

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
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

AUTHORITY AND CONTENTS

The Legislative Manual of nineteen hundred and nineteen is divided as to contents into three parts. Part I contains the state organic act, act authorizing a state government, act of admission, declaration of independence, articles of confederation, constitutions of the State of Minnesota and the United States, territorial and state government, and legislative statistics. Part II contains history and growth of state, and review of state departments and institutions. Part III contains roster of officers of state departments and institutions, county officers and federal officers appointed from Minnesota, election returns, population and financial statistics of the state, and such miscellaneous matter of general interest as has usually been published in the Manual.

The publication of this Manual is biennial, and is authorized under chapter 34, Revised Statutes of 1913.

Distribution is as follows:

- Fifty copies to each member of the legislature, including the president of the senate.
- Fifty copies to state historical society for exchange with other states.
- Five copies to state university.
- Three copies to state library.
- Two copies to congressional library at Washington.
- Two copies to soldiers' home.
- Two copies to each free public library in the state.

- One copy to each independent special and common school district in this state.

- One copy to each officer and employe of the house and senate.
- One copy to each supreme and district court judge.

- Two hundred and seventy-five copies to remain in the office of the secretary of state for distribution among the members of the next succeeding legislature.
- The remaining copies shall be held for distribution as deemed best.


For six years Attorney General of Minnesota, brought to the legal department of the state superb mental equipment, intense Americanism and consecration to duty, and by the product of his labors he more than vindicated the confidence reposed in him by the people of the state.

A native of New Hampshire, he was born in 1854 of an illustrious family and by his life work sustained its best traditions. He was graduated from Dartmouth College in 1880 at the head of his class. He went immediately to Washington, D. C., where he entered the office of the United States Commissioner of Education. While in Washington he studied law and in 1884 received the degree of Bachelor of Law from Georgetown University. Shortly after his graduation he came west and finally chose the city of Montevideo, Chippewa County, Minnesota, for the scene of his life's work.

His ability and integrity were soon recognized and he served as county attorney of Chippewa county from 1889 to 1890 and from 1903 to 1909. He was Lieutenant Governor of the State of Minnesota from 1899 to 1903 and to the legislative field carried the training of the lawyer, giving to all public questions careful and thoughtful consideration, and became a recognized authority on parliamentary law. During this period he was in close touch with all legislative questions and was always found aiding measures which were calculated to promote the welfare of the people of the state. In 1909 he was appointed Assistant Attorney General and in 1912 Attorney General. He continued to serve the state in the capacity of chief law adviser until his death.

He was a courteous yet formidable antagonist. His application, his untiring research, his painstaking care and patient labor were known to all who had dealings with him. He was cautious but once the path of duty became clear he followed it to the end. The gentleness of his nature, the charm of his personality, the readiness of his sympathy, each was such that to know him was to love him. Unswerving fidelity to duty had led him into the habit of overwork and his over exertion gradually sapped his vitality until the end came suddenly on March 5, 1918. Though frequently warned by his physicians that but one end would result unless he conserved his energies yet no change was made by him. By his death the people lost a public servant of unusual ability and the bar of the state one of its most respected and esteemed members.


JUDGE GEORGE L. BUNN

Was born at Sparta, Wisconsin, on June 25, 1865. Graduated from the law department of the University of that State in 1888, locating in Minnesota for the practice of his profession in September of that year. He was appointed Judge of the Second Judicial District in January, 1897, and thereafter held that office until appointed an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court to succeed the late Justice Jaggard. He was elected to the position in 1914, and continued in the office until his death, which occurred on Wednesday, October 9, 1918.

No lawyer ever came to the Supreme Bench of the State with any better equipment for the important work of that tribunal than Judge Bunn. He was a son of Judge Romanzo Bunn, of Wisconsin, a lawyer and jurist of high character and ability, and possessed the even tempered judicial mind to an exceptional degree of perfection. He approached his daily duties with an open mind, gave to all a patient and impartial hearing, and reached his conclusions from the standpoint of justice and right. He was profoundly learned in the fundamentals of the law, and though not aggressive in the expression of his views, was clear and forceful and commanded the unbounded confidence and respect of his associates. The opinions written by him are a monument to his learning and ability and place him in a class with the ablest of those who have honored the highest tribunal of the State with their presence.

"Had his inclinations ran to selfish interests, he would have died a millionaire."

These words expressed by a close observer of the political life of Robert C. Dunn, summed up the true characteristics of one of the most striking figures in Minnesota public life for many years.

Mr. Dunn, born in Ireland, had the true Celtic temperament: quick to resent opposition, but just as eager to make amends for hurting the feelings of an opponent. His mind ran not to petty political tricks, nor were his inclinations bent toward personal ambition. He was broad by nature and his editorial leadership easily resulted in his being selected by the Republican party, with which he always affiliated as one of its leaders.

It was to his own innate honesty that can be attributed the fact that he was not chosen as the chief executive of Minnesota in 1904. He refused to be cajoled into making an expression that would have eliminated opposition, preferring rather to stand by his principles.

Aside from his purely political activities, there are hundreds of men in Minnesota today who owe their first start toward success to the generosity of big, amiable and rough-spoken "Bob" Dunn. His close associates for many years will always remember him as one of the kindest of men, whose hand-shake once felt brought to one's mind the fact that there was great love for his fellow man behind the hand proffered.

Born in County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1855, Mr. Dunn came to America in the early '70s, learning the printer's trade at St. Louis. In 1876 he located at Princeton, Minn., where he began the publication of the Princeton Union, a weekly newspaper which became a positive voice in public affairs. He was a leading figure in the State Editorial Association. His leadership culminated in his election as state auditor in 1894, an office which he filled successfully for eight years, when he became a candidate for governor.


As a member of the State Legislature, Senator Dunn's activities were always directed in the broadest sense to the

public good. It was through his unbounded energy and faith in Minnesota's future that he fought continuously for good roads, and the State's magnificent program for highway construction was brought about through his individual efforts, and in years to come will be the outstanding monument in his life's work.

Mr. Dunn was married to Lydia McKenzin at Princeton, Minn., on Feb. 14th, 1887. They were the parents of two children, Dr. Geo. R. Dunn, who was with the Johns Hopkins unit base hospital 18, France, at the time of his father passing away, and Miss Grace A. Dunn, who, with her mother, was at the bedside of Mr. Dunn during his last illness.

He passed away Monday, Oct. 28, 1918.

ROBERT C. DUNN



A GLIMPSE OF THE CAPTIVE SIOUX INDIAN'S CAMP.

Under the guns of Fort Snelling, at the confluence of the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers. After the capture at Camp Release of most of the hostile Sioux Indians who had participated in the massacre of white settlers in Minnesota, those who had not been condemned to be hung were given an indeterminate sentence, which resulted in their being taken to Rock Island in the Mississippi river. They were brought down on steamers from the upper waters of the Minnesota river and after confinement in a corral at Fort Snelling were put aboard other steamers and removed to Rock Island.


ORGANIC ACT OF MINNESOTA.

An act to establish the Territorial Government of Minnesota.
[Passed March 3, 1849.]

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That from and after the passage of this act, all that part of the territory of the United States which lies within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning in the Mississippi river at the point where the line of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes of north latitude crosses the same; thence running due west on said line, which is the northern boundary of the state of Iowa, to the northwest corner of the said state of Iowa; thence southerly along the western boundary of said state to the point where said boundary strikes the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of White Earth river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the White Earth river to the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain, thence east and south of east along the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain to Lake Superior; thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the state of Wisconsin in Lake Superior; thence along the western boundary line of said state of Wisconsin to the Mississippi river; thence down the main channel of said river to the place of beginning, be and the same is hereby erected into a temporary government by the name of the Territory of Minnesota; *provided*, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to inhibit the government of the United States from dividing said Territory into two or more territories, in such manner and at such times as congress shall deem convenient and proper, or from attaching any portion of said Territory to any other state or territory of the United States.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That the executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Minnesota shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States. The governor shall reside within said Territory; shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof; shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian affairs. He may grant pardons for offenses against the law of said Territory, and reprieves for offenses against the laws of the United States until the decision of the president can be made known thereon; he shall commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of the said Territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

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SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That there shall be a secretary of said Territory, who shall reside therein, and hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States; he shall record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly hereinafter constituted, and all the acts and proceedings of the governor in his executive department; he shall transmit one copy of the laws and one copy of the executive proceedings, on or before the first day of December in each year, to the president of the United States, and at the same time two copies of the laws to the speaker of the house of representatives, and the president of the senate for the use of Congress. And in case of the death, removal, resignation, or necessary absence of the governor from the Territory, the secretary shall be and he is hereby authorized and required to execute and perform all the powers and the duties of the governor during such vacancy or necessary absence, or until another governor shall be duly appointed to fill such vacancy.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That the legislative power and authority of said Territory shall be vested in the governor and a legislative assembly. The legislative assembly shall consist of a council and house of representatives. The council shall consist of nine members having the qualifications of voters, as hereinafter prescribed, whose term of service shall continue two years. The house of representatives shall, at its first session, consist of eighteen members, possessing the same qualifications as prescribed for members of the council, and whose term of service shall continue one year. The number of councilors and representatives may be increased by the legislative assembly, from time to time, in proportion to the increase of population; *provided,* that the whole number shall never exceed fifteen councilors and thirty-nine representatives. An apportionment shall be made, as nearly equal as practicable, among the several counties or districts for the election of the council and representatives, giving to each section of the Territory representation in the ratio of its population, Indians excepted, as nearly as may be. And the members of the council and of the house of representatives shall reside in and be inhabitants of the districts for which they may be elected, respectively. Previous to the first election, the governor shall cause a census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the several counties and districts of the Territory to be taken, and the first election shall be held at such time and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct. and he shall, at the same time, declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties and districts shall be entitled under this act.

The number of persons authorized to be elected having the highest number of votes, in each of said council districts for members of the council, shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected to the council, and the person or persons authorized to be elected, having the greatest number of votes for the house of representatives, equal to the number to which each county or district shall be entitled, shall also be declared by the governor to be duly elected members of the house of representatives; *provided,* that in case of a tie between two or more persons voted for, the governor shall order a new election to supply the vacancy made by such tie. And the persons thus elected to the legislative

assembly shall meet at such place on such day as the governor shall appoint, but thereafter the time, place and manner of holding and conducting all elections by the people, and the apportioning of the representation in the several counties or districts to the council and house of representatives, according to the population, shall be prescribed by law, as well as the day of the commencement of the regular session of the legislative assembly; *provided*, that no one session shall exceed the term of sixty days.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said Territory at the time of the passage of this act, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to any office within the said Territory; but the qualifications of voters and of holding office at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the legislative assembly; *provided*, that the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States and those who shall have declared on oath their intention to become such, and shall have taken an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the legislative power of the Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation, consistent with the Constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act; but no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents. All the laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor shall be submitted to the Congress of the United States, and if disapproved shall be null and of no effect.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That all township, district and county officers, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, in such manner as shall be provided by the governor and legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota. The governor shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council, appoint all officers not herein otherwise provided for, and, in the first instance, the governor alone may appoint all said officers, who shall hold their offices until the end of the next session of the legislative assembly.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That no member of the legislative assembly shall hold or be appointed to any office which shall have been created, or the salary or emoluments of which shall have been increased, while he was a member, during the term for which he was elected, and for one year after the expiration of such term; and no person holding a commission or appointment under the United States, except postmasters, shall be a member of the legislative assembly, or shall hold any office under the government of said Territory.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the judicial power of said Territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts, and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and who shall hold

a term at the seat of government of said Territory annually; and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said Territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such time and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law; *provided*, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute, or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judges thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court, or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of every term of said courts, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said Territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive in all such cases the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin Territory received for similar services.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be appointed an attorney for said Territory, who shall continue in office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall receive the same fees and salary as the attorney of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin received. There shall also be a marshal for the Territory appointed, who shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall execute all processes issuing from the said courts, when exercising their jurisdiction as circuit and district courts of the United States; he shall perform the duties, be subject to the same regulations and penalties, and be entitled to the same fees as the marshal of the district court of the United States for the late

Territory of Wisconsin; and shall, in addition, be paid two hundred dollars annually as a compensation for extra services.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That the governor, secretary, chief justice and associate justices, attorney and marshal, shall be nominated and by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the president of the United States. The governor and secretary to be appointed as aforesaid shall, before they act as such, respectively, take an oath or affirmation, before the district judge, or some justice of the peace in the limits of said Territory, duly authorized to administer oaths and affirmations by the laws now in force therein, or before the chief justice, or some associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, to support the constitution of the United States, and faithfully to discharge the duties of their respective offices, which said oaths, when so taken, shall be certified by the person by whom the same shall have been taken, and such certificates shall be received and recorded by the said secretary among the executive proceedings; and the chief justice and associate justices, and all other civil officers in said Territory, before they act as such, shall take a like oath or affirmation, before the said governor or secretary, or some judge or justice of the peace of the Territory, who may be duly commissioned and qualified, which said oath or affirmation shall be certified and transmitted, by the person taking the same, to the secretary, to be by him recorded as aforesaid; and afterwards, the like oath or affirmation shall be taken, certified and recorded in such manner and form as may be prescribed by law. The governor shall receive an annual salary of \$1,500 as governor, and \$1,000 as superintendent of Indian affairs. The chief justice and associate justice shall each receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The secretary shall receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The said salaries shall be paid quarter-yearly, at the treasury of the United States. The members of the legislative assembly shall be entitled to receive three dollars each per day during their attendance at the session thereof, and three dollars each for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the said sessions, estimated according to the nearest usually traveled route. There shall be appropriated, annually, the sum of \$1,000, to be expended by the governor to defray the contingent expenses of the Territory; and there shall also be appropriated, annually, a sufficient sum to be expended by the secretary of the Territory, and upon an estimate to be made by the secretary of the treasury of the United States, to defray the expenses of the legislative assembly, the printing of the laws, and other incidental expenses, and the secretary of the Territory shall annually account to the secretary of the treasury of the United States for the manner in which the aforesaid sum shall have been expended.

SEC. 12. *And be it further enacted*, That the inhabitants of the said Territory shall be entitled to all the rights, privileges and immunities heretofore granted and secured to the Territory of Wisconsin and to its inhabitants; and the laws in force in the Territory of Wisconsin at the date of the admission of the State of Wisconsin shall continue to be valid and operative therein, so far as the same be not incompatible with the provisions of this act, subject, nevertheless, to be altered, modified or repealed by the governor and legislative assembly of the said Territory of Minnesota; and the laws of the United States are

hereby extended over and declared to be in force in said Territory, so far as the same, or any provision thereof, may be applicable.

SEC. 13. *And be it further enacted,* That the legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota shall hold its first session in St. Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of government for said Territory, at such place as they may deem eligible; and shall at such time as they shall see proper prescribe by law the manner of locating the permanent seat of government of said Territory by a vote of the people. And the sum of twenty thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated and granted to said Territory of Minnesota, to be applied by the governor and legislative assembly to the erection of suitable public buildings at the seat of government.

SEC. 14. *And be it further enacted,* That a delegate of the house of representatives of the United States, to serve for the term of two years, may be elected by the voters qualified to elect members of the legislative assembly, who shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as are exercised and enjoyed by the delegates from the several other territories of the United States to the said house of representatives. The first election shall be held at such times and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and at all subsequent elections the times, places and manner of holding the elections shall be prescribed by law. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected, and a certificate thereof shall be given accordingly.

SEC. 15. *And be it further enacted,* That all suits, process and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law or in chancery, and all indictments and informations, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the Territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said Territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect, shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said Territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws, in force within said limits, may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions and causes of action may be recovered under this act the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said Territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

SEC. 16. *And be it further enacted,* That all justices of the peace, constables, sheriffs, and all other judicial and ministerial officers, who shall be in office within the limits of said Territory when this act shall take effect, shall be and they are hereby authorized and required to continue to exercise and perform the duties of their respective offices as officers of the Territory of Minnesota, temporarily, and until they or others shall be duly appointed and qualified to fill their places, in the manner herein directed, or until their offices shall be abolished.

SEC. 17. *And be it further enacted,* That the sum of \$5,000 be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the said governor of the Territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorneys of said Territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 18. *And be it further enacted,* That when the lands in said Territory shall be surveyed under the direction of the government of the United States, preparatory to bringing the same into market, sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in said Territory shall be and the same are hereby reserved for the purpose of being applied to schools in said Territory, and in the state and territories hereafter to be erected out of the same.

SEC. 19. *And be it further enacted,* That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said Territory may define the judicial districts of said Territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said Territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter or modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.

SEC. 20. *And be it further enacted,* That every bill which shall or may pass the council and house of representatives, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the Territory; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated; which shall cause the objections to be entered at large upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall also be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law; but in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislative assembly, by adjournment, prevent it, in which case it shall not become a law.

MINNESOTA STATE SEAL.

The first official record of a state seal is in the message of Governor Ramsey to the first territorial legislature, Sept. 9, 1849, in which he says: "A temporary great seal of the Territory of Minnesota has been adopted, an impression of which will be submitted. I preferred consulting the legislative assembly upon the adoption of a permanent great seal, and I herewith lay before you the design of one, to which I ask your attention, and if you approve it, or suggest its modification, it will be placed in the hands of an artist and engraved, and thenceforward supersede the seal now in use." On October 31st Mr. James M. Boal, from the committee appointed to draft a device for the territorial seal, reported having adopted for "a device, an every-day scene, consisting of an Indian family with their lodge, canoe, etc., and a single white man visiting them, with no other protection than the feeling of hospitality and friendship existing between the two people. The white man is receiving from the Indian the pipe of peace," etc. This report was adopted, and an act providing for the use of the seal was duly passed and became a law. But, for some reason, the seal so authorized was never used.

In place of it one was adopted, just how or by whom there is no record now, and which was used as "the great seal of Minnesota" until 1858. It bears the date at the bottom, "1849." The device is much the same as the present state seal. A farmer is plowing in the foreground, but facing to the west. His rifle, powderhorn, etc., are leaning on a stump near him. In the distance, to the left, is the Falls of St. Anthony, and an Indian on horseback riding rapidly *eastward*, towards what appears to be a rising sun. Over the device is the motto, "*Quo sursum velo videre*," the third word a misprint for *volo*, the whole meaning, "I wish to see what lies beyond." This motto was selected by Hon. H. H. Sibley, while delegate in congress, and the engraving of the seal was procured in Washington, by Governor Ramsey, of D. O. Hare, an engraver of that city, at a cost of \$157.

This seal was ridiculed more or less by journalists, who said it represented "a man plowing one way and looking another," or "an astonished Indian and a scared white man," etc. But it was used until 1858.

At the first session of the state legislature the question of a state seal was taken up. Hon. Chas. F. Dowe, a member of the constitutional convention in 1857, had drafted (by Mr. Buechner, an artist of St. Paul) a design for a state seal, which he had hoped that the first state legislature would adopt. It was generally considered very suitable (an engraving is given of it on page 658 of W. H. C. Folsom's History of the Northwest). Article fifteen of the state constitution, adopted on Oct. 13, 1857, provided that "The legislature shall pro-



vide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal." The first legislative session (which assembled Dec. 2, 1857), however, does not seem to have done so, and when the state government came into operation in May, 1858, there was still no "state seal" for use on documents. Governor Sibley authorized the secretary of state to continue the use of the old territorial seal for the present. At the adjourned session of the legislature in June, Governor Sibley referred to the subject, and a special committee was appointed to report the design for a seal, of which W. H. C. Folsom was chairman. This was done on June 30th. Mr. Folsom had secured an elaborate design from an artist of St. Paul, Dr. R. O. Sweeny, fully described in his report. A joint resolution adopting the design was passed, and duly signed, on July 16th.

Several months appear to have elapsed before the new seal was engraved and put into use, and when it was, it was found that the elaborate design proposed in Mr. Folsom's report had not been adopted, but that the device of the old territorial seal had been used, with a little change. The equestrian Indian was represented as riding *westward* and the farmer plowing eastward. No other change was made except the use of the word "state" instead of "territory," and adding the date of its admission, "1858." The motto was "L'ETOILE DU NORD" (the North Star). The "Minnesotian" newspaper ridiculed this latter in a series of vituperative articles, declaring that Governor Sibley had used a French motto simply because he spoke that tongue. But the seal soon came into general use, and has been the only one used officially.

A new die of the same design was made necessary in 1907 by reason of the old one having been worn by excessive use in the rapid growth of business of the state.

ACT

AUTHORIZING A STATE GOVERNMENT.

[Passed Feb. 26, 1857.]

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled,* That the inhabitants of that portion of the Territory of Minnesota which is embraced within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and the British Possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois de Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof, thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river, and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin, until the same intersects with the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and the British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning, be and they hereby are authorized to form for themselves a constitution and state government by the name of the State of Minnesota, and to come into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, according to the Federal Constitution.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That the State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state and any state or states now or hereafter to be formed or bounded by the same; and said river or waters leading into the same shall be common highways, and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to all other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That on the first Monday in June next, the legal voters in each representative district then existing within the limits of the proposed state, are hereby authorized to elect two delegates for each representative to which said district shall be entitled according to the appor-

tionment for representatives to the territorial legislature; which election for delegates shall be held and conducted, and the returns made, in all respects in conformity with the laws of said Territory regulating the election of representatives, and the delegates so elected shall assemble at the capitol of said Territory on the second Monday in July next, and first determine by a vote whether it is the wish of the people of the proposed State to be admitted into the Union at that time; and if so, shall proceed to form a constitution, and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a state government, in conformity with the Federal Constitution, subject to the approval and ratification of the people of the proposed State.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That in the event said convention shall decide in favor of the immediate admission of the proposed State into the Union, it shall be the duty of the United States marshal for said Territory to proceed to take a census or enumeration of the inhabitants within the limits of the proposed State, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, with the view of ascertaining the number of representatives to which said State may be entitled in the Congress of the United States. And said State shall be entitled to one representative, and such additional representatives as the population of the State shall, according to the census, show it would be entitled to according to the present ratio of representation.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That the following propositions be and the same are hereby offered to the said convention of the people of Minnesota for their free acceptance or rejection, which, if accepted by the convention, shall be obligatory on the United States, and upon the said State of Minnesota, to-wit:

First—That sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in every township of public lands in said State, and where either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been sold or otherwise been disposed of, other lands, equivalent thereto, and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to said State for the use of schools.


Second—That seventy-two sections of land shall be set apart and reserved for the use and support of a state university, to be selected by the governor of said State, subject to the approval of the commissioner at the general land office, and to be appropriated and applied in such manner as the legislature of said State may prescribe; for the purpose aforesaid, but for no other purpose.

Third—Ten entire sections of land to be selected by the governor of said State, in legal subdivisions, shall be granted to said State for the purpose of completing the public buildings, or for the erection of others at the seat of government, under the direction of the legislature thereof.

Fourth—That all salt springs within said State, not exceeding twelve in number, with six sections of land adjoining or as contiguous as may be to each, shall be granted to said State for its use; and the same to be selected by the governor thereof within one year after the admission of said State, and, when so selected, to be used or disposed of on such terms, conditions and regulations

as the legislature shall direct; *provided*, that no salt spring or land the right whereof is now vested in any individual or in individuals, or which may be hereafter confirmed or adjudged to any individual or individuals, shall by this article be granted to said State.

Fifth—That five per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands lying within said State, which shall be sold by Congress after the admission of said State into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said State for the purpose of making public roads and internal improvements as the legislature shall direct; *provided*, the foregoing propositions herein offered are on the condition that the said convention which shall form the constitution of said State shall provide, by a clause in said constitution, or an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to *bona fide* purchasers thereof; and that no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States, and that in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.



MINNESOTA STATE FLAG.

The state legislature of 1893, by chapter sixteen, provided for the adoption of a state flag.

Mrs. Franklyn L. Greenleaf, Mrs. A. A. White, Mrs. Edward Durant, Mrs. F. B. Clarke, Mrs. H. F. Brown and Mrs. A. T. Stebbins were by this act named and designated a commission to select and adopt an appropriate design for a state flag.

Conformably to the provision of this act, this commission called for designs, and on Tuesday, Feb. 28, 1893, met, selected and adopted the design presented by Mrs. Edward H. Center, of Minneapolis.

Following is a description of the flag: "The ground is of white silk, and the reverse side of blue silk, bordered with bullion fringe. In the center is the state seal, wreathed with white moccasin flowers, on a blue ground. The red ribbon of the seal bearing the motto is continued through the wreath, entwining the blossoms and floating carelessly over the lower portion of the flag. It bears, in gold, the dates 1819, the time of the settlement of Minnesota, and 1893. Above, also in gold, is the date 1858, the time of the admission of Minnesota to the Union. Below the design, in gold letters, is wrought 'Minnesota.' Grouped around the seal are nineteen stars in the design of star points, with the North Star, significant of the North Star State, in a group of three at the top."

The choice of the number nineteen is a peculiarly happy one, as Minnesota was the nineteenth state, after the original thirteen, to be admitted to the Union. The standard to the flag was surmounted by a golden gopher, and tied with a gold cord and tassel. The execution of the design is entirely in needle work.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Under the enabling act of Congress, approved March 3, 1857, a constitutional convention of one hundred and eight members (each council district to elect two for each councilman and representative it was entitled to) was authorized to meet at the capitol on the second Monday in July, to frame a state constitution, and submit it to the people of the territory. The election was held on the first Monday in June. On July 13th the delegates met, but, a disagreement arising in the organization, the Republican members organized one body, and the Democratic members organized separately. Each of these bodies, claiming to be the legal constitutional convention, proceeded with the work of forming an instrument to be submitted to the people. After some days an understanding was effected between them, and, by means of committees of conference, the same constitution was framed and adopted by both bodies. On being submitted to the people October 13th, it was ratified.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

STATE OF MINNESOTA.

Adopted October 13, 1857. Ayes, 30,055; Noes, 571.

Preamble. We, the people of the State of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution:

ARTICLE I.

BILL OF RIGHTS.

Object of government. SECTION 1. Government is instituted for the security, benefit and protection of the people, in whom all political power is inherent, together with the right to alter, modify or reform such government, whenever the public good may require it.

Rights and Privileges. SEC. 2. No member of this State shall be disfranchised, or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land, or the judgment of his peers. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the State otherwise than in the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted.

Liberty of the press. SEC. 3. The liberty of the press shall forever remain inviolate, and all persons may freely speak, write and publish their sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of such right.

Right of trial by jury. SEC. 4. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, and shall extend to all cases at law without regard to the amount in controversy, but a jury trial may be waived by the parties in all cases

in the manner prescribed by law; [and the legislature may provide that the agreement of five-sixths of any jury in any civil action or proceeding, after not less than six (6) hours' deliberation, shall be a sufficient verdict therein.]*

No excessive bail or unusual punishments. SEC. 5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor shall excessive fines be imposed; nor shall cruel or unusual punishments be inflicted.

Rights of accused in criminal prosecutions. SEC. 6. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the county or district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which county or district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel in his defense. (a)

Further rights of accused—when bailable. SEC. 7. No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense without due process of law, and no person for the same offense shall be put twice in jeopardy of punishment, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. All persons shall before conviction be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great; and the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when in case of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require.

Redress of injuries or wrongs. SEC. 8. Every person is entitled to a certain remedy in the laws for all injuries or wrongs which he may receive in his person, property or character; he ought to obtain justice freely and without purchase; completely and without denial; promptly and without delay, conformable to the laws.

Treason defined. SEC. 9. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against the same, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

Right against unreasonable searches. SEC. 10. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the person or things to be seized.

(a) The jury contemplated by article 1, section 6, securing the right to jury trial in criminal cases, is a body of twelve men, and it is error to try a party charged with crime in a justice court, against his objection, with a jury of six. The fact that he may appeal to the district court, on entering into recognizance with sureties, does not change the rule. 14 Minn. 330.

Prohibits ex post facto laws, or laws impairing contracts. SEC. 11. No bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, nor any law impairing the obligation of contracts shall ever be passed, and no conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Imprisonment for debt—property exemption. SEC. 12. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in this State, (a) but this shall not prevent the legislature from providing for imprisonment, or holding to bail, persons charged with fraud in contracting said debt. A reasonable amount of property shall be exempt from seizure or sale for the payment of any debt or liability. The amount of such exemption shall be determined by law. [*Provided, however, that all property so exempted shall be liable to seizure and sale for any debts incurred to any person for work done or materials furnished in the construction, repair or improvement of the same, and provided further, that such liability to seizure and sale shall also extend to all real property for any debt incurred to any laborer or servant for labor or service performed.*]*

Private property for public use. SEC. 13. Private property shall not be taken, destroyed or damaged for public use without just compensation therefor, first paid or secured. †

Military power subordinate. SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power, and no standing army shall be kept up in this State in times of peace.

Lands declared allodial—leases, when void. SEC. 15. All lands within the State are declared to be allodial, and feudal tenures of every description, with all their incidents, are prohibited. Leases and grants of agricultural lands for a longer period than twenty-one years hereafter made, in which shall be reserved any rent or service of any kind, shall be void.

Freedom of conscience—no preference to be given to any religious establishment or mode of worship. SEC. 16. The enumeration of rights in this constitution shall not be construed to deny or impair others retained by and inherent in the people. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience shall never be infringed, nor shall any man be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any religious or ecclesiastical ministry, against his consent; nor shall any control of or interference with the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness, or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the State, nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious societies, or religious or theological seminaries.

No religious test or property qualifications to be required. SEC. 17. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification for any office of public trust under the State. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification of any voter at any election in this State; nor shall any person be rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity in consequence of his opinion upon the subject of religion.

No license to peddle. SEC. 18. Any person may sell or peddle the products of the farm or garden occupied and cultivated by him without obtaining a license therefor.*

ARTICLE II.

ON NAME AND BOUNDARIES.

Name and boundaries. SECTION 1. This State shall be called and known by the name of the State of Minnesota, and shall consist of and have jurisdiction over the territory embraced in the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and British Possession crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois des Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence east along the northern boundary of said State to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin until the same intersects the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning.**

**The northern boundary of the state at the Lake of the Woods is projected beyond the 49th parallel a distance of about twenty miles, making a wedge-shaped jog through the lake until it strikes firm ground on the west bank of the lake; thence in a due south line to the 49th parallel. The explanation of this jog is found in the subjoined paragraphs. In the seventh article of the treaty of Ghent, section 19 reads as follows: Sec. 19. Resolved that the following described (also represented on said map as before mentioned), is, in the opinion of the commissioners, so far as the same extends, the true boundary intended by the before mentioned treaties, namely: * * * thence through the middle of the waters of this bay to the northwest extremity of the same; being the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods, and from a monument in this bay, on the nearest firm ground to the above northwest extremity of said bay, the courses and distances are as follows: 56° W. 1,565½ feet; 2d, N. 6° W. 861½ feet; 3d, N. 28° W. 615.4 feet; 4th, N. 27° 10' W. 495.4 feet; 5th, N. 5° 10' E. 1,322½ feet; 6th, N. 70° 45' W. 493 feet, the variation being 12° east. Jurisdiction on bordering rivers. SEC. 2. The State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and on all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said State, and any other state or states now or hereafter to be formed by the same; and said rivers and waters, and navigable waters leading into the same, shall be common highways and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said State as to other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

Acceptance of propositions in enabling act. SEC. 3. The propositions contained in the act of Congress entitled, "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government, preparatory to their admission into the Union on equal footing with the original states," are hereby accepted, ratified and confirmed, and shall remain irrevocable without the consent of the United States; and it is hereby ordained that this State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same, by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title to said soil to *bona fide* purchasers thereof; and no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States and in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

ARTICLE III.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE POWERS OF GOVERNMENT.

Division of powers. SECTION 1. The powers of government shall be divided into three distinct departments—legislative, executive, and judicial; and no person or persons belonging to or constituting one of these departments shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except in the instances expressly provided in this constitution. (a)

The second article of the convention of 1818 is as follows: Article 2. It is agreed that a line drawn from the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods along the 49th parallel of north latitude, or, if the said point shall not be in the 49th parallel of north latitude, then that a line drawn from the said point due north or south, as the case may be, until the said line shall intersect the said parallel of north latitude, and from the point of such intersection due west, along and with the said parallel, shall be the line of demarkation between the territories of the United States and His Britannic Majesty, and that the said line shall form the northern boundary of the said territories of the United States and the southern boundary of His Britannic Majesty, from the Lake of the Woods to the Stony Mountains. This boundary was re-established and determined by a commission authorized by congress, and the surveys embracing four years were made and reported to congress in 1877.

(a) Courts cannot control or interfere with an executive officer of the state in his official acts, even though they are such that the duty to perform them might have been entrusted to some other officer. 28 Minn. 50.

ARTICLE IV.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

Legislature meets biennially—length of session. SECTION 1. The legislature shall consist of the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall meet biennially at the seat of government of the State, at such time as shall be prescribed by law, but no session shall exceed the term of ninety (90) legislative days; and no new bill shall be introduced in either branch, except on the written request of the governor, during the last twenty (20) days of such sessions, except the attention of the legislature shall be called to some important matter of general interest by a special message from the governor.

Apportionment of members. SEC. 2. The number of members who compose the Senate and House of Representatives shall be prescribed by law, but the representatives in the Senate shall never exceed one member for every 5,000 inhabitants, and in the House of Representatives one member for every 2,000 inhabitants. The representation in both houses shall be apportioned equally throughout the different sections of the State, in proportion to the population thereof, exclusive of Indians not taxable under the provisions of law.

Eligibility of members—quorum. SEC. 3. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and eligibility of its own members; a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as it may provide.

Rules of government. SEC. 4. Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, sit upon its own adjournment, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member; but no member shall be expelled the second time for the same offense.

Officers—journal of proceedings. SEC. 5. The House of Representatives shall elect its presiding officer and the Senate and House of Representatives shall elect such other officers as may be provided by law; they shall keep journals of their proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays, when taken on any question, shall be entered on such journals.

Length of adjournments. SEC. 6. Neither house shall, during a session of the legislature, adjourn for more than three days (Sundays excepted), nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be assembled, without the consent of the other house.

Compensation. SEC. 7. The compensation of senators and representatives shall be three dollars per diem during the first session, but may afterwards be prescribed by law. But no increase of compensation shall be prescribed which shall take effect during the period for which the members of the existing House of Representatives may have been elected.

Privileged from arrest. SEC. 8. The members of each house shall in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses, and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

Restriction as to holding office. SEC. 9. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he is elected, hold any office under the authority of the United States or the State of Minnesota, except that of postmaster, and no senator or representative shall hold an office under the state which has been created or the emoluments of which have been increased during the session of the legislature of which he was a member, until one year after the expiration of his term of office in the legislature.

Bills of revenue to originate in House. SEC. 10. All bills for raising a revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives, but the Senate may propose and concur with the amendments as on other bills.

Approval of bills by Governor—action on non-approval. SEC. 11. Every bill which shall have passed the Senate and House of Representatives, in conformity to the rules of each house and the joint rules of the two houses, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the State. If he approve, he shall sign and deposit it in the office of secretary of state for preservation, and notify the house where it originated of the fact. But if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it shall have originated; when such objections shall be entered at large on the journal of the same, and the house shall proceed to reconsider the bill. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered; and if it be approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by adjournment within that time, prevents its return; in which case it shall not be a law. The governor may approve, sign and file in the office of the secretary of state, within three days after the adjournment of the legislature, any act passed during the last three days of the session, and the same shall become a law.

Governor may cut out items of appropriation bills and otherwise approve. If any bill presented to the governor contain several items of appropriation of money, he may object to one or more of such items, while approving of the other portion of the bill. In such case he shall append to the bill, at the time of signing it, a statement of the items to which he objects, and the appropriation so objected to shall not take effect. If the legislature be in session, he shall transmit to the house in which the bill originated a copy

of such statement, and the items objected to shall be separately reconsidered. If, on reconsideration, one or more of such items be approved by two-thirds of the members elected to each house, the same shall be a part of the law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. All the provisions of this section, in relation to bills not approved by the governor, shall apply in cases in which he shall withhold his approval from any item or items contained in a bill appropriating money.

Money appropriations, how made. SEC. 12. No money shall be appropriated except by bill. Every order, resolution or vote requiring the concurrence of the two houses (except such as relate to the business or adjournment of the same) shall be presented to the governor for his signature, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being returned by him with his objections, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the members of the two houses, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

Majority vote of all members-elect to pass a law. SEC. 13. The style of all laws of this State shall be: "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota." No law shall be passed unless voted for by a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature, and the vote entered upon the journal of each house.

Impeachment powers. SEC. 14. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, through a concurrence of a majority of all the members elected to seats therein. All impeachments shall be tried by the Senate; and when sitting for that purpose the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Exclusion from civil rights. SEC. 15. The legislature shall have full power to exclude from the privilege of electing or being elected any person convicted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime.

Protest and dissent of members. SEC. 16. Two or more members of either house shall have liberty to dissent and protest against any act or resolution which they may think injurious to the public or to any individual, and have the reason of their dissent entered on the journal.

Vacancies in legislature. SEC. 17. The governor shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies as may occur in either house of the legislature. The legislature shall prescribe by law the manner in which evidence in cases of contested seats in either house shall be taken.

Punish for disorderly conduct. SEC. 18. Each house may punish by imprisonment, during its session, any person, not a member, who shall be guilty of any disorderly or contemptuous behavior in their presence, but no such imprisonment shall at any time exceed twenty-four hours.

Open sessions. SEC. 19. Each house shall be open to the public during the sessions thereof, except in such cases as in their opinion may require secrecy.

Reading of bills. SEC. 20. Every bill shall be read on three different days in each separate house, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the house where such bill is depending shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed by either house until it shall have been previously read twice at length.

Enrollment of bills. SEC. 21. Every bill having passed both houses shall be carefully enrolled, and shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house. Any presiding officer refusing to sign a bill which shall have previously passed both houses shall thereafter be incapable of holding a seat in either branch of the legislature, or hold any other office of honor or profit in the State, and in case of such refusal, each house shall, by rule, provide the manner in which such bill shall be properly certified for presentation to the governor.

Passage of bills on last day of session prohibited. SEC. 22. No bill shall be passed by either house of the legislature upon the day prescribed for the adjournment of the two houses. But this section shall not be so construed as to preclude the enrollment of a bill, or the signature and passage from one house to the other, or the reports thereon from committees, or its transmission to the executive for his signature.

Census enumeration—apportionment. SEC. 23. The legislature shall provide by law for an enumeration of the inhabitants of this State in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and every tenth year thereafter. At their first session after each enumeration so made, and also at their first session after each enumeration made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall have the power to prescribe the bounds of congressional, senatorial and representative districts, and to apportion anew the senators and representatives among the several districts according to the provisions of section second of this article.

Senatorial districts—term of office of senators and representatives. SEC. 24. The senators shall also be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory, at the same time that members of the house of representatives are required to be chosen, and in the same manner; and no representative district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. The senate districts shall be numbered in a regular series. The terms of office of senators and representatives shall be the same as now prescribed by law until the general election of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight (1878), at which time there shall be an entire new election of all the senators and representatives. Representatives chosen at such election, or at any election thereafter, shall hold their office for the term of two years, except it be to fill a vacancy; and the senators chosen at such election by districts designated as odd numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the second year, and senators chosen by districts designated by even numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the fourth year; and thereafter senators shall be chosen for four years, except there shall be an entire new election of all the senators at the election of representatives next succeeding each new apportionment provided for in this article.

Qualification of legislators. SEC. 25. Senators and representatives shall be qualified voters of the State, and shall have resided one year in the State and six months immediately preceding the election in the district from which they are elected.

Senators to Congress. SEC. 26. Members of the Senate of the United States from this State shall be elected by the two houses of the legislature in joint convention, at such time and in such manner as may be provided by law.

Laws to embrace only one subject. SEC. 27. No law shall embrace more than one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.

Divorces. SEC. 28. Divorces shall not be granted by the legislature.

Oath of office. SEC. 29. All members and officers of both branches of the legislature shall, before entering upon the duties of their respective trusts, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and faithfully and impartially to discharge the duties devolving upon him as such member of office.

