

AUTHORITY AND CONTENTS

The Legislative Manual of 1925 is divided as to contents into three parts. Part I contains the state organic act, act authorizing a state government, act of admission, constitutions of the State of Minnesota and the United States, territorial and state government, and legislative statistics. Part II contains history of state, and review of state departments and institutions. Part III contains roster of officers of state departments and institutions, county officers and federal officers appointed from Minnesota, election returns, population and financial statistics of the state, and such miscellaneous matter of general interest as has usually been published in the Manual.

The publication of this Manual is biennial, and is authorized under Section 4940 of the General Statutes of 1913.

Distribution is as follows:

Usual copies to each member of the legislature, including the president of the senate.

Fifty copies to state historical society for exchange with other states.

Five copies to state university.

Three copies to state library.

Two copies to congressional library at Washington.

Two copies to soldiers' home.

Two copies to each free public library in the state.

Two copies to each public college, seminary or academy in this state.

Two copies to each state normal school.

Two copies to each state high school.

One copy to each independent special and common school district in this state.

And the secretary of state shall send the number of manuals required to be furnished said school districts to the county superintendent of schools of each county.

One copy to each state institution not herein provided for.

One copy to each elective state officer.

One copy to each appointed state officer who is the head of any department.

One copy to each officer and employe of the house and senate.

One copy to each supreme and district court judge.

One copy to each United States senator and member of congress from this state.

One copy to each auditor's office in this state.

Two hundred and seventy-five copies to remain in the office of the secretary of state for distribution among the members of the next succeeding legislature.

The remaining copies shall be held for distribution as deemed best.

KNUTE NELSON

Knute Nelson was born February 2, 1843, at Evanger, Voss, in a little hut on a barren mountainside overlooking a beautiful valley. His father died when he was three years old. Two years later he and his mother came to America. On the Atlantic, finding his mother weeping and in prayer in her cabin, the boy exclaimed, "Don't cry, mother, we are poor now, but when I grow up, I shall be next to the king."

They came to Chicago, and the five-year-old lad became a newsboy. A year later we find them in Dane County, Wisconsin, on a farm. The boy received all the education afforded in the common schools and in Albion Academy. The strong arms and ready hands inspired his youthful companions with respect, as did his industry his conscientious teacher with due admiration.

In 1861, the war broke out and Nelson enlisted in Company B, Fourth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry. He participated in the capture of Fort Jackson, St. Philip and New Orleans, in the expedition against Vicksburg and in the battles of Baton Rouge, Camp Bislan, Franklin and Opelauses. He was wounded and taken prisoner in the charge against Fort Hudson. He returned to Wisconsin in 1864, broken in health but not in spirit. He had sent his monthly wages to his mother, and she had saved them for him so that he might re-enter Albion Academy. Later he entered the Law School at the University of Wisconsin.

The year he was admitted to the bar he was elected to the Legislature on the Republican ticket. He had not yet recovered his health, and seeking a more healthful climate, he came to Minnesota in 1871, and took a homestead at Alexandria, upon which he lived until his death.

He engaged in the practice of law, served as county attorney three years, state senator four years, as a member of the University board of regents eleven years, and in Congress six years. He retired voluntarily to re-engage in the practice of law, but two years later was drafted as his party's nominee for governor. He was pitted against D. W. Lawler, then Minnesota's most brilliant young man, and Ignatius Donnelly, famed from coast to coast. He was elected by a fair plurality and two years later he was re-elected.

The Legislature of 1895 elected him United States Senator. He was re-elected by the Legislature in 1901, 1907, and 1913, and by popular vote in 1918. In war and in peace, he served his country a total of fifty-nine years, a most unusual record.

His service in Congress was particularly marked by his fearless stand on the tariff, he being one of three Republicans to vote for the Democratic Mills bill. He ever since maintained his attitude for a low protective tariff.

As governor, he distinguished himself because of his recommendations affecting the grain and warehouse business. He showed his ability to cope with a difficult situation when the Hinckley fire broke out in 1894. His efforts for reclamation in the Red River Valley are still remembered by the people in that section, as are his attainments in connection with the development of our iron ore mines.


In the United States Senate he served with untiring energy for nearly thirty years. He was unostentatious and never boasted of his attainments, although he was one of the most distinguished members of that body. Senator Beveridge said of him that he "was the nearest approach to the ideal senator." In Washington he was known as the senator who had stepped into the shoes of Senator Hoar of Massachusetts. His industry was the greatest of any man in the capital.

Senator Nelson was the father of the department of commerce and labor. The bankruptcy act of 1898 was his work and bears his name as the "Nelson cure." It was due to him that national banks can be established with a capital of \$25,000. He served with distinction as chairman of the senate judiciary committee from 1919 until his death. His speeches and actions supporting the government during the World War were vigorous and emphatic.

In the winter of 1923, Senator Nelson suffered a severe attack of influenza. During his illness he often expressed a longing for the peace and quiet of his farm home at Alexandria. This wish was to be denied to him, he succumbed to heart failure on the train, near Harrisburg, Pa., April 28, 1923. His remains lie buried near his homestead at Alexandria, and a permanent memorial will be erected on the State Capitol grounds.

Senator Nelson fulfilled his boyish prediction that he "would be next to the king." A man of oak, in whose early childhood instinct became intelligence; in whose youth anger begot ambition; in whose life's evening his fellow-citizens viewed him as a mental colossus, he at all times had the love and admiration of all who knew him. Truly, he could have said: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." His life is the greatest inspiration of our day to the lowly American immigrant; may his memory be as lasting as the noble purposes for which he lived.

CALVIN LUTHER BROWN

Calvin Luther Brown, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Minnesota from 1899 to 1912, and Chief Justice from then until his death, was born at Goshen, New Hampshire, April 26th, 1854, and died at his home in Minneapolis, Minnesota, September 24th, 1923.

Like his close friend and predecessor, Mr. Chief Justice Start, he possessed the heritage of New England ancestry. His great-grandfather, William Brown, was a soldier of the Revolution; his grandfather, Luther Brown, took part in the war of 1812, and his father, John Harrison Brown, for many years a District Judge in this State; was in the Commissary Department of the Union Army during the Civil War, stationed at Madison, Wisconsin, with the rank of Captain.

When the late Chief Justice was but one year old his parents settled at Shakopee, in this State. Minnesota was then a territory, so that during the subsequent sixty-seven years of his life he witnessed and took part in the development of the State to its present position.

As a boy in Shakopee he saw the trembling fugitives from the Sioux massacre of 1862; he experienced the thrill of horror which swept over the nation at the assassination of Lincoln; he saw the survivors of the Minnesota regiments return to their homes after the suppression of the rebellion; he knew when the first mile of railway was constructed in Minnesota and when the Indians ceased to come with their Red River carts to barter with the fur traders; and then, when the St. Paul and Pacific Railway pierced the "Big Woods" and emerged upon the prairie, he joined in the movement which filled the western lands of Minnesota with happy homes and prosperous citizens.

In 1870 the family removed to Willmar, Kandiyohi County, Minnesota, and there, on September 1st, 1878, the late Chief Justice married Miss Annette Marlow, who bore him five children; one, Olive, dying in infancy, and four who survived him—Alice A., now the wife of Dr. B. J. Branton, of Willmar; Edna M., and Margaret E., residents of Minneapolis, and Montreville J. Brown, attorney at law of St. Paul.

Mrs. Brown, an ideal mother and helpmate, died at Minneapolis, October 13th, 1919.

After some ventures into other fields, usually to be expected of a restless and ambitious young man in a frontier state, Calvin L. Brown seriously took up the study of law, and was admitted to the Bar of Minnesota, February 22nd, 1876. He first practiced in Willmar, in partnership with his brother, Horace W. Brown, and in 1878 removed to Morris, Stevens County, where he served as County Attorney from 1883 until his appointment by Gov. McGill, on March 10th, 1887, as District Judge of the Sixteenth Judicial District.

Presiding for eleven years as District Judge, he earned the approbation and love of all with whom he came in contact, with the result that in 1898 he was elected Associate Judge of the Supreme Court for the term commencing January 1, 1900. Before the beginning of his term Mr. Justice Buck resigned, and Gov. Lind, on November 20th, 1899, appointed the newly elected Justice to fill the vacancy. In 1912, when Mr. Chief Justice Start refused to accept a re-election, Justice Brown was elected Chief Justice, and continued to serve in that position until his death.

The real life work of the Chief Justice began with his elevation to the Supreme Court, and his legal attainments, his clear vision and common sense, and his gentle heart and intellectual honesty may be gathered from the opinions written by him, beginning with Skone vs. Barnard, 78 Minn., 210. Since then he delivered the opinion of the Court in cases which cover the whole field of law, and show him to have been a profound lawyer as well as a practical man of affairs.

The dignity, poise and patience with which he presided in the Supreme Court as its Chief Justice, and the unfailing courtesy which he extended to counsel appearing in that tribunal, won him the universal esteem of the members of the bar in addition to their admiration for him as a jurist.

The Chief Justice was essentially an original thinker, and in the performance of his judicial duties he first endeavored to arrive at what he felt should be the law and justice of the case under consideration. Following this, he studied precedents to test the correctness of his judgment, and when he found sufficient authority to support his own conclusions, he immediately, and in longhand, wrote his opinion, the first draft of which was generally so clear and simple as to need little or no revision.


Although occupying the highest judicial position in the State, he never lost his simplicity or kindness of heart, and although pre-eminently of a domestic disposition, he mingled freely with other men in a spirit of fraternity, and was Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Minnesota during the years 1894 and 1895.

His sympathetic and broad Christian charity came into full play in connection with the performance of the duties imposed upon the Chief Justice as a member of the Board of Pardons. No shrinking waif, unhappy parent or distracted wife failed of a sympathetic hearing from him, and even when he could give no assurance of mercy, his sympathetic bearing and kindly counsel brought solace to the class upon whom the punishment for crime often bears the heaviest.

His is the story of a real American, and although to some the maxim noblesse oblige may present the picture of an armored knight of the old regime, to the American, saturated with traditions of his country, it brings a vision of a sturdy, self-reliant and self-supporting man who reveres God, believes in the sanctity of the home, recognizes the dignity of labor and equality of all men before the law; of one who appreciates a government of laws and not of men, and who classifies humanity not by wealth, religion or race, but by conduct and attainments.

And so this man, who endured the privations of the frontier, remained unsullied by its rudeness. With only the scant aid of inadequate educational institutions he mastered the intricacies of the great legal profession. Called to high positions, he remained a kindly, simple gentleman, unspoiled by the temptations of place and power. He thought upon the things which are good and true and beautiful, and we do not so much sorrow at his death as rejoice in the fact that we knew him and loved him, and that his name will always stand high on the Honor Roll of Minnesota.

ORGANIC ACT OF MINNESOTA.

An act to establish the Territorial Government of Minnesota.

[Passed March 3, 1849.]

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That from and after the passage of this act, all that part of the territory of the United States which lies within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning in the Mississippi river at the point where the line of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes of north latitude crosses the same; thence running due west on said line, which is the northern boundary of the state of Iowa, to the northwest corner of the said state of Iowa; thence southerly along the western boundary of said state to the point where said boundary strikes the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of White Earth river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the White Earth river to the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain, thence east and south of east along the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain to Lake Superior; thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the state of Wisconsin in Lake Superior; thence along the western boundary line of said state of Wisconsin to the Mississippi river; thence down the main channel of said river to the place of beginning, be and the same is hereby erected into a temporary government by the name of the Territory of Minnesota; provided, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to inhibit the government of the United States from dividing said Territory into two or more territories, in such manner and at such times as congress shall deem convenient and proper, or from attaching any portion of said Territory to any other state or territory of the United States.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Minnesota shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States. The governor shall reside within said Territory; shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof; shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of super-intendent of Indian affairs. He may grant pardons for offenses against the law of said Territory, and reprieves for offenses against the laws of the United States until the decision of the president can be made known thereon; he shall commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of the said Territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That there shall be a secretary of said Territory, who shall reside therein, and hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States; he shall record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly hereinafter constituted, and all the acts and proceedings of the governor in his executive department; he shall transmit one copy of the laws and one copy of the executive proceedings, on or before the first day of December in each year, to the president of the United States, and at the same time two copies of the laws to the speaker of the house of representatives, and the president of the senate for the use of Congress. And in case of the death, removal, resignation, or necessary absence of the governor from the Territory, the secretary shall be and he is hereby authorized and required to execute and perform all the powers and the duties of the governor during such vacancy or necessary absence, or until another governor shall be duly appointed to fill such vacancy.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That the legislative power and authority of said Territory shall be vested in the governor and a legislative assembly. The legislative assembly shall consist of a council and house of representatives. The council shall consist of nine members having the qualifications of voters. as hereinafter prescribed, whose term of service shall continue two years. The house of representatives shall, at its first session, consist of eighteen members, possessing the same qualifications as prescribed for members of the council, and whose term of service shall continue one year. The number of councilors and representatives may be increased by the legislative assembly, from time to time, in proportion to the increase of population; provided, that the whole number shall never exceed fifteen councilors and thirty-nine representatives. An apportionment shall be made, as nearly equal as practicable, among the several counties or districts for the election of the council and representatives, giving to each section of the Territory representation in the ratio of its population, Indians excepted, as nearly as may be. And the members of the council and of the house of representatives shall reside in and be inhabitants of the districts for which they may be elected, respectively. Previous to the first election, the governor shall cause a census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the several counties and districts of the Territory to be taken, and the first election shall be held at such time and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct, and he shall, at the same time, declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties and districts shall be entitled under this act.

The number of persons authorized to be elected having the highest number of votes, in each of said council districts for members of the council, shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected to the council, and the person or persons authorized to be elected, having the greatest number of votes for the house of representatives, equal to the number to which each county or district shall be entitled, shall also be declared by the governor to be duly elected members of the house of representatives; provided, that in case of a tie between two or more persons voted for, the governor shall order a new election to supply the vacancy made by such tie. And the persons thus elected to the legislative

assembly shall meet at such place on such day as the governor shall appoint, but thereafter the time, place and manner of holding and conducting all elections by the people, and the apportioning of the representation in the several counties or districts to the council and house of representatives, according to the population, shall be prescribed by law, as well as the day of the commencement of the regular session of the legislative assembly; provided, that no one session shall exceed the term of sixty days.

- SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said Territory at the time of the passage of this act, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to any office within the said Territory; but the qualifications of voters and of holding office at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the legislative assembly; provided, that the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States and those who shall have declared on oath their intention to become such, and shall have taken an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act.
- SEC. 6. And be it further enacted, That the legislative power of the Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation, consistent with the Constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act; but no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents. All the laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor shall be submitted to the Congress of the United States, and if disapproved shall be null and of no effect.
- SEC. 7. And be it further enacted, That all township, district and county officers, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, in such manner as shall be provided by the governor and legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota. The governor shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council, appoint all officers not herein otherwise provided for, and, in the first instance, the governor alone may appoint all said officers, who shall hold their offices until the end of the next session of the legislative assembly.
- SEC. 8. And be it further enacted, That no member of the legislative assembly shall hold or be appointed to any office which shall have been created, or the salary or emoluments of which shall have been increased, while he was a member, during the term for which he was elected, and for one year after the expiration of such term; and no person holding a commission or appointment under the United States, except postmasters, shall be a member of the legislative assembly, or shall hold any office under the government of said Territory.
- SEC. 9. And be it further enacted, That the judicial power of said Territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts, and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and who shall hold

a term at the seat of government of said Territory annually; and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said Territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such time and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law; provided, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute. or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judges thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court, or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of every term of said courts, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said Territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive in all such cases the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin Territory received for similar services.

SEC. 10. And be it further enacted, That there shall be appointed an attorney for said Territory, who shall continue in office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall receive the same fees and salary as the attorney of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin received. There shall also be a marshal for the Territory appointed, who shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall execute all processes issuing from the said courts, when exercising their jurisdiction as circuit and district courts of the United States; he shall perform the duties, be subject to the same regulations and penalties, and be entitled to the same fees as the marshal of the district court of the United States for the late

Territory of Wisconsin; and shall, in addition, be paid two hundred dollars annually as a compensation for extra services.

Sec. 11. And be it further enacted, That the governor, secretary, chief justice and associate justices, attorney and marshal, shall be nominated and by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the president of the United States. The governor and secretary to be appointed as aforesaid shall, before they act as such, respectively, take an oath or affirmation, before the district judge, or some justice of the peace in the limits of said Territory, duly authorized to administer oaths and affirmations by the laws now in force therein, or before the chief justice, or some associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, to support the constitution of the United States, and faithfully to discharge the duties of their respective offices, which said oaths, when so taken, shall be certified by the person by whom the same shall have been taken, and such certificates shall be received and recorded by the said secretary among the executive proceedings; and the chief justice and associate justices, and all other civil officers in said Territory, before they act as such, shall take a like oath or affirmation, before the said governor or secretary, or some judge or justice of the peace of the Territory, who may be duly commissioned and qualified, which said oath or affirmation shall be certified and transmitted, by the person taking the same, to the secretary, to be by him recorded as aforesaid; and afterwards, the like oath or affirmation shall be taken, certified and recorded in such manner and form as may be prescribed by law. The governor shall receive an annual salary of \$1,500 as governor, and \$1,000 as superintendent of Indian affairs. The chief justice and associate justice shall each receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The secretary shall receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The said salaries shall be paid quarter-yearly, at the treasury of the United States. The members of the legislative assembly shall be entitled to receive three dollars each per day during their attendance at the session thereof, and three dollars each for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the said sessions, estimated according to the nearest usually traveled route. There shall be appropriated, annually, the sum of \$1,000, to be expended by the governor to defray the contingent expenses of the Territory; and there shall also be appropriated, annually, a sufficient sum to be expended by the secretary of the Territory, and upon an estimate to be made by the secretary of the treasury of the United States, to defray the expenses of the legislative assembly, the printing of the laws, and other incidental expenses, and the secretary of the Territory shall annually account to the secretary of the treasury of the United States for the manner in which the aforesaid sum shall have been expended.

SEC. 12. And be it further enacted, That the inhabitants of the said Territory shall be entitled to all the rights, privileges and immunities heretofore granted and secured to the Territory of Wisconsin and to its inhabitants; and the laws in force in the Territory of Wisconsin at the date of the admission of the State of Wisconsin shall continue to be valid and operative therein, so far as the same be not incompatible with the provisions of this act, subject, nevertheless, to be altered, modified or repealed by the governor and legislative assembly of the said Territory of Minnesota; and the laws of the United States are

hereby extended over and declared to be in force in said Territory, so far as the same, or any provision thereof, may be applicable.

Sec. 13. And be it further enacted, That the legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota shall hold its first session in St. Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of government for said Territory, at such place as they may deem eligible; and shall at such time as they shall see proper prescribe by law the manner of locating the permanent seat of government of said Territory by a vote of the people. And the sum of twenty thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated and granted to said Territory of Minnesota, to be applied by the governor and legislative assembly to the erection of suitable public buildings at the seat of government.

SEC. 14. And be it further enacted, That a delegate of the house of representatives of the United States, to serve for the term of two years, may be elected by the voters qualified to elect members of the legislative assembly, who shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as are exercised and enjoyed by the delegates from the several other territories of the United States to the said house of representatives. The first election shall be held at such times and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and at all subsequent elections the times, places and manner of holding the elections shall be prescribed by law. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected, and a certificate thereof shall be given accordingly.

SEC. 15. And be it further enacted, That all suits, process and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law or in chancery, and all indictments and informations, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the Territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said Territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect, shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said Territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws, in force within said limits, may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions and causes of action may be recovered under this act the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said Territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

SEC. 16. And be it further enacted, That all justices of the peace, constables, sheriffs, and all other judicial and ministerial officers, who shall be in office within the limits of said Territory when this act shall take effect, shall be and they are hereby authorized and required to continue to exercise and perform the duties of their respective offices as officers of the Territory of Minnesota, temporarily, and until they or others shall be duly appointed and qualified to fill their places, in the manner herein directed, or until their offices shall be abolished.

- SEC. 17. And be it further enacted, That the sum of \$5,000 be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the said governor of the Territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorneys of said Territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.
- SEC. 18. And be it further enacted, That when the lands in said Territory shall be surveyed under the direction of the government of the United States, preparatory to bringing the same into market, sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in said Territory shall be and the same are hereby reserved for the purpose of being applied to schools in said Territory, and in the state and territories hereafter to be erected out of the same.
- Sec. 19. And be it further enacted, That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said Territory may define the judicial districts of said Territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said Territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter or modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.
- SEC. 20. And be it further enacted, That every bill which shall or may pass the council and house of representatives, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the Territory; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated; which shall cause the objections to be entered at large upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall also be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law; but in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it-shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislative assembly, by adjournment, prevent it, in which case it shall not become a law.

MINNESOTA STATE SEAL

The state seal is similar in design to the territorial seal, although various other devices were proposed and even adopted as laws.

First official reference to the seal appears in the message of Governor Ramsey to the first territorial legislature, September 9, 1849. A legislative committee, October 31, recommended as a seal device, "an every-day scene, consisting of an Indian family with their lodge, canoe, etc., and a single white man visiting them, with no other protection than the feeling of hospitality and friendship existing between the two people. The white man is receiving from the Indian the pipe of peace." That seal was authorized by law but never used.

The territorial seal depicted instead a scene at St. Anthony Falls, as shown in the accompanying engraving. The earlier proposal may have influenced the design, but substitution of the musket and powderhorn for the pipe of peace may have had special significance. The motto, "Quo sursum velo videre." the third word a misprint for "volo," meaning "I wish to see what lies beyond," was selected by H. H. Sibley, while a delegate in Congress. Governor Ramsey commissioned D. O. Hare of Washington to engrave the seal and the cost was \$157.

Although ridiculed by journalists as representing "a scared white man and an astonished Indian," and "a man plowing one way and looking another," this territorial seal was used until the adoption of the state seal in 1858.

During the first session of the state legislature, assembled December 2, 1857, Charles F. Lowe, a member of the convention of 1857 which drafted the state constitution, including a provision for a state seal, procured from Mr. Buechner, a St. Paul artist, a design shown on page 658 of W. H. C. Folsom's "Fifty Years in the Northwest."

The state government upon beginning operations in May, 1858, was without a state seal. Authorizing temporary use of the territorial seal, Governor Sibley brought up the subject at the adjourned legislative session in June and a special committee was named. W. H. C. Folsom, chairman, submitted the design mentioned, which on July 16 was adopted by joint resolution. When the new seal was delivered, however, it was found that the legislative intent had failed, and in place of that elaborate design one resembling the territorial seal was used, as it appears in the illustration. The word "state" was added and the date of admission substituted for the territorial year. The motto was changed to "L'Etoile du Nord," translated "The North Star," and this state seal has ever since been in official use. The Minnesotian published articles ridiculing the French motto and declaring that Governor Sibley had chosen it simply because he spoke that language.





ACT

AUTHORIZING A STATE GOVERNMENT.

[Passed Feb. 26, 1857.]

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the inhabitants of that portion of the Territory of Minnesota which is embraced within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and the British Possessions crossés the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois de Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof, thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river, and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin, until the same intersects with the St. Louis river: thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and the British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning, be and they hereby are authorized to form for themselves a constitution and state government by the name of the State of Minnesota, and to come into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, according to the Federal Constitution.

- SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state and any state or states now or hereafter to be formed or bounded by the same; and said river or waters leading into the same shall be common highways, and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to all other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.
- SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That on the first Monday in June next, the legal voters in each representative district then existing within the limits of the proposed state, are hereby authorized to elect two delegates for each representative to which said district shall be entitled according to the appor-

tionment for representatives to the territorial legislature; which election for delegates shall be held and conducted, and the returns made, in all respects in conformity with the laws of said Territory regulating the election of representatives, and the delegates so elected shall assemble at the capitol of said Territory on the second Monday in July next, and first determine by a vote whether it is the wish of the people of the proposed State to be admitted into the Union at that time; and if so, shall proceed to form a constitution, and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a state government, in conformity with the Federal Constitution, subject to the approval and ratification of the people of the proposed State.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That in the event said convention shall decide in favor of the immediate admission of the proposed State into the Union, it shall be the duty of the United States marshal for said Territory to proceed to take a census or enumeration of the inhabitants within the limits of the proposed State, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, with the view of ascertaining the number of representatives to which said State may be entitled in the Congress of the United States. And said State shall be entitled to one representative, and such additional representatives as the population of the State shall, according to the census, show it would be entitled to according to the present ratio of representation.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That the following propositions be and the same are hereby offered to the said convention of the people of Minnesota for their free acceptance or rejection, which, if accepted by the convention, shall be obligatory on the United States, and upon the said State of Minnesota, to-wit:

First—That sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in every township of public lands in said State, and where either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been sold or otherwise been disposed of, other lands, equivalent thereto, and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to said State for the use of schools.

Second—That seventy-two sections of land shall be set apart and reserved for the use and support of a state university, to be selected by the governor of said State, subject to the approval of the commissioner at the general land office, and to be appropriated and applied in such manner as the legislature of said State may prescribe; for the purpose aforesaid, but for no other purpose.

Third—Ten entire sections of land to be selected by the governor of said State, in legal subdivisions, shall be granted to said State for the purpose of completing the public buildings, or for the erection of others at the seat of government, under the direction of the legislature thereof.

Fourth—That all salt springs within said State, not exceeding twelve in number, with six sections of land adjoining or as contiguous as may be to each, shall be granted to said State for its use; and the same to be selected by the governor thereof within one year after the admission of said State, and, when so selected, to be used or disposed of on such terms, conditions and regulations

as the legislature shall direct; provided, that no salt spring or land the right whereof is now vested in any individual or in individuals, or which may be hereafter confirmed or adjudged to any individual or individuals, shall by this article be granted to said State.

Fifth—That five per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands lying within said State, which shall be sold by Congress after the admission of said State into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said State for the purpose of making public roads and internal improvements as the legislature shall direct; provided, the foregoing propositions herein offered are on the condition that the said convention which shall form the constitution of said State shall provide, by a clause in said constitution, or an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to bona fide purchasers thereof; and that no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States, and that in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

MINNESOTA STATE FLAG.

The State Legislature of 1893, by Chapter 16, provided for the adoption of a state flag.

Mrs. Franklyn L. Greenleaf, Mrs. A. A. White, Mrs. Edward Durant, Mrs. F. B. Clarke, Mrs. H. F. Brown and Mrs. A. T. Stebbins were by this act named and designated a commission to select and adopt an appropriate design for a state flag.

Conformably to the provision of this act, this commission called for designs, and on Tuesday, Feb. 28, 1893, met, selected and adopted the design presented by Mrs. Edward H. Center, of Minneapolis.

Following is a description of the flag: "The ground is of white silk, and the reverse side of blue silk, bordered with bullion fringe. In the center is the state seal, wreathed with white moccasin flowers, on a blue ground. The red ribbon of the seal bearing the motto is continued through the wreath, entwining the blossoms and floating carelessly over the lower portion of the flag. It bears, in gold, the dates 1819, the time of the settlement of Minnesota, and 1893. Above, also in gold, is the date 1858, the time of the admission of Minnesota to the Union. Below the design, in gold letters, is wrought 'Minnesota.' Grouped around the seal are nineteen stars in the design of star points, with the North Star, significant of the North Star State, in a group of three at the top."

The choice of the number nineteen is a peculiarly happy one, as Minnesota was the nineteenth state, after the original thirteen, to be admitted to the Union. The standard to the flag was surmounted by a golden gopher, and tied with a gold cord and tassel. The execution of the design is entirely in needle work.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Under the enabling act of Congress, approved March 3, 1857, a constitutional convention of one hundred and eight members (each council district to elect two for each councilman and representative it was entitled to) was authorized to meet at the capitol on the second Monday in July, to frame a state constitution, and submit it to the people of the territory. The election was held on the first Monday in June. On July 13th the delegates met, but, a disagreement arising in the organization, the Republican members organized one body, and the Democratic members organized separately. Each of these bodies, claiming to be the legal constitutional convention, proceeded with the work of forming an instrument to be submitted to the people. After some days an understanding was effected between them, and, by means of committees of conference, the same constitution was framed and adopted by both bodies. On being submitted to the people October 13th, it was ratified.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

STATE OF MINNESOTA.

Adopted October 13, 1857. Ayes, 30,055; Nays, 571

Preamble. We, the people of the State of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution:

ARTICLE I.

BILL OF RIGHTS.

Object of government. Section 1. Government is instituted for the security, benefit and protection of the people, in whom all political power is inherent, together with the right to alter, modify or reform such government, whenever the public good may require it.

Rights and Privileges. Sec. 2. No member of this State shall be disfranchised, or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land, or the judgment of his peers. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the State otherwise than in the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted.

Liberty of the press. Sec. 3. The liberty of the press shall forever remain inviolate, and all persons may freely speak, write and publish their sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of such right.

Trial by jury. Sec. 4. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, and shall extend to all cases at law without regard to the amount in controversy, but a jury trial may be waived by the parties in all cases

in the manner prescribed by law; [and the legislature may provide that the agreement of five-sixths of any jury in any civil action or proceeding, after not less than six (6) hours' deliberation, shall be a sufficient verdict therein.]*

No excessive bail or unusual punishments. Sec. 5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor shall excessive fines be imposed; nor shall cruel or unusual punishments be inflicted.

Rights of accused in criminal prosecutions. Sec. 6. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the county or district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which county or district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel in his defense. (a)

Further rights of accused—when bailable. Sec. 7. No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense without due process of law, and no person for the same offense shall be put twice in jeopardy of punishment, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. All persons shall before conviction be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great; and the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when in case of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require.

Redress of injuries or wrongs. Sec. 8. Every person is entitled to a certain remedy in the laws for all injuries or wrongs which he may receive in his person, property or character; he ought to obtain justice freely and without purchase; completely and without denial; promptly and without delay, conformable to the laws.

Treason defined. Sec. 9. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against the same, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

Right against unreasonable searches. Sec. 10. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the person or things to be seized.

⁽a) The jury contemplated by article 1, section 6, securing the right to jury trial in criminal cases, is a body of twelve men, and it is error to try a party charged with crime in a justice court, against his objection, with a jury of six. The fact that he may appeal to the district court, on entering into recognizance with sureties, does not change the rule. 14 Minn. 330.

Prohibits ex post facto laws, or laws impairing contracts. Sec. 11. No bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, nor any law impairing the obligation of contracts shall ever be passed, and no conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Imprisonment for debt—property exemption. Sec. 12. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in this State, (a) but this shall not prevent the legislature from providing for imprisonment, or holding to bail, persons charged with fraud in contracting said debt. A reasonable amount of property shall be exempt from seizure or sale for the payment of any debt or liability. The amount of such exemption shall be determined by law. [Provided, however, that all property so exempted shall be liable to seizure and sale for any debts incurred to any person for work done or materials furnished in the construction, repair or improvement of the same, and provided further, that such liability to seizure and sale shall also extend to all real property for any debt incurred to any laborer or servant for labor or service performed.]*

Private property for public use. Sec. 13. Private property shall not be taken, destroyed or damaged for public use without just compensation therefor, first paid or secured. †

Military power subordinate. Sec. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power, and no standing army shall be kept up in this State in times of peace.

Lands declared allodial—leases, when void. Sec. 15. All lands within the State are declared to be allodial, and feudal tenures of every description, with all their incidents, are prohibited. Leases and grants of agricultural lands for a longer period than twenty-one years hereafter made, in which shall be reserved any rent or service of any kind, shall be void.

Freedom of conscience—no preference to be given to any religious establishment or mode of worship. Sec. 16. The enumeration of rights in this constitution shall not be construed to deny or impair others retained by and inherent in the people. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience shall never be infringed, nor shall any man be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any religious or ecclesiastical ministry, against his consent; nor shall any control of or interference with the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness, or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the State, nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious societies, or religious or theological seminaries.

No religious test or property qualifications to be required. Sec. 17. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification for any office of public trust under the State. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification of any voter at any election in this State; nor shall any person be rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity in consequence of his opinion upon the subject of religion.

- No license to peddle. Sec. 18. Any person may sell or peddle the products of the farm or garden occupied and cultivated by him without obtaining a license therefor.*

ARTICLE II.

ON NAME AND BOUNDARIES.

Name and boundaries. Section 1. This State shall be called and known by the name of the State of Minnesota, and shall consist of and have jurisdiction over the territory embraced in the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and British Possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois des Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence east along the northern boundary of said State to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin until the same intersects the St. Louis river: thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning.**

^{**}The northern boundary of the state at the Lake of the Woods is projected beyond the 49th parallel a distance of about twenty miles, making a wedge-shaped jog through the lake until it strikes firm ground on the west bank of the lake; thence in a due south line to the 49th parallel. The explanation of this jog is found in the subjoined paragraphs. In the seventh article of the treaty of Ghent, section 19 reads as follows: Sec. 19. Jurisdiction on bordering rivers. Sec. 2. The State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and on all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said State, and any other state or states now or hereafter to be formed by the same; and said rivers and waters, and navigable waters leading into the same, shall be common highways and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said State as to other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

Acceptance of propositions in enabling act. Sec. 3. The propositions contained in the act of Congress entitled, "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government, preparatory to their admission into the Union on equal footing with the original states," are hereby accepted, ratified and confirmed, and shall remain irrevocable without the consent of the United States; and it is hereby ordained that this State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same, by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title to said soil to bona fide purchasers thereof; and no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States and in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

ARTICLE III.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE POWERS OF GOVERNMENT.

Division of powers. Section 1. The powers of government shall be divided into three distinct departments—legislative, executive, and judicial; and no person or persons belonging to or constituting one of these departments shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except in the instances expressly provided in this constitution. (a)

of the Lake of the Woods, as designated by the seventh article of the treaty of Ghent, and being in latitude 49° 23′ 55″ north of the equator, and in longitude 95° 14′ 38″ west from Greenwich. The second article of the convention of 1818 is as follows: Article 2. It is agreed that a line drawn from the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods along the 49th parallel of north latitude, or, if the said point shall not be in the 49th parallel of north latitude, then that a line drawn from the said point due north or south, as the case may be, until the said line shall intersect the said parallel of north latitude, and from the point of such intersection due west, along and with the said parallel, shall be the line of demarkation between the territories of the United States and His Britannic Majesty, and that the said line shall form the northern boundary of the said territories of the United States and the southern boundary of His Britannic Majesty, from the Lake of the Woods to the Stony Mountains. This boundary was re-established and determined by a commission authorized by congress, and the surveys embracing four years were made and reported to congress in 1877.

ARTICLE IV.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

Legislature meets biennially—length of session. Section 1. The legislature shall consist of the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall meet biennially at the seat of government of the State, at such time as shall be prescribed by law, but no session shall exceed the term of ninety (90) legislative days; and no new bill shall be introduced in either branch, except on the written request of the governor, during the last twenty (20) days of such sessions, except the attention of the legislature shall be called to some important matter of general interest by a special message from the governor.

Apportionment of members. Sec. 2. The number of members who compose the Senate and House of Representatives shall be prescribed by law, but the representation in the Senate shall never exceed one member for every 5,000 inhabitants, and in the House of Representatives one member for every 2,000 inhabitants. The representation in both houses shall be apportioned equally throughout the different sections of the State, in proportion to the population thereof, exclusive of Indians not taxable under the provisions of law.

Eligibility of members—quorum. Sec. 3. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and eligibility of its own members; a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as it may provide.

Rules of government. Sec. 4. Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, sit upon its own adjournment, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member; but no member shall be expelled the second time for the same offense.

Officers—journal of proceedings. Sec. 5. The House of Representatives shall elect its presiding officer and the Senate and House of Representatives shall elect such other officers as may be provided by law; they shall keep journals of their proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays, when taken on any question, shall be entered on such journals.

Length of adjournments. Sec. 6. Neither house shall, during a session of the legislature, adjourn for more than three days (Sundays excepted), nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be assembled, without the consent of the other house.

Compensation. Sec. 7. The compensation of senators and representatives shall be three dollars per diem during the first session, but may afterwards be prescribed by law. But no increase of compensation shall be prescribed which shall take effect during the period for which the members of the existing House of Representatives may have been elected.

Privileged from arrest. Sec. 8. The members of each house shall in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses, and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

Restriction as to holding office. Sec. 9. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he is elected, hold any office under the authority of the United States or the State of Minnesota, except that of postmaster, and no senator or representative shall hold an office under the state which has been created or the emoluments of which have been increased during the session of the legislature of which he was a member, until one year after the expiration of his term of office in the legislature.

Bills of revenue to originate in House. Sec. 10. All bills for raising a revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives, but the Senate may propose and concur with the amendments as on other bills.

Approval of bills by Governor—action on non-approval. Sec. 11. Every bill which shall have passed the Senate and House of Representatives, in conformity to the rules of each house and the joint rules of the two houses, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the State. If he approves, he shall sign and deposit it in the office of secretary of state for preservation, and notify the house where it originated of the fact. But if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it shall have originated; when such objections shall be entered at large on the journal of the same, and the house shall proceed to reconsider the bill. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered; and if it be approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by adjournment within that time, prevents its return; in which case it shall not be a law. The governor may approve, sign and file in the office of the secretary of state, within three days after the adjournment of the legislature, any act passed during the last three days of the session, and the same shall become a law.

Governor may cut out items of appropriation bills and otherwise approve. If any bill presented to the governor contain several items of appropriation of money, he may object to one or more of such items, while approving of the other portion of the bill. In such case he shall append to the bill, at the time of signing it, a statement of the items to which he objects, and the appropriation so objected to shall not take effect. If the legislature be in session, he shall transmit to the house in which the bill originated a copy

of such statement, and the items objected to shall be separately reconsidered. If, on reconsideration, one or more of such items be approved by two-thirds of the members elected to each house, the same shall be a part of the law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. All the provisions of this section, in relation to bills not approved by the governor, shall apply in cases in which he shall withhold his approval from any item or items contained in a bill appropriating money.

Money appropriations, how made. Sec. 12. No money shall be appropriated except by bill. Every order, resolution or vote requiring the concurrence of the two houses (except such as relate to the business or adjournment of the same) shall be presented to the governor for his signature, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being returned by him with his objections, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the members of the two houses, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

Majority vote of all members-elect to pass a law. Sec. 13. The style of all laws of this State shall be: "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota." No law shall be passed unless voted for by a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature, and the vote entered upon the journal of each house.

Impeachment powers. Sec. 14. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, through a concurrence of a majority of all the members elected to seats therein. All impeachments shall be tried by the Senate; and when sitting for that purpose the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Exclusion from civil rights. Sec. 15. The legislature shall have full power to exclude from the privilege of electing or being elected any person convicted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime.

Protest and dissent of members. Sec. 16. Two or more members of either house shall have liberty to dissent and protest against any act or resolution which they may think injurious to the public or to any individual, and have the reason of their dissent entered on the journal.

Vacancies in legislature. Sec. 17. The governor shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies as may occur in either house of the legislature. The legislature shall prescribe by law the manner in which evidence in cases of contested seats in either house shall be taken.

Punish for disorderly conduct. Sec. 18. Each house may punish by imprisonment, during its session, any person, not a member, who shall be guilty of any disorderly or contemptuous behavior in their presence, but no such imprisonment shall at any time exceed twenty-four hours.

Open sessions. Sec. 19. Each house shall be open to the public during the sessions thereof, except in such cases as in their opinion may require secrecy.

Reading of bills. Sec. 20. Every bill shall be read on three different days in each separate house, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the house where such bill is depending shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed by either house until it shall have been previously read twice at length.

Enrollment of bills. Sec. 21. Every bill having passed both houses shall be carefully enrolled, and shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house. Any presiding officer refusing to sign a bill which shall have previously passed both houses shall thereafter be incapable of holding a seat in either branch of the legislature, or hold any other office of honor or profit in the State, and in case of such refusal, each house shall, by rule, provide the manner in which such bill shall be properly certified for presentation to the governor.

Passage of bills on last day of session prohibited. Sec. 22. No bill shall be passed by either house of the legislature upon the day prescribed for the adjournment of the two houses. But this section shall not be so construed as to preclude the enrollment of a bill, or the signature and passage from one house to the other, or the reports thereon from committees, or its transmission to the executive for his signature.

Census enumeration—apportionment. Sec. 23. The legislature shall provide by law for an enumeration of the inhabitants of this State in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and every tenth year thereafter. At their first session after each enumeration so made, and also at their first session after each enumeration made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall have the power to prescribe the bounds of congressional, senatorial and representative districts, and to apportion anew the senators and representatives among the several districts according to the provisions of section second of this article.

Senatorial districts-term of office of senators and representatives. SEC. 24. The senators shall also be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory, at the same time that members of the house of representatives are required to be chosen, and in the same manner; and no repretative district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. senate districts shall be numbered in a regular series. The terms of office of senators and representatives shall be the same as now prescribed by law until the general election of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight (1878), at which time there shall be an entire new election of all the senators and representatives. Representatives chosen at such election, or at any election thereafter, shall hold their office for the term of two years, except it be to fill a vacancy; and the senators chosen at such election by districts designated as odd numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the second year, and senators chosen by districts designated by even numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the fourth year; and thereafter senators shall be chosen for four years, except there shall be an entire new election of all the senators at the election of representatives next succeeding each new apportionment provided for in this article.

Qualification of legislators. Sec. 25. Senators and representatives shall be qualified voters of the State, and shall have resided one year in the State and six months immediately preceding the election in the district from which they are elected.

Senators to Congress. Sec. 26. Members of the Senate of the United States from this State shall be elected by the two houses of the legislature in joint convention, at such time and in such manner as may be provided by law. [While still law, this is of no effect because of passage of Federal Constitution No. 17 in 1913.]

Laws to embrace only one subject. Sec. 27. No law shall embrace more than one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.

Divorces. Sec. 28. Divorces shall not be granted by the legislature.

Oath of office. Sec. 29. All members and officers of both branches of the legislature shall, before entering upon the duties of their respective trusts, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and faithfully and impartially to discharge the duties devolving upon him as such member or officer.

Elections viva voce. Sec. 30. In all elections to be made by the legislature, the members thereof shall vote viva voce, and their votes shall be entered on the journal.

Prohibition of lotteries. Sec. 31. The legislature shall never authorize any lottery or the sale of lottery tickets.

Change of form of taxation of railroads to be voted upon. Sec. 32. [a] Any law providing for the repeal or amendment of any law or laws heretofore or hereafter enacted, which provides that any railroad company now existing in this State or operating its road therein, or which may be hereafter organized, shall, in lieu of all other taxes and assessments upon their real estate, roads, rolling stock, and other personal property, at and during the time and periods therein specified, pay into the treasury of this State a certain percentage therein mentioned of the gross earnings of such railroad companies now existing or hereafter organized, shall, before the same shall take effect or be in force, be submitted to a vote of the people of the State, and be adopted and ratified by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the election at which the same shall be submitted to them.

Internal improvement lands—investment of proceeds in bonds. Sec. 32. [b] All lands donated to the State of Minnesota for the purpose of internal improvement, under the eighth section of the act of Congress, approved September fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-one, being "An act to appropriate the proceeds of the sale of the public lands, and to grant pre-emption rights," shall be appraised and sold, in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same as is provided by law for the appraisement and sale of the school lands, under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight, of the General Statutes, except the modifications hereinafter mentioned. All moneys derived from the sales of said lands shall be invested in the bonds of the United States, or of the State of

Minnesota issued since 1860; and the moneys so invested shall constitute the Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State. All moneys received by the county treasurer under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight (38), aforesaid, derived from the sale of internal improvement lands, shall be held at all times subject to the order and direction of the state treasurer, for the benefit of the fund to which it belongs; and on the fifteenth day of June in each year, and at such other times as he may be requested so to do by the state treasurer, he shall pay over to the said state treasurer all moneys received on account of such fund.

The bonds purchased in accordance with this amendment shall be transferable only upon the order of the governor, and on each bond shall be written "Minnesota Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State, transferable only on the order of the governor."

Principal not to be reduced. The principal sum from all sales of internal improvement lands shall not be reduced by any charges or costs of officers, by fees, or by any other means whatever; and section fifty (50), of title one (1), chapter thirty eight (38), of the General Statutes, shall not be applicable to the provisions of this amendment, and wherever the words "school lands" are used in said title, it shall read as applicable to this amendment, "Internal Improvement Lands."

Appropriations therefrom to be voted upon before valid. The moneys belonging to the Internal Improvement Land Fund shall not be appropriated for any purpose whatever until the enactment for that purpose shall have been approved by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the annual general election following the passage of the act. (a)

The force of this amendment shall be to authorize the sale of the internal improvement lands, without further legislative enactment.

Against special legislation. Sec. 33. In all cases when a general law can be made applicable, no special law shall be enacted; and whether a general law could have been made applicable in any case is hereby declared a judicial question, and as such shall be judicially determined without regard to any legislative assertion on that subject. The legislature shall pass no local or special law regulating the affairs of, or incorporating, erecting or changing the lines of, any county, city, village, township, ward or school district, or creating the offices, or prescribing the powers and duties of the officers of, or fixing or relating to the compensation, salary or fees of the same, or the mode of election or appointment thereto, authorizing the laying out, opening, altering, vacating or maintaining roads, highways, streets or alleys; remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures; regulating the powers, duties and practice of justices of the peace, magistrates and constables; changing the names of persons, places, lakes or rivers; for opening and conducting of elections, or fixing or changing the places of voting;

authorizing the adoption or legitimation of children; changing the law of descent or succession; conferring rights upon minors; declaring any named person of age; giving effect to informal or invalid wills or deeds, or affecting the estates of minors or persons under disability; locating or changing county seats; regulating the management of public schools, the building or repairing of schoolhouses, and the raising of money for such purposes; exempting property from taxation, or regulating the rate of interest on money; creating corporations, or amending, renewing, extending or explaining the charters thereof; granting to any corporation, association or individual any special or exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever, or authorizing public taxation for a private purpose. *Provided, however*, That the inhibitions of local or special laws in this section shall not be construed to prevent the passage of general laws on any of the subjects enumerated.

Repeal of existing special laws. The legislature may repeal any existing special or local law, but shall not amend, extend or modify any of the same.

Refers to amendment of 1881, superseded as above. Sec. 34. The legislature shall provide general laws for the transaction of any business that may be prohibited by section one (1) of this amendment, and all such laws shall be uniform in their operation throughout the State.

Against combinations or pools to affect markets. Sec. 35. Any combinations of persons, either as individuals or as members or officers of any corporation, to monopolize the markets for food products in this State, or to interfere with, or restrict the freedom of, such markets, is hereby declared to be a criminal conspiracy, and shall be punished in such manner as the legislature may provide.

City or village may frame its own charter-charter to be submitted to voters. Sec. 36. Any city or village in this State may frame a charter for its own government as a city consistent with and subject to the laws of this State, as follows: The legislature shall provide, under such restrictions as it deems proper, for a board of fifteen freeholders, who shall be and for the past five years shall have been qualified voters thereof, to be appointed by the district judges of the judicial district in which the city or village is situated, as the legislature may determine, for a term in no event to exceed six years, which board shall, within six months after its appointment, return to the chief magistrate of said city or village draft of said charter, signed by the members of said board, or a majority thereof. Such charter shall be submitted to the qualified voters of such city or village at the next election thereafter, and if four-sevenths of the qualified voters voting at such election shall ratify the same it shall, at the end of thirty days thereafter, become the charter of such city or village as a city, and supersede any existing charter and amendments thereof; provided, that in cities having patrol limits now established, such charters shall require a three-fourths majority vote of the qualified voters voting at such election to change the patrol limits now established.

Legislature to prescribe general limits of charter-amendment of charter—upon application of 5 per cent of legal voters. Before any city shall incorporate under this act the legislature shall prescribe by law the general limits within which such charter shall be framed. Duplicate certificates shall be made setting forth the charter proposed and its ratification, which shall be signed by the chief magistrate of said city or village and authenticated by its corporate seal. One of said certificates shall be deposited in the office of secretary of state, and the other, after being recorded in the office of the register of deeds for the county in which such city or village lies, shall be deposited among the archives of such city or village, and all courts shall take judicial notice thereof. Such charter so deposited may be amended by proposal therefor made by a board of fifteen commissioners aforesaid, published for at least thirty days in three newspapers of general circulation in such city or village, and accepted by three-fifths of the qualified voters of such city or village voting at the next election, and not otherwise; but such charter shall always be in harmony with and subject to the Constitution and laws of the State of Minnesota. The legislature may prescribe the duties of the commission relative to submitting amendments of charter to the vote of the people and shall provide that upon application of five per cent of the legal voters of any such city or village, by written petition, such commission shall submit to the vote of the people proposed amendments to such charter set forth in said petition. The board of freeholders above provided for shall be permanent, and all the vacancies by death, disability to perform duties, resignation or removal from the corporate limits, or expiration of term of office, shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original board was created, and said board shall always contain its full complement of members.

Mayor and legislative body. It shall be a feature of all such charters that there shall be provided, among other things, for a mayor or chief magistrate, and a legislative body of either one or two houses; if of two houses, at least one of them shall be elected by general vote of the electors.

Articles of amendment may be submitted separately. In submitting any such charter or amendment thereto to the qualified voters of such city or village, any alternate section or article may be presented for the choice of the voters, and may be voted on separately without prejudice to other articles or sections of the charter or any amendments thereto.

General laws for cities by divisions of population. The legislature may provide general laws relating to affairs of cities, the application of which may be limited to cities of over fifty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of fifty and not less than twenty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of twenty and not less than ten thousand inhabitants, or to cities of ten thousand inhabitants or less, which shall apply equally to all such cities of either class, and which shall be paramount while in force to the provisions relating to the same matter included in the local charter herein provided for. But no local charter, provision or ordinance passed thereunder shall supersede any general law of the State defining or punishing crimes or misdemeanors.

ARTICLE V.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Officers in executive department. Section 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general who shall be chosen by the electors of the State. (a)

Election returns to be sent to secretary of state. Sec. 2. The returns of every election for the officers named in the foregoing section shall be made to the secretary of state, who shall call to his assistance two or more of the judges of the supreme court, and two disinterested judges of the district courts of the State, who shall constitute a board of canvassers, who shall open and canvass said returns and declare the result within three days after such canvass.

Official term of governor and lieutenant governor—qualifications. Sec. 3. The term of office for the governor and lieutenant governor shall be two years, and until their successors are chosen and qualified. Each shall have attained the age of twent—five (25) years, and shall have been a bona fide resident of the State for one year next preceding his election. Both shall be citizens of the United States.

Powers and duties of governor. Sec. 4. The governor shall communicate by message to each session of the legislature such information touching the state and condition of the country as he may deem expedient. He shall be commander-in-chief of the military and naval forces, and may call out such forces to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion. He may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power, in conjunction with the board of pardons, of which the governor shall be ex officio a member, and the other members of which shall consist of the attorney general of the State of Minnesota and the chief justice of the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, and whose powers and duties shall be defined and regulated by law, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction for offenses against the State, except in cases of impeachment. He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint a state librarian and notaries public, and such other officers as may be provided by law. He shall have power to appoint commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds or other instruments in writing, to be used in the State. He shall have a negative upon all laws passed by the legislature, under such rules and limitations as are in this Constitution prescribed. He may on extra-

ordinary occasions convene both houses of the legislature. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, fill any vacancy that may occur in the office of secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and such other state and district offices as may be hereafter created by law, until the next annual election, and until their successors are chosen and qualified.

Official term of other executive officers. Sec. 5. The official term of the secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general shall be two (2) years. The official term of the state auditor shall be four (4) years, and each shall continue in office until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The further duties and salaries of said executive officers shall each be prescribed by law.

