the problems of farm and home management which they are sure to meet at their own homes and makes them better able to cope with all conditions of soil, climate or whatever problems they are to meet in after life.

The college of agriculture gives regular four year University courses and graduate students with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture or Bachelor of Science in Forestry or Bachelor of Science in Home

Economics, depending upon which course is elected. The entrance requirements for the college courses have, during the past year, been made the same as the requirements for the college of Science, Literature and the Arts. The aim of this college is to give a thorough training in the preparation of teachers and investigators for colleges, experiment stations, agricultural high schools, etc. The records show that 90 % of the graduates of the college since it was founded are now engaged in this kind of work.

The increase in attendance in both the school and college of agriculture during the past few years and especially the past year is shown by the figures in the accompanying table.

The dairy school, the first session of which was held in January, 1902, has been a potent factor in the development of the dairy industry in Minnesota. Its students have become especially distinguished for their skill in the manufacture of creamery butter of superior grade. Of the nine banners which have been awarded by the National Butter Makers' Association for best creamery butter, seven have been won by Minnesota buttermakers who were graduates of this course. The average attendance in the dairy school is about 100 men. These students are required to spend at least one season in a creamery or cheese factory before taking the course, and after finishing the course they are not given their diplomas until they have gone out and actually demonstrated their ability as creamery and factory managers and skillful butter and cheese maker-

The short course for farmers is a four weeks' lecture course given in mid-winter for the benefit of farmers who are unable to attend the regular school course. The lectures cover the more important branches of agriculture, horticulture, live stock, breeding, dairying, farm botany, farm chemistry, farm accounts, entomology, poultry, home economics, etc., and especial attention is given to the matter of judging horses, cattle, sheep, swine and grains, with a view of making the students familiar with the methods of judging at fairs and stock shows.

The school of traction engineering is a four weeks' course, having as its special aim the training of men to run and manage all kinds of traction engines and power machinery. This has proved a very attractive course for a certain class of young men and the average attendance has been about 150.

The summer school for teachers is a six weeks' course especially designed to help teachers in rural and secondary schools who are interested in introducing elementary agriculture and home economics into their schools.

The legislature of 1895 appropriated money to establish two sub-stations permanently. One of these was located near Crookston and is known as the Northwest Experiment Farm.

The farm consists of about 450 acres. It was donated to the state for experimental purposes by the Great Northern Railroad. A dwelling house, work shop and a horse barn were built the first year. Later a cattle barn was erected and a large poultry plant established. Several miles of fence have been put up, dividing the farm into fields, meadows and pastures. Herds of grade cattle are kept, but most of the stock are pure-bred

Galloways, Shorthorns, and Herefords. Draft and driving horses are kept for work and breeding purposes. Pure-bred hogs and sheep are also kept. Several hundred birds of the leading strains of poultry are kept on the farm.

One of the plans of the farm has been to encourage the growing of a larger variety of crops in northwestern Minnesota than was formerly raised. Experience shows that an abundance of crops needed to make the best rotation of crops can be most successfully produced. This work has met with great success. Grains, grasses, and forage crops are very much more extensively raised than formerly. Tree-planting and the development of horticultural products is progressing nicely. The success of the institution is measured by the progress made in agriculture in the Red River Valley as influenced by the work on the experiment farm.

Drainage is one of the great problems for the farmers in the Red River Valley. It is part of the plans to introduce a system of tile drainage to learn if this method will be a success in our soil and climate.

The Legislature of 1905 established at Crookston, under the direction and educational supervision of the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota, a school of agriculture and appropriated \$15,000 to erect a school building therefor. The Regents located the school on the Northwest Experiment Farm at Crookston, and with the appropriation a three-story brick building has been erected providing a kitchen, dining room, two class rooms, an office, dormitory facilities for twenty-four boys. The building is heated by steam and is wired for electrical lighting, and is well adapted to its purpose. It is a splendid example of economic building. The original farm building is being used for instruction in domestic science and a dormitory for girls.

In 1908 the magnificent new building known as Stephens Hall, was dedicated with much pomp and ceremony, President Hill of the Great Northern, being one of the speakers. The same year an industrial building was erected at a cost of \$15,000 and an administration building at a cost of \$40,000 and a girl's dormitory at a cost of \$25,000 have just been completed.

The school is a success and has been compelled to turn away students because of lack of accommodations.

The other farm is known as the Northeast Experiment Farm.

The Northeast Experiment Farm is located at Grand Rapids, Itasca county. It was established in 1896 and for the purpose of determining the agricultural possibilities of northeastern Minnesota.

It comprises a farm of 450 acres, 160 acres of which are under cultivation at the present time. Of the remainder about 200 acres have been partly cleared and are used for pasture, while the rest is still covered with the native forest.

The farm is quite representative of the different kinds of land of northeastern Minnesota. The early work of the farm was largely given to clearing the land and drainage. This was followed by experimental work with the different kinds of small grains, grasses, and root crops. The small

grains, wheat, oats and barley, have been grown successfully. Numerous varieties have been tested and the kind best adopted for northern conditions determined.

For the growth of hay, clover and timothy the country has been found especially favorable. Clover has failed but once in eight years. Under ordinary conditions its yield is commonly two tons per acre.

All kinds of root crops, especially potatoes, do very well. The same may be said of garden vegetables.

Corn as a rule will not mature, varieties are being produced adapted to this section and have yielded well the past two or three years. As a fodder for live stock the corn yield is equal to that of the best corn-growing districts of the State.

In the line of fruit, apples are still in an experimental state. Plums do well, but not always ripen before frost. All kinds of small fruit, especially strawberries and raspberries, do very well.

The legislature of 1909 accepted the old Indian school at Morris for the purpose of converting it into an agricultural school under the direction of the Board of Regents. The buildings already located upon the place were repaired and put into condition to open the school on the 5th of October, 1910. The money available for starting the school was sufficient only to make the most necessary repairs and provide the teaching force for the school. The attendance at the opening was a surprise to even the most sanguine friends of the institution. Sixty-three students appeared on the first day and this number has now increased to over 80, which is all that can possibly be accommodated with the present equipment.

THE AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION DIVISION.

The Agricultural Extension Division, established by the last legislature for the purpose of carrying agricultural information to the people of the state, has taken up the work along the following lines:

A press sheet is published twice a month and sent to the papers of the state, giving timely items in agriculture and information regarding the work done at this and other agricultural institutions. Every three weeks a page of illustrated agricultural matter is furnished to the American Press Association, which sends the page in plate form, at \$1.00 per page, to forty or more papers in the state. Popular bulletins are published each month and sent to any farmer in the state who asks for them. There are now 22,000 names on our mailing list. Each bulletin deals in a concise and practical way with some timely farm topic.

Representatives of the Extension Division spent one week last summer at each of 27 summer schools, giving instruction in sewing and baking. Agricultural instructors spent three days in each of 24 summer schools, giving instruction in agriculture. This was to enable rural school teachers to more effectively carry on the work of the State Industrial Contest, in which 15,000 boys and girls in 40 different counties in the state took part during the last year.

Two hundred sixty-eight lectures were given in high schools in home economics and agriculture by Extension workers, and a total of 18,523 people were reached. A one week course in dairying was given to 26 dairymen in Todd County. Three hundred thirty-one rural schools were visited by Extension workers, and 16,161 persons reached. Seventy-one local meetings were held in connection with Farmers' Clubs and Dairy Associations, with a total attendance of 7,853. Eight farmers' picnics were attended, with a total attendance of 5,200. Eighteen demonstration farms have been established and operated under the direction of Extension workers in co-operation with farmers. A correspondence course, covering the subjects given in the School of Agriculture, is being prepared.

There is a constantly increasing demand for this type of work along practically every line we have been working. Requests for Extension bulletins are coming in at the rate of from 500 to 1,000 per week; and our mailing list should be, and no doubt will be, at least 100,000 within the next two years.

At the 1911 session an act was passed directing the board of regents to purchase land near the cities of Waseca and Duluth for the purpose of establishing sub-experiment and demonstration farms, wherein shall be taught the clearing of cut-over timber land, and the developing of the same, the growing of field and garden crops, the breeding, feeding and caring for dairy cows, etc. For the former institution \$35,000 was appropriated, and for the latter \$65,000.



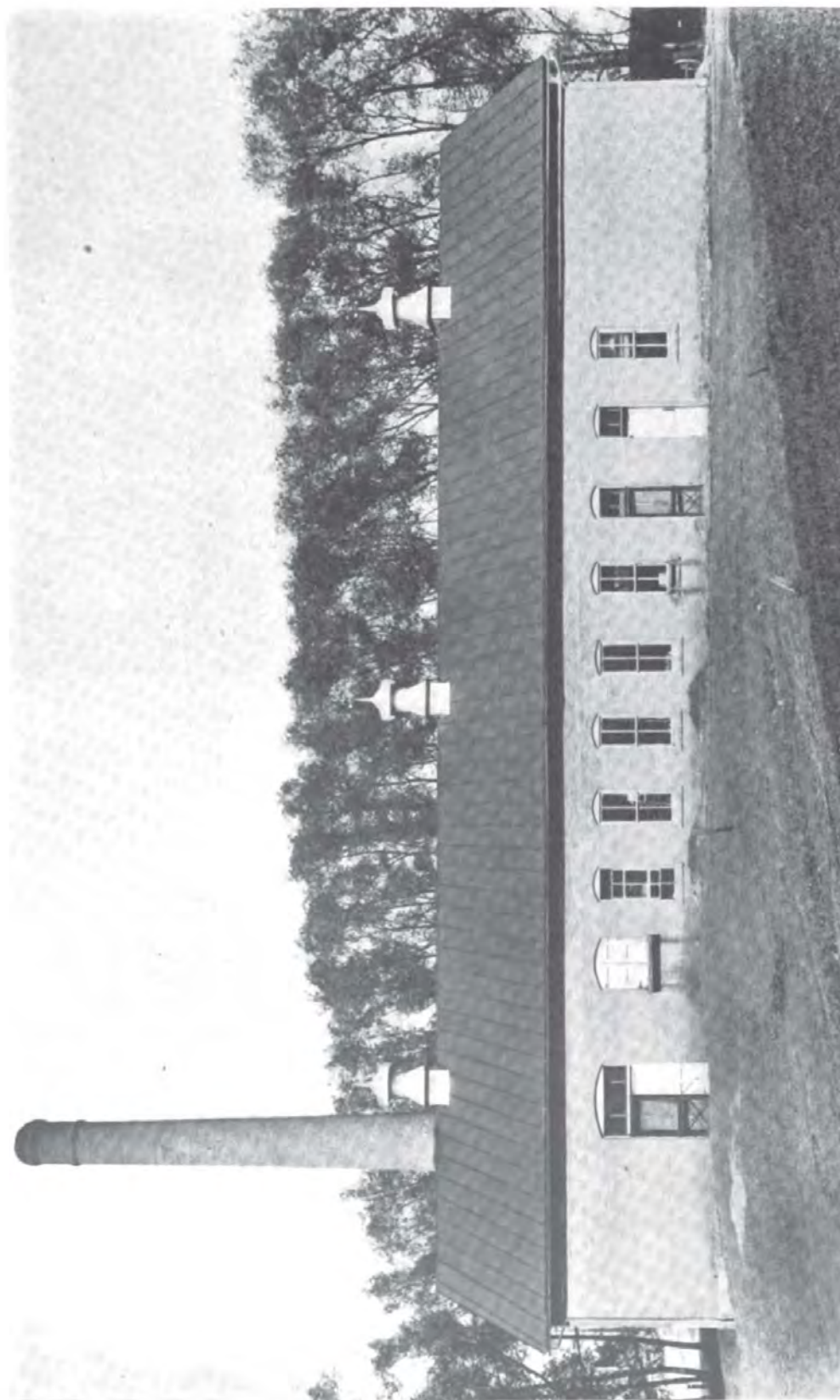
James J. Hill Building, Crookston School of Agriculture.

A new agricultural class room and laboratory building was completed Dec. 1, 1912. It was dedicated Dec. 5, 1912, and named the James J. Hill Building. Although the building has simple lines, it is very well built and is excellently equipped with furniture and class room fixtures. The building, with equipment, cost \$40,000.

The first floor consists of class rooms for the horticultural and farm botany department. There are also two locker rooms, one for the boys and one for the girls, as well as an office for the Horticulturist.

On the second floor there is the Agronomy lecture room, the Farm Crops laboratory, a grain storage room, and a museum to be used for exhibits and demonstrations. The Agronomy lecture room will be fitted with a stereopticon to give illustrated lectures to the students. The museum is fitted with cases of various kinds in which will be exhibited models of farm buildings, sanitary domestic appliances, etc. Its main function is to show what is needed in farm homes. There is also an office for the Agronomist on the second floor.

The third floor consists of an English recitation room, Farm Mathematics room, Agricultural Physics and Chemistry laboratory and recitation rooms.

ALBERT LEA STATE CREAMERY.

The business of manufacturing butter in factories started in this state sometime in the eighties. From that time to the present day the industry has gone through various phases of development. Through this period of development, in its various stages, the information obtained for building up on progressive lines, by those engaged in the business, has been chiefly gleanings from the experience of others. No attempt has been made by anyone anywhere to spend money in experimenting to solve any of the problems that come up from time to time. The Division at the Experiment Station, under the charge of Prof. T. L. Haecker, later aided by the Dairy & Food Department, has given attention to the dissemination of knowledge in regard to the most up to date methods and practices in the business, but the information sent out has come almost entirely by observing the different methods practiced in the creameries throughout the state. All of these practices have come about through an attempt on the part of the men engaged in the industry to carefully and economically manage their business, and practically no money has been spent in advanced investigation as to the practicability of the different methods of conducting their business nor for discovering new and progressive methods.

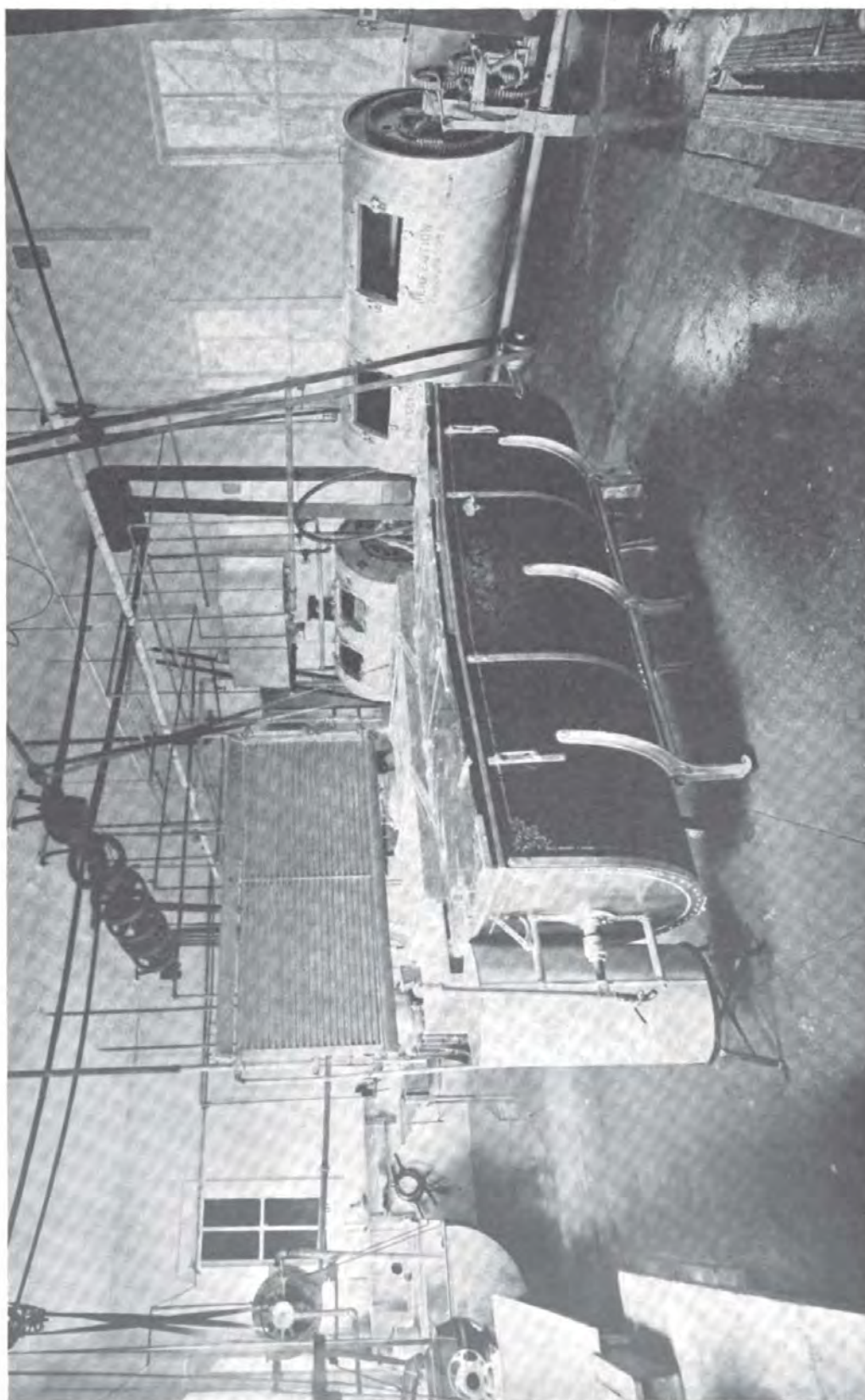
It is not in keeping with the progressive spirit of an important dairy state like Minnesota that some experimental conditions had not been created to assist in the development of this important work, and it remained for the Legislature of 1911 to establish an experimental creamery in Albert Lea to meet the problems that come up and spend the money necessary for determining the value of new methods, and to point the way to better and more progressive methods of operating the creameries of the state. That this creamery can be of immense value in developing this important industry can be accepted without further argument.

The accounting and business management of the creameries in the state are in such a rudimentary condition that if it did no more than satisfactorily solve these problems and give to the creamery managers concise and comprehensive information in regard to satisfactory methods to employ, the experimental creamery would be well worth what it costs the state to operate it. And there are many other things which this creamery can set itself to make right.

The question of refrigeration is one needing particular attention at this time. Several methods are used, without showing definitely which is the most economical, and some of them are so inefficient that the money expended on them is practically wasted, and it is necessary to send out information among the creameries of the state to avoid consequent losses.

So we could go on and show through the different parts of the creamery business the need for this experimental creamery, but space allows us to enumerate only a few of the most important things. The economical use of fuel is a subject needing particular attention, and in this line also comes labor. Then, we have also the innumerable questions that come up as to the proper handling of the raw material through the whole process of manufacture in order to obtain satisfactory results.

This creamery will be used as a school to give to the buttermakers of the state a training that could be obtained in no other way. The establishment of this experimental creamery is a mile stone in the development of the dairy industry Minnesota.

STATE NORMAL SCHOOLS.

The normal school system of the state was inaugurated by the legislature of 1858, making provision for the organization of three schools, upon donations from localities desiring the schools, or five thousand dollars from each locality. Under this law schools were established at Winona, Mankato and St. Cloud; and in 1885 a fourth school was located at Moorhead; the fifth school opened at Duluth, September, 1902.

The normal schools give scholastic and professional training to those who aspire to become teachers in the elementary schools of the state, and stand in relations of closest contact and sympathy with the rural schools. The majority of the students enter direct from the rural schools, and a large proportion support themselves by alternately teaching in the rural schools and attending the normal schools as means and circumstances permit. Thus they bring from their experience as actual teachers a devotion and zeal for professional studies which few other students possess, and in turn carry back to their teaching in rural schools a better preparation, newer methods, higher ideals and greater skill in their chosen work. work in common and lower grade schools.

The normal department embraces the following courses of study:

An Elementary Course of Three Years, designed to fit teachers for work in Common and lower grades.

An Advanced Course of Five Years, which gives the preparation needed by teachers of higher as well as lower grades.

A professional course of One or Two Years, for students who are graduates of approved high schools.

A Kindergarten Training Course of Two Years, for students who are graduates of high schools, and who desire to equip themselves especially for kindergarten or first primary work.

Winona Normal. By an act of the legislature of 1858, less than four months after the State was admitted into the Union, provision was made for the establishment of three normal schools "to educate and prepare teachers for teaching in the common schools of this State." Under the provision of this act the normal school at Winona was opened in September, 1860, with a principal and one assistant in a building having accommodations for forty students. This was the first normal school opened west of the Mississippi river, and it preceded by two years the establishment of a school system for the State. Since September, 1864, this school has been in continuous operation. The first class was graduated in 1866, and since then the graduates and undergraduates number nearly 13,000. A model school was established in 1864, and a kindergarten training course

in 1880. In 1900 manual training became a part of the curriculum of study. The original cost of the building and grounds was \$134,000, of which the city and the citizens of Winona donated \$32,450.

The Mankato Normal was opened in 1868, since which time it has issued diplomas to nearly 2,000, and a partial training to many times that number. The course includes the five-year English and Latin courses, the one-year and two-year courses for high school graduates, the three-year elementary course for more mature students, and a kindergarten training course.

The St. Cloud Normal was provided for by the legislature of 1866, and was opened in 1869. It has graduated nearly 2,000 pupils up to the present time.

The Moorhead Normal was the fourth school of its kind provided for by the legislature, the act passing in 1885. The site is a gift of Hon. S. G. Comstock. The buildings are modern and include a main building, a dormitory for young ladies, and an addition to the main building which contains a beautiful auditorium, library, biological laboratories, gymnasium and bath rooms. The school was opened August 29, 1888, with a membership of 42, and since that time the growth of the school has been steady and continuous.

The Duluth Normal was established by the 1895 legislature. The partially completed building was destroyed by fire in 1901 and it was not until Sept. 2, 1902, that the school was thrown open to enrollment.

SCHOOLS FOR DEFECTIVES.

By the law of 1901 these institutions, located at Faribault, were placed under the direction of the board of control. In 1858 the legislature made provisions for the education of the deaf and dumb, but the school was not opened until 1863, and in 1866 the first appropriation for a building was made. The school for the deaf, now under the supervision of J. N. Tate, has an enrollment of nearly 400 and the pupils receive instruction in the following trades and handicrafts: Baking, blacksmithing, cabinet-making, chair-caning, carpentry, cooking, drawing, dressmaking, fancy work, glazing, ironing, painting, printing, sewing, shoe-making, sloyd, wood carving, wood inlaying, and wood turning. A large part of the repairing to buildings and furniture is done by the pupils. So the trades are not only schools for the pupils, but are a means of revenue to the state. The industrial training in this institution is regarded as second in importance only to that done in the literary department. The proper age for admission is eight years. The regular school period is ten years, to which a special course of three years may be added.

The School for the Blind, under the superintendency of James J. Dow, is located one mile from the school for the deaf. It was established in 1866 and in 1868 it was combined with the School for the Deaf, but in 1874 it was finally separated from that school and placed in the location which it now occupies. The school is open to all blind persons residing in the state of

Minnesota who are between the ages of six and twenty-five years. Board, care and instruction are furnished to all pupils without charge. The school is organized on the basis of the school system of the state, with an elementary course of eight years and a secondary or high school course of four years. Manual and industrial training is given in sewing, knitting and fancy work, in sloyd, rattan and willow work, in hammock and net weaving, and in broom and whisk making.

The School for Feeble-Minded and Colony of Epileptics, with Dr. A. C. Rogers as superintendent, grew out of the providing for a commission in 1879, the power of which was to select from the patients at the hospital for insane such children as were feeble-minded or idiotic, and not properly belonging with the insane, and assign them to the care of the directors of the Faribault institution. A large frame building situated about one-half mile south of the school for the deaf was rented by the board of the "experimental" school, and a veteran specialist, Dr. H. M. Knight of Connecticut, was employed to organize the work, and his son, Dr. Geo. H. Knight, was placed in charge under the title of "acting superintendent," the nominal supervision resting with the superintendent of the school for the deaf till 1882, when a separation was made in name, as it had formerly existed in practice. Dr. Knight resigned in 1885 and Dr. A. C. Rogers, formerly assistant physician to the Iowa institution for feeble-minded at Glenwood, was appointed in his place. The entire institution comprises about sixty buildings of all kinds, which with heating, plumbing and lighting equipment is valued at \$900,000.

The present main building was begun in 1881, by the erection of what is now the north section of the north wing of the "Center," containing the administration offices, school and training departments, store rooms, teachers' quarters, living rooms and dormitories for the younger school children and dining rooms for all school children and nearly all of the help connected with this department. This building is constructed of local blue lime stone. Grouped about it are two dormitories for school and working girls, one of lime stone and one of hollow brick, cement finish; central kitchen and bakery of brick and ice and vegetable storage structures of brick and concrete. Capacity of center group 470 inmates. The Custodia consists of two groups of buildings, one for boys and one for girls. The former is known as "Sunnyside," built of brick, and two annexes both of brick, with a total capacity of 300. The latter is known as "George E. Skinner Hall," is of brick construction and an annex built of concrete. Total capacity 350. The epileptic department consists of three brick cottages for males, located about one-third mile distant from the main building, on the dairy farm and garden, and two brick cottages for females, located near the girls' custodial group. Total capacity 230 patients. On the dairy farm and garden about one-fourth mile distant from the epileptic men and boys is a family of working farm boys in a model cottage of wood construction with a capacity of 50. The Walcott farm of 507 acres is located four and one-half miles (by road) south from the center plant. There are two hospital buildings, one general, constructed of brick, with 60 beds,

and one for the cases of tuberculosis, constructed of brick and cement, with 28 beds. In addition, the law provides that this institution shall care for certain cases of incurable physical helplessness. No buildings have been provided for this class though a few patients are being cared for. Total capacity of institution, 1,400. Total value of building and grounds, \$1,028,437.