Elections viva voce. SEC. 30. In all elections to be made by the legislature, the members thereof shall vote *viva voce*, and their votes shall be entered on the journal.

Prohibition of lotteries. SEC. 31. The legislature shall never authorize any lottery or the sale of lottery tickets.

Change of form of taxation of railroads to be voted upon. SEC. 32. [a] Any law providing for the repeal or amendment of any law or laws heretofore or hereafter enacted, which provides that any railroad company now existing in this State or operating its road therein, or which may be hereafter organized, shall, in lieu of all other taxes and assessments upon their real estate, roads, rolling stock, and other personal property, at and during the time and periods therein specified, pay into the treasury of this State a certain percentage therein mentioned of the gross earnings of such railroad companies now existing or hereafter organized, shall, before the same shall take effect or be in force, be submitted to a vote of the people of the State, and be adopted and ratified by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the election at which the same shall be submitted to them.

Internal improvement lands—investment of proceeds in bonds. SEC. 32. [b] All lands donated to the State of Minnesota for the purpose of internal improvement, under the eighth section of the act of Congress, approved September fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-one, being "An act to appropriate the proceeds of the sale of the public lands, and to grant pre-emption rights," shall be appraised and sold, in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands, under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight, of the General Statutes, except the modifications hereinafter mentioned. All moneys derived from the sales of said lands shall be invested in the bonds of the United States, or of the State of

Minnesota issued since 1860; and the moneys so invested shall constitute the Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State. All moneys received by the county treasurer under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight (38), aforesaid, derived from the sale of internal improvement lands, shall be held at all times subject to the order and direction of the state treasurer, for the benefit of the fund to which it belongs; and on the fifteenth day of June in each year, and at such other times as he may be requested so to do by the state treasurer, he shall pay over to the said state treasurer all moneys received on account of such fund.

The bonds purchased in accordance with this amendment shall be transferable only upon the order of the governor, and on each bond shall be written "Minnesota Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State, transferable only on the order of the governor."

Principal not to be reduced. The principal sum from all sales of internal improvement lands shall not be reduced by any charges or costs of officers, by fees, or by any other means whatever; and section fifty (50), of title one (1), chapter thirty eight (38), of the General Statutes, shall not be applicable to the provisions of this amendment, and wherever the words "school lands" are used in said title, it shall read as applicable to this amendment, "Internal Improvement Lands."

Appropriations therefrom to be voted upon before valid. The moneys belonging to the Internal Improvement Land Fund shall not be appropriated for any purpose whatever until the enactment for that purpose shall have been approved by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the annual general election following the passage of the act. (a)

The force of this amendment shall be to authorize the sale of the internal improvement lands, without further legislative enactment.

Against special legislation. SEC. 33. In all cases when a general law can be made applicable, no special law shall be enacted; and whether a general law could have been made applicable in any case is hereby declared a judicial question, and as such shall be judicially determined without regard to any legislative assertion on that subject. The legislature shall pass no local or special law regulating the affairs of, or incorporating, erecting or changing the lines of, any county, city, village, township, ward or school district, or creating the offices, or prescribing the powers and duties of the officers of, or fixing or relating to the compensation, salary or fees of the same, or the mode of election or appointment thereto, authorizing the laying out, opening, altering, vacating or maintaining roads, highways, streets or alleys; remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures; regulating the powers, duties and practice of justices of the peace, magistrates and constables; changing the names of persons, places, lakes or rivers; for opening and conducting of elections, or fixing or changing the places of voting;

authorizing the adoption or legitimation of children; changing the law of descent or succession; conferring rights upon minors; declaring any named person of age; giving effect to informal or invalid wills or deeds, or affecting the estates of minors or persons under disability; locating or changing county seats; regulating the management of public schools, the building or repairing of schoolhouses, and the raising of money for such purposes; exempting property from taxation, or regulating the rate of interest on money; creating corporations, or amending, renewing, extending or explaining the charters thereof; granting to any corporation, association or individual any special or exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever, or authorizing public taxation for a private purpose. *Provided, however,* That the inhibitions of local or special laws in this section shall not be construed to prevent the passage of general laws on any of the subjects enumerated.

Repeal of existing special laws. The legislature may repeal any existing special or local law, but shall not amend, extend or modify any of the same.

Refers to amendment of 1881, superseded as above. SEC. 34. The legislature shall provide general laws for the transaction of any business that may be prohibited by section one (1) of this amendment, and all such laws shall be uniform in their operation throughout the State.

Against combinations or pools to affect markets. SEC. 35. Any combinations of persons, either as individuals or as members or officers of any corporation, to monopolize the markets for food products in this State, or to interfere with, or restrict the freedom of, such markets, is hereby declared to be a criminal conspiracy, and shall be punished in such manner as the legislature may provide.

City or village may frame its own charter—charter to be submitted to voters. SEC. 36. Any city or village in this State may frame a charter for its own government as a city consistent with and subject to the laws of this State, as follows: The legislature shall provide, under such restrictions as it deems proper, for a board of fifteen freeholders, who shall be and for the past five years shall have been qualified voters thereof, to be appointed by the district judges of the judicial district in which the city or village is situated, as the legislature may determine, for a term in no event to exceed six years, which board shall, within six months after its appointment, return to the chief magistrate of said city or village draft of said charter, signed by the members of said board, or a majority thereof. Such charter shall be submitted to the qualified voters of such city or village at the next election thereafter, and if four-sevenths of the qualified voters voting at such election shall ratify the same it shall, at the end of thirty days thereafter, become the charter of such city or village as a city, and supersede any existing charter and amendments thereof; *provided,* that in cities having patrol limits now established, such charters shall require a three-fourths majority vote of the qualified voters voting at such election to change the patrol limits now established.

Legislature to prescribe general limits of charter—amendment of charter—upon application of 5 per cent of legal voters. Before any city shall incorporate under this act the legislature shall prescribe by law the general limits within which such charter shall be framed. Duplicate certificates shall be made setting forth the charter proposed and its ratification, which shall be signed by the chief magistrate of said city or village and authenticated by its corporate seal. One of said certificates shall be deposited in the office of secretary of state, and the other, after being recorded in the office of the register of deeds for the county in which such city or village lies, shall be deposited among the archives of such city or village, and all courts shall take judicial notice thereof. Such charter so deposited may be amended by proposal therefor made by a board of fifteen commissioners aforesaid, published for at least thirty days in three newspapers of general circulation in such city or village, and accepted by three-fifths of the qualified voters of such city or village voting at the next election, and not otherwise; but such charter shall always be in harmony with and subject to the Constitution and laws of the State of Minnesota. The legislature may prescribe the duties of the commission relative to submitting amendments of charter to the vote of the people and shall provide that upon application of five per cent of the legal voters of any such city or village, by written petition, such commission shall submit to the vote of the people proposed amendments to such charter set forth in said petition. The board of freeholders above provided for shall be permanent, and all the vacancies by death, disability to perform duties, resignation or removal from the corporate limits, or expiration of term of office, shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original board was created, and said board shall always contain its full complement of members.

Mayor and legislative body. It shall be a feature of all such charters that there shall be provided, among other things, for a mayor or chief magistrate, and a legislative body of either one or two houses; if of two houses, at least one of them shall be elected by general vote of the electors.

Articles of amendment may be submitted separately. In submitting any such charter or amendment thereto to the qualified voters of such city or village, any alternate section or article may be presented for the choice of the voters, and may be voted on separately without prejudice to other articles or sections of the charter or any amendments thereto.

General laws for cities by divisions of population. The legislature may provide general laws relating to affairs of cities, the application of which may be limited to cities of over fifty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of fifty and not less than twenty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of twenty and not less than ten thousand inhabitants, or to cities of ten thousand inhabitants or less, which shall apply equally to all such cities of either class, and which shall be paramount while in force to the provisions relating to the same matter included in the local charter herein provided for. But no local charter, provision or ordinance passed thereunder shall supersede any general law of the State defining or punishing crimes or misdemeanors.

ARTICLE V.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Officers in executive department. SECTION 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general who shall be chosen by the electors of the State. (a)

Election returns to be sent to secretary of state. SEC. 2. The returns of every election for the officers named in the foregoing section shall be made to the secretary of state, who shall call to his assistance two or more of the judges of the supreme court, and two disinterested judges of the district courts of the State, who shall constitute a board of canvassers, who shall open and canvass said returns and declare the result within three days after such canvass.

Official term of governor and lieutenant governor—qualifications. SEC. 3. The term of office for the governor and lieutenant governor shall be two years, and until their successors are chosen and qualified. Each shall have attained the age of twenty-five (25) years, and shall have been a *bona fide* resident of the State for one year next preceding his election. Both shall be citizens of the United States.

Powers and duties of governor. SEC. 4. The governor shall communicate by message to each session of the legislature such information touching the state and condition of the country as he may deem expedient. He shall be commander-in-chief of the military and naval forces, and may call out such forces to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion. He may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power, in conjunction with the board of pardons, of which the governor shall be *ex officio* a member, and the other members of which shall consist of the attorney general of the State of Minnesota and the chief justice of the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, and whose powers and duties shall be defined and regulated by law, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction for offenses against the State, except in cases of impeachment. He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint a state librarian and notaries public, and such other officers as may be provided by law. He shall have power to appoint commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds or other instruments in writing, to be used in the State. He shall have a negative upon all laws passed by the legislature, under such rules and limitations as are in this Constitution prescribed. He may on extra-

(a) An executive officer of the state is not subject to the control or interference of the judiciary in the performance of duties belonging to him as an executive officer, and no act done, or threatened to be done, by him in his official capacity can be brought under judicial control or interference by mandamus or injunction, even when the act is purely ministerial. 29 Minn. 555.

ordinary occasions convene both houses of the legislature. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, fill any vacancy that may occur in the office of secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and such other state and district offices as may be hereafter created by law, until the next annual election, and until their successors are chosen and qualified.

Official term of other executive officers. SEC. 5. The official term of the secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general shall be two (2) years. The official term of the state auditor shall be four (4) years, and each shall continue in office until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The further duties and salaries of said executive officers shall each be prescribed by law.

Duties of lieutenant governor. SEC. 6. The lieutenant governor shall be *ex officio* president of the Senate; and in case a vacancy shall occur, from any cause whatever, in the office of governor, he shall be governor during such vacancy. The compensation of lieutenant governor shall be double the compensation of a state senator. Before the close of each session of the Senate they shall elect a president *pro tempore*, who shall be lieutenant governor in case a vacancy should occur in that office.

Official terms of first State officers—(Obsolete.) SEC. 7. The term of each of the executive officers named in this article shall commence on taking the oath of office on or after the first day of May, 1858, and continue until the first Monday of January, 1860, except the auditor, who shall continue in office till the first Monday of January, 1861; and until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified; and the same above mentioned time for qualification and entry upon the duties of their respective offices shall extend and apply to all other officers elected under the State Constitution, who have not already taken the oath of office, and commenced the performance of their official duties.

Oath of office to be taken by State officers. SEC. 8. Each officer created by this article shall, before entering upon his duties, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States and of this State, and faithfully discharge the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

(Obsolete.) SEC. 9. Laws shall be passed at the first session of the legislature after the State is admitted into the Union to carry out the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE VI.

JUDICIARY.

Judicial powers. SECTION 1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish by a two-thirds vote.

Supreme court—jurisdiction and powers—reporter of decisions—clerk of supreme court. SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and two associate justices, but the number of the associate justices may be increased to a number not exceeding four, by the legislature, by a two-thirds vote, when it shall be deemed necessary. It shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity, but there shall be no trial by jury in said court. It shall hold one or more terms in each year, as the legislature may direct, at the seat of government, and the legislature may provide, by a two-thirds vote, that one term in each year shall be held in each or any judicial district. It shall be the duty of such court to appoint a reporter of its decisions. There shall be chosen, by the qualified electors of the State, one clerk of the supreme court, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor is duly elected and qualified, and the judges of the supreme court, or a majority of them, shall have the power to fill any vacancy in the office of the clerk of the supreme court until an election can be regularly had.

Election and term of office for judges. SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the State at large, and their term of office shall be six years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

District judges may act where supreme judges are disqualified. Whenever all or a majority of the judges of the supreme court shall, from any cause, be disqualified from sitting in any case in said court, the governor, or, if he shall be interested in the result of such case, then the lieutenant governor, shall assign judges of the district court of the State, who shall sit in such case in place of such disqualified judges, with all the powers and duties of judges of the supreme court.

Judicial districts for district courts—election of judges—term of office and residence. SEC. 4. The State shall be divided by the legislature into judicial districts, which shall be composed of contiguous territory, be bounded by county lines, and contain a population as nearly equal as may be practicable. In each judicial district, one or more judges, as the legislature may prescribe, shall be elected by the electors thereof, whose term of office shall be six years, and each of said judges shall severally have and exercise the powers of the court, under such limitations as may be prescribed by law. Every district judge shall, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district for which he shall be elected, and shall reside therein during his continuance in office. In case any court of common pleas heretofore established shall be abolished, the judge of said court may be constituted by the legislature one of the judges of the district court of the district wherein such court has been so established for a period not exceeding the unexpired term for which he was elected.

The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and four associate justices. G. L. 1881, ch. 141.

Jurisdiction of district courts. SEC. 5. The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds one hundred dollars, and in all criminal cases where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than one hundred dollars, and shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. The legislature may provide by law that the judge of one district may discharge the duties of judge of any other district not his own, when convenience or the public interest may require it.

Qualifications. SEC. 6. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be men learned in the law, and shall receive such compensation at stated times as may be prescribed by the legislature; which compensation shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward for their services.

Probate court—judges to be elected—jurisdiction. SEC. 7. There shall be established in each organized county in the State a probate court, which shall be a court of record, and be held at such time and place as may be prescribed by law. It shall be held by one judge, who shall be elected by the voters of the county for the term of two years. He shall be a resident of such county at the time of his election, and reside therein during his continuance in office; and his compensation shall be provided by law. He may appoint his own clerk where none has been elected; but the legislature may authorize the election, by the electors of any county, of one clerk or register of probate for such county, whose powers, duties, term of office and compensation shall be prescribed by law. A probate court shall have jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, but no other jurisdiction, except as prescribed by this Constitution.

Justices of the peace to be elected—jurisdiction. SEC. 8. The legislature shall provide for the election of a sufficient number of justices of the peace in each county, whose term of office shall be two years, and whose duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law. *Provided*, That no justice of the peace shall have jurisdiction of any civil cause where the amount in controversy shall exceed one hundred dollars, nor in a criminal cause where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment, or a fine over one hundred dollars, nor in any cause involving the title to real estate.

Judges for other courts to be elected. SEC. 9. All judges other than those provided for in this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of the judicial district, county, or city, for which they shall be created, not for a longer term than seven years.

Vacancies—appointment by governor. SEC. 10. In case the office of any judge become vacant before the expiration of the regular term for which he was elected, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor, until a successor is elected and qualified. And such successor shall be elected at the first annual election that occurs more than thirty days after the vacancy shall have happened.

Prohibition, supreme or district judges to hold other offices or to be voted for office while in office. SEC. 11. The justices of the supreme court and the district courts shall hold no office under the United States, nor any other office under this State. And all votes for either of them for any elective office under this Constitution, except a judicial office given by the legislature or the people, during their continuance in office, shall be void.

Change of judicial districts. SEC. 12. The legislature may at any time change the number of judicial districts or their boundaries, when it shall be deemed expedient; but no such change shall vacate the office of any judge.

Clerk of court. SEC. 13. There shall be elected in each county where a district court shall be held, one clerk of said court, whose qualifications, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law, and whose term of office shall be four years.

Legal pleadings. SEC. 14. Legal pleadings and proceedings in the courts of this State shall be under the direction of the legislature. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Minnesota," and all indictments shall conclude, "against the peace and dignity of the State of Minnesota."

Court commissioner—powers and jurisdiction. SEC. 15. The legislature may provide for the election of one person in each organized county in this State, to be called a court commissioner, with judicial power and jurisdiction not exceeding the power and jurisdiction of a judge of the district court at chambers; or the legislature may, instead of such election, confer such power and jurisdiction upon the judges of probate in the State.

ARTICLE VII.

ELECTIVE FRANCHISE.

Elective franchise. SECTION 1. What persons are entitled to vote:

Residence required. Every male person of the age of twenty-one (21) years or upwards belonging to either of the following classes who has resided in this State six (6) months next preceding any election shall be entitled to vote at such election in the election district of which he shall at the time have been for thirty (30) days a resident, for all officers that now are, or hereafter may be, elective by the people.

Citizens of the United States. *First*—Citizens of the United States who have been such for the period of three (3) months next preceding any election.

Mixed Indians. *Second*—Persons of mixed white and Indian blood, who have adopted the customs and habits of civilization.

Pure Indians having adopted habits of civilization. *Third*—Persons of Indian blood residing in this State, who have adopted the language, customs and habits of civilization, after an examination before any district court of the State, in such manner as may be provided by law, and shall have been pronounced by said court capable of enjoying the rights of citizenship within the State.

Non-eligible. SEC. 2. No person not belonging to one of the classes specified in the preceding section; no person who has been convicted of treason or any felony, unless restored to civil rights; and no person under guardianship, or who may be *non compos mentis* or insane, shall be entitled or permitted to vote at any election in this State.

Residence not lost in certain cases. SEC. 3. For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have lost a residence by reason of his absence while employed in the service of the United States; nor while engaged upon the waters of this State or of the United States; nor while a student in any seminary of learning; nor while kept at any almshouse or asylum; nor while confined in any public prison.

Soldiers and sailors—restriction. SEC. 4. No sailor, seaman or marine in the army or navy of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State in consequence of being stationed within the same.

Civil process suspended on election day. SEC. 5. During the day on which any election shall be held, no person shall be arrested by virtue of any civil process.

Elections by ballots. SEC. 6. All elections shall be by ballot, except for such town officers as may be directed by law to be otherwise chosen.

Right to hold office. SEC. 7. Every person who by the provisions of this article shall be entitled to vote at any election shall be eligible to any office which now is, or hereafter shall be, elective by the people in the district wherein he shall have resided thirty days previous to such election, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, or the Constitution and law of the United States. (a).

Women may vote and be eligible. SEC. 8. Women may vote for school officers and members of library boards, and shall be eligible to hold any office pertaining to the management of schools or libraries.

Any woman of the age of twenty-one (21) years and upward and possessing qualifications requisite to a male voter may vote at any election held for the purpose of choosing any officer of schools or any members of library boards, or upon any measure relating to schools or libraries, and shall be eligible to hold any office pertaining to the management of schools and libraries.

Official year of the State. SEC. 9. The official year for the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Monday in January in each year, and all terms of office shall terminate at that time; and the general election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The first general election for State and county officers, except judicial officers, after the adoption of this amendment, shall be held in the year A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four (1884), and thereafter the general election shall be held biennially. All state, county or other officers elected

at any general election, whose terms of office would otherwise expire on the first Monday of January, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six (1886), shall hold and continue in such offices, respectively, until the first Monday in January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven (1887).

ARTICLE VIII.

SCHOOL FUNDS, EDUCATION AND SCIENCE.

Uniform system of public schools. SECTION 1. The stability of a republican form of government depending mainly upon the intelligence of the people, it shall be the duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools. (a)

Proceeds of school lands to be a perpetual fund. SEC. 2. The proceeds of such lands as are or hereafter may be granted by the United States for the use of schools within each township of this State shall remain a perpetual school fund to the State; and not more than one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) of said lands may be sold in two (2) years, one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) in five (5) years, and one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) in ten (10) years; but the lands of the greatest valuation shall be sold first; *provided*, that no portion of said lands shall be sold otherwise than at public sale. The principal of all funds arising from sales or other disposition of lands or other property, granted or entrusted to this State in each township for educational purposes, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished; and the income arising from the lease or sale of said school land shall be distributed to the different townships throughout the State, in proportion to the number of scholars in each township, between the ages of five and twenty-one years; and shall be faithfully applied to the specific objects of the original grants or appropriations.

*A revolving fund of not over two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) may be set apart from the fund derived from the sale of school and swamp lands, to be used in constructing roads, ditches and fire breaks in, through and around unsold school and swamp lands and in clearing such lands, such fund to be replenished as long as needed from the enhanced value realized from the sale of such lands so benefited.

Investment of funds. Suitable laws shall be enacted by the legislature for the safe investment of the principal of all funds which have heretofore arisen or which may hereafter arise from the sale or other disposition of such lands, or the income from such lands accruing in any way before the sale or disposition thereof, in interest-bearing bonds of the United States, or of the State of Minnesota, issued after the year one thousand eight hundred and

sixty (1860), or of such other state as the legislature may, by law, from time to time direct.

Swamp lands—division of proceeds. All swamp lands now held by the State, or that may hereafter accrue to the State, shall be appraised and sold in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same less one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$), as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands under the provisions of title one (1) of chapter thirty-eight (38) of the General Statutes. The principal of all funds derived from sales of swamp lands, as aforesaid, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished. One-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the proceeds of said principal shall be appropriated to the common school fund of the State. The remaining one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) shall be appropriated to the educational and charitable institutions of the State in the relative ratio of cost to support said institutions.

Public schools in each township to be established. SEC. 3. The legislature shall make such provisions, by taxation or otherwise, as, with the income arising from the school fund, will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools in each township in the State.

Prohibition as to aiding sectarian school. But in no case shall the moneys derived as aforesaid, or any portion thereof, or any public moneys or property, be appropriated or used for the support of schools wherein the distinctive doctrines, creeds or tenets of any particular Christian or other religious sect are promulgated or taught.

University of Minnesota—location confirmed. SEC. 4. The location of the University of Minnesota, as established by existing laws, is hereby confirmed, and said institution is hereby declared to be the University of the State of Minnesota. All the rights, immunities, franchises and endowments heretofore granted or conferred are hereby perpetuated unto the said university; and all lands which may be granted hereafter by Congress, or other donations for said university purposes, shall vest in the institution referred to in this section.

Permanent school funds may be loaned to districts or counties for school purposes. SEC. 5. The permanent school funds of the State may be loaned upon interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum to the several counties or school districts of the State, to be used in the erection of county or school buildings. No such loan shall be made until approved by a board consisting of the governor, the state auditor and the state treasurer, who are hereby constituted an investment board for the purpose of the loans hereby authorized; nor shall any such loan be for an amount exceeding three (3) per cent of the last preceding assessed valuation of the real estate of the county or school district receiving the same. The state auditor shall annually, at the time of certifying the state tax to the several county auditors, also certify to each auditor to whose county, or to any of the school districts of whose county, any such loan shall have been made, the tax necessary to be levied to meet the accruing interest or principal of any

such loan, and it shall be the duty of every such county auditor forthwith to levy and extend such tax upon all the taxable property of his county, or of the several school districts, respectively, liable for such loans—as the case may be—and in all such cases the tax so assessed shall be fifty (50) per cent in excess of the amount actually necessary to be raised on account of such accruing principal or interest. It shall be levied, collected and paid into the county and state treasuries in the same manner as state taxes, and any excess collected over the amount of such principal or interest accruing in any given year shall be credited to the general funds of the respective counties or school districts. No change of the boundaries of any school district after the making of any such loan shall operate to withdraw any property from the taxation herein provided for; nor shall any law be passed extending the time of payment of any such principal or interest, or reducing the rate of such interest, or in any manner waiving or impairing any rights of the State in connection with any such loan. Suitable laws, not inconsistent with this amendment, may be passed by the legislature for the purpose of carrying the same into effect. (a)

Investment of permanent school and university funds—approval—bonded indebtedness not to exceed 15 per cent, draw not less than 3 per cent, run not less than 5 nor more than 20 years. **SEC. 6. The permanent school and university fund of this state may be invested in the bonds of any county, school district, city, town or village of this state, *and in first mortgage loans secured upon improved and cultivated farm lands of this state.* But no such investment or loan shall be made until approved by the board of commissioners designated by law to regulate the investment of the permanent school fund and the permanent university fund of this state; nor shall such loan or investment be made when the bonds to be issued or purchased would make the entire bonded indebtedness exceed 15 per cent of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the county, school district, city, town or village issuing such bonds; *nor shall any farm loan or investment be made when such investment or loan would exceed 30 per cent of the actual cash value of the farm land mortgage to secure said investment,* nor shall such investments or loans be made at a lower rate of interest than 3 per cent per annum, nor for a shorter period than five years, nor for a longer period than *thirty* years, and no change of the town, school district, city, village or of county lines shall relieve the real property in such town, school district, county, village or city in this state at the time of issuing of such bonds from any liability for taxation to pay such bonds.

*Sec. 7. Such of the school and other public lands of the state as are better adapted for the production of timber than for agriculture, may be

set apart as state school forests, or other state forests, as the legislature may provide, and the legislature may provide for the management of the same on forestry principles. The net revenue therefrom shall be used for the purposes for which the lands were granted to the state.

ARTICLE IX.

FINANCES OF THE STATE AND BANKS AND BANKING.

Power of taxation—legislature may authorize. SECTION 1. The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects, and shall be levied and collected for public purposes, but public burying grounds, public school houses, public hospitals, academies, colleges, universities, and all seminaries of learning, all churches, church property, and houses of worship, institutions of purely public charity, and public property used exclusively for any public purpose, shall be exempt from taxation, and there may be exempted from taxation personal property not exceeding in value \$200, for each household, individual or head of a family, as the legislature may determine: *Provided*, that the legislature may authorize municipal corporations to levy and collect assessments for local improvements upon property benefited thereby without regard to a cash valuation, and, provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect, modify or repeal any existing law providing for the taxation of the gross earnings of railroads.

State debt limited—how contracted. SEC. 5. For the purpose of defraying extraordinary expenditures, the State may contract public debts but such debts shall never, in the aggregate, exceed \$250,000; every such debt shall be authorized by law, for some single object, to be distinctly specified therein; and no such law shall take effect until it shall have been passed by the vote of two-thirds of the members of each branch of the legislature, to be recorded by yeas and nays on the journals of each house respectively; and every such law shall levy a tax annually sufficient to pay the annual interest of such debt, and also a tax sufficient to pay the principal of such debt within ten years from the final passage of such law, and shall specially appropriate the proceeds of such taxes to the payment of such principal and interest; and such appropriation and taxes shall not be repealed, postponed or diminished, until the principal and interest of such debt shall have been wholly paid. The State shall never contract any debts for works of internal improvements, or be a party in carrying on such works, except in cases where grants of land or other property shall have been made to the State, especially dedicated by the grant to specific purposes, and in such case the State shall devote thereto the avails of such grants, and may pledge or appropriate the revenue derived from such works in aid of their completion.

Issue of bonds for created debt. SEC. 6. All debts authorized by the preceding section shall be contracted by loan on State bonds of amounts not less than five hundred dollars each on interest, payable within ten years

after the final passage of the law authorizing such debt; and such bonds shall not be sold by the State under par. A correct registry of all such bonds shall be kept by the treasurer, in numerical order, so as always to exhibit the number and amount unpaid and to whom severally made payable.

Limitation as to when debt may be contracted. SEC. 7. The State shall never contract any public debt, unless in time of war, to repel invasion or suppress insurrection, except in the cases and in the manner provided in the fifth and sixth sections of this article.

Disposition of funds received for bonds. SEC. 8. The money arising from any loan made, or debt or liability contracted, shall be applied to the object specified in the act authorizing such debt or liability, or to the repayment of such debt or liability, and to no other purpose whatever.

Money drawn from the State treasury. SEC. 9. No money shall ever be paid out of the treasury of this State except in pursuance of an appropriation by law.

Credit of the State prohibited. SEC. 10. The credit of the State shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association or corporation. Nor shall there be any further issue of bonds denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds," under what purports to be an amendment to section ten (10) of article nine (9) of the Constitution, adopted April fifteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-eight, which is hereby expunged from the Constitution, saving, excepting and reserving to the State, nevertheless, all rights, remedies and forfeitures accruing under said amendment.

Publication of receipts and expenditures by treasurer. SEC. 11. There shall be published by the treasurer, in at least one newspaper printed at the seat of government, during the first week in January in each year, and in the next volume of the acts of legislature, detailed statements of all moneys drawn from the treasury during the preceding year, for what purpose and to whom paid, and by what law authorized; and also of all moneys received, and by what authority and from whom.

State school fund—investment—safe keeping—All State funds to be deposited in name of State. SEC. 12. Suitable laws shall be passed by the legislature for the safe-keeping, transfer and disbursements of the State and school funds; and all officers and other persons charged with the same or any part of the same, or the safe keeping thereof, shall be required to give ample security for all moneys and funds of any kind received by them; to make forthwith and keep an accurate entry of each sum received, and of each payment and transfer; and if any of said officers or other persons shall convert to his own use in any manner or form, or shall loan, with or without interest, or shall deposit in his own name, or otherwise than in the name of the State of Minnesota; or shall deposit in banks or with any person or persons, or exchange for other funds or property, any portion of the funds of the State or the school funds aforesaid, except in the manner prescribed by law, every such act shall be and constitute an embezzlement of so much of the aforesaid State and school funds, or either of the same,

as shall thus be taken, or loaned, or deposited or exchanged, and shall be a felony; and any failure to pay over, produce or account for the State school funds, or any part of the same entrusted to such officer or persons as by law required on demand, shall be held and be taken to be *prima facie* evidence of such embezzlement.

General banking law—provision and restrictions. SEC. 13. The legislature may, by a two-thirds vote, pass a general banking law, with the following restrictions and requirements, viz.:

First—The legislature shall have no power to pass any law sanctioning in any manner, directly, or indirectly, the suspension of specie payments by any person, association or corporation issuing bank notes of any description.

Second—The legislature shall provide by law for the registry of all bills or notes issued or put in circulation as money, and shall require ample security in United States stock or State stocks for the redemption of the same in specie; and in case of a depreciation of said stocks, or any part thereof, to the amount of ten per cent or more on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by additional stocks.

Third—The stockholders in any corporation and joint association for banking purposes, issuing bank notes, shall be individually liable in an amount equal to double the amount of stock owned by them for all the debts of such corporation or association; and such individual liability shall continue for one year after any transfer or sale of stock by any stockholder or stockholders.

Fourth—In case of the insolvency of any bank or banking association, the bill holders thereof shall be entitled to preference in payment over all other creditors of such bank or association.

Fifth—Any general banking law which may be passed in accordance with this article shall provide for recording the names of all stockholders in such corporation, the amount of stock held by each, the time of transfer, and to whom transferred.

Special provision for a loan for hospital building for insane. SEC. 14. For the purpose of erecting and completing buildings for a hospital for the insane, a deaf, dumb and blind asylum, the state prison, the legislature may by law increase the public debt of the State to an amount not exceeding \$250,000, in addition to the public debt already heretofore authorized by the Constitution; and for that purpose may provide by law for issuing and negotiating the bonds of the State, and appropriate the money only for the purpose aforesaid; which bonds shall be payable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the date of the same, at the option of the State.

Superseded by section 15 but not repealed in express terms. SEC. 14. The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds or to become indebted in any manner to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any

amount that shall exceed ten per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation; the amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made for the purpose of state and county taxation previous to the incurring of such indebtedness, Nov. 5, 1872.

County, city or township aid to railroads limited. SEC. 15. The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds, or to become indebted in any manner, to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed five (5) per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation. The amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made, for the purpose of state and county taxation, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

State Road and Bridge Fund. SEC. 16. For the purpose of lending aid in the construction and improvement of public highways and bridges, there is hereby created a fund, to be known as the "state road and bridge fund," said fund shall include all moneys accruing from the income derived from investments in the internal improvement land fund, or that may hereafter accrue to said fund, and shall also include all funds accruing to any state road and bridge fund however provided.

The legislature is authorized to add to such fund, for the purpose of constructing or improving roads and bridges of this state, by providing, in its discretion, for an annual tax levy upon the property of this state of not to exceed in any year one mill on all the taxable property within the state. *Provided*, that no county shall receive in any year more than three (3) per cent, or less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of one (1) per cent of the total fund thus provided and expended during such year.**

ARTICLE X.

OF CORPORATIONS HAVING NO BANKING PRIVILEGES.

Corporations for general purposes. SECTION 1. The term "Corporation," as used in this article, shall be construed to include all associations and joint stock companies having any of the powers and privileges not possessed by individuals or partnerships, except such as embrace banking privileges. and all corporations shall have the right to sue, and shall be liable to be sued in all courts, in like manner as natural persons.

Not to be created by special act. SEC. 2. No corporations shall be formed under special acts, except for municipal purposes.

Liability of Stockholders. SEC. 3. Each stockholder in any corporation excepting those organized for the purpose of carrying on any kind of manufacturing or mechanical business shall be liable to the amount of stock held or owned by him.

Lands may be taken for public use. SEC. 4. Lands may be taken for public way, for the purpose of granting to any corporation the franchise of way for public use. In all cases, however, a fair and equitable compensation shall be paid for such land, and the damages arising from the taking of the same; but all corporations being common carriers enjoying the right of way in pursuance of the provisions of this section, shall be bound to carry the mineral, agricultural and other productions of manufacturers on equal and reasonable terms.

ARTICLE XI.

COUNTIES AND TOWNSHIPS.

County organization. SECTION 1. The legislature may from time to time establish and organize new counties; but no new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any county be reduced below that amount; and all laws changing county lines in counties already organized, or for removing county seats, shall, before taking effect, be submitted to the electors of the county or counties to be affected thereby, at the next general election after the passage thereof, and be adopted by a majority of such electors. Counties now established may be enlarged, but not reduced below four hundred (400) square miles.

Cities of 20,000 population may be organized into separate counties. SEC. 2. The legislature may organize any city into a separate county, when it has attained a population of 20,000 inhabitants, without reference to geographical extent, when a majority of the electors of the county in which such city may be situated, voting thereon, shall be in favor of a separate organization.

Township organization. SEC. 3. Laws may be passed providing for the organization for municipal and other town purposes, of any congressional or fractional townships in the several counties in the State, *provided* that when a township is divided by county lines or does not contain one hundred inhabitants, it may be attached to one or more adjoining townships or parts of townships for the purposes aforesaid.

Election of county and town officers. SEC. 4. Provisions shall be made by law for the election of such county or township officers as may be necessary.

Local taxation may be authorized. SEC. 5. Any county and township organization shall have such powers of local taxation as may be prescribed by law.

Money drawn from county or town treasuries. SEC. 6. No money shall be drawn from any county or township treasury except by authority of law.

County of Manomin abolished. SEC. 7. That the county of Manomin is hereby abolished, and that the territory heretofore comprising the same shall constitute and be a part of the county of Anoka.

ARTICLE XII.

OF THE MILITIA.

Militia organization. SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the legislature to pass such laws for the organization, discipline and service of the militia of the State as may be deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XIII.

IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVAL FROM OFFICE.

Impeachment and removal from office. SECTION 1. The governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and the judges of the supreme and district courts, may be impeached for corrupt conduct in office, or for crimes and misdemeanors; but judgment in such case shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit in this State. The party convicted thereof shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 2. The legislature of this State may provide for the removal of inferior officers from office, for malfeasance or nonfeasance in the performance of their duties.

SEC. 3. No officer shall exercise the duties of his office after he shall have been impeached and before his acquittal.

SEC. 4. On the trial of an impeachment against the governor, the lieutenant governor shall not act as a member of the court.

SEC. 5. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he shall have been served with a copy thereof at least twenty days previous to the day set for trial.

ARTICLE XIV.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Amendments to constitution—majority vote of electors voting makes amendment valid. SECTION 1. Whenever a majority of both houses of the legislature shall deem it necessary to alter or amend this Constitution, they may propose such alterations or amendments, which proposed amendments shall be published with the laws which have been passed at the same session, and said amendments shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at any general election, and if it shall appear, in a manner to be provided by law, that a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for and ratified such alterations or amendments, the same shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of this Constitution. If two or more alterations or amendments shall be submitted at the same time, it shall be so regulated that the voters shall vote for or against each separately.

Revision of constitution. SEC. 2. Whenever two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the legislature shall think it necessary to call a convention to revise this Constitution, they shall recommend to the electors to vote at the next general election for members of the legislature, for or against a convention; and if a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for a convention, the legislature shall, at their next session, provide by law for calling the same. The convention shall consist of as many members as the House of Representatives, who shall be chosen in the same manner, and shall meet within three months after their election for the purpose aforesaid.

ARTICLE XV.

MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS.

Seat of government. SECTION 1. The seat of government of the State shall be at the city of St. Paul, but the legislature, at their first or any future session, may provide by law for a change of the seat of government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by Congress for a seat of government to the State; and in the event of the seat of government being removed from the city of St. Paul to any other place in the State, the capitol building and grounds shall be dedicated to an institution for the promotion of science, literature and the arts, to be organized by the legislature of the State, and of which institution the Minnesota Historical Society shall always be a department.

Residents on Indian lands. SEC. 2. Persons residing on Indian lands within the State shall enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizens, as though they lived in any other portion of the State, and shall be subject to taxation.

Uniform oath at elections. SEC. 3. The legislature shall provide for a uniform oath or affirmation to be administered at elections, and no person shall be compelled to take any other or different form of oath to entitle him to vote.

State seal. SEC. 4. There shall be a seal of the State, which shall be kept by the secretary of state, and be used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the State of Minnesota, and shall be attached to all the official acts of the governor (his signature to acts and resolves of the legislature excepted) requiring authentication. The legislature shall provide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal.

State prison location. SEC. 5. The territorial prison, as located under existing laws, shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, be and remain one of the state prisons of the State of Minnesota.

SCHEDULE.

Territorial laws valid in change to State organization. SECTION 1. That no inconvenience may arise by reason of a change from a territorial to a permanent state government, it is declared that all rights, actions, prosecutions, judgments, claims and contracts, as well of individuals as of bodies corporate, shall continue as if no change had taken place; and all process which may be issued under the authority of the Territory of Minnesota previous to its admission into the Union of the United States shall be as valid as if issued in the name of the State.

Territorial laws not repugnant to constitution to be in force. SEC. 2. All laws now in force in the Territory of Minnesota not repugnant to this Constitution shall remain in force until they expire by their own limitation, or be altered or repealed by the legislature.

SEC. 3. All fines, penalties or forfeitures accruing to the Territory of Minnesota shall inure to the State.

Civil rights under territorial government secured in the change to State government. SEC. 4. All recognizances heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from a territorial to a permanent state government shall remain valid, and shall pass to and may be prosecuted in the name of the State; and all bonds executed to the governor of the Territory, or to any other officer or court in his or their official capacity, shall pass to the governor or state authority and their successors in office, for the uses therein respectively expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly; and all the estate of property, real, personal or mixed, and all judgments, bonds, specialties, choses in action, and claims and debts, of whatsoever description, of the Territory of Minnesota, shall inure to and vest in the State of Minnesota, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner and to the same extent by the State of Minnesota as the same could have been by the Territory of Minnesota. All criminal prosecutions and penal actions which may have arisen, or which may arise before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment and execution in the name of the State. All offenses committed against the laws of the Territory of Minnesota, before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall not be prosecuted before such change, may be prosecuted in the name and by the authority of the State of Minnesota with like effect as though such change had not taken place, and all penalties incurred shall remain the same as if this Constitution had not been adopted. All actions at law and suits in equity which may be pending in any of the courts of the Territory of Minnesota, at the time of a change from a territorial to a state govern-

ment, may be continued and transferred to any court of the State which shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter thereof.

Territorial officers continued until superseded. SEC. 5. All territorial officers, civil or military, now holding their offices under the authority of the United States, or of the Territory of Minnesota shall continue to hold and exercise their respective offices until they shall be superseded by the authority of the State.

First session of State legislature. SEC. 6. The first session of the legislature of the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Wednesday of December next, and shall be held at the capitol, in the city of St. Paul.

SEC. 7. The laws regulating the election and qualification of all district, county and precinct officers shall continue and be in force until the legislature shall otherwise provide by law.

Constitution submitted to a vote of the people. SEC. 8. The president of this convention shall, immediately after the adjournment thereof, cause this Constitution to be deposited in the office of the governor of the Territory; and if, after the submission of the same to a vote of the people, as hereinafter provided, it shall appear that it has been adopted by a vote of the people of the State, then the governor shall forward a certified copy of the same, together with an abstract of the votes polled for and against the said Constitution, to the president of the United States, to be by him laid before the Congress of the United States.