Duties of lieutenant governor. Sec. 6. The lieutenant governor shall be ex officio president of the Senate; and in case a vacancy should occur, from any cause whatever, in the office of governor, he shall be governor during such vacancy. The compensation of lieutenant governor shall be double the compensation of a state senator. Before the close of each session of the Senate they shall elect a president pro tempore, who shall be lieutenant governor in case a vacancy should occur in that office.

Official terms of first State officers—(Obsolete.) Sec. 7. The term of each of the executive officers named in this article shall commence on taking the oath of office on or after the first day of May, 1858, and continue until the first Monday of January, 1860, except the auditor, who shall continue in office till the first Monday of January, 1861; and until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified; and the same above mentioned time for qualification and entry upon the duties of their respective offices shall extend and apply to all other officers elected under the State Constitution, who have not already taken the oath of office, and commenced the performance of their official duties.

Oath of office to be taken by State officers. Sec. 8. Each officer created by this article shall, before entering upon his duties, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States and of this State, and faithfully discharge the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

(Obsolete.) Sec. 9. Laws shall be passed at the first session of the legislature after the State is admitted into the Union to carry out the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE VI.

JUDICIARY.

Judicial powers. Section 1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish by a two-thirds vote.

Supreme court-jurisdiction and powers-reporter of decisions-clerk of supreme court. Sec. 2. The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and two associate justices, but the number of the associate justices may be increased to a number not exceeding four, by the legislature, by a two-thirds vote, when it shall be deemed necessary. It shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity, but there shall be no trial by jury in said court. It shall hold one or more terms in each year, as the legislature may direct, at the seat of government, and the legislature may provide, by a two-thirds vote, that one term in each year shall be held in each or any judicial district. It shall be the duty of such court to appoint a reporter of its decisions. There shall be chosen, by the qualified electors of the State, one clerk of the supreme court, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor is duly elected and qualified, and the judges of the supreme court, or a majority of them, shall have the power to fill any vacancy in the office of the clerk of the supreme court until an election can be regularly had.

Election and term of office for judges. Sec. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the State at large, and their term of office shall be six years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

District judges may act where supreme judges are disqualified. Whenever all or a majority of the judges of the supreme court shall, from any cause, be disqualified from sitting in any case in said court, the governor, or, if he shall be interested in the result of such case, then the lieutenant governor, shall assign judges of the district court of the State, who shall sit in such case in place of such disqualified judges, with all the powers and duties of judges of the supreme court.

Judicial districts for district courts—election of judges—term of office and residence. Sec. 4. The State shall be divided by the legislature into judicial districts, which shall be composed of contiguous territory, be bounded by county lines, and contain a population as nearly equal as may be practicable. In each judicial district, one or more judges, as the legislature may prescribe, shall be elected by the electors thereof, whose term of office shall be six years, and each of said judges shall severally have and exercise the powers of the court, under such limitations as may be prescribed by law. Every district judge shall, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district for which he shall be elected, and shall reside therein during his continuance in office. In case any court of common pleas heretofore established shall be abolished, the judge of said court may be constituted by the legislature one of the judges of the district court of the district wherein such court has been so established for a period not exceeding the unexpired term for which he was elected.

The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and four associate justices. G. L. 1881, ch. 141.

Jurisdiction of district courts. Sec. 5. The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds one hundred dollars, and in all criminal cases where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than one hundred dollars, and shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. The legislature may provide by law that the judge of one district may discharge the duties of judge of any other district not his own, when convenience or the public interest may require it.

Qualifications. Sec. 6. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be men learned in the law, and shall receive such compensation at stated times as may be prescribed by the legislature; which compensation shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward for their services.

Probate court—judges to be elected—jurisdiction. Sec. 7. There shall be established in each organized county in the State a probate court, which shall be a court of record, and be held at such time and place as may be prescribed by law. It shall be held by one judge, who shall be elected by the voters of the county for the term of four* years. He shall be a resident of such county at the time of his election, and reside therein during his continuance in office; and his compensation shall be provided by law. He may appoint his own clerk where none has been elected; but the legislature may authorize the election, by the electors of any county, of one clerk or register of probate for such county, whose powers, duties, term of office and compensation shall be prescribed by law. A probate court shall have jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, but no other jurisdiction, except as prescribed by this Constitution.

Justices of the peace to be elected—jurisdiction. Sec. 8. The legislature shall provide for the election of a sufficient number of justices of the peace in each county, whose term of office shall be two years, and whose duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law. *Provided*, That no justice of the peace shall have jurisdiction of any civil cause where the amount in controversy shall exceed one hundred dollars, nor in a criminal cause where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment, or a fine over one hundred dollars, nor in any cause involving the title to real estate.

Judges for other courts to be elected. Sec. 9. All judges other than those provided for in this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of the judicial district, county, or city, for which they shall be created, not for a longer term than seven years.

Vacancies—appointment by governor. Sec. 10. In case the office of any judge become vacant before the expiration of the regular term for which he was elected, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor, until a successor is elected and qualified. And such successor shall be elected at the first annual election that occurs more than thirty days after the vacancy shall have happened.

Prohibition, supreme or district judges to hold other offices or to be voted for office while in office. Sec. 11. The justices of the supreme court and the district courts shall hold no office under the United States, nor any other office under this State. And all votes for either of them for any elective office under this Constitution, except a judicial office given by the legislature or the people, during their continuance in office, shall be void.

Change of judicial districts. Sec. 12. The legislature may at any time change the number of judicial districts or their boundaries, when it shall be deemed expedient; but no such change shall vacate the office of any judge.

Clerk of court. Sec. 13. There shall be elected in each county where a district court shall be held, one clerk of said court, whose qualifications, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law, and whose term of office shall be four years.

Legal pleadings. Sec. 14. Legal pleadings and proceedings in the courts of this State shall be under the direction of the legislature. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Minnesota," and all indictments shall conclude, "against the peace and dignity of the State of Minnesota."

Court commissioner—powers and jurisdiction. Sec. 15. The legislature may provide for the election of one person in each organized county in this State, to be called a court commissioner, with judicial power and jurisdiction not exceeding the power and jurisdiction of a judge of the district court at chambers; or the legislature may, instead of such election, confer such power and jurisdiction upon the judges of probate in the State.

ARTICLE VII

ELECTIVE FRANCHISE.

Elective franchise. Section 1. What persons are entitled to vote:

Residence required. Every male* person of the age of twenty-one (21) years or upwards belonging to either of the following classes who has resided in this State six (6) months next preceding any election shall be entitled to vote at such election in the election district of which he shall at the time have been for thirty (30) days a resident, for all officers that now are, or hereafter may be, elective by the people.

Citizens of the United States. First—Citizens of the United States who have been such for the period of three (3) months next preceding any election.

Mixed Indians. Second—Persons of mixed white and Indian blood, who have adopted the customs and habits of civilization.

Pure Indians having adopted habits of civilization. Third—Persons of Indian blood residing in this State, who have adopted the language, customs and habits of civilization, after an examination before any district court of the State, in such manner as may be provided by law, and shall have been pronounced by said court capable of enjoying the rights of citizenship within the State.

Non-eligible. Sec. 2. No person not belonging to one of the classes specified in the preceding section; no person who has been convicted of treason or any felony, unless restored to civil rights; and no person under guardianship, or who may be non compos mentis or insane, shall be entitled or permitted to vote at any election in this State.

Residence not lost in certain cases. Sec. 3. For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have lost a residence by reason of his absence while employed in the service of the United States; nor while engaged upon the waters of this State or of the United States; nor while a student in any seminary of learning; nor while kept at any almshouse or asylum; nor while confined in any public prison.

Soldiers and sailors—restriction. Sec. 4. No sailor, seaman or marine in the army or navy of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State in consequence of being stationed within the same.

Civil process suspended on election day. Sec. 5. During the day on which any election shall be held, no person shall be arrested by virtue of any civil process.

Elections by ballots. Sec. 6. All elections shall be by ballot, except for such town officers as may be directed by law to be otherwise chosen.

Right to hold office. Sec. 7. Every person who by the provisions of this article shall be entitled to vote at any election shall be eligible to any office which now is, or hereafter shall be, elective by the people in the district wherein he shall have resided thirty days previous to such election, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, or the Constitution and law of the United States. (a).

Women may vote (Obsolete). Sec. 8. Women may vote for school officers and members of library boards, and shall be eligible to hold any office pertaining to the management of schools or libraries.

Any woman of the age of twenty-one (21) years and upward and possessing qualifications requisite to a male voter may vote at any election held for the purpose of choosing any officer of schools or any members of library boards, or upon any measure relating to schools or libraries, and shall be eligible to hold any office pertaining to the management of schools and libraries.

Official year of the State. Sec. 9. The official year for the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Monday in January in each year, and all terms of office shall terminate at that time; and the general election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The first general election for State and county officers, except judicial officers, after the adoption of this amendment, shall be held in the year A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four (1884), and thereafter the general election shall be held biennially. All state, county or other officers elected

at any general election, whose terms of office would otherwise expire on the first Monday of January, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eightysix (1886), shall hold and continue in such offices, respectively, until the first Monday in January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven (1887).

ARTICLE VIII.

SCHOOL FUNDS, EDUCATION AND SCIENCE.

Uniform system of public schools. Section 1. The stability of a republican form of government depending mainly upon the intelligence of the people, it shall be the duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools. (a)

Proceeds of school lands to be a perpetual fund. Sec. 2. The proceeds of such lands as are or hereafter may be granted by the United States for the use of schools within each township of this State shall remain a perpetual school fund to the State; and not more than one-third (1/3) of said lands may be sold in two (2) years, one-third (1/3) in five (5) years, and one-third (1/3) in ten (10) years; but the lands of the greatest valuation shall be sold first; provided, that no portion of said lands shall be sold otherwise than at public sale. The principal of all funds arising from sales or other disposition of lands or other property, granted or entrusted to this State in each township for educational purposes, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished; and the income arising from the lease or sale of said school land shall be distributed to the different townships throughout the State, in proportion to the number of scholars in each township, between the ages of five and twenty-one years; and shall be faithfully applied to the specific objects of the original grants or appropriations.

*A revolving fund of not over two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) may be set apart from the fund derived from the sale of school and swamp lands, to be used in constructing roads, ditches and fire breaks in, through and around unsold school and swamp lands and in clearing such lands, such fund to be replenished as long as needed from the enhanced value realized from the sale of such lands so benefited.

Investment of funds. Suitable laws shall be enacted by the legislature for the safe investment of the principal of all funds which have heretofore arisen or which may hereafter arise from the sale or other disposition of such lands, or the income from such lands accruing in any way before the sale or disposition thereof, in interest-bearing bonds of the United States, or of the State of Minnesota, issued after the year one thousand eight hundred and

sixty (1860), or of such other state as the legislature may, by law, from time to time direct.

Swamp lands—division of proceeds. All swamp lands now held by the State, or that may hereafter accrue to the State, shall be appraised and sold in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same less one-third $(\frac{1}{3})$, as is provided by law for the appraisement and sale of the school lands under the provisions of title one (1) of chapter thirty-eight (38) of the General Statutes. The principal of all funds derived from sales of swamp lands, as aforesaid, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished. One-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ of the proceeds of said principal shall be appropriated to the common school fund of the State. The remaining one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ shall be appropriated to the educational and charitable institutions of the State in the relative ratio of cost to support said institutions.

Public schools in each township to be established. Sec. 3. The legislature shall make such provisions, by taxation or otherwise, as, with the income arising from the school fund, will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools in each township in the State.

Prohibition as to aiding sectarian school. But in no case shall the moneys derived as aforesaid, or any portion thereof, or any public moneys or property, be appropriated or used for the support of schools wherein the distinctive doctrines, creeds or tenets of any particular Christian or other religious sect are promulgated or taught.

University of Minnesota—location confirmed. Sec. 4. The location of the University of Minnesota, as established by existing laws, is hereby confirmed, and said institution is hereby declared to be the University of the State of Minnesota. All the rights, immunities, franchises and endowments heretofore granted or conferred are hereby perpetuated unto the said university; and all lands which may be granted hereafter by Congress, or other donations for said university purposes, shall vest in the institution referred to in this section.

Permanent school funds may be loaned to districts or counties for school purposes. Sec. 5. The permanent school funds of the State may be loaned upon interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum to the several counties or school districts of the State, to be used in the erection of county or school buildings. No such loan shall be made until approved by a board consisting of the governor, the state auditor and the state treasurer, who are hereby constituted an investment board for the purpose of the loans hereby authorized; nor shall any such loan be for an amount exceeding three (3) per cent of the last preceding assessed valuation of the real estate of the county or school district receiving the same. The state auditor shall annually, at the time of certifying the state tax to the several county auditors, also certify to each auditor to whose county, or to any of the school districts of whose county, any such loan shall have been made, the tax necessary to be levied to meet the accruing interest or principal of any

such loan, and it shall be the duty of every such county auditor forthwith to levy and extend such tax upon all the taxable property of his county, or of the several school districts, respectively, liable for such loans—as the case may be—and in all such cases the tax so assessed shall be fifty (50) per cent in excess of the amount actually necessary to be raised on account of such accruing principal or interest. It shall be levied, collected and paid into the county and state treasuries in the same manner as state taxes, and any excess collected over the amount of such principal or interest accruing in any given year shall be credited to the general funds of the respective counties or school districts. No change of the boundaries of any school district after the making of any such loan shall operate to withdraw any property from the taxation herein provided for; nor shall any law be passed extending the time of payment of any such principal or interest, or reducing the rate of such interest, or in any manner waiving or impairing any rights of the State in connection with any such loan. Suitable laws, not inconsistent with this amendment, may be passed by the legislature for the purpose of carrying the same into effect. (a)

Investment of permanent school and university funds—approval bonded indebtedness not to exceed 15 per cent, draw not less than 3 per cent, run not less than 5 nor, more than 20 years. **Sec. 6. The permanent school and university fund of this state may be invested in the bonds of any county, school district, city, town or village of this state, and in first mortgage loans secured upon improved and cultivated farm lands of this state. But no such investment or loan shall be made until approved by the board of commissioners designated by law to regulate the investment of the permanent school fund and the permanent university fund of this state; nor shall such loan or investment be made when the bonds to be issued or purchased would make the entire bonded indebtedness exceed 15 per cent of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the county, school district, city, town or village issuing such bonds; nor shall any farm loan or investment be made when such investment or loan would exceed 30 per cent of the actual cash value of the farm land mortgage to secure said investment, nor shall such investments or loans be made at a lower rate of interest than 3 per cent per annum, nor for a shorter period than five years, nor for a longer period than thirty years, and no change of the town, school district, city, village or of county lines shall relieve the real property in such town, school district, county, village or city in this state at the time of issuing of such bonds from any liability for taxation to pay such bonds.

*Sec. 7. Such of the school and other public lands of the state as are better adapted for the production of timber than for agriculture, may be

set apart as state school forests, or other state forests, as the legislature may provide, and the legislature may provide for the management of the same on forestry principles. The net revenue therefrom shall be used for the purposes for which the lands were granted to the state.

ARTICLE IX.

FINANCES OF THE STATE AND BANKS AND BANKING

Power of taxation—legislature may authorize. Section 1. The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects, and shall be levied and collected for public purposes, but public burying grounds, public school houses, public hospitals, academies, colleges, universities, and all seminaries of learning, all churches, church property, and houses of worship, institutions of purely public charity, and public property used exclusively for any public purpose, shall be exempt from taxation, and there may be exempted from taxation personal property not exceeding in value \$200, for each household, individual or head of a family, as the legislature may determine: Provided, that the legislature may authorize municipal corporations to levy and collect assessments for local improvements upon property benefited thereby without regard to a cash valuation, and, provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect, modify or repeal any existing law providing for the taxation of the gross earnings of railroads.

Occupation tax. *Sec. 1A. Every person, co-partnership, company, joint stock company, corporation, or association however or for whatever purpose organized, engaged in the business of mining or producing iron ore or other ores in this state, shall pay to the state of Minnesota an occupation tax on the valuation of all ores mined or produced, which tax shall be in addition to all other taxes provided by law, said tax to be due and payable from such person, co-partnership, company, joint stock company, corporation, or association however or for whatever purpose organized, on May first of the calendar year next following the mining or producing thereof. The valuation of ore for the purpose of determining the amount of tax to be paid shall be ascertained in the manner and method provided by law. Funds derived from the tax herein provided for shall be apportioned; fifty percent to the State General Revenue Fund, forty percent to the Permanent School Fund and ten percent to the Permanent University Fund. The Legislature shall by law make the necessary provisions for carrying out the provisions of this section.

N. B.—Sections 2, 3 and 4 obsolete, because in 1906 there was adopted the section which now is Section I in this article. It supplanted Sections 1, 2, 3 and 4 and the unnumbered section of 1896. This amendment is sometimes called the wide open tax amendment. No amendments have been adopted to take the place of the old sections 2, 3 and 4. There is therefore a gap in the numbering from 1 to 5.

State debt limited—how contracted. *Sec. 5. For the purpose of defraying extraordinary expenditures, the state may contract public debts, but such debts shall never, in the aggregate, exceed two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; every such debt shall be authorized by law, for some single object, to be distinctly specified therein; and no such law shall take effect until it shall have been passed by the vote of two-thirds of the members of each branch of the legislature, to be recorded by yeas and nays on the journals of each

house respectively; and every such law shall levy a tax annually sufficient to pay the annual interest of such debt, and also a tax sufficient to pay the principal of such debt within ten years from the final passage of such law, and shall specially appropriate the proceeds of such taxes to the payment of such principal and interest; and such appropriation and taxes shall not be repealed, postponed, or diminished, until the principal and interest of such debt shall have been wholly paid. The state shall never contract any debts for works of internal improvements, or be a party in carrying on such works, except as authorized by section 16 of Article 9, and by Article 16 of this Constitution, but it may levy an excise tax upon any substance, material, fluid, force or other means or instrumentality, or the business of dealing in, selling or producing any or all thereof, used or useful, in producing or generating power for propelling motor or other vehicles used on the public highways of this State, and shall place the proceeds of such tax in the Trunk Highway Fund provided for in Section 2 of said Article 16, and further except in cases where grants of land or other property shall have been made to the state, especially dedicated by the grant to specific purposes, and in such cases the state shall devote thereto the avails of such grants, and may pledge or appropriate the revenues derived from such works in aid of their completion.

Issue of bonds for created debt. Sec. 6. All debts authorized by the preceding section shall be contracted by loan on State bonds of amounts not less than five hundred dollars each on interest, payable within ten years after the final passage of the law authorizing such debt; and such bonds shall not be sold by the State under par. A correct registry of all such bonds shall be kept by the treasurer, in numerical order, so as always to exhibit the number and amount unpaid and to whom severally made payable.

Limitation as to when debt may be contracted. Sec. 7. The State shall never contract any public debt, unless in time of war, to repel invasion or suppress insurrection, except in the cases and in the manner provided in the fifth and sixth sections of this article.

' Disposition of funds received for bonds. Sec. 8. The money arising from any loan made, or debt or liability contracted, shall be applied to the object specified in the act authorizing such debt or liability, or to the repayment of such debt or liability, and to no other purpose whatever.

Money drawn from the State treasury. Sec. 9. No money shall ever be paid out of the treasury of this State except in pursuance of an appropriation by law.

Credit of the State limited. Sec. 10. The Credit of the State shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association or corporation, except as hereinafter provided. Nor shall there be any further issue of bonds denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds," under what purports to be an amendment to section ten (10) of article nine (9) of the Constitution, adopted April 15th, 1858, which is hereby expunged from the Constitution, saving, excepting and reserving to the State, nevertheless, all rights, remedies and forfeitures accruing under said amendment. *Provided, however, that for the purpose of developing the agricultural resources of the state, the State may establish and maintain a system of rural credits and thereby loan money and extend credit to the people of the State upon real estate security in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as may be prescribed by law, and to issue and negotiate bonds to provide money to be so loaned. The limit of indebtedness con-

tained in Section 5 of this Article shall not apply to the provisions of this Section, and the purposes for which the credit of the State or the aforesaid municipal subdivisions thereof may be given or loaned as herein provided are declared to be public purposes.

Publication of receipts and expenditures by treasurer. Sec. 11. There shall be published by the treasurer, in at least one newspaper printed at the seat of government, during the first week in January in each year, and in the next volume of the acts of legislature, detailed statements of all moneys drawn from the treasury during the preceding year, for what purpose and to whom paid, and by what law authorized; and also of all moneys received, and by what authority and from whom.

State school fund-investment-safe keeping-All State funds to be deposited in name of State. Sec. 12. Suitable laws shall be passed by the legislature for the safe-keeping, transfer and disbursements of the State and school funds; and all officers and other persons charged with the same or any part of the same, or the safe keeping thereof, shall be required to give ample security for all moneys and funds of any kind received by them; to make forthwith and keep an accurate entry of each sum received, and of each payment and transfer; and if any of said officers or other persons shall convert to his own use in any manner or form, or shall loan, with or without interest, or shall deposit in his own name, or otherwise than in the name of the State of Minnesota; or shall deposit in banks or with any person or persons, or exchange for other funds or property, any portion of the funds of the State or the school funds aforesaid, except in the manner prescribed by law, every such act shall be and constitute an embezzlement of so much of the aforesaid State and school funds, or either of the same, as shall thus be taken, or loaned, or deposited or exchanged, and shall be a felony; and any failure to pay over, produce; or account for the State school funds, or any part of the same entrusted to such officer or persons as by law required on demand, shall be held and be taken to be prima facie evidence of such embezzlement.

General banking law—provision and restrictions. Sec. 13. The legislature may, by a two-thirds vote, pass a general banking law, with the following restrictions and requirements, viz.:

First—The legislature shall have no power to pass any law sanctioning in any manner, directly, or indirectly, the suspension of specie payments by any person, association or corporation issuing bank notes of any description.

Second—The legislature shall provide by law for the registry of all bills or notes issued or put in circulation as money, and shall require ample security in United States stock or State stocks for the redemption of the same in specie; and in case of a depreciation of said stocks, or any part thereof, to the amount of ten per cent or more on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by additional stocks.

Third—The stockholders in any corporation and joint association for banking purposes, issuing bank notes, shall be individually liable in an amount equal to double the amount of stock owned by them for all the debts of such corporation or association; and such individual liability shall continue for one year after any transfer or sale of stock by any stockholder or stockholders.

Fourth—In case of the insolvency of any bank or banking association, the bill holders thereof shall be entitled to preference in payment over all other creditors of such bank or association.

Fifth—Any general banking law which may be passed in accordance with this article shall provide for recording the names of all stockholders in such corporation, the amount of stock held by each, the time of transfer, and to whom transferred.

Special provision for a loan for hospital building for insane. Sec. 14. (a) For the purpose of erecting and completing buildings for a hospital for the insane, a deaf, dumb and blind asylum, the state prison, the legislature may by law increase the public debt of the State to an amount not exceeding \$250,000, in addition to the public debt already heretofore authorized by the Constitution; and for that purpose may provide by law for issuing and negotiating the bonds of the State, and appropriate the money only for the purpose aforesaid; which bonds shall be payable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the date of the same, at the option of the State.

Superseded by section 15 but not repealed in express terms. Sec. 14. (b) The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds or to become indebted in any manner to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed ten per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation; the amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made for the purpose of state and county taxation previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.*

County, city or township aid to railroads limited. Sec. 15. The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds, or to become indebted in any manner, to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed five (5) per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation. The amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made, for the purpose of state and county taxation, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.**

State Road and Bridge Fund. Sec. 16. For the purpose of lending aid in the construction and improvement of public highways and bridges, there

is hereby created a fund, to be known as the "state road and bridge fund," said fund shall include all moneys accruing from the income derived from investments in the internal improvement land fund, or that may hereafter accrue to said fund, and shall also include all funds accruing to any state road and bridge fund however provided.

The legislature is authorized to add to such fund, for the purpose of constructing or improving roads and bridges of this state, by providing, in its discretion, for an annual tax levy upon the property of this state of not to exceed in any year one mill on all the taxable property within the state. *Provided*, that no county shall receive in any year more than three (3) per cent, or less than one-half (½) of one (1) per cent of the total fund thus provided and expended during such year.***

ARTICLE X:

OF CORPORATIONS HAVING NO BANKING PRIVILEGES.

Corporations for general purposes. Section 1. The term "Corporation," as used in this article, shall be construed to include all associations and joint stock companies having any of the powers and privileges not possessed by individuals or partnerships, except such as embrace banking privileges, and all corporations shall have the right to sue, and shall be liable to be sued in all courts, in like manner as natural persons.

Not to be created by special act. Sec. 2. No corporations shall be formed under special acts, except for municipal purposes.

Liability of Stockholders. Sec. 3. Each stockholder in any corporation excepting those organized for the purpose of carrying on any kind of manufacturing or mechanical business shall be liable to the amount of stock held or owned by him.

Lands may be taken for public use. Sec. 4. Lands may be taken for public way, for the purpose of granting to any corporation the franchise of way for public use. In all cases, however, a fair and equitable compensation shall be paid for such land, and the damages arising from the taking of the same; but all corporations being common carriers enjoying the right of way in pursuance of the provisions of this section, shall be bound to carry the mineral, agricultural and other productions of manufacturers on equal and reasonable terms.

ARTICLE XI.

COUNTIES AND TOWNSHIPS.

County organization. Section 1. The legislature may from time to time establish and organize new counties; but no new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any county be reduced below that amount; and all laws changing county lines in counties already organized, or for removing county seats, shall, before taking effect, be submitted to the electors of the county or counties to be affected thereby, at the next

general election after the passage thereof, and be adopted by a majority of such electors. Counties now established may be enlarged, but not reduced

below four hundred (400) square miles.

Cities of 20,000 population may be organized into separate counties. Sec. 2. The legislature may organize any city into a separate county, when it has attained a population of 20,000 inhabitants, without reference to geographical extent, when a majority of the electors of the county in which such city may be situated, voting thereon, shall be in favor of a separate organization.

Township organization. Sec. 3. Laws may be passed providing for the organization for municipal and other town purposes, of any congressional or fractional townships in the several counties in the State, provided that when a township is divided by county lines or does not contain one hundred inhabitants, it may be attached to one or more adjoining townships or parts of townships for the purposes aforesaid.

Election of county and town officers. Sec. 4. Provisions shall be made by law for the election of such county or township officers as may be

necessary.

Local taxation may be authorized. Sec. 5. Any county and township organization shall have such powers of local taxation as may be prescribed by law.

Money drawn from county or town treasuries. Sec. 6. No money shall be drawn from any county or township treasury except by authority

of law.

County of Manomin abolished. Sec. 7. That the county of Manomin is hereby abolished, and that the territory heretofore comprising the same shall constitute and be a part of the county of Anoka.*

· ARTICLE XII.

OF THE MILITIA.

Militia organization. Section 1. It shall be the duty of the legislature to pass such laws for the organization, discipline and service of the militia of the State as may be deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XIII.

IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVAL FROM OFFICE.

Impeachment and removal from office. Section 1. The governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and the judges of the Supreme and district courts, may be impeached for corrupt conduct in office, or for crimes and misdemeanors; but judgment in such case shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit in this State. The party convicted thereof shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

Sec. 2. The legislature of this State may provide for the removal of inferior officers from office, for malfeasance or nonfeasance in the perform-

ance of their duties.

SEC. 3. No officer shall exercise the duties of his office after he shall have been impeached and before his acquittal.

SEC. 4. On the trial of an impeachment against the governor, the

lieutenant governor shall not act as a member of the court.

Sec. 5. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he shall have been served with a copy thereof at least twenty days previous to the day set for trial.

ARTICLE XIV.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Amendments to constitution—majority vote of electors voting makes amendment valid. Section 1. Whenever a majority of both houses of the legislature shall deem it necessary to alter or amend this Constitution, they may propose such alterations or amendments, which proposed amendments shall be published with the laws which have been passed at the same session, and said amendments shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at any general election, and if it shall appear, in a manner to be provided by law, that a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for and ratified such alterations or amendments, the same shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of this Constitution. If two or more alterations or amendments shall be submitted at the same time, it shall be so regulated that the voters shall vote for or against each separately.

Revision of constitution. Sec. 2. Whenever two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the legislature shall think it necessary to call a convention to revise this Constitution, they shall recommend to the electors to vote at the next general election for members of the legislature, for or against a convention; and if a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for a convention, the legislature shall, at their next session, provide by law for calling the same. The convention shall consist of as many members as the House of Representatives, who shall be chosen in the same manner, and shall meet within three months after their election for the purpose aforesaid.

ARTICLE XV.

MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS.

Seat of government. Section 1. The seat of government of the State shall be at the city of St. Paul, but the legislature, at their first or any future session, may provide by law for a change of the seat of government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by Congress for a seat of government to the State; and in the event of the seat of government being removed from the city of St. Paul to any other place in the State, the capitol building and grounds shall be dedicated to an institution for the promotion of science, literature and the arts, to be organized by the legislature of the State, and of which institution the Minnesota Historical Society shall always be a department.

Residents on Indian lands. Sec. 2. Persons residing on Indian lands within the State shall enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizens, as though they lived in any other portion of the State, and shall be subject to taxation.

Uniform oath at elections. Sec. 3. The legislature shall provide for a uniform oath or affirmation to be administered at elections, and no person shall be compelled to take any other or different form of oath to entitle him to vote.

State seal. Sec. 4. There shall be a seal of the State, which shall be kept by the secretary of state, and be used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the State of Minnesota, and shall be attached to all the official acts of the governor (his signature to acts and resolves of the legislature excepted) requiring authentication. The legislature shall provide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal.

State prison location. Sec. 5. The territorial prison, as located under existing laws, shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, be and remain

one of the state prisons of the State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE XVI.*

TRUNK HIGHWAY SYSTEM.

Section 1.—There is hereby created and established a trunk highway system, which shall be located, constructed, reconstructed, improved and torever maintained as public highways, by the state of Minnesota. The said highways shall extend as nearly as may be along the following described routes, the more specific and definite location of which shall be fixed and determined by such boards, officers or tribunals, and in such manner, as shall be prescribed by law, but in fixing such specific and definite routes there shall not be any deviation from the starting points or terminals set forth in this bill, nor shall there be any deviation in fixing such routes from the various villages and cities named herein, through which such routes are to pass.

Route No. 1.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa, southeasterly at Albert Lea and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point in Albert Lea and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point and on the southerly limits of the city of St. Paul and then beginning at a point on the northerly limits of the city of St. Paul and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and then beginning at a point on the northerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on the boundary line between the state of Minnesota and the province of Ontario, affording Albert Lea, Owatonna, Faribault, Northfield, Farmington, St. Paul, White Bear, Forest Lake, Wyoming, Rush City, Pine City, Hinckley, Sandstone, Moose Lake, Carlton, Duluth, Two Harbors, Grand Marais and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 2.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 1 on the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a southwesterly direction along said Route No. 1 to a point on said route at Carlton and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the east bank of the Red River of the North at Moorhead, affording Duluth, Carlton, McGregor, Aitkin, Brainerd, Motley, Staples, Wadena, Detroit, Moorhead, and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 3.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Wisconsin, westerly of La Crosse, Wisconsin, and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the easterly limits of the city of St. Paul and then beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city

of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the east bank of the Red River of the North at Breckenridge, affording La Crescent, Winona, Kellogg, Wabasha, Lake City, Red Wing, Hastings, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Osseo, Champlin, Anoka, Elk River, Big Lake, St. Cloud, Albany, Sauk Center, Alexandria, Elbow Lake, Fergus Falls, Breckenridge and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 4.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa, southwesterly of Jackson and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 3, southeasterly of Sauk Center and thence extending in a northwesterly direction along said Route No. 3 to a point on said route at Sauk Center and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point at International Falls, affording Jackson, Windom, Sanborn, Redwood Falls, Morton, Olivia, Willmar, Paynesville, Sauk Center, Long Prairie, Wadena, Park Rapids, Itasca State Park, Bemidji, International Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 5.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa, southerly of Blue Earth and thence extending in a north-easterly direction to a point on the southerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and then beginning at a point on the northerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point in Swan River on Route No. 8, hereinafter described, affording Blue Earth, Winnebago, Mankato, St. Peter, Le Sueur, Jordan, Shakopee, Minneapolis, Cambridge, Mora, McGregor, Swan River and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 6.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa, southerly of Ash Creek, and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on the boundary line between the state of Minnesota and the province of Manitoba, near St. Vincent, affording Luverne, Pipestone, Lake Benton, Ivanhoe, Canby, Madison, Bellingham, Odessa, Ortonville, Graceville, Dumont, Wheaton, Breckenridge, Moorhead, Kragnes, Georgetown, Perley, Hendrum, Ada, Crookston, Warren, Donaldson, Hallock and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 7.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Winona and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and South Dakota, westerly of Lake Benton, affording Winona, St. Charles, Rochester, Kasson, Dodge Center, Claremont, Owatonna,

Waseca, Mankato, St. Peter, New Ulm, Springfield, Tracy, Lake Benton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 8.

Beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 near Crookston and thence extending in a westerly and northerly direction along said Route No. 6 to a point on said route northerly of Crookston and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the east bank of the Red River of the North at East Grand Forks, affording Duluth, Floodwood, Swan River, Grand Rapids, Cass Lake, Bemidji, Bagley, Erskine, Crookston, East Grand Forks and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 9.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3. at La Crescent and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and South Dakota southwesterly of Beaver Creek, affording La Crescent, Hokah, Houston, Rushford, Lanesboro, Preston, Fountain, Spring Valley, Austin, Albert Lea, Blue Earth, Fairmont, Jackson, Worthington, Luverne and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 10.

Beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at or near Wheaton, affording Minneapolis, Montrose, Cokato, Litchfield, Willmar, Benson, Morris, Herman, Wheaton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 11.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 at the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a northwesterly and northerly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at International Falls and thence extending in a southwesterly direction along said Route No. 4 to a point on said route southwesterly of International Falls and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Donaldson, affording Duluth, Eveleth, Virginia, Cook, Orr, Cussons, International Falls, Baudette, Warroad, Roseau, Greenbush, Donaldson and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 12.

Beginning at a point on the west bank of the St. Croix River near Hudson, Wisconsin, and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the easterly limits of the city of St. Paul and then beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Madison, affording St. Paul, Minneapolis, Hopkins, Norwood, Glencoe, Olivia, Granite Falls, Montevideo, Dawson, Madison and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 13.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 at Albert Lea and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 5 at Jordan, affording Albert Lea, Waseca, Waterville, Montgomery, New Prague, Jordan and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 14.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 6 at Ivanhoe and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at Redwood Falls and thence extending in an easterly direction along said Route No. 4 to a point on said route at Morton and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 22, hereinafter described, at Gaylord, affording Ivanhoe, Marshall, Redwood Falls, Morton, Winthrop, Gaylord and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 15.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa southerly of Fairmont and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 14 at Winthrop, affording Fairmont, Madelia, New Ulm, Winthrop and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 16.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 southwesterly of Mankato and thence extending westerly to a point on Route No. 15 at Madelia and thence extending in a southerly direction along said Route No. 15 to a point on said route southerly of Madelia and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 4 northerly of Windom and thence extending in a southerly direction along said Route No. 4 to a point on said route at Windom and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point at Fulda and thence extending in a southerly direction to a point on Route No. 9 at Worthington, affording Mankato, Madelia, St. James, Windom, Fulda, Worthington and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state

Route No. 17.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 16 at Fulda and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 12 at Granite Falls, affording Fulda, Slayton, Garvin, Marshall, Granite Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 18.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Elk River and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 2 easterly of Brainerd. affording Elk River, Princeton, Milaca, Onamia and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 19.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 2 at Brainerd and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 8 at Cass Lake, affording Brainerd, Pine River, Walker, Cass Lake and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 20.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa near Canton and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 9 at or near Preston and thence extending in a northwesterly direction along said Route No. 9 to a point on said route at Fountain and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 in the town of Douglas, Dakota county (T. 113, R. 17 W.) affording Canton, Harmony, Preston, Fountain, Chatfield, Oronoco, Pine Island, Zumbrota, Cannon Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 21.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 20 at Zumbrota and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 5, at St. Peter, affording Zumbrota, Kenyon, Faribault, Le Sueur Center, Cleveland, St. Peter and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 22.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 at St. Peter and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at Paynesville, affording St. Peter, Gaylord, Glencoe, Hutchinson, Litchfield, Paynesville and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 23.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 4 at Paynesville and thence extending in a northeasterly direction through the village of Richmond, Coldspring, Rockville and Waite Park to a point on Route No. 3 westerly of St. Cloud, and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 5 southerly of Mora, and thence extending in a northerly direction along said

Route No. 5 to a point on said route at Mora, and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 1 southerly of Hinckley, affording Paynesville, St. Cloud, Foley, Milaca, Ogilvie, Mora and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 24.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 10 at Litchfield and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at St. Cloud, affording Litchfield, St. Cloud and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 25.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 at or near Belle Plaine and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Big Lake, affording Belle Plaine, Norwood, Watertown, Montrose, Buffalo, Monticello, Big Lake and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 26.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 10 at Benson and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 near Ortonville, affording Benson, Ortonville and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 27.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at St. Cloud and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 2 at Brainerd, affording St. Cloud, Sauk Rapids, Royalton, Little Falls, Brainerd and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 28.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 27 at Little Falls and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and South Dakota at Browns Valley, affording Little Falls, Sauk Center, Glenwood, Starbuck, Morris, Graceville, Browns Valley and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 29.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 28 at Glenwood and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 2 westerly of Wadena, affording Glenwood, Alexandria, Parkers Prairie, Deer Creek and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 30.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Fergus Falls, and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 8 at Erskine, affording Fergus Falls, Pelican Rapids, Detroit, Mahnomen, Erskine and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 31.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 6 at Ada, and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 30 near Mahnomen, affording Ada, Mahnomen and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 32.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 easterly of Crookston and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 11 at Greenbush, affording Red Lake Falls, Thief River Falls, Middle River, Greenbush and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 33.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 32 at Thief River Falls and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Warren, affording Thief River Falls, Warren and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 34.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 2 at Detroit and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 8 westerly of Grand Rapids, affording Detroit, Park Rapids, Walker, Remer, Grand Rapids and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 35.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 18 near Mille Lacs Lake and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point at Grand Rapids and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point at Ely, affording Aitkin, Grand Rapids, Hibbing, Chisholm, Buhl, Mountain Iron, Virginia, Gilbert, McKinley, Biwabik, Aurora, Tower and Ely and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 36.

Beginning at a point or Route No. 3 at Fergus Falls and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 29 easterly of Henning, affording Fergus Falls, Henning and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 37.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 27 at Little Falls and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 2 at Motley, affording Little Falls, Motley and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 38.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 12 at Montevideo and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 28 at Starbuck, affording Montevideo, Benson, Starbuck and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 39.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 7 at Mankato and thence extending in a southeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 9 westerly of Albert Lea, affording Mankato, Mapleton, Minnesota Lake, Wells and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 40.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa at Lyle and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 7 at Owatonna, affording Lyle, Austin, Blooming Prairie, Owatonna and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 41.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 40 at or near Blooming Prairie and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 56, hereinafter described, near Hayfield, affording Blooming Prairie, Hayfield and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 42.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 7 easterly of Rochester and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Kellogg, affording Rochester, Elgin, Plainview, Kellogg and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 43.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 at Rushford and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Winona, affording Rushford, Winona and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 44.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 at Hokah and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 20 near Canton, affording Hokah, Caledonia, Canton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communciation, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 45.

Beginning at a point on the west bank of the St. Croix River at Stillwater and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on the easterly limits of the city of St. Paul, affording Stillwater, Lake Elmo, St. Paul and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 46.

Beginning at a point on the west bank of the St. Croix River at Taylors Falls and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 1 near Wyoming, affording Taylors Falls, Center City, Wyoming and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 47.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 17 at Slayton and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Pipestone, affording Slayton, Pipestone and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 48.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 17 westerly of Granite Falls and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Canby, affording Granite Falls, Clarkfield, Canby and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 49.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 12 easterly of Montevideo and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 4 southerly of Willmar, affording Montevideo, Clara City, Willmar and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 50.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 20 at Cannon Falls and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the southerly limits of the city of Minneapolis, affording Cannon Falls, Farmington, Minneapolis and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 51.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 at Shakopee and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 12 northerly of Shakopee, affording a connection between said Route No. 5 and said Route No. 12.

Route No. 52.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 south of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on the westerly limits of the United States Military reservation at Fort Snelling, affording St. Paul and adjacent communities a reasonable communication with said Route No. 5.

Route No. 53.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Hastings and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the southerly limits of the city of South St. Paul, affording Hastings, South St. Paul and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 54.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Elbow Lake and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 10 at Herman, affording Elbow Lake, Herman and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 55.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 2 northwesterly of Carlton and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point in Cloquet, affording Carlton, Cloquet and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 56.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 easterly of Austin and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 21 at or near Kenyon, affording Brownsdale, Hayfield, Dodge Center, West Concord, Kenyon and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 57.

Beginning at a point in Mantorville and extending in a southerly direction to a point on Route No. 7 southerly of Mantorville, affording Mantorville a reasonable means of communication with said Route No. 7.

Route No. 58.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 20 at Zumbrota and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Red Wing, affording Zumbrota, Red Wing and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 59.

Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa southerly of Spring Valley and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Lake City, affording Spring Valley, Stewartville, Rochester, Zumbro Falls, Lake City and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 60.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 1 at Faribault and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 7 at or near Madison Lake, affording Faribault, Morristown, Waterville, Madison Lake and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 61.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 at Deer River and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at or near Big Falls, affording Deer River, Big Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 62.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Anoka and thence extending in a southeasterly direction to a point on the northerly limits of the city of St. Paul, affording Anoka, St. Paul and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 63.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 1 southerly of Forest Lake and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on the northerly and easterly limits of the city of Minneapolis, affording a reasonable means of communication between Route No. 1 and Minneapolis.

Route No. 64.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 30 northerly of Fergus Falls and thence extending in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 southerly of Moorhead, affording Fergus Falls, Rothsay, Barnesville, Moorhead and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 65.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 at Bagley and thence extending in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on Route No. 32 southerly of Red Lake Falls, affording Bagley, Clearbrook, Gonvick, Gully, Brooks, Terrebonne and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 66.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 12 at Montevideo and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 26 northerly of Appleton, affording Montevideo, Appleton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 67.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 14 southerly of Echo and thence extending in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on Route No. 17 at or near Granite Falls, affording Echo, Granite Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 68.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 14 at Marshall and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 near Canby, affording Marshall, Minneota, Canby and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 69.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 25 at Buffalo and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 22 southeasterly of Paynesville, affording Buffalo, Maple Lake, Annandale, Eden Valley, Paynesville and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Route No. 70.

Beginning at a point on Route No. 7 westerly of New Ulm and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 12 at or near the village of Hector, affording Fort Ridgely, Fairfax, Hector and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the state.

Additional Routes.

Whenever, either by reason of the creation of a new county, or by reason of the change of the county seat of any existing county, any city or village not a county seat at the time of the adoption of this amendment is lawfully constituted the county seat of any county, the legislature is authorized to add to the trunk highway system such additional routes connecting such newly constituted county seats with other county seats and other points in the state.

When after at least seventy-five (75) per cent of the total number of the miles of the routes embraced in the trunk highway system hereinbefore specified shall have been constructed and permanently improved, the legislature shall have authority to add new routes to such trunk highway system; provided, however, that no such new routes shall be added until and unless the funds available for the construction, improvement and maintenance of such additional routes shall be sufficient therefor in addition to the construction, improvement and maintenance of the several routes hereinbefore specifically described.

Section 2. There is hereby created a fund which shall be known as the trunk highway sinking fund. Said fund shall consist of the proceeds of any tax imposed on motor vehicles as herein authorized. The moneys in said fund shall be used for the payment of the principal and interest of any bonds which may be issued under the authority of this article; and any moneys in excess of such requirements shall be transferred to a fund which is hereby created and which shall be known as the trunk highway fund. The trunk highway fund shall be used solely for the purposes specified in section 1 of this article, and when duly authorized by legislative enactment to reimburse any county for the money expended by it subsequent to February 1st, 1919, in permanently improving any road hereinbefore specifically described, in accordance with plans and specifications therefore approved by the commissioner of highways.

Section 3. The legislature is hereby authorized to provide, by law, for the taxation of motor vehicles, using the public streets and highways of this state, on a more onerous basis than other personal property; provided, however, that any such tax on motor vehicles shall be in lieu of all other taxes thereon, except wheelage taxes, so-called, which may be imposed by any borough, city or village. Any such law may, in the discretion of the legislature, provide for the exemption from taxation of any motor vehicle owned by a non-resident of the state, and transiently or temporarily using the streets and highways of the state. The proceeds of such tax shall be paid in to said trunk highway sinking fund.

Section 4. The legislature may provide by law for the issue and sale of the bonds of the state in such amount as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of section 1 of this article, provided, however, that the amount of bonds which may be issued in any one calendar year shall not exceed, in the aggregate, ten million dollars, par value, and provided, further,

the total amount of such bonds issued and unpaid shall not at any time exceed seventy-five million dollars, par value. The proceeds of the sale of such bonds shall be paid into the treasury of the state and credited to the trunk highway fund. Any bonds so issued and sold shall be for a term not exceeding twenty (20) years. They shall not be sold for less than par and accrued interest and shall not bear interest at a greater rate than five per cent per annum. In case the trunk highway sinking fund shall not be adequate to meet the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds authorized by the legislature as hereinbefore provided, the legislature may provide by law for the taxation of all taxable property of the state in an amount sufficient to meet the deficiency, or it may, in its discretion, appropriate to such sinking fund moneys in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Section 5. Any and all provisions of the constitution of the state of Minnesota are hereby repealed, inconsistent with the provisions of this article, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the legislature, to enact laws authorizing or permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

ARTICLE XVII.*

Section 1. The state and (or) any of its political subdivisions, if and whenever authorized by the legislature, may contract debts and pledge the public credit for and engage in any work reasonably tending to prevent or abate forest fires, including the compulsory clearing and improvement of wild lands (whether belonging to the public or privately owned) and the assessment against such lands of the value of all benefits so conferred and the payment of damages so sustained in excess of such benefits.

SEC. 2. Any and all provisions of the constitution of the state of Minnesota inconsistent with the provisions of this article, are hereby repealed, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the legislature to enact laws authorizing or permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

SCHEDULE.

Territorial laws valid in change to State organization. Section 1. That no inconvenience may arise by reason of a change from a territorial to a permanent state government, it is declared that all rights, actions, prosecutions, judgments, claims and contracts, as well of individuals as of bodies corporate, shall continue as if no change had taken place; and all process which may be issued under the authority of the Territory of Minnesota previous to its admission into the Union of the United States shall be as valid as if issued in the name of the State.

Territorial laws not repugnant to constitution to be in force. Sec. 2. All laws now in force in the Territory of Minnesota not repugnant to this Constitution shall remain in force until they expire by their own limitation, or be altered or repealed by the legislature.

SEC. 3. All fines, penalties or forfeitures accruing to the Territory of Minnesota shall inure to the State.

Civil rights under territorial government secured in the change to State government. Sec. 4. All recognizances heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from a territorial to a permanent state government shall remain valid, and shall pass to and may be prosecuted in the name of the State; and all bonds executed to the governor of the Territory, or to any other officer or court in his or their official capacity, shall pass to the governor or state authority and their successors in office, for the uses therein respectively expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly; and all the estate of property, real, personal or mixed, and all judgments, bonds, specialties, choses in action, and claims and debts, of whatsoever description, of the Territory of Minnesota, shall inure to and vest in the State of Minnesota, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner and to the same extent by the State of Minnesota as the same could have been by the Territory of Minnesota. All criminal prosecutions and penal actions which may have arisen, or which may arise before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment and execution in the name of the State. All offenses committed against the laws of the Territory of Minnesota, before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall not be prosecuted before such change, may be prosecuted in the name and by the authority of the State of Minnesota with like effect as though such change had not taken place, and all penalties incurred shall remain the same as if this Constitution had not been adopted. All actions at law and suits in equity which may be pending in any of the courts of the Territory of Minnesota, at the time of a change from a territorial to a state government, may be continued and transferred to any court of the State which shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter thereof.

Territorial officers continued until superseded. Sec. 5. All territorial officers, civil or military, now holding their offices under the authority of the United States, or of the Territory of Minnesota shall continue to hold and exercise their respective offices until they shall be superseded by the authority of the State.

First session of State legislature. Sec. 6. The first session of the legislature of the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Wednesday of December next, and shall be held at the capitol, in the city of St. Paul.

SEC. 7. The laws regulating the election and qualification of all district, county and precinct officers shall continue and be in force until the legislature shall otherwise provide by law.

Constitution submitted to a vote of the people. Sec. 8. The president of this convention shall, immediately after the adjournment thereof, cause this Constitution to be deposited in the office of the governor of the Territory; and if, after the submission of the same to a vote of the people, as hereinafter provided, it shall appear that, it has been adopted by a vote of the people of the State, then the governor shall forward a certified copy of the same, together with an abstract of the votes polled for and against the said Constitution, to the president of the United States, to be by him laid before the Congress of the United States.

Representation to congress. Sec. 9. For the purposes of the first election, the State shall constitute one district, and shall elect three members to the House of Representatives of the United States.

First apportionment into legislative districts. Sec. 10. For the purposes of the first election for members of the State Senate and House of Representatives, the State shall be divided into senatorial and representative districts, as follows, viz: First district, Washington county; Second district, Ramsey county; Third district, Dakota county; Fourth district, so much of Hennepin county as lies west of the Mississippi; Fifth district, Rice county; Sixth district, Goodhue county; Seventh district, Scott county; Eighth district, Olmsted county; Ninth district, Fillmore county; Tenth district, Houston county; Eleventh district, Winona county; Twelfth district, Wabasha county; Thirteenth district, Mower and Dodge counties; Fourteenth district, Freeborn and Faribault counties; Fifteenth district, Steele and Waseca counties; Sixteenth district, Blue Earth and Le Sueur counties; Seventeenth district, Nicollet and Brown counties; Eighteenth district, Sibley, Renville and McLeod counties; Nineteenth district, Carver and Wright counties; Twentieth district, Benton, Stearns and Meeker counties; Twenty-first district, Morrison, Crow Wing and Mille Lacs counties: Twenty-second district, Cass, Pembina and Todd counties; Twenty-third district, so much of Hennepin county as lies east of the Mississippi; Twenty-fourth district, Sherburne, Anoka and Manomin counties; Twenty-fifth district, Chisago, Pine and Isanti counties; Twenty-sixth district, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis, Lake and Itasca counties.

SEC. 11. The counties of Brown, Stearns, Todd, Cass, Pembina and Renville, as applied in the preceding section, shall not be deemed to include any territory west of the State line, but shall be deemed to include all counties and parts of counties east of said line as were created out of the territory of either, at the last session of the legislature.

Apportionment of members. Sec. 12. The senators and representatives at the first election shall be apportioned among the several senatorial and representative districts as follows, to-wit:

SEC. 13. The returns from the Twenty-second district shall be made to and canvassed by the judges of election at the precinct of Otter Tail City.

Judicial districts. Sec. 14. Until the legislature shall otherwise provide, the State shall be divided into judicial districts as follows, viz.:

The counties of Washington, Chisago, Manomin, Anoka, Isanti, Pine, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis and Lake shall constitute the First judicial district.

The county of Ramsey shall constitute the Second judicial district.

The counties of Houston, Winona, Fillmore, Olmsted and Wabasha shall constitute the Third judicial district.

The counties of Hennepin, Carver, Wright, Meeker, Sherburne, Benton, Stearns, Morrison, Crow Wing, Mille Lacs, Itasca, Pembina, Todd and Cass shall constitute the Fourth judicial district.