Crippled and Deformed Children. In 1905 a commission was created to investigate the advisability of establishing a State hospital for the treatment, care and education of crippled and deformed children, who are indigent, the creation of the commission following a law passed in 1897 providing for the care of such children. In 1907 the city of St. Paul tendered to the State, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions and suggestions of both acts, a tract of land adjoining the St. Paul city hospital, on which there was already constructed two two-story and basement brick buildings, then used for the care of crippled and deformed children, free of charge. In addition certain citizens and commercial bodies tendered to the State as a gift 23 acres abutting on Phalen Park in said city, which was to be used in connection with the hospital as a fresh air sanitarium for convalescent crippled children. The same sources offered to donate \$5,000 towards the construction of cottages on the Park site for the use of the children. The magnificent gift was immediately accepted by the 1907 legislative body and the "State Hospital for Indigent, Crippled and Deformed Children" was established by Chapter 81 of the laws of that session. The board of control is given supervision over the property and of the admission of children to the hospital.

The Public School for indigent children is located at Owatonna; and here several hundred children, who have become orphans, or whose parents have neglected, or are so unfortunate as to be unable to provide for them, are cared for by the state, and are being given education according to their years. Homes are found for them as soon as they reach a certain age. The institution has been in successful operation for more than 20 years.

STATE CORRECTIONAL AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

STATE BOARD OF CONTROL.

This is a board consisting of three members appointed by the Governor, whose powers and duties are prescribed by law. It has general supervision over the State Hospitals and Asylums for the Insane, the School for Feeble Minded and Colony for Epileptics at Faribault, the State Training School, the State Reformatory and the State Prison, and financial supervision of the State Public School at Owatonna and of the School for the Blind and School for the Deaf at Faribault. Its duties include the purchase of all supplies and equipment for the above institutions and the supervision of the construction and repair of buildings.

In addition to the general control of the above named institutions, this board is charged with full authority in all matters of the State University and the State Normal Schools relating to the erection and construction of new buildings, the purchasing of fuel and the placing of insurance on buildings and contents. It is also charged with the purchase of supplies and fuel for the State Capitol and the placing of insurance on all state buildings except the Soldiers' Home. The State Board of Control also has charge of the examination and approval of plans for jails and lockups, the inspection and condemnation of jails and lockups, the deportation of non-resident dependents, the regulation of the importation of juvenile dependents; and the further duty of passing upon applications for paroles and discharges from the State Reformatory, the paroling of prisoners from the State Prison, and the paroling and discharge of inmates from the State Training School, as well as the general supervision of all paroled inmates of the three last-named institutions. At the Prison, Reformatory and Training School a meeting is held each month for the purpose of hearing applications for discharge and parole and complaints on the part of inmates.

St. Peter Hospital. The state legislature, at its session in 1866, passed an act establishing the Minnesota Hospital for Insane, and appointed commissioners to locate the same. It was located at St. Peter, the citizens generously presenting the state with a fine farm of two hundred and ten acres, one mile south of the city. An appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars was made for temporary provision and support of the insane. At the session of the legislature in 1867 forty thousand dollars were appropriated for a permanent building on the farm acquired. Plans were obtained and the building commenced. Temporary quarters had been provided and opened

for the reception of patients in October, 1866, to which the patients, previously boarded at the hospital in Iowa, were brought. Dr. Samuel E. Shantz of Utica, N. Y., was elected by the trustees superintendent and physician. Under Dr. Shantz the temporary hospital was organized and directed until his death in August, 1868, when he was succeeded by Dr. C. K. Bartlett of Northampton, Mass. Appropriations were made from year to year for building purposes until the plans were completed in 1876. Dr. Bartlett remained in charge of the institution until January the first, 1893, when he was succeeded by the present superintendent.

Rochester State Hospital. By a special law passed by the legislature of 1873, and amended in 1874, a tax of \$10 on all liquor dealers was assessed to raise a fund for the establishment of a state inebriate asylum, and when completed it was to be maintained by a continuation of the same tax. As soon as a sufficient fund was accumulated the inebriate asylum board purchased a farm of 160 acres, within a mile and a half of the city of Rochester, for \$9,000. They secured plans and began building in 1877. Later on it became apparent, and was admitted generally, that room was much more urgently needed for the care of the rapidly increasing insane of the state than for inebriates. The legislature of 1878, considering this point, and in view of the determined opposition to the inebriate asylum to be built and maintained on this plan, repealed the act levying the tax, and changed it to the Second Minnesota Hospital for Insane (since changed to the Rochester State Hospital), with the proviso, however, that inebriates should be admitted into the institution and cared for and treated at the expense of the state on the same basis as the insane. On January 1, 1879, the institution was opened for the reception of patients. The hospital farm contains 680 acres.

Fergus Falls State Hospital. In 1885 the legislature established a commission to locate a third hospital in the northern section of the state. The commission received several propositions from important towns in the section designated, and finally accepted the proposal from Fergus Falls. The state secured the title of 636 acres of land, and in 1887 the legislature formally located the hospital and established the same at Fergus Falls, appropriating \$94,280 therefor, of which amount \$24,280 was designated as payment for the land, \$50,000 for building and furnishing a detached ward, and \$20,000 for boiler house and engine, laundry, shops and stables, and for sewerage and water connections. The appropriations for buildings contemplated the erection of so much as would be necessary to accommodate 300 persons. The various buildings contemplated in the original plan were all completed in 1900. The normal capacity of the institution is 1,300 patients. The total valuation of the hospital property is approximately \$1,000,000. The hospital was first opened, July 29th, 1890.

The State Asylum at Anoka was opened March 14, 1900, with one hundred patients. This number has been increased from time to time until the inmates now number over 300. The farm operated in connection with the asylum contains 648 acres, operated by the inmates under the direction

of competent foremen. Since the opening of the asylum two modern barns have been built for the accommodation of the stock and farm machinery. A fire-proof cottage for females has been built, which is very handsome in design, and complete in all its appointments and will accommodate fifty people.

Hastings State Asylum. The legislature at its session in 1899 passed an act locating the Second State Asylum for the Insane at Hastings. There are 643 acres of land connected with the institution, of which 450 acres are under cultivation. The present buildings consist of center building and two transverse wings, built of red brick; the women's cottage, heating and lighting plant and waterworks, and two cottages for men. They are fire-proof buildings built of pressed brick. The institution was opened on April 26, 1900.

Detention Hospitals at Fergus Falls, Rochester and St. Peter are provided for, where persons found to be insane, except those criminally insane, are to be committed to these detention hospitals and kept and treated there until the superintendent certifies that the person is not insane or is a fit subject for the state hospital for the insane.

An Asylum for Dangerous Insane is located at St. Peter, and this institution receives insane persons, idiots, imbeciles, and epileptics who are committed by courts of criminal jurisdiction or those who may be transferred from other hospitals on the certificate of being dangerously insane. An inmate of a penal institution who is likewise certified to be dangerously insane is to be received at this institution.

Training School for Boys. This institution is located near Red Wing, and is for the education and training of the delinquent and criminal boys who may be committed to its guardianship by the courts of the state. Justice and municipal courts have authority to commit boys. They are committed between the ages of eight and seventeen years, and remain under the guardianship of the Institution until they are twenty-one years old. The board of control of state institutions has authority to parole. The buildings are the administration building, with the boys' dining hall and kitchen attached, three cottages, all alike, power house and shop building, greenhouses and cold storage. A school house, patterned after the modern graded school building of six rooms and one large assembly room, houses the schools. Besides the common branches up to and including the eighth grade, drawing is taught. All boys go to school about four hours each day. An opportunity to get a fair start in the following trades is afforded: Carpentry, blacksmithing, laundering, tailoring, printing, shoemaking, painting, cooking and floriculture.

Training School for Girls. Under chapter 282, of the general laws 1907, the state industrial school for girls was created. In connection therewith, the act provides for the appointment of a board of women visitors to be appointed by the governor. This law was enacted for the purpose of separating the school for girls from that of the school for boys at Red Wing, already located at Red Wing. The board of control was instructed by the

act to invite proposals for a site for the state industrial school for girls of not less than 160 acres, situated in any county in this state, and by virtue of the provisions of the act, the board, more than four years ago, decided on the location of this institution at Sauk Center, in Stearns county, and since that time the board has been engaged in erecting cottages for the reception of the girls from the Red Wing school, a transfer from which has already been made. The advisory board is required to inspect the training school twice in each year at such times as the board deems best. The members are to serve without compensation, except such expenses actually incurred in the performance of their duties.

The girls are employed in sewing, knitting, cooking, laundering and general housework. They also have a large garden, some small fruit and considerable poultry, which, together with their flower gardens and lawns, keeps them reasonably busy.

The Minnesota State Reformatory, located at St. Cloud, is designated for the reception of first offenders in felony only, but persons are frequently committed to the reformatory who have been previously imprisoned in state prisons and other institutions for serious offenses because the trial courts are not in possession of accurate information concerning their past life. Inmates of the reformatory for sufficient cause may be transferred to the state prison at Stillwater, and it has sometimes been found necessary to order their transfer. All inmates of the reformatory are received on the indeterminate plan except United States prisoners and persons received on transfer from the State Training School. The federal prisoners have fixed terms of sentence, and those transferred from the State Training School remain under the jurisdiction of the reformatory until they reach their majority. The age limits for inmates are sixteen and thirty years. Inmates are paroled whenever such a course seems best and proper employment can be procured.

The Minnesota Prison is the penal institution of the state. Here is carried on the manufacturing of binding twine, which is sold to Minnesota farmers at a little more than actual cost of manufacture; and, as the price charged is from two to two and one-half cents per pound below the price charged by outside jobbers and manufacturers to dealers, and as it is just as good as any twine made by outside concerns, it is in great demand, the entire output being usually disposed of before the first of May. The plant has grown gradually until it now has a capacity of over thirteen million pounds per annum. Something over 225 inmates are employed in the shoe factory all the year around. The company pays a stated price for each piece of work turned out, and the per diem earnings of the prisoners is larger than in any other prison in the country. The volume of business of these two industries amounts annually to about \$2,000,000.00. Of this total, returns from the twine factory, operated on "state account," amount to over \$1,000,000. In order that every inmate may be given an opportunity to acquire the foundation of a good education, there is in connection with the prison a night school in operation eight months in the year. The better educated prisoners are privileged to join a branch of the Chau-

tauqua Society, which is located within the walls of the institution. This circle is officered and managed entirely by inmates, and, under the direction of the main organization, pursues the regular course of Chautauqua study each year.

The Minnesota Soldiers' Home is located at Minnehaha Falls. Its object is to provide for all honorably discharged ex-soldiers, sailors and marines who served in the army and navy of the United States during the War of the Rebellion, Mexican war or the war with Spain, who now are or who may hereafter become citizens of the State of Minnesota, who, by reason of wounds, disease, old age or infirmities, are unable to earn their living, and who have no adequate means of support, and the board of trustees are also authorized to admit wives with their husbands and the widows and mothers of those who are, or if living would be, eligible to admittance; but no wife or widow shall be admitted unless she shall have been married to her soldier husband prior to the year 1890, and no wife, widow or mother shall be admitted unless she shall be fifty-five years of age and shall have been a resident of the State of Minnesota not less than five years next preceding the date of her application. Its management is vested in a board of seven trustees, appointed by the governor. All expenses of maintaining the Soldiers' Home, including not only food, clothing, fuel and medicine, but also salaries, furniture, fixtures, books, nursing, burials and all repairs in excess of \$1,500 a year are paid from the "home support fund" in the state treasury. The fund consists: (1), of an annual appropriation by the state legislature, and of the per capita allowance from the United States government of \$100 a year for each member of the home (average present), not including those who served in the Indian wars, or women.

Morris School. Through the efforts of Hon. L. C. Spooner, a representative in the legislature from Stevens county, the state accepted the offer of the U. S. Government to give to the state the Indian school located near Morris, on condition that the same would be continued as a public institution. At the 1911 session Mr. Spooner secured an extensive appropriation, amounting to over \$225,000 for the construction of additional buildings, and for placing the school on a firm basis. The school is now being successfully operated by the state.

The Administration Building was built in 1910 at a cost of \$40,000. This building contains the administrative offices, the library, reading room, gymnasium with shower baths, and a fine auditorium seating over 500. It was named the "David L. Kiehle Building" in honor of Mr. Kiehle, state superintendent of public instruction at the time the school was organized at St. Anthony Park and who was influential in creating sentiment in favor of agricultural teaching at that time.

The Girls' Dormitory was built in 1910 at a cost of \$25,000. This contains dormitory rooms for the girls and a suite of rooms for the preceptress. It was named "Robertson Hall" in honor of Supt. Wm. Robertson who was the first superintendent of the school here and who died while holding that office.

The Farm Engineering and Dairy building was built in 1908 at a cost of \$25,000. It contains the dairy department, stock judging room, carpentry shop, blacksmithing shop, and farm machinery room. It was named the "Sidney M. Owen Building" after Mr. Owen who was a member of the Board of Regents and did much for agricultural interests.

MISCELLANEOUS.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Minnesota Tax Commission, created in 1907, exercises general supervision over the administration of the assessment and taxation laws of the state, over assessors, town, county and state boards of review and equalization, and all other assessing officers. It is given power to issue instructions and directions to local assessors and call meetings of local assessors of each county for the purpose of receiving instructions as to the laws governing the assessment and taxation of all classes of property. It is also authorized to enforce the laws relating to the liability and punishment of public officers who fail to comply with the provisions of the law governing the returns of assessment and taxation of property in so far as it relates to their duties and as to their removal from office. County attorneys may be directed by them to commence prosecutions for violations of the law. All public officers are required to report to it as to the assessment of property, collection of taxes received from licenses and other sources, and individuals, co-partnerships, companies, corporations and associations are to furnish any information asked for relative to their capital, funded or other debt, taxes or other information required by law for taxation purposes. The commission may summon witnesses to appear before it, and give testimony relating to any tax matter, and to cause the depositions of witnesses, within or without the state, relative to the same subject.

The Insurance Department of the State of Minnesota was organized in 1872. The department has supervision of all classes of insurance companies, which consist of life insurance companies, both upon the level premium and assessment plan; fraternal insurance companies, fire, marine, accident, health, employers' liability, credit, burglary, fidelity, title, plate glass, and sprinkler leakage. The fire insurance companies are divided into many kinds, including stock fire, mutual, and farmers' mutual.

The commissioner is required to examine each domestic company at least once in two years, and he may examine foreign companies whenever in his opinion such examination is necessary.

The Office of Public Examiner was created in 1878 by the appointment, to be made by the governor for the term of three years, of a competent person, who shall be a skillful accountant and well versed as an expert in the theory and practice of bookkeeping. The duties of this officer, being of a fiduciary character, his bonds were fixed at \$50,000 for their faithful discharge. The law gives him almost unlimited power in the examination of the accounts of public officers, state and county. He prescribes and enforces correct methods of keeping the financial accounts of state institutions, coun-

ty offices and banking institutions; visits them twice annually, and makes an exhaustive inspection of their books and the detailed items of expenditure. With reference to county officers, it is his duty to enforce a correct and uniform system of bookkeeping by auditors and treasurers, so as to insure the thorough supervision and safety of the public fund. The jurisdiction of the public examiner embraces the financial officers of the city of St. Paul. The public examiner also examines the books of all corporations paying a gross earnings tax to the state, viz., the railroad companies, the sleeping car companies and the telephone companies.

Superintendent of Banks. By an act of the 1909 legislature the visitation of state banks, etc., was divorced from the public examiner's office, and a new department under the above caption was created, the law going into effect August 1, 1909, when John B. Galarneault of Aitkin was appointed to hold office until January 3, 1911, or until his successor was appointed. By the act the superintendent or his deputies, have authority to visit each of the banking, savings and other moneyed corporations created under the laws of this state, and thoroughly examine into their affairs and ascertain their financial condition at least once in each year. It shall be his duty to carefully inspect and verify the validity and amount of securities and assets held by such institutions, examine into the validity of the mortgages held by savings banks, and see that the same are duly recorded, and ascertain the nature and amount of any discount or other banking transactions which he may deem foreign to the legitimate and lawful purposes of savings institutions. The law also requires him to ascertain the financial standing of all bondsmen of state and county officials; and pass upon the sufficiency of such bonds.

Dairy and Food Commissioner. The dairy industry of Minnesota is among its most important factors in the development of the state, and it is more closely allied to the whole people than any other. The first co-operative creamery in Minnesota was erected in Freeborn county seventeen years ago, and today there are between 500 and 600 of them scattered over the state, in fact there is hardly another state that has so many successful co-operative creameries. No department in the country has made greater efforts to protect the public health through the enforcement of the pure food laws than our own, and it is an established fact that our food inspectors have taken up a larger number of samples annually than are reported by any similar department in the United States.

Bureau of Labor, Industries and Commerce was created by the 1907 legislature, to which is given a wide power for the inspection of industrial and labor conditions in Minnesota, and inspection of factories, etc., is authorized during all reasonable hours. Employers of labor are required to furnish information upon request, although the courts may modify the request of the labor department. Free employment bureaus are established in all cities of over 50,000 population, which at the present time embraces only the cities of Duluth, Minneapolis and St. Paul. No child under 14 years is permitted to work at any time in a factory, mill or work-shop or about any

mine and during the school period; it is made unlawful for any person or corporation to employ any child under 16 years of age, unless an employment certificate is first secured.

Railroad and Warehouse. The first legislation enacted in Minnesota for the regulation of railroads was the act providing for a railroad commissioner, approved March 4, 1871. This act provided for one commissioner to be appointed by the governor. The term of office was fixed at two years; the salary was made \$3,000 per annum. Governor Austin appointed under this act A. J. Edgerton, who served until March, 1875. The powers of the commissioner were very limited, practically confined to inspecting the railways and reporting to the legislature his recommendations. This was superseded by the law enacted March 6, 1874, creating a board of railroad commissioners consisting of three members, to be appointed by the governor for a term of two years. The powers of the board were largely increased, including authority "to make and establish a schedule of rates, said schedule or revisions of the same to be deemed and taken in all courts as prima facie evidence as reasonable maximum rates." In 1875 the office was made elective, with only one commissioner, and on March 5, 1885, the three member commission, to be appointed by the governor, was again created, but in 1899 the commission was made elective, with Ira B. Mills, Joseph G. Miller and Charles F. Staples as the elected members, in November of 1890. The first secretary of the commission was Eli S. Warner, who served from January, 1885, till January, 1889. He was succeeded by Tams Bixby, who served until September, 1890, when he resigned. He was succeeded by A. K. Teisberg, who served until September, 1901. A. C. Clausen was appointed at that time and is the present secretary. The most important work undertaken by the commission during its thirty-six years' existence as a state department was accomplished during 1905-06, and the results were reported to the legislature at its thirty-fifth session of 1907. This was an investigation into the reasonableness of merchandise and commodity rates pursuant to a legislative resolution passed by the legislature of 1905. These labors resulted in the adoption and promulgation of new schedules of maximum merchandise and commodity rates showing an average reduction of nearly 25 per cent from those previously in force.

Weights and Measures. A department of weights and measures was created by the legislature of 1911, and placed under the supervision of the railroad and warehouse commission, the latter having the commissioner and other employees to designate. The weights and measures are to conform to the standards at Washington, and full power of inspection is given to all public scales, and the possession of false scales is made a misdemeanor. Employees have police power, and \$10,000 was appropriated to enforce the act. Fees for inspection are provided for.

Grain Inspection. The system of inspection, weighing and registration of grain has been in existence and operation in this state since June 1, 1885, a period of over twenty years. Previous to its establishment the control of grain inspection and weighing was vested in the boards of trade at St.

Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth, the members of these commercial bodies each year choosing the official inspectors and weighers by ballot. The inspection department is under the supervision of a chief inspector, who is appointed by the railroad and warehouse commission, and it is divided into seven districts, St. Paul, Minneapolis, St. Cloud, Duluth, New Prague, Montgomery, and Sleepy Eye, each comprising a district. In each of these districts a chief deputy inspector has direct control of the work, and has in charge as many deputies and helpers as the work requires. Each district except Sleepy Eye has a weighing department in charge of a state weighmaster, with such number of assistant weighers as he may require. Assistant weighers are also stationed at Faribault and Kasota.

Minnesota Historical Society. The Minnesota Historical Society was organized under an act passed by the first session of the territorial legislature, in 1849, and is therefore the oldest institution in the state. Its objects are the collection, preservation, and publication of materials relating to the history of this state and the development of its resources; to collect biographic sketches and portraits of its pioneers and prominent citizens; to record their work in settling the state and building up its towns, cities, and institutions; to preserve an account of its Indian tribes; to gather a museum of articles illustrative of the conditions of the settlement and later history of Minnesota, of the aboriginal people who built the thousands of prehistoric mounds in this state, and of the tribes who were living here when the first white men reached this region; to collect and maintain for the use of the public a reference library of books, pamphlets, maps and manuscripts on the local and general history, resources and development of Minnesota, of the United States and the world, and to promote the knowledge of these subjects among the citizens of the state. The library contains 68,928 bound and 36,436 unbound volumes, in total 105,364, all of which have been carefully selected and are practically valuable, some being very rare. In the newspaper department the society has complete files of nearly all papers that have been and are being published in Minnesota. The many portraits, historical pictures, and framed documents, which have been donated to the society, and its museum, including very extensive archeological collections donated by the late Rev. Edward C. Mitchell, and the late Hon. J. V. Brower, are of great interest to visitors. Membership in the society is open to any citizen interested in its objects. The executive council comprises thirty, who are chosen from this membership, and, according to a statute of the state, the governor, lieutenant governor and the four other elective officers of the executive departments of the state government, who are ex-officio councilors. The officers of the society are elected by the council for three years.

Game and Fish. The execution of the laws relating to the propagation and preservation of game and fish is made the duty of the state game and fish commission, a body of five members, each appointed for four years by the governor. The commission is required to select one of its members as executive agent, which officer has the powers of the board when the same is not in session, and is the only salaried member. Other em-

ployes and officers of the commission include a superintendent of fisheries, superintendents of the several hatcheries, and a force of wardens. The work of the commission is supported by funds derived from several sources, including direct legislative appropriations for general and special purposes, from the sale of the various kinds of fishing and hunting licenses, and from the sale of contraband game, fish and paraphernalia for the propagation of the several species of food and game fishes.

State Library. This is designed to be a comprehensive and fairly complete collection of books on the subject of law and legislation. As a "working library" it now ranks with the best in the country, and, if conducted along the lines that are now being developed, it will eventually, in every way, compare favorably with the best and oldest state libraries. The librarian is appointed by the governor, and his assistant is appointed by the supreme court. The judges of the supreme court exercise a general supervision over the library and direct the purchase of books and prescribe the rules governing the library.