Representation to congress. SEC. 9. For the purposes of the first election, the State shall constitute one district, and shall elect three members to the House of Representatives of the United States.

First apportionment into legislative districts. SEC. 10. For the purposes of the first election for members of the State Senate and House of Representatives, the State shall be divided into senatorial and representative districts, as follows, viz: First district, Washington county; Second district, Ramsey county; Third district, Dakota county; Fourth district, so much of Hennepin county as lies west of the Mississippi; Fifth district, Rice county; Sixth district, Goodhue county; Seventh district, Scott county; Eighth district, Olmsted county; Ninth district, Fillmore county; Tenth district, Houston county; Eleventh district, Winona county; Twelfth district, Wabasha county; Thirteenth district, Mower and Dodge counties; Fourteenth district, Freeborn and Faribault counties; Fifteenth district, Steele and Waseca counties; Sixteenth district, Blue Earth and Le Sueur counties; Seventeenth district, Nicollet and Brown counties; Eighteenth district, Sibley, Renville and McLeod counties; Nineteenth district, Carver and Wright counties; Twentieth district, Benton, Stearns and Meeker counties; Twenty-first district, Morrison, Crow Wing and Mille Lacs counties; Twenty-second district, Cass, Pembina and Todd counties; Twenty-third district, so much of Hennepin county as lies east of the Mississippi; Twenty-fourth district, Sherburne, Anoka and Manomin counties; Twenty-fifth district, Chisago, Pine and Isanti counties; Twenty-sixth district, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis, Lake and Itasca counties.

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SEC. 11. The counties of Brown, Stearns, Todd, Cass, Pembina and Renville, as applied in the preceding section, shall not be deemed to include any territory west of the State line, but shall be deemed to include all counties and parts of counties east of said line as were created out of the territory of either, at the last session of the legislature.

Apportionment of members. SEC. 12. The senators and representatives at the first election shall be apportioned among the several senatorial and representative districts as follows, to-wit:

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SEC. 13. The returns from the Twenty-second district shall be made to and canvassed by the judges of election at the precinct of Otter Tail City.

Judicial districts. SEC. 14. Until the legislature shall otherwise provide, the State shall be divided into judicial districts as follows, viz.:

The counties of Washington, Chisago, Manomin, Anoka, Isanti, Pine, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis and Lake shall constitute the First judicial district.

The county of Ramsey shall constitute the Second judicial district.

The counties of Houston, Winona, Fillmore, Olmsted and Wabasha shall constitute the Third judicial district.

The counties of Hennepin, Carver, Wright, Meeker, Sherburne, Benton, Stearns, Morrison, Crow Wing, Mille Lacs, Itasca, Pembina, Todd and Cass shall constitute the Fourth judicial district.

The counties of Dakota, Goodhue, Scott, Rice, Steele, Waseca, Dodge, Mower and Freeborn shall constitute the Fifth judicial district.

The counties of Le Sueur, Sibley, Nicollet, Blue Earth, Faribault, McLeod, Renville, Brown, and all other counties in the State not included within the other districts, shall constitute the Sixth judicial district.

SEC. 15. Each of the foregoing enumerated judicial districts may, at the first election, elect one prosecuting attorney for the district.

First State election. SEC. 16. Upon the second Tuesday, the thirteenth day of October, 1857, an election shall be held for members of the House of Representatives of the United States, governor, lieutenant governor, supreme and district judges, members of the legislature, and all other officers designated in this Constitution, and also for the submission of this Constitution to the people, for their adoption or rejection.

Voters at the first election. SEC. 17. Upon the day so designated as aforesaid every free white male inhabitant over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within the limits of the State for ten days previous to the day of said election, may vote for all officers to be elected under this Constitution at such election, and also for or against the adoption of this Constitution.

Vote on the constitution. SEC. 18. In voting for or against the adoption of this Constitution, the words, "For Constitution," or "Against Constitution," may be written or printed on the ticket of each voter, but no voter shall vote for or against this Constitution, on a separate ballot from that cast by him for officers to be elected at said election under this Constitution; and if upon the canvass of the vote so polled it shall appear that there was a greater number of votes polled for than against said Constitution, then this Constitution shall be deemed to be adopted as the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and all the provisions and obligations of this Constitution, and of the schedule thereunto attached, shall thereafter be valid to all intents and purposes as the Constitution of said State.

Election—how conducted. SEC. 19. At said election the polls shall be opened, the election held, returns made, and certificates issued, in all respects as provided by law for opening, closing and conducting elections and making returns of the same, except as hereinbefore specified, and excepting also that polls may be opened and elections held at any point or points in any of the counties where precincts may be established as provided by law, ten days previous to the day of election, not less than ten miles from the place of voting in any established precinct.

Returns of election. SEC. 20. It shall be the duty of the judges and clerks of election, in addition to the returns required by law for each precinct, to forward to the secretary of the Territory, by mail, immediately after the close of the election, a certified copy of the poll book containing the name of each person who has voted in the precinct and the number of votes polled for and against the adoption of this Constitution.

Canvassing returns. SEC. 21. The returns of said election for and against this Constitution, and for all state officers and members of the House of Representatives of the United States, shall be made, and certificates issued in the manner now prescribed by law for returning votes given for delegates to Congress; and the returns for all district officers, judicial, legislative or otherwise, shall be made to the register of deeds of the senior county in each district, in the manner prescribed by law, except as otherwise provided. The returns for all officers elected at large shall be canvassed by the governor of the Territory, assisted by Joseph R. Brown and Thomas J. Galbraith, at the time designated by law for canvassing the vote for delegates to Congress.

SEC. 22. If, upon canvassing the votes for and against the adoption of this Constitution, it shall appear that there has been polled a greater number of votes against than for it, then no certificate of election shall be issued for any State or district officer provided for in this Constitution, and no State organization shall have validity within the limits of the Territory, until otherwise provided for and until a Constitution for a State government shall have been adopted by the people.



CYPRIPEDIUM.—THE MOCCASIN FLOWER.

STATE FLOWER OF MINNESOTA.

MINNESOTA STATE FLOWER

The name *Cypripedium* (from Greek words meaning the shoe of Venus), published for this genus in 1737 by Linnæus, and its common English and American popular names, as Lady's Slipper, Moccasin Flower, and Indian Shoe, refer to the saccate and somewhat shoe-like form of the most conspicuous petal (in this Orchis family called the lip) of the flower.

About twenty-five species of *Cypripedium* are known, belonging to the north temperate zone and reaching south into Mexico and Northern India. Six species occur in the northern United States and Canada, east of the Rocky Mountains, all of these being found in Minnesota; and about a dozen species in total occur on this continent. They are perennial herbs with perfect, irregular flowers, which are solitary or few, large and showy.

The Minnesota species are as follows: *C. arietinum* R., Br., the Ram's-head Moccasin Flower, with red and whitish veiny lip, as shown in the accompanying plate; *C. candidum* Muhl, the small white Moccasin Flower; *C. parviflorum* Salisb., the small Yellow Moccasin Flower, also shown in this plate; *C. pubescens* Wild, with much larger yellow flowers; *C. spectabile* Sw., with most showy, large flowers, of mingled white and pink-purple color; and *C. acule* Ait., the Stemless Moccasin Flower, with leaves on the ground and a large rose-purple flower on an erect scape nearly a foot high. These plants grow preferably in cold and moist woods and in bogs, flowering from May to July. The first and second are rare or infrequent; but the other four are frequent or common, especially northward.

NOTE.—Minnesota has fourteen genera, including forty-one species, of the Orchis family, to which the *Cypripediums* belong. In total, 1,583 species of flowering plants, and sixty-eight ferns and their allies, making together 1,650 species, were tabulated, as known to grow without cultivation in this state, by Warren Upham in the Catalogue of the Flora of Minnesota, published in the Twelfth Annual Report of the Geological and Natural History Survey for the year 1883 (193 pages, with a map showing the areas of forest and prairie). Within the basin of the Minnesota river, according to the report in 1892 by Prof. Conway MacMillan, the state botanist, 1,174 species and varieties of flowering plants, including all our *Cypripediums*, are known and have been collected for the Herbarium of the State University. The State Flower is thus chosen from among more than a thousand others which bloom on our prairies, in the northern woods, in their cool bogs, and in our streams and lakes.

ACT OF ADMISSION INTO THE UNION.

An Act for the admission of Minnesota into the Union.
[Passed May 11, 1858.]

WHEREAS, An act of Congress was passed February twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states;" and, whereas, the people of said Territory did, on the twenty-ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by delegates elected for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and state government, which is republican in form, and was ratified and adopted by the people at an election held on the thirteenth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, for that purpose; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the State of Minnesota shall be one, and is hereby declared to be one, of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states in all respects whatever.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That said State shall be entitled to two representatives in Congress, until the next apportionment of representatives among the several states.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That from and after the admission of the State of Minnesota, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within that State as in other States of the Union; and the said State is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Iowa, shall be established; the judge, attorney and marshal of the United States of the said district of Minnesota shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney and marshal of the district of Iowa; and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the supreme court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be directed by the supreme court of the United States to the district court of the United States for the district of Minnesota, or to the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require; and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same, and to ward mesne or final process therein.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776.

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

WHEN, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

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He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time after such dissolutions to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large, for their exercise, the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering, fundamentally, the forms of our government:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has incited domestic insurrections among us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind—enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which INDEPENDENT STATES may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of DIVINE PROVIDENCE, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

THE ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 9, 1778.

Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union between the States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

ARTICLE 1. The style of this confederacy shall be "THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA."

ART. 2. Each state retains its sovereignty, freedom, and independence, and every power, jurisdiction, and right, which is not by this confederation expressly delegated to the United States in Congress assembled.

ART. 3. The said states hereby severally enter into a firm league of friendship with each other for their common defense, the security of their liberties, and their mutual, and general welfare, binding themselves to assist each other against all force offered to or attacks made upon them, or any of them, on account of religion, sovereignty, trade, or any other pretence whatever.

ART. 4. § 1. The better to secure and perpetuate mutual friendship and intercourse among the people of the different states in this Union, the free inhabitants of each of these states (paupers, vagabonds, and fugitives from justice excepted) shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of free citizens in the several states, and the people of each state shall have free ingress and egress to and from any other state, and shall enjoy therein all the privileges of trade and commerce, subject to the same duties, impositions and restrictions as the inhabitants thereof respectively; *provided*, that such restrictions shall not extend so far as to prevent the removal of property imported into any state, to any other state of which the owner is an inhabitant; *provided, also*, that no imposition, duties, or restriction shall be laid by any state on the property of the United States, or either of them.

§ 2. If any person guilty of, or charged with, treason, felony, or other high misdemeanor, in any state, shall flee from justice, and be found in any of the United States, he shall, upon the demand of the governor or executive power of the state from which he fled, be delivered up and removed to the state having jurisdiction of his offense.

§ 3. Full faith and credit shall be given in each of these states to the records, acts and judicial proceedings of the courts and magistrates of every other state.

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ART. 5. § 1. For the more convenient management of the general interests of the United States, delegates shall be annually appointed in such manner as the legislature of each state shall direct, to meet in congress on the first Monday in November, of every year, with a power reserved to each state to recall its delegates, or any of them, at any time within the year, and to send others in their stead, for the remainder of the year.

§ 2. No state shall be represented in congress by less than two, nor more than seven, members; and no person shall be capable of being a delegate for more than three years, in any term of six years; nor shall any person, being a delegate, be capable of holding any office under the United States, for which he, or any other for his benefit, receives any salary, fees, or emoluments of any kind.

§ 3. Each state shall maintain its own delegates in a meeting of the states, and while they act as members of the committee of these states.

§ 4. In determining questions in the United States in congress assembled, each state shall have one vote.

§ 5. Freedom of speech and debate in congress shall not be impeached or questioned in any court or place out of congress, and the members of congress shall be protected in their persons from arrests and imprisonments during the time of their going to and from, and attendance on, congress, except for treason, felony, or breach of the peace.

ART. 6. § 1. No state, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, shall send any embassy to, or receive any embassy from, or enter into any conference, agreement, alliance or treaty with, any king, prince or state; nor shall any person holding any office of profit or trust under the United States, or any of them, accept any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever from any king, prince, or foreign state; nor shall the United States in congress assembled, or any of them, grant any title of nobility.

§ 2. No two or more states shall enter into any treaty, confederation, or alliance whatever, between them, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, specifying accurately the purposes for which the same is to be entered into, and how long it shall continue.

§ 3. No state shall lay any imposts or duties which may interfere with any stipulations in treaties entered into by the United States, in congress assembled, with any king, prince, or state, in pursuance of any treaties already proposed by congress to the courts of France and Spain.

§ 4. No vessels of war shall be kept up in time of peace by any state, except such number only as shall be deemed necessary by the United States in congress assembled, for the defense of such state, or its trade; nor shall any body or forces be kept up by any state, in time of peace, except such number only as, in the judgment of the United States in congress assembled, shall be deemed requisite to garrison the forts necessary for the defense of such state; but every state shall always keep up a well regulated and disciplined militia, sufficiently armed and accoutered, and shall provide and constantly have ready for use, in public stores, a due number of field pieces and tents, and a proper quantity of arms, ammunition and camp equipage.

§ 5. No state shall engage in any war without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be actually invaded by enemies, or shall have received certain advice of a resolution being formed by some nation of Indians to invade such state, and the danger is so imminent as not to admit a delay till the United States in congress assembled can be consulted; nor shall any state grant commissions to any ships or vessels of war, nor letters of marque or reprisal, except it be after a declaration of war by the United States in congress assembled, and then only against the kingdom or state, and the subjects thereof, against which war has been so declared, and under such regulations as shall be established by the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be infested by pirates, in which case vessels of war may be fitted out for that occasion, and kept so long as the danger shall continue, or until the United States in congress assembled shall determine otherwise.

ART. 7. When land forces are raised by any state for the common defense, all officers of or under the rank of colonel shall be appointed by the legislature of each state, respectively, by whom such forces shall be raised, or in such manner as such state shall direct, and all vacancies shall be filled up by the state which first made the appointment.

ART. 8. All charges of war, and all other expenses that shall be incurred for the common defense or general welfare, and allowed by the United States in congress assembled, shall be defrayed out of a common treasury, which shall be supplied by the several states, in proportion to the value of all lands within each state, granted to or surveyed for any person, as such land and the buildings and improvements thereon shall be estimated, according to such mode as the United States in congress assembled shall, from time to time, direct and appoint. The taxes for paying that proportion shall be laid and levied by the authority and direction of the legislatures of the several states within the time agreed upon by the United States in congress assembled.

ART. 9. § 1. The United States in congress assembled shall have the sole and exclusive right and power of determining on peace and war, except in the cases mentioned in the sixth article; of sending and receiving ambassadors, entering into treaties and alliances; *provided*, that no treaty of commerce shall be made whereby the legislative power of the respective states shall be restrained from imposing such imposts and duties on foreigners as their own people are subjected to, or from prohibiting the exportation or importation of any species of goods or commodities whatsoever; of establishing rules for deciding in all cases what captures on land or water shall be legal, and in what manner prizes taken by land or naval forces in the service of the United States shall be divided or appropriated; of granting letters of marque and reprisal in times of peace; appointing courts for the trial of piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and establishing courts for receiving and determining finally appeals in all cases of captures; *provided*, that no member of congress shall be appointed a judge of any of the said courts.

§ 2. The United States in congress assembled shall also be the last resort on appeal in all disputes and differences now subsisting, or that may hereafter arise, between two or more states concerning boundary, jurisdiction, or any

other cause whatever; which authority shall always be exercised in the manner following: Whenever the legislative or executive authority or lawful agent of any state in controversy with another shall present a petition to congress, stating the matter in question, and praying for a hearing, notice thereof shall be given by order of congress to the legislative or executive authority of the other state in controversy, and a day assigned for the appearance of the parties by their lawful agents, who shall then be directed to appoint, by joint consent, commissioners or judges to constitute a court for hearing and determining the matter in question; but if they cannot agree, congress shall name three persons out of each of the United States, and from the list of such persons each party shall alternately strike out one, the petitioners beginning, until the number shall be reduced to thirteen; and from that number not less than seven nor more than nine names, as congress shall direct, shall, in the presence of congress, be drawn out by lot; the persons whose names shall be so drawn, or any five of them, shall be commissioners or judges to hear and finally determine the controversy, so always as a major part of the judges who shall hear the cause shall agree in the determination; and if either party shall neglect to attend at the day appointed, without showing reasons which congress shall judge sufficient, or being present shall refuse to strike, the congress shall proceed to nominate three persons out of each state, and the secretary of congress shall strike in behalf of such party absent or refusing; and the judgment and sentence of the court, to be appointed in the manner before prescribed, shall be final and conclusive; and if any of the parties shall refuse to submit to the authority of such court, or to appear to defend their claim or cause, the court shall nevertheless proceed to pronounce sentence or judgment, which shall in like manner be final and decisive; the judgment or sentence and other proceedings being in either case transmitted to congress and lodged among the acts of congress, for the security of the parties concerned; *provided*, that every commissioner, before he sits in judgment, shall take an oath, to be administered by one of the judges of the supreme or superior court of the state where the cause shall be tried, "well and truly to hear and determine the matter in question, according to the best of his judgment, without favor, affection, or hope of reward;" *provided*, also, that no state shall be deprived of territory for the benefit of the United States.

§ 3. All controversies concerning the private right of soil claimed under different grants of two or more states, whose jurisdiction, as they may respect such lands, and the states which passed such grants are adjusted, the said grants or either of them being at the same time claimed to have originated antecedent to such settlement of jurisdiction, shall, on the petition of either party to the congress of the United States, be finally determined, as near as may be, in the same manner as is before prescribed for deciding disputes respecting territorial jurisdiction between different states.

§ 4. The United States in congress assembled shall also have the sole and exclusive right and power of regulating the alloy and value of coin struck by their own authority, or by that of the respective states; fixing the standards of weights and measures, throughout the United States; regulating the trade and managing all affairs with the Indians, not members of any of the states;

provided, that the legislative right of any state, within its own limits, be not infringed or violated; establishing and regulating postoffices from one state to another, throughout all the United States, and exacting such postage on the papers passing through the same as may be requisite to defray the expenses of the said office; appointing all officers of the land forces in the service of the United States, excepting regimental officers; appointing all the officers of the naval forces, and commissioning all officers whatever in the service of the United States; making rules for the government and regulation of the said land and naval forces, and directing their operations.

§ 5. The United States in congress assembled shall have authority to appoint a committee, to sit in the recess of congress, to be denominated "*A Committee of the States*," and to consist of one delegate from each state; and to appoint such other committees and civil officers as may be necessary for managing the general affairs of the United States under their direction; to appoint one of their number to preside; *provided*, that no person be allowed to serve in the office of president more than one year in any term of three years; to ascertain the necessary sums of money to be raised for the service of the United States, and to appropriate and apply the same for defraying the public expenses; to borrow money or emit bills on the credit of the United States, transmitting every half year to the respective states an account of the sums of money so borrowed or emitted; to build and equip a navy; to agree upon the number of land forces, and to make requisitions from each state for its quota, in proportion to the number of white inhabitants in such state, which requisition shall be binding; and thereupon the legislature of each state shall appoint the regimental officers, raise the men, and clothe, arm and equip them, in a soldier-like manner, at the expense of the United States; and the officers and men so clothed, armed and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled; but if the United States in congress assembled shall, on consideration of circumstances, judge proper that any state should not raise men, or should raise a smaller number than its quota, and that any other state should raise a greater number of men than the quota thereof, such extra number shall be raised, officered, clothed, armed and equipped in the same manner as the quota of such state, unless the legislature of such state shall judge that such extra number cannot be safely spared out of the same, in which case they shall raise, officer, clothe, arm and equip as many of such extra number as they judge can be safely spared, and the officers and men so clothed, armed, and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled.

§ 6. The United States in congress assembled shall never engage in a war, nor grant letters of marque and reprisal in time of peace, nor enter into any treaties or alliances, nor coin money, nor regulate the value thereof, nor ascertain the sums and expenses necessary for the defense and welfare of the United States, or any of them, nor emit bills, nor borrow money on the credit of the United States, nor appropriate money, nor agree upon the number of vessels of war to be built or purchased, or the number of land or sea forces to be raised, nor appoint a commander-in-chief of the army or navy, unless nine states

assent to the same; nor shall a question on any other point, except for adjourning from day to day, be determined, unless by the votes of a majority of the United States in congress assembled.

§ 7. The congress of the United States shall have power to adjourn to any time within the year, and to any place within the United States, so that no period of adjournment be for a longer duration than the space of six months, and shall publish the journal of their proceedings monthly, except such parts thereof relating to treaties, alliances, or military operations as in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the delegates of each state, on any question, shall be entered on the journal, when it is desired by any delegate; and the delegates of a state, or any of them, at his or their request, shall be furnished with a transcript of the said journal, except such parts as are above excepted, to lay before the legislatures of the several states.

ART. 10. The committee of the states, or any nine of them, shall be authorized to execute, in the recess of congress, such of the powers of congress as the United States in congress assembled, by the consent of nine states, shall, from time to time, think expedient to vest them with; *provided*, that no power be delegated to the said committee, for the exercise of which, by the articles of confederation, the voice of nine states, in the congress of the United States assembled, is requisite.

ART. 11. Canada acceding to this confederation, and joining in the measures of the United States, shall be admitted into and entitled to all the advantages of this Union; but no other colony shall be admitted into the same, unless such admission be agreed to by nine states.

ART. 12. All bills of credit emitted, moneys borrowed, and debts contracted by or under the authority of congress, before the assembling of the United States, in pursuance of the present confederation, shall be deemed and considered as a charge against the United States, for payment and satisfaction whereof the said United States and the public faith are hereby solemnly pledged.

ART. 13. Every state shall abide by the determination of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by this confederation are submitted to them. And the articles of this confederation shall be inviolably observed by every state, and the Union shall be perpetual; nor shall any alteration at any time hereafter be made in any of them, unless such alteration be agreed to in a congress of the United States, and be afterward confirmed by the legislature of every state.

And whereas, it has pleased the great Governor of the world to incline the hearts of the legislatures we respectively represent in congress to approve of and to authorize us to ratify the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, Know ye, that we, the undersigned delegates, by virtue of the power and authority to us given for that purpose, do by these presents, in the name and in behalf of our respective constituents, fully and entirely ratify and confirm each and every of the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, and all and singular the matters and things therein contained. And we do further solemnly plight and engage the faith of our respective constituents, that

they shall abide by the determinations of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by the said confederation are submitted to them; and that the articles thereof shall be inviolably observed by the states we respectively represent, and that the Union shall be perpetual. It witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands in congress.

Done at Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, the ninth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, and in the third year of the Independence of America.

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Preamble. We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives.

SEC. 2. The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states, and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every 30,000, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose 3; Massachusetts, 8; Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, 1; Connecticut, 5; New York, 6; New Jersey, 4; Pennsylvania, 8; Delaware, 1; Maryland, 6; Virginia, 10; North Carolina, 5; South Carolina, 5. Georgia, 3.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

*SEC. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second

year. *When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

The vice president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their own officers, and also a president *pro tempore*, in the absence of the vice president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments.

When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law.

SEC. 4. The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meetings shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall, by law, appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same; excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law and paid out of the treasury of the United

States. They shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No senator or representatives shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States which shall have been created or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return; in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representative, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The Congress shall have power:

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish postoffices and post roads ;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times, to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries ;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court ;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses, against the laws of nations ;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water ;

To raise and support armies ; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years ;

To provide and maintain a navy ;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces ;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions ;

To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress ;

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States ; and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards, and other needful buildings ; and

To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight ; but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended unless when, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or *ex post facto* law, shall be passed.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. No preference shall be given, by any regulation of commerce or revenue, to the ports of one state over those of another ; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law ; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States, and no person holding any office of profit and trust under them shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts laid by any state on imports or exports shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the Congress.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice president, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the Congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

[The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates; and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be appointed, if such a number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the

electors shall be the vice president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice president.]*

The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president; and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur, and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The president shall have power to fill all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

*The portion in brackets has been superseded by the 12th amendment.

SEC. 3. He shall, from time to time, give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice president, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state or the citizens thereof and foreign states, citizens or subjects.*

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Congress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury, and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attained.

*See the 11th amendment.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labor in one state under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States, and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in the Union a republican form of government; and shall protect each of them against invasion, and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which in either case shall be valid, to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided*, that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution, but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

ARTICLES

In addition to, and amendment of, the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress and ratified by the Legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original Constitution.

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war and public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court in the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states, respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice president, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballot the person voted for as vice president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president and of all persons voted for as vice president, and of the number of votes for each; which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president; if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states; and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of votes as vice president shall be the vice president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then, from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice president of the United States, representatives in Congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in Congress or elector of president and vice president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each house remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim

for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any state, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

NOTE.—The Constitution was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, by the unanimous consent of the states present in the convention appointed in pursuance of the resolution of the Congress of the confederation, of the twenty-first of February, 1787, and was ratified by the conventions of the several states, as follows, viz: By convention of Delaware, Dec. 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, Dec. 12, 1787; New Jersey, Dec. 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2, 1788; Connecticut, Jan. 9, 1788; Massachusetts, Feb. 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788; New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789; Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

The first ten of the amendments were proposed at the first session of the First Congress of the United States, Sept. 25, 1789; and were finally ratified by the constitutional number of states Dec. 15, 1791. The eleventh amendment was proposed at the first session of the Third Congress, March 5, 1794, and was declared in a message from the president of the United States to both houses of Congress, dated Jan. 8, 1798, to have been adopted by the constitutional number of states. The twelfth amendment was proposed at the first session of the Eighth Congress, Dec. 12, 1803, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1804, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Sept. 25, 1804.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed at the second session of the Thirty-eighth Congress, Feb. 1, 1865, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1865, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Dec. 18, 1865.

The fourteenth amendment took effect July 28, 1868.

The fifteenth amendment took effect March 30, 1870.

The sixteenth amendment was ratified in 1913.

NOTE.—The Sixty-fifth Congress of the United States at its second session adopted a joint resolution proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the United States providing for nation-wide prohibition, reading as follows:

“Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following amendment to the Constitution be, and hereby is, proposed to the States, to become valid as a part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of the several States as provided by the Constitution:

ARTICLE —

“Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

“Sec. 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

“Sec. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.”



SPECIAL SESSION OF 1912.

An extra session was called for the purpose of enacting a state-wide direct primary law applicable to all state officers, a corrupt practices act and a reapportionment law. The extra session convened June 4, 1912, and adjourned June 18, 1912. The officers and members were the same as at the regular session, except that Hon. W. A. Fisher and Hon. John J. Anderson, members of the House of Representatives, thirty-seventh legislature, having died, the fortieth legislative district (Minneapolis, Fourth ward) was represented by one member only, and Douglas county, in the fifty-eighth legislative district, was not represented in the House of Representatives at the extra session.





SPECIAL SENATORIAL ELECTIONS.

Owing to the death of Senator Harry F. Weis, of LeSueur, January 8, 1919, and of Senator Carlton L. Wallace, of Minneapolis, January 13, special primary and general elections were held under Chapter 5, G. S. 1919, as amended by Chapter 11, G. S. 1919, approved February 10, 1919. Under this new law C. N. Cosgrove, of LeSueur, and Arch Coleman, Minneapolis, were nominated at special primary elections held in the 17th and the 34th senatorial districts, February 11, and both were elected at special elections February 18. The senate as a result of contest proceedings brought by George H. Sullivan, of Stillwater, against W. W. Wilcox, of White Bear, declared that there was a vacancy in the district supposed to have been represented by Mr. Wilcox. This necessitated another special primary and general election in the 43rd senatorial district, Washington county. Both Sullivan and Wilcox were nominated at the primaries held February 13; and at the general election February 20, Mr. Sullivan was declared elected. He took his seat February 24, 1919.

PERMANENT RULES OF SENATE 1919

CALLING SENATE TO ORDER.

1. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the Senate shall have adjourned, and shall immediately call the members to order, and on the appearance of a quorum, shall proceed with the regular order of business.

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

2. He shall preserve order and decorum; may speak on points of order in preference to members, and shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. He shall also decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Senate by any member, but such appeal shall be decided by a majority vote of those present and voting thereon.

QUESTIONS—HOW STATED AND DECIDED.

3. He shall rise to put the question, but may state it sitting.

4. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say Aye," and after the affirmative voice is expressed, "As many as are of the contrary opinion say No." The President shall declare all votes, but if any member rise to doubt a vote, he shall order a division.

PRESIDENT PRO TEM.

5. The president shall call some member into the chair when the Senate goes into committee of the whole. He shall also have the right to name a member to perform the duties of the chair; but substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. In the absence of the president, except as above, the Senate shall appoint a president pro tem.

FURTHER DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

6. The president of the Senate shall sign all acts, memorials, addresses and resolutions; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the Senate shall be signed by him and attested by the secretary.

7. The president is authorized to administer all oaths required in the discharge of his duties.

DISTURBANCE IN LOBBY.

8. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobbies or galleries, the president or chairman of the committee of the whole shall have power to order the same cleared.

PRIVILEGES OF REPORTERS.

9. Reporters wishing to take down the debates may be admitted by the president, who shall assign them to such places on the floor or elsewhere to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate. But any reporter of any newspaper who shall purposely misrepresent or misreport the proceedings of the Senate, shall during the remainder of the session, be denied admission to the Senate Chamber.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

10. The order of business shall be as follows:
- First—Petitions, letters, remonstrances.
 - Second—Executive and official communications.
 - Third—Introduction and first reading of Senate bills.
 - Fourth—Messages from the House of Representatives.
 - Fifth—First Reading of House bills.
 - Sixth—Reports of committees.
 - (a) From standing committees.
 - (b) From select committees.
 - Seventh—Second reading of Senate bills.
 - Eighth—Second reading of House bills.
 - Ninth—Motions and resolutions.
 - Tenth—Third reading of Senate bills.
 - Eleventh—Third reading of House bills.
 - Twelfth—General orders of the day.

REFERRING OF BILLS.

11. All bills shall be referred by the President of the Senate without motion to the proper standing committee, on the first reading, unless otherwise referred by the Senate. And all bills providing for an appropriation of money, when referred to and reported by any other than the Committee on Finance, shall, before passage, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

ORDER IN DEBATE.

12. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Senate, he shall rise to his feet, and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid personality. In discussing any resolution, Senators shall be limited to five minutes each.

13. Whenever any member is called to order he shall sit down until it is determined whether he is in order or not, and if a member is called to order for words spoken in debate, the words excepted to shall be taken down in writing immediately.

14. When two or more members shall happen to rise at once, the President shall name the member who is to speak.

15. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question on the same day without leave of the Senate.

CONDUCT DURING BUSINESS.

16. When the president is putting any question, or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of, or across, the room; nor when a member is speaking shall any one pass between the member speaking and the chair. No member, or other person, shall proceed to or remain by the secretary's desk while the ayes and nays are being called or counted.

17. Upon a division and count of the Senate on any question no member without the Senate Chamber shall be counted.

SENATORS TO VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED.

18. Every member who shall be in the Senate when the question is put shall give his vote unless the Senate, for special reasons, shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the Senate divides or before he gives his vote upon a call of the ayes and noes. Any member wishing to be excused from voting may make a brief statement of the reasons for making such request, and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

MOTIONS.

19. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the President; or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the Secretary and read aloud for debate.

20. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member desires it. In such case it must be signed by the member or committee offering it.

21. After a motion is stated by the President or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Senate, but may be withdrawn by the author at any time before decision or amendment.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

22. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

For the previous question.

(Which three motions shall be decided without debate.)

To commit.

To postpone to a day certain.

To amend or

To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order; but a motion for the previous question having been seconded, or the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

A motion to postpone to a certain day, to commit, to postpone indefinitely, or to amend, being decided, shall not again be allowed on the same day, nor at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

MOTION TO ADJOURN.

23. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order and also a motion to adjourn to a time certain. The latter motion is debatable. When either motion is refused it shall not be renewed until further business shall be transacted.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

24. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon all pending amendments in their order upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the Senate shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered such motion, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.

25. On a previous question there shall be no debate. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

RECONSIDERATION.

26. When a motion or question has been once put and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for a reconsideration thereof, on the same day on which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the Senate thereafter; and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn. A motion for reconsideration being put and lost, shall not be renewed.

DIVISION OF QUESTION.

27. Any member may call for a division of the question, when the same will admit of it. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed to be indivisible. A motion to strike out being lost shall not preclude an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

PETITIONS AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS.

28. In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance or other communication addressed to the Senate, the members shall only state the general purport of it.

29. Every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee, shall be indorsed with its appropriate title, and immediately under the indorsement the name of the member presenting the same shall be written.

CALL OF THE SENATE.

30. Any member may make a call of the Senate, and require absent members to be sent for, but a call of the Senate cannot be made after the voting has commenced; and the call of the Senate being ordered and the absentees noted, the door shall be closed, and no member permitted to leave the room until further proceedings under the call be dispensed with by a majority vote of all the members of the Senate and the matter or question, if any, under consideration at the time of the call be disposed of, or the Senate adjourns.

 Municipal Affairs, 9 members.
 Public Institution and Buildings, 9 members.
 Public Domain, 9 members.
 Public Utilities, 9 members.
 Public Welfare and Health, 9 members.
 Public Highways, 15 members.
 Railroads, 9 members.
 Reconstruction and Relief, 9 members.
 Rules, 9 members.
 State and County Fairs, 9 members.
 State Development and Immigration, 9 members.
 Soldiers' Home, 7 members.
 Taxes and Tax Laws, 13 members.
 Towns and Counties, 11 members.
 Temperance, 9 members.
 Workmen's Compensation, 9 members.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

32. The rules observed in the Senate shall govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings of the Committee of the Whole, except that a member may speak more than twice on the same subject, and that a call for the yeas and nays, or for the previous question cannot be made.

33. Amendments made in the Committee of the Whole shall be entered on a separate piece of paper, and so reported to the Senate by the Chairman standing in his place, which amendment shall not be read by the President unless required by one or more of the members. On adoption of the report by the Committee of the Whole, all bills recommended to pass, shall be placed upon the calendar.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

34. Bills, memorials and joint resolutions may be introduced by any member in his place, or by order of the Senate on a report of a committee. Each member so introducing such bill, memorial or joint resolution shall, at the time of such introduction thereof, furnish to the Secretary of the Senate two copies thereof, which shall be endorsed "copies."

Every bill, memorial or joint resolution shall have prefixed thereto the name of the person introducing it, and when reported from a committee, the name of said committee shall be endorsed thereon. Every proposed amendment to any bill, memorial or joint resolution, and every committee report, shall be in triplicate form, and shall be written on only one side of the paper. That hereafter all bills introduced in the Senate shall be so framed that when any section or subdivision or chapter of any existing law is to be amended, or when any section or subdivision or chapter of any existing law is to be repealed, or when any section or subdivision or chapter of any repealed law is to be revived, the said section or subdivision or chapter shall in each case be given in full as it is designed to read when enacted, and all new matter contained in any bill which proposes to amend any section or subdivision of any existing law by inserting or adding such new matter shall be underscored, and when the bill is printed it shall be italicized, and when any bill proposes to amend an existing law by omitting any part thereof, the part proposed to be omitted shall be noted in a memorandum at the end of the bill and after the last section thereof, and such memorandum shall be printed at the bottom of the bill, with the bill, but shall not be any part of the enrolled bill, and no bill not so framed shall be received or read by the Secretary, unless otherwise especially ordered by the Senate.

READING OF BILLS.

35. Every bill, memorial, order, resolution or vote requiring the approval of the Governor shall receive three several readings previous to its passage; the first and third reading shall be at length; and no such bill, memorial, order or resolution shall be read twice on the same day.

COMMITMENT.

36. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it has been once read at length. If objections are made to a bill on its first reading the question shall be: "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no objection be made or the question to reject be lost, the bill shall go on its second reading.

ALL BILLS TO GO TO COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

37. All bills, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the Governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in Committee of the Whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the Senate.

PRINTING OF BILLS.

38. All bills of general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands, shall be printed; provided, that no bills shall be printed until after the same shall have been reported upon favorably by the committee to whom the same shall be referred.

FINAL PASSAGE.

39. The final question upon a bill or other paper requiring action by both houses, after the first and second readings thereof and after the consideration in Committee of the Whole, shall be upon its final passage.

AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING.

40. No amendment shall be received on third reading except to fill blanks, without the unanimous consent of the Senate. In filling blanks, the largest sum, the longest time and greatest distance shall be first taken.

41. A bill or resolution may be committed at any time, prior to its passage, and if any amendment be reported on such commitment to any other than a Committee of the Whole, it shall be again read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and the question for third reading and passage again put.

ENGROSSMENT.

42. Every bill, memorial, order or resolution originating in the Senate shall be carefully engrossed in typewriting before being transmitted to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

TRANSMITTING BILLS TO THE HOUSE.

43. Immediately after the passage of any bill or other paper to which the concurrence of the House of Representatives is to be asked it shall be the duty of the Secretary to transmit the same to the House, unless some member of the Senate shall make a motion to reconsider the vote by which the Senate passed the said bill or other paper; in which case the Secretary shall not transmit said bill or other paper until a motion to reconsider has been put; and on the concurrence of any bill or other paper of the House of Representatives by the Senate, or on the concurrence or disagreement in any vote of the House it shall also be the duty of the Senate to notify the House thereof.

MEMORIALS TO CONGRESS.

44. Memorials to Congress, to the President of the United States or the heads of either of the departments, shall be considered in Committee of the Whole before being adopted.

ANY SENATOR MAY DEMAND AYES AND NOES.

45. It shall be competent for any member, when a question is being taken, to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be entered on the Journal. A call for the ayes and noes cannot be interrupted in any manner whatever.

COMMITTEE NOT TO BE ABSENT.

46. Committees shall not absent themselves from the Senate, by reason of their appointment, without special permission for that purpose be first obtained.

ENROLLMENT.

47. All bills shall be carefully enrolled in typewriting under the supervision of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expenses. Said committee may report to the Senate at any time on the enrollment of bills.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

48. The Secretary shall keep a correct Journal of the proceedings of the Senate, and shall perform such other duties as shall be assigned to him as such Secretary. He shall permit no Journal, records, accounts or papers to be taken from the table or out of his custody, other than in the regular mode of business. If any paper in his charge shall be missing, he shall report the fact to the President that inquiry may be made. He shall superintend the recording of proceedings in the Journal, the engrossing, transcribing and copying of the bills and resolutions, and generally perform the duties of Secretary, under direction of the President. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the books to be called "Minute Books," in which he shall enter, under the appropriate marginal numbers, all Senate and House bills, and correct notes, with the dates thereof, of the state, condition and progress of each bill pending, until its final passage.

CERTIFICATE FOR MONEY.

49. No certificate authorizing the payment of any money appropriated by the Legislature shall be issued by the Secretary, by virtue of any motion or resolution, unless such a motion or resolution shall be voted for by a majority of all members of the senate. And all motions or resolutions authorizing the issuing of certificates by the Secretary for the payment of money shall be upon a call of the yeas and noes.

JOURNAL OF EXECUTIVE SESSION.

50. The proceedings of the Senate on executive business shall be kept in a separate book of record to be provided by the Secretary of the Senate, and published with the proceedings of the Senate, unless the public good requires secrecy; which shall be determined by a vote of the Senate.

JEFFERSON'S MANUAL.

51. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual shall govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and orders of the Senate, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

HOURS OF MEETING.

52. The standing hour of the daily meeting of the Senate shall be 10 o'clock in the morning, unless the Senate direct otherwise.

ABSENCE OF SENATORS.

53. No senator or officer of the Senate, unless from illness or other cause shall be unable to attend, shall absent himself from the session of Senate during the entire day, without having first obtained leave of absence.

PERSONS PRIVILEGED TO THE FLOOR OF THE SENATE.

54. No person shall be admitted within the Senate chamber but the executive or ex-Governor of the State of Minnesota, members of the House, heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme and District Courts and members of Congress, and when personally introduced by members of the Senate, those who have been members of Congress or of the State Legislature or other visitors who are not interested in any claim or directly in any bill pending before the Legislature.