The counties of Dakota, Goodhue, Scott, Rice, Steele, Waseca, Dodge, Mower and Freeborn shall constitute the Fifth judicial district.

The counties of Le Sueur, Sibley, Nicollet, Blue Earth, Faribault, McLeod, Renville, Brown, and all other counties in the State not included within the other districts, shall constitute the Sixth judicial district.

Sec. 15. Each of the foregoing enumerated judicial districts may, at the first election, elect one prosecuting attorney for the district.

First State election. Sec. 16. Upon the second Tuesday, the thirteenth day of October, 1857, an election shall be held for members of the House of Representatives of the United States, governor, lieutenant governor, supreme and district judges, members of the legislature, and all other officers designated in this Constitution, and also for the submission of this Constitution to the people, for their adoption or rejection.

Voters at the first election. Sec. 17. Upon the day so designated as aforesaid every free white male inhabitant over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within the limits of the State for ten days previous to the day of said election, may vote for all officers to be elected under this Constitution at such election, and also for or against the adoption of this Constitution.

Vote on the constitution. Sec. 18. In voting for or against the adoption of this Constitution, the words, "For Constitution," or "Against Constitution," may be written or printed on the ticket of each voter, but no voter shall vote for or against this Constitution, on a separate ballot from that cast by him for officers to be elected at said election under this Constitution; and if upon the canvass of the vote so polled it shall appear that there was a greater number of votes polled for than against said Constitution, then this Constitution shall be deemed to be adopted as the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and all the provisions and obligations of this Constitution, and of the schedule thereunto attached, shall thereafter be valid to all intents and purposes as the Constitution of said State.

Election—how conducted. Sec. 19. At said election the polls shall be opened, the election held, returns made, and certificates issued, in all respects as provided by law for opening, closing and conducting elections and making returns of the same, except as hereinbefore specified, and excepting also that polls may be opened and elections held at any point or points in any of the counties where precincts may be established as provided by law, ten days previous to the day of election, not less than ten miles from the place of voting in any established precinct.

Returns of election. Sec. 20. It shall be the duty of the judges and clerks of election, in addition to the returns required by law for each precinct, to forward to the secretary of the Territory, by mail, immediately after the close of the election, a certified copy of the poll book containing the name of each person who has voted in the precinct and the number of votes polled for and against the adoption of this Constitution.

Canvassing returns. Sec. 21. The returns of said election for and against this Constitution, and for all state officers and members of the House of Representatives of the United States, shall be made, and certificates issued in the manner now prescribed by law for returning votes given for delegates to Congress; and the returns for all district officers, judicial, legislative or otherwise, shall be made to the register of deeds of the senior county in each district, in the manner prescribed by law, except as otherwise provided. The returns for all officers elected at large shall be canvassed by the governor of the Territory, assisted by Joseph R. Brown and Thomas J. Galbraith, at the time designated by law for canvassing the vote for delegates to Congress.

SEC. 22. If, upon canvassing the votes for and against the adoption of this Constitution, it shall appear that there has been polled a greater number of votes against than for it, then no certificate of election shall be issued for any State or district officer provided for in this Constitution, and no State organization shall have validity within the limits of the Territory, until otherwise provided for and until a Constitution for a State government shall have been adopted by the people.



CYPRIPEDIUM.—THE MOCCASIN FLOWER.

STATE FLOWER OF MINNESOTA.

MINNESOTA STATE FLOWER

The state flower is the showy pink and white moccasin flower, the largest blossom pictured in the accompanying illustration, and known as the Cypripedium Spectabile and the earlier name of Cypripedium Reginae.

The state legislature adopted a state flower or floral emblem during February, 1892, on a petition signed by Mrs. A. L. Stebbins of Rochester and other members of the Woman's Auxiliary, Board of World's Fair Managers, urging adoption of the "Wild Lady Slipper or Moccasin Flower," Cypripedium Calceolus, which was followed.

Women of the St. Anthony Study Circle, through Mrs. E. C. Chatfield of Minneapolis, announced later that the calceolus was not found in Minnesota and in February, 1902, the legislature changed the designation to the reginae.

Thus the Cypripedium Reginae became the Minnesota state flower. The name Cypripedium, from the Greek words meaning the shoe of Venus, published for this genus in 1737 by Linnaeus, and its common English and American popular names, as Lady's Slipper, Moccasin Flower and Indian Shoe, refer to the saccate and somewhat shoe-like form of the most conspicuous petal (in this Orchis family called the lip) of the flower. The plants grow preferably in cool and moist woods and in bogs, flowering from May to July. The reginae is one of six species found in Minnesota.

NOTE.—Minnesota has fourteen genera, including forty-one species, of the Orchis family, to which the Cypripediums belong. In total, 1,583 species of flowering plants, and sixty-eight ferns and their allies, making together 1,650 species, were tabulated, as known to grow without cultivation in this state, by Warren Upham in the Catalogue of the Flora of Minnesota, published in the Twelfth Annual Report of the Geological and Natural History Survey for the year 1883 (193 pages, with a map showing the areas of forest and prairie). Within the basin of the Minnesota river, according to the report in 1892 by Prof. Conway MacMillan, the state botanist, 1,174 species and varieties of flowering plants, including all our Cypripediums, are known and have been collected for the Herbarium of the State University. The State Flower is thus chosen from among more than a thousand others which bloom on our prairies, in the northern woods, in their cool bogs, and in our streams and lakes.

ACT OF ADMISSION INTO THE UNION.

An Act for the admission of Minnesota into the Union.
[Passed May 11, 1858.]

Whereas, An act of Congress was passed February twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states;" and, whereas, the people of said Territory did, on the twenty-ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by delegates elected for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and state government, which is republican in form, and was ratified and adopted by the people at an election held on the thirteenth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, for that purpose; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the State of Minnesota shall be one, and is hereby declared to be one, of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states in all respects whatever.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That said State shall be entitled to two representatives in Congress, until the next apportionment of representatives among the several states.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That from and after the admission of the State of Minnesota, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within that State as in other States of the Union; and the said State is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Iowa, shall be established; the judge, attorney and marshal of the United States of the said district of Minnesota shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney and marshal of the district of Iowa; and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the supreme court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be directed by the supreme court of the United States to the district court of the United States for the district of Minnesota, or to the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require; and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same, and to ward mesne or final process therein.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776.

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time after such dissolutions to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large, for their exercise, the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving its, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering, fundamentally, the forms of our government:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has incited domestic insurrections among us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind—enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as Free and Independent States, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

THE ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 9, 1778.

Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union between the States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

Article 1. The style of this confederacy shall be "The United States of America."

- ART. 2. Each state retains its sovereignty, freedom, and independence, and every power, jurisdiction, and right, which is not by this confederation expressly delegated to the United States in Congress assembled.
- ART. 3. The said states heréby severally enter into a firm league of friendship with each other for their common defense, the security of their liberties, and their mutual, and general welfare, binding themselves to assist each other against all force offered to or attacks made upon them, or any of them, on account of religion, sovereignty, trade, or any other pretence whatever.
- ART. 4. § 1. The better to secure and perpetuate mutual friendship and intercourse among the people of the different states in this Union, the free inhabitants of each of these states (paupers, vagabonds, and fugitives from justice excepted) shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of free citizens in the several states, and the people of each state shall have free ingress and egress to and from any other state, and shall enjoy therein all the privileges of trade and commerce, subject to the same duties, impositions and restrictions as the inhabitants thereof respectively; provided, that such restrictions shall not extend so far as to prevent the removal of property imported into any state, to any other state of which the owner is an inhabitant; provided, also, that no imposition, duties, or restriction shall be laid by any state on the property of the United States, or either of them.
- § 2. If any person guilty of, or charged with, treason, felony, or other high misdemeanor, in any state, shall flee from justice, and be found in any of the United States, he shall, upon the demand of the governor or executive power of the state from which he fled, be delivered up and removed to the state having jurisdiction of his offense.
- § 3. Full faith and credit shall be given in each of these states to the records, acts and judicial proceedings of the courts and magistrates of every other state.

- ART. 5. § 1. For the more convenient management of the general interests of the United States, delegates shall be annually appointed in such manner as the legislature of each state shall direct, to meet in congress on the first Monday in November, of every year, with a power reserved to each state to recall its delegates, or any of them, at any time within the year, and to send others in their stead, for the remainder of the year.
- § 2. No state shall be represented in congress by less than two, nor more than seven, members; and no person shall be capable of being a delegate for more than three years, in any term of six years; nor shall any person, being a delegate, be capable of holding any office under the United States, for which he, or any other for his benefit, receives any salary, fees, or emoluments of any kind.
- § 3. Each state shall maintain its own delegates in a meeting of the states, and while they act as members of the committee of these states.
- § 4. In determining questions in the United States in congress assembled, each state shall have one vote.
- § 5. Freedom of speech and debate in congress shall not be impeached or questioned in any court or place out of congress, and the members of congress shall be protected in their persons from arrests and imprisonments during the time of their going to and from, and attendance on, congress, except for treason, felony, or breach of the peace.
- ART. 6. § 1. No state, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, shall send any embassy to, or receive any embassy from, or enter into any conference, agreement, alliance or treaty with, any king, prince or state; nor shall any person holding any office of profit or trust under the United States, or any of them, accept any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever from any king, prince, or foreign state; nor shall the United States in congress assembled, or any of them, grant any title of nobility.
- § 2. No two or more states shall enter into any treaty, confederation, or alliance whatever, between them, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, specifying accurately the purposes for which the same is to be entered into, and how long it shall continue.
- § 3. No state shall lay any imposts or duties which may interfere with any stipulations in treaties entered into by the United States, in congress assembled, with any king, prince, or state, in pursuance of any treaties already proposed by congress to the courts of France and Spain.
- § 4. No vessels of war shall be kept up in time of peace by any state, except such number only as shall be deemed necessary by the United States in congress assembled, for the defense of such state, or its trade; nor shall any body or forces be kept up by any state, in time of peace, except such number only as, in the judgment of the United States in congress assembled, shall be deemed requisite to garrison the forts necessary for the defense of such state; but every state shall always keep up a well regulated and disciplined militia, sufficiently armed and accountered, and shall provide and constantly have ready for use, in public stores, a due number of field pieces and tents, and a proper quantity of arms, ammunition and camp equipage.

- § 5. No state shall engage in any war without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be actually invaded by enemies, or shall have received certain advice of a resolution being formed by some nation of Indians to invade such state, and the danger is so imminent as not to admit a delay till the United States in congress assembled can be consulted; nor shall any state grant commissions to any ships or vessels of war, nor letters of marque or reprisal, except it be after a declaration of war by the United States in congress assembled, and then only against the kingdom or state, and the subjects thereof, against which war has been so declared, and under such regulations as shall be established by the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be infested by pirates, in which case vessels of war may be fitted out for that occasion, and kept so long as the danger shall continue, or until the United States in congress assembled shall determine otherwise.
- ART. 7. When land forces are raised by any state for the common defense, all officers of or under the rank of colonel shall be appointed by the legislature of each state, respectively, by whom such forces shall be raised, or in such manner as such state shall direct, and all vacancies shall be filled up by the state which first made the appointment.
- ART. 8. All charges of war, and all other expenses that shall be incurred for the common defense or general welfare, and allowed by the United States in congress assembled, shall be defrayed out of a common treasury, which shall be supplied by the several states, in proportion to the value of all lands within each state, granted to or surveyed for any person, as such land and the buildings and improvements thereon shall be estimated, according to such mode as the United States in congress assembled shall, from time to time, direct and appoint. The taxes for paying that proportion shall be laid and levied by the authority and direction of the legislatures of the several states within the time agreed upon by the United States in congress assembled.
- ART. 9. § 1. The United States in congress assembled shall have the sole and exclusive right and power of determining on peace and war, except in the cases mentioned in the sixth article; of sending and receiving ambassadors, entering into treaties and alliances; provided, that no treaty of commerce shall be made whereby the legislative power of the respective states shall be restrained from imposing such imposts and duties on foreigners as their own people are subjected to, or from prohibiting the exportation or importation of any species of goods or commodities whatsoever; of establishing rules for deciding in all cases what captures on land or water shall be legal, and in what manner prizes taken by land or naval forces in the service of the United States shall be divided or appropriated; of granting letters of marque and reprisal in times of peace; appointing courts for the trial of piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and establishing courts for receiving and determining finally appeals in all cases of captures; provided, that no member of congress shall be appointed a judge of any of the said courts.
- § 2. The United States in congress assembled shall also be the last resort on appeal in all disputes and differences now subsisting, or that may hereafter arise, between two or more states concerning boundary, jurisdiction, or any

other cause whatever; which authority shall always be exercised in the manner following: Whenever the legislative or executive authority or lawful agent of any state in controversy with another shall present a petition to congress, stating the matter in question, and praying for a hearing, notice thereof shall be given by order of congress to the legislative or executive authority of the other state in controversy, and a day assigned for the appearance of the parties by their lawful agents, who shall then be directed to appoint, by joint consent, commissioners or judges to constitute a court for hearing and determining the matter in question; but if they cannot agree, congress shall name three persons out of each of the United States, and from the list of such persons each party shall alternately strike out one, the petitioners beginning, until the number shall be reduced to thirteen; and from that number not less than seven nor more than nine names, as congress shall direct, shall, in the presence of congress, be drawn out by lot; the persons whose names shall be so drawn, or any five of them, shall be commissioners or judges to hear and finally determine the controversy, so always as a major part of the judges who shall hear the cause shall agree in the determination; and if either party shall neglect to attend at the day appointed, without showing reasons which congress shall judge sufficient, or being present shall refuse to strike, the congress shall proceed to nominate three persons out of each state, and the secretary of congress shall strike in behalf of such party absent or refusing; and the judgment and sentence of the court, to be appointed in the manner before prescribed, shall be final and conclusive; and if any of the parties shall refuse to submit to the authority of such court, or to appear to defend their claim or cause, the court shall nevertheless proceed to pronounce sentence or judgment, which shall in like manner be final and decisive; the judgment or sentence and other proceedings being in either case transmitted to congress and lodged among the acts of congress, for the security of the parties concerned; provided, that every commissioner, before he sits in judgment, shall take an oath, to be administered by one of the judges of the supreme or superior court of the state where the cause shall be tried, "well and truly to hear and determine the matter in question, according to the best of his judgment, without favor, affection, or hope of reward;" provided, also, that no state shall be deprived of territory for the benefit of the United States.

- § 3. All controversies concerning the private right of soil claimed under different grants of two or more states, whose jurisdiction, as they may respect such lands, and the states which passed such grants are adjusted, the said grants or either of them being at the same time claimed to have originated antecedent to such settlement of jurisdiction, shall, on the petition of either party to the congress of the United States, be finally determined, as near as may be, in the same manner as is before prescribed for deciding disputes respecting territorial jurisdiction between different states.
- § 4. The United States in congress assembled shall also have the sole and exclusive right and power of regulating the alloy and value of coin struck by their own authority, or by that of the respective states; fixing the standards of weights and measures, throughout the United States; regulating the trade and managing all affairs with the Indians, not members of any of the states;

provided, that the legislative right of any state, within its own limits, be not infringed or violated; establishing and regulating postoffices from one state to another, throughout all the United States, and exacting such postage on the papers passing through the same as may be requisite to defray the expenses of the said office; appointing all officers of the land forces in the service of the United States, excepting regimental officers; appointing all the officers of the naval forces, and commissioning all officers whatever in the service of the United States; making rules for the government and regulation of the said land and naval forces, and directing their operations.

- § 5. The United States in congress assembled shall have authority to appoint a committee, to sit in the recess of congress, to be denominated "A Committee of the States," and to consist of one delegate from each state; and to appoint such other committees and civil officers as may be necessary for managing the general affairs of the United States under their direction; to appoint one of their number to preside; provided, that no person be allowed to serve in the office of president more than one year in any term of three years; to ascertain the necessary sums of money to be raised for the service of the United States, and to appropriate and apply the same for defraying the public expenses; to borrow money or emit bills on the credit of the United States, transmitting every half year to the respective states an account of the sums of money so borrowed or emitted; to build and equip a navy; to agree upon the number of land forces, and to make requisitions from each state for its quota, in proportion to the number of white inhabitants in such state, which requisition shall be binding; and thereupon the legislature of each state shall appoint the regimental officers. raise the men, and clothe, arm and equip them, in a soldier-like manner, at the expense of the United States; and the officers and men so clothed, armed and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled; but if the United States in congress assembled shall, on consideration of circumstances, judge proper that any state should not raise men, or should raise a smaller number than its quota, and that any other state should raise a greater number of men than the quota thereof. such extra number shall be raised, officered, clothed, armed and equipped in the same manner as the quota of such state, unless the legislature of such state shall judge that such extra number cannot be safely spared out of the same, in which case they shall raise, officer, clothe, arm and equip as many of such extra number as they judge can be safely spared, and the officers and men so clothed, armed, and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled.
- § 6. The United States in congress assembled shall never engage in a war, nor grant letters of marque and reprisal in time of peace, nor enter into any treaties or alliances, nor coin money, nor regulate the value thereof, nor ascertain the sums and expenses necessary for the defense and welfare of the United States, or any of them, nor emit bills, nor borrow money on the credit of the United States, nor appropriate money, nor agree upon the number of vessels of war to be built or purchased, or the number of land or sea forces to be raised, nor appoint a commander-in-chief of the army or navy, unless nine states

assent to the same; nor shall a question on any other point, except for adjourning from day to day, be determined, unless by the votes of a majority of the United States in congress assembled.

- § 7. The congress of the United States shall have power to adjourn to any time within the year, and to any place within the United States, so that no period of adjournment be for a longer duration than the space of six months, and shall publish the journal of their proceedings monthly, except such parts thereof relating to treaties, alliances, or military operations as in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the delegates of each state, on any question, shall be entered on the journal, when it is desired by any delegate; and the delegates of a state, or any of them, at his or their request, shall be furnished with a transcript of the said journal, except such parts as are above excepted, to lay before the legislatures of the several states.
- ART. 10. The committee of the states, or any nine of them, shall be authorized to execute, in the recess of congress, such of the powers of congress as the United States in congress assembled, by the consent of nine states, shall, from time to time, think expedient to vest them with; provided, that no power be delegated to the said committee, for the exercise of which, by the articles of confederation, the voice of nine states, in the congress of the United States assembled, is requisite.
- ART. 11. Canada acceding to this confederation, and joining in the measures of the United States, shall be admitted into and entitled to all the advantages of this Union; but no other colony shall be admitted into the same, unless such admission be agreed to by nine states.
- ART. 12. All bills of credit emitted, moneys borrowed, and debts contracted by or under the authority of congress, before the assembling of the United States, in pursuance of the present confederation, shall be deemed and considered as a charge against the United States, for payment and satisfaction whereof the said United States and the public faith are hereby solemnly pledged.
- ART. 13. Every state shall abide by the determination of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by this confederation are submitted to them. And the articles of this confederation shall be inviolably observed by every state, and the Union shall be perpetual; nor shall any alteration at any time hereafter be made in any of them, unless such alteration be agreed to in a congress of the United States, and be afterward confirmed by the legislature of every state.

And whereas, it has pleased the great Governor of the world to incline the hearts of the legislatures we respectively represent in congress to approve of and to authorize us to ratify the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, Know ye, that we, the undersigned delegates, by virtue of the power and authority to us given for that purpose, do by these presents, in the name and in behalf of our respective constituents, fully and entirely ratify and confirm each and every of the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, and all and singular the matters and things therein contained. And we do further solemnly plight and engage the faith of our respective constituents, that

they shall abide by the determinations of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by the said confederation are submitted to them; and that the articles thereof shall be inviolably observed by the states we respectively represent, and that the Union shall be perpetual. It witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands in congress.

Done at Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, the ninth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, and in the third year of the Independence of America.

Preamble. We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives.

SEC. 2. The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states, and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every 30,000, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose 3; Massachusetts, 8; Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, 1; Connecticut, 5; New York, 6; New Jersey, 4; Pennsylvania, 8; Delaware, 1; Maryland, 6; Virginia, 10; North Carolina, 5; South Carolina, 5. Georgia, 3.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

*Sec. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications rquisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second

year. *When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

The vice president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their own officers, and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments.

When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law.

SEC. 4. The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meetings shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall, by law, appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and qualifitions of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same; excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law and paid out of the treasury of the United

States. They shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No senator or representatives shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States which shall have been created or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

· Sec. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return; in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representative, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The Congress shall have power:

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish postoffices and post roads;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times, to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses, against the laws of nations;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

To provide and maintain a navy;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States; and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards, and other needful buildings; and

To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight; but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or ex post facto law, shall be passed.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. No preference shall be given, by any regulation of commerce or revenue, to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States, and no person holding any office of profit and trust under them shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts laid by any state on imports or exports shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the Congress.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice president, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the Congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates; and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be appointed, if such a number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice president.]*

The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president; and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur, and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The president shall have power to fill all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

- SEC. 3. He shall, from time to time, give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.
- SEC. 4. The president, vice president, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

- Section 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.
- SEC. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state or the citizens thereof and foreign states, citizens or subjects.*

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Congress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury, and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attained.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labor in one state under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States, and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in the Union a republican form of government; and shall protect each of them against invasion, and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which in either case shall be valid, to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; provided, that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution, but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

ARTICLES

In addition to, and amendment of, the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress and ratified by the Legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original Constitution.

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war and public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court in the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states, respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice president, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballot the person voted for as vice president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president and of all persons voted for as vice president, and of the number of votes for each; which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president; if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceedingthree on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states; and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of votes as vice president shall be the vice president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then, from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

- Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.
- SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice president of the United States, representatives in Congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.
- SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in Congress or elector of president and vice president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each house remove such disability.
- Sec. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim

for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any state, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

ARTICLE XVII.

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

ARTICLE XVIII.

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The Congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIX.

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Note.—The Constitution was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, by the unanimous consent of the states present in the convention appointed in pursuance of the resolution of the Congress of the confederation, of the twenty-first of February, 1787, and was ratified by the conventions of the several states, as follows, viz: By convention of Delaware, Dec. 7, 1787; Pennsylvania,

Dec. 12, 1787; New Jersey, Dec. 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2, 1788; Connecticut, Jan. 9, 1788; Massachusetts, Feb. 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New HampsHire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788; New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789; Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

The first ten of the amendments were proposed at the first session of the First Congress of the United States, Sept. 25, 1789; and were finally ratified by the constitutional number of states Dec. 15, 1791. The eleventh amendment was proposed at the first session of the Third Congress, March 5, 1794, and was declared in a message from the president of the United States to both houses of Congress, dated Jan. 8, 1798, to have been adopted by the constitutional number of states. The twelfth amendment was proposed at the first session of the Eighth Congress, Dec. 12, 1803, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1804, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Sept. 25, 1804.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed at the second session of the Thirty-eighth Congress, Feb. 1, 1865, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1865,

according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Dec. 18, 1865.

The fourteenth amendment took effect July 28, 1868. The fifteenth amendment took effect March 30, 1870.

The sixteenth amendment took effect February 25, 1913.

The seventeenth amendment took effect May 31, 1913.

The eighteenth amendment took effect January 29, 1920.

The nineteenth amendment took effect August 27, 1920.



SPECIAL SESSION OF 1919

An extra session was called to ratify the proposed Woman Suffrage Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, to enact legislation for the benefit of the returning soldiers of the World War, to create a State Relief board, to amend election laws, to establish a better state budget system and to pass laws to curb profiteering and reduce the high cost of living. The extra session convened September 8, 1919, and adjourned September 19, 1919. The officers and members were the same as at the regular session of 1919.



PERMANENT RULES OF SENATE 1925

(CORRECTED TO JANUARY 27, 1925.)

CALLING THE SENATE TO ORDER.

1. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the Senate shall have adjourned, and shall immediately call the members to order, and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall proceed with the regular order of business.

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

2. He shall preserve order and decorum; may speak on points of order in preference to members, and shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. He shall also decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Senate by any member, but such appeal shall be decided by a majority vote of those present and voting thereon.

QUESTIONS-HOW STATED AND DECIDED.

- 3. He shall rise to put the question, but may state it sitting.
- 4. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say Aye," and after the affirmative voice is expressed. "As many as are of the contrary opinion say No." The president shall declare all votes, but if any member rise to doubt a vote, he shall order a division.

PRESIDENT PRO TEM.

5. The president shall call some member into the chair when the Senate goes into committee of the whole. He shall also have the right to name a member to perform the duties of the chair; but substitution shall not extend beyond adjournment. In the absence of the president, except as above, the Senate shall appoint a president pro tem.

FURTHER DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

- 6. The president of the Senate shall sign all acts, memorials, addresses and resolutions; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the Senate shall be signed by him and attested by the secretary.
- 7. The president is authorized to administer all oaths required in the discharge of his duties.

DISTURBANCE IN LOBBY.

In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobbies or galleries, the president or chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall have power to order the same cleared.

PRIVILEGES OF REPORTERS.

9. Reporters wishing to take down the debates may be admitted by the president, who shall assign them to such places on the floor or elsewhere to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate. But any reporter or any newspaper who shall purposely misrepresent, or misreport the proceedings of the Senate, shall, during the remainder of the session, be denied admission to the Senate chamber.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 10. The order of business shall be as follows: First—Petitions, letters, remonstrances. Second—Executive and official communications. Third—Introduction and first reading of Senate bills. Fourth—Messages from the House of Representatives. Fifth—First reading of House bills. Sixth—Reports of committees.
 - (a) From standing committees.
 - (b) From select committees.
 Seventh—Second reading of Senate bills.
 Eighth—Second reading of House bills.
 Ninth—Motions and resolutions.
 Tenth—Third reading of Senate bills.
 Eleventh—Third reading of House bills.
 Twelfth—General orders of the day.

REFERRING OF BILLS.

11. All bills shall be referred by the president of the Senate without motion to the proper standing committee, on the first reading, unless otherwise referred by the Senate; and all bills providing for an appropriation of money or obligating the state to pay or expend money, when referred to and reported by any other than the Committee on Finance, shall, before passage, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

ORDER IN DEBATE. .

- 12. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Senate, he shall rise to his feet, and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid personality. In discussing any resolution, senators shall be limited to five minutes each.
- 13. When any member is called to order he shall sit down until it is determined whether he is in order or not, and if a member is called to order for words spoken in debate, the words excepted to shall be taken down in writing immediately.
- 14. When two or more members shall happen to rise at once, the president shall name the member who is to speak.
- 15. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question on the same day without leave of the Senate.

CONDUCT DURING BUSINESS.

- 16. When the president is putting any question, or addressing the Senate no one shall walk out of, or across, the room; nor when a member is speaking shall any one pass between the member speaking and the chair. No member, or other person, shall proceed to or remain by the secretary's desk while the ayes and noes are being called or counted.
- 17. Upon a division and count of the Senate on any question no member without the Senate chamber shall be counted.

SENATORS TO VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED.

18. Every member who shall be in the Senate when the question is put shall give his vote unless the Senate for special reasons shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the Senate divides or before he gives his vote upon a call of the ayes and noes. Any member wishing to be excused from voting may make a brief statement of the reasons for making such request, and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

MOTIONS.

- 19. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the president; or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the secretary and read aloud for debate.
- 20. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing if the president or any member desires it. In such case it must be signed by the member or committee offering it.
- 21. After a motion is stated by the president or read by the secretary, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Senate, but may be withdrawn by the author at any time before decision or amendment.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

22. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, but

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

For the previous question.

Which three motions shall be decided without debate.

To commit.

To postpone to a day certain.

To amend, or

To postpone indefinitely.

These and several motions have precedence in the foregoing order; but a motion for the previous question having been seconded, or the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

A motion to postpone to a certain day, to commit, to postpone indefinitely, or to amend, being decided, shall not again be allowed on the same day, nor at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

MOTION TO ADJOURN.

23. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and also a motion to adjourn to a time certain. The latter motion is debatable. When either motion is refused it shall not be renewed until further business shall be transacted.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

- 24. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon all pending amendments in their order and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the Senate shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered such motion, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.
- 25. On a previous question there shall be no debate. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

RECONSIDERATION.

26. When a motion or question has been once put and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for reconsideration thereof, on the same day on which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the Senate thereafter; and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn. A motion for reconsideration being put and lost, shall not be renewed.

DIVISION OF QUESTION.

27. Any member may call for a division of the question, when the same will admit of it. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed to be indivisible. A motion to strike out being lost shall not preclude an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

PETITIONS AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS.

28. In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance or other communication addressed to the Senate, the members shall only state the general purport of it.

29. Every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee, shall be indorsed with its appropriate title, and immediately under the indorsement the name of the member presenting the same shall be written.

CALL OF THE SENATE.

- 30. Any member may make a call of the Senate, and require absent members to be sent for, but a call of the Senate cannot be made after the voting has commenced; and the call of the Senate being ordered and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed, and no member permitted to leave the room until further proceedings under the call be dispensed with by a majority vote of all the members of the Senate and the matter or question, if any, under consideration at the time of the call be disposed of, or the Senate adjourns.
- 31. The standing committees of the Senate shall be as follows, composed of the number of members set opposite the name of each committee:

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

- 32. The rules observed in the Senate shall govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings of the Committee of the Whole, except that a member may speak more than twice on the same subject, and that a call for the ayes and noes, or for the previous question cannot be made.
- 33. Amendments made in the Committee of the Whole shall be entered on a separate piece of paper, and so reported to the Senate by the chairman standing in

his place, which amendment shall not be read by the president unless required by one or more of the members. On adoption of the report by the Committee of the Whole, all bills recommended to pass, shall be placed upon the calendar.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

34. Bills, memorials and joint resolutions may be introduced by any member in his place, or by order of the Senate on a report of a committee. Each member so introducing such bill, memorial or joint resolution shall, at the time of such introduction thereof, furnish to the Secretary of the Senate two copies thereof, which shall be endorsed "copies."

Every bill, memorial or joint resolution shall have prefixed thereto the name of the person introducing it, and when reported from a committee, the name of said committee shall be endorsed thereon. Every proposed amendment to any bill, memorial or joint resolution, and every committee report, shall be in triplicate form, and shall be written on only one side of the paper.

If the bill before an amendment of a present statute, it shall contain the full text of the chapter or section or sub-division to be amended. Then in the proper place shall be inserted the words and characters constituting the new amending matter which shall be underscored, and when printed put in italics. The words and characters to be eliminated by the amendment shall be stricken out by a line drawn through the eliminated matter, and when the bill is printed such eliminated matter shall be capitalized and inclosed in brackets, and no bill not so framed shall be received or read by the secretary, unless otherwise especially ordered by the Senate.

READING OF BILLS.

35. Every bill, memorial, order, resolution or vote requiring the approval of the governor shall receive three several readings previous to its passage; the first and third readings shall be at length; and no such bill, memorial, order or resolution shall be read twice on the same day.

COMMITMENT.

36. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it has been once read at length. If objections are made to a bill on its first reading the question shall be: "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no objection be made or the question to reject be lost, the bill shall go on its second reading.

ALL BILLS TO GO TO COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

37. All bills, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in Committee of the Whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the Senate.

PRINTING OF BILLS.

38. All bills of general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands, shall be printed; provided, that no bills shall be printed until the same shall have been reported upon favorably by the committee to whom the same shall be referred.

FINAL PASSAGE.

39. The final question upon a bill or other paper requiring action by both houses after the first and second reading thereof, and after the consideration in Committee of the Whole, shall be upon its final passage.

AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING.

- 40. No amendment shall be received on third reading except to fill blanks without the unanimous consent of the Senate. In filling blanks, the largest sum, the longest time and greatest distance shall be first taken.
- 41. A bill or resolution may be committed at any time, prior to its passage, and if any amendment be reported on such commitment to any other than a Committee of the Whole, it shall be again read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and the question for third reading and passage again put.

ENGROSSMENT.

42. Every bill, memorial, order or resolution originating in the Senate shall be carefully engrossed in typewriting before being transmitted to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

TRANSMITTING OF BILLS TO THE HOUSE.

43. Immediately after the passage of any bill or other paper to which the concurrence of the House of Representatives is to be asked it shall be the duty of the secretary to transmit the same to the House, unless some member of the Senate shall make a motion to reconsider the vote by which the Senate passed the said bill or other paper; in which case the secretary shall not transmit said bill or other paper until a motion to reconsider has been put; and on the concurrence of any bill or other paper of the House of Representatives by the Senate, or on the concurrence or disagreement in any vote of the House it shall also be the duty of the Senate to notify the House thereof.

MEMORIALS TO THE UNITED STATES OR ANY STATE OR FOREIGN GOVERNMENT.

44. Memorials or petitions to the president or Congress of the United States, or any branch or member thereof, or any department or officer of the United States, or any state or foreign government, including all motions, resolutions, joint or concurrent resolutions in relation thereto, shall follow the same course of procedure as bills before being adopted.

ANY SENATOR MAY DEMAND AYES AND NOES.

45. It shall be competent for any member, when a question is being taken to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be entered on the journal. A call for the ayes and noes cannot be interrupted in any manner whatever.

COMMITTEE NOT TO BE ABSENT.

46. Committees shall not absent themselves from the Senate, by reason of their appointment, without special permission for that purpose be first obtained.

ENROLLMENT.

47. All bills shall be carefully enrolled in typewriting under the supervision of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expenses. Said committee may report to the Senate at any time on the enrollment of bills.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

48. The secretary shall keep a correct journal of the proceedings of the Senate, and shall perform such other duties as shall be assigned to him as such secretary. He shall permit no journal records, accounts or papers to be taken from the table or out of his custody, other than in the regular mode of business. If any paper in his charge shall be missing, he shall report the fact to the president, that inquiry may be made. He shall superintendent the recording of proceedings in the journal, the engrossing, transcribing and copying of the bills and resolutions, and generally perform the duties of secretary, under direction of the president. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the books to be called "Minute Books," in which he shall enter under the appropriate marginal numbers, all Senate and House bills, and correct notes, with the dates thereof, of the state, condition and progress of each bill pending, until its final passage.

CERTIFICATE FOR MONEY.

49. No certificate authorizing the payment of any money appropriated by the Legislature shall be issued by the secretary, by virtue of any motion or resolution, unless such a motion or resolution shall be voted for by a majority of all members of the Senate. All motions or resolutions authorizing the issuing of certificates by the secretary for the payment of money shall be upon a call of the aves and noes.

JOURNAL OF EXECUTIVE SESSION.

50. The proceedings of the Senate on executive business shall be kept in a separate book of record to be provided by the Secretary of the Senate, and published with the proceedings of the Senate, unless the public good requires secrecy, which shall be determined by a vote of the Senate.

JEFFERSON'S MANUAL.

51. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual shall govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and orders of the Senate, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

HOURS OF MEETING.

52. The standing hour of the daily meeting of the Senate shall be 10 o'clock in the morning, unless the Senate direct otherwise.

ABSENCE OF SENATORS.

53. No Senator or officer of the Senate shall absent himself from any session of the Senate without having first obtained leave of absence.

PERSONS PRIVILEGED TO THE FLOOR OF THE SENATE.

54. No person shall be admitted within the Senate chamber, but the executive or ex-Governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the House, heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme and District Courts and members of Congress, and when personally introduced by members of the Senate, those who have been members of Congress or of the State Legislature or other visitors who are not interested in any claim or directly in any bill pending before the Legislature.

No lobbyist shall be permitted on the floor of the Senate or in the retiring room or corridors during the session of the Senate. The Sergeant-at-Arms is charged with the duty of strict enforcement of this rule.

AMENDMENTS. RULES AND SUSPENSION OF RULES.

55. Every proposition to amend any rule of the Senate shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense, and shall not be acted upon until the report of such committee is received by the Senate; nor shall any rule be suspended except by at least two-thirds vote of the full Senate; provided that a motion to suspend the rules for the purpose of advancing a bill shall be made only under the order of business "Motions and Resolutions."

AMENDMENTS TO BILLS.

56. In drawing any amendment to any bill or resolution reference shall be made therein, first to the number of the bill, then to the section, and then to the line or lines from which matter is to be stricken or in which new matter is to be inserted.

NOTICE TO DEBATE.

57. Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution the same shall lie over one day without debate or other action.

EXECUTIVE SESSION.

58. When in executive session, the Senate may, in all cases, sit with closed doors, and the Senate chamber may be cleared of all persons except the officers and members of the Senate.

NO SMOKING.

59. No senator or officer of the Senate, or other person shall be permitted to smoke in the Senate chamber.

SECRETARY MAY CORRECT ERRORS.

60. The Secretary and Engrossing Clerk, in all proper cases, shall correct all mistakes in numbering the sections and reference thereto, whether such errors occur in the original bill or are caused by amendments thereto.

DUTIES OF THE SERGEANT, AT-ARMS.

61. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to execute all orders of the president of the Senate, and to perform all duties they may assign to him connected with the police and good order of the Senate chamber; to exercise a supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the chamber; to see that messages, etc., are promptly executed; that the hall is properly ventilated and the temperature thereof properly regulated, and open for the use of members of the Senate at the time fixed; and to perform all other services pertaining to his office.

REPORT ON AMENDED BILLS.

62. No committee nor any member thereof shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject, or is intended to accomplish a different purpose than that of the original bill for which it is reported, or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the Senate is advised that the same is in violation of this rule.

GÈNERAL ORDERS.

63. The Secretary shall make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other proceedings of the Senate, which are referred to the Committee of the Whole, and which are not made the order of the day, for any particular day, and to number the same, which lists shall be called the "General Orders of the Day," and they shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee.

Such general orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the rules or orders of the Senate, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the same shall be considered in Committee of the Whole.

CALENDAR.

64. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to make a list of all bills, resolutions and other matters coming before the Senate for final action and place the same upon the calendar in the order in which they may have been acted upon in Committee of the Whole, and such calendar shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the matters included therein shall, be considered.

ADDITIONAL EMPLOYES—GRATUITIES.

65. All propositions for the appointment of employes of the Senate or for expenditures on account of the legislature, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules, without debate, and no appointment shall be made or expense incurred unless reported favorably by said committee, or unless its report be overruled by a three-fourths (%) vote of the whole Senate.

Said committee shall report to the Senate the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each employe whose appointment is recommended by it. All propositions for extra compensation or gratuity shall be referred to said committee, and no extra compensation or gratuity shall be paid to any officer, employe or other person unless reported upon favorably by said committee or unless its report be reversed by a three-fourths (%) vote of the whole Senate.

SPECIAL ORDER.

66. On two days' notice it shall require a two-thirds vote of the whole Senate to designate a special order and when a time has been designated by the Senate, whether by adoption of a report of a committee or otherwise, for a particular or special order, the Senate shall at such time proceed to the consideration of such order, and shall at such time so designated, after considering the bill, resolution, or measure included therein, unless the same shall be then otherwise disposed of, or the special order postponed to a day certain, immediately proceed to the third reading and final passage of the same and during the consideration of such special order Rule No. Fifteen (15) shall be suspended, and the debate thereon and all proceedings thereunder, including amendments and substitutions, shall be, as nearly as applicable, that of the Committee of the Whole, except that it shall be competent for any member when a question is being taken, to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be entered on the journal.

JOURNAL-HOW APPROVED.

67. The Journal of each day's proceedings shall be open for correction at any time during the session of the succeeding day, and unless corrected on that day, shall stand approved.

PRESIDENT'S AUTHORITY OVER EMPLOYES.

68. The President of the Senate shall have full and exclusive authority over, and charge of all the employes, officers and clerks of the Senate both elective and appointive. He shall have the sole and exclusive power and authority to assign them to such duties, other than for which they were elected or appointed, as he shall see fit. He shall have power to appoint such of said employes, officers or clerks as he shall deem proper to exercise the powers to him granted by this rule. He may make such rules and regulations for the government of the employes, officers and clerks as he shall see fit and proper. In case of violation of any of the orders of the President of the Senate by any employe, officer or clerk, or in case of any violation of any such rule or regulation made by him by any such employe, officer or clerk, or in case of any misconduct or omission of any such employe, officer or clerk, the president shall refer such complaint to the Committee on Rules, which shall have the final power to hear such complaint and to discharge any such employe, officer or clerk, or to impose such other punishment by way of fine or otherwise upon such employe, officer or clerk, as to the said committee may seem just and proper.

AMENDMENTS TO TITLE.

69. The title to any bill may be amended at any time during its pendency in the Senate.

WHEN COMMITTEE MUST REPORT.

70. Every bill referred to a standing committee shall be reported therefrom within twenty-five (25) days after its reference to such committee except all bills referred to the Finance Committee.

A majority of the Senate may at any time recall a bill from any committee or take a bill from the table and place such bill on General Orders.

SENATE EMPLOYES TO ENROLL AND ENGROSS BILLS.

71. All enrolling and engrossing of bills shall be done by enrolling and engrossing clerks and stenographers regularly in the employ of the Senate and shall not be paid for per folio.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

72. Except as provided in Rule 44 joint resolutions not requiring the signature of the Governor need not take the regular course of bills and memorials, but may be acted upon in the same manner as resolutions.

PURCHASING SUPPLIES.

73. The Secretary of the Senate shall be the agent of the Senate for the purchase of supplies. Before making any purchases, however, it shall be his duty to submit to the Rules Committee a list of necessary supplies, together with the prices for which the same can be secured, which supplies shall then be purchased only upon the approval of the Rules Committee.

REPORT OF VOTE IN COMMITTEE.

74. Upon the request of any member of any standing committee of the Senate, or upon the request of the author of any bill, a record shall be made of the vote on such bill in any committee, including the vote of any amendment or proposed amendments thereto in the committee to which the bill was referred, and such vote of the members of such committee shall accompany the report of the committee on the bill and shall be printed in the journal as a part of the report of the committee.

QUORUM IN COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY.

75. Ten (10) members shall constitute a quorum of the Committee on Judiciary.

PERMANENT RULES OF THE HOUSE 1925

(CORRECTED TO JANUARY 27, 1925.)

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE.

1. Meeting, Roll Call, Etc.

The Speaker shall take the chair at the hour at which the House stands adjourned. The House shall then be called to order, and after prayer by the Chaplain, a roll of members shall be called and the names of the members present and those excused shall be entered on the Journal of the House. Unless otherwise ordered by the House, regular sessions thereof shall convene at two o'clock p. m.

2. Reading of the Journal.

Upon the appearance of a quorum, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Chief Clerk, unless otherwise ordered, and any errors therein may be corrected by the House.

Order of Business.

After the reading of the Journal, the order of business of the day shall be as follows:

- 1. Presentation of Petitions or other communications.
- Reports of Standing Committees. 3. Second reading of House Bills.
- Second reading of Senate Bills.
- 5. Reports of Select Committee.
- 6. Introduction of Bills.
- 7. Motions and resolutions.
- 8. Consideration of messages from the Senate.
- 9. First reading of Senate Bills.
- 10. Calendar for the day.
- 11. General Orders.

4a. Bills-How Introduced.

A member or committee desiring to introduce a bill shall place the same in the hands of the Speaker before the opening of the session.

All memorials and joint resolutions shall be presented, received and considered in the same manner as bills; shall be bound in the regular House file binder, and take the same course as a bill.

No bill shall be introduced after the sixtieth (60th) legislative day of the session except its reception be authorized by two-thirds (2-3) vote of the House. This vote shall not apply to committee bills or bills introduced by request of the governor under the constitutional provision as provided for in Article 4, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota.

Any standing or special committee of the House may introduce a bill as a committee bill which shall be read the first time, laid over for one day, when it shall be read for the second time and placed upon General Orders.

Every bill and resolution shall be introduced in triplicate and shall have prefixed thereto the name of the member, members or committee introducing it.

4b. Bills—How Drafted.

The title of every bill must give its single subject and briefly state its purpose as far as practicable.

If the bill be for an amendment of a present statute, it shall contain the full text of the chapter or section or sub-division to be amended. Then in the proper place, shall be inserted the words and characters constituting the new amending matter which shall be underscored, and when printed put in italics. The words and characters to be eliminated by the amendment shall be stricken out by a line drawn through the eliminated matter, and when the bill is printed such eliminated matter shall be capitalized and inclosed in brackets. The chairman of each committee to which such bill is referred shall see that the bill conforms to this rule before it is favorably reported to the House.

Bills should refer to session laws and statutes as follows:

"Laws 1913" (or other years after 1891).

"General Laws 1891" (or other years).

"Special Laws 1891" (or prior years).

"General Statutes 1913" (Sec. 9421).

"Revised Laws 1905" (Sec. 5504).

All numbers in the titles should be expressed in figures. All numbers of sections or chapters of laws shall be in figures. In the body of the bill numbers in excess of 10 should be in figures except for a special reason they may be written, but when written they should not be followed by numbers in parentheses.

A copy of this rule shall be furnished the stenographers or others copying bills, and they are specifically enjoined to observe the same.

• The author of a bill may attach thereto a memorandum of information headed "memorandum," which shall constitute no part of the bill, and shall not be printed in connection with the bill unless otherwise ordered by a vote of the House.

5. First Reading and Reference of Bills.

All bills, memorials and joint resolutions shall be read at length upon their introduction, unless objected to. If objection is made to the introduction of a bill, the question shall be:

"Shall the bill be rejected?"

A majority vote of the whole House shall be required for rejection. If no objection be made, or if the question to reject be lost, the bill shall after reading be referred by the Speaker to its appropriate standing committee, except when introduced by such committee. Every bill introduced, except when introduced by a committee as above provided, containing an amendment to an existing law of the state, shall first be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee of the House appointed with reference to the subject matter contained in the law proposed to be amended.

After a reference of a bill by the Speaker, a majority vote of the whole House shall be required for a re-reference or re-commital thereof by the House.

All bills whether emanating from the House or the Senate carrying an appropriation shall be referred to the Committee on Appropriations for action by the committee before the second reading of the bill, and the fact that the bill carries an appropriation shall be noted by the committee in its report returning the same.

6. Records and Reports of Committees.

The Chairman, or Acting Chairman, of each committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record on which shall be entered:

- (a) The time and place of each hearing and of each meeting of the committee.
 - (b) The attendance of committee members at each meeting.
- (c) The name of each person, except members of the House and Senate, appearing before the committee, with the name of the person or persons, association, firm or corporation in whose behalf the appearance is made.
- (d) Any member of any committee may demand a roll call on any bill, resolution, or amendment before the committee and upon such demand being made and not otherwise the roll call shall be called on such bill, resolution or amendment, and a record of the vote of each member thereon made and kept; and the name of the member making such demands shall also be recorded.

Such record shall be approved at the next regular meeting of the committee.

Such record shall be filed with the Chief Clerk during the session of the Legislature and at the expiration thereof shall be filed with the Secretary of State; and such records shall be open to the public inspection at all times.

The chairman of a committee reporting the action taken by his committee upon bills submitted to it shall do so upon the form provided for such reports, stating the date of the meeting when such action was taken, and shall authenticate the same by his signature. Any number of bills may be embodied in one report; but at the request of any member the report may be divided by excepting any bill therefrom and if this be done the bill so excepted may be acted upon independently from the report as a whole.

The report of any committee, or any part thereof, may be laid upon the table for a day and printed in the Journal, if so ordered by the House.

In the event of a minority report, the majority and minority reports shall be made separately from the regular committee reports.

7. Quorum of Committees.

A majority of the members of any standing or special committee shall constitute a quorum. This rule shall not apply to the Committee on Judiciary, where 9 members shall constitute a quorum.

8. Second Reading of Bills.

All bills, concurrence reports, mémorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the governor, shall, after a second reading, be considered in a Committee of the Whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the House. Unless otherwise ordered bills, resolutions authorizing the expenditure of money, and joint memorials to Congress only, shall require a second and third reading.

9. Third Reading of Bills.

No amendment shall be received on the third reading except to fill blanks or amend titles, without the unanimous consent of the House; and all bills and resolutions may, at any time previous to their passage, be committed or re-committed only by majority vote of the whole House. If any amendment be reported upon such commitment or re-commitment by any other than a Committee of the Whole, it shall be read a second time, considered in the Committee of the Whole and the question for a third reading and passage again put.

10. Disposition of Senate Bills.

When a Senate file has been received by the House, with a message announcing that the same has passed the Senate, such bill shall be referred to the appropriate standing committee; provided, however, that when a Senate file is received the provisions of which are stated by a member to be identical with those of a House file, which has already been considered by one of the Committees of the House and is on General Orders or the Calendar, such Senate file shall be referred to the Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment, for comparison, which committee shall report forthwith whether the said Senate file is identical with the House file. And, if reported identical, such Senate file may, by a majority vote, be substituted for the House file (the latter in such case being considered withdrawn) and shall take the place of the House file; provided, however, that the fact that the bills are identical shall be entered on the Journal.

11. Committee of the Whole.

When the House has arrived at the General Orders of the Day, they shall go into a Committee of the Whole upon General Orders. And unless a particular bill is ordered up, the Committee of the Whole shall consider, act upon or pass the General Orders according to order of their reference.

In forming a Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall appoint a chairman to preside.

Bills committed to the Committee of the Whole House shall, in the Committee of the Whole thereon, be first read through, unless the Committee shall otherwise order, and then read and debated by sections, leaving the title to be last considered. All amendments shall be in writing, in duplicate, and reported to the House by the chairman.

12. Rules of the House to Apply to Committee of the Whole.

The Rules of the House shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as may be applicable, except that the yeas and nays shall not be called, the previous question forced, and speaking limited.

A motion that the committee arise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

13. General Order of the Day.

The Speaker shall cause the Chief Clerk to make out a list of all bills, resolutions and reports of committees, and which are not made a Special Order, and to number the same. This list shall be called "General Orders of the Day;" and items listed thereon shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the Committee. General Orders, to gether with all bills included therein required to be printed under the Rules or Orders of the House, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least two days before the same are to be considered in the Committee of the Whole.

Each member of the House shall leave on or under the desk, each time the House adjourns for the day, his file binder for bills. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the House to have placed in each binder one copy of each bill to be printed under the Rules or Orders of the House at least forty-eight hours before the same shall be considered in the Committee of the Whole, and under the first Order of Business each day, said Clerk shall report to the House what bills he has placed in the binders.

If progress is reported on a bill by the Committee for three days, such bill shall go to the foot of General Orders, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote.

14. Special Orders.

Bills may be made the Order of the Day for a special time. Such bills shall be entered upon a separate list known as "Special Orders." Bills may be made a Special Order by a two-thirds vote of the entire House upon two days notice.

Any Special Order, or any part thereof, may be continued or postponed by two-thirds of the entire House at the time of such Special Order.

When the time arrives for the consideration of any Special Order, the House shall proceed to the consideration of the bill or bills upon the said Special Order in the order in which they are respectively listed; and after consideration they shall immediately be read the third time and placed upon final passage.

15. Duties and Privileges of Officers and Members. Duties of the Speaker.

(a) The Speaker shall preside over the House, and be charged with all the powers and duties pertaining to such presiding officer.

(b) He shall preserve order and decorum, and in case of disorderly conduct or disturbance in the galleries or the lobby, he or the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole House may order the same to be cleared.

(c) He shall have general control, except as provided by rule or law, of the hall of the House and of the corridors and passages and of the rooms assigned to the use of the House, until further ordered.

(d) He shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas of, or issued by order of the House; and he shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member.

The Speaker shall not vote on appeals from his own decisions.

16. Speaker Pro Tempore.

The presiding officer may call a member to the chair, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. In the absence of the presiding officer, one of the members shall be selected by a majority vote to preside temporarily, until the return of the regular presiding officer.

17. Duties of Members.

When the House adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.

Every member, before speaking, shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the Speaker, but shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the chair. When two or more members rise at once, the Speaker shall designate which shall speak first.