State Agricultural Society. The Minnesota State Agricultural Society dates its corporate existence from the year 1868, although for many years previous to that date, even into the territorial days, a society had been in existence covering the main features of the present organization. The annual fairs of the society were held in different localities, with varying financial success, until 1885, when the county of Ramsey conveyed to the State of Minnesota 200 acres of land midway between St. Paul and Minneapolis for the purpose of exhibiting thereon, under the management of the State Agricultural Society, or its successors, annually, the agriculture, stock-breeding, horticultural, mining, mechanical, industrial and other products and resources of the State of Minnesota, including proper exhibits of the arts, sciences and all other public displays pertinent to or attendant upon exhibitions and expositions of human art, industry or skill. The legislature met this munificent donation with the same liberal spirit that characterized the tender and appropriated \$100,000 for permanent improvements. The board of managers proceeded at once to erect such buildings as were necessary for holding the first exhibition on the new grounds, but it was found that, despite the most careful management, the grounds could not be put in condition for the use of the society without a greater expense than had been anticipated. The total expenditures for improvements aggregated \$131,319, and the amount beyond the \$100,000 was advanced by public spirited citizens of St. Paul and Minneapolis. During 1886 further expenditures equal to \$34,074, were incurred, and the state was again appealed to, and in 1887 an appropriation of \$50,000 was made. Further appropriations for permanent equipment have been made by each succeeding session of the legislature. In 1911 the legislature passed an act defining the membership of the society, whereby it is now composed of three delegates to be chosen annually by one County Agricultural society in each county in the state which shall maintain an active existence, hold annual fairs and be entitled to share in the state appropriation under the provisions of Section 3098. If any such county society fails to choose delegates, then the Presi-

dent, Secretary and Treasurer thereof shall, by virtue of their offices, be the delegates from such society. Where there is more than one county agricultural society in any county of this state, only one, and that the senior, society shall be entitled to choose such delegates. Such seniority shall be determined by the State Auditor, and in all cases where more than one such society in any county in the state shall claim such seniority, no delegates from any of such societies shall be recognized unless their credentials be accompanied by a certificate of such seniority, duly issued and signed by the State Auditor; provided, when two or more counties of the state not having county agricultural societies maintain district agricultural societies they shall have the same privileges as county agricultural societies; such delegates shall be chosen from the county or district in which the society is located. Provided, further, that societies or associations heretofore decided by the State Auditor to be of equal age shall continue to share equally in the sums appropriated pursuant to this act so long as they otherwise comply with all the legal requirements, and delegates from such societies or associations shall each be entitled to one-half vote at the regular or special meeting. One delegate from such county in the state in which no county or district agricultural society exists to be appointed by the County Board of such county. Individuals, who by reason of eminent services in agriculture, horticulture or in the arts and sciences connected therewith, or of long and faithful service in the society or of benefits conferred upon it, may by two-thirds vote at any annual meeting be elected as honorary members. The number of such honorary members shall not at any time exceed its present membership; provided, that not more than one honorary member shall be elected annually. Each honorary member shall be entitled to one vote. Two delegates elected by, and the president, ex-officio, of the following societies and associations: the State Horticultural society; the State Dairymen's Association; the State Beekeepers' Association; the Minnesota Live Stock Breeders' Association; the Minnesota Field Crop Breeders' Association; the Minnesota Swine Breeders' Association; the Minnesota Sheep Breeders' Association; the Minnesota Horse Breeders' Association; the Minnesota Veterinary Association; the Minnesota Cattle Breeders' Association; the State Poultry Association; the Minnesota Implement Dealers' Association; the Minnesota Florists' Association; the Minnesota Garden Flowers Association; the Minnesota County Exhibitors' Association; the Minnesota Federation of County Fairs and the State Forestry Association; the following societies and associations shall be entitled to one vote each: the Minneapolis Market Gardeners' Association of Minnesota; the State Growers' Association; Minnesota Shorthorn Breeders' Association; Minnesota Guernsey Breeders' Association; Minnesota Jersey Breeders' Association; Minnesota Holstein-Friesian Breeders' Association, and Minnesota Hereford Breeders' Association; provided, that all such societies and associations shall be active and statewide in their scope and operation, hold annual meetings and be incorporated under the laws of the State of Minnesota, before being entitled to select such delegates. The societies and associations named in this sub-division shall file with the secretary of state on or before December 20

of each year, a report showing that said society or association has held a regular annual meeting for such year, a summary of its financial transactions, for the current year, and an affidavit of the president and secretary that it has a paid up membership of at least twenty-five. On or before January 5 of each year, the Secretary of State shall certify to the secretary of the state agricultural society, the names of such societies or associations herein named as have complied with the provisions hereof. The members of the governing board of the State Agricultural Society shall, by virtue of their offices as such, be members of said society and be entitled to one vote each. On all questions arising for determination by the State Agricultural Society, including the election of members of the governing board, each delegate present shall be entitled to one vote, and no proxies shall be recognized by said society, except when less than three delegates of any county or district agricultural society shall attend the annual meeting, those present may cast the full vote of said society. All delegates shall be accredited in writing and their credentials shall be signed by the president and secretary of the society or association represented. The annual meeting of the society occurs in St. Paul or Minneapolis on the second Tuesday in January each year and continues for three days, the election of officers occurring upon the last day of the session. A president and two vice presidents are elected to serve for one year and two managers to serve for three years at each annual meeting. The state appropriates \$4,000 annually to aid in the payment of premiums, and \$28,000 annually to aid in the payment of premiums at county and other fairs and exhibitions complying with the provisions of the law.

Minnesota State Horticultural Society is incorporated under the laws of the state, and has for its work the gathering and dissemination of knowledge pertaining to forestry, fruit and vegetable growing, the culture of flowers, etc., adapted to the soil and climate of Minnesota. The present working membership of the society consists of over two thousand professional and amateur horticulturists throughout the Northwest. The annual membership fee is \$1, while the life membership fee is \$10, payable in two annual installments of \$5 each, if preferred. Life members are entitled to all the privileges of the society, including its publications, during life, and to a file of the back reports, as complete as possible, some twenty volumes, constituting an invaluable horticultural library. The society has a plant breeders' auxiliary and also a woman's auxiliary, the former to encourage the origination of new horticultural plants, and the latter to awaken and foster an interest in horticulture among women.

The Minnesota Dairymen's Association (incorporated March 2, 1882) was organized Feb. 7, 1878, for the purpose of improving the Minnesota stock and dairy products by holding an annual meeting of the representatives of these interests and the distribution of literature on such subjects among the people of the state. The association is encouraged by a permanent appropriation of \$2,000 annually for the publication of its proceedings and distribution of dairy literature and dairy instruction.

Minnesota Butter and Cheese Makers' Association was organized in the fall of 1894, and is incorporated under the laws of the state, its special object being to advance the dairy interests of the state and to improve the quality of Minnesota dairy products. It holds an annual meeting, and pays premiums on butter and cheese exhibited, and participates in the appropriation allowed by the state for the encouragement of such organizations.

Farmers' Institutes. The holding of farmers' institutes has been in vogue for 25 years, or more. The government is vested in a board of administration. This board has for a long time consisted of six members, three of whom are chosen from the board of regents of the State University, and the other three are the presidents of the State Agricultural Society, the State Horticultural Society and the State Dairymen's Association. The three officers last mentioned hold their places for three years and at the close of that period the party who may have been elected as president of their association then becomes a member of the board of administration, to continue for a period of three years. The work was under the direction of Mr. O. C. Gregg from its beginning to early in 1907 when Prof. Jas. Wilson was elected to succeed him. The institutes are largely held during the winter months, commencing with some date in November, and closing about the middle of March. The Farmers' Institute Annual is now issued in a standard size of about 400 pages. As the name indicates, it is published each year, and contains the latest and best practical information concerning agriculture in all its branches, which includes the work of the field, stock interests and horticulture.

State Board of Health and Vital Statistics. The revised laws of 1905 have materially enlarged the duties of this board. In addition to its duties relative to the commonly accepted contagious diseases, it has authority to deal with such general problems as the manufacture into articles of commerce, other than food, of diseased, tainted, or decayed animal or vegetable matter; the business of scavenging and the disposal of sewage; the location of mortuaries and cemeteries, and the removal and burial of the dead; the management of lying-in houses and boarding places for infants, and the treatment of infants therein; the pollution of streams and other waters, and the distribution of water by private persons for drinking or domestic use; the construction and equipment, in respect to sanitary conditions, of schools, hospitals, almshouses, prisons, and other public institutions, and of lodging houses and other public sleeping places kept for gain; the treatment, in hospitals and elsewhere, of persons suffering from communicable diseases, the disinfection and quarantine of persons and places in case of such diseases, and the reporting of sickness and deaths therefrom; the furnishing of vaccine matter; the accumulation of filthy and unwholesome matter to the injury of the public health, and the removal thereof; and the collection, recording, and reporting of vital statistics. These laws also provide that all health officers throughout the state must be medical men.

The State Live Stock Sanitary Board was established by Chapter 352, Laws of 1903. The board consists of five members appointed by the governor. Three members of the board are persons financially interested in

the breeding and maintenance of live stock. The remaining two members are graduate veterinarians practicing in the state. The duties of the board are to protect the health of the domestic animals of the state, to determine and employ the most competent and practical means for the prevention, suppression, control and eradication of dangerous contagious and infectious diseases among domestic animals. The board is required to hold quarterly meetings in St. Paul on the Friday after the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October of each year. The annual meeting occurs at the regular quarterly meeting held in April. The secretary and executive officer, together with the field veterinarians are required to be graduate veterinarians, and are elected to their position for one year or until their successors are appointed.

State Sanatorium for Consumptives. This institution was definitely established by the act of the legislature of 1903, which also appropriated \$25,000 with which to secure a site and prepare for building. The site selected and purchased by the State Board of Control consists of 740 acres upon the southern extremity of Leech Lake, near Walker. The building which has been erected will accommodate twenty-eight patients in two wards. The number of patients that can be cared for has been increased by the erection of sleeping shacks on the grounds. An ornamental cottage has been erected for the former, which greatly adds to the attractiveness of the view from the front of the institution.

Printing Commission. The public printing of the State of Minnesota is under the control of commissioners of printing, comprising the secretary of state, state auditor and state treasurer. Biennially the commissioners elect a superintendent of printing. The public printing is divided into five classes, and let by the commissioners of printing by contract to the lowest bidder, sufficient bonds being required of contractors for faithful performance of the work.

The Minnesota Society for the Prevention of Cruelty was organized Oct. 21, 1869, for the purpose of preventing cruelty to animals throughout the State of Minnesota. It was recognized by the legislature of 1905 constituting the society a state bureau of child and animal protection. The governor, the superintendent of public instruction and the attorney-general are ex-officio members of the board of directors of said state bureau.

The Board of Pardons was created by chapter 23 of the General Laws of 1897, and consists of the governor, chief justice of the supreme court and the attorney general. Said board has the power to grant pardons and to commute the sentence of any person convicted of any offense against the laws of this state. The board holds regular meetings on the second Mondays of January, April, July and October of each year, and such other meetings as may be deemed expedient.

The State Board of Investment of the proceeds from sales of state lands consists of the governor, state auditor and state treasurer. This board controls the investment of the trust funds in the state treasury, and no purchase or disposition of securities can be made without its favorable

action. This board has entire charge of the loaning of school and university funds to counties, cities, villages, townships and school districts.

Notaries Public are appointed by the governor, for the term of seven years, upon a payment of a fee to the private secretary of three dollars and the filing of a bond in the sum of \$2,000.

The Legislature for the year 1913 is composed of sixty-three senators and one hundred and twenty representatives. The legislature meets biennially, commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January in odd numbered years. The session is limited to ninety legislative days by constitutional amendment, adopted at the general election of 1888. The legislative term of representatives is for two years and of senators for four years.

The State Elections are held on every even numbered year, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The official year commences on the first Monday in January, and the terms of office terminate at that time. Women may vote for school officers, and are eligible as school officers, county superintendents of schools, and to appointments as deputies by county officers, provided they are citizens of this state. The election law passed by the legislature of 1891 brought the entire state under the so-called Australian system of voting at general elections.

The Primary Election is held on Tuesday, seven weeks preceding any election (except town, village or special elections), for the purpose of choosing candidates for all state, county and city officers and elective members of school, park and library boards in cities of over 50,000 inhabitants, and all officers chosen wholly within any subdivision of the state. State officers being exempt. Primary election day constitutes the first day of registration for the ensuing election. All persons entitled to registration on such day are qualified to vote for candidates of the political party with which they affiliated and generally supported at the last general election, and with which they propose to affiliate at the next election.

Legal Holidays of the state, established by law, are: New Year's Day, the 1st of January; Christmas Day, the 25th of December; Lincoln's birthday, February 12th; Washington's birthday, February 22d; Memorial Day, May 30th; Independence Day, the 4th of July; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Good Friday, next preceding Easter Sunday; the general election day, the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in even numbered years. The statutes of the state indirectly recognize Sunday, and Thanksgiving Day as legal holidays by providing that maturing paper, bills of exchange, etc., falling due on those days shall be due and payable on the business day following.

Fiscal Year. Chapter 124, G. L. of 1883, provides that the fiscal year of all official reports should commence on the first day of August and close on the thirty-first day of July, except the reports of the insurance commissioner, which are made for the calendar year.

General Taxes become a lien upon real property from the first day of May of the year in which levied, but between grantor and grantee the lien does not attach until the next January. Tax sales by county auditor are made annually, on the second Monday in May, of the lands delinquent on the first Monday in January preceding June of the previous year. Payment of real estate taxes must be made on or before the first day of June for the taxes of the previous year. After that rate a penalty of ten per cent immediately attaches, which penalty carries it through the remaining seven months of the year. At the expiration of that time, if still unpaid, the tax is deemed delinquent, and an additional five per cent will be added. If still unpaid, the property for which the tax is delinquent will be sold on the second Monday of May. Chapter 54, of the General Laws of 1897, provides: "That if one-half of the amount of the tax on any real estate shall be paid before the first day of June of each year, then no penalty shall be charged or collected on the one-half remaining unpaid; provided, such one-half remaining unpaid shall be paid before the first day of November of each year; but if said remaining one-half of said tax shall not be paid before said first day of November, then a penalty of ten per cent shall immediately accrue, and thereafter be charged upon the one-half of any such real estate tax remaining unpaid." After the tax sale, the amount of the judgment against the property and for which it was sold draws interest at the rate of one per cent per month until redeemed, whether the same has been purchased or is bid in by the state. The redemption period extends for three years and until public notice of the time of expiration of such redemption has been made by the county auditor. The full period of redemption does not expire until sixty days after the proof of service of such notice has been filed with the county auditor.

Rights of Women. Women may vote for school officers. Property owned prior to marriage remains in her own right, as well as property acquired during marriage. She is practically given the same property rights in her married state, as the husband, and a recent legislative act permits the husband and wife to deed direct from one to the other. A widow is entitled to one-third of the property of her demised husband, and the homestead goes direct to her in case of no children—with children, she has a life estate in the same. Various personal property rights are given to her. In order to vote she must be naturalized, although the naturalization of the husband naturalizes the wife. Divorces are granted by the district courts under the usual statutory conditions.

State Drainage. Early legislation calling for drainage of the low, flat and swamp lands of the state has been superseded by various drainage laws, and the one under which the state carries on the work creates the state drainage commission consisting of the governor, auditor, and secretary of state, which commission names an engineer, and the latter designates his assistants. The legislature has appropriated \$100,000 annually for several years past to carry on the work, and vast tracts of land in northern Minnesota, belonging to the state, and to private parties, have been reclaimed for agricultural purposes.

Oil Inspection. An inspector of illuminating oils is appointed by the governor, and the inspector designates his deputies in the various counties. All fees are paid into the treasury, and a salary is paid the inspector and deputies.

The State Highway Commission was created by the 1905 legislature, which session provided for the levying of an annual tax, the proceeds from which, as well as from the internal improvement land fund, have been turned over to the commission for division among the different counties for building state roads. The division basis has been reached by taking an average of area, the road mileage and the assessed valuation of each county. The manner in which a county can avail itself of the state aid is by act of the county board in establishing a state road or bridge, after such is accomplished this commission pays one-third of the cost of the road and the county pays two-thirds of the cost. The road is built by contracts let by the county board, under the supervision of the state engineer.

The Minnesota Public Library Commission was created by an act of legislature in April, 1899. The board of directors is composed of the president of the State University, the state superintendent of public instruction, the secretary of the State Historical Society, each ex-officio, and two other members appointed by the governor. The executive officers appointed by this board are: (1), the secretary, who is responsible for the administration of the commission and supervises the extension work; and (2), the librarian of the department of traveling libraries. The purpose of the commission, as expressed in the law, is: (1), to give "advice and instruction to the managers of any public library, and to the trustees of any village, town, or community upon any matter pertaining to the organization, maintenance, or administration of libraries, and to assist, by counsel and encouragement, in the formation of libraries where none exist, or in improving those already established," and (2), to maintain a "state circulating library, from which any town, village, or community may borrow books." The general traveling libraries are made up of groups of 50 volumes each for small towns and villages, and of 25 volumes each for rural communities. They are loaned for six months upon application of ten taxpayers, and to a public library upon application of the board of directors. A fee of \$1.00 for 50 books and 50 cents for 25 books is paid in advance for transportation charges. In addition to the 50 volume and 25 volume library, this free circulating library reaches out to every interest within the state.

The Minnesota State Art Society was created by the 1903 session of the legislature for the advancement of fine arts, etc. The governing board consists of the governor, president of the university and seven members to be appointed by the governor, qualifications being prescribed by the act. The officers and membership are prescribed by the act, and annual exhibits are provided for, prizes being offered and paid for by the state.

The Minnesota State Board of Immigration was created by an act of the legislature approved April 22d, 1907. The act provides that the governor, auditor, and secretary of state shall be ex-officio members, and they

are empowered to select two additional members to hold their offices for the term of two years. The duties of the Board shall be to collect and arrange statistics and other information in reference to the lands and general and special resources of the State of Minnesota, and the advantages of this state as a place of residence; to spread knowledge of the same throughout the civilized world by correspondence, by messengers and public lectures and by all forms of legitimate advertising; to facilitate the immigration of persons of good moral character as may desire a change of domicile, and to answer all inquiries from persons residing within or without the state, upon the subjects aforesaid.

Board of Visitors. On April 25, 1907, the governor approved chapter 441 general laws of that session of the legislature, creating a state board of visitors for public institutions. Meetings are to be held quarterly or oftener if required. The members are to study the care and management of charitable and correctional institutions and must visit those within the bounds of the state and the governor may order the board to investigate any penal or charitable institution in Minnesota, the latter being empowered to administer oaths for the purpose of carrying on such investigation, and a report of which is to be made to the governor and transmitted to the legislature.

Board of Examiners of Nurses was provided for by the 1907 session of the legislature, the act making it unlawful to practice professional nursing as a registered nurse without first obtaining a certificate of registration from this board. The board is to hold public examinations at least once in each year at its headquarters in St. Paul for the purpose of carrying on the examination of all applicants who must be 21 years old, of good moral character, having received an education equivalent to that required for admission into the high schools and graduate from a training school connected with a general hospital where three years of training with a systematic course of instruction is given, who apply. The application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5. The members of the board are to receive a compensation of \$5 per day for each day of actual service and 10 cents per mile for each mile traveled in attending meetings of the board, and the excess fees shall be paid into the state treasury.

A Stallion Registration Board consisting of the professor of animal husbandry of the Minnesota College of Agriculture, who shall be ex-officio secretary, an officer of the board, the veterinary of the state experimental station and the president of the Minnesota Horse Breeders' Association, was created by the 1907 session of the legislature. The act makes suitable provisions for the inspection of all animals subject to registration and provides for a licensing of the animal by the board. A form of license is given in the act. The registration fee must not exceed \$2 for the examination and enrollment of each pedigree and the license fee. An annual fee of \$1 is required for renewal of the license.

Apiaries. Under Chapter 160, G. L. 1907, the governor was directed to appoint a state inspector of apiaries, to hold office for two years. The inspector has charge of the work of the suppression of contagious diseases among bees, and is given powers along that line.

Fire Marshal. The legislature of 1911 passed an act practically revising the law relating to the state fire marshal. The new act provides for an increased force of employees, and gives the marshal almost unlimited power in the investigation of the origin of fires throughout the state.

Reclamation Board. A reclamation board was created by the 1911 session. The board consists of three members, appointed by the governor, whose duty it is to select 40 acre tracts of state swamp or stumpage land, and to improve and sell the same. Eight thousand dollars was appropriated for the purpose.

State Forestry Board. The 1911 session repealed all previous acts relating to a forest and fire commissioner, and placed an entire new law on the statute books, whereby a board of nine members was called for, and this board is empowered to elect a secretary, a state forester, and the latter is to appoint his assistant and all other employees. The board is to have management of forest reserves, it is to co-operate with the highway commission, is to establish patrol districts, and is to outline the duties of rangers and fire patrolmen. Special provisions are laid down as to railroad companies, and the duty of their employees, as well as to logging and lumber companies, and employees. Road overseers are also enforced into the fire prevention regulations.

Automobile Board. A board of automobile examiners, appointed by the governor, has been provided for. This board holds examinations for chauffeurs at such times as may be designated by the secretary of state, and during the year 1912 nearly 4,000 applicants have been passed upon.

Armory Supervisors. A board of armory supervisors was created by the 1911 session for the purpose of selecting armory sites and passing upon plans and specifications for the different armory buildings to be thereafter erected. By the same act \$10,000 was appropriated to each armory to be constructed by the various municipalities throughout the state, not more than three armories to be constructed each year. All armories are now under the control of this board.

State Board of Parole. A board was created by the 1911 session, with power to parole prisoners from the state penal institutions, after a certain portion of the time has been served. The same act provides for the indeterminate sentence plan. The board is to consist of a member of the board of control oldest in the point of service, the warden at the penitentiary, and a third to be appointed by the governor. Dr. S. G. Smith of St. Paul was the latter appointee.

Fourth Fish Hatchery. The 1911 session of the legislature provided for a fourth fish hatchery, the same to be located in or near the city of Detroit, Becker county. An appropriation was made for securing the land and commencing the work of construction of buildings.

Hotel Inspector. A state inspector of hotels, together with an assistant, was provided for by the last session of the legislature. The act gives the inspector and his assistant unlimited powers in the inspection of hotels for fire and other purposes, and the requiring of fire escapes and modes of exit.

POSTAGE RATES.

THE CLASSES OF MAIL MATTER.

Domestic mail matter is divided into four classes, as follows:

First Class—Letters, postal cards and matter wholly or partially in writing, whether sealed or unsealed (except manuscript copy accompanying proof-sheets or corrected proof-sheets of the same), and all matter sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

Rates of Postage—Two cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Postal cards one cent each. On "drop" letters, two cents per ounce or fraction thereof, when mailed at letter-carriers' office; and one cent per ounce or fraction thereof at other offices.

Second Class—Newspapers and publications issued at stated intervals as often as four times a year, bearing date of issue and numbered consecutively, issued from a known office of publication, and formed of printed sheets, without board, cloth, leather or other substantial binding. Such publications must be originated and published for the dissemination of information of a public character, or devoted to literature, the sciences, art, or some special industry. They must have a legitimate list of subscribers, and must not be designed primarily for advertising purposes, or for free circulation at nominal rates.

Rate of Postage—One cent for each four ounces or fraction thereof, when sent by other than publishers.

Third Class—Books, circulars, periodicals, and matter wholly in print (not included in second class), proof-sheets, corrected proof-sheets and manuscript copy accompanying the same.

Rate of Postage—One cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

Fourth Class—Merchandise, namely, all matter not embraced in the other three classes, and which is not in its form and nature liable to destroy, deface, or otherwise damage the contents of the mail bag, or harm the person of any one engaged in the postal service, and not above the weight provided by law.

Rates of Postage—One cent per ounce or fraction thereof, but on seeds, cuttings, roots, scions and plants, one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

THE LIMIT OF WEIGHT.

A package must not exceed four pounds in weight, unless it be a single book.

PAYMENT OF POSTAGE.

On first-class matter the postage should be fully prepaid; but if two cents in stamps be affixed, the matter will be forwarded and remainder due collected and addressed before delivery.

On second-class matter the postage must be fully prepaid.

On third-class matter the postage must be fully prepaid.

On fourth-class matter the postage must be fully prepaid.

POSTAGE RATES.

WHAT MAY BE WRITTEN OR PRINTED ON MAIL MATTER.

Second Class—The name and address of persons to whom the matter is to be sent; index-figures of subscription book printed or written; printed title of publication; printed or written name or address, without advertisement of publisher or sender; written or printed words or figures, or both, indicating date upon which subscriptions ends; correction of typographical errors; a mark except by printed or written words to designate a word or passage to which it is desired to call attention; the words, "Sample copy"; publishers' or news agents' bills, receipts and orders for subscriptions, but the same shall convey no other information than the name, place of publication, subscription price, and amount of subscription due. The number of copies inclosed may be indicated on wrapper or face of package.

Third Class—Sender's name and address, with word "from"; marks other than by written or printed words to call attention to word or passage; correction of typographical errors; on the blank leaves or cover of any book may be placed a simple manuscript dedication or inscription not like a personal correspondence; upon the address side of wrapper, envelope, tag or label must be left space sufficient for legible address and necessary stamps.

Fourth Class—With matter of this kind may be inclosed any mailable third-class matter. On wrapper, cover, tag or label may be written name and address of sender with words "from"; marks, numbers, names or letters for purpose of description, or same may be printed; any printed matter not in nature of a personal correspondence. On address side must be left space sufficient for legible address and necessary stamps.

THE REGISTRY SYSTEM.

All mail matter, including drop letters, may be registered; but not matter addressed to fictitious names, initials or box numbers, or bearing vague and indefinite addresses. The registry fee is eight cents in addition to postage. It must be prepaid by stamps affixed.

THE POSTAL MONEY ORDER SYSTEM.

POSTAGE RATES.

PARCEL POST DELIVERY.