No lobbyist shall be permitted on the floor of the Senate or in the retiring room or corridors during the session of the Senate. The sergeant-at-arms is charged with the duty of strict enforcement of this rule.

AMENDMENTS TO RULES.

55. No rule or order of the Senate shall be amended without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor shall any rule be suspended except by at least a two-thirds vote of the full Senate.

NOTICE TO DEBATE.

56. Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or other action.

EXECUTIVE SESSION.

57. When in executive session, the Senate may, in all cases, sit with closed doors, and the Senate chamber may be cleared of all persons except the officers and members of the Senate.

NO SMOKING.

58. No senator or officer of the Senate, or other person, shall be permitted to smoke in the Senate Chamber.

SECRETARY MAY CORRECT ERRORS.

59. The Secretary and Engrossing Clerk, in all proper cases, shall correct all mistakes in numbering the sections and reference thereto, whether such errors occur in the original bill or are caused by amendments thereto.

DUTIES OF THE SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.

60. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to execute all orders of the President of the Senate, and to perform all duties they may assign to him connected with the police and good order of the Senate chamber; to exercise a supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the Chamber; to see that messages, etc., are promptly executed; that the hall is properly ventilated and the temperature thereof properly regulated, and open for the use of members of the Senate at the time fixed; and to perform all other services pertaining to his office.

REPORT ON AMENDED BILLS.

61. No committee nor any member thereof shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject, or is intended to accomplish a different purpose than that of the original bill for which it is reported, or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the Senate is advised that the same is in violation of this rule.

GENERAL ORDERS AND CALENDAR.

62. The Secretary shall make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other proceedings of the Senate which are referred to the Committee of the Whole, and which are not made the order of the day, for any particular day, and to number the same, which lists shall be called the "General Orders of the Day," and they shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee.

Such general orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the rules or orders of the Senate, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the same shall be considered in Committee of the Whole.

63. That it shall be the duty of the Secretary to make a list of all bills, resolutions and other matters coming before the Senate for final action and place the same upon the calendar in the order in which they may have been acted upon in Committee of the Whole, and such calendar shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the matters included therein shall be considered.

ADDITIONAL EMPLOYEES—GRATUITIES.

64. All propositions for the appointment of employees of the Senate or for expenditures on account of the Legislature, other than those provided by law shall be referred to the Committee on Rules, without debate, and no appointment shall be made or expense incurred unless reported favorably by said committee, or unless its report be overruled by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of the whole Senate. Said committee shall report to the Senate the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each employee whose appointment is recommended by it. All propositions for extra compensation or gratuity shall be referred to said committee, and no extra compensation or gratuity shall be paid to any officer, employee or other person unless reported upon favorably by said committee or unless its report be reversed by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of the whole Senate.

SPECIAL ORDER.

65. On two days' notice it shall require a majority vote of the whole Senate to designate a special order, and when a time has been designated by the Senate, whether by adoption of a report of a committee or otherwise, for a particular or special order, the Senate shall at such time proceed to the consideration of such order, and shall at such time so designate, after considering the bill, resolution or measure included therein, unless the same shall be then otherwise disposed of, or the special order postponed to a day certain, immediately proceed to the third reading and final passage of the same, and during the consideration of such special order Rule No. Fifteen (15) shall be suspended, and the debate thereon and all proceedings thereunder, including amendments and substitutions, shall be, as nearly as applicable, that of the Committee of the Whole, except that it shall be competent for any member when a question is being taken, to call for the yeas and nces, which shall be entered on the Journal.

JOURNAL—HOW APPROVED.

66. The Journal of each day's proceedings shall be open for correction at any time during the session of the succeeding day, and unless corrected on that day, shall stand approved.

PRESIDENT'S AUTHORITY OVER EMPLOYEES.

67. The President of the Senate shall have full and exclusive authority over, and charge of, all the employees, officers and clerks of the Senate, both elective and appointive. He shall have the sole and exclusive power and authority to assign them to such duties, other than for which they were elected or appointed, as he shall see fit. He shall have power to appoint such of said employees, officers or clerks as he shall deem proper to exercise the powers to him granted by this rule. He may make such rules and regulations for the government of the employees, officers and clerks as he shall see fit and proper. In case of violation of any of the orders of the President of the Senate by any employee, officer or clerk, or in case of any violation of any such rule or regulation made by him by any such employee, officer or clerk, or in case of any misconduct or omission of any such employee, officer or clerk, the President shall refer such complaint to the Committee on Rules, which shall have the final power to hear such complaint and to discharge any such employee, officer or clerk, or to impose such other punishment by way of fine or otherwise upon such employee, officer or clerk, as to the said committee may seem just and proper.

AMENDMENTS TO TITLE.

68. The title to any bill may be amended at any time during its pendency in the Senate.

WHEN COMMITTEES MUST REPORT.

69. Every bill referred to a Standing Committee shall be reported therefrom within twenty-five (25) days after its reference to such committee, except all bills referred to the Finance Committee.

A majority of the Senate may at any time recall a bill from any committee or take a bill from the table and place such bill on General Orders.

SENATE EMPLOYEES TO ENROLL AND ENGROSS BILLS.

70. All enrolling and engrossing of bills shall be done by Enrolling and Engrossing Clerks and Stenographers regularly in the employ of the Senate and shall not be paid for per folio.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

71. Joint resolutions not requiring the signature of the Governor need not take the regular course of bills and memorials, but may be acted upon in the same manner as resolutions.

PURCHASING SUPPLIES.

72. The Secretary of the Senate shall be the agent of the Senate for the purchase of supplies. Before making any purchases, however, it shall be his duty to submit to the Rules Committee a list of necessary supplies, together with the prices for which the same can be secured, which supplies shall then be purchased only upon the approval of the Rules Committee.

REPORT OF VOTE IN COMMITTEE.

73. Upon the request of any member of any standing committee of the Senate or upon the request of the author of any bill, a record shall be made of the vote on such bill in any committee, including the vote on any amendment, or proposed amendments thereto in the committee to which the bill was referred, and such vote of the members of such committee shall accompany the report of the committee on the bill and shall be printed in the Journal as a part of the report of the committee.

QUORUM IN COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY.

74. Ten (10) members shall constitute a quorum of the Committee on Judiciary.

PERMANENT RULES OF THE HOUSE 1919

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE.

1. *Meeting, Roll Call, Etc.*

The Speaker shall take the chair at the hour at which the House stands adjourned. The House shall then be called to order, and after prayer by the Chaplain, a roll of the members shall be called and the names of the members present and those excused shall be entered on the Journal of the House.

2. *Reading of the Journal.*

Upon the appearance of a quorum, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Chief Clerk, unless otherwise ordered, and any errors therein may be corrected by the House.

3. *Order of Business.*

After the reading of the Journal, the order of business of the day, shall be as follows:

1. Presentation of petitions or other communications.
2. Reports of Standing Committees.
3. Second reading of House bills.
4. Second reading of Senate bills.
5. Reports of Select Committees.
6. Introduction of Bills.
7. Motions and resolutions.
8. Consideration of messages from the Senate.
9. First reading of Senate bills.
10. Calendar for the day.
11. General Orders

4a. *Bills—How Introduced.*

A member or committee desiring to introduce a bill shall place the same in the hands of the Speaker before the opening of the session.

All memorials and joint resolutions shall be presented, received and considered in the same manner as bills; shall be bound in the regular House file binder, and take the same course as a bill.

No bill shall be introduced after the sixtieth (60th) Legislative day of the session except its reception be authorized by two-thirds (2-3) vote of the House. This vote shall not apply to Committee bills or bills introduced by request of the Governor under the Constitutional provision as provided for in Article 4, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota.

Any standing or special committee of the House may introduce a bill as a committee bill, which shall be read the first time, laid over for one day, when it shall be read for the second time and placed upon General Orders.

Every bill and resolution shall be introduced in triplicate and shall have prefixed thereto the name of the member, members or committee introducing it.

4b. Bills—How Drafted.

The title of every bill must give its single subject, and briefly state its purpose as far as practicable.

If the bill be for an amendment of a present statute, it shall contain the full text of the chapter or section or sub-division to be amended. Then in the proper place shall be inserted the words and characters constituting the new amending matter which shall be underscored, and, when printed, put in italics. The words and characters to be eliminated by the amendment shall be stricken out by a line drawn through the eliminated matter, and when the bill is printed such eliminated matter shall be capitalized and enclosed in brackets. The chairman of each committee to which such a bill is referred shall see that the bill conforms to this rule before it is favorably reported to the house.

Bills should refer to session laws and statutes as follows:

"Laws 1913" (or other years after 1891).

"General Laws 1891" (or prior year).

"Special Laws 1891" (or prior year).

"General Statutes 1913" (Sec. 9421).

"Revised Laws 1905" (Sec. 5504).

All numbers in the title should be expressed in figures. All numbers of sections or chapters of laws shall be in figures. In the body of the bill numbers in excess of 10 should be in figures except for a special reason they may be written, but when written they should not be followed by numbers in parentheses.

A copy of this rule shall be furnished the stenographers or others copying bills, and they are specifically enjoined to observe the same.

The author of a bill may attach thereto a memorandum of information headed "memorandum," which shall constitute no part of the bill, and shall not be printed in connection with the bill unless otherwise ordered by a vote of the house.

5. First Reading and Reference of Bills.

All bills, memorials and joint resolutions shall be read at length upon their introduction unless objected to.

If objection is made to the introduction of a bill, the question shall be: "Shall the bill be rejected?" A majority vote of the whole House shall be required for rejection.

If no objection be made, or if the question to reject be lost, the bill shall, after reading, be referred by the Speaker to its appropriate Standing Committee, except when introduced by such Committee.

Every bill introduced, except when introduced by a Committee as above provided, containing an amendment to an existing law of the State, shall first be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee of the House appointed with reference to the subject matter contained in the law proposed to be amended.

After a reference of a bill by the Speaker, a majority vote of the whole House shall be required for a re-reference or re-committal thereof by the House.

All bills, whether emanating from the House or the Senate, carrying an appropriation, shall be referred to the Committee on Appropriations for action by the committee before the second reading of the bill; and the fact that the bill carries an appropriation shall be noted by the committee in its report returning the same.

6. Records and Reports of Committees.

The Chairman, or Acting Chairman, of each committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record, on which shall be entered:

(a) The time and place of each hearing and of each meeting of the committee.

(b) The attendance of committee members at each meeting.

(c) The name of each person, except members of the House and Senate, appearing before the committee, with the name of the person or persons, association, firm or corporation in whose behalf the appearance is made.

(d) Any member of any committee may demand a roll call on any bill, resolution, or amendment before the committee, and upon such demand being made, and not otherwise, the roll call shall be called on such bill, resolution, or amendment and a record of the vote of each member thereon made and kept; and name of the member making such demands shall also be recorded.

Such record shall be approved at the next regular meeting of the committee.

Such record shall be filed with the Chief Clerk during the session of the Legislature and at the expiration thereof shall be filed with the Secretary of State; and such records shall be open to the public inspection at all times.

The chairman of a committee reporting the action taken by his committee upon bills submitted to it shall do so upon the form provided for such reports, stating the date of the meeting, when such action was taken, and shall authenticate the same by his signature.

Any number of bills may be embodied in one report; but at the request of any member the report may be divided by excepting any bill therefrom, and if this be done the bill so excepted may be acted upon independently from the report as a whole.

The report of any committee, or any part thereof, may be laid upon the table for a day and printed in the Journal if so ordered by the House.

In the event of a minority report, the majority and minority reports shall be made separately from the regular committee reports.

7. *Quorum on Committees.*

A majority of the members of any standing or special committee shall constitute a quorum. This rule shall not apply to the Committee on Judiciary where 11 members shall constitute a quorum.

8. *Second Reading of Bills.*

All bills, concurrence reports, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the Governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in a committee of the whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the House. Unless otherwise ordered, bills, resolutions authorizing the expenditure of money and joint memorials to Congress, only, shall require a second and third reading.

9. *Third Reading of Bills.*

No amendments shall be received on the third reading except to fill blanks or amend titles, without the unanimous consent of the House; and all bills and resolutions may at any time previous to their passage be committed or re-committed only by majority vote of the whole House. If any amendment be reported upon such commitment or re-commitment by any other than a committee of the whole, it shall be read a second time, considered in the committee of the whole and the question for a third reading and passage again put.

10. *Disposition of Senate Bills.*

When a Senate file has been received by the House, with a message announcing that the same has passed the Senate, such bill shall be referred to the appropriate standing committee; provided, however, that when a Senate file is received, the provisions of which are stated by a member to be identical with those of a House file, which has already been considered by one of the committees of the House and is on General Orders or the Calendar, such Senate file shall be referred to the Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment for compari-

son, which committee shall report forthwith whether the said Senate file is identical with the House file. And, if reported identical, such Senate file may by a majority vote, be substituted for the House file (the latter, in such case being considered withdrawn), and shall take the place of the House file; provided, however, that the fact that the bills are identical shall be entered on the Journal.

11. *Committee of the Whole.*

When the House has arrived at the General Orders of the day, they shall go into a Committee of the Whole upon General Orders. And, unless a particular bill is ordered up, the Committee of the Whole shall consider, act upon or pass the General Orders according to order of their reference.

In forming a Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall appoint a chairman to preside.

Bills committed to the Committee of the Whole House shall, in the Committee of the Whole thereon, be first read through unless the committee shall otherwise order, and then read and debated by sections, leaving the title to be last considered. All amendments shall be in writing, in duplicate, and reported to the House by the Chairman.

12. *Rules of the House to Apply to Committee of the Whole.*

The rules of the House shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as may be applicable; except that the yeas and nays shall not be called, the previous question forced and speaking limited.

A motion that the Committee rise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

13. *General Order of the Day.*

The Speaker shall cause the Chief Clerk to make out a list of all bills, resolutions and reports of Committees and which are not made a Special Order, and to number the same. This list shall be called "General Orders of the Day;" and items listed thereon shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the Committee. General Orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the Rules or Orders of the House, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least two days before the same are to be considered in the Committee of the Whole.

Each member of the House shall leave on or under the desk, each time the House adjourns for the day, his file binder for bills. It shall be the duty of the clerk of the House to have placed in each binder one copy of each bill to be printed under the Rules or Orders of the House at least forty-eight hours before the same shall be considered in the Committee of the Whole, and under the first order of business each day, said Clerk shall report to the House what bills he has placed in the binders.

If progress is reported on a bill by the Committee for three days, such bill shall go to the foot of General Orders, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote.

14. *Special Orders.*

Bills may be made the order of the day for a special time. Such bills shall be entered upon a separate list, known as "Special Orders." Bills may be made a Special Order by a majority vote of the entire House upon two days' notice. Any Special Order, or any part thereof, may be continued or postponed by a majority of the entire House at the time of such Special Order.

When the time arrives for the consideration of any Special Order, the House shall proceed to the consideration of the bill or bills upon the said Special Order in the order in which they are respectively listed; and after consideration they shall immediately be read the third time and placed upon final passage.

DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS.

15. *Duties of the Speaker.*

(a) The Speaker shall preside over the House, and be charged with all the powers and duties pertaining to such presiding officer.

(b) He shall preserve order and decorum, and in case of disorderly conduct or disturbance in the galleries or the lobby, he, or the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole House, may order the same to be cleared.

(c) He shall have general control, except as provided by Rule or law, of the Hall of the House and of the corridors and passages and of the rooms assigned to the use of the House, until further ordered.

(d) He shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas of, or issued by order of the House; and he shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member.

The Speaker shall not vote on appeals from his own decisions.

16. *Speaker Pro Tempore.*

The presiding officer may call a member to the Chair, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. In the absence of the presiding officer, one of the members shall be selected by a majority vote to preside temporarily, until the return of the regular presiding officer.

17. *Duties of Members.*

When the House adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.

Every member, before speaking, shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the Speaker, but shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the Chair. When two or more members rise at once, the Speaker shall designate which shall speak first.

18. *Explaining or Changing Vote.*

No member shall be allowed to explain his vote or discuss the question while the yeas and nays are being called; and no member shall be allowed to change his vote after the same is announced from the chair.

19. *Name of Member Offering Bills, Etc., to Go on Journal.*

In all cases where a bill, order, resolution or motion shall be entered on the Journal of the House, the name or names of the member or members offering the same shall be entered on the Journal.

20. *Absence of Members and Officers.*

No member or officer of the House shall, unless from illness or some other sufficient cause he be unable to attend, absent himself from any session of the House during the entire day without having first obtained leave of absence from the Speaker.

21. *Duties of the Chief Clerk and Assistants or Employees.*

Neither the chief clerk nor his assistants or employees shall permit any records or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody, other-

wise than in the regular course of business. The Chief Clerk shall report any missing papers to the Speaker. He shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House; shall perform, under the direction of the Speaker, all the duties pertaining to his office, and shall keep a book showing the situation and progress of bills, memorials, and joint resolutions.

22. Clerical Corrections to Bills.

(a) Minor clerical errors in any bill, memorial or resolution such as errors in orthography or grammar, or the incorrect use of one word for another (as "affect" for "effect") or wrong numbering or references, whether such errors occur in the original bill or any amendment thereto, shall be corrected by the Chief Clerk, as a matter of course, upon the approval of the chairman of any committee to which the bill was referred.

(b) The Chief Clerk shall insert the enacting clause in any bill before its passage, if the same shall have been omitted.

(c) Any corrections made by the Clerk under this rule shall be noted by him in the Journal.

(d) Webster's New International Dictionary shall be the standard authority in matters falling under the above rules.

23. No One to Remain by the Clerk's Desk.

No member or other person shall remain by the Clerk's desk when the yeas and nays are being called.

24. Duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to execute all orders of the House or its presiding officer; to perform all duties that may, from time to time, be assigned to him connected with the police and good order of the House; to exercise supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the chamber; to see that all messages, etc., etc., are promptly executed; that the hall is properly ventilated and open for the use of the members; and to perform all other services pertaining to the office of Sergeant-at-Arms.

25. Smoking Prohibited.

No person shall be permitted to smoke in the House Chamber while that body is in session. The Sergeant-at-Arms is charged with the duty of enforcing observance of this rule.

26. Order in Debate.

No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every other member wishing to speak on the pending question shall have spoken.

27. Motions.

No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the Speaker before debate, and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any other member requires it.

After a motion has been stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the House, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision; but all motions, resolutions or amendments shall be entered in the Journal unless withdrawn the same day.

28. Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except during roll call.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state any fact to the House relative to the condition of the business of the House which would seem to render it improper to adjourn at that time. Such statement, however, shall not be debatable and shall not, in any case, occupy more than two minutes.

29. Precedence of Motions.

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
(Which three motions shall be decided without debate.)
4. To commit.
5. To postpone to a day certain.
6. To amend.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order; but the previous question having been seconded and the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

30. The Previous Question.

(a) The previous question shall be in this form: "The gentleman frommoves the previous question. Do ten members second the motion?" If the motion be properly seconded, the question shall be stated as follows: "As many as are in favor of ordering the previous question will say aye; as many as are opposed will say no."

There shall be a motion for the previous question which, being ordered by a majority of all members present, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the House to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions upon which it has been ordered.

The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the Rules or an amendment or amendments; or it may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection.

(b) On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered such motion, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.

(c) When the previous question is decided in the negative, it shall leave the main question under debate for the residue of the sitting unless sooner disposed of by taking a vote on the question or in some other manner.

31. Incidental Questions of Order.

All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, during the pendency of such motion, or after the House shall have determined that the main question now be put, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

32. Petitions, Etc., How Presented.

Petitions, memorials and other papers presented to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or a member in his place, and a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made verbally and endorsed thereon, together with the name of the member introducing the same.

33. *Every Member to Vote Unless Excused.*

Every member who shall be present before the vote is declared from the Chair shall vote for or against the matter before the House unless the House shall excuse him, or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.

34. *Procedure in Excusing Member from Voting.*

When a member declines to vote on a call of his name, he shall be required to assign his reasons therefor; and, having assigned them the presiding officer shall submit the question to the House: "Shall the member, for the reasons assigned by him, be excused from voting?" Which shall be decided without debate. And these proceedings shall be had after the roll call, and before the result is announced, and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.

35. *Order During Session.*

When the Speaker is putting the question no member shall walk out of or across the House; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member entertain any private discourse or pass between the speaking member and the Chair.

36. *Order of Putting Questions.*

All questions whether in Committee or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions; and in filling up blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

37. *Division of a Question.*

If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the said question divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

38. *Questions of Order.*

If any member of the House, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the Rules, the Speaker shall (or any member may) call him to order; in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted on motion of another member to explain, and the House, if appealed to, shall decide in either case without debate. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

39. *Called to Order for Offensive Words in Debate.*

If any member be called to order for offensive words in debate, the person calling him to order shall report the words excepted to and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's desk and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House, for language used in debate, if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exception to them shall have been taken.

40. *Members May Demand Yeas and Nays.*

The yeas and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by ten members, except upon final passage of bills, joint resolutions and motions directing the payment of money. In these cases yeas and nays shall be ordered without demand.

41. *Notice of Intention to Debate.*

Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or other action.

42. *Call of the House.*

Ten members may demand a call of the House and require absent members to be sent for; but a call of the House can not be made after the voting has commenced, and such call being ordered and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed and no member permitted to leave the room until the call is suspended. And, pending the call, no motion shall be in order except it pertains to matters incidental to the call or motion to suspend further proceedings under the same. After the call of the House has been ordered and proceedings thereunder are suspended, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall not permit any member to leave the hall or the House unless excused by the Speaker.

The call may be suspended at any time by a vote of a majority of the entire House.

43. *Suspension of Rules to Hasten a Bill.*

Every bill shall be read on three different days unless in case of urgency two-thirds of the whole House deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed until it shall have been read at length twice.

44. *Proceedings of the Passage of Bills.*

No resolution involving the expenditure of money, or joint resolution, shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House, to be determined by a roll call. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of its being an amendment.

No bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto or incorporating therein any other bill or resolution pending before the House.

45. *Amendments to Appropriation Bills.*

No amendment increasing the amount or amounts carried by any appropriation bill shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House.

46. *Motion for Reconsideration.*

When a question has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof; but no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after a bill, resolution, message, report, amendment, or motion upon which the vote was taken shall have gone out of the possession of the House, announcing their decision. Nor shall any motion for reconsideration be in order unless made on the same day upon which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the House thereafter. Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions except the motion to adjourn; provided that when notice of the intention to remove such reconsideration shall be given by such member, the clerk of the House shall retain the said bill, resolution, message, report, amendment or motion until after the expiration of the time during which such motion can be made, as hereinbefore provided, unless the same is previously disposed of. A motion for reconsideration having been put and lost shall not be renewed.

47. *Authorized Manual of Parliamentary Practice.*

The rules of parliamentary practice embraced in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the House in all cases where they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the House and joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

48. *Standing Committees.*

Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Speaker as follows:

49. *Committee on Legislative Expenses.*

(a) The purchase of supplies and fixtures of whatever nature, and contracts for rentals of telephones, typewriters and such similar fixtures as may be necessary, shall in all cases be made by the Committee on Legislative Expense. Every such order shall be made upon a blank furnished for that purpose, in duplicate, signed by the Chairman of the said Committee and countersigned by the Chief Clerk of the House. All such purchases shall be accompanied by invoices in duplicate, the original to be signed by the Chairman of the said committee to indicate it has been favorably acted upon. The said invoices shall then be made a part of the Chief Clerk's voucher and filed with the State Auditor. The said committee shall make a report of expenditures to the House every thirty days, which report shall be entered in the Journal.

(b) All such supplies shall be in charge of the Chairman of the Committee who shall disburse the same only upon requisitions properly made out and indicating to whom the said supplies are to be delivered, and shall be countersigned by the chief clerk.

(c) The Chief Clerk shall keep a record showing the disposition of all supplies purchased and not in stock, in all instances.

50. *Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment.*

The Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed and report the same to the House "correctly engrossed" before the third reading. The said Committee may report at any time, and all bills shall be engrossed in typewriting.

The Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment shall examine all House bills, memorials and joint resolutions, which have passed the two houses, and when reported "Correctly enrolled" they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the two houses for their signatures; and when so signed, to the Governor for his approval. The said committee may report at any time, but it shall not report any bill as correctly enrolled which has words interlined therein, or when any words have been erased therefrom; and all bills shall be enrolled in typewriting.

The chairman of the said committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record showing the hour and date of the receipt by it of each bill and of its return to the House; and all bills shall be returned in the same order as that in which they are received.

51. *Committee of Conference.*

A Committee of Conference may report at any time.

No committee except a Committee of Conference and the Committee on Rules shall sit during the sitting of the House without leave.

52. *Special Committees.*

Special Committees to whom reference shall be made, shall in all cases report a state of facts and their opinions, thereupon, to the House.

53. *Meetings of Committees.*

The chairman of the Rules Committee shall call a meeting of the chairmen of the various committees of the House and after conference, the Committee on Rules shall prepare a schedule of committee meetings, fixing as far as practicable the date and hour which will be the regular meeting time of each

committee to be first approved by a majority vote of the House. Should it be necessary to hold a special meeting or for any reason change temporarily the regular meeting of a committee, the notice by the chairman of said committee, of such change shall be read from the desk at least one day in advance thereof, and also posted upon the bulletin board at the same time, or on a majority vote of the House fixing a time therefor at any time.

54. *Time Limit for Consideration of Bills.*

Fifteen days after a bill has been referred to a Committee (other than a bill for appropriations or claims) and no report has been made upon the bill by a Committee, any member may request that the bill be returned to the House. The Committee shall then have three days in which to report back the bill requested. If the Committee fails to report within three days, any member may at any time after the expiration of such three days, during the order of "Motions and Resolutions," demand the return forthwith to the House of the bill in question, which shall constitute the demand of the House and the said bill shall at once be considered to be in possession of the House, subject, however, to such disposition as the House may determine. Provided, that the House can recall any bill from any committee at any time, give the same second reading and advance the same to General Orders by a majority vote of the members present.

55. *Substitution of Bills.*

No standing or special committee, nor any member or members thereof, shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject or is intended to accomplish a different purpose from that of the original bill for which it is reported, or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the House is advised that the same is in violation of this Rule. The Rule shall not be suspended without the unanimous consent of the House.

56. *Employees.*

All propositions for the appointment of employees of the House, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. No appointment shall be made unless favorably reported upon by such committee, or its report to be overruled by three-fourths vote of the House.

The said committee shall report to the House the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each of the said employees.

Any employee of the House may be assigned to other duties, suspended or discharged at any time by the Committee on Rules.

Rule 56 shall not be construed as authorizing the employment or appointment of any employee named therein, in any case any employee has been appointed or authorized to be appointed or engaged by this House for such position by any rule or resolution heretofore adopted. No clerk shall be appointed for any of the committees named in Rule 56 unless the necessity for the same is recommended by the Committee on Rules; and no clerk of the said Committee and no employee of this House shall receive any pay for any time prior to the date of appointment, and no employee or clerk mentioned in Rule 56 shall receive any pay, compensation, gratuity or reward over and above the salary named therein, except upon an approval of a four-fifths vote of the whole House.

No employee shall, under any circumstances, make, or permit to be made, any copy or copies of any papers, files or documents in his or her custody or to which she or he has access, except it be upon the request of some member of the House; and in such cases, the employee making, or permitting to be made, such copies, shall file a statement with the Chief Clerk of the House, showing the paper, file or document copied, the number of copies furnished or made, to whom furnished, and by whom made. Violations of this rule shall be ground for instant and summary discharge of the offending employee.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES.

57. *Vote Required to Suspend Rules.*

No rule of the House shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the whole House, except Rules 56 and 57, which shall require the concurrence of three-fourths of the members of the whole House. But the Committee on Rules may report at any time and any Rule so reported may be adopted by the majority of the House.

58. *Weekly Synopsis of All Entries in Journal.*

After the last session of each week the Clerk shall prepare a synopsis of all entries affecting bills in the Journal for the week. Such synopsis shall specify clearly and briefly the proceedings had and action taken, giving dates:

- H. F. No. 11. A bill to, etc., etc.
- Jan. 10. Int. by Mr. Doe. Ref. to Jud.
- Jan. 12. Jud. Rep., with amdt. pass.
- Jan. 14. On General Orders.
- Jan. 15. On Calendar.
- Jan. 16. Passed.

The synopsis so prepared shall be of the same size and form as the Journal, and shall be distributed on the desks of the members not later than noon of the following Monday.

59. *Printing of Bills.*

All bills of a general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands shall be printed; provided, that no bill shall be printed until after the same shall have been favorably reported by the committee to which it shall have been referred, unless ordered printed by a majority vote of the House.

Upon bills received from the Senate, it shall be the duty of the committee of the House to which the same are referred to make a report to the House as to the advisability or inadvisability of having the same printed.

60. *Newspaper Reporters.*

On account of the limited space available on the floor of the House, the Associated Press, the United Press, the St. Paul Pioneer Press, the St. Paul Dispatch, the St. Paul Daily News, the Minneapolis Journal, the Minneapolis Tribune, the Minneapolis Daily News, the Duluth News-Tribune, and the Duluth Herald and any other daily or weekly newspaper published in this state in the English language having a bona fide circulation of more than twenty thousand subscribers, and no other, shall each be permitted to be represented at the press table by one regularly employed reporter who shall file with the Chief Clerk credentials to be approved by the Rules Committee.

61. *Who May Be Admitted on the Floor.*

No person or persons shall be admitted within the House Chamber, corridors or retiring room, except the members themselves, the properly authorized employees, the Chief Executive and ex-Governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the Senate, the Heads of Departments of the State government, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, members of Congress, the properly accredited representatives of the newspapers and press association, as herein provided for, and none other. Former members of Congress, or Minnesota Legislature or any other person when personally introduced to the Speaker by members of the House. The Speaker may issue a permit good for the day to such person after having satisfied himself that such person does not seek the floor of the House for the purpose of directing or using his influence upon any measure pending or otherwise before the House. It is expressly directed that the Sergeant-at-Arms shall keep the alcoves cleared (the alcoves shall be kept for members only), and at no time when the House is in session, can visitors on the floor of the House who are guests of the members thereof, occupy the alcoves, but visiting members shall be provided with a seat near the member who has recommended him, and at no time shall a conversation be carried on to disturb the business of the House.

It shall not be in order for the Speaker to entertain a request for the suspension of this rule, or to present from the chair the request of any member for unanimous consent, unless, however, an extraordinary condition exists, in which event he may consent to entertain a motion for its suspension.

62. *Construction Rule As To.*

In construction of the terms "majority vote," "vote of the House," "vote of the whole House," and "vote of the entire House," as used in these rules, the first two phrases shall be deemed a majority vote of the members present at the particular time, and the last two phrases to mean a majority vote of all the members elected to the House at the particular session of the Legislature.

63. *Bulletin Board.*

The Chief Clerk shall prepare a bulletin board, upon which shall be posted a list of committee meetings, and any other announcements or notice the House may require.

64. *Topical Index.*

The Chief Clerk shall prepare a topical card index, in which bills may be indexed by number, author, subject, section of the code amended, the committees and any other subject that will make it a complete and comprehensive index, and to be made a permanent file to be used by all succeeding Chief Clerks. The topical index shall be filed with the Secretary of State after the expiration of the session of the Legislature and the cards constituting the record shall be retained open for the public inspection at all times.

65. *Visiting Public Institutions.*

No leave of absence shall be granted any committee, special or standing, to visit any public institution of the State or for any other purpose. Whenever any committee shall report to the House that it is desirable that such committee receive information concerning any public institution, the House may, by a majority vote of all its members, grant a leave of absence to not more than three members of such committee, to be designated by the chairman thereof. Application for a leave of absence of such members of a committee shall be made to the House in writing by the chairman thereof, and such application shall give the name of the institution or institutions to be visited and briefly recite the occasion and necessity for visiting the same, together with the names of the committeemen designated for that purpose and the name of the stenographer to accompany such committeemen, if one is necessary. Such application shall immediately, and without debate, be referred to the Committee on Rules, with instructions to report upon the same on the next legislative day. Said members and their stenographer, if any, shall be allowed their actual expenses

HISTORY.

MINNESOTA.

Brief Historical Sketch of the North Star State.

The great and prosperous commonwealth now known as the State of Minnesota, at one time formed part of three great sovereignties: France, Spain and Great Britain. At different periods sections of it bore the names of the Northwest Territory, Louisiana, Missouri, Michigan, Iowa and finally "Minnesota," a name derived from two Sioux words meaning "sky-colored water," which was applied to its principal river.

The economic, political and institutional life of Minnesota can be traced back to the brilliant period of Louis XIV of France and the French conquest of the territory furnishes one of the most fascinating chapters in American history. Whether this was effected by devoted priests under the direction of various religious orders or by intrepid adventurers encouraged in their undertakings by officials of the French government, makes little difference. The French were the pioneers in the development of the Northwest fur trade and it was the discovery of potential wealth in the large number of fur bearing animals in the territory that offered a promising field for white adventurous spirits from the settlements along the St. Lawrence river.

Thus it was that in 1655 two of these traders, now indisputably identified as Medard Chouart, Sieur de Groseilliers and Pierre d'Esprit, Sieur de Radisson, reached Minnesota, having crossed Wisconsin to the Mississippi river and after two years' sojourn returned to Montreal laden with valuable pelts. They were the first white men to visit Minnesota.

Thereafter the possibilities of great wealth in the vast empire beyond the Great Lakes became known and the commercial life of Minnesota may well be said to have commenced in the seventeenth century.

In 1679 Daniel Greysolon DuLhut (Duluth), a French officer, explored the region along the shores of Lake Superior and inland to Mille Lacs lake where he held council with the Indians and during the following summer journeyed to the Mississippi river where he met Father Louis Hennepin, a missionary priest. Father Hennepin was on a voyage of discovery also, the object being to trace the source of the Mississippi. He reached the Falls of St. Anthony, the present site of the City of Minneapolis, April 30, 1680.

The spirit of romance and adventure was ever present during this early period of Minnesota's history, and the latter part of the seventeenth century, but the aborigines did not always take kindly to the visitors.

It was, therefore, a matter of self preservation that led to the erection by Nicholas Perrot of a fort on the shores of Lake Pepin in 1689 and of a similar means of defense by Pierre LeSueur, French explorer, at the mouth of the Blue Earth river eleven years later.

When France lost her American dependencies in 1763 all that part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi river came under the control of Great Britain and the result was that English trading enterprises began to supersede the French companies.

During the early years of this commercial warfare, there arrived in the territory Jonathan Carver, a native of Connecticut, who was the first "Yankee" to venture into the territory. With characteristic foresight, Carver established friendly relations with the Indians, and it is alleged that in the spring of 1767 he obtained a grant of land from the Sioux which included the present site of the city of St. Paul, but no government recognition of the grant, currently referred to as "Carver's Claim," has ever been discovered.

The battle for supremacy in the fur trade continued to occupy the attention of the French, British and American companies until the Northwest Company was organized in 1783 and which a few years later gained exclusive control of the trading region beyond the Great Lakes. This supremacy it practically maintained until 1816 when the American Fur Company came into existence. This latter company has been credited with being commercially and politically the greatest single force in the development of the territory of which Minnesota forms a part.

That section of the State west of the Mississippi river had several times prior to 1803 been alternately possessed by Spain and France, but following the "Louisiana Purchase" in that year Minnesota came under the jurisdiction of Missouri territory, and incidently, for the first time became a political division of the United States. In 1805 that part east of the Mississippi river, which had been a section of the Northwest Territory, and later of Indiana, was included in Michigan territory.

Geographers and scientific explorers were also taking an active interest in the territory about this time for in 1798 David Thompson traversed and mapped the Red Lake region and the discovery of the source of the Mississippi river at Itasca lake, was announced in 1804 by William Morrison.

Two years after the Louisiana Purchase the Federal government sent an expedition into the new acquisition commanded by Lieut. Zebulon M. Pike, who wintered near what is now Little Falls and visited the Indian trading posts which had been established at Leech and Cass Lakes.

Lieutenant Pike negotiated with the Sioux for the purchase of a tract of land extending from below the confluence of the Mississippi and St. Peter's (Minnesota) rivers, up the Mississippi to include the Falls of St. Anthony, extending nine miles on each side of the river. Another tract nine miles square at the mouth of the St. Croix river was included in the cession. In consideration of these grants the Government paid \$2,000, the actual payment being made in the distribution of goods to the Indians by

Major Forsyth in 1819 and that year Fort St. Anthony, afterward named Fort Snelling, was located on the Mississippi-Minnesota rivers site.

Another Government expedition arrived in the territory in 1820 headed by General Lewis Cass, who then was governor of all the territory between the Detroit river on the east and the Mississippi on the west. This expedition ascended the Mississippi river to Cass Lake, so named by the historian Henry Schoolcraft, who accompanied it and who also named Lake Itasca, discovered by Thompson in 1804. Three years later the country north and west of Fort Snelling was traversed by Major Stephen Long and a military escort.

Italy was represented in this exploration but not officially, for with Major Long was Giocome C. Beltrami, an Italian political exile. Beltrami left Long's expedition at Pembina and traveled alone or with Indian companions past Red Lake and across the western section of the territory and down the Mississippi river to Fort Snelling.

In the early summer of 1823 the first steamboat on the upper Mississippi, the little "Virginia," laden with supplies, picked its way slowly up the river to Fort Snelling, but almost a decade passed after the advent of soldiers at the fort before settlers began to arrive in any number.

Hon. Henry H. Sibley, afterwards the first governor of the State of Minnesota, arrived at St. Peters (Mendota) in 1834 from Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, as resident partner and manager of the American Fur Company, and the Anglo-Saxon influence which had begun to manifest itself in the years following the treaty of Versailles in 1763, by which the territory's allegiance was changed from France to England, began to take more definite shape.

The Sioux and Ojibway Indians, had, up to the beginning of the nineteenth century, held the territory practically undisturbed, but the commercial spirit entered at about this period and the Indians were used to material advantage in many transactions with the fur traders. They received in exchange for peltries, guns, ammunition, blankets, calicoes, knives, tobacco and rum. Under this system of barter the traders were undoubtedly able to reap large profits, the Indians being permitted to obtain desired articles at the trading posts and given credit according to their hunting and trapping ability.

The first actual settlement of the present State of Minnesota followed as a result of treaties negotiated with the Indians by Governor Dodge of Wisconsin at Fort Snelling, and by Joel Poinsette, a special commissioner, at Washington in 1837. By the first of these the Ojibways ceded all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries, and by the Washington treaty the Dakota Indians ceded their lands east of the Mississippi and all its islands. Through these treaties the United States government gained possession of the land between the Mississippi and the St. Croix rivers south of a line drawn through the mouth of the Crow Wing river; and after the ratification of the treaties by Congress in 1838 these lands were opened for settlement.

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In the next few years small settlements were created at St. Paul, Mendota, Pembina, Marine and Dakota (Stillwater), at which latter place the "Stillwater Convention" was held August 26, 1848, whereby measures were adopted for separate territorial organization and providing that the proposed new territory be named Minnesota. Henry H. Sibley was elected delegate to Congress with the result that on March 3, 1849, the bill organizing Minnesota as an independent territory was passed. The territorial government was declared fully organized June 1, 1841, by Hon. Alexander Ramsey of St. Paul, who had been appointed governor.

With the creation of the territory of Minnesota, the domain of which extended to the Missouri river, a change took place in the industrial and commercial life of the people. The region was still mainly Indian country and the magnificent opportunities for development brought about negotiations with the tribal chiefs for approximately 24,000,000 acres of the finest agricultural land in the world by the signing of the famous Traverse des Sioux and the Mendota treaties. The first of these was signed July 23, 1851, in the presence of a large number of Sioux Chiefs at a council presided over by Governor Ramsey and at which the United States government was represented by Hon. Luke Lee, Indian Commissioner; the second was negotiated at Mendota on the fifth of August. By the Traverse des Sioux treaty the chiefs ceded all the lands claimed by the Sisseton and Wahpeton bands of Sioux, east of the Bois des Sioux and Big Stone rivers and Lake Traverse to the Mississippi river, excepting a reservation one hundred miles long by twenty wide, at the upper part of the Minnesota river. The Indians, under the terms of the treaty, were to move within two years to the reservation; to receive from the Government, after removal, \$275,000 to enable them to become established in their new domain, and \$30,000 was to be expended in breaking land, establishing mills and providing a manual labor school. They also were to receive an annuity of \$68,000 for fifty years payable \$40,000 in cash, \$10,000 in goods and provisions, a civilization fund of \$12,000 and an education fund of \$6,000.

