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
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CHAPTER ONE

MINNESOTA AT MID-DECADE

Minnesota's population and economy grew at a phenomenal pace in the first half of the 1990s. Population growth has been faster than in the previous two decades and as fast as in the 1960s. The economy has grown even more quickly.

Population growth in Minnesota has averaged more than 1 percent in the first five years of the 1990s. This rapid growth has occurred in spite of the fewer births and aging population. The primary explanation for Minnesota's population expansion has been a reverse in migration trends. Since 1988, more people have moved into Minnesota than have moved out.

Population growth varies widely in Minnesota. Twenty counties in the southern and western parts of the state lost population between 1990 and 1995. The central cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul both lost population in the 1990s, as did many inner-ring suburbs. Suburban areas, especially second- and third-ring suburbs, continue to grow rapidly.

These differential growth rates mean that legislative districts in Minnesota are no longer equal in population. Using 1995 estimates of population, the largest House district had 11,500 more people than the smallest district. The Iron Range has lost the population equivalent of half a district, and Minneapolis and St. Paul have lost more than one district. Suburban districts in the seven-county Twin Cities area have gained the equivalent of 2.4 districts and make up about one-third of Minnesota's population.

If population trends continue through the last five years of the decade, redistricting following the 2000 census would increase the number of legislative districts in the suburban Twin Cities and in the Anoka-St. Cloud corridor. Areas in southern, western and northern Minnesota, where population has grown more slowly, would have fewer districts covering larger areas.

Population trends in Minnesota have been much more positive in the 1990s than in the 1980s. Although many counties lost population in the 1990s, these declines have been much smaller than in the previous decade. Whereas in the 1980s, population losses ranged as high as 20.1 percent, from 1990 to 1995, the greatest decrease was only 4.1 percent.

Trends in migration have been more positive in all but four counties in the state. In many counties, more people moved in than moved out. And in counties where more people left than moved in, the difference was much smaller in the 1990s.

Natural increase, on the other hand, shows a more negative trend. Thirteen counties had a greater number of deaths than births in at least three of the four years between 1990 and 1994. Migration has made up for the losses due to natural decrease so that population continued to grow in most areas of the state.

Rapid population growth has been matched and fueled by strong economic growth in the state. One of the benefits of Minnesota's strong economy has been a decline in the unemployment rate, which went from 4.9 percent in 1990 to 3.7 percent in 1995.

Economic growth, especially in the number of jobs, has been greater than population growth. From 1990 to 1994, the number of jobs increased almost twice as fast as the population. The robust economy turned Minnesota into something of a migration magnet, as people move to the state to benefit from an expanding job market.

The early 1990s were a time of recession in the United States, and Minnesota's economy struggled with loss of jobs and accompanying higher unemployment rates. However, in 1993, the economy turned around, and in 1994, the number of new jobs added in Minnesota was phenomenal. More than one-third of the new jobs created between 1990 and 1994 were added in the last year. Hennepin County, alone, had a total of 24,100 new jobs in 1994.

Per capita income in Minnesota lagged in the early 1990's with the nationwide recession. The 1993 floods in the Red River Valley and southern Minnesota further dampened personal income. But the recovery in 1994 meant that per capita income has grown 23.1 percent since 1990 and was much higher than in neighboring states and the national average. Per capita income in Minnesota was slightly higher than the national average. In the 1990s, income has grown at a slightly faster rate in Minnesota than the rest of the nation.

Cities in Minnesota accounted for about 85 percent of all population growth. While Minneapolis, St. Paul and cities with less than 100 people lost population, cities with populations ranging from 10,000 to 90,000 gained 167,200 in the 1990s, or about two-thirds of the total increase.

Population in townships grew more slowly than in cities in the 1990s, averaging a 4.2 percent increase. Only about 20 percent of Minnesota's population lives in townships. Township populations are more difficult to track since many of the largest population declines resulted from mergers, annexations or dissolutions.

MINNESOTA STATE GOVERNMENT

Editor's Note: The following essay first appeared in the 1963/64 edition of the *Minnesota Legislative Manual*. It seems timely now to present an updated version in light of the current mood of restructuring fundamental governmental relationships.

Minnesota exists as a state because people here wanted to run their own affairs. Early settlers in the upper Mississippi and Minnesota River valleys were not content to have much of their everyday public business determined in Washington while they were a Territory, so they petitioned and got the chance to be admitted as an equal partner in the federal union.

State Powers

In the some one hundred forty years that have elapsed since statehood, international events have forced people to look up from the barge and plow and notice what the national government was doing. In fact, economic developments have made the barge and plow themselves concerns of the national government, which now regulates and promotes much of our work-a-day lives. Because the national government has become such a great enterprise we sometimes overlook the tremendous powers left to the state government.

In fact, the people of Minnesota continue to operate a huge and rapidly expanding business and regulatory enterprise themselves, using the state government to shape the everyday quality of their existence in considerable detail.

Nowhere is it possible to find listed the powers of state government. Unlike the powers of national government, which are spelled out, in bare bones, at least, in the United States Constitution, the powers of the State of Minnesota are not detailed anywhere. In truth, Minnesota has all the powers of the British House of Commons at the time of the American Revolution, which was virtually unlimited, except for such powers as the United States and Minnesota Constitutions have taken away.

Not all the constitutional restrictions on states were obvious at the time they were written. In fact, courts to this day are still in the process of determining in what ways the state may affect religion, what the requirements are for treating an accused person fairly, and the specific meanings of "equality" that a state must not deny by its laws or official actions. Through the 14th Amendment, Minnesota is also covered from doing most things restricted in the federal Bill of Rights. States learned, too, that they could not block a legitimate power of the national government by trying to forbid, regulate, or tax its operations.

Furthermore, since the people in Minnesota would never tolerate their government having all the power of the pre-revolutionary British House of Commons, they wrote out a large number of restrictions of their own. Minnesota's Constitution contains its own Bill of Rights, stated as Article I. It reads much like the Bill of Rights that restrains the national government's infringement of free speech, free press, and rights of the accused. Two items are missing: the rights of assembly and petition. And there is no equal protection clause (which the federal Bill of Rights also does not specifically state). There are, however, a few additions in the Minnesota document, such as a much more detailed statement forbidding the use of tax money for religious activities, and the right to sell farm vegetables without a license! Other restrictions elsewhere in the state Constitution restrict Minnesota's legislature from enacting changes in railroad taxes without a popular vote, from passing special laws applying to an individual local government without consent of that municipality, or from enacting laws on some subjects that would apply only to named individuals. Churches, cemeteries, charitable institutions, and schools are not taxable. The state Constitution also spells out the proportion of motor vehicle taxes to be distributed to various kinds of highways, which therefore cannot be changed by ordinary statutes of the legislature.

Because Minnesota is a government on its own, the Minnesota supreme court can by interpretation of the state Constitution, enlarge freedoms guaranteed against state action beyond what the United States supreme court defines the Fourteenth Amendment to require. But by and large, the people of Minnesota have not been desirous of restricting the state, and have left the state able, through the governmental structure they describe in the Constitution, to handle a very large number of important things such as:

1) The protection and improvement of society and of the individual. The state makes regulations regarding public safety (criminal law defining prohibited acts of violence and theft), health (sanitation, quarantine, hospitals, housing), morals (sexual behavior, dance halls, liquor), social welfare (family life, marriage and divorce, women, children, aged, relief), and all levels of education.

2) The regulation and promotion of people's political life. The state decides virtually all election

procedures and regulations, such as voter registration, nomination methods, district boundaries, ballot forms, recounts, political parties, precinct caucuses, campaign contributions and spending (including partial public subsidies), and corrupt practices legislation. The state also prescribes local governmental units, structures, and powers, including the details of how home rule is acquired by cities.

3) The protection and improvement of economic welfare and processes. The state makes civil law dealing with business, contracts, and corporations. The state has authority to define and punish business frauds and monopolies, to regulate banking, and to provide labor standards (unemployment insurance, wages, hours, conditions of work, industrial accidents, disputes), subject to national government action where these affect interstate commerce. The state also promotes and regulates agriculture, marketing and transportation (trucks, railroads, terminals, highways, and aviation) subject again to national government actions or requirements of national uniformity.

4) The conservation and development of natural resources. The state regulates land (irrigation, drainage, settlement), sub-soil wealth (minerals), public utilities, forestry, lakes, fish and game.

The state has wide latitude to decide what and how heavily to tax in order to provide for these functions. And the state can structure its own government any way it chooses, so long as the people are allowed ultimately to control it under a republican form of government.

Local Government

A further word should be said about one of the powers of the state, namely its control over local government. Contrary to popular thinking, there is no right of local self-government, apart from that allowed by the state.

Lawmakers

Laws are made in Minnesota by being agreed to by a majority of all members elected to each house of the legislature and by being signed by the governor, or passed by a two-thirds vote over the governor's veto. Minnesota has no direct legislation, referendum or initiative, by which people make ordinary law in the voting booth. Even the state Constitution can be changed only upon the suggestion of the legislature. Such proposals to amend the Constitution are then referred to the people where a majority of those voting at the election must say "Yes" before the Constitution is held to be changed, which has happened 114 times in 208 tries. If the legislature so desired, it could let the people decide that a constitutional convention should be called to revise the entire document.

This means that the legislature is a very powerful body. The legislature has all the powers the people themselves could exercise except those denied it in the state Constitution. No money can be spent unless appropriated by the legislature. No government agency can be set up or changed except by the legislature and governor acting together. No act can be punished as a crime unless the legislature specifically so declares, and no punishment can be administered except for that which the legislature prescribes. The legislature redraws its own district lines after the census, as well as congressional district lines. The legislature even decides upon proposed amendments to the United States Constitution unless Congress provides for a special ratifying convention.

Minnesota state representatives are elected every two years and senators every four years (except for a two-year term at the end of the decade when new census population figures require drawing new district lines). The state Constitution requires that the districts of both houses be laid out on the basis of equality of population, but this was ignored from 1913 to 1959, after which federal courts either required the legislature to draw new districts or did it themselves.

Minnesota election laws provide that the political party's official nomination, the right to carry the party's label on the general election ballot, be conferred on the plurality winners of the primary election, in which all voters can choose in which primary to select candidates in the secrecy of the voting booth. But the major political parties hold precinct caucuses (local meetings of voters of each party) that elect delegates to a series of legislative district, congressional district, and state conventions where candidates are endorsed to the party's voters. Then the parties assist in the campaigns, but the endorsed candidates do not always win the nomination.

Members of the legislature from each party caucus for organizational purposes, to determine who will be the leaders and committee members. The majority group names the committee chairs and dominates the agenda of the sessions. Party members meet often for policy discussions and usually show considerable unity in voting on most controversial matters.

Executives

The governor of Minnesota is charged with taking "care that the laws be faithfully executed." Yet the governor is not the sole executive officer of the state. Instead, five other elected officers, together with

the governor, constitute the executive department: the lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and attorney general. In recent years one party has not been able to elect all of its candidates to these positions. These officials, except the lieutenant governor, constitute the Executive Council, which handles mineral leases, timber permits, sale of state lands, and several administrative responsibilities. Moreover, the governor is simply one member of the State Board of Investment and the Land Exchange Commission. Also, instead of possessing sole authority to grant pardons, the governor shares this power with the attorney general and the chief justice of the state supreme court.

Administrative duties of the state are performed, according to a recent count, by about 150 administrative departments, agencies, authorities, boards, commissions, councils, and committees. The governor has power to appoint and remove these officials. An open appointments provision allows ordinary citizens to apply for these positions, and some are picked for the lesser jobs.

Except for top departmental executives (called "commissioners") and their staffs, most state employees are under a merit personnel system. State employees have the right to organize unions to bargain for their wages, and most have the right to strike. Minnesota was the first state to implement "comparable worth," to make sure jobs traditionally held by women are evaluated and paid according to the responsibilities they entail.

Administrative agencies have power derived from the statutes that created them to issue rules, but an independent hearing examiner reviews the proposed regulations in a proceeding similar to lawmaking before they are published as administrative law.

The principal power of the governor over the agencies is through the power to recommend a budget. The commissioner of finance receives spending requests from the several state agencies and assists the governor in deciding what program priorities to recommend to the legislature. Of course, the legislature ultimately decides the exact amount of money to be spent for individual programs of each agency, but the governor's recommendation is carefully considered and typically becomes the range of the final amount. The governor can veto individual items in an appropriation bill as well as whole bills.

After a gradual series of measures concentrating executive power in this office, the governor of Minnesota is considered to be among the strongest in the nation in formal powers. In recent years several imaginative programs of administrative improvement have attracted national attention, resulting in Minnesota's being named among the most effectively administered states.

Ultimately, the real power of any governor depends upon his leadership of public opinion, and the effectiveness of his political party organization in electing majorities to the legislature and in securing a measure of uniformity of views among officeholders. In terms of the influence of political parties in shaping governmental programs Minnesota stands, perhaps, midway among the states of the Union. Some have much stronger parties and some much weaker. Conversely, and not unrelated, Minnesota is considered to be less dominated by interest groups than most states. The parties in Minnesota are policy-oriented and different enough that it matters in public policy which controls the government. Over the years Minnesota has often experienced split control between the governor and the legislature, requiring fierce negotiation.

Judiciary

The judicial branch of Minnesota is a unified court system, but there are three principal sections. Besides the seven-judge supreme court, Minnesota has a court of appeals with 16 judges, and one district court operating with 240 judges in 10 judicial districts. Most judgments in the district courts can be appealed to the court of appeals which sits in three-judge panels at several points around the state. Then the supreme court can choose whether to hear a further appeal, except that it must review appeals in legislative or statewide election contests and first-degree murder cases. For most Minnesotans the state supreme court is the court of last resort, since only cases involving a substantial federal question can be appealed to the United States Supreme Court, which has substantial discretion in deciding what cases it accepts for review.