By an act of congress, approved Aug. 24, 1912, fourth-class mail matter, in addition to that previously designated, is to include farm and factory products, not exceeding 11 pounds in weight, nor greater in size than 72 inches in length and girth combined, nor in dangerous form or perishable in nature. For the transportation of these packages the United States, Territories and possessions, excepting the Phillipines, is divided into eight postal zones, and will permit the shipment of packages within each radius from the sending point at the following rates, which went into effect Jan. 1st, 1913:

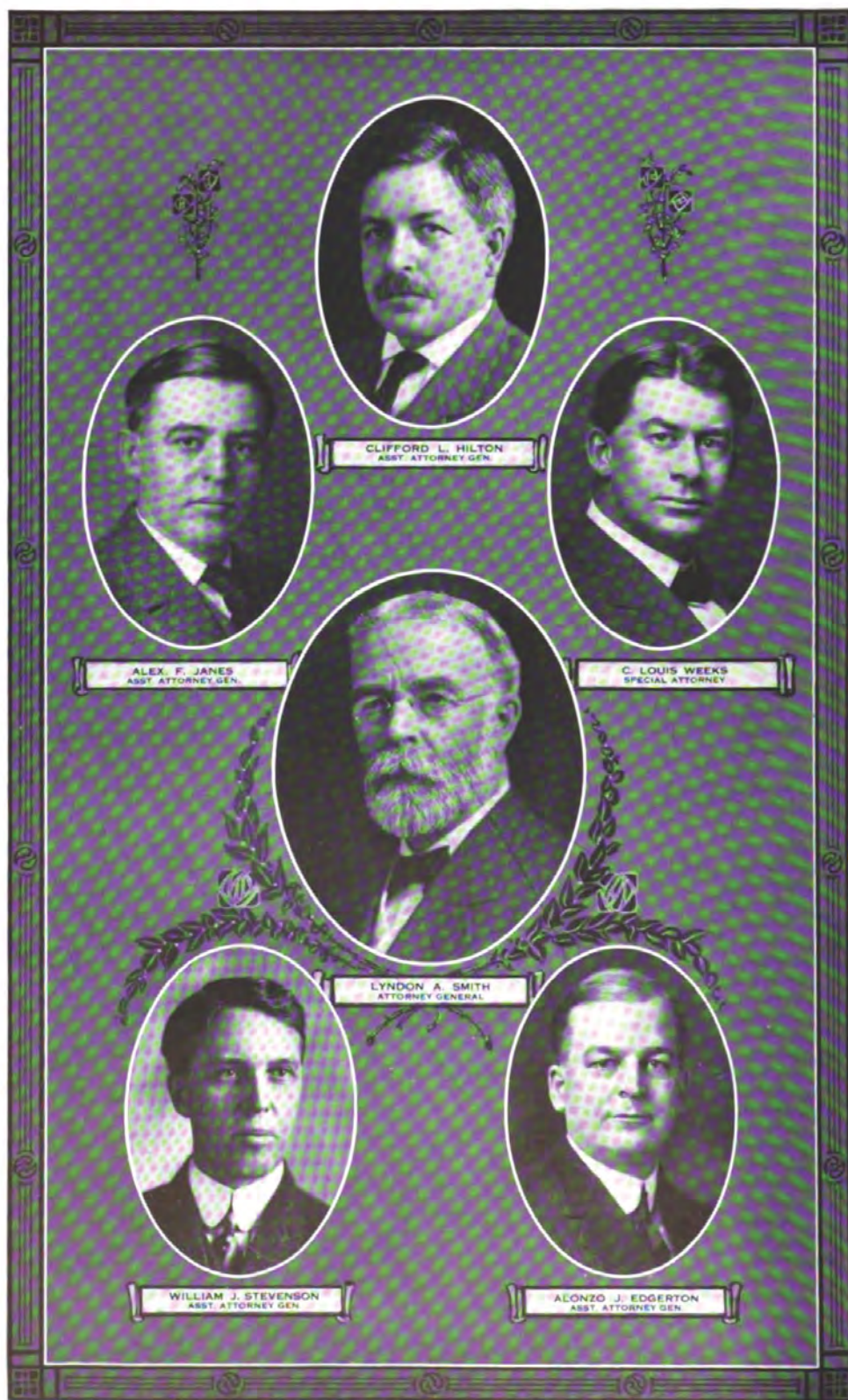

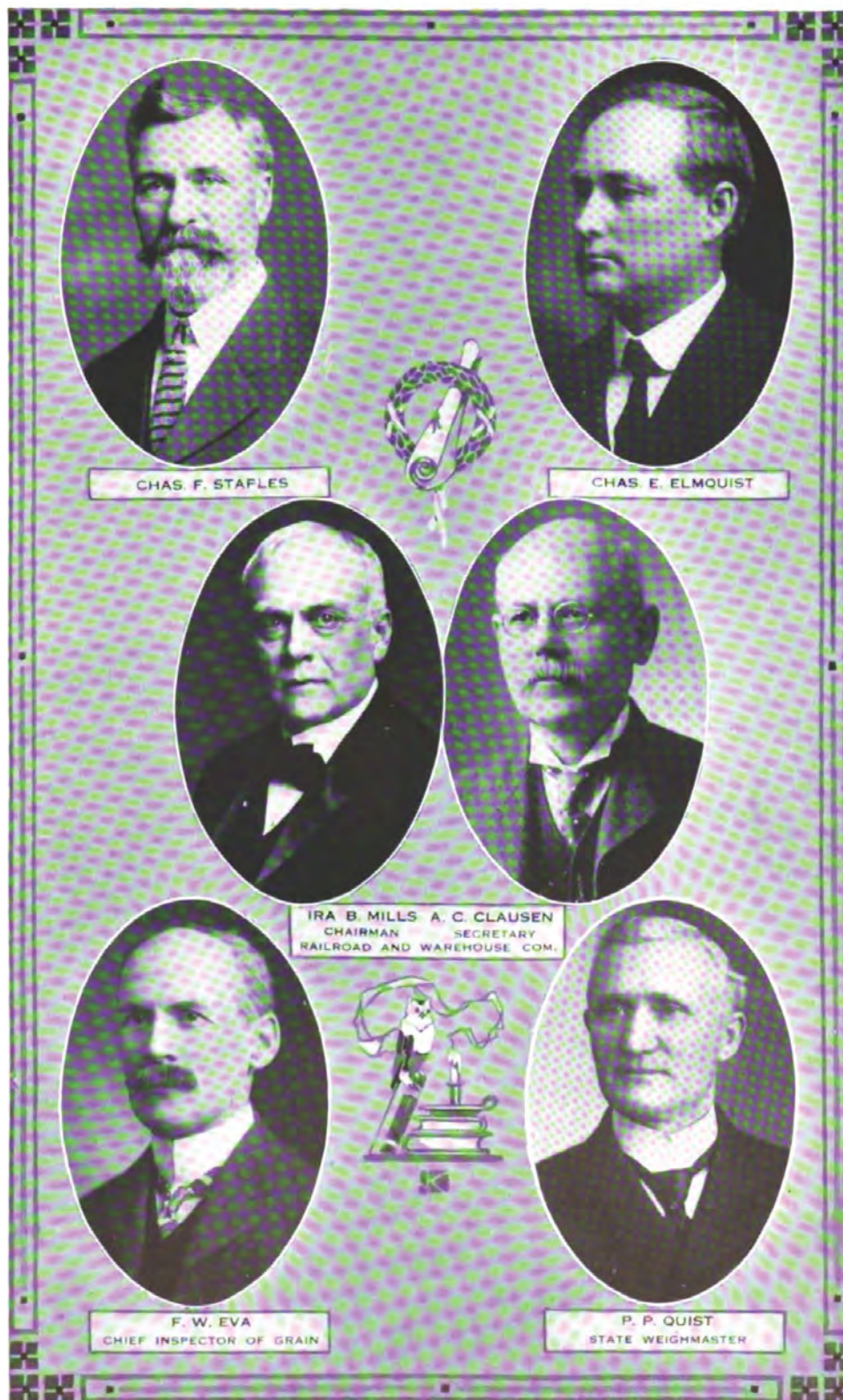
The local rate is applicable to parcels intended for delivery at the office of mailing or on a rural route starting therefrom.

It will be observed that the rates of postage are largely reduced and that the limit of weight is increased from four to eleven pounds. Parcels will be delivered at all free-delivery offices and to patrons residing on rural and star routes; they may be registered and may be accorded special-delivery service on payment of the usual fees, and they may be insured against loss in an amount equivalent to their actual value, but not to exceed \$25, upon payment of a fee of five cents. Distinctive stamps must be used on all parcels, but they may be mailed in quantities of not less than 2,000 identical pieces without stamps affixed, the postage being paid in money.

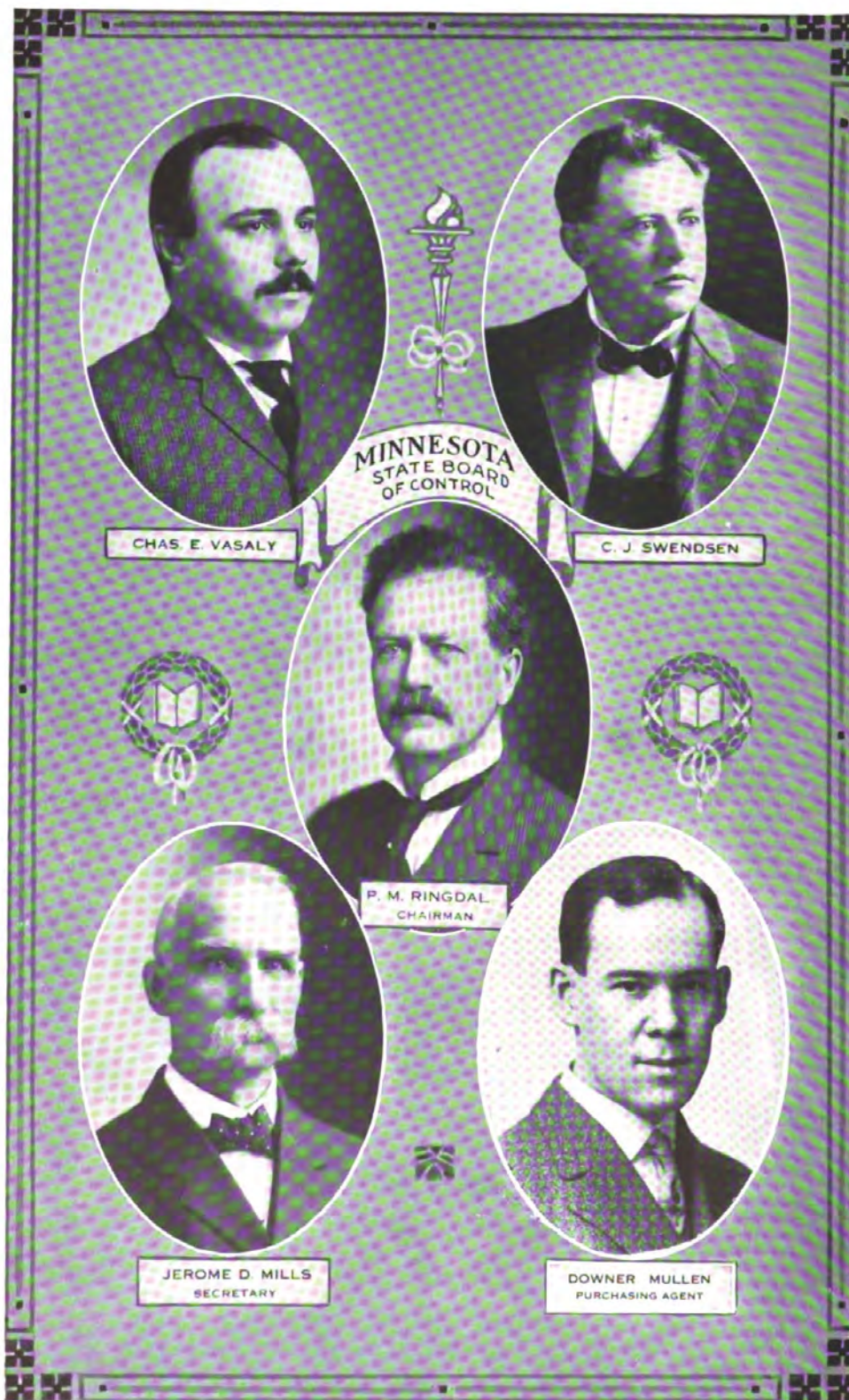












BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES.

EXECUTIVE.

STATE OFFICERS.

GOVERNOR.

A. O. Eberhart (Republican) is a lawyer, residing at Mankato, Blue Earth county. Born in Sweden. He came to Minnesota in 1881. He is thirty-eight years of age and married. A graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, Minn., in 1895. He studied law in the office of Judge Cray, Mankato, Minn. Has been appointed and served as deputy clerk United States circuit and district courts, and United States Commissioner for the district of Minnesota. Is a director in the First National Bank, Mankato. Served in the Senate sessions 1903 and 1905, and was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1906; and was re-elected in 1908. On the death of John A. Johnson, September 21, 1909, Mr. Eberhart took the oath of office as governor, and at once assumed the duties of the office. He was nominated as the Republican candidate for governor in 1910, and elected November 8, 1910, by a large plurality. He was re-nominated under the first state wide primary enacted at a special session of the legislature held in June of 1912, and was re-elected in November.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

J. A. A. Burnquist (Republican) is a lawyer, thirty-one years of age and married. He was born in Dayton, Iowa, and is a graduate of Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota, Columbia University, N. Y. City, and the University of Minnesota. He represented his district in the lower house of the legislature in the 1909 and 1911 sessions, as well as in the extra session of 1912, and became the Republican nominee for lieutenant governor at the first state-wide primary held on Sept. 17th, 1912.

SECRETARY OF STATE.

Julius A. Schmahl (Republican) is a Minnesota product, having been born in Traverse des Sioux, Nicollet county, in 1867. He moved with his parents to Redwood Falls in 1870, and there secured a common school education, herding cattle and working on farms in summer time until he was fourteen years old, when he commenced an apprenticeship in the printing office of the Redwood Gazette. Working there three years, he

served two years in the Fargo Argus job printing office. Afterwards he reported for eight or more years on the daily papers of St. Paul and Minneapolis. In 1892 he returned to Redwood Falls, purchased an interest in the Redwood Gazette with James Aiken. He was chief clerk of the house in 1901, at the extra session of 1902, 1903 and 1905 sessions. Elected secretary of state, 1906, 1908, 1910, and again in 1912.

STATE AUDITOR AND LAND COMMISSIONER.

Samuel G. Iverson (Republican) was born in Rushford, Fillmore county, Minnesota, in 1859. Was appointed postmaster of his native city in 1881 by President Hayes. Held that position until September, 1886. In November, 1886, was elected a member of the legislature. Was auditor's accountant in state auditor's office from 1887 to 1891, deputy state treasurer from 1891 to 1895 and deputy state auditor from 1895 to 1903. Was elected state auditor in 1902, 1906 and 1910. He is a graduate of the law department of the University of Minnesota.

STATE TREASURER.

Walter Joseph Smith (Republican) was born in Eureka, Kansas, October 5, 1870. Removed to Bellevue, Ohio, in 1871, where he attended the public schools and later attended business college in Cleveland. Entered the service of the First National Bank of Bellevue, going from there in 1893 to accept the position of assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Tower, Minnesota, where he was also elected city treasurer. He was married in 1896. After spending the following year in Texas he returned to accept the position of deputy collector of customs at Harding where he remained two years, removing to Eveleth in 1900 to become cashier of the First National Bank, which position he resigned to become president of the Miners National Bank, which position he still holds. During most of his residence in Eveleth he has been one of the directors on the school board and has been elected city recorder and mayor. Elected state treasurer in 1910 and re-elected in 1912.

ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Lyndon A. Smith (Republican) was born in New Hampshire in 1854. Graduated from Dartmouth College in 1880, and from the Georgetown University Law College in 1884. Was assistant to the United States Commissioner of Education for five years. Was county attorney of Chippewa county from 1889-1890 and 1903-1909. Lieutenant Governor, 1899-1903; and appointed assistant attorney general, January 4, 1909, and on the resignation of General Simpson from office on Jan. 1st, 1911, he was appointed by Governor Eberhart to fill the vacancy. He was nominated and elected to the position at the primaries and general election of 1912.

CLERK OF SUPREME COURT.

Irving A. Caswell, born in Anoka county on farm. Educated in Anoka schools; graduated law department University of Minnesota. Editor and proprietor Anoka Herald for a number of years. Was appointed deputy

clerk by C. A. Pidgeon, and the latter resigning December 1, 1909, Mr. Caswell was chosen by the court to fill the vacancy. Was nominated for the position by the Republican state convention in June and elected without opposition on November 8, 1910.

RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSIONERS.

Ira B. Mills (Republican) was born in Scotchtown, Orange county, New York, Jan. 14, 1851. Received an academic education, and studied law four years in an office and then at Albany Law School, graduating in 1872. Came to Minnesota, 1881; resides at Moorhead; is married; practiced law at Moorhead until elected judge of the Fourteenth judicial district; was appointed assistant attorney general Jan. 2, 1893, and member of the railroad and warehouse commission January 26th of the same year by Governor Nelson and reappointed by Governor Clough, and served until January, 1900. At the 1900, 1904, 1908 and 1912 general elections he was elected a member of the railroad and warehouse commission for a term of four years.

Charles F. Staples (Republican) was born in Dakota county, this state, in 1856; was educated in the district schools and finished in St. Paul; engaged in teaching several years; is a practical farmer and dairyman, operating at one time the largest dairy in the state; has held many positions of trust and honor, including school, town and county; was elected a member of the state legislature in 1892, and was re-elected for four successive terms, and at the general election, 1900, he was elected a railroad and warehouse commissioner of the state for a term of two years; re-elected, 1902, 1906 and 1910.

Charles E. Elmquist (Republican) was born in Osceola, Polk county, Wis., of Swedish parentage, in January, 1872. Received a common school education at St. Croix Falls; entered a printing office at Taylors Falls as an apprentice at the age of fourteen, thence to Pine City, Minn., and State University in 1895, graduated in 1898, and returned to Rush City, Post as foreman and became the editor in 1894. Entered the Minnesota State University in 1895, graduated in 1898, and returned to Rush City, where he engaged in the practice of law. In 1900 was elected County Attorney of Chisago county, which position he held until his election in 1908 as state railroad commissioner. He was re-nominated and re-elected for the six year term in 1912. Mr. Elmquist is married, has three children, and his home is at Rush City, Chisago county.

GOVERNOR'S PRIVATE SECRETARY.

Ralph W. Wheelock, Secretary to the Governor, is a native of Ohio, coming west in the early eighties to locate in Dakota as a newspaper publisher. After twelve years of experience in this line at Mitchell, during which period he served as secretary to the capitol commission, deputy secretary of state, and receiver of the United States Land Office, he removed to Minneapolis, where he has since been engaged in newspaper work.

Mr. Wheelock was secretary to Mayor D. P. Jones of that city during that official's term, and in October, 1909, was selected by Governor A. O. Eberhart to serve in a like capacity.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE.

James A. Larson (Republican) was born in 1860 in Illinois. His education was received in the common schools of his native state. He settled in Minnesota in the spring of 1877. He has been a member of town and school boards for a number of years, postmaster and member of the legislature in 1899, 1901 and extra session 1902; he is married, a farmer by occupation, and his postoffice address is Walnut Grove.

DEPUTY STATE AUDITOR.

Claude S. Brown (Republican) was born in Rockford, Ill., Feb. 19, 1872. Received a common school education in Le Mars, Ia., where he lived until November, 1895. Attended the Breck School at Wilder, Minnesota, during the winter of 1895-6, where he took a course in stenography. Appointed clerk in the city clerk's office at St. Paul, Feb. 9, 1896, by Matt Jensen, city clerk. Resigned December, 1902, and was appointed to position as clerk in the land department, state auditor's office, by S. G. Iverson, state auditor. Appointed chief clerk land department June 1, 1904, and deputy state auditor Nov. 20, 1906.

DEPUTY STATE TREASURER.

Edward L. Erickson (Republican) was born at St. Peter, Minnesota. August 25th, 1872. Graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College in 1895. Was engaged in railway construction from 1896 to 1900. Entered the state treasury department January 1, 1901. Was advanced to the position of chief clerk on July 1, 1905, and received the appointment of deputy state treasurer in June, 1910.

ASSISTANTS TO THE ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Clifford L. Hilton (Republican) born at Kenyon, Minnesota, in 1866. Moved with his parents to Fergus Falls, Minnesota, in 1879. Graduated from Fergus Falls High School in 1884, and from the University of Wisconsin College of Law in 1888. Admitted to practice in Minnesota and Wisconsin the same year. City attorney of Fergus Falls, 1896-8; county attorney of Ottertail county, 1899-1908; appointed assistant attorney general, 1909. In 1891, he married Frances C. Moll, of Chicago, Ill.; they have one child. Residence, Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

C. Louis Weeks (Republican) was born in Ypsilanti, Michigan, January 20, 1871. In the year 1882 his parents moved to the city of Minneapolis, where he has continued to reside until the present time. In 1894 he graduated from the College of Law of the University of Minnesota and was, in June of that year, admitted to practice before the courts of this state. With the exception of a period of six years, which he devoted to

legal authorship, he has been in the active practice of law in the city of Minneapolis. From May, 1907, to January 4, 1909, he held the position of special assistant to Attorney General Young.

Alexander L. Janes (Republican) is 30 years old and was born in the state of Minnesota in Madelia, Watonwan county. In 1884 his parents removed to Pipestone, where his father, Frank L. Janes, has since been engaged in the practice of law. Mr. Janes was graduated from the Pipestone High School in 1898 and later took his collegiate degree from the University of Minnesota. At the completion of this course he entered the Harvard Law School from which he was graduated in 1905. He then returned to Pipestone, Minnesota, and entered the law office of his father and where he has since been engaged in the active practice of his profession. In 1907 he married Nanny Wood of St. Paul; they have two children. Mr. Janes was elected county attorney in 1908 and was re-elected for another term last November.

William J. Stevenson, (Republican) born in Olmsted county, Minnesota, in 1870. Graduated from Law Department of University of Minnesota in 1893, and went at once to Duluth where he continued to practice law until appointed assistant attorney general in March, 1911. Was first assistant county attorney of St. Louis county, then special county counsel and attorney for the court house commission, when it was locating and building the million dollar court house at Duluth. Married. Residence, Duluth.

Alonzo J. Edgerton (Republican). Born in Mantorville, Dodge county, Minnesota, March 29, 1874. Graduated from the Law Department of the University of Minnesota 1898. County attorney Le Sueur county from 1902 to 1908. Assistant attorney general 1912. Residence St. Paul, Minnesota.

DEPUTY CLERK OF SUPREME COURT.

Vernon C. Pidgeon (Republican) was born in Wright county, Minnesota, where he attended school in his earlier years. Later he attended the university, and when I. A. Caswell was appointed clerk of the supreme court Mr. Pidgeon was designated as his deputy.

SUPERINTENDENT OF BANKS.

Kelsey S. Chase (Republican) was born at Crookston, Minnesota, April 15th, 1878, where he lived until 1887, at which time he moved with his parents to Faribault, Minnesota. He was educated in the public schools of that city and graduated from the high school and attended the Pennsylvania Military College at Chester, Pennsylvania, and Phillips' Academy at Andover, Mass. In the fall of 1897 he entered the academic department of the University of Minnesota and graduated from the law department in 1903, having in the meantime spent between two and three years in the Citizens' National Bank of Faribault in the position of clerk. After graduating from the Minnesota Law School he took up the practice of law at Chamberlain, S. D. In the fall of 1905 he was recalled to Faribault to start

a bank in that city, and has been discharging the duties of cashier in the Chase State Bank since then. Mr. Chase has been a member of Company B, 2nd Regiment Minnesota National Guards, and was chosen successively to the office of Sergeant, 2nd Lieutenant and Captain. He has occupied various prominent positions in his locality of both a semi-public and public character.

PUBLIC EXAMINER.

Andrew E. Fritz (Republican) born at St. Cloud, Minnesota, January 28, 1870. Graduated from the State Normal at St. Cloud in 1891. Was superintendent of the Otter Tail County schools from 1898 to 1901. For several years past has been in the blank book manufacturing business at St. Cloud, he having done the road work for the firm.

INSURANCE COMMISSIONER.

Jacob A. O. Preus (Republican) was born in Columbia county, Wis., on a farm, August 28, 1883; was graduated from Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, in 1903, and from the Minnesota Law School, State University, in 1906. In 1907 and 1908 Mr. Preus was a messenger in the United States Senate. He was assistant clerk to the Senate Committee on Public Lands in 1909. He served as executive clerk in the governor's office from September, 1909, to January, 1911. Appointed Insurance Commissioner in 1911 and re-appointed in 1913. He is married.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

C. G. Schulz (Republican) was born in Nicollet county, Minnesota, in 1867. Received common school education; entered Gustavus Adolphus College in 1880; graduated from Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill., in 1888; taught public school for two years following; held the office of county superintendent of Nicollet county from January, 1890, until July 1, 1901, when he was appointed to the position of assistant in the office he now holds. Mr. Schulz is married.

ADJUTANT GENERAL.

Fred B. Wood (Democrat) was born June 14, 1866, at Ames, Montgomery county, New York; came to Minnesota with his parents in 1877 and located at Austin, Mower county; graduated from the Austin high school in 1886; was engaged in the real estate and insurance business for many years, and for the past ten years was deputy register of deeds of Mower county, Minnesota. He has always taken a very active interest in militia matters, commencing his military career as a private in Company G, Second Infantry, M. N. G., on May 8, 1884; was promoted corporal in 1885; sergeant in 1886; right chief guide, Second Infantry, 1887; transferred back to Company G, Feb. 14, 1888, and appointed first sergeant; regimental sergeant major, Second Infantry, April 19, 1890; commissioned first lieutenant Company G, Second Infantry, Jan. 26, 1891; captain June

7, 1893; and was captain of Company G, Twelfth Minnesota Infantry, Volunteers, during the Spanish-American war, on April 29, 1898, to November 5, 1898; commissioned major Second Infantry May, 1899, and adjutant general, Minnesota National Guard, with the rank of brigadier general, Jan. 28, 1905.

COMMISSIONER OF LABOR.

William F. Houk (Republican) was born March 16, 1861, in Dearborn, Michigan. Learned printer's trade in Cleveland, Ohio, and joined Typographical Union in 1883. Came to Minneapolis in 1887, and has been employed on the Minneapolis Tribune twenty-two years, the last twelve years in the capacity of day foreman. He has served Minneapolis Typographical Union as President, Delegate to International Typographical Union, State Federation of Labor, and Trades Assembly.

DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER.

Joel G. Winkjer was born December 31, 1870, on the farm still owned by his parents in the town of Moe, Douglas county, Minnesota, about two miles from the present village of Garfield. His education consisted of the country common school, until sixteen years old, and then for the three following years he took short terms of work at the Willmar Seminary. In 1890 he entered the State Agricultural School at St. Anthony Park, and graduated from this institution in 1893. In the fall of that year he entered the State University, pursuing the college course in agriculture, and spent one full year's work on first entering, and then occasional terms as conditions allowed for the following years, ending up the school work with the fall term of 1897. In all, about two years' work was done in the university. To earn his way, one season during this period was spent in horticultural work in the Clarence Wedge Nursery at Albert Lea, Minn. It was during this time (1895) that the creamery work was taken up and afterwards followed as a profession with but little interruption. The first work was done in the Litchfield creamery as helper under H. T. Sondergard. The first creamery operated on his own responsibility was the Urness Co-operative Creamery in Urness township, Douglas county. After that the Garfield Creamery was under his charge. He resigned from this position a year later to attend the university, but resumed work again in this creamery and continued until engaged by the St. Hilaire Creamery in the spring of 1903. This position was held until 1905, when appointed Creamery Inspector by Governor Johnson to work in Northern Minnesota. During the engagement as Creamery Inspector and while serving the St. Hilaire Creamery, he was for several terms secretary of the Red River Valley Dairymen's Association. In the year 1907 he was engaged on a civil service examination as Assistant Dairyman in the service of the United States Department of Agriculture, with headquarters at Manhattan, Kansas, and with a territory of four or five of the surrounding states. During this time, however, he retained his home in Crookston, and was in the year 1909 transferred from Manhattan as headquarters to that of Crookston, with Minnesota, the two Dakotas and Montana as territory to work in.

