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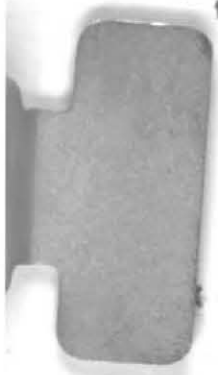
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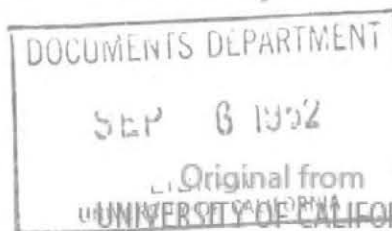

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THE MINNESOTA CAPITOL

Minnesota's first capitol, which stood at Tenth, Cedar, Exchange, and Wabasha streets in St. Paul, served the territory and state from 1854 until 1881, when it was destroyed by fire. A second capitol was immediately erected on the site of the first, but before many years the increase in the activities of state government required a larger building. In 1893 the legislature authorized the appointment of a commission to select a site for and to construct a new building, and provided for the necessary taxation to pay for it.

The original commission appointed by Governor Knute Nelson consisted of Henry W. Lamberton, George A. Du Toit, Charles H. Graves, Eben E. Corliss, John De Laittre, and James McHench, with Channing Seabury as chairman. Vacancies resulting from deaths and resignations of commissioners were filled by Daniel Shell, Edgar Weaver, John Ludwig, and Henry M. Lamberton. Frank E. Hanson was secretary of the commission.

After holding two competitions for architects, the commission adopted the design submitted by Cass Gilbert, who began his career in St. Paul in 1883 and later removed to New York, where he won fame as the designer of many public and other buildings, among them the Woolworth Building. Ground for the new building was broken on May 6, 1896, by Channing Seabury, in the presence of a large gathering of citizens, and the cornerstone was laid on July 17, 1898, by Alexander Ramsey, the first governor of Minnesota Territory. The building which was completed at a total cost of \$4,500,000, including the site and the furnishings, was ready for occupancy by the legislature in 1905. The first governor inaugurated in the new Capitol was John A. Johnson.

Soon after the building was completed, the following statement was made in a leading architectural journal: "It is probable that no other structure in the United States of its size and stability cost as little money"—a tribute to the integrity, loyalty, and efficiency of the Capitol Commission.

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MINNESOTA STATE SEAL

The state seal is similar in design to the territorial seal, although various other devices were proposed and even adopted as laws.

First official reference to the seal appears in the message of Governor Ramsey to the first territorial legislature, September 9, 1849. A legislative committee, October 31, recommended as a seal device, "an every-day scene, consisting of an Indian family with their lodge, canoe, etc., and a single white man visiting them, with no other protection than the feeling of hospitality and friendship existing between the two people. The white man is receiving from the Indian the pipe of peace." That seal was authorized by law but never used.

The territorial seal depicted instead a scene at St. Anthony Falls, as shown in the accompanying engraving. The earlier proposal may have influenced the design, but substitution of the musket and power-horn for the pipe of peace may have had special significance. The motto, "*Quo sursum velo videre*," the third word a misprint for "*volo*," meaning "I wish to see what lies beyond," was selected by H. H. Sibley, while a delegate in Congress. Governor Ramsey commissioned D. O. Hare of Washington to engrave the seal and the cost was \$157.

Although ridiculed by journalists as representing "a scared white man and an astonished Indian," and "a man plowing one way and looking another," this territorial seal was used until the adoption of the state seal in 1858.

During the first session of the state legislature, assembled December 2, 1857, Charles F. Lowe, a member of the convention of 1857 which drafted the state constitution, including a provision for a state seal, procured from Mr. Buechner, a St. Paul artist, a design shown on page 658 of W. H. C. Folsom's "Fifty Years in the Northwest."

The state government upon beginning operations in May, 1858, was without a state seal. Authorizing temporary use of the territorial seal, Governor Sibley brought up the subject at the adjourned legislative session in June and a special committee was named. W. H. C. Folsom, chairman, submitted the design mentioned, which on July 16 was adopted by joint resolution. When the new seal was delivered, however, it was found that the legislative intent had failed, and in place of that elaborate design one resembling the territorial seal was used, as it appears in the illustration. The word "state" was added and the date of admission substituted for the territorial year. The motto was changed to "*L'Etoile du Nord*," translated "The North Star," and this state seal has ever since been in official use. The Minnesotian published articles ridiculing the French motto and declaring that Governor Sibley had chosen it simply because he spoke that language.

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MINNESOTA STATE FLAG

The State legislature of 1893, by Chapter 16, provided for a state flag.

Mrs. Franklyn L. Greenleaf, Mrs. A. A. White, Mrs. Edward Durant, Mrs. F. B. Clarke, Mrs. H. F. Brown and Mrs. A. T. Stebbins were by this act named a commission to select an appropriate design.

This commission called for designs, and on Feb. 28, 1893, met, and adopted the design presented by Mrs. Edward H. Center, of Minneapolis.

Following is a description of the flag: "The ground is of white silk, and the reverse side of blue silk, bordered with bullion fringe. In the center is the state seal, wreathed with white moccasin flowers, on a blue ground. The red ribbon of the seal bearing a motto is continued through the wreath, entwining the blossoms and floating carelessly over the lower portion of the flag. It bears, in gold, the dates 1819, the time of the settlement of Minnesota, and 1893. Above, also in gold, is the date 1858, the time of the admission of Minnesota to the Union. Below the design, in gold letters, is wrought 'Minnesota.' Grouped around the seal are nineteen stars in the design of star points, with the North Star, significant of the North Star State, in a group of three at the top."

The choice of the number nineteen is a peculiarly happy one, as Minnesota was the nineteenth state, after the original thirteen, to be admitted to the Union. The standard to the flag was surmounted by a golden gopher, and tied with a gold cord and tassel. The execution of the design is entirely in needle work.



MINNESOTA STATE FLOWER

The state flower is the pink and white moccasin flower, pictured in the accompanying illustration, known as *Cypripedium spectabile* and by the earlier name of *Cypripedium reginae*.

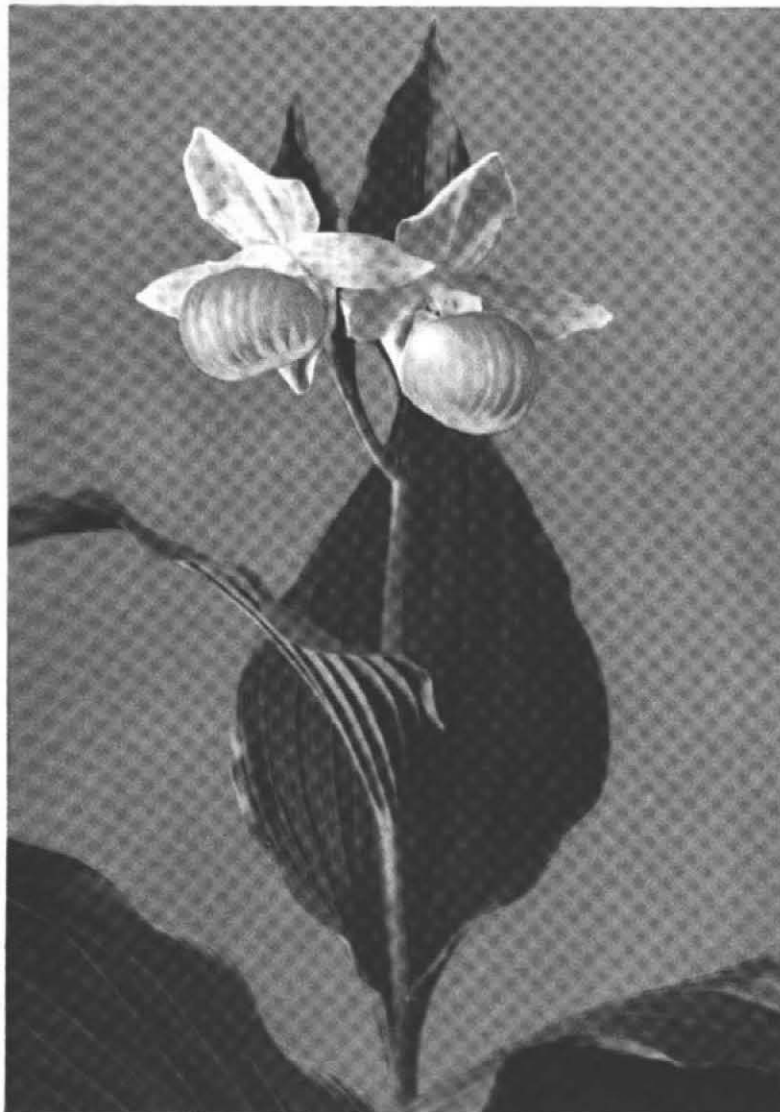
The state legislature adopted a state flower during February, 1892, on a petition signed by Mrs. A. L. Stebbins of Rochester and other members of the Woman's Auxiliary, Board of World's Fair Managers, urging adoption of the "Wild Lady Slipper or Moccasin Flower," *Cypripedium calceolus*, which was followed.

Women of the St. Anthony Study Circle, through Mrs. E. C. Chatfield of Minneapolis announced later that the *calceolus* was not found in Minnesota and in February, 1902, the legislature changed the designation to the *reginae*.

The name *Cypripedium*, from the Greek words meaning the shoe of Venus, published for this genus in 1737 by Linnaeus, and its common English and American popular names, as Lady's Slippers, Moccasin Flower and Indian Shoe, refer to the saccate and somewhat shoe-like form of the most conspicuous petal (in this *Orchis* family called the lip) of the flower. The plants grow in cool and moist woods and in bogs, flowering from May to July. *Cypripedium spectabile* is one of six species of *Cypripedium* found in Minnesota.

NOTE—Minnesota has fourteen genera, including forty-one species, of the *Orchis* family, to which the *Cypripediums* belong. In total, 1,583 species of flowering plants, and sixty-eight ferns and their allies, making together 1,650 species, were tabulated, as known to grow without cultivation in this state, by Warren Upham in the Catalogue of the Flora of Minnesota, published in the Twelfth Annual Report of the Geological and Natural History Survey for the year 1883 (193 pages, with a map showing the areas of forest and prairie). Within the basin of the Minnesota river, according to the report in 1892 by Prof. Conway MacMillan, the state botanist, 1,174 species and varieties of flowering plants, including all our *Cypripediums*, are known and have been collected for the Herbarium of the State University. The State Flower is thus chosen from among more than a thousand others which blossom on our prairies, in the northern woods, in their cool bogs, and in our streams and lakes.

Chapter 409 L. '25 provides for the protection of the Minnesota State Flower as well as other varieties of wild flowers.

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The Minnesota Legislative Manual is issued biennially, under provisions of Chapter 108, Laws 1947.

Distribution: Fifty copies to the president of the Senate; twenty-five copies to each member of the legislature on request; fifty copies to the state historical society; twenty-five copies to the state university; sixty copies to the state library; two copies each to the library of Congress, the Minnesota Soldiers' home, the state teachers colleges, the state high schools, the public academies; seminaries, and colleges of the state, and the free public libraries of the state; one copy each to the state institutions not hereinbefore mentioned, the elective state officials, the appointed heads of departments, the officers and employees of the legislature, the justices of the supreme court, the judges of the district court, the senators and representatives in Congress from this state, and the county auditors; one copy to each public school, to be distributed through the county superintendent of schools.

ORGANIC ACT OF MINNESOTA

An act to establish the Territorial Government of Minnesota
[Passed March 3, 1849]

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That from and after the passage of this act, all that part of the territory of the United States which lies within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning in the Mississippi river at the point where the line of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes of north latitude crosses the same; thence running due west on said line, which is the northern boundary of the state of Iowa, to the northwest corner of the said state of Iowa; then southerly along the western boundary of said state to the point where said boundary strikes the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of White Earth river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the White Earth river to the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain, thence east and south of east along the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain to Lake Superior; thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the state of Wisconsin in Lake Superior; thence along the western boundary line of said state of Wisconsin to the Mississippi river; thence down the main channel of said river to the place of beginning, be and the same is hereby erected into a temporary government by the name of the Territory of Minnesota; provided, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to inhibit the government of the United States from dividing said Territory into two or more territories, in such manner and at such times as Congress shall deem convenient and proper, or from attaching any portion of said Territory to any other state or territory of the United States.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Minnesota shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States. The governor shall reside within said Territory; shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof; shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian affairs. He may grant pardons for offenses against the law of said Territory, and reprieves for offenses against the laws of the United States until the decision of the president can be made known thereon; he shall commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of the said Territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That there shall be a secretary of said Territory, who shall reside therein, and hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States; he shall record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly hereinafter constituted, and all the acts and proceedings of the governor in his executive department; he shall transmit one copy of the laws and

one copy of the executive proceedings, on or before the first day of December in each year, to the president of the United States, and at the same time two copies of the laws to the speaker of the house of representatives, and the president of the senate for the use of Congress. And in case of the death, removal, resignation, or necessary absence of the governor from the Territory, the secretary shall be and he is hereby authorized and required to execute and perform all the powers and the duties of the governor during such vacancy or necessary absence, or until another governor shall be duly appointed to fill such vacancy.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That the legislative power and authority of said Territory shall be vested in the governor and a legislative assembly. The legislative assembly shall consist of a council and house of representatives. The council shall consist of nine members having the qualifications of voters, as hereinafter prescribed, whose term of service shall continue two years. The house of representatives shall, at its first session, consist of eighteen members, possessing the same qualifications as prescribed for members of the council, and whose term of service shall continue one year. The number of councillors and representatives may be increased by the legislative assembly, from time to time, in proportion to the increase of population; provided, that the whole number shall never exceed fifteen councillors and thirty-nine representatives. An apportionment shall be made, as nearly equal as practicable, among the several counties or districts for the election of the council and representatives, giving to each section of the Territory representation in the ratio of its population, Indians excepted, as nearly as may be. And the members of the council and of the house of representatives shall reside in and be inhabitants of the districts for which they may be elected, respectively. Previous to the first election, the governor shall cause a census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the several counties and districts of the Territory to be taken, and the first election shall be held at such time and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct, and he shall, at the same time, declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties and districts shall be entitled under this act.

The number of persons authorized to be elected having the highest number of votes, in each of said council districts for members of the council, shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected to the council, and the person or persons authorized to be elected, having the greatest number of votes for the house of representatives, equal to the number to which each county or district shall be entitled, shall also be declared by the governor to be duly elected members of the house of representatives; provided, that in case of a tie between two or more persons voted for, the governor shall order a new election to supply the vacancy made by

such tie. And the persons thus elected to the legislative assembly shall meet at such place on such day as the governor shall appoint, but thereafter the time, place and manner of holding and conducting all elections by the people, and the apportioning of the representation in the several counties or districts to the council and house of representatives, according to the population, shall be prescribed by law, as well as the day of the commencement of the regular session of the legislative assembly; provided, that no one session shall exceed the term of sixty days.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said Territory at the time of the passage of this act, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to any office within the said Territory; but the qualifications of voters and of holding office at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the legislative assembly; provided, that the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States and those who shall have declared on oath their intention to become such, and shall have taken an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act.

SEC. 6. And be it further enacted, That the legislative power of the Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation, consistent with the Constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act; but no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents. All the laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor shall be submitted to the Congress of the United States, and if disapproved shall be null and of no effect.

SEC. 7. And be it further enacted, That all township, district and county officers, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, in such manner as shall be provided by the governor and legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota. The governor shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council, appoint all officers not herein otherwise provided for, and, in the first instance, the governor alone may appoint all said officers, who shall hold their offices until the end of the next session of the legislative assembly.

SEC. 8. And be it further enacted, That no member of the legislative assembly shall hold or be appointed to any office which shall have been created, or the salary or emoluments of which shall have been increased, while he was a member, during the term for which he was elected, and for one year after the expiration of such term; and no person holding a commission or appointment under the United States, except postmasters, shall be a member of the legislative assembly, or shall hold any office under the government of said Territory.

SEC. 9. And be it further enacted, That the judicial power of said Territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts, and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and

who shall hold a term at the seat of government of said Territory annually; and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said Territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such time and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law; provided, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute, or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judges thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court, or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of every term of said courts, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said Territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive in all such cases the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin Territory received for similar services.

SEC. 10. And be it further enacted, That there shall be appointed an attorney for said Territory, who shall continue in office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall receive the same fees and salary as the attorney of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin received. There shall also be a marshal for the Territory appointed, who shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall execute all processes issuing from the said courts, when exercising their jurisdiction as circuit and district courts of the United States; he shall perform the duties, be subject to the same regulations and penalties, and be entitled to the same fees as the marshal of the district court of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin; and shall, in addition,

be paid two hundred dollars annually as a compensation for extra services.

SEC. 11. And be it further enacted, That the governor, secretary, chief justice and associate justices, attorney and marshal, shall be nominated and by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the president of the United States. The governor and secretary to be appointed as aforesaid shall, before they act as such, respectively, take an oath or affirmation, before the district judge, or some justice of the peace in the limits of said Territory, duly authorized to administer oaths and affirmations by the laws now in force therein, or before the chief justice, or some associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, to support the constitution of the United States, and faithfully to discharge the duties of their respective offices, which said oaths, when so taken, shall be certified by the person by whom the same shall have been taken, and such certificates shall be received and recorded by the said secretary among the executive proceedings; and the chief justice and associate justices, and all other civil officers in said Territory, before they act as such, shall take a like oath or affirmation, before the said governor or secretary, or some judge or justice of the peace of the Territory, who may be duly commissioned and qualified, which said oath or affirmation shall be certified and transmitted, by the person taking the same, to the secretary, to be by him recorded as aforesaid; and afterwards, the like oath or affirmation shall be taken, certified and recorded in such manner and form as may be prescribed by law. The governor shall receive an annual salary of \$1,500 as governor, and \$1,000 as superintendent of Indian affairs. The chief justice and associate justice shall each receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The secretary shall receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The said salaries shall be paid quarterly, at the treasury of the United States. The members of the legislative assembly shall be entitled to receive three dollars each per day during their attendance at the session thereof, and three dollars each for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the said sessions, estimated according to the nearest usually traveled route. There shall be appropriated, annually, the sum of \$1,000, to be expended by the governor to defray the contingent expenses of the Territory; and there shall also be appropriated, annually, a sufficient sum to be expended by the secretary of the Territory, and upon an estimate to be made by the secretary of the treasury of the United States, to defray the expenses of the legislative assembly, the printing of the laws, and other incidental expenses, and the secretary of the Territory shall annually account to the secretary of the treasury of the United States for the manner in which the aforesaid sum shall have been expended.

SEC. 12. And be it further enacted, That the inhabitants of the said Territory shall be entitled to all the rights, privileges and immunities heretofore granted and secured to the Territory of Wisconsin and to its inhabitants; and the laws in force in the Territory of Wisconsin at the date of the admission of the State of Wisconsin shall continue to be valid and operative therein, so far as the same be not incompatible with the provisions of this act, subject, nevertheless, to be altered, modified or repealed by the governor and legislative assembly of the said Territory of Minnesota; and the laws of the United States are hereby extended over and

declared to be in force in said Territory, so far as the same, or any provision thereof, may be applicable.

SEC. 13. And be it further enacted, That the legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota shall hold its first session in St. Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of government for said Territory, at such place as they may deem eligible; and shall at such time as they shall see proper prescribe by law the manner of locating the permanent seat of government of said Territory by a vote of the people. And the sum of twenty thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated and granted to said Territory of Minnesota, to be applied by the governor and legislative assembly to the erection of suitable public buildings at the seat of government.

SEC. 14. And be it further enacted, That a delegate of the house of representatives of the United States, to serve for the term of two years, may be elected by the voters qualified to elect members of the legislative assembly, who shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as are exercised and enjoyed by the delegates from the several other territories of the United States to the said house of representatives. The first election shall be held at such times and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and at all subsequent elections the times, places and manner of holding the elections shall be prescribed by law. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected, and a certificate thereof shall be given accordingly.

SEC. 15. And be it further enacted, That all suits, process and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law or in chancery, and all indictments and informations, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the Territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said Territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect, shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said Territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws, in force within said limits, may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions and causes of action may be recovered under this act the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said Territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

SEC. 16. And be it further enacted, That all justices of the peace, constables, sheriffs, and all other judicial and ministerial officers, who shall be in office within the limits of said Territory, when this act shall take effect, shall be and they are hereby authorized and required to continue to exercise and perform the duties of their respective offices as officers of the Territory of Minnesota, temporarily, and until they or others shall be duly appointed and qualified to fill their places, in the manner herein directed, or until their offices shall be abolished.

SEC. 17. And be it further enacted, That the sum of \$5,000 be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be ex-

pended by and under the direction of the said governor of the Territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorneys of said Territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 18. And be it further enacted, That when the lands in said Territory shall be surveyed under the direction of the government of the United States, preparatory to bringing the same into market, sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in said Territory shall be and the same are hereby reserved for the purpose of being applied to schools in said Territory, and in the state and territories hereafter to be erected out of the same.

SEC. 19. And be it further enacted, That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said Territory may define the judicial districts of said Territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said Territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter or

modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.

SEC. 20. And be it further enacted, That every bill which shall or may pass the council and house of representatives, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the Territory; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated; which shall cause the objections to be entered at large upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall also be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law; but in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days, (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislative assembly, by adjournment, prevent it, in which case it shall not become a law.

ACT AUTHORIZING A STATE GOVERNMENT

[Passed Feb. 26, 1857]

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the inhabitants of that portion of the Territory of Minnesota which is embraced within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and the British Possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois de Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof, thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river, and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin, until the same intersects with the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and the British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning, be and they hereby are authorized to form for themselves a constitution and state government by the name of the State of Minnesota, and to come into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, according to the Federal Constitution.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state and any state or states now or hereafter to be formed or bounded by the same; and said river or waters leading into the same shall be common highways, and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to all other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That on the first Monday in June next, the legal voters in each representative district then existing within the limits of the proposed state, are hereby authorized to elect two delegates for each representative to which said district shall be entitled according to the apportionment for representatives to the territorial legislature; which election for delegates shall be held and conducted, and the returns made, in all respects in conformity with the laws of said Territory regulating the election of representatives, and the delegates so elected shall assemble at the capitol of said Territory on the second Monday in July next, and first determine by a vote whether it is the wish of the people of the proposed State to be admitted into the Union at that time; and if so, shall proceed to form a constitution, and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a state government, in conformity with the

Federal Constitution, subject to the approval and ratification of the people of the proposed State.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That in the event said convention shall decide in favor of the immediate admission of the proposed State into the Union, it shall be the duty of the United States marshal for said Territory to proceed to take a census or enumeration of the inhabitants within the limits of the proposed State, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, with the view of ascertaining the number of representatives to which said State may be entitled in the Congress of the United States. And said State shall be entitled to one representative, and such additional representatives as the population of the State shall, according to the census, show it would be entitled to according to the present ratio of representation.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That the following propositions be and the same are hereby offered to the said convention of the people of Minnesota for their free acceptance or rejection, which, if accepted by the convention, shall be obligatory on the United States, and upon the said State of Minnesota, to-wit:

First—That sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in every township of public lands in said State, and where either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been sold or otherwise been disposed of, other lands, equivalent thereto, and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to said State for the use of schools.

Second—That seventy-two sections of land shall be set apart and reserved for the use and support of a state university, to be selected by the governor of said State, subject to the approval of the commissioner at the general land office, and to be appropriated and applied in such manner as the legislature of said State may prescribe; for the purpose aforesaid, but for no other purpose.

Third—Ten entire sections of land to be selected by the governor of said State, in legal subdivisions, shall be granted to said State for the purpose of completing the public buildings, or for the erection of others at the seat of government, under the direction of the legislature thereof.

Fourth—That all salt springs within said State, not exceeding twelve in number, with six sections of land adjoining or as contiguous as may be to each, shall be granted to said State for its use; and the same to be selected by the governor thereof within one year after the admission of said State, and, when so selected, to be used or disposed of on such terms, conditions and regulations as the legislature shall direct; provided, that no salt spring or land the right whereof is now vested in any individual or in individuals, or which may be hereafter confirmed or adjudged to any individual or individuals, shall by this article be granted to said State.

Fifth—That five per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands lying within said State, which shall be sold by Congress after the admission of said State into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said State for the purpose of making public roads and internal improvements as the legislature shall direct; provided, the foregoing propositions herein offered are on the condition that the said convention which shall form the constitution of said State

shall provide, by a clause in said constitution, or an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to bona fide purchasers thereof; and that no tax shall be imposed on land belonging to the United States, and that in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Under the enabling act of Congress, approved March 3, 1857, a constitutional convention of one hundred and eight members (each council district to elect two for each councilman and representative it was entitled to) was authorized to meet at the capitol on the second Monday in July, to frame a state constitution, and submit it to the people of the territory. The election was held on the first Monday in June. On July 13th the delegates met, but, a disagreement arising in the organization, the Republican members organized one body, and the Democratic members organized separately. Each of these bodies, claiming to be the legal constitutional convention, proceeded with the work of forming an instrument to be submitted to the people. After some days an understanding was effected between them, and, by means of committees of conference, the same constitution was framed and adopted by both bodies. On being submitted to the people October 13th, it was ratified.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

STATE OF MINNESOTA

Adopted October 13, 1857. Ayes, 30,055; Nays, 571

Preamble. We, the people of the State of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution:

ARTICLE I.

Bill of Rights

Object of government. SECTION 1. Government is instituted for the security, benefit and protection of the people, in whom all political power is inherent, together with the right to alter, modify or reform such government, whenever the public good may require it.

Rights and Privileges. SEC. 2. No member of this State shall be disfranchised, or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land, or the judgment of his peers. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the State otherwise than the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted.

Liberty of the press. SEC. 3. The liberty of the press shall forever remain inviolate, and all persons may freely speak, write and publish their sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of such right.

Trial by jury. SEC. 4. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, and shall extend to all cases at law without regard to the amount in controversy, but a jury trial may be waived by the parties in all cases in the manner prescribed by law; [and the legislature may provide that the agreement of five-sixths of any jury in any civil action or proceeding, after not less than six (6) hours' deliberation, shall be a sufficient verdict therein.]*

(a) The jury contemplated by article 1, section 6, securing the right to jury trial in criminal cases, is a body of twelve men, and it is error to try a party charged with crime in a justice court, against his objection, with a jury of six. The fact that he may appeal to the district court, on entering into recognizance with sureties, does not change the rule. 14 Minn. 330.

No excessive bail or unusual punishments. SEC. 5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor shall excessive fines be imposed; nor shall cruel or unusual punishments be inflicted.

Rights of accused in criminal prosecutions. SEC. 6. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the county or district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which county or district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel in his defense. (a)

Due process; prosecutions; second jeopardy; self-incrimination; bail; habeas corpus. SEC. 7. No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense without due process of law, and no person for the same offense shall be put twice in jeopardy of punishment, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. All persons shall before conviction be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great; and the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when in case of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require.

Redress of injuries or wrongs. SEC. 8. Every person is entitled to a certain remedy in the laws for all injuries or wrongs which he may receive in his person, property or character; he ought to obtain justice freely and without purchase; completely and without denial; promptly and without delay, conformable to the laws.

Treason defined. SEC. 9. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against the same, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

Right against unreasonable searches. SEC. 10. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the person or things to be seized.

Prohibits ex post facto laws, or laws impairing contracts. SEC. 11. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, nor any law impairing the obligation of contracts shall ever be passed, and no conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Imprisonment for debt—property exemption. SEC. 12. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in this state, (b) but this shall not prevent the legislature from providing for imprisonment, or holding to bail, persons charged with fraud in contracting said debt. A reasonable amount of property shall be exempt from seizure or sale for the payment of any debt or liability. The amount of such exemption shall be determined by law. [Provided, however, that all property so exempted shall be liable to seizure and sale for any debts incurred to any person for work done or materials furnished in the construction, repair or improvement of the same, and provided further, that such liability to seizure and sale shall also extend to all real property for any debt incurred to any laborer or servant for labor or service performed.]*

Private property for public use. SEC. 13. Private property shall not be taken, destroyed or damaged for public use without just compensation therefor, first paid or secured.**

Military power subordinate. SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power, and no standing army shall be kept up in this State in times of peace.

Lands declared allodial—leases, when void. SEC. 15. All lands within the State are declared to be allodial, and feudal tenures of every description, with all their incidents, are prohibited. Leases and grants of agricultural lands for a longer period than twenty-one years hereafter made, in which shall be reserved any rent or service of any kind, shall be void.

Freedom of conscience—no preference to be given to any religious establishment or mode of worship. SEC. 16. The enumeration

of rights in this constitution shall not be construed to deny or impair others retained by and inherent in the people. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience shall never be infringed, nor shall any man be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any religious or ecclesiastical ministry, against his consent; nor shall any control of or interference with the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness, or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the State, nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious societies, or religious or theological seminaries.

No religious test or property qualifications to be required. SEC. 17. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification for any office of public trust under the State. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification of any voter at any election in this State; nor shall any person be rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity in consequence of his opinion upon the subject of religion.

No license to peddle. SEC. 18. Any person may sell or peddle the products of the farm or garden occupied and cultivated by him without obtaining a license therefor.***

ARTICLE II.

On Name and Boundaries

Name and boundaries. SECTION 1. This State shall be called and known by the name of the State of Minnesota, and shall consist of and have jurisdiction over the territory embraced in the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and British Possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois des Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse, thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence east along the northern boundary of said State to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin until the same intersects the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning.****

Jurisdiction on bordering rivers. SEC. 2. The State of Minnesota shall have concurrent

Acceptance of propositions in enabling act. SEC. 3. The propositions contained in the act of Congress entitled, "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government, preparatory to their admission into the Union on equal footing with the original states," are hereby accepted, ratified and confirmed, and shall remain irrevocable without the consent of the United States; and it is hereby ordained that this State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same, by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title to said soil to bona fide purchasers thereof; and no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States and in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

ARTICLE III.

Distribution of the Powers of Government

Division of powers. SECTION 1. The powers of government shall be divided into three distinct departments—legislative, executive, and judicial; and no person or persons belonging to or constituting one of these departments shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except in the instances expressly provided in this constitution.*

ARTICLE IV.

Legislative Department

Legislature meets biennially — length of session. SECTION 1. The legislature shall consist of the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall meet biennially at the seat of government of the State, at such time as shall be prescribed by law, but no session shall exceed the term of ninety (90) legislative days; and no new bill shall be introduced in either branch, except on the written request of the governor, during the last twenty (20) days of such sessions, except the attention of the legislature shall be called to some important matter of general

interest by a special message from the governor.

Apportionment of members. SEC. 2. The number of members who compose the Senate and House of Representatives shall be prescribed by law, but the representation in the Senate shall never exceed one member for every 5,000 inhabitants, and in the House of Representatives one member for every 2,000 inhabitants. The representation in both houses shall be apportioned equally throughout the different sections of the State, in proportion to the population thereof, exclusive of Indians not taxable under the provisions of law.

Eligibility of members—quorum. SEC. 3. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and eligibility of its own members; a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as it may provide.

Rules of government. SEC. 4. Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, sit upon its own adjournment, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member; but no member shall be expelled the second time for the same offense.

Officers—journal of proceedings. SEC. 5. The House of Representatives shall elect its presiding officer and the Senate and House of Representatives shall elect such other officers as may be provided by law; they shall keep journals of their proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays, when taken on any question, shall be entered on such journals.

Length of adjournments. SEC. 6. Neither house shall, during a session of the legislature, adjourn for more than three days (Sundays excepted), nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be assembled, without the consent of the other house.

Compensation. SEC. 7. The compensation of senators and representatives shall be three dollars per diem during the first session, but may afterwards be prescribed by law. But no increase of compensation shall be prescribed which shall take effect during the period for which the members of the existing House of Representatives may have been elected.

Privileged from arrest. SEC. 8. The members of each house shall in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace,

mentioned, is, in the opinion of the commissioners, so far as the same extends the true boundary intended by the before mentioned treaties, namely: " * * * thence through the middle of the waters of this bay to the northwest extremity of the same; being the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods, and from a monument in this bay, on the nearest firm ground to the above northwest extremity of said bay, the courses and distances are as follows: 56° W. 1,565½ feet; 2nd, N. 6° W. 861½ feet; 3rd, N. 28° W. 615.4 feet; 4th, N. 27° 10' W. 495.4 feet; 5th, N. 5° 10' E. 1,322½ feet; 6th, N. 70° 45' W. 493 feet, the variation being 12° east. The termination of this 6th and last course and distance being the above said most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods, as designated by the seventh article of the treaty of Ghent, and being in latitude 49° 23' 55" north of the equator, and in longitude 95° 14' 38" west from Greenwich. The second article of the convention of 1818 is as follows: Article 2. It is agreed that a line drawn from the most northwestern point of the Lake of the Woods along the 49th parallel of north latitude, or, if the said point shall not be in the 49th parallel of north latitude, then that a line drawn from the said point due north or south, as the case may be, until the said line shall intersect the said parallel of north latitude, and from the point of such intersection due west, along and with the said parallel, shall be the line of demarkation between the territories of the United States and His Britannic Majesty, and that the said line shall form the northern boundary of the said territories of the United States and the southern boundary of His Britannic Majesty, from the Lake of the Woods to the Stony Mountains. This boundary was re-established and determined by a commission authorized by congress, and the surveys embracing four years were made and reported to congress in 1877.

be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses, and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

Restriction as to holding office. SEC. 9. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he is elected, hold any office under the authority of the United States or the State of Minnesota, except that of postmaster, and no senator or representative shall hold an office under the state which has been created or the emoluments of which have been increased during the session of the legislature of which he was a member, until one year after the expiration of his term of office in the legislature.

Bills of revenue to originate in House. SEC. 10. All bills for raising a revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives, but the Senate may propose and concur with the amendments as on other bills.

Approval of bills by Governor—action on non-approval. SEC. 11. Every bill which shall have passed the Senate and House of Representatives, in conformity to the rules of each house and the joint rules of the two houses, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the State. If he approves, he shall sign and deposit it in the office of secretary of state for preservation, and notify the house where it originated of the fact. But if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it shall have originated; when such objections shall be entered at large on the journal of the same, and the house shall proceed to reconsider the bill. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered; and if it be approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by adjournment within that time, prevents its return; in which case it shall not be a law. The governor may approve, sign and file in the office of the secretary of state, within three days after the adjournment of the legislature, any act passed during the last three days of the session, and the same shall become a law.

Governor may cut out items of appropriation bills and otherwise approve. If any bill presented to the governor contain several items of appropriation of money, he may object to one or more of such items, while approving of the other portion of the bill. In such case he shall append to the bill, at the time of signing it, a statement of the items to which he objects, and the appropriation so objected to shall not take effect. If the legislature be in session, he shall transmit to the house in which the bill originated a copy of such statement, and the items objected to shall be separately reconsidered. If, on reconsideration, one or more of such items be approved by two-thirds of the members elected to each house, the same shall be a part of the law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. All the provisions of this section, in relation to bills not approved by the governor, shall apply in cases in which he shall withhold his

approval from any item or items contained in a bill appropriating money.

Money appropriations, how made. SEC. 12. No money shall be appropriated except by bill. Every order, resolution or vote requiring the concurrence of the two houses (except such as relate to the business or adjournment of the same) shall be presented to the governor for his signature, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being returned by him with his objections, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the members of the two houses, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

Majority vote of all members-elect to pass a law. SEC. 13. The style of all laws of this State shall be: "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota." No law shall be passed unless voted for by a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature, and the vote entered upon the journal of each house.

Impeachment powers. SEC. 14. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, through a concurrence of a majority of all the members elected to seats therein. All impeachments shall be tried by the Senate; and when sitting for that purpose the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Exclusive from civil rights. SEC. 15. The legislature shall have full power to exclude from the privilege of electing or being elected any person convicted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime.

Protest and dissent of members. SEC. 16. Two or more members of either house shall have liberty to dissent and protest against any act or resolution which they may think injurious to the public or to any individual, and have the reason of their dissent entered on the journal.

Vacancies in legislature. SEC. 17. The governor shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies as may occur in either house of the legislature. The legislature shall prescribe by law the manner in which evidence in cases of contested seats in either house shall be taken.

Punish for disorderly conduct. SEC. 18. Each house may punish by imprisonment, during its session, any person, not a member, who shall be guilty of any disorderly or contemptuous behavior in their presence, but no such imprisonment shall at any time exceed twenty-hour hours.

Open Sessions. SEC. 19. Each house shall be open to the public during the sessions thereof, except in such cases as in their opinion may require secrecy.

Reading of bills. SEC. 20. Every bill shall be read on three different days in each separate house, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the house where such bill is depending shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed by either house until it shall have been previously read twice at length.

Enrollment of bills. SEC. 21. Every bill having passed both houses shall be carefully enrolled, and shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house. Any presiding officer refusing to sign a bill which shall have previously passed both houses shall thereafter be incapable of holding a seat in either branch of the legislature, or hold any other office or honor of profit in the State, and in case of such refusal, each house shall, by

rule, provide the manner in which such bill shall be properly certified for presentation to the governor.

Passage of bills on last day of session prohibited. SEC. 22. No bill shall be passed by either house of the legislature upon the day prescribed for the adjournment of the two houses. But this section shall not be so construed as to preclude the enrollment of a bill, or the signature and passage from one house to the other, or the reports thereon from committees, or its transmission to the executive for his signature.

Census enumeration—apportionment. SEC. 23. The legislature shall provide by law for an enumeration of the inhabitants of this State in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and every tenth year thereafter. At their first session after each enumeration so made, and also at their first session after each enumeration made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall have the power to prescribe the bounds of congressional, senatorial and representative districts, and to apportion anew the senators and representatives among the several districts according to the provisions of section second of this article.

Senatorial districts — term of office of senators and representatives. SEC. 24. The senators shall also be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory, at the same time that members of the house of representatives are required to be chosen, and in the same manner; and no representative district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. The senate districts shall be numbered in a regular series. The terms of office of senators and representatives shall be the same as now prescribed by law until the general election of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight (1878), at which time there shall be an entire new election of all senators and representatives. Representatives chosen at such election, or at any election thereafter, shall hold their office for the term of two years, except it be to fill a vacancy; and the senators chosen at such election by districts designated as odd numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the second year, and senators chosen by districts designated by even numbers shall go out of office at the expiration of the fourth year; and thereafter senators shall be chosen for four years, except there shall be an entire new election of all the senators at the election of representatives next succeeding each new apportionment provided for in this article.

Qualification of legislators. SEC. 25. Senators and representatives shall be qualified voters of the State, and shall have resided one year in the State, and six months immediately preceding the election in the district from which they are elected.

Senators to Congress. SEC. 26. Members of the Senate of the United States from this State shall be elected by the two houses of the legislature in joint convention, at such time and in such manner as may be provided by law.*

Laws to embrace only one subject. SEC. 27. No law shall embrace more than one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.

Divorces. SEC. 28. Divorces shall not be granted by the legislature.

Oath of office. SEC. 29. All members and officers of both branches of the legislature shall, before entering upon the duties of their respective trusts, take and subscribe

an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and faithfully and impartially to discharge the duties devolving upon him as such member or officer.

Elections viva voce. SEC. 30. In all elections to be made by the legislature, the members thereof shall vote viva voce, and their votes shall be entered on the journal.

Prohibition of lotteries. SEC. 31. The legislature shall never authorize any lottery or the sale of lottery tickets.

Change of form of taxation of railroads to be voted upon. SEC. 32. [a] Any law providing for the repeal or amendment of any law or laws heretofore or hereafter enacted, which provides that any railroad company now existing in this State or operating its road therein, or which may be hereafter organized, shall, in lieu of all other taxes and assessments upon their real estate, roads, rolling stock, and other personal property, at and during the time and periods therein specified, pay into the treasury of this State a certain percentage therein mentioned of the gross earnings of such railroad companies now existing or hereafter organized, shall, before the same shall take effect or be in force, be submitted to a vote of the people of the State, and be adopted and ratified by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the election at which the same shall be submitted to them.

Internal improvement lands — investment of proceeds in bonds. SEC. 32 [b] All lands donated to the State of Minnesota for the purpose of internal improvement, under the eighth section of the act of Congress, approved September fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-one, being "An act to appropriate the proceeds of the sale of the public lands, and to grant pre-emption rights," shall be appraised and sold, in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands, under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight, of the General Statutes, except the modifications hereinafter mentioned. All moneys derived from the sales of said lands shall be invested in the bonds of the United States, or of the State of Minnesota issued since 1860; and the moneys so invested shall constitute the Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State. All moneys received by the county treasurer under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight (38), aforesaid, derived from the sale of internal improvement lands, shall be held at all times subject to the order and direction of the state treasurer, for the benefit of the fund to which it belongs; and on the fifteenth day of June in each year, and at such other times as he may be requested so to do by the state treasurer, he shall pay over to the said state treasurer all moneys received on account of such fund.

The bonds purchased in accordance with this amendment shall be transferable only upon the order of the governor, and on each bond shall be written "Minnesota Internal Improvement Land Fund of the State, transferable only on the order of the governor."

Principal not to be reduced. The principal sum from all sales of internal improvement lands shall not be reduced by any charges or costs of officers, by fees, or by any other means whatever; and section fifty (50), of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight (38), of the General Statutes, shall not be applicable to the provisions of this amendment, and

wherever the words "school lands" are used in said title, it shall read as applicable to this amendment, "Internal Improvement Lands."

Appropriations therefrom to be voted upon before valid. The moneys belonging to the Internal Improvement Land Fund shall not be appropriated for any purposes whatever until the enactment for that purpose shall have been approved by a majority of the electors of the State voting at the annual general election following the passage of the act.*

The force of this amendment shall be to authorize the sale of the internal improvement lands, without further legislative enactment.

Against special legislation. SEC. 33. In all cases where a general law can be made applicable, no special law shall be enacted; and whether a general law could have been made applicable in any case is hereby declared a judicial question, and as such shall be judicially determined without regard to any legislative assertion on that subject. The legislature shall pass no local or special law regulating the affairs of, or incorporating, erecting or changing the lines of, any county, city, village, township, ward or school district, or creating the offices, or prescribing the powers and duties of the officers of, or fixing or relating to the compensation, salary or fees of the same, or the mode of election or appointment thereto, authorizing the laying out, opening, altering, vacating or maintaining roads, highways, streets or alleys; remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures; regulating the powers, duties and practice of justices of the peace, magistrates and constables; changing the names of persons, places, lakes or rivers; for opening and conducting of elections, or fixing or changing the places of voting; authorizing the adoption or legitimation of children; changing the law of descent or succession; conferring rights upon minors; declaring any named person of age; giving effect to informal or invalid wills or deeds, or affecting the estates of minors or persons under disability; locating or changing county seats; regulating the management of public schools, the building or repairing of school-houses, and the raising of money for such purposes; exempting property from taxation, or regulating the rate of interest on money; creating corporations, or amending, renewing, extending or explaining the charters thereof; granting to any corporation, association or individual any special or exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever, or authorizing public taxation for a private purpose. Provided, however, That the inhibitions of local or special laws in this section shall not be construed to prevent the passage of general laws on any of the subjects enumerated.

Repeal of existing special laws. The legislature may repeal any existing special or local law, but shall not amend, extend or modify any of the same.

Refers to amendment of 1881, superseded as above. SEC. 34. The legislature shall provide general laws for the transaction of

any business that may be prohibited by section one (1) of this amendment, and all such laws shall be uniform in their operation throughout the State.