All judges in Minnesota are elected for six-year terms, but virtually all judges come to the court initially through appointment by the governor. A commission on judicial selection recommends several people for the governor to consider appointing to a vacancy on the district court. This provides some check on the governor's power over the judiciary, since his court appointments are not subject to state senate approval as are appointments to administrative positions. Judges are usually re-elected to successive terms without challenge, but some have been replaced. Judges are designated on the ballot for a specific seat, so challengers are required to file against a specific sitting judge or for an open seat. A board of judicial standards reviews allegations of misconduct by judges and recommends discipline, including

removal, to the state supreme court.

Expenditures

Minnesota is a big-spending state, about seventh in the nation per capita. State and local government spending together take about one-sixth of the personal income of the state.

The state operates on a biennial budget, framed in odd-numbered years right after the general election signals a new legislative session. The fiscal year starts the next July 1. In the even-year session, the legislature adopts the capital (building) budget and tinkers with the operating budget for the second year to reflect changed needs and revenue estimates. The budget that concerns the governor and the legislature is the general fund. But in reality this constitutes only about two-thirds of all state spending. About a quarter of the total funds come from the federal government to assist in a host of programs, and these are budgeted separately. In addition there are several dedicated funds established with separate revenue sources only for specified purposes, such as the gas tax that funds the highway programs and user fees and gambling revenues that support environmental programs.

The general fund by itself amounted to about \$10 billion per year in 1997. Education, health and human services, and aids to local governments get most of the money.

Local school districts are expected to bear the major share of the expense of kindergarten-throughtwelfth grade education, although there is a continuing debate about whether the state should take on more or even most of this cost. To insure that at least a minimum educational program is carried on by every district no matter how poor it may be, the state contributes a certain amount per pupil, less the amount received from a minimum local tax level. The state also pays special aids for transportation and special education. Currently, the state supplies about \$3 billion per year for K-12 education.

Higher education gets about one-eighth of the general fund, more than \$1 billion per year. Besides the University of Minnesota with four campuses, a second system includes seven state universities, 13 community colleges (some with more than one campus), 16 technical colleges (again some with several campuses), and three consolidated community and technical colleges. The University of Minnesota actually gets most of its money from tuition, fees, and federal grants.

Minnesota spends about \$2.5 billion a year on health care and financial support for the indigent. Most of this money goes to county-administered programs, but several state institutions serve the chemically dependent, mentally ill, and the aged.

Another eighth of the general fund, well over \$1 billion per year, goes to local governments as direct aids or to provide property tax relief for homesteads and farms.

Criminal justice requires about 5 percent of the general fund budget. Environment and natural resources: agriculture, forestry, state parks, game and fish, and water, land, and mineral management, takes another 2 percent. The actual operation of the state government amounts to only 3 percent of the general fund, \$250,000,000 per year. Interest on the debt (spent for capital construction, since Minnesota is forbidden to borrow for regular government programs) also costs about \$250,000,000 per year.

Revenues

Matching its spending, Minnesota is a high-tax state. Most money to cover the expenses of the state is raised through taxes. But there are substantial non-tax sources of income, such as sale of timber, fees for state park use and sports licenses, investment income, borrowing, and federal grants.

Federal money for all purposes comes to about \$3 billion a year. Federal grants typically are tied to program requirements, buying for the national government power over matters traditionally in state hands. An example is the requirement that persons under 19 (Minnesota had said 18) could not buy liquor or Minnesota would lose its federal highway aid.

Considering state taxes alone, Minnesota receives more than 40 percent of its general fund revenue from the individual income tax, 6 percent from the corporate income tax, and 2 percent from gross earnings taxes on railroads and telephone companies. The general sales tax provides about a third of the revenue, with special sales taxes on liquor and tobacco bringing in more than 2 percent.

The state does not tax real estate property, leaving this source of revenue for local governments. But the state deeply affects property taxes through its authority to differentially classify what percentage of market value each type of property: agricultural, homestead, apartments, commercial, industrial, and

recreational, should bear. Aids to local governments and school districts reduce the amount they have to levy on real property. And the state has a "circuit breaker" that pays part of the property tax of low income-people.

The high levels of spending and taxing in Minnesota appear to satisfy the public. Opinion surveys have shown that most people think they get good service from state and local government and would support higher spending on programs they value most, such as education, roads, and criminal justice.

Trends

Running the state of Minnesota is not merely funding the same old activities year after year. Instead, conditions change the impact of old programs, the means of handling them, the revenue flow that funds them, and new needs become apparent.

Population growth provides a constant challenge. Population is increasing in Minnesota faster than in surrounding states, although not as fast as in the nation as a whole. Soon 5 million people will live within the state's boundaries. But the characteristics of the population are also changing. The percentage of residents over 65 (who are major consumers of health costs) and the number of children (who are major consumers of education costs) is increasing, while the percentage of people in the earning and tax-paying years becomes smaller. This means that merely maintaining present services will require drastically increased expenditures from a smaller base. Minorities constitute about 7 percent of the population, a much smaller proportion than in many states, but that group is growing fast, and many new arrivals require special language and education services.

An even greater impact on state agencies will be produced by the changing nature of service to individuals. In the past, Minnesota has led the nation in applying new concepts of treatment of the physically and mentally ill. Breakthroughs are making possible vast improvements in preventing, diagnosing, and treating disease, but at great expense. Longer life expectancy means more people survive into non-working and possibly dependent years. The information age requires a substantially different emphasis in education and re-education for many. Far higher proportions of college age people are wanting further academic and professional education.

Demand for recreational facilities is skyrocketing because of increased leisure time and rising standards of living. Metropolitan sprawl now extends from St. Cloud to Rochester, and the profusion of automobiles is overloading the transportation infrastructure. Water supply, in quantity and quality, will plague even the land of 10,000 lakes. New types and standards of food production and marketing are in view, needing to be developed, promoted, and regulated. The public perception of increased crime demands expanded costly long-term detention facilities and underscores the need for new social programs for prevention. Meanwhile the federal government is reducing its contributions for human resource programs and devolving more responsibility on the state.

All of these developments and others must be faced by Minnesota's decisionmakers in the very near future. What kinds of programs to adopt to deal with them is only part of the question. How to pay for them is the rest. The state is a helpless bystander, except through its political influence, in the realm of national fiscal and monetary policies designed to regulate and promote the growth of the nation's economy. By and large, if the nation prospers, Minnesota will too. More money comes in from existing taxes. But the competitive place of Minnesota among the fifty states is within the control of this state to some extent, which limits how much people can be asked to pay. Minnesota can promote and encourage its own growth through programs of education and development of its resources, including the fostering of industrial and business growth within its borders.

The level of taxing and spending for public purposes is not fixed. It is a judgment of values and priorities people must make, within limits of economic reality. The aim is to meet the real needs of the people within the fairest and most productive distribution of costs. Solving this complicated formula will strain the wisest heads in the state. It will take energetic and dedicated officials to cope with the problems and a political structure that enables decisions to be made in the most efficacious, yet the most democratic, way possible. And it will require the enlightened participation of the citizenry in accepting local and state responsibilities.

If Minnesota's governmental system works well in its continuing and expanding job, it will prove that the present inheritors of the sky-blue water lands are indeed fit to run their own affairs, as their forefathers believed when they took on this task more than a century and a third ago.

Flood Situation Report, April 1997

The winter of 1996-97 was unusually cold and brought record snowfalls. Bad enough, the record snows were followed in April by more blizzards and finally, as the snow melted, record floods throughout much of the region. In western and northwestern Minnesota, many communities went directly from snowbound to flood bound. For the people of the Red River Valley, life may never be entirely the same. Rather than allowing the floods to pass unremarked, the following excerpts from daily reports by the Division of Emergency Management provide terse but eloquent testimony.

Flood Situation Report #2, April 2, 1997 (Wednesday)

Damage Assessment: Montevideo is at 1.9 ft. above flood stage, expected to reach 6 ft. by Friday, ice jams are of concern. Lac Qui Parle reported one-third of their roads are impassable, from the South Dakota border to Montevideo...

Weather: Major area of concern today is near the headwaters of the Minnesota River. Montevideo is on the rise and above flood stage and the tributaries to the Minnesota near Lac Qui Parle reservoir are also on the rise. River flooding has been reported on the Buffalo and Wild Rice Rivers in northwest Minnesota. Excessive runoff in some locations was causing overland flooding of roadways and agricultural communities.

Flood Situation Report #5, April 6, 1997 (Sunday)

Weather: This morning, blizzard conditions were occurring throughout much of south, central, and northwestern Minnesota. Zero visibility and 11 degrees reported in Warren.

Regional Field Update: . . . Electricity is out throughout the Red River Basin including portions of Marshall, Norman, Roseau, Red Lake, and Pennington counties. In addition, Kittson County lost its telephone service early this morning.

Norman County: Main lift station only one with electricity, because it has own generator. All others being pumped with portable pumps.

Polk County: In a whiteout condition this morning. Portions of East Grand Forks without power. Nursing home residents being moved into buildings which have availability to heat. Highway 2 closed between Crookston and East Grand Forks. Red Lake River rose 12" at Crookston since midnight. Power companies pulled crews due to weather conditions. Emergency vehicles stuck on city streets in Crookston. Most county roads will be under water and impassable.

Kittson County: Zero visibility with 50 mph winds. One traffic fatality reported as a result of the ice conditions.

Big Stone County: The dam at Big Stone Lake is predicted to hold at this time. However, due to conditions, 30 people were evacuated.

Wilkin County: As of 7:00 a.m. 180 people were evacuated. Approximately half of Breckenridge has at least 3 feet of water over the streets. At 10:10 p.m. last night the river gauge began to malfunction. Prior to that the gauge reading was at 18.74 feet. The river is expected to top 20', which is 10' above flood stage. Part of the city without telephone service. What began as heavy rain, freezing rain, turned into snow and blizzard conditions after 11:00 p.m. Concerns: Pumps at water treatment plant froze. The city is working on getting the pumps started again as well as additional sandbagging of the facility. Possible evacuation of the hospital. Need for volunteers to assist in sandbagging.

Chippewa/Lac Qui Parle Counties: Montevideo/Granite Falls area in need of an additional 300,000-400,000 sandbags.

Hennepin County: Volunteers sent to Dayton area yesterday to assist in sandbagging.

Washington County: Stillwater bridge was closed yesterday due to the high water. Sandbagging in Afton, Newport area.

Many roads throughout central, south central, west central, east central and northwestern Minnesota are closed due to high waters.

Flood Situation Report #6, April 7, 1997 (Monday)

Regional Update:

Montevideo/Granite Falls area: River at Montevideo at 23.7th above flood stage, looks like leveling off slightly, monitoring water from Ortonville and Big Stone Co. Hundreds of volunteers and national guards people. Levees no longer safe, potential to lose large part of town. At Granite Falls, levees are highly stressed. Lost 15th. Ave. South to flooding Bridge lost from Montevideo to Granite Falls, County Road #5 and Hwy. #23 are only routes into Granite Falls. North Redwood has built levee system.

Flood Situation Report #7, April 8, 1997 (Tuesday)

Status Report: Governor Arne Carlson sent a letter to the President today asking for a disaster declaration in Minnesota. Areas of greatest immediate concern are in the northwestern part of the state. 8,000 to 10,000 people have been impacted by flooding in this area. About 1,000 flood victims are being housed in temporary shelters. Elderly people and those with medical problems are most in need. Power is out in most of Norman County. Many homes without heat. Power has been restored to most of Roseau and Pennington Counties. Power may not be restored to all areas for 3 to 7 days. In city of Ada, over half of residents were re-evacuated and most homes are flooded; about 1,000 people are at shelters. Next problem areas expected to be cities of New Ulm and North Mankato. Earlier today, the National Guard conducted a successful air rescue mission of three flood-trapped people in Breckenridge. The National Guard currently has 1100 troops on active duty statewide, including 300 in the Red River valley.

Flood Situation Report #8, April 9, 1997 (Wednesday)

Vice President Al Gore will visit Minnesota on Friday. Full details of his itinerary will be available later. 300,000 sandbags were used in Moorhead yesterday. They are expecting a 39.5 foot crest there in the next day or so. Ada is surrounded by frozen flood waters. On a limited basis, Ada residents who were evacuated are being allowed to go into their homes to check on things. The evacuation of Shelly, Minnesota has been advised. Highway 75 is closed in Clay County from Kragnes to Moorhead. Power is being supplied by generator to the Norman County Courthouse, the Ada Police Department and the Ada Recreation Center, where the Red Cross has set up for feeding people.

Flood Situation Report #11, April 12, 1997 (Saturday)

Weather: Latest weather forecast calls for statewide lows in the mid teens to mid 20s, highs from mid 30s to mid 40s. Other than scattered snow in the extreme south this morning, no precipitation is forecast. The Minnesota River is cresting at 32.2 feet in Jordan today and near 718.5 feet in Shakopee tomorrow. The Mississippi River is cresting near 23 feet in St. Paul on Sunday or Monday. The St. Croix River is cresting at near 91 feet in Stillwater on Sunday and Monday. The Red River crested in Fargo/Moorhead Friday but will remain steady at high levels for several days. The Red will crest a second time near 18.5 feet this weekend in Breckenridge. Other points along the Red River will not crest until mid to late April.