STATE LIBRARIAN.

Elias J. Lien was born at Delavan, Faribault county, Minnesota, his parents having been among the pioneer settlers of that county. After graduating from the State Normal School at Mankato he taught school for several years and later engaged in farming and other work at St. Vincent, Kittson county, from which place he was appointed Assistant Librarian during the administration of Governor Van Sant. Is a graduate of the State University Law School and admitted to the bar. Also took a post-graduate course at the State University, receiving the degree of LL. M. Is married.

INSPECTOR OF ILLUMINATING OILS.

Guy Arthur Eaton (Republican) was born Oct. 27, 1871, in Red Oak, Iowa. He was educated in the public schools of Lincoln, Iowa, and St. Cloud, this state, as well as the Claverick College in New York, from which latter place he graduated as a civil engineer in 1889; from 1890 to 1892 he was engaged as a government surveyor in northern Minnesota, and during the next two years he followed that occupation in South America; returning to the United States he located in Wright county, Minnesota, where he was county surveyor for two years, after which he was the purchasing agent of timber lands for Shevlin and Carpenter. He was connected with various companies for the following five years, and on June 1, 1906, he was appointed postmaster at Duluth. He is commander of the naval militia of Minnesota, and a member of various clubs of Duluth and Superior, Wis. Mr. Eaton is married.

STATE FIRE MARSHAL.

Charles E. Keller (Republican) is a native of Minnesota, having been born in St. Paul on Sept. 21, 1858; he was educated in the St. Paul public schools and later engaged in the lumber business. He was deputy county auditor of Ramsey county for four years, and at the time of his appointment as chief fire marshal, he was engaged in the real estate business in St. Paul.

BOARD OF CONTROL.

P. M. Ringdal (Democrat) is a resident of Crookston, where his occupation is that of a marble manufacturer and dealer. He was born in Goodhue county, and educated in the public schools of his native county. At the age of nineteen he entered the service of the C. & N. W. railway company as a telegraph operator, and continued in that business with different companies until 1889. He located in Polk county in August, 1888. Elected state senator in 1894, serving during sessions 1895 and 1897. Appointed railroad and warehouse commissioner by Governor John Lind, from January 5, 1899, to January 7, 1901; appointed member of state board of control January 19, 1907, to succeed Ozro B. Gould, deceased.

C. J. Swendsen (Republican) appointed by Gov. Eberhart for the six year term commencing April 3, 1911, was born in Sweden, province of Smoland. He is a graduate of the Polytechnical School of Boras, Sweden.

He has been a member of the City Council of St. James, and has been president of the board of education. Mr. Swendsen is at present president of the board of directors of Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, Minn., a director in the Citizens' National Bank at St. James, and is engaged in the mercantile business in St. James. He is 49 years old and married. He served in 1907 and 1909 legislature, as a representative from Watonwan county.

Chas. E. Vasaly (Democrat) of Little Falls was born at Fort Ripley, Minn., December 13, 1869. Printer by trade and member of the Typographical Union. In newspaper work many years. Delegate to the democratic national convention in 1904 and member for Minnesota of committee on resolutions. Was editor of Little Falls Herald when appointed to present position in April, 1909. Member of the State Board of Equalization one term, mayor of Little Falls six terms.

Jerome D. Mills (Republican) was born in Andover, Mass., December, 1852; graduate of Kalamazoo, Michigan, high school and of Oberlin College; came to Minnesota in 1878; resided in St. Cloud in employ of lumber and logging firms until 1894; in service of State at Reformatory and office of State Board of Control since that time with exception of about two years; elected secretary of the board July, 1907. Married.

Downer Mullen (Republican) was born in Wabasha, Minnesota, May 20, 1880; graduate of Wabasha high school. Appointed to position in accounting department, State Board of Control, September, 1903. Appointed purchasing agent May, 1912.

STATE FORESTER.

William T. Cox entered the U. S. Forest Service in the spring of 1911 as a student assistant, in order to get experience in forestry work, then being carried on by the Federal government. Had been brought up in the woods of central Minnesota and inherited fondness for wood life and natural history. The first work to which he was assigned was in the spring of 1901, for a reconnaissance study of forests in the Big Horn Mountains, Wyoming. In the fall of 1901 he entered the college of agriculture, University of Minnesota, registering for a degree in Forestry. The next spring, 1902, was assigned to a field party, U. S. Forest Service, making reconnaissance of Columbia river watersheds, Washington, Oregon and Idaho. In the autumn, forest fires becoming exceedingly widespread and destructive, he was sent to investigate, map and report upon them on the west slope of the Cascade Mountains in Washington and Oregon. Later in the fall he went into Washington for office work, and in the winter and spring studied forest fire conditions in the Southern States, giving especial attention to the Carolinas, Georgia, Florida and Alabama. Mr. Cox recommended the creation of two national forests in Florida, which were made. In the spring of 1903, he was sent west to examine lands suggested as possible national forests. He explored and reported upon Coast Range, Rogue River Mountains, and Siskiyous in southwestern Oregon and northwestern California, and mapped the northern range of the redwood belt.

Early in the fall he examined lands in the Skagit river country, north-western Washington. He recommended a number of areas for national forests. He then returned to the University. In the spring of 1904 he explored and mapped various mountain ranges of central Idaho, recommending the creation of the Sawtooth, Lemhi, Salmon River and Lost River National Forests, coming out through the Bitter Root Mountains into Montana. Returned to school at University. In the spring of 1905 Mr. Cox examined and mapped what was formerly the north half of the Colville Indian Reservation in Washington, and a part of the east slope of the Cascade mountains on the Yakima watershed. Late in the summer he was called to Washington and made a forest inspector. He returned to University and completed his course, receiving Degree of Bachelor of Science in Forestry. In the spring of 1906 he installed administration on a number of national forests in various western states and territories. He was then made Chief of Forest Management of the Forest Service at Washington. In 1907 he was promoted to Assistant Forester and given charge of the timber sales and investigative branch of the forest service, which position was held until coming to Minnesota in May, 1911, to become State Forester. He has traveled extensively in western Canada and all of the western states, and is a member of the Camp Fire Club of America, a big game hunter, a rifle and pistol shot of some note, and a mountain climber.

SECRETARY TO THE FOREST COMMISSION.

Christopher C. Andrews (Republican) was born at Hillsboro, N. H.; was admitted to the bar of Massachusetts in 1850; elected to the senate of Minnesota in 1859. Served as colonel of the Third regiment, Minnesota volunteers, in the Civil war, and as brigadier general and brevet major general of volunteers; was United States minister at Stockholm, 1869-1877. His report on the forestry system of Sweden was published by the department of the state in 1872. He was a member of the first American forestry congress at Cincinnati, 1882.

EXECUTIVE AGENT GAME AND FISH COMMISSION.

H. A. Rider (Republican) was born in North Adams, Mass.; came to Minnesota in 1878; is fifty-four years of age and married. He was reared on a farm, but early took up railroading. For nine years he was connected with the engineering department of the Northern Pacific Railway Company; then with the Mexican National, with headquarters at the City of Mexico, two years, and with the Canadian Pacific, as engineer in charge of bridges, one year. He was sheriff of Morrison county six years; has been a member of the board of aldermen and of the school board at Little Falls a number of years; is now in the real estate business. Was also a member of the thirty-third house, was appointed executive agent of the game and fish commission in December, 1909.

CUSTODIAN OF THE CAPITOL.

E. E. Corliss (Republican) was born Sept. 1st, 1841, in Vermont. He resided in New Hampshire for a time, and in June of 1856 he came to Minnesota, where he has since resided. He served as a member of the Second Minnesota Infantry for four years during the Civil war, and was admitted to practice in the courts of the state in 1870, at which time he resided in Preston. After being admitted he moved to Fergus Falls and has since been a practicing attorney at that point. He was county attorney of Otter Tail county for ten years, was a member of the commission on the probate code of the state and also a member of the state capitol commission. Mr. Corliss was appointed custodian of the capitol to succeed the late Thomas Downs. He is married and is the father of six children.

STATE EXPERT PRINTER.

Joseph T. Mannix (Republican) was born at Boston, Mass., in 1856. He learned the printer's trade at Malone, N. Y. After traveling in the United States as a "typographical tourist" he located in Minneapolis; was engaged in reportorial and other capacities on twin city dailies for twenty years. Private secretary for Mayor W. H. Eustis in Minneapolis, 1893-1894. Spent several years in a globe-circumnavigating experience. Was elected to the House of Representatives, serving during the 1905 session. Chosen state expert printer for the two years ending July 31, 1909.

SECRETARY OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

Warren Upham, A. M. and D. Sc., was born in Amherst, N. H., March 8, 1850; was graduated at Dartmouth College in 1871; was assistant on the geological surveys of New Hampshire, Minnesota and the United States, 1874-1895; was librarian of the Western Reserve Historical Society, Cleveland, Ohio, 1895; has been secretary and librarian of the Minnesota Historical Society since November, 1895. He is author of "The Glacial Lake Agassiz," and of "Groseilliers and Radisson, the First White Men in Minnesota," besides many other works in geology and history.

WAREHOUSE REGISTRAR AND SECRETARY RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSION.

Albert C. Clausen (Republican) was born in Charlestown, Mass., May 6, 1849. He received an academic education in his native city. Came to Minnesota in the year 1872, and has since that time, with the exception of one year, been engaged in the grain business in one form or another. He was appointed chief deputy inspector at Minneapolis, under the new grain law, June 1, 1885; was promoted to the position of chief grain inspector of the state Aug. 1, 1889, which position he held until 1899. He was appointed to his present position in 1901.

CHIEF INSPECTOR OF GRAIN.

Frederick W. Eva (Republican) was born in Cornwall, England, April 19, 1860. Came to Minnesota in 1883, engaging in the grain business in one form or another since that time. He was appointed on the board of

grain appeals Aug. 1, 1899, resigning Aug. 1, 1901, to become chief deputy inspector of grain at Duluth; was promoted to the position of chief inspector of grain Aug. 1, 1902, which position he still holds. Mr. Eva now resides in St. Paul.

STATE WEIGHMASTER.

P. P. Quist (Republican) was born in Rinkaby, Sweden, Aug. 18, 1854. Came to the United States with his parents and settled in Nicollet county in 1865. Attended public schools at St. Peter and also St. Ansgar's Academy at East Union. Has been engaged in hardware and implement trade at Winthrop for eighteen years. Was appointed state weighmaster at Minneapolis, March 15, 1901.

DEPUTY INSURANCE COMMISSIONER.

Ira C. Peterson was born on a farm near Slayton, Murray county, Minn., October 10, 1877; attended the Slayton schools; served as Sergeant in Company M, 15th Minn. Volunteer Infantry during the Spanish-American War; studied stenography at Highland Park College, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1900; came to Minneapolis in 1902 and engaged in insurance work; entered the law department of the University of Minnesota from which he was graduated in 1905 and admitted to the bar; engaged in the practice of law in Minneapolis; appointed Chief Clerk in the Insurance Department Jan. 1, 1911 and Deputy Insurance Commissioner May 1, 1911. Mr. Peterson is married and resides in Minneapolis.

ASSISTANTS TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

G. M. Cesander (Republican) was born in Sweden in 1863. In 1869 came to Rockford, Illinois, with his parents. After attending the public schools at that place, in 1883 he went to St. Peter, Minnesota, where he entered Gustavus Adolphus College. On completion of his education at that institution, he taught for three years in the rural schools of Minnesota, and for two years and a half was principal of the public school at Gibbon. In 1893 he was elected county superintendent of schools of Sibley county, and by subsequent elections held the position for the next twelve years, during four of which he was secretary of the State Teachers' Reading Circle Board; was also president of the school board at Winthrop—his place of residence—for one year, and secretary for two years. In January, 1909, he became second assistant in the Department of Public Instruction.

P. C. Tønning was born in Norway in 1869. With his parents he came to Minnesota, where they settled on a farm in Mower county. After completing the public schools he attended Carleton College for three years and the State University, from which he was graduated in the class of '96. He has taught rural schools for three years, was principal of the Grand Meadow School, 1894-1895; city superintendent at Madison, Minn., 1896-1903 and at Willmar, 1903-1910. He assumed his present position July, 1910.

George S. Whitney (Democrat) was born at La Crosse, Wis., Dec. 9, 1858. Attended the public schools there, and in the fall of 1875 entered the Shattuck School at Faribault, Minn., graduating from the same as first lieutenant and adjutant in June, 1879, when he returned to La Crosse, Wis. In 1885 he came back to Faribault, Minn., and has resided there since, being engaged in the insurance business. He served as deputy county auditor for Rice county from 1899 until 1901, and was elected register of deeds in the fall of 1900 for the term of two years. He was commissioned captain Company B, Third Wisconsin, National Guard, in 1884; captain Company B, Second Regiment, Minnesota National Guard, Oct. 16, 1886; major Second Regiment, April 25, 1895; lieutenant-colonel May 23, 1903, and was major of the Twelfth Minnesota Infantry Volunteers during the Spanish-American war, serving from May 6, 1898, to November, 1898. Appointed January, 1905.

ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER OF LABOR.

John P. Gardiner (Republican) was born in Dundee, Scotland, February 8, 1870. He served his apprenticeship at the machinists' trade in the shops of the Great Western Railroad, Swindon, England. Came to the United States June, 1888; went to work for the Northern Pacific Railway at Brainerd, Minnesota, as machinist July, 1888; and worked continuously for said company for ten years; then entered the service of the Great Northern Railway Company at St. Paul. Joined Machinist's Union, August, 1891; served the Machinists' as its Recording Secretary, Business Agent, President, and Chairman of General Conference Committee of the Northern Pacific and Great Northern systems for four years. Delegate to the St. Paul Trades and Labor Assembly; delegate to the Grand Lodge convention for ten consecutive years and served as delegate for the St. Paul Local to the State Federation of Labor at five of its annual conventions.

ASSISTANT FIRE MARSHAL.

Asa M. Wallace (Republican) was born at Marble Rock, Iowa, Oct. 29, 1868. He entered the office of the Marble Rock Weekly in January, 1881, and has been actively identified with newspaper work ever since. From 1885 to 1892 he was employed on the Minneapolis Tribune and Journal. For the past eight years he has been editor and publisher of the Fairfax Standard.

DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT OF BANKS.

H. S. Quiggle (Republican) was born in Winnebago, Minnesota, May 10th, 1881. In 1901 he entered the First National Bank of Winnebago as bookkeeper; was assistant cashier of above named bank for four and a half years and cashier two years. In 1908, worked for Ross and Davidson, bankers of Minneapolis, for one year as assistant auditor. Was appointed assistant examiner in the Banking Department in January, 1909, and Deputy Superintendent of Banks in March, 1910, for a term of three years.

IMMIGRATION COMMISSIONER.

H. J. Maxfield was born in Springfield, Ill., and educated in the public schools in that city, removed to Carrington, North Dakota, in 1900, where he taught school for a time and studied law at the University in North Dakota, graduating in 1905. Practiced law one year in Carrington, N. D., and removed to Wadena in 1906. He was elected County Attorney of Wadena, Minn., in 1908 and re-elected in 1910. He resigned that office on January 1st, 1912 to accept the appointment of State Immigration Commissioner. Mr. Maxfield is thirty-three years old, is married and has two children.

SECRETARY OF STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Dr. Henry Martyn Bracken was born in Noblestown, Pa., Feb. 27, 1854, and graduated from the medical department of the Columbia University in 1877. He came west and took up a residence in Minneapolis in 1885. Dr. Bracken was a professor in the medical department of the state university from 1888 to 1909, and was chosen secretary of the state board of health in 1897, a position which he has since occupied.

ENGINEER OF THE STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION.

George Washington Cooley was born in New York City on Jan. 17, 1845. He came to Minnesota in 1864, and settled in Minneapolis. He was an assistant engineer on the construction of the Northern Pacific railroad, and for several years was county surveyor of Hennepin county. Since 1906 he has been secretary and engineer to the state highway commission.

GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE CLERK.

Archibald M. Hayes was born in Minnesota in 1873, the son of a well-known attorney and politician of Dakota county. Archie was schooled at Hastings, and afterwards engaged in the flouring mill business at that point. He was a representative in the legislature in 1905, and afterwards became a department clerk at Washington. He was appointed executive clerk to Gov. Eberhart in 1910, and has since held that position.

ASSISTANT DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER.

John McCabe was born at Redding, Connecticut, on June 26, 1850, where he received his early education. He came west in 1867, and settled at St. Peter, this state, where he became a contractor and builder, and which occupation he continued up to 1907, when he was appointed to the position of assistant dairy and food commissioner.

CHIEF CLERK IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT.

Fred D. Sherman was born of Irish parentage in Minneapolis, this state. With his parents he moved to a homestead in Linwood township, Anoka county, and he received a common school education in the schools of

Stacy, Chisago county. He was associated with his father in the whole-sale commission business at Duluth. In 1898 he enlisted in the 14th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry for the Spanish-American war, serving as a private and musician throughout the war. Returning to Minnesota he established the Gazette at Grey Eagle, Todd county, which he conducted up to the time of his appointment as clerk in the land department of the state auditor's office. Later he was made chief clerk to the bureau of immigration. He is 34 years old. Mr. Sherman is married and has three children.

ASSISTANT CUSTODIAN.

G. A. Peterson was born in Smoland, Sweden, Oct. 16, 1872. He came to this country and settled in Paxton, Ill., in May of 1883, and moved to Minnesota in March of 1887. His home is in Mankato. He was appointed assistant custodian in February of 1911.

SECRETARY DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSION.

O. A. Storvick was born July 20th, 1872, near Decorah, Iowa. Was raised on a farm in northern Nebraska, received an academic education, learned engineer's trade and later took up creamery work at Emmons, Minn., where he remained twelve years or until 1907 when appointed creamery inspector with the Dairy and Food Department; resigned Jan., 1911 to accept position with Federal Dairy Division, appointed to present position April, 1912.



TAX COMMISSION.

J. G. ARMSON.

J. G. Armson (Democrat) was born at Thornton, Ontario, Canada, July 8, 1859. Was educated in the public schools of his native town and at Manitoba College, Winnipeg. Studied law for a time and then engaged in the real estate business in Manitoba. Came to Minnesota in 1884, locating at Stillwater, where he has since resided. Was engaged in grain, milling and mercantile business 1889 to 1900, then in real estate and insurance until 1909, when he was appointed a member of the Tax Commission by Governor Johnson. Delegate to the Democratic National convention at St. Louis in 1904, and at Denver in 1908. Surveyor general of logs and lumber First district of Minnesota, 1905-1909. Elected mayor of Stillwater in 1898 and successively for six terms, serving in that capacity for 10 years, when he resigned to accept his present position. Vice president for Minnesota of the Upper Mississippi River Improvement Association. Married.

SAMUEL LORD.

Samuel Lord (Republican) of Kasson, was born in Marion, Olmsted county, Minn., February 25, 1859. Came with his parents to Dodge county in 1860. Was educated in the public schools at Mantorville, Shattuck School, and Carleton College. Studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1885. Located at Kasson the same year and has practiced his profession at that place ever since. He was elected County Attorney of Dodge county in 1886 and was re-elected five times, the last without opposition. Was elected to the State Senate in 1898 and re-elected in 1902, both times without opposition. In 1900 was chosen as one of the delegates-at-large to the National Republican convention at Philadelphia and at the convention was made chairman of the delegation. In 1907 was appointed by Governor Johnson a member of the first State Tax Commission.

O. M. HALL.

O. M. Hall (Democrat), member of Minnesota Tax Commission, was born at Conneaut, Ohio. In 1868 he removed to Red Wing, Minnesota, where he has since resided. Was a member of the State Senate in 1885, and represented the Third Minnesota District in the Fifty-second and Fifty-third United States Congress. Is a lawyer by profession, an Episcopalian in religion and a Democrat in politics.

RUKARD HURD.

Rukard Hurd (Republican) the son of Edward Hurd and Harriet Morris Duncan was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1858 and married Katherine Grant Hatfield of New York. He is of English and Scotch ancestry which emigrated to America in 1630.

He graduated from the Pennsylvania Military College in engineering. Was elected Trustee of the College in 1890. Has traveled extensively throughout the United States, Alaska, Canada, England and the Continent. Has resided in Minnesota since 1889. Has been engaged in General Produce, River Transportation and Insurance lines. Has served as Secretary Cincinnati Produce Exchange, Director Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce, Director St. Paul Chamber of Commerce; Member of Minnesota Club and Informal Club of St. Paul; a Blue Lodge and 30th Degree Scottish Rite Mason; Member of following Military-Historical Societies: Colonial Wars, Sons of the Revolution, 1812, Aztec, Loyal Legion. Commissioned Major and Aide de Camp on the Staffs of Governors Clough and Lind. Represented the Thirty-sixth District (7th Ward, St. Paul) in the Legislature of 1901 and the Special Tax Session of 1902. Was elected Secretary of the Minnesota Tax Commission at the time of the organization of the Commission April 29, 1907. He is the Author of Hurd's Iron Ore Manual, a general reference guide, hand-book on iron ore costs and values. In 1912 his Alma Mater conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

JUDICIARY.

SUPREME COURT.

CHIEF JUSTICE.

Calvin L. Brown was born in Sullivan county, New Hampshire, in 1854; came to Minnesota with his parents in 1855, and has since continuously resided in the state; was admitted to the bar in 1876; located at Morris in 1878, and was elected county attorney of Stevens county in 1882, 1884 and 1886. Was appointed judge of the Sixteenth judicial district by Governor McGill, on March 10, 1887, and was elected to that office in 1888, and again in 1894. Was appointed associate justice of the supreme court by Governor Lind, to succeed Justice Buck, resigned, and was elected to that office in 1898. Re-elected in 1904, for term beginning January, 1906 and in 1910 for the term beginning January, 1912 and in 1912, after Chief Justice Start retired from the race, Mr. Brown was re-nominated for the position as a non-partisan candidate, and was elected at the regular election in November.

ASSOCIATE JUSTICES.

George L. Bunn was born June 25, 1865, in Sparta, Wis. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1885, and from the law department of the same institution in 1888. Came to this state Sept. 18, 1888, locating at St. Paul, where he has since resided. Was appointed judge of the second judicial district on the second day of January, 1897, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. C. D. Kerr; elected in 1898; re-elected in 1904 and in 1910. He was appointed by Governor Eberhart to succeed Mr. Justice Jaggard, on the death of the latter, and in January of this year he was appointed to succeed Calvin L. Brown, who was elected to the position of chief justice.

Andrew Holt was born in East Union, Carver county, Minnesota, May 20, 1855. Judge Holt was born and raised on his father's farm until the age of nineteen years. He attended the common schools of the county, St. Ansgar's Academy at East Union, now Gustavus Adolphus College at St. Peter, during such periods as he could be spared from the farm work; entered the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1880; studied law and was admitted to the practice of law in 1881; practiced law in the city of Minneapolis until January, 1894, when he was appointed municipal judge; elected in the fall of 1894 and again in the fall of 1900; elected to the dis-

trict bench in 1904. He is a member of St. John's English Lutheran Church of Minneapolis. Mr. Holt was appointed to succeed Justice Simpson, resigned, and was elected for the full term of six years at the election of 1912.

Philip E. Brown was born in Lafayette county, Wisconsin in 1856; was educated at the University of Wisconsin, and graduated from the Albany, N. Y., Law School. Came to Luverne, Minnesota, in 1883. He is married and resides there. He was appointed judge of the 13th judicial district by Governor Merriam in February, 1891, and was elected to that office in 1892, 1898, and 1904. Was elected associate justice of the supreme court in 1910, for the term of six years commencing Jan. 1, 1912.

Oscar Hallam was born on a farm at Linden, Wis., Oct. 19, 1865. Attended the district school there. In 1881 he entered the Dodgeville high school and in 1882 entered the University of Wisconsin. Graduated there in 1887, and in 1889 graduated from the Wisconsin University law school. Came to Minnesota in 1889 and located in St. Paul, where he was admitted to the bar, and practiced there until taking office Jan. 1, 1905. Has been an instructor in the St. Paul College of Law since it was instituted. He was nominated as a non-partisan candidate at the September primaries for associate justice, and was elected in November for the full term of six years.



DISTRICT COURTS.

FIRST DISTRICT.

William Hodgson was born May 29, 1847, in Jo Daviess county, Illinois; his father followed the farmer's vocation and William grew up upon the home farm, acquiring his elementary education in the public schools of Weston, Ill. He came to Minnesota with his parents in 1855, the family locating on a farm in the southern part of Dakota county. Mr. Hodgson secured his collegiate education at Hamline University then situated at Red Wing. In the fall of 1867, he began reading law in the office of Judge Phelps of that city and in 1870 Mr. Hodgson was admitted to the bar of Minnesota. He has practiced law at Hastings since 1874, and has been associated with various men who have gained distinction in the legal fraternity; he is a veteran of the Civil War, having been a private in the Union Army as early as Dec. 2, 1862, and mustered out on Dec. 2, 1865. He has been county attorney of Dakota county for a number of years and on the death of Judge Crosby he was appointed to succeed that gentleman by Gov. Eberhart; and in 1912 was elected for the term of six years. He has been twice married and is the father of four children, among them is Lawrence C. who is the well-known "Larry Ho" of the St. Paul Dispatch.