Against combinations or pools to affect markets. SEC. 35. Any combinations of persons, either as individuals or as members or officers of any corporation, to monopolize the markets for food products in this State, or to interfere with, or restrict the freedom of, such markets, is hereby declared to be a criminal conspiracy, and shall be punished in such manner as the legislature may provide.

City or village may frame its charter; submitted to voters; cities classified. SEC. 36. Any city or village in this state may frame a charter for its own government as a city consistent with and subject to the laws of this state, as follows: The legislature shall provide, under such restrictions as it deems proper, for a board of fifteen freeholders, who shall be and for the past five years shall have been qualified voters thereof, to be appointed by the district judges of the judicial district in which the city or village is situated, as the legislature may determine, for a term in no event to exceed six years, which board shall, within six months after its appointment, return to the chief magistrate of said city or village a draft of said charter, signed by the members of said board, or a majority thereof. Such charter shall be submitted to the qualified voters of such city or village at the next election thereafter, and if four-sevenths of the qualified voters voting at such election shall ratify the same it shall, at the end of thirty days thereafter, become the charter of such city or village as a city, and supersede any existing charter and amendments thereof; Provided, that in cities having patrol limits now established, such charter shall require a three-fourths majority vote of the qualified voters voting at such election to change the patrol limits now established. Before any city shall incorporate under this act the legislature shall prescribe by law the general limits within which such charter shall be framed. Duplicate certificates shall be made setting forth the charter proposed and its ratification, which shall be signed by the chief magistrate of said city or village and authenticated by its corporate seal. One of the said certificates shall be deposited in the office of the secretary of state, and the other, after being recorded in the office of the register of deeds for the county in which such city or village lies, shall be deposited among the archives of such city or village, and all courts shall take judicial notice thereof. Such charter** so deposited may be amended by proposal therefor made by a board of fifteen commissioners aforesaid, published for at least once each week for four successive weeks in a legal newspaper of general circulation in such city or village, and accepted by three-fifths of the qualified voters of such city or village voting at the next election and not otherwise; but such charter shall always be in harmony with and subject to the constitution and laws of the state of Minnesota. The legislature may prescribe the duties of the commission relative to sub-

mitting amendments of charter to the vote of the people, and shall provide that upon application of five per cent of the legal voters of any city or village, by written petition, such commission shall submit to the vote of the people proposed amendments to such charter set forth in said petition. The board of freeholders above provided for shall be permanent, and all the vacancies by death, disability to perform duties, resignation or removal from the corporate limits, or expiration of term of office, shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original board was created, and said board shall always contain its full complement of members. It shall be a feature of all such charters that there shall be provided, among other things, for a mayor or chief magistrate, and a legislative body of either one or two houses; if of two houses, at least one of them shall be elected by general vote of the electors. In submitting any such charter or amendment thereto to the qualified voters of such city or village any alternate section or article may be presented for the choice of the voters, and may be voted on separately without prejudice to other articles or sections of the charter or any amendments thereto. The legislature may provide general laws relating to affairs of cities, the application of which may be limited to cities of over fifty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of fifty and not less than twenty thousand inhabitants, or to cities of twenty and not less than ten thousand inhabitants, or to cities of ten thousand inhabitants or less, which shall apply equally to all such cities of either class, and which shall be paramount while in force to the provisions relating to the same matter included in the local charter herein provided for. But no local charter, provision or ordinance passed thereunder shall supersede any general law of the state defining or punishing crimes or misdemeanors.

ARTICLE V

Executive Department

Officers in executive department. SEC. 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general, who shall be chosen by the electors of the State.*

Election returns to be sent to secretary of state. SEC. 2. The returns of every election for the officers named in the foregoing section shall be made to the secretary of state, who shall call to his assistance two or more of the judges of the supreme court, and two disinterested judges of the district courts of the State, who shall constitute a board of canvassers, who shall open and canvass said returns and declare the result within three days after such canvass.

Official term of governor and lieutenant governor—qualifications. SEC. 3. The term of office for the governor and lieutenant governor shall be two years, and until their successors are chosen and qualified. Each shall have attained the age of twenty-five (25) years, and shall have been a bona fide resident of the State for one year next preceding his election. Both shall be citizens of the United States.

*An executive officer of the state is not subject to the control or interference of the judiciary in the performance of duties belonging to him as an executive officer, and no act done, or threatened to be done, by him in his official capacity can be brought under judicial control or interference by mandamus or injunction, even when the act is purely ministerial, 29 Minn. 555.

Powers and duties of governor. SEC. 4. The governor shall communicate by message to each session of the legislature such information touching the state and condition of the country as he may deem expedient. He shall be commander-in-chief of the military and naval forces, and may call out such forces to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion. He may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power, in conjunction with the board of pardons, of which the governor shall be ex officio a member, and the other members of which shall consist of the attorney general of the State of Minnesota and the chief justice of the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, and whose powers and duties shall be defined and regulated by law, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction for offenses against the State, except in cases of impeachment. He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint a state librarian and notaries public, and such other officers as may be provided by law. He shall have power to appoint commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds or other instruments in writing, to be used in the State. He shall have a negative upon all laws passed by the legislature, under such rules and limitations as are in this Constitution prescribed. He may on extraordinary occasions convene both houses of the legislature. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, fill any vacancy that may occur in the office of secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and such other state and district offices as may be hereafter created by law, until the next annual election, and until their successors are chosen and qualified.

Official term of other executive officers. SEC. 5. The official term of the secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general shall be two (2) years. The official term of the state auditor shall be four (4) years, and each shall continue in office until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The further duties and salaries of said executive officers shall each be prescribed by law.

Duties of lieutenant governor. SEC. 6. The lieutenant governor shall be ex officio president of the Senate; and in case a vacancy should occur, from any cause whatever, in the office of governor, he shall be governor during such vacancy. The compensation of lieutenant governor shall be double the compensation of a state senator. Before the close of each session of the Senate they shall elect a president pro tempore, who shall be lieutenant governor in case a vacancy should occur in that office.

Oath of office to be taken by State officers. SEC. 8. Each officer created by this article shall, before entering upon his duties, take on oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States and of this State, and faithfully discharge the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

ARTICLE VI

Judiciary

Judicial powers. SECTION 1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in the supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish by a two-thirds vote.

***Supreme Court.** SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and six associate justices. It shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity, but there shall be no trial by jury in said court. It shall hold one or more terms in each year, as the legislature may direct, at the seat of government, and the legislature may provide, by a two-thirds vote, that one term in each year shall be held in each or any judicial district. It shall be the duty of such court to appoint a reporter of its decisions. There shall be chosen, by the qualified electors of the state, one clerk of the supreme court, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor is duly elected and qualified; and the judges of the supreme court, or a majority of them, shall have the power to fill any vacancy in the office of clerk of the supreme court until an election can be regularly had.

Election and term of office for judges. SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the State at large, and their term of office shall be six years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

District judges may act where supreme judges are disqualified. Whenever all or a majority of the judges of the supreme court shall, from any cause, be disqualified from sitting in any case in said court, the governor, or, if he shall be interested in the result of such case, then the lieutenant governor, shall assign judges of the district court of the State, who shall sit in such case in place of such disqualified judges, with all the powers and duties of judges of the supreme court.

Judicial districts for district courts—election of judges—term of office and residence. SEC. 4. The State shall be divided by the legislature into judicial districts, which shall be composed of contiguous territory, be bounded by county lines, and contain a population as nearly equal as may be practicable. In each judicial district, one or more judges, as the legislature may prescribe, shall be elected by the electors thereof, whose term of office shall be six years, and each of said judges shall severally have and exercise the powers of the court, under such limitations as may be prescribed by law. Every district judge shall, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district for which he shall be elected, and shall reside therein during his continuance in office. In case any court of common pleas heretofore established shall be abolished, the judge of said court may be constituted by the legislature one of the judges of the district court

of the district wherein such court has been so established for a period not exceeding the unexpired term for which he was elected.

Jurisdiction of district courts. SEC. 5. The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds one hundred dollars, and in all criminal cases where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than one hundred dollars, and shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. The legislature may provide by law that the judge of one district may discharge the duties of judge of any other district not his own, when convenience or the public interest may require it.

Qualifications. SEC. 6. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be men learned in the law, and shall receive such compensation at stated times as may be prescribed by the legislature; which compensation shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward for their services.

Probate court—judges to be elected—jurisdiction. SEC. 7. There shall be established in each organized county in the State a probate court, which shall be a court of record, and be held at such time and place as may be prescribed by law. It shall be held by one judge, who shall be elected by the voters of the county for the term of four** years. He shall be a resident of such county at the time of his election, and reside therein during his continuance in office; and his compensation shall be provided by law. He may appoint his own clerk where none has been elected; but the legislature may authorize the election, by the electors of any county, of one clerk or register of probate for such county, whose powers, duties, term of office and compensation shall be prescribed by law. A probate court shall have jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, but no other jurisdiction, except as prescribed by this Constitution.

Justices of the peace to be elected—jurisdiction. SEC. 8. The legislature shall provide for the election of a sufficient number of justices of the peace in each county, whose term of office shall be two years, and whose duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law. Provided, That no justice of the peace shall have jurisdiction of any civil cause, where the amount in controversy shall exceed one hundred dollars, nor in a criminal cause where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment, or a fine over one hundred dollars, nor in any cause involving the title to real estate.

Judges for other courts to be elected. SEC. 9. All judges other than those provided for in this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of the judicial district, county, or city, for which they shall be created, not for a longer term than seven years.

Vacancies — appointment by governor. SEC. 10. In case the office of any judge become vacant before the expiration of the

regular term for which he was elected, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor, until a successor is elected and qualified. And such successor shall be elected at the first annual election that occurs more than thirty days after the vacancy shall have happened.

Prohibition, supreme or district judges to hold other offices or to be voted for office while in office. SEC. 11. The justices of the supreme court and the district courts shall hold no office under the United States, nor any other office under this State. And all votes for either of them for any elective office under this Constitution, except a judicial office given by the legislature or the people, during their continuance in office, shall be void.

Change of judicial districts. SEC. 12. The legislature may at any time change the number of judicial districts or their boundaries, when it shall be deemed expedient; but no such change shall vacate the office of any judge.

Clerk of court. SEC. 13. There shall be elected in each county where a district court shall be held, one clerk of said court, whose qualifications, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law, and whose term of office shall be four years.

Legal pleadings. SEC. 14. Legal pleadings and proceedings in the courts of this State shall be under the direction of the legislature. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Minnesota," and all indictments shall conclude, "against the peace and dignity of the State of Minnesota."

Court commissioner — powers and jurisdiction. SEC. 15. The legislature may provide for the election of one person in each organized county in this State, to be called a court commissioner, with judicial power and jurisdiction not exceeding the power and jurisdiction of a judge of the district court at chambers; or the legislature may, instead of such election, confer such power and jurisdiction upon the judges of probate in the State.

ARTICLE VII.

Elective Franchise

Elective franchise. SECTION 1. What persons are entitled to vote:

Residence required. Every person of the age of twenty-one (21) years or upwards belonging to either of the following classes who has resided in this State six (6) months next preceding any election shall be entitled to vote at such election in the election district of which he shall at the time have been for thirty (30) days a resident, for all officers that now are, or hereafter may be, elective by the people.

First—Citizens of the United States who have been such for the period of three (3) months next preceding any election.

Second—Persons of mixed white and Indian blood who have adopted the customs and habits of civilization.

Third—Persons of Indian blood residing in this State, who have adopted the language, customs and habits of civilization, after an examination before any district

court of the State, in such manner as may be provided by law, and shall have been pronounced by said court capable of enjoying the rights of citizenship within the State.

Non-eligible. SEC. 2. No person not belonging to one of the classes specified in the preceding section; no person who has been convicted of treason or any felony, unless restored to civil rights and no person under guardianship, or who may be non compos mentis or insane, shall be entitled or permitted to vote at any election in this State.

Residence not lost in certain cases. SEC. 3. For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have lost a residence by reason of his absence while employed in the service of the United States; nor while engaged upon the waters of this State or of the United States; nor while a student in any seminary of learning; nor while kept at any almshouse or asylum; nor while confined in any public prison.

Soldiers and sailors—restriction. SEC. 4. No soldier, seaman or marine in the army or navy of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State in consequence of being stationed within the same.

Civil process suspended on election day. SEC. 5. During the day on which any election shall be held, no person shall be arrested by virtue of any civil process.

Elections by ballots. SEC. 6. All elections shall be by ballot, except for such town officers as may be directed by law to be otherwise chosen.

Right to hold office. SEC. 7. Every person who by the provisions of this article shall be entitled to vote at any election shall be eligible to any office which now is, or hereafter shall be, elective by the people in the district wherein he shall have resided thirty days previous to such election, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, or the Constitution and law of the United States.**

Official year of the State. SEC. 9. The official year for the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Monday in January in each year, and all terms of office shall terminate at that time; and the general election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The first general election for State and county officers, except judicial officers, after the adoption of this amendment, shall be held in the year A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four (1884), and thereafter the general election shall be held biennially. All state, county or other officers elected at any general election, whose terms of office would otherwise expire on the first Monday of January, A. ARTICLE VIII.

School Funds, Education and Science

Uniform system of public schools. SECTION 1. The stability of a republican form of government depending mainly upon the intelligence of the people, it shall be the

duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools.*

Proceeds of school lands to be a perpetual fund. SEC. 2. The proceeds of such lands as are or hereafter may be granted by the United States for the use of schools within each township of this State shall remain a perpetual school fund to the State; and not more than one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) of said lands may be sold in two (2) years, one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) in five (5) years, and one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) in ten (10) years; but the lands of the greatest valuation shall be sold first, provided, that no portion of said lands shall be sold otherwise than at public sale. The principal of all funds arising from sales or other disposition of lands or other property, granted or entrusted to this State in each township for educational purposes, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished; and the income arising from the lease or sale of said school land shall be distributed to the different townships throughout the State, in proportion to the number of scholars in each township, between the ages of five and twenty-one years; and shall be faithfully applied to the specific objects of the original grants or appropriations.

*A revolving fund of not over two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) may be set apart from the fund derived from the sale of school and swamp lands, to be used in constructing roads, ditches and fire breaks in, through and around unsold school and swamp lands and in clearing such lands; such fund to be replenished as long as needed from the enhanced value realized from the sale of such lands so benefited.

Investment of funds. Suitable laws shall be enacted by the legislature for the safe investment of the principal of all funds which have heretofore arisen or which may hereafter arise from the sale or other disposition of such lands, or the income from such lands accruing in any way before the sale or disposition thereof, in interest-bearing bonds of the United States, or of the State of Minnesota, issued after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty (1860), or of such other state as the legislature may, by law, from time to time direct.

Swamp lands—division of proceeds. All swamp lands now held by the State, or that may hereafter accrue to the State, shall be appraised and sold in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same less one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$), as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands under the provisions of title one (1) of chapter thirty-eight (38) of the General Statutes. The principal of all funds derived from sales of swamp lands, as aforesaid, shall forever be preserved inviolate and undiminished. One-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the proceeds of said principal shall be appropriated to the common school fund of the State. The remaining one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) shall be appropriated to the educational and charitable institutions of the State in the relative ratio of cost to support said institutions.

Public schools in each township to be established. SEC. 3. The legislature shall make such provisions, by taxation or otherwise, as, with the income arising from the

school fund, will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools in each township in the State.

Prohibition as to aiding sectarian school. But in no case shall the moneys derived as aforesaid, or any portion thereof, or any public moneys or property, be appropriated or used for the support of schools wherein the distinctive doctrines, creeds or tenets of any particular Christian or other religious sect are promulgated or taught.

University of Minnesota — location confirmed. SEC. 4. The location of the University of Minnesota, as established by existing laws, is hereby confirmed, and said institution is hereby declared to be the University of the State of Minnesota. All the rights, immunities, franchises and endowments heretofore granted or conferred are hereby perpetuated unto the said university; and all lands which may be granted hereafter by Congress, or other donations for said university purposes, shall vest in the institution referred to in this section.

Permanent school funds may be loaned to districts or counties for school purposes. SEC. 5. The permanent school funds of the State may be loaned upon interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum to the several counties or school districts of the State, to be used in the erection of county or school buildings. No such loan shall be made until approved by a board consisting of the governor, the state auditor and the state treasurer, who are hereby constituted an investment board for the purpose of the loans hereby authorized; nor shall any such loan be for an amount exceeding three (3) per cent of the last preceding assessed valuation of the real estate of the county or school district receiving the same. The state auditor shall annually, at the time of certifying the state tax to the several county auditors, also certify to each auditor to whose county, or to any of the school districts of whose county, any such loan shall have been made, the tax necessary to be levied to meet the accruing interest or principal of any such loan, and it shall be the duty of every such county auditor forthwith to levy and extend such tax upon all the taxable property of his county, or of the several school districts, respectively, liable for such loans—as the case may be—and in all such cases the tax so assessed shall be fifty (50) per cent in excess of the amount actually necessary to be raised on account of such accruing principal or interest. It shall be levied, collected and paid into the county and state treasuries in the same manner as state taxes, and any excess collected over the amount of such principal or interest accruing in any given year shall be credited to the general funds of the respective counties or school districts. No change of the boundaries of any school district after the making of any such loan shall operate to withdraw any property from the taxation herein provided for; nor shall any law be passed extending the time of payment of any such principal or interest, or reducing the rate of such interest, or in any manner waiving or impairing any rights of the State in connection with any such loan. Suitable

laws, not inconsistent with this amendment, may be passed by the legislature for the purpose of carrying the same into effect.*

Investment of permanent school and university funds. **SEC. 6. The permanent school, permanent university and swamp land funds of this state may be loaned to or invested in the bonds of any county, school district, city, town, or village of this state and in first mortgage loans secured upon improved and cultivated farm lands of this state, but no such investment or loan shall be made until approved by the board of commissioners designated by law to regulate the investment of the permanent school fund and the permanent university fund of this state; nor shall such loan or investment be made when the bonds to be issued or purchased would make the entire bonded indebtedness exceed 15 per cent of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the county, school district, city, town, or village issuing such bonds; nor shall any such farm loan or investment be made when such investment or loan would exceed 30 per cent of the actual cash value of the farm land mortgaged to secure said investment; nor shall such investments or loans be made at a lower rate of interest than two per cent per annum, nor for a shorter period than one year nor for a longer period than 30 years and no change of the town, school district, city, village, or county lines shall relieve the real property in such town, school district, county, village or city in this state at the time of issuing such bonds from any liability for taxation to pay such bonds.

***SEC. 7. Such of the school and other public lands of the state as are better adapted for the production of timber than for agriculture, may be set apart as state school forests, or other state forests, as the legislature may provide, and the legislature may provide for the management of the same on forestry principles. The net revenue therefrom shall be used for the purposes for which the lands were granted to the State.

****SEC. 8. Any of the public lands of the state, including lands held in trust for any purpose, may, with the unanimous approval of a commission consisting of the governor, the attorney general and the state auditor, be exchanged for lands of the United States and/or privately owned lands in such manner as the legislature may provide, and the lands so acquired shall be subject to the trust, if any, to which the lands exchanged therefor were subject, and the state shall reserve all mineral and water power rights in lands so transferred by the state.

ARTICLE IX

Finances of the State and Banks and Banking

Power of taxation — legislature may authorize. *****SECTION 1. The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects, and shall be levied and collected for public purposes,

but public burying grounds, public school houses, public hospitals, academies, colleges, universities, and all seminaries of learning, all churches, church property and houses of worship, institutions of purely public charity, and public property used exclusively for any public purpose, shall be exempt from taxation, and there may be exempted from taxation personal property not exceeding in value \$200, for each household, individual or head of a family, and household goods and farm machinery, as the legislature may determine; Provided, that the legislature may authorize municipal corporations to levy and collect assessments for local improvements upon property benefited thereby without regard to a cash valuation, and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect, modify or repeal any existing law providing for the taxation of the gross earnings of railroads.

Occupation tax. *****SEC. 1A. Every person, co-partnership, company, joint stock company, corporation, or association however or for whatever purpose organized, engaged in the business of mining or producing iron ore or other ores in this State, shall pay to the State of Minnesota an occupation tax on the valuation of all ores mined or produced, which tax shall be in addition to all other taxes provided by law, said tax to be due and payable from such person, co-partnership, company, joint stock company, corporation, or association however or for whatever purpose organized, on May first of the calendar year next following the mining or producing thereof. The valuation of ore for the purpose of determining the amount of tax to be paid shall be ascertained in the manner and method provided by law. Funds derived from the tax herein provided for shall be apportioned: fifty per cent to the State General Revenue Fund, forty per cent to the Permanent School Fund and ten per cent to the Permanent University Fund. The Legislature shall by law make the necessary provisions for carrying out the provisions of this section.

N. B.—Sections 2, 3 and 4 obsolete, because in 1906 there was adopted the section which now is Section 1 in this article. It supplanted Sections 1, 2, 3 and 4 and the unnumbered section of 1896. This amendment is sometimes called the wide open tax amendment. No amendments have been adopted to take the place of the old Sections 2, 3 and 4. There is therefore a gap in the numbering from 1 to 5.

State debt limited — how contracted. *****SEC. 5. For the purpose of defraying extraordinary expenditures, the state may contract public debts, but such debts shall never, in the aggregate, exceed two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; every such debt shall be authorized by law, for some single object, to be distinctly specified therein; and no such law shall take effect until it shall have been passed by the vote of two-thirds of the members of each branch of the legislature, to be recorded by yeas and nays on the journals of each house respectively; and every such law shall levy a tax annually sufficient to pay the annual interest of such

debt, and also a tax sufficient to pay the principal of such debt within ten years from the final passage of such law, and shall specially appropriate the proceeds of such taxes to the payment of such principal and interest; and such appropriation and taxes shall not be repealed, postponed, or diminished, until the principal and interest of such debt shall have been wholly paid. The state shall never contract any debts for works of internal improvements, or be a party in carrying on such works, except as authorized by Section 16 of Article 9, and by Article 16 of this Constitution, but it may levy an excise tax upon any substance, material, fluid, force or other means or instrumentality, or the business of dealing in, selling or producing any or all thereof, used or useful, in producing or generating power for propelling motor or other vehicles used on the public highways of this State, and shall place one-half of the proceeds of such tax in the Trunk Highway Fund provided for in Section 2 of said Article 16, apportion for road and street purposes on the basis of population 6% thereof to cities of over 100,000 population, according to the latest available federal census, and 44% thereof to the State Road and Bridge Fund, and further, except in cases where grants of land or other property shall have been made to the State, especially dedicated by the grant to specific purposes, and in such cases the state shall devote thereto the avails of such grants, and may pledge or appropriate the revenues derived from such works in aid of their completion.

Issue of bonds for created debt. SEC. 6. All debts authorized by the preceding section shall be contracted by loan on State bonds of amounts not less than five hundred dollars each on interest, payable within ten years after the final passage of the law authorizing such debt; and such bonds shall not be sold by the State under par. A correct registry of all such bonds shall be kept by the treasurer, in numerical order, so as always to exhibit the number and amount unpaid and to whom severally made payable.

Limitation as to when debt may be contracted. SEC. 7. The State shall never contract any public debt, unless in time of war, to repel invasion or suppress insurrection, except in the cases and in the manner provided in the fifth and sixth sections of this article.

Disposition of funds received for bonds. SEC. 8. The money arising from any loan made, or debt or liability contracted, shall be applied to the object specified in the act authorizing such debt or liability, or to the repayment of such debt or liability, and to no other purpose whatever.

Money drawn from the State treasury. SEC. 9. No money shall ever be paid out of the treasury of this State except in pursuance of an appropriation by law.

Credit of the State limited. SEC. 10. The Credit of the State shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association or corporation, except as hereinafter provided. Nor shall there be any further issue

of bonds denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds," under what purports to be an amendment to Section ten (10) of Article nine (9) of the Constitution, adopted April 15th, 1858, which is hereby expunged from the Constitution, saving, excepting and reserving to the State, nevertheless, all rights, remedies and forfeitures accruing under said amendment. *Provided, however, that for the purpose of developing the agricultural resources of the state, the State may establish and maintain a system of rural credits and thereby loan money and extend credit to the people of the State upon real estate security in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as may be prescribed by law, and to issue and negotiate bonds to provide money to be so loaned. The limit of indebtedness contained in Section 5 of this Article shall not apply to the provisions of this Section, and the purposes for which the credit of the State or the aforesaid municipal subdivisions thereof may be given or loaned as herein provided are declared to be public purposes.

Publication of receipts and expenditures of treasurer. SEC. 11. There shall be published by the treasurer, in at least one newspaper printed at the seat of government, during the first week in January in each year, and in the next volume of the acts of legislature, detailed statements of all moneys drawn from the treasury during the preceding year, for what purpose and to whom paid, and by what law authorized; and also of all moneys received, and by what authority and from whom.

State school fund — investment — safe keeping. SEC. 12. Suitable laws shall be passed by the legislature for the safe keeping, transfer and disbursements of the State and school funds; and all officers and other persons charged with the same or any part of the same, or the safe keeping thereof, shall be required to give ample security for all moneys and funds of any kind received by them; to make forthwith and keep an accurate entry of each sum received, and of each payment and transfer; and if any of said officers or other persons shall convert to his own use in any manner or form, or shall loan, with or without interest, or shall deposit in his own name, or otherwise than in the name of the State of Minnesota; or shall deposit in banks or with any person or persons, or exchange for other funds or property, any portion of the funds of the State or the school funds aforesaid, except in the manner prescribed by law, every such act shall be and constitute an embezzlement of so much of the aforesaid State and school funds, or either of the same, and shall thus be taken, or loaned, or deposited or exchanged, and shall be a felony; and any failure to pay over, produce or account for the State school funds, or any part of the same entrusted to such officer or persons as by law required on demand, shall be held and be taken to be prima facie evidence of such embezzlement.

General banking law—provision and restrictions. SEC. 13. The legislature may, by a two-thirds vote, pass a general banking law, with the following restrictions and requirements, viz.:

First—The legislature shall have no power to pass any law sanctioning in any manner, directly, or indirectly, the suspension of specie payments by any person, association or corporation issuing bank notes of any description.

Second—The legislature shall provide by law for the registry of all bills or notes issued or put in circulation as money, and shall require ample security in United States stock or State stocks for the redemption of the same in specie; and in case of a depreciation of said stocks, or any part thereof, to the amount of ten per cent or more on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by additional stocks.

Third—The stockholders in any corporation and joint association for banking purposes, issuing bank notes, shall be individually liable in an amount equal to double the amount of stock owned by them for all the debts of such corporation or association; and such individual liability shall continue for one year after any transfer or sale of stock by any stockholder or stockholders.

Fourth—In case of the insolvency of any bank or banking association, the bill holders thereof shall be entitled to preference in payment over all other creditors of such bank or association.

Fifth—Any general banking law which may be passed in accordance with this Article shall provide for recording the names of all stockholders in such corporation, the amount of stock held by each, the time of transfer, and to whom transferred.

Special provision for a loan for hospital building for insane. SEC. 14. (a) For the purpose of erecting and completing buildings for a hospital for the insane, a deaf, dumb and blind asylum, the state prison, the legislature may by law increase the public debt of the State to an amount not exceeding \$250,000, in addition to the public debt already heretofore authorized by the Constitution; and for that purpose may provide by law for issuing and negotiating the bonds of the State, and appropriate the money only for the purpose aforesaid; which bonds shall be payable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the date of the same, at the option of the State.

County, city or township aid to railroads limited. SEC. 15. The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds, or to become indebted in any manner, to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed five (5) per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation. The amount of such taxable property to be ascertained, and determined by the last assessment of said property made, for the purpose of state and county taxation, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.**

State Road and Bridge Fund. SEC. 16. For the purpose of lending aid in the construction and improvement of public highways and bridges, there is hereby created a fund, to be known as the "State road and

bridge fund," said fund shall include all moneys accruing from the income derived from investments in the internal improvement land fund, or that may hereafter accrue to said fund, and shall also include all funds accruing to any State road and bridge fund however provided.

The legislature is authorized to add to such fund, for the purpose of constructing or improving roads and bridges of this State, by providing, in its discretion, for an annual tax levy upon the property of this State of not to exceed in any one year one mill on all the taxable property within the State. **Provided**, that no county shall receive in any year more than three (3) per cent, or less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of one (1) per cent of the total fund thus provided and expended during such year.***

ARTICLE X

Of Corporations Having no Banking Privileges

Corporation for general purposes. SECTION 1. The term "Corporation," as used in this Article, shall be construed to include all associations and joint stock companies having any of the powers and privileges not possessed by individuals or partnerships, except such as embrace banking privileges and all corporations shall have the right to sue, and shall be liable to be sued in all courts in like manner as natural persons.

Not to be created by special act. SEC. 2. No corporations shall be formed under special acts, except for municipal purposes.

Liability of Stockholders. SEC. 3. The legislature shall have power from time to time to provide for, limit and otherwise regulate the liability of stockholders or members of corporations and co-operative corporations or associations, however organized. **Provided** every stockholder in a banking or trust corporation or association shall be individually liable in an amount equal to the amount of stock owned by him for all debts of such corporation contracted prior to any transfer of such stock and such individual liability shall continue for one year after any transfer of such stock and the entry thereof on the books of the corporation or association.

Lands may be taken for public use. SEC. 4. Lands may be taken for public way, for the purpose of granting to any corporation the franchise of way for public use. In all cases, however, a fair and equitable compensation shall be paid for such land, and the damages arising from the taking of the same; but all corporations being common carriers enjoying the right of way in pursuance of the provisions of this section, shall be bound to carry the mineral, agricultural and other productions of manufacturers on equal and reasonable terms.

ARTICLE XI

Counties and Townships

County organization. SECTION 1. The legislature may from time to time establish and organize new counties; but no new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any county be reduced below that amount; and all laws

changing county lines in counties already organized, or for removing county seats, shall, before taking effect, be submitted to the electors of the county or counties to be affected thereby, at the next general election after the passage thereof, and be adopted by a majority of such electors. Counties now established may be enlarged, but not reduced below four hundred (400) square miles.

Cities of 20,000 population may be organized into separate counties. SEC. 2. The legislature may organize any city into a separate county, when it has attained a population of 20,000 inhabitants, without reference to geographical extent, when a majority of the electors of the county in which such city may be situated, voting thereon, shall be in favor of a separate organization.

Township organization. SEC. 3. Laws may be passed providing for the organization for municipal and other town purposes, of any congressional or fractional townships in the several counties in the State, provided that when a township is divided by county lines or does not contain one hundred inhabitants, it may be attached to one or more adjoining townships or parts of townships for the purposes aforesaid.

Election of county and town officers. SEC. 4. Provision shall be made by law for the election of such county or township officers as may be necessary.

Local taxation may be authorized. SEC. 5. Any county and township organization shall have such powers of local taxation as may be prescribed by law.

Money drawn from county or town treasuries. SEC. 6. No money shall be drawn from any county or township treasury except by authority of law.

County of Manomn abolished. SEC. 7. That the county of Manomn is hereby abolished, and that the territory heretofore comprising the same shall constitute and be a part of the county of Anoka.*

ARTICLE XII

Of the Militia

Militia organization. SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the legislature to pass such laws for the organization, discipline and service of the militia of the State as may be deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XIII

Impeachment and Removal From Office

SECTION 1. The governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, and the judges of the supreme and district courts, may be impeached for corrupt conduct in office, or for crimes and misdemeanors; but judgment in such case shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit in this State. The party convicted thereof shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 2. The legislature of this State may provide for the removal of inferior officers from office, for malfeasance or nonfeasance in the performance of their duties.

SEC. 3. No officer shall exercise the duties of his office after he shall have been impeached and before his acquittal.

SEC. 4. On the trial of an impeachment against the governor, the lieutenant governor shall not act as a member of the court.

SEC. 5. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he shall have been served with a copy thereof at least twenty days previous to the day set for trial.

ARTICLE XIV

Amendments to the Constitution

Amendments to constitution — majority vote of electors voting makes amendment valid. SECTION 1. Whenever a majority of both houses of the legislature shall deem it necessary to alter or amend this Constitution, they may propose such alterations or amendments, which proposed amendments shall be published with the laws which have been passed at the same session, and said amendments shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at any general election, and if it shall appear, in a manner to be provided by law, that a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for and ratified such alterations or amendments, the same shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of this Constitution. If two or more alterations or amendments shall be submitted at the same time, it shall be so regulated that the voters shall vote for or against each separately.

Revision of constitution. SEC. 2. Whenever two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the legislature shall think it necessary to call a convention to revise this Constitution, they shall recommend to the electors to vote at the next general election for members of the legislature, for or against a convention; and if a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for a convention, the legislature shall, at their next session, provide by law for calling the same. The convention shall consist of as many members as the House of Representatives, who shall be chosen in the same manner, and shall meet within three months after their election for the purpose aforesaid.

ARTICLE XV

Miscellaneous Subjects

Seat of government. SECTION 1. The seat of government of the State shall be at the city of St. Paul, but the legislature, at their first or any future session, may provide by law for a change of the seat of government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by Congress for a seat of government to the State; and in the event of the seat of government being removed from the city of St. Paul to any other place in the State, the capitol building and grounds shall be dedicated to an institution for the promotion of science, literature and the arts, to be organized by the legislature of the State, and of which institution the Minnesota Historical Society shall always be a department.

Residents on Indian lands. SEC. 2. Persons residing on Indian lands within the State shall enjoy all rights and privileges of citizens, as though they lived in any other

portion of the State, and shall be subject to taxation.

Uniform oath at elections. SEC. 3. The legislature shall provide for a uniform oath or affirmation to be administered at elections, and no person shall be compelled to take any other or different form of oath to entitle him to vote.

State seal. SEC. 4. There shall be a seal of the State, which shall be kept by the secretary of state, and be used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the State of Minnesota, and shall be attached to all the official acts of the governor (his signature to acts and resolves of the legislature excepted) requiring authentication. The legislature shall provide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal.

State prison location. SEC. 5. The territorial prison, as located under existing laws, shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, be and remain one of the state prisons of the State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE XVI*

Trunk Highway System

SECTION 1. There is hereby created and established a trunk highway system, which shall be located, constructed, reconstructed, improved and forever maintained as public highways, by the State of Minnesota. The said highways shall extend as nearly as may be along the following described routes, the more specific and definite location of which shall be fixed and determined by such boards, officers or tribunals, and in such manner as shall be prescribed by law, but in fixing such specific and definite routes there shall not be any deviation from the starting points or terminals set forth in this bill, nor shall there be any deviation in fixing such routes from the various villages and cities named herein, through which such routes are to pass.

Route No. 1—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Iowa, southeasterly at Albert Lea and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point in Albert Lea and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point and on the southerly limits of the city of St. Paul and then beginning at a point on the northerly limits of the city of St. Paul and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and then beginning at a point on the northerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on the boundary line between the State of Minnesota and the province of Ontario, affording Albert Lea, Owatonna, Faribault, Northfield, Farmington, St. Paul, White Bear, Forest Lake, Wyoming, Rush City, Pine City, Hinckley, Sandstone, Moose Lake, Carlton, Duluth, Two Harbors, Grand Marais and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 2—Beginning at a point on Route No. 1 on the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a southwesterly direction along said Route No. 1 to a point on said route at Carlton and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the east bank of the Red River of the North at Moorhead, affording Duluth, Carlton, McGregor, Altin, Brainerd, Motley, Staples, Wadena, Detroit, Moorhead,

and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 3—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Wisconsin, westerly of La Crosse, Wisconsin, and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the easterly limits of the city of St. Paul and then beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the east bank of the Red River of the North at Breckenridge, affording La Crescent, Winona, Kellogg, Wabasha, Lake City, Red Wing, Hastings, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Osseo, Champlin, Anoka, Elk River, Big Lake, St. Cloud, Albany, Sauk Center, Alexandria, Elbow Lake, Fergus Falls, Breckenridge and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 4—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Iowa, southwesterly of Jackson and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 3, southeasterly of Sauk Center and thence extending in a northwesterly direction along said Route No. 3 to a point on said route at Sauk Center and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point at International Falls, affording Jackson, Windom, Sanborn, Redwood Falls, Morton, Olivia, Willmar, Paynesville, Sauk Center, Long Prairie, Wadena, Park Rapids, Itasca State Park, Bemidji, International Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 5—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Iowa, southerly of Blue Earth, and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on the southerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and then beginning at a point on the northerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point in Swan River on Route No. 8, hereinafter described, affording Blue Earth, Winnebago, Mankato, St. Peter, Le Sueur, Jordan, Shakopee, Minneapolis, Cambridge, Mora, McGregor, Swan River and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 6—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Iowa, southerly of Ash Creek, and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on the boundary line between the State of Minnesota and the province of Manitoba, near St. Vincent, affording Laverne, Pipestone, Lake Benton, Ivanhoe, Canby, Madison, Bellingham, Odessa, Ortonville, Graceville, Dumont, Wheaton, Breckenridge, Moorhead, Kragens, Georgetown, Perley, Hendrum, Ada, Crookston, Warren, Donaldson, Hallock and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 7—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Winona and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the boundary line between the States of

Minnesota and South Dakota, westerly of Lake Benton, affording Winona, St. Charles, Rochester, Kasson, Dodge Center, Claremont, Owatonna, Waseca, Mankato, St. Peter, New Ulm, Springfield, Tracy, Lake Benton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 8—Beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 near Crookston and thence extending in a westerly and northerly direction along said Route No. 6 to a point on said route northerly of Crookston and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the east bank of the Red River of the North at East Grand Forks, affording Duluth, Floodwood, Swan River, Grand Rapids, Cass Lake, Bemidji, Bagley, Erskine, Crookston, East Grand Forks and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 9—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at La Crescent and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and South Dakota southwesterly of Beaver Creek, affording La Crescent, Hokah, Houston, Rushford, Lanesboro, Preston, Fountain, Spring Valley, Austin, Albert Lea, Blue Earth, Fairmont, Jackson, Worthington, Luverne and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 10—Beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at or near Wheaton, affording Minneapolis, Montrose, Cokato, Litchfield, Willmar, Benson, Morris, Herman, Wheaton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 11—Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 at the westerly limits of the city of Duluth and thence extending in a northwesterly and northerly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at International Falls and thence extending in a southwesterly direction along said Route No. 4 to a point on said route southwesterly of International Falls and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Donaldson, affording Duluth, Eveleth, Virginia, Cook, Orr, Cussons, International Falls, Baudette, Warroad, Roseau, Greenbush, Donaldson and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 12—Beginning at a point on the west bank of the St. Croix River near Hudson, Wisconsin, and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on the easterly limits of the city of St. Paul and then beginning at a point on the westerly limits of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Madison, affording St. Paul, Minneapolis, Hopkins, Norwood, Glencoe, Olivia, Granite Falls, Montevideo, Dawson, Madison and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 13—Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 at Albert Lea and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 5 at Jordan, affording Albert Lea, Waseca, Waterville, Montgomery, New Prague, Jordan and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 14—Beginning at a point on Route No. 6 at Ivanhoe and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at Redwood Falls and thence extending in an easterly direction along said Route No. 4 to a point on said route at Morton and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 22, hereinafter described, at Gaylord affording Ivanhoe, Marshall, Redwood Falls, Morton, Winthrop, Gaylord and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 15—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Iowa southerly of Fairmont and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 14 at Winthrop, affording Fairmont, Madelia, New Ulm, Winthrop and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 16—Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 southwesterly of Mankato and thence extending westerly to a point on Route No. 15 at Madelia and thence extending in a southerly direction along said Route No. 15 to a point on said route southerly of Madelia and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 4 northerly of Windom and thence extending in a southerly direction along said Route No. 4 to a point on said route at Windom and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point at Fulda and thence extending in a southerly direction to a point on Route No. 9 at Worthington, affording Mankato, Madelia, St. James, Windom, Fulda, Worthington and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other, and other places within the State.

Route No. 17—Beginning at a point on Route No. 16 at Fulda and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 12 at Granite Falls, affording Fulda, Slayton, Garvin, Marshall, Granite Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 18—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Elk River and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 2 easterly of Brainerd, affording Elk River, Princeton, Milaca, Onamia and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 19—Beginning at a point on Route No. 2 at Brainerd and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 8 at Cass Lake, affording Brainerd, Pine River, Walker, Cass Lake and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 20—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and Iowa near Canton and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 9 at or near Preston and thence extending in a northwesterly direction along said Route No. 9 to a point on said route at Fountain and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 in the town of Douglas, Dakota county (T. 113, R. 17 W.) affording Canton, Harmony, Preston, Fountain, Chatfield, Oronoco, Pine Island, Zumbrota, Cannon Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 21—Beginning at a point on Route No. 20 at Zumbrota and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 5, at St. Peter, affording Zumbrota, Kenyon, Faribault, Le Sueur Center, Cleveland, St. Peter and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 22—Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 at St. Peter and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at Paynesville, affording St. Peter, Gaylord, Glencoe, Hutchinson, Litchfield, Paynesville and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 23—Beginning at a point on Route No. 4 at Paynesville and thence extending in a northeasterly direction through the village of Richmond, Coldspring, Rockville and Waite Park to a point on Route No. 3 westerly of St. Cloud, and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 5 southerly of Mora, and thence extending in a northerly direction along said Route No. 5 to a point on said route at Mora, and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 1 southerly of Hinckley, affording Paynesville, St. Cloud, Foley, Milaca, Ogilvie, Mora and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 24—Beginning at a point on Route No. 10 at Litchfield and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at St. Cloud, affording Litchfield, St. Cloud and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 25—Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 at or near Belle Plaine and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point at Route No. 3 at Big Lake, affording Belle Plaine, Norwood, Watertown, Montrose, Buffalo, Monticello, Big Lake and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 26—Beginning at a point on Route No. 10 at Benson and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 near Ortonville, affording Benson, Ortonville and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 27—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at St. Cloud and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 2 at Brainerd, affording St. Cloud, Sauk Rapids, Royalton, Little Falls, Brainerd and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 28—Beginning at a point on Route No. 27 at Little Falls and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on the boundary line between the States of Minnesota and South Dakota at Browns Valley, affording Little Falls, Sauk Center, Glenwood, Starbuck, Morris, Graceville, Browns Valley and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 29—Beginning at a point on Route No. 28 at Glenwood and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 2 westerly of Wadena, affording Glenwood, Alexandria, Parkers Prairie, Deer Creek and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 30—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Fergus Falls, and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 8 at Erskine, affording Fergus Falls, Pelican Rapids, Detroit, Mahanomen, Erskine and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 31—Beginning at a point on Route No. 6 at Ada, and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 30 near Mahanomen, affording Ada, Mahanomen and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 32—Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 easterly of Crookston and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 11 at Greenbush, affording Red Lake Falls, Thief River Falls, Middle River, Greenbush and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 33—Beginning at a point on Route No. 32 at Thief River Falls and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Warren, affording Thief River Falls, Warren and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 34—Beginning at a point on Route No. 2 at Detroit and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 8, westerly of Grand Rapids, affording Detroit, Park Rapids, Walker, Remer, Grand Rapids and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 35—Beginning at a point on Route No. 18 near Mille Lacs Lake and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point at Grand Rapids and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point at Ely, affording Aitkin, Grand Rapids,

Hibbing, Chisholm, Buhl, Mountain Iron, Virginia, Gilbert, McKinley, Biwabik, Aurora, Tower and Ely and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 36—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Fergus Falls and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 29 easterly of Henning, affording Fergus Falls, Henning and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 37—Beginning at a point on Route No. 27 at Little Falls and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 2 at Motley, affording Little Falls, Motley and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 38—Beginning at a point on Route No. 12 at Montevideo and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 28 at Starbuck, affording Montevideo, Benson, Starbuck and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 39—Beginning at a point on Route No. 7 at Mankato and thence extending in a southeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 9 westerly of Albert Lea, affording Mankato, Mapleton, Minnesota Lake, Wells and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 40—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa at Lyle and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 7 at Owatonna, affording Lyle, Austin, Blooming Prairie, Owatonna and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 41—Beginning at a point on Route No. 40 at or near Blooming Prairie and thence extending in an easterly direction to a point on Route No. 56, hereinafter described, near Hayfield, affording Blooming Prairie, Hayfield and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 42—Beginning at a point on Route No. 7 easterly of Rochester and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Kellogg, affording Rochester, Elgin, Plainview, Kellogg and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 43—Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 at Rushford and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Winona, affording Rushford, Winona and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 44—Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 at Hokah and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 20 near Canton, affording Hokah,

Caledonia, Canton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 45—Beginning at a point on the west bank of the St. Croix River at Stillwater and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on the easterly limits of the city of St. Paul, affording Stillwater, Lake Elmo, St. Paul and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 46—Beginning at a point on the west bank of the St. Croix River at Taylors Falls and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 1 near Wyoming, affording Taylors Falls, Center City, Wyoming and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 47—Beginning at a point on Route No. 17 at Slayton and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Pipestone, affording Slayton, Pipestone and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 48—Beginning at a point on Route No. 17 westerly of Granite Falls and thence extending in a westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 at Canby, affording Granite Falls, Clarkfield, Canby and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 49—Beginning at a point on Route No. 12 easterly of Montevideo and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 4 southerly of Willmar, affording Montevideo, Clara City, Willmar and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 50—Beginning at a point on Route No. 20 at Cannon Falls and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the southerly limits of the city of Minneapolis, affording Cannon Falls, Farmington, Minneapolis and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 51—Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 at Shakopee and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 12 northerly of Shakopee, affording a connection between said Route No. 5 and said Route No. 12.