Miscellaneous: The Interprovincial Pipeline from Canada to the United States has been shut down. This is one of the crude oil supply sources into both Koch and Ashland refineries in Minnesota.

Flood Situation Report #17, April 18, 1997 (Friday)

Regional Update: The Red River has continued a steady rise to 39.54 feet in the Fargo/Moorhead area this morning. The crest was not expected until April 19 and 20. The crest predictions have been revised upward by at least one foot throughout the Red River basin. At East Grand Forks, the Red River was at 52.0 feet this morning and is expected to crest at 53.0 feet tonight. Red Lake River water continues to contribute to the Red River levels in the East Grand Forks area, and fluctuations of .1 to .3 feet are possible. The ice jam between East Grand Forks and Crookston on the Red Lake River started to release water yesterday evening. The level of the Red Lake River at Crookston is decreasing. The Red River in the Wahpeton/Breckenridge area is expected to drop; this morning's river stage was 18.96 feet. Almost all the snow is melted in the area which will relieve the overland flooding. Rivers are expected to remain at these levels for the next five to seven days.


In Polk County, East Grand Forks' situation is critical. A break in a dike was reported at 12:15 p.m. today in the Timberline and James Street area. The location is behind the VFW Arena. There is overland flooding from the south and north, and the river is rising. The dikes are being built up with

sandbags, but the effort is losing ground. The Kennedy Bridge, the only bridge open between East Grand Forks and Grand Forks, is in danger of closing. More than 500,000 sandbags are being delivered to the area today, and additional National Guard troops are being activated. There was a major breach in a dike in Grand Forks early this morning. Reportedly, 300 homes were inundated there. In Crookston, 700 homes have been evacuated in the last two days. However, with the Red Lake River level dropping, the situation is improving.

In Marshall County, 200 homes in the city of Warren were flooded when water coming overland breached the elevated railroad tracks which bisect the town. Two feet of water flowed into the town in an hour and a half. The Snake River which runs through Warren is still ice-covered. Ice is off the Rainy River in Lake of the Woods County and the river is flowing well. Roseau County reports that the river level is still rising toward a predicted crest of 19 feet, and they are sandbagging. Emergency management officials in Roseau County foresee some problems. In the west-central region, the city of Breckenridge reports that the river is at 18.96 feet and holding. Approximately 300 homes are flooded. The Salvation Army has set up an assistance center, and the Red Cross has relocated to the Grace Lutheran Church. Other areas of the region are in recovery phase and have completed preliminary damage assessments.

Flood Situation Report #19, April 20, 1997 (Sunday)

Regional Update: In the northwest region, the Polk County city of East Grand Forks has been flooded due to a levee failure. There is a mandatory evacuation of residents of the 500-year flood plain. East Grand Forks police and city hall have been relocated to the Community Center. They are giving up the Area Vocational Technical Institute in East Grand Forks. There is visible water moving between Highway 220 and the Red River. Five semi loads of non-perishable food items were received in the Polk County area. Refrigerated trucks are being used for food storage to ensure safe food handling. A major fire erupted in downtown Grand Forks.

Flood Situation Report #20, April 21, 1997 (Monday)

Regional Update: In the northwest region, the Polk County emergency management officials have issued a mandatory evacuation of residents of the 500-year flood plain. Ice jams located north of East Grand Forks are forcing additional water toward the community. During a fly-over yesterday, it was revealed that homes in certain areas of the city are submerged to the roof lines. Rescue missions are continuing. Gas and electric service are still on in East Grand Forks. If these services are turned off, it will compound the problem of evacuations, because even those persons whose homes are not flooded will need to leave. Also, if the gas is turned off, there is more chance for water to infiltrate the system and make it more difficult to turn on again. Water mains were breaking regularly, and divers have been dispatched to shut down water valves to maintain the water system.

In Marshall County, the cities of Oslo, Alvarado, and Warren are flooding. Oslo is completely surrounded by water, and boat and helicopter are the only means of getting in or out. There is a plan in place to evacuate the 750 residents of Oslo and Alvarado to Argyle, if necessary. In Kittson County, the cities of Hallock and St. Vincent are still sandbagging today.

Flood Situation Report #21, April 22, 1997 (Tuesday)

President Clinton visited Grand Forks, ND, today, meeting with federal, state, and local officials from the region.

Governor Arne Carlson today asked the President to increase the level of federal disaster funding from a 75 percent federal share to a 90 percent federal share as has occurred in other major disasters.

The Salvation Army reports that 192,161 displaced flood victims and disaster services personnel have been assisted through 10 a.m. on April 21. The "Operation We Care" outreach includes 22 mobile kitchen (canteen) units serving food, drinks and snacks to more than 19,000 sandbaggers, emergency/security personnel and various shelter locations on a daily basis. To date, 27,744 volunteers from 14 states have participated in the overall effort. Primary relief emphasis is in the Fargo/Moorhead, Grand Forks/East Grand Forks and Crookston areas.

Flood Situation Report #26, April 27, 1997 (Sunday)

It is now estimated that up to 20,000 persons are displaced from their homes in the flooded areas, and will not be able to return for an extended period of time. Evacuees from Grand Forks and East Grand Forks are being relocated across the whole region. Approximately 6,800 persons have registered at the Crookston registration point, and 300 are currently being sheltered in Crookston. The registration center in Beltrami County has registered 2,905 people, and 500 more are expected today. People are being housed at Bemidji State University (BSU) and other facilities, as well as in private homes. The National Guard Armory has been used as a feeding site in Bemidji; however, starting Friday, April 25, all meals will be served as the BSU dining hall. Approximately 200 people have been registered in Hubbard County, and more are expected. Over 1000 beds have been identified in the area around Park Rapids, where private parties have volunteered the use of cabins, resorts, motels and private homes to house evacuees. Thief River Falls has established an evacuation center and mass feeding operation in the old Washington School. They are expecting as many as 300 people to arrive from shelters in Crookston. About 300 people are being sheltered and fed at the Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Detroit Lakes. Approximately 150 people have registered at the center in Warroad. Cass County officials estimate that they are hosting nearly 600 evacuees. Minnesota communities along the Canadian border are preparing to receive evacuees from Canada.

The American Red Cross announced a total of 195,870 meals have been served during Flood Fight 1997. There are five fixed feeding sites and two mobile Red Cross feeding sites operating in the state. The Red Cross currently has five shelters open in Minnesota, in Warroad, Bemidji, Hallock, Moorhead, and Crookston.

The pet rescue in East Grand Forks has been very successful, with many animals being reunited with their owners. The Crookston Animal Shelter ran out of room to house animals, so the animals were being temporarily housed at the Comfort Inn before their owners come for them.

In Mahnomen County, 7 resorts and the Shooting Star Hotel continue to feed and house 500 people. Marshall County reported that the width of the river has decreased considerably from its maximum width of 17 miles. Oslo reported that its dikes are holding, and no seeping or weeping is observed. Kittson County emergency management officials are closely watching the dike in St. Vincent. The river crest is currently cresting and is expected to remain at crest for 36-48 hours. Army National Guard troops are still in the area providing dike security.

Flood Situation Report #27, April 28, 1997 (Monday)

Jim Franklin, Director of DEM, ...said that damages sustained by the public infrastructure and private housing will approach \$1 billion. Three more counties have been named major disaster areas, bringing to total to 56. Beltrami, Douglas, and Pope are the latest counties... In the northwest region, (Polk County and East Grand Forks), approximately 700 evacuees were allowed to visit their homes yesterday. Neighborhoods that are open today contain 11,000 homes. Two people per household are allowed to visit their homes, to check on home condition and remove a few personal belongings... Visits will last about one hour. People may also remove working vehicles. In Crookston, work is continuing to shore up the dikes, but the water level is dropping. Kittson County emergency management officials are still closely watching the dike in St. Vincent. The river is expected to crest today at 54.9 feet. A dike break in Emerson, across the border in Canada, apparently allowed some water to surge past St.Vincent. Some breaches are occurring in the dikes. The State Emergency Operation Center is contacting emergency management officials in Manitoba to offer our assistance. The response is coming to an end and recovery is underway throughout the state.

MINNESOTA SYMBOLS

State Flag

The present state flag was adopted by the 1957 legislature. Pictured in the center of the flag is the state seal. Three dates are woven into a flowered wreath: 1858, the statehood year; 1819, the year Fort Snelling was established; and 1893, the year the original flag was adopted.

State Seal

The Great Seal of the State of Minnesota is the insignia which the secretary of state affixes to government papers and documents to make them official.

A seal for the territory of Minnesota was adopted in 1849 and approved by Governor Alexander Ramsey and the territorial legislature. When Minnesota became a state on May 11, 1858, there was no official state seal and according to law no official act could be undertaken without it.

The territorial seal was used as a state seal until a new design was adopted by Governor Sibley. When the legislature did not approve Governor Sibley's design, he made some changes including changing the original Latin motto to French: Etoile du Nord, thereby making Minnesota the North Star State. In 1861, after three years of use, the legislature adopted the changed design making it the official state seal. In 1983, the legislature resolved some inconsistencies in the design that had occurred through the years.

State Tree

The red (Pinus resinosa) or Norway pine became the official state tree in 1953. It is a tall stately tree which reaches a height of sixty to one hundred feet. The trunk is straight and uniform and may grow to three to five feet in diameter. It is usually bare of branches for two-thirds of the way up the trunk, with the top or crown rounded.

State Flower

The pink and white lady slipper (Cypripedium reginae) or showy lady slipper was adopted as the state flower in 1902. Since 1925 this wildflower has been protected by state law.

State Gemstone

The Lake Superior agate, a quartz mineral which is basically red with white bands, was named official gemstone in 1969. It is found primarily in the red glacial drift areas of central and northeastern Minnesota.

State Grain

Wild rice (Zizania aquatica) or manomin, staple food of Minnesota's Indians for centuries, was adopted as the official state grain in 1977.

State Bird

The loon (Gavia immer) became Minnesota's state bird in 1961. It is also known as the common loon and the great northern diver. The loon is a large bird, with wing spans up to five feet and body lengths up to three feet.

State Fish

The walleye (Stizostedion vitreum) is found throughout Minnesota in lakes and rivers but is most at home in the large, clear, cool lakes of Minnesota's northern forests. It attains a weight of eighteen pounds, has flesh of the highest quality and is any angler's prize. It became the state fish in 1965.

State Song

Hail! Minnesota

Other State Symbols

In 1984, the legislature adopted the morel (Morchella esculenta) as the official state mushroom, and milk became the state drink. The blueberry muffin joined the menu as the state muffin in 1988.

MINNESOTA CHRONICLE

The following chronology is offered as an introduction to Minnesota's role in the new millennium.

EXPLORATION AND TERRITORY

1654

French traders Pierre Radisson and the Sieur de Groseilliers reached Wisconsin and probably Minnesota.

1679

Daniel Greysolon Dulhut (Duluth) held a council with the Dakota (Sioux) near Mille Lacs Lake.

1680

Father Louis Hennepin, after being held captive in a village of the Mille Lacs Dakota, was the first European to see the Falls of St. Anthony.

1689

On May 8, Nicholas Perrot, at Fort St. Antoine, on Lake Pepin's Wisconsin shore, laid formal claim to the surrounding country for France. He also built a fort on the Minnesota shore of the lake, near its downstream end.

1695-1731

The French continued to develop forts and settlements in Minnesota such as Isle Pelee north of Red Wing in 1695, Fort L. Huillier near Mankato in 1700, Fort Beauharnois near Frontenac in 1727 and in 1731 Fort St. Pierre by International Falls and Fort St. Charles in the Northwest Angle.

1745

The Ojibwa won the decisive battle in their war with the Dakota at the Great Dakota village of Kathio on the western shore of Mille Lacs. The Ojibwa eventually drove the Dakota into southern and western Minnesota.

1763

The Treaty of Paris, following the French and Indian War, ceded French territory east of the Mississippi River to England.

1784

The North West Company became important in the fur trade after the Revolutionary War; Grand Portage was its headquarters.

1797

David Thompson, a North West Company trader, completed the mapping of the Minnesota area of the Northwest Territory.

1803

President Thomas Jefferson acquired that part of Minnesota lying south and west of the Mississippi River from the French emperor Napoleon Bonaparte in the Louisiana Purchase.

The Dakota, Ojibwa and Winnebago joined the English in the War of 1812.

1817

The American Fur Company, under the leadership of John Jacob Astor, began operations in Minnesota.

1818

The Convention of 1818 with England put all of Minnesota including the Red River valley under the American flag.

1819

The United States established Fort St. Anthony (renamed Fort Snelling in 1825) to protect the confluence of the Minnesota and Mississippi Rivers.

1823

On May 10, the first steamboat arrived at Fort St. Anthony. American explorer Stephen H. Long visited the Minnesota River, the Red River, and the northern frontier.

1832

With Ojibwa guide Ozawindib, Henry R. Schoolcraft discovered the source of the Mississippi River and named it Lake Itasca.

1836

On April 20, after Michigan became a state, the territory of Wisconsin was organized to include the entire area of Minnesota. Joseph N. Nicollet began explorations in Minnesota.

1837

Governor Henry Dodge of Wisconsin signed a treaty at Fort Snelling with the Ojibwa, who agreed to cede all their pine lands on the St. Croix and its tributaries. A treaty was also signed at Washington, D.C. with representatives of the Dakota for their lands east of the Mississippi. These treaties led the way for extensive white settlements within the area of Minnesota.

1838

Franklin Steele established a claim at the Falls of St. Anthony, in what is today Minneapolis; and Pierre Parrant built a shanty and settled on the present site of the city of St. Paul, then called Pig's Eye.