By the Mendota treaty, which was signed by sixty-four chiefs of the Med-ay-wakanton and Wah-pay-kee-tay bands of Sioux, all their lands in the territory of Minnesota and Iowa were ceded. In consideration for this the United States was to reserve for them a tract of an average width of ten miles on either side of the Minnesota river between the Yellow Medicine river on the west and the Little Rock river on the east; to pay them \$220,000 with which to settle debts and aid in their removal to the reservation; \$30,000 to be used for the erection of structures and opening farms; an annual civilization fund of \$12,000; an annual education fund of \$6,000; to provide \$10,000 in goods and provisions annually and to pay \$30,000 in cash. The annuities were to continue for fifty years. The treaties were ratified by Congress in June, 1852.

A third treaty of 1851 was effected by Governor Ramsey with the Red Lake and Pembina bands of Ojibwas at Pembina, but was not ratified by the Government until the fifth of May, 1864, when President Lincoln by

proclamation confirmed it. By this treaty 11,000,000 acres of land embraced within the northwestern section of the state in the Red River Valley was added to the already large tracts available for white settlement.

The United States census of 1850 showed that the white population of Minnesota numbered 6,077, but immigration increased rapidly after the negotiations and ratification of the Indian treaties and by 1853 steamboats engaged in the Minnesota river trade carried capacity cargoes and passengers. Villages grew rapidly in the valley of the Minnesota, which was regarded as a veritable Eden and farms appeared in all directions. A period of unprecedented immigration continued from 1853 to 1857, at which time the population of the territory was 150,027. During these years of prosperity Minnesota attracted the best class of men and women from Europe. They were hardy frontiersmen indeed, with slender financial resources, a condition typical always of those who have been in the vanguard of settlement. As a class they were far superior in morality, education and intelligence than the pioneers in many of the older territories. Many were farmers who came west in "Prairie Schooners," with their own stock. Although Southwestern Minnesota gained more from the incoming population than any other section, the unusual success which attended the beginning of the lumber industry had its effect on every branch of trade and a rapid increase in the wealth of the newcomers.

The adventurous spirit, however, of many of the settlers led many of them to locate near the extreme limits of the land grants and in immediate proximity to Indian settlements. Occasionally the younger Indians on hunting expeditions returned to the ceded lands in the Southwestern section near the Iowa border. One band under the leadership of Inkpaduta, composed of about fifteen lodges, were particularly given to marauding. It was this band which caused the first serious trouble for the whites. In the spring of 1857 a few of these Indians hunting in the vicinity of Rock river killed a dog belonging to a white settler. The owner of the dog assaulted one of the Indians and then gathering a few neighbors went to the Indian camp and disarmed them. In a spirit of revenge the Indians went to the white settlement at Spirit Lake, March 6, 1857, massacred the men and took four women captives, two of whom were later rescued. Other settlements were attacked and altogether forty-two settlers were killed. An expedition was dispatched by Hon. Charles E. Flandrau, the Indian agent, but all escaped across the prairies into the wilds of Dakota territory, except the eldest son of Inkpaduta who was killed in an attempt to capture him.

The prosperity of the years prior to 1857 resulted in a demand for an extensive railroad system and for a state government for the territory: therefore Congress, on February 26, 1857, passed an act authorizing a constitutional convention and also granting a large amount of lands in aid of public schools. In March of the same year, Congress enacted legislation making large grants of lands to railroad companies. But as the year 1857 advanced, financiers began to feel the effects of uncertain conditions in the

East. Stringency in the money market was the rule and business was dull. Local bankers had little money for business loans, having invested heavily in real estate. The crash came August 28, when a telegram reached St. Paul announcing the suspension of several eastern banking institutions. Within a week real estate transactions ceased; payments became slower, past due accounts began to accumulate; gold commanded a stiff premium and soon disappeared from general circulation, and money of any kind was scarce. Early in October St. Paul banks suspended specie payments, more banking firms went under and instead of immigration an exodus from the territory had actually begun. Bankers held meetings and unsuccessfully urged Governor Samuel Medary to call an extra session of the territorial legislature. The Constitutional convention which had assembled at St. Paul July 13, acting on the instant demands of the people, incorporated into the fundamental laws of the proposed state the constitutional basis for a sounder financial policy, but it was not until after the Civil War that prosperity returned.

The proposed State Constitution adopted at the convention also changed the western boundary of the proposed state, which heretofore had extended to the Missouri river. The Red River of the North, the Boise des Sioux river, Lake Traverse and Big Stone Lakes with a line extending due south to the Iowa border, was the established western limits. The Constitution also provided for the election of state officers at the same time of voting on the adoption of the Constitution. The first state legislature convened December 2, 1857, and continued in session until March 25, 1858, when a recess was taken pending the admission of Minnesota to statehood by Congress. The act of admission was passed May 11, 1858, and the state's first governor, Henry H. Sibley, assumed office May 24. On June 3 the legislature having again assembled, Governor Sibley delivered his inaugural address and the state's lawmaking body continued in session until August 12, 1858. The first legislature worked diligently on financial and railroad legislation. To utilize the government land grant a scheme was devised aimed to aid companies who might be willing to undertake the construction of railroads. This act came to be known as the "Five Million Loan Bill," under which the credit of the state was loaned to that amount. It was proposed as an amendment to the constitution and was adopted by a large majority. There always was much opposition to the measure, however, and when the State Supreme Court later ruled that the constitutional provision did not require the railroads to give the state a prior lien on their property, the railroad bonds depreciated in value. Eastern financiers refused to buy the bonds and finally the entire scheme collapsed with the foreclosure of the mortgages which the state had taken upon railroad franchises and lands. The result was the abandonment of railroad construction temporarily. The total amount of bonds issued was \$2,275,000, and by foreclosing the state acquired about 250 miles of graded road, the franchises and the lands amounting to about five million acres indemnity.

Minnesota struggled desperately, in the period from 1858 to 1863, to overcome the financial disasters of 1857 and to regain the prosperity which, a few years before, had seemed the State's natural heritage. Abundant crops of 1859 and 1860 restocked the granaries, and it was hoped that the difficulties would be overcome. But the presidential campaign served only to develop the disturbing situation throughout the country, followed by the war period, commencing with the President's proclamation, in April, 1861, in which the young state not only contributed her full quota of men for the preservation of the Union, but also was forced to fight for her own existence through one of the worst Indian uprisings ever witnessed in America.

Governor Alexander Ramsey chanced to be at Washington on the twelfth of April, 1861, when news that Fort Sumter had been fired upon, and war, which so long had been a probability, became a reality. He hastened at once to the war department and offered one thousand men from Minnesota, the first tender of troops from any quarter after the fall of the Charlestown fortress. On April 15th President Lincoln's war proclamation was published, and on the 16th Ignatius Donnelly, acting governor, issued a call for the first regiment of volunteers, which was assembled, organized and quartered at Fort Snelling with amazing rapidity, and before Lee surrendered at Appomatox, thus ending the war of the Rebellion, Minnesota had furnished a total of 22,160 troops.

The war, calling so many able-bodied men from the State, left the frontiers almost defenseless and, although the Indians had more or less complaint to make regarding extortions practiced on them by post traders, no serious outbreaks had occurred. They were, however, becoming more and more restless and coming off their reservations at increasing recurring intervals.

A sentiment was growing among the whites that the Indians should adopt modes of civilization, the splendid agricultural lands which they control should not be left idle. Therefore, the head chiefs were induced to go to Washington, in 1858, in charge of Hon. Joseph R. Brown, for the purpose of negotiating for the transfer of the whole, or part, of the twenty-mile strip on the upper valley of the Minnesota river, which had been reserved for them by the treaties of 1851. The transfer was made and a ten-mile strip on the north side of the river was relinquished to the Government for an agreed price of \$140,000. The Government also provided that every head of a family, or single person over 21, adopting civilization, should receive in fee eighty acres of land. When, however, for some cause, the payments were not made and no money was divided, on account of the relinquishment, the more hostile Indians became rebellious. Internal strife arose and was augmented from time to time by the withdrawal of families who were willing to sever tribal relations and accept the civilization fund provided in the earlier treaties. These were, however, annuity Indians and had a right to be heard in councils. They numbered about six thousand two hundred and received an annual cash payment from the Government of

about fifteen dollars each. They were treated as wards of the Government and handled little or no actual cash, agencies having been established, around which gathered storekeepers who sold the Indians goods in anticipation of the annual payments.

The discontent continued to increase, however, and the hostile feeling against the whites was in no wise ameliorated by some injustices which crept in with the dealings at the agency stores, culminated in the great massacre of 1862.

On the seventeenth of August four Indian boys made a threatening attack upon a family in the township of Acton, twelve miles west of Litchfield. They drove the family to a neighbor's house, where, after an altercation, they killed three men and two women. They lost no time returning to camp and reporting what had happened. The Indians, after consultation, decided to stand by their fellows, and a general uprising followed by the entire Sioux bands. Their movements were so swift that before effective resistance could be brought about, eight hundred men, women and children were massacred within a few days.

State and national authorities took prompt action, and a detachment of volunteers, under command of General Sibley, aided by some Union troops, met the savages near Wood Lake, on September 23, overwhelmed them and released a large number of women and children, who had been taken captive. The 2,000 Indians captured were given a trial and 303 were found guilty of murder and rape and condemned to death by military court martial. A reprieve by President Lincoln saved all but thirty-eight of the most prominent, who were hanged at Mankato on the 26th of December, 1862. Many of the Indians who escaped capture fled into the Dakotas, but two expeditions were sent after them and, in 1864, the final chapter of the Sioux outbreak was written when the Indians surrendered their ponies and arms to the Government.

Settlers, who had lost property through the Indian raids, were compensated to the amount of \$1,370,374 following an investigation by a commission appointed by the Government. This money was taken from the trust fund, which had been created for the Indians under the treaties of 1851, and which amounted, at that time, to \$2,520,000. With the payments of the claims to settlers by act of congress, further annuities to the Indians were stopped.

Despite the drain of war upon the male population of the State an increased acreage was sown during this period and, with the beginning of Scandinavian immigration into Minnesota, the outlook appeared brighter for its future.

The close of the Civil War, in 1865, with the return of the soldiers, and with no further outbreaks by Indians, a new era of prosperity loomed. New railroad companies had been granted charters on the road-beds taken in the foreclosure proceedings of 1857, and during the next five years the population increased to 239,760. The Government was making large expenditures for war claims, war bounties, payments to discharged soldiers and the

payment of other bills made money plentiful. Agriculture was given a great impetus by the steady influx of immigration from northern European countries and the population steadily increased until, in 1875, Minnesota's population was 597,407. An effort was made, during this era of prosperity, to adjust the matter of the dishonored railroad bonds, but it was not until 1881, at an extra session of the legislature, that an act was passed authorizing final adjustment on the basis of 50 per cent, payments to be made from the proceeds of 500,000 acres of internal improvement lands.

The million-population mark was passed by the State between 1880 and 1885. The development of the Dakotas, subsequent to 1885 and the breaking up of virgin soil in that territory, doubled the wheat yield of the Northwest, and the Minnesota farmer turned his attention more to diversified activities, with especial reference to dairying.

From 1885 to 1890 the population continued to increase, the national census in the latter year giving Minnesota credit for 1,302,826 inhabitants, and five years later, in 1895, the state census showed a population of 1,527,619.

In April, 1898, the United States declared war on Spain, and Minnesota, following the example shown in the Civil War, was the first to respond to the call for troops, and furnished four regiments. They were designated the Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth. The first three were mustered into service at St. Paul, May 7, after being mobilized April 29. The Fifteenth Regiment was mustered into service July 18. A total of 5,315 officers and men were furnished by Minnesota. The Twelfth and Thirteenth were mustered out in November, 1898; the Fifteenth, March 27, 1899, and the Fourteenth, October 3, 1899.

At the beginning of the present century Minnesota's population was 1,751,394; the state enumeration taken in 1905 showed 1,979,912, and the federal census showed Minnesota's population to be 2,075,708, and by 1918 it was estimated that this had increased to 2,550,000.

During the four years, from August, 1914, the world has been in a turmoil and, although President Wilson did not declare war on Germany until April 7, 1917, Minnesota troops had been in active service more than a year prior to that date on the Mexican border. The first change from peace to militant activity for the State came with orders, June 18, 1916, for the Minnesota National Guard to go to Llano Grande, Tex. The First, Second and Third Regiments of Infantry and the Second Battalion of Field Artillery were mobilized at Fort Snelling (named Camp Bobleter), June 26. The Third Regiment left for the Texas border July 10; the First Regiment July 12; the Second Regiment July 15; the Second Battalion of Field Artillery July 20, and the First Battalion of Artillery Oct. 1, 1916.

After service on the Mexican border the Third Regiment was mustered out, at Fort Snelling, in December, 1916; the First Regiment was mustered out March 14, 1917; the Second Regiment was mustered out January 24, 1917, and the First Field Artillery Regiment was mustered out February 28, 1917.

When President Wilson issued his war proclamation against the Imperial German government, on Good Friday, April 7, 1917, Minnesota, therefore, was somewhat prepared, as the Minnesota National Guard's service in the Southwest had somewhat prepared them.

The First Minnesota Regiment was called out March 26, 1917, and mustered into service April 7; the First Field Artillery was called June 24 and mustered in July 20; and the Second and Third Infantry Regiments were called July 15 and mustered in at the companies' home stations at various dates from July 21 to 29. These three regiments were again sent to the Southwest, but this time were stationed at Camp Cody, near Deming, New Mexico. The First Field Artillery left for Camp Mills, L. I., September 4, 1917, and a few weeks later was sent to France, where it upheld the honor of the State and Nation as the 151st United States Field Artillery.

In June, 1917, the Conscription Act became effective and all men between the ages of 21 and 31 were registered for military service, and later this was extended to men up to 45. More than half a million Minnesota men were listed as registrants; and, up to the fall of 1918, nearly 100,000 of Minnesota's best manhood was in the Service, either with the Federalized National Guard or in the National Army.

To better enable Minnesota to do its share in the war, the legislature of 1917 passed an act creating the Commission of Public Safety, to be composed of seven members, including the Governor and Attorney General, and appropriated \$1,000,000 for its use. This commission had almost unlimited powers and was to continue in existence until three months after the war ended. One of the first acts of this commission was to create the Minnesota Home Guard, comprised of volunteers in practically every city and town in the State, and approximately 20,000 men, from 18 to 52, became members. The commission also adopted and enforced other orders, including the closing of saloons in certain sections of the State and aiding the Government in its "work or fight order," as well as establishing standard minimum prices to be charged for commodities. In addition to these activities the State co-operated fully with the National Government in bringing to bear every natural resource, including the output of the mines and forests.

The formation of three new regiments of Minnesota National Guard was also authorized, in the summer of 1918, by the Governor, to aid in home defense.

Toward the end of 1918 Minnesota suffered one of the most serious catastrophies in its history through forest and prairie fires. On the afternoon of October 12, a small blaze, which had been smouldering in the peat bogs of Aitkin county for weeks, fanned by a high wind, suddenly broke forth into a seething, blazing mass and swept across sections of Aitkin, Pine and Carlton counties toward Duluth. The fire, fifty miles in width, destroyed the thriving villages of Moose Lake and Cloquet and nearly 600 men, women and children lost their lives. The property loss reached \$30,000,000. The military authorities were sent to the scene and worked

for weeks rehabilitating the refugees; the people of the State responded quickly to the call for succor so that before winter set in, everything possible was done for the sufferers.

But the terrible calamity was expected to bring good results, for the people were aroused to the necessity of adequate protection in the future, not only of the lives of settlers in the forest area of Minnesota, but for the safeguarding of the forests themselves.

CHRONOLOGICAL

1635. Jean Nicollet, an explorer from France, who had wintered in the neighborhood of Green Bay, brought to Montreal the first mention of the aborigines of Minnesota.
- 1659-60. Groseilliers and Radisson wintered among the Sioux of the Mille Lacs region, Minnesota, being its first white explorers. In a previous expedition, four years earlier, they are thought to have come to Prairie Island, west of the main channel of the Mississippi, between Red Wing and Hastings.
1661. Father Rene Menard left Keweenaw, on Lake Superior, to visit the Hurons, then in northern Wisconsin, and was lost near the sources of the Black and Chippewa rivers. His breviary and cassock were said to have been found among the Sioux.
1679. July 2d, Daniel Greysolon Du Lhut (Duluth) held a council with the Sioux at their principal settlement on the shore of Mille Lacs. Du Lhut, in June, 1680, by way of the St. Croix river, reached the Mississippi and met Hennepin.
1680. Louis Hennepin, after captivity in the village of the Mille Lacs Sioux, first saw the Falls of St. Anthony.
1689. May 8th, Nicholas Perrot, at his Fort St. Antoine, on the Wisconsin shore of Lake Pepin, laid formal claim to the surrounding country for France. He built a fort also on the Minnesota shore of this lake, near its outlet.
1695. Le Sueur built a fort or trading post on Isle Pelee, now called Prairie Island, above Lake Pepin.
1700. Le Sueur established Fort L'Huillier, on the Blue Earth river (near the mouth of the Le Sueur), and first supplied the Sioux with firearms.
1727. The French established a third fort on Lake Pepin, with Sieur de La Perriere as commander.
1728. Great flood in the Mississippi.
1763. By the treaty of Versailles, France ceded Minnesota, east of the Mississippi, to England, and west of it to Spain.
1766. Captain Jonathan Carver visited St. Anthony Falls and Minnesota river. He claimed to have made a treaty with the Indians the following spring, at a cave afterward called "Carver's Cave," within the present limits of St. Paul, by which he said they ceded to him an immense tract of land, long known as "Carver's Claim," but never recognized by government.

1796. Laws of the Ordinance of 1787 extended over the Northwest Territory, including the northeastern third of Minnesota, east of the Mississippi river.
- 1798-1799. The Northwestern Fur Company established itself in Minnesota.
1800. May 7th, that part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi became a part of Indiana by the division of Ohio.
1803. April 30th, that part of Minnesota west of the Mississippi, for the preceding forty years in possession of Spain as a part of Louisiana, was ceded to the United States by Napoleon Bonaparte, who had just obtained it from Spain.
- 1803-04. William Morrison, the first known white man to discover the source of the Mississippi river, visited Elk lake and explored the streams entering into the lake forming the head of the river.
1805. Lieutenant Z. M. Pike visited Minnesota to establish government relations there, and obtained the Fort Snelling reservation from the Dakotas.
1812. The Dakotas, Ojibways and Winnebagos, under the lead of hostile traders, joined the British during the war. Red river colony established by Lord Selkirk.
1819. Minnesota, east of the Mississippi river, became a part of Crawford county, Michigan. Fort St. Anthony (renamed Fort Snelling in 1825), established, and a post at Mendota occupied by troops under command of Colonel Henry Leavenworth. Major L. Taliaferro appointed Indian agent, arriving in the autumn of that year.
1820. Corner stone of Fort St. Anthony, later called Fort Snelling, laid September 10th. Governor Cass visits Minnesota and makes a treaty of peace between the Sioux and Ojibways at Fort St. Anthony, Aug. 1. Colonel Josiah Snelling appointed to the command of the latter post.
1823. The first steamboat in Minnesota arrived at Mendota, May 10th, Beltrami being a passenger. Major Stephen H. Long explored the Minnesota river, the Red River valley, and the northern frontier. Beltrami explored sources of the Mississippi.
1826. Great flood on the Red river; a part of the colony driven to Minnesota, settling near Fort Snelling.
1832. Schoolcraft explored sources of Mississippi river, and named Lake Itasca (formerly called Elk lake).
1833. First mission established at Leech lake by Rev. W. T. Boutwell.
1834. The portion of Minnesota west of the Mississippi attached to Michigan. General H. H. Sibley settled at Mendota.
1835. Catlin and Featherstonhaugh visited Minnesota.
1836. The territory of Wisconsin organized, embracing the part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi, the part on the west being attached to Iowa. Nicollet visited Minnesota.

1837. Governor Dodge of Wisconsin made a treaty at Fort Snelling, with the Ojibways, by which the latter ceded all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries; a treaty was also effected at Washington with a deputation of Dakotas for their lands east of the Mississippi. These treaties led the way to the first actual settlements within the area of Minnesota.
1838. The treaty ratified by Congress. Franklin Steele makes a claim at St. Anthony Falls. Pierre Parrant makes a claim and builds a shanty on the present site of St. Paul.
1839. St. Croix county established.
1841. The "Chapel of St. Paul" built and consecrated, giving the name to the future capital of the State.
1843. Stillwater settled.
1846. August 6. The Wisconsin enabling act.
1847. The Wisconsin constitutional convention meets. The town of St Paul surveyed, platted and recorded in St. Croix county register of deeds' office. First improvement of the water power at the Falls of St. Anthony.
1848. May 29th, Wisconsin admitted, leaving the area of Minnesota without a government. August 26th, the "Stillwater convention" held, taking measures for a separate territorial organization, and asking that the new Territory be named Minnesota. October 30th, H. H. Sibley elected delegate to Congress.
1849. January 15th, H. H. Sibley admitted to a seat. March 3rd, the bill organizing Minnesota passed. March 19th, its territorial officers appointed. June 1st, Gov. Ramsey declared, by proclamation, the Territory organized. September 3rd, the first territorial legislature assembled.
1850. Great flood this year; highest water ever known. Minnesota river first navigated by steamboats. Census shows 6,077 inhabitants.
1851. Location of the capital, university, and penitentiary; another flood. July 23rd, treaty of Traverse des Sioux completed and August 5th the treaty of Mendota, opening the territory west of the Mississippi to settlers.
1852. June 23d, the treaties ratified by the United States Senate.
1853. Pierce's administration. W. A. Gorman appointed governor. The capitol building completed.
1854. Celebration of the opening of the Rock Island railroad, the first road to the Mississippi river, by a mammoth excursion, reaching St. Paul June 8th. Large immigration this season and the three succeeding ones, and the real estate mania commences.
1857. Enabling act passes Congress February 26th. Gov. Samuel Medary (appointed by Buchanan), arrives on April 22d. Legislature passes a bill to remove the capital to St. Peter, but it fails to accomplish the object. Ink-pa-du-ta massacre, April. Land grant passes Congress. April 27th, extra session of the legisla-

- ture to apportion land grant. July 13th, constitutional convention assembles. Real estate speculation reaches its height, and is checked by the financial panic, August 27th. Great revulsions and hard times. Census shows 150,037 population. October 13th, constitution adopted and State officers elected.
1858. State loan of \$250,000 negotiated. Five million loan bill passed by the legislature, March 9th; ratified by vote of people, April 15th. Great stringency in money market. State admitted May 11th. State officers sworn in, May 24th.
1859. Hard times continue to intensify. "Wright County War." "Glencoe" and "Owatonna" money issued. Work on the land grant roads ceases. Collapse of the five million scheme. First export of grain this fall. Hard political struggle; the Republicans triumph.
1860. Another warm political canvass. Federal census, 172,023.
1861. April 15th, president's proclamation for troops received; the first regiment recruits at once; June 22d, it embarks at Fort Snelling for the seat of war.
1862. Call for 600,000 men. July 2d, first railroad in Minnesota in operation, between St. Paul and Minneapolis. August 17th, massacre at Acton; August 18th, outbreak at Lower Sioux Agency, eight miles east of Redwood Falls; 19th, New Ulm attacked; 20th, Fort Ridgely attacked; 25th, second attack on New Ulm; 30th, Fort Abercrombie besieged; September 2d, the bloody attack at Birch Coulee. September 23d, battle of Wood Lake; 26th, captives surrendered at Camp Release; military commission tries 321 Indians for murder, rape, etc.; 303 condemned to die. December 26th, 38 hung at Mankato.
1863. General Sibley's expedition to the Missouri river; July 3d, Little Crow killed; July 24th, battle of Big Mound; July 26th, battle of Dead Buffalo Lake; July 28th, battle of Stony Lake.
1864. Large levies for troops. Expedition to Missouri river, under Sully. Inflation of money market. Occasional Indian raids.
1865. Peace returns. Minnesota regiments return and are disbanded. In all 22,016 troops furnished by the State. Census shows 250,099 inhabitants.
- 1866-72. Rapid railroad building everywhere; immigration heavy; "good times" prevail, and real estate inflated.
1873. January 7th, 8th, and 9th, polar wave sweeps over the State; seventy persons perish. September, the Jay Cooke failure creates another panic. Grasshopper raid begins and continues five seasons.
1876. September 7th, attack on bank at Northfield by a gang of armed outlaws from Missouri; three of the latter killed and three captured.
1877. Biennial session amendment adopted.
1878. May 2d, three flouring mills at Minneapolis explode; eighteen lives lost.

1880. November 15th, portion of the hospital for the insane at St. Peter destroyed by fire; eighteen inmates burned to death, seven died subsequently of injuries and fright, and six missing; total loss, \$150,000.
1881. March 1st, the state capitol destroyed by fire.
1883. August 21st, tornado in Olmsted County most destructive at Rochester; many homes wrecked and 26 people killed.
1884. January 25th, state prison partially burned.
1886. April 14th, a tornado strikes the cities of St. Cloud and Sauk Rapids, demolishing scores of buildings and killing about seventy people.
1887. Important legislation regarding the liquor traffic, common carriers, and elections.
1889. The legislature enacts the Australian system of voting in cities of 10,000 and over. The first electric street railway started in the State at Stillwater.
1890. United States census shows a population of 1,301,826. July 13th, an excursion steamboat returning from Lake City encampment foundered on Lake Pepin, and 100 people were drowned. July 13th, a tornado swept across Lake Gervais, in Ramsey County, demolishing several buildings and killing six people.
1891. June 15th, a series of tornadoes started in Jackson county, near the town of Jackson, traversing Martin, Faribault, Freeborn, Mower and Fillmore counties, on a line nearly parallel with, but from five to fifteen miles north of the Southern Minnesota division of the Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, doing a large amount of damage to farms and farm buildings, and causing death to about fifty people along the track of the storm.
1892. June 7th, national convention (Rep.) held at Minneapolis. The Australian system of voting used at the November general election.
1893. The legislature authorizes the appointment of a capitol commission to select a site for a new capitol, and providing a tax of two-tenths of a mill for ten years to pay for the site and the erection of a building. A great financial crisis causes the failure of several banks and many mercantile and manufacturing establishments in the larger cities of the State.
1894. September 1st, forest fires start in the neighborhood of Hinckley, in Pine county, carrying death and destruction over nearly four hundred square miles of territory, destroying the towns of Hinckley and Sandstone, causing the death of four hundred and seventeen people, rendering homeless and destitute twenty-two hundred men, women and children, and entailing a property loss of about one million dollars.
1895. A census of the State was taken during the month of June, and the total population of the State was found to be 1,574,619.
1896. The Red Lake Indian reservation was diminished to about a quarter part of its former area, and on May 15th a large tract of agri-

- cultural and timber lands formerly belonging to that reservation was opened for settlement.
1897. July 2d, the monument at Gettysburg to the First Minnesota Regiment was dedicated.
1898. July 27th, the corner stone of the new capitol was laid. Minnesota supplied four regiments for service in the Spanish war, being the first state, May 7th to respond to the President's call. October 5th, the Pillager Indians attacked United States troops near Sugar Point, Leech lake.
1899. Semi-centennial of the Territory and State celebrated by the old Settlers' Association, June 1st, and by the Historical Society, November 15th.
1900. Population of Minnesota, shown by the national census, 1,751,394. Death of Senator C. K. Davis, November 27th.
1901. In the Pan-American Exposition, at Buffalo, N. Y., the superior exhibits of wheat, flour, and dairy products of Minnesota caused her to be called "the Bread and Butter State."
1902. August 23rd, the fortieth anniversary of the Sioux war celebrated at New Ulm. Monuments and tablets erected there and at other places in the Minnesota valley.
1903. Tide of immigration into Minnesota, particularly in northern and western sections. April 22d. death of Alexander Ramsey, first territorial governor, later governor of the state, United States senator, and secretary of war.
1904. Louisiana Purchase Exposition. Minnesota exhibits win many first prizes for flour, butter, fruits, iron ores, work of pupils in schools, etc.
1905. January 3d, legislature convenes in the new capitol. The population, according to the State census, June 1st, was 1,979,912.
1906. September 3d, Live Stock Amphitheater on the State Fair ground dedicated, with address by James J. Hill. Attendance at the Fair on that day, 93,199; during the week, 295,000.
1907. Folwell Hall, the new main building for the College of Science, Literature and Arts, of the University of Minnesota, completed at cost of \$410,000 for the building and its equipment. The total number of students of this University enrolled in all departments for the year was 4,145.
1908. The fiftieth anniversary of the admission of Minnesota to statehood was celebrated in connection with the State Fair, its attendance during the week being 326,753.
1909. Death of Gov. John A. Johnson after an operation, at Rochester, Minn., Sept. 21, 1909. Lieut. Gov. Adolph O. Eberhart sworn in as governor by Chief Justice Start, in the Supreme Court retiring room, at 11 o'clock the same day.
1910. Population of Minnesota, shown by the national census, 2,075,708. Death of State Treasurer Clarence C. Dinehart June 8. E. S.

- Pettijohn appointed to succeed June 11. Forest fires in northern Minnesota during the second and third week in October, result in death to about 30 people and the destruction of about \$20,000,000 of property. Spooner and Baudette wiped out.
1911. The legislature ratified the proposed amendment to the United States Constitution for election of U. S. senators by popular vote. October 18th, George E. Vincent was inaugurated president of the University of Minnesota.
1912. The legislature in special session enacted a new primary election law and "corrupt practices" act. October 19th, the statue of Governor Johnson on the Capitol ground was unveiled.
1913. February 5th, former Governor Hubbard died in Minneapolis. June 16-20, the American Medical Association held in Minneapolis its sixty-fourth annual session.
1914. The total mileage of main line railways operated in this state was 9,002 miles, on June 30th, an increase of 54 miles from the mileage of 1913. July 4-11, the National Education Association held its annual convention in St. Paul.
1915. In November, the last bonds of indebtedness of the state resulting from the Five Million Loan bill for railroad building, enacted in 1858, were paid and burned. December 30th, Governor Hammond died of apoplexy in Clinton, La.; and on the same day Lieutenant Governor Burnquist took the oath of office as his successor.
1916. In February, iron and steel manufacture and production of Portland cement, each on a very large scale, were begun at Duluth. May 29th, James J. Hill, railway builder, organizer of the Great Northern Railway system, died at his home in St. Paul. July 19-21, the National Prohibition convention was held in St. Paul, for the presidential campaign.
1917. April 6th, the United States entered the World War, which began in the last days of July 1914. During nineteen months until the war closed, Minnesota gave over 80,000 men in the army service, 13,000 in the navy, and 6,000 in the marine corps, an aggregate of over 100,000 troops. July 1st, Marion LeRoy Burton began presidency of the State University.
1918. May 11th, dedication of the building of the Minnesota Historical Society, erected by the state at a cost of \$500,000. September 25th, Archbishop John Ireland died. Oct. 12-13, forest fires after a long drought, driven by a great wind, spread over a large area in Carlton county and the south part of St. Louis county, inflicting loss of more than 1,000 lives of agricultural settlers and residents in many villages with destruction of property exceeding \$30,000,000. November 11th, signature of an armistice terminated the World War and opened a new era of reconstruction. The people of Minnesota own 222,222 automobiles.

DESCRIPTIVE

NAME.

Minnesota derives its name from the river named "Minisota" by the Dakotas, pronounced "Min-nee-sotah" (Mini, water; sotah, sky-colored). To secure the correct pronunciation in English letters, the convention called at Stillwater, in 1848, to secure a territorial organization, instructed their delegates to see that the name of the Territory was written Min-ne-sota.

GEOGRAPHY.

Minnesota occupies the exact center of North America. The state is bounded on the south by Iowa, on the west by South and North Dakota, on the north by Manitoba and Ontario, and on the east by Wisconsin. It extends from latitude 43 degrees 30 minutes to 49 degrees 24 minutes, and from 89 degrees 29 minutes to 97 degrees 15 minutes west longitude. It is about 400 miles long and from its most eastern to the extreme western point about 354 miles wide. In a foot-note on article 2 of the State constitution the boundaries are fully defined, including a history of the projecting point beyond the forty-ninth parallel, shown upon the map.

AREA.

In area Minnesota is the tenth state of the Union. It contains 84,287 square miles, or about 53,943,379 acres, of which 3,608,012 acres are water. The headwaters of three great river systems are found in its limits, those of streams flowing northward to Hudson bay, eastward to the Atlantic ocean, and southward to the Gulf of Mexico. About half of this surface, on the south and west, consists of rolling prairie. The rest, embracing the elevated district west and north of Lake Superior, has rich mineral ranges. Throughout most of the timbered sections are fertile valleys and broad trenches of flat and slightly rolling tillable lands.

RIVERS.

But few states are so well watered as Minnesota. Its navigable rivers are the Mississippi, the Minnesota, the St. Croix, the Rainy river, the St. Louis, the Red River of the North, and the Red Lake river, all of which, near their sources, have extensive water powers. The smaller streams include the Rum river and Snake river, the Cannon and Zumbro rivers, the Vermillion, Crow, Blue Earth, Des Moines, Cottonwood, Chippewa, Le Sueur, Root, Elk and Sauk rivers. These with their tributaries and a host of lesser streams penetrate every portion of the State.

LAKES.

Within the State there are about ten thousand lakes, the largest of which is Red Lake, in the extreme central northern part of the State. On the same northern slope, in St. Louis county, is the beautiful Vermilion lake, with its tributaries. Bordering on the northeast corner of the State for one hundred and fifty miles, the waters of the great Lake Superior wash its shores. On the southern slope of the State is Itasca lake, the source of the Mississippi, with Cass lake, Lake Winnibigoshish, Leech lake, and other innumerable lakes, all adding volume to the water of the Mississippi, eventually flowing into the Gulf of Mexico. Then we have Mille Lacs, the source of Rum river, and the picturesque Lake Minnetonka. These are the largest lakes in the State. Of these, only Minnetonka, White Bear, Bald Eagle and Chisago lakes have so far been much utilized as summer resorts. The northeastern and southwestern sections each have numerous lakes to attract the summer visitor.

ELEVATION.


The shore of Lake Superior is the lowest land in the State, 602 feet above sea level. The waters of the northeastern part of the State south of the Mesabi iron range flow into Lake Superior, and are carried to the Atlantic ocean. The Mississippi river, having its chief source in Lake Itasca, at 1,466 feet elevation, runs in a southerly direction, leaving the State at 620 feet above sea level.

The Red River of the North, rising in the north, near Itasca lake, at a height of 1,600 feet above the ocean, leaves the State at an elevation of 750 feet. The average elevation of the State is given at about 1,275 feet. The highest elevation is the Misquah hills, in Cook county, 2,230 feet.

CLIMATE.

Minnesota has an annual mean temperature of 44 degrees, while its mean summer temperature is 70 degrees, the same as that of middle Illinois and Ohio, southern Pennsylvania, etc. Its high latitude gives it correspondingly longer days in summer than states further south, and during the growing season there are two and one-half hours more sunshine than in the latitude of Cincinnati. The winters are not severe. The rainfall in summer is abundant. In every way the climate of Minnesota is ideal.

STATE FORESTS AND PARKS

The importance of the woods of Minnesota as a playground for the people of not only this State but of the whole middle west does not receive the consideration that it should. They are among the State's most valuable assets. Our forest stretches over hundreds of thousands of acres unbroken, save here and there a lake or a rugged hogback splits the area. The woods so closely resemble the woods of Maine that only an expert can tell the difference. Wild life abounds.

For the small boy, who bobs for perch in the shallow lakes, or the scientific angler who casts for muscullonge, there is sport galore. The black bass specialist finds plenty of sport in the lakes and streams of the southern and central northern part of the state. The streams and the lakes of the northeast abound in speckled and lake trout, and for the fisherman who simply wants to catch fish, pike, crappies, blue gills and pickerel can be pulled from the water almost anywhere.

Nor are our North Woods without scenery. It is hard for the prairie dweller to realize that there are near mountains in his own state, but they are there,—mountains rising to an altitude of over 2,000 feet, carved into rocky cliffs and spruce covered peaks. Set right into this backbone of broken country are hundreds of island-dotted lakes, the ideal campers' country.

Since the Minnesota Forest Service first took up the work of calling attention to the beauties and possibilities of the North Woods, there has been an apparent increase in the number of summer vacationists who seek out "the land of sky-blue waters" as a place for recreation. The improvement work of the Forest Service has been of great assistance to the campers and tourists who annually go into the forest regions.

The State Forest Service expects from all campers co-operation in its work of guarding the forests from fires. In return it will do all within its power to make the summer vacation the pleasantest possible.

BURNTSIDE STATE FOREST.

Ten miles west of Ely, Minnesota, the State owns 20,000 acres of rocky non-agricultural land close to Burntside Lake, known as the Burntside Forest. This tract was granted to the state by act of Congress, April 28, 1904, for tree propagation and playground purposes. It lies in two separate pieces in township 63 N., range 14 W., and town 64 N., range 13 W. It is in the rocky lake region of northeastern Minnesota, where there are large areas impossible of cultivation. The forest contains forty-three lakes, all connected, and one of the noted canoe routes of the state passes through it. The entire district can be developed into a splendid playground. The abundance of fish and big game make it especially attractive.

ITASCA STATE PARK.

Situated in the beautiful Lake Park region of Minnesota, Itasca Park possesses most attractive opportunities for an outing. Douglas Lodge, built from among the pines, offers to the rest-seeker all the physical comforts of the city, enhanced by the soothing quiet of the forest. Fish are plentiful and of many species. Beaver, elsewhere practically extinct, abound in the lakes and streams. A band of elk were placed in the Park during the spring of 1914. Reachable by auto, mail and telephone, the park is yet so far removed from the outside world that the roar of a train never penetrates its solitudes. There are 22,000 acres of forest and lake in the confines of the park, which is in all respects an ideal spot for healthful recreation.

Itasca State Park was established by the legislature of 1891 as a park embracing the headwaters of the Mississippi river. Congress granted the state all unpatented lands within its boundaries, on condition that the state acquire the privately owned lands and timber and maintain it as a park forever. The acquisition of the private lands proceeded slowly because of lack of funds, but the legislature of 1913 made an appropriation sufficient to complete the title of the state to all of the land in the park.

During the spring of 1914 the Forest Service began the work of planting forest trees on areas not bearing desirable tree growth.

Itasca Park is accessible by road from Park Rapids, Bemidji, Shevlin, Bagley and La Porte.

PILLSBURY FOREST.

In 1899, the estate of the late Hon. John S. Pillsbury donated 1,000 acres of cut-over non-agricultural pine land to the state of Minnesota, to be administered by the Forestry Board as a State Forest. Two-thirds of any revenue which may accrue from the forest shall flow into the fund of the state university. In honor of the donor, the tract has been called "Pillsbury Forest."

The land lies in Cass county, close to Gull Lake, approximately the geographical center of the state. Since the tracts were logged, the land has been so swept by fires that reproduction was greatly retarded. However, a growth of scrubby poplar and birch has come in over much of the acreage.

In 1904 a small nursery was established on the forest, with a little money saved from the Forestry Board appropriation of 1903. During the spring of 1913 and 1914, the Forest Service planted over 110 acres of the land not reseeding naturally to pine. Norway and white pine, and white and Norway spruce have been used. This work gives promise of excellent results.

INTERSTATE PARK AT THE DALLES OF THE ST. CROIX.