Route No. 52—Beginning at a point on Route No. 5 south of the city of Minneapolis and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on the westerly limits of the United States Military reservation at Fort Snelling, affording St. Paul and adjacent communities a reasonable communication with said Route No. 5.

Route No. 53—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Hastings and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the southerly limits of the city of South St. Paul, affording Hastings, South St. Paul and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 54—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Elbow Lake and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 10 at Herman, affording Elbow Lake, Herman and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 55—Beginning at a point on Route No. 2 northwesterly of Carlton and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point in Cloquet, affording Carlton, Cloquet and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 56—Beginning at a point on Route No. 9 easterly of Austin and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 21 at or near Kenyon, affording Brownsdale, Hayfield, Dodge Center, West Concord, Kenyon and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 57—Beginning at a point in Mantorville and extending in a southerly direction to a point on Route No. 7 southerly of Mantorville, affording Mantorville a reasonable means of communication with said Route No. 7.

Route No. 58—Beginning at a point on Route No. 20 at Zumbrota and thence extending in a northeasterly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Red Wing, affording Zumbrota, Red Wing and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other points within the State.

Route No. 59—Beginning at a point on the boundary line between the states of Minnesota and Iowa southerly of Spring Valley and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 3 at Lake City, affording Spring Valley, Stewartville, Rochester, Zumbro Falls, Lake City and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 60—Beginning at a point on Route No. 1 at Faribault and thence extending in a southwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 7 at or near Madison Lake, affording Faribault, Morristown, Waterville, Madison Lake and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 61—Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 at Deer River and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 4 at or near Big Falls, affording Deer River, Big Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 62—Beginning at a point on Route No. 3 at Anoka and thence extending in a southeasterly direction to a point on the northerly limits of the city of St. Paul, affording Anoka, St. Paul and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 63—Beginning at a point on Route No. 1 southerly of Forest Lake and thence extending in a southwesterly direc-

tion to a point on the northerly and easterly limits of the city of Minneapolis, affording a reasonable means of communication between Route No. 1 and Minneapolis.

Route No. 64—Beginning at a point on Route No. 30 northerly of Fergus Falls and thence extending in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on Route No. 6 southerly of Moorhead, affording Fergus Falls, Rothsay, Barnesville, Moorhead and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 65—Beginning at a point on Route No. 8 at Bagley and thence extending in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on Route No. 32 southerly of Red Lake Falls, affording Bagley, Clearbrook, Gonvick, Gully, Brooks, Terrebonne and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 66—Beginning at a point on Route No. 12 at Montevideo and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 26 northerly of Appleton, affording Montevideo, Appleton and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 67—Beginning at a point on Route No. 14 southerly of Echo and thence extending in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on Route No. 17 at or near Granite Falls, affording Echo, Granite Falls and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 68—Beginning at a point on Route No. 14 at Marshall and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 6 near Canby, affording Marshall, Minneota, Canby and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 69—Beginning at a point on Route No. 25 at Buffalo and thence extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on Route No. 22 southeasterly of Paynesville, affording Buffalo, Maple Lake, Annandale, Eden Valley, Paynesville and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Route No. 70—Beginning at a point on Route No. 7 westerly of New Ulm and thence extending in a northerly direction to a point on Route No. 12 at or near the village of Hector, affording Fort Ridgely, Fairfax, Hector and intervening and adjacent communities a reasonable means of communication, each with the other and other places within the State.

Additional Routes—Whenever, either by reason of the creation of a new county, or by reason of the change of the county seat of any existing county, any city or village not a county seat at the time of the adoption of this amendment is lawfully constituted the county seat of any county, the legislature is authorized to add to the trunk highway system such additional routes connecting such newly constituted county seats with other county seats and other points in the State.

When after at least seventy-five (75) per

cent of the total number of the miles of the routes embraced in the trunk highway system hereinbefore specified shall have been constructed and permanently improved, the legislature shall have authority to add new routes to such trunk highway system; provided, however, that no such new routes shall be added until and unless the funds available for the construction, improvement and maintenance of such additional routes shall be sufficient therefor in addition to the construction, improvement and maintenance of the several routes hereinbefore specifically described.

SEC. 2. There is hereby created a fund which shall be known as the trunk highway sinking fund. Said fund shall consist of the proceeds of any tax imposed on motor vehicles as herein authorized. The moneys in said fund shall be used for the payment of the principal and interest of any bonds which may be issued under the authority of this article; and any moneys in excess of such requirements shall be transferred to a fund which is hereby created and which shall be known as the trunk highway fund. The trunk highway fund shall be used solely for the purposes specified in section 1 of this article, and when duly authorized by legislative enactment to reimburse any county for the money expended by it subsequent to February 1st, 1919, in permanently improving any road hereinbefore specifically described, in accordance with plans and specifications therefor approved by the commissioner of highways.

*SEC. 3. The legislature is hereby authorized to provide, by law, for the taxation of motor vehicles, using the public streets and highways of this state, on a more onerous basis than other personal property; provided, however, that any such tax on motor vehicles shall be in lieu of all other taxes thereon, except wheelage taxes, so-called which may be imposed by any borough, city or village, and except that the legislature may impose such tax upon motor vehicles of companies paying taxes under gross earnings system of taxation and upon the right to use such vehicles upon the public highways notwithstanding the fact that earnings from such vehicles may be included in the earnings of such companies upon which such gross earnings taxes are computed. Any such law may, in the discretion of the legislature, provide for the exemption from taxation of any motor vehicle owned by a non-resident of the state, and transiently or temporarily using the streets and highways of the state. The proceeds of such tax shall be paid in to said trunk highway sinking fund.

SEC. 4. The legislature may provide by law for the issue and sale of the bonds of the state in such amount as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of section 1 of this article, provided, however, that the amount of bonds which may be issued in any one calendar year shall not exceed, in the aggregate, ten million dollars, par value, and provided, further, the total amount of such bonds issued and unpaid shall not at any time exceed seventy-five million dollars, par value. The proceeds of the sale of such bonds shall be paid into the treasury of the state and credited to the trunk highway fund. Any bonds so issued and sold shall be for a term not exceeding twenty (20) years. They shall not be sold for less than par and

accrued interest and shall not bear interest at a greater rate than five per cent per annum. In case the trunk highway sinking fund shall not be adequate to meet the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds authorized by the legislature as hereinbefore provided, the legislature may provide by law for the taxation of all taxable property of the state in an amount sufficient to meet the deficiency, or it may, in its discretion, appropriate to such sinking fund moneys in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 5. Any and all provisions of the constitution of the state of Minnesota are hereby repealed, inconsistent with the provisions of this article, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the legislature to enact laws authorizing or permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

ARTICLE XVII*

Forest Fire Prevention

SECTION 1. The state and (or) any of its political subdivisions, if and whenever authorized by the legislature, may contract debts and pledge the public credit for and engage in any work reasonably tending to prevent or abate forest fires, including the compulsory clearing and improvement of wild lands (whether belonging to the public or privately owned) and the assessment against such lands of the value of all benefits so conferred and the payment of damages so sustained in excess of such benefits.

SEC. 2. Any and all provisions of the constitution of the state of Minnesota inconsistent with the provisions of this article, are hereby repealed, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the legislature to enact laws authorizing or permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

ARTICLE XVIII*

Promoting Forestation and Reforestation

SECTION 1. Laws may be enacted for the purpose of encouraging and promoting forestation and reforestation of lands in this state, whether owned by private persons or the public, including the fixing in advance of a definite and limited annual tax on such lands for a term of years and a yield tax at or after the end of such term upon the timber and other forest products so grown, but the taxation of mineral deposits shall not be affected by this amendment.

SEC. 2. Any and all provisions of the constitution of the state of Minnesota, inconsistent with the provisions of this article, are hereby repealed, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the legislature to enact laws authorizing or permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

ARTICLE XIX***

Air Navigation Facilities and Taxation

SECTION 1. The state may construct, improve, maintain, and operate and may assist counties, cities, towns, villages, boroughs and public corporations in constructing, improving, maintaining, and operating airports and other air navigation facilities.

SEC. 2. For the purpose of carrying on or assisting in carrying on such work it may expend monies, including such monies as the legislature may see fit to appropriate, may incur debts, and may issue and negotiate

bonds to provide money therefor. The provisions of Section 5 of Article 9 of the Constitution shall not apply to the provisions of this section, and the purposes for which the credit of the state may be given or loaned as herein provided are declared to be public purposes.

SEC. 3. The state may levy a state excise tax upon any fluid or other means or instrumentalities, or the business of dealing in, selling, or producing any or all thereof, used in producing or generating power for propelling aircraft of any kind now known or hereafter invented, or for propelling or operating motor or other vehicles, or other equipment used for airport purposes and not used on the public highways of this state.

SEC. 4. The legislature is hereby authorized to provide, by law, for the taxation of aircraft using the air space overlying the State of Minnesota and the airports thereof, including any contrivance, now known or hereafter invented, used or designed for navigation of or flight in the air, on a more onerous basis than other personal property; provided, however, that any such tax on aircraft shall be in lieu of all other taxation thereon, and except that the legislature may impose such tax upon aircraft of companies paying taxes under any gross earnings system of taxation, and upon the right to use such aircraft in the air space overlying the State of Minnesota and upon the airports thereof, notwithstanding the fact that earnings from such aircraft may be included in the earnings of such companies upon which such gross earnings taxes are computed. Any such law may, in the discretion of the legislature, provide for the exemption from taxation of any aircraft owned by a non-resident of the state and transiently or temporarily using the air space overlying the State of Minnesota or the airports thereof.

SEC. 5. Any and all provisions of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota inconsistent with the provisions of this article are hereby repealed, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the legislature to enact laws authorizing or permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

ARTICLE XX*

Bonus for World War II Service

SEC. 1. The State may at any time pay an adjusted compensation to persons who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States during the period from and including September 16, 1940, through December 30, 1946; may levy taxes and appropriate monies for such purpose; and if and whenever authorized, and in such amounts and on such terms as may be fixed by the Legislature, may expend monies, may contract debts, may issue and negotiate bonds or certificates of indebtedness, or both, and may pledge the public credit, to provide money therefor. The provisions of section 5 of Article 9 of the Constitution shall not apply to the provisions of this section, and the purposes for which the credit of the State may be given or loaned as herein provided are declared to be public purposes.

SEC. 2. Any and all provisions of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota inconsistent with the provisions of this article are hereby repealed, so far, but only so far, as the same prohibit or limit the power of the Legislature to enact laws authorizing or

permitting the doing of the things hereinbefore authorized.

SCHEDULE

Territorial laws valid in change to State organization. SECTION 1. That no inconvenience may arise by reason of a change from a territorial to a permanent state government, it is declared that all rights, actions, prosecutions, judgments, claims and contracts, as well of individuals as of bodies corporate, shall continue as if no change had taken place; and all process which may be issued under the authority of the Territory of Minnesota previous to its admission into the Union of the United States shall be as valid as if issued in the name of the State.

Territorial laws not repugnant to constitution to be in force. SEC. 2. All laws now in force in the Territory of Minnesota not repugnant to this Constitution shall remain in force until they expire by their own limitation, or be altered or repealed by the legislature.

SEC. 3. All fines, penalties or forfeitures accruing to the Territory of Minnesota shall inure to the State.

Civil rights under territorial government secured in the change to State government.

SEC. 4. All recognizances heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from a territorial to a permanent state government, shall remain valid, and shall pass to and may be prosecuted in the name of the State; and all bonds executed to the governor of the Territory, or to any other officer or court in his or their official capacity, shall pass to the governor or state authority and their successors in office, for the uses therein respectively expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly and all the estate of property, real, personal or mixed, and all judgments, bonds, specialties, choses in action, and claims and debts of whatsoever description, of the Territory of Minnesota, shall inure to and vest in the State of Minnesota, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner and to the same extent by the State of Minnesota as the same could have been by the Territory of Minnesota. All criminal prosecutions and penal actions which may have arisen, or which may arise before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment and execution in the name of the State. All offenses committed against the laws of the Territory of Minnesota, before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall not be prosecuted before such change, may be prosecuted in the name and by the authority of the State of Minnesota with like effect as though such change had not taken place, and all penalties incurred shall remain the same as if this Constitution had not been adopted. All actions at law and suits in equity which may be pending in any of the courts of the Territory of Minnesota, at the time of a change from a territorial to a state government, may be continued and transferred to any court of the State which shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter thereof.

Territorial officers continued until superseded. SEC. 5. All territorial officers, civil or military, now holding their offices under the authority of the United States, or of the Territory of Minnesota shall continue to hold and exercise their respective offices until they shall be superseded by the authority of the State.

First session of State legislature. SEC. 6. The first session of the legislature of the State of Minnesota shall commence on the first Wednesday of December next, and shall be held at the capitol, in the city of St. Paul.

SEC. 7. The laws regulating the election and qualification of all district, county and precinct officers shall continue and be in force until the legislature shall otherwise provide by law.

Constitution submitted to a vote of the people. SEC. 8. The president of this convention shall, immediately after the adjournment thereof, cause this Constitution to be deposited in the office of the governor of the Territory; and if, after the submission of the same to a vote of the people, as hereinafter provided, it shall appear that it has been adopted by a vote of the people of the State, then the governor shall forward a certified copy of the same, together with an abstract of the votes polled for and against the said Constitution, to the president of the United States, to be by him laid before the Congress of the United States.

Representation to congress. SEC. 9. For the purposes of the first election, the State shall constitute one district, and shall elect three members to the House of Representatives of the United States.

First apportionment into legislative districts. SEC. 10. For the purpose of the first election for members of the State Senate and House of Representatives, the State shall be divided into senatorial and representative districts, as follows, viz.: First district, Washington county; Second district, Ramsey county; Third district, Dakota county; Fourth district, so much of Hennepin county as lies west of the Mississippi; Fifth district, Rice county; Sixth district, Goodhue county; Seventh district, Scott county; Eighth district, Olmsted county; Ninth district, Fillmore county; Tenth district, Houston county; Eleventh district, Winona county; Twelfth district, Wabasha county; Thirteenth district, Mower and Dodge counties; Fourteenth district, Freeborn and Faribault counties; Fifteenth district, Steele and Waseca counties; Sixteenth district, Blue Earth and Le Sueur counties; Seventeenth district, Nicollet and Brown counties; Eighteenth district, Sibley, Renville and McLeod counties; Nineteenth district, Carver and Wright counties; Twentieth district, Benton, Stearns and Meeker counties; Twenty-first district, Morrison, Crow Wing and Mille Lacs counties; Twenty-second district, Cass, Pembina and Todd counties; Twenty-third district, so much of Hennepin county as lies east of the Mississippi; Twenty-fourth district, Sherburne, Anoka and Manomin counties; Twenty-fifth district, Chisago, Pine and Isanti counties; Twenty-sixth district, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis, Lake and Itasca counties.

SEC. 11. The counties of Brown, Stearns, Todd, Cass, Pembina and Renville, as applied in the preceding section, shall not be deemed to include any territory west of the State line, but shall be deemed to include all counties and parts of counties east of said line as were created out of the territory of either, at the last session of the legislature.

Apportionment of members. SEC. 12. The senators and representatives at the first election shall be apportioned among the several senatorial and representative districts as follows, to-wit:

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SEC. 13. The returns from the Twenty-second district shall be made to and canvassed by the judges of election at the precinct of Otter Tail city.

Judicial districts. SEC. 14. Until the legislature shall otherwise provide, the State shall be divided into judicial districts as follows, viz.:

The counties of Washington, Chisago, Manomin, Anoka, Isanti, Pine, Buchanan, Carlton, St. Louis and Lake shall constitute the First judicial district.

The county of Ramsey shall constitute the Second judicial district.

The counties of Houston, Winona, Fillmore, Olmsted and Wabasha shall constitute the Third judicial district.

The counties of Hennepin, Carver, Wright, Meeker, Sherburne, Benton, Stearns, Morrison, Crow Wing, Mille Lacs, Itasca, Pembina, Todd and Cass shall constitute the Fourth judicial district.

The counties of Dakota, Goodhue, Scott, Rice, Steele, Waseca, Dodge, Mower and Freeborn shall constitute the Fifth judicial district.

The counties of Le Sueur, Sibley, Nicollet, Blue Earth, Faribault, McLeod, Renville, Brown and all other counties in the State not included within the other districts, shall constitute the Sixth judicial district.

SEC. 15. Each of the foregoing enumerated judicial districts may, at the first election, elect one prosecuting attorney for the district.

First State election. SEC. 16. Upon the second Tuesday, the thirteenth day of October, 1857, an election shall be held for members of the House of Representatives of the United States, governor, lieutenant governor, supreme and district judges, members of the legislature, and all other officers designated in this Constitution, and also for submission of this Constitution to the people, for their adoption or rejection.

Voters at the first election. SEC. 17. Upon the day so designated as aforesaid every free white male inhabitant over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within the limits of the State for ten days previous to the day of said election, may vote for all officers to be elected under this

Constitution at such election, and also for or against the adoption of this Constitution.

Vote on the constitution. SEC. 18. In voting for or against the adoption of this Constitution, the words "For Constitution," or "Against Constitution," may be written or printed on the ticket of each voter, but no voter shall vote for or against the Constitution, on a separate ballot from that cast by him for officers to be elected at said election under this Constitution; and if upon the canvass of the vote so polled it shall appear that there was a greater number of votes polled for than against said Constitution, then this Constitution shall be deemed to be adopted as the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, and all the provisions and obligations of this Constitution, and of the schedule thereunto attached, shall thereafter be valid to all intents and purposes as the Constitution of said State.

Election—how conducted. SEC. 19. At said election the polls shall be opened, the election held, returns made, and certificates issued, in all respects as provided by law for opening, closing and conducting elections and making returns of the same, except as hereinbefore specified, and excepting also that polls may be opened and elections held at any point or points in any of the counties where precincts may be established as provided by law, ten days previous to the day of election, not less than ten miles from the place of voting in any established precinct.

Returns of election. SEC. 20. It shall be the duty of the judges and clerks of election, in addition to the returns required by law

for each precinct, to forward to the secretary of the Territory, by mail, immediately after the close of the election, a certified copy of the poll book containing the name of each person who has voted in the precinct and the number of votes polled for and against the adoption of this Constitution.

Canvassing returns. SEC. 21. The returns of said election for and against this Constitution, and for all state officers and members of the House of Representatives of the United States, shall be made, and certificates issued in the manner now prescribed by law for returning votes given for delegates to Congress; and the returns for all district officers, judicial, legislative or otherwise, shall be made to the register of deeds of the senior county in each district, in the manner prescribed by law, except as otherwise provided. The returns for all officers elected at large shall be canvassed by the governor of the Territory, assisted by Joseph R. Brown and Thomas J. Galbraith, at the time designated by law for canvassing the vote for delegates to Congress.

SEC. 22. If, upon canvassing the votes for and against the adoption of this Constitution, it shall appear that there has been polled a greater number of votes against than for it, then no certificate of election shall be issued for any State or district officer provided for in this Constitution, and no state organization shall have validity within the limits of the Territory, until otherwise provided for and until a Constitution for a State government shall have been adopted by the people.

ACT OF ADMISSION INTO THE UNION

An Act for the admission of Minnesota into the Union
[Passed, May 11, 1858]

WHEREAS, An act of Congress was passed February twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states"; and, whereas, the people of said Territory did, on the twenty-ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by delegates elected for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and state government, which is republican in form, and was ratified and adopted by the people at an election held on the thirteenth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, for that purpose; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the State of Minnesota shall be one, and is hereby declared to be one, of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states in all respects whatever.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That said State shall be entitled to two representatives in Congress, until the next apportionment of representatives among the several states.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That from and after the admission of the State

of Minnesota, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within that State as in other States of the Union; and the said State is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Iowa, shall be established; the judge, attorney and marshal of the United States of the said district of Minnesota shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney and marshal of the district of Iowa; and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the supreme court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be directed by the supreme court of the United States to the district court of the United States for the district of Minnesota, or to the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require; and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same, and to ward meane or final process therein.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

In Congress, July 4, 1776

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies

at places unusual, uncomfortable and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time after such dissolutions to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large, for their exercise, the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering, fun-

damentally, the forms of our government:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has incited domestic insurrections among us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind—enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and

by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which INDEPENDENT STATES may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of DIVINE PROVIDENCE, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

THE ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION

In Congress, July 9, 1778

Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union between the States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

ARTICLE 1. The style of this confederacy shall be "THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA."

ART. 2. Each state retains its sovereignty, freedom, and independence, and every power, jurisdiction, and right, which is not by this confederation expressly delegated to the United States in Congress assembled.

ART. 3. The said states hereby severally enter into a firm league of friendship with each other for their common defense, the security of their liberties, and their mutual, and general welfare, binding themselves to assist each other against all force offered to or attacks made upon them, or any of them, on account of religion, sovereignty, trade, or any other pretence whatever.

ART. 4. § 1. The better to secure and perpetuate mutual friendship and intercourse among the people of the different states in this Union, the free inhabitants of each of these states (paupers, vagabonds, and fugitives from justice excepted) shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of free citizens in the several states, and the people of each state shall have free ingress and egress to and from any other state, and shall enjoy therein all the privileges of trade and commerce, subject to the same duties, impositions and restrictions as the inhabitants thereof respectively; provided, that such restrictions shall not extend so far as to prevent the removal of property imported into any state, to any other state of which the owner is an inhabitant; provided, also, that no imposition, duties, or restriction shall be laid by any state on the property of the United States, or either of them.

§ 2. If any person guilty of, or charged with, treason, felony, or other high misdemeanor, in any state, shall flee from justice, and be found in any of the United States, he shall, upon the demand of the governor or executive power of the state from which he fled, be delivered up and removed to the state having jurisdiction of his offense.

§ 3. Full faith and credit shall be given in each of these states to the records, acts and judicial proceedings of the courts and magistrates of every other state.

ART. 5. § 1. For the more convenient management of the general interests of the United States, delegates shall be annually appointed in such manner as the legislature of each state shall direct, to meet in congress on the first Monday in November, of every year, with a power reserved to each state to recall its delegates, or any of them, at any time within the year, and to

send others in their stead, for the remainder of the year.

§ 2. No state shall be represented in congress by less than two, nor more than seven, members; and no person shall be capable of being a delegate for more than three years, in any term of six years; nor shall any person, being a delegate, be capable of holding any office under the United States, for which he, or any other for his benefit, receives any salary, fees, or emoluments of any kind.

§ 3. Each state shall maintain its own delegates in a meeting of the states and while they act as members of the committee of these states.

§ 4. In determining questions in the United States in congress assembled each state shall have one vote.

§ 5. Freedom of speech and debate in congress shall not be impeached or questioned in any court or place out of congress, and the members of congress shall be protected in their persons from arrests and imprisonments during the time of their going to and from, and attendance on, congress, except for treason, felony or breach of the peace.

ART. 6. § 1. No state, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, shall send any embassy to, or receive any embassy from, or enter into any conference, agreement, alliance or treaty with, any king, prince or state; nor shall any person holding any office of profit or trust under the United States, or any of them, accept any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever from any king, prince, or foreign state; nor shall the United States in congress assembled, or any of them, grant any title of nobility.

§ 2. No two or more states shall enter into any treaty, confederation, or alliance whatever, between them, without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, specifying accurately the purposes for which the same is to be entered into, and how long it shall continue.

§ 3. No state shall lay any imposts or duties which may interfere with any stipulations in treaties entered into by the United States, in congress assembled, with any king, prince, or state, in pursuance of any treaties already proposed by congress to the courts of France and Spain.

§ 4. No vessels of war shall be kept up in time of peace by any state, except such number only as shall be deemed necessary by the United States in congress assembled, for the defense of such state, or its trade; nor shall any body or forces be kept up by any state, in time of peace, except such

number only as, in the judgment of the United States in congress assembled, shall be deemed requisite to garrison the forts necessary for the defense of such state; but every state shall always keep up a well regulated and disciplined militia, sufficiently armed and accoutered, and shall provide and constantly have ready for use, in public stores, a due number of field pieces and tents, and a proper quantity of arms, ammunition and camp equipage.

§ 5. No state shall engage in any war without the consent of the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be actually invaded by enemies, or shall have received certain advice of a resolution being formed by some nation of Indians to invade such state, and the danger is so imminent as not to admit a delay till the United States in congress assembled can be consulted; nor shall any state grant commissions to any ships or vessels of war, nor letters of marque or reprisal, except it be after a declaration of war by the United States in congress assembled, and then only against the kingdom or state, and the subjects thereof, against which war has been so declared, and under such regulations as shall be established by the United States in congress assembled, unless such state be infested by pirates, in which case vessels of war may be fitted out for that occasion, and kept so long as the danger shall continue, or until the United States in congress assembled shall determine otherwise.

ART. 7 When land forces are raised by any state for the common defense, all officers of or under the rank of colonel shall be appointed by the legislature of each state, respectively, by whom such forces shall be raised, or in such manner as such state shall direct, and all vacancies shall be filled up by the state which first made the appointment.

ART. 8. All charges of war, and all other expenses that shall be incurred for the common defense or general welfare, and allowed by the United States in congress assembled, shall be defrayed out of a common treasury, which shall be supplied by the several states, in proportion to the value of all lands within each state, granted to or surveyed for any person, as such land and the buildings and improvements thereon shall be estimated, according to such mode as the United States in congress assembled shall, from time to time, direct and appoint. The taxes for paying the proportion shall be laid and levied by the authority and direction of the legislatures of the several states within the time agreed upon by the United States in congress assembled.

ART. 9 § 1. The United States in congress assembled shall have the sole and exclusive right and power of determining on peace and war, except in the cases mentioned in the sixth article, of sending and receiving ambassadors, entering into treaties and alliances: provided, that no treaty of commerce shall be made whereby the legislative power of the respective states shall be restrained from imposing such imposts and duties on foreigners as their own people are subjected to, or from prohibiting the exportation or importation of any species of goods or commodities whatsoever, of establishing rules for deciding in all cases what captures on land or water shall be legal, and in what manner prizes taken by land or naval forces in the service

of the United States shall be divided or appropriated, of granting letters of marque and reprisal in times of peace; appointing courts for the trial of piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and establishing courts for receiving and determining finally appeals in all cases of captures; provided, that no member of congress shall be appointed a judge of any of the said courts.

§ 2. The United States in congress assembled shall also be the last resort on appeal in all disputes and differences now subsisting, or that may hereafter arise, between two or more states concerning boundary, jurisdiction, or any other cause whatever; which authority shall always be exercised in the manner following: Whenever the legislative or executive authority or lawful agent of any state in controversy with another shall present a petition to congress, stating the matter in question, and praying for a hearing, notice thereof shall be given by order of congress to the legislative or executive authority of the other state in controversy, and a day assigned for the appearance of the parties by their lawful agents, who shall then be directed to appoint, by joint consent, commissioners or judges to constitute a court for hearing and determining the matter in question; but if they cannot agree, congress shall name three persons out of each of the United States, and from the list of such persons each party shall alternately strike out one, the petitioners beginning until the number shall be reduced to thirteen; and from that number not less than seven nor more than nine names, as congress shall direct, shall, in the presence of congress, be drawn out by lot; the persons whose names shall be so drawn, or any five of them, shall be commissioners or judges to hear and finally determine the controversy, so always as a major part of the judges who shall hear the cause shall agree in the determination; and if either party shall neglect to attend at the day appointed, without showing reasons which congress shall judge sufficient, or being present shall refuse to strike, the congress shall proceed to nominate three persons out of each state, and the secretary of congress shall strike in behalf of such party absent or refusing, and the judgment and sentence of the court, to be appointed in the manner before described, shall be final and conclusive; and if any of the parties shall refuse to submit to the authority of such court, or to appear to defend their claim or cause, the court shall nevertheless proceed to pronounce sentence or judgment, which shall in like manner be final and decisive; the judgment or sentence and other proceedings being in either case transmitted to congress and lodged among the acts of congress, for the security of the parties concerned; provided, that every commissioner, before he sits in judgment, shall take an oath, to be administered by one of the judges of the supreme or superior court of the state where the cause shall be tried, "well and truly to hear and determine the matter in question, according to the best of his judgment, without favor, affection, or hope of reward"; provided, also, that no state shall be deprived of territory for the benefit of the United States.

§ 3. All controversies concerning the private right of soil claimed under different grants of two or more states, whose jurisdiction, as they may respect such lands, and the states which passed such grants are

adjusted, the said grants or either of them being at the same time claimed to have originated antecedent to such settlement or jurisdiction, shall, on the petition of either party to the congress of the United States, be finally determined, as near as may be, in the same manner as is before prescribed for deciding disputes respecting territorial jurisdiction between different states.

§ 4. The United States in congress assembled shall also have the sole and exclusive right and power of regulating the alloy and value of coin struck by their own authority, or by that of the respective states; fixing the standards of weights and measures, throughout the United States; regulating the trade and managing all affairs with the Indians, not members of any of the states; provided, that the legislative right of any state, within its own limits, be not infringed or violated; establishing and regulating postoffices from one state to another, throughout all the United States, and exacting such postage on the papers passing through the same as may be requisite to defray the expenses of the said office; appointing all officers of the land forces in the service of the United States, excepting regimental officers; appointing all the officers of the naval forces, and commissioning all officers whatever in the service of the United States; making rules for the government and regulation of the said land and naval forces, and directing their operations.

§ 5. The United States in congress assembled shall have authority to appoint a committee, to sit in the recess of congress, to be denominated "A Committee of the States," and to consist of one delegate from each state; and to appoint such other committees and civil officers as may be necessary for managing the general affairs of the United States under their direction; to appoint one of their number to preside; provided, that no person be allowed to serve in the office of president more than one year in any term of three years; to ascertain the necessary sums of money to be raised for the service of the United States, and to appropriate and apply the same for defraying the public expenses; to borrow money or emit bills on the credit of the United States, transmitting every half year to the respective states an account of the sums of money so borrowed or emitted; to build and equip a navy; to agree upon the number of land forces, and to make requisitions from each state for its quota, in proportion to the number of white inhabitants in such state, which requisition shall be binding; and thereupon the legislature of each state shall appoint the regimental officers, raise the men, and clothe, arm and equip them, in a soldier-like manner, at the expense of the United States, and the officers and men so clothed, armed and equipped shall march to the place appointed and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled, but if the United States in congress assembled shall, on consideration of circumstances, judge proper that any state should not raise men, or should raise a smaller number than its quota and that any other state should raise a greater number of men than the quota thereof, such extra number shall be raised, officered, clothed, armed and equipped in the same manner as the quota of such state, unless the legislature of such state shall judge that such extra number cannot be safely spared out

of the same, in which case they shall raise, officer, clothe, arm and equip as many of such extra number as they judge can be safely spared, and the officers and men so clothed, armed, and equipped shall march to the place appointed, and within the time agreed on by the United States in congress assembled.

§ 6. The United States in congress assembled shall never engage in a war, nor grant letters of marque and reprisal in time of peace, nor enter into any treaties or alliances, nor coin money, nor regulate the value thereof, nor ascertain the sums and expenses necessary for the defense and welfare of the United States, or any of them, nor emit bills, nor borrow money on the credit of the United States, nor appropriate money, nor agree upon the number of vessels of war to be built or purchased, or the number of land or sea forces to be raised, nor appoint a commander-in-chief of the army or navy, unless nine states assent to the same; nor shall a question on any other point, except for adjourning from day to day, be determined, unless by the votes of a majority of the United States in congress assembled.

§ 7. The congress of the United States shall have power to adjourn to any time within the year, and to any place within the United States, so that no period of adjournment be for a longer duration than the space of six months, and shall publish the journal of their proceedings monthly, except such parts thereof relating to treaties, alliances, or military operations as in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the delegates of each state, on any question, shall be entered on the journal, when it is desired by any delegate; and the delegates of a state, or any of them, at his or their request, shall be furnished with a transcript of the said journal, except such parts as are above excepted, to lay before the legislatures of the several states.

ART. 10. The committee of the states, or any nine of them, shall be authorized to execute, in the recess of congress, such of the powers of congress as the United States in congress assembled, by the consent of nine states, shall, from time to time, think expedient to vest them with; provided, that no power be delegated to the said committee, for the exercise of which, by the articles of confederation, the voice of nine states, in the congress of the United States assembled, is requisite.

ART. 11. Canada acceding to this confederation, and joining in the measures of the United States, shall be admitted into and entitled to all the advantages of this Union; but no other colony shall be admitted into the same, unless such admission be agreed to by nine states.

ART. 12. All bills of credit emitted, moneys borrowed, and debts contracted by or under the authority of congress, before the assembling of the United States in pursuance of the present confederation, shall be deemed and considered as a charge against the United States, for payment and satisfaction whereof the said United States and the public faith are hereby solemnly pledged.

ART. 13. Every state shall abide by the determination of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by this confederation are submitted to them.

And the articles of this confederation shall be inviolably observed by every state, and the Union shall be perpetual; nor shall any alteration at any time hereafter be made in any of them, unless such alteration be agreed to in a congress of the United States, and be afterward confirmed by the legislature of every state.

And whereas, it has pleased the great Governor of the world to incline the hearts of the legislatures we respectfully represent in congress to approve of and to authorize us to ratify the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, Know ye, that we, the undersigned delegates, by virtue of the power and authority to us given for that purpose, do by these presents, in the name and in behalf of our respective constituents, fully and entirely ratify and confirm each and every of the said articles of confederation and perpetual union, and all and singular the matters and things therein

contained. And we do further solemnly plight and engage the faith of our respective constituents, that they shall abide by the determinations of the United States in congress assembled, on all questions which by the said confederation are submitted to them; and that the articles thereof shall be inviolably observed by the states we respectively represent, and that the Union shall be perpetual. In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands in congress. Done at Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, the ninth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, and in the third year of the Independence of America.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

ARTICLE I.

SECTION—

ARTICLE III.

ARTICLE IV.

1. Effect of public acts, records, etc., of each state.
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Preamble. We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives.

SEC. 2. The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states, and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding

Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every 30,000, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose 3; Massachusetts, 8; Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, 1; Connecticut, 5; New York 6; New Jersey, 4; Pennsylvania, 8; Delaware, 1; Maryland, 6; Virginia, 10; North Carolina, 5; South Carolina, 5; Georgia, 3.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

*SEC. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year. *When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

The vice president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their own officers, and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments.

When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law.

SEC. 4. The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meetings shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall, by law, appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same; excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States which shall have been created or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting

for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return; in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The Congress shall have power:

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform through the United States;

To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish a uniform rule of naturalization and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coins, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish postoffices and postroads;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times, to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses, against the laws of nations;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

To provide and maintain a navy;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States; and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards, and other needful buildings; and

To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight; but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or ex post facto law, shall be passed.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

No preference shall be given, by any regulation of commerce or revenue, to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States, and no person holding any office of profit and trust under them shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts laid by any state on imports or exports shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the Congress.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice president, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors equal to the whole num-

ber of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the Congress but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

[The electors shall meet in their respective states, and by vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates; and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be appointed, if such a number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice president.]*

The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president; and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend

the Constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur, and he shall nominate and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The president shall have power to fill all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall, from time to time, give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice president, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state or the citizens thereof and foreign states, citizens or subjects.*

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in

which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Congress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury, and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attained.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens of the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labor in one state under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States, and

nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in the Union a republican form of government; and shall protect each of them against invasion, and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which in either case shall be valid, to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; provided, that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution, but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

In addition to, and amendment of, the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress and ratified by the Legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original Constitution.

AMENDMENT I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

AMENDMENT III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

AMENDMENT IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war and public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI.

In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

AMENDMENT VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court in the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

AMENDMENT VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

AMENDMENT IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

AMENDMENT X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states, respectively, or to the people.

AMENDMENT XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

AMENDMENT XII.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice president, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballot the person voted for as vice president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president and of all persons voted for as vice president, and of the number of votes for each; which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president; if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states; and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of votes as vice president shall be the vice president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then, from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

AMENDMENT XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice president of the United States, representatives in Congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in Congress or elector of president and vice president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each house remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

AMENDMENT XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any

state, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

AMENDMENT XVII.

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

AMENDMENT XVIII.

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The Congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XX.

SECTION 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

SEC. 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by

law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

SEC. 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

SEC. 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

SEC. 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.

AMENDMENT XXI.

SECTION 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

SEC. 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENT XXII.

SECTION 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

SEC. 2. The power of the several states is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of state laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress.

NOTE.—The Constitution was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, by the unanimous consent of the states present in the convention appointed in pursuance of the resolution of the Congress of the confederation, of the twenty-first of February, 1787, and was ratified by the conventions of the several states, as follows, viz.: By convention of Delaware, Dec. 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, Dec. 12, 1787; New Jersey, Dec. 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2, 1788; Connecticut, Jan. 9, 1788; Massachusetts, Feb. 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788; New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789; Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

The first ten of the amendments were proposed at the first session of the First Congress of the United States, Sept. 25, 1789; and were finally ratified by the constitutional number of states Dec. 15, 1791. The eleventh amendment was proposed at the first session of the Third Congress, March 5, 1794, and was declared in a message from the president of the United States to both houses of Congress, dated Jan. 8, 1798, to have been adopted by the constitutional number of states. The twelfth amendment was proposed at the first session of the Eighth Congress, Dec. 12, 1803, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1804, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Sept. 25, 1804.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed at the second session of the Thirty-Eighth Congress, Feb. 1, 1865, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1865, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Dec. 18, 1865.

The fourteenth amendment took effect July 28, 1868.

The fifteenth amendment took effect March 30, 1870.

The sixteenth amendment took effect February 25, 1913.

The seventeenth amendment took effect May 31, 1913.

The eighteenth amendment took effect January 29, 1920.

The nineteenth amendment took effect August 27, 1920.

The twentieth amendment was proclaimed February 6, 1933.

The twenty-first amendment was proclaimed December 5, 1933.

The twenty-second amendment has been proposed by Congress to the states. It has not yet been ratified by the requisite number of states. It has been ratified by the Minnesota Legislature Joint Resolution No. 2, approved December 14, 1933. Extra Sessions. As to limitation of time for ratification see *Coleman v. Miller*, 307 U. S. 433 (Kansas, 1939).

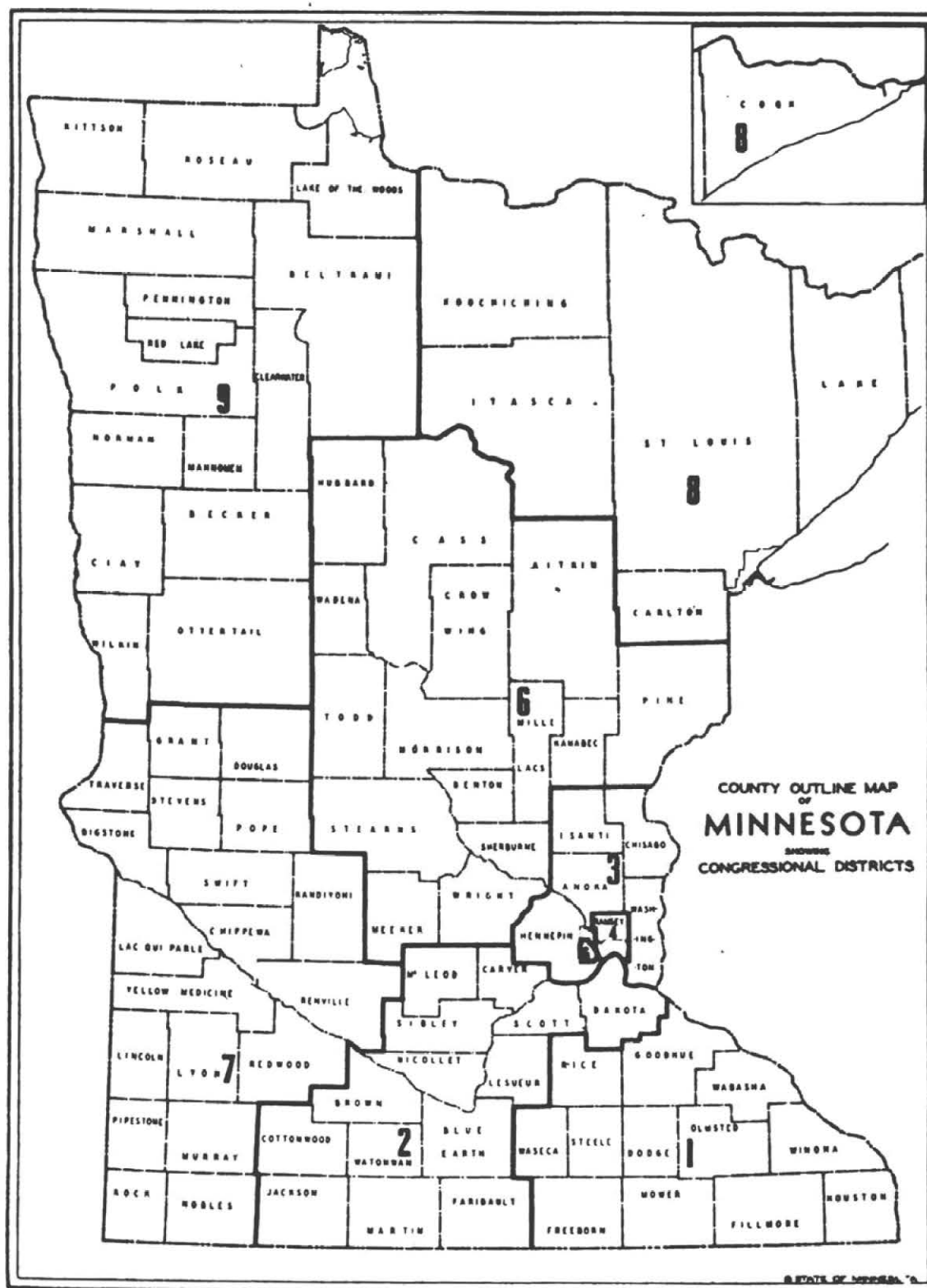

LEGAL HOLIDAYS IN MINNESOTA

Section 645.44, Minnesota Statutes for 1945, Subd. 4:

Holidays—The word "holiday" includes New Year's Day, January 1; Lincoln's Birthday, February 12; Washington's Birthday, February 22; Memorial Day, May 30; Independence Day, July 4; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Christopher Columbus Day, October 12; Christmas Day, December 25; the Friday next preceding Easter Sunday, commonly known as Good Friday; Thanksgiving Day; and Armistice Day, November 11th. No public business shall be transacted on those days, except in cases of necessity, nor shall any civil process be served thereon.