18. Explaining or Changing Vote.

No member shall be allowed to explain his vote or discuss the question while the yeas and nays are being called; and no member shall be allowed to change his vote after the same is announced from the chair.

19. Name of Member Offering Bills, Etc., to Go on Journal.

In all cases where a bill, order, resolution or motion shall be entered on the Journal of the House, the name or names of the member or members offering the same shall be entered on the Journal.

20. 'Absence of Members and Officers.

No member or officer of the House shall, unless from illness or some other sufficient cause he be unable to attend, absent himself from any session of the House during the entire day without naving first obtained leave of absence from the Speaker.

21. Duties of the Chief Clerk and Assistants, or Employes.

Neither the Chief Clerk nor his assistants or employes shall permit any records or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody otherwise than in the regular course of business. The Chief Clerk shall report any missing papers to the Speaker. He shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House; shall perform under the direction of the Speaker, all the duties pertaining to his office, and shall keep a book showing the situation and progress of bills, memorials, and joint resolutions.

22. Clerical Corrections to Bills.

- (a) Minor clerical errors in any bill, memorial or resolution, such as errors in orthography or grammar, or the incorrect use of one word for another (as "affect" for "effect") or wrong numbering of references, whether such errors occur in the original bill or any amendment thereto, shall be corrected by the Chief Clerk, as a matter of course, upon the approval of the chairman of any committee to which the bill was referred.
- (b) The Chief Clerk shall insert the enacting clause in any bill before its passage if the same shall have been omitted.
- (c) Any corrections made by the Clerk under this rule shall be noted by him in the Journal.
- (d) Webster's New International Dictionary shall be the standard authority in matters falling under the above' rules.

23. No One to Remain by the Clerk's Desk.

No member or other person shall remain by the Clerk's desk when the yeas and nays are being called.

24. Duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to execute all orders of the House or its presiding officer; to perform all duties that may, from time to time, be assigned to him, connected with the police and good order of the House; to exercise supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the the Chamber; to see that all messages, etc., are promptly executed; and that the hall is properly ventilated and open for the use of the members; and to perform all other services pertaining to the office of Sergeant-at-Arms.

25. Smoking Prohibited.

No person shall be permitted to smoke in the House Chamber while that body is in session. The Sergeant-at-Arms is charged with the duty of enforcing observance of this rule.

26. Order in Debate.

No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House; nor more than once until every other member wishing to speak on the pending question shall have spoken.

27. Motions.

No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the Speaker before debate, and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any other member requires it.

After a motion has been stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the House, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision; but all motions, resolutions or amendments shall be entered in the Journal unless withdrawn the same day.

28. Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except during roll call.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state any fact to the House, relative to the condition of the business of the House which would seem to render it improper to adjourn at that time. Such statement, however, shall not be debatable and shall not, in any case, occupy more than two minutes.

29. Precedence of Motions.

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but:

- 1. To adjourn.
- 2. To lay on the table.
- 3. For the previous question.
 - (Which three motions shall be decided without debate.)
- 4. To commit.
- 5. To postpone to a day certain.
- 6. To amend.
- 7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order; but the previous question having been seconded, and the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

30. The Previous Question.

The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions, allowable under the rules or an amendment or amendments; or it may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. b. On a motion for the previous question and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered such motion, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.

(c) When the previous question is decided in the negative it shall leave the main question under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking a vote on the question or in some other manner.

31. Incidental Questions of Order.

All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, during the pendency of such motion, or after the House shall have determined that the main question now be put, shall be decided whether on appeal or otherwise without debate.

32. Petitions and, Etc.-How Presented.

Petitions, memorials and other papers presented to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or member in his place, and a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made verbally and endorsed thereon, together with the name of the member introducing the same.

33. Every Member to Vote Unless Excused.

Every member who shall be present before the vote is declared from the chair, shall vote for or against the matter before the House, unless the House shall excuse him, or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.

34. Procedure in Excusing Member From Voting.

When a member declines to vote on a call of his name, he shall be required to assign his reasons therefor; and having assigned them, the presiding officer shall submit the question to the House, "Shall the member for the reasons assigned by him, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate. And these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced, and any further proceedings in reference thereto, shall be after such announcement.

35. Order During Session.

When the Speaker is putting the question, no member shall walk out of or across the House, nor when a member is speaking shall any other member entertain any private discourse or pass between the speaking member and the chair.

36. Order of Putting Question.

All questions, whether in committee or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions, and in filling up blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

37. Division of a Question.

If the question in debate contains several points any member may have the said question divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

38. Questions of Order.

If any member of the House in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules, the Speaker shall (or any member may) call him to order, in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted on motion of another member to explain, and the House, if appealed to, shall decide in either case without debate. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

39. Called to Order for Offensive Words in Debate.

If any member be called to order for offensive words in debate the person calling him to order shall report the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the clerk's desk and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House, for language used in debate if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exception to them shall have been taken.

40. Members May Demand Yeas and Nays.

The yeas and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by ten members, except upon final passage of bills, joint resolutions, and motions directing the payment of money. In these cases yeas and nays shall be ordered without demand.

41. Notice of Intention to Debate.

Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or any other action.

42. Call of the House.

Ten members may demand a call of the House and require absent members to be sent for; but a call of the House cannot be made after the voting has commenced, and such call being ordered, the doors shall be closed and no member permitted to leave the chamber until the call is suspended. And, pending the call, no motion shall be in order except it pertains to matters incidental to the call or motion to suspend further proceedings under the same, provided that the call shall not be suspended, until the calling of the roll has been completed. Thereafter the call may be suspended by majority vote of the entire House only when all members are present or at any time by a two-thirds vote of the entire House. After the call of the House has been ordered and proceedings thereunder are suspended, the Segeant-at-Arms shall not permit any member to leave the chamber unless excused by the Speaker.

43. Suspension of Rules to Hasten a Bill.

Every bill shall be read on the three different days unless in case of urgency, two-thirds of the whole House deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed until it shall have been read at length twice, provided that no motion for suspension of the rules to advance a bill for consideration out of its regular order shall be made or entertained unless presented to the Speaker in writing stating the present position of the bill and then only under the order of business "Motions and Resolutions," as such order of business is reached under Rule 3. Unanimous consent must be first obtained by the member making the motion before the Speaker can entertain the motion to suspend the rules at any other time.

44. Proceedings of the Passage of Bills.

No resolution involving the expenditure of money out of the legislative expense fund or otherwise, or joint resolution, shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House, to be determined by a roll call. All resolutions involving the expenditure of money out of the legislative expense fund shall be referred to the Rules Committee before being acted upon by the House. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of its being an amendment. No bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto or incorporating therein any other bill or resolution pending before the House.

45. Amendments to Appropriation Bills.

No amendment increasing the amount or amounts carried by any appropriation bill shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House.

46. Motion for Reconsideration.

When a question has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative. it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof; but no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after a bill, resolution, message, report, amendment or motion upon which the vote was taken shall have gone out of the possession of the House, announcing their decision. Nor shall any motion for reconsideration be in order unless made on the same day upon which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the House thereafter.

Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions, except the motion to adjourn; provided that when notice of the intention to move such reconsideration

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shall be given by such member, the Clerk of the House shall retain the said bill, resolution, message, report, amendment or motion until after the expiration of the time during which such motion can be made, as hereinbefore provided, unless the same is previously disposed of. A motion for reconsideration having been put and lost shall not be renewed.

47. The Motion to Rescind.

The motion to rescind shall not be in order at any time.

48. Authorized Manual of Parliamentary Practice.

The rules of parliamentary practice embraced in Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern the House in all cases where they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the House and joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

50. Purchasing Supplies.

The Chief Clerk of the House shall be the agent of the House for the purchase of supplies. Before making any purchases, however, it shall be his duty to submit to the Rules Committee a list of necessary supplies, together with the prices for which the same can be secured, which supplies shall then be purchased only upon the approval of the Rules Committee.

51. Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment.

The Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment, shall examine all bills after they are engrossed, and report the same to the House "correctly engrossed" before the third reading. The said Committee may report at any time, and all bills shall be engrossed in typewriting.

The Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment shall examine all House bills, memorials, and joint resolutions which have passed the two houses and when reported "correctly enrolled" they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the two houses for their signatures; and when so signed, to the Governor for his approval. The said committee may report at any time, but it shall not report any bills as correctly enrolled which has words interlined therein; or when any words have been erased therefrom; and all bills shall be enrolled in typewriting. The Chairman of said committee shall keep or cause to be kept, a record showing the hour and date of the receipt by it of each bill and its return to the House and all bills shall be returned in the same order as that in which they are received.

52. Committee of Conference.

A committee of conference may report at any time. No committee except a committee of conference and the committee on rules shall sit during the sitting of the House without leave.

53. Special Committees.

Special committees to whom reference shall be made shall in all cases report a state of facts and their opinions thereupon, to the House.

54. Meeting of Committees.

The Chief Clerk of the House after conference with the Chairmen of the various committees of the House shall prepare a schedule of committee meetings, fixing as far as practicable the date and hour which will be the regular meeting time of each committee to be first approved by a majority of the House. Should to be necessary to hold a special meeting or for any reason change temporarily the regular meeting of the committee, the notice by the chairman of said committee of such change shall be read from the desk at least one day in advance thereof, and also posted upon the bulletin board at the same time, or on a majority vote of the House, fixing the time therefor at any time. Provided that committee sessions shall be held in the forenoon and shall convene at 10 o'clock A. M., unless otherwise ordered by the House, subject, however, to the right of any committee to change the time of its meeting.

55. Time Limit for Consideration of Bills.

Fifteen days after a bill has been referred to a committee (other than a bill for appropriations or claims) and no report has been made upon the bill by a committee, any member may request that the bill be returned to the House. A committee shall then have three days in which to report back the bill requested. If the committee fails to report, within three days, any member may at any time after the expiration of such three days, during the order of "Motions and Resolutions" demand the return forthwith to the House of the bill in question, which shall constitute the demand of the House, and the said bill shall at once be considered

to be in possession of the House, subject, however, to such disposition as the House may determine. Provided, that the House can recall any bill from any committee at any time, give the same second reading and advance the same to General Orders by a majority vote of the members present.

Substitution of Bills.

No standing or special committee, nor any member or members thereof, shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject or is intended to accomplish a different purpose from that of the original bill for which it is reported or which if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the House is advised that the same is in violation of this rule. The rule shall not be suspended without the unanimous consent of the House.

Employes.

All propositions for the appointment of employes of the House, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. No appointment shall be made unless favorably reported upon by such committee, or its report be overruled by three-fourths vote of the House. The said committee shall report to the House, the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each of said employes.

Any employe of the House may be assigned to other duties, suspended or discharged at any time by the Committee on Rules.

Rule 56 shall not be construed as authorizing the employment or appointment of any employe named therein in case any employe has been appointed or authorized to be appointed or engaged by this House for such position by any rule or resolution heretofore adopted. No clerk shall be appointed for any of the committees named in Rule 56 unless the necessity for the same is recommended by the Committee on Rules; and no clerk of the said committee and no employe of this House shall receive any pay for any time prior to the date of appointment, and no employe or clerk mentioned in Rule 56 shall receive any pay, compensation, gratuity or reward over and above the salary named therein, except upon approval of a four-fifths yote of the whole House.

No employe shall, under any circumstances make or permit to be made, any copy or copies of any papers, files or documents in his or her custody, or to which she or he has access except it be upon the request of some member of the House; and in such cases the employe making or permitting to be made such copies, shall file a statement with the Chief Clerk of the House, showing the paper, file or document copied; the number of copies furnished, or made, to whom furnished, and by whom made. Violations of this rule shall be ground for instant and summary discharge of the offending employe.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES.

58. Vote Required to Suspend Rules.

No rule of the House shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the whole House excépt Rules 56 and 57, which shall require the concurrence of three-fourths of the members of the whole House. But the Committee on Rules may report at any time and any rule so reported may be adopted by the majority of the House.

59. Weekly Synopsis of All Entries in Journal.

After the last session of each week the Clerk shall prepare a synopsis of all entries affecting bills in the Journal for the week. Such synopsis shall specify clearly and briefly the proceedings had and action taken, giving dates.

The synopsis so prepared shall be of the same size and form as the Journal and shall be distributed on the desks of the members as soon as practicable.

60. Printing of Bills.

All bills of general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands shall be printed, provided, that no bill shall be printed until after the same shall have been favorably reported by the committee to which it shall have been referred unless ordered printed by a majority vote of the House.

In case of bills received from the Senate which have been amended in the Senate after having been printed by that body, it shall be the duty of the committee of the House to which the same are referred to make a report to the House as to the advisability or inadvisability of having the same printed. All committee chairmen shall be furnished with a copy of this rule.

61. Newspaper Reporters.

On account of the limited space available on the floor of the House, the Associated Press, United Press, the St. Paul Pioneer Press, the St. Paul Dispatch, the St. Paul Daily News, the Minneapolis Journal, the Minneapolis Tribune, the Minneapolis Daily News, the Minnesota Daily Star, the Duluth News-Tribune, and the Duluth Herald and any other daily or weekly newspaper published in this state in the English language having a bona fide circulation of more than twenty thousand subscribers, and no other, shall each be permitted to be represented at the press table by one regularly employed reporter who shall file with the Chief Clerk credentials to be approved by the Rules Committee.

62. Who May Be Admitted on the Floor.

No person or persons shall be admitted within the House Chamber, corridors or retiring room, except the members themselves, the properly authorized employes, the chief executive and ex-governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the Senate, the heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme and District Courts, members of Congress, the properly accredited representatives of the newspapers and press associations, as herein provided for, and none other. Former members of Congress, or Minnesota Legislature, or any other person when personally introduced to the Speaker by members of the House, the Speaker may issue a permit good for the day to such person, after having satisfied himself that such person does not seek the floor of the House for the purpose of directing or using his influence upon ary measure pending or otherwise before the House. It is expressly directed that the Sergeant-at-Arms shall keep the alcoves cleared (the alcoves shall be kept for members only) and at no time when the House is in session can visitors on the floor of the House who are guests of the members thereof, occupy the alcoves, but a visiting member shall be provided with a seat near the member who has recommended him, and at no time shall a conversation be carried on to disturb the business of the House.

It shall not be in order for the Speaker to entertain a request for the suspension of this rule, or to present from the chair the request of any member for unanimous consent unless, however, an extraordinary condition exists, in which event he may consent to entertain a mótion for its suspension.

63. Construction, Rule as to.

In consideration of the terms "majority vote," "vote of the House," "vote of the whole House" and "vote of the entire House," as used in these rules, the first two phrases shall be deemed a majority of the members present at the particular time, and the last two phrases to mean a majority vote of all the members elected to the House at the particular session of the Legislature.

64. Bulletin Board.

The Chief Clerk shall prepare a bulletin board, upon which shall be posted a list of committee meetings and any other announcements or notice the House may require.

65. Topical Index.

The Chief Clerk shall prepare a topical card index, in which bills may be indexed by number, author, subject, section of the code amended, the committees and any other subject that will make it a complete and comprehensive index, and to be made a permanent file to be used by all succeeding chief clerks. The topical index shall be filed with the Secretary of State after the expiration of the session of the Legislature and the cards constituting the record shall be retained open for the public inspection at all times.

66. Visiting Public Institutions.

No leave of absence shall be granted any committee, special or standing, to visit any public institution of the state or for any other purpose. Whenever any committee shall report to the House that it is desirable that such committee receive information concerning any public institution, the House may, by a majority vote of all its members, grant a leave of absence to not more than three members of such committee, to be designated by the chairman thereof. Application for a leave of absence of such members of a committee shall be made to the House in writing, by the chairman thereof, and such application shall give the name of the institution or institutions to be visited and to briefly recite the occasion and necessity for visiting the same, together with the names of the committeemen designated for that purpose and the name of the stenographer to accompany such committeemen if one is necessary. Such application shall immediately and without debate be referred to the Committee on Rules, with instructions to report upon the same on the next legislative day. Said members and their stenographers, if any, shall be allowed their actual expenses.

HISTORY.

MINNESOTA.

Brief Historical Sketch of the North Star State.

The great and prosperous commonwealth now known as the State of Minnesota had earlier formed part of three great sovereignties: France, Spain and Great Britain. At different periods sections of it bore the names of the Northwest Territory, Louisiana, Missouri, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, and finally "Minnesota," a name derived from two Sioux words meaning "sky-colored water," which was applied to its principal river.

The economic, political and institutional life of Minnesota can be traced back to the brilliant period of Louis XIV of France, and the French conquest of the territory furnishes one of the most fascinating chapters in American history. Whether this was effected by devoted priests under the direction of various religious orders or by intrepid adventurers encouraged in their undertakings by officials of the French government, makes little difference. The French were the pioneers in the development of the Northwest fur trade and it was the discovery of potential wealth in the large number of fur bearing animals in the territory that offered a promising field for white adventurous spirits from the settlements along the St. Lawrence river.

Thus it was that in the spring of 1655 traders, now indisputably identified as Medard Chouart, Sieur des Groseilliers, and Pierre Esprit Radisson, reached Minnesota, having crossed Wisconsin to the Mississippi river, and after more than a year's sojourn returned to Montreal laden with valuable pelts. They were the first white men to visit Minnesota, excepting a party from Scandinavia in the year 1362, made known by the Kensington rune stone, as narrated in Volume XV of the Minnesota Historical Society Collections.

Thereafter the possibilities of great wealth in the vast empire beyond the Great Lakes became known, and the commercial life of Minnesota may well be said to have commenced in the seventeenth century.

In 1679 Daniel Greysolon DuLhut (Duluth), a French officer, explored the region along the shores of Lake Superior and inland to Mille Lacs, where he held a council with the Indians. During the next summer he journeyed to the Mississippi river and there met Father Louis Hennepin, a missionary priest. Father Hennepin was on a voyage of discovery also, the object being to trace the source of the Mississippi. He reached the Falls of St. Anthony, the present site of the City of Minneapolis, in July, 1680.

The spirit of romance and adventure was ever present during this early period of Minnesota's history, in the latter part of the seventeenth century, but

the aborigines did not always take kindly to the visitors. It was, therefore, a matter of self preservation that led to the erection by Nicholas Perrot of a fort on the shore of Lake Pepin in 1689, and of a similar means of defense by Pierre LeSueur, French explorer, on the Blue Earth river near its mouth, eleven years later.

When France lost her American dependencies in 1763, all that part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi river came under the control of Great Britain, and the result was that English trading enterprises began to supersede the French companies.

During the early years of this commercial warfare, there arrived in the territory Jonathan Carver, coming from Connecticut, who was the first "Yankee" to venture into the territory. With characteristic foresight, Carver established friendly relations with the Indians, and it is alleged that on May 1, 1767, he received a grant of land from the Sioux, including the present site of the city of St. Paul, but no government recognition of the grant, currently referred to as "Carver's Claim," has ever been obtained.

The battle for supremacy in the fur trade continued to occupy the attention of the French, British, and American companies, until the Northwest Company was organized in 1783, which ten to fifteen years later gained exclusive control of the trading region beyond the Great Lakes. This supremacy it practically maintained until 1808, when the American Fur Company came into existence. This latter company has been credited with being commercially and politically the greatest single force in the development of the territory of which Minnesota forms a part.

The section of this state west of the Mississippi had prior to 1803 been alternately possessed by Spain and France, but following the "Louisiana Purchase" in that year the southern and western area of Minnesota came under the jurisdiction of Missouri territory, and incidentally became a political division of the United States. In 1818 that part east of the Mississippi, which had been at first a section of the Northwest Territory and afterward successively of Indiana and Illinois, was included in Michigan Territory.

Geographers and scientific explorers were also taking an active interest in the territory, for in 1798 David Thompson traversed and mapped the Red Lake region, and the source of the Mississippi, later named Itasca lake, was visited in 1804 by William Morrison.

Two years after the Louisiana Purchase the Federal government sent an expedition here, commanded by Lieut. Zebulon M. Pike, who wintered near what is now Little Falls and visited the Indian trading posts which had been established at Leech and Cass Lakes.

Lieutenant Pike negotiated with the Sioux for the purchase of a tract of land extending from below the confluence of the Mississippi and St. Peter's (Minnesota) rivers, up the Mississippi to include the Falls of St. Anthony, extending nine miles on each side of the river. Another tract nine miles square at the mouth of the St. Croix river was included in the cession. In consideration of these grants the Government paid \$2,000, the actual payment being made in

the distribution of goods to the Indians by Major Forsyth in 1819; and in that year Fort St. Anthony, six years afterward renamed Fort Snelling, was located at the mouth of the Minnesota river.

Another Government expedition arrived in the territory in 1820, headed by General Lewis Cass, who then was governor of Michigan, which comprised all the territory between the Detroit river on the east and the Mississippi on the west. This expedition, coming by the way of Lake Superior, ascended the Mississippi river to Cass Lake, so named by the historian, Henry Schoolcraft, who accompanied it.

Three years later the country north and west of Fort St. Anthony was traversed by Major Stephen H. Long and a military escort. Italy was represented in this exploration but not officially, for with Major Long was Giacomo C. Beltrami, an Italian political exile. Beltrami left Long's expedition at Pembina and traveled alone, or with Indian companions, past Red Lake and down the Mississippi to the fort.

May 10, 1823, the first steamboat on the upper Mississippi, the little "Virginia," laden with supplies, picked its way slowly up the river to Fort St. Anthony, but almost a decade passed after the advent of soldiers at the fort before settlers began to arrive in any number.

Hon. Henry H. Sibley, afterward the first governor of the State of Minnesota, arrived at St. Peter's (Mendota) in 1834 from Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, as resident partner and manager of the American Fur Company; and the Anglo-Saxon influence, which had first manifested itself in the years following the treaty of Versailles in 1763, when the territory's allegiance was changed from France to England, began to take more definite shape.

The Sioux and Ojibway Indians had, up to the beginning of the nineteenth century, held the territory practically undisturbed, but the commercial spirit entered during this period, the Indians finding material advantage in many transactions with the fur traders. In exchange for peltries, they received guns, ammunition, blankets, calicoes, knives, tobacco and rum. Under this system of barter the traders were undoubtedly able to reap large profits, the Indians obtaining desired articles at the trading posts and being given credit according to their hunting and trapping ability.

The first permanent settlement of the present State of Minnesota followed as a result of treaties negotiated in 1837 with the Indians by Governor Dodge of Wisconsin at Fort Snelling, and by Joel R. Poinsett, a special commissioner, at Washington. By the first of these treaties the Ojibways ceded all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries, and by the Washington treaty the Dakota Indians ceded their lands east of the Mississippi and all its islands. The United States government thus gained possession of the land between the Mississippi and St. Croix rivers, south of a line drawn through the mouth of the Crow Wing river; and after the ratification of the treaties by Congress, in 1838, these lands were opened for settlement.

In the next few years small settlements were made at St. Paul, Mendota, Marine, and Dakota (Stillwater), at which latter place the "Stillwater Conven-

tion" was held August 26, 1848, whereby measures were adopted for separate territorial organization, and that the proposed new territory be named Minnesota. Henry H. Sibley was elected delegate to Congress, with the result that on March 3, 1849, the bill organizing Minnesota as an independent territory was passed. The territorial government was declared fully organized June 1, 1849, by Hon. Alexander Ramsey of St. Paul, who had been appointed governor.

With the creation of the territory of Minnesota, which extended to the Missouri river, a change took place in the industrial and commercial life of the people. The region was still mainly Indian country, and the magnificent opportunities for development brought negotiations with the tribal chiefs for approximately 24,000,000 acres of the finest agricultural land in the world, by the signing of the famous Traverse des Sioux and Mendota treaties. The first of these was signed July 23, 1851, in the presence of a large number of Sioux chiefs at a council presided over by Governor Ramsey, the United States government being represented by Hon. Luke Lea, Indian Commissioner; the second was negotiated at Mendota on the fifth of August. By the Traverse des Sioux treaty the chiefs ceded all the lands claimed by the Sisseton and Wahpeton bands of Sioux, east from the Bois des Sioux river and Lakes Traverse and Big Stone to the Mississippi, excepting a reservation about one hundred and thirty miles long by twenty wide, along the upper part of the Minnesota river and onward to Lake Traverse. The Indians, under the terms of the treaty, were to move within two years to the reservation; to receive from the Government, after removal, \$275,000 to enable them to become established in their new domain; and \$30,000 was to be expended in breaking land, establishing mills, and providing a manual labor school. They also were to receive an annuity of \$68,000 for fifty years, payable \$40,000 in cash, \$10,000 in goods and provisions, a civilization fund of \$12,000, and an education fund of \$6,000.

By the Mendota treaty, which was signed by sixty-four chiefs of the Medawakanton and Wahpekuta bands of Sioux, all their lands in the territory of Minnesota and Iowa were ceded. In consideration for this the United States was to reserve for them a tract of an average width of ten miles on each side of the Minnesota river, between the Yellow Medicine river on the west and the Little Rock river on the east; to pay them \$220,000, with which to settle debts and aid in their removal to the reservation; \$30,000 to be used for the erection of buildings and opening farms; an annual civilization fund of \$12,000; an annual education fund of \$6,000; to provide \$10,000 in goods and provisions annually, and \$30,000 in cash. These annuities were to continue for fifty years. The treaties were ratified by Congress in June, 1852.

September 20, 1851, a treaty was effected by Governor Ramsey with the Red Lake and Pembina bands of Ojibways at Pembina, but it was not ratified by the Government. A second treaty with these Ojibway bands, by Governor Ramsey and Ashby C. Morrill, at a crossing of the Red Lake river near the later site of Crookston, on the second of October, 1863, was ratified by the United States Senate, March 1, 1864, and on May 5 President Lincoln by proclamation confirmed it. By this treaty 11,000,000 acres of land within and adjoining the Red

river valley, in northwestern Minnesota and the present state of North Dakota, were added to the already large ceded tracts available for white settlement.

. The United States census of 1850 showed that the white population of Minnesota numbered 6,077, but immigration increased rapidly after the negotiations and ratification of the Indian treaties, and by 1853 steamboats of the upper Mississippi and the Minnesota river trade carried capacity cargoes and passengers. Villages grew rapidly in the valley of the Minnesota, which was regarded as a veritable Eden, and farms appeared in all directions. A period of unprecedented immigration continued from 1853 to 1857, at which time the population of the territory was 150,037. During these years of prosperity Minnesota attracted the best class of men and women from the eastern states and from Europe. They were hardy frontiersmen indeed, with slender financial resources, a condition typical always of those who have been in the vanguard of settlement. As a class they were, in morality, education, and intelligence, far superior to the pioneers in many of the older territories. Many were farmers who came west in "prairie schooners," with their own stock. Southeastern Minnesota gained more from the incoming population than any other section, but the unusual success which attended the beginning of the lumber industry had its effect on every branch of trade and brought a rapid increase in-the wealth of the newcomers.

The adventurous spirit, however, of many of the settlers led them to locate near the extreme limits of the land cessions and in immediate proximity to Occasionally the younger Indians on hunting expeditions Indian settlements. returned to the ceded lands in the southern section near the Iowa border. One band under the leadership of Inkpaduta, composed of about fifteen lodges, were particularly given to marauding. It was this band which caused the first serious trouble for the whites. Early in 1857 a few of these Indians hunting about forty miles south of Spirit Lake, Iowa, killed a dog belonging to a white settler. The owner of the dog assaulted one of the Indians, and then gathering a few neighbors went to the Indian camp and disarmed them. In revenge the Indians went to the white settlement at Spirit Lake, March 7, 1857, massacred the men, and took four women captives, two of whom were later rescued. Other settlements were attacked, including Springfield, on the later site of Jackson, Minnesota, and altogether forty-two settlers were killed. An expedition was dispatched by Hon. Charles E. Flandrau, the Indian agent, but all escaped across the prairies into the wilds of Dakota territory, except the eldest son of Inkpaduta who was killed in an attempt to capture him.

Prosperity of the years prior to 1857 resulted in a demand for an extensive railroad system, and for a state government for the territory; therefore Congress, on February 26, 1857, passed an act authorizing a constitutional convention and also granting lands in aid of public schools. In March of the same year, Congress enacted legislation making large grants of lands to railroad companies. But as the year 1857 advanced, financiers began to feel the effects of uncertain conditions in the East. Stringency in the money market caused business to be dull. Local bankers had little money for business loans, having invested heavily

in real estate. The crash came August 27, when a telegram reached St. Paul, announcing the suspension of several eastern banking institutions. Within a week real estate transactions ceased; payments became slower, past due accounts began to accumulate; gold commanded a stiff premium and soon disappeared from general circulation, and money of any kind was scarce. Early in October St. Paul banks suspended specie payments, more banking firms went under, and instead of immigration an exodus from the territory had actually begun. Bankers held meetings and unsuccessfully urged Governor Samuel Medary to call an extra session of the territorial legislature. The Constitutional convention which had assembled at St. Paul July 13, acting on the demands of the people, incorporated into the fundamental laws of the proposed state the constitutional basis for a sounder financial policy, but it was not until after the Civil War that prosperity returned.

The proposed State Constitution also changed the western boundary of Minnesota, which heretofore had extended to the Missouri river. The Red River of the North, the Bois des Sioux river, and Lakes Traverse and Big Stone, with a line extending due south to the Iowa border, were the established western limits. The Constitution also provided for the election of state officers at the time of voting on the adoption of the Constitution. The first state legislature convened December 2, 1857, and continued in session until March 25, 1858, when a recess was taken, pending the admission of Minnesota to statehood by Congress. The act of admission was passed May 11, 1858, and the state's first governor, Henry H. Sibley, assumed office May 24. On June 3, the legislature having again assembled, Governor Sibley delivered his inaugural address and the state's law-making body continued in session until August 12, 1858, working diligently on financial and railroad legislation.

For securing the government land grant, a scheme was devised to aid companies willing to undertake the construction of railroads. This act came to be known as the "Five Million Loan Bill," under which the credit of the state could be loaned to that amount. It was proposed as an amendment to the constitution and was adopted by a large majority. There always was much opposition to the measure, however, and when the State Supreme Court later ruled that the constitutional provision did not require the railroads to give the state a prior lien on their property, the railroad bonds depreciated in value. Eastern financiers refused to buy the bonds, and finally the entire scheme collapsed, with the foreclosure of the mortgages which the state had taken upon railroad franchises and lands. The result was the abandonment of railroad construction temporarily. The total amount of bonds issued was \$2,275,000, and by foreclosing the state acquired about 250 miles of graded road, the franchises and the lands, amounting to about five million acres indemnity.

Minnesota struggled desperately, in the period from 1858 to 1863, to overcome the financial disasters of 1857 and to regain the prosperity which, a few years before, had seemed the State's natural heritage. Abundant crops of 1859 and 1860 restocked the granaries, and it was hoped that the difficulties would be overcome. But the presidential campaign served only to develop the disturbing

situation throughout the country, followed by the Civil War commencing in April, 1861, in which the young state not only contributed her full quota of men for the preservation of the Union, but also was forced to fight for her own existence through the worst Indian uprising ever witnessed in America.

Governor Alexander Ramsey was at Washington on the twelfth of April, 1861, when Fort Sumter was fired upon, and war, which so long had been a probability, became a reality. He hastened at once to the war department and offered one thousand men from Minnesota, the first tender of troops from any quarter after the attack on the Charleston fortress. On April 15th President Lincoln's war proclamation was published, and on the 16th Ignatius Donnelly, acting governor, issued a call for the first regiment of Minnesota volunteers, which was assembled and organized at Fort Snelling with amazing rapidity. Before Lee surrendered at Appomattox, thus ending the War of the Rebellion, Minnesota had furnished a total of 22,016 troops.

The war, calling so many able-bodied men from the State, left the frontiers almost defenseless. Although the Indians had more or less complaint to make regarding extortions practiced on them by post traders, no serious outbreak occurred during the first year and four months of the Civil War. They were, however, becoming more and more restless and coming off their reservations at increasingly recurring intervals.

A sentiment had grown among the whites that the Indians should adopt modes of civilization, that their splendid agricultural lands should not be left idle. Therefore the head chiefs were induced to go to Washington in 1858, in charge of Hon. Joseph R. Brown, for the purpose of negotiating for the transfer of the whole, or part, of the twenty-mile strip along the upper valley of the Minnesota river, which had been reserved for them by the treaties of 1851. The transfer was made and the ten-mile strip on the north side of the river was relinquished to the Government for an agreed price of \$140,000. The Government also provided that every head of a family, or single person over 21, adopting civilization, should receive in fee eighty acres of land. When, however, for some cause, the payments were not made and no money was divided, on account of the relinquishment, the more hostile Indians became rebellious. Internal strife arose and was augmented from time to time by the withdrawal of families who were willing to sever tribal relations and accept the civilization fund provided in the treaties. These were, however, annuity Indians and had a right to be heard in councils. They numbered about six thousand two hundred and received an annual cash payment from the Government of about fifteen dollars each. They were treated as wards of the Government and handled little or no actual cash, agencies having been established, around which gathered storekeepers who sold goods to the Indians in anticipation of the annual payments.

The discontent increased, however, and the hostile feeling against the whites, intensified by injustices which crept in with the dealings at the agency stores, culminated in the great massacre of 1862.

On Sunday, August 17, six young Indian hunters attacked two families of white settlers in the township of Acton, twelve miles west of the later site of Litchfield, killing three men and two women. They hurriedly returned to their villages on the Sioux reservation, at the south side of the Minnesota river, and reported what they had done. The Indians, after consultation, decided to stand by their fellows, and on the next day there was a general uprising by the entire Sioux bands. Their movements were so swift that before effective resistance could be brought, nearly four hundred men, women and children were massacred within a few days.

The number was even estimated to be about 800, and has been commonly so reported in histories and in many editions of this manual; but recent reliable search of all available records, by Marion P. Satterlee, published in Volume 2 of Dr. Folwell's History of Minnesota, gives only 360 killed during the massacre in 1862, and twenty-one murdered by Sioux marauders in the state within the next three years. To these should be added sixty-one soldiers and twenty-nine citizen volunteers killed in Minnesota during the campaign against the Sioux in 1862, five others within the next three years, and thirty-one soldiers in Dakota during the expeditions of 1863 and 1864. Five hundred and seven white people are thus known to have been killed in the Sioux massacre and war, including ninety-seven men in the army service.

State and national authorities took prompt action, and a detachment of volunteers, under command of General Sibley, aided by Union troops, met the savages near Wood Lake, on September 23, overwhelmed them, and three days afterward released 269 women and children, who had been taken captive. The Indians captured were given a trial, and 303 were adjudged guilty of murder and rape and condemned to death by a military court martial. A reprieve by President Lincoln saved all but thirty-eight of the most prominent, who were hanged at Mankato on the 26th of December, 1862. Many of the Indians who escaped capture fled into Dakota, but two expeditions were sent after them, and in 1864 the final chapter of the Sioux outbreak was written, when the Indians surrendered their ponies and arms to the Government.

Settlers, who had lost property through the Indian raids, were compensated to the amount of \$1,370,374, following an investigation by a commission appointed by the Government. This money was taken from the trust fund, which had been created for the Indians under the treaties of 1851, and which amounted, at that time, to \$2,520,000. With the payments of the claims to settlers by act of congress, further annuities to the Indians were stopped.

Despite the drain of war upon the male population of the State, an increased acreage was sown during this period; and, with the beginning of Scandinavian immigration into Minnesota, the outlook appeared brighter for its future.

At the close of the Civil War, in 1865, with the return of the soldiers, and with no further outbreaks by Indians, a new era of prosperity loomed. New railroad companies had been granted charters on the road-beds taken in the foreclosure proceedings of 1858, and during the next five years the population increased to 439,706. The Government was making large expenditures for war

claims, war bounties, payments to discharged soldiers, and the payment of other bills, which made money plentiful. Agriculture was given a great impetus by the steady influx of immigration, most notably from northern European countries, and in 1875 Minnesota's population was 597,407. An effort was made, during this era of prosperity, to meet the obligation of the dishonored railroad bonds; but it was not until 1881, at an extra session of the legislature, that an act was passed authorizing final adjustment on the basis of 50 per cent, payments to be made from the proceeds of 500,000 acres of internal improvement lands.

The million population mark was passed by the State between 1880, when the national census was 780,773, and 1885, when the figures of the state census were 1,117,798. The development of Dakota subsequent to 1885, and the breaking up of virgin soil in that territory, doubled the wheat yield of the Northwest; and the Minnesota farmer turned his attention more to diversified activities, with especial reference to dairying.

In 1890 the United States census gave Minnesota credit for 1,301,826 inhabitants, and in 1895 the state census showed a population of 1,574,619.

In April, 1898, the United States declared war on Spain, and Minnesota, following the example shown in the Civil War, was the first to respond to the call for troops, and furnished four regiments. They were designated the Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth. The first three were mustered into service at St. Paul, May 6-8, after being mobilized April 29. The Fifteenth Regiment was mustered into service July 18. A total of 5,315 officers and men were furnished by this state.

At the beginning of the present century Minnesota's population was 1,751,-394; the state enumeration taken in 1905 showed 1,979,912; and the federal census in 1910 was 2,075,708, and in 1920 it was 2,387,125.

During the four years and three months from August, 1914, to November, 1918, the world was in a turmoil, and although President Wilson did not declare war on Germany until April 7, 1917, Minnesota troops had been in active service through a year prior to that date on the Mexican border.

For better enabling this state to do its share in the World War, the legislature of 1917 passed an act creating the Commission of Public Safety, to be composed of seven members, including the Governor and Attorney General, and appropriated \$1,000,000 for its use. This commission had almost unlimited powers, and continued in existence for many months after the war ended. One of the first acts of the commission was to create the Minnesota Home Guard, comprising volunteers in practically every city and town in the State, and approximately 20,000 men became members. It also adopted and enforced other orders, notably the closing of saloons in certain sections of the State, and aided the Government in its "work or fight order," as well as by establishing standard minimum prices to be charged for commodities. In addition to these activities, the State co-operated fully with the National Government in bringing to bear every natural resource, including the output of the mines and forests.

CHRONOLOGICAL

- 1635. Jean Nicolet, an explorer from France, who had wintered in the neighborhood of Green Bay, brought to Montreal the first mention of the aborigines of Minnesota.
- 1655-60. Groseilliers and Radisson wintered in 1659-60 among the Sioux of the Mille Lacs region, Minnesota, being its first white explorers. In a previous expedition, four years earlier, they had come to Prairie Island, west of the main channel of the Mississippi, between the sites of Red Wing and Hastings.
- 1661. Father Rene Menard left Keweenaw, on Lake Superior, to visit the Hurons, then in northern Wisconsin, and was lost near the sources of the Black and Chippewa rivers. His breviary and cassock were said to have been found among the Sioux.
- 1679. July 2d, Daniel Greysolon Du Lhut (Duluth) held a council with the Sioux at their principal settlement on the shore of Mille Lacs. Du Lhut, in July, 1680, by way of the St. Croix river, reached the Mississippi and met Hennepin.
- 1680. Louis Hennepin, after captivity in a village of the Mille Lacs Sioux, first saw the Falls of St. Anthony, which he named in honor of his patron saint.
- 1689. May 8th, Nicholas Perrot, at his Fort St. Antoine, on the Wisconsin shore of Lake Pepin, laid formal claim to the surrounding country for France. He built a fort also on the Minnesota shore of this lake, near its outlet.
- 1695. Le Sueur built a fort or trading post on Isle Pelee, now called Prairie Island, above Lake Pepin.
- 1700. Le Sueur established Fort L'Huillier, on the Blue Earth river (near the mouth of the Le Sueur), and first supplied the Sioux with firearms.
- 1727. The French established Fort Beauharnois near the site of Frontenac, Lake Pepin, with Sieur de La Perriere as commander.
- 1728. Great flood in the Mississippi.
- 1731-32. Verendrye, his sons, and his nephew Jemmeraye, established on the present north boundary of Minnesota two trading posts, Fort St. Pierre, near the mouth of Rainy lake, and Fort St. Charles, near the Northwest Angle of the Lake of the Woods.
- 1736. June 6th, the eldest son of Verendrye, also Father Aulneau, and nineteen French voyageurs, were massacred by a war party of the Sioux.

- 1763. By the treaty of Versailles, France ceded the part of Minnesota, east of the Mississippi to England, the country west of the river having been ceded to Spain the previous year.
- 1766. Captain Jonathan Carver visited St. Anthony Falls and the Minnesota river. He claimed to have made a treaty with the Indians in the following spring, at-a cave afterward called "Carver's Cave," within the present limits of St. Paul, by which he said they ceded to him a very large tract of land, long known as "Carver's Claim," but it was never recognized by government.
- 1794-99. The Northwest Fur Company established itself in the area of Minnesota.
- 1796. Laws of the Ordinance of 1787 extended over the Northwest Territory, including the northeastern third of Minnesota, east of the Mississippi river.
- 1800. May 7th, that part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi became a part of Indiana by the division of Ohio.
- 1803. April 30th, the area of Minnesota west of the Mississippi, for the preceding forty years in possession of Spain as a part of Louisiana, was ceded to the United States by Napoleon Bonaparte, who had just obtained it from Spain.
- 1803-04. William Morrison, the first known white man to discover the source of the Mississippi river, visited Elk lake and explored the streams entering into the lake forming the head of the river.
- 1805. Lieutenant Z. M. Pike visited Minnesota to establish government relations here, and obtained cessions, including the subsequent Fort Snelling reservation, from the Dakotas.
- 1812. The Dakotas, Ojibways, and Winnebagoes, under the lead of hostile traders, joined the British during the war. Red river colony established by Lord Selkirk. June 4th the area of this state west of the Mississippi was included in Missouri Territory.
- 1819. Minnesota east of the Mississippi became a part of Crawford county, Michigan. Fort St. Anthony (renamed Fort Snelling in 1825) established, beginning as a post at Mendota occupied by troops on August 24th, under command of Colonel Henry Leavenworth. Major L. Taliaferro appointed Indian agent, arriving in the autumn of that year.
- 1820. Corner stone of Fort St. Anthony, later called Fort Snelling, laid September 10th. Governor Cass visits Minnesota and makes a treaty of peace between the Sioux and Ojibways at Fort St. Anthony, August 1st.

 Colonel Josiah Snelling appointed to the command of that post.
- 1823. The first steamboat in Minnesota arrived at Mendota, May 10th, Beltramibeing a passenger. Major Stephen H. Long explored the Minnesota river, the Red River valley, and the northern frontier. Beltrami explored sources of the Mississippi.

- 1826. Great flood on the Red river; a part of the Selkirk colony driven to Minnesota, settling in 1827 near Fort Snelling.
- 1832. Schoolcraft explored sources of the Mississippi, and named Lake Itasca (formerly called Elk lake).
- 1833. First mission established at Leech lake by Rev. W. T. Boutwell.
- 1834. The portion of Minnesota west of the Mississippi attached to Michigan.

 General H. H. Sibley settled at Mendota.
- 1835. Catlin and Featherstonhaugh visited Minnesota.
- 1836. The territory of Wisconsin organized, embracing the whole area of Minnesota, until two years afterward the part west of the Mississippi was attached to the new Iowa Territory. Joseph N. Nicollet began his explorations in Minnesota.
- 1837. Governor Dodge of Wisconsin made a treaty at Fort Snelling with the Ojibways, by which they ceded all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries; a treaty was also effected at Washington with a deputation of Dakotas, for their lands east of the Mississippi. These treaties led the way to the first settlements from the eastern states within the area of Minnesota.
- 1838. The treaties ratified by Congress. Franklin Steele makes a claim at St. Anthony Falls. Pierre Parrant makes a claim and builds a shanty on the present site of St. Paul.
- 1839. St. Croix county of Wisconsin established, reaching west to the upper Mississippi.
- 1841. The "Chapel of St. Paul" built and consecrated, giving the name to the future capital of the State.
- 1843. Stillwater settled.
- 1846. August 6th, the Wisconsin enabling act.
- 1847. The Wisconsin constitutional convention meets. The town of St. Paul surveyed, platted, and recorded in St. Croix county register of deeds' office. First improvement of the water power at the Falls of St. Anthony.
- 1848. May 29th, Wisconsin admitted to the Union, leaving the area of Minnesota without a government. August 26th, the "Stillwater convention" held, taking measures for a separate territorial organization, and asking that the new Territory be named Minnesota. October 30th, H. H. Sibley elected delegate to Congress.
- 1849. January 15th, H. H. Sibley admitted to a seat. March 3rd, the bill organizing Minnesota passed. March 19th, its territorial officers appointed. June 1st, Gov. Ramsey declared, by proclamation, the Territory organized. September 3rd, the first territorial legislature assembled. November 15th, the Minnesota Historical Society organized.
- 1850. Great flood this year; highest water ever known. Minnesota river first navigated by steamboats. Census shows 6,077 inhabitants.

- 1851. Location of the capital, university, and penitentiary; another flood. July 23rd, treaty of Traverse des Sioux completed, and August 5th the treaty of Mendota, opening the territory west of the Mississippi to settlers.
- 1852. June 23rd, the treaties ratified by the United States Senate.
- 1853. Pierce's administration. W. A. Gorman appointed governor. The capitol building completed.
- 1854. Celébration of the opening of the Rock Island railroad, the first road to the Mississippi river, by a mammoth excursion, reaching St. Paul June 8th. Large immigration this season and the three succeeding ones, and the real estate mania commences.
- 1857. Enabling act passes Congress, February 26th. Gov. Samuel Medary (appointed by Buchanan) arrives on April 22d. Legislature passes a bill to remove the capital to St. Peter, but it fails to accomplish the object. Inkpaduta massacre at Springfield (now Jackson), March 26th. Land grant passes Congress. April 27th, extra session of the legislature to apportion land grant. July 13th, constitutional convention assembles. Real estate speculation reaches its height, and is checked by the financial panic, August 27th. Great revulsions and hard times. Census shows 150,037 population. October 13th, constitution adopted and State officers elected.
- 1858. State loan of \$250,000 negotiated. Five million loan bill passed by the legislature, March 9th; ratified by vote of people, April 15th. Great stringency in money market. State admitted May 11th. State officers sworn in, May 24th.
- 1859. Hard times continue. "Wright County War." "Glencoe" and "Owatonna" money issued. Work on the land grant roads ceases. Collapse of the five million scheme. First export of wheat this fall. Hard political struggle; the Republicans triumph.
- 1860. Another warm political canvass. Federal census, 172,023.
- 1861. April 15th, president's proclamation for troops; the first regiment recruits at once; June 22d, it embarks at Fort Snelling for the seat of
- 1862. Call for 600,000 men. July 2d, first railroad in Minnesota in operation, between St. Paul and Minneapolis. August 17th, murders by Sioux at Acton; August 18th, outbreak at Lower Sioux Agency, eight miles east of Redwood Falls; 19th, New Ulm attacked; 20th, Fort Ridgely attacked; 23d, second attack on New Ulm; 30th, Fort Abercrombie besieged; September 2d, the bloody attack at Birch Coulee. September 23d, battle of Wood Lake; 26th, captives surrendered at Camp Release; military commission tries 321 Indians for murder, rape, etc.; 303 condemned to die. December 26th, 38 hung at Mankato.
- 1863. July 3d, Little Crow killed. General Sibley's expedition to the Missouri river; July 24th, battle of Big Mound; July 26th, battle of Dead Buffalo Lake; July 28th, battle of Stony Lake.

- 1864. Large levies for troops. Expedition to Missouri river, under Gen Alfred Sully. Inflation of money market. Occasional Indian raids
- 1865. Peace returns. Minnesota regiments return and are disbanded. In all 22,016 troops furnished by the State. Census shows 250,099 inhabitants.
- 1866-72. Rapid railroad building; immigration heavy; "good times" prevail, and real estate inflated.
- 1873. January 7th, 8th and, 9th, a polar wave sweeps over the State; seventy persons perish. September, the Jay Cooke failure creates another panic. Grasshopper raid begins and continues five seasons.
- 1876. September 7th, attack on bank at Northfield by a gang of armed outlaws from Missouri, three of whom were killed and three captured.
- 1877. Biennial session amendment adopted.
- 1878. May 2d, three flouring mills at Minneapolis explode; eighteen lives lost.
- 1880. November 15th, a portion of the hospital for the insane at St. Peter destroyed by fire; eighteen inmates burned to death, seven died subsequently of injuries and fright, and six missing; total loss, \$150,000.
- 1881. March 1st, the state capitol was burned. Within the next two years the second capitol, on the same site, was built, being occupied in January, 1883, by the legislature.
- 1883 August 21st, tornado in Olmsted county, most destructive at Rochester; many homes wrecked and 26 people killed.
- 1884. January 25th, the state prison partially burned.
- 1886. April 14th, a tornado strikes the cities of St. Cloud and Sauk Rapids, demolishing scores of buildings and killing about seventy people.
- 1887. Important legislation regarding the liquor traffic, common carriers, and elections.
- 1889. The legislature enacts the Australian system of voting in cities of 10,000 and over. The first electric street railway started in the State at Sillwater.
- 1890. United States census shows a population of 1,301,826. July 13th, an excursion steamboat returning from Lake City encampment foundered on Lake Pepin, and 100 people were drowned. July 13th, a tornado swept across Lake Gervais, in Ramsey County, demolishing several buildings and killing six people.
- 1891. June 15th, a series of tornadoes started in Jackson county, near the town of Jackson, traversing Martin, Faribault, Freeborn, Mower and Fillmore counties, on a line nearly parallel with, but from five to fifteen miles north of the Southern Minnesota division of the Milwaukee and St. Paul railway, doing a large amount of damage to farms and farm buildings, and causing death to about fifty people along the track of the storm.
- 1892. June 7th, national Republican convention held at Minneapolis. The Australian system of voting used at the November general election.

- 1893. The legislature authorizes the appointment of a capitol commission to select a site for a new capitol, and provides a tax of two-tenths of a mill for ten years to pay for the site and the erection of a building.

 A great financial crisis causes the failure of several banks and many mercantile and manufacturing establishments in the larger cities of the State. Rev. Edward D. Neill, historian of Minnesota, died September 26th.
- 1894. Forest fires start September 1st in the neighborhood of Hinckley, in Pine county, carrying death and destruction over nearly four hundred square miles of territory, destroying the towns of Hinckley and Sandstone, causing the death of four hundred and seventeen people, rendering homeless and destitute twenty-two hundred men, women and children, and entailing a property loss of about one million dollars.
- 1895. A census of the State was taken during the month of June, and the total population was found to be 1,574,619.
- 1896. The Red Lake Indian reservation was diminished to about a quarter part of its former area, and on May 15th a large tract of agricultural and timber lands formerly belonging to that reservation was opened for settlement.
- 1897. July 2d, the monument at Gettysburg to the First Minnesota Regiment was dedicated.
- 1898. July 27th, the corner stone of the new capitol was laid. Minnesota supplied four regiments for service in the Spanish war, being the first state, May 7th, to respond to the President's call. October 5th, the Pillager Ojibways attacked United States troops near Sugar Point, Leech lake.
- 1899. Semi-centennial of the Territory and State celebrated by the old Settlers' Association, June 1st, and by the Historical Society, November 15th.
- 1900. Population of Minnesota, shown by the national census, 1,751,394. Death of Senator Cushman K. Davis, November 27th.
- 1901. In the Pan-American Exposition, at Buffalo, N. Y., the superior exhibits of wheat, flour, and dairy products of Minnesota caused her to be called "the Bread and Butter State."
- 1902. August 23rd, the fortieth anniversary of the Sioux war celebrated at New Ulm. Monuments and tablets erected there and at other places in the Minnesota valley.
- 1903. Tide of immigration into Minnesota, particularly in northern and western sections. April 22d, death of Alexander Ramsey, first territorial governor, later governor of the state, United States senator, and secretary of war.
- 1904. Louisiana Purchase Exposition. Minnesota exhibits win many first prizes for flour, butter, fruits, iron ores, work of pupils in schools, etc.
- 1905. January 3d, the legislature convened in the new capitol. The population, according to the State census, June 1st, was 1,979,912.