In 1895 the State of Minnesota, by a legislative act, set aside a tract of about 110 acres in the town of Taylors Falls, Chisago county, as a public park, to be called the State Park of the Dalles of the St. Croix. An act was also passed by the Wisconsin legislature of the same year, which pro-

vided a commission to ascertain the probable cost of acquiring a larger tract for a state park on the opposite side of the St. Croix river; and in 1899 and 1901 the State of Wisconsin passed acts for the purchase of lands there, amounting to about 600 acres. The original park on the Minnesota side of the river has been extended to an area of about 150 acres, and plans are under consideration for further extension to a total of about 500 acres in Minnesota. The two states have thus established an Interstate Park, including the grand and picturesque rock gorge called the Upper Dalles of the St. Croix, where the river for a distance of two-thirds of a mile, at and just south of the village of Taylors Falls, flows through a chasm walled by cliffs of rock 75 to 150 feet high.

MINNEOPA STATE PARK.

Under Chapter 297, G. L. 1905, provision was made for the purchase of land containing Minneopa Falls, near Mankato, to establish and create a public park, to be known as "The Minneopa State Park." The sum of \$5,000 was appropriated for that purpose. Under section 3, the general care and supervision of the park, until otherwise provided for, was vested in the state auditor. J. B. Hodge is superintendent or caretaker of the park.

The Indian word "Minneopa" means water of two falls. Indian lore connects a number of legends with the falls, the names of great Indian chiefs, pow-wows and the romantic wooing of the Indian maid.

The park is four miles west of Mankato, easily accessible by railroad and driveways. It includes a tract of about sixty acres, through which runs Minneopa river, the waters of which dash with the beauty of a Minnehaha over a ledge sixty feet to a gorge below. There are two falls, but a few rods apart. The falls are seventy-five feet wide, surrounded by towering hills.

ALEXANDER RAMSEY STATE PARK.

Ramsey State Park is situated at the junction of the Ramsey creek with Redwood river, just above the point where the Redwood valley opens out into the bottom lands of the Minnesota river, and a part of the city of Redwood Falls. This park, with its magnificent falls and winding streams, is among the prettiest of the states reservations. It was named after Alexander Ramsey, the first governor of the territory and the second governor of the state. Adjacent to the Ramsey Park is the city park of Redwood Falls.

Ramsey Park is within a short distance of nearly every point of interest connected with the Indian outbreak of 1862: Fort Ridgely, where the first engagement was fought; the stone building, which was the principal agency headquarters and is the most important structure of reservation days still standing; the sites of the early trading posts; the Indian stone church, built from the ruins of the first mission church of the valley, now in use by a colony of Indians; the Morton monuments erected to the memory of soldiers slain in the battle and to Indians friendly to the whites during the conflict; Birch Coulee battlefield, Brown's castle and the upper Sioux

Agency; the Wood Lake monument where the closing battle of the Minnesota campaign was fought, and the sod stockade erected for protection to the first white settlement on the reservation which was the beginning of the present town of Redwood Falls.

HORACE AUSTIN STATE PARK.

This park, a late acquisition, is located at Austin and is named in honor of the sixth Governor of Minnesota. The park consists of 50 acres of water of the Red Cedar river and a number of deeply wooded islands.


The waters abound in black bass, pickerel, crappies and perch.

Horace Austin Park marks a historical site in Southern Minnesota. According to the "Journal of the Marches of the First United States Dragoons 1834-1845," companies B, H and I of that famous organization camped here in 1835. In 1836 a party of hunters from Fort Snelling were encamped here. That party was headed by Major Laurence Taliaferro and among the hunters was Dr. John Emerson, surgeon at Fort Snelling. With him was his slave Dred, who had just married Harriet, whom Major Taliaferro had sold to the surgeon. This "Dred" became famous by reason of the "Dred Scott" decision in later years. In 1846 H. H. Sibley, Alexander Faribault, Wm. H. Forbes, John C. Fremont and a party of Sioux Indians were camped here. In October, 1841, Sibley, as agent for the American Fur Company, came here with Sioux Indians and spent the winter trapping and hunting, the camp being on the land now included in the park. Sibley's diary shows they got 2,000 deer, 50 elk, 50 bears, and a few buffalo. The old territorial road forms the west and south lines of the park.

JAY COOKE STATE PARK.

Jay Cooke State Park in Carlton County is one of the State's newest recreation spots. Over 2,000 acres were secured as a nucleus and during the past summer 318 acres have been added. This park is located 15 miles from the city of Duluth and is remarkably beautiful. To serve the purpose for which it was secured construction and road development are necessary that the park may become accessible from adjacent cities.

THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

OFFICERS FOR 1919.

The constitution of the State provides that these officers shall be elected for two years, except the state auditor, whose term of office is for four years. They constitute the executive department.

The Governor. The duties of the governor are prescribed by the constitution and the laws of the state. The office assistants of the governor are a private secretary, executive clerk, two stenographers and executive messenger. Connected with the executive office is the appointment of notaries public.

The Lieutenant Governor is ex-officio president of the senate, and has no other duties to perform, except in a protracted absence of the governor from the state he may be called to act. In case of vacancy in the office he becomes governor during said vacancy.

The Secretary of State is the recording officer of the state and the official custodian of official papers. All the private and public corporations of the State are recorded, and the official bonds of all state and county officers are filed in this office. He is the custodian of all the volumes of laws and journals and all the legislative records of whatever nature as well as the United States government surveys of Minnesota, recently turned over to the state. The whole machinery of state elections and the final canvassing of votes is carried forward in his office. The preparation of the volumes of law for publication is part of his duty, and the care and disposition of all printed executive documents of the state. His office is the place of registration of motor vehicles. For the general purposes of the office, the clerical force is an assistant secretary, a chief clerk, one record clerk, a clerk of government surveys, a document clerk, a general clerk, an automobile clerk, an assistant automobile clerk, and a number of other employees.

The State Auditor has charge of two departments of the government, the auditing department and the land department. The auditing department is to keep a record of all public accounts, audit all claims presented, and issue warrants in payment. He has charge of the tax law, makes all the

drafts for state taxes, and keeps an account of the same, and is required to make a detailed and exhaustive report of the affairs of his office to the legislature.

The duties of the land department are the care and sale of school, university, agricultural, college and swamp lands; the leasing of mineral lands; and the making out and record of all deeds and conveyances for the disposition of lands, besides keeping a classified account of all money transactions connected with these lands.

The Treasurer is the receiving and disbursing officer of the State. His duties are defined by law to keep an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements of the treasury, specifying the names of persons from whom received, to whom paid, on what account the same is received and paid out, and the time of such receipt and payment. For all payments into the state treasury by county treasurers he issues two receipts, one to the treasurer and the other to the county auditor.

The Attorney General is the legal adviser of all the departments of State, and counsel for the State or departments in all suits at law; prosecutes all official bonds of delinquent officers; prepares all forms of contracts; receives reports of criminal actions in all the counties of the State from the county attorneys, and makes a biennial report to the legislature. He has five assistant attorney generals.

(The Legislature of 1917, (chapter 61, S. F. No. 109) created the office of **Deputy Attorney General**).

ADMINISTRATIVE.

The Department of Public Examiner was created in 1878. The public examiner is appointed by the governor for the term of three years. It is required that he shall be a skillful accountant. The duties of this officer, being of a fiduciary character, his bonds were fixed at \$50,000. The law gives him almost unlimited power in the examination of the accounts of public officers, state, county, city, village and school district and the prescribing of systems of accounting. The law providing for the department of public examiner was re-enacted in 1913 with important amendments.

The Insurance Department was organized in 1872. The department has supervision of all classes of insurance companies, doing business in the state. The commissioner is required to examine each domestic company at least once in two years, and he may examine foreign companies whenever in his opinion such examination is necessary. By the provisions of a law passed in 1913 the commissioner is given authority to pass upon securities issued by insurance companies doing business in this state. In August 1917, Gov. J. A. A. Burnquist made the insurance commissioner also the state fire marshal, and chief state boiler inspector.

Department of Banking. By an act of the 1909 legislature the visitation of state banks, etc., was divorced from the public examiner's office, and a new department under the above caption created. By the act the superintendent of banks, or his deputies, is given authority to visit each of the banking, savings and other moneyed corporations created under the laws of this state, and thoroughly examine into their affairs and ascertain their financial condition at least once in each year. His term is for three years. The law also requires the superintendent of banks to ascertain the financial standing of all bondsmen of state and county officials and pass upon the sufficiency of such bonds.

Dairy and Food Department. This department has supervision of the dairying and buttermaking industries, it is also charged with the enforcement of laws designed to prevent fraud and deception in the manufacture and sale of articles intended for human consumption. It is required to take proper educational measures to foster and promote the manufacture and sale of pure food products. Its chief executive officer is appointed by the governor for a term of two years. Inspectors are required to pass a civil service examination. Officers of the department are given access to all places where food is manufactured, stored and sold, or where cows or other domestic animals are pastured and stabled, and to railroad cars, warehouses, etc. The dairy and food commissioner was made chief oil inspector by Gov. J. A. A. Burnquist in August 1917.

The Department of Labor and Industries was created by the legislature in 1887. The present department consists of four bureaus: a bureau of statistics, a bureau of factory inspection, a bureau of women and children, and a bureau of state free employment, with offices in St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth. The department is empowered to enforce all laws regulating the employment of minors and women; the protection of health, lives, limbs and rights of employes; to gather statistics relating to industrial accidents and to all branches of labor, labor troubles and unions, and to enforce the compulsory education laws.

Oil Inspection Department. For the purpose of inspecting illuminating oils, gasoline, etc., made, or offered for sale or sold in the state, the governor, with the consent of the senate, is authorized to appoint a chief inspector of oils. The dairy and food commissioner was made chief oil inspector by Gov. J. A. A. Burnquist in August 1917.

State Fire Marshal's Department. The legislature of 1913 passed an act revising the laws relating to the state fire marshal. The act provides for the appointment by the governor of a state fire marshal and a first assistant. The marshal is authorized to appoint two deputy fire marshals and such other special deputies and clerks as may be necessary to carry on the work of the department. The State insurance commissioner was made State fire marshal August 1, 1917.

Hotel Inspection. All hotels and restaurants in the state are under the supervision of a hotel inspector appointed by the governor for a term of two years. The inspector is required to inspect each hotel and restaurant at least once a year and may enforce sanitary and other regulations in regard to the same. Inspection fees (\$2 annually for each hotel or restaurant) are turned into the state treasury and the inspector and his assistants paid regular salaries.

Apiary Inspection. An inspector of apiaries at a salary of \$1,500 a year and such deputies as may be required, to be paid \$5 a day, but not more than \$500 in all in any one year, are provided for in Chap. 311, Laws 1911. The inspector has charge of the work of the suppression of contagious diseases among bees and is given large powers along that line.

COMMISSIONS AND BOARDS.

Railroad and Warehouse Commission. The first legislation enacted in Minnesota for the regulation of railroads was the act providing for a railroad commissioner, to be appointed by the governor, approved March 4, 1871. The term of office was fixed at two years; the salary was made \$3,000 per annum. Governor Austin appointed A. J. Edgerton, who served until March, 1875. The statute was superseded by a law enacted March 6, 1874, creating a board of railroad commissioners of three members, to be appointed by the governor for a term of two years. The powers of the board were largely increased. In 1875 the office was made elective, with only one commissioner, but on March 5, 1885, the three member commission, to be appointed by the governor, was again created. In 1899 the commission was made elective. Ira B. Mills, Joseph G. Miller and Charles F. Staples were the members elected in November of 1890. The first secretary of the commission was Eli S. Warner, who served from January, 1885, till January, 1889. He was succeeded by Tams Bixby, who served until September, 1890, when he resigned. He was succeeded by A. K. Teisburg, who served until September, 1901. A. C. Clausen was appointed at that time and is the present secretary.

Weights and Measures. This department was created by the legislature of 1911, and placed under the jurisdiction of the railroad and warehouse commission. A commissioner of weights and measures and a corps of inspectors are employed by this department. Weights and measures conform to the standards at Washington.

Grain Inspection. Minnesota has had a system of inspection, weighing and registration of grain since June 1, 1885. The inspection department is under the supervision of a chief inspector, who is appointed by the railroad and warehouse commission, and it is divided into eight districts, St. Paul, Minneapolis, St. Cloud, Duluth, New Prague, Montgomery, Sleepy Eye, and Winona, each comprising a district. In each of these districts a chief deputy inspector has direct control of the work, and has in charge as many deputies and helpers as the work requires. Each district except Sleepy Eye has a weighing department in charge of a state weighmaster, with such number of assistant weighers as he may require. Assistant weighers are also stationed at Faribault, Kasota, Appleton, Morristown, Montgomery, Waseca, New Richland, Hastings, Wabasha, Red Wing, and Little Falls in this state and at La Crosse and Osceola, Wisconsin.

Board of Grain Appeals. There are two of these boards, one at Minneapolis and one at Duluth. Each board consists of three members appointed by the governor for a term of three years, one member being appointed

each year. The boards are required to meet annually in joint session to establish grades of all grain to be known as "Minnesota Grades." Appeals may be taken to these boards from the decisions of the inspectors in their territory as to grades and dockage.

Commissioner of Highways. The State Highway Commission, as such, was abolished by the 1917 legislature and one commissioner was provided for, to be appointed by the governor and to be known as "Commissioner of Highways" upon whom devolved all powers, rights, duties, privileges and obligations theretofore imposed upon the State Highway Commission. The offices of "Secretary of the Highway Commission" and of "State Engineer" were likewise abolished.

The Minnesota Tax Commission, created in 1907, exercises general supervision over the administration of the assessment and taxation laws of the state, over assessors, town, county and city boards of review and equalization, and all other assessing officers. It is given power to issue instructions and directions to local assessors. All public officers are required to report to it as to the assessment of property and collection of taxes received from licenses and other sources.

Game and Fish Commissioner. The execution of the laws relating to the propagation and preservation of game and fish is made the duty of a state game and fish commissioner, appointed for a term of four years by the governor. Other employes and officers of the department include a superintendent of fisheries, superintendents of the several hatcheries, and a force of wardens.

Board of Inspectors of Steam Vessels and Boilers. It is the duty of the inspectors to inspect all steam vessels and steam boilers in use in the state and to grant certificates of license to steam engineers. The board meets once a year in St. Paul to establish regulations for the inspection of vessels and boilers, etc. Masters and pilots are examined and licensed by the inspectors. All fees are retained by the board.

The Minnesota State Board of Immigration was created by an act of the legislature approved April 22d, 1907. The act provides that the governor, auditor, and secretary of state shall be ex-officio members, and they are empowered to select two additional members to hold their offices for the term of two years. The duties of the board are to collect, arrange and disseminate statistics and other information in reference to the lands and general and special resources of the State of Minnesota, and the advantages of this state as a place of residence.

Printing Commission. The public printing of the State of Minnesota is under the control of commissioners of printing, comprising the secretary of state, state auditor and state treasurer.

State Forestry Board. The legislature at the 1911 session repealed all laws enacted prior to that time relating to a forest and fire commissioner, and placed an entirely new law on the statute books which makes provisions for a forestry board of nine members. The board elects a secretary and a state forester, and has general charge of the state forest service.

State Board of Timber Commissioners. The governor, treasurer, auditor, state forester and attorney general constitute this board. The governor is chairman of the board and the auditor secretary. Its duties are the care, conservation and sale of state timber.

State Drainage Commission. This commission consists of the governor, the state auditor and the secretary of state. This commission names the state drainage engineer and his assistants. This board places contracts and supervises all contracts for drainage work authorized by the legislature.

Reclamation Board. A reclamation board was created by the 1911 session. The board consists of three members, appointed by the governor, whose duty it is to select 40-acre tracts of state swamp or stumpage land, and to improve and sell the same. Eight thousand dollars was appropriated for this purpose. No appropriations have since been made.

The Minnesota Public Library Commission was created by an act of legislature in April, 1899. The board of directors is composed of the president of the State University, the state superintendent of education, the secretary of the State Historical Society, each ex-officio, and two other members appointed by the governor. The commission maintains a "state circulating library from which any town, village, or community may borrow books."

Minimum Wage Commission. This commission, provided for by the legislature of 1913, consists of the commissioner of labor, an employer of women, and a secretary, the two last named being appointed by the governor. It is the duty of the commission to establish a minimum wage to be paid to women and minors throughout the state and to see that not less than such minimum wage is paid.

The State Board of Investment consists of the governor, state auditor and state treasurer. This board controls the investment of the trust funds in the state treasury, and no purchase or disposition of securities can be made without its favorable action. The 1917 Legislature provided for a permanent secretary.

State Board of Audit. The governor, secretary of state and attorney general constitute this board. It is required to audit the accounts of the state treasurer at least four times a year. A report of the examination is made to the legislature the third day of the session.

State Board of Deposit. The state treasurer, secretary of state, state auditor, attorney general and public examiner make up this board. The board is required to designate the banks in which state moneys are to be deposited, approve their bonds, and prescribe the maximum amount to be deposited in each.

State Board of Parole. This board was created by the 1911 session, with power to parole prisoners from the state penal institutions, after a certain portion of the time has been served. The same act provides for the indeterminate sentence plan. The board consists of a member of the board of control oldest in the point of service, the warden at the penitentiary, and a third to be appointed by the governor.

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The Board of Pardons was created by Chapter 23 of the General Laws of 1897, and consists of the governor, chief justice of the supreme court and the attorney general. It has power to grant pardons and to commute the sentence of any person convicted of any offense against the laws of this state. The board meets quarterly.

State Board of Law Examiners. This board consists of not less than five nor more than seven attorneys at law, appointed for a term of three years by the justices of the supreme court. Its officers are a president, secretary and treasurer. It is required to hold public examinations of persons desirous of being admitted to the bar and report to the supreme court at least three times a year. Certificates authorizing the holder to practice law are issued by the board upon an order by the court.

Board of Visitors. This board was created by the 1907 legislature. Meetings are held quarterly or oftener if required. The members are required to study the care and management of charitable and correctional institutions and visit those within the bounds of the state. The governor may order the board to investigate any penal or charitable institution. The report of any such investigation is to be made to the governor and transmitted to the legislature.

Board of Women Visitors for the Minnesota Home School for Girls. This is an advisory board appointed by the governor, and consists of five women. It advises with the board of control with respect to buildings to be erected for the Home School and is required to visit the institution twice a year, inspect the cottages and inquire into the condition and treatment of the inmates.

Advisory Commission for the State Sanitarium for Consumptives. This commission consists of five physicians, one of whom must belong to the homeopathic school, appointed by the governor for a term of five years. All plans for buildings must be approved by the advisory commission. The commission appoints examining physicians, not more than three from each county, to pass upon applications for admission to the sanitarium.

State Board of Accountancy. Provision for this board was made by the legislature of 1909. It consists of three skilled accountants appointed by the governor for a term of three years. It is authorized to grant certificates to persons who have successfully passed an examination in accounting, auditing and commercial law affecting accounting.

State Board of Health and Vital Statistics. The revised laws of 1913 materially enlarged the duties of this board. In addition to its duties relative to the commonly accepted contagious diseases, it has authority to deal with the manufacture into articles of commerce, other than food, of diseased animal or vegetable matter; scavenging, disposal of sewage; location of mortuaries and cemeteries, removal and burial of the dead; pollution of streams and other waters; the sanitary construction, equipment and conduct of all public institutions, of lodging houses and other public sleeping places kept for gain, the collection, recording, and reporting of vital statistics, and the adoption of rules and regulations generally for the safeguarding of the public health. All health officers throughout the state must be medical men.

State Board of Medical Examiners consists of nine physicians appointed by the governor. The board must include three homeopathic physicians. It is authorized to grant licenses upon examination to persons desirous of practicing medicine, revoke licenses for cause, and license midwives. Examinations are held at St. Paul the first Tuesday in January, April, June and October.

The State Board of Dental Examiners consists of six practicing dentists appointed by the governor, each for a term of three years. Meetings are held at the college of dentistry of the state university in March and November, and other meetings at the pleasure of the board. The board is authorized to revoke licenses for cause.

The State Board of Osteopathy consists of five osteopathic physicians appointed by the governor. Its officers are a president and secretary. Its regular meetings are the second Tuesday of March and September. It is authorized to examine applicants and grant licenses to practice osteopathy.

The State Board of Pharmacy consists of five registered pharmacists appointed by the governor for a term of five years. The state pharmaceutical association may recommend five names for each appointment to be made from which the governor may select. It has general supervision over all places where drugs, medicines and poisons are sold, compounded or manufactured. The board is required to meet at least once in every three months to examine applicants for registration as pharmacists and assistants.

The State Board of Optometry consists of five optometrists appointed by the governor for a term of three years. The board is required to meet at least once a year at St. Paul to examine applicants for certificates to practice optometry.

The State Board of Examiners of Nurses was provided for by the 1907 session of the legislature. The act makes it unlawful to practice professional nursing without first obtaining a certificate of registration. The board, which is composed of five persons appointed by the governor, holds examinations at least once in each year at its headquarters in St. Paul.

The State Barbers' Board consists of three members appointed by the governor, each for a term of two years. One of these must be recommended by a barber's union. The board is required to hold at least one examination yearly in each of four different cities and to grant certificates to successful applicants. Its headquarters are at the state capital.

The State Live Stock Sanitary Board was established by Chapter 352. Laws of 1903. consists of five members appointed by the governor, three of whom are persons financially interested in the breeding and maintenance of live stock. The remaining two members are graduate veterinarians practicing in the state. The duties of the board are to protect the health of the domestic animals of the state. The board is required to hold quarterly meetings in St. Paul. The secretary and executive officer, together with the field veterinarians, are required to be graduate veterinarians.

The Stallion Registration Board was created by the 1907 session of the legislature. It is made up of the professor of animal husbandry of the Minnesota College of Agriculture, the veterinary of the State Experimental Sta-

tion and the president of the Minnesota Horse Breeders' Association. The act makes suitable provision for the inspection of all animals subject to registration and provides for a licensing of the animal by the board.

The State Veterinary Examining Board consists of five qualified veterinarians appointed by the governor for a term of five years. It is authorized to issue licenses upon examination to persons wishing to practice the veterinary profession.

The Horseshoers' Board of Examiners consists of five members appointed by the governor for a term of five years. Two must be master horseshoers, two journeymen horseshoers and one a veterinarian. Persons not having certificates are not allowed to practice horseshoeing in cities of the first class.

The State Board of Electricity consists of five members appointed by the governor, each for a term of five years. Two members of the board must be master electricians, two journeymen electricians recommended by unions of the craft, and one a consulting engineer or electrical inspector of a city. The board is authorized to issue licenses to persons wishing to engage in the occupation of operating, installing or repairing electrical wires or apparatus after examination.

The State Board of Arbitration for the settlement of labor disputes consists of three members appointed by the governor for a term of two years, one from among employers of labor, one not an employer recommended by a labor union, and a third who shall be neither employer nor a laborer on the recommendation of the other two.

Board of Armory Supervisors. The governor, brigade commander or adjutant general and the commanding officers of the several regiments and the battalion of field artillery compose this board. The duty of the board is to approve the selection of all armory sites, plans and specifications and to contract for the erection of armory buildings. All armories are under its supervision.

Automobile Board. A board of automobile examiners, appointed by the governor, has been provided for. This board holds examinations for chauffeurs at such times as may be designated by the secretary of state.

The State Securities Commission was created by the 1917 legislature under an Act "to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds or other securities sold or offered for sale within the state of Minnesota." The commission has offices in the capitol and main duty is to prevent what is popularly called "Blue-sky" speculation. It is composed of the Attorney General, State Insurance Commissioner and State Public examiner with a secretary. The law became effective July 1, 1917.

THE MINNESOTA COMMISSION OF PUBLIC SAFETY.

This body was created by the 1917 legislature. It was composed of seven members, including the governor and attorney general as ex-officio members. The governor was chairman. Senator George H. Sullivan, author of the bill creating the commission put the measure through in probably one of the shortest periods of time ever experienced in the passage of important legislation in Minnesota, probably through patriotic fervor, which was high at the time.

An appropriation of \$1,000,000 was placed at the disposal of the commission for the purpose of helping Minnesota to carry out the nation's war with Germany. Its activities were to terminate within three months after the war was ended.

In broadest terms power was given this commission to do "all acts and things non-inconsistent with the constitution or laws of the State of Minnesota or of the United States, which are necessary or proper for the public safety and for the protection of life and public property, or private property of a character as in the judgment of the commission requires protection."

Out of the \$1,000,000 appropriated approximately \$450,000 was paid (as authorized by the act) to Minnesota soldiers on a basis of 50 cents a day for each man serving on the Mexican border in 1916.

The commission was organized within a week after the passage of the act with C. H. March, Litchfield, vice-chairman; and as the committee on agriculture; J. F. McGee, Minneapolis, committee on military affairs; John Lind, Minneapolis, committee on labor; C. W. Ames, St. Paul, committee on civics and A. C. Weiss, Duluth, committee on publicity.

Steps were immediately taken to organize throughout Minnesota every man, woman and child as a part of the state's war activities plan. In every county a suitable person was named county director and instructed to organize his county to carry out the purposes of the commission. A military organization known as the Minnesota Home Guard also was created by the commission.

Woman's activities were separately organized on parallel lines under the general direction of the commission and by its appointment of Mrs. T. G. Winter, Minneapolis as head of the Women's Organization.

THE MILITARY DEPARTMENT.


The active military forces of the state are officially known as The National Guard of Minnesota. In time of peace the National Guard is composed of three regiments of infantry and one regiment of field artillery; all with attached sanitary troops. The commander-in-chief is authorized to increase this force in time of war.


Answering the call of President Wilson, issued June 18, 1916, for service on the Mexican Border, the various companies of the National Guard of Minnesota assembled at their local armories, were in turn mobilized at Fort Snelling (christened Camp Bobleter for the occasion) and were mustered into the Federal Service. Later the officers and men were transferred to the Mexican Border, where they are still in the service of the Government.

At the outbreak of the war in April 1917 Minnesota had three regiments of infantry and one of field artillery. All four of these regiments were called into active service during August and September 1917. A total of over 100,000 men has been furnished the army, navy and marine corps of the United States by recruiting and by the draft from April 5, 1917 to November 1, 1918. About 76,000 of this number were secured by the selective service.

Following the withdrawal of the National Guard troops from State service into national service the State was left without military protection. Authorization was given by the Minnesota Commission of Public Safety to organize and maintain for the duration of the war a military organization to be known as "Home Guards." As the result of that authorization, Minnesota now possesses about 10,000 uniformed and trained men, who may be used within the borders of the State.

Federal authorization was given for the organization of additional regiments of National Guards to replace those federalized in 1917. The 4th, 5th and 6th regiments of infantry were then authorized by the Adjutant General.

THE JUDICIARY DEPARTMENTS.

THE SUPREME COURT.

The constitution provides that the judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court as the legislature may from time to time establish. This latter prerogative the legislature has exercised in the establishment of municipal courts in the larger cities of the State.

The supreme court consists of one chief justice and four associate justices, elected by the people, and holding office for six years, and until successors are elected and qualified. The 1913 session of the legislature created two positions of commissioners of the court, these commissioners to be attorneys, and to perform such duties as the court should assign to them. Immediately after the enactment of the law Judges Homer B. Dibell and Myron D. Taylor were appointed as commissioners. Two terms of court are held in each year, commencing on the first Tuesday of April and October, at the capitol, in St. Paul. This court has original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity.

The clerk of the supreme court is an elective officer, the term of office being four years.

The reporter of the supreme court is an officer appointed by the supreme court to prepare the adjudicated cases for publication in official volumes, entitled, "Minnesota Reports."

Originally the reporter owned the exclusive copyright, and the reports were printed and bound at his expense, the State buying of him 200 copies of each volume at six dollars a volume. In 1881, an act was passed providing that the reporter should have no pecuniary interest in the reports, but that they should be published by contract under his supervision, the publisher to agree to sell the volumes at two dollars a volume and the State to agree to buy 200 copies at that price. The State now purchases 425 copies of each report issued. The contract price is \$1. The copyright of the volumes already published vests in the secretary of state for the benefit of the people of the State, but the publisher is permitted to continue the publication and sale of such volumes so long as he complies with the requirements of law as to character and price of volumes.

The secretary of state is charged with the distribution of the volumes, one copy to each of the several departments of state, to each judge of the supreme court, and of the several district, probate and municipal courts, and to the clerks of each district court, while the University of Minnesota

receives 100 copies for the law department, and the state library receives a sufficient number for exchanges with other states and for the use of the library. The remaining copies stay in the custody of the secretary of state for further distribution by law.

THE LOWER COURTS.

The district courts are created by the legislature, the State being divided into nineteen judicial districts with one or more judges in a district, as the exigencies of business may require, and the judges are elected for six years. The district courts have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount exceeds \$100, or the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than \$100. Also, in criminal cases where presentments are made by grand juries.

The municipal courts generally have the power of disposing of all criminal cases for infraction of city laws, and for hearing and committing for trial on arrests for violation of state laws. Chap. 146, G. L. 1891, "An act relating to villages of over 3,000 inhabitants, and providing for municipal courts therein." By the provisions of this act a municipal court has jurisdiction in civil actions where amount does not exceed \$500; also, in all cases where a justice court has jurisdiction, and over certain criminal actions. Its jurisdiction is co-extensive with the limits of the county where located.

The probate courts are created by authority of the constitution, one for each county, and the judges to be elected by the people, for two years. The probate court has jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, and the examination and commitment of insane persons to the asylums. The salaries of probate judges are fixed by special law, or in lieu thereof a salary of \$100 for the first 1,000 inhabitants and \$50 for each additional 1,000 inhabitants, limiting the compensation, where by reason of population the sum would be larger, to \$4,000 per annum.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

When Minnesota was organized as a territory March 3, 1849, it was understood that a grant of public lands would be made by Congress for the endowment and support of a university as in the case of all other states carved out of this old northwest territory.

On December 10, 1850, Delegate Sibley gave notice of a bill to grant two townships (46,080 acres) which became law on February 19, 1851. Meantime the Minnesota Legislature had by Act, February 13, created the University of Minnesota and made over to that corporation the proceeds of all lands which Congress might grant.

The location of the institution was fixed by this law "at or near the Falls of St. Anthony," by virtue of an understanding relating to the distribution of public buildings. A board of twelve regents elected in classes by the legislature had charge till 1860. In the fall of 1851, a preparatory school was opened. In 1856, intoxicated by the boom which was then raging, the Regents began the erection of the rear part of the "Old Main" building. Before it was finished, the panic of 1857 came on. The board could not pay the contractors nor meet the interest on the bonds they had been authorized to sell.

In the winter of 1860 the Legislature replaced the old board of twelve regents by one of five appointed by the Governor. At the end of four years this board had not been able to put the finances of the University on a sound footing. Senator John S. Pillsbury laid before the Legislature of 1864 a plan to pay off the accumulated debt by the sale of less than one-third of the land grant. A special board of three regents, headed by Mr. Pillsbury, was created to make the experiment. At the close of 1866 this board reported the debt substantially liquidated. A debt of gratitude is due to the creditors and bondholders for scaling down their just claims and accepting sums far below their dues. By means of a small appropriation the special board renovated the building, purchased furniture and appliances, and in November, 1867, opened the preparatory department, to which girls as well as boys were admitted.

This board having accomplished its purpose prepared for the Legislature the bill which, enacted into law February 13, 1868, became the actual charter of the University. By far the most important element was that which united with the university endowment proper the expected income from the congressional land grant of 1862 for the support of colleges of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

At the close of the college year of 1869 a small company of preparatory students were found ready for college instruction. A faculty of nine professors and instructors was elected and began their work in September. In this year William Watts Folwell was appointed president.

In 1873 two students were graduated at the first commencement. Some twenty years now passed in quiet work and growth, mostly in the Academic department. A good beginning was made in that of Engineering and Mechanic Arts, but in spite of the most earnest endeavors by the Regents

the College of Agriculture developed slowly. There was little demand for proper agricultural instruction and the pedagogy of that branch had not been developed.

In the year 1870 Congress confirmed to the State a second grant of public land for a state University ingeniously embodied in the enabling act of February 26, 1857, which the department authorities at Washington had persistently refused to recognize.

In September, 1884, Cyrus Northrop succeeded to the presidency and not long after began that great development familiar to all.

The Colleges of Law and Medicine were organized. New buildings sprang up, nobly equipped, and the faculties were reinforced as means accumulated. The growth of the College of Agriculture has been remarkable. The congressional appropriations for experiment stations and additional endowment have greatly increased its efficiency and prosperity. The College of Engineering has also enjoyed a rapid and cumulative development. The Colleges of Pharmacy, Dentistry, the School of Mines, Chemistry, Education, and the Graduate School have been added in recent years, the result of public demands for special technical training and research.

President Northrop resigned in 1910, and, on April 1, 1911, George Edgar Vincent, Ph.D., LL.D., Dean of the Faculties of Arts, Literature, and Science, of the University of Chicago, succeeded to the presidency of the University. President Vincent resigned in April, 1917, and Marion Leroy Burton was appointed in July of that year.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

The Department of Agriculture of the University of Minnesota comprises the Central Experiment Station, the College of Agriculture, the College of Forestry, the Central School of Agriculture, the Dairy School, the Farmers' Week, the Junior Short Course, the School of Traction Engineering, the Extension Service, the Northwest School of Agriculture and Experiment Station at Crookston, the West Central School of Agriculture and Experiment Station at Morris, the North Central Experiment Station at Grand Rapids, the Northeast Demonstration Farm and Experiment Station at Duluth, the Southeast Demonstration Farm and Experiment Station at Waseca, the Forest Experiment Station at Cloquet, and the Fruit Breeding Station at Zumbra Heights. In connection with a summer session of its college of Agriculture at St. Anthony Park a Teachers' Training School is also maintained in co-operation with the State Department of Education. The total enrollment in the Department of Agriculture (including the Teachers' Training School) is about 3,800.

The Department has its home on University Farm, a tract of 412 acres of land lying midway between St. Paul and Minneapolis and adjoining the State Fair grounds. The buildings occupy a prominent position on the highest ground between the two cities.

GOVERNMENT—BY BOARD OF REGENTS AND THE UNIVERSITY SENATE.

The University is governed by a board of twelve Regents, consisting of three ex-officio members, the governor of the State, the state superintendent of public instruction and the president of the University, and nine members appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, who hold office for six years.

The Regents have absolute control over all University affairs, save in the matter of erection of new buildings, the purchase of fuel and the placing of insurance. These three items are under the supervision of the State Board of Control.

The University Senate is composed of the President, the Deans and all Professors (including acting Professors), Associate Professors, and the University Librarian. The President Emeritus, Professors Emeriti, and Professors who devote less than half time to the work of the University are entitled to participate in the discussions of the Senate, but not to vote. The Registrar is the Clerk of the Senate and Custodian of its records.

The Senate has general legislative and administrative authority over all matters concerning the University as a whole; but not the internal affairs of a single College or School of collegiate rank, except where the same affect the interest of the University as a whole or the interest of other Colleges or Schools.

STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM.

This consists of:

- Rural schools of one, two, and three rooms.
- Consolidated rural schools.
- Graded schools.
- High schools.
- Normal schools.
- State University.
- Special schools for Deaf and Blind.

CONTROL.

Rural Schools are supervised in each county by the county superintendent of schools. Consolidated, graded, and high schools are supervised by a principal or superintendent in charge of each. The county superintendent has authority to exercise general supervision over all public schools in the county. He receives reports from all public schools, in relation to attendance, cost of maintenance, teachers, buildings, text books, libraries, and other general factors.

The Public Schools are supervised and controlled on the part of the state by

- (a) A State Department of Education, which is directed by the State Superintendent of Education and his assistants.
- (b) A State High School Board, which has immediate direction of state high and graded schools.
- (c) The normal schools are controlled by the Normal School Board, consisting of nine members; eight appointed direct by the Governor, each for a term of four years, and the Superintendent of Education, who is ex officio a member, and secretary of the Board. Each normal school is under the immediate direction and management of a President.
- (d) The State University is controlled by the Board of Regents, consisting of twelve members. The Governor, the Superintendent of Education, and the President of the University are ex officio members. The nine remaining members are appointed by the Governor, each for a term of six years.

SUPPORT

The Public Schools are supported by:

- (a) A local tax upon the property of the school district, including a one-mill tax required by law to be levied in each district.
- (b) A state mill tax.
- (c) Income from the permanent school fund.
- (d) Special annual state aid.

The support indicated under a, b, and c applies to all public schools. The state aid is granted to rural, consolidated, graded and high schools, and to special departments in high and graded schools, under specified conditions fixed either in the law or by administrative rule of the Department of Education or the High School Board.

Libraries. Annual grants by the state are made to public schools for the establishment and maintenance of school libraries. The annual grant is \$10 for each teacher, with a limit of \$25 to each school building, conditioned upon an equal sum being paid by the school.

Normal Schools are supported by direct appropriations made by the legislature.

The State University is supported by a state tax of twenty-three hundredths of a mill upon all taxable state property, by state appropriations, and by appropriations from the Federal Government. In addition to this, the University receives support through fees.

Teaching. The state provides funds for teachers' institutes and training schools, held under the direction of the State Superintendent of Education.

Teachers' certificates are issued by the Superintendent of Education upon examinations, or upon endorsement of diplomas or other credentials issued by accredited state normal schools and by colleges and universities.

The normal school system of the state was inaugurated by the Legislature of 1858, making provision for the organization of three schools, upon donation from localities desiring the schools, or five thousand dollars from each locality. Under this law schools were established at Winona, Mankato, and St. Cloud; and in 1885 a fourth school was located at Moorhead; the fifth school opened at Duluth September, 1902.

Each of the state normal schools embraces a normal or professional department, and a model school or training department. The normal department offers the following courses of study:

An Elementary Course of three years.

An Advanced Course of five years.

A Professional Course of one or two years, for students who are graduates of approved high schools.

A Kindergarten Training Course of two years, for students who are graduates of high schools, and who desire to equip for kindergarten or first primary work.

STATE BOARD OF CONTROL.

Minnesota was among the first of the states of the Union to adopt a system of centralized control of its state institutions. The law creating the Board of Control as it is now constituted was enacted in 1901 and it is safe to say that but few of the taxpayers of the state have full realization of the duties or the trust they imposed on the three men constituting the board.

The state Board of Control at the present time has complete financial and general control over thirteen state institutions, located in as many cities, as follows:

Hospital for Insane, Willmar.

It has financial supervision over the School for the Blind, Faribault; School for the Deaf, Faribault; State Public School, Owatonna.

It acts as a board of parole and discharge for the State Training School for Boys and the Home School for Girls.

It has charge of inspection of jails, lockups, infirmaries and hospitals, through the state.

It has charge of the deportation of insane and criminals.

It buys fuel for all state institutions, excepting the Soldiers' Home and State Fair.

It insures all state boilers.

It inspects and visits the hospitals and asylums for the insane every month.

It has plans prepared and oversees the construction of all state buildings except for the State Fair.

It has advisory supervision over all jails, lockups and infirmaries, and must examine all plans for new jails and lockups or improvements on these structures where estimated cost is over \$200.

It visits and inspects the homes of associations for receiving delinquent, dependent and neglected children.

It supervises paroled insane.

It determines residence of paupers.

It buys supplies for all state institutions under its charge.

It licenses children's and orphans' homes.

Supervises expenditures of State Conference of Charities and Correction.

Purchases land for state institutions.

The institutions in its charge, among other things, operate a stone quarry and manufacture granite, crush stone for highways, manufacture clothing for state institutions, manufacture twine, manufacture farm machinery.

The member of the Board of Control longest in service acts as chairman of the State Board of Parole. The member of the Board of Control whose time is shortest acts as Chairman of that Board.

STATE INSTITUTIONS.

St. Peter State Hospital—This was the first institution established by the Minnesota legislature for the treatment of the insane. The act creating it, including an appropriation of \$15,000, was passed in 1866. The site, a fine farm of 210 acres, was presented the state by the citizens of St. Peter. The present land area is 865 acres with a value of \$47,860. The total inventory, including personal property, is \$1,282,439.45. Attached to this institution is the asylum and hospital for the criminal insane. The present population is 1,242, of which 515 are women. The official staff numbers 225 persons.

Rochester State Hospital—This institution established by the legislature in 1874 was originally a hospital for the cure of persons addicted to the liquor habit. It was maintained by a tax of \$10 on all liquor dealers in the state. In 1878 it was converted into a hospital for the insane and has since been so maintained. The land area is 1,371 acres; total valuation, \$1,235,628.31; population, 1,284, and number of employes, 210.