Chapter 324, L'47—**Special Days**—The following days or the school days nearest such days are hereby designated for special observance in the public schools of the state: September 28 as Frances Willard Day, October 9 as Leif Erikson Day, and February 15 as Susan B. Anthony Day. On such days one-half hour may be devoted in the schools to instruction and appropriate exercises relative to and in commemoration of the life and history of the respective persons and the principles and ideals they fostered.

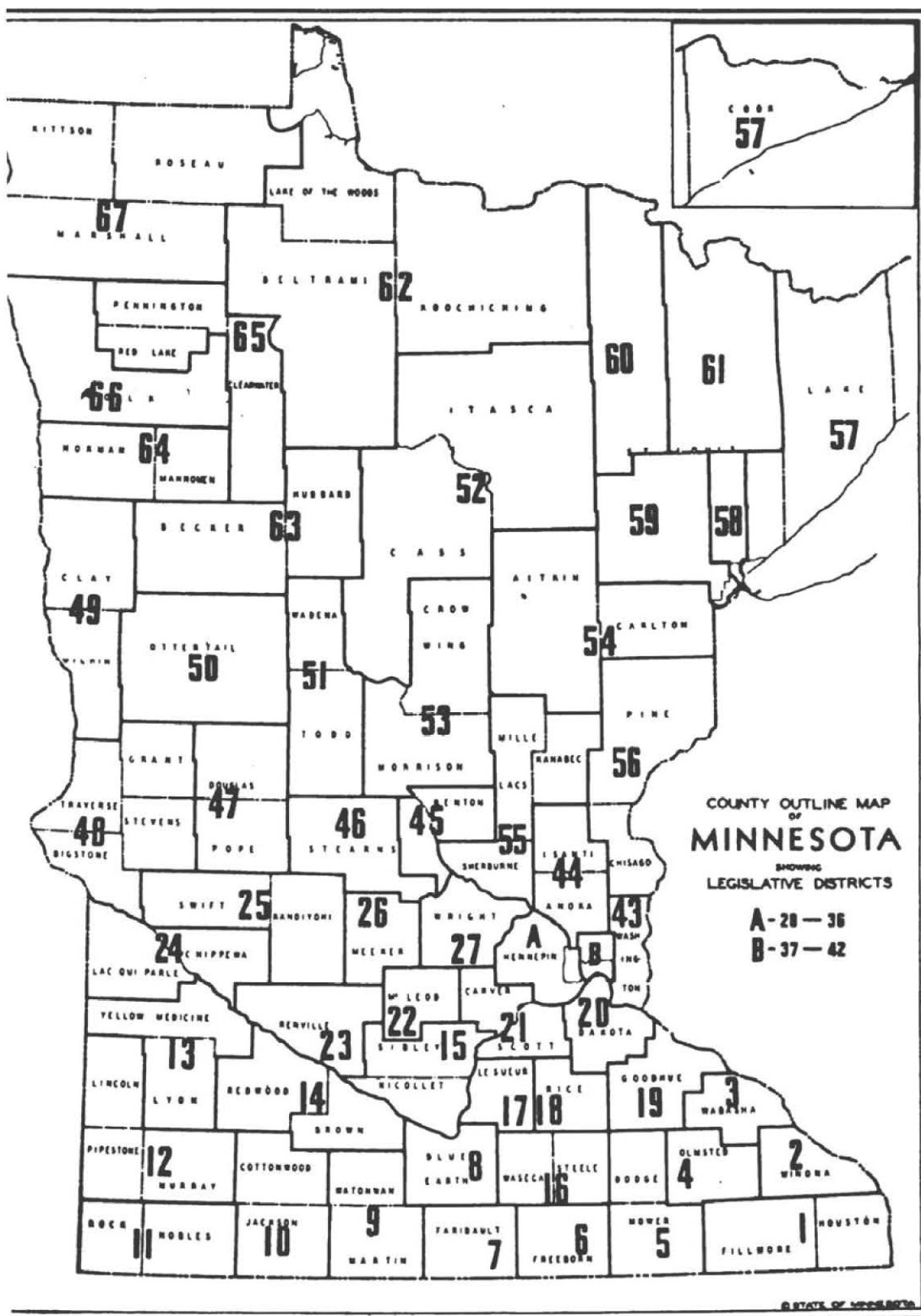

PERMANENT RULES OF THE SENATE

1951

CALLING SENATE TO ORDER

1. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Senate shall have adjourned, and shall immediately call the members to order, and on the appearance of a quorum, shall proceed with the regular order of business. He shall preserve order and decorum; may speak on points of order in preference to members, and shall also decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Senate by any member but such appeal shall be decided by a majority vote of those present and voting thereon.

APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

2. All committees of the Senate and members of commissions to be appointed by the Senate authorized by rule, statute, resolution or otherwise, shall be appointed by a Committee on Committees, subject to confirmation by the Senate, and all such appointments made by such Committee on Committees shall likewise be subject to confirmation by the Senate.

QUESTIONS—HOW STATED AND DECIDED

3. He shall rise to put the question, but may state it sitting.

4. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say Aye," and after the affirmative voice is expressed, "As many as are of the contrary opinion say No." The President shall declare all votes, but if any member rise to doubt a vote, he shall order a division.

CONFIRMATIONS

4(a). When nominations or appointments made by the Governor which require confirmation by the Senate have been transmitted to the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received, nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee unless by unanimous consent.

Every such nomination shall, upon request of any senator, be referred to a committee, and if a question shall arise as to the proper committee, the same shall be referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense to report the proper reference thereof and upon adoption of the report of such committee it shall be referred accordingly.

PRESIDENT PRO TEM

5. The President shall call some member to the chair when the Senate goes into Committee of the Whole. In the absence of the President the President Pro Tem. shall preside, and in the absence of both the President and President Pro Tem. a member may be called to perform the duties of the chair; but substitutions shall not extend beyond adjournment.

FURTHER DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT

6. The President of the Senate shall sign all acts, memorials, addresses and resolutions; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the Senate shall be signed by him and attested by the Secretary.

7. The President is authorized to administer all oaths required in the discharge of his duties.

DISTURBANCE IN LOBBY

8. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobbies or galleries, the President or chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall have power to order the same cleared.

9. Because of the limited space available on the floor of the Senate, the Associated Press, United Press, the St. Paul Pioneer Press, the St. Paul Dispatch, the Minneapolis Star Journal, the Minneapolis Morning Tribune, the Minneapolis Daily Times, the Duluth News-Tribune and the Duluth Herald, KSTP, and WCCO, shall each be permitted representation at the press table by one regular reporter whose credentials are approved by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense. Any person wishing to report proceedings of the Senate may apply to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense for assignment to suitable, available space.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

10. The order of business shall be as follows:

1. Petitions, letters, remonstrances.
2. Executive and official communications.
3. Introduction and first reading of Senate bills.
4. Messages from the House of Representatives.
5. First reading of House bills.
6. Reports of Committees:
 - (a) From standing committees.
 - (b) From select committees.
7. Second reading of Senate bills.
8. Second reading of House bills.
9. Motions and resolutions.
10. Third reading of Senate bills.
11. Third reading of House bills.
12. General orders of the day.

REFERRING OF BILLS

11. All bills shall be referred by the President of the Senate without motion to the proper standing committee, on the first reading, unless otherwise referred by the Senate; and all bills providing for the appropriation of money, or obligating the State to pay or expend money, when referred to and reported by any other than the Committee on Finance, shall, before passage, be referred to the Committee on Finance, provided that when any question shall arise concerning the proper reference of a bill the bill shall be

referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense to report the proper reference thereof, and upon adoption of such report it shall be referred accordingly.

ORDER IN DEBATE

12. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Senate, he shall rise to his feet and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," but shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the Chair. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid personality. In discussing any resolution, senators shall be limited to five minutes each.

13. When any member is called to order he shall sit down until it is determined whether he is in order or not, and if a member is called to order for words spoken in debate, the words excepted to shall be taken down in writing immediately.

14. When two or more members shall happen to rise at once, the President shall name the member who is to speak.

15. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question on the same day without leave of the Senate.

CONDUCT DURING BUSINESS

16. When the President is putting any question, or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of, or cross the room; nor when a member is speaking shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the chair. No member, or other person, shall proceed to or remain by the Secretary's desk while the ayes and nays are being called or counted.

17. Upon a division and count of the Senate on any question no member without the Senate chamber shall be counted.

SENATORS TO VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED

18. Every member who shall be in the Senate when the question is put shall give his vote unless the Senate for special reasons shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the Senate divides or before he gives his vote upon a call of the ayes and nays. Any member wishing to be excused from voting may make a brief statement of the reasons for making such request, and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

MOTIONS

19. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the President; or, being in writing it shall be handed to the Secretary and read aloud for debate.

20. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member desires it. In such case it must be signed by the member or committee offering it.

21. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Senate, but may be withdrawn by the author at any time before decision or amendment.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

22. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, but

To adjourn.
To lay on the table.
For the previous question.

Which three motions shall be decided without debate.

To commit.
To postpone to a day certain.
To amend, or
To postpone indefinitely.

These and several motions have precedence in the foregoing order; but a motion for the previous question having been seconded, or the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

A motion to postpone to a certain day, to commit, to postpone indefinitely, or to amend, being decided, shall not again be allowed on the same day, nor at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

MOTION TO ADJOURN

23. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and also a motion to adjourn to a time certain. The latter motion is debatable. When either motion is refused it shall not be renewed until further business shall be transacted.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION

24. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon all pending amendments in their order and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the Senate shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered such motion, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.

25. On a previous question there shall be no debate. All incidental questions of order, arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

RECONSIDERATION

26. When a motion or question has been once put and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for reconsideration thereof, on the same day on which the vote was taken or within the next two days of actual session of the Senate thereafter; and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn. A motion for reconsideration being put and lost, shall not be renewed.

DIVISION OF QUESTION

27. Any member may call for a division of the question when the same will admit of it. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed to be indivisible. A motion to strike out being lost shall not preclude an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

PETITIONS AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS

28. In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance or other communication addressed to the Senate, the members shall only state the general purpose of it.

29. Every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee, shall be indorsed with its appropriate title, and immediately under the indorsement the name of the member presenting the same shall be written or printed.

CALL OF THE SENATE

30. Any member may make a call of the Senate, and require absent members to be sent for, but a call of the Senate cannot be made after the voting has commenced; and the call of the Senate being ordered and absentees noted, the doors shall be closed, and no member permitted to leave the room until further proceedings under the call be dispensed with by a majority vote of all the members of the Senate and the matter or question, if any, under consideration at the time of the call be disposed of, or the Senate adjourns.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

32. The rules observed in the Senate shall govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings of the Committee of the Whole, except that a member may speak more than twice on the same subject, and that a call for the ayes and nays, or for the previous question cannot be made.

33. Amendments made in the Committee of the Whole shall be entered on a separate piece of paper, and so reported to the Senate by the chairman standing in his place, which amendment shall not be read by the President unless required by one or more of the members. On adoption of the report by the Committee of the Whole, all bills recommended to pass, shall be placed upon the calendar.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS — LIMITING NUMBER OF AUTHORS

34. Bills, memorials and joint resolutions may be introduced by any member in his place or by order of the Senate on a report of a committee, at which time an original and three copies thereof, shall be furnished

the Secretary of the Senate. Each such copy shall be endorsed "copy." The number of authors shall not exceed three.

The name of the introducing member is to be prefixed to each bill, memorial, or joint resolution; and the name of a committee reporting a bill, memorial, or joint resolution shall be endorsed thereon.

A committee report or a proposed amendment to a bill, memorial, or joint resolution shall be in triplicate and written only on one side of the paper.

The title of each bill shall give its single subject and briefly state its purpose.

A bill for an amendment of a statute shall contain the full text of the chapter, section, or subdivision to be amended. Insert the words and characters constituting the amending matter in the proper place in the text and underscore them. When the bill is printed put the amending matter in italics. Strike out the words and characters to be eliminated by the amendment by drawing a line through them. When the bill is printed capitalize these words and characters and enclose them in brackets. In a bill amending the language of an existing chapter, section, or subdivision, and also adding a new section or subdivision thereto, the text of the new section or subdivision shall likewise be underscored. When the bill is printed, put the amending matter, including the new section or subdivision, in italics. Before a committee favorably reports upon such a bill, the chairman of the committee shall see that the bill conforms to this rule.

Bills shall refer to the session laws as follows: "Laws—, Chapter—, Section—".

Bills shall refer to compilations of the laws as follows:

"Revised Laws 1905, Section—".

When referring to laws passed at the session of 1891 and prior years, and only in those cases, references shall be as follows:

"Special Laws—, Chapter—, Section—".

"General Laws—, Chapter—, Section—".

Reference shall be made to Minnesota Statutes 1949 for the provisions appearing therein, unless reference to previous session laws is required for some special reason.

If the bill is for an original law and not for an amendment of an existing law, the sections and subdivisions shall be arranged subdivided, and numbered in like manner as Minnesota Statutes 1949. No such bill assigning to the sections thereof identification by the decimal system of numbering used in Minnesota Statutes shall be introduced, unless there is attached to the bill a written authorization by the Revisor of Statutes for such identification.

If the bill is for an amendment of a statute, all statutory references shall be to Minnesota Statutes 1949, and it shall contain the full text of the section or subdivision to be amended as it appears in Minnesota Statutes 1949.

When a law is sought to be amended or repealed the title of the amendatory act shall contain a proper reference to the law to be amended or repealed and briefly express its subject matter.

All numbers in titles shall be expressed in figures. All numbers of section or chapter of laws shall be in figures. In the body of a bill numbers in excess of ten shall be in figures, except for a special reason they may be written, but when written they should not be followed by numbers in parentheses.

READING OF BILLS

35. Every bill, memorial, order, resolution or vote requiring the approval of the Governor shall receive three separate readings previous to its passage; the first and third readings shall be at length; and no such bill, memorial, order or resolution shall be read twice on the same day.

COMMITMENT

36. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it has been once read at length. If objections are made to a bill on its first reading the question shall be: "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no objection be made or the question to reject be lost, the bill shall go on its second reading.

ALL BILLS TO GO TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

37. All bills, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the Governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in Committee of the Whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the Senate.

PRINTING OF BILLS

38. All bills of general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands shall be printed; provided, that no bills shall be printed until the same shall have been reported upon favorably by the committee to whom the same shall be referred, or such committee shall recommend such printing.

FINAL PASSAGE

39. The final question upon a bill or other paper requiring action by both Houses after the first and second reading thereof, and after the consideration in Committee of the Whole, shall be upon its final passage.

AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING

40. No amendment shall be received on third reading except to fill blanks without the unanimous consent of the Senate. In filling blanks, the largest sum, the longest time and the greatest distance shall be first taken.

41. A bill or resolution may be committed at any time prior to its passage, and if any amendment be reported on such commitment to any other than a Committee of the Whole, it shall be again read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and the question for third reading and passage again put.

ENGROSSMENT

42. Every bill, memorial, order or resolution originating in the Senate shall be carefully engrossed in typewriting before being transmitted to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

TRANSMITTING OF BILLS TO THE HOUSE

43. Immediately after the passage of any bill or other paper to which the concurrence of the House of Representatives is to be asked it shall be the duty of the Secretary to transmit the same to the House, unless some member of the Senate shall make a motion to reconsider the vote by which the Senate passed the said bill or other paper;

in which case the Secretary shall not transmit said bill or other paper until a motion to reconsider has been put; and on the concurrence of any bill or other paper of the House of Representatives by the Senate, or on the concurrence or disagreement in any vote of the House it shall also be the duty of the Senate to notify the House thereof.

MEMORIALS TO THE UNITED STATES OR ANY OTHER STATE OR FOREIGN GOVERNMENT

44. Memorials or petitions to the President or Congress of the United States, or any branch or member thereof, or any department or officer of the United States, or any state or foreign government, including all motions, resolutions, joint or concurrent resolutions in relation thereto, shall follow the same course of procedure as bills before being adopted.

ANY SENATOR MAY DEMAND AYES AND NAYS

45. It shall be competent for any member, when a question is being taken, to call for the ayes and nays, which shall be entered on the Journal. A call for the ayes and nays cannot be interrupted in any manner whatever.

COMMITTEE NOT TO BE ABSENT

46. Committees shall not absent themselves from the Senate, by reason of their appointment, without special permission for that purpose being first obtained.

ENROLLMENT

47. All bills shall be carefully enrolled in typewriting under the supervision of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense. Said committee may report to the Senate at any time on the enrollment of bills.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY

48. The Secretary shall keep a correct Journal of the proceedings of the Senate and shall perform such other duties as shall be assigned to him as such Secretary. He shall permit no Journal records, accounts or papers to be taken from the table or out of his custody, other than in the regular mode of business. If any paper in his charge shall be missing, he shall report the fact to the President, that inquiry may be made. He shall superintend the recording of proceedings in the Journal, the engrossing, transcribing and copying of the bills and resolutions, supervise the assistants, clerks and stenographers under the direction of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense, and generally perform the duties of Secretary, under direction of the President. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the books to be called "Minute Books," in which he shall enter under the appropriate marginal numbers, all Senate and House bills, and correct notes, with the dates thereof, of the state, condition and progress of each bill pending, until its final passage.

CERTIFICATE FOR MONEY

49. No certificate authorizing the payment of any money appropriated by the Legislature shall be issued by the Secretary, by virtue of any motion or resolution, unless such a motion or resolution shall be voted for by a majority of all members of the

Senate. All motions or resolutions authorizing the issuing of certificates by the Secretary for the payment of money shall be upon a call of the ayes and nays.

JOURNAL OF EXECUTIVE SESSION

50. The proceedings of the Senate on executive business shall be kept in a separate book of record to be provided by the Secretary of the Senate, and published with the proceedings of the Senate, unless the public good requires secrecy, which shall be determined by a vote of the Senate.

JEFFERSON'S MANUAL

51. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual shall govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and orders of the Senate, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

HOURS OF MEETING

52. The standing hour of the daily meeting of the Senate shall be 10 o'clock in the morning, unless the Senate direct otherwise.

ABSENCE OF SENATORS

53. No Senator or officer of the Senate shall absent himself from any session of the Senate without having first obtained leave of absence.

PERSONS PRIVILEGED TO THE FLOOR OF THE SENATE

54. No persons shall be admitted within the Senate chamber, but the executive or ex-Governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the House, heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme and District Courts and members of Congress and, when personally introduced by members of the Senate, those who have been members of Congress or of the State Legislature or other visitors who are not interested in any claim or directly in any bill pending before the Legislature. No lobbyist shall be permitted on the floor of the Senate or in the retiring room or corridors during the session of the Senate. No public hearings shall be held in the Senate Chamber and the retiring room of the Senate shall be reserved for the exclusive use of the members of the Senate at all times during the session. The Sergeant-at-Arms is charged with the duty of strict enforcement of this rule.

AMENDMENTS, RULES AND SUSPENSION OF RULES

55. Every proposition to amend any rule of the Senate shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense, and shall not be acted upon until the report of such committee is received by the Senate; nor shall any rule be suspended except by at least two-thirds vote of the full Senate; provided that a motion to suspend the rules for the purpose of advancing a bill shall be made only under the order of business, "Motions and Resolutions."

AMENDMENTS TO BILLS

56. In drawing any amendment to any bill or resolution reference shall be made therein first to the number of the bill, then to the section, and then to the line or lines

from which matter is to be stricken or in which new matter is to be inserted.

NOTICE TO DEBATE

57. Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or other action, except that upon the request of any Senator, any resolution shall be referred to the proper committee, provided that whenever any question shall arise concerning the proper reference thereof the procedure provided by Rule No. 11 shall apply. This rule shall not apply to any resolution offered by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

58. When in executive session, the Senate may, in all cases, sit with closed doors, and the Senate chamber may be cleared of all persons except the officers and members of the Senate.

NO SMOKING

59. No Senator or officer of the Senate, or other person, shall be permitted to smoke in the Senate chamber.

SECRETARY MAY CORRECT ERRORS

60. (a) Minor clerical errors in any bill, memorial or resolution, such as errors in orthography or grammar, or the incorrect use of one word for another (as "affect" for "effect"), or wrong numbering of references, whether such errors occur in the original bill or any amendment thereto, shall be corrected by the Secretary of the Senate, as a matter of course, upon the approval of the Chairman of any committee to which the bill was referred.

(b) The Secretary of the Senate shall insert the enacting clause in any bill before its passage if the same shall have been omitted.

(c) Webster's New International Dictionary shall be the standard authority in matters falling under the above rules.

DUTIES OF THE SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

61. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to execute all orders of the President of the Senate, and to perform all duties they may assign to him connected with the police and good order of the Senate chamber; to exercise a supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the chambers; to see that messages, etc., are promptly executed; that the hall is properly ventilated and the temperature thereof properly regulated, and open for the use of members of the Senate at the time fixed; and to perform all other services pertaining to his office.

REPORT ON AMENDED BILLS

62. No committee nor any member thereof shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject, or is intended to accomplish a different purpose than that of the original bill for which it is reported, or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the Senate is advised that the same is in violation of this rule.

GENERAL ORDERS

63. The Secretary shall make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other proceedings of the Senate, which are referred to the Committee of the Whole, and which are not made the order of the day, for any particular day, and to number the same, which lists shall be called the "General Orders of the Day," and they shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee.

Such general orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the rules or orders of the Senate, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the same shall be considered in Committee of the Whole.

CALENDAR

64. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to make a list of all bills, resolutions and other matters coming before the Senate for final action and place the same upon the calendar in the order in which they have been acted upon in Committee of the Whole, and such calendar shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one day before the matters included therein shall be considered.

EMPLOYEES AUTHORIZED IN
THE SENATE

65. The Senate shall employ for the Session, at the compensation of \$8.00 per day, unless otherwise specified, the following:

Three assistant secretaries of the Senate at \$11.00 per day.

Chaplain of the Senate at \$6.00 per day.

One bill clerk at \$9.00 per day.

One index clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One clerk to the Finance Committee at \$12.00 per day. One stenographer to the Finance Committee at \$10.00 per day.

One clerk to the Judiciary Committee at \$14.00 per day.

One clerk to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense at \$12.50 per day.

One clerk for the Secretary's office at \$12.50 per day.

One file clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One assistant file clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One permanent index clerk at \$10.00 per day.

One special clerk at \$10.00 per day.

Twenty-two general committee clerks to be assigned to their respective positions and duties by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense.

One Stenographer to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense at \$12.00 per day.

One stenographer to the Committee on Taxes and Tax Laws at \$12.00 per day.

One stenographer to the Committee on Judiciary at \$12.00 per day.

One stenographer to the Engrossing and Enrolling Clerks at \$10.00 per day.

Supervisor of Stenographers at \$10.00 per day.

Fifteen stenographers and such additional

stenographers as the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense may from time to time determine at \$8.50 per day.

Thirty-eight sergeants of galleries, committee rooms, retiring rooms, cloak rooms, doorkeepers to be assigned to their respective positions and duties by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense.

One superintendent of janitors at \$10.00 per day and six assistant janitors at \$8.00 per day.

Six pages.

One telephone messenger at \$9.00 a day.

The sergeant-at-arms shall receive \$12.50 per day and the first assistant sergeant-at-arms shall receive \$11.50 per day.

The enrolling clerk and the engrossing clerk shall receive \$10.00 per day.

The President of the Senate is hereby authorized to appoint a secretary at \$10.00 per day, also a stenographer at \$8.50 per day.

The Secretary of the Senate shall receive \$20.00 per day and the sum of \$2,000.00 for extra work after the session and for compensation of clerical help for such post session.

The appointment to the foregoing positions shall be made by resolution specifying the names of such appointments and the positions to which the same are appointed, adopted by a majority of all members of the Senate.

ADDITIONAL EMPLOYEES—
GRATUITIES

66. All propositions for the appointment of employees of the Senate or for expenditures on account of the Legislature, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense, without debate, and no appointment shall be made or expense incurred unless reported favorably by said committee, or unless its report be overruled by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of the whole Senate. Said committee shall report to the Senate the amount of compensation that shall be paid to each employee whose appointment is recommended by it. All propositions for extra compensation or gratuity shall be referred to said committee, and no extra compensation or gratuity shall be paid to any officer, employee or other person unless reported upon favorably by said committee or unless its report be reversed by a three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) vote of the whole Senate.

SPECIAL ORDER

67. On two days' notice it shall require a two-thirds vote of the whole Senate to designate a Special Order and when a time has been designated by the Senate, whether by adoption of a report of the committee or otherwise, for a particular or Special Order, the Senate shall at such time proceed to the consideration of such order, and shall at such time so designated, after considering the bill, resolution, or measure included therein, unless the same shall be otherwise disposed of or the Special Order postponed to a day certain, immediately proceed to the third reading and final passage of the same and during the consideration of such Special Order Rule No. Fifteen (15) shall be suspended, and the debate thereon and all proceedings thereunder, including amendments and substitutions, shall be, as nearly

as applicable, that of the Committee of the Whole, except that it shall be competent for any member when a question is being taken, to call for the ayes and nays which shall be entered on the Journal.

JOURNAL—HOW APPROVED

68. The Journal of each day's proceedings shall be open for correction at any time during the session of the succeeding day, and unless corrected on that day, shall stand approved.

AUTHORITY OVER EMPLOYEES

69. Except as otherwise provided in these rules, the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense shall have full and exclusive authority over, and charge of all employees, officers and clerks of the Senate, both elective and appointive. Such committee shall have the sole and exclusive power and authority to assign them to such duties other than for which they were elected or appointed as such committee may from time to time provide. Such committee shall have power to appoint such of said employees, officers or clerks as they shall deem proper to exercise the power to them granted by this rule. They may make such rules and regulations for the government of the employees, officers and clerks as they shall see fit and proper. In case of violation of any of the orders of said committee by any employee, officer or clerk, or in case of any violation of any such rule or regulation made by such committee, or in case of any misconduct or omission of any such employee, officer or clerk, the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense shall have power to hear complaints and to discharge any such employee, officer or clerk or impose such other punishment by way of fine or otherwise upon such employee, officer or clerk as to such committee may seem just and proper.

AMENDMENTS TO TITLE

70. The title to any bill may be amended at any time during its pendency in the Senate.

WHEN COMMITTEE MUST REPORT

71. Every bill referred to a standing committee shall be reported therefrom within twenty-five (25) days after its reference to such committee except all bills referred to the Finance Committee.

A majority of the Senate may at any time recall a bill from any committee or take a bill from the table and place such bill on General Orders.

SENATE EMPLOYEES TO ENROLL AND ENGROSS BILLS

72. All enrolling and engrossing of bills shall be done by enrolling and engrossing

clerks and stenographers regularly in the employ of the Senate and shall not be paid for per folio.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS

73. Except as provided in Rule 44, joint resolutions not requiring the signature of the Governor need not take the regular course of bills and memorials, but may be acted upon in the same manner as resolutions.

PURCHASING SUPPLIES

74. The Secretary of the Senate shall be the agent of the Senate for the purchase of supplies. Before making purchases, however, it shall be his duty to consult with and get prices from the Commissioner of Purchases of the State of Minnesota and then submit the same to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense together with a list of necessary supplies, and the prices for which the same can be secured, which supplies shall then be purchased by the Secretary upon the approval of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense.

REPORT OF VOTE IN COMMITTEE

75. Upon the request of any member of any standing committee of the Senate, or upon the request of the author of any bill, a record shall be made of the vote on such bill in any committee, including the vote of any amendment or proposed amendments thereto in the committee to which the bill was referred, and such vote of the members of such committee shall accompany the report of the committee on the bill and shall be printed in the Journal as a part of the report of the committee.

QUORUM IN COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

76. Eight members shall constitute a quorum of the Committee on Judiciary.

COMPARISON OF BILLS

77. No House bill shall be substituted in the Senate for any Senate bill, except by adopting a report of a proper committee, until the same shall have been compared with the Senate bill by a comparison clerk, and any dissimilarities noted in a written memorandum signed by the clerk and attached to the bill. Such comparison shall be made by the clerk upon request of a member or order of the Senate.

AUTHORIZING ELECTRICAL DEVICE

78. Unless otherwise ordered any vote, except upon elections and upon the overriding of a Governor's veto, may be taken by means of the electrical voting system which shall be under the control of the President of the Senate.

PERMANENT RULES OF THE HOUSE

1951

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE MEETING, ROLL CALL, ETC.

1. The Speaker shall take the chair at the hour at which the House stands adjourned. The House shall then be called to order, and after prayer by the Chaplain, a roll of members shall be called and the names of the members present and those excused shall be entered on the Journal of the House. Unless otherwise ordered by the House, regular sessions thereof shall convene at two o'clock P.M.

READING OF THE JOURNAL

2. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Chief Clerk, unless otherwise ordered, and any errors therein may be corrected by the House.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

3. After the reading of the Journal, the order of business of the day shall be as follows:

1. Presentation of petitions or other communications.
2. Reports of standing committees.
3. Second reading of House Bills.
4. Second reading of Senate Bills.
5. Reports of select committees.
6. Introduction and first reading of bills.
7. Motions and resolutions.
8. Consideration of messages from the Senate.
9. First reading of Senate Bills.
10. Calendar for the day.
11. General Orders.

BILLS—HOW INTRODUCED

4a. A member or committee desiring to introduce a bill shall place the same in the hands of the Speaker before the opening of the session.

All bills introduced shall as soon as may be after introduction be examined by the Revision Clerk who shall recommend any necessary changes in the form thereof to make the same comply with the Rules of the House, and communicate any such recommendation to the member introducing the same and to the chairman of the committee to which the same is referred by the Speaker.

All memorials and joint resolutions shall be presented, received and considered in the same manner as bills, and take the same course as a bill.

No bill shall be introduced after the sixtieth (60th) legislative day of the session except its reception be authorized by two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote of the House; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to committee bills or bills introduced by request of the Governor under the constitutional provision as provided for in Article 4, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota.

Any standing or special committee of the

House may introduce a bill on any subject or matter within its purview as a committee bill, which bill shall be read for the first time and may then be referred by the Speaker to any standing committee whose study it requires, but if not so referred shall be laid over one day, when it shall be read for the second time and placed upon General Orders.

Every bill and resolution shall be introduced in quadruplicate and shall have prefixed thereto the name of the member or committee introducing it.

No bill, memorial, resolution or joint resolution shall have affixed thereto the names or more than five members as the authors thereof.

BILLS—HOW DRAFTED

4b. The title of each bill must give its single subject and briefly state its purpose.

A bill for the amendment of a statute shall contain the full text of the chapter, section, or subdivision to be amended. Insert the words and characters constituting the amending matter in the proper place in such text and underscore them. When the bill is printed, put the amending matter in italics. Strike out the words and characters to be eliminated by the amendment by drawing a line through them. When the bill is printed, capitalize these words and characters and enclose them in brackets. Before a committee reports favorably upon such a bill, the chairman of the committee shall see that the bill conforms to this rule.

Bills shall refer to the Session Laws of this state as follows: "Laws—, Chapter —, Section —."

Bill shall refer to compilations of the laws of this state as follows: "Revised Laws 1905, Section —."

When referring to laws passed at the session of 1891 and prior years, and only in those cases, references shall be as follows:

"Special Laws—, Chapter—, Section —."

"General Laws —, Chapter—, Section —."

Reference shall be made to Minnesota Statutes 1949 for the provisions appearing therein, unless reference to previous Session Laws is required for some special reason.

If the bill is for an original law and not for an amendment of an existing law, the sections and subdivisions shall be arranged, subdivided, and numbered in like manner as Minnesota Statutes. No such bill assigning to the sections thereof identification by the decimal system of numbering used in Minnesota Statutes shall be introduced, unless there is attached thereto a written authorization by the Revisor of Statutes for such identification.

If the bill is for an amendment of a statute, all statutory references shall be to Minnesota Statutes 1949, and it shall contain the full text of the section or subdivision to be amended as it appears in Minnesota Statutes 1949.

When a law is sought to be amended or

repealed, the title of the amendatory act shall contain a proper reference to the law to be amended or repealed and briefly express its subject matter.

All numbers in the titles shall be expressed in figures. All numbers of sections or chapters of laws shall be in figures. In the body of the bill numbers in excess of 10 shall be in figures, except for a special reason they may be written, but when written they shall not be followed by numbers in parentheses.

The author of a bill may attach thereto a memorandum of information, headed "memorandum," which constitutes no part of the bill, and which shall only be printed when ordered by a vote of the House.

FIRST READING AND REFERENCE OF BILLS

5. All bills, memorials and joint resolutions shall be read at length upon their introduction, unless objected to. If objection is made to the introduction of a bill, the question shall be:

"Shall the bill be rejected?"

A majority vote of the whole House shall be required for rejection. If no objection be made, or if the question to reject be lost, the bill shall after reading be referred by the Speaker to its appropriate standing committee, except when introduced by such committee. Every bill introduced, except when introduced by a committee as above provided, containing an amendment to an existing law of the state, shall first be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee of the House appointed with reference to the subject matter contained in the law proposed to be amended.

After a reference of a bill by the Speaker, a majority vote of the whole House, shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be required for a re-reference or re-committal thereof by the House.

Any bill whether emanating from the House or the Senate carrying an appropriation or which may involve any financial obligation either present or future on the part of the State, which has been previously referred by the Speaker under the Rules to any Committee of the House other than the Committee on appropriations shall, after the same has been reported back to the House, be referred, or if originally introduced by a Committee, referred to the Committee on Appropriations for action by that committee before the second reading of the bill, and the fact that any such bill referred to any committee other than the Committee on Appropriations carries an appropriation shall be noted by the committee to which it was referred in the report of such committee returning the same.

Any bill whether emanating from the House or the Senate which creates any new department, agency, commission, board or bureau or which in any way relates to or affects the organization of any department or agency thereof of state government or the organization of any department or agency thereof, or in any way relates to or affects the official rights, powers or duties of any official, department or agency of the state government or any institution under its control, except the University of Minnesota, which has been previously referred by the Speaker under the Rules to any Committee, other than the Committee on Civil Administration, shall after the same has been reported back to the House, be referred, or if originally introduced by a Committee, referred to the Committee on

Civil Administration for action by that Committee before the second reading of the bill, and the fact that any such bill referred to any Committee other than the Committee on Civil Administration, relates to or affects any matters specified in this paragraph shall be noted by the Committee to which it was referred in the report of such Committee returning the same.

RECORDS AND REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

6. The Chairman, or Acting Chairman, of each committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record on which shall be entered:

(a) The time and place of each hearing and of each meeting of the committee.

(b) The attendance of committee members at each meeting.

(c) The name of each person, except members of the House and Senate, appearing before the committee, with the name of the person or persons, association, firm or corporation in whose behalf the appearance is made.

Any member of any committee may demand a roll call on any bill, resolution, or amendment before the committee and upon such demand being made and not otherwise the roll call shall be called on such bill, resolution or amendment, and a record of the vote of each member thereon made and kept; and the name of the member making such demands shall also be recorded.

Such record shall be approved at the next regular meeting of the committee.

Such record shall be filed with the Chief Clerk during the session of the Legislature and at the expiration thereof shall be filed with the Secretary of State; and such records shall be open to public inspection at all times.

The chairman of a committee reporting the action taken by his committee upon bills submitted to it shall do so upon the form provided for such reports, stating the date of the meeting when such action was taken, and shall authenticate the same by his signature. Any number of bills may be embodied in one report; but at the request of any member the report may be divided by excepting any bill therefrom and if this be done, the bill so excepted may be acted upon independently from the report as a whole.

The report of any committee, or any part thereof, may be laid upon the table for a day and printed in the Journal, if so ordered by the House.

In the event of a minority report, the majority and minority reports shall be made separately from the regular committee reports.

QUORUM ON COMMITTEES

7. A majority of the members of any standing or special committee shall constitute a quorum.

SECOND READING OF BILLS

8. All bills, concurrent resolutions, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the Governor, shall after a second reading, be considered in a Committee of the Whole before they shall be finally acted upon by the House. Unless otherwise ordered bills, resolutions authorizing the expenditure of money, and joint memorials to Congress only, shall require a second and third reading.

THIRD READING OF BILLS

9. No amendment shall be received on the third reading except to fill blanks or to amend titles, without the unanimous consent of the House; and all bills and resolutions may, at any time previous to their passage, be committed or re-committed only by majority votes of the whole House. If any amendment be reported upon by such commitment or re-commitment by any other than a Committee of the Whole, it shall be read a second time, considered in the Committee of the Whole and question for third reading and passage again put.

DISPOSITION OF SENATE BILLS

10. When a Senate file has been received by the House, with a message announcing that the same has passed the Senate, such bill shall be referred to the appropriate standing committee; provided, however, that when a Senate file is received the provisions of which are stated by a member to be identical with those of a House file, which has already been considered by one of the Committees of the House and is on General Orders or the Calendar, such Senate file shall be referred to the Committee on Enrollment and Engrossment for comparison, which committee shall report forthwith whether the said Senate file is identical with the House file. And, if reported identical, such Senate file may, by majority vote, be substituted for the House file (the latter in such case being considered withdrawn) and shall take the place of the House file; provided, however, that the fact that the bills are identical shall be entered on the Journal.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

11. The Committee of the Whole shall mean and include a committee of the entire membership of the House. When the House has arrived at the General Orders of the Day, they shall go into a Committee of the Whole upon General Orders. And unless a particular bill is ordered up, the Committee of the Whole shall consider, act upon or pass the General Orders according to order of their reference.

In forming a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker may appoint a chairman to preside.

Bills committed to the Committee of the Whole shall, in the Committee of the Whole thereon, be first read through, unless the Committee shall otherwise order, and then read and debated by sections, leaving the title to be last considered. All amendments shall be in writing, in triplicate, and reported to the House by the Chairman.

RULES OF THE HOUSE TO APPLY TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

12. The Rules of the House shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as may be applicable, except that the yeas and nays shall not be called, the previous question forced, nor speaking limited.

Provided that in the Committee of the Whole, there shall be a record vote on any amendment increasing the amount or amounts carried by any appropriation bill.

A motion that the committee arise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

GENERAL ORDERS OF THE DAY

13. The Speaker shall cause the Chief Clerk to make out a list of all bills, resolutions and reports of committees, which

have not been made a Special Order, and to number the same. This list shall be called "General Orders of the Day"; and items listed thereon shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the Committee. General Orders, together with all bills included therein required to be printed under the Rules or Orders of the House, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least two days before the same are to be considered in the Committee of the Whole.

Each member of the House shall leave on or under the desk, each time the House adjourns for the day, his file binder for bills. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the House to have placed in each binder one copy of each bill printed under the Rules or Orders of the House at least forty-eight hours before the same shall be considered in the Committee of the Whole, and under the first Order of Business each day said Clerk shall report to the House what bills he has placed in the binders.

If progress is reported on a bill by the Committee for three days, such bills shall go to the foot of General Orders, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote.

SPECIAL ORDERS

14. Bills may be made the Order of the Day for a special time. Such bills shall be entered upon a separate list known as "Special Orders." Bills may be made a Special Order by a two-thirds vote of the whole House upon two days' notice. The motion pursuant to said notice may be made only by the member giving the same or another member designated by him in writing in possession of the Speaker. Such notice shall state the House File number or Senate File number, as the case may be, and the title of the bill to be made a Special Order and shall specify the day upon which the motion for such Special Order is to be made and that such Special Order will be set for a day certain. The time within which said motion may be made pursuant to said notice shall not be extended and if the member giving such notice or the person so designated by him, as the case may be, shall fail to make the motion for a Special Order on the day specified therein, his right to make the same pursuant to said notice shall expire. Appropriation bills introduced by the Appropriations Committee of the House, or by the Finance Committee of the Senate coming into the possession of the House during the last ten days of the Session, may be made a Special Order without notice. A motion to make a bill a Special Order when made as heretofore prescribed, shall be a privileged motion, shall take precedence over all other motions except the motion to fix the time to adjourn, the motion to adjourn and questions of personal privilege, and may be made at any time on the day designated in the notice and shall not be suspended except by a three-fourths vote of the whole House.

Any Special Order, or any part thereof, may be continued or postponed by two-thirds vote of the Whole House at the time of such Special Order.

When the time arrives for the consideration of any Special Order, the House shall proceed to the consideration of the bill or bills upon the said Special Order in the order in which they are respectively listed; and after consideration they shall immediately be read the third time and placed upon final passage.

DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF OFFICERS
AND MEMBERS

DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

15. (a) The Speaker shall preside over the House, and be charged with all the powers and duties pertaining to such presiding officer.

(b) He shall preserve order and decorum, and in case of disorderly conduct or disturbance in the galleries or the lobby, he or the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole may order the same to be cleared.

(c) He shall have general control, except as provided by rule or law of the hall of the House and of the corridors and the passages and of the rooms assigned to the use of the House, until further ordered.

(d) He shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas of or issued by order of the House and all vouchers for the payment of money out of the legislative expense fund of the House, and except as otherwise ordered by the House, money shall be paid out of said fund only upon voucher signed by the Speaker.

The Speaker shall not vote on appeals from his own decisions.

SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

16. The presiding officer may call a member to the chair, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. In the absence of the presiding officer, one of the members shall be selected by a majority vote to preside temporarily until the return of the regular presiding officer.

DUTIES OF MEMBERS

17. When the House adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.

Every member, before speaking, shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the Speaker, but shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the Chair. When two or more members rise at once, the Speaker shall designate which shall speak first.

EXPLAINING OR CHANGING VOTE

18. No member shall be allowed to explain his vote or discuss the question while the yeas and nays are being taken; and no member shall be allowed to change his vote after the same is announced from the Chair.

NAME OF MEMBER OFFERING BILLS,
ETC., TO GO ON JOURNAL

19. In all cases where a bill, order, resolution or motion shall be entered on the Journal of the House, the name of the member offering the same, shall be entered on the Journal.

ABSENCE OF MEMBERS AND OFFICERS

20. No member or officer of the House shall, unless from illness or some other sufficient cause he be unable to attend, absent himself from any session of the House during the entire day without having first obtained leave of absence from the Speaker.

DUTIES OF THE CHIEF CLERK AND
ASSISTANTS OR EMPLOYEES

21. Neither the Chief Clerk nor his assistants or employees shall permit any rec-

ords or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody otherwise than in the regular course of business. The Chief Clerk shall report any missing papers to the Speaker. He shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House; shall perform under the direction of the Speaker, all the duties pertaining to his office, and shall keep a book showing the situation and progress of bills, memorials, and joint resolutions.

CLERICAL CORRECTIONS TO BILLS

22. (a) Minor clerical errors in any bill, memorial or resolution, such as errors in orthography or grammar, or the incorrect use of one word for another (as "affect" for "effect"), or wrong numbering of references, whether such errors occur in the original bill or any amendment thereto, shall be corrected by the Chief Clerk, as a matter of course, upon the approval of the Chairman of any committee to which the bill was referred.

(b) The Chief Clerk shall insert the enacting clause in any bill before its passage if the same shall have been omitted.