- 1906. September 3d, Live Stock Amphitheater on the State Fair ground dedicated, with address by James J. Hill. Attendance at the Fair on that day, 93,199; during the week, 295,000.
- 1907. Folwell Hall, the new main building for the College of Science, Literature and Arts, of the University of Minnesota, completed at cost of \$410,000 for the building and its equipment. The total number of students of this University enrolled in all departments for the year was 4,145.
- 1908. The fiftieth anniversary of the admission of Minnesota to statehood was celebrated in connection with the State Fair, its attendance during the week being 326,753.
- 1909. Death of Gov. John A. Johnson after an operation, at Rochester, Minn., September 21st, 1909. Lieut. Gov. Adolph O. Eberhart sworn in as governor by Chief Justice Start, in the Supreme Court retiring room, at 11 o'clock the same day.
- 1910. Population of Minnesota, shown by the national census, 2,075,708. Death of State Treasurer Clarence C. Dinehart, June 8th. E. S. Pettijohn appointed to succeed, June 11th. Forest fires in northern Minnesota during the second and third weeks of October, in the driest autumn season of record, result in death to 29 people and the destruction of about \$2,661,265 of property. Spooner and Baudette villages were almost entirely wiped out.
- 1911. The legislature ratified the proposed amendment to the United States constitution for election of U. S. senators by popular vote. October 18th, George E. Vincent was inaugurated president of the University of Minnesota.
- 1912. The legislature in special session enacted a new primary election law and "corrupt practices" act. October 19th, the statue of Governor Johnson on the Capitol ground was unveiled.
- 1913. February 5th, former Governor Hubbard died in Minneapolis. June 16-20, the American Medical Association held in Minneapolis its sixty-fourth annual session.
- 1914. Prof. N. H. Winchell, state geologist, 1872-1900, died May 2nd. The total mileage of main line railways operated in this state was 9,002 miles, on June 30th, an increase of 54 miles from the mileage of 1913. July 4-11, the National Education Association held its annual convention in St. Paul.
- 1915. In November, the last bonds of indebtedness of the state resulting from the Five Million Loan bill for railroad building, enacted in 1858, readjusted by legislation in 1881, were paid and burned. December 30th, Governor Hammond died of apoplexy in Clinton, La.; and on the same day Lieutenant Governor Burnquist took the oath of office as his successor.
- 1916. In February, iron and steel manufacture and production of Portland cement, each on a very large scale, were begun at Duluth. May 29th, James J. Hill, railway builder, organizer of the Great Northern Rail-

- way system, died at his home in St. Paul. July 19-21, the National Prohibition convention was held in St. Paul, for the presidential campaign.
- 1917. April 6th, the United States entered the World War, which began in the last days of July, 1914. During nineteen months until the war closed, Minnesota gave 107,902 men in the army service, and 15,423 in the navy, the marine corps and coast guard, an aggregate of 123,325 troops. July 1st, Marion LeRoy Burton began presidency of the State University.
- 1918. May 11th, dedication of the building of the Minnesota Historical Society, erected by the state at a cost of \$500,000. September 25th, Archbishop John Ireland died. October 12-13, forest fires after a long drought, driven by a great wind, spread over large areas in Carlton county and the south part of St. Louis county, inflicting loss of 432 lives of agricultural settlers and residents in many villages, with vast destruction of property. August 22nd, a tornado at Tyler killed 37 people, and caused property loss estimated at \$1,000,000. November 11th, signature of an armistice terminated the World War and opened a new era of reconstruction. The people of Minnesota owned 222,222 automobiles.
- 1919. June 22nd, a tornado in Fergus Falls and vicinity killed 62 persons, injured about 200 others, and inflicted losses of property estimated at about \$4,500,000. The Minnesota state fair, August 30 to September 6, had an attendance of 582,217.
- 1920. Population of Minnesota, by the national census, 2,387,125; of Minneapolis, 380,582; of St. Paul, 234,698; of Duluth, 98,917. July 1st, Lotus D. Coffman began presidency of the University of Minnesota, which for the year 1918-19 had an enrollment of 7,379 students.
- 1921. About 300,000 tourists spend parts of the summer in this "State of Ten Thousand Lakes."
- 1922. Cyrus Northrop, president of the State University from 1884 to 1911, died April 3rd, at his home in Minneapolis. The sixtieth anniversary of the Sioux massacre and war, in August, was celebrated at New Ulm, and at the State Park on the site of Fort Ridgely.
- 1923. April 28th, death of Knute Nelson, who was governor of this state in 1893-95, and later through twenty-eight years a United States senator. September 24th, death of Calvin L. Brown, who from 1899 was an associate justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court, and from 1913 its chief justice.
- 1924. The new library building of the University of Minnesota, opened to public use in June, has about 425,000 volumes, with space for two million volumes. November 15th, dedication of the stadium of this University, having capacity for an audience of 51,000, "in remembrance of the thousands of Gopher soldiers who answered the great call in 1917."

DESCRIPTIVE

NAME.

This state derives its name from the river called "Minisota" by the Dakotas, pronounced "Min-nee-sotah" (Mini, water; sotah, whitishly clouded, sky-colored). For correct pronunciation, the convention held at Stillwater in 1848, to secure a territorial organization, instructed their delegates that the name of the Territory be written Minnesota.

GEOGRAPHY.

Minnesota includes the geographic center of North America. The state is bounded on the south by Iowa, on the west by South and North Dakota, on the north by Manitoba and Ontario, and on the east by Wisconsin. It extends from latitude 43 degrees 30 minutes to 49 degrees 23 minutes, and from 89 degrees 29 minutes to 97 degrees 13 minutes west longitude. It is about 406 miles long, and from its most eastern point to the extreme western point about 358 miles wide. In a foot-note on article 2 of the State constitution, the boundaries are fully defined, with explanation of the part projecting twenty-six miles north beyond the forty-ninth parallel, at the west side of the Lake of the Woods.

AREA.

In area Minnesota is the eleventh state of the Union. It contains 84,286.53 square miles, or 53,943,379 acres, of which 5,637 square miles, or 3,607,680 acres, are water. The headwaters of three great river systems are found in its limits, those of streams flowing northward to Hudson bay, eastward to the Atlantic ocean, and southward to the Gulf of Mexico. About a third of this surface, on the south and west, consists of rolling prairie. The district north and west of Lake Superior has rich iron ore ranges. On the northwest border of this state, reaching also west into North Dakota and north into Manitoba, is the very fertile and broad Red river valley, formerly the bed of the Glacial Lake Agassiz, famed for its great harvests of wheat. This ancient lake, also its large Beltrami island, are shown by the map on page 222.

RIVERS.

Few states are so well watered as Minnesota. Its navigable rivers are the Mississippi, the Minnesota, the St. Croix, the Rainy river, the St. Louis, the Red River of the North, and the Red Lake river, all of which, near their sources, have valuable water powers. Smaller streams include the Rum river and Snake

river, the Cannon, Zumbro and Root rivers, the Vermilion, Crow Wing, Sauk and Elk rivers, the Blue Earth, Le Sueur, Des Moines, Cottonwood and Chippewa rivers.

LAKES.

Minnesota has about ten thousand lakes, the largest of which is Red Lake, with an area of 440 square miles, in the central northern part of the State. On the same northern slope, in St. Louis county, is the beautiful Vermilion lake. Adjoining the northeast part of the State for one hundred and fifty miles, the waters of the great Lake Superior wash its shores. On the southward slope of the State is Itasca lake, the source of the Mississippi, with Bemidji and Cass lakes, Lake Winnebagoshish, Leech Lake, and a multitude of others, all adding volume to the water of the Mississippi, eventually flowing into the Gulf of Mexico. There we have also Mille Lacs, about 200 square miles in area, the source of Rum river. The picturesque Lake Minnetonka, White Bear, Bald Eagle, the Chisago lakes, and very many more, have been much utilized as summer resorts. The northeastern and southwestern sections, likewise, have many lakes to attract the summer visitor.

ELEVATION.


The shore of Lake Superior is the lowest land in the State, 602 feet above sea level. The waters of the northeastern part of the State south of the Mesabi iron range, flow into Lake Superior, and are carried east to the Atlantic ocean. The Mississippi river, having its chief source in Lake Itasca, at 1,462 feet elevation, leaves the State at 620 feet above sea level.

The Red River of the North, beginning near Itasca, at a height of 1,500 feet above the ocean, leaves the State at an elevation of 750 feet. The average altitude of the State is about 1,250 feet. The highest elevations are the tops of the Misquah hills, near the center of Cook county, which rise about 1,630 feet above Lake Superior, or 2,230 feet above the sea.

CLIMATE.

Recorded observations through long series of years show that Minnesota has an annual mean temperature of 44 degrees, and its mean summer temperature is about 70 degrees, like that of middle Illinois, Ohio, and southern Pennsylvania. The high latitude gives longer days in summer than in states farther south, and during the middle part of the growing season there are two and a half hours more of sunshine than in the latitude of Cincinnati. The winters are not severe, and the rainfall during the summer is usually abundant.

Through all the eighty-seven years since considerable agricultural settlements were first made within the area of this State, its temperature and rainfall, though showing marked contrasts in different years, have always been so favorable for farming that there has been no instance of failure to secure at least a generally remunerative harvest, while most of the years have yielded very abundantly.

All of these parks are under the supervision of the state auditor except Itasca, under the state forester.

Minnesota, "land of sky-blue waters," with thousands of clear lakes set in virgin pine and other great forests and noted for scenic beauties, is developing rapidly as a recreation state. Every summer brings increases in the numbers of tourists and vacationists from virtually all parts of the country to enjoy Minnesota's playground attractions.

Minnesota forests, counted an important asset, stretch over hundreds of thousands of acres and are unbroken save where lakes or hogbacks split the areas. They abound with wild life which with the fish found in the lakes attract thousands of sportsmen.

For the small boy who bobs for perch or sunfish in the shallow lake waters, or for the scientific angler who drops deep for pike or casts for the great muscallonge, bass or other game fish, there is sport galore. The black bass specialist finds good sport in the lakes in the southern and north central

sections. Streams and lakes in the northeastern part abound in speckled and lake trout. Pike, crappies, sunfish and other varieties can be pulled out of the waters almost anywhere in Minnesota. Extensive commercial fisheries are located on the larger lakes in the north.

Big game is plentiful in northern districts; duck shooting is good on most lakes and marshes and every season in Minnesota furnishes sport for the man with gun or rod.

Accommodations ranging from modern hotels to mere hunting lodges and fishing camps, and including summer cottages and log cabins, are located less than a day's ride apart. Good roads are equipped with signposts to guide tourists and thousands find motoring in Minnesota a pleasure in the summer and fall months. Maps of roads, canoe routes and other like literature are easily procurable.

The state auditor and Highway Department has been engaged for years in exploiting Minnesota's recreational advantages. It is continuing the work and has been joined by the Minnesota Ten Thousand Lakes Association. All are ready to assist tourists and vacation parties to make their visits to Minnesota resorts most enjoyable.

Minnesota now has a number of state parks, acquired for their peculiar attractions and historical value, being improved and made available for recreational purposes, and there are also important federal reserves within its borders.

Itasca State Park of 32,000 acres of forest and lake area in the famous Lake Park region, has many kinds of fish, a herd of elk, colonies of beaver and much other wild life; embraces the headwaters of the Mississippi river; is noted for Douglas lodge, built from pine logs and offering ideal conditions for a healthful outing, and was established by the Legislature of 1891 and since has been enlarged by federal grants and acquisitions by the state. C. M. Roberts, superintendent.

Burntside Forest, a 20,000 acre tract of rocky, non-agricultural land containing 43 connected lakes and located 10 miles from Ely, near Burntside Lake, in a region famed for big game and good fishing, was granted to the state by an act of Congress, April 28, 1904, for tree propagation and playground purposes.

Pillsbury Forest, located in Cass county and near Gull Lake, comprises 1,000 acres of cut-over, non-agricultural land, donated in 1899 by the estate of the late John S. Pillsbury, and now is being replanted to Norway and white pine by the state forest service.

Interstate Park at the Dalles of the St. Croix, a tract of 150 acres at Taylors Falls, is opposite a 6,000-acre Wisconsin state park, with which it shares the scenic grandeur of a chasm with cliffs from 75 to 150 feet high through which flows the St. Croix River. It was set aside by the Legislature of 1895. Charles M. Truesdell is superintendent.

Minneopa State Park is a 60-acre tract four miles west of Mankato, with two waterfalls only a few rods apart over which the creek water drops 60 feet into a gorge surrounded by high hills. The name is the Indian word for "two falls," and to them are attached many Indian legends, the names of great Indian chiefs, pow-wows and the romantic wooing of the Indian maid. Established by the Legislature of 1905. John W. Ellis is superintendent.

Alexander Ramsey State Park, at the junction of Ramsey creek with the Redwood river, is at Redwood Falls. With winding streams and magnificent falls, it is one of the prettiest state reservations. It was named after Alexander Ramsey, first governor of the territory and second governor of the state of Minnesota. The park is surrounded by points of interest connected with the Indian outbreak of 1862.

Fort Ridgely State Park, in Nicollet county, 20 miles southeast of Alexander Ramsey Park and on the field of the first engagement of the 1862 Indian uprising. Between here and Alexander Ramsey Park is located the stone building which was the agency post and most important structure of frontier days and nearby are the sites of the early trading points, the Indian stone church, Birch Coulee battlefield, Brown's castle and several others marked by monuments.

The Fort Ridgely monument, built of granite and bronze, with a legislative appropriation of \$3,500, was dedicated Aug. 22, 1896, on the 34th anniversary of the defense of the fort against the Sioux. On the shaft, 12 feet square at the base and 42 feet high, is inscribed an account of the siege and attack with a list of the garrison of soldiers, the armed citizens, and the women who aided in the defense.

In the Fort Ridgely cemetery is a monument 16 feet high, dedicated August 20, 1914, as a memorial to an Ojibway chief of the Mille Lacs band, Mou-zoo-mau-nee, who with other Ojibways persuaded that tribe of Northern Minnesota from joining the Sioux outbreak and massacre in 1862, and a monument to John S. Marsh and his party who were nearly annihilated at the lower agency.

Camp Release State Park is located one mile southwest of Montevideo, in Lac qui Parle county. In it is located a granite monument, fifty-one feet high, dedicated July 4, 1894, and commemorating the release September 26, 1862, of 269 prisoners, mostly women and children, from captivity among the Sioux Indians.

Traverse Des Sioux State Park is situated near a ford of the Minnesota river, whence Traverse village and township in Nicollet county also were named, and where a treaty with the Dakotas or Sioux was made in 1841 by Governor James D. Doty, of Wisconsin, but failed of ratification in the United States Senate. Ten years later, on July 23, 1851, a treaty with the Wahpeton and Sisseton Sioux of the Minnesota Valley was concluded here by Governor Ramsey and Colonel Luke Lea, whereby the Indians ceded to the United States for white settlement, the greater part of their lands in southern Minnesota. This treaty with changes was duly proclaimed February 24, 1853, by President Fillmore. The park contains a commemorative tablet of bronze erected in 1914 by Captain Richard Somers chapter, Daughters of the

American Revolution, St. Peter. The signing of the treaty is depicted in a painting by Frank D. Millet, displayed in the governor's reception room at the capitol.

Sibley State Park, one of the newer state acquisitions, embraces about 355 acres located north of Lake Andrew, Kandiyohi county, and in the Monongalia game refuge. It is one of the most beautiful and picturesque places in the state. Virgin hardwood forests clothe the rugged moraines, including "Mount Tom," on which a tall flagstaff has been erected. The legislature of 1919 appropriated \$25,000 for the purchase of the property. The park was named in honor of the late Governor H. H. Sibley, who found much pleasure in hunting and fishing in the district and frequently referred to it in his writings.

Horace Austin State Park is located at Austin and named in honor of the sixth governor of Minnesota. It consists of 50 acres on the Red Cedar river and includes a number of deeply wooded islands. The park marks the historical site where camped Companies B, H and I, of the First U. S. Dragoons in 1835. The following year it was visited by a party of hunters from Fort Snelling, headed by Major Laurence Taliaferro and Dr. John Emerson, with whom was a slave, Dred Scott, who later became famous through the "Dred Scott" decision. In 1846, H. H. Sibley, Alexander Faribault, W. H. Forbes, John C. Fremont and a party of Sioux Indians camped here and in 1841 Sibley, as agent for the American Fur Company, with Sioux Indians camped on the site and spent the winter trapping and hunting. Sibley's diary shows they got 2,000 deer, 50 elk, 50 bears and a few buffalo.

Jay Cooke State Park is in Carlton county. More than 3,200 acres have been secured through gifts and purchase. It is a remarkably beautiful place near Duluth. F. R. Paine is the superintendent.

Toqua Lakes State Park in Graceville has been platted and a landscape architect has prepared a plan for bringing out the natural beauties of the site. The Legislature of 1917 designated the governor, state auditor, secretary of state and R. A. Costello, of Graceville, a commission to acquire the park property, and voted an appropriation which was vetoed by the governor. The Legislature of 1919 appropriated \$5,000 for the same purpose and the project was advanced. Parcels were given by the Keating and Hickey estates, and others acquired, and the boulevard is named "Keating" and a tract is called "Hickey Park" in honor of the donors.

Whitewater State Park, established by the Legislature of 1919, is in Elbo township, Winona county. An appropriation of \$10,000 for acquisition and expenses was made and the commission was made up of the governor, state auditor and A. C. Gooding, of Rochester. The name is a translation of the Dakota or Sioux name, "Mini-ska."

Sleepy Eye Lake State Park was created by the Legislature of 1921 by merely taking over the Sleepy Eye City park property within the city limits, which park property fronts on Lake Sleepy Eye. The park comprises only a few acres, but has been well equipped.

Scenic State Park was authorized by the 1921 Legislature and is located well to the north in Itasca county. In the park is included most of the shore line of two lakes—Sanwick and Coon—and about half of the shore line and park property is on state-owned lands.

Birch Coulee Monument, near Morton, is not a state park in reality, but is the site of two large, impressive monuments to commemorate one of the greatest battles of the Sioux Uprising of 1862, in which hundreds of white settlers in Minnesota lost their lives.

Garvin Heights Park is a beautiful tract of land of about 12 acres situated on the high bluffs south of Winona Lake and is the nucleus of a high line drive and park affording a wonderful view of Winona and surrounding country. This was donated to the State by Hon. H. C. Garvin, of Winona, and has cost the State nothing.

John Latsch Park. This is a tract of land containing about 600 acres near the town of Minneiska and about 10 miles northwest of Winona on State Highway No. 3 and bordering on the Mississippi River. This is a magnificent tract of land and will prove to be a valuable addition to the State Park system. This was donated by the Hon. John Latsch, of Winona, and cost the State nothing.

Bemidji State Park on Lake Bemidji, Beltrami county, is a tract of forest land containing 421 acres and was recently purchased by act of the Legislature of 1923, appropriating \$45,000 for the purpose.

Pillsbury Forest, a tract of approximately 1,000 acres in Cass county, southwest of Gull Lake, donated by the Pillsbury Estate. No expense to the State. No improvements yet made.

Pipestone State Park, so-called, is a tract of 22 acres in the famous Pipestone Indian Reservation in Pipestone county, Minnesota, which Congress will be asked to set aside for a park to perpetuate the historical points therein contained.

REFORESTATION

Forestry or timber growing is a business and occupation that is here to stay and must be so recognized. Public sentiment towards forestry, forest protection and timber production has had a greater impetus the last two years than has obtained in any equal length of time in this country. Timber manufacturers, with the assistance of Forest Service laboratories and research, have revolutionized both the utilization of forest products and the methods of manufacture. Although wood substitutes are being developed, more new and important uses for wood itself are coming in daily. We need no longer look to Europe for demonstration of successful reforestation and timber growing projects, since we have in our own Eastern and Southern States, many plantations of trees twenty-five to fifty years old which were established purely for timber production and which have been continuously managed for that purpose with gratifying results.

However, there must be moulded in the public mind a better sentiment and sympathy for the protection of privately owned timber, particularly as against trespass, fire and unjust taxation.

The forests and forest lands of Minnesota need no public subsidies, but do need a fair chance to expand and produce. Minnesota forests are fortunately situated as to location. Minnesota has substantial industries and capital enough to consume the major portion of raw products both from the farm woodlot and the big forests; it has a large agricultural region within its own borders that needs the products of the woods; it has the vast prairie regions of adjoining states as a market for surplus timber products and which form a strong barrier between Minnesota timber and that manufactured from the forests of the West and South. The citizens, labor and the many manufacturing interests of the State should unite at this time in a program of greater forest protection and production.

III.

EXECUTIVE AND ADMINISTRATIVE.

THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

The constitution of the state provides that these officers shall be elected for two years, except the state auditor, whose term of office is for four years. They constitute the executive department.

The Governor. The duties of the governor are prescribed by the constitution and the laws of the state. The office assistants of the governor are a private secretary, executive clerk, two stenographers and executive messenger. Connected with the executive office is the appointment of notaries public.

The Lieutenant Governor is ex-officio president of the senate, and has no other duties to perform, except in a protracted absence of the governor from the state he may be called to act. In case of vacancy in the office he becomes governor during said vacancy.

The Secretary of State is the recording officer of the state and the official custodian of official papers. All the private and public corporations of the state are recorded, and the official bonds of all state and county officers are filed in this office. He is the custodian of all the volumes of laws and journals and all the legislative records of whatever nature as well as the United States government surveys of Minnesota, recently turned over to the state. The whole machinery of state elections and the final canvassing of votes is carried forward in his office. The preparation of the volumes of law for publication is part of his duty, and the care and disposition of all printed executive documents of the state. His office is the place of registration of motor vehicles. For the general purposes of the office, the clerical force is an assistant secretary, a chief clerk, one record clerk, a clerk of government surveys, a document clerk, a general clerk, a motor vehicle license force and other employees.

The State Auditor has charge of two departments of the government, the auditing department and the land department. The auditing department is to keep a record of all public accounts, audit all claims presented, and issue warrants in payment. He has charge of the tax law, makes all the drafts for state taxes, and keeps an account of the same, and is required to make a detailed and exhaustive report of the affairs of his office to the legislature.

The duties of the land department are the care and sale of school, university, agricultural, college and swamp lands; the leasing of mineral lands; and the making out and record of all deeds and conveyances for the disposition of lands, besides keeping a classified account of all money transactions connected with these lands. He has supervision of the state parks.

The Treasurer is the receiving and disbursing officer of the state. His duties are defined by law to keep an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements of the treasury, specifying the names of persons from whom received, to whom paid, on what account the same is received and paid out, and the time of such receipt and payment. For all payments into the state treasury by county treasurers he issues two receipts, one to the treasurer and the other to the county auditor.

The Attorney General is the legal adviser of all the departments of state and counsel for the state or departments in all suits at law; prosecutes all official bonds of delinquent officers; prepares all forms of contracts; receives reports of criminal actions in all the counties of the state from the county attorneys, and makes a biennial report to the legislature. His staff is made up of a deputy attorney general, under a 1917 act, and a number of regular and special assistants.

ADMINISTRATIVE.

The Department of Public Examiner was created in 1878. The public examiner is appointed by the governor for the term of three years. It is required that he shall be a skillful accountant. The duties of this officer, being of a fiduciary character, his bonds were fixed at \$25,000. The law gives him almost unlimited power in the examination of the accounts of public officers, state, county, city, village and school district and the prescribing of systems of accounting. He also examines railroad, express, sleeping-car and telephone companies on their earnings returns for taxation purposes. The law providing for the department of public examiner was re-enacted in 1913 with important amendments.

The Insurance Department was organized in 1872. The department has supervision of all classes of insurance companies, doing business in the state. The commissioner is required to examine each domestic company at least once in two years, and he may examine foreign companies whenever in his opinion such examination is necessary. By the provisions of a law passed in 1913 the commissioner is given authority to pass upon securities issued by insurance companies doing business in this state.

Department of Banking. By an act of the 1909 legislature the visitation of state banks, etc., was divorced from the public examiner's office, and a new department under the above caption created. By the act the superintendent of banks, or his deputies, is given authority to visit each of the banking, savings and other moneyed corporations created under the laws of this state, and thoroughly examine into their affairs and ascertain their financial condition at least twice in each year. His term is for three years.

The Dairy and Food Department is charged with the enforcement of the dairy and food laws, also special laws regulating the manufacture and sale of feeds for domestic animals, the sale of commercial fertilizers, the sale of cigarettes and prohibiting fraudulent advertising. Its aim is to prevent fraud and deception in the manufacture of food and drinks and of feeds for domestic animals. The commissioner and inspectors have access to all places where foods are manufactured, stored or kept for sale and is authorized to take all proper educational measures to foster and promote the manufacture and sale of pure food products.

The state oil inspection division in 1919 was placed in the dairy and food department. The act authorized the commissioner, with the approval of the governor, to appoint a chief oil inspector and extended the latter's term of office to four years from two years.

The Fire Marshal Department was established by the Legislature of 1905 to enforce laws relating to fire prevention, storage, sale and use of combustibles and explosives; adequacy of exits in buildings in which people congregate; to investigate fires of a suspicious nature and prosecute arson cases; and to compile statistics on the origins and circumstances of fires and resulting losses of life and property. The law was revised in 1913, the governor being authorized to appoint the fire marshal and first assistant. An effort to consolidate the fire marshal's office with the department of insurance failed in the 1917 session, but was practically effected by the governor. A 1919 revision provides that the fire marshal shall be appointed by the commissioner of insurance.

Hotel Inspection. All hotels, restaurants, boarding houses, lodging houses and places of refreshment in Minnesota are subject to inspection and licensing by the state hotel inspector, under a 1919 revision of the law creating that office. The inspector is appointed by the governor for a two-year term. He is required to inspect places under his regulation at least once a year and may enforce sanitary and other regulations relating to such places. License fees—\$3.50 each—are turned into the state treasury and the inspector and his assistants receive salaries.

Apiary Inspection. An inspector of apiaries at a salary of \$1,500 a year and such deputies as may be required, to be paid \$5 a day, but not more than \$500 in all in any one year, are provided for in Chap. 311, Laws 1911. The inspector has charge of the work of the suppression of contagious diseases among bees and is given large powers along that line.

State Library. The state library was originally established by an act of Congress creating the Territory of Minnesota in 1849. It is under the general supervision of the supreme court, and, though the scope of the library is not fixed by law, it has in fact been built up as a law and legislative reference library. It contains a fairly comprehensive collection of books of law, American, English, Canadian and Colonial. It also contains collections of Minnesota public documents and documents of other states and of the United States. It contains approximately 90,000 volumes. The state librarian is appointed by the governor for a term of two years.

The Department of Agriculture was created by the Legislature of 1919. It is in charge of a commissioner, appointed by the governor for a four-year term, and given a deputy and such other assistants as may be required. The duties of this department consist largely of regulatory work in connection with the agencies handling Minnesota farm products, the administration of the co-operate law, and the organization of co-operative marketing associations. It also administers the cold storage law. Agricultural statistics are collected, and it has power to establish grades for certain farm products. In co-operation with the federal bureau of markets it issues market reports and crop estimates, and in general encourages agricultural development in Minnesota. Under a special act it has conducted investigations relative to costs and trade practices in the necessities of life, issuing reports and recommendations relative to its findings. It has charge of weed inspection work.

COMMISSIONS AND BOARDS.

Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission is a state department exercising supervision over the rates and service of steam railroads, city street railways, suburban electric lines, express and telephone companies, also over weights and measures, grain inspection and weighing, commission merchants of grain and agricultural products, warehousemen in cities of the first class (other than grain and cold storage warehousemen), and public stock yards. The board is made up of three elective commissioners and its various departments have several hundred employees.

The first Minnesota legislation for the regulation of railroads was an act approved March 4, 1871, providing for a railroad commissioner to be appointed by the governor at a salary of \$3,000 per annum for a two-year term. Governor Austin appointed A. J. Edgerton, who served until March, 1875. The first statute was superceded by an act of March 6, 1874, creating a board of three commissioners, appointive by the governor for two-year terms and vested with broader powers. In 1875 the office was made elective with only one commissioner, but on March 5, 1885, the three-member commission appointive by the governor was restored and continued until 1899. The commission was made elective again in 1900 and in November 1899, Ira B. Mills, Joseph G. Miller and Charles F. Staples were elected to the offices. Eli S. Warner, first secretary, served from 1885 to 1888, inclusive; was succeeded by Tams Bixby, who resigned in September, 1890, and then A. K. Teisburg was appointed. Ten years later, A. C. Clausen was named secretary and he continued to hold the office until his death in 1921, when Thomas Yapp succeeded him.

The authority of the commission has been extended from time to time to cover lines enumerated in the first paragraph.

Grain Inspection. Minnesota has had a system of inspection, weighing and registration of grain since June 1, 1885. The department is in charge of a chief inspector, appointed by the railroad and warehouse commission, employs about 415 deputies, weighers and other assistants and has supervision of county and terminal warehouses. The state is divided into three principal inspection districts—Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth—but inspection or weighing service or both are established at 28 other places within and five places outside of the state. Each main district has a chief deputy inspector with as many assistants and helpers as the work requires.

Boards of Grain Appeals. Two of these boards are maintained, one at Minneapolis and the other at Duluth. Each board consists of three members, appointed by the governor for three-year terms, one being named each year.

The boards are required to meet annually in joint session to establish grades of all grains to be known as "Minnesota Grades." Appeals may be taken to these boards from the decisions of the inspectors as to grades and dockage.

Weights and Measures. This department was created by the legislature of 1911, and placed under the railroad and warehouse commission. The commissioner of weights and measures and a corps of inspectors are employed. Weights and measures conform to the United States standards.

Telephones. The Legislature of 1915 conferred upon the railroad and warehouse commission powers over Minnesota telephone systems similar to those exercised by it over railroad and express companies. The telephone department is under a supervisor with a staff of seven aids. It concerns itself with the rates and service of about 2,000 telephone companies operating in the state. The commission through this department has completed a statewide investigation and valuation to determine and establish reasonable rates and charges for all classifications of telephone service.

Stock Yards. Public stockyards in Minnesota were placed under the jurisdiction of the railroad and warehouse commission by an act of the Legislature of 1919. Authority was given to regulate rates and charges, require additional facilities and supervise weighing in all public yards and to license live stock commission merchants and control their trade practices. Employees include the chief supervisor, assistants and weighers and inspectors Federal control in 1922 superseded the state control, but the state weighers were continued.

Commissioner of Highways. The State Highway Commission, as such, was abolished by the 1917 legislature and one commissioner was provided for, to be appointed by the governor and to be known as "Commissioner of Highways" upon whom devolved all powers, rights, duties, privileges and obligations theretofore imposed upon the State Highway Commission. The offices of "Secretary of the Highway Commission" and of "State Engineer" were likewise abolished.

The Minnesota Tax Commission, created in 1907, exercises general supervision over the administration of the assessment and taxation laws of the state, over assessors, town, county and city boards of review and equalization, and all other assessing officers. It is given power to issue instructions and directions to local assessors. All public officers are required to report to it as to the assessment of property and collection of taxes received from licenses and other sources.

Game and Fish Commissioner. The administration of the laws relating to wild animals is made the duty of a state game and fish commissioner, appointed for a term of four years by the governor. Other employes and officers of the department include a superintendent of fisheries, superintendents of the several hatcheries, and a force of wardens. The state game code was revised and re-enacted by the legislature of 1919.

Board of Inspectors of Steam Vessels and Boilers. It is the duty of the inspectors to inspect all steam vessels and steam boilers in use in the state

and to grant certificates of license to steam engineers. The board meets once a year in St. Paul to establish regulations for the inspection of vessels and boilers, etc. Masters and pilots are examined and licensed by the inspectors. Inspectors retain 50 per cent of fees and turn the balance into the state treasury.

The Minnesota State Board of Immigration was created by an act of the legislature approved April 22nd, 1907. The act provides that the governor, auditor, and secretary of state shall be ex-officio members, and they are empowered to select two additional members to hold their offices for the term of two years. The duties of the board are to collect, arrange and disseminate statistics and other information in reference to the lands and general and special resources of the State of Minnesota, and the advantages of this state as a place of residence.

Printing Commission. The public printing of the State of Minnesota is under the control of commissioners of printing, comprising the secretary of state, state auditor and state treasurer.

State Forestry Board. The legislature at the 1911 session repealed all laws enacted prior to that time relating to a forest and fire commissioner, and placed an entirely new law on the statute books which makes provisions for a forestry board of nine members. The board elects a secretary and a state forester, and has general charge of the state forest service.

State Board of Timber Commissioners. The governor, treasurer, auditor, state forester and attorney general constitute this board. The governor is chairman of the board and the auditor secretary. Its duties are the care, conservation and sale of state timber.

Commissioner of Drainage and Waters. The legislature of 1919 abolished the state drainage commission, as such, and created the office of commissioner of drainage and waters, to be appointed by the governor. Upon the commissioner devolves all powers, rights and duties previously exercised by the commission, and other duties prescribed by the act creating the department.

The State Board of Investment consists of the governor, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general, and president of the board of regents of the state university. This board controls the investment of the trust funds in the state treasury, and no purchase or disposition of securities can be made without its favorable action. The 1917 legislature provided for a permanent secretary.

State Board of Audit. The governor, secretary of state and attorney general constitute this board. It is required to audit the accounts of the state treasurer at least four times a year. A report of the examination is made to the legislature the third day of the session.

State Board of Deposit. The state treasurer, secretary of state, state auditor, attorney general and public examiner make up this board. The board is required to designate the banks in which state moneys are to be deposited approve their bonds, and prescribe the maximum amount to be deposited in each.

State Board of Parole. This board was created by the 1911 session, with power to parole prisoners from the state penal institutions, after a certain portion of the time has been served. The same act provides for the indeterminate sentence plan. The board consists of a member of the board of control oldest in the point of service, the warden at the penitentiary, and a third to be appointed by the governor.

The Board of Pardons was created by Chapter 23 of the General Laws of 1897, and consists of the governor, chief justice of the supreme court and the attorney general. It has power to grant pardons and to commute the sentence of any person convicted of any offense against the laws of this state. The board meets quarterly, in January, April, July and October.

State Board of Law Examiners. This board consists of not less than five nor more than seven attorneys at law, appointed for a term of three years by the justices of the supreme court. Its officers are a president, secretary and treasurer. It is required to hold public examinations of persons desirous of being admitted to the bar and report to the supreme court at least three times a year. Certificates authorizing the holder to practice law are issued by the board upon an order by the court.

Board of Visitors. This board was created by the 1907 legislature. Meetings are held quarterly or oftener if required. The members are required to study the care and management of charitable and correctional institutions and visit those within the bounds of the state. The governor may order the board to investigate any penal or charitable institution. The report of any such investigation is to be made to the governor and transmitted to the legislature.

Board of Women Visitors for the Minnesota Home School for Girls. This is an advisory board appointed by the governor, and consists of five women. It advises with the board of control with respect to buildings to be erected for the Home School and is required to visit the institution twice a year, inspect the cottages and inquire into the condition and treatment of the inmates.

Advisory Commission for the State Sanitarium for Consumptives. This commission consists of five physicians, one of whom must belong to the homeopathic school, appointed by the governor for a term of five years. All plans for public tuberculosis sanitoria must be approved by the advisory commission. The commission appoints examining physicians, not more than three from each county, to pass upon applications for admission to the institutions under its supervision.

State Board of Accountancy. Provision for this board was made by the legislature of 1909. It consists of three skilled accountants appointed by the governor for a term of three years. It is authorized to grant certificates to persons who have successfully passed an examination in accounting, auditing and commercial law affecting accounting.

State Board of Health and Vital Statistics. The revised laws of 1913 materially enlarged the duties of this board. In addition to its duties rela-

tive to the commonly accepted contagious diseases, it has authority to deal with the manufacture into articles of commerce, other than food, of diseased animal or vegetable matter; scavengering, disposal of sewage; location of mortuaries and cemeteries, removal and burial of the dead; pollution of streams and other waters; the sanitary construction, equipment and conduct of all public institutions, of lodging houses and other public sleeping places kept for gain, the collection, recording, and reporting of vital statistics, and the adoption of rules and regulations generally for the safeguarding of the public health. All health officers throughout the state must be medical men.

State Board of Medical Examiners consists of nine physicians appointed by the governor. The board must include three homeopathic physicians. It is authorized to grant licenses upon examination to persons desirous of practicing medicine, revoke licenses for cause, and license midwives. Examinations are held at St. Paul the first Tuesday in January, April, June and October.

The State Board of Dental Examiners consists of five practicing dentists appointed by the governor, each for a term of three years. Meetings are held at the college of dentistry of the state university in March and November, and other meetings at the pleasure of the board. The board is authorized to revoke licenses for cause.

The State Board of Osteopathy consists of five osteopathic physicians appointed by the governor. Its officers are a president and secretary. Its regular meetings are the second Tuesday of March and September. It is authorized to examine applicants and grant licenses to practice osteopathy.

The State Board of Pharmacy consists of five registered pharmacists actually engaged in the retail drug business, appointed by the governor for a term of five years. The state pharmaceutical association may recommend five names for each appointment to be made from which the governor may select. It has general supervision over all places where drugs, medicines and poisons are sold, compounded or manufactured. The board is required to meet at least once in every three months to examine applicants for registration as pharmacists and assistants.

The State Board of Optometry consists of five optometrists appointed by the governor for a term of three years. The board is required to meet at least once a year at St. Paul to examine applicants for certificates to practice optometry.

The State Board of Examiners of Nurses was provided for by the 1907 Session of the Legislature. The Board consists of five nurses appointed by the Governor for a term of five years. The Board may appoint a Director of Nursing Education. Examinations for the registration of graduate nurses are held semi-annually in Duluth, Rochester and St. Paul.

The State Barbers' Board consists of three members appointed by the governor, each for a term of two years. One of these must be recommended by a barbers' union. The board is required to hold at least one examination yearly in each of four different cities and to grant certificates to successful applicants.

The State Live Stock Sanitary Board was established by Chapter 352, Laws of 1903, consists of five members appointed by the governor, three of whom are persons financially interested in the breeding and maintenance of live stock. The remaining two members are graduate veterinarians practicing in the state. The duties of the board are to protect the health of the domestic animals of the state. The board is required to hold quarterly meetings in St. Paul. The secretary and executive officer, together with the field veterinarians, are required to be graduate veterinarians.

The Stallion Registration Board was created by the 1907 session of the legislature. It is made up of the professor of animal husbandry of the Minnesota College of Agriculture, the veterinary of the State Experimental Station and the president of the Minnesota Horse Breeders' Association. The act makes suitable provision for the inspection of all animals subject to registration and provides for a licensing of the animal by the board.

The State Veterinary Examining Board consists of five qualified veterinarians appointed by the governor for a term of five years. It is authorized to issue licenses upon examination to persons wishing to practice the veterinary profession.

The State Board of Electricity consists of five members appointed by the governor, each for a term of five years. Two members of the board must be master electricians, two journeymen electricians recommended by unions of the craft, and one a consulting engineer or electrical inspector of a city. The board is authorized to issue licenses to persons wishing to engage in the occupation of operating, installing or repairing electrical wires or apparatus after examination.

The State Board of Arbitration for the settlement of labor disputes' consists of three members appointed by the governor for a term of two years, one from among employers of labor, one not an employer recommended by a labor union, and a third who shall be neither employer nor a laborer on the recommendation of the other two.

Board of Armory Supervisors. The governor, brigade commander or adjutant general and the commanding officers of the several regiments and the battalion of field artillery compose this board. The duty of the board is to approve the selection of all armory sites, plans and specifications and to contract for the erection of armory buildings. All armories are under its supervision.

Automobile Board. A board of automobile examiners, appointed by the governor, has been provided for. This board holds examinations for chauffeurs at such times as may be designated by the secretary of state.

State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, as created in 1919, is made up of five members, graduates of different chiropractic schools and of at least three years' practice in Minnesota. It is authorized to license chiropractors and to revoke or cancel licenses for stated reasons.

State Board for Seed Potato Inspection and Certification was established by the Legislature of 1919, to perform the functions its name indicates.

It is composed of five members, the dean of the Minnesota College of Agriculture and the president of the State Potato Growers' association, as ex-officio members, and three others appointed by the governor, each for a three-year term. Fees for inspections and certifications are paid in to the state treasury and board members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for actual expenses.

The Minnesota Commission on the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Project was provided for in a joint resolution of the Legislature of 1919, to promote in conjunction with like commissions in other states the establishment of a deep waterway connection for ocean-going vessels between the Great Lakes and the Atlantic ocean. Five members named by the governor made up the commission and they serve without pay, although \$12,500 was set aside to defray expenses.

Minnesota Land and Lake Attractions Board was created and given a fund of \$15,000 by the Legislature of 1919 to carry on a publicity campaign exploiting and advertising the characteristics and true worth of Minnesota lands and the various attractions afforded by the numerous lakes of the state. It is composed of five members appointed by the governor and serving without pay.

State Board of Chiropody Examiners, established under a law of 1917, consists of five members, appointed by the governor, each for a five-year term. Its duties are to examine and license chiropodists to practice in Minnesota.


The Capitol Grounds Commission was created to acquire lands for enlargement and for beautification of the state capitol property in St. Paul. It is made up of three members appointed by the governor.

The State Relief Commission is composed of the governor, state treasurer and state auditor. It was created by the Legislature of 1919 during the special session to prevent public disasters and to provide relief for communities stricken by fire, flood or other like calamities.

Soldiers' Bonus. Under the provisions of Chapter 49, Extra Legislative Session Laws of 1919, there was created a Soldiers' Bonus Board consisting of the State Auditor, the State Treasurer and the Adjutant General. Under the provisions of this act, there were filed approximately 119,000 claims, of which approximately 108,000 were paid and 11,000 disallowed on various grounds. The original act was amended by the provisions of Chapter 471, Session Laws of 1921. Under these acts there was disbursed for Bonus Claims approximately \$22,000,000.00. The Legislature of 1923 reopened the Bonus Laws, under the supervision of the Adjutant General, for the period beginning April 19, 1923, and ending September 30, 1924. During this period there were received approximately 800 new claims, and a total of 5,000 old claims were reviewed. Of these classes there were paid approximately 2,000 claims, involving the expenditure of approximately \$580,000.00. An appropriation of \$850,000.00 was available, of which approximately \$270,000.00 was not

used. The Soldiers' Tuition authorized by the Legislature of 1919, and the Soldiers' Bonus authorized by the Legislatures of 1919, 1921 and 1923, became inoperative by Statutory provisions of June 30 and September 30, 1924, respectively.

Minnesota Rural Credit Bureau. The Bureau consists of three members, two of whom are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate, the third member being appointed by the Attorney General. The Bureau has the management and control of the system of Rural Credits provided for and established by Chapter 225, Laws of Minnesota, 1923. The purpose of the Rural Credit system is to promote agriculture, dairying, livestock raising and development of farm lands in this State.

Official National Guard Organizations

The Minnesota National Guard and the Minnesota Naval Militia are the official designations of the active military and naval forces of the State of Minnesota, of which Brigadier General Walter F. Rhinow is the Chief of Staff.

The passage of the National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, as amended by the Act of June 4, 1920, necessitated a complete reorganization of the National Guard of the United States as it existed prior to April 6, 1917. Under the provisions of the Act of June 4, 1920, the United States was divided into three army areas, each army area being sub-divided into three corps areas, making a total of nine corps areas in the United States, each with a population of approximately twelve millions of people. To each corps area was allocated six Infantry Combat Divisions, one Regular Army, two National Guard and three Organized Reserve Divisions, each consisting of approximately twenty thousand men. In addition there was allocated to each corps area certain G. H. Q., army and corps troops. These units were in turn allocated to the several states in the army or corps area.

In 1919 and 1920, a committee of General Staff officers, many of whom were National Guard officers, met in Washington and perfected the scheme of allocation of units. This scheme was submitted to the several states and territories in October, 1920, in a series of conferences held at each of the corps area headquarters. Minnesota finally approved her allotment under protest in December, 1920. Minnesota based her protest on receiving an allotment of only one infantry regiment, whereas three had been maintained heretofore. This protest was echoed by most of the states, wherein several states comprised the division. Attention is invited to the fact that in the four states comprising the 34th Division, namely, Minnesota, Iowa, North and South Dakota, there was in existence on July 15, 1917, ten regiments of infantry. Under the present plan, a combat division consists of only four regiments of infantry.

The strict enforcement of the plan of allocation would have meant either the conversion of two regiments of infantry in this state or their muster out. The difficulty was finally solved by granting to Minnesota a special allotment of two regiments of infantry. In accordance with the scheme of allocation of units as amended, Minnesota has organized and received Federal recognition for the following units:

Regular Allotment: State Staff Corps and Departments; Quartermaster Corps Detachment; Hdq. and Hdq. Battery, 59th Field Artillery Brigade; Hdq. and Hdq. Company, 68th Infantry Brigade; 151st Field Artillery; 125th Field Artillery, less three units; 135th Infantry; 109th Squadron (observation); Air Intelligence Section, 34th Division; Photo Section, 109th Squadron, 34th Division, Air Service.


Special Allotment: 206th Infantry, 205th Infantry.

Minnesota Naval Militia: Eight Divisions.

The National Guard now consists of 353 officers, 5 warrant officers and 4,658 enlisted men on the active list, and 39 officers on the reserve list, an aggregate of 5,105. The Naval Militia consists of 26 officers and 298 enlisted men, an aggregate of 314. These figures represent a drop in strength during the past year of approximately 400 enlisted men. This decrease in strength was caused by the limitations of strength imposed by the War Department owing to the lack of appropriations to maintain a National Guard in excess of 177,000 officers and men. The present strength of the National Guard in the United States being approximately 189,000 officers and men.

The National Guard of Minnesota is in excellent condition, as evinced by the reports of Federal officers detailed by the War Department to inspect and instruct the personnel. In comparison with the total amount spent on maintenance, Minnesota spends but very little, the bulk of the cost falling on the Federal Government.

Minnesota is well supplied with adequate armories. These armories are primarily intended for military use, but this office has indicated a policy of permitting civic organizations to use the armories whenever possible. This has resulted in the armories becoming real community centers and closer co-operation between the National Guard units and the communities.

THE JUDICIARY DEPARTMENTS.

THE SUPREME COURT.

The constitution provides that the judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish. This latter prerogative the legislature has exercised in the establishment of municipal and conciliation courts in the larger cities of the state.

The supreme court consists of one chief justice and four associate justices, elected by the people, and holding office for six years, and until successors are elected and qualified. The 1913 session of the legislature created two positions of commissioners of the court, these commissioners to be attorneys, and to perform such duties as the court should assign to them. Appointments to be made by the supreme court.


One term of court is held in each year, commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January at the capitol in St. Paul. On the filing of the record of the court appealed from and of the appellant's brief, the case is set for argument or submission on briefs as the case may be and notice of the date thereof given the parties. This court has original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity.

The clerk of the supreme court is an elective officer, the term of office being four years.

The reporter of the supreme court is an officer appointed by the supreme court to prepare the adjudicated cases for publication in official volumes, entitled, "Minnesota Reports."

Originally the reporter owned the exclusive copyright, and the reports were printed and bound at his expense, the state buying of him 200 copies of each volume at six dollars a volume. In 1881, an act was passed providing that the reporter should have no pecuniary interest in the reports, but that they should be published by contract and this is now the law. The copyright of the volumes already published vests in the secretary of state for the benefit of the people of the state, but the publisher is permitted to continue the publication and sale of such volumes so long as he complies with the requirements of law as to character and price of volumes.

The secretary of state is charged with the distribution of the volumes, one copy to each of the several departments of state, to each judge of the supreme court, and of the several district, probate and municipal courts,

and to the clerks of each district court, while the University of Minnesota receives 100 copies for the law department, and the state library receives a sufficient number for exchanges with other states and for the use of the library. The remaining copies stay in the custody of the secretary of state for further distribution by law.


THE LOWER COURTS.

The district courts are created by the legislature, the state being divided into nineteen judicial districts with one or more judges in a district, as the exigencies of business may require, and the judges are elected for six years. The district courts have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity; also, in criminal cases where indictments or presentments are made by grand juries, or informations filed by the county attorney.

The municipal courts generally have the power of disposing of all criminal cases for infraction of city laws, and for hearing and committing for trial on arrests for violation of state laws. Chap. 146, G. L. 1891, "An act relating to villages of over 3,000 inhabitants, and providing for municipal courts therein." By the provisions of this act a municipal court has jurisdiction in civil actions where amount does not exceed \$500; also, in all cases where a justice court has jurisdiction, and over certain criminal actions. Its jurisdiction is co-extensive with the limits of the county where located.

The probate courts are created by authority of the constitution, one for each county, and the judges to be elected by the people, for four years.* The probate court has jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, and the examination and commitment of insane persons to the asylums. The salaries of probate judges are fixed by law.

STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM.

Minnesota maintains a complete public school system from the kindergarten to the technical colleges of the university. The courses offered in the public schools are so varied that the youth of the state may receive the training necessary for economic production and effective citizenship. The system is so organized that students may progress from one school to another without loss of time and effort.

The State Department of Education has general charge of education in the rural, graded and high schools of the state. The department is organized and maintained under the direction of the state board of education composed of five representative citizens. The work of the department is directed by a commissioner of education, appointed by the board. The department of education is charged with the following responsibilities: Certification of teachers for all classes of schools; distribution of state funds under conditions prescribed by statute; supervision of schools, and promotion of sound policies of public education.

School activities authorized and encouraged with appropriations by the Legislature include:

- 1. State high schools maintaining a well-balanced four-year course.
- 2. Graded schools with four or more departments offering instruction in the eight grades.
- 3. High school departments for schools giving high school instruction but not meeting the requirements of a state high school.
- 4. Rural schools to encourage proper equipment and high standards of teaching in country districts.
- 5. Industrial departments of agriculture, home training, manual training and commercial training.
- 6. Vocational training to fit young men and young women to enter the industries.
- 7. Consolidation to encourage central schools in rural districts and to provide transportation for pupils and to promote the teaching of practical courses.
- 8. Libraries by assisting school districts in the selection and purchase of books.
- 9. Teacher training departments maintained in high schools of the state to prepare teachers for rural schools.
- 10. Placement of teachers through a teachers' employment bureau maintained in connection with the state department and at the service of local school officers and qualified teachers of any state.
 - 11. Rehabilitation and placement of persons injured in industries.
- 12. Special classes for defectives, designed to furnish in the local communities training to those handicapped.

- 13. Tuition paid by the state to districts for furnishing high school instruction to non-resident pupils.
- 14. Approval of plans for all school buildings by the department of education to insure proper sanitary and hygienic conditions in the schools.
 - 15. Institutes to train and interest teachers in the service.
- 16. Supplemental aid for districts burdened with a high tax for schools.

Local school districts in Minnesota receive federal, state and local support.

Federal support consists of appropriations under the Smith-Hughes act for vocational and trade instruction, and appropriations for the promotion of vocational rehabilitation of persons disabled in industry.

Federal support is given under the Smith-Hughes act for vocational and trade instruction and in additional appropriations for the promotion of vocational rehabilitation of persons disabled in industry.


State support is from the income on the permanent school fund and one-half the income from the state swamp land fund, from revenue derived from a one-mill state tax, and from biennial appropriations by the legislature. The appropriated funds are distributed in the form of special state aid to schools and departments. Income from trust funds and the state tax, is distributed to the districts according to the number of pupils enrolled in the public schools and attending forty or more days in the year.

Local support consists of a local tax upon the property of the district, including a one-mill tax required by law to be levied in each district.