Fergus Falls State Hospital—In 1885 the legislature placed in the hands of a commission to select a site for the location of a third hospital for the insane to be located in the northern part of the state. Fergus Falls was decided upon as the location and 636 acres of land was secured as a site. This institution is now the largest in the state devoted to the care and treatment of the insane. It has a land area of 1,075 acres, is valued at \$1,376,872.60, and has a population of 1,558. The employes number 250.

Anoka State Asylum—The institution at Anoka is devoted to the care and treatment of insane persons regarded as practically incurable. No commitments are made direct to the asylum, but they are filed by transfers from the three insane hospitals. The asylum was opened March 14, 1900, and now houses 887 patients. The land area is 680 acres; the valuation of the property and land is \$719,400 and 85 persons are employed.

Hastings State Asylum—The legislature of 1899 authorized the Hastings association, its location being the result of a strenuous contest between that city and Anoka for one of the many state institutions then contemplated. This institution, like the one at Anoka, is conducted largely on the cottage plan. The asylum is located on 683 acres of land, has a valuation of \$748,686.16, and has a staff of 80 persons.

State School for Feeble Minded and Colony for Epileptics—This institution, located at Faribault, had its inception in the determination arrived at in 1879 to separate from the patients at the hospital for the insane such children as were feeble-minded or idiotic. The director of the school for the deaf and blind, a nearby institution, was placed in charge, but in 1882

a separation was made and the school has ever since been conducted and maintained as a distinct institution. In addition to the feeble-minded, the idiotic and those afflicted with epilepsy, the school cares for certain cases of incurable physical helplessness. The land area is 1,063 acres, nearly all of which is under cultivation. The inventories of real and movable property are \$1,575,693.11. The present population is 1,543 children. The official staff consist of 260 persons.

School for the Deaf—In 1858 the legislature made provisions for the education of the deaf and dumb, but the school, which is located at Faribault, was not opened until 1863, and in 1866 the first appropriation for a building was made. The pupils receive instruction in numerous trades and handicrafts. A large part of the repairing to buildings and furniture is done by the pupils. The proper age for admission is eight years. The regular school period is ten years, to which a special course of three years may be added. The land area is 96 acres and the value of the institution \$623,175.11. The enrollment is 250. The official staff numbers about 80 persons.

School for the Blind—This institution, also located at Faribault, and which is one of the several state schools for defectives grouped in that city, is situated south of the School for the Deaf. It was established in 1866, and in 1868 it was combined with the School for the Deaf, but in 1874 it was finally separated from that school and placed in the location which it now occupies. The school is open to all blind persons residing in the state of Minnesota who are between the ages of six and twenty-one years. Board, care and instruction are furnished to all pupils without charge. The school has a land area of 50 acres, has a value of \$202,915.88, an enrollment of 80, and an official staff of 42.

Minnesota State Prison—The greatest revenue producing public institution in the world is the Minnesota State Prison at Stillwater. It is the state's one penal institution. The new prison is also the last word in prison construction and management.

In 1890 the binding twine industry was established at the prison, and in 1908 the making of farm machinery was begun. Then in rapid order came other reforms, the abolishment of the lock step, the passing of the striped uniform except in the case of the particularly vicious, and finally the building of the new prison at South Stillwater. This magnificent structure, the product of the act of the legislature of 1909, covers a ground space of twenty-two acres, is admirably located and embodies in its construction every practical requisite for the humane and sanitary housing of human beings.

Since the establishment of the binding twine industry in 1890 over \$20,000,000 worth of twine has been manufactured and sold. The machinery department has turned out nearly \$1,500,000 worth of mowers, binders and other farm machinery. The property has a valuation of \$4,173,460.04. The official staff consists of 190 persons. The land area is 750 acres.

State Reformatory—Minnesota's one correctional institution for first offenders in felony only is the State Reformatory located at St. Cloud. Sentences to this institution are entirely on the indeterminate plan, with the age limits ranging from sixteen to thirty years. The only fixed terms are those in the case of federal prisoners and boys transferred from the state training school at Red Wing who are under the jurisdiction of the reformatory officers until they attain their majority. The reformatory was established in 1889. Located on the extensive grounds is one of the finest granite quarries in the state. Another line of employment is that of garment making. The land area is 1,057 acres, value of buildings and land \$1,099,089.36, and 70 persons are employed. The present population is 615.

State Training School for Boys—The school is located two miles east of Red Wing, and is for the education and training of delinquent boys who may be committed to its guardianship by the courts of the state. The lads are committed between the ages of eight and seventeen years, and remain under the guardianship of the institution until they are twenty-one years old unless they prove themselves worthy of discharge before reaching the age of twenty-one. The State Board of Control has authority to parole. The boys of this institution attend school one-half of each day and work the other half. Carpentering, blacksmithing, laundering, tailoring, printing, shoemaking, painting, cooking, baking and agriculture are taught. There is a land area of 471 acres, the property has a valuation of \$543,111.97, and 58 persons are employed. The present population is 220 boys.

Home School for Girls—This institution was located at Red Wing until its separation from the Boys' Training School was ordered by the legislature in 1907, when a new site of 168 acres was purchased at Sauk Center. The institution was opened in 1911. The girls are employed in sewing, knitting, cooking, laundering, and general housework. They also have a large garden, some small fruit, and considerable poultry, which, together with their flower gardens and lawns, keep them reasonably busy. The school is conducted on the cottage plan. Total inventory, including personal property, \$424,748.63.

Hospital for Crippled and Deformed Children—It is located on a beautiful tract of land of 22 acres in the suburbs of St. Paul. The first structure (built in 1910) was designed to receive children whose deformities were more amenable to treatment, leaving the more serious cases, requiring surgical and medical treatment in a ward set aside for them at the City and County Hospital until complete facilities could be provided at Phalen Park. This has now been accomplished and the patients remaining at the city hospital transferred to the handsome new addition for which the legislature made an appropriation of \$60,000 (including equipment). In addition to its regular charges the institution cares for indigent blind babies, a separate appropriation being made by the legislature for this purpose. Total inventory, including personal property, \$147,294.00. Present population, 72 boys, 51 girls. Officers and employes, 40. The land was the gift of certain St. Paul residents and commercial bodies.

State Public School for Dependent Children—Was established by the legislature in 1885. It was located at Owatonna by a board of five commissioners appointed by the governor. The first buildings were completed and the school opened in December, 1886. Dependent, neglected, and ill-treated children are eligible to admission, and may be committed by the probate courts in counties having less than 50,000 population and by the juvenile division of the district courts in counties having more than 50,000 population. Children may also be transferred to the school from other institutions and associations in Minnesota. The campus, farm lands, orchards, pastures and buildings occupy 315 acres. Ten acres are used as an experimental station for the State School of Agriculture in the growing and testing of fruit trees. The children are divided into family groups, each family occupying a cottage with a matron and an assistant in charge. A graded school is maintained and instruction given in agriculture, carpentry, music, domestic science, and art. The aim of the institution is to place dependent children in normal relations to society and so they are transferred from the institution to private homes as soon as families suited to their individual needs and capacity and willing to take them are found. Some are returned to relatives whose improved circumstances enable them to provide properly for the children. Total inventory, including personal property, \$450,934.51. Present population, 212 boys and 107 girls. Number of children in homes or under supervision, 1,286. Official staff, including teachers and five state agents for placing children in families, 74.

STATE SOCIETIES AND ASSOCIATIONS.

State Agricultural Society—Minnesota's chief organization in aid of its principal industry is the Minnesota State Agricultural Society, which dates its corporate existence from the year 1868. It was not the first, as even in territorial days societies existed, the object of which was the advancements of the state's natural resources, but it was the first concrete attempt at consolidation and so marked was its success that its annual exposition has continued unchallenged to this day. Out of it all came the annual Minnesota state fair, regarded as the greatest of its kind on the North American continent. Up to 1885 the annual fairs of the society were held in different localities with varying financial success. That year the county of Ramsey, through the efforts of public-spirited citizens, conveyed to the State of Minnesota for state fair purposes 200 acres of land, located midway between St. Paul and Minneapolis, the same to be under the management of the State Agricultural society. The legislature of the same year met the donation with an appropriation of \$100,000 for permanent improvements, which was supplemented by private subscriptions to the extent of over \$31,000. This investment, together with the grounds, might be said to be the real beginning of the largest annual agricultural and industrial meet in the United States, which since, through bi-annual aid on the part of the Minnesota legislature and its own earnings, has reached proportions in respect to buildings and investment far beyond the wildest dreams of its organizers. Up to 1903 state control of both the society and the state fair only extended to such financial aid as was necessary, but the legislature of that year, recognizing the need of more intimate relations, together with a supervision that would place the two beyond the possibility of outside influence and petty interference with its internal affairs, enacted a law practically making both a department of the state government. In 1911 supplemental legislation was adopted defining and regulating membership in the State Agricultural society. This membership, together with the right to vote, includes three delegates to the annual meeting to be named by each county agricultural society, such honorary members as may be elected by a two-thirds vote at each annual meeting, one delegate from such counties having no county or district agricultural society and to be named by the county board, and two delegates and the president, ex-officio, representing the following societies and associations:

The State Horticultural society; the State Dairymen's association; the State Beekeepers' association; the Minnesota Live Stock Breeders' association; the Minnesota Field Crop Breeders' association; the Minnesota Swine Breeders' association; the Minnesota Sheep Breeders' association; the Min-

nesota Horse Breeders' association; the Minnesota Veterinary association; the Minnesota Cattle Breeders' association; the State Poultry association; Minnesota Implement Dealers' association; the Minnesota Florists' association; the Minnesota Garden Flowers' association; the Minnesota County Exhibitors' association; the Minnesota Federation of County Fairs; the State Forestry association and the Minnesota State Grange association. The following societies and associations are entitled to one vote each: Minneapolis Market Gardeners' association of Minnesota; the State Growers' association; Minnesota Shorthorn Breeders' association; Minnesota Guernsey Breeders' association; Minnesota Jersey Breeders' association; Minnesota Holstein-Friesian Breeders' association, and the Minnesota Hereford Breeders' association.

The members of the governing board of the State Agricultural Society are entitled to one vote each. The annual meeting of the society occurs in St. Paul or Minneapolis on the second Tuesday in January each year and continues for three days, the election of officers occurring upon the last day of the session. A president and two vice presidents are elected to serve for one year and two managers to serve for three years at each annual meeting. The state appropriates \$100,000 annually to aid in the payment of premiums at county and other fairs and exhibitions complying with the provisions of the law.

State Horticultural Society has for its work the gathering and dissemination of knowledge pertaining to forestry, fruit and vegetable growing, the culture of flowers, etc., adapted to the soil and climate of Minnesota. The present working membership of the society consists of over two thousand professional and amateur horticulturists throughout the Northwest. The society has a plant breeders' auxiliary and also a woman's auxiliary, the former to encourage the origination of new horticultural plants, and the latter to awaken and foster an interest in horticulture among women. Financial aid is given by the state.

The Minnesota Dairymen's Association (incorporated March 2, 1882) was organized Feb. 7, 1878, for the purpose of improving the Minnesota stock and dairy products by holding an annual meeting of the representatives of these interests and the distribution of literature on such subjects among the people of the state. The association is encouraged by a permanent appropriation of \$2,000 annually for the publication of its proceedings and distribution of dairy literature and dairy instruction.


The Minnesota Butter and Cheese Makers' Association was organized in the fall of 1894, and is incorporated under the laws of the state, its special object being to advance the dairy interests of the state and to improve the quality of Minnesota dairy products. It holds an annual meeting, and pays premiums on butter and cheese exhibited, and participates in the appropriation allowed by the state for the encouragement of such organizations.

Farmers' Institutes. The holding of farmers' institutes has been in vogue for 25 years or more. The government is vested in a board of admin-

istration. This board consists of six members, three of whom are chosen from the board of regents of the State University, and the other three are the presidents of the State Agricultural Society, the State Horticultural Society and the State Dairymen's Association. The institutes are largely held during the winter months, commencing with some date in November, and closing about the middle of March. The Farmers' Institute Annual is published each year, and contains the latest and best practical information concerning agriculture in all its branches, which includes the work of the field stock interests and horticulture.

The Minnesota State Art Society was created by the 1903 session of the legislature for the advancement of fine arts, etc. The governing board consists of the governor, president of the university and seven members to be appointed by the governor, qualifications being prescribed by the act. The officers and membership are prescribed by the act, and annual exhibits are provided for, prizes being offered and paid for by the state.

The Minnesota Society for the Prevention of Cruelty was organized Oct. 21, 1869, for the purpose of preventing cruelty to animals throughout the State of Minnesota. It was recognized by the legislature of 1905 constituting the society a state bureau of child and animal protection. The governor, the superintendent of public instruction and the attorney-general are ex-officio members of the board of directors.

THE MINNESOTA HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND BUILDING.


The new building erected by the state at a cost of \$500,000 for the use of the Minnesota Historical society was dedicated Saturday, May 11, 1918, the sixtieth anniversary of the admittance of the state into the Union.

Charles P. Noyes, president of the society from 1915 to 1918 and chairman of the building committee, presided at the first session. Ralph W. Wheelock, chairman of the state board of control, which had charge of the erection of the building, formally turned it over to the state. C. G. Schulz, state superintendent of education, responded on behalf of Governor Burnquist, who was unable to be present, and formally entrusted the society with the use of the building. The trust was accepted on behalf of the society by its president, Gideon S. Ives.

Dr. Benjamin F. Shambaugh, superintendent of the Iowa State Historical society, spoke on behalf of sister societies, after which brief addresses were made by Dr. Warren Upham, archeologist of the society, who was its secretary from 1893 to 1914, and by Dr. Solon J. Buck, present secretary and superintendent.

At the close of the dedication program the building was thrown open for inspection and hundreds of members and friends made a tour of offices, reading rooms, stack rooms, art galleries and museum. During the evening sessions were continued in the House Chamber of the Capitol. Here an inspiring address was delivered by Dr. Frederick J. Turner, professor of history, Harvard university, on "Middle Western Pioneer Democracy."

The dedication took place on the final day of the eleventh annual meeting of the Mississippi Valley Historical association held May 9, 10, and 11, and five of the seven sessions of the association were held in the new building.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

LEGISLATURE.

The legislature for the year 1919 is composed of 67 senators and 131 representatives.

The legislature meets biennially, commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of odd numbered years. The session is limited to 90 legislative days by the constitution.

The legislative term of representatives is for two years and for senators, four years.

ELECTIONS.

State elections are held in every even numbered year on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November and the terms of office terminate at that time.

The primary election to nominate candidates to be elected at the general election is held on the third Monday in June. The so-called Australian system of voting is used in both elections.

Two kinds of ballots are used in the primary election—a party ballot and a non-partisan ballot. All candidates for executive officers, including railroad and warehouse commissioners and federal representatives are nominated by means of a party ballot. The justices of the supreme court, members of the state legislature and all county officers, except county surveyor are nominated on a non-partisan ballot.

Primary election day constitutes the first day of registration for the ensuing election, except in cities of the first class.

Women may vote for school offices and are eligible as school officers, and to appointments as deputies by county officers, provided they are citizens of this state. In order to vote a woman must be naturalized. The naturalization of the husband naturalizes the wife.

PROPERTY RIGHTS.

Various property rights are given to women. Property owned prior to marriage remains in her own right, as well as property acquired during marriage. She is practically given the same property rights in her married state as the husband. A widow is entitled to one-third of the property of her demised husband, and the homestead goes direct to her in case of no children—with children she has a life estate in the same.

TAXATION.

General taxes become a lien upon real property from the first day of May of the year in which levied, but between grantor and grantee the lien does not attach until the next January. Payment of real estate taxes must be made on or before the first day of June for the taxes of the preceding year, otherwise a penalty of ten per cent attaches which penalty carries it through the remaining seven months of the year. At the expiration of that time, if still unpaid, the tax is deemed delinquent and an additional five per cent is added. If the delinquency continues the property is sold on the second Monday of May. After the tax sale the amount of the judgment against the property, and for which it was sold draws interest at the rate of one per cent per month until redeemed. The redemption period extends for three years and until public notice of the time of expiration of such redemption has been made by the county auditor.

TRUST FUNDS, ETC.

Minnesota at the present time has the largest permanent trust fund of any state in the Union. On November 1, 1918, the total amount of bonds in the possession of the state treasurer and belonging to the several state trust funds amounted to \$28,817,428.05.

Various receipts by the state for the fiscal year, ending July 31, 1918, included: Royalties on iron ore from state lands, \$1,076,846.55; interest from invested permanent trust funds, \$980,596.98; sale of binding twine and machinery manufactured at state prison, \$3,948,730.90; sale of state timber, \$514,009.40; inheritance taxes, \$873,122.57; hunting licenses, \$68,460.91; telephone taxes, \$298,648.36; gross earnings taxes from railroads, \$6,269,379.41; incorporation fees, \$90,880.00; automobile licenses, \$1,024,240.50.

ASSESSED VALUATION.

The assessed value of all real and personal property in Minnesota subject to ad valorem taxation for 1917, as equalized by the Minnesota tax commission, is \$1,951,252,019.

In 1916 the assessed valuation as equalized by the commission was \$1,844,280,845.

Real estate is assessed only in the even numbered years and the 1915 and 1917 assessments are the same as that of 1914 and 1916 respectively, with the exception of the addition of new buildings and land becoming sub-

ject to taxation between May 1, 1914, and May 1, 1915 and May 1, 1916 and May 1, 1917.

It is to be understood that these figures do not include the value of railroad property in the state, nor the property of freight line, sleeping car, express, telephone and trust companies not doing a banking business, all of which are subject to a gross earnings tax. The value of this property has not been ascertained but probably exceeds \$700,000,000.

LEGAL HOLIDAYS.

Legal holidays of the state, established by law, are: New Year's Day, the 1st of January; Christmas Day, the 25th of December; Lincoln's Birthday, February 12th; Washington's Birthday, February 22d; Memorial Day, May 30th; Independence Day, the 4th of July; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Good Friday, next preceding Easter Sunday; general election day, the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in even numbered years. The statutes of the state indirectly recognize Sunday and Thanksgiving Day as legal holidays by providing that maturing paper, bills of exchange, etc., falling due on those days shall be due and payable on the business day following.

FISCAL YEAR.

Chapter 124, G. L. 1883, provides that the fiscal year of all official reports should commence on the first day of August and close on the thirty-first day of July, except the reports of the insurance commissioner, which are made for calendar year.

NOTARIES PUBLIC.

Notaries Public are appointed by the governor, for the term of seven years, upon a payment of a fee of three dollars and the filing of a bond in the sum of \$2,000.

STATE OFFICERS

GOVERNOR.

J. A. A. Burnquist (Republican) was born at Dayton, Iowa, in July, 1879. After graduating from the high school at Dayton, he came to Minnesota, where he entered Carleton college, Northfield, graduating there in 1902. He is also a graduate of Columbia university, New York City, and the University of Minnesota College of Law. He began the practice of law in St. Paul in 1905. In 1908 he was elected to represent his district in the legislature, serving in the House sessions of 1909 and 1911 and the special session of 1912. He was elected lieutenant governor in 1912 and re-elected in 1914. He became governor Dec. 30, 1915, upon the death of Governor W. S. Hammond. In 1916 he was the Republican nominee for governor, elected, and re-elected in 1918.


LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.


Thomas Frankson (Republican) is a native of Minnesota, having been born in York township, Fillmore county in 1869. He was educated in the public schools, Decorah Institute, Valder Business College, and then taught school in Fillmore county for thirteen terms. He then entered the law department of the State University and graduated with the class of 1900. He practiced law two years and then engaged in real estate and farming which he has since followed. Mr. Frankson represented Fillmore county in the state legislature in the sessions of 1911-1913 and the special session of 1912. Elected lieutenant governor 1916 and 1918. He is married.

SECRETARY OF STATE.


Julius A. Schmahl (Republican) is of German parentage, both his father and mother having been born in Germany. He was born in Nicollet county in 1867 and moved with his parents to Redwood Falls in 1870. For many years he was the publisher of the Redwood Falls Gazette. He was chief clerk of the House in 1901, the special session of 1902, 1903 and 1905 sessions, and was elected Secretary of State in 1906, 1908, 1910, 1912, 1914, 1916 and again in 1918.

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STATE AUDITOR AND LAND COMMISSIONER.

Jacob A. O. Preus (Republican) was born on a Wisconsin farm August 28, 1883. He attended country school, was graduated from Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, in 1903 and from the Law School of the University of Minnesota in 1906. For three years thereafter he served as clerk under Senator Knute Nelson in the United States Senate at Washington. From September, 1909, to 1911, he was executive clerk in the governor's office. He was appointed insurance commissioner by Governor Eberhart in 1911 and re-appointed in 1913. Mr. Preus was elected state auditor in 1914 and is now serving his second term, having been re-elected in 1918.

STATE TREASURER.

Henry Rines (Republican) was born in Stockmora, Orsa, Sweden, June 9, 1872. He has been a resident of Kanabec county for 40 years. Mr. Rines was assistant postmaster at Brunswick and when 19 years old went to Mora, his present home, to accept a similar position. At the age of 22 he was elected county auditor of Kanabec county, a position which he held ten years. Upon retiring from the county auditor's office, Mr. Rines engaged in the newspaper business by the purchase of the Kanabec County Times. Ten years ago, Mr. Rines was elected to the lower branch of the Minnesota legislature, a position which he held for four terms. In the session of 1913, his last term, he was speaker. Elected treasurer 1916 and re-elected 1918.

ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Clifford L. Hilton (Republican) was born at Kenyon, Goodhue county, Minnesota, December 8, 1866. Moved with his parents to Fergus Falls, Minnesota, in 1879; was graduated from the Fergus Falls high school in 1884 and from the University of Wisconsin College of Law in 1888. Admitted to practice in all courts of Minnesota and Wisconsin in 1888 and in the Supreme Court of the United States in 1911. Served as city attorney of Fergus Falls 1896-98. County attorney of Ottertail county 1899-1908. Assistant attorney general 1909-1917, and appointed deputy attorney general April, 1917. Appointed attorney general March 8, 1918, on the death of Lyndon A. Smith. Elected at the general election November 5, 1918, by a plurality of 80,848 votes. Married in 1891 to Frances C. Moll of Chicago, Illinois. They have one son, Bernard M. Hilton, born February 23, 1902. Residence, Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

CLERK OF THE STATE SUPREME COURT.

Herman Mueller (Republican) was born at LaFayette, Ind., in 1868 and came to St. Paul with his parents in that year. Moved to St. Cloud with his parents in 1876 and has resided there since. Attended district school, St. Cloud, and graduated from St. John's University, Collegeville, Minn., 1886. Was connected with court house force, Stearns county, for twenty-five years, employed in offices of county treasurer; county auditor and register of deeds. Served as clerk of the district court for six years. Was offered

appointment in 1898 as deputy revenue collector under the McKinley administration, but declined, although the appointment was tendered in recognition of services rendered the Republican party in 1896. Has been a Republican since 1896. Elected clerk of the supreme court November 5, 1918.

RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSIONERS.

Ira B. Mills (Republican) born in Scotchtown, Orange county, New York, January 14, 1851. Graduated from Albany Law School in 1872. Came to Minnesota, 1881; is married, practiced law at Moorhead until elected judge of the Fourteenth judicial district; was appointed assistant attorney general January 2, 1893, and member of the railroad and warehouse commission January 26th of the same year by Governor Nelson and re-appointed by Governor Clough. At the 1900, 1904, 1908 and 1912 general elections he was elected a member of the commission for a term of four years, and in 1916 for a term of six years.

Fred W. Putnam (Republican) is a native of Minnesota, born at Red Wing, November 15, 1884. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Putnam are pioneer residents of Red Wing and Goodhue county. After completing the public school course of his native city he attended the University of Minnesota, where he received his academic degree. Later he obtained his law degree at the University of Michigan. He served a brief apprenticeship in the office of George T. Simpson, then attorney general, and with a leading law firm in Minneapolis, after which he entered upon the practice of law in Red Wing. Was appointed a member of the commission in November, 1917, to succeed Charles E. Elmquist, upon the latter's resignation. Mr. Putnam is a married man with a family. He was elected Nov. 5, 1918, for the six-year term.

O. P. B. Jacobson (Republican) was born in Fredriksvarn, Norway, on the second day of July, 1857. Was educated in the city schools of Sandefjord, and later graduated from the Navigation Board in Kristiania. Came to Fergus Falls, Minnesota, in 1884. Has been engaged in the mercantile implement and grain trade, and for several years editor of the "Fergus Falls Ugeblad." Was a member of the State Board of Grain Appeals for three years, and appointed by Governor Eberhart on the Board of Railroad and Warehouse Commissioners to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Charles F. Staples. Was nominated and elected for the same position in November, 1914, for a term of six years.

PRIVATE SECRETARY TO GOVERNOR.

Gustaf Lindquist was born in Sweden in 1880 and emigrated to the United States with his parents at an early age. He has been a resident of St. Paul for sixteen years and has been actively engaged in the fire and life insurance business during the most of that time. Mr. Lindquist was a member of the republican state central committee in 1916, and chairman in the campaign of 1918.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE.

James A. Larson was born in 1860 in Illinois. His education was received in the common schools of his native state. He settled in Minnesota in the spring of 1877. He has been a member of town and school boards for a number of years, postmaster and member of the legislature in 1897, 1899, 1901 and extra session 1902; he is married, a farmer by occupation, and his home address is Walnut Grove.

DEPTUY STATE AUDITOR.

R. P. Chase was born at Anoka, Minn., March 12, 1880; graduated from Anoka high school in 1898; University of Minnesota in 1903, and studied law at the law department of the university. He was in the newspaper business for ten years, being secretary-treasurer of the Anoka Herald Publishing Company. Mr. Chase is married, and has one child.

DEPUTY STATE TREASURER.

Edward H. Walden, born in Cattaraugus county, New York. Came to Minnesota in 1865. Educated in the public schools of Rochester. Held the office of city treasurer six years, city clerk two years, was deputy county auditor four years, and auditor of Olmsted county for six years. Was appointed clerk in the land department of the state auditor's office in October, 1905, and was so employed until Nov. 2, 1916. Received appointment as deputy state treasurer July 17, 1916. Married.

DEPUTY ATTORNEY GENERAL.

C. Louis Weeks was born in Ypsilanti, Michigan, Jan. 20, 1871. In the year 1882 his parents moved to the city of Minneapolis, where he has continued to reside until the present time. In 1894 he graduated from the College of Law of the University of Minnesota and was, in June of that year, admitted to practice before the courts of this state. With the exception of a period of six years, which he devoted to legal authorship, he has been in the active practice of law in the city of Minneapolis. From May, 1907, to January 4, 1909, he held the position of special assistant to Attorney General Young. He served as assistant attorney general under the administrations of Attorneys General George T. Simpson and Lyndon A. Smith and appointed deputy attorney general in April, 1918.

ASSISTANTS TO THE ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Egbert S. Oakley was born in New York City in 1872; moved with his parents to Buffalo Wright county, Minnesota, in 1873. Graduated from the law department, University of Minnesota, 1898. County attorney Wright county, 1901 to 1903. Register of U. S. Land Office, Cass Lake, Minn., 1903 to 1908. Assistant United States district attorney for Minnesota, 1908 to 1915. Appointed assistant attorney general April, 1916, and deputy attorney general in September, 1918. Married. Residence, Duluth.

James E. Markham was born in Rochester, New York, July 21, 1859. He graduated from the Genessee Valley Seminary, June, 1876; was admitted to practice law at Buffalo, New York, 1881, came to Minnesota and located at St. Paul May, 1886, where he has practiced his profession ever since. He was city attorney of St. Paul from 1897 to 1903.

Henry C. Flannery was born in Bismarck, North Dakota, April 4, 1879. Removed to Minneapolis in 1887. Entered the academic department of the University of Minnesota in 1904 and graduated from the law department in 1908. Assistant city attorney of Minneapolis 1910 to 1914. Appointed assistant attorney general in 1915.

Rollin L. Smith, attorney of special claims for the department, was born in Mankato, in 1879, and moved to Minneapolis with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Smith, at an early age. He is a graduate of Princeton and of the law department of the University of Minnesota. Mr. Smith entered the attorney general's department in 1914.

John Everall was born in Clayton county, Iowa, Feb. 16, 1871. Graduated from law department, Drake University, 1893. After 12 years' general practice in Iowa he entered the legal department, Chicago, Great Western Railway and in 1909 came to St. Paul as assistant general attorney of that company. Member law firm of Briggs, Thygeson & Everall, St. Paul, until September, 1918, when he was appointed assistant attorney general. Is admitted to practice in all courts of Iowa and Minnesota and supreme court of the United States. Married. Residence, St. Paul.

Montreville J. Brown was born at Morris, Minnesota, June 13, 1884, graduated from the Morris high school, 1903, from the academic department of the University of Minnesota in 1907, and from the law department of that institution in 1909. Admitted to practice in the courts of Minnesota in 1909. City attorney of the city of Bemidji, Minnesota, 1917-1918. Member of draft board, Beltrami county, 1917-1918. Appointed assistant attorney general in March, 1918. Married to Minnie Stinchfield of Rochester, Minnesota, in 1910. Residence, Bemidji, Minnesota.

John Earl Palmer, born February 28, 1873, at Edgcombe, Maine. Came to Minnesota with parents in 1882; settled at Fairmont, Martin county. Finished grades at Fairmont; graduate State Normal School, Mankato, 1894. Principal graded schools three years. Admitted to practice 1899. County attorney Martin county, 1902 to 1908; 1909 to 1912. Appointed assistant attorney general, March 19, 1917. Married, 1898, Winifred Ibertson, Mankato. Three sons. Residence, Fairmont, Minnesota.

DEPUTY CLERK OF SUPREME COURT.

Peter O. Scow (Republican) was born March 24th, 1869, at the town of Gale, Trempealeau County, Wis. He received his early education at the public schools at Galesville, Wis. He came to Long Prairie, Minnesota, in the fall of 1891, and entered into partnership with Charles H. Ward under the firm name of Ward & Scow, doing a general merchandise business under

this name until 1897. In 1898 he was elected Clerk of the District Court of Todd County and held the office continuously for twenty years. He is married. Appointed Deputy Clerk, Supreme Court, January 6, 1919.

SUPERINTENDENT OF BANKS.

F. E. Pearson was born in Mankato, Minn., Aug. 30, 1870. Moved with his parents to Pipestone county in 1878. Lived on the farm until 17 years of age. Attended school in Pipestone and Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Was deputy county auditor of Pipestone county three years. In 1890 entered the Pipestone County bank (now Pipestone State bank) as bookkeeper; was elected cashier in 1895 and vice president in 1908, which position he held at the time of his appointment as superintendent of banks. Married in 1895 to Anna W. Loomis of Pipestone. Republican.

PUBLIC EXAMINER.

Andrew E. Fritz (Republican) born at St. Cloud, Minnesota, January 28, 1870. Graduated from the State Normal at St. Cloud in 1891. Was superintendent of the Otter Tail County schools from 1898 to 1901. For several years past has been in the blank book manufacturing business at St. Cloud, he having done the road work for the firm. Was appointed by Governor Eberhart and reappointed by Governor Burnquist.

COMMISSIONER OF INSURANCE.

John B. Sanborn, Lawyer, St. Paul, Minn. Son of the late General John B. Sanborn; graduate of St. Paul Central High School, University of Minnesota, and St. Paul College of Law. Member of the House of Representatives during 1913 and 1915 sessions of the Legislature. Appointed Commissioner of Insurance January, 1917; resigned August, 1918, to enlist in the Army of the United States, a private soldier in the Infantry Replacement Troops, Camp Pike, Arkansas, on detached service at Infantry Central Officers Training School, from August 12th to December 3d, 1918. Commissioned First Lieutenant U. S. R., November 30th, 1918; honorably discharged December 3d. Reappointed Commissioner of Insurance January 14th, 1919.

DEPUTY COMMISSIONER OF INSURANCE.

Charles G. Wright, St. Paul, was born in Ontario county, New York, in 1878. Educated at Geneva, N. Y. Located at St. Paul in 1898, entering government service. Graduated from the St. Paul College of Law 1911, and admitted to the Minnesota bar that year. Entered insurance department June, 1917, and appointed deputy commissioner Oct. 1, 1917.

SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION.

James M. McConnell was born in Pennsylvania in 1868; attended rural schools and academy; graduated from the Edinboro State Normal School; and was a law student for two years. Taught in the rural schools of Pennsylvania and was principal of graded schools. Since coming to Minnesota he graduated from Carleton College, having been a teacher in the academy while a student. Was superintendent of schools in Heron Lake three

years; Winnebago four years; and Mankato five years. In 1909 he became teacher of History and Civics in the Mankato Normal School, from which position he was appointed superintendent of education for the term beginning January, 1919. Was president of the Southern Minnesota Teachers' Association in 1906 and of the Minnesota Educational Association in 1907. Assumed office January 20, 1919.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL.

Walter F. Rhinow was born May 5, 1878, Newark, New Jersey. Came to Minnesota in 1899 with the 8th United States Infantry. His military career covers a period of twelve years in the United States Army, with service during the Spanish-American war, Cuban occupation and Philippine insurrection. Was appointed military instructor at the University of Minnesota, 1909, which office he held for eight years, during which time he was appointed captain of Battery "F" 1st Minnesota Field Artillery, serving during the Mexican border trouble. Resigned the position at the University to accept the appointment of military secretary to the governor, May, 1917; he was subsequently appointed The Adjutant General of Minnesota, September 1, 1917.

COMMISSIONER OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIES.

John P. Gardiner was born at Dundee, Scotland, February 8, 1870. Served his apprenticeship at the machinists' trade in the shops of the Great Western railroad, Swindon, England. Came to the United States in June, 1888. Delegate to the St. Paul Trades and Labor Assembly; delegate to the Grand Lodge convention for ten consecutive years and served as delegate for the St. Paul local to the State Federation of Labor at five annual conventions. On the death of W. F. Houk, July 20, 1918, Mr. Gardiner was appointed commissioner to fill the unexpired term and in November, 1918, Governor Burnquist appointed him commissioner for the full four-year term beginning January 6, 1919.

DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER.

James Sorenson was born in Denmark on February 22, 1871. He came to the United States in 1890.

He operated creameries in Indiana, Iowa, Wisconsin, South Dakota and Minnesota. Was appointed creamery inspector in 1907, and served in that capacity until 1911, when he was appointed manager of the Albert Lea State Experimental Creamery.

He served two years as president of the Minnesota State Butter & Cheese Makers' Association; is a member of the executive committee of the National Creamery Buttermakers' Association; has also served a number of years on the Board of Managers of the Dairy Record, St. Paul, and is serving as first vice president of the Association of American Dairy, Food and Drug Officials.

He was appointed dairy and food commissioner August 15, 1917, and re-appointed January, 1919.

STATE LIBRARIAN.

Elias J. Lien was born at Delavan, Faribault county, Minnesota. After graduating from the State Normal School at Mankato he taught school for several years. Was appointed assistant librarian by Governor Van Sant and librarian by Governor Eberhart in 1911. Is a graduate of the State University Law School and admitted to the bar. President of the American Association of Law Libraries, 1914-16. Is librarian of the Minnesota State Bar Association. Is married.

BOARD OF CONTROL.

Ralph W. Wheelock is a native of Ohio, coming west in the early eighties to locate in Dakota as a newspaper publisher. After twelve years of experience in this line at Mitchell, during which period he served as secretary to the capitol commission, deputy secretary of state, and receiver of the United States Land Office, he removed to Minneapolis, where he has since been engaged in newspaper work. Mr. Wheelock was secretary to Mayor D. P. Jones of that city during that official's term, and in October, 1909, was selected by Governor A. O. Eberhart to service in a like capacity. He resigned as private secretary in April, 1913, and was appointed a member of the Board of Control for a term of six years, to succeed P. M. Ringdal, and re-appointed January, 1919.

C. J. Swendsen, appointed by Governor Eberhart for the six-year term commencing April 3, 1911, was born in Sweden, Province of Smoland. He is a graduate of the Polytechnical School of Boras, Sweden. He has been a member of the city council of St. James, and has been president of the board of education. Mr. Swendsen is a member of the board of directors of Gustavus Adolphus College of St. Peter, Minn., and is engaged in the mercantile business at St. James. He served in 1907 and 1909 legislature as a representative from Watonwan and Martin counties. He was re-appointed in 1917 for six years.

Charles E. Vasaly, of Little Falls, was born at Ft. Ripley, Minn., December 13, 1869. Printer by trade and member of the Typographical Union. In newspaper work many years. Delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1904, and member for Minnesota of Committee on Resolutions. Was editor of Little Falls Herald when appointed to present position in April, 1909. Member of the State Board of Equalization one term; mayor of Little Falls six terms. Reappointed April, 1915.

Downer Mullen was born in Wabasha, Minn., May 20, 1880. Appointed to position in accounting department, State Board of Control, September, 1903, was advanced to the position of purchasing agent May, 1912, and was appointed secretary of the board, October, 1913.

Marcus G. Fossum is a native of Norway and came to Minnesota in 1872, and settled on a farm in Watonwan county. In 1882 he went into general mercantile business and continued until 1898. Was appointed deputy county auditor of Watonwan county in 1898, and in 1900 was elected county

auditor and served for five consecutive terms. Removed to Minneapolis in 1911. Was appointed purchasing agent for state board of control, October 1, 1913.

STATE FORESTER.

William T. Cox, chief of the department, is a graduate in forestry, having received his degree from the University of Minnesota. His first work in this line was as a student assistant in the United States forest service in 1900. Later he was attached to the field service and figured prominently in the exploration and mapping of large areas of government lands and reservations. Prior to accepting the position of state forester in 1911 he was assistant forester at Washington.

SECRETARY TO THE FOREST COMMISSION.

Christopher C. Andrews was born in Hillsboro, N. H.; was admitted to the bar of Massachusetts in 1850; elected to the senate of Minnesota in 1859. Served as colonel of the Third regiment, Minnesota volunteers, in the Civil War, and as brigadier general and brevet major general of volunteers; was United States minister at Stockholm, 1869-1877. His report on the forestry system of Sweden was published by the department of the state in 1872. He was a member of the first American forestry congress at Cincinnati, 1882.

GAME AND FISH COMMISSIONER.

Carlos Avery was born in Minneoka, Ill., January 25, 1868, and has lived in Minnesota since 1872. Was elected county superintendent of schools of McLeod county, Minn., in 1890, and served six years. He is the owner and publisher of the Hutchinson Leader. Was appointed member of the game and fish commission January 14, 1915, and was named commissioner on the abolishment of the board by the 1915 legislature.

STATE EXPERT PRINTER.

Sam Y. Gordon (Republican) was born in Indiana, but came to Minnesota with his parents prior to the Indian Massacre of 1862. Resided in Meeker County until 1880, when he moved to Browns Valley. In 1885 established the Inter-Lake Tribune, a weekly newspaper, which he still owns. Served as lieutenant governor 1910-12. Served in the house of representatives, 1915 session. Appointed to his present position as state expert printer in 1917. Mr. Gordon is married and has a son serving in the United States army in France.

SECRETARY OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

Solon Justus Buck, A. M. and Ph. D., was born in Wisconsin; was graduated at the University of Wisconsin in 1904; received the Ph. D. degree at Harvard University, 1911; was instructor in history at the University of Illinois, 1911-14; came to the University of Minnesota as assistant professor of history in 1914; and was elected superintendent and secretary of this society in November, 1914.

ARCHAEOLOGIST OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

Warren Upham, A. M. and D. Sc., was born in Amherst, N. H., March 8, 1850; was graduated at Dartmouth College in 1871; was assistant on the geological surveys of New Hampshire, Minnesota, and the United States, 1874-1895; was librarian of the Western Reserve Historical Society, Cleveland, Ohio, 1895; he was secretary and librarian of the Minnesota Historical Society for many years. He is author of many works in geology and history.

WAREHOUSE REGISTRAR AND SECRETARY RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSION.