(c) Any corrections made by the Chief Clerk under this rule shall be noted by him in the Journal.

(d) Webster's New International Dictionary shall be the standard authority in matters falling under the above rules.

NO ONE TO REMAIN BY THE
CLERK'S DESK

23. No member, or other person, shall remain by the Clerk's desk when the yeas and nays are being called.

DUTIES OF THE SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

24. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to execute all orders of the House or of its presiding officer; to perform all duties that may, from time to time, be assigned to him connected with the policing and good order of the House; to exercise supervision over the ingress and egress of all persons to and from the Chamber; to see that all messages, etc., are promptly executed; and that the hall is properly ventilated and open for the use of the members; and to perform all other services pertaining to the office of Sergeant-at-Arms.

MOTIONS TO RECESS

25. All motions to recess for the purpose of granting the privilege to any person or persons to appear before the House during said recess shall be referred to the Committee on Rules, and no such motion shall be acted upon without a favorable report from said committee.

ORDER IN DEBATE

26. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every other member wishing to speak on the pending question shall have spoken.

MOTIONS

27. No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the Speaker before debate, and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any other member requires it.

After a motion has been stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the House, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before

amendment or decision; but all motions, resolutions or amendments shall be entered in the Journal unless withdrawn the same day.

MOTION TO ADJOURN

28. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except during roll call.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state any fact to the House, relative to the condition of the business of the House, which would seem to render it improper to adjourn at that time. Such statement, however, shall not be debatable and shall not, in any case, occupy more than two minutes.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

29. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but:

1. Fix time to which to adjourn.
2. To adjourn
3. To lay on the table.
4. For the previous question.
(Which four motions shall be decided without debate.)
5. To commit.
6. To postpone to a day certain.
7. To amend.
8. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order; but the previous question having been seconded, and the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION

30. (a) The previous question shall be in this form: "The Gentleman from..... moves the previous question. Do fifteen members second the motion?" If the motion be properly seconded, the question shall be stated as follows: "As many as are in favor of ordering the previous question will say 'aye'; as many as are opposed will say 'no'." There shall be a motion for the previous question, which, being ordered by a majority of all members present, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the House to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions upon which it has been ordered.

The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules or an amendment or amendments; or it may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection.

(b) On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after a majority shall have ordered the previous question, no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question.

(c) When the previous question is decided in the negative it shall leave the main question under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking a vote, on the question or in some other manner.

INCIDENTAL QUESTIONS OF ORDER

31. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, during the pendency of such motion, or after the House shall have deter-

mined that the main question now be put, shall be decided whether on appeal or otherwise without debate.

PETITIONS, ETC.—HOW PRESENTED

32. Petitions, memorials and other papers presented to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or member in his place, and a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made verbally and endorsed thereon, together with the name of the member introducing the same.

EVERY MEMBER TO VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED

33. Every member who shall be present before the vote is declared from the chair, shall vote for or against the matter before the House, unless the House shall excuse him, or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.

PROCEDURE IN EXCUSING MEMBER FROM VOTING

34. When a member declines to vote on a call of his name, he shall be required to assign his reasons therefor; and having assigned them, the presiding officer shall submit the question to the House, "Shall the member, for the reasons assigned by him, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate. And these proceedings shall be had after the vote has been taken and before the chair has announced the vote, and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.

ORDER DURING SESSION

35. When the Speaker is putting the question, no member shall walk out of or across the House, nor when a member is speaking shall any other member entertain any private discourse or pass between the speaking member and the chair.

ORDER OF PUTTING QUESTIONS

36. All questions, whether in committee or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions, and in filling up blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

DIVISION OF A QUESTION

37. If the question in debate contains several points any member may have the question divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

QUESTIONS OF ORDER

38. If any member of the House, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules, the Speaker shall (or any member may) call him to order, in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted on motion of another member to explain, and the House, if appealed to, shall decide in either case without debate. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

CALLED TO ORDER FOR OFFENSIVE WORDS IN DEBATE

39. If any member be called to order for offensive words in debate the person calling him to order shall report the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the clerk's desk and no member shall be held to answer, or be subjected to the censure of the House, for language used in debate if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exception to them shall have been taken.

MEMBERS MAY DEMAND YEAS AND NAYS

40. The yeas and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by 15 members, except upon final passage of bills, joint resolutions, and motions directing the payment of money. In these cases yeas and nays shall be ordered without demand.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DEBATE

41. Upon any member giving notice of his intention to debate any resolution, the same shall lie over one day without debate or any other action. This notice of intention to debate may be given at any time before the vote is taken on the resolution.

CALL OF THE HOUSE

42. Ten members may demand a call of the House and require absent members to be sent for; but a call of the House cannot be made after the voting has commenced, and such call being ordered, the doors shall be closed and no member permitted to leave the chamber until the call is suspended. And, pending the call, no motion shall be in order, except it pertains to matters incidental to the call or motion to suspend further proceedings under the same, provided that the call shall not be suspended until a record of those present has been completed. Thereafter the call may be suspended by majority vote of the whole House only when all members are present or at any time by a two-thirds vote of the whole House. After the call of the House has been ordered and proceedings thereunder are suspended, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall not permit any member to leave the chamber unless excused by the Speaker.

SUSPENSION OF THE RULES TO HASTEN A BILL

43. Every bill shall be read on three different days, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the whole House deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; and no bill shall be passed until it shall have been read at length twice, provided that no motion for suspension of the rules to advance a bill for consideration out of its regular order shall be made or entertained unless presented to the Speaker in writing stating the present position of the bill and then only under the order of business "Motions and Resolutions," as such order of business is reached under Rule 3. Unanimous consent must be first obtained by the member making the motion before the Speaker can entertain the motion to suspend the rules at any other time.

A motion to suspend the rules together with the subject matter to which it pertains shall be open to debate but the previous question may be applied thereto.

UNANIMOUS CONSENT TO MAKE A MOTION

44. Whenever unanimous consent to make a motion is requested by a member, the member as a part of such request shall state briefly the purpose of such motion and the subject matter involved.

PROCEEDINGS ON THE PASSAGE OF RESOLUTIONS INVOLVING THE EXPENDITURE OF MONEY, AND OF JOINT RESOLUTIONS

45a. No resolution involving the expenditure of money out of the legislative expense fund or otherwise, or joint resolution, shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House, to be determined by a roll call. All resolutions and motions involving the expenditure of money out of the legislative expense fund shall be referred to the Rules Committee before being acted upon by the House.

MOTIONS AND PROPOSITIONS TO BE GERMANE

45b. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of its being an amendment.

AMENDMENT NOT TO ANNEX ANOTHER BILL

45c. No bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto or incorporating therein any other bill or resolution pending before the House.

AMENDMENTS TO APPROPRIATION BILLS

46. No amendment increasing the amount or amounts carried by any appropriation bill shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of all members elected to the House.

MOTION FOR RECONSIDERATION

47. When a question has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof; but no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after a bill, resolution, message, report, or other official action upon which the vote was taken shall have gone out of the possession of the House, announcing their decision. Nor shall any motion for reconsideration be in order unless made on the same day upon which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of actual session of the House thereafter.

Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions, except the motion to adjourn; provided, that when notice of intention to move such reconsideration shall be given by a member, the Clerk of the House shall retain the said bill, resolution, message, report, or other official action, until after the expiration of the time during which such motion can be made, as hereinbefore provided, unless the same is previously disposed of. Such notice of intention to move reconsideration shall have precedence over the motion to reconsider, except that it shall be in order for any member who voted on the prevailing side to make the motion to reconsider on the last day allowed for the making thereof, unless the same has been

previously disposed of. A motion for reconsideration having been put and lost shall not be renewed.

THE MOTION TO RESCIND

48. The motion to rescind shall not be in order at any time in any proceeding in the House or of any committee thereof.

AUTHORIZED MANUAL OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE

49. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual shall govern the House in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and orders of the House, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

50. Standing Committees shall be appointed by the speaker as follows:

PURCHASING SUPPLIES

51. The Chief Clerk shall be the agent of the House of Representatives for the purchase of supplies. Before making purchases, however, it shall be his duty to consult with and get prices from the Commissioner of Administration of the State of Minnesota and then submit the same to the Rules Committee together with a list of necessary supplies, and the prices for which the same can be secured, which supplies shall then be purchased by the Chief Clerk upon the approval of the Rules Committee.

COMMITTEE ON ENGROSSMENT AND ENROLLMENT

52. The Committee on Engrossment and

Enrollment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed, and report the same to the House "correctly engrossed" before the third reading. The said Committee may report at any time, and all bills shall be engrossed in typewriting.

The Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment shall examine all House bills, memorials, and joint resolutions which have passed the two houses and when reported "correctly enrolled" they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the two houses for their signatures; and when so signed, to the Governor for his approval. The said Committee may report at any time, but it shall not report any bill as correctly enrolled which has the words interlined therein; or when any words have been erased therefrom and all bills shall be enrolled in typewriting. The Chairman of said Committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record showing the hour and date of the receipt by it of each bill and its return to the House and all bills shall be returned in the same order as that in which they are received.

COMMITTEE OF CONFERENCE

53. A Committee of Conference may report at any time. No committee except the Committee of Conference and the Committee on Rules shall sit during the sitting of the House without leave.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES

54. Special committees to whom reference shall be made shall in all cases report a state of facts and their opinions thereupon, to the House.

MEETING OF COMMITTEES

55. The Chief Clerk of the House after conference with the chairmen of the various committees of the House shall prepare a schedule of committee meetings, fixing as far as practicable the date and hour which will be the regular meeting time of each committee to be first approved by a majority of the House. Should it be necessary to hold a special meeting or for any reason change temporarily the regular meeting of the committee, the notice by the chairman of said committee of such change shall be read from the desk at least one day in advance thereof, and also posted upon the bulletin board at the same time, or on a majority vote of the House, fixing the time therefor at any time. Any committee shall have the right to change the time of its meeting.

TIME LIMIT FOR CONSIDERATION OF BILLS

56. Fifteen legislative days after a bill has been referred to committee (other than a bill for appropriations or claims) and no report has been made upon the same by such committee, the author thereof may request that such bill be returned to the House and such request shall be entered in the Journal for the day. Such committee shall then have seven calendar days thereafter in which to report back the bill requested. If the committee shall fail to report such bill back within such seven days, such author may at any time during a legislative session within five calendar days after the expiration of such seven days in writing presented to the Speaker, demand the return forthwith to the House of the bill in question.

which demand shall forthwith be entered in the Journal for the day and shall constitute the demand of the House and thereupon such bill shall at once be considered to be in possession of the House and shall be placed at the foot of General Orders for the following day in the manner prescribed by Rule 13 subject to re-reference by the House. A motion for such re-reference if made on the day of such demand or within one legislative day thereafter shall take precedence over all other motions except privileged motions and shall be in order at any time.

The House may recall any bill from any committee at any time, give the same its second reading and advance the same to General Orders by a majority vote of the whole House.

SUBSTITUTIONS OF BILLS

57. No standing or special committee, nor any member or members thereof, shall report any substitute for any bill or bills referred to such committee, which substitute relates to a different subject or is intended to accomplish a different purpose from that of the original bill for which it is reported or which, if adopted and passed, would require a title essentially different from the title of the original bill; and every substitute bill so reported shall be rejected whenever the House is advised that the same is in violation of this rule. This rule shall not be suspended without the unanimous consent of the House.

EMPLOYEES

58. All propositions for the appointment of employees of the House, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. No appointments shall be made unless favorably reported upon by such Committee or its report be overruled by three-fourths vote of the House. All employees shall be paid on the basis of seven days a week at the compensation of \$7.00 per day unless otherwise specified.

- to be appointed by the Speaker or to be designated by the Speaker from among the three sergeants-at-arms elected by the House.

Any employee of the House may be assigned to other duties, suspended or discharged at any time by the Committee on Rules.

This rule shall not be construed as authorizing the employment or appointment of any employee named therein in case any employee has been appointed or authorized to be appointed or engaged by this House for such position by any rule or resolution heretofore adopted. No clerk shall be appointed for any of the committees named in this rule unless the necessity for the same is recommended by the Committee on Rules; and no clerk of the said Committee and no employee of this House shall receive any pay for any time prior to the date of appointment; and no employee or clerk mentioned in this rule shall receive any pay, compensation, gratuity or reward over and above salary named therein except upon approval of a three-fourths vote of the whole House.

No employee shall make or permit to be made any copy or copies of any journals, bills, papers, files, records or documents in his or her possession or custody or to which he or she has access, except it be upon the request of some member of the House. No journal, bill, paper, file, record or document, or copy thereof, belonging to or in the possession or custody of the House shall be furnished, or delivered to any person other than a member of the House except by or through the Chief Clerk with the approval and under the direction of the Rules Committee, and upon such terms as the Rules Committee shall prescribe and otherwise in accordance with the rules of the House, provided that this rule shall not apply to members of the House. All moneys received for any matter or service herein referred to shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the Legislative Expense Fund of the House. Any violation of this rule shall operate as a removal or discharge of the person offending.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES VOTE REQUIRED TO SUSPEND RULES

- 59. No rule of the House shall be suspend-

ed, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the whole House, except Rules 57 and 58, which shall require the concurrence of three-fourths of all the members of the whole House. But the Committee on Rules may report at any time and any rule so reported may be adopted by the majority of the House.

PRINTING OF BILLS

60. All bills of general nature, including all bills appropriating money or lands shall be printed, provided that no bill shall be printed until after the same shall have been favorably reported by the committee to which it shall have been referred unless ordered printed by a majority vote of the House.

In case of bills received from the Senate which have been amended in the Senate after having been printed by that body, it shall be the duty of the Committee of the House to which the same are referred to make a report to the House as to the advisability or inadvisability of having the same printed. All Committee Chairmen shall be furnished with a copy of this rule.

NEWSPAPER REPORTERS

61. Because of the limited space available on the floor of the House, the Associated Press, United Press, the St. Paul Pioneer Press, the St. Paul Dispatch, the Minneapolis Star-Journal, The Minneapolis Morning Tribune, the Duluth News-Tribune, the Duluth Herald and Radio Stations located in Minnesota licensed to operate at 5000 KW or more shall each be permitted representation at the press table by one regular reporter whose credentials are approved by the Rules Committee. Any person wishing to report proceedings of the House may apply to the Rules Committee for assignment to suitable, available space.

WHO MAY BE ADMITTED ON THE FLOOR

62. No person or persons shall be admitted within the House Chamber, corridors, or retiring room, except the members themselves, the properly authorized employees, the Chief Executive and ex-governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the Senate, the heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme and District Courts, members of Congress, the properly accredited representatives of the radio stations, newspapers and press associations, as herein provided for, and none other. When former members of Congress or the Minnesota Legislature or any other persons are personally introduced to the Speaker by members of the House, the Speaker may issue a permit good for the day to such persons, after having satisfied himself that such person does not seek the floor of the House for the purpose of directing or using his influence upon any measure pending or otherwise before the House. It is expressly directed that the Sergeant-at-Arms shall keep the alcoves cleared (the alcoves shall be kept for members only) and at no time when the House is in session can visitors on the floor of the House who are guests of members thereof occupy the alcoves, but such persons when admitted shall be provided with a seat near the Speaker's rostrum, and at no time shall a conversation be carried on to disturb the business of the House.

It shall not be in order for the Speaker to entertain a request for the suspension of

this rule, or to present from the chair the request of any member for unanimous consent unless, however, an extraordinary condition exists, in which event he may consent to entertain a motion for its suspension.

CONSTRUCTION, RULE AS TO

63. In consideration of the terms "majority vote", "vote of the House", and "vote of the whole House", as used in these rules, the first two phrases shall be deemed a majority of the members present at the particular time, and the last phrase to mean a majority vote of all the members elected to the House at the particular session of the Legislature.

Words used in these Rules in the singular shall include the plural, unless the context indicates a contrary intention.

BULLETIN BOARD

64. The Chief Clerk shall prepare a bulletin board, upon which shall be posted a list of committee meetings and any other announcements or notice the House may require.

TOPICAL INDEX

65. The Index Clerk, under the supervision of the Chief Clerk, shall prepare a topical card index, in which bills may be indexed by number, author, subject, section of the code amended, the committees and any other subject that will make it a complete and comprehensive index, and to be made a permanent file to be used by all succeeding Chief Clerks. The topical index shall be filed with the Secretary of State after the expiration of the session of the Legislature and the cards constituting the record shall be retained open for public inspection at all times.

VISITING PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS

66. No leave of absence shall be granted any committee, special or standing, to visit any public institution of the state, or for any other purpose. Whenever any committee shall report to the House that it is desirable that such committee receive information concerning a public institution, the House may, by a majority vote of the whole House, grant a leave of absence to not more than three members of such committee, to be designated by the chairman thereof. Application for a leave of absence of such members of a committee shall be made to the House in writing, by the chairman thereof, and such application shall give the name of the institution or institutions to be visited and to briefly recite the occasion and necessity for visiting the same, together with the names of the committeemen designated for that purpose and the name of the stenographer to accompany such committeemen if one is necessary. Such application shall immediately and without debate be referred to the Committee on Rules, with instructions to report upon the same on the next legislative day. Said members and their stenographers, if any, shall be allowed their actual expenses.

AUTHORIZING ELECTRICAL DEVICE

67. Unless otherwise ordered any vote, except upon elections and upon the overriding of a Governor's veto, may be taken by means of the electrical voting system which shall be under the control of the Speaker of the House.

JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE

1951

JOINT CONVENTIONS—HOW GOVERNED

Rule 1. The Speaker of the House shall preside at all conventions of the two branches of the Legislature, and shall call the members to order. The Chief Clerk of the House shall be the secretary, and the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House shall be the Sergeant-at-Arms at the Convention.

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT

Rule 2. The President of the convention shall preserve order and decorum, may speak on all points of order in preference to other members; shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the convention by any member. He shall rise to put a question, but may state it sitting.

QUESTIONS—HOW STATED

Rule 3. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be), say 'Aye,'" and after an affirmative vote is expressed, "As many as are of the contrary opinion, say 'No.'" If the President doubts, or a division be called, the convention shall decide—those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise and afterwards those in the negative.

PRESIDENT'S RIGHT TO VOTE

Rule 4. The President shall have the right of voting in all cases except on an appeal from the decisions, and on all questions he shall vote last.

ORDER OF DEBATE

Rule 5. When any member is about to speak or deliver any matter to the convention, he shall rise and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and confine himself to the question under debate and avoid personalities.

Rule 6. Whenever any member is called to order he shall be seated until the point of order is determined; and if called to order for words spoken in debate the exceptional words shall be reduced to writing immediately.

Rule 7. When two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall name the member who is in order.

Rule 8. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question, without permission of the convention.

CALL OF THE CONVENTION

Rule 9. Any five members may move a call of the convention and require absent members to be sent for, but a call cannot be made after voting is commenced; and a call being ordered and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed and no member permitted to leave the hall until the report of the Sergeant-at-Arms be received and acted upon, or further proceedings under the call are suspended by a vote of the majority of all the members of the convention.

EITHER HOUSE MAY AMEND, ETC.

Rule 10. It shall be in the power of either House to amend any amendment made by the other to any bill or resolution.

BILLS—HOW ENROLLED AND SIGNED

Rule 11. After a bill, memorial or resolution shall have passed both Houses, it shall be duly enrolled in typewriting by the enrolling clerk of the House in which it originated. The Senate and House Committees on Enrolled Bills, acting jointly, shall then carefully compare the enrollment with the engrossed copies as passed by the two Houses, and after correcting all errors that may be discovered in the enrollment, report the same as correctly enrolled to their respective Houses. They shall then obtain the signatures and certificates of the proper officers to the enrolled copies, present the same to the Governor for his approval, and report the date of such presentation to their respective Houses.

ELECTIONS BY JOINT CONVENTIONS

Rule 12. Whenever there shall be an election of any officer in Joint Convention, the result shall be certified by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, and by them announced to their respective Houses, and shall be entered on the Journal of each and communicated to the Governor by the Secretary of the convention.

COMMITTEES OF CONFERENCE

Rule 13. In all cases of disagreement between the Senate and House on amendments, adopted by either House to a bill, memorial or resolution passed by the other House, a Committee of Conference, consisting of not less than three members, nor more than five members from each House, may be requested by either House, and the other House shall appoint a similar committee. The manner of procedure shall be as follows: The Senate, for instance, passes a bill and it is duly transmitted to the House, which body adopts an amendment to the bill and passes the bill as amended, returning the same with the record of the actions of the House, to the Senate; the Senate refuses to concur in the House amendment, asks for a

Committee of Conference, appoints such a committee on the part of the Senate, and with a record of the action of the Senate, returns the bill to the House; if the House adheres to its amendment, a like committee is appointed on the part of the House. The joint committee shall at a convenient hour agreed upon meet and state to each other, verbally or in writing, the reason of their respective Houses for or against the disagreement, and confer thereon, and shall report to both Houses such agreement as they may arrive at, if any—and if not, the fact of a disagreement. The House last having possession of the bill before the conference commences shall first act upon such report, if an agreement is reported, and duly transmit the same with the record of its action thereon to the other House together with the bill.

EITHER HOUSE MAY RECEDE, ETC.

Rule 14. It shall be in order for either House to recede from any subject or matter of difference existing between the two Houses at any time previous to a conference, whether the papers upon which the difference has arisen are before it or not, and a majority shall govern, except in cases otherwise provided in the constitution; and the question having been put and lost, shall not be again put upon the same day, and a reconsideration thereof shall in all respects be regulated by the rules of the respective Houses.

APPROPRIATIONS OF MONEY—HOW MADE

Rule 15. The same bill shall not appropriate public money or property to more than one local or private purpose.

A bill for legislative expense shall be passed in both branches of the Legislature in the same manner as other bills carrying an appropriation are passed, and approved by the Governor, and the fund provided by such appropriation shall be designated as the "Legislative Expense Fund" from which money shall be paid out by the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the House as herein provided.

Payment out of the Legislative Expense Fund for all supplies for the Senate shall be made upon proper certification by the Secretary of the Senate, upon approval of the Senate Committee on Rules and Legislative Expense.

Payment out of the Legislative Expense Fund for all supplies for the House of Representatives shall be made upon proper certification by the Chief Clerk of the House upon approval of the House Committee on Rules.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House with the approval of the Speaker of the House, are each hereby authorized and empowered to employ from the stenographic and clerical force of the Senate and House respectively, for not to exceed five days after the close of the Session, such employees as may be necessary to finish the business of the Legislature for such Session, at salaries not to exceed the salaries paid such employees under the rules of the Senate or House, as the case may be.

Persons so employed by the Secretary of the Senate shall upon proper certification by the Secretary of the Senate, and persons so employed by the Chief Clerk of the House shall upon proper certification by the Chief Clerk of the House, be paid for such services out of the Legislative Expense Fund of the Legislature for such Session.

No certificate authorizing the payment of any money appropriated by the Legislature shall be issued by the Secretary of the Senate or by the Clerk of the House by virtue of any motion or resolution, unless such motion or resolution shall have been carried by a majority of all members of the House in which it was introduced.

No cause appropriating money for a local or private purpose shall be contained in a bill appropriating money for the state government or public institutions, and all resolutions authorizing the issuing of certificates by the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the House for the payment of money shall be upon the call of the "yeas" and "nays."

Within sixty legislative days after the convening of the Legislature in regular session and at least twenty days prior to the adjournment thereof, the Committee on Finance of the Senate and the Committee on Appropriations of the House shall report to their respective Houses six separate appropriation bills as follows:

1. A bill appropriating money for the general administrative and judicial expenses of the state government for the succeeding two fiscal years including salaries, office expenses and supplies and other necessary expenses connected therewith.

2. A bill appropriating money for the support and maintenance of all state penal and charitable institutions, and other institutions of the state except educational for the two succeeding fiscal years.

3. A bill appropriating money for the support and maintenance of all state educational institutions for the two succeeding fiscal years.

4. A bill covering all appropriations providing for the payment of claims against the State of Minnesota which may have been allowed by the Finance Committee of the Senate or the Appropriations Committee of the House.

5. A bill covering all appropriations made to aid in the maintenance of state or county fairs including parks, fish hatcheries and other semi-state activities.

6. A bill covering all appropriations relating to public welfare.

No other appropriations shall be contained in any of said bills but all other appropriations shall be contained in separate bills.

RULES OF JOINT CONVENTION

Rule 16. The rules of the House shall be the rules of the Joint Convention of both Houses in all cases where the foregoing rules are not applicable.

TITLE OF BILLS SHALL EXPRESS THEIR SUBJECT

Rule 17. The subject of each bill shall be clearly expressed in the title and when a bill is amendatory of an existing act, it shall not be sufficient to refer to the chapter, section or page, but the subject thereof shall be clearly stated.

MINNESOTA

A BRIEF SKETCH OF MINNESOTA HISTORY

The development of Minnesota has been conditioned to no slight degree by the glaciers that in the ice ages covered most of its area. Their story is written in the thousands of lakes left in their wake; in the terminal moraines that rise as bluffs and mounds to give a varied aspect to the scenery; and in the deep rich soil, ground fine by the age-long passage of ice rivers. Glacial action may even explain the presence in eastern and northern Minnesota of splendid pine and hardwood forests; and it may account for the absence of trees on the prairies that stretch away to the south and west.

French, English, and American explorers found their way into the region at surprisingly early dates through the innumerable waterways left as glacial imprints. By the main highways of water that lead into the heart of Minnesota—the Red, the St. Louis, the Pigeon, and the Mississippi and its Tributaries, the Minnesota and the St. Croix—came traders in their light birch canoes, lured by the treasures of furs and skins that brought fortunes in distant European and Asiatic markets; explorers to seek the elusive Northwest Passage or to set up claims to an inland empire; and settlers who were to build the foundations of a commonwealth. These lakes and streams not only have influenced the course of Minnesota's history, but they have also by their beauty entered into the very concept of "Minnesota," an Indian name probably meaning "cloud-tinted water."

Scarcely were the Pilgrim Fathers settled on their rocky shore when the exploration of the Minnesota region began. Who the white man was that first trod its soil may never be known, but Radisson and Groseilliers seem to have been the first to leave written records of their visits. Radisson's narratives of his "voyages" into the "upper country" not long after the middle of the seventeenth century record vividly the life of the native tribes at the beginning of their contacts with the white men and before the clashes between the Sioux and Chippewa Indians that pushed the former back from Lake Superior and from the region of Wisconsin. The Chippewa, armed with guns and ammunition, forced the Sioux to retreat continually toward the west and south, until when British and American traders reached the headwaters of the Mississippi after the close of the French regime in 1763, the Chippewa were living in the former habitat of the Sioux, and the latter had become a prairie tribe with an inveterate hatred for their Chippewa aggressors.

Best known among the many Frenchmen who made their way into the Northwest after the visits of Radisson and Groseilliers were Nicolas Perrot, who in 1686 built a fort on the shores of Lake Pepin and took possession of the region in the name of the king of France; Du Lhut, who between 1679 and 1689 explored the country between the Kaministiquia, the Mississippi, and the St. Croix rivers and exercised a wise restraint over the savage tribes of the region; Michael Accault and Father Hennepin, who explored the upper Mississippi in 1680, when Hennepin discovered and named the Falls of St. Anthony; Le Sueur, a companion of Perrot at Lake Pepin in 1686, who built a post on Prairie Island in 1695 and Fort L'Huillier on the Blue Earth River in 1700; and the knightly La Verendrye, who with his sons and his nephew, La Jemeraye, opened the great canoe route from Lake Superior to Lake Winnipeg between 1731 and 1743.

Peace between Great Britain and France in 1763 brought eastern Minnesota under the British flag. It brought also freer trade with the Indians, and as a result many traders built their palisaded forts on Minnesota rivers and lakes. Two interesting figures of the British

regime were Jonathan Carver and Peter Pond. Carver spent the winter of 1766-67 on the Minnesota River and during the following summer journeyed from Prairie du Chien to Grand Portage with Captain James Tute's expedition, which, inspired by Robert Rogers of Mackinac, intended to cross the continent in quest of the Northwest Passage. The plan had to be given up, but Carver later wrote and published an account of his travels which became a "best seller" of its day and gave to thousands on both sides of the Atlantic their first information about the Minnesota country. Pond, a Connecticut Yankee, spent two successive winters as a fur trader on the Minnesota River, beginning in 1773. Other traders operating in Minnesota during the British period were Jean Baptiste Perrault, who from 1783 to 1800 was an almost constant sojourner in this promised land of the fur traders; and Jean Baptiste Cadotte, who is believed to have opened to British traders the contested territory between the Sioux and the Chippewa in central and western Minnesota. Through northern Minnesota from the Red River to Lake Superior in the winter of 1797-98 passed David Thompson, a trader for the Northwest Company, who was also employed in determining scientifically the location of the forty-ninth parallel. His travels for the combined purpose of trade and exploration resulted in a great map of northwestern North America, and the diaries in which he recorded his observations are the earliest scientific data known to be extant on Minnesota topography.

The peace of 1783 granted to the United States the region between the Mississippi and Lake Superior, but British traders continued to ply their trade and to maintain their forts in the area until after the War of 1812, when Congress passed an act prohibiting foreigners from serving as chief traders in the fur trade of the United States. After 1816 the Northwest Company passed from the Minnesota scene, and the American Fur Company, which had been incorporated by John Jacob Astor in 1808, took up the business of exploiting Minnesota's fur resources.

To protect American traders in the region a military post originally known as Fort St. Anthony and later called Fort Snelling was established in 1819 as part of a broad scheme of frontier defense. The land on which this fort was built was obtained from the Sioux in a treaty made in 1805 by Lieutenant Zebulon M. Pike. After the Louisiana Purchase had made Minnesota west of the Mississippi American territory, Pike was sent into the region to explore the headwaters of the Mississippi, conciliate the Indians, and obtain fort sites. His selection of the site at the mouth of the Minnesota River was approved in 1817 by Major Stephen H. Long while engaged in a government reconnaissance.

With the establishment of Fort Snelling a new era began for the Minnesota country. Trade relations were opened with the Selkirk colony on the lower Red River in Canada; steamboats appeared on the Mississippi in 1823, making possible communication with the settlements to the south and east; an Indian agent, Lawrence Taliaferro, settled at the fort and exercised a wise influence over the savage tribes for twenty years; and explorers made the fort the objective or point of departure for their expeditions. Among the explorers who stopped at Fort Snelling may be mentioned Governor Lewis Cass, who attempted to find the source of the Mississippi in 1820; Giacomo C. Beltrami, an Italian explorer, who three years later sought the same objective; Major Long, whose second Minnesota journey in 1823 took him up the Minnesota and down the Red River; Henry R. Schoolcraft, who discovered Lake Itasca, the source of the Mississippi, in 1832; George Catlin, whose journey of 1836 took him to the famous pipestone quarry; Joseph N. Nicollet, whose tours in the late thirties resulted in the first scientifically accurate map of the present area of Minnesota; and

Major Samuel Woods, who marched with dragoons through the Red River country in 1849.

Just at the time of the founding of the fort missionaries began to appear among the Sioux and Chippewa Indians. The Catholics, Dumoulin and Edge, were at Rainy Lake and Pembina as early as 1818. They were followed in 1829 by the Presbyterians, Coe and Stevens, and in 1831 and 1833 by the Congregationalists, Ayer, Ely, and Boutwell. In 1836 three Swiss Protestants, Gavin, Dentan, and Rossier, began a mission station at Red Wing's village; and the following year the Methodist elder, Brunson, opened a station at Kaposia. Other prominent missionaries were Dr. Williamson, Stephen Riggs, Father Ravoux, and Gideon and Samuel Pond, who labored among the Sioux; and Father Pierz, who established a church and school at Grand Portage in the early forties.

For some years before the arrival of Father Ravoux at St. Peter's, settlers had been collecting about the fort. Many of them were old voyageurs, and others were colonists from the Red River settlements. Hither in 1834 came a man who was destined for an important role in Minnesota history—Henry H. Sibley, the agent of the great American Fur Company. The Reverend Lucian Galtier came as priest to the Catholic populace in 1840 and built a little log church across the river from St. Peter's, by that time called Mendota. This chapel he dedicated in 1841 to the great missionary apostle, and from the church the settlement round about took the name St. Paul.

Meanwhile other settlements of whites had begun. In 1837 the United States government had purchased from the Indians the triangle of land between the lower St. Croix and the Mississippi, and at once lumbering camps began to dot the pine forests. Settlements began at Dakota (Stillwater), Marine, and St. Croix Falls; and in 1848 a land boom started at St. Paul. Within a year immigration had increased the population to the number requisite for a territory; and in 1849 this region, which, in whole or in part, had been successively a portion of the French, English, and Spanish empires, the Northwest Territory, and the territories of Louisiana, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri, Iowa, and Wisconsin, came into the Union as Minnesota Territory, with Alexander Ramsey of Pennsylvania as its first governor.

From 1849 to 1858 Minnesota remained a territory. This period witnessed the establishment of counties, the building of roads, the survey and sale of large tracts of the public domain, the extensive development of the lumber industry, and, in general, the laying of the foundations of a frontier state. One of the usual prerequisites for such a foundation is land, and until 1851 most of the land in Minnesota had not been secured from the Indians. In that year the treaties of Traverse des Sioux and Mendota opened for settlement a large tract of land in the southern and western portions of the territory, which had been occupied by the Sioux; and in 1854 and 1855 the Chippewa Indians likewise yielded up a large area in the northeastern and north central parts of the territory. The former region was wanted by settlers, the latter by lumber interests.

After 1851 the settlement of southeastern Minnesota was rapid, especially along the valleys of the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers. The majority of settlers in the years before the Civil War were native Americans, largely New Englanders, New Yorkers, and Pennsylvanians. Many of them came in colonies or townsites parties, and the new hamlets had much of the tone of eastern villages. Education was stressed from the start, both by the territorial legislature, which in its first session evolved a comprehensive system of free public schools and in 1851 passed an act to incorporate the University of Minnesota, and by religious bodies like the Methodists and the Benedictine monks,

who in 1854 and 1857, respectively, established Hamline University and St. John's University. Another characteristic of these frontier settlements was the prevalence of lyceums, reading circles, and lecture programs. A high standard was set for journalism by the early newspapers, particularly by the first newspaper, the Minnesota Pioneer, established in 1849 at St. Paul by James M. Goodhue.

Immigration was stimulated by the territorial government, which appointed a board of immigration, and by transportation agencies. This was the heyday of steamboats on the upper Mississippi, which brought settlers up the river from Galena, Dunleith, or St. Louis. A great desire for railroads was felt and expressed, but the panic of 1857 and the Civil War retarded the early movement in this direction. Even before the war, however, the immigration of Irish, Germans, Norwegians, Swedes, and other nationalities had begun, and the movement increased for many years.

By 1857 settlement had progressed so far that statehood was a possibility. The desire for land grants, which Congress could be expected to make only to states, and the need of representatives in Congress to urge the building of a Pacific railroad through Minnesota led in that year to a demand for statehood. The story of the rival conventions, Democratic and Republican, that met in St. Paul, in July, 1857, held separate sessions, and produced two constitutions almost identical in phrasing is a dramatic one. Even more so is that of how Congress kept Minnesota standing before the portals until "Bleeding Kansas" had been ministered unto, despite all Stephen A. Douglas' efforts in Minnesota's behalf. Finally, after almost a year of waiting, on May 11, 1858, Minnesota took its place among the states.

Immigration from the East and from Europe went on apace, even after the outbreak of the Civil War, but in 1862, a rude setback was experienced. In August of that year the Sioux Indians, goaded by the lack of food, the tardiness of their annual payment, and other causes, rose against the whites and massacred scores of helpless settlers in the Minnesota Valley. Fort Ridgely and New Ulm were besieged and many cabins and settlements were attacked. Two important engagements with soldiers sent out from St. Paul under General Sibley were necessary before the Sioux were quelled. Most of the Indians who did not escape to the plains or to Canada were captured and sent to a reservation beyond the boundaries of the state. Thirty-eight of those found guilty of gross offenses were hanged. Many of the newer settlements were almost depopulated as a result of this uprising and it was many years before the hysteria and hatred of the Indian to which it gave rise were obliterated.

The settlement of Minnesota continued until the early 20th century. First the southeast and middle sections of the state were settled, then the south and west, and finally, the northeast, which still remains sparsely populated. Earlier immigrants came from northern Europe; in the later period there were added to Minnesota's population Finns, Poles, Czechs, Slovaks, Russians, Italians, Greeks, and other nationalities.

The building of railroads in the state began with ten miles of road completed between St. Paul and St. Anthony in 1862. This line was constructed by the St. Paul and Pacific, the road that was reorganized under the leadership of James J. Hill in 1879 and eventually became the Great Northern. The first road to connect Minnesota with the Pacific coast, the Northern Pacific, was completed under the guidance of Henry Villard in 1883.

During the years following the Civil War the lumber resources of the state were intensively exploited. Minneapolis and Duluth owed their rapid growth during the seventies and eighties in part to the

milling and shipping of lumber. In 1905 the production of lumber reached its peak with the cutting of two billion feet of timber.

In the early sixties agriculture in Minnesota emerged from the frontier subsistence type of farming and in the next two decades developed into commercial farming, devoted largely to a single crop. The state became one of the world's great wheat-producing centers. Beginning in 1880, however, wheat gradually gave way to corn as the staple produce, and agriculture became diversified. Dairying did not become an important industry in Minnesota until the early eighties, but its development since then has been rapid. Minnesota ranks high among the states in the production of milk, butter, and eggs, and there has been a remarkable growth of marketing through farmers' co-operative creameries. The rise and decline of wheat raising in Minnesota are reflected in the story of the Minneapolis flour mills. Between 1870 and 1890 they gained a position of undisputed leadership in the milling industry, a rank that they held until 1915. Since that time, however, the output of the mills has declined.

Rich beds of iron ore were discovered in the northeastern section of the state in the last decades of the nineteenth century. In 1884 the first shipment of ore was made from the Vermillion Range, finding its way to Lake Superior and eastern markets by way of Two Harbors. Later Duluth developed into an important lake port for the shipment of ore from the Mesabi Range, discovered by the Merritt brothers in 1890, and the Cuyuna Range. Minnesota became a national center for iron mining.

In the years following the Civil War the state gradually assumed increased responsibility for the care of poor, sick, and defective citizens. The first of six hospitals for the insane was opened at St. Peter in 1866; since then colonies for epileptics, hospitals for consumptives, and schools for feeble-minded, deaf, blind, dependent, and indigent crippled children have been established. The organization of a state board of health in 1872 was followed by the passage of laws compelling quarantine for contagious diseases, establishing a bureau of vital statistics, setting standards for pure foods, and in other ways meeting the requirements of new social points of view.

Cultural and educational transition and development have marked the state's progress. The University of Minnesota opened its doors in 1869 and in the decades that followed sought to meet and serve the changing needs of the state in higher education under such leaders as Folwell, Northrop, Vincent, Burton, Coffman, and Guy Stanton Ford. Musical organizations became active in St. Paul as early as the sixties, and the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra can trace its beginnings to a musical society of the seventies. Free libraries appeared in the cities in the eighties, and the Minneapolis Society of Fine Arts was incorporated in 1883. The woman's movement had reached the state about 1870, when women's clubs began to appear and the state suffrage association had its origin. Athletics and outdoor sports attracted increasing interest in the eighties and nineties. In the field of literature Minnesota has produced noted authors and critics. Rolvaag, Lewis, and others have pictured Minnesota scenes in novels that have won wide acclaim; Firkins and Upson have won distinction in criticism and poetry; and Neill, Folwell, and Blegen have contributed outstanding historical studies.

The first Minnesota state governor was a Democrat, Henry H. Sibley. The Republican party, which put Ramsey in the governor's chair in 1860, was dominant for a generation after the Civil War, giving the state such governors as Miller, Marshall, Austin, Davis, Pillsbury, Hubbard, McGill, Merriam, Nelson, and Clough. Challenges from the Democrats and third parties increased toward the end of the century and in 1898 John Lind won the governorship. The Republicans,

with Van Sant, then held the office for two terms, when John A. Johnson, Democrat, appeared and carried the state three times. Eberhart, Republican, was followed by Hammond, Democrat, and he in turn by Burnquist, Preus, and Christianson, Republicans. Donnelly was a leader of the agrarian movement in its early years; the nonpartisan league, with the elder Charles A. Lindbergh among its leaders, appeared in the World War years; and the Farmer-Labor party, organized after the war, elected Floyd B. Olson governor in 1930. Governor Olson's career was cut short by his death in office on August 22, 1936, and his position was filled by Hjalmar Petersen until Elmer A. Benson took office in 1937. The Republican party returned to power in the state elections of 1938. Harold E. Stassen, first inaugurated as the state's chief executive in 1939, was twice re-elected. In 1943 Stassen resigned the governorship to enter active service in the United States Navy, and Lieutenant Governor Edward J. Thye became governor. Thye, who was re-elected in 1944, was succeeded by Luther W. Youngdahl in 1946, who was re-elected in 1948 and again in 1950. United States senators from Minnesota have included such men as Rice, Shields, Ramsey, Windom, Washburn, Nelson, Clapp, Kellogg, Shipstead, Ball, and the incumbents, Thye and Hubert H. Humphrey.

No brief sketch can gather up the many forces that have played parts in developing the commonwealth of Minnesota or call the long roll of its distinguished sons and daughters. The people of the state naturally have been influenced by all the factors that have been fundamental in modern American life generally. To the national life, too, the state and its people have made notable contributions both in wars—Civil, Spanish-American, and the two World Wars—and in the pursuits of peace—statesmanship, the church, with Bishop Whipple and Archbishop Ireland notable figures, science, invention, the arts, and the professions. From the day of the explorers to the present time, Minnesota has been intimately bound to the larger world in which its transition from wilderness to commonwealth has had its setting.