State Teachers' Colleges are six in number, established by law to train teachers for the public schools. These colleges are controlled by a teachers' college board of nine members. The commissioner of education is ex-officio a member of this board. Other members are appointed by the governor for four-year terms. Each teachers' college is in the immediate charge of a president. The teachers' colleges are maintained by direct appropriations made by the legislature. The teachers' colleges:

Each teachers' college maintains a model or training school for elementary pupils to give college students an opportunity for observation and practice teaching under the most favorable conditions. The professional courses are: Advanced course of two years, open to high school graduates, and special three-year course with like entrance requirements.

UNIVERSITY MEMORIAL STADIUM


The University of Minnesota's new Memorial Stadium, situated on the main campus and seating 50,500 persons, was begun in March, 1924, and completed by Oct. 4 to a degree that permitted the Minnesota football team to meet North Dakota on that date in the first game of the 1924 season. In it Minnesota has for the first time an athletic field which is on a par with those of the other principal universities in utility and beauty, though it is less elaborate and far less expensive than the stadiums of Illinois, Ohio State, California, Harvard and Yale. The cost of the stadium to date, slightly more than \$700,000, has been defrayed from the gifts of students, faculty members, alumni, and other friends of the University of Minnesota.

The new Minnesota Stadium serves a purpose that is at least threefold. First of all, it is a memorial to the men and women of Minnesota, whether students or others, who have given their lives in war for their country. It is a memorial to those who fell in earlier wars as well as in the great war that provided the immediate occasion for its erection. In the second place, the stadium provides an outstanding symbol of the value of health, bodily activity, clean sportsmanship and earnest competition. Its third value is that it is a lasting refutation to the charge that University of Minnesota students have little spirit. The gifts which made the stadium possible put this charge into the permanent discard.

Funds for the building were obtained during a campaign that was conducted on the campus in the fall of 1922 and carried throughout the state the next spring. Total pledges received for the joint project of erecting an auditorium on the campus as a memorial to Dr. Cyrus Northrop, and a stadium, amounted to nearly \$2,000,000. Allowing for the usual shrinkage of performance under promise, there will be at least as much gift money left for the auditorium after the stadium has been paid for, as went into the construction of the stadium.

Besides providing a splendid field for football and track athletics which will assure all Minnesotans a chance to see games, the structure has a large amount of interior space which the athletic association will develop little by little for use as auxiliary gymnasium space, team rooms, locker rooms, coaches' headquarters, and the like.

Inasmuch as the University is part of the state, the stadium is a splendid gift to the state of Minnesota from its patriotic and appreciative citizens.

The University of Minnesota is the most widely known and most broadly serviceable institution maintained by the State of Minnesota.

Offering, as it does, the benefits of higher education and the consequent possibilities of advancement, to every boy and girl born in Minnesota who has the perseverance to complete a high school course or its equivalent, it holds out one of the great hopes for the future Minnesota, both to the young, who look forward to attendance there, and to the parents, who long to see further ambitions of their own fulfilled by the accomplishments of their children.

Although its enrollment at the end of December, 1924, made the University of Minnesota one of the largest institutions of higher education in the entire world, and although its recognized high rank in scholarship and accomplishment has long made it one of the best known universities, education at Minnesota can be obtained at a cost much below that required by conditions at the great endowed institutions of the East. Government statistics show also that the cost of living in Minneapolis and St. Paul'is consistently lower than it is in most of the other cities or towns where state universities, west or east, are established. Tuition charges at the University of Minnesota are well below those of endowed universities and colleges.

Official figures compiled by the registrar show that on December 13, 1924, a total of 15,496 men and women were studying in courses directed by the University of Minnesota. Of these 9,642 were students in the twelve schools and colleges that comprise the university proper. In the four schools of secondary grade, supported and supervised by the University, namely, the University High School, Central School of Agriculture, Northwest School of Agriculture, and West Central School of Agriculture, were another 927 students. Evening extension classes made up 3,434 of the total, members of classes taught by correspondence added 1,513, and at that particular time 25 students were attending one of the many short extension courses that are offered from time to time during each year.

Between December 15, 1923, and December 13, 1924, the increase in attendance at the twelve schools and colleges, which are the heart of the University, was from 9,265 to 9,642, or approximately 4 per cent. The increase in the preceding year was approximately the same.

Briefly described, the twelve colleges which make up the University of Minnesota, are as follows:

College of Science, Literature, and the Arts (Academic, College): This is the college in which students not specializing in a professional school study to obtain a liberal education in the broad cultural sense. Here also they take the preliminary work fitting them for admission to one of the professional or semi-professional colleges. (Four-year course.)

College of Agriculture, Forestry, and Home Economics: This college is to all intents and purposes described by its title. Men and women whose life work is to be agriculture, the allied profession of forestry, or the capable conduct of the home are here given the best possible opportunities to acquire expert knowledge based on the experience and research of generations. (Four-year course.)

Law School: A professional school to fit students for admission to the Minnesota bar and for the expert and ethical practice of law. Two years of work in the Academic College are required for admission. (Three-year course.)

Medical School: A professional school for training physicians and surgeons for service to the people of Minnesota. Two years of work in the Academic College are required for admission. (Five-year course.)

College of Dentistry: A professional school for training dentists and dental hygienists. One year of work in the Academic College is required for admission. (Four-year course.)

School of Mines: A four-year course of training in preparation for the profession of mining engineer.

School of Chemistry: A collegiate division of the University specializing in the science of chemistry.

College of Pharmacy: Devoted to the instruction of men and women who desire to become registered pharmacists under the laws of the State of Minnesota.

College of Education: A college specializing in the preparation of men and women to serve as teachers in Minnesota high schools, or as supervisors, principals or superintendents of Minnesota public schools.

School of Business: A collegiate division of the University in which are offered the courses in economics and allied subjects, together with specialized training that particularly fits the student to enter the business field.

Graduate School: The unit of the University of Minnesota in which students who have been granted the bachelor's degree at the completion of a four-year course can continue their studies along some specialized line, leading to the master of arts degree or to that of doctor of philosophy.

College of Engineering and Architecture: A college devoted to the technical education of those who desire to make a profession of engineering in any of several branches or of architecture.

Historically, the development of the various colleges has been outlined in the report of the survey commission, which is now available to citizens of Minnesota. This said:

"The University of Minnesota originally consisted of five departments, namely, the college of science, literature, and the arts, the law school, the school of medicine, the department of theory and practice of elementary instruction, and the department of agriculture. Actual instruction in some of these departments or colleges did not begin for many years after legal provision had been made for their establishment.

"The first charter of the University of Minnesota was provided by the territorial assembly of 1851. Changes were made in this from time to time until 1868, when the Legislature passed an amended act which constitutes the charter under which the University now is operating. The law school actually took form in 1888, the school of medicine in 1888, the college of dentistry in 1888, the school of mines in 1891, the college of pharmacy in 1891, the school of chemistry in 1897, the graduate school in 1905, the college of education in 1905, and the school of business in 1919. In the original plan of organization there were but five departments or colleges, now there are twelve.

"How the tiny school of the late sixties has grown to a great, cosmopolitan university cannot be told in a few words. The curriculum, the plant, the library, the faculty, the student body, the educational machinery, the administrative and business machinery, the finance, the experimental and research work, the publications of the University, each represents a large chapter in such a history.

"In the early days, the University consisted largely of an arts college. It provided general education. Training for the professions was secured through some modified form of the apprenticeship system which prevailed in that day, but gradually the knowledge in each of the professional fields was enlarged and the practitioners of the professions themselves began to set up standards for entrance, so that a certain amount of training was required of all recruits. Since then knowledge in the professional fields has grown more vast, more scientific and exact in character, the professional standards have been raised, and more and more training has been required of those desiring to enter the professions. The differentiation of the course of study into many different courses, the elaboration of these courses so as to provide satisfactory training and practice, are two explanations of the increased cost of the University, for professional schools must have laboratories if their work is to be carried on satisfactorily.

"The elaboration and expansion of various study courses and the establishment of professional schools have not taken place because of the whims or caprices of educators. They are the direct result in every case of pressure brought to bear upon the regents for the establishment of new units and the enrichment of the educational opportunities. In many cases the regents responded reluctantly to requests for the establishment of new units because they realized that new units always mean an added expense, but in every case the pressure was so insistent and the need so obvious, that it would have been unwise to have hesitated longer. A university is but the reflection of the people's desires. The fundamental desires of the people sooner or later find expression in the schools, particularly if they represent needs that emphasize justice, insure health, or are likely to increase wealth, improve citizenship, or advance knowledge."

In compliance with an act passed by the Minnesota Legislature on February 13, 1851, creating the University of Minnesota and making over to it the proceeds of all public lands that Congress might grant as an endowment, the institution was established "at or near the Falls of St. Anthony," a location which has long been a part of the City of Minneapolis.

The original site has been expanded until it extends for more than half a mile along the east bank of the Mississippi river. With the "old campus" as fully populated by university buildings as any pretense to beauty will justify, the regents have begun a policy of building on the more recently acquired property running from the center of the first campus, southward towards the Mississippi river across Washington avenue southeast. Here, with completion of the comprehensive building program already approved by the Minnesota Legislature, will be the new "mall" or central avenue of buildings.

The University Farm, a tract lying midway between Minneapolis and St. Paul, adjoining the State Fair Grounds, is the site of the College of Agriculture, Forestry, and Home Economics. It also is the headquarters for the Department of Agriculture.

Comprised in the Department of Agriculture are the following: The Central Experiment station, College of Agriculture, Forestry and Home Economics, the Central School of Agriculture, and the Agricultural Extension Division, all at the University Farm; the Northwest School of Agriculture, with an experiment station, at Crookston; West Central School of Agriculture and Experiment Station, at Morris; North Central Experiment Station, at Grand Rapids; Northeast Demonstration Farm and Experiment Station, at Duluth; Southeast Demonstration Farm and Experiment Station, at Waseca; Forest Experiment Station at Cloquet, and the Fruit Breeding Farm and Station at Zumbra Heights. Activities at the Central station include the annual Farmers' Week, short courses, and the centralization of many extension services.

Important among the activities of the University of Minnesota is the General Extension Service, a major division of the University, with which has been combined the department for correspondence study. The extension service conducts night classes and maintains offices in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth. Persons anywhere in the state who have met the requirements may enroll for the correspondence courses, which now number nearly 200. Credits attained by completing courses under the night extension or the correspondence instructors are equivalent, in most cases to those gained by attendance at regular classes. The extension division is maintained in part from the support funds of the University and in part from fees paid in by students who attend.

The University of Minnesota is governed by a board of thirteen regents, among them three ex-officio members, the Governor of Minnesota, the state superintendent of public instruction, and the president of the University. The other ten members, appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the State Senate, hold office for six years.

The Board of Regents has absolute control over all University of Minnesota affairs, save the erection of new buildings and the purchase of fuel. These items are under the supervision of the State Board of Control. The president of the University of Minnesota is the administrative head, and the chief finance officer is the comptroller.

Internal affairs of the University of Minnesota are governed by the University Senate, composed of the president, deans, all professors, including associate and acting professors, the comptroller, certain other administrative officers, and the University librarian. Some others who do not devote full time to university work are members without power to vote. The registrar of the University is clerk of the Senate and custodian of its records.

STATE BOARD OF CONTROL

The Minnesota State Board of Control was created by Chapter 122, General Laws of 1901, succeeding the former State Board of Corrections and Charities, Board of Trustees for the Hospitals and Asylums for the Insane, Board of Directors of the Minnesota Institute for Defectives, Board of Managers of the State Training School for Boys and Girls, Board of Managers of the State Reformatory, and Board of Managers of the State Prison. In 1917 all powers and duties conferred by law on the Board of Directors of the Minnesota Schools for the Deaf and the Blind, and the Board of Managers of the State Public School, were transferred to the Board of Control.

POWERS AND DUTIES

The Board has complete financial and general control over eighteen state institutions, viz.: The hospitals and asylums for the insane. School for Feeble-Minded, Colony for Epileptics, School for Blind, School for Deaf, State Public School, Training School for Boys, Home School for Girls, Reformatory, Reformatory for Women, Prison, Sanatorium for Consumptives, and Hospital for Crippled Children.

It has charge of the construction of buildings for the institutions under its full control, the University, Agricultural Schools and Stations, Teachers' Colleges, Soldiers' Home, State Fair, and County Tuberculosis Sanatoria.

It purchases all supplies for the institutions under its jurisdiction and for all governmental departments of the state; fuel for the University, Agricultural Schools and Stations, Teachers' Colleges, and Capitols; and equipment for County Tuberculosis Sanatoria.

It has charge of the state insurance fund, the appraisal of losses of state property by fire, and the repairing or rebuilding of the structures destroyed

It acts as a board of parole and discharge for the State Training School for Boys and the Home School for Girls.

The member oldest in service is ex-officio chairman of the State Board of Parole for the State Reformatories and the State Prison.

It has charge of the manufacture and sale of binder twine and farm machinery at the State Prison; and the operation of a granite quarry, a rock crushing plant, a clothing factory, and a woodworking factory, at the State Reformatory.

It collects the charge for maintenance of the insane; has supervision over paroled insane; and is charged with the deportation of non-resident insane.

It determines the legal residence of paupers.

It inspects jails, lockups, poorhouses, and infirmaries; examines all plans for new structures or for repairs; and has advisory supervision over all such institutions.

It appoints county child welfare boards.

It is the duty of the Board to promote the enforcement of all laws for the protection of defective, illegitimate, dependent, neglected, and delinquent children.

It inspects, investigates, and licenses maternity hospitals, infants' homes, and agencies for receiving and caring for children or placing them in private homes.

It has powers of legal guardianship over the persons of all children committed by the Courts to the care of the Board or to institutions under its management.

It is the duty of the Board to supervise and promote efficiency and uniformity in the administration of mothers' pensions.

It is charged with safeguarding the interests of illegitimate children; establishing their paternity; and securing for them the nearest possible approximation to the care, support and education that they would be entitled to if born of lawful marriage.

It investigates all petitions for the adoption of children, and visits the children and the homes in which they have been placed.

It is the duty of the Board to aid the blind of the state by home instruction and training; by assisting them in securing tools, appliances and supplies, and in marketing the products of their labors; and by extending care and relief to blind persons who are not capable of self-support.

It is charged with the administration of the soldiers' welfare fund; assisting ex-service men in establishing just claims for compensation, insurance, etc.; and providing emergency hospitalization, treatment, maintenance and relief for such persons.

It has general supervision over the state camp for disabled veterans of the World War and other wars.

MINNESOTA'S GOVERNMENT

Minnesota, known as The North Star State, because of the territory north of the Lake of the Woods being the northernmost land in the entire United States, has a government common to the other states.

Like the national government, the State Constitution, adopted in 1857, changing the Minnesota territory, organized in 1849, to a real unit of the United States, provides for legislative, judicial and executive branches.

As conditions have changed in the past 65 years, it has been necessary to broaden the powers and branches of government, especially as to commissions to care for the ever-increasing state institutions and for regulating industries which have sprung into existence since the state was created, such as railroads, street car companies, telephone, heating, lighting and power systems. The Constitution, as amended, provides for the present form of government.

The legislative branch of the state government is the Minnesota Legislature, with its forty-fourth session in 1925. There are 67 legislative districts, each of which has one member in the State Senate and from one to four members per district in the House, making 67 state senators and 131 House members. Senators and representatives are paid \$1,000 for each two-year period. The House members are elected every two years, while the state Senators are elected for four years each even year that is not a presidential election year.

The Legislature enacts the statutes, or laws which in no way conflict with the Constitutional provisions. In case it is considered necessary to pass laws not authorized by the Constitution, the Legislature submits an amendment to the Constitution to the people of the state, which must have a majority of all votes cast at that election. An example of this is the Trunk Highway system, known as the Babcock Good Roads' Law, adopted at the election November 2, 1920, and thereby made a part—Article XVI—of the Constitution.

The Legislature also makes appropriations for the support of schools, the University of Minnesota, state institutions, erection of state buildings and for other expenses. The Legislature delegates to the State Auditor power to fix the state tax rate and to levy a tax for state revenue purposes. No revenue tax was levied for 1921 for the first time, and again for 1922. The legislature meets every two years—in January of odd-numbered years.

The executive branch of the state government is headed by the Governor. The other state executives are the lieutenant governor, attorney general, state auditor, secretary of state and state treasurer. Their duties are fixed by the Constitution. An executive officer is not subject to the control or interference of the judiciary in the performance of duties belonging to him as an executive officer. The terms of the governor, secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general are for two years as is that of the lieutenant governor. The lieutenant governor is ex-officio president of the Senate and receives \$2,000 per two-year term. In case of a vacancy in the governor's office the lieutenant governor becomes the state's chief executive. Before the close of each Senate session a president pro tempore is elected, who shall be lieutenant governor in case of a vacancy.

The judicial branch of the state government consists of the Minnesota Supreme Court, district courts, probate courts, municipal courts, conciliation courts, justices of the peace and other courts that the Legislature creates, inferior to the Supreme Court.

The Legislature first provided for one chief and two associate justices of the Supreme Court, but permitted an increase to four associate justices. The justices are elected for six years. The work of the court so increased that it was considered necessary to add to the Supreme Court. As the Constitution limited the number to five, two court commissioners were added. Their duties are practically identical and the commissioners write opinions, but do not have a vote. The two commissioners took office April 1, 1913. They receive salaries of the same amount as the associate justices. A clerk of the Supreme Court is elected for a four-year term.

The district courts have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds \$100, and in criminal cases where the punishment exceeds three months. Justices of the peace and lower courts have jurisdiction in cases involving smaller amounts or less punishment. The Supreme Court has original jurisdiction in remedial cases as prescribed by law and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity, but there is no trial by jury in the Supreme Court, which is assured all litigants in the district and lower courts. All judges are to be elected except where vacancies occur by resignation or death, in which case the Governor appoints a successor until the next election.

As times have changed, due to new inventions, discoveries and rapid forward strides in population, it has been necessary for the state government to expand and to create new departments and increase the number of officials to care for the work. Among these departments is the Railroad and Warehouse Commission of three members, elective, in charge of railroads, telephones, street railway systems, the stockyards, grain inspection and other affairs.

Practically all of the other commissioners are appointed by the Governor, with many for six-year terms. These include the State Board of Control, which directs the seventeen state institutions for the criminal, the insane and the unfortunates, acts as purchasing agent for the state departments and supervises construction of buildings; the tax commission, which serves as a sort of appellate board to which tax payers may bring complaints for re-assessments and corrections of inequalities and which assists to fix the tax rates for general purposes; the State Securities Commission, which attempts to prevent the sale of any except legitimate stocks and bonds and which passes on applications for bank charters, requiring applicants to prove good character, ability and does not allow a field to be overcrowded. The Board of Control is composed of three members, one of whom, under the law, must be a woman.

A new commission of three members was created in 1921, the State Industrial Commission, which investigates into causes of labor troubles, strikes, and acts as a board of arbitration to avoid labor disputes. In this department have been consolidated the former departments of labor, minimum wage for women, arbitration board and similar state agencies. It also deals largely with the administration of workmen's compensation insurance. The Rural Credits Board, consisting of three members, was created by the Legislature of 1923.

Other departments are: the public examiner's, which examines the accounts of all state departments and has power even to check up on the Governor's contingent fund; superintendent of banks, which is to see that all banks are maintained in a solvent condition and which places an examiner in charge of an institution to guard the interests of depositors if the bank fails to maintain the legal reserves and standards required; the department of insurance, which examines and regulates insurance companies and licenses no companies until it is satisfied that the policyholders will derive all the benefits promised; the department of agriculture, which supervises, the expenditures of huge sums to assist co-operative groups of farmer's to market their products and to advise and co-operate with them to help them raise two blades of grass where one grew before; the department of education, which apportions the millions of state aid distributed annually by the state, fixes the requirements necessary for schools to share in this state aid, establishes standards of education and standards for teachers, and supervises, directs and inspects high, rural, graded and consolidated schools.

The foregoing are the principal commissions. Most of these commissioners receive \$4,500 a year, the same as the state executives except the Governor, who receives \$7,000 and the attorney general at \$6,000. The commissioner of highways, appointed, at \$6,000, directs the state highway construction work, expending approximately \$5,500,000 raised through the motor vehicle tax annually. Other important state departments are:

Department of weights and measures; state expert printer; state dairy and food department; oil inspection; state librarian; department of immigration; drainage and waters' department; game and fish commission; state board of investment; state hotel inspection; state fire marshal; state board of health and vital statistics; Minnesota forest service; department of public property.

In addition there are many boards, of which the Board of University Regents, in charge of the University of Minnesota, the state teachers' college board, boards of law examiners, medical examiners and board of grain appeals are the most important. These are appointed by the Governor.

The Ten Thousand Lakes of Minnesota Association is an important body which is working to develop the recreational advantages of the state's 10,000 lakes and thousands of acres of forests into the playground of the Northwest. There are other commissions and boards of minor importance, such as the voting machine commission.

The State Agricultural Society, in reality the State Fair Board, has charge of the Minnesota State Fair and for years it has been the greatest in America and has been of vast educational value. The Minnesota Historical Society also is an important state organization.

The county governments of the state are similar to those in other states with boards of county commissioners, auditors, treasurers, registers of deeds, county attorneys, judges of probate, surveyors, coroners, clerks of court, court commissioners and superintendents of schools in each county and some additional commissioners in Ramsey and St. Louis counties. Otherwise there are five commissioners in each county. The pay is not uniform, some of the larger counties paying more than the others.

Minnesota is one of the larger states, being the eleventh in area, with an average length of about 350 miles from north to south and an average width of 240 miles from east to west. It comprises 84,286 square miles, having 5,637 square miles of lakes and rivers, about 31,800 square miles of prairie, and, until largely cleared for farming, it had nearly 50,000 square miles of forest. It is from 602 to 2,230 feet above the sea level, and Federal reports show Minnesota's larger cities to be near the head of the list as ideal for health. The exploration of this area by white people was begun in 1655 to 1660, and a trading post was established near the outlet of Lake Pepin in 1689.

In the matter of financing, Minnesota is probably the most fortunate state in the union, having the largest trust funds of any state in the country except Texas and a reported higher net total than all of the states east of the Mississippi combined.

The various trust funds approximate 54 million. This includes approximately 9 million in land contracts bearing 4 per cent interest in the school, internal improvement, swamp and other land funds. The United States gave outright to the state 8,445.961 acres, of which 2,976,454 acres were for the common schools and 91,524 for the University.

The state government has closely guarded this great heritage and every cent ever received from the sales of land, timber and iron ore royalties is still in these funds. The school fund at the start of the fiscal year 1924 was \$33,145,164.76, and it is estimated that iron ore now under lease will add at least \$30,500,000 more. Much state land also remains to be sold to

further increase the funds. The university permanent fund is \$2,266,007.00 and ore now leased will almost double it. The swamp land fund of \$5,621,692 also will be about doubled, as well as the other trust funds.

The above permanent trust funds had a cash balance June 30, 1924, of \$2,049,026.46 to be invested. The above corrected figures are the exact amount of securities in the custody of the state treasurer.

There are two ore leases under lakes that will net about \$4,000,000 for the state.

During the war as much as 45,990,000 tons of iron ore were shipped from the state in a year or 62 per cent of the nation's total output. Almost a billion tons have been shipped from the state and more than 1,300,000,000 tons remain. One state-owned mine, the Missabe Mountain, near Virginia, covering 160 acres, contains 44,000,000 tons of commercial ore. This mine alone will yield the state school fund \$15,000,000. Minnesota has other considerable deposits of minerals, including copper in the extreme northeastern part of the state and there have been several gold rushes, only one—at Rat Root lake, which ever really paid.

While Minnesota is rich as a mineral state, its industries are diversified with agriculture the principal industry, although it has the greatest wheat flour mills in the world at Minneapolis, huge granite quarries, building stone, brick plants, sewer pipe and pottery works and raw materials for lime and cement. The commercial fisheries are no small item, producing millions of pounds of fish from Lake Superior and other lakes. Prof. E. K. Soper, formerly of the University of Minnesota, has estimated that there are more than 6,800,000,000 tons of peat, which might be made to serve the state as fuel.

The timber industry, while it has seen its best days in central and southern Minnesota, is still a large and important industry in the north, with the world's largest white pine mills at Virginia and others at Cloquet, International Falls, Bemidji and other places. The re-forestration program promises to keep Minnesota in the lumber-producing stage for an indefinite period.

Minnesota state taxes are lighter in comparison to the benefits received than most states—though taxes always are a sore point with the property owner, whether his taxes are low or high.

Minnesota taxpayers, taking the year ended 1924 for an example, paid in \$9,533,526.51 in taxes, while \$33,416,152.66 was returned directly or indirectly to the counties.

The state taxes collected directly for the year 1924 total \$9,533,526.51, while the indirect taxes totaled \$23,618,303.85, made up of railroad gross earnings taxes of \$8,418,971.25, telephone earnings' tax of \$686,280.68, telegraph companies' taxes of \$38,109.59, sleeping car companies' taxes of \$64,863.32, express companies' taxes of \$75,371.40, freight lines' taxes of \$44,523.31, insurances companies' taxes of \$1,237,669.50, inheritance taxes of \$902,854.33 and vessel tonnage taxes of \$7,054.95, occupation tax on iron ore

\$11,738,183.75, tax on iron ore royalties \$349,904.72, state fire marshal \$54.517.05.

Property is classified for taxation purposes according to what is generally considered the fairest basis. Iron ore is assessed at 50 per cent of true value; city property and platted real estate, 40 per cent of true value; farm lands, unplatted real estate, live stock, merchandise, manufactured goods, tools and implements, 33½ per cent, and household goods at 25 per cent.

The tax receipts for 1924 total \$9,533,526.51 distributed as follows:

While the state collected only about \$9,500,000 in direct taxes, it returned to the counties \$33,416,152.66, distributed as follows: State University, \$3.230,000; state aid to schools, \$5,657,393.17; apportional school fund, \$3,194,219.15; agricultural activities, \$654,556.33; soldiers' and sailors' tuition, \$80,687.36; State Board of Relief, \$109,108.77; state teachers colleges buildings, \$753;210.32; state roads and bridges, \$2,059,466.42; trunk highways, \$11,035,-498.23; state charitable and penal institutions, \$4,339,376.12; counties' share of inheritance taxes, \$139,589.39; state parks and monuments, \$60,523.99; national guard armories, \$162,279.98; state teachers colleges maintenance, \$797,350.00; aid to fire companies, \$205,186.20; wolf and horse thief bounties, \$66,548.50; drainage assessments, \$79,297.75; county sanatoria and commission, \$227,-871.81; livestock sanitary board refundments, \$335,864.12; relief of soldiers and sailors, \$228,125.05.

Taking the average tax dollar of 100 cents paid by the average taxpayer only 9.04 cents goes for state government; 26.25 cents for county government costs; 24.92 cents for city and village governmental costs; 2.14, cents for township government costs and 37.65—the largest share—for school costs.

That directing the affairs of the business of the state is a real business proposition probably can best be realized when one knows that the receipts and disbursements through the office of the state treasurer for the fiscal

year 1924 was \$181,179,348.93. While the receipts exceeded the disbursements, they were quite equally divided.

The disbursements include the payments to schools, the University, agricultural development expenditures and many more items that really should be classed investments for the future benefit, rather than expenses.

The State of Minnesota annually expends hundreds of thousands of dollars to help develop new industries and to encourage present industries. The State Agricultural Society, which has charge of the Minnesota State Fair—the largest in the country—is the chief organization to assist in the aid to the state's basic industry. The state also assists to finance the State Horticultural society, the State Dairymen's association, the Bee Keepers, the Live Stock Breeders, the Field Crop breeders and other organizations. It donates \$140,000 annually to assist county fairs to pay premiums and also assists to pay the premiums at county and other poultry shows. It also assists to conduct farmers' institutes and like improvement organizations.

In Minnesota the state auditor is practically custodian of the state's greater resources. He has charge of the auditing and land departments. In the auditing department it is his duty to keep records of all public accounts, audit all claims and issue warrants in payment. He makes drafts for taxes. The duties of the land department are the care and sale of school, university, agricultural, college and swamp lands, the leasing of mineral lands, and the making out and recording of all deeds and conveyances of lands, in addition to keeping a classified account of all money transactions regarding these lands.

In analyzing the state tax payments and the distribution back to the counties by the state further, it is pointed out in the state auditor's report for the fiscal year 1923, that 82 counties pay to the state \$4,773,622.78 and 5 counties pay to the state \$3,638,844.65, a total of \$8,412,467.43, while the same 82 counties receive \$9,285,173.61 and the 5 counties receive \$2,438,331.03, a total of \$11,723,504.64. In this way, the 5 counties receive back from the state about twice as much as they have paid in.

In most cases, the counties rich in natural resources and wealth pay more taxes than they get back. For instance, St. Louis county of iron mining fame, pays \$1,557,066.19 in taxes, while it gets back only \$875,863.97. Hennepin county pays \$1,305,220.78 and receives \$924,857.28. Ramsey county pays \$680,580.62 and receives \$552,348.45.

The counties which received more back than they paid in state taxes in 1921, were Aitkin, Anoka, Becker, Beltrami, Benton, Big Stone, Carlton, Cass, Chisago, Clearwater, Cook, Cottonwood, Dodge, Hubbard, Isanti, Kanabec, Koochiching, Lake, LeSueur, Mahnomen, Marshall, Mille Lacs, Norman, Pennington, Pine, Pope, Red Lake, Roseau, Sherburne, Todd, Traverse, Wadena, Watonwan and Wilkin. All other counties pay more to the state in taxes than they receive directly from the state.

The State Central committee is made up of two members from each congressional district selected at the state convention by the delegates from

the district. Each candidate indorsed is entitled to select one member and the delegate appointed by the candidate for governor is chairman. Each candidate for Congress also is to select a member. The state convention is called by such State Central committee.

The general elections in the years when there is no presidential election are really the most important to Minnesota. As there are two United States senators for each state and they are elected for six years, there is an election of a United States senator at two of each three general elections.

Ten Minnesota congressmen, the governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, one railroad and warehouse commissioner, one or more Supreme Court justices and all members of the Minnesota House of the Legislature are elected every two years. The state auditor and the clerk of the supreme court, with four-year terms, are elected at every non-presidential general election, as also are the four-year-term members of the State Senate.

The non-presidential year also is the important year in county elections, as county officials are elected for four-year terms for most county officers in Minnesota, including the county offices of auditor, treasurer, register of deeds, sheriff, attorney, surveyor, coroner, court commissioner and superintendent of schools.

Some of the members of the boards of county commissioners and some of the district judges also are elected at each general election, the county commissioners for four-year terms and the district judges for six-year terms.

In order to have the right to vote, a person must be more than 21 years old and must have been a citizen of the United States for at least three months. The adult person must have lived in the state six months and in the county, city or town and precinct for at least thirty days. Persons convicted of treason or a felony and unpardoned, persons under a guardianship and uncivilized Indians are not allowed to vote.

STATE INSTITUTIONS

UNDER MANAGEMENT OF STATE BOARD OF CONTROL

Anoka State Asylum—The institution consists of a main building, including north and south wings, for men patients, and ten cottages for women patients, one of which is equipped as an infirmary. Other principal buildings are a service building, containing kitchen, bakery and dining room, a new assembly hall and chapel, a new administration building, a greenhouse, and a complete set of farm buildings, including a new blacksmith shop and a new slaughter house. The work of reconstructing and fireproofing the center of the main building was completed in 1924. It now houses 904 patients. The land area is 733 acres; valuation of property and lands, \$1,112,200, and it has 93 officers and employes.

Hastings State Asylum—This institution, originally built for both men and women patients, now cares for men exclusively. The buildings are a main or administration building with east and west wings, which have recently been reconstructed and fireproofed; nine cottages for patients, one of which is an infirmary; service building, laundry, dormitory for employes, superintendent's cottage, and a new central power plant. The farm group consists of three barns, two silos, creamery, greenhouse, etc. The asylum is located on 749 acres of land, has a valuation of \$1,047,859. The population is 1,000 and the staff numbers 104 persons.

Willmar State Asylum—The buildings include an administration building with two wings for patients, three cottages for men, three cottages for women, superintendent's cottage, service building and assembly hall, power house, laundry, farm buildings, and cottages for the farmer and the engineer. It has a land area of 706 acres, a total valuation of \$867,801, and a population of 493. The staff is composed of 74 officers and employes.

Fergus Falls State Hospital—This hospital consists of an administration building with six adjoining sections or wings for the accommodation of patients, detention or psychopathic hospital, isolation hospital, industrial building, dormitories for men and women nurses, central kitchen, laundry, power house, and farm buildings. It is the largest of the institutions for the insane. It has a land area of 1,076 acres, is valued at \$1,337,719, and has a population of 1,637. The employes number 259.

Rochester State Hospital—The buildings comprising this institution include an administration building with wings for patients, two detached ward buildings for patients, detention or psychopathic hospital, isolation hospital,

nurses' homes for men and women, laundry, storehouse, industrial pavilion and a central power plant. The farm group consists of a new barn for the housing of the large dairy herd, slaughter house, blacksmith shop, greenhouse and cottages for employes. The land area is 1,375 acres; total valuation, \$1,082,953; population, 1,380, and employes number 236.

St. Peter State Hospital—This hospital consists of a main building with two wings, detached ward buildings for men and women patients, cottage for women patients, detention or psychopathic hospital, tuberculosis hospital, three dormitories for men and women employes, superintendent's cottage, steward's building, a complete set of farm buildings, and cottages for the farmer and the engineer. The Asylum for the Dangerous Insane, with accommodations for 150 dangerous and criminal insane, is operated in conjunction with this institution. It has an area of 865 acres with a valuation of \$1,439,592. The present population is 1,476. The official staff numbers 260 members.

INSTITUTIONS FOR FEEBLE-MINDED AND EPILEPTICS

The Minnesota School for Feeble-Minded and Colony for Epileptics is located at Faribault, with a population of 1,878. It was opened in 1882.

All feeble-minded persons, residents of the state, who are of sutiable age and capacity to receive instruction in the school and whose defects prevent them from receiving proper training in the public schools, and all idiotic and epileptic persons resident of the state, may be admitted to their respective departments of the institution.

The charge for maintenance is \$40 a year, and is paid by the person legally responsible for the support of the inmate, or, in the event he is financially unable to make such payment, by the county from which the person is admitted.

The institution has an accredited training school for nurses, which is affiliated with the Minneapolis General Hospital. Nurses spend two years in training at the institution and their third year in Minneapolis. They are then eligible for registration.

Acting under authority granted by the legislature, the Board of Control has purchased 323 acres of land adjoining the village of Cambridge to be used as a location for a new institution to be known as the Minnesota Colony for Epileptics. As buildings are erected at this institution the epileptics now housed at Faribault will be transferred to Cambridge, and the space vacated made available for feeble-minded persons now on the waiting list.

School for Feeble-Minded, Faribault—The buildings of this institution include an administration building with wings, custodial buildings for boys and girls, two cottages for epileptic boys, two cottages for epileptic girls, a cottage for working boys, a cottage for boys employed at the dairy, Hillcrest cottage for boys, Riverview cottage for girls, general hospital, central kitchen and bakery, laundry, power house, superintendent's cottage, and building for women employes. The farm group includes modern dairy barns with accom-

modations for 120 cows. A new building has just been completed for high-grade delinquent females. It has a ground area of 1,145 acres, with a valuation of \$1,792,874; a population of 1,878 and 305 employes.

Colony for Epileptics, Cambridge—One cottage, providing accommodations for 75 inmates and necessary employes, is under construction.

The Board of Control has requested the legislature at its 1925 session to grant an appropriation of \$255,000.00 to be used to erect an administrative center group, consisting of the front main center building for administrative offices and quarters for officers and employes; a rear center building including dining rooms for inmates and employes, kitchen, bakery, etc., and quarters for employes; and ward buildings at either side of the front main center for sleeping quarters, day rooms, etc., for inmates. Area of grounds, 323 acres; values of lands and buildings, \$117,065.00.

SCHOOLS FOR THE BLIND AND THE DEAF

School for the Blind, Faribault—This institution, opened in 1874, is located on a high bluff overlooking the river and the city, with spacious grounds, pleasant walks and abundant shade trees. Its opportunities are free to all blind persons, or those who have not sufficient sight to pursue their studies in the public school, who are residents of the state, between the ages of six and 21 years, who are capable of profiting by instruction. The school year extends from September to June. During the summer vacation all of the pupils return to their homes. Summer schools for adult blind men and women are maintained during the summer months. In these schools the principal emphasis is placed upon industrial and vocational training. The school co-operates with the division for the blind of the Board of Control in its work of aiding and assisting the blind of the state. The school has a land area of 50 acres, has a value of \$246,900, an enrollment of 92, and an official staff of 53.

School for the Deaf, Faribault—Minnesota has a compulsory education law for the deaf, and all children of the state between eight and 20 years of age, too deaf or too dumb or defective of speech to be materially benefited by the methods of instruction in vogue in the public schools, and who are not taught in a private school or in a school having a special teacher for the deaf, are required to attend the School for the Deaf until discharged by the superintendent upon approval of the Board of Control. As in the case of the School for the Blind, the only expense is for clothing, postage and transportation. The institution was opened in 1863. The buildings are an administration building with wings (known as Tate Hall), Barron Hall, Noyes Hall (consisting of an auditorium, school building and library), service building, bakery, hospital, trades building, power house and the farm group. The land area is 116 acres and the value of the institution \$598,246. The enrollment is 252. The official staff numbers 85.

STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL, OWATONNA

This school was opened at Owatonna in 1886. Dependent, neglected and ill-treated children under 15 years of age who are normal mentally and free from disease are eligible to admission on orders of the probate and juvenile courts and by transfer from private institutions which are authorized by the Board of Control to receive and find homes for children.

The cottages, occupied by groups of children, form a community of families and, with the church and school privileges, afford conditions favorable to wholesome community and family life. The location on the farm gives the children the benefits of rural life and the opportunity to receive practical instruction in all branches of agriculture. The care and training given the children is preparatory to their early transfer to foster homes, restoration to parents or, in the case of the older children, discharge to self-support.

Of the 413 outside children who were discharged during the past two years, 231 were self-supporting, 104 legally adopted and 72 restored to parents.

The main building consists of a central section with north and south wings and enlarged dining rooms. There are ten cottages, including a nursery for babies and younger children, a school house, gymnasium, superintendent's residence, laundry, power house, four cottages for employes, greenhouse and sundry farm buildings. Area of grounds, 325 acres; value, \$578,765. Present population, 358. Number of children in homes or under supervision, 1,223. Official staff, including teachers and five state agents for placing children in families, 97.

INSTITUTIONS FOR DELINQUENT CHILDREN

Training School for Boys, Red Wing—This institution was created by an act of the legislature in 1867. It was first located in St. Paul but was moved to Red Wing in 1890. It occupies a beautiful site overlooking the Mississippi river.

Commitments to the institution cover incorrigibles up to the age of 18 years. All boys committed are under the care of the institution until they attain their majority unless their conduct is such as to warrant a full discharge at an earlier date.

The work has been benefited by the introduction of an improved system of vocational training in well equipped shops. This work was organized under the direction of Mr. C. R. Allen, of Dunwoody Institute, Minneapolis, and has been in effect for a period of two years.

The institution maintains a good sized farm, a dairy herd of 50 cows, and a school of letters with a principal and six teachers. Vocational training, under competent instructors, is given in blacksmithing, carpentry and cabinet making, baking, cooking and meat cutting, painting, plumbing and pipe fitting, printing and truck driving and maintenance.

Fully 75 per cent of the boys passing through this institution develop into worthy, self-respecting citizens. An average of 350 boys are on parole at all

times and this large number is cared for by a parole department consisting of six persons.

The buildings consist of an administration building which houses the offices, store rooms and two families of boys, six cottages for inmates, school house, auditorium and gymnasium, industrial building, hospital, cottages for the superintendent, the steward and the head farmer, and the farm group. Area of grounds, 560 acres; value, \$705,402; 78 persons are employed. The population July 1, 1922, was 297—there are now 372 on parole—total under care, 669.

Home School for Girls, Sauk Centre—While this school is among the oldest of the state's correctional institutions, the location of the home at Sauk Centre is comparatively new, having been authorized by the legislature in 1907, and opened in 1911. Prior to that the institution was conducted in connection with the Training School for Boys at Red Wing. It is admirably located on a tract of wooded and farm land, with Sauk lake, a beautiful body of water, in close proximity.

Though custodial in character, the institution is a home in every sense of the word.

One of the unique features of the school is the wage-earning system. It in a large measure characterizes the work of the school in a training way, for besides its educational value it has proved the chief source of discipline. Every girl on commitment is for a month in dependency. At the end of the month she is assigned a cottage and becomes a member of the family and a citizen in the community. She is given food and shelter, but beyond that she must earn her support. She is credited for all work according to amount and skill, and is likewise fined for family or social offense.

A large farm is operated in connection with the institution. Farming, gardening, dairying, canning of fruits and vegetables, butter-making and cheese-making, are extensively carried on by the girls.

The buildings include an administration building, receiving cottage and hospital, 26 cottages for girls, chapel, a modern school building containing rooms for regular and special courses, offices and a large auditorium, and adequate farm buildings to house the large dairy herd.

The hospital is one of most modern arrangement. Population, 324; on parole, 321; total, 645. Employes, 95; acreage, 447; value, \$612,812.

REFORMATORY AND PENAL INSTITUTIONS

State Reformatory, St. Cloud—The correctional institution for male first offenders in felony only is the State Reformatory, opened in St. Cloud in 1889. The age limits range from 16 to 30 years.

Located on the extensive grounds is one of the finest granite quarries in the state. From this quarry has been taken practically all the stone used in the construction of the institution buildings, and the quarrying, cutting and placing of the stone has been done entirely by the inmates. In addition there is a stone crushing plant, the product of which enters into state road work.

The woodworking industry turns out sash, doors and blinds, screens and storm sash for state institutions. In the factory attached to the institution is made nearly all of the men's clothing used in the state institutions. There are various other shops.

An extensive farm is operated in connection with the institution, and the establishment of a farm colony where some 50 men employed in the farm department are housed has proved a decided success.

The institution consists of an administration building containing offices and a chapel, five cell houses for inmates, hospital, central power plant, superintendent's residence, and additions including kitchens, bakery, dining rooms, shops and storerooms. The principal buildings are constructed of granite quarried on the institution grounds by inmates. The grounds are enclosed by a wall of granite. The walled enclosure, containing 55 acres, is one of the largest in America and is valued at \$1,379,529. Population July 1, 1924, 650.

State Reformatory for Women, Shakopee—The State Reformatory for Women, created by the legislature in 1915, and located at Shakopee on a beautiful site overlooking the Minnesota river, is one of the latest institutions to be established by the state of Minnesota.

The institution has a fine farm, a large portion of which is under cultivation. It is planned to interest the women in gardening, dairying, buttermaking, etc.

Women's and children's clothing for other state institutions is now being made by the inmates of this institution, and it is planned to enlarge this industry.

The buildings are an administration building and reception hospital, known as Isabel Higbee Hall, which includes offices, hospital and medical section, industrial workrooms, kitchen, dining rooms for officers and inmates, officers' bedrooms, and 20 rooms for inmates; two cottages for imnates; and cottages for the farmer and the engineer. A third cottage for inmates is under construction. The land area is 167 acres; valuation, \$244,535; population, 63, and number of employes, 16.

State Prison, Stillwater—The Minnesota State Prison at Stillwater, the oldest state institution, was originally founded in 1851. The new prison, built on the most approved lines of prison architecture and stated by experts to be the most modern institution of its kind in the world, was opened in 1912.

Systematic reform in prison life and management in Minnesota started many years ago. Contracts for prison labor as fast as they expired were not renewed. In 1890 the binding twine industry was established, and in 1908 the making of farm machinery was begun. Then in rapid order came other reforms, the abolishment of the lock step, the granting of privileges to the prisoners commensurate with their conduct, the passing of the striped uniform, the payment of wages to the inmates, and the granting of monthly allowances for the support of families of prisoners.

The buildings consist of an administration building and connecting corridors containing offices of the warden and assistants, an office for use of the

boards of control and parole, reception room, barber shop, telephone exchange, rooms for officers and guests, officers' kitchen and dining rooms, school rooms and lecture halls, library, printing office where the "Mirror," the newspaper published by the inmates, is printed, and space for the Bertillon and finger-print systems used in the identification of criminals; two large cell houses, each containing 512 cells; a modern prison hospital; chapel; central power plant; greenhouse; and residences for the warden and other officers. Space is provided for two subsidiary cell houses which, when built, will provide accommodations for a total of 1,384 inmates.

The industrial group includes the twine factory, a three-story and basement building, 360 feet in length; a warehouse, 360 feet long, for the storage of raw material and manufactured twine; a main factory building of the same size for the farm machinery plant, containing machine shop, woodworking and assembling departments; foundry, 180 feet by 100 feet; blacksmith shop; steel storage house; and two large warehouses for storage of manufactured machines.

The population is 1,053 and the official staff consists of 273 persons. The land area is 1,000 acres and its value is \$2,574,582.

SANATORIUM FOR CONSUMPTIVES, AH-GWAH-CHING

Minnesota probably has done more toward the prevention and control of tuberculosis than any other state in the Union. It conducts a state sanatorium, located at Ah-gwah-ching, three miles south of Walker, opened in 1908 for the study and cure of this disease, aids financially in the erection of sanatoria by counties or groups of counties, and maintains in connection with the various institutions for the insane and the School for Feeble-Minded special buildings and sick wards in which the tuberculous patients are cared for.

The state institution is situated on a beautiful wooded tract overlooking Leech Lake. In 1922 the Board of Control authorized the purchase of 200 acres located about ten miles from the sanatorium to be used for farm and garden purposes.

The charge for board and treatment is \$1.40 a day, and in a large number of cases, where the patient or his family is unable to make the payments, the expense is paid by the county of which the patient is a resident.

The buildings consist of a main or administration building, infirmary, service building including kitchen, bakery, dining rooms and quarters for employes, recreation building, numerous cottages for patients, superintendent's cottage, staff house, greenhouse, cottage for head carpenter and sundry farm buildings. A new central power plant is nearing completion and a cottage for the engineer is being erected. The lands, \$593,048, with an area of 866 acres. It has a population of 253 and a staff of 110 officers and employes.

HOSPITAL FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN, ST. PAUL

Minnesota has the distinction of being the first of the states to attempt the treatment of indigent crippled and deformed children at public expense. Prior to 1897 no effort had been made by any state in the Union to relieve such children of their deformities in a public institution. There were private hospitals for this purpose, the majority of them located in the eastern states, but they were not available to the children of the poor or to those of limited means. This fact and the need for such an institution were callled to the attention of the legislature of 1897 and that body, as an experiment, appropriated \$5,000.00 to be used for that purpose.

From that modest appropriation has grown the substantial fireproof institution of today, the State Hospital for Indigent Crippled and Deformed Children, located on a beautiful tract of land in the suburbs of St. Paul, adjoining Phalen Park, opened in 1911, and from it has come a remarkable number of cures.

The present medical and surgical staff is made up of 35 of the foremost specialists of St. Paul and Minneapolis. These men are on call at all times and the services given these poor children are entirely gratuitous and unlimited. The resident medical and surgical staff is composed of students from the University of Minnesota graduate and undergraduate schools.

The buildings are the main building with large additions, power plant and laundry, and a service building containing central kitchen, bakery, dining room, root cellar, storerooms, steward's office and rooms for 22 employes. A new school building, to be known as the Michael J. Dowling Memorial Hall and to be used for the education and training of indigent crippled and deformed children of the state of Minnesota, is under construction and will be completed in the near future. The sum of \$50,000, representing one-half the cost of this building, was donated by the Minnesota Editorial Association and the Minnesota Bankers' Association. Area, 23 acres; value, \$376,136; population, 195; employes, 195.

MINNESOTA SOLDIERS' HOME.

MANAGEMENT: BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Minnesota Soldiers Home is located on land at the confluence of Minnehaha creek with the Mississippi river in Minneapolis.

It was established by the Legislature of 1887, acting on recommendations of a committee of the Department Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, which made a study of two or more years' duration. Governor A. R. McGill approved the law and a board of seven trustees was appointed to locate and open the home. The site at Minnehaha Falls was chosen after a spirited contest. A temporary structure was erected to care for some twenty men who were the first to be admitted. Since that time, there have been 4,560 applications for admission to the home, 3,874 men and 686 women.

On June 30, 1924, the average age of Civil War men was 81 years, average service 2 years and 1 month; Spanish War men, average age 57 years, average service 11 months. Oldest man in the Home is 96 years of age. There are 3 Indian War men of 1862.

The Civil War population is growing on account of increased age and inevitable disabilities.

Population for Dec. 18, 1924, Civil War men, 234; Civil War women, 140.

Total value of property including buildings, machinery, equipment and grounds by a careful inventory taken this year is \$1,110,000. The property is being brought up to as good a condition as is possible for buildings, most of which having been built for over 35 years and in constant occupancy all of the time.

STATE SOCIETIES AND ASSOCIATIONS.

State Agricultural Society-Minnesota's chief organization in aid of its principal industry is the Minnesota State Agricultural Society, which dates its corporate existence from the year 1868. It was not the first, as even in territorial days societies existed, the object of which was the advancement of the state's natural resources, but it was the first concrete attempt at consolidation and so marked was its success that its annual exposition has continued unchallenged to this day. Out of it all came the annual Minnesota state fair, regarded as the greatest of its kind on the North American continent. Up to 1885 the annual fairs of the society were held in different localities with varying financial success. That year the county of Ramsey, through the efforts of public-spirited citizens, conveyed to the State of Minnesota for state fair purposes 200 acres of land, located midway between St. Paul and Minneapolis, the same to be under the management of the State Agricultural society. The Legislature of the same year met the donation with an appropriation of \$100,000 for permanent improvements, which was supplemented by private subscriptions to the extent of over \$31,000. This investment, together with the grounds, might be said to be the real beginning of the largest annual agricultural and industrial meet in the United States, which since, through biennial aid on the part of the Minnesota legislature and its own earnings, has reached proportions in respect to buildings and investment far beyond the wildest dreams of its organizers. Up to 1903 state control of both the society and the state fair only extended to such financial aid as was necessary, but the legislature of that year, recognizing the need of more intimate relations, together with a supervision that would place the two beyond the possibility of outside influence and petty interference with its internal affairs, enacted a law practically making both a department of the state government. In 1911 supplemental legislation was adopted defining and regulating membership in the State Agricultural society which was further amended in 1913, 1919 and 1921. This membership, together with the right to vote, includes three delegates to the annual meeting to be named by each county and district agricultural society, such honorary members as may be elected by a two-thirds vote at each annual meeting, one delegate from such counties having no county or district agricultural society and to be named by the county board, and two delegates and the president, ex-officio, representing the following societies and associations:

The state horticultural society, the state dairymen's association, the state beekeepers' association, the Minnesota live stock breeders' association, the Minnesota crop improvement association, the Minnesota swine breeders' association, the Minnesota horse breeders' association, the Minnesota veterinary association, the Minnesota cattle breeders' association, the state poultry association, Minnesota implement dealers' association, the Minnesota florists' association, the Minnesota garden flowers' association, the Minnesota county exhibitors' association, the Minnesota federation of county fairs, the state forestry association, the Minnesota state grange association and the Minnesota farm bureau federation.

The following societies and associations shall be entitled to one vote each: Minneapolis market gardeners' association of Minnesota, the state growers' association, Minnesota Shorthorn breeders' association, Minnesota Guernsey breeders' association, Minnesota Jersey cattle club, Minnesota Holstein-Friesian breeders' association, the Minnesota Hereford breeders' association, Minnesota Aberdeen Angus breeders' association, Minnesota Red Polled breeders' association, Minnesota Ayreshire breeders' association, Minnesota Brown Swiss breeders' association, Minnesota Poland China breeders' association, Minnesota Duroc Jersey breeders' association, Minnesota Chester White breeders' association and Minnesota Berkshire breeders' association.