1841

The Chapel of St. Paul was built and consecrated, giving the name to the future capital of the state.

1848

On August 26, after the admission of Wisconsin to the Union, the Stillwater Convention adopted measures calling for a separate territory to be named Minnesota. On October 30, Henry Hastings Sibley was elected delegate to Congress.

1849

On March 3, Congress passed the bill organizing Minnesota as a territory. Territorial officers were appointed March 19. Governor Alexander Ramsey proclaimed the organization of the territory on June 1, and the first territorial legislature assembled on September 3. On November 15, the Minnesota Historical Society was organized.

1850

The first U.S. census taken in Minnesota showed a population of 6,077.

1851

St. Paul, St. Anthony, and Stillwater were selected for the locations of the capitol, university, and penitentiary. In July and August, the treaties of Traverse des Sioux and Mendota opened a large area in southern Minnesota to white settlers.

1853

The first capitol was constructed.

1855

On January 23, the first bridge to span the main channel of the Mississippi River anywhere along its length was opened between Minneapolis and St. Anthony.

EARLY STATEHOOD

1857

The process of establishing state government in Minnesota began when Congress passed the Minnesota Enabling Act on February 26. The legislature passed a bill to make St. Peter the state capital, but since the bill was stolen before it was filed with the territorial secretary of state, the move was never made. The constitutional convention assembled on July 13 with such a rift between Democrats and Republicans that two constitutions were adopted. By October 3 one constitution was agreed upon and state officers were elected. Minnesota had a population of 150,037.

1858

Minnesota became the thirty-second state on May 11. At the time of its entry Minnesota was the third largest state in land area, only Texas and California were larger.

1861

On April 14, Governor Alexander Ramsey offered President Lincoln 1,000 men making Minnesota the first state to offer troops to the Union. The first Minnesota regiment left Fort Snelling on June 22.

1862

The first railroad in Minnesota opened between Minneapolis and St. Paul. Indian discontent with the treaties that made them relinquish their lands in Minnesota to white settlers who threatened their traditional way of life and frustration with a corrupt and slow annuity system were among the causes of the Dakota War of the late summer. Several settlements in the Minnesota Valley were attacked. After 392 Indians were tried by a military commission and many of those convicted were pardoned by President Abraham Lincoln, thirty-eight Indians were hanged at Mankato on December 26.

1863

At the battle of Gettysburg on July 2, the 1st Minnesota Regiment made its famous charge and 215 of the 262 men were killed or wounded.

1865

At the close of the Civil War, Minnesota troops in the Civil and Indian wars totaled 21,982. The population of Minnesota was 250,099.

1867

The legislature created the State Board of Immigration to encourage immigration to Minnesota.

1869

William W. Folwell became the first president of the University of Minnesota, some eighteen years after the institution had received its charter from the territorial legislature.

1881

The first state capitol burned and a second was built within two years on the site. Technological advances in flour milling during the 1870s helped make Minneapolis the flour milling capital of the world. From 1881-1930, Minneapolis was the nation's leading center of flour production.

1883

The Northern Pacific Railroad completed its transcontinental route from Minnesota to the Pacific.

1884

The first iron ore was shipped from Minnesota, a product of the Soudan Mine on the Vermillion Range. Six years later iron was discovered on the Mesabi Range and shipped from there beginning in 1892.

1889

St. Marys Hospital opened in Rochester, marking the birth of the Mayo Clinic.

1891

Itasca State Park, Minnesota's first state park, was established.

1894

On September 1, killer forest fires started, destroying over 400 square miles near Hinckley and Sandstone. More than 418 people died.

Three-fourths of the Red Lake Indian Reservation was opened for white settlement.

1898

Minnesota supplied four regiments to serve in the Spanish-American War, the first state to respond to the president's call for volunteers.

TWENTIETH CENTURY

1900

During the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, the tide of immigration into the U.S. and Minnesota swelled. Germany, Sweden, and Norway contributed most to the state's population increase with smaller migrations from other European countries, the Middle East, and China.

1905

Following twelve years of planning and construction, Minnesota's third and present state capitol was occupied. Lumber production from Minnesota sawmills peaked.

1909

President Theodore Roosevelt issued a proclamation establishing the Superior National Forest.

1913

The legislature passed the state's first workers compensation bill.

1918

During World War I, Minnesota contributed 123,325 troops.

1919

Prohibition began. A Minnesota congressman, Andrew J. Volstead, authored the enforcement legislation (repealed in 1933). The Minnesota legislature ratified the woman suffrage amendment to the U.S. Constitution on September 8.

1920

The state trunk highway system was created by passage of the Babcock Good Roads Amendment, named after the state highway commissioner.

1927

On May 20-21, Charles A. Lindbergh of Little Falls made his trans-Atlantic flight from New York to Paris.

1930

Minnesotan Frank B. Kellogg, serving as U.S. secretary of state, was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his work on the Kellogg-Briand Peace Pact signed in Paris in 1928. Floyd B. Olson was elected the first Farmer-Labor governor of Minnesota. The state had a population of 2,563,953.

1931

Sinclair Lewis from Sauk Centre won the Nobel Prize for literature.

1932

Because of failure to redistrict the state, Minnesota's nine congressional representatives were elected at large. The next year the legislature passed a reapportionment act dividing the state into nine districts.

1933-34

As the depression worsened, federal and state programs were implemented to assist the unemployed and the state's farmers. The nation's first modern sit-down strike occurred in Austin.

1937

Establishment of the Pipestone National Monument protected the sacred Indian quarry near Pipestone.

1941

The Minnesota National Guard and the Naval Reserve were ordered to duty with the armed forces in World War II. The great wartime demand for military equipment led to the production by Minnesota iron mines of 83,960,822 tons of ore in 1943, the largest single tonnage up to that time.

A special session of the legislature allowed Minnesotans in the armed forces to vote. The Democratic and Farmer-Labor parties merged to form the Minnesota Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party.

1947

Engineering Research Associates, Inc. designed the ATLAS, the beginning of Minnesota's computer industry.

1948

The value of manufactured products exceeded cash farm receipts in the state for the first time.

1950

The state population was 2,982,483.

1951

The state produced a new record of 89,564,932 tons of iron, 82 percent of the nation's total output.

1956

Reserve Mining Company's E. W. Davis Works opened at Silver Bay, inaugurating large-scale production of taconite in Minnesota.

1958

Grand Portage National Monument was established to protect one of the nation's foremost inland centers of 18th and 19th century fur trading.

1959

Transoceanic trade began with the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway which made Duluth accessible to ocean vessels.

1963

After the closest race for governor in the state's history, Karl F. Rolvaag was declared the winner over Elmer L. Andersen by ninety-one votes and sworn in on March 25, after four months of recounts.

1965

Hubert H. Humphrey became the first Minnesotan to win election to national executive office when he was sworn in as vice-president on January 20.

1967

The legislature created the nation's first department of human rights.

1968

Vice President Hubert Humphrey became the first Minnesotan to be nominated by a major political party for president of the United States, but lost to Richard Nixon in a close election.

1969

Warren Burger of St. Paul became chief justice of the United States Supreme Court. In 1970, Harry Blackmun of Rochester was appointed to the court.

1970

Voyageurs National Park was authorized. The state population was 3,805,069.

1972

The DFL gained control of the legislature, the first time since 1859 that the Democrats had a majority in both houses. The 1973 legislature repealed a sixty year old law providing for the nonpartisan election of legislators and restored party designation.

1977

Rosalie Wahl became the first woman to serve on the state Supreme Court.

1978

An era in Minnesota politics ended with the death of Hubert Humphrey. Independent-Republicans captured both U.S. Senate seats and the governorship.

The state population was 4,077,148. The state's greatest influx of immigrants since displaced persons arrived after the end of World War II came in the late 1970s and early 1980s: 26,000 southeast Asians settled in Minnesota. State revenue shortfalls forced several regular and special sessions to consider budget cuts.

1982

National recession severely impacted mining, manufacturing, and agriculture throughout the state.

Rudy Perpich became the first non-consecutive term governor and Marlene Johnson became the first woman elected lieutenant governor.

Post-census redistricting again resolved by the federal courts.

The state constitution was amended, allowing the creation of the state Court of Appeals.

1983

Farm foreclosures accelerated across Minnesota as land values fell.

1984

Native son Walter Mondale won the Democratic presidential nomination and carried Minnesota.

The Independent-Republican party gained control of the House after 12 years.

1986

The state economy began to rebound, accompanied by massive growth in the service industry. Control of the House returned to the Democratic-Farmer-Labor party.

1987

A special session convened to assist Dayton-Hudson and other Minnesota corporations in warding off hostile takeovers.

The Minnesota Twins won the World Series.

1988

Record breaking drought gripped Minnesota.

An amendment to establish an environmental trust fund passed by a 77.41 percent margin, the third greatest margin this century. The voters approved an amendment allowing the legislature to authorize a state lottery.

1989

The Pillsbury Company was acquired by Grand Metropolitan PLC, a British food industry conglomerate.

The Berlin wall was torn down as Germany moved toward reunification.

1990

The state population was 4,379,099, an increase of 7.3 percent from 1980, making Minnesota the fastest growing state in the region.

Iraq invaded Kuwait on August 2nd; Minnesota reserve units mobilized.

The Minnesota Judicial Center opened.

In a dramatic sequence of events, Arne Carlson replaced Independent-Republican nominee Jon Grunseth on the state general election ballot and defeated Rudy Perpich's bid for an unprecedented third four-year term as governor.

The Minnesota Supreme Court became the first state supreme court in the nation to have a majority of women seated as justices following the appointment of Appeals Court Judge Sandra Gardebring.

Mikhail Gorbachev, president of the U.S.S.R., and his wife Raisa visit Minnesota on June 3rd, meeting with business and civic leaders and ordinary people. Although the weather is cold and raw, their routes through the Twin Cities area are lined with thousands of enthusiastic Minnesotans hopeful of world

peace.

1991

Minnesota's economy followed the nation's into recession.

Allied forces in Operation Desert Storm defeated Iraqi troops and liberated Kuwait. Approximately 11,100 Minnesotans served in the Persian Gulf theater.

The dissolution of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics marked the end of the cold war that had dominated state and national politics since 1947.

Casino gambling transformed life in and around Minnesota's reservations.

The Minnesota Twins won their second world championship in five years.

Continued diversification of Minnesota's economy encouraged development of smaller, newer technomanufacturing companies over heavy industry and defense contractors in the state economy.

In what has become a tradition, post-census redistricting was again thrown into the state and federal courts for resolution.

1992

Minnesota's first presidential primary election since 1956 was held April 7.

Responding to escalating medical care costs, the MinnesotaCare cost containment and funding program was enacted.

The country's largest indoor shopping and entertainment complex, the Mall of America, opened in Bloomington in August. The new Minnesota History Center opened in October.

Bill Clinton became the nation's first post-World War II, "baby boom generation" president. Alan Page became the first African-American justice elected to the state supreme court. Dee Long became the first woman to serve as Speaker of the House.

1993

Minnesota teacher Ann Bancroft became the first woman to reach both of the earth's poles over land.

Minnesota lost major league hockey when the North Stars move to Dallas.

A record 54 women were sworn in as members of the legislature.

Spring snow melt and frequent rains produced record flooding throughout the southern portion of the state and upper Midwest generally, leading to massive crop loses, property damage and the disruption of transportation.

Sharon Sayles Belton was elected mayor of Minneapolis, the first woman and the first African-American to preside over the state's largest city.

Congress ratified the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), providing for unrestricted trade between Canada, Mexico, and the United States.

1994

Following lengthy and passionate debate, the legislature approved the long term storage of high-level radioactive waste in dry casks at the Prairie Island nuclear generating plant near Red Wing.

South Africa held its first free elections in the post-apartheid era. Minnesota Secretary of State Joan Growe served as a member of the United Nations Observer Mission to monitor the election.

1995

The Women's Final Four basketball tournament was held in Minneapolis.

1996

A new record low temperature for the state is established at 9:10 a.m., February 2 when the mercury bottomed out at -60° (F) in the City of Tower, St. Louis County.

The state and national economies continued to set new highs as the Dow Jones stock average broke 7,000. Minnesota's unemployment rate remained steady at less than 3%, and use of state public assistance programs declined by 17%. The state treasury posted a record breaking 2.3 billon dollar surplus fueled by higher than expected tax revenues and state budget cuts.

The University of Minnesota's Golden Gophers men's basketball team won the Big Ten championship and went on to compete in the NCAA Final Four basketball tournament.

Sixty years of federally guaranteed "safety net" social protections were reversed beginning April 1 when Title IV of the Social Security Act, otherwise known as the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program, became a time-limited, fixed appropriation program.

Severe winter storms and snowfalls led to record breaking spring floods along Minnesota's major river systems. Red River and Minnesota River valley communities were especially hard hit.

FUNDAMENTAL CHARTERS AND LAWS

This section includes six fundamental charters and laws which affect the state of Minnesota.

MINNESOTA UNDER FOUR NATIONS

The land area of Minnesota has been under the governments of four nations: France, Spain, England and the United States. The early territorial claims of France, Spain and England were vague and overlapping. Formal government was nonexistent.

Formal dominion over this area was probably first expressed by the French when the Sieur de Lusson, in a picturesque ceremony held at the Sault de Ste. Marie in 1671, claimed for France the vast northwest area of North America.

However, British dominion over northeastern Minnesota appears to have provided the first written constitution nominally in effect. The Quebec Act of 1774 made Minnesota a part of the province of Quebec. England's claim to this area was not exclusive as Virginia maintained a claim to the same area under its colonial charter of 1609.