MINNESOTA CHRONOLOGY

1635. Jean Nicolet, a French explorer, spent the winter near Green Bay on Lake Michigan. He took back to Montreal the first information about Minnesota Indians.
- 1654-60. Radisson and Groseilliers, French traders, made two expeditions into the West, reaching the Wisconsin region and possibly the Minnesota country. In 1654-56 they may have gone as far west as Prairie Island, in the Mississippi River between Red Wing and Hastings. In 1659-60 they again traveled in the West and came in contact with Sioux Indians.
1665. Father Claude Allouez, a Jesuit, established a mission at La Pointe, near Ashland, Wisconsin.
1679. July 2, Daniel Greysolon DuLhut (Duluth) held a council with the Sioux on the shore of Mille Lacs. DuLhut, in July, 1680, by way of the St. Croix river, reached the Mississippi and met Hennepin.
1680. Louis Hennepin, after being held captive in a village of the Mille Lacs Sioux, discovered the Falls of St. Anthony, which he named for his patron saint.
1689. May 8, Nicolas Perrot, at his Fort St. Antoine, on the Wisconsin shore of Lake Pepin, laid formal claim to the surrounding country for France. He built a fort also on the Minnesota shore of this lake, near its outlet.
1695. Le Sueur built a fort or trading post on Isle Pelee, now Prairie Island, above Lake Pepin.
1700. Le Sueur established Fort L'Huilier, on the Blue Earth river (near the mouth of the Le Sueur).
1727. The French established Fort Beauharnois near the site of Frontenac on Lake Pepin, with the Sieur de La Perriere as commander.
1728. Great flood in the Mississippi.
- 1731-32. La Verendrye, his sons, and his nephew, La Jemeraye, established on the present north boundary of Minnesota two trading posts, Fort St. Pierre, near the mouth of Rainy Lake, and Fort St. Charles, on the Lake of the Woods, within the present area of Minnesota.
1736. June 6, the eldest son of La Verendrye, Father Aulneau, and nineteen French voyageurs were massacred by a war party of Sioux on an island in Lake of the Woods.
- 1750-56. Joseph Marin and his son maintained the last French post on the upper Mississippi. It was on Lake Pepin near the present site of Frontenac.
1763. By the Treaty of Versailles, France ceded the part of Minnesota east of the Mississippi to England, the country west of the river having been ceded to Spain the previous year.
- 1766-67. Jonathan Carver visited the Falls of St. Anthony and the Minnesota river. He claimed to have made a treaty with the Indians in the following spring, at a cave afterward called "Carver's Cave," within the present limits of St. Paul, by which he said they ceded to him a very large

- tract of land, long known as "Carver's Claim," but it was never recognized by the government.
- 1784-1816. The Northwest Company carried on extensive fur-trading operations in the Minnesota country and established many posts in the region. During much of the period the company's headquarters were at Grand Portage.
1800. May 7, Minnesota east of the Mississippi became part of Indiana by the division of Ohio.
1803. April 30, Minnesota west of the Mississippi, for the preceding forty years in possession of Spain as a part of Louisiana, was ceded to the United States by Napoleon Bonaparte, who had just obtained it from Spain.
- 1805-06. Lieutenant Z. M. Pike visited Minnesota to establish government relations here, and obtained cessions, including the subsequent Fort Snelling reservation, from the Sioux.
1809. Minnesota East became part of Illinois Territory.
1812. The Sioux, Chippewa, and Winnebago under the leadership of hostile traders, joined the British during the war. Red river colony established by Lord Selkirk. June 4, Minnesota west of the Mississippi was included in Missouri Territory.
1817. The American Fur Company, under the leadership of John Jacob Astor, began trading operations in the Minnesota country.
1818. Minnesota East became part of Michigan Territory.
1819. Minnesota east of the Mississippi became a part of Crawford county, Michigan. Fort St. Anthony (renamed Fort Snelling in 1825) established, beginning as a post at Mendota occupied by troops on August 24, under command of Colonel Henry Leavenworth. Major L. Taliaferro appointed Indian agent at the new post.
1820. Cornerstone of Fort St. Anthony laid September 10. Governor Cass visited Minnesota and made a treaty of peace between the Sioux and Chippewa at Fort St. Anthony, August 1. Colonel Josiah Snelling took command of the post.
1823. The first steamboat arrived at Fort Snelling on May 10. Major Stephen H. Long explored the Minnesota river, the Red River valley, and the northern frontier. Beltrami explored the region near the source of the Mississippi.
1825. Dividing line between the Chippewa and Sioux agreed upon at Prairie du Chien.
1826. Great flood on the Red river; a part of the Selkirk colony driven to Minnesota, settling in 1827 near Fort Snelling.
1832. Schoolcraft discovered the source of the Mississippi, and named it Lake Itasca. It had been known earlier to Indians and traders as Elk Lake.
1834. Minnesota west of the Mississippi attached to Michigan. H. H. Sibley settled at Mendota as a trader for the American Fur Company. Pond brothers came to Lake Calhoun.
1835. Catlin and Featherstonhaugh visited Minnesota. Lac qui Parle mission founded.
1836. The territory of Wisconsin organized, embracing the whole area of Minnesota. Joseph N. Nicollet began his explorations in Minnesota. Catlin visited the pipestone quarries.

1837. Governor Dodge of Wisconsin made a treaty at Fort Snelling with the Chippewa, by which they ceded all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries; a treaty was also effected at Washington with a deputation of Sioux, for their lands east of the Mississippi. These treaties led the way to the first settlements from the eastern states within the area of Minnesota.
1838. Franklin Steele made a claim at the Falls of St. Anthony. Pierre Parrant built a shanty and settled on the present site of St. Paul.
1839. St. Croix county, Wisconsin, including all of Minnesota east of the Mississippi established.
1841. The "Chapel of St. Paul" built and consecrated, giving the name to the future capital of the State.
1847. The Wisconsin constitutional convention met. The town of St. Paul surveyed, platted, and recorded in St. Croix county register of deeds' office. First improvement of the water power at the Falls of St. Anthony.
1848. May 29, Wisconsin admitted to the Union, leaving the area of Minnesota east of the Mississippi without a government. August 26, the "Stillwater convention" took measures for a separate territorial organization, and asked that the new Territory be named Minnesota. October 30, H. H. Sibley elected delegate to Congress.
1849. January 15, Sibley admitted to a seat in Congress. March 3, the bill organizing Minnesota Territory passed. March 19, territorial officers appointed. June 1, Gov. Ramsey proclaimed the Territory organized. September 3, the first territorial legislature assembled. November 15, the Minnesota Historical Society organized.
1850. Great floods. Commercial steamboating inaugurated on the Minnesota river. Population of Minnesota, 6,077.
1851. Location of the capitol, university, and penitentiary at St. Paul, St. Anthony and Stillwater. By the treaties of Traverse des Sioux and Mendota, in July and August, the territory west of the Mississippi was opened to settlers. Rt. Rev. Joseph Cretin, first Catholic bishop of Minnesota, arrived.
1853. W. A. Gorman appointed governor. The capitol building completed. Construction of Fort Ridgley begun.
1854. Celebration of the opening of the Rock Island railroad, the first road to the Mississippi river, by a mammoth excursion, which reached St. Paul on June 8. Large immigration this season and the three succeeding ones. The real estate boom commenced. Commercial flour milling began by establishment of the "Minnesota" mill on Hennepin island.
1857. Minnesota Enabling act passed by Congress, February 26. Gov. Samuel Medary (appointed by Buchanan) arrived April 22. Legislature passed a bill to remove the capitol to St. Peter, but failed to accomplish the object. Inkapaduta massacre at Springfield (now Jackson), March 26. July 13, constitutional convention assembled. Real estate speculation reached its height, and was checked by the financial panic, August 27. October 13, constitution adopted and state officers elected. Population of Minnesota, 150,037.

- 1858. State loan of \$250,000 negotiated. Five million loan bill for railroads passed by the legislature, ratified by vote of people. Great stringency in money market. State admitted to Union May 11. State officers sworn in, May 24. H. B. Whipple, first Episcopal bishop of Minnesota, arrived.
- 1859. Hard times continued. Work on the land grant railroads ceased. Collapse of the five million scheme. First export of wheat from Minnesota.
- 1860. Population of Minnesota 172,023.
- 1861. Civil war began. April 15, president called for troops; the first Minnesota regiment left Fort Snelling June 22.
- 1862. Call for 600,000 men. July 2, first railroad in Minnesota opened between St. Paul and Minneapolis. August 17, murders by Sioux at Acton; August 18, outbreak at Lower Sioux Agency, eight miles east of Redwood Falls; 19, New Ulm attacked; 20, Fort Ridgely attacked; 23, second attack on New Ulm; 30, Fort Abercrombie besieged; September 2, attack on Birch Coulee; September 23, battle of Wood Lake; 26, captives surrendered at Camp Release; military commission tried 321 Indians for murder, rape, etc.; 303 condemned to die. December 26, 38 Indians hanged at Mankato.
- 1863. July 3, Little Crow, leader in the Sioux War, killed. General Sibley's expedition to the Missouri river to suppress the Sioux.
- 1864. Large levies for troops. Expedition to Missouri river against Sioux under Gen. Alfred Sully. Inflation of money market. Occasional Indian raids.
- 1865. Civil War ended. Minnesota regiments returned and were disbanded. In all 22,016 troops furnished by the State. Population of Minnesota, 250,099.
- 1866-72. Rapid railroad building; heavy immigration; real estate inflation; "good times." White Earth Indian Reservation established. State University opened with William Watts Folwell president.
- 1873. January 7, 8, and 9, a polar wave swept the State; 70 perished. September, the Jay-Cooke failure created another panic. Grasshopper raid began and continued five seasons.
- 1877. Biennial session of Legislature amendment adopted.
- 1878. May 2, three flour mills at Minneapolis exploded; 18 lives lost.
- 1881. March 1, state capitol burned. Within the next two years the second capitol, on the same site, was built, and occupied by the legislature, January, 1883.
- 1884. January 25, the state prison partially burned. First iron ore shipped from Vermillion Range. Cyrus Northrop became president of the University of Minnesota.
- 1889. The first electric street railway started in the State at Stillwater.
- 1890. Iron ore discovered on the Mesabi Range by the Merritt brothers.
- 1892. June 7, national Republican convention met at Minneapolis. First iron ore shipped from the Mesabi Range.
- 1893. The legislature authorized the appointment of a capitol commission to select a site for a new capitol, and provided a tax of two-tenths of a mill for ten years to pay for the

- site and the erection of a building. A great financial crisis caused many bank and business failures.
1894. Forest fires started September 1 near Hinckley carrying death and destruction over nearly four hundred square miles and destroying Hinckley and Sandstone.
1895. Minnesota Legislature passed a child labor law.
1896. The Red Lake Indian reservation was diminished to about a quarter of its former area, and on May 15, a large tract of agricultural and timber lands formerly belonging to that reservation was opened for settlement.
1898. July 27, the corner stone of the new capitol was laid. Minnesota supplied four regiments for service in the Spanish war, being the first state, May 7, to respond to the President's call. October 5, the Pillager band of Chippewa attacked United States troops near Sugar Point, Leech lake.
1899. John Lind became the first non-Republican governor since the Civil War.
1900. Death of Senator Cushman K. Davis, November 27.
1901. In the Pan-American Exposition, at Buffalo, N. Y., the superior exhibits of wheat, flour, and dairy products of Minnesota caused her to be called "the Bread and Butter State." State board of control established.
1903. Tide of immigration into Minnesota, particularly in northern and western sections. April 22, death of Alexander Ramsey, first territorial governor, later governor of the state, United States senator, and secretary of war.
1905. January 3, the legislature convened for the first time in the new capitol.
1906. State Highway Commission created.
1909. Death of Gov. John A. Johnson on September 21.
1910. Forest fires in northern Minnesota during the second and third weeks of October, in the driest autumn on record, resulted in death to 29 people and the destruction of about \$2,661,265 of property. Spooner and Baudette were almost entirely wiped out.
1911. The legislature ratified the proposed amendment to the United States constitution for election of U. S. senators by popular vote. George E. Vincent became president of the University of Minnesota. On October 17, Hugh Robinson attempted the first air mail flight from Minneapolis to New Orleans, completing the portion of the journey from Minneapolis to Rock Island, Illinois, a distance of 371 miles, and carrying 25 pounds of mail.
1912. The legislature in special session enacted a new primary election law and "corrupt practices" act.
1913. Dunn Good Roads Law enacted—compulsory 1 mill road tax.
1915. In November, the last bonds of indebtedness of the state resulting from the five million loan bill for railroad building, enacted in 1858, readjusted by legislation in 1881, were paid and burned. December 30, Governor Hammond died.
1916. In February, iron and steel manufacture and production of Portland cement, each on a very large scale, were begun at Duluth. May 29, James J. Hill, railway builder, organizer of the Great Northern Railway system, died at

- his home in St. Paul. July 19-21, the National Prohibition convention was held in St. Paul.
1917. April 6, the United States entered the World War. During 19 months until the war closed, Minnesota gave 107,902 men in the army service, and 15,423 in the navy, the marine corps and coast guard, an aggregate of 123,325 troops. July 1, Marion LeRoy Burton became president of the University of Minnesota.
1918. May 11, dedication of the building of the Minnesota Historical Society, erected by the state at a cost of \$500,000. September 25, death of Archbishop John Ireland, archbishop of St. Paul since 1888. October 12-13, forest fires after a long draught, driven by a great wind, spread over large areas in Carlton county and the south part of St. Louis county, inflicting loss of 432 lives, with vast destruction of property.
1920. Population of Minnesota, 2,387,125. July 1, Lotus D. Coffman became president of the University of Minnesota. Babcock Good Roads Amendment adopted.
1921. Minnesota Industrial Commission established.
1922. Cyrus Northrop, president of the State University from 1884 to 1911, died April 3.
1923. April 28, death of Knute Nelson, governor in 1893-95, and later for 28 years a United States senator.
1924. The new library building of the University of Minnesota opened. November 15, dedication of the stadium of the University "in remembrance of the thousands of Gopher soldiers who answered the great call in 1917."
1925. Reorganization of state government. Norse-American Centennial celebration in St. Paul.
1929. September 18, death of Dr. William W. Folwell, first president of the University of Minnesota.
1930. Population of Minnesota 2,563,953.
1932. Minnesota's nine Representatives to the 73rd Congress were elected at large. New state office building occupied.
1933. Legislature passed a new apportionment act dividing the state into nine Congressional districts.
1934. Extensive federal and state aid projects for relief of unemployed.
1935. Death of Senator Thomas D. Schall, December 22.
1936. Old Age Assistance Act effective March 1. Death of Governor Floyd B. Olson, August 22.
1937. Death of Frank Billings Kellogg, December 21, former United States senator, ambassador to Great Britain, secretary of state, co-author of the Kellogg-Briand peace pact, and World Court justice.
1938. Death of Lotus D. Coffman, president of the state university, September 22, succeeded by Guy Stanton Ford.
1939. Death of Dr. Charles H. Mayo, May 20, and of Dr. Wm. J. Mayo, July 28, founders of the Mayo Clinic at Rochester. Death of Pierce Butler, Associate Justice, United States Supreme Court, November 16. Reorganization of state government.
1940. Death of Ernest Lundeen, United States Senator from Minnesota, August 31. Population of Minnesota, 2,792,300.

1941. The Minnesota National Guard and the Naval Reserve were ordered to duty with the armed forces. The State Guard organization was completed. Governor Stassen issued a wartime emergency proclamation December 8.
1942. Minnesota industry was mobilized for war with many war production activities in the state. The state was organized on the home front with about 143,000 volunteers, including home guards, air raid wardens, auxiliary police and firemen, and victory aides. Co. A, 194th Tank Battalion, of Brainerd, lost in the fall of Corregidor.
1943. The legislature passed an act giving the governor wartime emergency powers over the military, civil, and industrial resources of the state. Minnesota mines produced 83,960,822 tons of iron ore, the largest amount in their history.
1944. A special session of the legislature made provision for Minnesotans in the armed forces to vote. An aviation amendment to the Constitution was adopted, permitting a state-wide system of airport and aviation development, and providing for a state tax on aircraft and on gasoline used for aviation in lieu of the personal property tax.
1945. The legislature passed an act to promote safety on public highways by requiring owners and drivers of motor vehicles to give proof of financial responsibility. The laws relating to the preservation of the state's wild life were revised and codified and new provisions were added. Other acts created a Minnesota Resources Commission and provided for the construction of a War Veterans' Service Building.
1946. The value of Minnesota's crop production reached an all-time high of \$683,000,000.
1947. The legislature passed a Youth Conservation Act providing for methods of treatment, training, and education of young persons with a view toward prevention of delinquency and crime, and created a Youth Conservation Commission.
1948. An amendment to the state constitution permitting a bonus for World War II veterans was adopted.
1949. Minnesota observed the centennial of its establishment as a territory in a year-long, state-wide celebration.
1950. Population of Minnesota, 2,982,483.

NORTH STAR STATE

NAME

Minnesota, "The Land of Sky Blue Waters," derives its name from the river called "Minisota" by the Dakotas, pronounced "Min-neesotah" (Minni, water; sotah, whitishly clouded, sky-colored). For correct pronunciation, the convention held at Stillwater in 1848, to secure a territorial organization, instructed its delegates that the name of the Territory be written Minnesota. During an argument concerning the design of the seal to be adopted for the new territory it was called by Henry Sibley "The star of the north" probably in reference to the fact that the northwest angle beyond the Lake of the Woods is the northernmost land in the United States.

Out of lands at that time part of the territory of Wisconsin, Minnesota became a territory in 1849. After passage of the Enabling Act of 1857, Minnesota was admitted to the Union on May 11, 1858.

GEOGRAPHY

Minnesota includes the geographic center of North America. The state is bounded on the south by Iowa, on the west by South and North Dakota, on the north by Manitoba and Ontario, and on the east by Wisconsin. It is about 406 miles long, and from its most eastern point to the extreme western point about 358 miles wide. In a footnote on article 2 of the State constitution, the boundaries are fully defined, with explanation of the part projecting twenty-six miles north beyond the forty-ninth parallel, at the west side of the Lake of the Woods.

AREA*

In area Minnesota is the eleventh state of the Union. It contains 79,739.76 square miles, or 51,033,448.43 acres, exclusive of water area. The headwaters of three great river systems are found in its limits, those of streams flowing northward to Hudson bay, eastward to the Atlantic ocean, and southward to the Gulf of Mexico. About a third of this surface, on the south and west, consists of rolling prairie. The district north and west of Lake Superior has rich iron ore ranges. On the northwest border of this state, reaching also west into North Dakota and north into Manitoba, is the very fertile and broad Red river valley, formerly the bed of the Glacial Lake Agassiz, famed for its great harvests of wheat.

RIVERS

Few states are so well watered as Minnesota. Its navigable rivers are the Mississippi, the Minnesota, the St. Croix, the Rainy river, the St. Louis, the Red River of the North, and the Red Lake river, all of which, near their sources, have valuable water powers. Smaller streams include the Rum river and Snake river, the Cannon, Zumbro and Root rivers, the Vermillion, Crow Wing, Sauk and Elk rivers, the Blue Earth, Le Sueur, Des Moines, Cottonwood and Chippewa rivers.

LAKES

Minnesota has more than ten thousand lakes, the largest of which is Red Lake, with an area of 440 square miles, in the central northern part of the State. On the same northern slope, in St. Louis county, is the beautiful Vermillion lake. Adjoining the northeast part of the State for one hundred and fifty miles, the waters of the great Lake Superior wash its shores. On the southward slope of the State is Itasca lake, the source of the Mississippi, with Bemidji and Cass lakes, Lake Winnebigoishish, Leech Lake, and a multitude of others, all adding volume to the water of the Mississippi, eventually flowing into the Gulf of Mexico. There we have also Mille Lacs, about 200 square miles in area, the source of Rum River. The picturesque Lake Minne-

tonka, White Bear, Bald Eagle, the Chisago lakes, and very many more, have been much utilized as summer resorts. The northeastern section of the state, easily accessible on Minnesota's excellent system of highways, will generously reward all seekers of rest and recreation in its vast stretches of virgin forest and innumerable lakes of clear, cool water. Here just across the pavement from a fine, modern hotel probably facing a sporty golf course with fine bent greens and beautiful fairways cut right through the pines is almost sure to be one of Minnesota's ten thousand lakes, where wall-eyes, northerns or bass abound.

ELEVATION AND CLIMATE

Altitude of the state ranges from 602 feet above sea level on the shore of Lake Superior to 2,230 feet at the summit of the Misquah hills in Cook county.

Average mean temperature for the year is 44 degrees, and the summer mean temperature is about 70 degrees. According to federal health reports, it possesses an ideal climate, and throughout the more than 90 years of its agricultural history, there has been no instance of general crop failure.

INDUSTRIES AND RESOURCES

Minnesota is a state of seemingly endless resources and riches. Within its borders are found rich, rolling farm lands whose dairies lead the nation in the production of butter and rank second in the production of milk and milk powder. Its farms produce more oats and clover seed than those of any other state and rank second in poultry, poultry products and flax, third in turkeys, fourth in corn, fifth in rye and seventh in alfalfa seed and barley. The third largest stockyards in the nation are at South St. Paul.

While agriculture is the State's leading industry, mining is an important second. During 1947 and 1948 the iron mines of northeastern Minnesota poured more than 66,000,000 tons of ore into the nation's blast furnaces, which is more than 70% of the country's total for this period.

Twenty-two state-owned mines contributed to this huge aggregate. Royalty income from state-owned mines, occupation taxes on mined iron ore and revenue from other state-owned lands increased Minnesota's permanent trust funds to a total of \$166,549,049 by June 30, 1948.

These huge trust funds have been built up through the sale and lease of public lands that originally comprised about 5,500,000 acres, and through royalties and occupation tax on iron ore. The annual income from the permanent trust funds is distributed to our public schools, the state University and other state educational and charitable institutions.

Lumbering, once the major industry in Minnesota, declined with depletion of the original stands of big timber. Lately, however, scientific forestry practices have opened new sources of supply, and new manufacturing processes have created demands for forest products that once were ignored.

Minnesota's timber supports an industry which is estimated to produce more total income to the people of northern Minnesota annually than was ever derived from the logging of the virgin forest. The sales value of all the forest products in the state now amounts to well over \$100,000,000 per year, including pulp, paper, lumber, and other forest products. In fact, 1948 is recognized as an all-time high—the value of forest products harvested having been estimated at \$136,000,000. This is directly reflected in wages, business income, tax revenue, and property values throughout the forest region.

Minnesota's 32 state forests comprise a gross area of 5,340,988 acres. No other state has as large an acreage in state forests. Of the

total area 2,036,065 acres are trust fund and acquired lands. Forests and woodlands constitute one of the most valuable assets of the state. In addition to the direct economic value of the timber, the forests constitute a great recreational and scenic attraction, enhance the appearance of lakes and streams, provide the habitat for abundant wildlife, and check floods and soil erosion.

A third major industry is the entertainment of vacationists, who come here each summer from throughout the nation to enjoy the state's recreational facilities. According to a survey based on the 1948 season, the summer vacation travel trade amounted to approximately \$103,000,000 as spent by some 860,000 out-of-state vacationists and 795,000 resident vacationists. This substantiates the standing estimate of a \$200,000,000 tourist business annually in the State. Subsequent seasons have brought an increase in vacation visitors, with the out-of-state number likely reaching 1,000,000.

Recent studies indicate a changing economic pattern in Minnesota—the balance desirable between industry, agriculture, trade and service. Food manufacturing is the largest employing industry in Minnesota having more than one-fourth of the State's total manufacturing employment of approximately 200,000. Machinery production, printing and fabricated metal products represent the second, third and fourth groups respectively. Stone, clay and glass; electrical machinery; apparel; and paper and paper products follow in that sequence. All these industries have grown substantially since 1939.

The Department of Business Research and Development stimulates and encourages sound expansion and promising growth in the general economy of the State, based on a careful analysis of existing economic conditions and resources.

The 1947 Legislature created the Department by consolidating functions of the former Resources Commission, Postwar Council, and the Tourist Bureau and by adding certain other responsibilities, including the enforcement of fair trade practices.

To protect "the legitimate interest and welfare of Minnesota business, industry, and commerce, within and outside the State," as the law enjoins, the Department coordinates research, publicity, industrial development and trade promotion.

More specifically the directive of the Legislature is being applied along the following lines: counseling with communities in organizing and planning for local development; assisting the establishment of "grass roots" industry; helping local inventors; working with merchants for promotion of trade; promoting Minnesota-made products; publicizing Minnesota's vacation attractions; encouraging the upgrading of resort facilities in accord with public demand; serving as secretariat for the Waterways Commissions and other boards designated by the Governor; operating as the State's liaison with federal offices and national groups serving commercial interests; and acting as a liaison between the state university and businessmen who can put to practical use the technical services and findings. As occasion demands, the Department also is called upon to relieve emergency shortages in the State.

MINNESOTA STATE PARKS AND FORESTS

The state park system in Minnesota was started in 1889, when the legislature appropriated funds for purchase of a site for a monument on the Camp Release battlefield in Lac qui Parle County, to commemorate the last decisive battle with the Sioux in 1862. By 1945 the state had established 57 parks or other recreational areas, comprising 83,372.40 acres.

STATE PARKS

Alexander Ramsey State Park, purchased in 1911, comprises 185.38 acres of land adjacent to Redwood Falls. Included is a section of the Redwood River Valley and the Valley of Ramsey Creek. The slopes of the valley are precipitous. Deer and buffalo are held in captivity as a feature of the park.

Baptism River State Park, located on the North Shore of Lake Superior, was acquired in 1945. An area of 706 acres embraces the gorge of the Baptism River for approximately three miles of its length from the mouth. The river cascades over the highest waterfall in the state within the park, and another spectacular formation on the shore of Lake Superior, known as Shovel Point, is included in the area. This park is within an area known as the Saw Tooth Mountains, which is a particularly descriptive name for this section of geologic ruggedness. Public facilities have not been provided.

Beaver Creek Valley State Park, established in 1937, contains 325.17 acres and is located near Caledonia. It derives its name from a trout stream which rises from artesian springs within the park and threads its way to the pool of the "Old Schech Mill" constructed in 1896 and still operating. The park extends for approximately two miles through the narrow valley flanked by hills with numerous outcroppings of sandstone topped with limestone.

Big Island State Park, authorized by act of 1947 legislature, is a heavily wooded island in Albert Lea lake, five miles south of Albert Lea in Freeborn County, comprising 117.3 acres. It is presently undeveloped but is available for picnicking, hiking and boating.

Buffalo River State Park, 241.86 acres, is one-half mile south of U. S. Highway No. 10, 12½ miles east of Moorhead. It was established in 1937, and commemorates the prehistoric Campbell Beach of Lake Agassiz. Picnic facilities and a bathhouse and swimming pool are provided.

Camden State Park, acquired in 1935, embodies 469.96 acres of hilly country through which the Redwood River flows. It is in Lyon County, south of Marshall. Facilities for camping and picnicking, comfort stations, camp stoves, swimming pool with bathhouse, refectory and pure drinking water are provided.

Caribou Falls State Park, authorized by act of 1947 legislature, located 45 miles northeast of Two Harbors containing 91.65 acres of state land and contains a rugged gorge, waterfalls and interesting and geological formations. Park facilities are undeveloped but should appeal to the hiker, fisherman and camera enthusiast.

Flandrau State Park (formerly called Cottonwood River State Park) embodies 836.48 acres purchased in 1934, adjacent to the south boundary of New Ulm. The area comprises a portion of the river valley including the tops of the bluffs which rise from the valley floor. A concrete dam created a lake of 209 acres which affords canoeing, boating, swimming and fishing. A modern bathhouse and refectory, a fine sand beach, boating and picnic facilities are provided.

Gooseberry Falls State Park consists of 637.83 acres established in 1933. The Gooseberry River, with two water falls of approximately

30 feet, flows through the area to Lake Superior. The park is 40 miles northeast of Duluth on U. S. Highway No. 61, Minnesota's famous North Shore Drive. The picnic ground and the camp ground, segregated along the shore of the lake, are equipped with modern toilets, pure drinking water, shelter buildings and refectories.

Interstate Park consists of 167 acres of St. Croix River valley extending from Taylors Falls down the river 1.1 miles. It was acquired in 1895 by purchase. A rock gorge rises perpendicularly in places two hundred feet from the water's edge. Part of the area consists of stratified and precipitous rock formation, in which are spectacular examples of pot holes, created by the motion of rotating water and boulders which set up a grinding action in depressions. A parking space and a combination refectory and shelter building have been provided adjacent to the pot holes, and also facilities for picnicking and camping.

Itasca State Park is midway between Bemidji and Park Rapids on U. S. Highway No. 71. It consists of 31,976 acres, established primarily to preserve an exceptionally fine scenic piece of northern Minnesota, unaltered from its natural state. The area is dotted with 157 lakes, foremost of which is Lake Itasca, the source of the Mississippi River. In the area are large stands of virgin Norway and white pine. A camp ground on the east shore of Lake Itasca provides facilities for three hundred cars. Limited cabin accommodations are available in this area.

Douglas Lodge, established in 1891, a dignified resort hotel and cabin development located in the south end of Lake Itasca among tall virgin pine is state-owned and is operated by the division of state parks under the European plan. Excellent fishing, boating, excursion boat trips, foot trails and other recreational activities may be enjoyed.

A State Forestry School and Biological Station is operated by the University of Minnesota for summer school students.

The picnic ground, near the Headwaters of the Mississippi River, is well developed. Ample parking space, tables, benches, fireplaces and well-water are available for public use. Modern toilets and an interesting museum are located in this area.

James A. Carley State Park. The present state senator James A. Carley donated 211 acres of beautifully wooded and picturesque gorge on the north branch of Whitewater River, Wabasha County for future State Park purposes. An unusual stand of White Pine is located on this property, and the river lends itself to excellent trout fishing.

Jay Cooke State Park, 8,366.7 acres, was established in 1915. It extends from Thomson seven miles downstream on both sides of the St. Louis River to Fond du Lac. The terrain is spectacular because of ruggedness of slope. Camp and picnic grounds are equipped with tables, stoves, drinking water, shelters, and comfort stations.

John A. Latsch State Park lies along U. S. Highway No. 61, north of Winona. It was established in 1925 and comprises 350.2 acres. Three limestone bluffs rise abruptly nearly 450 feet above the highway.

The Whitman Dam and Locks, contiguous with the park, play an important part in navigation on the Mississippi River.

Small areas for picnicking have been developed, provided with fireplaces, water and toilets.

Kaplan Woods State Park, two miles south of Owatonna on State Trunk Highway No. 65, is 180 acres in area and was acquired in 1935. It comprises one of the few remnants of the hardwood forest that once covered this section. The park has been developed for hiking and picnicking.

Kilen Woods State Park (172.41 acres) was established by the 1945 legislature and negotiations are completed on the greater portion of the land designated for acquisition. This area lies about 7 miles

northwest of Jackson, on the west bank of the Des Moines River. An unusually fine stand of hardwood timber covers the steep banks in this area. It is estimated that the river banks rise about 200 feet at one point within the park. The existence of the fine virgin timber stand in this older intense agricultural section of Minnesota is extremely unusual. No public use facilities have been provided.

Kodonce River State Park (127.80 acres) located 11 miles east of Grand Marais in Cook County was acquired in 1948. Its spectacular rocky gorge and waterfalls will amply reward the hiker, camera man or fisherman.

Lac qui Parle State Park, established in 1941, comprises two areas at the foot of Lac qui Parle Lake with a total area of 457.49 acres. On the east side of the lake, the site of the first Protestant Mission in Minnesota was dedicated in 1831. The heavily wooded area on the southwest side of the lake has been developed for extensive picnicking activity.

Lake Bemidji State Park, established in 1923, embodies 205.48 acres of lakeshore land, about six miles northeast of Bemidji. Within the virgin Norway pine forest a public camp ground and picnic grounds have been developed.

Lake Bronson State Park, established 1937, 745.62 acres, is about two miles east of Bronson on U. S. Highway No. 59. A bathhouse and sand beach provide swimming facilities. Boating, picnic and limited facilities for organized group camp activities are also provided.

Lake Carlos State Park is 10 miles north of Alexandria on the north end of Lake Carlos. Its 403.56 acres were acquired in 1937 and are located in rolling topography. Deer and other wild life are plentiful. Provision has been made for picnicking, bathing, boating, and organized group camp use.

Lake Shetek State Park, established 1937, comprises 155.24 acres, six miles north of Slayton on the shores of Lake Shetek. One island, Loon, is within the park area, and on the portion known as the east mainland is located the Lake Shetek Monument, which commemorates the massacre of a white family during the Indian uprising of 1862. Picnic, swimming beach and bathhouse, boats, and organized group camp facilities are provided on the east mainland.

Middle River State Park, consisting of 285 acres, was purchased in 1937, and is located 17 miles northeast of Warren on State Highway No. 3. The remnants of an old water-power operated flour mill constructed originally in 1780, can be seen. This park provides accommodations for swimming, picnicking and hiking.

Minneopa State Park has as the principal natural attraction Minneopa Creek which tumbles over two waterfalls into a deep-cut gorge. Its 110.24 acres are in Blue Earth County six miles west of Mankato on U. S. Highway No. 60. It was acquired in 1905 and now affords excellent picnic facilities including a water system, a modern comfort station, picnic kitchen and shelter, and refectory.

Nerstrand Woods State Park was dedicated by the 1945 legislature and consists of 467.55 acres of land near the village of Nerstrand in Rice County. An excellent stand of virgin hardwood timber covers the greatest portion of the area, which was part of the "Big Woods" designated by the Indians and early explorers in Minnesota. An unusually large variety of native botanical specimens are found in the park area and it has been utilized by Northfield College for field study classes. Commercial hardwood logging operations had made serious inroads on sections of the park up to the time of its establishment under public ownership for preservation. Public use facilities have not as yet been provided.

St. Croix State Park, comprising 30,557 acres, 18 miles east of Hinckley in Pine County, was transferred to the state by the federal government in 1943, after having been developed by CCC and WPA under the supervision of the National Park Service. Developments comprise three large group camps and a well developed picnic and camp grounds. Boats and overnight cabins are available for rental. A number of fine streams bisect this fine recreation area, which lies between the St. Croix and Kettle Rivers, and provides excellent fishing opportunities.

Scenic State Park consists of 2,121.3 acres, six miles east of Bigfork. It was acquired in 1921. This area is the most primitive of all Minnesota state parks and comprises large stands of virgin Norway pine. Boating, swimming, fishing and hiking provide recreation. Camp and picnic grounds and limited cabin accommodations are offered.

Sibley State Park, established by the 1919 legislature, contains 378.83 acres along the north shore of Lake Andrew in Kandiyohi County, seven miles west of New London. Virgin hardwoods and unusual examples of red cedar cover the morainic hills. Lake Andrew provides boating, fishing and swimming, and a fine sand beach, bathhouse, a well-equipped picnic and public camp ground are provided. Three remaining buildings of the National Park Service CCC camp are maintained for organized group camp activities.

Whitewater State Park is in Winona County, about midway between Winona and Rochester. It was acquired in 1919 and comprises 688.28 acres. The park includes a wide, deep ravine through which the Whitewater River and secondary creeks flow. Unusual escarpments and formations of limestone add to the picturesqueness of the park. The bathhouse and picnic and camp grounds, equipped with modern structures and overnight cabins, provide facilities for the comfort of park users. Group camp facilities for organized camping are also available.

William O'Brien State Park, established in 1945, is an area of 180.3 acres on the west banks of the St. Croix River, two miles north of Marine-on-the-St. Croix. This tract is a typical example of the lands bordering the historic St. Croix River, which was a principal artery of travel for Indians and early explorers. This section of the St. Croix River has been the scene of intense lumbering activities in the past. This park was donated to the state by Miss Alice O'Brien in memory of her father, who was one of the early lumbermen in this region. No public use facilities have been provided.

STATE MEMORIAL PARKS

Birch Coulee State Memorial Park containing 82 acres, was established in 1893, and is 1½ miles north of Morton. One of the hardest fought battles of the 1862 uprising took place on this site. Picnic facilities are provided.

Charles A. Lindberg State Memorial Park, 110.42 acres along the Mississippi River, two miles south of Little Falls, was established in 1931 as a memorial to Congressman Charles A. Lindbergh, father of the "Flying Colonel." It includes the boyhood home of the famous flyer, which contains many objects connected with his childhood.

Across the road from the residence is a large, wooded tract, available for picnic activities. A picnic shelter and kitchen, water system, comfort station and foot trails have been provided.

Fort Ridgely State Memorial Park is west of Trunk Highway No. 4, seven miles south of Fairfax. The park, created in 1911, consists of 224.8 acres and contains the site of Old Fort Ridgely, built in 1853, around which occurred some of the battles with the Sioux in 1862. The old fort commissary has been restored as a museum and meeting hall. The remnants of several other original fort structures

are preserved. A rostrum, as well as two well developed picnic areas are provided.

McCarthy Beach State Memorial Park was established by the 1945 legislature to preserve a stand of 135 acres of virgin pine timber in memory of the service men of World War II. This Park is located 20 miles northwest of Hibbing and Chisholm, between Side Lake and Sturgeon Lake, two beautiful northern Minnesota lakes. Unusually gradual sloping sand beaches form the lake shores within the park, which provide excellent opportunities for safe water recreation activities. The financial assistance of the towns of Hibbing and Chisholm in both the acquisition of the property, and improvement for public use has resulted in a limited picnic ground facility.

Monson Lake State Memorial Park, commemorates the massacre of a white family in the Sioux uprising of 1862. The park is in Swift County about 25 miles from Benson and Willmar. This area of 198.95 acres was established in 1937. Picnic tables and beaches, a shelter and picnic kitchen building, comfort station, well and parking space have been provided.

STATE RECREATIONAL RESERVES

Mound Springs State Recreational Reserve, 194.90 acres, established in 1937, lies seven miles north of Luverne and one mile east of U. S. Highway No. 75. Mound Creek runs through the park and two dams have been constructed, impounding lakes totalling about eight acres.

Pomme De Terre State Recreational Reserve, 363.51 acres, established in 1937, is adjacent to Morris. A dam has been constructed across the Pomme de Terre River forming a lake. A bathing beach, bathhouse, comfort station and well have been provided.

Silver Creek Recreational Reserve, authorized by the legislature of 1947, located in Wright County on State-aid Highway No. 11 near Monticello, has not yet been acquired. Its facilities are entirely undeveloped but its deciduous forest and lake should attract the hiker and fisherman.

Split Rock Creek State Recreational Reserve, established 1937, one mile east of Ihlen in Pipestone County, contains 227.64 acres. A dam across Split Rock Creek provides a small lake and the area is being developed for picnicking and bathing.

STATE SCENIC RESERVES

St. Croix Islands Scenic Reserve, established 1943, includes five heavily wooded islands in the St. Croix River immediately above the City of Stillwater in Washington County. These islands totalling 39.36 acres were dedicated primarily to preserve them for their scenic value.

STATE WAYSIDES

Camp Release State Memorial Wayside, purchased in 1889, includes 17.8 acres, west of Montevideo on U. S. Highway No. 212. A granite shaft commemorates the release, on September 26, 1862, of 269 prisoners to General Sibley. At the site stood the Sioux Village of Red Iron, friendly chief during the outbreak of 1862. A well, picnic tables and benches, and toilets have been provided.

Father Hennepin State Memorial Wayside, established in 1941, comprises 129.75 acres on the west shore of Isle bay, adjacent to Isle on the southeast side of Lake Mille Lacs. Its $\frac{3}{4}$ mile of shoreline is wooded. The site is to be developed for picnicking, camping and bathing.

Garvin Heights State Scenic Wayside, established 1922, 12 acres, overlooking Winona. The area lies 575 feet above the parkway, which

runs between the foot of the bluff and Winona Lake. Its principal use is scenic. Two shelters have been provided.

Horace Austin State Scenic Wayside, established 1913, comprises 50 acres adjacent to Austin, above the power dam on the Red Cedar River. Picnic facilities are provided. The City of Austin operates a public swimming pool.

Inspiration Peak State Scenic Wayside, 82 acres, was acquired in 1931. It is in Otter Tail County just north of the Douglas County line and west of Urbank. It consists of a wooded hill from the summit of which is afforded a spectacular view. A small picnic ground has been developed with fireplaces, tables, water supply and toilets.

Joseph R. Brown State Memorial Wayside, three acres, was donated in 1937. The ruins of the Brown Mansion still exist on the site. Major Brown was an Indian Agent representing the Government in the middle 1800's and built the elaborately furnished mansion overlooking the Minnesota Valley seven miles south of Sacred Heart in Renville County.

Old Crossing Treaty State Historical Wayside, established in 1931, comprising 111 acres along the Red Lake River west of the village of Huot was originally dedicated in 1932, because of it being the site of the Old Pembina Trail Ford and also where a Treaty was signed which ceded to the United States the north half of the Red River Valley. An extensive acquisition was made in 1944 with funds raised by public subscription.

Oronoco State Scenic Wayside (105 acres) established 1937, is on Shady Lake near U. S. Highway No. 52, seven miles north of Rochester. The artificial lake is created by a dam which impounds water of the Zumbro River. The park provides facilities for picnickers.

Pine Tree State Park (20 acres) is located one mile west of Blackduck in Beltrami County. It is available for picnics, camping, boating and fishing and a well, fireplaces, toilets and picnic tables are supplied.

Ray Berglund Memorial Wayside, is a 20 acre tract of land located on the north shore of Lake Superior, surrounding the mouth of the Onion River and its waterfalls. The land was acquired by a group of Mr. Berglund's friends, shortly after his death, and donated to the state out of perpetuation of his memory. Mr. Berglund was well known for his Conservation activities and the establishment of this Memorial Wayside is considered the most fitting tribute in perpetuation of his memory.

Sleepy Eye State Scenic Wayside, established 1921 of 40 acres, is at the edge of Sleepy Eye bordering a lake of the same name. The area is provided with facilities for picnicking.

Split Rock State Scenic Wayside, established 1919, is an area of 35 acres, acquired in 1945 and located approximately 8 miles southwest of Beaver Bay on the shore of Lake Superior. It embraces a high rocky knoll, which affords an excellent panorama view of the rugged, picturesque lakeshore and the famed Split Rock Lighthouse.

Toqua Lakes State Scenic Wayside, established 1905, is an area of 40 acres, south of Graceville in Big Stone County, adjacent to State Highway No. 28. A well, toilets, and picnic tables have been provided.

Traverse des Sioux State Historical Wayside is a 2.27 acre tract along the west side of U. S. Highway No. 169, north of St. Peter. Here the treaty of Traverse des Sioux was signed, July 23, 1851.

Watson State Scenic Wayside, established 1938, 12 acres, is two miles northeast of Watson. Accommodations have been provided for picnicking.

STATE MONUMENTS

Acton State Monument was erected in 1909 to commemorate the spot where the first blood was shed in the Sioux uprising of 1862. It is on a one-tenth acre tract, four miles south of Grove City near State Highway No. 4.

Brook Park Monument was erected on October 11, 1915, on .25 acre, adjacent to the village of the same name in Pine County. It commemorates the many who lost their lives in the Hinckley fire, and who are buried at the site, unidentifiable, individually.

Count Beltrami State Monument was established in 1945, to perpetuate the memory of one of the colorful early fur traders in the Red Lake area of Minnesota. A one-acre tract is designated at the site of the trading post established by Count Beltrami, and which is on a height of land established in 1823 as located on the Continental Divide. A suitable marker was erected.

Hinckley State Monument, established 1899, is a granite shaft erected on one-tenth of an acre in Hinckley Cemetery along State Highway No. 48, in memory of a large number of people who lost their lives in the great forest fire of 1894.

Milford State Monument, established 1929, is on a one-acre tract three miles north of Essig. The monument was erected in memory of those who lost their lives in the Indian massacre near that place.

Moose Lake State Monument is a granite shaft erected on one-tenth of an acre in 1929, in memory of the 183 victims of the Moose Lake fire of 1918. The area adjoins the village of Moose Lake and U. S. Highway No. 61.

Sam Brown State Monument, established 1929, is on the west edge of the Browns Valley. On the one-acre tract is located the old log home of the Brown family, and beside the building stands a bronze plaque in memory of Samuel Jerome Brown's ride on April 19, 1866, to warn the people of the frontier and Fort Sisseton of an Indian uprising. The old Brown cabin now serves as a museum.

Schwandt State Monument was erected on a one-tenth acre tract in 1915, in memory of the Schwandt family who were murdered by the Sioux August 18, 1862. It overlooks the Minnesota River Valley 12 miles south of Renville.

Wood Lake State Monument, established 1907, is reached by traveling southeast from Granite Falls on State Highway No. 67 to the Rock Creek church and cemetery, thence one-quarter mile west. The monument is erected on a one-acre tract and commemorates the battle of Wood Lake, where on September 23, 1862, during the Sioux outbreak, Little Crow's warriors ambushed General Sibley's troops. Several of those who lost their lives in this battle, which broke the organized efforts of the Sioux at this point, are buried on this site.

MINNESOTA STATE FORESTS

In 1899 the state legislature authorized the establishment of state forests, or forest reserves, as they were called at that time. The first state forest was established the same year and was named the Pillsbury Forest. Subsequently by legislation in the years 1905, 1907, 1917, 1927, 1931, 1935 and 1943, other state forests were established, until there now are 32 state forests, with a gross area of 5,340,988 acres, of which 2,037,065 acres are state-owned. These forests are scattered throughout the northern two-thirds of the state.