The members of the governing board of the State Agricultural society are entitled to one vote each. The annual meeting of the society occurs in St. Paul or Minneapolis on the Wednesday following the second Tuesday in January each year, and continues for three days, the election of officers occurring upon the last day of the session, when a president is elected for a term of one year; a vice president for a term of two years, and two or three managers, as the case may be, for a term of three years. The entire membership of the governing board is one president, two vice presidents and eight managers, one manager being elected from each of the following congressional districts: First, second, third, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth.

The state appropriates \$170,000 annually to aid in the payment of premiums at county and other fairs and exhibitions complying with the provisions of the law.

State Horticultural Society has for its work the gathering and dissemination of knowledge pertaining to forestry, fruit and vegetable growing, the culture of flowers, etc., adapted to the soil and climate of Minnesota. The present working membership of the society consists of more than 3,600 professional and amateur horticulturists throughout the Northwest. The following societies are auxiliaries of the Horticultural Society: Minnesota Garden Flower Society, Minnesota State Florists' Association, State Vegetable Growers' Association, State Beekeepers' Association. A vegetable garden for each home, a shelter belt for each farm and trees for each school are sought.

The Minnesota Dairymen's Association (incorporated March 2, 1882) was organized February 7, 1878, for the purpose of improving the Minnesota stock and dairy products by holding an annual meeting of the representatives of these interests and the distribution of literature on such subjects among the people of the state. The association is encouraged by a permanent appropriation of \$5,000 annually for the publication of its proceedings and distribution of dairy literature and dairy instruction.

• Farmers' Institutes—The holding of farmers' institutes has been in vogue for 25 years or more. The government is vested in a board of administration. This board consists of six members, three of whom are chosen from the board of regents of the State University, and the other three are the presidents of the State Agricultural Society, the State Horticultural Society and the State Dairymen's Association. The institutes are largely held during the winter months, commencing with some date in November, and closing about the middle of March. The Farmers' Institute Annual is published each year, and contains the latest and best practical information concerning agriculture in all its branches, which includes the work of the field stock interests and horticulture.

The Minnesota State Art Society was created by the 1903 session of the legislature for the advancement of fine arts, etc. The governing board consists of the governor, president of the university and seven members to be appointed by the governor, qualifications being prescribed by the act. The officers and membership are prescribed by the act, and annual exhibits are provided for, prizes being offered and paid for by the state.

The Minnesota Society for the Prevention of Cruelty was organized October 21, 1869, for the purpose of preventing cruelty to animals throughout the State of Minnesota. It was recognized by the legislature of 1905 constituting the society a state bureau of child and animal protection. The governor, the superintendent of public instruction and the attorney-general are ex-officio members of the board of directors.

The Minnesota State Florists' Association is an organization incorporated under the laws of the state composed of professional florists, nurserymen and others interested in horticulture. The object of the association is to promote the interests of floriculture and horticulture in the state.

THE MINNESOTA HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

Incorporated less than two months after the convening of the first territorial legislature in 1849, the Minnesota Historical Society is the oldest institution in the state. It is supported mainly by legislative appropriation. By gift and purchase it has accumulated one of the largest and best historical libraries in the West, containing approximately 156,000 books and pamphlets. An important part of the library consists of materials on Minnesota history—the most complete collection of its kind in existence. In the society's manuscript division is a growing body of letters, diaries, and other documents left by men who have played some part in the making of Minnesota. Included in this unique collection are the papers of such men as Sibley, Ramsey, Taliaferro, Steele, Donnelly, and J. W. Taylor. Scarcely less important historically are the twelve thousand bound volumes of Minnesota and other newspapers. An historical museum, with varied displays, visualizes the external conditions of life in Minnesota's past.

In 1919 the legislature recognized the society in effect as a state department of archives. An act authorized the transfer of non-current records from state, county, city, and township offices, and made the society the official custodian of such transferred records. Since 1919 non-current archives from six state departments and five commissions have been received, including executive records, census schedules, and pension records from the offices respectively of the governor, the secretary of state, and the adjutant general.

Two volumes of Dr. William W. Folwell's authoritative History of Minnesota have been published by the society. These volumes, which narrate the story of Minnesota from the earliest French explorations to the end of the Civil War, are to be followed by two volumes on the later period. A quarterly magazine, the Minnesota History Bulletin, was begun in 1915. Seventeen volumes in a series of Collections have been issued, the last of which is Dr. Warren Upham's Minnesota Geographic Names, Their Origin and Historic Significance (vol. XVII, 1920). The publications are distributed to members as issued.

The society has a membership of about fourteen hundred. Dues amount to two dollars for annual, five dollars for sustaining, and twenty-five dollars for life members. Membership may be had through application and a first payment of dues. The governing body is an executive council composed of thirty elected members and six state officers ex-officio.

The society occupies the Historical Building adjacent to the capitol. This building was erected by the state at a cost of \$500,000 and was dedicated on May 11, 1918. The reading room, museum, and galleries are open to the public daily from 9:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. (summers, 8:30 A. M. to 4:30 P. M.).

RE-ORGANIZED DEPARTMENTS

Minnesota Highway Department. Improvement and maintenance of a 7,000-mile system of trunk highways is one of the most important and extensive state activities. Awakening to the importance of adequate highways, Minnesota in 1909 adopted a constitutional amendment providing for a one-twentieth mill general tax levy by the state to be apportioned as highway aid to the various counties, which with the townships and cities and villages then handled all road work. The rate later was increased to 1 mill and the state highway aid levy is still made.

With the creation of the state highway aid fund, was established the Minnesota Highway department for its administration. It was placed under a commission which some years later was changed to the single-commissioner plan of administration.

Charles M. Babcock, Elk River, a former member of the highway board, was retained in the new office of highway commissioner. He devised the so-called Babcock good roads plan, contemplating the designation of a system of trunk or arterial highways serving every district for improvement and maintenance by the state with the proceeds of a more onerous tax on motor vehicles and with federal highway aid. The plan was adopted in 1919 with the passage of Good Roads Amendment No. 1 to the state constitution. State trunk highway income to date under the new plan has been limited to motor vehicle tax funds and federal aid. Falling into line with other good roads states, Minnesota at the general election of 1924 adopted another highway amendment to the constitution expressly authorizing the legislature to impose an excise tax on gasoline or other fluids used or useful in propelling motor vehicles on the highways and further providing that the proceeds of such tax, when levied, shall be diverted to the trunk highway fund.

The new highway plan is generally credited with speeding up needed improvements and providing better maintenance on all roads in the state. Upon turning the 7,000 miles of trunk routes over to the state, the counties listed 1,499 miles as graded, 1,371 as graded and 66 as paved, and in less than four years the state department has added 4,979 miles of new grading, 5,236 miles of graveling and 490 miles of pavement. All county and township road and bridge tax funds released for other than trunk highway purposes, local road development has been even greater than that on trunk routes.

The Industrial Commission of three members at \$4,500 a year was created by Chapter 81 of the Laws of 1921 as of March 15, 1921. The De-

partments of labor, arbitration, etc., were abolished and the work consolidated within the Industrial commission, which has charge of administration of workmen's compensation; former work of labor and industries department; conducting free employment agencies; promotion of arbitration, mediation and conciliation by hearings or otherwise; investigation of strikes, etc.; establishment of branch offices; minimum wage law administration, etc.

The State Securities Commission was created by Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1921. There had previously been a State Securities commission made up of a board of other state officials who employed an executive secretary. The new commission consists of three commissioners at \$4,500 a year each, who have charge of administering the law with the object of preventing the floating of unsound securities or "selling the Blue Sky" in Minnesota. They license firms to sell stocks and bonds and issue warnings against frauds.

War Records Commission. Before the close of the World War, the work of gathering the records of Minnesota's part in that struggle was begun by the Minnesota Historical Society and continued by a special commission created by the Minnesota Commission of Public Safety in October, 1918. This special agency, the Minnesota War Records Commission, was established by law in April, 1919, and directed "to provide for the collection and preservation in state and local war records collections of all available material relating to Minnesota's participation in the World War" and "to provide for the preparation and publication, as a permanent memorial record, of a comprehensive documentary and narrative history of the part played by the state in the World War, including conditions and events within the state relating to or affected by the war."


In discharge of the first of these duties, the commission has assembled at its headquarters in the Historical Building, St. Paul, extensive files of records relating to the war services of citizens and organizations of the state—particularly of service men—including in many cases photographs, war letters, and mementoes, as well as written records. Through its county branches, also, the commission has been instrumental in building up a number of local war records collections—notably in Hennepin, Ramsey, Rice, Stevens, and St. Louis counties—intended for local preservation and use.

In 1921, before the second object of the commission—publication of a state World War history—was realized, the commission law was amended so as to call for the publication, first, of a history of Minnesota in the Spanish-American War and the Philippine Insurrection. The latter, comprising in one volume an historical narrative and a roster of Minnesotans in all branches of the service during the period indicated, was published in April, 1923.

In the meantime the commission has commenced the preparation of an eight volume history of Minnesota in the World War, the first volume of which, a history of the 151st Field Artillery, by former Lieutenant Governor

Louis L. Collins, was published in December, 1924. Other volumes of the World War history, according to a plan tacitly approved by the Legislature, will comprise a roster of all Minnesota soldiers, sailors, and marines, and a narrative history of local war activities, events, and conditions.

The commission makes a standing appeal to all citizens of the state for contributions to the State War Records Collection of personal narratives, war letters and relics, and photographs, and to officers of local war agencies, for the custody of the wartime files of their organizations. Such material, wherever available, should be forwarded without delay to Franklin F. Holbrook, secretary, Minnesota War Records Commission, Historical Building, St. Paul.

SCHOOLS OF AGRICULTURE.

The Northwest School of Agriculture, Crookston, a part of the University of Minnesota, is a state institution to serve the people of the northwestern part of the state. It does not belong to a particular town or county, but to this section of the state as a whole.

It has four distinct lines of work: *

1. As an institution of learning


2. As an experiment station and demonstration center-

3. As an extension service center

- 4. As an organization center.
- 1. As a school, it is organized with a liberal variety of courses designed to meet the needs of the various classes of young men and women seeking a training for management of the home and the farm and for citizenship in rural communities. As an institution with experienced and sympathetic men and women in charge, its courses are especially planned to meet the needs of rural young men and women. Being located two miles from the city, it retains the healthful influence of the country, and still gives the advantages of the city, with a minimum chance of its temptations. Students are surrounded with a moral influence at all times. Nearly 2,000 students have attended the school since 1906, while the number of graduates has reached over 600.
- 2. The station farm of 476 acres, fully equipped with stock and machinery in charge of competent experts, is devoted to an extensive study of the various agricultural problems of this part of the state. Reports are issued annually. Special bulletins are also issued from time to time.
- 3. Community work with farmers is an important part of the institution's service. The members of the staff devote much time to this work, giving special attention to cooperative work in pure seed production among farmers and home project work among students, work in farm crops, live stock and farm management and in institute work. A monthly paper, the Northwest Monthly, is published regularly as a medium for spreading useful information.

The West Central School of Agriculture and Experiment Station was established in 1910 as a branch of the Department of Agriculture of the University of Minnesota. P. E. Miller has been Superintendent since 1917. The School and Station now comprise 300 acres of land and a group of 20 buildings. The Experiment Station is conducting experimental projects in the most important agricultural problems of the region. Annual reports of the Experiment Station work are published each year and distributed to farmers throughout the district. In the school courses of study are offered in all branches of agriculture and home economics. The student body has increased from a small number in the early years to an annual enrollment of 300 students. The student body comes almost entirely from farm homes throughout west central Minnesota. Approximately 85% of the graduates and former students are engaged in the business of farming and home making.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

LEGISLATURE :

The legislature for the year 1925 is composed of 67 senators and 131 representatives.

The legislature meets biennially, commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of odd numbered years. The session is limited to 90 legislative days by the constitution.

The legislative term of representatives is for two years and for senators four years.

ELECTIONS

State elections are held in every even numbered year, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, and the terms of office terminate on the first Monday in January following.

The primary election to nominate candidates to be elected at the general election is held on the third Monday in June. The so-called Australian system of voting is used in both elections.

Two kinds of ballots are used in the primary election—a party ballot and a non-partisan ballot. All candidates for executive officers, including railroad and warehouse commissioners and federal representatives are nominated by means of a party ballot. The justices of the supreme court, members of the state legislature and all county officers, except county surveyor, are nominated on a non-partisan ballot.

Primary election day constitutes the first day of registration for the ensuing election, except in cities of the first class.

PROPERTY RIGHTS

Various property rights are given to women. Property owned prior to marriage remains in her own right, as well as property acquired during marriage. She is practically given the same property rights in her married state as the husband. A widow is entitled to one-third of the property of her demised husband, and the homestead goes direct to her in case of no children; with children she has a life estate in the same.

TAXATION

General taxes become a lien upon real property from the first day of May of the year in which levied, but between grantor and grantee the lien does not attach until the next January. One-half of the real estate tax must be paid before June 1; the second half before November 1, otherwise a penalty of ten per cent is added. If not paid before the first Monday in

January following, the same become delinquent and a further penalty of five per cent is added. The redemption period extends for three years and until notice of the time of expiration of such redemption has been made by the county auditor.

TRUST FUNDS AND FINANCES

Minnesota now has the largest permanent trust fund of any state in the union. At the end of the fiscal year June 30, 1924, the total of cash and securities in possession of the state treasurer and belonging to the several state trust funds, amounted to \$53,457,532.06, increasing approximately nine million in two years.

State receipts from various sources for the fiscal year 1924 totaled \$99,732,477.99. Total disbursements, \$82,829,461.30. Cash balance June 30, 1924, \$23,414,729.61. The greatest source was from the state taxes, while gross earnings on railroads were second with \$8,483,834.57; motor vehicle tax receipts, \$5,616,113.60; prison twine plant, \$2,523,434.44; state institution earnings, \$1,690,442.14; state mines, ore and timber income, \$1,905,502.71; trust fund interest, \$1,312,503.93; repayment of loans by municipalities, \$2,067,627.90; trust fund bond sales, \$1,229,676; inheritance tax, \$902,552.34; State Fair receipts, \$293,732.81; teachers' insurance fees, \$270,707.37; Federal road aid, \$1,492,030.63; armory bonds, \$321,535.75; vocational education aid, \$59,116.05. Miscellaneous accounts make up the balance. Of this revenue, approximately \$60 of \$100 was returned directly or indirectly to the counties.

ASSESSED VALUATION

The assessed value of all real and personal property in Minnesota subject to ad valorem taxation for 1920, as equalized by the Minnesota Tax Commission is \$2,389,690,374

Personal property is assessed annually and real estate only in the even numbered years, except that new buildings are added.

It is to be understood that these figures do not include the value of railroad property in the state, nor the property of freight line, sleeping car, express, telephone and trust companies not doing a banking business, all of which are subject to a gross earnings tax. The value of this property has not been officially ascertained.

LEGAL HOLIDAYS

Legal holidays of the state, established by law, are: New Year's Day, the 1st of January; Christmas Day, the 25th of December; Lincoln's Birthday, February 12th; Washington's Birthday, February 22d; Memorial Day, May 30th; Independence Day, the 4th of July; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Good Friday, next preceding Easter Sunday; General Election Day, the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in even numbered years; Armistice Day, November 11. The statutes of the state indirectly recognize Sunday and Thanksgiving Day as commercial holidays, by providing that maturing paper, bills of exchange, etc., falling due on those days shall be due and payable on the business day following.

FISCAL YEAR

Chapter 165, G. S. 1919, designates the period of twelve months ending at midnight between June 30th and July 1st, as the fiscal year of the state of Minnesota. It provides further that the fiscal year of all official reports shall commence on the first day of July, except the reports of the insurance commissioner, which are made for the calendar year.

NOTARIES PUBLIC,

Notaries Public are appointed by the governor, for the term of seven years, upon a payment of a fee of three dollars and the filing of a bond in the sum of \$2,000.

GREAT LAKES—ST. LAWRENCE TIDEWATER COMMISSION OF MINNESOTA

Pursuant to the legislative resolution of 1919, creating the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Commission, the Board was constituted by the appointment of G. G. Hartley of Duluth, J. L. Record of Minneapolis, and M. J. Dowling of Olivia. Charles P. Craig, to whom one of the original appointments was tendered, had in the meantime taken the post of Executive Director in the service of the states associated.

Upon the resignation of G. G. Hartley of Duluth, A. H. Comstock of Duluth was appointed, and has been Chairman of the Commission from December, 1920.

Upon the death of Mr. Dowling, A. O. Moreaux of Luverne was appointed, and has been a member and the secretary of the Commission from May, 1921.

The work of this Commission is the work of the States associated. Its efforts have been put forth mainly through the association of States, and Minnesota has from the beginning taken a prominent and leading part in this Association.

The case for the west was proved before the International Joint Commission. The economic feasibility was determined; the Federal Administration has been committed to the project; satisfactory approaches to final conclusions have been made by the governments of Canada and the United States. And it is now anticipated that at an early date concrete proposals will be laid before the legislative bodies of the two countries, and that they will be approved by both.

Public judgment in Minnesota, and in the neighboring states, is firm in the opinion that this improvement will prove a continental benefit and a great gain to all the region served by the Lakes. No state will profit more by this than Minnesota, which will thus gain a seaport at the furthest extremity of this lakes-to-ocean route.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES

EXECUTIVE

STATE OFFICERS

GOVERNOR

Theodore Christianson (Republican), born on September 12, 1883, in Lac Qui Parle township, Lac Qui Parle county, Minnesota. Worked on a farm and attended country schools, and graduated in 1906 from the College of Science, Literature and Arts of the University of Minnesota and from the College of Law of the same institution in 1909. Was admitted to practice law in June, 1909, and engaged in the practice of his profession at Dawson, Minnesota, 9 miles from the farm on which he was born.

On July 1, 1909, he became the owner and publisher of the Dawson Sentinel, which he continued to publish until January 1, 1925.

He was elected a member of the House of Representatives in 1914 and served in the sessions of 1915-17-19-21 and 23; served as chairman of the Committee on Appropriations in 1917-19-21 and 23.

Was elected governor in November, 1924.

Was married on June 4, 1907, to Ruth Eleanor Donaldson at Dundas, Minnesota. Has two children, Robert, 16 years of age, and Theodore, Jr., 9 years of age.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

W. I. Nolan (Republican), native of Minnesota, educated in the common schools of Minneapolis, served in the legislature 1903, 1905, 1907, from the Forty-third District; 1911, 1913, 1917, 1919, 1921, and 1923, from the Thirty-third District; served as speaker of the house in the 1919, 1921 and 1923 sessions. Elected lieutenant governor in 1924. Married, and has seven daughters and three grandchildren.

SECRETARY OF STATE

Mike Holm (Republican) was born June 17, 1876, in Sweden. When he was seven years of age, his parents emigrated to the United States and settled in Marshall county. In 1887 the family moved to Roseau county in which they were pioneers and where Mr. Holm still resides. Mr. Holm was probate judge of Roseau county for 18 years, and a member of the Minnesota State Fair board for four years. He is married and has six children. He was elected secretary of state in 1920 and re-elected in 1922 and 1924.

STATE AUDITOR AND LAND COMMISSIONER

Ray P. Chase (Republican) was born at Anoka, March 12, 1880. Graduate of the Anoka high school, the University of Minnesota, and the St. Paul College of Law. He was in the newspaper business for ten years, as secretary-treasurer of the Anoka Herald Publishing Company. He was appointed clerk in the auditor's office in 1916, later in the same year was made deputy state auditor, and in January, 1921, was appointed state auditor by Governor Preus to succeed the latter when he was elected governor. He was elected state auditor in 1922. Mr. and Mrs. Chase have two daughters, Lora Lee and Phyllis.

STATE TREASURER

Henry Rines (Republican) was born in Stockmora, Orsa, Sweden, June 9, 1872. He has been a resident of Kanabec county for 40 years. Mr. Rines was assistant postmaster at Brunswick and when 19 years old went to Mora, his present home, to accept a similar position. At the age of 22 he was elected county auditor of Kanabec county, a position which he held ten years. Upon retiring from the county auditor's office, Mr. Rines engaged in the newspaper business by the purchase of the Kanabec County Times. In 1906 Mr. Rines was elected to the lower branch of the Minnesota legislature, a position which he held for four terms. In the session of 1913, his last term, he was speaker. Elected treasurer 1916 and re-elected 1918, 1920, 1922 and 1924.

ATTORNEY GENERAL

Clifford L. Hilton (Republican) was born at Kenyon, Goodhue county, Minnesota, December 8, 1866. Moved with his parents to Fergus Falls, Minnesota, in 1879; was graduated from the Fergus Falls high school in 1884 and from the University of Wisconsin College of Law in 1888. Admitted to practice in all courts of Minnesota and Wisconsin in 1888 and in the Supreme Court of the United States in 1911. Served as city attorney of Fergus Falls 1896-98. County attorney of Ottertail county 1899-1908. Assistant attorney general 1909-1917, and appointed deputy attorney general April, 1917. Appointed attorney general March 8, 1918, on the death of Lyndon A. Smith. Elected at the general election November 5, 1918, reelected 1920, 1922 and 1924. Married in 1891 to Frances C. Moll of Chicago, Illinois. They have one son, Bernard M. Residence, Fergus Falls, Minn.

CLERK OF THE STATE SUPREME COURT

Grace Fayette Kaercher (Republican), a daughter of the late A. B. Kaercher, of Ortonville, Minn., was born near West Union, Fayette county, Iowa, June 17, 1889, fourth of a family of eleven children. Her parents were Big Stone Lake pioneers, homesteading in 1881. Her father was born at Preston, Minn., and his people came from Alsace-Lorraine. Her mother, Gertrude M. Kaercher, is the daughter of South Dakota pioneers. Miss Grace Kaercher was educated at Ortonville and took a business course, becoming secretary

to her father in the land, loan, law and insurance business in 1907, and continued in that work, now being a member of the firm of A. B. Kaercher & Co. with her four brothers. For one year she managed a branch land office at Ada, Minn. She attended and took an interest in flood control and drainage matters, her father having been president of the Tri-State Flood Control Association. Her father was county attorney eight years and had an extensive practice, so Miss Kaercher has had 15 years of law office experience. She has been active in farm club activities. She is chairman of the Big Stone County Republican Women's Association, Ortonville Independent associate editor, secretary-treasurer of the Big Stone County Farm Bureau Association, American Legion Auxiliary member, and served as secretary of the Minnesota River Drainage and Conservancy district as secretary in her development work for west central Minnesota.

RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSIONERS

Chairman O. P. B. Jacobson (Republican) was born in Fredriksvarn, Norway, on July 2, 1857. Was educated in the city schools of Sandefjord, and later graduated from the Navigation Board of Kristiania. Came to Fergus Falls, Minnesota, in 1884. Has been engaged in the mercantile, implement and grain trade, and for several years editor of the "Fergus Falls Ugeblad." Was a member of the State Board of Grain Appeals for three years, and appointed by Governor Eberhart on the Board of Railroad and Warehouse Commissioners to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Charles F. Staples. Was nominated and elected for the same position in November, 1914, for a term of six years; re-elected in 1920.

Ivan Bowen (Republican), attorney, of Mankato. Was born January 28, 1886, at Sleepy Eye, Brown county; attended public schools of Nicollet and Blue Earth counties, graduating from Mankato High School; received his law degree at Georgetown Law College, Washington, D. C., in 1911; member of the bar of the District of Columbia and Minnesota, practicing at Mankato since 1913; served overseas as Captain of Field Artillery with the Eighty-ninth Division. He was appointed by Governor Preus May 9, 1921, to fill the vacancy on the Railroad and Warehouse Commission created by the death of the late Judge Ira B. Mills. Elected for the six-year term commencing Jan. 1, 1923.

Colonel Frank W. Matson (Republican), born Sept. 25, 1874, St. Paul. Served in Spanish-American War as Second Lieutenant 14th Minn. Infantry, and in World War as Major and Lieut. Colonel of 35th Minn. Infantry, converted to 125th Field Artillery. Commissioner of Finance and Commissioner of Public Safety, City of St. Paul. Married and has three children.

CHIEF INSPECTOR OF GRAIN

George H. Tunell was born September 26, 1858, on a farm near Albert Lea, Minnesota. He was engaged in farming until 1880, when he became a wheat buyer for country elevator. Mr. Tunell entered the service of the grain inspection department of the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse

Commission, in August, 1889, as deputy inspector of grain at Duluth. Five years later he was promoted to be first assistant chief deputy inspector at Minneapolis. He served in this capacity for seventeen years. In 1911 Mr. Tunell became chief deputy inspector at Minneapolis, from which position he was promoted to become chief inspector for the department in May, 1917, upon the resignation of H. E. Emerson. Mr. Tunell is a married man with a family.

SUPERVISOR OF TELEPHONES

James W. Howatt, supervisor of telephones under the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission, was born August 27, 1880, in Wabasha county, Minnesota. Attended the local schools and the high school at Wabasha. Took an engineering course at the University of Minnesota. Connected with telephony since 1897, having had supervision over commercial, traffic, maintenance, construction, and engineering departments of the business. In these lines of work he has been stationed at Melrose, Wadena, St. Cloud and Minneapolis, and is now a resident of St. Paul. His appointment as supervisor of telephones dates from July 1, 1915, when the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission under a legislative act of that year assumed jurisdiction over the telephone utilities in the state.

SECRETARY, RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COM'MISSION

Thomas Yapp was born in Liverpool, England, Dec. 6, 1852. Educated at Liverpool College. Moved to Montreal, Canada, in 1874 and engaged in railroad work with the Grand Trunk Railway. Came to St. Paul in 1886 to work for the Chicago, Burlington & Northern Railway. Employed in the Railroad and Warehouse Commission from 1894 to the present time as statistician, rate clerk, assistant secretary and secretary.

CHIEF RATE EXPERT, RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSION

Allan Flinn was born in Manchester, England, Dec. 6, 1864. Received his education in St. Bedes College, Manchester. Moved to Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 1888 and engaged in railroad work with the Canadian Pacific Railway. Came to Minneapolis in 1888 and engaged in railroad work in Minnesota and Iowa until appointed rate clerk for the Commission in 1902. Since that time he has been employed as rate clerk and chief rate expert. Mr. Flinn is a married man with a family.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY, RAILROAD COMMISSION

George G. Grant was born in St. Paul, Sept. 21, 1884. Received his education in the public schools of St. Paul. Commenced work with the Great Northern Railway, Motive Power Department, in 1900. Connected with the Traffic Department, Northern Pacific Railroad, from 1905 to 1907. Appointed as stenographer in the Grain Inspection Department of the Commission in 1907. Has been employed by the Commission since that time continuously, as a stenographer, reporter, chief clerk of Grain department,

and assistant secretary. Mr. Grant is a married man and has one daughter, Betty.

COMMISSIONER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

Raymond F. Barron was born January 1, 1888, at Brainerd and graduated from the high school in that city in 1906. After being employed three years as a railroad accountant, he was in the United States customs service for five years. Mr. Barron was appointed inspector of weights and measures in 1917, and on January 1, 1921, was appointed head of the department by the state railroad and warehouse commission to succeed Charles C. Neale, resigned.

PRIVATE SECRETARY TO GOVERNOR

Harry J. Acton was born at Madison, Minnesota, February 9, 1893. He attended the common school and high school there. He was graduated from the College of Law, University of Minnesota, in 1917, and was admitted to the bar on the 15th day of June, 1917. He enlisted on May 7, 1917, in the First Officers Training Camp at Fort Snelling, Minnesota, and was commissioned, in August of that year, a second lieutenant, U. S. Infantry. On June 7, 1918, he went overseas with "D" Company, 359th Infantry, 90th Division. He was promoted to First Lieutenant, and participated with his company in the St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives. He was wounded in action on November 2, 1918, and was cited in orders for gallantry in action on that day. He joined his organization in Germany after returning from the hospital, and returned to the United States as a staff officer of the 180th Infantry Brigade of the 90th Division. He was honorably discharged from the service on July 2, 1919. Since September, 1919, until the time of his appointment as private secretary to the governor, he has been engaged in the practice of law at Madison, Minnesota, in the firm of Ewing & Acton, and served as Republican county chairman for Lac qui Parle, County in the last two campaigns.

EXECUTIVE CLERK

Gustav B. Wollan was born in Glenwood, Minnesota, on September 21, 1877. Was graduated from Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, in June, 1897. Taught English and Greek for two years at the Glenwood Academy. Assistant cashier of Pope County State Bank, Glenwood, 1899-1903. Assistant secretary, State Senate, sessions of 1903 and 1905. Editor Glenwood Gopher, 1903-05. With Hanna Coal Co., St. Paul, 1905-07. Employed in newspaper work in Duluth, Barnesville and St. Paul, 1907 to 1918. Private secretary to Mayor L. C. Hodgson, St. Paul, 1918-20. Membership secretary of St. Paul Association, 1920-22. Life insurance solicitor 1922 to February 7, 1924, when appointed executive clerk by Governor J. A. O. Preus. Married in 1903 and has five sons.

GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE CLERK

Herman E. Samuelson was born in Nicollet county, Minn., July 22, 1882. Was graduated from Gustavus Adolphus college, St. Peter, in 1903;

was instructor in high school, Renville, Minn., one year, and news writer on St. Paul and Minneapolis dailies from 1904 to 1914. He served as executive clerk 1915 to 1924, secretary to the governor during 1924, and was re-appointed executive clerk in 1925. He is married and has three children.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE

J. P. Bengtson was born January 14, 1881, and grew up on a farm near Lake Park, Minn. He was educated in the public schools of Lake Park, the Moorhead State Normal and the University of Minnesota. For nineteen years he has been engaged in school work in this state, seven years as principal of the graded school at Evansville, four years in charge of the Roseau public schools, and for the past eight years as preceptor and instructor in the Northwest School of Agriculture, Crookston, Minn. In 1912 he was married to Mary E. McLaughlin of Willmar, Minn. They have three children.

CHIEF CLERK SECRETARY OF STATE

W. N. Brown, 3827 North Lyndale Ave., Minneapolis, has been chief clerk in the office of the secretary of state for eight years, during two administrations. He was born March 20, 1863, at Bloomfield, III., and located in Minneapolis in 1889. He is a member of all Masonic bodies, past state consul of the Modern Woodmen of America and past head consul of the Woodmen of the World. He was married to Minnie B. Kemp of St. Paul July 9, 1882. He is the president of the Minneapolis Court of Honor of Boy Scouts of America. He has three daughters.

CHIEF DEPUTY STATE AUDITOR

Matt J. Desmond, deputy state auditor, was born at Rushford, Minnesota, October 3, 1872. Attended graded and high schools, business college and studied law. Served ten years in railroad accounting and twenty-two years continuous service in State Auditor's Department.

SUPERINTENDENT OF STATE MINES

F. A. Wildes was born May 28, 1871, at Phippsburg, Maine, of old colonial Massachusetts and Maryland families. His father, grandfathers and other ancestors served the country in its wars. Moving to Minnesota at an early age, he lived on a farm near Mankato. He taught country school, was graduated from the Mankato Teachers College, was superintendent of graded and high schools, received a degree in law at the University of Minnesota, practiced law, is a registered professional engineer in mining, and is now superintendent of the department of mines of the State Auditor's office. He is married and has one daughter.

CHIEF OF ACCOUNTS

John H. Kaisersatt, born in Le Sueur county, Minnesota, February 10, 1873. Educated in the public schools of Le Sueur county. Was deputy

county auditor seven years and county auditor of Le Sueur county six years. Was appointed warrant clerk in the State Auditor's office in September, 1916, and was so employed until July 1, 1921, receiving appointment as chief of accounts in the same office.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF TIMBER

Otto H. Diercks is a native of Minnesota, having been born in 1886 in Minneapolis. He attended the public schools in that city and in 1907 entered the employ of a lumber company at Baudette, Minnesota. Later he engaged in the lumber, timber and drainage business. Mr. Diercks served as clerk of the committee on appropriations during the 1917 and 1919 sessions of the Legislature. He was appointed assistant superintendent of timber in May, 1917, by Auditor J. A. O. Preus and upon the resignation of Oscar Arneson in January, 1919, was advanced to the office he now holds.

DEPUTY STATE TREASURER

Walter C. Martin was born at Lake Mills, Iowa, April 27, 1881, and educated in the Lake Mills public schools. Moved to Minnesota in 1906. SECRETARY STATE BOARD OF INVESTMENT

William H. Lamson was born on a farm near Winona, Minnesota; graduate of Minnesota University law school; practiced at Duluth for six years and at Hinckley since 1908; county attorney of Pine county two terms. Was appointed as the first secretary of the investment board, in August, 1917.

DEPUTY ATTORNEY GENERAL

James E. Markham was born in Rochester, New York, July 21, 1859. He was graduated from Gennessee Valley Seminary, June, 1876; was admitted to practice law at Buffalo, New York, 1881, came to Minnesota and located at St. Paul, May, 1886, where he has practiced his profession ever since. He was city attorney of St. Paul from 1897 to 1903.

ASSISTANT ATTORNEYS GENERAL

Rollin L. Smith, attorney of special claims for the department, was born in Mankato, in 1887, and moved to Minneapolis with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Smith, at an early age. He is a graduate of Princeton and of the law department of the University of Minnesota. Mr. Smith entered the attorney general's department in 1914. Married.

Albert F. Pratt, Anoka, was born and raised on a farm in Anoka county. Graduate of Anoka high school, 1889; University of Minnesota, 1893, and College of Law, 1895—Phi Beta Kappa, Psi Upsilon, Phi Delta Phi.

Served as city attorney of Anoka, 1899 to 1901; Anoka county attorney, 1900 to 1914, and as state representative in 44th district, 1915 and 1917. Enlisted as a private Co. B, Third Minnesota Infantry, N. G., May 18, 1889, and served continuously until January 20, 1919; first lieutenant, 14th Minn. U. S. Vol. Inf. during war with Spain; captain of 3rd Minn. Inf., April, 1899; promoted to major, December, 1907, and lieutenant-colonel, July 21, 1916; served on Mexican border; lieutenant-colonel 3rd Minn. Inf., U. S. A., 125th F. A. and 126th F. A., U. S. A. American Expeditionary Forces, July 15, 1917, to Jan. 20, 1919.

G. Aaron Youngquist was born in Sweden November 4, 1885; resident of Minnesota since 1889. Was graduated from St. Paul College of Law and admitted to the bar in 1909. County attorney of Polk county 1915-1918. Was commissioned captain, Army Service Corps, U. S. A., in October, 1918. Married. Residence, Crookston.

Ernest C. Carman (Republican); born at Independence, Penn., March 28, 1880. Attended public schools in Pennsylvania and Ohio; State Normal School and University of West Virginia; taught school and also engaged in newspaper business; United States Treasury Department, Washington, D. C., for six years; was graduated in 1909 from law department of University of Pennsylvania; admitted to practice in Minnesota in 1910. Married. Residence, Minneapolis.

Charles E. Phillips (Republican); graduate law department University of Minnesota 1906; practiced law at Mankato, Minnesota; city attorney of Mankato 1915 to 1919; county attorney Blue Earth county 1919 to 1923; appointed assistant attorney general June, 1923. Residence, Mankato.

Victor E. Anderson; born on a farm near Wheaton, Minnesota, 1883; graduate of Northwestern College and University of Minnesota; admitted to the bar in 1906 and practiced law at Wheaton; county attorney of Traverse county 1910-12; secretary Board of Education 13 years; secretary County Farm Bureau 12 years; secretary School Board Division M. E. A. 3 years; president Minnesota School Board Association 4 years; assistant secretary, treasurer and counsel for Minnesota Farm Bureau Federation 5 years. Married. Residence, Wheaton.

William Harold Gurnee; born in Hutchinson, McLeod county, Minnesota, in 1885; educated in public schools of Minneapolis; graduate of law department, University of Minnesota, 1908; practiced law at Duluth; assistant city attorney of Duluth for two years; appointed assistant attorney general February, 1924. Married. Residence, Duluth.

DEPUTY CLERK OF SUPREME COURT

Peter O. Scow (Republican) was born March 24, 1869, at the town of Gale, Trempealeau county, Wis. He received his early education at the public schools at Galesville, Wis. He went to Long Prairie, Minnesota, in the fall of 1891 and entered into partnership with Charles H. Ward under the firm name of Ward & Scow, doing a general merchandise business under

this name until 1897. In 1898 he was elected clerk of the District Court of Todd county and held the office continuously for twenty years. He is married. Appointed deputy clerk, Supreme Court, January 6, 1919.

BOARD OF CONTROL

C. J. Swendsen, appointed by Governor Eberhart for the six-year term commencing April, 3, 1911, was born in Sweden, Province of Smoland. He is a graduate of the Polytechnic School of Boras, Sweden. He has been a member of the city council of St. James, and has been president of the board of education. Mr. Swendsen for twenty-three years has been on board of Gustavus Adolphus College of St. Peter, Minn., and was engaged in the mercantile business at St. James. He served in 1907 and 1909 legislature as a representative from Watonwan and Martin counties. He was reappointed in 1917 and 1923.

Ralph W. Wheelock is a native of Ohio, coming west in the early eighties to locate in Dakota as a newspaper publisher. After twelve years of experience in this line at Mitchell, during which period he served as secretary to the capitol commission, deputy secretary of state, and receiver of the United States Land Office, he removed to Minneapolis, where he has since been engaged in newspaper work. Mr. Wheelock was secretary to Mayor D. P. Jones of that city during that official's term, and in October, 1909, was selected by Governor A. O. Eberhart, to serve in a like capacity. He resigned as private secretary in April, 1913, and was appointed a member of the Board of Control for a term of six years, to succeed P. M. Ringdal, and re-appointed January, 1919.

Mrs. Blanche L. La Du, of Minneapolis, was born in Waseca county on a farm and is a graduate of the Waseca High School. Later she was graduated from the Winona Normal School and taught school for several years. She is a graduate of the College of Law of the University of Minnesota, class of 1905. Mrs. La Du practiced law at Pine River, Minn. She has made her home in Minneapolis for several years, where she has been prominent in club activities. She is the mother of two children. She was appointed a member of the Board of Control in 1921, and re-appointed for a term of six years in 1924.

John Coleman was born on November 20, 1852, in Ireland and has been a resident of Minnesota 56 years. He has been connected with the departments and boards of which he is now a member for 25 years, or prior to the time of the organization of the Board of Control as now perfected. He was superintendent of the Anoka State Asylum for 22 years. He was county commissioner for Anoka county for 12 years and has held numerous positions of trust. He owns and is interested in farms.

Downer Mullen was born in Wabasha, Minn., May 20, 1880. Appointed to position in accounting department, State Board of Control, September, 1903, was advanced to the position of purchasing agent May, 1912, and was appointed secretary of the Board, October, 1913.

TAX COMMISSION

Samuel Lord was born in Marion, Olmsted county, Minnesota, February 25, 1859. Came with his parents to Mantorville, Minnesota, the same year. Was educated in the public schools at Mantorville, Shattuck School and Carleton College. Studied law with Hon. C. D. Murray in Dunkirk, N. Y., 1881-1883. Engaged in locating land in Florida 1883-1885. Admitted to the bar in 1885 and located at Kasson the same year. Was county attorney of Dodge county twelve years, 1887 to 1899, and served as state senator eight years, from 1899 to 1907. Was appointed a member of the Minnesota Tax Commission by Governor Johnson at the time of its organization in 1907, and was re-appointed by Governor Eberhart in 1911, by Governor Burnquist in 1917, and by Governor Preus in 1923. Was delegate at large to the National Republican Convention in 1900 where he served as chairman of the Minnesota delegation and took an active part in securing the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt as vice president. Was president of the National Tax Association 1921-1922.

J. G. Armson, a resident of Stillwater, was appointed a member of the Tax Commission in 1909 by Governor J. A. Johnson. He was re-appointed in 1915 by Governor W. S. Hammond, and again in 1921 by Governor J. A. O. Preus.

Odin Halden was born in 1862 in Norway and received a high school education in his native land. In 1881 he immigrated to the United States and engaged in the mercantile business in Minnesota. Mr. Halden accepted the post of deputy auditor in St. Louis county in 1888 and in 1894 was elected county auditor and held that office continuously for twenty-four years. He was appointed a member of the state tax commission by Governor Preus in January, 1921. to succeed John B. Sanborn, St. Paul, resigned.

Nicholas A. Nelson was born in Norway, November 4, 1868, and in 1871 his parents moved to Milwaukee, where he received a public school education. He moved to Minnesota in 1880 and lived on a farm near Morris until 1888, when he removed to Stillwater, where he has since resided. Entered newspaper work in 1889. Served two terms as Stillwater city assessor; later elected city councilman and in 1906 was elected Washington county auditor. Held the latter office until February, 1920, when he became secretary to the Minnesota Tax Commission. He is married and has two sons and two daughters.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Charles M. Babcock, commissioner of highways, was born August 10, 1871, in Sherburne county, has resided there almost continuously and still continues his residence in Elk River in that county. He entered the University of Minnesota in 1892 and after leaving college engaged in the general mercantile business in Elk River, became associated in banking and other enterprises and later became identified with the development of better highways in Minnesota. Mr. Babcock was appointed a member of the Minnesota

Highway commission on November 9, 1909, and when the administration was placed under a single commissioner was appointed April 7, 1917, to that office. He formulated the plan for a state system of trunk highways to be improved and maintained with motor vehicle tax revenue and federal highway aid. The plan was adopted by an overwhelmingly favorable vote on Good Roads Constitutional Amendment No. 1 in 1919. Mr. Babcock formerly was president of the American Association of State Highway Officials and is prominent in national good roads councils.

John H. Mullen, first assistant commissioner and chief highway engineer, is a native Minnesotan, born April 29, 1884, in St. Paul. He has been engaged in road work for fifteen years. He first was employed as superintendent of highways in Pine county and in 1909 took a position in the state highway department. He was made assistant to George W. Cooley, then state highway engineer, in 1911, and has since been in charge of state road work.

J. T. Ellison, second assistant highway commissioner and chief bridge engineer in the department, was born July 6, 1881, at Winnebago City, Minnesota. After attending high schools in Iowa, he entered the University of Minnesota and was graduated in 1909 from the college of civil engineering. Later he was employed on the Minnesota iron range and in Minneapolis and as a drainage engineer in the western part of the state. He became a member of the state highway organization in 1911 and was appointed chief bridge engineer in 1917 and assistant commissioner in 1922.

INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

Henry McColl, chairman of the Industrial Commission, since July 1, 1923, was born in Chicago, March 2, 1866, moved with his parents to St. Paul in 1873 and has resided here since. He was educated in parochial schools. At an early age he obtained employment in a retail drug store. Engaged in the retail drug business in 1889 and was a drug store proprietor more than twenty-five years. Served as a member in the House of Representatives in the Legislative Sessions of 1903 and 1905 and as State Senator in 1907 and 1909. He was elected a member of the Board of Aldermen of St. Paul in 1912 and by that body elected its president. In 1914 the city government having changed to the commission form, Mr. McColl was elected councilman and by the Mayor assigned to the Commissionership of Public Safety. Re-elected in 1916 and 1918 and re-assigned to the same commissionership. Appointed by Governor Preus in 1921 as a member of the Industrial Commission when that body was created.

F. A. Duxbury was born in Fillmore county, Minn., April 11, 1862. He is a lawyer and practiced at Caledonia for thirty years until appointed chairman of the State Industrial Commission when it was created in 1921. Mr. Duxbury was a member of the Minnesota Senate from 1911 to 1917, inclusive.

James D. Williams was born in Minneapolis, November 21, 1878. He was a printer. Was appointed as a member of the Industrial Commission of Minnesota on March 15, 1921.

John P. Gardiner was born at Dundee, Scotland, February 8, 1870, a machinist by trade. Came to the United States in 1888. On the death of W. F. Houk, July 20, 1918, Mr. Gardiner was appointed commissioner to fill the unexpired term and in November, 1918, Governor Burnquist appointed him commissioner for the full four-year term beginning January 6, 1919. The 1921 Legislature abolished the office and Mr. Gardiner was appointed as secretary of the Industrial Commission.

COMPENSATION DIRECTOR

Frank E. Hoffman was born at Hudson, Wis., Feb. 26, 1875. Moved to Minnesota when 13 years old. Appointed deputy labor commissioner by Governor John A. Johnson in 1905. Promoted to assistant labor commissioner in July, 1918, by John P. Gardiner, commissioner. Appointed head of the division of compensation of Industrial Commission.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Albert J. Chesley, M.D., secretary and executive officer Minnesota State Board of Health. Graduated from the College of Medicine and Surgery. University of Minnesota, 1907, was born September 12, 1877, in Minneapolis. He was a private and non-commissioned officer in Co. F, 13th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry, during Spanish War and Philippine insurrection. Began work for State Board of Health June, 1901, as clerk; 1902-1907, laboratory assistant, part time; 1907-1910, assistant bacteriologist, then bacteriologist; December, 1910, to July, 1912, epidemiologist; July, 1912-May, 1914, director Division of Epidemiology; May, 1914-May, 1921, director, Division of Preventable Diseases. At request of American Red Cross was granted leave of absence without salary from May, 1918, to October, 1920. During this period served as public health expert for American Red Cross Commission to France and as chief of Health Inspection Service to March, 1919, then as chief of staff for American Red Cross Commission to Poland to July, 1919, and then as commissioner. Returned to Division of Preventable Diseases, October 1, 1920. Detailed by Board as acting executive officer November 11, 1920, and appointed secretary and executive officer May 1, 1921, upon resignation of Dr. C. E. Smith, Jr. Appointed associate professor, Department of Preventive Medicine and Public Health, University of Minnesota, October 1, 1922, without salary.

Orianna McDaniel, M.D., director, Division of Preventable Diseases, was born in Durham, New Hampshire, receiving her early education in that state. After graduating from the Medical Department of the University of Michigan in 1894, she served fifteen months as interne in the Northwestern Hospital, Minneapolis, completing the hospital work in 1895. The following year, 1896, she began work as bacteriologist in the laboratories of the State Board of Health, and except for a few months in 1897-98, has continued in the service of the State Board of Health. She was placed in charge of the Pasteur Institute from the date of its opening in 1907 to its closing in 1921, and also acted from 1917 to 1921 as assistant director of the Division of Preventable Diseases. In 1921 she was made director of the Division of Preventable Diseases.

Harold Arthur Whittaker, director, Division of Sanitation, was born near North Prairie, Wisconsin, August 2, 1882. He was graduated from the University of Wisconsin 1903 with Ph.G. degree, and in 1906 with B.A. degree. He acted as student assistant with the Wisconsin State Hygienic Laboratory in 1904 and 1905; was employed by the Ohio State Board of Health as assistant chemist and bacteriologist in 1906; and by the Minnesota State Board of Health as chemist in 1907. Was scientific assistant with the United States Department of Agriculture in 1908. Returned to Minnesota State Board of Health in 1909 as chief of the Water and Sewage Laboratory; was appointed assistant director, Laboratory Division, in 1912; assistant director, Division of Sanitation, 1914; and director, Division of Sanitation, in 1915, which position he holds at the present time. During 1918, he was sent by the American Red Cross to France as sanitary representative of the Bureau of Hospital Administration. He has been assistant professor in the Department of Preventive Medicine and Public Health of the University of Minnesota since 1922 (without salary).

- O. C. Pierson, director, Division of Records, was born in Red Wing, Minn., Feb. 26, 1873, where he attended the public and high schools. In 1888 he entered the employ of the State Board of Health, the offices of which were then at Red Wing. He has been continually with the Board since that time. With the Board's offices he moved to St. Paul in 1894. In 1892 he was made chief clerk. In 1906 he was appointed assistant secretary. In 1917 the Board created the Division of Records and appointed him as its director.
- H. G. Irvine, M.D., director, Division of Venereal Diseases. School, University of Minnesota, 1903, was born Portland, Me., October 16, 1881. Post graduate work London and University of Vienna during year of 1911. Private practice, limited to skin and venereal diseases since 1911 in Minneapolis. Teacher on staff of Medical School since 1906; now associate professor of skin diseases and syphilis, University of Minnesota. As a war service organized the Bureau of Venereal Diseases (the first in the country) of the California State Board of Health in Sept., 1917, remaining there until March, 1918. In 1918 organized Division of Venereal Diseases of Minnesota State Board of Health and since its organization has been director of it. Has been commissioned special consultant in the United States Public Health Service and now holds title of acting assistant'surgeon in that service. Was examined and accepted in the Medical Corps of the Army during summer of 1918, although listed as an essential teacher at the University; the application for commission was before the Personnel Division of the Surgeon General's office at the time of signing of the Armistice in Nov., 1918.

Ruth E. Boynton, M.D., director, Division of Child Hygiene. Born in La Crosse, Wisconsin, January 3, 1896, was graduated from high school and state normal school at La Crosse. Received Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Wisconsin, 1918; M.D. degree from University of Minnesota Medical School, 1921. December, 1921, to Nov., 1923, assistant director Students' Health Service, and instructor in Department of Preventive Medicine and Public Health at the University of Minnesota. Appointed director of the Division of Child Hygiene November, 1923.

Mrs. Yerda C. Pierson, director, Division of Vital Statistics, was born in Red Wing, where she attended high school and business college. Entered the employ of State Board of Health as clerk in 1894. Resigned in 1903. In 1908 was requested by Board to return on a part time basis and take charge of work connected with Vital Statistics. This resulted in the entire reorganization of this work, and in 1910 Minnesota gained admission to the U. S. Registration Area of Deaths established by the Census Bureau, and was one of the ten states comprising the primary Birth Registration Area established in 1915. The Division of Vital Statistics was created in 1915, at which time the Board appointed Mrs. Pierson as its director.

STATE SECURITIES COMMISSION

Dr. E. H. Haas, of the State Securities Commission, was born in Chicago on December 25, 1875. He is a graduate of the Colleges of Dentistry and Medicine of the University of Minnesota and practiced in St. Paul for more than 15 years. He is and has been great commander of the Knights of Maccabees of Minnesota and a member of the National Board of Directors for seventeen years; chairman of the Ramsey County Republican club, and was president of the St. Paul Lincoln club in 1922.

E. W. Stark was born in Chisago county, Minn., and attended the schools of that county. In 1900 he was elected as a member of the Minnesota Legislature, serving in House sessions of 1901, special session of 1902 and in 1903. Shortly after that time he was appointed as probate judge of Chisago county and was elected to that office continuously until appointed as a member of the State Securities Commission by Governor Preus in April of 1921. His legal residence was at Harris and at Center City while probate judge. He is married.

Henry C. Brasie was born at Monticello, Minnesota, in 1869. Graduated from the high school there. Taught school several years. Was deputy auditor and auditor of Wright county for ten years. Assistant cashier of the State Bank at Monticello and cashier of the Citizens State Bank of Osseo. Worked at the insurance business. Was investment clerk in the state auditor's office seven years. Married.

GAME AND FISH COMMISSIONER

James F. Gould was born in Medford, Mass., August 19, 1887. Is a graduate of the public schools of Medford and Malden, Mass., and Burdette College, Boston. Resides at 126 Arthur Ave. S. E., Minneapolis. Married and has four children. Officer Minnesota National Guard. Was manager State Land Department under Auditor J. A. O. Preus from January 1, 1917, to March 1, 1919, inclusive. Elected member Minneapolis Board of Education 1923. Appointed Game and Fish Commissioner by Governor J. A. O. Preus, August 3, 1923.