Albert Johnson (Republican) is a native of Goodhue county. He was admitted to the bar at Red Wing in 1885 and practiced law at that place until he was appointed to the judgeship. He was county attorney from 1896 to 1906. He has always been a Republican and at one time served on the Republican State Central Committee. In August, 1909, he was appointed judge of district court, first judicial district, to fill out the unexpired term of the late Judge Williston, and at the November election 1910 was elected district judge by a large majority. He resides at Red Wing.

SECOND DISTRICT.

Hascal R. Brill was born in the Province of Quebec, Canada, 1846; came to the United States in 1859, and settled in Minnesota the same year; received a university education, and studied law with Judge Palmer of St. Paul; was admitted to the bar in 1870; elected judge of probate of Ramsey county, 1872, appointed judge of the court of common pleas of the same county March 1, 1875, and elected judge of the same court in the fall of 1875 for seven years; unanimously elected judge of the second judicial district, 1882 and each succeeding six years since. He is married and resides in St. Paul.

William Louis Kelly was born at Springfield, Ky., Aug. 27, 1839, and settled in Minnesota in 1865; educated in private country school. At his father's death, in 1854, had to take charge of and support his family. In 1855 he went to Louisville, Ky., first entered the office of the chancery court clerk as a deputy; after that, and in the same year, entered the postoffice in that city as an ordinary clerk; became assistant postmaster of Louisville, Ky., in August or September, 1855, and held that position until 1864, when he was tendered a commission as special agent of the postoffice department, and ordered to General Sherman's army; resigned as assistant postmaster and continued with the army until the war closed. While in postoffice service in Louisville, Ky., he studied law (at night) and succeeded in passing through the law department of the University of Louisville, A. D. 1859. Has farmed in Minnesota, edited a newspaper for a while, and practiced law. Was admitted to the Ramsey county bar in 1871, but never made the law his exclusive occupation until the fall of 1878; appointed judge of district court March 15, 1887, by Governor McGill; was elected in 1888, and on each six year period since that time.

Olin B. Lewis (Republican) was born in Weyauwega, Wis., March 12, 1861. He graduated from Omro high school in 1879, the classical department of the State University of Wisconsin in 1884, and the University Law School of Wisconsin in 1889, where he was for some time instructor. He came to this state in 1889 and located at St. Paul. He was elected to the assembly in 1894 and re-elected in 1896; elected to the district bench in 1896; re-elected, 1908.

Grier M. Orr (Republican) was born May 14, 1856, in Clarion county, Pennsylvania. Attended the public schools in Oconto, Wis., from 1868 to 1873. Entered Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, 1873, graduating in 1878. Taught school and read law for two years. Graduated from Cincinnati law school, 1883. Practiced law in Lima, Ohio, until 1884, when he came to St. Paul. Elected judge of the municipal court in St. Paul, 1894, and re-elected, 1898; elected judge of district court, 1902, re-elected, 1908. He is married.

Frederick Newberry Dickson was born in Northfield, this state, May 15, 1863. He graduated from Carleton college in 1885, and settled in St. Paul the following year. Two years later he was admitted to the bar, and in 1901 he became assistant United States district attorney. Mr. Dickson was appointed a judge of the district court by Gov. Eberhart in 1911, he succeeding George L. Bunn, who was appointed to the supreme bench. He was elected as a non-partisan candidate for the full term of six years in 1912.

Frederick M. Catlin was born in Erie, Pa., in 1859. He graduated from Cornell college at Ithaca, New York, in 1882, and was admitted to practice two years later. He settled in St. Paul in 1884, where he has since been following his profession. He became a police commissioner under Mayor Keller, and later was designated by the commission as chief of police. He was appointed to the bench by Gov. Eberhart, in January of this year, to succeed Judge Hallam, who was elected to the supreme bench.

THIRD DISTRICT.

Arthur H. Snow (Democrat) was born in Clinton, Mich., in 1841. He graduated from the literary department of the University of Michigan in 1865, and came to this state in January, 1871. He has held the positions of city attorney of Winona, county attorney of Winona county, mayor of Winona, member and president of board of education of Winona, court commissioner and president of the state board of examiners in law.

FOURTH DISTRICT.

John Day Smith (Republican) Minneapolis, was born in Litchfield, Me., Feb. 25, 1845, and came to Minnesota in 1886. Served in the army for three years during the War of the Rebellion in Company F, Nineteenth Maine Volunteers, and was severely wounded at the battle of Petersburg, Va., in 1864. Graduated from Brown University in 1872, and received the degree of A. M. from that university in 1875. Was given the degree of LL. M. by the Columbia Law School in 1880. Served in the Minnesota house of representatives in 1889 and in the senate in 1891 and 1893. Was elected department commander of the Grand Army of the Republic in 1893. Was elected district judge in 1904 and re-elected in 1910.

Horace D. Dickinson, born at Ogdensburg, St. Lawrence county, New York, July 25, 1866, and in the same year brought by parents to Minnesota, the family locating on a farm near Hastings, Dakota county. Moved to Minneapolis in September, 1876. Educated in the public schools of that city and the State University, graduating from the law department in 1890, at the age of twenty-four. Engaged in the general practice of law for six years, when he became assistant city attorney of the city of Minneapolis, occupying said position for four years. Elected in 1900 one of the judges of the municipal court of Minneapolis, resigning the latter office to assume the duties of one of the judges of the district court of the Fourth judicial district, to which place he was elected at the Republic in 1893. Was elected district judge in 1904 and re-elected in 1910.

William Edward Hale (Republican) was born at Wheeling, West Va., May 11, 1845. He received a common school education and in 1858 he came to Minnesota with his father on a prospecting tour, returning a few months later to Wisconsin, to which state his parents had removed from West Virginia and Ohio some years previous. In 1860 Mr. Hale located at Plainview and from that point enlisted as a private in the 3rd Minnesota in the fall of 1861, serving as such for three years; on his return he entered Hamline University, then located at Red Wing where he took a three years' collegiate course and then entered the law office of Judge Wilder of that city where he studied law; he was admitted to practice in 1869, after which he moved to Buffalo, Wright county, where he commenced the practice of his profession. He was county attorney of Wright county for two years. In the spring of 1872, he moved to Minneapolis where he has since resided. He served four years as county attorney of that county, after which he carried on an extensive law practice with a number of prominent jurists

of Hennepin county. He was appointed judge by Gov. Eberhart to succeed Judge Donahue, deceased and has since been elected to the position. He is married and has three children.

Wilbur F. Booth was born in Seymour, Connecticut, August 22, 1861, being the third child of Rev. Albert Booth and Louisa Booth. His early education was obtained in the public schools of Connecticut and in the Episcopal Military School at Cheshire in that state, where he was prepared for college. In 1880 he entered Yale College and graduated in 1884. He was a member of the college societies, Psi Upsilon, Phi Beta Kappa, and Skull & Bones, and the salutatorian of his class. At graduation he was given the Douglas Fellowship by the college authorities and pursued courses of study in New Haven for two years in history and political economy. In 1886, he entered the Yale Law School and graduated in 1888, summa cum laude. While in the law school, he was also engaged in teaching in the Hopkins Grammar School in New Haven. He came to Minnesota, in November, 1888, and was admitted to the Minnesota Bar in January, 1889, in St. Paul, and practiced law in that city until the fall of 1890, being associated with Frank G. Peters. Removing to Minneapolis in the fall of 1890, he became assistant counsel for the Minneapolis & St. Louis Railway Company, and W. H. Truesdale, its receiver. In the spring of 1898 he resigned his position with the railway company and re-entered general practice, forming a partnership with his brother, Samuel A. Booth. The partnership continued until the death of his brother in December, 1898. In 1904 he entered into a partnership with Charles J. Tryon and continued a member of the firm of Tryon & Booth until May 20, 1909, when he was appointed judge of the district court by Governor John A. Johnson. He was nominated by the Democratic party to succeed himself and was elected at the election held Nov. 8, 1910. He is unmarried. In politics he has always been a Democrat.

Charles S. Jelley was born on a farm in Southeastern Indiana; attended and was graduated at the High School of a near-by town, and afterwards was graduated in the Academic Department from Yale College; practiced law in Indiana for a few years after his admission at the bar and then located at Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1886. Since coming to Minnesota he was attorney for the county commissioners of Hennepin county, first assistant county attorney, and special counsel to the attorney general of the State; on December 21st, 1911, was appointed by Governor Eberhart to the position of district judge for the Fourth judicial district of the State, and was elected on November 5th, 1911, to succeed himself upon the bench for the next succeeding six years.

Edward Foote Waite was born January 15, 1860, at Norwich, New York, being the son of John Waite, a lawyer, and Betsey Foote. He has resided in Minneapolis since 1888. He was educated at Norwich Academy, Colgate University, and the Columbian Law School. From his graduation from college, in 1880, to 1897, he held various positions in the U. S. Pension Bureau, first in Washington, D. C., and afterward in Minnesota, in which his work was of a semi-legal nature. In 1897 he entered upon the practice of

law in Minneapolis, in partnership with Judge Austin H. Young. He was subsequently an assistant city attorney, and, during the *ad interim* administration of Acting Mayor David P. Jones, in 1901, superintendent of police. In December, 1904, he was appointed by Governor Van Sant to be municipal judge of Minneapolis, to fill a vacancy, and was elected to the same office in 1906. In April, 1911, the legislature having provided for an additional judge of the Fourth district, to have special charge of juvenile court work, he was appointed to the new office, and elected for a full term in 1912.

William C. Leary was born in Owatonna, Minnesota, in 1869, residing there until 1882, when he moved with his parents to Minneapolis, where he has since resided. Attending the public schools in those two cities he afterwards entered the academic department of the Minnesota University, graduating from the same in 1892. He then entered the law department and graduated two years later. He practiced law for six years in Minneapolis, after which he was appointed assistant county attorney of Hennepin county, serving four years. Mr. Leary was then appointed attorney to the county commissioners by the then county attorney, serving in that capacity for over three years, after which he was appointed first assistant county attorney, serving in that capacity until he became municipal judge. He served in that capacity for four years and last November was elected to the district bench. He resides with his mother and two sisters.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

Arthur B. Childress (Republican) was born in Kingston, Roane county, Tenn., on August 17, 1871. He graduated from Grant University at Athens, Tennessee, in May, 1892. Came to Minneapolis in April, 1893, and settled at Dundas in Rice county, where he taught school for two years. He entered the law department of the University of Minnesota in September, 1895, and graduated in June, 1898, and was admitted to the bar June 4, 1898. He at once began the practice of law at Northfield, June 5, 1898, and continued it until elected district judge. He held the office of county attorney of Rice county four years. He was elected district judge November 8, 1910. He is a married man and now resides at Faribault.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

Albert R. Pfau, Sr., (Democrat), lawyer, was born in Germany, February 14, 1847; came to the United States when two years old; was admitted to the bar in 1868; settled in Mankato, Minnesota, the following year. Appointed to succeed Lorin Cray and elected in 1908.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

Carroll A. Nye (Democrat) was born on a farm in St. Croix county, Wisconsin, forty-nine years ago. Was educated in the common and normal schools of that state. He took up law for a profession, studying first with his brother, Congressman Frank M. Nye, now of Minneapolis, and with Robert M. La Follette, present United States senator from Wisconsin, afterward continuing his legal studies in the law department of the Wisconsin University, graduating in 1886. While pursuing his work as a student he earned

his way from year to year by working on a farm and other manual work and as a teacher. He located at Moorhead, Minnesota, in 1887, where he has practiced his profession ever since. Has held the office of city attorney five years; mayor four years; county attorney eight years; and has also served as a member of the State Normal Board two terms. Elected judge of the district court in 1910.

Myron D. Taylor was born Dec. 30, 1855, at Byron, Maine; came to Minnesota in September, 1858; graduate of the University of Minnesota, class of 1878; principal of schools at Henderson, Minn., two years; resided at St. Cloud, Minn., practicing law, since March, 1881. City attorney twelve years; register United States land office eight years; member Republican state central committee in 1888; appointed to succeed Judge Searle Dec. 1, 1906, and has twice been elected to the position.

EIGHTH DISTRICT.

P. W. Morrison (Republican) was born on a farm in the town of Trapon, Sibley county, Minnesota, on the 12th day of March, 1866; worked there upon his father's farm until he was nineteen years old; educated in the common schools, and at the age of twenty years began teaching, which occupation he followed for six years, during which time he occupied his evenings studying law. In 1886 he attended college at Sauk Center. In 1889 he entered the law office of W. H. Leeman at Henderson, where he remained until April, 1891, at which time he was admitted to the bar. On the 13th day of July, 1891, he located in Norwood, Carver county, where he still resides. In 1894 he was elected county attorney, which office he held for eight years. In 1902 he was a candidate at the primary election for congress from the Third district. In 1904 he was elected judge of the district court of the Eighth judicial district, and re-elected in 1910.

NINTH DISTRICT.

I. M. Olsen was born in Norway, Jan. 4, 1861; came to Nicollet county, Minnesota, in May, 1865; graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1887; admitted to the bar in 1893; practiced law at Sleepy Eye, Minn., from June, 1894, until his election as judge, Nov. 6, 1906. He was re-elected in 1912.

TENTH DISTRICT.

Nathaniel Kingsley was born at Sharon, Conn., Sept. 10, 1850. In 1858 his father moved west, settling on a farm in La Salle county, Illinois. In March, 1869, Mr. Kingsley came to Minnesota and worked on a farm until the following year, when he learned the miller's trade. He was admitted to the bar at Preston, Fillmore county, in November, 1876, and in February, 1877, commenced practicing law at Rushford, Fillmore county; in December, 1878, he moved to Chatfield, in the same county, and opened an office there. At the November election, in 1880, he was elected county attorney of Fillmore county, and held the office four years. In April, 1887, he moved to Austin, where he now lives. Was appointed judge by Governor Clough to fill vacancy caused by death of John Whytock. Elected district judge in 1900, 1906 and 1912.

ELEVENTH DISTRICT.

Josiah D. Ensign (Republican) was born in Erie county, New York, May 14, 1833. Moved with his parents to Ashtabula county, Ohio, in 1839, where he received a common school and academic education; was admitted to the bar in 1857. He was elected clerk of the courts of Ashtabula county in 1857, and served six years. Settled in Minnesota in 1869, and in Duluth, February, 1870, where he followed the practice of law until his appointment as judge, April, 1889. He has held the office of county attorney for St. Louis county, member of city council and mayor of Duluth, and member of board of education.

William A. Cart (Republican) was born at Westfield, Marquette county, Wisconsin, Dec. 23, 1863. Came to Minnesota in 1881; settled in Duluth in April, 1886; was elected a member of the house of representatives in 1894, city attorney of Duluth in 1895, and judge of the district court in 1896. Was educated in the common schools of his native state, the St. Cloud State Normal School of Minnesota and the University of Michigan.

Homer B. Dibell (Republican) was born in Fillmore county, Minnesota, forty-four years ago; graduated from the University of Indiana in 1889, and from the Northwestern University law schools, of Chicago, in 1890; was admitted to the bar in October of the same year. Judge Dibell has been a practicing attorney in Duluth for a number of years. Term as district judge began January, 1900, and was re-elected in November, 1910, for the term of six years commencing January, 1912; he is married.

Martin Hughes (Democrat) was born in Sheboygan county, Wisconsin, on the 18th day of March, 1867, and resided in that county until coming to Minnesota on December 5, 1901, and has ever since lived at Hibbing. Was endorsed by the Bar Association of the Eleventh judicial district for the appointment of fourth judge of the district court and was appointed such by Governor Johnson on the 28th of March, 1909; was elected on the 8th of November, 1910.

Herbert A. Dancer was born on a farm near Chelsea, Michigan, March 8, 1874, where he lived until 21 years of age. He first attended the District School, then graduated from the Chelsea High School and from the academic and law departments of the University of Michigan. He came to Duluth in 1897 where he practiced law continuously until appointed judge of the District Court in April, 1911, by Governor Eberhart. He was re-elected in November, 1912, for a full term of six years.

TWELFTH DISTRICT.

Gorham Powers (Republican) was born in Pittsfield, Somerset county, Maine. He received a common school and academic education; settled in Minnesota in 1866; enlisted as a private Feb. 2, 1862, Fourth Maine Battery Light Artillery; commissioned lieutenant in Thirteenth United States Colored Heavy Artillery, August, 1864; discharged October, 1865. Graduated from Albany Law School, 1866; practiced law in Minneapolis two years, then located at Granite Falls; held the office of county attorney of Yellow Medicine county seven years; in 1879 was a member of the legislature; ap-

pointed judge by Governor Merriam, February, 1890; elected same year, and re-elected in 1908.

G. E. Qvale (Republican) was born at Haugesund, Norway, forty-eight years ago; came to the United States in October, 1878; settled in Minnesota the following year; admitted to the bar July, 1882; practiced law in Willmar until appointed judge in 1897; elected in 1898, and re-elected in 1910; was judge of probate six years, and county attorney four years, of Kandiyohi county. Mr. Qvale resides at Willmar.

THIRTEENTH DISTRICT.

Lewis S. Nelson (Republican) was born November 2, 1850, in Grundy county, Illinois. Was educated in the common schools, Fowler Institute at Newark, Illinois, Luther College at Decorah, Iowa, and entered the law department of the Michigan University at Ann Arbor in 1872, and completed the law course in 1874. Was admitted to the bar in Illinois in 1875 and in Iowa in 1876. Came to Adrian, Nobles county, in 1879. Served as Captain of Co. "G," 15th Minnesota, from July 2, 1898, to March 27, 1899. Moved to Slayton, Murray county, in 1900, and served as county attorney for Murray county from 1902 to 1908. Was elected district judge November 8, 1910.

FOURTEENTH DISTRICT.

William Watts (Republican) was born in the Province of Ontario, Canada, in 1850; graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan and was admitted to the bar in 1877; came to Minnesota in 1878; resides at Crookston; has held the office of city attorney, county attorney, president of the city council, and a member of the board of education. Elected judge, 1898, in 1904, and again in 1910. He is married.

Andrew Grindeland (Republican) is by profession a lawyer, residing at Warren, Marshall county, Minnesota. He was born in Winnesheik county, Iowa, fifty-two years ago. He graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa in 1882, and settled in Minnesota July of the same year. He is married, and has held the office of judge of probate of Marshall county. Served as senator from the Sixty-third district, 1889 to 1903. Appointed judge of the district court, Fourteenth district, March 24, 1903, and has been twice re-elected.

FIFTEENTH DISTRICT.

William S. McClenahan was born in Baltimore, Md., June 19, 1854; was graduated (A. B.) from Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., 1875, and from the law department of the University of Maryland (LL. B.) in 1880; practiced law in Baltimore until October, 1882, when he came to Brainerd, where he has resided and practiced law ever since; held the office of city attorney of Brainerd from March, 1888, until November, 1900; has held no other office prior to his election to the office he now holds; still resides at Brainerd. Re-elected, 1906.

Benjamin F. Wright (Republican) was born in Durham, Me., forty-seven years ago, graduated from Colby College, Waterville, Me. He lo-

cated in Minnesota in 1887 and his present residence is Park Rapids. He is married.

Charles W. Stanton (Democrat), journalist, was born at Pine Island, Minnesota, in 1862; was editor and publisher of the Appleton Press after 1885; judge of probate of Swift county 1890-1894; moved to International Falls, and on the creation of the new judgeship for the Fifteenth judicial district by the 1907 session of the legislature was appointed to that place by Governor Johnson. Was a candidate for re-election at the November election, 1908, and was defeated by B. F. Wright. The 1909 session of the legislature created a third judgeship for that district and Mr. Stanton was again appointed to that position by the governor. He was re-elected in 1910.

SIXTEENTH DISTRICT.

Stephen A. Flaherty was born in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, April 11, 1855. He was educated at a country school, at Lawrence University in Appleton, Wisconsin, and at the University of Minnesota. He came to Morris in 1881 where, in 1882, he was admitted to the bar. For many years he was county attorney of Stevens county and resigned that office in 1895 upon moving to Minneapolis. After a year's residence there he moved to Litchfield, and in 1899 returned to Morris, where he now resides. He was elected judge of the district court in 1900, and re-elected in 1906 and 1912.

SEVENTEENTH DISTRICT.

James H. Quinn (Republican) was born in Kilbourn City, Wis., June 23, 1857; came to Minnesota, locating in Blue Earth county, June, 1864; has practiced law ever since twenty-four years of age; was elected county attorney of Faribault county five terms; resigned when appointed judge in March, 1897. Mr. Quinn is married and resides at Fairmont, Minn.

EIGHTEENTH DISTRICT.

Arthur E. Giddings (Republican) was born in Anoka, Oct. 2, 1866. He is a graduate of the State University, and took a full course at the university law school. He has been city attorney of Anoka for two terms, and county attorney of Anoka county. Mr. Giddings is married and resides at Anoka. First term began 1899.

NINETEENTH DISTRICT.

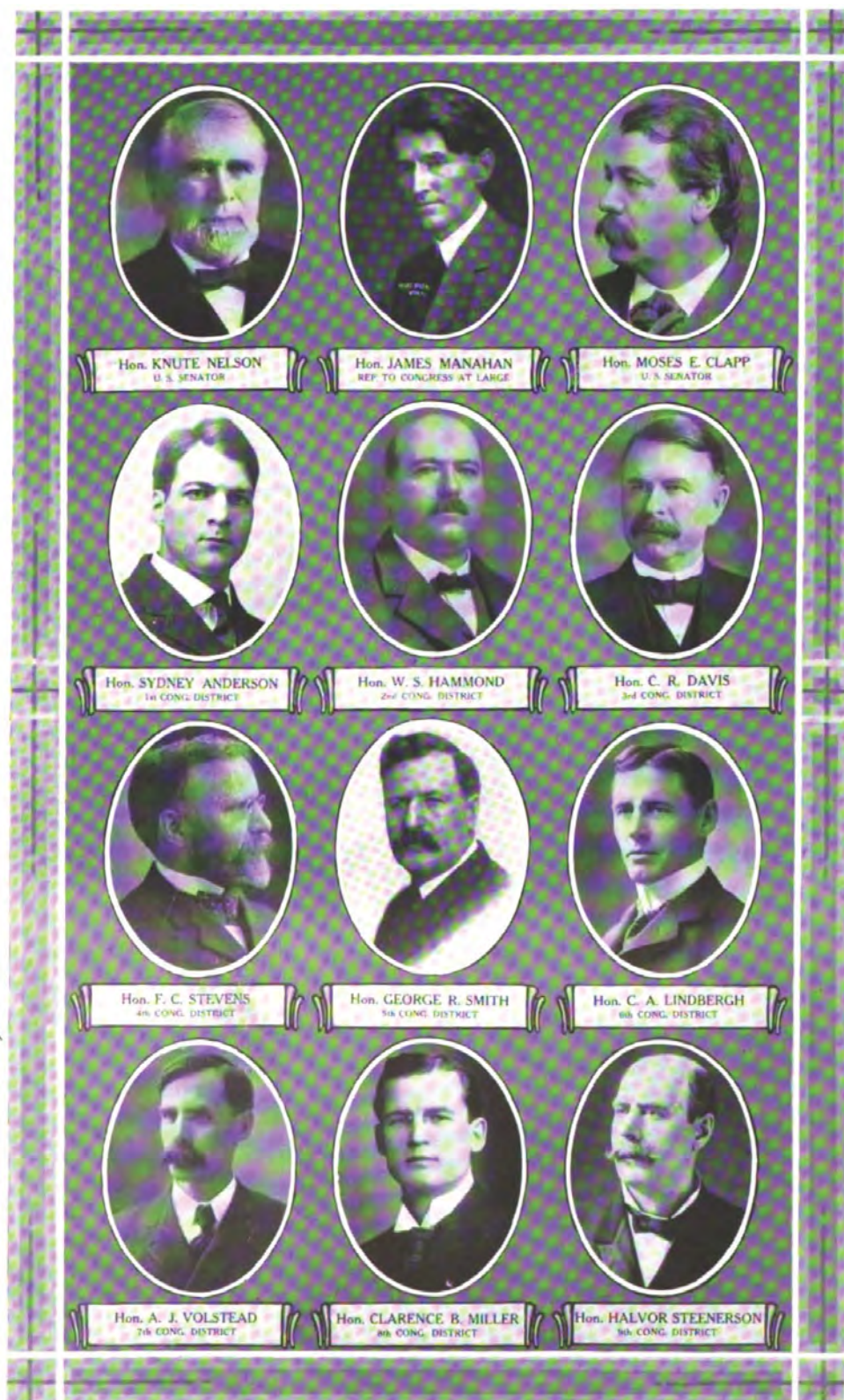

Was appointed Receiver of Public Moneys at United States Land Office at Taylors Falls in 1883, and held that position until 1887; was admitted to the bar in 1888, served as county attorney of Chisago county for twelve years; appointed judge of the Nineteenth judicial district, April 11, 1907, and nominated and elected in 1908 without opposition. MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.

SENATORS.