Beltrami Island State Forest, comprising a gross acreage of 480,000 acres, lies in west central Lake of the Woods, east central Roseau, and northwestern Beltrami counties, near the Canadian boundary, of which 341,112 acres are state-owned. It is representative in a general way of a considerable portion of the northern lake states as it

alternates between large level areas of peat swamp with or without tree growth and islands or ridges of jack pine sand capable of producing excellent crops of various kinds of timber, but particularly adapted to the growth of Norway and jack pine.

Blackduck State Forest, with a gross area of 90,880 acres, of which 5,260 acres are state-owned lands, lies in northern Beltrami county. Within this forest there are numerous lakes and streams and fairly rugged topography. On the whole, however, the soil is suitable for agricultural use. There are so many roads, farms and resorts now within the area that it will never be of major importance as a state forest.

Bowstring State Forest, 122,789 acres in area, all of which is state-owned land, is situated in Cass, Beltrami and Itasca counties. It consists of state-owned lands located within the boundaries of the original Chippewa National Forest and in several townships adjoining it on the east. The area as a whole is gently rolling with numerous lakes and streams. The state forest land proper averages more than 50 per cent swamp. The soil is rather sandy and not adapted to agricultural use. The lakes are very good and most of them have good sand beaches. Two large lakes, Winnibigoshish and Leech, are partly or wholly within the area.

Buena Vista State Forest, having a gross area of 79,641, of which 7,970 acres are state owned, is located in central Beltrami county, immediately south of the Blackduck Forest and has many of the same characteristics. Topography varies from comparatively level jack pine flats in the southwest portion to extremely rolling, hilly country in the northeast. Within the area there are many lakes and streams both large and small which make attractive possibilities for recreational development. It is by no means a primitive forest as there are numerous roads throughout the whole area.

Burntside State Forest, with a gross acreage of 20,000 acres, wholly state-owned, is situated in northeastern St. Louis county. The entire area is extremely rough with a great deal of rock outcrop. There are numerous lakes and streams but no soil suitable for farming. Some small swamps occupy a portion of the area but for the most part it is a series of lakes, ridges and streams. The 20,000 acres making up the Burntside Forest was a special grant from the federal government to the State of Minnesota to be used for forestry purposes. At the time the grant was made the area was almost bare of tree growth and apparently had no value. Since the establishment of the forest the chief aim has been to produce a crop of timber which at the same time would enhance the recreational value. This has largely been accomplished at the present time, partially through planting as early as 1913 and 1914 but mostly through natural regeneration.

Cloquet Valley State Forest has a gross area of 307,011 acres, of which 26,381 acres are state-owned, and lies in southeastern St. Louis county. It has almost all manner of topography. As the soil varies from a light jack pine sand in some locations to a heavy red clay in others, the second growth timber which now covers most of the area varies considerably according to the type of soil. On the whole aspen and jack pine predominate. There are numerous rivers and lakes within the forest.

Crow Wing State Forest, with a gross area of 120,760 acres, of which 4,292 acres are state-owned, lies within Crow Wing county. The topography varies from flat to extremely hilly. The soil is mostly of a sandy nature with a forest cover of mixed hardwoods and conifers in varying degrees of density. There are many lakes both large and small and the area has one of the heaviest resort populations of any place in the state.

D.A.R. Memorial State Forest. The extent of this forest, located in Pine county, is only 240 acres. It was established primarily as a memorial to Daughters of the American Revolution. The location, approximately one hundred miles north of the Twin Cities, makes it possible to gradually plant the whole area to native conifers.

Finland State Forest, having a gross area of 149,240 acres, of which 25,174 acres are state-owned, is in eastern Lake county. The topography of this forest is as nearly mountainous as is found in Minnesota, except perhaps in the extreme eastern portion of Cook county. There are numerous streams and many lakes, the streams being particularly attractive because of the series of falls existing on almost all of them. In many places the streams have cut deep gorges through the solid rock giving the effect of minor canyons.

Fond du Lac State Forest has a gross area of 71,680 acres, 37,056 acres of which are state-owned, and is located in St. Louis and Carlton counties. The topography is flat to rolling with only a relatively small number of lakes and streams of no importance. Much of the land is peat swamp covered by a growth of spruce. The timber is mostly second growth which is now becoming merchantable. It is valuable because of its nearness to Duluth and the wood using industries in Cloquet.

Foot Hills State Forest, with a gross area of 202,900 acres, 16,211 acres being state-owned, lies within Cass and Crow Wing counties. For the most part this forest is extremely hilly and once carried a heavy stand of Norway and white pine. There are several streams which have some value for trout fishing. In certain parts of the forest where fires have been controlled, there is a good second growth of mixed conifers and hardwoods.

General C. C. Andrews State Forest. This forest with a gross area of 8,325 acres of which 4,309 acres are state-owned, surrounds the state forest nursery of the same name. It is located in northern Pine county. Its chief purpose and value is for experimental planting in connection with the nursery and timber production in general. The soil is sandy and of low value for agriculture.

George Washington State Forest, containing a gross area of 371,000 acres, of which 99,511 acres are state-owned, lies in Itasca and St. Louis counties. The topography varies from flat spruce swamps and jack pine sand flats to rolling and even hilly country in the north and southwest. Most of the forest has been logged at one time or another. The forest is a mixture of all species with Norway pine predominating in virgin stands. The area contains numerous lakes of exceptional scenic beauty.

Grand Portage State Forest, with a gross area of 105,880 acres, 31,094 being state-owned, is located in Cook county. It has the roughest topography of any region in the state of Minnesota. The northern part of it has several lakes which in part are surrounded by precipitous cliffs from three to five hundred feet in height.

Kabetogama State Forest, covering a gross area of 789,800 acres, of which 165,473 are state-owned, lies in northern St. Louis county. The area is characterized by extremely rugged topography with much outcrop and a number of large lakes, some small lakes and numerous rivers and creeks. A large part of the area was originally covered by a stand of Norway and white pine with a large mixture of white spruce, cedar, balsam, birch, and in the lower areas pure stands of black spruce. There are comparatively few roads in the area, giving it a wilderness character which probably will prevail for many years to come. On the northeast the forest adjoins the Canadian boundary.

Koochiching State Forest, having a gross area of 208,855 acres, of which 148,670 acres are state-owned, lies in Koochiching county. It is characterized by a relatively flat topography with enormously large peat swamps covered in part by spruce swamps and in part by spruce forests of good merchantable quality. The area has been relatively inaccessible until in recent years and consequently much virgin timber remains. This is gradually being changed through selective logging and the construction of administrative roads. There are a few streams in the area but no lakes.

Land O' Lakes State Forest, with a gross area of 139,521 acres, of which 9,176 acres are state-owned, lies within Cass county. The topography is very hilly. There are numerous lakes, no large rivers but a number of smaller streams. The whole area was logged many years ago and a forest cover of mixed conifers and hardwoods has again become established.

Mille Lacs State Forest, with an area of 29,980 acres, of which 8,770 acres are state-owned, is situated in Aitkin county. Much of it is relatively flat and swampy and although it lies on the north shore of Mille Lacs Lake there is very little resort development. The forest as a whole is almost worthless for agriculture and only fair for the production of timber. Its chief value is for game cover and as a water reservoir.

Minnesota State Forest has an area of 211,739 acres, all of which is state-owned, and lies in Lake, Cook and St. Louis counties. This forest at the present time comprises the state land only which is located within a certain part of the Superior National Forest. The area lies between the Kabetogama State Forest and the Grand Portage and has most of the characteristics of these two. The topography is extremely rough and in some portions is mountainous. There are numerous large lakes and streams. The forest lies along the international boundary. These boundary forests are interesting inasmuch as this was the route used by the old voyageurs coming from Lake Superior and going westward into the interior of the continent. Within the forest are primitive areas many miles in extent which are accessible only by foot or canoe.

Mississippi Headwaters State Forest, having an area of 90,610 acres of which 8,611 acres are state-owned, lies in Hubbard, Clearwater and Beltrami counties. The topography of this forest is rolling to hilly. The Mississippi River which rises in Lake Itasca a short distance south of the forest, meanders north and northeasterly through the forest. The roughest topography is found along this river. There is a fairly large number of lakes and streams within this territory.

Nemadji State Forest, located in Pine and Carlton counties, contains 150,537 acres, of which 51,263 acres are state-owned. The topography varies considerably within the forest from level to extremely hilly with a great many boulders throughout almost the whole area. The soil for the most part is a heavy clay, although it verges on the jack pine sand type in some locations. The lakes are not very numerous but there are excellent small streams. The original forest was mostly white pine but this was all removed a great many years ago.

Northwest Angle State Forest contains 79,276 acres and is located in Lake of the Woods county, 9,928 acres are state-owned. The topography varies from level swamps to rolling country. A portion of the Angle was cut over during the past twenty years but much of it remains in its original state. There are a few lakes in this forest, but no roads whatsoever. Because of the primitive condition of the forest, fishing and hunting are particularly attractive. There are a great many moose, deer and bear in the forest. The possibility of nature and wildlife study is of the best.

Paul Bunyan State Forest, containing 152,920 acres, of which 59,520 acres are state-owned, lies within Hubbard county. The topography is extremely hilly with consistent irregularity to the arrangement of the hills. The soil is rather heavy, with numerous large boulders. There is a considerable number of lakes and several streams, all of which have recreational possibilities. The original stand of timber was mostly white and Norway pine but this through logging and repeated fires has been removed and replaced with aspen stands. A small portion on the west and northwest has re-established to jack pine of good quality.

Pillsbury State Forest, comprising 52,767 acres, of which 2,658 acres are state-owned, lies in Cass county. The topography is very hilly except in the extreme southwestern portion of the forest. In parts there are well stocked stands of jack pine, Norway pine, popple and birch. The area adjoins Gull Lake, which is one of the most highly developed private recreational areas in the state.

Pine Island State Forest, located in Koochiching and Beltrami counties, has an area of 587,829, of which 457,746 acres are state-owned. The topography is flat. There are several streams but no lakes. The strange characteristic is that the land adjoining the streams is somewhat higher than that farther back. According to geologists, it is part of the location of the glacial Lake Agassiz. Some of the area is still covered with virgin timber. This consists primarily of the so-called swamp species, spruce, tamarack and cedar. On the deep peat areas the tree growth is entirely stagnant and suitable only for Christmas trees.

Rum River State Forest, with a gross area of 57,600 acres, of which 2,817 acres are state-owned, is located in Mille Lacs and Kanabec counties. The topography is rather hilly and the soil predominantly heavy, containing a good many boulders. There are numerous lakes and rivers within the area and it has many roads and trails. The tree growth on most of the forest is very scattered.

Sand Dunes State Forest contains 7,680 acres of which 1,418 acres are state-owned. It is located in Sherburne county about fifty miles from the Twin Cities. Most of it has been farmed at one time but as the soil is composed of almost sterile sand, farming was a losing venture. The nature of the sand is such that it actually drifts like snow and forms sand dunes. Trees will grow on this sand and eventually tie down the sand and furnish timber and recreation.

Savanna State Forest has a gross area of 213,860 acres, of which 102,988 acres are state-owned, and lies within Aitkin county. The topography varies from comparatively large areas of flat peat swamps to rolling areas of jack pine and hilly areas of comparatively heavy soil. The Mississippi River bounds it on the west and a well known recreational area surrounding Big Sandy Lake takes in a large portion of the southwest part of the forest. There are a number of other good lakes and several streams within the area. The original forest cover which was predominantly white pine was cut off quite a few years ago. In many places the second growth timber is now mature and consists of many different varieties with aspen predominating.

Smoky Hills State Forest has a gross area of 109,874, of which 9,491 acres are state-owned, and lies within Becker county. The topography is rough with fairly heavy soil. There are quite a number of large and small lakes of considerable scenic value. The area was logged many years ago and has restocked to a variety of tree species with aspen predominating. There are some peat swamps with fair stands of tamarack.

St. Croix State Forest, having a gross area of 78,282 acres, of which 4,053 acres are state-owned, is located in Pine county. Most of this forest has a sandy soil, varying from pure sand to a sandy loam. The original forest was predominantly white and Norway pine. Some of the area was cleared and cultivated for agriculture and much has been burned over due to various causes. Some areas of good second growth jack pine occur which indicates that under management the forest is capable of producing a good volume of timber. It has a high value as a game producing area.

Third River State Forest, with a gross area of 46,227 acres, of which 18,059 acres are state-owned, lies within Itasca county. The topography is rolling with numerous lakes and streams. A considerable quantity of virgin timber, primarily white and Norway pine, can still be found although most of the area is covered with a second growth of mixed species, predominantly aspen.

White Earth State Forest has a gross area of 203,285 acres, of which 22,900 acres are state-owned, and is located in Mahnomen, Clearwater and Becker counties. The topography is rolling to very hilly, with numerous lakes scattered throughout the area. The hills in the eastern part of the forest constitute the watershed which supplies much of the water for the source of the Mississippi. Towards the west the same hills are the source of several large drainage systems. Originally much of the area was covered by excellent stands of Norway and white pine. This has all been logged, however, and has been replaced by second growth which is predominantly popple, with excellent stands of white, Norway and jack pine. Some of the lakes have excellent recreational possibilities.

MINNESOTA GOVERNMENT

Minnesota's government is divided into three branches—the legislative to make the laws, the judiciary to interpret the laws, and the executive to enforce and administer them.

All operate within the framework of the state constitution, which is subject to amendment by the voters of the state acting on provisions submitted to them by the legislature.

LEGISLATURE

The Legislature is composed of the House of Representatives and the Senate. It meets regularly every odd-numbered year, for not more than 90 legislative days, and can be summoned by the governor for special sessions at any time. Each branch makes its own rules for conduct of members, and legislators are not liable for anything said during discussion on the floor. One Senator and one or more Representatives are elected in each of the state's 67 legislative districts.

House of Representatives—131 members, elected for two-year terms. Salary \$2,000 per term plus \$10 per day during special sessions. Presided over by a Speaker, elected by Representatives from among their own membership. All revenue raising measures must originate in the House.

Senate—67 members, elected for four-year terms. Salary \$4,000 per term plus \$10 per day for special sessions. Lieutenant Governor is presiding officer. Senate elects a President Pro Tempore from among its membership, to serve during absence of Lieutenant Governor. President Pro Tempore is next in line for succession to the Governor's office if Governor and Lieutenant Governor are both unable to serve. Gubernatorial appointments of department heads and members of boards and commissions are subject to Senate confirmation.

JUDICIARY

State Supreme Court—One Chief Justice, six Associate Justices. Elected for six-year terms. Chief Justice salary \$12,000 per year. Associate Justices' salary \$11,000 per year. Clerk of Supreme Court, elected for four-year term, salary \$6,300 per year.

The Court has direct jurisdiction in certain remedial cases, and receives appeals from district and certain municipal courts. It is in session from first Tuesday after the first Monday in January each year to the end of the year, with recesses at discretion of the court. A reporter appointed by the court edits its decisions for publication in "Minnesota Reports."

The Law Library, under general supervision of the Supreme Court, contains American, English, Canadian and Colonial books of law, and collections of public documents of Minnesota and other states. The State Librarian is appointed by the governor for two years.

District Courts—One or more in each of 19 judicial districts in the state. Judges elected for six-year terms, salary from \$8,000 to \$9,500 per year. They have jurisdiction over civil and criminal cases, and can receive appeals from some municipal or probate courts and justices of the peace.

Probate Courts—One in each county, Judge of Probate elected by voters of county. Jurisdiction only over estates of deceased persons and over cases involving persons under guardianship.

Municipal Courts—Established in cities and villages. Jurisdiction in civil cases involving not more than \$500, in criminal cases when punishment does not exceed \$100 fine or three months imprisonment. Jurisdiction co-extensive with county in which located.

Justices of the Peace—Elected in townships, villages, cities. Jurisdiction over actions arising within county when amount of civil case does not involve more than \$100, or when criminal case involves punishment not exceeding \$100 fine or three months imprisonment.

EXECUTIVE AND ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICIALS

Governor—Elected for two-year term. Salary \$12,000 per year. Commander-in-Chief of state military. Ex officio member of state pardon board, executive council, state board of investment, legislative advisory council. Has veto power over measures passed by legislature. Appoints certain department heads and members of administrative boards and commissions.

Lieutenant-Governor—Elected for two-year term. Salary \$4,000 per term. Presides over State Senate. Becomes Governor during vacancy in that office.

Secretary of State—Elected for a two-year term. Salary \$6,900 plus \$1,800 as Registrar of Motor Vehicles. He is official custodian of State papers and legislative records. Public and private corporation papers of Minnesota companies as well as those of other states which become authorized to operate in Minnesota under the Foreign Corporation Act are filed in his office. He is custodian of the original United States Government Survey notes of Minnesota and the township plats drawn from these notes and supplies certified photo copies of either or both upon request.

State election machinery, from the preparation of the forms to be used through the filing of the candidates for the various offices and collection of the required fees, the preparation and printing of the State ballot, the certifying of the names of candidates to county auditors to be carried on the county ballots, the distribution to the auditors of the state and constitutional amendment ballots and forms for making returns, the collating of these returns and the final canvassing of the votes operate through his office. He is charged with the preparation of the laws passed by the legislature for publication.

As registrar of motor vehicles he must prepare all the forms required in the registration of all cars and trucks, collect the required fee, mail or deliver the proper plates and the registration card required. He also conducts examinations for those requiring chauffeurs licenses and issues such licenses to applicants who qualify.

The Legislative Manual or Blue Book is prepared, compiled, edited and distributed through his office.

State Auditor—Elected for four year term. Salary \$8,700. Under the constitution, the auditor is the state's chief accounting officer, and pre-audits every bill, claim or evidence of debt against the state. No money can legally go out of the state treasury except upon auditor's warrant. He is the custodian of all contracts and other documents relating to the state's financial condition and directs the appropriation cash and encumbrance controls against state expenditures. He records receipts and disbursements and directs the state's fund accounting, reporting thereon to the legislature every two years and to the governor every three months. He develops and maintains a uniform accounting system for every department, division and state agency. He maintains a detailed record of the state's indebtedness and of the state's investments and certifies to the legislature the amount of debt, principal and interest due in any tax period. He certifies the amounts of municipal debt to the various county auditors and the dates thereof. He pays the salaries, expenses and retirement annuities of the district court judges, reimburses the counties their share of state bounties and pays the sheriffs for costs of transporting state prisoners. He distributes to the various municipal subdivisions their share of state aids, special taxes, etc. He is a member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Investment, and the State Land Exchange Commission. He is a member of the State Highway Board of Allotment and an ex officio member of the retirement associations for state employees, state teachers, and public employees, and of the state historical society.

State Treasurer—Elected for two-year term. Salary \$8,700 per year. Member of the Executive Council, Investment and Allotment Boards. Custodian of all State Funds, Investment Securities, Guaranty Fund and Collateral Securities. He collects certain taxes and receipts for payment thereof. He keeps detailed accounts of receipts and disbursements and is the paymaster for the State of Minnesota with special designation as ex officio Treasurer for various boards.

Attorney General—Elected for two years. Salary \$11,000 per year. Represents the state in all civil actions and in criminal cases before the supreme court. Renders legal opinions to state legislature, state officials and county and village attorneys and legal assistance to state boards, commissions, and departments. Besides being state's chief law officer, the Attorney General is also by the state constitution made a member of the Board of Pardons and State Land Exchange Commission, and by statute a member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Investment and Voting Machine Commission.

Railroad and Warehouse Commission—Three members, elected for six years, one every two years. Salary \$5,000 per year plus \$1500 each as commissioner in the grain inspection division. The Commission has general jurisdiction over rail, bus and truck rates, and street railway rates, and issuance of certificates of indebtedness, railroad service, for hire bus and truck lines, and telephone companies.

The Commission's Grain Inspection Division samples, inspects and weighs grain and commercial coal in carload lots. Appeals from its decisions may be taken to the Board of Grain Appeals at Minneapolis, consisting of three members appointed by the Governor. The board is independent of the Commission, but salaries and expenses are paid from the grain inspection fund.

Other divisions within the Commission inspect weights and measures, regulate rates and charges of public stockyards, regulate operations of public warehouses (grain and merchandise), license livestock buyers, and inspect meters outside cities of the first class.

Executive Council—Composed of Governor, Secretary of State, State Auditor, State Treasurer, Attorney General. Performs duties formerly handled by state timber commission, state board of deposit, state land commission, and state board of relief.

Board of Investment—Composed of Governor, State Auditor, State Treasurer, Attorney General and one member of University of Minnesota Board of Regents. Invests permanent trust funds, state employees' retirement fund, public employees' retirement fund, teachers' insurance and retirement fund, and soldiers' welfare fund. Also invests the highway patrolmen's retirement fund.

Legislative Advisory Committee—Composed of chairmen of Senate committees on Finance and on Taxes and Tax Laws, and chairmen of House committees on appropriations and on Taxes and Tax Laws, with State Commissioner of Administration as secretary. Makes recommendations regarding disposition of the general contingent appropriation, War Veterans Fund, and Minnesota Metropolitan Airports Fund. The Governor presides over the meetings of the committee, but is not a member thereof.

Legislative Research Committee—The Legislative Research Committee was created by the 1947 Legislature to gather factual information for members of the Legislature.

Members of the Committee are chosen before the close of each regular session and serve until the opening day of the succeeding regular session.

The Committee consists of nine Senators—one from each congressional district chosen by caucus, and nine members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House.

The Committee maintains a permanent research staff to conduct its studies. Proposals for study can be submitted by any member of the

Legislature and if accepted, are assigned to functional sub-committees under whose direction the research staff prepares a report. All reports are subject to approval by the full Committee.

Board of Pardons—Composed of Governor, Attorney General, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court. Empowered to grant or reject petitions for pardons or commutation of sentences of persons convicted of offenses against state laws.

DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND NAVAL AFFAIRS

The Adjutant General is the head of the Department of Military and Naval Affairs. His office is charged with the administration, training, discipline and supply of the military forces of the State. In time of peace the military force of the State is designated as the Minnesota National Guard, which is equipped and, to a very large extent, maintained by the federal government under the provisions of the National Defense Act of 1920, as amended. This force has a dual status, in that it is the Minnesota National Guard when in the service of the State and the National Guard of the United States when it is ordered into the active military service of the United States during periods of war or great National emergency. During periods when all or a substantial part of the National Guard is in active federal service and the security and welfare of the State is endangered because of the absence from the State of this military force, the Military Code of Minnesota prescribes that the military force of the state will consist of the Minnesota State Guard, organized from those of the Militia of the State who are not likely to be called to federal service during the war or emergency.

The Minnesota National Guard was reorganized after World War II, beginning in September of 1946 and, as of January 15, 1951, consisted of 116 units with a strength of 8,600 officers and men. As of that date, all but two battalions with a strength of less than 1,000 officers and men had been mobilized or were under orders for mobilization for active federal service. The 47th Infantry Division is in training at Camp Rucker, Alabama; the 109th Transportation Truck Battalion is at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin; the Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 216th AAA Group is on duty at Camp Stewart, Georgia; and the 133rd Fighter Wing, Air National Guard, is to be federalized for active duty on March 1, 1951.

The department is now in the process of organizing a Minnesota State Guard which will consist of two Group Headquarters of 15 Battalions, located in the 66 communities in Minnesota in which the National Guard was organized. Whereas the National Guard is armed, uniformed, equipped and paid for armory drill and field training by the federal government, the State Guard receives no pay, except when they are on emergency duty in the interest of the State, and the State must assume a major share in supplying arms, uniforms and equipment for this force.

The Department of Military and Naval Affairs has control and jurisdiction over the Camp Ripley Military Reservation; 50 State-owned or controlled armories throughout the State; the Holman Air National Guard Base and the Duluth Air National Guard Base.

HANDLING THE STATE'S BUSINESS

The reorganization act of 1939 re-grouped various departments of the state government and established a system of cross-checking and auditing to enable each department to know how much money it would have for operating expenses during any quarter, and to prevent spending in one quarter money provided for operation during the succeeding one.

The Department of Administration, created by this Act, is under the supervision of a Commissioner of Administration. The Depart-

ment is constituted as a staff agency of the Governor, dealing with: (a) budgeting and finances, (b) purchasing and contracting, and (c) care and custody of State properties. All State departments and agencies are subject to the Department of Administration, except the University, certain examining and licensing boards, the Legislature, and the judiciary.

Preparation of a biennial budget, operation of a quarterly allotment system, and supervision of state expenditures through an encumbrance system are responsibilities of the Department. The law provides that budget allotments from any state fund shall not exceed available current resources of that fund.

Supervision and control of state purchases and contracts are placed under the Commissioner. The Department does centralized purchasing for the state and operates central supply and central duplicating divisions. The Commissioner supervises printing and advertising for state departments and exercises duties relating to publication of legal notices.

The Department maintains and operates the capitol group of buildings, and provides telephone and mailing services therefor. It supervises the maintenance and repair of other state-owned buildings, controls rental of property by the State, supervises construction of buildings, and maintains a perpetual inventory and periodical inspection of state property.

To assure adherence to the provisions of law respecting budget allotments and to institute a basis for expenditure control, every allotment is submitted to the **state auditor** to determine the availability of appropriation balances. Where appropriation balances are available, the auditor encumbers thereof such amounts as may be necessary to meet the obligations of the individual allotment, and draws his warrant to pay such obligation when the services are rendered or the materials are delivered according to contract.

Department of Public Examiner. The Public Examiner is required to post audit and make an examination of the financial transactions of all State departments, boards, commissions and other State agencies, at least once a year. Reports covering such audits should set forth whether funds have been expended for the purposes outlined in the appropriations therefor; whether all receipts have been accounted for; all illegal and unbusinesslike practices, if any; and recommendations for greater simplicity, accuracy, efficiency and economy. Such audit reports must be filed with the department concerned, the Governor and the Legislature, and in cases of malfeasance, misfeasance, or nonfeasance on the part of any officer or employee, a verified copy of the report must be filed with the secretary of the Legislative Advisory Committee and the Attorney General. Copies are also furnished the Commissioner of Administration and the State Auditor.

The Public Examiner is also required to make annual audits of all counties of the State, cities of the first class, and to make examinations of other local units of government when called upon to do so either by request of the governing body or upon petition of freeholders.

The Public Examiner is also directed to inquire into the accounting and budgeting systems of all local units of government and to prescribe suitable systems of accounts and budgeting. He is also required to collect annually from all local units of government information as to the assessment of property, collection of taxes, receipts from various sources, expenditures of public funds for all purposes, borrowings, etc., and to file in his office a summary report of the information so collected.

The Department of Aeronautics, headed by the Commissioner, fosters air commerce within the state and has supervision over the aeronautical activities and facilities within the state, including super-

vision and control over all airports, emergency landing strips, air instruction, air marking, air beacons, and all navigation facilities, and the registration of all pilots and aircraft. Under the appropriations for airport aids the Department gives assistance to municipalities in the form of matching funds for airport improvement and development.

The Department of Taxation, with a **Commissioner of Taxation** superseding the former Tax Commission, was created under the Reorganization Act of 1939. The Commissioner, in addition to assuming the powers and duties vested in the former Commission, is also charged with the responsibility of administering tax laws formerly exercised by other state departments.

The Department as now organized consists of:

(1) A General Administrative Division which has supervision over the administration of general property assessment laws, including those relating to local assessors, county assessors, and supervisors of assessments, local boards of review and county boards of equalization. It also administers special laws governing the imposition of occupation and royalty taxes on the iron mining industry, gross earnings taxes imposed on railroads and other public service corporations, forfeited tax laws, and laws relating generally to the ad valorem assessment of public utilities, including the assessment and taxation of air flight property. Within this Division the Commission has created a research unit with a director in charge for the purpose of developing statistical and general tax research useful to the public.

(2) The Income Tax Division exercising supervision over all matters relating to income and franchise taxes.

(3) The Petroleum Division wherein is vested supervision over all laws relating to gasoline taxes, special use fuel taxes, petroleum inspections, and other related subjects.

(4) The Inheritance and Gift Tax Division having supervision over all laws relating to inheritance and gift taxes.

(5) The Cigarette Division which administers the law imposing cigarette taxes.

The Commissioner, as directing head of the Department, has to assist him a deputy, a departmental secretary, five directors, and others who exercise limited supervision over matters of administration.

Appeals from decisions of the Commissioner of Taxation can be taken to the **Board of Tax Appeals**, a three-man body created by the same 1939 act which established the Department of Taxation. This board has the power to review and redetermine all decisions of the Commissioner respecting fees, taxes and assessments.

Laws relating to care of and assistance to the indigent, unemployed, and physically and mentally handicapped are administered by the **Department of Social Security**, composed of the Division of Social Welfare, the Division of Employment and Security, and the Division of Public Institutions. Directors of the three divisions make up the **Social Security Board**, of which the director of the Division of Social Welfare is chairman.

The Division of Social Welfare has general supervision over expenditure of state appropriations and federal grants for relief purposes and for aid to old persons, dependent children, needy blind and persons otherwise handicapped who are outside of state institutions. It supervises county welfare boards through which most of these activities are carried on locally. It supervises and administers all child welfare activities, including supervision of maternity hospitals and children's homes, licensing of public and private children's agencies and institutions, placement of state wards for adoption or care. It is legal guardian for dependent and neglected children. It operates the State Sanatorium and administers aid to county tuberculosis sana-

toria. It operates a program for crippled children and a rehabilitation program for blind and visually handicapped persons.

The Division of Public Institutions supervises eight mental hospitals which are located at Anoka, Hastings, Willmar, Fergus Falls, Rochester, St. Peter, Moose Lake and Sandstone; the Minnesota School and Colony at Faribault; the Cambridge State School and Hospital; Braille and Sight Saving School and the School for the Deaf at Faribault; the State Reformatory for Women at Shakopee and the State Reformatory for Men at St. Cloud; the State Prison at Stillwater and the Gillette State Hospital for Crippled Children in St. Paul.

The Division of Employment and Security administers the Minnesota Employment and Security Law, which must comply with the provisions of the federal Social Security Act and the federal Internal Revenue Code. The administrative costs are financed 100 per cent by federal funds appropriated by Congress. The Division administers three programs: The state employment service, the state unemployment compensation program, and the federal veterans readjustment allowance program. It maintains 33 full-time offices in Minnesota and 113 part-time offices which are open one or more days in each week. It assists job applicants in finding jobs and employers in finding workers. It provides special services to applicants such as occupational information and counseling. It provides statistical information to the public and cooperates with the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics in labor market analysis and trends. It maintains a special farm employment program. Approximately 3,200 employers are subject to the Minnesota Employment and Security Law, and approximately 800,000 workers are covered by it. Contributions collected from subject employers are placed in a Trust Fund to be used exclusively for the payment of benefits to eligible workers unemployed through no fault of their own. Since 1944, the Division has administered, under agreement with the Veterans Administration, Title V of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, which provides for the payment of federal unemployment and self-employment allowances to veterans.

The Department of Agriculture Dairy and Food headed by the Commissioner of Agriculture is charged with encouragement of agricultural development. It administers laws governing organization of co-operatives, supervises agencies handling farm products, and collects and compiles agricultural statistics.

The department also enforces dairy and food laws, regulates and inspects places where foods are manufactured, stored, or sold, enforces the Wholesale Dealers Act, and administers laws prohibiting fraudulent advertising. It issues licenses for milk, eggs, Babcock test, fur farms, creameries, condenseries, cream stations, cheese factories, milk plants, horse meat, oleomargarine, ice cream, cigarettes for common carriers, canneries, beverage plants, cold storage warehouses, wholesale dealers, and locker plants. It has charge of feed and fertilizer registrations and economic poisons registrations.

The department is charged with the inspection of nursery stock, apiaries, investigation of sale, transportation, distribution, and adaptation of agricultural seeds, weed control, and inspection service for seed potato growers and certifies potatoes found to meet the requirements of our seed potato certification law and regulations.

The Commissioner of Highways directs the construction, improvement, and maintenance of the 11,893 miles of trunk highways in the state. He also administers the State Highway Patrol, the Drivers License law and the Safety Responsibility Act.

The Commissioner of Highways has supervisory authority over the state aid highways. He is also a member of the Allotment Board, comprised of the State Auditor, State Treasurer and Commissioner of Highways, which Board makes the allotments from the state road

and bridge fund to the counties for use on the state aid and county aid road systems.

The Department of Commerce has the general duty of protecting residents of the state against fraudulent or unsound business practices. It is composed of three divisions:

The Division of Banking has supervisory powers over state banks, savings banks, trust companies, savings, building and loan associations, credit unions, small loan companies, industrial loan and thrift companies and certain investment companies.

The Insurance Division is charged with the enforcement of all insurance laws. Its main functions are in a general way to protect, inform and assist policyholders and the public; to supervise some eight hundred companies doing an insurance business in the state; to collect about 4½ millions for the state through premium taxes and fees levied on insurers and agents; to assist insurance companies on various matters; and to furnish information relating to insurance to other departments of the state, commissioners of insurance of other states and federal agencies.

The Commissioner of Insurance, in addition to serving on various statutory boards, such as the Compensation Insurance Board and several Retirement fund boards, is also the State Fire Marshal. In that capacity he maintains and directs a staff of employees for the enforcement of laws relating to fire prevention; arson; the storage, sale and use of combustibles and explosives; and exits in public places.

The Division of Securities passes upon all applications for licenses to sell securities in the state; supervises and licenses dealers, brokers, investment advisers and agents; investigates and prosecutes violations of the state securities act; and by means of personal contact with law enforcing officials and county newspaper editors, constantly carries on an educational campaign to prevent fraud in the sale of worthless securities before loss occurs.

The Surveyor General of Logs and Lumber is charged with the duty of scaling all state timber cut on any state lands, surveys such timber before the Division of Forestry closes the sale, and scaling privately-owned timber for fees when requested by the owner. The Surveyor General is appointed by the governor for two years.

The Department of Labor and Industry handles problems directly affecting workers and employers. Within the department are seven divisions—Accident Prevention, Boiler Inspection, Statistics, Steam-fitting Standards, Voluntary Apprenticeship, Women and Children, and Workmen's Compensation.

The three members of the **Industrial Commission** administer the Department of Labor and Industry and act as an appellate body to hear and determine appeals from decisions of referees in workmen's compensation cases.

The Division of Conciliation is nominally a unit of the Department of Labor and Industry, but operates as an independent department under direction of a Labor Conciliator appointed by the Governor. The Conciliator administers the state labor relations act, designed to settle labor disputes, avoid strikes and lockouts and promote industrial peace.

Under terms of this law, workers or employers must notify the Conciliator 10 days in advance of any projected strike or lockout. He then attempts settlement of the dispute. If he fails and if the dispute involves an industry in which a stoppage would be detrimental to the public interest, he may refer the matter to the Governor, who can name a three-man fact-finding commission to investigate it and

report its findings and recommendations to him within 30 days. During that period the proposed strike or lockout must be delayed. Neither the Conciliator nor the fact-finding commissions have judicial or police powers, but violations of the law are enforceable in the courts.

Whenever a question concerning the representative of employees is raised by an employee or group of employees or employer, upon request, the conciliator is required to investigate and certify the representative designated or selected.

The Civil Service Department is the central personnel agency for the state classified service. Its organization includes a quasi-judicial and policy-making board, a Director as administrative head, and three divisions within the department, namely: the Classification and Pay Division, the Recruiting and Examining Division, and the Transactions and Office Management Division. The activities of the Civil Service Department include examining and placement, maintenance of the classification and salary plans, and the establishment of employment procedures.

The Department of Rural Credit was established in 1923 to make farm loans to owner-occupants. Lending was discontinued in 1933 and the department was placed under a Conservator who was directed to dispose of the department's business as prudently as possible. The 1947 Legislature transferred the Department of Rural Credit to the Division of Banking, making the Commissioner of Banks Ex officio Conservator to continue the department's liquidation.

Administration of state liquor laws is vested in the **Liquor Control Commissioner**, appointed by the Governor. The Commissioner regulates importation and sale of intoxicating liquor, wine and beer, designates denomination of excise tax stamps and enforces collection of state taxes. Liquor tax stamps are sold by the State Treasurer but it is the responsibility of the Commissioner to audit all dealers' tax accounts for alcoholic beverages and to prevent the sale of untaxed liquor. It is his further duty to license manufacturers and wholesalers and issue various types of permits to dealers. Off Sale retail liquor licenses are subject to the Commissioner's approval, and On Sale licenses and municipal stores are registered with the Department. The Commissioner promulgates regulations to govern the collection of taxes, retail licensing conditions, and for standard of quality of alcoholic beverages, advertising and other matters. The Department renders assistance to local enforcement officers through inspection and investigating services.

The Bureau of Criminal Apprehension is headed by a superintendent appointed by the Governor. The Bureau cooperates with all other peace officers in the detection of crime and apprehension of criminals, maintains a laboratory and files of fingerprints and other criminological data, and operates a radio broadcasting station to aid in the arrest of offenders and recovery of property.

The State Department of Health is the operating force for the State Board of Health, composed of nine members appointed by the Governor for three-year terms.

The Board is the official agency for health administration in the state. The state board of health may make such reasonable rules and regulations as may be necessary for the public health of the state. It has authority to exercise general supervision of all health boards and officers, investigate sanitary conditions, learn the cause and source of diseases and epidemics, observe the effect upon human health of localities and employments, and gather and diffuse proper information upon all subjects to which its duties relate. The board also has the authority to gather, collate and publish medical and vital

statistics of general value, and advise all state officials and boards in hygienic and medical matters.

Office of the Commissioner of the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation was created by the 1941 Legislature and is charged with the duty of developing all resources and providing Vocational Training and rehabilitation of residents of any county in which natural resources have been depleted, with resultant unemployment and distress.

The Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation Commission was created by the 1943 Legislature and has the duty of acting in an advisory capacity to the Commissioner of the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation. The Commission is composed of three members of the Senate and three from the House of Representatives, the seventh member being the Commissioner of Conservation, all being appointed for a term of two years. Meetings are held quarterly and projects proposed and recommended by the Commissioner are reviewed and are modified, accepted or rejected. The Commission is also charged with the study of labor costs on the production of iron ore.

The Revisor of Statutes prepares and revises the Minnesota Statutes and Annotations for publications, and edits the Session Laws. The revisor is appointed by the Supreme Court.

The Department of Veterans Affairs assists Minnesota veterans and their dependents in obtaining federal and state benefits to which they may be entitled; administers funds approved by the legislature for the benefit of disabled veterans and their dependents; rehabilitation and education of veterans of WW II; war orphans' education of WW I and WW II; erection of headstones, furnished by Federal Government, and grave markers; funds for the maintenance of rest camps; maintains a permanent registry of the graves of all veterans buried in Minnesota; administers the laws relating to Indian War veterans; acts as custodian of all bonus records; acts as guardian for minor or incompetent persons; maintains a contact with veterans confined in state institutions; supervises and cooperates with the county veteran service officers of the counties of the State; administers the payment of bonus to veterans of World War II.

The Youth Conservation Commission, as established by the 1947 Legislature, has the responsibility of coordinating facilities which deal in the treatment of delinquents and youthful offenders. The Commission accepts commitment of all children and youth under the age of twenty-one who are adjudged delinquent or found guilty of crime and who the judges feel present behavior problems with which the assistance of state facilities is needed. The needs of each committed youth are considered individually, and all efforts are made to help him develop socially, physically, psychologically, and spiritually. The correctional schools at Red Wing and Sauk Centre were transferred to the Youth Conservation Commission on July 1, 1949 and the programs for individualized help initiated.

The prevention program is developed to meet at the local level problems which may arise. It also offers expert services in the coordination of the health, welfare, educational, religious, recreational, law enforcement, and other agencies serving youth. The prevention program is locally developed to meet local needs.

The statistical department has developed means for determining the size of Minnesota's problem of delinquency and crime among youth by establishing a base enabling the state to determine trends or particular areas of difficulty. It must also test, insofar as possible, every step of the Youth Conservation Commission's program to see that it is as effective and efficient as possible.

STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM

Article VIII of the State Constitution makes it "the duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools," establishes the permanent school fund, and requires the legislature to "make such provisions, by taxation or otherwise as, with the income arising from the school fund, will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools in each township in the State."

The whole area of the state is organized into school districts. Each is under direction of a school board elected by the people, with the exception of a few special districts in which direction of the schools is vested in some other municipal body.

County superintendents of schools, elected for a four-year term, have administrative and supervisory powers in relation to rural ungraded schools.

Chapter 334, Laws of 1919, created a State Department of Education under direction of a non-salaried board of five citizens, appointed for five-year terms by the Governor with consent of the Senate. The State Board of Education also acts as the State Board for Vocational Education in administering federal programs of vocational education. The board is required by law to hold an annual meeting the first Tuesday in August and to hold quarterly meetings.

Secretary and executive officer of board is the Commissioner of Education, elected by the board for six years. The Commissioner is ex officio a member of the State Teachers Retirement Fund Board and a member and secretary of the State Teachers College Board. He is "responsible for efficient administration and discipline of the various offices and divisions in the organization of the Department of Education."

The schools of the state derive support from local, state, and county sources. The state's share approximates 40 per cent of the cost of school maintenance. The following state funds contribute to the support of schools.

(1) The Endowment Fund, income from the permanent school fund.

(2) The Special State Aid Fund, an amount transferred from the Income Tax School Fund and appropriated biennially by the legislature.

(3) The Income Tax School Fund.

The first fund is apportioned to districts on the basis of school attendance.

The purposes of the aid distributed from the Special State Aid Fund and the basis for determining the sums to be paid the several school districts are found in the state aid laws. The aids are distributed:

(1) To assist in providing equal educational opportunities through (a) the payment of reimbursement aid for transportation or board of resident pupils in school districts which are consolidated; high school pupils residing in districts not maintaining high schools; crippled children who cannot walk to school; isolated elementary school pupils; and elementary pupils in closed school districts; (b) payment of tuition for nonresident high school pupils.

(2) To aid in establishing a minimum program of education through the payment of basic aid. An amount fixed by law is paid per pupil unit in average daily attendance to all districts maintaining public schools classified under standards established by the State Board of Education and conforming to certain minimum provisions of the law.

(3) To assist school districts with high tax levies for maintenance. Equalization aid is paid to school districts with an assessed valuation per resident pupil unit of less than \$2,300 in inverse ratio to the assessed valuation per pupil unit, and emergency aid is granted to those districts that are unable to maintain school with the regular state aid and reasonable local effort.

(4) To stimulate educational progress. Aid is granted to encourage (a) the establishment of special classes for children who are handicapped by blindness, deafness, defective speech, subnormal mentality or physical impairment, and (b) vocational training. Federal aid is also provided for vocational training in agriculture, home economics, trade and industrial education and distributive occupations.

(5) To provide for the maintenance of teacher training departments in high schools.

From the receipts of the State Income Tax the districts are apportioned \$10 per year for each child six to sixteen years of age in the district and \$10 for each child sixteen to seventeen years of age attending school.

The State Department of Education makes the distribution of these aids according to law.

The Division of Graded Elementary, Secondary Schools and Junior Colleges exercises general supervision over the public graded elementary, secondary schools and junior colleges of the state by visiting these schools and receiving reports from them. It also advises superintendents and school boards, prepares materials for use and administers the standards set up for these schools by the State Board of Education. Audio-visual aids are under the supervision of this Division.

The Rural School Division conducts institutes for rural teachers in each county in the state and meetings for rural school board members, assists in organization of consolidations and reorganizing of school districts, supervises transportation of pupils, and under an agreement with the federal government supervises approximately forty schools attended by Indian children.

The Division of High School Teacher Training and Handicapped Children supervises instruction in the high school teacher training departments, approves teachers selected for the work and requires annual reports of progress. The division also supervises special classes for handicapped children in public schools, instruction in the home, hospitals and sanatoria for such children.