The portion of Minnesota's land area east of the Mississippi River came under the jurisdiction of the United States by the treaty of peace between England and the United States in 1783. Four years later, under the Ordinance of 1787, the first genuine government was extended to this area, and the Minnesota country began its march to statehood.

THE NORTHWEST ORDINANCE OF 1787

One of the great charters in Minnesota history is the Northwest Ordinance passed by the Congress of the Confederation on July 13, 1787. The Ordinance of 1787 was made possible when several states, including Massachusetts, New York, Virginia and Connecticut released their claims to the land area west of the Appalachian Mountains extending to the Mississippi River. This area became known as the Northwest Territory.

The Ordinance of 1787 followed the fundamentals of Thomas Jefferson's Ordinance of 1784 and established a government over the Northwest Territory and gave impetus to westward expansion. This outstanding governmental document gave first national recognition to the Bill of Rights, abolished primogeniture, provided for the encouragement of education, prohibited slavery, and established the principle that new states should be admitted to the federal government on equal footing with the original states.

The full effect of the Northwest Ordinance upon Minnesota law has yet to be determined. For example, the question of whether common law in Minnesota dates from the revolution or from the Ordinance of 1787 has been left open by decisions of the Minnesota courts.

The ordinance provided for the formation out of the Northwest Territory of not less than three nor more than five states. The states were to be admitted to the federal government on an equal footing with the original states.

By May of 1848 five states had been formed out of the Northwest Territory: Ohio, Indiana, Illinois,

Michigan and Wisconsin.

The state of Wisconsin was organized out of the territory of Wisconsin, the last remnant of the Northwest Territory. Although in 1848 the territory of Wisconsin extended to the Mississippi River, the state of Wisconsin voluntarily limited its western boundary to the St. Croix River. This boundary limitation by the state of Wisconsin left the land area between the St. Croix and the Mississippi available for eventual inclusion in the state of Minnesota.

The state of Minnesota can trace much of its fundamental governmental principles, and a substantial portion of its territory, back to the Northwest Ordinance of 1787.

NORTHWEST ORDINANCE 1787 ACT OF CONGRESS, JULY 13, 1787

An Ordinance for the government of the territory of the United States northwest of the river Ohio.

1. Be it ordained by the United States, in Congress assembled, That the said territory, for the purpose of temporary government, be one district, subject, however, to be divided into two districts, as future circumstances may, in the opinion of Congress, make it expedient.

2. Be it ordained by the authority aforesaid. That the estates both of resident and non-resident proprietors in the said territory, dying intestate, shall descend to, and be distributed among, their children and the descendants of a deceased child in equal parts, the descendants of a deceased child or grandchild to take the share of their deceased parent in equal parts among them; and where there shall be no children or descendants, then in equal parts to the next of kin, in equal degree; and among collaterals, the children of a deceased brother or sister of the intestate shall have, in equal parts among them, their deceased parent's share; and there shall, in no case, be a distinction between kindred of the whole and half blood; saving in all cases to the widow of the intestate her third part of the real estate for life, and one-third part of the personal estate; and this law, relative to descents and dower, shall remain in full force until altered by the Legislature of the district. And until the Governor and judges shall adopt laws, as hereinafter mentioned, estates in the said territory may be devised or bequeathed by wills in writing, signed and sealed by him or her in whom the estate may be, (being of full age), and attested by three witnesses; and real estates may be conveyed by lease and release, or bargain and sale, signed, sealed, and delivered by the person, being of full age, in whom the estate may be, and attested by two witnesses, provided such wills be duly proved, and such conveyances be acknowledged, or the execution thereof duly proved, and be recorded within one year after proper magistrates, courts, and registers, shall be appointed for that purpose; and personal property may be transferred by delivery, saving, however, to the French and Canadian inhabitants, and other settlers of the Kaskaskies, Saint Vincents, and the neighboring villages, who have heretofore professed themselves citizens of Virginia, their laws and customs now in force among them, relative to the descent and conveyance of property.

3. Be it ordained by the authority aforesaid, That there shall be appointed, from time to time, by Congress, a Governor, whose commission shall continue in force for the term of three years, unless sooner revoked by Congress; he shall reside in the district, and have a freehold estate therein, in 1,000 acres of land, while in the exercise of his office.

4. There shall be appointed from time to time, by Congress, a Secretary, whose commission shall continue in force for four years, unless sooner revoked; he shall reside in the district, and have a freehold estate therein, in five hundred acres of land, while in the exercise of his office. It shall be his duty to keep and preserve the Acts and laws passed by the Legislature, and the public records of the district, and the proceedings of the Governor in his executive department, and transmit authentic copies of such Acts and proceedings every six months, to the Secretary of Congress. There shall also be appointed a court, to consist of three judges, any two of whom to form a court, who shall have a common law jurisdiction, and reside in the district, and have each therein a freehold estate in five hundred acres of land, while in the exercise of their offices; and their commission shall continue in force during good behavior.

5. The Governor and judges, or a majority of them, shall adopt and publish in the district such laws of the original States, criminal and civil, as may be necessary, and best suited to the circumstances of the district, and report them to Congress from time to time, which laws shall be in force in the district until the organization of the General Assembly therein, unless disapproved of by Congress; but afterwards the Legislature shall have authority to alter them as they shall think fit.

6. The Governor, for the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of the militia, appoint and commis-

sion all officers in the same below the rank of general officers; all general officers shall be appointed and commissioned by Congress.

7. Previous to the organization of the general assembly, the Governor shall appoint such magistrates, and other civil officers, in each county or township, as he shall find necessary for the preservation of the peace and good order in the same. After the General Assembly shall be organized the powers and duties of magistrates and other civil officers shall be regulated and defined by the said assembly; but all magistrates and other civil officers, not herein otherwise directed, shall, during the continuance of this temporary government, be appointed by the Governor.

8. For the prevention of crimes and injuries, the laws to be adopted or made shall have force in all parts of the district, and for the execution of process, criminal and civil, the Governor shall make proper divisions thereof; and he shall proceed, from time to time, as circumstances may require, to lay out the parts of the district in which the Indian titles shall have been extinguished, into counties and townships, subject, however, to such alterations as may thereafter be made by the Legislature.

9. So soon as there shall be five thousand free male inhabitants, of full age, in the district, upon giving proof thereof to the Governor, they shall receive authority, with the time and place, to elect Representatives from their counties or townships, to represent them in the General Assembly: Provided, that for every five hundred free male inhabitants there shall be one Representative, and soon, progressively, with the number of free male inhabitants, shall the right of representation increase, until the number of Representatives shall amount to twenty-five; after which the number and proportion of Representatives shall be regulated by the legislature: Provided, that no person be eligible or qualified to act as a Representative, unless he shall have been a citizen of one of the United States three years, and be a resident in the district, or unless he shall have resided in the district three years; and, in either case, shall likewise hold in his own right, in fee simple, two hundred acres of land within the same: Provided also, that a freehold in fifty acres of land in the district, having been a citizen of one of the States, and being resident in the district, or the like freehold and two years' residence in the district, shall be necessary to qualify a man as an elector of a Representative.

10. The Representatives thus elected shall serve for the term of two years; and in case of the death of a Representative, or removal from office, the Governor shall issue a writ to the county or township, for which he was a member, to elect another in his stead, to serve for the residue of the term.

11. The General Assembly, or Legislature, shall consist of the Governor, Legislative Council, and a House of Representatives. The Legislative Council shall consist of five members, to continue in office five years, unless sooner removed by Congress; any three of whom to be a quorum; and the members of the council shall be nominated and appointed in the following manner, to wit: As soon as Representatives shall be elected the Governor shall appoint a time and place for them to meet together, and when met they shall nominate ten persons, resident in the district, and each possessed of a freehold in five hundred acres of land, and return their names to Congress, five of whom Congress shall appoint and commission to serve as aforesaid; and whenever a vacancy shall happen in the Council, by death or removal from office, the House of Representatives shall nominate two persons, qualified as aforesaid, for each vacancy, and return their names to Congress, one of whom Congress shall appoint and commission for the residue of the term; and every five years, four months at least before the expiration of the time of service of the members of the Council, the said House shall nominate ten persons, qualified as aforesaid, and return their names to Congress, five of whom Congress shall appoint and commission to serve as members of the Council five years, unless sooner removed. And the Governor, Legislative Council, and House of Representatives shall have authority to make laws in all cases for the good government of the district, not repugnant to the principles and articles in this Ordinance established and declared. And all bills, having passed by a majority in the House, and by a majority in the Council, shall be referred to the Governor for his assent; but no bill or legislative Act whatever shall be of any force without his assent. The Governor shall have power to convene, prorogue, and dissolve the General Assembly when, in his opinion, it shall be expedient.

12. The Governor, judges, Legislative Council, Secretary, and such other officers as Congress shall appoint in the district, shall take an oath or affirmation of fidelity, and of office; the Governor before the President of Congress, and all other officers before the Governor. As soon as a legislature shall be formed in the district, the Council and House assembled, in one room, shall have authority, by joint ballot, to elect a delegate to Congress, who shall have a seat in Congress, with a right of debating, but not of voting, during this temporary government.

13. And for extending the fundamental principles of civil and religious liberty, which form the basis whereon these republics, their laws and Constitutions, are erected; to fix and establish those principles

as the basis of all laws, Constitutions, and governments, which forever hereafter shall be formed in the said territory; to provide, also, for the establishment of States, and permanent government therein, and for their admission to a share in the federal councils on an equal footing with the original States, at as early periods as may be consistent with the general interest.

14. It is hereby ordained and declared, by the authority aforesaid, that the following articles shall be considered as articles of compact, between the original States and the people and States in the said territory, and forever remain unalterable, unless by common consent, to wit:

Article I. No person demeaning himself in a peaceable and orderly manner shall ever be molested on account of his mode of worship, or religious sentiments in the said territories.

Art. II. The inhabitants of the said territory shall always be entitled to the benefits of the writs of habeas corpus, and of the trial by jury; of a proportionate representation of the people in the Legislature, and of judicial proceedings according to the course of the common law. All persons shall be bailable, unless for capital offenses, where the proof shall be evident or the presumption great. All fines shall be moderate, and no cruel or unusual punishments shall be inflicted. No man shall be deprived of his liberty or property, but by the judgment of his peers, or the law of the land, and should the public exigencies make it necessary, for the common preservation, to take any person's property, or to demand his particular services, full compensation shall be made for the same. And, in the just preservation of rights and property, it is understood and declared that no law ought ever to be made or have force in the said territory, that shall, in any manner whatever, interfere with or affect private contracts, or engagements bona fide and without fraud previously formed.

Art. III. Religion, morality, and knowledge being necessary to good government and the happiness of mankind, schools and the means of education shall forever be encouraged. The utmost good faith shall always be observed towards the Indians; their lands and property shall never be taken from them without their consent; and in their property, rights, and liberty they never shall be invaded or disturbed, unless in just and lawful wars authorized by Congress; but laws founded in justice and humanity shall, from time to time, be made, for preventing wrongs being done to them, and for preserving peace and friendship with them.

Art. IV. The said territory, and the States which may be formed therein, shall forever remain a part of this Confederacy of the United States of America, subject to the Articles of Confederation, and to such alterations therein as shall be constitutionally made; and to all the Acts and Ordinances of the United States in Congress assembled, conformable thereto. The inhabitants and settlers in the said territory shall be subject to pay a part of the federal debts, contracted, or to be contracted, and a proportional part of the expenses of government, to be apportioned on them by Congress, according to the same common rule and measure by which apportionments thereof shall be made on the other States; and the taxes for paying their proportion shall be laid and levied by the authority and direction of the Legislatures of the district, or districts, or new States, as in the original States, within the time agreed upon by the United States in Congress assembled. The Legislatures of those districts, or new States, shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil by the United States in Congress assembled, nor with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in such soil to the bona fide purchasers. No tax shall be imposed on lands the property of the United States; and in no case shall nonresident proprietors be taxed higher than residents. The navigable waters leading into the Mississippi and Saint Lawrence, and the carrying places between the same, shall be common highways, and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of the said territory as to the citizens of the United States, and those of any other States that may be admitted into the Confederacy, without any tax, impost, or duty therefor.

Art. V. There shall be formed in the said territory not less than three nor more than five States; and the boundaries of the States, as soon as Virginia shall alter her Act of cession, and consent to the same, shall become fixed and established as follows, to wit: The western State, in the said territory, shall be bounded by the Mississippi, the Ohio, and the Wabash rivers; a direct line drawn from the Wabash and Post Vincents, due north, to the territorial line between the United States and Canada; and by the said territorial line to the Lake of the Woods and Mississippi. The middle States shall be bounded by the said direct line, the Wabash from Post Vincents to the Ohio, by a direct line drawn due north from the mouth of the Great Miami to the said territorial line, and by the said territorial line. The eastern State shall be bounded by the last mentioned direct line, the Ohio, Pennsylvania, and the said territorial line: Provided, however, and it is further understood and declared, that the boundaries of these three States, shall be subject so far to be altered, that, if Congress shall hereafter find it expedient, they shall have authority to form one or two States in that part of the said territory which lies north of an east and west line drawn through the southerly bend or extreme of Lake Michigan. And whenever any of the said States shall have sixty thousand free inhabitants therein, such State shall be admitted, by its

delegates, into the Congress of the United States, on an equal footing with the original States, in all respects whatever; and shall be at liberty to form a permanent Constitution and State government: Provided, the Constitution and government, so to be formed, shall be republican, and in conformity to the principles contained in these Articles, and, so far as it can be consistent with the general interest of the Confederacy, such admission shall be allowed at an earlier period, and when there may be a less number of free inhabitants in the State than sixty thousand.