Knute Nelson (Republican) of Alexandria was born in Norway, Feb. 2, 1843. He came to the United States in July, 1849, resided in Chicago, Ill., until the fall of 1850, when he removed to the state of Wisconsin, and from there to the state of Minnesota in July, 1871. He was a private and non-commissioned officer in the Fourth Wisconsin Regiment during the War of the Rebellion, and was wounded and taken prisoner at Port Hudson, La., on the 14th day of June, 1863. He was admitted to the bar as a practicing attorney in the spring of 1867; was a member of the assembly in the Wisconsin legislature in 1868 and 1869; was county attorney of Douglas county, Minnesota, in 1872, 1873 and 1874; was state senator in 1875, 1876, 1877 and 1878; was presidential elector in 1880; was a member of the board of regents of the State University from Feb. 1, 1882, to Jan. 1, 1893; was a member of the forty-eighth, forty-ninth and fiftieth congresses for the Fifth district of Minnesota; was elected governor of Minnesota in the fall of 1892; re-elected as governor in the fall of 1894, and was elected United States senator for Minnesota on the 23rd day of January, 1895, re-elected in 1901, 1907 and 1913.

Moses E. Clapp (Republican) was born at Delphi, Ind., in 1851; parents removed to Hudson, Wis., in 1857; attended common school and graduated from Wisconsin Law School in 1873; commenced the practice of law at New Richmond, Wis., in 1873; removed to Hudson, Wis., in 1875; removed to Fergus Falls, Minn., in June, 1881; was elected attorney general in the fall of 1886, again in the fall of 1888, and again in the fall of 1890; removed to St. Paul, Minn., in the spring of 1891. Elected to the United States senate Jan. 23, 1901, to fill the unexpired term of the late Cushman K. Davis. Re-elected, 1905 and 1911.



REPRESENTATIVES.

REPRESENTATIVE AT LARGE.

James Manahan (Republican) was born at Chatfield, Minnesota, March 12th, 1866. He attended the public schools of Olmsted county, and after graduating from the Winona State Normal School taught for a short time. After studying law at the University of Wisconsin and the University of Minnesota, and graduating from the latter institution as the first graduate of its law department, he practiced in St. Paul for five years. Later he removed to Lincoln, Nebraska, and practiced in that city for ten years. Since 1904 he has practiced in the twin cities.

FIRST DISTRICT.

Sydney Anderson (Republican) was born on a farm in Goodhue county, Minnesota, September 17, 1880. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota law school and is a practicing attorney in Lanesboro, Fillmore county. He is married. He was elected representative to congress in 1910 and 1912.

SECOND DISTRICT.

Winfield S. Hammond (Democrat) was born in Southborough, Worcester county, Massachusetts, Nov. 17, 1863. He attended the public schools of his native town, graduating from the Peters' High School in June, 1880. That year he entered Dartmouth College, and graduated therefrom in June, 1884. Shortly after graduation, he came to Minnesota, and for one year was employed as principal of the high school at Mankato, Minn., and thereafter for five years as superintendent of schools in Madelia, Minn. In 1891 he was admitted to the bar, and began the practice of his profession in Madelia, Minnesota. Mr. Hammond moved to St. James, Minn., May, 1895, and has since been engaged in the practice of law there.

He served as county attorney of Watonwan county during the years 1895 and 1896, and again from the year 1900 to the end of 1904. In 1898 he was appointed by Governor Lind a member of the board of directors for state normal schools of Minnesota and re-appointed by Governor Van Sant, serving as a normal school director for eight years. He was president of the board of education of St. James, Minn., for several years, and for a number of years has been one of the state managers of the Sons of the Revolution. In 1892 he was the Democratic candidate for congress in the Second Minnesota district, and was, in 1906, again a candidate for the same position, to which he was elected at the general election that year. Re-elected 1908, 1910 and 1912.

THIRD DISTRICT.

Charles Russell Davis (Republican) of St. Peter was born at Pittsfield, Ill., Sept. 17, 1849; removed to Le Sueur county, Minnesota, in 1853; was educated in the common schools of Le Sueur county, graduating from the St. Peter High School in 1865; for two years thereafter received private instruction in the higher branches, and took a business college course in St. Paul during the winters of 1867-68; studied law with Alfred Wallin, present chief justice of North Dakota; was admitted to the bar March 6, 1872, and has practiced his profession ever since in Minnesota; was married, 1874, to Miss Emma Haven of Chicago; was county attorney of Nicollet county for ten years, and city clerk and city attorney of St. Peter for eighteen years; elected to the house of representatives of the state legislature in 1888 and to the senate in 1890; was captain of Company I, Second Regiment, Minnesota National Guard, for four years; was elected to the fifty-eighth and succeeding sessions.

FOURTH DISTRICT.

Frederick C. Stevens (Republican) was born in Boston, Mass., fifty years ago. Graduated from Bowdoin College in 1881, and from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1884. He came to Minnesota that year, settling in St. Paul. He was a representative to the legislature of Minnesota in 1889 and in 1891, and served as secretary of the State League of Republican Clubs from 1891 to 1896. Term began March 4, 1897 and he has since been continuously re-elected.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

George Ross Smith (Republican) was born in St. Cloud, this state, May 28, 1864, and graduated from the law school of the University of Minnesota in 1893, since which date he has been engaged in the practice of law in Minneapolis. He was a representative in the legislature from the first ward of Minneapolis in the 1903 session, and was elected judge of probate in 1907, holding the latter position until Jan. 7th of this year. He was nominated for representative in congress from the fifth district on Sept. 17th, 1912, and elected in the following November.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

Charles A. Lindbergh (Republican) was born January 20, 1859, in Sweden. Brought by his parents to the United States in 1860; lived on a farm near Melrose, Minn., from 1860 to 1881, where he attended the public schools; later on attended Grove Lake Academy and Michigan University, Ann Arbor. He resides at Little Falls, where he is engaged in the practice of law, which profession he has followed for twenty-one years. He is married. He was elected to the 60th, and re-elected to the 61st, 62nd and 63rd congresses.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

Andrew J. Volstead (Republican) of Granite Falls, born in Goodhue county, Minnesota, 1860. Was educated at the common schools, St. Olaf's College and Decorah Institute. Studied and was admitted to practice law. He has been engaged in farming, teaching and practicing law. Has been president of the board of education, city attorney and mayor of Granite Falls, and for fourteen years county attorney of Yellow Medicine county. He is married. Was elected as a Republican to the fifty-eighth congress, and has since been continuously re-elected.

Clarence B. Miller (Republican) is a native of Minnesota, having been born in Goodhue county in 1872; educated in the high school at Pine Island, the Minneapolis Academy and at the State University, graduating from the academic department in 1895 and from the law department in 1900. Was superintendent of schools at Rushford, Minn., from 1895 to 1898. He is engaged in the practice of law at Duluth; married. Served in the State Legislature 1907. Elected 1908, 1910 and 1912.

NINTH DISTRICT.

Halvor Steenerson, (Republican) of Crookston, Minn., was born June 30, 1852, in Dane county, Wisconsin, but removed to Minnesota the following year, 1853, his parents having settled in Houston county, where he was educated in the common schools, and at the high school in Rushford, Minn. Studied law in an office at Austin, Minn., and at Union College of Law, Chicago, and was admitted to the bar in the supreme court of Illinois in June, 1878, and the courts of Minnesota the same year. Began the practice of his profession at once, and removed to Crookston in April, 1880. Was in the fall of that year elected county attorney and served two years. In 1882 elected state senator and served in the sessions of 1883 and 1885. Was delegate to the national Republican convention at Chicago in 1884 and 1888. Married Maria Christofferson in 1878. Was elected to the fifty-eighth congress, and re-elected since that time.

SECOND DISTRICT.

M. J. McGrath (Democrat) was born in Ireland, came to the United States with his parents in 1851, resided in New York City for some years, came to Minnesota in 1867, settled in the city of St. Charles, Winona county; served on the city council, also on the school board and was president of the latter; served as a member of the legislature in 1891 and 1893. Moved to the city of Winona in 1902, where he is extensively engaged in farming. He is sixty-three years of age, married and has four children.

He has been mayor, member of the city council, and member and clerk of the board of education, Lanesboro. He served on the governor's staff under Governors Clough and Van Sant. He has been active in church and school work, and for two terms was a member of the board of trustees of the United Lutheran Church of America. Is president of the Norwegian Pioneer Association of America. Served in the senate 1907-1909.





SIXTH DISTRICT.

C. F. Cook (Democrat) was born in Austin, Minnesota, December 24, 1866; attended the public schools in Austin and Eastman College at Poughkeepsie, New York. He is engaged in the real estate and insurance business; has served the city of Austin as alderman and mayor. He is married.

Mr. Dunn has served three terms as member of the House of Representatives, being during his second term, chairman of the judiciary committee. He is fifty years old and married. Third term in Senate.



THIRTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

James Handlan (Democrat) was born in Sparta, Wis. He is forty-two years of age and married; graduated from high school at Sparta, Wis.; settled in Minnesota in 1884, at St. Paul, and has been engaged in the meat market business since 1890. Was a member of the House of Representatives in 1903, 1905, 1907 and 1909.

THIRTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Peter Van Hoven (Democrat) was born in the city of Oost Eysden, Province of Limburg, Holland, on March 7, 1855; received his education in the College of Hassel, Belgium, came to America in 1874, was engaged in the live stock and packing business for a number of years in this state and was appointed to the Board of Public Works of the city of St. Paul in 1902, and elected president of said board in 1909. He was elected state senator on the Democratic ticket, representing the 35th district in which he has been a continuous resident for the past thirty-two years.





THIRTY-SIXTH DISTRICT.

James D. Denegre (Republican) was born in New Orleans, La., is a graduate of the Phillips Exeter Academy, Princeton University, and the Law School of the University of Minnesota; he is engaged in the practice of law in St. Paul; is forty-four years of age and unmarried.

THIRTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.

Elwell (Republican) was born in Minnesota where he received his education in the common schools and at Carleton College, Northfield: served as a member of the legislature in 1899, and in senate in 1907-1909; has been secretary of the Good Roads Association, and instrumental in securing good roads legislation. William S. Dwinnell (Republican) was born in Wisconsin. Educated at the University of Wisconsin; came to Minnesota in 1889 and has resided in Minneapolis ever since. FORTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

Geo. P. Wilson (Republican) was born in Pennsylvania in 1840; came to Minnesota in 1860, locating at Winona. He has been assistant secretary of the state senate, secretary of the senate, county attorney of Winona county, government commissioner of the Southern Pacific Railway from San Francisco, south; member of the House of Representatives, and attorney general of Minnesota. He was chairman of the judiciary committee in the house in 1873, and was chairman of the senate judiciary committee in 1909. He resides at Minneapolis, in which city he is engaged in the practice of law. Elected to the senate since 1898.





FORTY-SECOND DISTRICT.

Manley L. Fosseen (Republican) was born in the state of Illinois, Dec. 10, 1869. He received his early education in the schools of that state. He afterwards studied law and graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1895. Since that time he has continuously practiced his profession in Minneapolis. He is married. FORTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.

John D. Sullivan (Democrat) was born at Peterboro, Ontario, on Nov. 25, 1862; attended public school; graduated from Peterboro Collegiate Institute; taught school thereafter in Ontario for four years; studied law and was admitted to practice at St. Cloud, Minn., in July, 1886; practiced ever since at St. Cloud. Held office of county attorney of Stearns county for eight years; city attorney of St. Cloud for three years; was married at St. Augusta, Minn., in 1886 to Elizabeth M. Schmidt; has four children, three sons and one daughter.





FORTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.

Charles D. Johnson (Democrat) was born in Mankato, Minn., Jan. 2, 1873; went to school in the public school at Mankato; moved to Brainerd in 1877, and has been engaged in the drug business in that city for thirty-three years. He served as postmaster of Brainerd from 1896 to 1900. Was a member of the city council seven years and for four years president of that body.

Served two terms in the house in 1899 and 1901, and an extra session, 1902; was elected to the senate in 1902, re-elected in 1906, and again re-elected in 1910.



FIFTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

Henry W. Cheadle (Democrat) was born in Meiggs county, Ohio, in 1865. With his parents he removed to Minnesota in 1872, and resided successively in Blue Earth, Buffalo, Jackson and Duluth. He attended Carleton College three years and taught country schools in Goodhue, Wright and Jackson counties. He was a member of the senate of 1907 and 1909. At present he is still engaged in the mercantile business at Richmond and Donnelly, and is interested in four different banks and president of the Bank of Rockville, Minn. FIFTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

C. W. Odell (Republican) was born in Sweden in 1862; came to Minnesota in 1879, settling in Kandiyohi county; was elected sheriff in 1890, and held that office for twelve years; was one of the organizers of the First National Bank of Willmar, Minn., in 1902; elected cashier of that institution and is still holding that position. Was appointed supervisor of the census for the Seventh Congressional District in 1910. He is married.

Born in Randolph, Vt., Oct. 2, 1864; came to Minnesota in 1882; is forty-eight years of age and married; was educated in the common schools of his native state and in Bristol Academy. Studied law in the office of M. R. Tyler of Fergus Falls; served as county attorney of Clay county from January, 1901, to January, 1907.

A. C. Johnson (Republican) was born in Norway, July 6th, 1857; came with his parents to Houston county, Minn., in 1861. Received his education in the common schools of Houston, county. In 1878 he moved to Madison county, Nebraska, and took up a homestead, where he was engaged in farming. He served three consecutive terms as county commissioner until the spring of 1902, when he came back to Houston county, Minnesota, and purchased a 480 acre farm, where he still resides, and is engaged in farming and live stock raising. He served as member of school board eight years, township assessor four years and justice of peace six years. He is a member of the I. O. O. F. and other organizations. He is married.

SECOND DISTRICT.

Henry Steen (Democrat) was born in Norway in 1858, and with his parents came to this country in 1870, settling in Rushford, Fillmore county, where Mr. Steen attended high school. He moved to Winona in 1880, and has since made his home in that city, with the exception of the years 1893 to 1896, when he was engaged in the clothing business at Rushford. Leonard Virtue (Democrat) was born in Owatonna, April 2, 1865, where he received his education in the public schools. He has served as alderman, mayor, member of the library board, and on the local board of state public school at Owatonna. He is married and at present engaged in the occupation of farming. Member of the house in 1909 and 1911.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

Finlay McMartin (Republican) was born in Ormstown, Quebec, March 23, 1845; settled in Minnesota in 1863; has served as county commissioner for two terms; he is married, resides at Claremont, and is engaged in farming and stock-breeding. Member of house 1909 and 1911.

Miles Porter (Republican) is a Minnesota product, born in Ceresco township, Blue Earth county, thirty-nine years ago. He is a lawyer by profession and a graduate of Mankato Normal school. After his graduation he engaged in hardware business at Vernon Center, during which time was elected five years in succession as president of village council, which office he resigned when he took up the study of law with Senator Frank Clague of Redwood Falls. Admitted to practice in 1908, and located in Mankato in which city he is now actively engaged in the law business. Served one term as city attorney of Mankato.



Alec Hanson (Republican) was born in Minnesota forty-five years ago. He received a common school education. Has served as county commissioner of Blue Earth county for eight years and as chairman of the county board for two years. He resides on a farm in Blue Earth county and is married.

Claude E. Southwick (Republican) was born at Wells, Minnesota, Jan. 15th, 1873, of New England parentage. After graduating from the Wells high school, he attended Hamline University, graduated from there in 1894, in the Latin scientific course. He is in the newspaper business and has been editor and publisher of the Minneota Mascot, published at Minneota, Minnesota, since April 15, 1900. He is married and lives in the village of Minneota, Lyon county.

Andrew Olien (Republican) was born in Sweden in 1860, and came to the United States in 1879. He was married in Wisconsin in 1887, and afterwards moved to Yellow Medicine county, this state, where he located on a farm in Friendship township in 1891. In 1904 he engaged in the hardware and implement business in Clarkfield, and still resides at that place. He has been a member of the Yellow Medicine board of county commissioners from 1904 up to his taking seat in the legislature.



EIGHTEENTH DISTRICT.

Albert J. Peterson (Republican) is a resident of Dawson, Lac qui Parle county, where he has been engaged in the banking business since 1890. Is forty-four years of age, married, and was a member of the 1911 session.

A. F. Teigen (Republican) is fifty-two years of age, married and resides on his farm. He received a common school education, followed by several years at college. Was elected register of deeds, Chippewa county, for two terms.



NINETEENTH DISTRICT.

Albert Pfaender (Democrat) was born in New Ulm, Minnesota, where he still resides. He graduated from the New Ulm High School, Mankato Normal School, and the University of Minnesota. He has held the office of city attorney of New Ulm for several terms, is interested in the National Guard, and has been for several years Captain of Company A of the Second Regiment. He is thirty-seven years old, a lawyer by profession, married, and is serving his second term in the house.



C. M. Bendixen (Republican) was born in Denmark fifty-three years ago; emigrated to the United States in 1880, going to California; came to St. Paul in 1883, where he was engaged in various occupations. Settled on a farm in Redwood county in 1898, in which business he is still engaged. Attended the schools in St. Paul and the State University. He is married and was a member of the 1907 and 1909 sessions of the house.



TWENTIETH DISTRICT.



Oscar A. Swenson (Republican) was born in New Sweden, Nicollet county, March 27, 1877. He received a common school education in the schools of his home district, and later spent three years at the Luther Academy in Albert Lea, following this by taking a one year course at Gustavus Adolphus college at St. Peter. He has been a supervisor of New Sweden township for seven years, and chairman of the town board for the past four years. He is secretary and manager of the New Sweden Creamery association, and also secretary of the Nicollet County Creamery and Dairy association. He is a farmer by occupation, and is married.

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

Ernest C. Pless (Republican) was born in New Ulm, Brown county, in 1882. When twelve years old he came with his parents to Gibbon, where he has since resided. He received his education in the public schools. He has served on the city council and is a member of the board of education. He is engaged in the milling business. Is married.



TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICT.



Nathaniel J. Holmberg (Republican) of Renville county, was born on a farm near Renville, attended rural schools and high school at Renville, is a graduate of the school of agriculture, University of Minnesota. By occupation he is a farmer and is interested in different lines of agriculture. He served in the sessions of 1907, 1909 and 1911, and was re-elected to serve his third term.

Frank Hopkins (Republican) was born Nov. 7, 1877, in Renville county, Minn.; lived on a farm until seventeen years of age; taught school and canvassed, working his way through the University of Minnesota, from the law department of which he graduated in June, 1903. In the summer of 1903, he entered the active practice of law in his home town, Fairfax, Minn., where he still resides. October 19, 1905, he was united in marriage to Estella J. Schramm of Fairfax, Minn. Two daughters have been born to the union. Was defeated for county attorney of Renville county in 1908 by a small margin. His father and mother have resided in Renville county since 1869. He was a member of the 1911 session.

L. O. Westman (Republican) was born in Meeker county, January 6, 1863, his parents being pioneers, having settled in the county in 1861, coming direct from Norway. He is a farmer and has taken an active interest in the development of the dairy and agricultural interests of the county. He is a director of the Litchfield co-operative creamery. For the past four years he has served as clerk of Litchfield township. Is married.



TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

Garfield W. Brown (Republican) was born in Pipestone county; received his education in the Pipestone High School and Academic and Law Departments of the State University. Graduated from the law school and admitted to the bar in 1906. He has been engaged in the practice of his profession for the past four years at Glencoe and was a member of the 1911 session.





TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Gerhard Kimpel (Republican) was born on a farm in Young America township, Carver county, Sept. 12, 1861, and received a common school education. He has spent his entire life on the farm, and has served in various public positions, including that of town clerk, county commissioner and as chairman of the Carver county board of commissioners. TWENTY-SIXTH DISTRICT.

Joseph Barten (Democrat) was born on a farm in the township of Belle Plaine, Scott county, Minn. Having attended his home school, he spent several years at college, and then came back to the farm, where he still lives. He has held several offices in his township, has been secretary of the Union Hill Co-operative Creamery Association, as long as the same existed and is secretary of the New Prague Township Mutual Insurance Society since 1904. He is married and forty-seven years of age.



TWENTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.

Martin Schwartz (Democrat) was born in Le Sueur county, Minn., in 1863, and was raised on a farm. Attended school at Ottawa until 18 years of age, and at the present time is engaged in dairying and running his own farm in Ottawa townsh p. Is secretary and manager of the Ottawa Co-operative Dairy Association, and township treasurer, which offices he has held for ten successive years. Mr. Schwartz has always taken great interest in educational matters, and is treasurer of his school district. He is forty-nine years old, and married and was a member of the 1911 session.



H. H. Flowers (Republican) was born on a farm in Cleveland, Le Sueur county, in 1865, and was educated in the common schools, afterwards attending the high school at St. Peter, and then graduating from a business college at Fayette, Ohio. He taught school for several years and then entered the mercantile business in 1889, closing out his interests in 1889. He is president of the First State Bank of Cleveland, has been postmaster of that village for fifteen years, and has held many other positions of trust. He is married and has four children.



TWENTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.

Ferdinand L. Klemer (Republican) was born at Watertown, Wis., Sept. 4, 1856; parents removed to Goodhue county, Minn., in 1857, and again moved to Faribault in the fall of 1864. He was educated in the public schools and also took a course in commercial and law school; has been connected with the woolen manufacturing business since 1874, and is now president of the Faribault Woolen Mill Co. He was a member of the 1911 session.



George D. Reed (Republican) was born in Pennsylvania, came to Faribault, Minnesota, in 1885, where he has since resided, for the past few years has been engaged in the fuel business, and other leading enterprises of Faribault. Was deputy register of deeds of Rice county for six years, served the county as clerk of the district court for nine years, served as clerk in the senate during the session of 1905; he is fifty-two years of age and married; was educated in some of the leading schools of Pennsylvania. Mr. Reed was a member of the 1911 session.





TWENTY-NINTH DISTRICT.

Geo. H. Voxland (Prohibition) is a native of Minnesota, having been born on the farm in Goodhue county where he still resides. Received his education at St. Olaf College, graduating from the academic department in 1894. Thirty-seven years of age and married. Mr. Voxland was a member of the 1911 session.

Fred. Seebach (Republican) was born in Germany on May 28, 1841. He came to America with his parents in 1844, and located near Milwaukee, where he taught school for two years, and then enlisted in a company of the 24th Regiment of Wisconsin Volunteers, in the struggle for the preservation of the Union, serving for three years, during which time he spent fifteen months in southern prisons, thirteen months of which was spent in Andersonville. He moved to Red Wing in 1873, where he has since resided. He has been postmaster at Red Wing, a ward alderman, county commissioner, and retires as county treasurer to serve in the legislature.



N. A. Stageberg (Republican) was born in Norway in 1850, and eight years later, with his parents, migrated direct from that country to Minnesota, settling on a farm in Goodhue township, where Mr. Stageberg still resides. He received a common school education and has held various positions of trust, among them being member of the town board, assessor, county commissioner for twelve years, director of the Wanamingo Insurance company, of which company he has also been treasurer.

THIRTIETH DISTRICT.

William H. Wescott (Republican) was born in Minnesota forty years ago in Dakota county; educated in common schools; elected assessor in 1899 to 1907, and clerk of school board since 1897. He is a farmer by occupation and married; member of the house in 1907 and 1909 and 1911.



T. H. Prince (Republican) was born in Bangor, Maine, in 1867, and three years later came with his parents to Minnesota, settling in St. Paul, where, in the public schools of the capitol city, he received his education. Afterwards he moved to South St. Paul, where he served in various municipal positions prior to his election to the present session of the legislature. He is a general contractor by occupation, and is married.

THIRTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

Henry B. Vollmer (Republican) was born in Switzerland, and is by occupation a farmer. Settled in Minnesota in 1858. He is sixty years of age and married; has been chairman of the town board of Lakeland township, Washington county, for twelve consecutive years; clerk of school board for fifteen years; has been either director, secretary or president of the German Farmers' Fire Insurance Company for thirty years; member of the legislature in 1889 and 1905, and held other positions of trust; educated in the German and French schools in Switzerland, and the common schools of Minnesota. He was a member of the 1905 and 1907 sessions of the legislature.





H. H. Harrison (Democrat) was born near Wheeling, West Virginia, in 1850, and graduated in the high school and draughting room of mechanical arts. He came west to Missouri in 1871, owing to poor health, and taught a rural school for one winter, after which he went to St. Louis, where he studied civil engineering. He came to Minnesota in 1880, laying the foundation for the Stillwater water works system, as well as in numerous other places throughout the northwest. He is a member of the St. Paul society of civil engineers. He has traveled extensively through this country and Europe. He is a single man.

THIRTY-SECOND DISTRICT.

Henry Rines (Republican) was born in Orsa, Sweden, forty years ago. His parents moved to this country when he was one year old, settling in Isanti county, Minnesota. When four years old he moved to Brunswick, Kanabec county, and has since made that county his home. At the age of twenty-two he was elected county auditor of Kanabec county, which position he held for ten years. He served as secretary of the Republican county committee four years and as chairman six years. He is engaged in the newspaper business at Mora, the county seat, being the editor of the Kanabec County Times. He is also in the real estate business. Was a member of the house in 1907, 1909 and 1911.



Adolph S. Larson (Republican) was born in Sweden thirty-three years ago. Received a public school education; emigrated from Sweden in 1893, locating at Sandstone, Minn., where he has since resided. He is a merchant and is married.

THIRTY-THIRD DISTRICT.

E. J. Fuchs (Republican) was born in Germany in 1874, came direct to St. Paul with father at the age of six; went to the public school up to the eighth grade; sold papers and shined shoes in the meantime; left school at twelve and went to work. Helped in his father's drug store from the time he was fourteen years old, with the exception of one year when he worked in a drug store at Worthington, Minn. Mr. Fuchs is at present running a drug store in the district in which he has lived for twenty-eight years. He has been married for ten years and was a member of the 1911 session.