The Vocational Education Division under direction of the State Board for Vocational Education supervises programs of training in agriculture, home economics, trade and industrial education and distributive occupations in accordance with state plans approved by the United States Office of Education to assure that these departments maintain standards entitling them to reimbursement from federal and special state aid funds. Licensing of private trade schools and guidance service are also supervised by this Division.

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation provides vocational advisement and training for physically handicapped persons through use of state and federal funds. It operates in cooperation with the State Department of Labor and Industry, the Division of Services for Crippled Children and the Division for the Blind in the State Department of Social Security, the public schools, and various other public and private agencies which work with the handicapped.

The Division of Physical and Health Education, Safety and Recreation, in addition to supervising the school programs in these fields, aids in planning community recreation programs.

Division of School Buildings and Business Administration examines the plans and specifications and advises with local school officials and architects in planning and improvement of school plant

facilities. Rules for schoolhouse construction including rules of the State Board of Health relating to sanitary standards are prepared and distributed by this division.

The Division of Teacher Personnel issues certificates of qualification to teach in public schools and examines qualifications of teachers employed by local districts. The Teachers Employment Bureau is maintained as a part of this division.

The Library Division serves as a clearing house on all library problems, and aims to give impetus to library development in the state. It operates a circulating library to provide books and other reading materials for rural communities.

STATE TEACHERS COLLEGES

At the first session of the State Legislature, in 1858, provision was made for three state normal schools "to educate and prepare teachers for teaching in the common schools." These were established at Winona in 1860, Mankato in 1868 and St. Cloud in 1869. Schools were opened, at Moorhead in 1888, at Duluth in 1902, and at Bemidji in 1919. In 1921 the Legislature designated all as Teachers Colleges and gave the State Teachers College Board authority to grant appropriate degrees to students who complete prescribed courses. Duluth State Teachers College was made a branch of the University of Minnesota in 1948.

The Teachers Colleges devote themselves primarily to the preparation of teachers for the elementary and secondary schools. Each maintains two-year courses to prepare teachers for elementary schools. Each maintains four-year courses for more advanced training of elementary teachers, for training supervisors and teachers of special subjects, and for training secondary school teachers. The degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred upon those who complete a four-year course. The diplomas of the Teachers Colleges are accepted by the State Department of Education as basis for the issuance of certificates which qualify teachers for employment in public schools.

Each conducts a summer term, under the same standards of instruction as the regular term, designed to give opportunity for further training of rural teachers.

The Teachers Colleges are supported by appropriations made biennially by the Legislature and by tuition charged the students.

All of the colleges are under direction of the State Teachers College Board. Eight members of the board are appointed by the Governor with consent of the Senate, one "resident director" from each county in which a Teachers College is located and two from the state at large. The board members serve without compensation for four-year terms. The Commissioner of Education serves as ninth member and secretary of the board. The president of the board is elected by the board at an annual meeting which is held the first Tuesday in June.

The Teachers College Board is charged with responsibility for appointment of all presidents, teachers and other employees, general management of the colleges, and recommendations for improvements.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Because it prepares young people for the future, training them in the professions, broadening their outlook and strengthening their sense of service, the University of Minnesota may properly be called the most important among state institutions.

The University of Minnesota is the second largest state university in the United States in numbers of full-time students of college and graduate status. Admission to the University of Minnesota is granted those who have graduated from any accredited Minnesota secondary school and to a small number of superior students from other states.

In 1949-50 there were 35,174 different collegiate students enrolled at one time or another in the University. In addition, over 18,000 adults sat in General Extension courses, and there were 23,575 individuals attending short courses, institutes, laboratory schools, the Schools of Agriculture and other noncollegiate educational programs. The overall instructional load of the University in that single year involved 71,941 persons.

But the University of Minnesota, like all great universities, has expanded far beyond its teaching and training programs. In its diverse research laboratories on three campuses, at the several agricultural experiment stations, at the Rosemount Research Center, and at the University Hospitals, its scientists at any one moment are working on countless research experiments of vital interest to the future health and welfare of all of us. These projects deal with such matters as cancer, poliomyelitis, taxation, low-grade iron ore, cheese making, teacher training, municipal government, nuclear fission, new varieties and strains of grains and fruits, supersonics and transconics.

The people of Minnesota are proud of their University, not because it is the second largest state university in the nation, but because of the extent and quality of its services from which they, their families, communities, and organizations benefit.

COLLEGES OF THE UNIVERSITY

College of Science, Literature, and the Arts: Specialized training in a variety of fields, combined with liberal education in courses selected to support professional work. Journalism, social sciences, natural sciences, languages, music and art constitute some of the subject matter offered by the divisions of the college.

Institute of Technology: Professional training in engineering is offered by the four branches of the Institute: College of Engineering, and the Schools of Architecture, Chemistry, and Mines and Metallurgy.

College of Agriculture, Forestry, Home Economics and Veterinary Medicine: Offers course work in a wide range of subject areas, concentrating on both the theoretical and applied aspects of such subjects as food technology, fish and wildlife management, agricultural education, agricultural business administration, forest management and home economics.

College of Education: Preparation for teaching in kindergarten and primary grades, and in elementary, junior and senior high schools; also programs for school librarians, teachers of handicapped children, and those interested in public health work.

Graduate School: All work toward advanced degrees is administered in this school.

Medical School: Preparation for the practice of medicine; also courses in medical technology, physical and occupational therapies and mortuary science. The School of Nursing offers training for practical nursing and home management, and advanced professional courses in medical, psychiatric, surgical, and other nursing fields.

School of Dentistry: A professional school for training dentists and dental hygienists.

College of Pharmacy: Preparation for "the science of compounding, using, and dispensing medicines."

Law School: Preparation for the professional bachelor of laws which qualifies one for bar examination and admission to practice; also, preparation for the non-professional bachelor of science in law.

School of Business Administration: General courses in business and in accounting, advertising, industrial relations, merchandising and other business specialties.

Duluth Branch: Both liberal arts and pre-professional training in a variety of general and specialized courses.

SERVICE AND RESEARCH

Minnesota Geological Survey: A department of the College of Science, Literature and the Arts, conducting intensive studies of important phases of the state's mineral resources, waters, soils, or topography, as a part of a continuous state investigation allotted to the University.

Mines Experiment Stations: A department of the Institute of Technology which works on problems of extraction and treatment of the mineral resources of Minnesota.

University of Minnesota Hospitals: A center for research and treatment of disease. Associated with this unit is the Student Health Service, which conducts physical examinations for all students and provides medical services when needed. The Mayo Memorial Medical Center and the Variety Club Heart Hospital will soon be added to these physical facilities.

General Extension Division: A division of the University formed to help Minnesota citizens use Minnesota facilities to advantage including services to both students and the general public. Among the departments of this division are: Audio-Visual Extension Service, Center for Continuation Study, Correspondence Study Department, Radio Station KUOM and the State Organization Service.

Agricultural Extension Service: A division of University of Minnesota's Department of Agriculture carrying on the work of transmitting the results of agricultural research to the farmers of the state. Includes the activities of county agricultural agents, county home demonstration agents, 4-H Club agents, and agricultural short courses.

Agricultural Experiment Station: A division of the University of Minnesota's Department of Agriculture devoted to agricultural and forestry experimentation. The work of this division is conducted, not only in the gardens on the St. Paul campus, but at experiment stations at Grand Rapids, Crookston, Waseca, Morris, Cloquet and elsewhere throughout the state. The Agricultural Experiment Station is an integral part of the educational program of the College of Agriculture.

Institute of Child Welfare: Carries on continuous investigations into the habits, abilities and methods of training and educating young children, and is publicizing these findings through extension classes, lectures, and bulletins. It also maintains a Nursery School and Kindergarten for demonstration and practice purposes in the training of teachers and other workers for service with children of the younger age groups.

Minnesota Museum of Natural History: Devoted to recording and preserving data and specimens of Minnesota animal life.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The hub of cultural activities at the University of Minnesota is Northrop Memorial Auditorium. A memorial to Cyrus Northrop, this building is one of the most beautiful college halls in the world. It is the home of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra and the University Artists Course, the scene of University indoor commencements, and of many other events of artistic and educational importance, ranging from the Metropolitan Opera presentations to single lectures. It is from this auditorium each Thursday morning that University convocations are broadcast over Station KUOM at 11 o'clock. The third and fourth floors of the Auditorium feature constantly changing exhibits in the University Art Gallery.

Coffman Memorial Union is the center for student activities. The student body finds place in it not only for eating and recreation, but for meetings of committees and boards, dances, conventions, and events such as Parents' Day.

The center of the intellectual life of the University is its library. From its bookshelves, students are able to draw from approximately 1,400,000 items. Its large reading rooms provide the accommodations where Minnesota students do a considerable part of their studying.

The Music Building houses the main offices of the University Theatre and an auditorium for theatrical performances. Nearby Eddy Hall houses the University radio station, KUOM, which carries news, lectures, music, farm and home information and dramatic productions into many Minnesota homes.

STATE INSTITUTIONS

ANOKA STATE HOSPITAL

This institution, created by an act of the Legislature in 1899, was opened in 1900 with 115 patients transferred from the St. Peter State Hospital. It consists of ten cottages, one of which is equipped as an infirmary and contains laboratory facilities. One cottage is used as an isolation unit for tuberculous patients. Two of the remaining cottages house male patients and six cottages house female patients. In addition there is a large building that is being remodeled to serve as the state-wide treatment center for the tuberculous mentally ill. Other principal buildings are a service building containing a central kitchen for the hospital, employees' dining room, and bakery; an auditorium which houses occupational and recreational therapy; an administration building; laundry; greenhouse; complete group of farm buildings; power plant; and residence cottages for the chief engineer and head farmer. Nearing completion are three staff residences. Under construction is a 60-bed receiving hospital.

FERGUS FALLS STATE HOSPITAL

This institution was authorized by the Legislature in 1887, and was opened in 1890 with 80 patients transferred from the St. Peter State Hospital. The hospital consists of an administration building with twelve adjoining wards for the accommodation of male patients and ten adjoining wards for the accommodation of female patients; a psychopathic hospital divided into two wards, one for the male and one for the female patients, a hospital for contagious diseases, a separate tubercular building for men and a separate pavilion for female tubercular patients, a building for convalescent patients, an occupational therapy building, a nurses' home and a dormitory for male attendants, central kitchen, laundry, powerhouse, and farm buildings.

HASTINGS STATE HOSPITAL

This institution, authorized by the Legislature in 1899, was opened when 115 patients were transferred from the Rochester State Hospital. Both men and women were included in the first group, but the women patients were subsequently transferred to Anoka in 1910. The hospital was then used for men patients only until 1944 when certain remodeling was completed to provide facilities for women patients. The hospital now consists of an administration building with east and west wings each containing two wards, nine separate cottages, the main kitchen, laundry, occupational therapy building, home for the employees, the superintendent's home, three individual homes on the farm, now occupied by the farm manager, dairy man, and engineer, and a central heating plant. The farm group consists of three barns, two silos, a creamery, two greenhouses, a hog house, and several small service buildings.

MOOSE LAKE STATE HOSPITAL

The Legislature in 1935 enacted a law authorizing the appointment of five members to select in northeastern Minnesota a site for the fourth state hospital for the insane. The commission selected land and a site adjacent to the Village of Moose Lake, and 1,605 acres of land with some farm buildings and residences were duly purchased. Construction of the institution began in November, 1936, and the buildings planned for in the original legislative appropriation were completed in 1938. The hospital is built on the south shore of one of the most beautiful Minnesota lakes, Moosehead Lake, approximately one mile from the Village of Moose Lake. The original capacity of the institution was 900 patients. In June of 1950 the first of two geriatric buildings was opened. The second geriatric building will be opened approximately January, 1951. This will increase the capacity of the institution to 1,200 patients. The institution consists of a central building for patients consisting of six wards located in two wings of the

medical center with a capacity for 400 patients, four cottages with a capacity of 125 patients each, and two geriatric buildings with a capacity of 150 patients each. In addition to these facilities for patients there are the administrative offices, kitchen, bakery, laundry, sewing room, power house, maintenance departments, sewage disposal plant, and various farm buildings.

The first patients were received May 2, 1938, by transfer from other institutions, and direct commitment of patients from fourteen counties in northern Minnesota was authorized on August 15, 1938. The Moose Lake State Hospital is a receiving hospital, and all forms of treatment that have proven of value in the treatment of mental and nervous diseases are available at this institution.

ROCHESTER STATE HOSPITAL

This institution was created by an act of the Legislature in 1875 as the Asylum for Inebriates. Two years later the law was amended and the name changed to the Second State Hospital for the Insane. The amendment provided for a special department for the treatment of inebriates. This department was abolished by the Legislature in 1897. The hospital was opened in 1879 with 68 patients, transferred from the St. Peter State Hospital. The buildings comprising the institution include an administration building with wings for patients, two detached ward buildings for patients, detention or psychopathic hospital, isolation hospital, nurses' homes for men and women, laundry, storehouse, industrial pavilion, and a central power plant. The farm group consists of barns, garages, slaughterhouse, piggery, poultry plant, granary, blacksmith shop, greenhouse, and cottages for employees.

ST. PETER STATE HOSPITAL

This is the oldest Minnesota institution for the mentally ill. The Legislature in 1863 authorized the Governor to place destitute insane in the Iowa State Hospital, the number not to exceed 25. Later on a few patients were sent to St. Vincent's Institution for Insane, St. Louis. In 1866 the Legislature enacted a law providing for the establishment and location of a hospital for the insane. A farm of 210 acres was purchased by citizens of St. Peter and conveyed to the state. In order to provide temporary care for the patients, the state purchased an old building that had been used as a hotel in St. Peter. Nineteen patients, previously sent to the Iowa State Hospital, were transferred to St. Peter in December, 1866. The contract for the first building of the present institution was awarded in 1867.

The hospital consists of a main building with two wings, detached ward buildings for men and women patients, cottage for women patients, cottage for male workers, detention or psychopathic hospital, tuberculosis hospital, industrial building, three dormitories for men and women employees, physician's staff house, steward's buildings, a complete set of farm buildings, and cottages for the business manager, engineer, and assistant engineer.

The Asylum for the Dangerous Insane, with accommodations for 287 dangerous and criminal insane, is operated in conjunction with this institution.

SANDSTONE STATE HOSPITAL

This institution is leased the Division of Public Institutions by the Federal Government and will be used to relieve the crowded conditions at the Rochester and Hastings State Hospitals.

Capacity of hospital, 500; area, 2,939 acres.

WILLMAR STATE HOSPITAL

This institution was established by the Legislature of 1907 as a hospital for inebriates. In order to provide funds for the purchase of land and the construction of buildings, the act provided for the levying of a tax of two per cent upon all license fees for the sale of intoxicating liquor. The original institution was opened in 1912. In 1917 the act was amended to provide for the care of the chronic insane, and the same year 91 patients were transferred to the institution from the Fergus Falls, Rochester, and St. Peter State Hospitals. In 1919 the name of the institution was changed to the Willmar State Asylum, and again, in 1937 to the Willmar State Hospital. The treatment of inebriates has been continued, but the larger part of the population is composed of mentally ill patients. The buildings include an administration building with two wings for patients, seven cottages for men, six cottages for women, superintendent's cottage, service building and assembly hall, power-house, laundry, farm buildings and cottages for the farmer and the engineer.

MINNESOTA SCHOOL AND COLONY—Faribault

In 1879 the Legislature authorized the Board of Directors of the Minnesota Institute for the Deaf, Dumb and Blind to open an experimental department for feeble minded children. In July of that year a class was organized of fifteen children transferred from the Rochester and St. Peter State Hospitals. In 1881 the Legislature directed that the School for Idiots and Imbeciles be connected with the Minnesota Institute for Deaf, Dumb and Blind, and granted an appropriation of \$25,000 for the erection of a building which was occupied the following year. In 1887 the school was made a department of the Minnesota Institute for Defectives. The name of School for Feeble Minded and Colony for Epileptics was adopted in 1905, and changed in 1949 to Minnesota School and Colony.

The buildings include an administration building with wings, several custodial buildings for boys and girls, a cottage for working boys, a cottage for boys working at the dairy, Hillcrest Cottage for boys, Riverview and Lilacs Cottages for girls, central kitchen, bakery, laundry, power plant, building for women employees, six colony buildings for boys situated some distance from the main institution in connection with farm and garden, a modern 200 bed hospital, opened in 1937, with four hospital annex buildings opened in 1947, superintendent's residence, several dwellings occupied by employees, and the farm group which includes modern dairy barns with accommodations for 120 cows.

This is the largest institution in the Division of Public Institutions. Number of patients, 2,872; officers and employees, 541; area, 1,217 acres.

CAMBRIDGE STATE SCHOOL AND HOSPITAL

This institution was formerly known as the Colony for Epileptics, but in 1949 the name was changed to Cambridge State School and Hospital. It is located about one and one-half miles southwest of the Village of Cambridge, in Isanti County.

Authorization for the institution was first given by the 1919 Legislature, and a legislative committee was appointed to select a site from state owned lands for the location of a Colony for Epileptics. In 1923 this law was amended, authorizing the purchase of land for the institution. Following this, the present site was purchased and erection of the present institution was started.

One cottage for patients was opened in 1925. Since that time the institution has grown until at present it consists of an administration building, which houses two hospital wards, two wards for school children, the institution laundry, kitchen, bakery, administrative offices, and a large portion of the school departments. There are ten outlying cottages, a power plant, auditorium and warehouse, and several farm buildings.

The 1949 Legislature authorized the construction of a nurses' home, a physician's residence, and an addition to the power plant, plans for which are in progress at present.

OWATONNA STATE SCHOOL

The Minnesota State Public School was created by the Legislature in 1885 and was opened at Owatonna in 1886. Provisions of law provided that dependent, neglected and ill-treated children under fifteen years of age, who were of normal mentality and free from disease, were eligible to admission on the order of the Probate and Juvenile Courts of the State. In the legislative session of 1945 a bill was introduced, passed and signed by the Governor, which provided for a change in the services of the State Public School on a two-year trial basis. The provisions of this law designated that high-grade mentally deficient children, who had been so committed by the Probate Courts of the State, were to be admitted for the purpose of providing academic, educational and vocational training. It was the intention of the Legislature that this training should point toward the eventual release of as many of these children as possible so that these individuals could be given a trial in making a successful economic and social adjustment in community living. The dependent and neglected children in residence were transferred to the care and supervision of the Division of Social Welfare. All of the physical facilities at the State Public School thereby became available for use in providing training and care for the new population. The 1947 session of the Legislature passed the necessary laws to make the temporary change permanent and the Minnesota State Public School is now known as the Owatonna State School.

SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—Faribault

This School, the second oldest state school in Minnesota, was established by act of the Legislature in 1858 under the name of the Minnesota State Institute for the Education of the Deaf and the Dumb. It was opened in 1863, with eight pupils in attendance the first year. In 1864 the name was changed to the Minnesota Institute for the Deaf, Dumb and Blind. The first class for the blind was organized in 1866. In 1879 the Legislature authorized the board of directors to open an experimental department for feeble-minded children. Fifteen children

were transferred from the Rochester and St. Peter hospitals to Faribault in July, 1879. In 1887 the name of the school was changed to the Minnesota Institute for Defectives, the act providing for the maintenance of separate departments for the blind, deaf, and feeble-minded. Separate campuses were provided for the blind in 1874, and for the feeble-minded in 1882. Thus there are now three separate state schools in Faribault, each operating independently of the other. The present name of this school—Minnesota School for the Deaf—was adopted in 1902. The school grounds are beautifully situated on a high bluff overlooking the Straight River, between the campuses of the Shattuck School and the St. Mary's School.

Minnesota has a compulsory education law for the deaf, and all children of the state between the ages of 6 and 20, too deaf or hard of hearing to make satisfactory progress in the public schools, and who are not taught in a private school or in a school having a special teacher for the deaf, are required to attend the Minnesota School for the Deaf until discharged by the Superintendent upon approval of the Director of the Division of Public Institutions. This education is provided by the state at no cost to the parents of the children, except for transportation, clothing, incidental expenses, and extraordinary medical or dental care. Application is made directly to the Superintendent of the School for the Deaf, and can be made by the parents, or any interested person or agency.

The buildings are an administration and dormitory building (Tate Hall); a boys' dormitory (Barron Hall); the academic classroom building and auditorium (Noyes Hall); the dormitory for small boys and girls (Pollard Hall); the industrial arts building (Mott Hall); the hospital, the laundry, the power plant and maintenance shops, the service building, the gymnasium, the farm group. The buildings are of uniform architectural style, constructed of native Faribault stone.

MINNESOTA BRAILLE AND SIGHT SAVING SCHOOL—Faribault

This school (formerly known as the School for the Blind) is the third oldest of 19 institutions in Minnesota. Established in 1866, only eight years after our state's admission to the Union, it had enrolled a total of 1,237 children by June 30, 1950. Since the time classes for the adult blind were started in 1907, 651 men and women have attended.

Eleven months of instruction are provided during the year; nine for boys and girls, six to twenty years of age; two for adults. The regular school year runs from September through May; summer school, during June and July. To residents of the state, there is no charge for tuition, board, room, laundry and ordinary medical care.

Eligibility requirements are: state residence, blindness or vision too defective to make progress in public schools, and the ability to learn. Out-of-state attendance is permitted on a tuition basis, which is equal to the per capita cost for the preceding year.

The present campus comprises five acres, well shaded by large trees, overlooking the City of Faribault. There are eight buildings.

STATE REFORMATORY FOR WOMEN—Shakopee

The State Reformatory for Women, located at Shakopee, Minnesota, was established by an act of the State Legislature in 1915, when the appropriation for a separate institution to house women offenders was approved. The first two buildings were opened in February, 1920, at which time all women housed in the State Prison at Stillwater, Minnesota, were transferred to this institution. The two years following saw the completion of two more buildings, all located on a beautifully landscaped seven acre tract overlooking the Minnesota Valley.

The physical plant consists of an administration building, which houses the offices, doctor's and dentist's office, kitchen, officers' dining rooms, store rooms, class room, library, laundry, superintendent's apartment, and living quarters for officers. The upper floor of the administration building is known as Higbee Cottage, the west wing of which is reserved for the use of the Youth Conservation Commission; the east wing is the reception hospital for the institution. The large recreation room is used by the inmates of this cottage not only as a living room, but also as a chapel and collective recreational center for programs and parties. Each of the other three cottages contains twenty-one bedrooms for inmates, a kitchen, dining room, living room and two officers' rooms. The auditorium, gymnasium, Catholic Chapel, and sewing room are located in the semi-basements of two of the cottages.

The farm of 148 acres adjoins the main campus. The buildings consist of a farm house, horse barn, cattle barn, chicken house, hog house, and machine sheds.

STATE REFORMATORY FOR MEN—St. Cloud

The Legislature in 1885 appointed a commission to find a location for a second penal institution. The site near Saint Cloud of the present institution was selected. In 1887 a law was enacted creating the Minnesota State Reformatory, which was opened in 1889, and providing that only first offenders between the ages of sixteen and thirty years should be committed to the institution. The prevailing laws provide for the commitment of all male offenders regardless of age with the exception of those convicted of first degree murder who are received only by transfer. Located on the extensive grounds is one of the finest granite quarries in the state. From this quarry has been taken practically all the stone used in the construction of the institution buildings, and the quarrying, cutting, and placing of the stone has been done entirely by the inmates. The woodworking industry turns out sash, doors, blinds, screens, storm sash, and furniture for state use and in the tailoring department is made almost all of the men's clothing used in the various institutions. There are also a number of other shops for the instruction of trades and the manufacture of necessary articles. An extensive farm operated in connection with the institution, and the establishment of a farm colony where approximately sixty-five inmate farmers are housed has proved a decided success. Two prison camps located at East Grand Forks and Moose Lake are also operated from the institution with carefully selected prisoners who are engaged in extensive farming, logging, and maintenance work. The institution itself consists of an administration building containing offices, chapel, visiting facilities, and officers' dining room; nine cell houses and dormitories; hospital, central power plant, building additions including kitchens, dining rooms, bakery, laundry,

shops, cold storage room, and store rooms; and six residences. The grounds are enclosed by a granite wall from twenty-two to thirty feet high, the enclosure of fifty-five acres being one of the largest in America.

STATE PRISON—Stillwater

The Minnesota State Prison at Stillwater, the oldest state institution, was originally founded in 1851. The new prison, built on the most approved line of prison architecture and stated by experts to be one of the most modern institutions of its kind in the world, was opened in 1912. The buildings consist of an administration building and connecting corridors containing offices of the warden and assistants, an office for use of the the board of parole, reception room, barber shop, telephone exchange, rooms for officers and guests, officers' kitchen and dining rooms, schoolrooms and lecture halls, library, printing office where THE MIRROR, the newspaper published by the inmates, is printed, and space for the Bertillon and fingerprint system used in the identification of criminals; two large cell houses, each containing 512 cells; a modern prison hospital, chapel, central power plant, greenhouse, and cell houses, one of which has been completed, thus providing accommodations for 1,224 inmates. The industrial group includes a twine factory, a three-story and basement building 360 feet in length; a warehouse, 360 feet long, for the storage of raw material and manufactured twine; a main factory building of the same size for the farm machinery plant, containing machine shop, woodworking and assembling departments; foundry, 180 feet by 100 feet; blacksmith shop, steel storage house, and three large warehouses for storage of manufactured machines.

The buildings on the farm adjacent to the prison are as follows: a house and garage, a large dairy barn with full basement, granary with full basement, machine shed, blacksmith shop, horse barn, and two silos. The Barker farm is equipped with a large brick house, a barn, and root cellar. On the South farm there are a small house and a large hay shed with basement. On the West farm there are a house, two large barns with basement, large chicken coop, two brooder houses, hog house and shelter barn, and a corn crib. Outside of the prison wall and adjacent to the home farm has been constructed a farm colony building, fully equipped as living quarters for inmates who work on the farm and in the shipping department. This building has a capacity of 132 regular beds, and by using double-deck beds the capacity can be increased to 264.

GILLETTE STATE HOSPITAL FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN—

St. Paul

The Minnesota State Hospital for Crippled and Deformed Children was established by legislative action in 1897. For ten years the Board of Regents at the University of Minnesota had the direction and control of the hospital, which was located at the City and County Hospital in St. Paul. In 1907 the State Legislature transferred the institution to the jurisdiction of the State Board of Control. Today the hospital is under the jurisdiction of the Division of Public Institutions. The present site was presented by certain citizens of St. Paul and donations were made by other citizens and organizations to apply on construction of buildings. In 1926 the name of the hospital was changed to Gillette State Hospital for Crippled Children by legislative action to honor the services of Dr. Arthur J. Gillette, who had given so much of his time and skill to the establishment and building of the institution.

The objective of the hospital in the past and at the present is to provide care and treatment for medically indigent crippled children of the state of Minnesota. It is also to provide an opportunity for the patient to carry on his regular school work, pre-vocational training, to furnish religious instruction in the church selection of his parents and the moral training of the patient usually given to children in their own homes.

The medical and surgical staff is made up of outstanding specialists from St. Paul and Minneapolis. These men are on call at all times. The resident medical and surgical staff are Fellows from the Orthopedic Departments of the University of Minnesota Medical Graduate School and the Mayo Foundation.

The nursing care is provided by graduate nurses, practical nurses, and affiliating student nurses. The physical therapy department provides physical therapy treatments under the direction of the doctors. All the physical therapists are graduates of nationally approved schools of Physical Therapy. The brace shop makes the braces, appliances, the artificial limbs ordered for patients of this hospital.

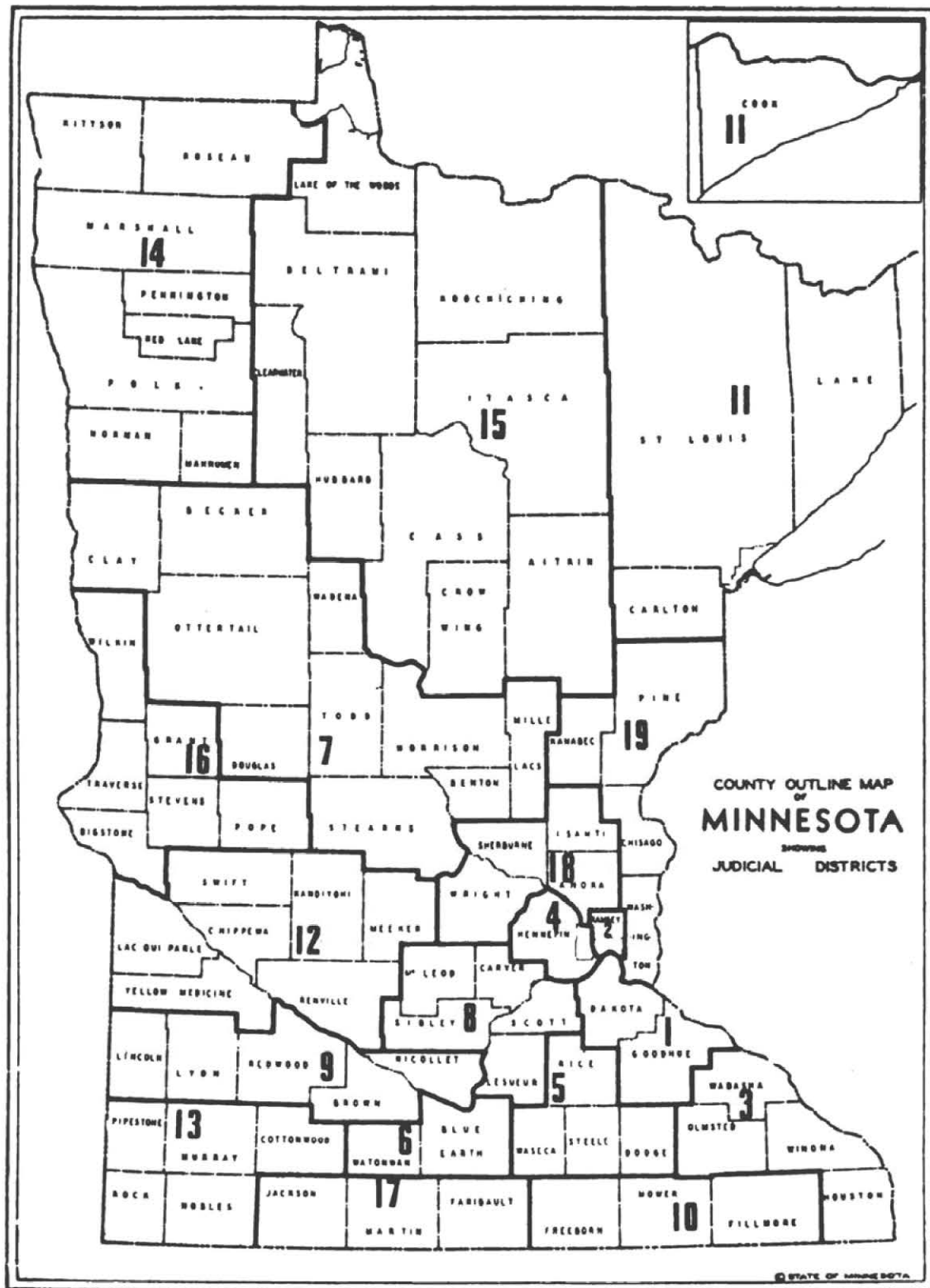

MISCELLANEOUS BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Minnesota Society for Prevention of Cruelty investigates complaints and enforces humane laws, inspects cattle trucks for proper loading and transportation, and inspects livestock markets. It also conducts a humane educational program and has organized a junior division, the Minnesota Junior Humane Society, among boys and girls of school age.

Board of Commissioners for Promotion of Uniformity of Legislation consists of three lawyers appointed by the Governor, the Chief Justice and the Attorney General to cooperate with other state and national organizations in promoting adoption of uniform state laws.

The State Athletic Commission consists of five commissioners appointed by the Governor to regulate boxing.

The Tri-State Waters Commission is composed of nine members, three each from Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, to study utilization and control of that portion of the Red River and its drainage basin lying within the three states. Minnesota members include two residents of the affected district and the state commissioner of conservation.

The Minnesota Commission on the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Project comprises three members, named by the Governor, to work in conjunction with like commissions from other states to promote development of a deep waterway between the Great Lakes and the Atlantic Ocean. Members serve without pay but expenses are covered by legislative appropriation.

The Upper Mississippi and St. Croix River Improvement Commission was created to promote development of navigation on those rivers. Its five members are appointed by the Governor.

The State Livestock Sanitary Board is the official state agency for the protection of the health of livestock, and for administering the State laws relative thereto. It has power to issue regulations which have the force of law concerning the importation of animals into the State, and the operation of public sales and exhibitions of livestock, the operation of rendering plants and as deemed expedient for the eradication of diseases of domestic animals.

The Board consists of five members appointed by the Governor for five years, one member is recommended by the Minnesota Livestock Breeders' Association, two must be financially interested in livestock breeding and two must be practicing veterinarians and graduates of a recognized veterinary college.

The Minnesota Poultry Improvement Board was established by Chapter 408, Laws of 1931. The board consists of five members, who serve without compensation; the Commission of Agriculture, Chief, Poultry Section, University Farm, and Secretary, Minnesota Livestock Sanitary Board, who are ex-officio members and two breeders who are appointed by the Governor for terms of three years. The board is the official state agency for National Poultry Improvement Plan and chicks and poults produced under supervision are properly identified as to grade and quality, under uniform terminology. Hatcheries pay for the privilege of being under supervision and this board pays for the cost of operation.

Until the National Poultry Improvement Plan was adopted in 1935, the board administered a Minnesota state plan for poultry improvement. The National Turkey Improvement Plan was adopted in the fall of 1945.

Mr. W. K. Dyer has been the Secretary and Executive Officer of the board since the start, October 1, 1931. Participation has increased from 33 hatcheries that year to 252 for the 1951 season.

The **Stallion Registration Board** is composed of the professor of animal husbandry of the Minnesota College of Agriculture, the veterinary of the State Experimental Station, and the president of the Minnesota Horse Breeders' Association.

The **Minnesota Voting Machine Commission** comprises the Attorney General, who is chairman, and two other members who must be master mechanics or graduates of a school of mechanical engineering, one appointed by the Attorney General, the other by the Governor for four-year terms. It examines voting machines to determine whether they can be used in elections in the state.

The **State Employees Retirement Association** was created by the 1929 Legislature to provide annuities for employees. Beginning in 1949 the proceeds of 6/10 of a mill tax levy plus a sum equal to 60% of the amount deducted from the salaries of employees whose salaries are paid from funds other than an appropriation from the general revenue fund. The management of the association is vested in a Board consisting of the State Auditor, State Treasurer, Commissioner of Insurance, and four state employees to be chosen two in each even numbered year from the association membership. The requirements are not less than 5 years service as a member of the Association at age 65. After 20 or more years allowable service at any age between 58 and 65 on an adjusted basis, and after 35 years allowable service at age 58 with no adjustment in amount. The benefit is equal to 1/60 of the average salary upon which deductions for the retirement fund have been based for any ten consecutive salary years when salary was highest, times years of allowable service, plus a service allowance of \$5.00 a year for each year of allowable service. The maximum benefit is \$150 a month. Members contribute 5% of salary limited to a salary of \$4800 in any fiscal year.

The **Minnesota Historical Society**, incorporated less than two months after the convening of the territorial legislature in 1849, is the oldest institution in the state and the official custodian of the state's history. It is supported mainly by legislative appropriation. It has one of the largest historical libraries in the west, containing more than 200,000 books, pamphlets, and newspaper volumes; over 280,000 paintings, photographs, and prints; and over 2,000,000 manuscripts. A historical museum visualizes the external conditions of life in Minnesota's past.

The society publishes a quarterly magazine, **Minnesota History**, and occasional volumes relating to the history of Minnesota, the most recent of which is **Rainy River Country**, by Grace Lee Nute.

The society holds an annual meeting in January and conducts each summer a historical tour and convention. It promotes organization of local history work, co-operates with the state's 87 county historical societies, maintains an educational program for the teaching of Minnesota history and citizenship in the schools, and gives reference and information service on all aspects of Minnesota history.

Management of the **State Teachers Retirement Fund** is vested in a Board of Trustees composed of the state commissioner of education, the state auditor, the commissioner of insurance, and two members elected by the Fund Association.

The **State Agricultural Society**. Organized in 1854 as the Minnesota Territorial Agricultural Society, it was incorporated, in 1860, as the Minnesota State Agricultural Society, its function being the operation of the Minnesota State Fair. In 1903 the legislature confirmed and established the society as a public corporation and a department of state.

The society's voting membership comprises three delegates from each county agricultural society in the state; one delegate from each

county in the state in which no county agricultural society exists; individuals who have been elected honorary life members of the society; two delegates and the president of each of twenty-five statewide organizations affiliated with agriculture and kindred pursuits; one delegate from each of seventeen similar statewide organizations; and the incumbent members of the governing board.

At the annual meeting of the society, held three days beginning the Wednesday following the second Tuesday in January, are elected the members of the governing board, which body directly manages and operates the State Fair.

State Horticultural Society gathers and disseminates knowledge pertaining to fruit, flower, tree and vegetable growing and prepares lists of suitable varieties for planting in Minnesota. The society is composed of 459 life members and more than 8,000 annual members. The *Minnesota Horticulturist* is the official publication.

The **Minnesota State Archives Commission** was established by the 1947 Legislature. The Commission is empowered to direct the destruction or other disposition of state records determined to be of no lasting value; to micro-film or otherwise reproduce records that are essential; and to direct the archival storage and preservation of state records that have legal, administrative, or historical value.

The Commission meets periodically and acts on departmental applications for the disposition of records. It directs an archival program that makes provision for the control of rapidly accumulating current records, an inventory and eventual destruction of nonessential records, and the preservation of essential state records.

State Veterans Service Building Commission. The State Veterans Service Building Commission was established under the provisions of Laws 1945, Chapter 315. The Commission was charged with the responsibility, in conjunction with the City of St. Paul, for the acquisition of lands to enlarge the Capitol site; the development and beautification thereof; providing the necessary approaches to the Capitol and the erection of a Veterans Service Building.

The Commission consists of the Governor of the State as Chairman, Ex-Officio; two members At Large from the State and one member from each Congressional District. The Commission as now constituted consists of:

The Youth Conservation Commission was created by the 1947 Legislature. It is composed of six members, with three additional advisory members.

When a court decides that a person under 21 years of age requires the services of state facilities, commitments must be made to the Commission. The Commission is charged with the responsibility of determining the causes of each individual's difficulties and of planning for each committed youth a program that will aid him in the rehabilitation process.

The Commission also has the duty of developing constructive programs for the prevention and decrease of delinquency and crime among youth.

EXAMINING BOARDS

State Board of Accountancy members are certified public accountants appointed by the Governor for a term of three years. It issues certificates to those passing an examination in such subjects pertaining to accounting as the board may deem necessary.

Board of Registration for Architects, Engineers and Land Surveyors consists of nine members appointed by the Governor, for the registration of architects, engineers and land surveyors.

The State Board of Barber Examiners consists of three members appointed by the Governor for a term of three years. One must be a member of or recommended by a Union of Journeymen Barbers, and one must be a member of or recommended by the Master Barbers Association of Minnesota. The board conducts examinations of applicants not more than four times each year and grants certificates to successful applicants.

The Board of Basic Sciences consists of five members appointed by the Governor. The duties of the board are to conduct examinations in the basic sciences for those who desire to treat ailments of the human body, and to issue certificates of registration to those who pass the examinations or are eligible for certificates by reciprocity or on the basis of their previous licensure.

State Board of Chiropody Examiners consists of five members, appointed by the Governor for a five-year term. Its duties are to examine and license chiropodists to practice.

The State Board of Chiropractic Examiners is made up of five members, graduates of five different Chiropractic Schools. It is authorized to license Chiropractors and revoke licenses for stated reasons. It also takes action in cases of criminal or illegal practice by licensed or unlicensed Chiropractors.

The State Board of Dental Examiners consists of five practicing dentists appointed by the Governor for a term of three years. At least two regular meetings are held each year at times fixed by the board. The board is authorized to revoke licenses for cause, as well as grant licenses by examination for the practice of Dentistry and Dental Hygiene.

The State Board of Electricity consists of seven members appointed by the Governor for five years, of which two shall be representatives of the electrical suppliers in the rural areas of the state, two shall be master electricians, who shall be contractors, two journeyman electricians, and one a consulting electrical engineer or electrical inspector of a city of the first class. The board is authorized to issue licenses after examination, to persons wishing to engage in operating, installing or repairing electrical wires or apparatus.

Minnesota State Board of Hairdressing and Beauty Culture Examiners is composed of three members appointed by the Governor. It is authorized to issue licenses to hair dressers and beauty culturists, after they have passed the examination.

State Board of Law Examiners consists of not less than three nor more than seven attorneys at law, appointed for a term of three years by the justices of the supreme court. It is required to hold public examinations of persons desirous of being admitted to the bar and report to the supreme court. Certificates authorizing the holder to practice law are issued by the court upon recommendation by the board.

State Board of Medical Examiners consists of seven physicians appointed by the Governor. The board is authorized to grant licenses upon examination to persons desirous of practicing medicine, midwifery or massage, and to revoke such licenses for cause.

The State Board of Examiners of Nurses consists of seven registered nurses appointed by the Governor for a term of five years. The board may appoint and employ an executive secretary and it may employ such other persons as may be necessary to carry on the work of the board. The board employs two associate executive secretaries who share in the office and state field work of the board. Examinations are held simultaneously in two or three places in the state and are at present conducted three or four times a year.

The State Board of Optometry consists of five optometrists appointed by the Governor for a term of three years. The board is required to meet at least once a year at St. Paul to examine applicants for certificates to practice optometry.

The State Board of Osteopathy consists of five osteopathic physicians appointed by the Governor. Its regular meetings are the second Tuesday of March and September, and at such other times as the board deems necessary. It is authorized to examine applicants and grant licenses to practice osteopathy.

The State Board of Pharmacy consists of five registered pharmacists actually engaged in the retail drug business, appointed by the Governor for a term of five years. It has general supervision over all places where drugs, medicines and poisons are sold compounded or manufactured. The board is required to meet at least once in every six months to examine applicants for registration as pharmacists.

The State Veterinary Examining Board consists of five veterinarians appointed by the Governor for five years. It is authorized to issue licenses upon examination to persons wishing to practice the veterinary profession.

The Minnesota Board of Examiners in Watchmaking, created in 1943, consists of five members appointed by the Governor for four year terms. The principal duties of the Minnesota Board of Examiners in Watchmaking are to define the standards of workmanship and skill in entrance examinations for persons desiring to engage in Watchmaking, and to administer the provisions of the law.

Examinations are conducted in the office of the Board, 415 Bremer Arcade, 7th and Robert, St. Paul 1. All communications should be addressed to that office.

EDWARD J. THYE

Edward J. Thye (Republican), Northfield. Born April 26, 1896, of Norwegian parents. Raised on a farm. Educated in public schools and business college. Served in U. S. Army Air Forces, commissioned in France, World War I. Farmer near Northfield. Deputy commissioner of agriculture, 1939-42. Elected Lieutenant-governor November 7, 1942. Became Governor of Minnesota April 27, 1943; re-elected, 1944. Elected United States Senator, November 5, 1946. Married and has one daughter, Jean.

Hubert Horatio Humphrey, Jr., (Democrat-Farmer-Labor), born May 27, 1911, Wallace, South Dakota. Graduated Doland (S. D.) high school 1928, bachelor of arts degree, University of Minnesota; degree from Denver College of Pharmacy; Master of Arts degree, Louisiana State University.