Art. VI. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the said territory, otherwise than in the punishment of crimes, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted: Provided always, that any person escaping into the same, from whom labor or service is lawfully claimed in any one of the original States, such fugitive may be lawfully reclaimed, and conveyed to the person claiming his or her labor or service as aforesaid.

Be it ordained by the authority aforesaid, That the resolutions of the 23rd of April, 1784, relative to the subject of this Ordinance, be, and the same are hereby, repealed, and declared null and void.

Done by the United States, in Congress assembled, the 13th day of July, in the year of our Lord 1787, and of their sovereignty and independence the 12th.

THE ORGANIC ACT OF 1849

The organic act was passed by Congress on March 3, 1849, to provide for the territorial government of Minnesota. The boundaries of the territory of Minnesota were Canada on the north, Wisconsin on the east, Iowa on the south and the Missouri and White Earth rivers on the west.

The movement to create a territorial government arose from the necessity for formal government in the land area remaining after formation of the states of Wisconsin and Iowa.

The formation of the state of Iowa in 1846 left Minnesota's land area west of the Mississippi without territorial government. The triangular area between the St. Croix River and the Mississippi River was left without territorial government when the state of Wisconsin was admitted to the Union in 1848. By 1848 the land area from the St. Croix River west to the Missouri and White Earth Rivers was without territorial government, a veritable "no man's land." Consequently, when Henry H. Sibley was elected delegate to Congress from this area, he worked with Senator Stephen A. Douglas, chairman of the senate committee on territories, to bring about passage of an organic act for the establishment of territorial government for Minnesota.

The organic act provided for a governor, secretary, judicial system, legislative assembly, and a delegate to Congress. Legislators and the delegate to Congress were elected; all other officers were appointive.

The legislative assembly consisted of two houses, a council composed of nine members and a house of representatives with eighteen members. The first session of the legislature convened on September 3, 1849, in the Central House at the corner of Bench and Minnesota Streets in St. Paul. Since that time St. Paul has been the capital of Minnesota.

In 1857 a bill was introduced in the territorial legislative assembly to have the capital removed from St. Paul to St. Peter. This action was promoted by the east and west boundary group which contended that the boundary for the state of Minnesota should extend from Wisconsin west to the Missouri River, with a northern boundary just north of St. Paul.

Although this bill passed both houses of the legislative assembly, it was stolen before it could be presented to the territorial governor for his signature. Assembly member Joseph Rolette disappeared with the bill and held it until the close of the legislative session.

An important provision of the organic act was the reservation of sections 16 and 36 of each township for school purposes.

Alexander Ramsey, a Whig, was the first territorial governor. He was followed by Willis A. Gorman and Samuel Medary, Democrats.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE TERRITORIAL GOVERNMENT OF MINNESOTA. [Passed March 3, 1849]

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in

Congress assembled. That from and after the passage of this act, all that part of the territory of the United States which lies within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning in the Mississippi river at the point where the line of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes of north latitude crosses the same; thence running due west on said line, which is the northern boundary of the state of Iowa, to the northwest corner of the said state of Iowa: thence southerly along the western boundary of said state to the point where said boundary strikes the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of White Earth river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the White Earth river to the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain, thence east and south of east along the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain to Lake Superior; thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the state of Wisconsin in Lake Superior; thence along the western boundary line of said state of Wisconsin to the Mississippi river; thence down the main channel of said river to the place of beginning, be and the same is hereby erected into a temporary government by the name of the Territory of Minnesota; provided, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to inhibit the government of the United States from dividing said Territory into two or more territories, in such manner and at such times as Congress shall deem convenient and proper, or from attaching any portion of said Territory to any other state or territory of the United States.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the executive power and authority in and over said Territory of Minnesota shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States. The governor shall reside within said Territory; shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof; shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian affairs. He may grant pardons for offenses against the law of said Territory, and reprieves for offenses against the laws of the United States until the decision of the president can be made known thereon; he shall commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of the said Territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That there shall be a secretary of said Territory, who shall reside therein, and hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States; he shall record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly hereinafter constituted, and all the acts and proceedings of the governor in his executive department; he shall transmit one copy of the laws and one copy of the executive proceedings, on or before the first day of December in each year, to the president of the United States, and at the same time two copies of the laws to the speaker of the house of representatives, and the president of the senate for the use of Congress. And in case of the death, removal, resignation, or necessary absence of the governor from the Territory, the secretary shall be and he is hereby authorized and required to execute and perform all the powers and the duties of the governor during such vacancy or necessary absence or until another governor shall be duly appointed to fill such vacancy.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That the legislative power and authority of said Territory shall be vested in the governor and a legislative assembly. The legislative assembly shall consist of a council and house of representatives. The council shall consist of nine members having the qualifications of voters, as hereinafter prescribed, whose term of service shall continue two years. The house of representatives shall, at its first session, consist of eighteen members, possessing the same qualifications as prescribed for members of the council, and whose term of service shall continue one year. The number of councilors and representatives may be increased by the legislative assembly, from time to time, in proportion to the increase of population; provided, that the whole number shall never exceed fifteen councilors and thirty-nine representatives. An apportionment shall be made, as nearly equal as practicable, among the several counties or districts for the election of the council and representatives. giving to each section of the Territory representation in the ratio of its population, Indians excepted, as nearly as may be. And the members of the council and of the house of representatives shall reside in and be inhabitants of the districts for which they may be elected, respectively. Previous to the first election, the governor shall cause a census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the several counties and districts of the Territory to be taken, and the first election shall be held at such times and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct, and he shall, at the same time, declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties and districts shall be entitled under this act.

The number of persons authorized to be elected having the highest number of votes, in each of said council districts for members of the council, shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected to the council, and the person or persons authorized to be elected, having the greatest number of votes for the house of representatives, equal to the number to which each county or district shall be entitled, shall also be declared by the governor to be duly elected members of the house of representatives; provided,

that in case of a tie between two or more persons voted for, the governor shall order a new election to supply the vacancy made by such tie. And the persons thus elected to the legislative assembly shall meet at such place on such day as the governor shall appoint, but thereafter the time, place and manner of holding and conducting all elections by the people, and the apportioning of the representation in the several counties or districts to the council and house of representatives, according to the population, shall be prescribed by laws, as well as the day of the commencement of the regular session of the legislative assembly; provided, that no one session shall exceed the term of sixty days.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said Territory at the time of the passage of this act, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to any office within the said Territory; but the qualifications of voters and of holding office at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the legislative assembly; provided, that the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States and those who shall have declared on oath their intention to become such, and shall have taken an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That the legislative power of the Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation, consistent with the Constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act; but no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents. All the laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor shall be submitted to the Congress of the United States, and if disapproved shall be null and of no effect.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That all township, district and county officers, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, in such manner as shall be provided by the governor and legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota. The governor shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council, appoint all officers not herein otherwise provided for, and, in the first instance, the governor alone may appoint all said officers, who shall hold their offices until the end of the next session of the legislative assembly.

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That no member of the legislative assembly shall hold or be appointed to any office which shall have been created, or the salary or emoluments of which shall have been increased, while he was a member, during the term for which he was elected, and for one year after the expiration of such term; and no person holding a commission or appointment under the United States, except postmasters, shall be a member of the legislative assembly, or shall hold any office under the government of said Territory.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That the judicial power of said Territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts, and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and who shall hold a term at the seat of government of said Territory annually, and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said Territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such time and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law; provided, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute, or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judges thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court, or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of

every term of said courts, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said Territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive in all such cases the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin Territory received for similar services.

Sec. 10. And be it further enacted, That there shall be appointed an attorney for said Territory, who shall continue in office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall receive the same fees and salary as the attorney of the United States for the late Territory of Wisconsin received. There shall also be a marshal for the Territory appointed, who shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall execute all processes issuing from the said courts, when exercising their jurisdiction as circuit and district courts of the United States; he shall perform the duties, be subject to the same regulations and penalties, and be entitled to the same fees as the marshal of the district court of the United States for the late Territory of two hundred dollars annually as a compensation for extra services.

Sec. 11. And be it further enacted, That the governor, secretary, chief justice and associate justices, attorney and marshal, shall be nominated and by and with the advice and consent of the senate. appointed by the president of the United States. The governor and secretary to be appointed as aforesaid shall, before they act as such, respectively, take an oath or affirmation, before the district judge, or some justice of the peace in the limits of said Territory, duly authorized to administer oaths and affirmations by the laws now in force therein, or before the chief justice, or some associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, to support the constitution of the United States, and faithfully to discharge the duties of their respective offices, which said oaths, when so taken, shall be certified by the person by whom the same shall have been taken, and such certificates shall be received and recorded by the said secretary among the executive proceedings; and the chief justice and associate justices, and all other civil officers in said Territory, before they act as such, shall take a like oath or affirmation, before the said governor or secretary, or some judge or justice of the peace of the Territory, who may be duly commissioned and qualified, which said oath or affirmation shall be certified and transmitted, by the person taking the same, to the secretary, to be by him recorded as aforesaid; and afterwards, the like oath or affirmation shall be taken, certified and recorded in such manner and form as may be prescribed by law. The governor shall receive an annual salary of \$1,500 as governor, and \$1,000 as superintendent of Indian affairs. The chief justice and associate justice shall each receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The secretary shall receive an annual salary of \$1,800. The said salaries shall be paid quarter-yearly, at the treasury of the United States. The members of the legislative assembly shall be entitled to receive three dollars each per day during their attendance at the session thereof, and three dollars each for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the said sessions, estimated according to the nearest usually traveled route. There shall be appropriated, annually, the sum of \$1,000, to be expended by the governor to defray the contingent expenses of the Territory; and there shall also be appropriated, annually, a sufficient sum to be expended by the secretary of the Territory, and upon an estimate to be made by the secretary of the treasury of the United States, to defray the expenses of the legislative assembly, the printing of the laws, and other incidental expenses, and the secretary of the Territory shall annually account to the secretary of the treasury of the United States for the manner in which the aforesaid sum shall have been expended.

Sec. 12. And be it further enacted, That the inhabitants of the said Territory shall be entitled to all the rights, privileges and immunities heretofore granted and secured to the Territory of Wisconsin and to its inhabitants; and the laws in force in the Territory of Wisconsin at the date of the admission of the State of Wisconsin shall continue to be valid and operative therein, so far as the same be not incompatible with the provisions of this act, subject, nevertheless, to be altered, modified or repealed by the governor and legislative assembly of the said Territory of Minnesota; and the laws of the United States are hereby extended over and declared to be in force in said Territory, so far as the same, or any provision thereof, may be applicable.

Sec. 13. And be it further enacted, That the legislative assembly of the Territory of Minnesota shall hold its first session in St. Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of government for said Territory, at such place as they may deem eligible; and shall at such time as they shall see proper prescribe by law the manner of locating the permanent seat of government of said Territory by a vote of the people. And the sum of twenty thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated and granted to said Territory of Minnesota, to be applied by the government.

Sec. 14. And be it further enacted, That a delegate of the house of representatives of the United States, to serve for the term of two years, may be elected by the voters qualified to elect members of the legislative assembly, who shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as are exercised and enjoyed by the delegates from the several other territories of the United States to the said house of representatives. The first election shall be held at such time and places and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and at all subsequent elections the times, places and manner of holding. the elections shall be prescribed by law. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected, and a certificate thereof shall be given accordingly.

Sec. 15. And be it further enacted, That all suits, process and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law or in chancery, and all indictments and information, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the Territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said Territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect, shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said Territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws, in force within said limits, may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions and causes of action may be recovered under this act the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said Territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

Sec. 16. And be it further enacted, That all justices of the peace, constables, sheriffs, and all other judicial and ministerial officers, who shall be in office within the limits of said Territory, when this act shall take effect, shall be and they are hereby authorized and required to continue to exercise and perform the duties of their respective offices as officers of the Territory of Minnesota, temporarily, and until they or others shall be duly appointed and qualified to fill their places, in the manner herein directed, or until their offices shall be abolished.

Sec. 17. And be it further enacted, That the sum of \$5,000 be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the said governor of the Territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorneys of said Territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.

Sec. 18. And be it further enacted, That when the lands in said Territory shall be surveyed under the direction of the government of the United States, preparatory to bringing the same into market, sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in said Territory shall be and the same are hereby reserved for the purpose of being applied to schools in said Territory, and in the state and territories hereafter to be erected out of the same.

Sec. 19. And be it further enacted, That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said territory may define the judicial districts of said Territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said Territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter or modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.

Sec. 20. And be it further enacted, That every bill which shall or may pass the council and house of representatives, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the Territory; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated; which shall cause the objections to be entered at large upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall also be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law; but in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislative assembly, by adjournment, prevent it, in which case it shall not become a law.

THE ENABLING ACT

Minnesota progressed under the territorial government, but many groups felt that progress would be accelerated if Minnesota were a state. Within a short time there arose a strong desire for statehood.

Henry M. Rice, delegate to Congress from the territory of Minnesota, at the opening of Congress in December, 1856, introduced a bill for an act to authorize a state government for Minnesota.

The Rice bill proposed that the north, south and east boundaries of Minnesota be continued, and that the west boundary be established as a line beginning at a point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North at the Canadian border and running south through Lake Traverse, through Big Stone Lake, to the Big Sioux River and to the northwest corner of Iowa. In place of the Big Sioux River, Congress substituted a line from the outlet of Big Stone Lake due south to the Iowa border.