Victor C. Sundberg (Republican) was born at Lake City, this state, on Aug. 29, 1871. He passed through the grades and high school of that city, and entered the drug business in 1889. Mr. Sundberg came to St. Paul in 1895, and has since been engaged in the drug business at his present place in the first ward. He is married.

THIRTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

T. J. Greene (Republican) was born in St. Paul thirty-six years ago and graduated from the Cretin High School of that city; he served four years as a deputy clerk of court under the administration of Hon. Edw. G. Rogers and for the past two years has served his county in the position of deputy sheriff. Mr. Greene has always been actively alert to the best interests of his home city and is well and favorably known as an enterprising young Republican. Member of house in 1909 and 1911.





J. J. Preston (Democrat) is a native of Minnesota, having been born of Irish parents in St. Paul fifty-two years ago, and here he received his education in the public schools. He is a stone mason by occupation, and is a prominent member of the Union of Team Owners. He is a married man.

W. E. Dindorf (Democrat) was born in St. Paul in 1874, and was educated in the St. Paul schools. He has resided in the Capitol City ever since he was born, and has been employed as a local traveling salesman for a number of years, although during a more recent period he has been with the ranks of professional advertising men. He is a firm believer in Democratic principles, and his election to the legislature is the first public position which he has sought.



THIRTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Adolph C. Stoven (Republican) was born in St. Paul, Nov. 7th, 1882, and resides at 676 Stryker Ave. Educated in the city public schools, high school, business college and is a graduate of the St. Paul College of Law, class of 1911. He is engaged in the practice of law, also as a bookkeeper, accountant and rate clerk. He is unwed.

Jos. M. Thornton (Democrat) representing the Thirty-fifth legislative district, comprising the Fifth ward, City of St. Paul, is serving his first term in this body. Mr. Thornton is a member of the firm of Thornton Bros., contractors, with offices at South St. Paul. He was born and raised in St. Paul, and received his schooling in the public and high schools of that city. He was born Sept. 5, 1872. This is his first entry into politics.

His father, P. H. Thornton, was a member of the House of Representatives for two terms, from Scott county, in 1879 and 1881.



THIRTY-SIXTH DISTRICT.

James P. Elmer (Republican) was born in New Jersey. He came to Minnesota in 1880, being employed on the United States survey of the reservoir dams of the upper Mississippi river. From 1883 to 1897 he was in the mercantile business as manufacturer's agent, and railroad supplies. In 1897 he entered the service of the Chicago Great Western Railway Company as city passenger agent at St. Paul, and in 1900 he was appointed general passenger agent for the same company, retiring from that position in 1909, and since that time he has been engaged in the life insurance business as a member of the Tarbox-Elmer Agency, having charge of the business of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York.



George H. Moeller (Republican) was born in St. Paul on Feb. 13th, 1882. He received a common school education, and at the age of fourteen he accepted a position with the St. Paul Dispatch as office boy, and afterwards found employment in the business and circulation departments of the Volkszeitung Printing and Publishing Co. He served in the United States navy in 1899 and 1900, and since that time he has been engaged in the newspaper, telephone, insurance and advertising business. At present he is with the Corning Advertising agency.



THIRTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.



Charles N. Orr (Republican) was born at Princeton, Minnesota. He is a graduate of the Princeton High School, Hamline University and the St. Paul College of Law. While engaged in the study of law he was for three years employed in the office of State Auditor, resigning therefrom to engage in the practice of his profession. He was admitted to the bar in the fall of 1906, and has since been engaged in the practice of law.



THIRTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.

Michael J. Sullivan (Democrat) was born in Minneapolis, Minn., where he is engaged in the cut stone contracting business; he is married and forty-four years old. Served in the 1909 and 1911 sessions.

Wm. H. Thielen (Democrat) was born and raised in the district which he represents and has lived in the same all his life. He resides at 906 Second St. N. E., Minneapolis. He received a common school education and at the age of seventeen entered the printing business with his brother and father. At present it is the Thielen Printing Co.



THIRTY-NINTH DISTRICT.

Frank L. Palmer (Republican) was born in Jackson county, Michigan, fifty-two years ago, and at thirteen, owing to the death of his father, he assumed control of the farm. He obtained a graded school education, and later removed to Kalamazoo, where he was employed in the grocery business. Later he was employed in the postoffice, and in 1883 went to North Dakota, where he resided for five years. Going to Minneapolis in 1888 he was given employment in a real estate office, and for the past sixteen years has been engaged in that business, together with loans, rentals and insurance. He has been on the park and pure water commissions, was president of the St. Anthony Commercial Club, is Past Grand Regent of the Royal Arcanum of the state. He is married.



W. I. Norton (Republican) was born in Allegan county, Michigan, April 28th, 1880. He taught school at various times before leaving college, and removed to Minneapolis in 1884, where he studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1886. Mr. Child was appointed by the judges of the district court as a member of the Minneapolis charter commissions of 1897 and 1911.



FORTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

Thomas Kneeland (Republican) is a native of Maine; was graduated from Bowdoin College in 1874; admitted to the bar at Portland, Maine, in 1879, and in Minnesota in 1880, and to the United States Supreme Court in 1903. He acted as special counsel to the Attorney General on behalf of the state in the Gross Earnings Tax Case of the state of Minnesota against the Great Northern Railway Company. He was a member of the house in the session of 1909. In 1887 he married Miss Josephine W. Underwood, daughter of the Hon. Wm. H. Underwood, a distinguished jurist of Illinois. Since 1880 he has resided in Minneapolis, where he is engaged in the practice of his profession.



John George Lennon (Republican) born in Minneapolis, is a traveling salesman, fifty-three years of age and married. Educated at Owatonna High School. He has held the positions of postmaster and member of the village council of Blooming Prairie. Now serving fifth term.



Charles L. Sawyer (Republican) was born in Lee, N. H.; educated at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N. H., in 1888, received master's degree in 1891, graduate of the Minnesota School of Law, 1897. Was principal of the South Side High School, Minneapolis, from 1892 to 1899, when he engaged in the real estate business, which he still follows. He settled in Minnesota in 1892; is married and fifty-two years of age; member of the house in 1907 and 1909.

Ellis J. Westlake (Republican) was born at Horse Heads, Chemung county, New York, April 30, 1854. He came to Minneapolis in 1852, and was appointed by President Villard of the Northern Pacific as superintendent of the dining car and hotel department of that system. In 1897 he became assistant secretary and superintendent of the St. Paul Commercial club and in 1902 was elected secretary and manager of the Minneapolis Commercial club, serving in that capacity for ten years, and resigning to engage in the insurance business. He is now vice president of the Wm. B. Joyce & Co. agency.



FORTY-SECOND DISTRICT.



Wm. A. Campbell (Republican) was born in Pocahontas county, Iowa, on a farm thirty-nine years ago. Came to Minnesota in 1892. Commercial traveler and lecturer by occupation, and resides at Minneapolis. Was chairman of the labor committee and one of the labor leaders of the house in the 1909 session, when he secured the enactment of the law creating a woman's department in the labor bureau; receiving the state endorsement from organized labor at the close of the session because of his efforts in their behalf. At the 1912 extra session he was the champion of the bill, which became a law, regulating the employment of children.

Ernest Lundeen (Republican) attorney at law, Northwestern Bank Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota. Born on a homestead near Beresford, S. D., August 4th, 1878. Son of Rev. Charles Henry and Christine C. (Peterson) Lundin. Attended common school near Beresford, S. D., and Harcourt, Iowa. Graduated from Dayton, Iowa, High School 1895. Served as a volunteer during the Spanish American war, 1898. Won State oratorical contest of Minnesota 1901. Represented Minnesota State University in debate with Northwestern University 1903. Studied law at the University of Minnesota and was admitted to the bar May 21st, 1906, and has practiced since admission. Holds many decorations and prizes won in athletic, rifle, debate and oratorical contests. Member of National Champion Rifle team 1909. Nominated and elected state representative 1910-1912. Elected alternate delegate from Hennepin County, to the National Republican Convention at Chicago, 1912, without opposition. Re-nominated and re-elected state representative 1912-1914 by large majorities. Stood consistently for all progressive and labor measures. Received indorsement from the State Progressive League, and the State Federation of Labor for legislation which he secured in their behalf. Member I. O. O. F., Spanish War Veterans and other organizations.



FORTY-THIRD DISTRICT.

W. I. Nolan (Republican) was born in the city of St. Paul, where he received his common school education. He removed to Minneapolis where he has since resided. Mr. Nolan is a lecturer by occupation. James Dwver (Democrat) was born at St. Stephens, New Brunswick, on September 20, 1858. He came to Minnesota on October 9th, 1880, and has lived in Minneapolis since that time, at 2828 Fourth Street north. He was formerly engaged in the lumber business, but is now engaged in the ice business. He served in the city council for twelve years.

FORTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Robert C. Dunn (Republican) was born in County Tyrone, Ireland. He resides at Princeton, where he publishes and edits the Princeton Union, a weekly newspaper; he settled in Minnesota in 1876; he is married. He held the office of town clerk of Princeton from 1878 to 1889; he was county attorney of Mille Lacs county, 1884 to 1888; served as a member of the house in 1889; was renominated by the Republican party in 1890, but the contesting candidate was by the canvassing board declared elected, and, after a stubborn contest in the house, seated by the house. He was a delegate to the Republican National Convention from the Sixth congressional district, and an ardent supporter of James G. Blaine; member of the house in 1893; was elected state auditor, 1894 and 1898.



Andrew Davis (Republican) was born in Elk River July 31st, 1866, at which place he still resides and is engaged in the mercantile business; is married; served in the house sessions of 1907, 1909 and 1911.

Isaac F. Walker (Republican) was born in New Jersey in 1851. He came to Minnesota in 1856, and has lived on a farm ever since, making Isanti county his home for the past twenty-five years. He was engaged in the mercantile business for a number of years. Mr. Coates was a member of the house in 1891, and in 1903 was appointed clerk of court, holding that office for three years. In addition he has been extensively engaged in farming and real estate.

FORTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.

Charles W. Bouck (Republican) was born in Rockford, Illinois, the 29th day of February, 1852. Moved onto a farm at an early age. Worked in a mercantile store at Independence, Iowa, at the age of twenty. Moved to Brainerd, Minnesota, in 1880, and there entered the employ of the Northern Pacific as a bridge builder and carpenter. Moved to Royalton in 1885, where he resided ever since. Owns, together with his son, a hardware and implement store at Royalton. Owns several farms in southern Morrison county, and is heavily interested in Morrison county lands. Lives on a farm within the village limits of Royalton.



Louis W. Vasaly (Democrat) was born in Little Falls, Minnesota, in 1879, and has resided there continuously up to the present time. He is a graduate of the Little Falls High School, and of the Minnesota University. He is a lawyer by profession and has been city attorney for Little Falls for six years.

FORTY-NINTH DISTRICT.

John A. Healy (Republican) was born at Oswego, N. Y., February 22, 1870. Educated in the public schools and settled in Minnesota in 1893; he is married and resides at Hibbing, where he is engaged in the hotel business.



Cleon T. Knapp (Republican) age thirty years. Residence, Chisholm, Minnesota. Resided in Twin Cities for twenty-two years. Graduate of High School and University of Minnesota. City attorney for several years. Married.

FIFTIETH DISTRICT.

Anton Borgen (Republican) born in Norway, 1851, came to America and located in Minnesota in 1871, railroaded as engineer for twelve years, in the grocery business for twenty-four years, also secretary and treasurer of the Scandinavian Cemetery Association for the last twenty years. Has retired from active business five years ago. Is married and is a resident of Duluth, Minn.





E. R. Ribenack (Democrat) born in the village of Kilbourn, Wisconsin, November 26, 1868. Graduated from High School and took a course in a business college. Moved to Duluth in 1890, and has been engaged in the hotel and restaurant business continuously ever since. Married Miss Ella Van Alstine at Kilbourn, in 1893. Have two children, a girl of fifteen years and a boy eleven. Was elected to the city council from the 5th Ward in 1905 and re-elected to succeed himself in that body in 1907.

FIFTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

N. S. Hillman (Public Ownership) born in Sweden Nov. 18, 1862; came to the United States in April, 1880; first located in Moorhead, Clay county. In 1883 moved to Two Harbors, Lake county, where he entered the service of the Duluth & Iron Range R. R. Co., then under construction; was promoted to locomotive engineer in 1887, which position he still occupies.



Amos L. Warner (Republican) was born in Garden City, this state, May 7th, 1857. For ten years he was engaged in farming and live stock business in southern Minnesota, and was married to Harriet Piper of Mankato on Dec. 26th, 1884. He moved to Duluth in December of 1886, since which time he has been actively engaged in the real estate, timber and farm land business in northern Minnesota and western Canada. At the present time he is actively engaged in farming and developing farm lands.

FIFTY-SECOND DISTRICT.

Chas. H. Warner (Republican) came to Minnesota in a prairie schooner when he was three months old, and was raised on a hardwood timber farm in the backwoods of Wright county. Taught school and read law, being admitted to the bar. Was Assistant State Land Clerk from 1895 to 1900, when he resigned to engage in private business in Aitkin. For several years owned and published the Aitkin Age. Was Superintendent of State Immigration Department, 1905-1906. Secretary of Republican State Central Committee in 1904. Stone (Republican) was born in New York state; came to Fox Lake, Wis., when about two years of age; he was educated at Wayland Academy, Beaver Dam, Wis., and the Wisconsin University; medical degrees from Hahnemann, Chicago, 1882; P. & S., Chicago, 1897; Columbia Laboratory, 1898. Practiced in St. Cloud 1882 to 1896, and in Park Rapids 1898 to present time; he is fifty-seven years of age and married, and was a member of the 1911 session.





John Anderson (Republican) was born in Westergtland, Sweden, July 10th, 1864. With his parents he migrated to America in the spring of 1882, and accepted a position in a store at Wadena, this state, in 1884. He attended the Archibald Business College in Minneapolis during various periods, graduating from there in 1888. He formed a partnership with W. R. Baumbach of Wadena in 1890, and opened a store at Sebeka, which Mr. Anderson is still conducting, having purchased Mr. Baumbach's interest several years ago. He has served as president of the village council, and was the first postmaster at Sebeka, a position which he still holds.

FIFTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

F. E. Minnette (Democrat) was born March 9th, 1859, on a farm, helping his parents in the summer and going to school in the winter, until he was twenty years old. Began teaching school in 1881. In 1892 was elected a member of the legislature and re-elected a member of the legislature in 1902. In 1908 in one of the hardest contests witnessed in Sauk Centre, Minn., was elected its mayor, and was re-elected mayor in 1909 by a still larger majority. Served as president and secretary of the Stearns County Agricultural Society for a number of years and is serving as its secretary at the present time. He was a member in 1911.



J. A. Henry (Democrat) was born in Eldora township, Benton county, Nov. 16, 1881. After attending the common schools he graduated from the St. Cloud High School, and the Normal School in St. Cloud. He then commenced the study of pharmacy, and graduated from the Minnesota School of Pharmacy on June 5th, 1905. Later he was employed as a clerk in a Minneapolis drug store. On Nov. 16th, 1907, he became a registered pharmacist, and then purchased a drug business at Albany, where he has since resided. He is secretary of the Albany Commercial club.

FIFTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

P. H. Frye (Republican) was born in Lowell, Mass., on May 17, 1850, and moved with his parents to Boone county, Ill., when he was but five years old. Upon the death of his father, when young Frye was but 16 years, the latter was compelled to leave school, and assist in the support of the family. He worked on farms in Illinois and Iowa, and in 1870 went to the Pacific Coast. Returning three years later he again found employment on the farm. Entered the newspaper business in 1888, and in partnership with Leslie Matthews published the Swift County Monitor. Was appointed postmaster at Benson in 1895 and served four years. Served two terms as register of deeds of Swift county and is at present a member of the Benson School Board. He is now actively engaged in the banking business in Benson and is also interested in farming and real estate; married.



FIFTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.



Lewis C. Spooner (Republican) was born in Erie county, New York, where he received his education in the common schools. He came to Minnesota in 1875, and engaged in the practice of law at Morris. He was a member of the sessions of 1907, 1909 and 1911, and during the last session was a firm and consistent advocate of the new Stillwater prison, and of the rights of the people of the state to the water powers. He was a prominent candidate for the Republican nomination for governor in 1912, and failing in securing the nomination he returned to his district, and was re-elected to the house as an independent Republican.

Carl P. Carlson (Republican) was born in Fillmore county, Minnesota, in 1860. Attended the common schools. In 1883 he moved to Barnes county, N. D., where he took up a homestead near Valley City, and lived until 1900. He served Barnes county as a county commissioner for three years. Mr. Carlson moved to Stevens county in 1900, and bought the farm near Morris where he now resides. He has served the township of Swan Lake several terms as town clerk.



FIFTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.



Nels E. Nelson (Republican) was born in the Province of Vermland, Sweden, July 26, 1858. Came with his parents to this country and settled in 1871 in the township of La Grand, Douglas county, Minnesota, where he has ever since continued to reside. In 1884 when the Holmes City Farmers' Mutual Insurance Company was organized he was one of the promoters and its first secretary, and of which he is now president. Served as township supervisor for one year, town clerk for five years, register of deeds for twenty-two years. Is married and has five children. Occupation, farmer.

T. T. Ofsthun (Republican) was born in Norway fifty-three years ago and settled in Minnesota in 1871. One of the first things he did after reaching proper age was to study law, and he did that at the law department of the University of Iowa. Equipped with legal learning, he started out on his professional career, and was elected county attorney of Pope county, Minesota, and held that office for ten years. He is a widower. Was also member of the house in 1901, 1902, 1903 and 1905.



FIFTY-NINTH DISTRICT.

John T. Johnson (Republican) was born in Waseca county, Minnesota; attended the common schools and Bayley's Business College at Dubuque, Iowa; settled in Fergus Falls in 1878; has served as chairman of the county commissioners; he is engaged in the drug, paint and oil business at Fergus Falls; married and fifty-two years of age. Member of the 1907 and 1909 legislatures.

H. A. Putnam (Republican) born in Minnesota in 1865. Attended the common school and the St. Cloud Normal. Taught school a few years and since then has conducted a farm in Amor township. Served in the session of 1909. Married. P. O. is R. 3, Battle Lake, Minn.





R. J. Lindberg (Republican) was born in Norway in 1868; came with his parents to Jackson county, Minnesota, in 1881. Received his education in Norway and Minnesota; came to Henning in 1902, and engaged in the drug business; has served as president of the village council, president of the board of education for several years, vice president and director of the Farmers' State Bank of Henning. He is married.

G. T. Braateliën (Republican) was born in Sigdal, Norway, Sept. 4th, 1871. He attended school in the city of Drammen until his parents moved to America in 1885, they settling at Rothsay. Mr. Braateliën continued winter studies until he was twenty-two years old. He is a farmer by occupation, has been a justice of the peace, clerk of his school district, organizer and officer in a farmers' elevator company, and has had extended experience in probate matters. He is married.



SIXTIETH DISTRICT.

Henry O. Bjorge (Republican) was born at Lake Park, Minn., where he now resides, being engaged in the practice of law and farming. He is forty-one years of age and single. Graduated from the State Normal School at Moorhead in 1893 and from the Law Department of the State University in 1898. Member of the house in 1905 and 1907.

George W. Burrows (Republican) was born in Wright county, Iowa, in 1867. Educated in common schools of Iowa and the Iowa Business College of Des Moines; was engaged in farming until 1889; since that time has been engaged in the real estate and farm loan business. Moved to Minnesota in 1899 and established the business at Breckenridge at present conducted by Burrows & Shepherd, of which he is the senior member. Is vice president and director of the Commercial Club; treasurer and director of the Breckenridge Telephone Company; director of the Breckenridge National Bank; a member of the City Water & Light Commission, and was chairman of the board of county commissioners at the time of his election to the house. Has held many minor offices. Is married.



Knud Wefald (Republican) was born at Krager, Norway, forty-five years ago and came to the United States when seventeen years of age, alone and the first member of his family to emigrate. Received his education in the public schools and the high school of his native city. Worked first on farms, then in country stores, in Minnesota and North Dakota; assumed his father's obligations on the old farm homestead in Norway. Came to Hawley, Minn., sixteen years ago as retail lumber yard manager. Married Miss Sarah Skree in 1899. At the death of his father nine years ago went to Norway and disposed of the old homestead, came back to Hawley and engaged in the retail lumber business and has resided there ever since. Has served as president of the village council, the present one being his sixth consecutive term. Has a family of four boys and four girls.



SIXTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

Daniel P. O'Neill (Republican) was born in Ontario, Canada, in 1853, moved with his parents to Stillwater in 1872, engaged in lumbering until 1879. Settled on a homestead in Bigstone county, moved to Thief River Falls in 1902. Member of the Board of Education. Representative in 1893 and 1899. Common school education. Occupation, farmer. Married.

A. B. Peterson (Republican) was born in Norway in 1852. He came to Dane county, Wis., in 1861 and moved to Goodhue county, Minn., in 1864. He received his education in Wisconsin and Minnesota. OFFICERS OF THE SENATE

SECRETARY OF THE SENATE.

George W. Peachey was born in Waupun, Wis., on September 3, 1853. He came to Minnesota in June, 1856, and is now engaged in the real estate and loan business at Owatonna, Steele county. He has held the office of clerk of court twelve years, was a member of the board of education for eight years, a member of the hospital board for two years, a member of the state senate for four years, secretary of the senate during the sessions of 1909 and 1911. He has always been an active Republican politically. He is married.

FIRST ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF THE SENATE.

Edgar B. Shanks was born in Fillmore, Minn., July 31st, 1860. He removed with his parents to Martin county in 1866, locating at Fairmont. He graduated from the Fairmont public school in 1876. Entered the Faddis Business College, St. Paul, graduating therefrom in June, 1880, at that time receiving a gold pen as a prize for penmanship. He studied law for a short time and assumed the position of deputy county auditor in March, 1881, serving in that capacity for six years. He married Lilly Meteer in 1883; was elected county auditor of Martin county in 1887, and served as such for ten years. Mr. Shanks joined the I. O. O. N. C. Koel was born on a farm near the village of Caledonia, Houston county, Dec. 20, 1886. He received a common school education and is a graduate of the Wisconsin Business College. Was committee clerk in senate of 1911 session. Is married and resides at Caledonia.

ENGROSSING CLERK.

Harry N. Nordholm, was born at Red Wing, Minn., May 2, 1884 of Swedish parents. He received a common school education and served four years' apprenticeship in the mason trade and has followed that trade since. He was married at Red Wing, Minn., May 19, 1909 to Anna Margaret Von-Bargen. He cast his first ballot for the Republican party at the age of twenty-one and has been a supporter of that party ever since.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.

James H. Ege was born at Pine Grove Furnace, Cumberland county, Pennsylvania, March 20, 1844. Mr. Ege's grandfather, Peter Ege, served on General Washington's staff and married Miss Arthur, a cousin of General

Arthur, at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, September 12, 1799. General and Martha Washington were present at the wedding and presented Mr. Ege with a pair of silver knee buckles which are still in the family. James Ege, at the age of thirteen, began to support himself, working on a farm at \$4 a month until he had earned enough at his fourteenth year, to take him west, landing at Whiteside county, Illinois, in August, 1858. He worked on a farm summers and attended school winters, until, in August, 1862, when in his seventeenth year, he enlisted in Company F, 93d Regiment of Illinois Volunteers, with which he served two years, eleven months and twenty days at the front. He took part in every engagement of his regiment, notably Raymond, Jackson and Champion Hills, Mississippi, where he was taken prisoner and in a short time was exchanged, returning to his regiment. He engaged in the battles of Dalton and Allatona Pass, Georgia, was in the battle of Mission Ridge, Tennessee, and a number of minor engagements and skirmishes, and finally in Sherman's march to the sea and the grand review at Washington. He was promoted to corporal and later, for meritorious conduct, was made mounted orderly at brigade headquarters, third brigade, third division, 15th army corps. He was offered a lieutenancy in three different regiments by being transferred, but he did not accept. He returned to Illinois where he farmed until 1867. He married Margaret C. Quick, of Albany, Ill., who died twelve years ago in Minneapolis. He moved to Minneapolis in 1869 where he has been engaged in speculating in stock and real estate. He joined the G. A. Rev. Andrew David Stowe, B. D., Rector of Christ Episcopal church, Minneapolis, was born in Readsboro, Vermont, April 21, 1851. He removed to Waterville, Minnesota, with his parents in June, 1856. He was educated in the public school, Shattuck school, Faribault and Seabury Divinity School at Faribault, Minnesota. He was ordained as a deacon June

13, 1880, in the Cathedral at Faribault, and to the Priesthood December 19, 1880, in St. Paul's church at St. Paul. He became Rector of Trinity church, at Anoka, Minnesota, and in charge of Elk River, Becker and Princeton, August 30, 1880, in which capacity he served until April 1, 1888, when he became Rector of Ascension church at Stillwater. He resigned Ascension church on Easter, 1900, and assumed his present charge October 1st, 1900, also having had charge, during this time, of St. Matthew's church, St. Anthony Park, Epiphany church at Hamline and Grace church in Minneapolis. He has served as the secretary of the diocese of Minnesota since October 1st, 1885, being appointed to that office by the late Bishop of the diocese, the Right Reverend H. B. Whipple, D. D., LL. D. and has since been annually chosen to that office. He married Francis Ellen Jacklin of Detroit, Mich.