Albert C. Clausen was born in Charlestown, Mass., May 6, 1849. He received an academic education in his native city, and came to Minnesota in the year 1872. He was appointed chief deputy inspector at Minneapolis, under the new grain law, June 1, 1885; was promoted to the position of chief grain inspector of the state August 1, 1889, which position he held until 1899. He was appointed to his present position in 1901.

CHIEF INSPECTOR OF GRAIN.

George H. Tunell was born September 26, 1858, on a farm near Albert Lea, Minnesota. He was engaged in farming until 1880, when he became a wheat buyer for country elevators. Mr. Tunell entered the service of the grain inspection department of the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission, in August, 1889, as deputy inspector of grain at Duluth. Five years later he was promoted to be first assistant chief deputy inspector at Minneapolis. He served in this capacity for seventeen years. In 1911 Mr. Tunell became chief deputy inspector at Minneapolis, from which position he was promoted to become chief inspector for the department in May, 1917, upon the resignation of H. E. Emerson. Mr. Tunell is a married man with a family.

SUPERVISOR OF TELEPHONES.

James W. Howatt, supervisor of telephones under the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission, was born August 27, 1880, in Wabasha county, Minnesota. Attended the local schools and the high school at Wabasha. Took an engineering course at the University of Minnesota. Connected with telephony since 1897, having had supervision over commercial, traffic, maintenance, construction, and engineering departments of the business. In these lines of work he has been stationed at Melrose, Wadena, St. Cloud and Minneapolis, and is now a resident of St. Paul. His appointment as supervisor of telephones dates from July 1, 1915, when the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission under a legislative act of that year assumed jurisdiction over the telephone utilities in the state.

COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION.

Fred D. Sherman was born of Scotch-Irish parentage on a homestead in Linwood township, Anoka county, this state. In 1898 he enlisted in the 14th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry for the Spanish-American war, serving as a private and musician throughout the war. Returning to Minnesota he established the Gazette at Grey Eagle, Todd county. He was appointed clerk in the land department of the state auditor's office; later was made chief clerk to the Bureau of Immigration and on June 1, 1913, he was elected commissioner of immigration. He is 38 years old.

SECRETARY OF STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Dr. Henry Martyn Bracken was born in Noblestown, Pa., February 27, 1854, and graduated from the medical department of the Columbia University in 1877. He came west and took up a residence in Minneapolis in 1885. Dr. Bracken was a professor in the medical department of the State University from 1888 to 1909, and was chosen secretary of the state board of health in 1897, a position which he has since occupied.

COMMISSIONER OF HIGHWAYS.

C. M. Babcock was born in Sherburne county August 10, 1871, and has lived there practically all his life. He entered the University of Minnesota in 1892 and since leaving college has been engaged in general mercantile business and banking. Has always been an enthusiastic advocate of good roads and was appointed by Governor A. O. Eberhart as member of the Highway Commission November 9, 1909, and served in the capacity of chairman. He was appointed commissioner of highways April 7, 1917.

GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE CLERK.

Herman E. Samuelson was born in Nicollet county, Minn., July 22, 1882. He graduated from Gustavus Adolphus college, St. Peter, in 1903; was instructor in high school, Renville, Minn., one year, and news writer on St. Paul and Minneapolis dailies from 1904 to 1914. He was appointed executive clerk by Governor Hammond in 1915 and retained by Governor Burnquist. He is married and has three children.

ASSISTANT DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER.

A. D. Sibbald was born on a farm in Ontario on March 23, 1867. He went to Michigan in 1888, where he entered the employ of a lumber company; came to Minnesota and settled in Duluth in 1891, where he was again employed in the lumber business. Was chief deputy in the office of the Surveyor of Logs and Lumber before being appointed dairy and food inspector in 1911. Was appointed assistant commissioner in 1917.

ACTING ENGINEER STATE DRAINAGE COMMISSION.

E. Victor Willard was born on a farm near Welch, Goodhue county, Minnesota, June 14, 1880. Spent two years teaching school. Entered the University of Minnesota in 1903, taking up a course in civil engineering. Left the University in the spring of 1905, and with the exception of eighteen months engaged in railroad construction, has pursued drainage engineering as his profession since leaving college. Was elected engineer by the Drainage Commission March 1, 1913. Married.

ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER OF LABOR.

Frank E. Hoffman was born at Hudson, Wis., Feb. 26, 1875. Moved to Minnesota when 13 years old. Appointed deputy labor commissioner by Governor John A. Johnson in 1905. Promoted to assistant labor commissioner in July, 1918, by John P. Gardiner, commissioner.

TAX COMMISSION.

Samuel Lord, of Kasson, was born in Marion, Olmsted county, Minnesota, February 25, 1859. Came with his parents to Mantorville, Dodge county, Minnesota, the same year. Was educated in the public schools at Mantorville, Shattuck School, and Carleton College. Studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1885. Located at Kasson the same year. He was elected county attorney of Dodge county in 1886 and was re-elected five times. Was elected to the state senate in 1898 and re-elected in 1902. In 1900 was chosen as one of the delegates-at-large to the National Republican Convention at Philadelphia and at the convention was made chairman of the delegation. Was appointed a member of the Minnesota Tax Commission by Governor Johnson at the time of its organization and was reappointed by Governor Eberhart in 1911, and by Governor Burnquist in 1917.

J. G. Armson was born at Thornton, Ontario, Canada, July 8, 1859. Was educated in the public schools of his native town and at Manitoba College, Winnipeg. Studied law for a time and then engaged in the real estate business in Manitoba. Came to Minnesota in 1884, locating at Stillwater, where he has since resided. Was engaged in grain, milling, and mercantile business, 1889 to 1900, then in real estate and insurance until 1909, when he was appointed a member of the Tax Commission by Governor Johnson. He was reappointed in 1916 by Governor Hammond. Delegate to the Democratic National Convention at St. Louis in 1904, and at Denver in 1908. Surveyor general of logs and lumber, First district of Minnesota, 1905-1909. Elected mayor of Stillwater in 1898 and successively for six terms, serving in that capacity for ten years, when he resigned to accept his present position.

James T. Hale was born in Towanda, Pennsylvania, October 8, 1855. Was graduated from Lafayette College, Easton, Pa., in the class of 1877. Attended the law department of the University of Pennsylvania in 1878 and 1879. Was admitted to practice law in Bradford county, Pennsylvania, in the fall of 1879. Came to Duluth, Minnesota, in June, 1884. Practiced law

in Duluth until 1890. In 1889 became interested in the exploration and development of the Mesaba Range and finally in 1890 gave up his law practice and devoted all his time to his growing interests on the range. His interests were practically wiped out in the panic of 1893 and following years. Moved to Deerwood, Crow Wing county, Minnesota, several years ago and has resided there ever since, engaged in the real estate business. Re-appointed on the commission January, 1918, for six-year term.

Henry A. Swift Ives was born at St. Peter, Minnesota, June 13, 1881. Graduate of St. Peter high school, University of Minnesota Academic Department, Class 1903, Night Law School, 1905. Is a member of Phi Delta Phi. Entered daily newspaper work in 1903 and was employed in Minneapolis, Chicago, St. Louis, Salt Lake City, and St. Paul until July 15, 1915, when he was appointed secretary of the Minnesota Tax Commission. He is married.

Rukard Hurd was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1858, and married Katherine Grant Hatfield, of New York. He is of English and Scotch ancestry. Has resided in Minnesota since 1889. He was graduated from the Pennsylvania Military College in Civil Engineering. Has served on the Board of Trustees of the College since 1890. He is a member of the American Institute of Mining Engineers and of the American Iron and Steel Institute. Represented the Thirty-sixth district (7th Ward, St. Paul) in the legislature of 1901 and the Special Tax Session of 1902. Was elected secretary of the Minnesota Tax Commission at the time of the organization of the commission April 29, 1907, and resigned July 15, 1915, to accept an appointment of the commission as director of the Department of Mines and Natural Resources. He is the author of the Iron Ore Manual, a general reference guide handbook on iron ore costs and values.

STATE HOTEL INSPECTOR.

W. A. Wittbecker was born in Germany and came to the United States with his parents when two years old. Settled at Freeport, Ill.; removed to Iowa in 1890 and to St. Paul in 1901. For seventeen years was a traveling salesman. Married and family of seven sons and one daughter.

CHIEF OF ACCOUNTS (Auditor's Department).

Matt J. Desmond was born at Rushford, Minnesota, October 3, 1872. Attended the graded and high schools and business college and studied law. Served ten years in railroad accounting and for the last sixteen years chief of accounts, state auditor's department.

DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT OF BANKS.

George H. Sivwright, born July 16, 1879, Sycamore, Ill. Moved with his parents to Hutchinson, Minnesota, in July, 1893. Graduate of Hutchinson High School. Worked in Bank of Hutchinson from September, 1899, to October, 1914. Appointed to examining force of the Department of Banking in October, 1914; appointed deputy superintendent November 1, 1916.

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL.

William C. Garis, born in Zanesville, Ohio, December 27, 1884; was educated in the public and high schools of Franklin, Ohio; two years' preparatory work in Prep College, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas. Graduate Minnesota College of Law, 1915, L. L. B. Degree. Served eight years in United States army, through grades of corporal, sergeant, battery quartermaster sergeant, battalion sergeant major. Two years and four months in the Philippine Constabulary through grades of sub-lieutenant, third lieutenant, second lieutenant and first lieutenant, in command of the volcano of Taal, stationed in Lake Taal; took part in several engagements at that command. Practiced law until appointed major, chief of staff, to The Adjutant General of Minnesota.

SUPERINTENDENT OF CAPITOL.

Chas. E. Chapel was born at Beloit, Wis., in August, 1843. Came to Minnesota 1856. Enlisted February 14, 1862, in the Sixth Regiment, Minnesota Volunteer Infantry. Discharged June 14, 1865, by reason of the loss of his left forearm from shell wound received April 2, 1865, a week prior to the surrender of General Lee and the Confederacy. Sheriff Faribault county, 1866. Custodian old Capitol, 1872. Elected sheriff Ramsey county, 1892, serving two terms. Appointed superintendent new Capitol, 1916.

COMMISSIONER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Charles C. Neale was born at Rushford, Minnesota, October 29, 1873. Admitted to the Minnesota bar after graduating from the St. Paul College of Law. Appointed commissioner of weights and measures July 1, 1911.

JUDICIARY

SUPREME COURT


CHIEF JUSTICE.

Calvin L. Brown was born in Sullivan county, New Hampshire, in 1854; came to Minnesota in 1855, was admitted to the bar in 1876; located at Morris in 1878, and was elected county attorney of Stevens county in 1882, 1884 and 1886. Was appointed judge of the sixteenth judicial district by Governor McGill, on March 10, 1887, and was elected to that office in 1888, and again in 1894. Was appointed associate justice of the supreme court by Governor Lind, to succeed Justice Buck, resigned, and was elected to that office in 1898. Re-elected in 1904, for term beginning January, 1906, and in 1910 for the term beginning January, 1912, and in 1912 was nominated for the position of Chief Justice as a non-partisan candidate, and elected in November. Re-elected in 1918.

ASSOCIATE JUSTICES.

Andrew Holt was born in East Union, Carver county, Minnesota, May 20, 1855. He attended the common schools of the county, St. Ansgar's Academy at East Union, now Gustavus Adolphus College at St. Peter, during such periods as he could be spared from the farm work; entered the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1880; studied law and was admitted to the practice of law in 1881; practiced law in the city of Minneapolis until January, 1894, when he was appointed municipal judge; elected in the fall of 1894 and again in the fall of 1900; elected to the district bench in 1904. Mr. Holt was appointed to succeed Justice Simpson, resigned, and was elected for the full term of six years at the election of 1912, and re-elected in November, 1918.

Oscar Hallam was born on a farm at Linden, Wis., October 19, 1865. Attended the district school there. In 1881 he entered the Dodgeville high school and in 1882 entered the University of Wisconsin. Graduated there in 1887, and in 1889 graduated from the Wisconsin University law school. Came to Minnesota in 1889 and located in St. Paul, where he was admitted to the bar, and practiced there until taking office January 1, 1905. Has been an instructor in the St. Paul College of Law since it was instituted. He was nominated as a non-partisan candidate at the primaries for associate justice, and was elected in November for the full term of six years and re-elected in November, 1918.



James H. Quinn was born in Kilbourn City, Wis., June 23, 1857; came to Minnesota, locating in Blue Earth county, June, 1864; practiced law ever since he was twenty-four years of age; was elected county attorney of Faribault county five terms; resigned when appointed district judge in 1897 which position he held continuously until his election as justice of the supreme court at the November election in 1916.

Homer B. Dibell was born in Fillmore county, Minnesota, in 1864; graduate of the University of Indiana, 1889, and of the Northwestern University Law School, 1890. Admitted to the bar at Duluth, October, 1890. Elected judge of district court, 1898; re-elected in 1904 and 1910. Appointed supreme court commissioner April 1, 1913 and appointed associate justice in October, 1918, on the death of Justice G. L. Bunn.

SUPREME COURT COMMISSIONERS.

Myron D. Taylor was born December 30, 1855, at Byron, Maine; came to Minnesota in September, 1858; graduate of the University of Minnesota, class of 1878; principal of schools at Henderson, Minn.; resided at St. Cloud, Minn., practicing law since March, 1881. City attorney twelve years; register United States land office eight years; appointed to succeed Judge Searle December 1, 1906, and twice elected to the position. Appointed supreme court commissioner April 1, 1913.

Edward Lees was born in Buffalo county, Wisconsin, in 1865, graduated from the law department of the University of Wisconsin in 1886, and immediately thereafter located at Winona, Minnesota, where he has since resided and practiced law. He was a member and president of the State Board of Law Examiners for many years and for four years was a member of the Minnesota Board of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws. Appointed supreme court commissioner for the six-year term beginning December 1, 1918.

DISTRICT COURTS

FIRST DISTRICT.

Albert Johnson is a native of Goodhue county. He was admitted to the bar at Red Wing in 1885 and practiced law at that place until appointed to the judgeship. He was county attorney from 1896 to 1906. In August, 1909, he was appointed judge of district court, First judicial district, and at the November election 1910 was elected to the position. He was re-elected in 1916. He resides at Red Wing.

Willard L. Converse was born in Winnishiek county, Iowa, in 1870. He graduated from the State University of Iowa in 1895, and in the same year was admitted to the practice of law. He was twice elected county attorney of Howard county, Iowa, on the Republican ticket, and served four years in that capacity. In 1907 he removed to South St. Paul, Minnesota, where he still resides. At the fall election of 1914 he was elected district judge of the First district, and after election he was appointed by the governor to serve in that capacity till his regular term began, January 1st, 1915. In 1896 he married Eva M. Klickner, of Sioux City, Iowa.

SECOND DISTRICT.

Hascal R. Brill was born in the Province of Quebec, Canada, 1846; came to the United States in 1859, and settled in Minnesota the same year; was admitted to the bar in 1870; elected judge of probate of Ramsey county, 1872; appointed judge of the court of common pleas of the same county March 1, 1875, and elected judge of the same court in the fall of 1875, for seven years; unanimously elected judge of the second judicial district, 1882, and each succeeding six years since. He is married and resides in St. Paul.

William Louis Kelly was born at Springfield, Ky., August 27, 1839, and settled in Minnesota in 1865; educated in private country school; has farmed in Minnesota, edited a newspaper for a while, and practiced law. Was admitted to the Ramsey county bar in 1871, but never made the law his exclusive occupation until the fall of 1878; appointed judge of district court March 15, 1887, by Governor McGill; was elected in 1888, and on each six year period since that time. Is a veteran of the Civil war.

Olin B. Lewis was born in Weyauwega, Wis., March 12, 1861. He graduated from Omro high school in 1879, the classical department of the State University of Wisconsin in 1884, and the University Law School of Wisconsin in 1889, where he was for some time instructor. He came to this state in 1889 and located at St. Paul. He was elected to the assembly in 1894 and re-elected in 1896; elected to the district bench in 1896, and for each six-year period since.

Grier M. Orr was born May 14, 1856, in Clarion county, Pennsylvania. Attended the public schools in Oconto, Wis., from 1868 to 1873. Entered Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, 1873, graduating in 1878. Taught school and read law for two years. Graduated from Cincinnati law school, 1883. Practiced law in Lima, Ohio, until 1884, when he came to St. Paul. Elected judge of the municipal court in St. Paul, 1894, and re-elected, 1898; elected judge of district court 1902, re-elected 1908 and 1914. He is married.

Frederick Newberry Dickson was born in Northfield, this state, May 15, 1863. He graduated from Carleton College in 1885, and settled in St. Paul the following year. Two years later he was admitted to the bar, and in 1901 he became assistant United States district attorney. Mr. Dickson was appointed a judge of the district court by Gov. Eberhart in 1911, he succeeding George L. Bunn, who was appointed to the supreme bench. He was elected as a non-partisan candidate for the full term of six years in 1912 and 1918.

Hugo O. Hanft was born at St. Peter, Minn., December 16, 1871. He was educated in the grammar and high school at New Ulm, Minn., German-American Teachers' Seminary at Milwaukee, Wis., regular and post-graduate course of law at University of Minnesota. Began practice of law at St. Paul, 1896; enlisted as private in Co. E, 13th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry during its war with Spain; mustered out as batallion adjutant, third batallion, same regiment. Assistant county attorney Ramsey county 1900-1906; judge of municipal court by election, 1906-1914. Judge of district court by election, 1914.

James C. Michael was born in Preston county, Va., March 19, 1863. He came to Minnesota in 1884, settling at Red Wing, where he was admitted to the bar. He moved to St. Paul in 1889, where he practiced his profession and was corporation attorney of the city for several years. On the creation of a new judgeship by the 1915 legislature he was appointed to the position and was elected to the office at the 1916 general election.

Charles C. Haupt was born at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., January, 1854. Moved with his parents to southern Michigan when ten years old. Educated at Ann Arbor, Mich. Came to Minnesota in 1882 and located at Willmar, later moving to Fergus Falls. Was appointed United States district attorney in 1902 by President Roosevelt and moved to St. Paul, where he has since resided. Was appointed district judge May, 1917, and elected to his present position for the full six-year term in November, 1918. Married.

THIRD DISTRICT.

Charles E. Callaghan was born May 20, 1863, in Livingston county, New York, and came to Minnesota with his parents in 1865. He was admitted to the bar at Rochester in 1889 and practiced law at that place until his appointment as district judge in September, 1917, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge George W. Granger. He was elected without opposition in November, 1918.

FOURTH DISTRICT.

Horace D. Dickinson, born at Odgensburg, St. Lawrence county, New York, July 25, 1866. Moved to Minneapolis in September, 1876. Graduated from the law department of the Minnesota University in 1890, at the age of twenty-four. Assistant city attorney of the city of Minneapolis, occupying said position for four years. Elected in 1900 one of the judges of the municipal court of Minneapolis, resigning the latter office to assume the duties of one of the judges of the district court, to which place he was elected in 1904 and re-elected in 1910 and 1916.

William Edward Hale was born at Wheeling, West Va., May 11, 1845. In 1860 Mr. Hale located at Plainview and from that point enlisted as a private in the 3rd Minnesota in the fall of 1861, serving as such for three years. He was county attorney of Wright county for two years. In the spring of 1872, he moved to Minneapolis where he has since resided. He served four years as county attorney of that county. He was appointed judge by Gov. Eberhart to succeed Judge Donahue, deceased, and has since been elected to the position. He is married.

Charles S. Jelley was born on a farm in southeastern Indiana; graduated in the academic department from Yale College; practiced in Indiana for a few years after his admission to the bar and then located at Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1886. Since coming to Minnesota he was attorney for the county commissioners of Hennepin county, first assistant county attorney, and assistant attorney general; on December 21st, 1911, was appointed by Governor Eberhart to the position of district judge for the Fourth judicial district of the state, was elected on November 5, 1912, to succeed himself, and re-elected in November, 1918.

Edward Foote Waite was born January 15, 1860, at Norwich, New York. He has resided in Minneapolis since 1888. He was educated at Norwich Academy, Colgate University, and the Columbian Law School. He was an assistant city attorney, and, during the ad interim administration of Acting Mayor David P. Jones, in 1901, superintendent of police. In December, 1904, he was appointed municipal judge of Minneapolis, and was elected to the same office in 1906. In April, 1911, the legislature having provided for an additional judge of the Fourth district, he was appointed to the new office, and elected for a full term in 1912, and re-elected in 1918.

William C. Leary was born in Owatonna, Minnesota, in 1869, residing there until 1882, when he moved to Minneapolis. He practiced law for six years in Minneapolis, after which he was appointed assistant county attorney of Hennepin county, serving four years. Mr. Leary was appointed attorney to the county commissioners, serving in that capacity for over three years, after which he was appointed first assistant county attorney, serving until he became municipal judge. He was elected to the district bench in 1914 and re-elected in November, 1918.

John H. Steele was born at Longford, Ireland, in 1856. Came to America with his parents when a small boy; was admitted to the bar of Illinois

in 1883, and located in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1884; was elected judge of probate of Hennepin county in 1902 and served from January, 1903, until January, 1907. He was appointed judge to succeed D. F. Simpson in December, 1910. Was married in Minneapolis. Elected in 1914 for full term.

Joseph W. Molyneaux, Minneapolis, was born in Bellevue, Campbell county, Kentucky, December 12, 1862. Was educated at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, and Cincinnati Law School, Cincinnati, Ohio. Came to Minneapolis in 1886. May, 1913, he was appointed judge of the district court, and was elected to succeed himself as such at the general election in November, 1914. Was married in June, 1900.

Daniel Fish, born January 31, 1848, at Cherry Valley, Ill. Served in the 45th Illinois Infantry from January 4, 1864, to July 12, 1865. Admitted to the Iowa bar April 19th, 1871. Settled in Wright county, Minnesota, in the following June. Was judge of probate there three years. Was the first attorney of the Minneapolis Park Board. Appointed by the Supreme Court Justices a Commissioner to revise the statutes (1901) and later was chairman of the Commission. City attorney of Minneapolis, January, 1911, to May 21, 1914. Resigned to accept appointment as judge. Elected in 1914 for six-year-term. Married in 1873.

Winfield W. Bardwell, born at Excelsior, Hennepin county, Minnesota; educated in Excelsior public schools, Excelsior academy, University of Minnesota; member of the Minnesota State Legislature during sessions of 1903 and 1905; six years on the municipal bench of the city of Minneapolis. Elected to district court November, 1918.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

Arthur B. Childress was born in Kingston, Roane county, Tenn., on August 17, 1871. He graduated from Grant University at Athens, Tennessee, in May, 1892. Came to Minnesota in April, 1893, and settled at Dundas in Rice county, where he taught school for two years. Was admitted to the bar June 4, 1898. He held the office of county attorney of Rice county four years. He was elected district judge November, 1910 and in 1916. He is married and resides at Faribault.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

W. L. Comstock was born in Mankato, Minn., November 24, 1861; he was admitted to the bar in Mankato in 1890 and practiced there. He was a representative in the legislature in 1893. Elected to the district bench in 1914.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

Carroll A. Nye was born on a farm in St. Croix county, Wisconsin, forty-nine years ago. He took up law for a profession, studying first with his brother, Frank M. Nye, of Minneapolis, and with Robert M. La Follette, present United States senator from Wisconsin. He located at Moorhead, Minnesota, in 1887, where he has practiced his profession ever since. Has held the office of city attorney five years; mayor four years; county attorney

eight years, and has also served as a member of the State Normal Board two terms. Elected judge of the district court in 1910 and in 1916.

John A. Roeser was born January 28, 1867, in Stearns county, Minnesota. Educated in the common and normal schools of St. Cloud. Taught school 1883 to 1890. Admitted to bar in 1898. Later admitted to partnership under firm name of Reynolds & Roeser. Was elected judge of the district court in November, 1914.

William L. Parsons was born at Westfield, New York, in 1858. Educated in Westfield Academy, graduated from Hamilton College in 1878. Engaged as teacher in Adelphi Academy, Brooklyn, New York, 1878 to 1881; admitted to bar in 1882; practiced law in Fergus Falls 1883 to 1907; referee in bankruptcy 1898 to 1907; elected judge of district court in November, 1914. Married.

EIGHTH DISTRICT.

Cyril M. Tift was born in the township of Mayfield, De Kalb county, Illinois, April 23, 1865. Moved to Hutchinson, McLeod county, Minnesota in the fall of 1879. Was graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor, in 1888; and in June, 1889, located at Glencoe, Minn. In November, 1902, was elected Judge of Probate of McLeod county and has held that position for fourteen years. On November 7, 1916, he was elected judge of the district court of the eighth judicial district. Mr. Tift was married to Lillian M. Richardson of Glencoe.

NINTH DISTRICT.

Frank Clague, resident of Redwood Falls. Native of Ohio. Resided in Minnesota since 1881. Admitted to the bar in 1891 and practiced law in Redwood county since admission. County attorney of Redwood county, 1895 to 1903. Representative in legislature, sessions 1903 and 1905. Speaker Minnesota house of representatives, session 1905. State senator from Brown and Redwood counties, 1907 to 1915. Elected district judge at November election, 1918.

TENTH DISTRICT.

Samuel D. Catherwood was born in Freeborn county, Minn., Nov. 12, 1859. He was admitted to the bar in 1888 and immediately began the practice of law at Austin. He was county attorney of Mower county for three terms. Judge Catherwood is an active member of the State and American Bar associations. He was appointed to succeed Nathan Kingsley, resigned, and was elected at the November election in 1916.

ELEVENTH DISTRICT.

Josiah D. Ensign was born in Erie county, New York, May 14, 1833. Moved to Ashtabula county, Ohio, in 1839, and was admitted to the bar in 1857. He was elected clerk of the courts of Ashtabula county in 1857, and served six years. Settled in Duluth, in 1870, where he followed the practice of law until his appointment as judge, April, 1889. He has held the offices

of county attorney for St. Louis county, member of city council and mayor of Duluth, and member of board of education.

William A. Cant was born at Westfield, Marquette county, Wisconsin, December 23, 1863. Came to Minnesota in 1881; settled in Duluth in April, 1886; elected a member of the house of representatives in 1894, city attorney of Duluth in 1895, and judge of the district court in 1896. Was educated in the common schools of his native state, the St. Cloud State Normal School and the University of Michigan.

Herbert A. Dancer was born on a farm near Chelsea, Michigan, March 8, 1874, where he lived until 21 years of age. He graduated from the Chelsea high school and from the Academic and Law departments of the University of Michigan. He came to Duluth in 1897 where he practiced law until appointed judge of the district court in April, 1911, by Governor Eberhart. He was elected in November, 1912, and re-elected in 1918.

Martin Hughes was born in Sheboygan county, Wisconsin, on the 18th day of March, 1867, and resided in that county until coming to Minnesota on December 5, 1901, and has ever since lived at Hibbing. Was appointed district judge by Governor Johnson on the 28th of March, 1909; was elected on the 8th of November, 1910, and November, 1916.

Bert Fesler was born at Franklin, Indiana, July 22, 1866, the son of Col. John R. Fesler, 27th Ind. VI. Graduated from the University of Indiana in 1889. Admitted to the Minnesota Bar in October, 1893. City attorney of Duluth, 1904-1908 and 1910-1912. Appointed judge of the district court by Governor Eberhart in March, 1913, to succeed Judge Dibell. Elected in November, 1914, for a term of six years.

Edward Freeman, Virginia, Minnesota, was born at Mankato, Minnesota, October 15, 1878, son of Everett P. Freeman, attorney-at-law. Graduate of Mankato high school, 1896, and of the Law Department, University of Minnesota, 1903. Located at Chisholm, Minnesota, in the fall of 1903, practiced law there until April, 1917, when he was appointed judge of the district court, to which position he was elected in November, 1918.

TWELFTH DISTRICT.

Richard T. Daly, judge of the twelfth judicial district, was born on a farm near Watertown, Jefferson county, Wisconsin, in 1863. He attended district school, took two terms at the Mankato Normal school, studied law with William Plymat at Mapleton, and afterward entered the office of Freeman & Pfau at Mankato, being admitted to the bar at Mankato on December 31, 1887. He taught school in Nebraska, and in September, 1890, he located at Renville. The same year he was elected county attorney of Renville county and served one term. He was appointed a member of the State Board of Equalization by Governor Johnson in 1905. February, 1915, Judge Gorham Powers, resigned and on the twenty-fifth day of February, 1915, Governor W. S. Hammond appointed Mr. Daly to succeed him. Judge Daly was married to Lillie J. Johnson, September 16, 1896.

G. E. Qvale was born at Haugesund, Norway, September 24th, 1860; came to the United States in October, 1878; settled in Minnesota the following year; admitted to the bar July, 1882; practiced law in Willmar until appointed judge in 1897; elected in 1898, and re-elected in 1904, 1910 and 1916; was judge of probate six years, and county attorney of Kandiyohi county four years. Mr. Qvale has resided at Willmar since 1880.

THIRTEENTH DISTRICT.

Lewis S. Nelson was born November 2, 1850, in Grundy county, Illinois. Was admitted to the bar in Illinois in 1875 and in Iowa in 1876. Came to Adrian, Nobles county, in 1879. Served as Captain of Co. "G," 15th Minnesota, from July 2, 1898, to March 27, 1899. Moved to Slayton, Murray county, in 1900, and served as county attorney for Murray county from 1902 to 1908. Was elected district judge November 8, 1910, and November, 1916. His residence is Worthington, Minn.

FOURTEENTH DISTRICT.

William Watts was born in the Province of Ontario, Canada, in 1850; was admitted to the bar in 1877; came to Minnesota in 1878; resides at Crookston; has held the office of city attorney, county attorney, president of the city council and a member of the board of education. Elected judge, 1898, 1904, 1910 and 1916. He is married.

Andrew Grindelund resides at Warren, Marshall county, Minnesota. He was born at Winnesheik county, Iowa, fifty-six years ago. He graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa in 1882, and settled in Minnesota July of the same year. He is married, and has held the office of judge of probate of Marshall county, and senator from the Sixty-third district. Appointed judge of the district court, Fourteenth district, March 24, 1903, and has been re-elected three times.

FIFTEENTH DISTRICT.

William E. McClenahan was born in Baltimore, Md., June 19, 1854; was graduated (A. B.) from Dickson College, Carlisle, Pa., 1875, and from the Law Department of the University of Maryland (LL. B.) in 1880; practiced law in Baltimore until October, 1882, when he came to Brainerd; held the office of city attorney of Brainerd from March, 1888, until November, 1900. Elected judge of district court 1912 and re-elected November 5, 1918.

Benjamin F. Wright was born in Durham, Me., fifty-one years ago, graduated from Colby College, Waterville, Me. He located in Minnesota in 1887 and his present residence is Park Rapids. He is married.

Charles W. Stanton was born in Pine Island, Goodhue county, Minnesota, in 1862; was editor and publisher of the Press at Appleton, Minnesota, until after his admission to the bar in 1889; was judge of probate of Swift county, 1890-1894; was county attorney of Koochiching county at the time of his appointment as judge of the Fifteenth judicial district to fill a vacancy, in March, 1908. He was elected in 1910 and in 1914.

SIXTEENTH DISTRICT.

Stephen A. Flaherty was born in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, April 11, 1855. He was educated at a country school, at Lawrence University in Appleton, Wisconsin, and at the University of Minnesota. He came to Morris in 1881, where, in 1882, he was admitted to the bar. Married Miss Nellie M. Sheridan in 1884. Was county attorney of Stevens county many years and resigned that office in 1895 upon moving to Minneapolis. After a year's residence there, he moved to Litchfield, and in 1899 returned to Morris, where he now resides. He was elected judge of the district court in 1900, 1906, 1912 and 1918.

SEVENTEENTH DISTRICT.

Ezra C. Dean was born in Le Moille, Ill., March 22, 1858. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois and of the law department of the University of Iowa. Following his admission to the bar in 1881 he located in Pipestone county, of which he was county attorney for ten years. From Pipestone county he moved to Martin county, of which he was also county attorney. He was elected district judge at the general election in 1916.

EIGHTEENTH DISTRICT.

Arthur E. Giddings was born in Anoka, October 2, 1866. He is a graduate of the State University, and took a full course at the University Law School. He has been city attorney of Anoka for two terms, and county attorney of Anoka county. Mr. Giddings is married and resides at Anoka. First term began 1899.

NINETEENTH DISTRICT.

Jasper N. Searles came to Minnesota from Hiram, Ohio, with his parents in the spring of 1855, locating at Hastings. Served as clerk in general store and druggist's establishment and taught private school until the Civil war, when he enlisted in the First Regiment, Minnesota Volunteer Infantry, as private, serving three years until mustered out. Spent three years at Ft. Wadsworth, now Ft. Sisseton, South Dakota, then entered law school at Ann Arbor, Michigan, where he graduated in 1869. Opened law office at Hastings and served as county attorney. Moved to Stillwater 1881. Served in the legislature while a resident of Hastings. Candidate for state senate from Washington county in 1890, but unseated in a contest by Jas. S. O'Brien. Appointed judge nineteenth district in July, 1917, and elected in November, 1918.



SENATORS

Knute Nelson (Republican) of Alexandria was born in Norway, Feb. 2, 1843. He came to the United States in July, 1849, resided in Chicago, Ill., until the fall of 1850, when he removed to the state of Wisconsin, and from there to the state of Minnesota in July, 1871. He was a private and non-commissioned officer in the Fourth Wisconsin Regiment during the War of the Rebellion, and was wounded and taken prisoner at Port Hudson, La., on the 14th day of June, 1863. He was admitted to the bar as a practicing attorney in the spring of 1867; was a member of the assembly in the Wisconsin legislature in 1868 and 1869; was county attorney of Douglas county, Minnesota, in 1872, 1873 and 1874; was state senator in 1875, 1876, 1877 and 1878; was presidential elector in 1880; was a member of the board of regents of the State University from Feb. 1, 1882, to Jan. 1, 1893; was a member of the forty-eighth, forty-ninth and fiftieth congresses for the Fifth district of Minnesota; was elected governor of Minnesota in the fall of 1892; re-elected as governor in the fall of 1894, and was elected United States senator for Minnesota on the 23d day of January, 1895, re-elected in 1901, 1907, 1913 and 1918.

Frank B. Kellogg (Republican) was born in St. Lawrence County, northern New York, December 22, 1856. He was nine years old when he accompanied his parents from the Empire State to Minnesota. His boyhood schooling was secured in the district schools of Olmsted county, where his parents had settled, and he later attended the graded school at Elgin. In the fall of 1875, he was admitted to the bar, and at once entered upon the practice of his profession at Rochester. He continued to reside in Rochester until October, 1887, and during this time was elected city attorney and county attorney of Olmsted county, which offices he filled for the terms of three and five years, respectively. Mr. Kellogg removed to St. Paul in October, 1887, when he entered into partnership with Cushman K. Davis and Cordenia A. Severance. Mr. Kellogg's work, for a number of years, was largely that of counsel merger. In 1904 he was government delegate to the University Congress of Lawyers and Jurists. From 1904 to 1912 he was the Minnesota member of the Republican National Committee. During the year 1912-1913 he was President of the American Bar Association. He was nominated and elected United States Senator in 1916.



REPRESENTATIVES

FIRST DISTRICT.

Sydney Anderson (Republican) was born on a farm in Goodhue county, Minnesota, September 17, 1880. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota Law School and is a practicing attorney in Lanesboro, Fillmore county. He is married. He was elected representative to congress in 1910, 1912, 1916 and 1918.

SECOND DISTRICT.

Franklin F. Ellsworth (Republican) of Mankato, was born at St. James, Minnesota, July 10, 1879. Has practiced law at St. James and Mankato since June 7, 1901. Was county attorney of Watonwan county four years, and city attorney at St. James two years. Enlisted in Company H, 12th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry, Spanish-American war. Was married in 1902 to Miss Lurline Mae Bader of Minneapolis. Elected in 1914, 1916 and 1918.

THIRD DISTRICT.

Charles Russell Davis (Republican) of St. Peter was born at Pittsfield, Ill., Sept. 17, 1849; removed to Le Sueur county, Minnesota, in 1853; was admitted to the bar March 6, 1872, and has practiced his profession ever since in Minnesota. He was county attorney of Nicollet county for ten years, and city clerk and city attorney of St. Peter for eighteen years; elected to the house of representatives of the state legislature in 1888 and to the senate in 1890; was captain of Company I, Second Regiment, Minnesota National Guard, for four years; was elected to the fifty-eighth and succeeding sessions.

FOURTH DISTRICT.

Carl C. Van Dyke (Democrat) is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Van Dyke. He was born at Alexandria, Minnesota, February 18, 1881. Served with a St. Paul Company in the Spanish-American war, later entered government service. While in government service studied law. For three years beginning in 1911 he represented government employes at Washington. In 1914 was elected on the Democratic ticket to represent the Fourth congressional district in congress, and again in 1916 and 1918.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

Walter Hughes Newton (Republican) was born at Minneapolis October 10, 1880, the son of Thomas R. and Mary Newton, old residents of that city and state.

After leaving the South High school he entered the employ of Dodson, Fisher, Brockmann Company, wholesale saddlery, with which he was connected for fifteen years. Studied nights at the Y. M. C. 
FORTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.


FORTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.

Ole O. Sageng, farmer, resides near Dalton, Otter Tail county. Born in Norway, December 1, 1871, and came to the United States in 1878. Graduate of Fergus Falls high school. Married in 1904 to Carrie Brandvold. Elected to house in 1900, serving one term. Member of senate since 1906.

FIFTY-FIRST DISTRICT.

John B. Stepan was born in Rice county, Minnesota, forty years ago. Educated in the common schools; held various township and school district offices. Occupation, farmer and dealer in lands. Is married and resides at Browerville, Todd county.



FIFTY-SECOND DISTRICT.



P. H. McGarry was born at Grand Rapids, Michigan, where he attended the public schools. Located in Walker in the year 1896. Purchased the townsite known as Walker from Mr. T. B. Walker, Minneapolis, and became first president of the village. After the county was organized was one of the first county commissioners. Took an active part in the upbuilding of the village of Walker and has been identified with most of the public affairs of importance to this section of the state. Owner of resort known as Glengarry Springs. Mr. McGarry was a member of the house in 1909 and 1913 and of the senate 1915 and 1917.

FIFTY-THIRD DISTRICT.

Hilding A. Swanson was born in Smoland, Sweden, June 30, 1885; emigrated to the United States June 8, 1888. His parents located at Gull River, Cass county, Minnesota. Received a common school education at Kalamazoo, Michigan; is a plumber by trade and served as alderman and later mayor of the city of Virginia for eleven years. Leonard H. Nord was born in Christiania, Norway, in 1873. Emigrated to Minneapolis in 1884. He established the Enger-Nord Realty Company of Minneapolis, International Falls, and Fort Francis, Ontario, in 1900. Married and resides at International Falls.

J. J. Sliter was born in 1873 on a farm near Spring Green, Wisconsin. Attended country school one month each year until 17. Graduated from high school at 19. Attended business college one year, law school at St. Paul one year. School teacher several years, farmer for past fifteen years. Resides at Houston.



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Charles W. Hale, known as one of the Hale Bros., of Stewartville, Minn., was born on a farm in Sumner township, Fillmore county, December 27, 1863, where he still resides. Attended common school, high school at Spring Valley, Minn.; was graduated from the School of Agriculture, University of Minnesota, in 1899; married to Martha Engle in 1901, has three children; engaged in general farming and stock raising; member of school board about quarter of century; with State Farmers Institute for a number of years. Serving second term in house.



SECOND DISTRICT.

W. Galewski was born of Polish parents in the eastern part of Germany in October, 1862, and studied in the common schools of his native town. Came to the United States and to Milwaukee, Wis., in 1879 and two years later to Winona, Minn. For a number of years engaged in the sheet metal trade and in 1903 organized the Winona Heating & Ventilating Co., of which he is president. Elected a member board of education in 1900 and held the office eighteen years, serving also as president of the board. Is married and only son is serving in the U. S. navy.

FORTY-SECOND DISTRICT.



ASSISTANT SERGEANT-AT-ARMS OF THE SENATE.


Mathias Nuereberg was born at Marrytown, Wis., April 20, 1859, but for the last forty years has been a resident of St. Cloud, Minn.


ASSISTANT ENROLLING CLERK OF THE SENATE.

POSTMASTER.