Considerable controversy had arisen in the territory over proposed boundaries for the state of Minnesota. There were two general groups, the east and west group and the north and south group. The east and west group proposed the Missouri River as the west boundary, and a point just north of St. Paul as the north boundary. The Rice bill followed the proposal of the north and south group.

The bill for an enabling act was not without opposition in Congress. However, Minnesota again found a friend in Senator Stephen A. Douglas who was still chairman of the senate committee on territories. The enabling act passed Congress and was approved on February 27, 1857.

In addition to establishing state boundaries, the enabling act provided for a constitutional convention and an election of delegates to that convention. It further provided that the following proposals be submitted for the consideration of the constitutional convention: that seventy-two sections of land be reserved and set aside for a state university; that ten sections be granted to the state to complete and erect public buildings at the capitol; that all salt springs, not exceeding twelve, be granted to the state for its use; and that five per centum of new proceeds from the sale by Congress of public lands lying within the state of Minnesota be paid to the state for public road purposes.

The enabling act also authorized the state of Minnesota to have one representative in Congress and such additional representatives as the population of the state would entitle it to at the current ratio of representation. For the purpose of determining the population, the act authorized a census to be taken by the United States marshal. The census was completed in October of 1857; population of the territory was 150,037.

ACT AUTHORIZING A STATE GOVERNMENT

[Passed Feb. 26, 1857]

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the inhabitants of that portion of the Territory of Minnesota which is embraced within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red River of the North, where the boundary line between the United States and the British Possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois de Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof, thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the State of Iowa; thence along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river, and following the boundary line of the State of Wisconsin, until the same intersects with the St. Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and the British Possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning, be and they hereby are authorized to form for themselves a constitution and state government by the name of the State of Minnesota, and to come into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, according to the Federal Constitution.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the State of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and all other rivers and waters bordering on the said State of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state and any state or states now or hereafter to be formed or bounded by the same; and said river or waters leading into the same shall be common highways, and forever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to all other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That on the first Monday in June next, the legal voters in each representative district then existing within the limits of the proposed state, are hereby authorized to elect two delegates for each representative to which said district shall be entitled according to the apportionment for representatives to the territorial legislature; which election for delegates shall be held and conducted, and the returns made, in all respects in conformity with the laws of said Territory regulating the election of representatives, and the delegates so elected shall assemble at the capitol of said Territory on the second Monday in July next, and first determine by a vote whether it is the wish of the people of the proposed State to be admitted into the Union at that time; and if so, shall proceed to form a constitution, and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a state government, in conformity with the Federal Constitution, subject to the approval and ratification of the people of the proposed State.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That in the event said convention shall decide in favor of the immediate admission of the proposed State into the Union, it shall be the duty of the United States marshal for said Territory to proceed to take a census or enumeration of the inhabitants within the limits of the proposed State, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, with the view of ascertaining the number of representatives to which said State may be entitled in the Congress of the United States. And said State shall be entitled to one representative, and such additional representatives as the population of the State shall, according to the census, show it would be entitled to according to the present ratio of representation.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That the following propositions be and the same are hereby offered to the said convention of the people of Minnesota for their free acceptance or rejection, which, if accepted by the convention, shall be obligatory on the United States, and upon the said State of Minnesota, to-wit:

First: That sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in every township of public lands in said State, and where either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been sold or otherwise been disposed of, other lands, equivalent thereto, and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to said State for the use of schools.

Second: That seventy-two sections of land shall be set apart and reserved for the use and support of a state university, to be selected by the governor of said State, subject to the approval of the commissioner at the general land office, and to be appropriated and applied in such manner as the legislature of said State may prescribe; for the purpose aforesaid, but for not other purpose. *Third:* Ten entire sections of land to be selected by the governor of said State, in legal subdivisions, shall be granted to said State for the purpose of completing the public buildings, or for the erection of others at the seat of government, under the direction of the legislature thereof.

Fourth: That all salt springs within said State, not exceeding twelve in number, with six sections of land adjoining or as contiguous as may be to each, shall be granted to said State for its use; and the same to be selected by the governor thereof within one year after the admission of said State, and, when so selected, to be used or disposed of on such terms, conditions and regulations as the legislature shall direct; provided, that no salt spring or land the right whereof is now vested in any individual or individuals, or which may be hereafter confirmed or adjudged to any individual or individuals, shall by this article be granted to said State.

Fifth: That five per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands lying within said State, which shall be sold by Congress after the admission of said State into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said State for the purpose of making public roads and internal improvements as the legislature shall direct; provided, the foregoing propositions herein offered are on the condition that the said convention which shall form the constitution of said State shall provide, by a clause in said constitution, or an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to bona fide purchasers thereof; and that no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States, and that in no case shall norresident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

In accordance with the enabling act of February 26, 1857, an election was held on June 1, 1857, at which Republican and Democratic delegates were elected to the constitutional convention. When these delegates assembled in St. Paul on July 13, 1857, to draft the Minnesota constitution, bitterness between the two parties was so intense that Republican delegates and Democratic delegates refused to

meet in the same convention. As a result each party held separate sessions in different rooms of the first capitol building.

The Democratic "convention" was presided over by Henry H. Sibley, later elected first governor of Minnesota. The Republican "convention" was presided over first by John W. North, and later by St. Andrew D. Balcombe.

The political cleavage was so great that the two bodies never acted in joint meeting during the entire constitutional convention: July 13 to Aug. 29. The final work was done through a conference committee composed of five conferees from each of the conventions. The conferees, by reporting to and receiving advice from their respective conventions, were able to draft a constitution that would be acceptable to both bodies. On August 28, 1857, in spite of numerous protests by delegates, the report of the conference committee was adopted without amendment by both the Republican and Democratic conventions.

However, when it came time to sign the constitution, the bitter feeling was still so intense that Democrats would not sign an instrument which bore Republican signatures, and the Republicans objected to signing an instrument which bore the signatures of Democrats. The solution to this impasse is a credit to Minnesota political ingenuity: two constitutions. One constitution was written on white paper and signed only by Republicans. The other constitution was written on blue-tinted paper and signed only by Democrats.

Thus, on the twenty-ninth day of August, after seven weeks of political dispute and disagreement, the "two" conventions adjourned when as many members as could bring themselves to do so signed the copy of the constitution enrolled for their particular convention.

ELECTION TO ACCEPT THE CONSTITUTION

The schedule to the constitution provided for an election to be held on October 13, 1857. At this election the voters were to accept or reject the constitution. The ballots used for this purpose were printed to provide only for affirmative votes. A voter who wished to reject the constitution had to alter his ballot and write in a negative vote. The result: 30,055 for acceptance and 571 for rejection.

APPROVAL BY CONGRESS

The procedure for acquiring statehood not only requires a constitution to be approved by the voters of the proposed state, the constitution must also be approved by Congress. In December of 1857 the Minnesota constitution was submitted to the United States Senate for ratification.

A certified copy of the Democratic constitution was transmitted to the senate by the territorial secretary: a Democrat. This copy was attached to the bill for the admission of Minnesota into the Union. However, when the bill was reported back from the senate, historians report that the Republican constitution was attached. In any event, there is substantial authority that both constitutions were before Congress when Minnesota was admitted to the union on May 11, 1858.

In reality, the constitution ratified by Congress was not the original constitution. At the election of October 13, 1857, in addition to voting on the constitution, the voters elected executive, legislative and judicial officers. The state officers were content to wait for the act of Congress before assuming office. But the legislature took a contrary view. It convened on December 3, 1857, on the theory that under the enabling act the statehood of Minnesota began when the voters approved the constitution. Even though this theory was incorrect, the legislature proceeded to enact laws, the effects of which have remained undisturbed by the courts.

The first two acts passed by the legislature were proposed amendments to the constitution. One amendment authorized a loan to railroads of \$5,000,000 and the other related to the term of office of the first state officers. These amendments were ratified by the voters at a special election held April 15, 1858. It would appear that the constitution which Congress approved on May 11, 1858, was an amended constitution: not the original adopted by the constitutional convention and approved by the voters in 1857.

THE MINNESOTA CONSTITUTION 1974

The legislature in 1971 established a constitutional study commission to review the constitution and

make recommendations to maintain its utility. After two years study, the commission recommended that an amendment restructuring the constitution for easy reference and rewriting it in modern language be prepared.

The amendment was introduced and passed in both houses, signed by the governor, and approved by the voters on November 5, 1974. The previous wording of the constitution is printed, with all the amendments approved by voters since its adoption in 1857, in the Minnesota Legislative Manual 1973-74, pages 445-484. The amendment approved in 1974 did not alter the meaning of the constitution. In cases of constitutional law, the original document remains the final authority.

CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA

[Generally Revised November 5, 1974]

Preamble

We, the people of the state of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I BILL OF RIGHTS

Section 1. **Object of government.** Government is instituted for the security, benefit and protection of the people, in whom all political power is inherent, together with the right to alter, modify or reform government whenever required by the public good.

Sec. 2. **Rights and privileges.** No member of this state shall be disfranchised or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land or the judgment of his peers. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the state otherwise than as punishment for a crime of which the party has been convicted.

Sec. 3. Liberty of the press. The liberty of the press shall forever remain inviolate, and all persons may freely speak, write and publish their sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of such right.

Sec. 4. **Trial by jury.** The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, and shall extend to all cases at law without regard to the amount in controversy. A jury trial may be waived by the parties in all cases in the manner prescribed by law. The legislature may provide that the agreement of five-sixths of a jury in a civil action or proceeding, after not less than six hours' deliberation, is a sufficient verdict. The legislature may provide for the number of jurors in a civil action or proceeding, provided that a jury have at least six members.

Sec. 5. No excessive bail or unusual punishments. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel or unusual punishments inflicted.

Sec. 6. **Rights of accused in criminal prosecutions.** In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the county or district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which county or district shall have been previously ascertained by law. In all prosecutions of crimes defined by law as felonies, the accused has the right to a jury of 12 members. In all other criminal prosecutions, the legislature may provide for the number of jurors, provided that a jury have at least six members. The accused shall enjoy the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor and to have the assistance of counsel in his defense.

Sec. 7. **Due process; prosecutions; double jeopardy; self-incrimination; bail; habeas corpus.** No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense without due process of law, and no person shall be put twice in jeopardy of punishment for the same offense, nor be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. All persons before conviction shall be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless the public safety requires it in case of rebellion or invasion.

Sec. 8. Redress of injuries or wrongs. Every person is entitled to a certain remedy in the laws for all injuries or wrongs which he may receive to his person, property or character, and to obtain justice freely

and without purchase, completely and without denial, promptly and without delay, conformable to the laws.

Sec. 9. **Treason defined.** Treason against the state consists only in levying war against the state, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act or on confession in open court.

Sec. 10. Unreasonable searches and seizures prohibited. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the person or things to be seized.

Sec. 11. Attainders, ex post facto laws and laws impairing contracts prohibited. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or any law impairing the obligation of contracts shall be passed, and no conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Sec. 12. **Imprisonment for debt; property exemption.** No person shall be imprisoned for debt in this state, but this shall not prevent the legislature from providing for imprisonment, or holding to bail, persons charged with fraud in contracting said debt. A reasonable amount of property shall be exempt from seizure or sale for the payment of any debt or liability. The amount of such exemption shall be determined by law. Provided, however, that all property so exempted shall be liable to seizure and sale for any debts incurred to any person for work done or materials furnished in the construction, repair or improvement of the same, and provided further, that such liability to seizure and sale shall also extend to all real property for any debt to any laborer or servant for labor or service performed.

Sec. 13. **Private property for public use.** Private property shall not be taken, destroyed or damaged for public use without just compensation therefor, first paid or secured.

Sec. 14. **Military power subordinate.** The military shall be subordinate to the civil power and no standing army shall be maintained in this state in times of peace.

Sec. 15. Lands allodial; void agricultural leases. All lands within the state are allodial and feudal tenures of every description with all their incidents are prohibited. Leases and grants of agricultural lands for a longer period than 21 years reserving rent or service of any kind shall be void.

Sec. 16. Freedom of conscience; no preference to be given to any religious establishment or mode of worship. The enumeration of rights in this constitution shall not deny or impair others retained by and inherent in the people. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience shall never be infringed; nor shall any man be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any religious or ecclesiastical ministry, against his consent; nor shall any control of or interference with the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the state, nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious societies or religious

or theological seminaries.

Sec. 17. **Religious tests and property qualifications prohibited.** No religious test or amount of property shall be required as a qualification for any office of public trust in the state. No religious test or amount of property shall be required as a qualification of any voter at any election in this state; nor shall any person be rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity in consequence of his opinion upon the subject of religion.

ARTICLE II NAME AND BOUNDARIES

Section 1. Name and boundaries; acceptance of organic act. This state shall be called the state of Minnesota and shall consist of and have jurisdiction over the territory embraced in the act of Congress entitled, "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government, preparatory to their admission into the Union on equal footing with the original states," and the propositions contained in that act are hereby accepted, ratified and confirmed, and remain irrevocable without the consent of the United States.

Sec. 2. Jurisdiction on boundary waters. The state of Minnesota has concurrent jurisdiction on the

Mississippi and on all other rivers and waters forming a common boundary with any other state or states. Navigable waters leading into the same, shall be common highways and forever free to citizens of the United States without any tax, duty, impost or toll therefor.