ASSISTANT GAME AND FISH COMMISSIONER

Charles W. Henke was born at Baldwin, Wisconsin, on December 22, 1874. He received a public school education and took up the printing and newspaper business early in life. He edited newspapers at various points in

Wisconsin and Minnesota and for the past twenty-five years has been editor of the Dispatch at Dassel, Minnesota. He was chief clerk of the Game and Fish Department in 1913-1914 and publicity director of the Public Safety Commission during the World War. He began his duties as assistant commissioner in August, 1923.

S. A. Selvog, superintendent Minnesota State Fisheries, born in Eksund P. O., west coast of Norway, 1879: Came to Minnesota 1894 at the age of 15 years. Worked on farm and lumber woods in early days. Worked in stores and engaged in different business ventures on own account up to 1908 when engaged in the hotel and fishing business at Warroad, Minnesota, and continued in this business until 1917, when employed by the State Game and Fish Department as superintendent of Minnesota State Fisheries. Common school education. Married and has 3 children.

CHIEF WARDEN

D. A. Peterson was born on farm in Iowa, 1880. Educated at common school and at age of fourteen moved to Pilot Mound, Iowa. Worked in general merchandise store in the daytime and attended school at night. Twenty years ago moved to Brainerd, Minnesota. Engaged in general merchandise business ten years, automobile business four years, served on city council at Brainerd two terms and was city treasurer one term. Later years game warden. Appointed chief warden in 1923.

Albert C. Klancke was born at Norwood, Carver county, Minnesota, April 12, 1884. Schooling in common graded and high school, and University of Minnesota. With Minnesota Game and Fish Department since 1910 as hatchery assistant, chief clerk in office and supervisor of commercial fishing. Married and residing in St. Paul.

SUPERINTENDENT FISH PROPAGATION

Thaddeus Surber was born in West Virginia, February 19, 1871. Educated in his native state. Early in life took up study of zoology and was three years at Field Museum of Natural History as zoological collector. Entered service of U. S. Bureau of Fisheries in 1903, and continued in that service until 1916, serving as fish culturist, fishery expert and scientific assistant. First came to Minnesota in 1911, but did not become resident of State until 1914. Has been connected with Game and Fish Department since 1917 as biologist, taking up present duties October 1, 1923.

RURAL CREDIT BUREAU

Edwin J. Oppliger, farmer member Rural Credit Bureau, appointed chairman by Gov. Preus. Born March 22, 1874, at Owatonna, Minn; 4 years in meat business with father and for himself; 10 years purebred livestock farming near Hancock, Minn.; 3 years in nursery business at Faribault, Minn.; at present and for past 12 years purebred livestock farming at Forest Lake, Minn. Married Calista A. Johnston, of Owatonna, in 1897, family consists of 2 sons and 4 daughters.

T. O. Ofsthun, born in Norway, June 5, 1866; immigrated with parents to western part of Pope county, Minnesota, in 1872; moved to Glenwood, Minnesota, in 1890. Was elected register of deeds of Pope county in 1896 and served in that capacity until January, 1909. Was elected cashier of Pope County State Bank in 1907 and resigned in 1917 to accept a position with the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul. Was elected assistant treasurer of the Federal Land Bank in 1918 and resigned to accept the appointment of secretary of the Minnesota Rural Credit Bureau, April, 1923. Has been a resident of St. Paul since June, 1918. Married and has a family of five girls and two boys.

Ludvig Gullickson was born in Bloomfield township, Fillmore county, Minnesota, October 20, 1875. Practiced law at Preston, Minnesota, for several years. Moved to Spring Valley, Minnesota, in 1913, where he continued in the practice of law until appointed a member of the Minnesota Rural Credit Bureau in April 1923. Is married and has two children.

SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION

James M. McConnell was born in Pennsylvania in 1868; attended rural schools and academy; was graduated from Edinboro State Normal school, and was a law student for two years. A. J. Veigel, born November 30, 1872, Mankato, Minnesota. Graduate of Mankato Normal school, 1893. Appointed superintendent of banks on May 1, 1923.

DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT OF BANKS

George H. Sivwright, born July 16, 1879, Sycamore, Illinois. Moved with his parents to Hutchinson, Minnesota, in July, 1893. Graduate of Hutchinson high school. Worked in Bank of Hutchinson from September, 1899, to October, 1914. Appointed to examining force of the Department of Banking in October, 1914; appointed deputy superintendent November 1, 1916.

EXAMINER BANKING DEPARTMENT

William Adelbert Smith, examiner in charge of liquidation, born Ionia, Michigan, Dec. 18, 1867. Removed to Windom, Minnesota, 1871. Educated public schools at Windom and Hamline University. Banking business at Windom seventeen years. State senator Cottonwood and Jackson counties 1903 and 1905. Married.

COMMISSIONER OF INSURANCE

George W. Wells, Jr., was born in St. Paul June 13, 1892, and attended the graded and high schools and Macalester college in St. Paul. He is a graduate of the St. Paul College of Law, class of 1916, and practiced law a short time. He was secretary of the State Securities Commission for two and a half years and was appointed an examiner in the insurance department in April of 1921. Was made deputy in March of 1922 and commissioner on June 1, 1922.

COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION

Oscar H. Smith was born in Wisconsin December 22, 1872, and came to Minnesota in 1888. He was engaged in the newspaper and real estate business at Lester Prairie, Minnesota, for 25 years prior to his appointment as commissioner of immigration in May, 1921.

ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION

Wilhelm Michelet was born in Madison, Wisconsin, November 15, 1873. Received his schooling in the public schools of Minneapolis and was graduated from the College of Law, University of Minnesota, in 1903. County attorney of Red Lake county, 1909-1910; probate judge of Pennington county, 1910-1919; and United States Commissioner, 1908-1921. Was appointed superintendent of state lands Sept. 1, 1921, by State Auditor Ray P. Chase. He resigned Oct. 1, 1924, to accept the position he now holds. Married and has two children.

DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER

Chris. Heen was born in Norway, near Christiania, September 26, 1868, and came to Rice county, Minnesota, with his parents in 1874. Four years later the family moved to Todd county, where he has been actively engaged in farming and dairying since 1890. He served as county commissioner of Todd county for eight years and has served as town clerk for twenty-eight consecutive years. He organized the Osakis Co-operative Creamery Association in 1909. Was elected secretary and manager of this association and served in that capacity for twelve years. Has served as secretary for the local Farmers' Telephone Company for ten years. Has served as secretary for the Gordon Skandinavian Mutual Fire Insurance Company for twelve years. Was one of the original incorporators of the Mutual Creamery and Cheese Factory Liability Insurance Company and has served as its secretary since its organization. Was president of Minnesota State Dairymen's Association for two years, and has served many years as its secretary. Was appointed dairy and food commissioner April 1, 1920.

ASSISTANT DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER

A. D. Sibbald was born on a farm in Ontario on March 23, 1867. He went to Michigan in 1888, where he entered the employ of a lumber company; came to Minnesota and settled in Duluth in 1891, where he was again employed in the lumber business. Was chief deputy in the office of the Surveyor of Logs and Lumber before being appointed dairy and food inspector in 1911. Was appointed assistant commissioner in 1917.

COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE

N. J. Holmberg, farmer, born at Renville, Minnesota, July 24, 1878. Graduate of school of agriculture, University of Minnesota, 1902. Representative from the 23rd legislative district, 1907-1909-1911-1913. Served in the state senate 1915-1917. Was appointed to the board of grain appeals January 1, 1919, and appointed commissioner of agriculture June 1, 1919.

DEPUTY COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE

J. H. Hay is of Scotch-Canadian origin; resident of Minnesota for thirty years; educator and farmer, at present and for years past farming in Pennington county, Minnesota.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL

Walter F. Rhinow was born May 5, 1878, Newark, New Jersey. Came to Minnesota in 1899 with the 8th United States Infantry. His military career covers a period of twelve years in the United States Army, with service during the Spanish-American war, Cuban occupation and Philippine insurrection. Was appointed military instructor at the University of Minnesota in 1909, which office he held eight years, during which time he was appointed captain of Battery "F," 1st Minnesota Field Artillery, serving during the Mexican border trouble. Resigned the position at the University to accept the appointment of military secretary to the governor, May, 1917;

he was subsequently appointed the Adjutant General of Minnesota, September 1, 1917, and has served in that position since.

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL

Colonel Ellard A. Walsh was born October 3, 1887, in Hull, Province of Quebec, Canada, has been a resident of Minnesota for thirty-three years; was educated in the public schools of Minneapolis, graduated from North High in 1907, later taking a postgraduate course. He has served sixteen years in the Minnesota National Guard and five years in the United States Army, saw service on the Mexican border and served overseas one year as a member of the 34th and 29th Divisions. Was detailed as assistant adjutant general in 1921 and on August 23, 1924, was promoted colonel of infantry and assigned as chief of staff, 34th Division, in addition to his other duties. Married Viola Herrich, of Champlin, Minnesota, in 1917.

CHIEF OIL INSPECTOR

Hjalmar Nilsson was born September 24, 1860, in Nora, Sweden. Graduated from Polytechnical school of Orebro, Sweden. Emigrated to Boston in 1881; took up his father's vocation of practical coppersmith. Later engaged in newspaper work in Worcester, Mass., and in 1902 moved to Minnesota and became editor-in-chief of Svenska Amerikanska Posten, published in Minneapolis. Appointed deputy oil inspector for Hennepin county in 1909 and served ten years and until appointed chief oil inspector. Promoted new 1919 inspection law providing for quality test of motor fluids by distillation and for inspections at retail places.

STATE FIRE MARSHAL

Burton L. Kingsley was born at Minneapolis, March 9, 1879; educated in the public grade and high schools; entered the City Engineers' Department in 1900 and served as chief clerk of the Labor Division until 1910. Was appointed chief of park police of Minneapolis, in which capacity he served for four years. From 1914 to 1916 was identified with American District Telegraph Company as manager of St. Paul office, resigning to become northwest sales representative of the Seagrave Company of Columbus, Ohio. Nov. 5, 1916, was elected to the Board of Park Commissioners of Minneapolis for six years. Mr. Kingsley enlisted in the Minnesota National Guard March 6, 1900, and in 1905 was elected as second lieutenant, Company "I," First Infantry, elected first lieutenant in 1910 and commissioned captain of Company "K," First Infantry, Nov. 5, 1910. Resigned and honorably discharged from the Minnesota National Guard March 6, 1912. Was commissioned captain in National Army June 28, 1918, and assigned to duty in the U. S. Guard at the Presideo, San Francisco, California. Honorably discharged from service on account of physical disability August 1, 1918. Was elected member of the Minnesota House of Representatives from the 29th District, Hennepin county, in 1918. Named head of the State Bonus Board in 1920. Appointed State Fire Marshal July 1, 1923. Mr. Kingsley is also president of the Minneapolis Board of Park Commissioners.

STATE LIBRARIAN

Charles F. Ebel, Republican, was born at Northfield, Rice county, Minnesota, on March 28, 1873. Was educated in the public schools at Northfield. Moved to Faribault in November, 1897, and was engaged in the mercantile business until 1904 when he was elected Clerk of the District Court of Rice county and continued in that office until the year 1921. Appointed State Librarian January 14, 1921. Is married.

STATE EXPERT PRINTER

Sam Y. Gordon (Republican) was born in Indiana, but came to Minnesota with his parents when less than one year old. Resided in Meeker county until 1880, when he moved to Browns Valley, where in 1885 he established the Inter-Lake Tribune, a weekly newspaper, which he still owns. Served as lieutenant governor 1910-12. Served in House of Representatives 1915 session. Mr. Gordon is married, having one daughter and three sons.

COMMISSIONER OF DRAINAGE AND WATERS

E. Victor Willard was born June 14, 1880, on a farm near Welch, Goodhue county, Minnesota. Was graduated from Cannon Falls high school and taught school for two years. Entered the civil engineering college, University of Minnesota, in 1903. Except for eighteen months spent in railroad construction, has pursued drainage engineering since leaving college. Elected engineer by the state drainage commission March 1, 1913, and held office until its abolishment in 1919. Appointed commissioner of drainage and waters April 25, 1919. Re-appointed in April, 1923.

STATE HOTEL INSPECTOR

W. A. Wittbecker was born in Germany and came to the United States with his parents when two years old. Settled at Freeport, Ill.; removed to Iowa in 1890 and to St. Paul in 1901. For seventeen years was a traveling salesman. Married and family of seven sons and one daughter.

SECRETARY OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Solon J. Buck was born in Wisconsin, August 16, 1884. Was graduated by the University of Wisconsin in 1904, took graduate work in history there and at Harvard, and received the degree of Ph.D. at the latter institution in 1911. He taught history at Indiana University 1908-09, and held a joint teaching and research position in the University of Illinois from 1910 to 1914 when he was called to the faculty of the University of Minnesota, where he now has the title of professor of history. He has been secretary and superintendent of the Minnesota Historical Society since November, 1914.

ARCHAEOLOGIST OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Warren Upham, A.M. and D.Sc., was born in Amherst, N. H., March 8, 1850; was graduated at Dartmouth College in 1871; was assistant on the geological surveys of New Hampshire, Minnesota, and the United States, 1874-1895; was librarian of the Western Reserve Historical Society, Cleveland, Ohio, 1895; he was secretary and librarian of the Minnesota Historical Society for many years. He is author of many works in geology and history.

EXECUTIVE AGENT STATE HUMANE SOCIETY

Samuel Ferguson Fullerton was born on a farm within a mile of the village of Charlemont, County Armagh, Ireland. Losing his parents when he was twelve years old, he came to Canada in 1873 and in 1879 came to Duluth. Was appointed a deputy game warden under Governor Merriam's administration. Served six years without pay as a volunteer in St. Louis county. Was one of the members of the Game and Fish Commission appointed by Governor Nelson in 1894. Served four years under Governor Clough, two months under Governor Lind, four years under Governor Van Sant, four years under Governor Johnson and six months under Governor Eberhart. Appointed to present position as executive agent of the State Humane Society in April, 1919.

STATE FORESTER

Grover M. Conzet was born in Todd County, December 22, 1886. Moved to Hubbard County with parents in 1908 after graduation from the High School at Eagle Bend. Graduated from the College of Forestry, University of Minnesota, in 1912, Degree of Bachelor of Science in Forestry; and Degree of Master of Science in 1913. Prior to graduation from the University worked in saw mill and logging operations and on U. S. land classification and timber survey in Oregon. Since graduation has worked with Division of Agricultural Engineering, University Farm, on a study of drainage of peat and swamp lands and their uses for agriculture and other purposes. Has been connected with the State Forest Service most of the period since 1914. Was Assistant State Forester when appointed to the position of State Forester, July 1, 1924.

CUSTODIAN

J. H. Schoonmaker was born in Brooklyn, New York. Educated at Juvenile High School and Polytechnic Institute in that city. Moved to Minneapolis in 1901. Was appointed clerk in custodian's department by Governor Eberhart in January, 1912. Appointed custodian by Governor Burnquist and re-appointed by Governor Preus. Served 10 years in Minnesota National Guard. Married in 1894 to Marjory E. Cruikshank, of Buffalo, Minn.

SUPERINTENDENT OF CAPITOL

Chas. E. Chapel was born at Beloit, Wisconsin, in August, 1843. Came to Minnesota, 1856. Enlisted February 14, 1862, in the Sixth Regiment, Minnesota Volunteer Infantry. Discharged June 14, 1865, by reason of the loss of his left forearm from shell wound received April 2, 1865, a week prior to the surrender of General Lee and the Confederacy. Sheriff, Faribault county, 1866. Custodian, old Capitol, 1872. Elected sheriff, Ramsey county, 1892, serving two terms. Appointed superintendent new Capitol, 1916.

JUDICIARY

SUPREME COURT

CHIEF JUSTICE

Samuel B. Wilson was born at Prices Branch, Montgomery county, Missouri, in 1873, was educated in the public schools and graduated from the Minnesota Teachers College at Mankato, Minn. Later he attended the University of Minnesota, from which he graduated in 1896 with the LL.B. degree and was admitted to the bar the same year. He located at Mankato, Minn. He served as judge of probate and later served six years as county attorney of Blue Earth county.

During the World War Mr. Wilson served in various capacities. He was director of the safety commission for Blue Earth county. He was government appeal agent and also food administrator. He was director of the Bureau of War Industries for his district, and represented the Bureau of War Risk Insurance as field agent. In addition to this he served as president of the Blue Earth County Safety Association and was a member of the Legal Advisory Board.

Mr. Wilson is a member of the American, Minnesota State and Blue Earth County bar associations. He is a thirty-second degree Mason, Shriner, and Elk. In 1899 he married Daisy Sheehan, a state normal school teacher. They have three children, S. Bailey, Phyllis and Corol.

Governor J. A. O. Preus appointed Mr. Wilson Chief Justice of the Supreme Court on September 29, 1923, and in 1924 he was elected to succeed himself in that office.

ASSOCIATE JUSTICES

Andrew Holt was born in East Union, Carver county, Minnesota, May 20, 1855. He attended the common schools of the county, St. Ansgar's Academy at East Union, now Gustavus Adolphus College at St. Peter, during such periods as he could be spared from the farm work; entered the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1880; studied law and was admitted to the practice of law in 1881; practiced law in the city of Minneapolis until January, 1894, when he was appointed municipal judge; elected in the fall of 1894 and again in the fall of 1900; elected to the district bench in 1904. Mr. Holt was appointed to succeed Justice Simpson, resigned, and was elected for the full term of six years at the election of 1912, and re-elected in November, 1918, and November, 1924.

James H. Quinn was born in Kilbourn City, Wis., June 23, 1857; came to Minnesota, locating in Blue Earth county, June, 1863; practiced law ever since he was twenty-four years of age; was elected county attorney of Faribault county five terms; resigned when appointed district judge in 1897, which position he held continuously until his election as justice of the supreme court at the November election in 1916, and re-elected November 7, 1922.

Homer B. Dibell was born in Fillmore county, Minnesota, in 1864; graduate of the University of Indiana, 1889; Northwestern University Law School, 1890; admitted to the bar at Duluth, October, 1890; elected judge of district court, 1898; re-elected in 1904 and 1910; appointed supreme court commissioner, April 1, 1913; appointed justice in 1918, and elected in 1920.

Royal A. Stone was born in LeSueur county; Minnesota, in 1875, and has resided here ever since, from 1876 to 1905 at Morris and thereafter in St. Paul. Admitted to the bar in 1897 after graduation from the College of Law of Washington University, St. Louis. Assistant attorney general 1905 to 1907. Served with the infantry during the Spanish American and World Wars. Appointed Associate Justice of the Supreme Court May 25, 1923, to succeed Justice Hallam, resigned. Elected to the same position November 4, 1924.

SUPREME COURT COMMISSIONERS

Myron D. Taylor was born December 30, 1855, at Byron, Maine; came to Minnesota in September, 1858; graduate of the University of Minnesota, class of 1878; principal of schools at Henderson, Minn.; resided at St. Cloud, Minn., practicing law since March, 1881. City attorney twelve years; register United States land office eight years; appointed to succeed Judge Searle December 1, 1906, and twice elected to the position. Appointed supreme court commissioner April 1, 1913.

Edward Lees was born in Buffalo county, Wisconsin, in 1865, graduated from the law department of the University of Wisconsin in 1886, and immediately thereafter located at Winona, Minnesota, where he has since resided and practiced law. He was a member and president of the State Board of Law Examiners for many years and for four years was a member of the Minnesota Board of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws. Appointed supreme court commissioner December 1, 1918.

DISTRICT COURTS

FIRST DISTRICT

Albert Johnson is a native of Goodhue county. He was admitted to the bar at Red Wing in 1885 and practiced law at that place until appointed to the judgeship. He was county attorney from 1896 to 1905. In August, 1909, he was appointed judge of district court, First judicial district, and at the November election, 1910, was elected to the position. He was re-elected in 1916 and 1922. He resides at Red Wing.

W. A. Schultz was born in Brown county, Minnesota, in 1887. He resided on a farm in that county until sixteen years of age, at which time he graduated from the high school at Sleepy Eye, Minnesota. He graduated from the law department of the University of Minnesota in 1907. He was elected municipal judge of the city of South St. Paul in 1917, and again re-elected in 1921. In March, 1923, he was appointed district judge of the First District, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge Willard L. Converse, and at the fall election of 1924, he was elected for the term beginning January 1, 1925. In 1919 he married Ida Hauge, of Clarkfield, Minnesota.

SECOND DISTRICT

Olin B. Lewis was born in Weyauwega, Wis., March 12, 1861. He was graduated from Omro high school in 1879, classical department of the State University of Wisconsin in 1884, where he was for some time instructor, and the University Law School of Wisconsin in 1889. He came to this state in 1899 and located at St. Paul. He was elected to the assembly in 1894 and re-elected in 1896; elected to the district bench in 1896, and for each six year period since.

Grier M. Orr was born May 14, 1856, in Clarion county, Pennsylvania. Attended the public schools in Oconto, Wis., from 1868 to 1873. Entered Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, 1873, finishing in 1878. Taught school and read law for three years. Graduated from Cincinnati law school, 1883. Practiced law in Lima, Ohio, until 1884, when he came to St. Paul. Elected judge of the municipal court in St. Paul, 1894, and re-elected, 1898; elected judge of district court continuously since 1902. He is married.

Hugo O. Hanft was born at St. Peter, Minn., December 16, 1871. He was educated in the grammar and high school at New Ulm, Minn., German-American Teachers' Seminary at Milwaukee, Wis., regular and post-graduate course of law at University of Minnesota. Began practice of law at St. Paul, 1896; enlisted as private in Co. E, 13th Minnesota Volunteer Infantry during its war with Spain; mustered out as battalion adjutant,

third battalion, same regiment. Assistant county attorney Ramsey county 1900-1906; judge of municipal court by election, 1906-1914. Judge of district court by election, 1914; re-elected, 1920.

James C. Michael was born in Preston county, Va., March 19, 1863. He came to Minnesota in 1884, settling at Red Wing, where he was admitted to the bar. He moved to St. Paul in 1889, where he practiced his profession and was corporation attorney of the city for eight years. On the creation of a new judgeship by the 1915 legislature he was appointed to the position and was elected to the office in 1916 and 1922.

John B. Sanborn, son of Gen. John B. Sanborn, born in St. Paul, November 9, 1883, a graduate of the University of Minnesota, 1905; St. Paul College of Law, 1907; representative in the 1913 and 1915 sessions of the state legislature, insurance commissioner from January, 1917, to August, 1918; enlisted in the U. S. Infantry August 12, 1918, discharged December 3, 1919; re-appointed state insurance commissioner January 14, 1919; member of tax commission July, 1920, to January, 1921; appointed to the district bench by Governor Preus on death of Hon. Hascal R. Brill in March, 1922; elected November, 1922.

John W. Boerner was born in 1874 at Fort Hays, Kan. He was educated in the public schools and was graduated from the St. Paul College of Law in 1913. He practiced law in partnership with Raymond O'Malley for about four years and was assistant county attorney with R. D. O'Brien and for eight years was judge of municipal court. He was elected district judge November 7, 1922. He is married, the father of two children and lives at 1085 Fairmount Ave., St. Paul.

Charles Bechhoefer was born in Woodbury, Pa., on January 1, 1864. His parents, natives of Bavaria, came to America shortly after the German Revolution of 1848. He obtained his early education in the Woodbury village school and in the high school at Altoona, Pa., and received his law degree in the University of Michigan. He was admitted to practice in July, 1885. He entered the law office of John B. and W. H. Sanborn as a clerk, and in 1887 opened his own office in St. Paul, and has been in active practice ever since. He was a member of the Charter Commission of St. Paul. He was appointed January 3, 1923, and was elected in November, 1924.

Richard Dillon O'Brien was born in St. Paul on the 16th of August, 1874, and his parents were Christopher Dillon and Susan E. (Slater) O'Brien, the former a native of Ireland and the latter of New York state. After completing his high school course he became a student at the University of Minnesota and in 1900 he was graduated from that institution, winning the LL.B. degree. He was admitted to the bar in the same year and then joined his father and uncle, Thos. D. O'Brien, in the practice of law, their business being conducted under the firm style of C. D. & Thos. D. O'Brien, which was continued until November, 1906. Meanwhile R. D. O'Brien had entered the

political arena. He served for one term as a member of the city council and was re-elected in May, 1906. He was identified with that law-making body until elected county attorney of Ramsey county and since 1907 has been successively elected to that office, having been re-elected for another four-year term in November, 1922. In April, 1923, Governor Preus appointed him judge of the district court to fill out an unexpired term. He was elected Nov., 1924, to succeed himself. On June 30, 1906, Mr. O'Brien was married to Miss Edith L. Clemens, of Farmington, Minnesota, and they have become the parents of four daughters, Marjorie, Edith Ann, Elizabeth and Barbara.

THIRD DISTRICT

Charles E. Callaghan was born May 20, 1863, in Livingston county, New York, and came to Minnesota with his parents in 1865. He was admitted to the bar at Rochester in 1889 and practiced law at that place until his appointment as district judge in September, 1917, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge George W. Granger. He was elected without opposition in November, 1918.

FOURTH DISTRICT

Horace D. Dickinson, born at Ogdensburg, St. Lawrence county, New York, July 25, 1866. Moved to Minnesota the same year and has resided in Minneapolis since September, 1876. Graduated from the law department of the Minnesota University in 1890. Assistant city attorney of the city of Minneapolis, 1896-1900; elected in 1900 one of the judges of municipal court of Minneapolis, resigning the latter office to assume the duties of one of the judges of the district court, to which place he was elected in 1904 and re-elected in 1910, 1916 and 1922.

Edward Foote Waite was born January 15, 1860, at Norwich, New York. He has resided in Minneapolis since 1888. He was educated at Norwich Academy, Colgate University, and the Columbian Law School. He was an assistant city attorney, and, during the administration of Acting Mayor David P. Jones, in 1901, superintendent of police. In December, 1904, he was appointed municipal judge of Minneapolis, and was elected to the same office in 1906. In April, 1911, the legislature having provided for an additional judge of the Fourth district, he was appointed to the new office, and elected for a full term in 1912, and re-elected in 1918.

Mathias Baldwin was born near Stewartville, Olmsted county, Minnesota, August 26, 1875. He was educated in the country schools of Olmsted county and Rock county, graduated from the Luverne high school with the class of 1898, completed the law course of the University of Minnesota with the class of 1903 and received the Master degree in 1904. He began the practice of law in Minneapolis immediately after graduation; was first assistant county attorney of Hennepin county from 1911 to 1914; became judge of the Municipal Court of Minneapolis, by appointment, in January, 1919; was later elected and served there until elected to the District Court bench in 1922. He is married and has four children.

William C. Leary was born in Owatonna, Minnesota, in 1869, residing there until 1882, when he moved to Minneapolis. He practiced law for six years in Minneapolis, after which he was appointed assistant county attorney of Hennepin county, serving four years. Mr. Leary was appointed attorney to the county commissioners, serving in that capacity for over three years, after which he was appointed first assistant county attorney, serving until he became municipal judge. He was elected to the district bench in 1912 and re-elected in November, 1918.

Frank M. Nye was born March 7, 1852, in Shirley, Maine. When he was three years old, his parents moved to St. Croix county, Wisconsin, and there he was reared on a farm. Educated in Academy and Collegiate Institute at River Falls, Wisconsin; taught school for a few years and was admitted to practice law in the spring of 1878. Was district attorney of Polk county, Wisconsin, five years, member of the lower house of the Wisconsin legislature two years. Moved to Minneapolis in 1886 and commenced practice of law; was assistant county attorney under Robert Jamison two years; elected county attorney in 1892 and held office four years; resumed practice and was elected to congress in 1906, serving three terms, not being a candidate for re-election. Accepted position of first assistant county attorney in January, 1919, and held it until appointed judge of the district court.

Joseph W. Molyneaux, Minneapolis, was born in Bellevue, Campbell county, Kentucky, December 12, 1862. Was educated at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, and Cincinnati Law School, Cincinnati, Ohio. Came to Minneapolis in 1886. May, 1913, he was appointed judge of the district court, and was elected to succeed himself as such at the general election in November, 1914, and re-elected in 1920. Was married in June, 1900.

Winfield W. Bardwell, born at Excelsior, Hennepin county, Minnesota; educated in Excelsior public schools, Excelsior Academy, University of Minnesota; member of the Minnesota State Legislature during sessions of 1903 and 1905; six years on the municipal bench of the city of Minneapolis. Elected to district court November, 1918.

Edmund A. Montgomery was born September 20, 1868, at St. Peter, Minnesota. His early education was received in the public schools of that city, graduating from the St. Peter High School in 1884; graduated from Hamline University, St. Paul, in 1888; studied law in the law office of William E. Hale at Minneapolis and admitted to the bar in 1890; engaged in general law practice in Minneapolis until April 18, 1911, when he was appointed judge of the municipal court of Minneapolis by Governor Eberhart; elected judge of that court at the general election in 1912, and re-elected in 1918. Elected judge of the district court for Hennepin county at the general election in 1920. He is married and has one son.

Thomas H. Salmon was born at Bloomington, Illinois, February 10, 1865. He is the son of Ellen and William Salmon. His father was an engineer. He graduated from the Marshall High School, Wilder College and the law department of the University. He finished his law course and was admitted to the bar in 1894. He practiced law until 1917 when he was appointed by the governor a municipal judge of the city of Minneapolis. While in that office he established the Conciliation Court and also the Traffic Court. In 1922 he was elected a district judge. He has been appointed on different commissions by the governor; was a Roosevelt delegate; was secretary of the State Republican Committee and manager of several campaigns. He is a member of the Automobile, Athletic, City and Lions Clubs. He married Adelaine Z. Olivier, June 23, 1898. They have two daughters, Mrs. Robert Hartzell and Adelaine Salmon.

Paul W. Guilford was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota, January 15, 1876. He was educated in the public schools of that city, is a graduate of the academic and law departments of the University of Minnesota and was admitted to practice in 1900. He is married and has three children, and resides at 4751 Fremont Avenue South, Minneapolis. He served as a member of the Minneapolis Charter Commission in 1912 and 1913, was a member of the Minnesota House of Representatives 1915 to 1917 and a member of the State Senate 1919 to 1923. He was appointed judge of the District Court, Juvenile branch, by Governor Preus in August, 1923, and elected for a term of six years at the 1924 election.

Frank E. Reed was born at Glencoe, Minnesota, June 19, 1880. Graduated from the Academic Department of the University of Minnesota 1902, and from the College of Law 1904. Graduate manager of athletics at the University for four years. Entered the practice of law in Minneapolis 1904. Enlisted in the Minnesota National Guard in 1905, and served continuously until June, 1916, when he responded to the call of the president of the United States for troops for Mexican border service. He was a member of the Minnesota State Legislature during the session of 1917. On March 26, 1917, he again entered the military service of the United States and served continuously until July 29, 1919, and served overseas and with the Army of Occupation in Germany. In January, 1921, he became judge of the Municipal Court of the city of Minneapolis. Was elected district judge in November, 1924.

FIFTH DISTRICT

Fred W. Senn was born at Remsen, Iowa, March 15, 1885, and the same year moved with his parents to a farm in Dodge county, Minnesota, where he was reared. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota and was admitted to the bar in June, 1909. He served as city attorney of the city of Waseca, was twice elected county attorney of Waseca county and was judge of the probate court of that county for nine years. He was elected district judge at the general election in 1922. He married Ella Martin, of Mantorville, Minn., and has three sons. His residence is at Waseca.

SIXTH DISTRICT

Willard L. Comstock was born at Mankato, Minnesota, on November 24, 1861; educated in the common and high schools and the state normal school; engaged in teaching at Mapleton, Mankato and elsewhere for six years. After five years of preparatory study, he was admitted to the bar and began practicing law in May, 1900, in Mankato, which city has since been his home. Meantime, he served ten years in the Minnesota National Guard, resigning the command of Co. "F," Second Infantry, Mankato, in December, 1902, because of demands of professional work. Was a member of the 28th Legislature of Minnesota; served on Mankato school board for six years; elected municipal judge in 1905 and held latter office until 1914, when elected district judge. Re-elected in 1920 without opposition. Judge Comstock was married in November, 1900, and has two children, a son and a daughter. For many years has been actively engaged in fraternal work and has served as Grand Master of the A. O. U. W. of Minnesota and as Grand Regent of the Royal Arcanum of Minnesota.

SEVENTH DISTRICT

Carroll A. Nye is a native of Wisconsin and a graduate of the university of that state with degree of LL.B. Located for the practice of law at Moorhead, Minnesota, where he now resides. Has held the offices of city and county attorney, mayor and member of the state normal school board. Elected judge in 1910 and re-elected in 1916 and 1922 without opposition. Commissioned captain in the organized reserves of the United States Army in 1916, and called to active service soon after war was declared with Germany. Ordered overseas in summer of 1917 with the First Division and served in France with the American Expeditionary Forces until June, 1919; was discharged at Camp Dix, N. J., after serving twenty-six months and was again commissioned major in the organized reserves, which appointment he still holds. Resumed the duties of district judge July 1, 1919.

John A. Roeser was born January 28, 1867, in Stearns county, Minnesota. Educated in the common and normal schools of St. Cloud. Taught school, 1883 to 1890. Admitted to bar in 1898. Later admitted to partnership under firm name of Reynolds & Roeser, which continued until Mr. Reynolds' death, August 17, 1910, after which he continued practice alone. Was appointed judge of the district court in place of Judge Myron D. Taylor, resigned, by Governor Eberhart, on April 1, 1913. Elected in 1914 and re-elected in 1920.

William L. Parsons was born at Westfield, New York, in 1858. Educated in Westfield Academy; is graduate of Hamilton College in 1878. Engaged as teacher in Adelphi Academy, Brooklyn, New York, 1878 to 1881; admitted to bar in 1882; practiced law in Fergus Falls 1883 to 1913; referee in bankruptcy 1898 to 1913; appointed judge of district court in May, 1913, and elected since. Married.

EIGHTH DISTRICT

Cyril M. Tifft was born in the township of Mayfield, De Kalb county, Illinois, April 23, 1865. Moved to Hutchinson, McLeod county, Minnesota, in the fall of 1879. Was graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor, in 1888; and in June, 1889, located at Glencoe, Minn. In November, 1902, was elected judge of probate of McLeod county and has held that position for fourteen years. On November 7, 1916, and 1922, elected judge of district court of the eighth judicial district. Mr. Tifft was married to Lillian M. Richardson of Glencoe.

NINTH DISTRICT

I. M. Olsen was born in Norway, January 4, 1861; came to Nicollet county, Minnesota, in 1865, and has resided in the ninth judicial district since that time. Was graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1887; admitted to the bar in 1893; practiced law at Sleepy Eye, Minnesota, 1904-1906; elected district judge in 1906; re-elected 1912; was not a candidate in 1918; re-appointed judge February 1, 1920, and re-elected 1920. Married to Lida McBain in 1896, and resides at New Ulm.

A. B. Gislason was born in Iceland, August 8, 1877; came to Lyon county, Minnesota, in 1879 and has since resided in Lyon county. Graduated from the Marshall high school in 1897; attended the University of Minnesota for three years, 1901-1905; practiced law at Minnesota, Minnesota, several years; was appointed district judge of the ninth judicial district, April 10, 1923, by Governor J. A. O. Preus; elected district judge in 1924. Resides at Marshall, Minnesota.

TENTH DISTRICT

Norman E. Peterson, of Albert Lea, was appointed January 5, 1923, as district judge of the Tenth district by Governor J. A. O. Preus. Ralph J. Parker was elected as district judge at the election November 7, 1922, but died December 24 at his home in Austin before assuming the judgeship. Mr. Peterson was born at Albert Lea, Minn., in 1880, and was graduated from the Albert Lea high school. He took his collegiate and law course at the George Washington University, Washington, D. C. Since 1903 he has practiced law at Albert Lea and for twelve years was county attorney of Freeborn county.

Admitted to the Minnesota bar in October, 1893. City attorney of Duluth, 1904-1908 and 1910-1912. Appointed judge of the district court by Governor Eberhart in March, 1913, to succeed Judge Dibell. Elected in 1914; re-elected in 1920.

Edward Freeman, Virginia, Minnesota, was born at Mankato, Minnesota, October 15, 1878, son of Everett P. Freeman, attorney at law. Graduate of Mankato high school, 1896, and of the Law Department, University of Minnesota, 1903. Located at Chisholm, Minnesota, in the fall of 1903; practiced law there until April, 1917, when he was appointed judge of the district court, to which position he was elected in November, 1918.

C. R. Magney was born of Swedish parentage January 11, 1883, in Trenton, Wisconsin. Attended South Stillwater public school and in 1903 graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter. Taught school in Idaho and Washington and 1904-05 was principal of schools at Lindstrom. Was graduated from Harvard law school in 1908 with LL.B. degree, beginning practice in Duluth. Elected mayor of Duluth in 1917 and resigned in September, 1920. Elected judge of eleventh judicial district November 2, 1920, and succeeded Hon. J. D. Ensign, who voluntarily retired after nearly 32 years of service on the bench.

Henry J. Grannis was born on a farm in Racine township, Mower county, Minnesota, June 18, 1865. He was graduated from the University of Minnesota with the B.A. degree in 1886 and from the Law School of the University of Michigan with the LL.B. degree in 1888. Commenced the practice of law at Faribault, Minnesota, in the fall of 1888, and in October, 1890, removed to Duluth, where he engaged in general practice until appointed judge of the District Court, by Governor Preus in August, 1923, to succeed Judge William A. Cant, who resigned to become judge of the United States District Court. Elected at the general election in 1924.

Edwin J. Kenny was born at Northfield, Minnesota, Dec. 19, 1881. Was educated in the public graded and high schools of Duluth and graduated from the Academic and Law Departments of the University of Michigan. Practiced law at Duluth from 1907 to February, 1924, when he was appointed judge of district court to succeed Judge H. A. Dancer, resigned. Elected in November, 1924.

TWELFTH DISTRICT

G. E. Qvale was born at Haugesund, Norway, September 24, 1860; came to the United States in October, 1878; settled in Minnesota the following year; admitted to the bar July, 1882; practiced law in Willmar until appointed judge in 1897; elected in 1898, and re-elected in 1904, 1910 and 1916 and 1922; probate judge six years, and county attorney of Kandiyohi county four years. He has resided at Willmar since 1880.

Judge Harold Baker was born in Madison, Wis., August 29, 1879. He moved to Minnesota the following year and attended schools of Stillwater, later Winona Normal, South Side High School of Minneapolis, and Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill. He is a graduate of the advanced course of the St. Cloud Normal, a graduate of the Law department of University of Minnesota and practiced law in Renville county nine years. He was elected county attorney of Renville county 1918 and district judge November 7, 1922.

THIRTEENTH DISTRICT

Lewis S. Nelson was born November 2, 1850, in Grundy county, Ill. Attended country school, Fowler Institute in Newark, Ill., two years, Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, two years. Was graduated from the Law School, Ann Arbor, in 1874. Was admitted to the bar in Illinois in 1875. In Iowa in 1876. He came to Adrian, Nobles county, Minnesota, in 1877. Served as captain of Company G, Fifteenth Minnesota Volunteer Infantry in the Spanish-American war from July 2, 1898, to March 27, 1899, and in Cuba from April 1 to July 1, 1899. William Watts was born in the Province of Ontario, Canada, in 1850; was admitted to the bar in 1877; came to Minnesota in 1878; resides at Crookston; has held the office of city attorney, county attorney, president of the city council and a member of the board of education. Elected judge, 1898, 1904, 1910, 1916 and 1922. He is married.

Andrew Grindeland resides at Warren, Marshall county, Minnesota. He was born at Winneshiek county, Iowa, November 20, 1856. Was graduated from the Law department of the University of Iowa in 1882, and settled in Warren, Minn., July of the same year. He is married and has held the office of judge of probate of Marshall county, and senator from the Sixty-third district. Appointed judge of the district court, Fourteenth district, March 24, 1903, and has been re-elected four times. Was a member of State Normal School board.

FIFTEENTH DISTRICT

William S. McClenahan was born in Baltimore, Maryland, June 19, 1854; was graduated (A.B.) from Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania, 1875, and from the Law department of the University of Maryland (LL.B.) in 1880; practiced law in Baltimore until October, 1882, when he came to Brainerd; held the office of city attorney of Brainerd from March, 1888, until November, 1900. Elected judge of district court, 1900, and re-elected in 1906, 1912 and 1918.

Benjamin F. Wright was born in Durham, Me., in 1861. Was graduated from Colby College, Waterville, Maine, in 1883. He located in Minnesota in 1887 and his present residence is Park Rapids. He is married.

Charles W. Stanton was born in Pine Island, Goodhue county, Minnesota, in 1862; was editor and publisher of the Press at Appleton, Minnesota, until after his admission to the bar in 1889; was judge of probate of Swift county, 1890-1894; was county attorney of Koochiching county at the time of his appointment as judge of the Fifteenth judicial district to fill a vacancy in March, 1908. He was elected in 1910, 1916 and 1922.

SIXTEENTH DISTRICT

Stephen A. Flaherty was born in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, April 13, 1855. He was educated at a country school in Calumet county; at Lawrence University in Appleton, Wisconsin, and at the University of Minnesota. He came to Morris in 1881, was admitted to the bar there in 1882, and married to Miss Nellie M. Sheridan in 1884. For many years he was county attorney of Stevens county, and resigned that office in 1895 upon moving to Minneapolis. After a year's residence there he moved to Litchfield, and in 1899 returned to Morris, where he now resides. He was elected judge of the district court in 1900, 1906, 1912, 1918 and 1924.

SEVENTEENTH DISTRICT

E. C. Dean was born in La Moille, Illinois, March 22, 1858. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois and of the Law department of the University of Iowa. Following his admission to the bar in 1881 he located in Pipestone county, of which he was county attorney for ten years. From Pipestone county he moved to Martin county, of which he was also county attorney. He was first elected district judge at the general election in 1916.

EIGHTEENTH DISTRICT

Arthur E. Giddings was born in Anoka, Minn., October 2, 1867. His father, Dr. A. W. Giddings, located at Anoka in 1854, and for fifty years thereafter successfully practiced medicine in Anoka and adjoining counties. Attended the public schools, was graduated from the high school in 1885. worked on farms or in the mills during vacations. Entered the University of Minnesota in 1885, was graduated (A.B.) in 1889. Was superintendent of schools at Mapleton, Minn., during the year 1889-90. Took the full course at the University of Minnesota Law School. While at the University was in newspaper work one year, glee club five years, managing editor "Ariel" one year, elected to Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Delta Phi, and Psi Upsilon. Upon graduating (LL.B.) from the Law School in 1892 was admitted to the bar and at once went into practice in Minneapolis and later at Anoka, where he now resides. Was on the Public Library board fourteen years, city attorney of Anoka two terms, county attorney of Anoka county two terms, the while engaged in general practice. In 1898 was elected judge of the district court of the Eighteenth judicial district and was re-elected in 1904, 1910, 1916 and 1922 without opposition. In 1892 married Sibyl Belle Baker and they have three children, Paul, Arthur, and Mary Frances.

NINETEENTH DISTRICT

Alfred P. Stolberg was born in town of Fish Lake, Chisago county, Minn., December 4, 1876, and is a son of the late Judge Peter H. Stolberg. He is a graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, Minn., and of the College of Law of University of Minnesota. Admitted to bar in 1902. Served as register of deeds of Chisago county for six years and county attorney ten years. He is married and resides at Center City. Was elected district judge at general election of 1924.

MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

MARCH 4, 1925 - MARCH 4, 1927

Dr. Henrik Shipstead was born in 1881 and has been a practicing dentist in Minneapolis recently. Previously Dr. Shipstead was a dentist in Glenwood. He was elected from the Forty-seventh legislative district as a member of the 1917 House of the Minnesota legislature. He was graduated from the College of Dentistry of Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., in 1902. In 1918 Dr. Shipstead ran against Representative in Congress A. J. Volstead of the Seventh district and in 1920, as candidate of the Nonpartisan League, he was defeated by J. A. O. Preus for the governorship of Minnesota. In 1922 he upset all precedent for the state when elected as United States senator, being the first United States senator ever elected who was not inside the ranks of the Republican party, though some Democrats have held that office by appointment. Dr. Shipstead defeated United States Senator Frank B. Kellogg in the November 7, 1922, election. He was born in Burbank, Kandiyohi county, Minn. He was elected on the Farmer-Labor ticket.

Magnus Johnson was born in Sweden in 1871, received common school education; emigrated to United States 1891; took up farming 1893, been farming ever since. Held many offices in Farmers' Co-operative enterprises. Held school and township offices; elected to Minnesota house of representatives 1914, served four years; elected 1918 to state senate for four years; candidate for governor 1922 on the Farmer-Labor ticket, but defeated. Elected in 1923 to fill out the unexpired term of Senator Knute Nelson in United States Senate; candidate for re-election 1924 but unsuccessful.

Thomas D. Schall (Republican) was born in 1877 on a farm near Grand Rapids, Michigan, and came to Minnesota at the age of seven. He received his education in the common schools of Wheaton, Minnesota, the Ortonville High school, Hamline University, the University of Minnesota, and completed his law studies in the St. Paul College of Law. He is engaged in the practice of law in Minneapolis. Mr. Schall lost his sight in 1907 through an electric shock, but has continued the practice of his profession. He was elected to Congress in November, 1914, 1916, 1918, 1920 and 1922, by the largest vote ever given any congressman in Minnesota two times. He was a member of the powerful Rules Committee of the House of Representatives. Mr. Schall was sent to France in 1918 by a committee of Congress to make investigations during the war, and spent two months at the battle front. He was on the transport Mt. Vernon when it was wrecked by a torpedo two hundred fifty miles off the coast of Brest. Was elected United States senator to succeed Magnus Johnson, on Nov. 4, 1924.

FIRST DISTRICT

Allen J. Furlow (Republican) is a native of Rochester, Minnesota, where he was born November 9, 1890. He is a graduate of the Rochester high school and the Law Department of George Washington University, Washington, D. C. He was for a time a newspaper publisher and editor in Rochester. During the world war he enlisted and served for 17 months overseas in the aviation corps with the rank of First Lieutenant. Mr. Furlow is married and is the father of one son, John Allen Furlow.

SECOND DISTRICT

Frank Clague (Republican) is a resident of Redwood Falls. Native of Ohio. Resided in Minnesota since 1881. Admitted to the bar in 1891 and practiced law in Redwood county since admission. County attorney 1895 to 1903; representative in state legislature during sessions of 1903 and 1905; state senator from Brown and Redwood counties from 1907 to 1915; elected district judge in 1918, and elected to Congress November 2, 1920, and re-elected November 7, 1922.

THIRD DISTRICT

O

August H. Andresen (Republican) of Red Wing, Goodhue County, Minnesota, born at Newark, Ill., 1890; son of Rev. and Mrs. O. Andresen; attended public school in Grand Forks, N. D., and Eagle Grove, Iowa; moved to Red Wing in 1905 and received B.A. degree from Red Wing Seminary in 1912; alumnus of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn.; attended night classes of St. Paul College of law, B.L. degree 1915; admitted to practice 1914. He married Miss Julia Lien, of Red Wing, in 1914. At the age of twelve he started work as a delivery boy, and in order to secure funds for his education, worked at various kinds of labor on farm and in city. He was an officer of two labor unions, and acted as special investigator for the Minnesota Department of Weights & Measures for two years. Commenced practice of law in Red Wing in 1915 and became associated with Edw. H. Lidberg in the real estate investment business. He is actively interested in several business institutions in his city and is part owner of and operates a farm. He was Chairman of Goodhue County Republican Committee for four years, and president of Goodhue County Red Cross, Goodhue County Soldiers Memorial Association, Red Wing Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club and Red Wing Fair Association. Elected to Congress by a majority of over 10,000 votes, running far ahead of the rest of Republican ticket.

FOURTH DISTRICT

Oscar Edward Keller (Republican) was born in Helensville, Jefferson county, Wisconsin, July 30, 1878; educated in public schools and high school of Jefferson county; completed short courses in dairying and agriculture in the University of Wisconsin; moved to Minnesota in 1901; married Alice Seebeck, of St. Paul, in 1911; has three children—one son, Oscar Edward, Jr., five years old; two daughters, Margaret, aged nine years, and Florence, aged seven years; engaged in politics for past eleven years; elected to the assembly of the city of St. Paul in 1910; re-elected in 1912; when commission form of government was adopted in 1914, became a candidate for commissioner, and was elected; appointed to the office of commissioner of public utilities; reelected as commissioner in 1916 and 1918, and assigned to the same office; when the late Congressman Carl C. Van Dyke died, an old-fashioned convention was held to nominate candidates for the special election; lost the Republican nomination in the convention, but was persuaded by friends to run as an Independent, and with the support of labor, was elected in a very spirited campaign, defeating his Republican and Democratic opponents. Re-elected in 1920 and 1922.

FIFTH DISTRICT

Walter Hughes Newton (Republican) was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota, October 10, 1880, the son of Thomas R. and Mary Hughes Newton, old residents of that city. After leaving the South High School he entered the employ of Dodson, Fisher, Brockmann company, wholesale saddlery, with which concern he was connected for a period of about fifteen years. Studied nights at the Y. M. C. A. school, and in 1902 entered the law class of the University of Minnesota, from which he was graduated in 1905 with the degree of LL.B., and was thereupon admitted to practice. In 1915 he was appointed first assistant county attorney in Minneapolis and served until January, 1919. In 1905 Mr. Newton married Cora M. Noracon, of Minneapolis. With their three children, Grace Laura, age sixteen years; Walter Hughes, Jr., age eleven years; and John Marshall, age two years, they reside at 3012 Irving Avenue South, Minneapolis. Elected to the Sixty-sixth Congress in 1918; re-elected to the Sixty-seventh Congress in 1920 and was again re-elected to serve in the Sixty-eighth Congress in 1922. Is a member of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce.

SIXTH DISTRICT

Harold Knutson (Republican), St. Cloud, was raised on a dairy farm in Sherburne county. Attended the State Agricultural School at St. Anthony Park and during his vacation worked on the section and in the harvest fields to earn sufficient to pay his tuition. Later learned the printer's trade in the Clear Lake Times office. Published and edited the Royalton Banner and Foley Independent, and for two years was associate editor of the St. Cloud Daily Journal Press. Was for several years secretary to the Finance Commit-

tee of the Northern Minnesota Development association, and president of the Northern Minnesota Editorial association, 1910-11. Was first elected to congress in 1916 and after two years' service in that body was made majority whip of the house. Mr. Knutson is also chairman of the House Pension committee and member of the Committee on Insular Affairs.

SEVENTH DISTRICT

O. J. Kvale (Farmer-Labor) was born February 6, 1869, on a farm near Decorah, Iowa. His elementary education was obtained in the rural school near his parental pioneer homestead. His secondary and collegiate education was received at Luther College, Decorah, from which he was graduated in 1890. Was prepared for the ministry at Luther Seminary, Minneapolis, graduating in 1893. Later he carried on a year of graduate work in psychology and sociology at the University of Chicago, receiving from this institution the degree of Master of Arts. He was ordained as pastor in 1894, and has served continuously since that time, for twenty-three years at Orfordville, Wisconsin, and since 1917 as pastor of Our Savior's Church at Benson, Minnesota. He served from 1908 to 1917 as a member of the Board of Education of the former Norwegian Synod; as secretary of the Synod in 1916 and 1917; and since 1917 has been a member of the Board of Education of the Norwegian Lutheran Church of America. 
FORTY-SECOND DISTRICT

Harold R. Atwood, born Nov. 15, 1896, Trempealeau, Wis., moved to Winona, 1902. Attended Winona public schools. Served as machinist apprentice for C. & N. W. Ry. Co. and has been employed by said company for over 10 years. Entered military service Feb. 22, 1918, served one year overseas; received honorable discharge July 22, 1919. Member of American Legion; served 2 years as executive committeeman of Leon J. Wetzel Post No. 9. 