ARTICLE III DISTRIBUTION OF THE POWERS OF GOVERNMENT

Section 1. **Division of powers.** The powers of government shall be divided into three distinct departments: legislative, executive and judicial. No person or persons belonging to or constituting one of these departments shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others except in the instances expressly provided in this constitution.

ARTICLE IV LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

Section 1. Composition of legislature. The legislature consists of the senate and house of representatives.

Sec. 2. **Apportionment of members.** The number of members who compose the senate and house of representatives shall be prescribed by law. The representation in both houses shall be apportioned equally throughout the different sections of the state in proportion to the population thereof.

Sec. 3. Census enumeration apportionment; congressional and legislative district boundaries; senate districts. At its first session after each enumeration of the inhabitants of this state made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall have the power to prescribe the bounds of congressional and legislative districts. Senators shall be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory. No representative district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. The senate districts shall be numbered in a regular series.

Sec. 4. **Terms of office of senators and representatives; vacancies.** Representatives shall be chosen for a term of two years, except to fill a vacancy. Senators shall be chosen for a term of four years, except to fill a vacancy and except there shall be an entire new election of all the senators at the first election of representatives after each new legislative apportionment provided for in this article. The governor shall elections to fill vacancies in either house of the legislature.

Sec. 5. **Restriction on holding office.** No senator or representative shall hold any other office under the authority of the United States or the state of Minnesota, except that of postmaster or of notary public. If elected or appointed to another office, a legislator may resign from the legislature by tendering his resignation to the governor.

Sec. 6. **Qualification of legislators; judging election returns and eligibility.** Senators and representatives shall be qualified voters of the state, and shall have resided one year in the state and six months immediately preceding the election in the district from which elected. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and eligibility of its own members. The legislature shall prescribe by law the manner for taking evidence in cases of contested seats in either house.

Sec. 7. **Rules of government.** Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, sit upon its own adjournment, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds expel a member; but no member shall be expelled a second time for the same offense.

Sec. 8. **Oath of office.** Each member and officer of the legislature before entering upon his duties shall take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the constitution of this state, and to discharge faithfully the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

Sec. 9. **Compensation.** The compensation of senators and representatives shall be prescribed by law. No increase of compensation shall take effect during the period for which the members of the existing house of representatives may have been elected.

Sec. 10. **Privilege from arrest**. The members of each house in all cases except treason, felony and breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

Sec. 11. Protest and dissent of members. Two or more members of either house may dissent and

protest against any act or resolution which they think injurious to the public or to any individual and have the reason of their dissent entered in the journal.

Sec. 12. **Biennial meetings; length of session; special sessions; length of adjournments.** The legislature shall meet at the seat of government in regular session in each biennium at the times prescribed by law for not exceeding a total of 120 legislative days. The legislature shall not meet in regular session, nor in any adjournment thereof, after the first Monday following the third Saturday in May of any year. After meeting at a time prescribed by law, the legislature may adjourn to another time. "Legislative day" shall be defined by law. A special session of the legislature may be called by the governor on extraordinary occasions.

Neither house during a session of the legislature shall adjourn for more than three days (Sundays excepted) nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be assembled without the consent of the other house.

Sec. 13. **Quorum.** A majority of each house constitutes a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in the manner and under the penalties it may provide.

Sec. 14. **Open sessions.** Each house shall be open to the public during its sessions except in cases which in its opinion require secrecy.

Sec. 15. **Officers; journals.** Each house shall elect its presiding officer and other officers as may be provided by law. Both houses shall keep journals of their proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays, when taken on any question, shall be entered in the journals.

Sec. 16. Elections viva voce. In all elections by the legislature members shall vote viva voce and their votes shall be entered in the journal.

Sec. 17. Laws to embrace only one subject. No law shall embrace more than one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.

Sec. 18. **Revenue bills to originate in house.** All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose and concur with the amendments as on other bills.

Sec. 19. **Reporting of bills.** Every bill shall be reported on three different days in each house, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the house where the bill is pending deem it expedient to dispense with this rule.

Sec. 20. **Enrollment of bills.** Every bill passed by both houses shall be enrolled and signed by the presiding officer of each house. Any presiding officer refusing to sign a bill passed by both houses shall thereafter be disqualified from any office of honor or profit in the state. Each house by rule shall provide the manner in which a bill shall be certified for presentation to the governor in case of such refusal.

Sec. 21. **Passage of bills on last day of session prohibited.** No bill shall be passed by either house upon the day prescribed for adjournment. This section shall not preclude the enrollment of a bill or its transmittal from one house to the other or to the executive for his signature.

Sec. 22. **Majority vote of all members to pass a law.** The style of all laws of this state shall be: "Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Minnesota." No law shall be passed unless voted for by a majority of all the members elected to each house of the legislature, and the vote entered in the journal of each house.

Sec. 23. **Approval of bills by governor; action on veto.** Every bill passed in conformity to the rules of each house and the joint rules of the two houses shall be presented to the governor. If he approves a bill, he shall sign it, deposit it in the office of the secretary of state and notify the house in which it originated of that fact. If he vetoes a bill, he shall return it with his objections to the house in which it originated. His objections shall be entered in the journal. If, after reconsideration, two-thirds of that house agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the governor's objections, to the other house, which shall likewise reconsider it. If approved by two-thirds of that house it becomes a law and shall be deposited in the office of the secretary of state. In such cases the votes of both houses shall be entered in the journal of each house. Any bill not returned by the governor within three days (Sundays

excepted) after it is presented to him becomes a law as if he had signed it, unless the legislature by adjournment within that time prevents its return. Any bill passed during the last three days of a session may be presented to the governor during the three days following the day of final adjournment and becomes law if the governor signs and deposits it in the office of the secretary of state within 14 days after the adjournment of the legislature. Any bill passed during the last three days of the session which is not signed and deposited within 14 days after adjournment does not become a law.

If a bill presented to the governor contains several items of appropriation of money, he may veto one or more of the items while approving the bill. At the time he signs the bill the governor shall append to it a statement of the items he vetoes and the vetoed items shall not take effect. If the legislature is in session, he shall transmit to the house in which the bill originated a copy of the statement, and the items vetoed shall be separately reconsidered. If on reconsideration any item is approved by two-thirds of the members elected to each house, it is a part of the law notwithstanding the objections of the governor.

Sec. 24. **Presentation of orders, resolutions, and votes to governor.** Each order, resolution or vote requiring the concurrence of the two houses except such as relate to the business or adjournment of the legislature

shall be presented to the governor and is subject to his veto as prescribed in case of a bill.

Sec. 25. **Disorderly conduct.** During a session each house may punish by imprisonment for not more than 24 hours any person not a member who is guilty of any disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence.

Sec. 26. **Banking laws; two-thirds votes.** Passage of a general banking law requires the vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

ARTICLE V EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Section 1. Executive officers. The executive department consists of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general, who shall be chosen by the electors of the state. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be chosen jointly by a single vote applying to both offices in a manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. Term of governor and lieutenant governor; qualifications. The term of office for the governor and lieutenant governor is four years and until a successor is chosen and qualified. Each shall have attained the age of 25 years and, shall have been a bona fide resident of the state for one year next preceding his election, and shall be a citizen of the United States.

Sec. 3. **Powers and duties of governor.** The governor shall communicate by message to each session of the legislature information touching the state and country. He is commander-in-chief of the military and naval forces and may call them out to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion. He may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments upon any subject relating to his duties. With the advice and consent of the senate he may appoint notaries public and other officers provided by law. He may appoint commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds or other instruments in writing to be used in the state. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed. He shall fill any vacancy that may occur in the offices of secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general and the other state and district offices hereafter created by law until the end of the term for which the person who had vacated the office was elected or the first Monday in January following the next general election, whichever is sooner, and until a successor is chosen and qualified.

Sec. 4. Terms and salaries of executive officers. The term of office of the secretary of state, treasurer, attorney general and state auditor is four years and until a successor is chosen and qualified. The duties and salaries of the executive officers shall be prescribed by law.

Sec. 5. Succession to offices of governor and lieutenant governor. In case a vacancy occurs from any cause whatever in the office of governor, the lieutenant governor shall be governor during such vacancy. The compensation of the lieutenant governor shall be prescribed by law. The last elected presiding officer of the senate shall become lieutenant governor in case a vacancy occurs in that office. In case the governor. The legislature may provide by law for the case of the removal, death, resignation, or inability both of the governor and lieutenant governor to discharge the duties of governor and may provide by law for continuity of governor and may

enemy attack in this state, including but not limited to, succession to the powers and duties of public office and change of the seat of government.

Sec. 6. **Oath of office of state officers.** Each officer created by this article before entering upon his duties shall take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States and of this state and to discharge faithfully the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

Sec. 7. **Board of pardons.** The governor, the attorney general and the chief justice of the supreme court constitute a board of pardons. Its powers and duties shall be defined and regulated by law. The governor in conjunction with the board of pardons has power to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction for an offense against the state except in cases of impeachment.

ARTICLE VI JUDICIARY

Section 1. **Judicial power**. The judicial power of the state is vested in a supreme court, a court of appeals, if established by the legislature, a district court and such other courts, judicial officers and commissioners with jurisdiction inferior to the district court as the legislature may establish.

Sec. 2. **Supreme court.** The supreme court consists of one chief judge and not less than six nor more than eight associate judges as the legislature may establish. It shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as are prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, but there shall be no trial by jury in the supreme court.

The legislature may establish a court of appeals and provide by law for the number of its judges, who shall not be judges of any other court, and its organization and for the review of its decisions by the supreme court. The court of appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction over all courts, except the supreme court, and other appellate jurisdiction as prescribed by law.

As provided by law judges of the court of appeals or of the district court may be assigned temporarily to act as judges of the supreme court upon its request and judges of the district court may be assigned temporarily by the supreme court to act as judges of the court of appeals.

The supreme court shall appoint to serve at its pleasure a clerk, a reporter, a state law librarian and other necessary employees.

Sec. 3. Jurisdiction of district court. The district court has original jurisdiction in all civil and criminal cases and shall have appellate jurisdiction as prescribed by law.

Sec. 4. **Judicial districts; district judges.** The number and boundaries of judicial districts shall be established in the manner provided by law but the office of a district judge shall not be abolished during his term. There shall be two or more district judges in each district. Each judge of the district court in any district shall be a resident of that district at the time of his selection and during his continuance in office.

Sec. 5. **Qualifications; compensation.** Judges of the supreme court, the court of appeals and the district court shall be learned in the law. The qualifications of all other judges and judicial officers shall be prescribed by law. The compensation of all judges shall be prescribed by the legislature and shall not be diminished during their term of office.

Sec. 6. Holding other office. A judge of the supreme court, the court of appeals or the district court shall not hold any office under the United States except a commission in a reserve component of the military forces of the United States and shall not hold any other office under this state. His term of office shall terminate at the time he files as a candidate for an elective office of the United States or for a nonjudicial office of this state.

Sec. 7. **Term of office; election.** The term of office of all judges shall be six years and until their successors are qualified. They shall be elected by the voters from the area which they are to serve in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 8. **Vacancy.** Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of judge the governor shall appoint in the manner provided by law a qualified person to fill the vacancy until a successor is elected and qualified. The successor shall be elected for a six year term at the next general election occurring more than one year after the appointment.

Sec. 9. **Retirement, removal and discipline.** The legislature may provide by law for retirement of all judges and for the extension of the term of any judge who becomes eligible for retirement within three years after expiration of the term for which he is selected. The legislature may also provide for the retirement, removal or other discipline of any judge who is disabled, incompetent or guilty of conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice.

Sec. 10. **Retired judges.** As provided by law a retired judge may be assigned to hear and decide any cause over which the court to which he is assigned has jurisdiction.

Sec. 11. **Probate jurisdiction.** Original jurisdiction in law and equity for the administration of the estates of deceased persons and all guardianship and incompetency proceedings, including jurisdiction over the administration of trust estates and for the determination of taxes contingent upon death, shall be provided by law.

Sec. 12. Abolition of probate court; status of judges. If the probate court is abolished by law, judges of that court who are learned in the law shall become judges of the court that assumes jurisdiction of matters described in section 11.

Sec. 13. **District court clerks.** There shall be in each county one clerk of the district court whose qualifications, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law. He shall serve at the pleasure of a majority of the judges of the district court in each district.

ARTICLE VII ELECTIVE FRANCHISE

Section 1. Eligibility; place of voting; ineligible persons. Every person 18 years of age or more who has been a citizen of the United States for three months and who has resided in the precinct for 30 days next preceding an election shall be entitled to vote in that precinct. The place of voting by one otherwise qualified who has changed his residence within 30 days preceding the election shall be prescribed by law. The following persons shall not be entitled or permitted to vote at any election in this state: A person not meeting the above requirements; a person who has been convicted of treason or felony, unless restored to civil rights; a person under guardianship, or a person who is insane or not mentally competent.

Sec. 2. **Residence**. For the purpose of voting no person loses residence solely by reason of his absence while employed in the service of the United States; nor while engaged upon the waters of this state or of the United States; nor while a student in any institution of learning; nor while kept at any almshouse or asylum; nor while confined in any public prison. No soldier, seaman or marine in the army or navy of the United States is a resident of this state solely in consequence of being stationed within the state.

Sec. 3. Uniform oath at elections. The legislature shall provide for a uniform oath or affirmation to be administered at elections and no person shall be compelled to take any other or different form of oath to entitle him to vote.

Sec. 4. Civil process suspended on election day. During the day on which an election is held no person shall be arrested by virtue of any civil process.

Sec. 5. Elections by ballot. All elections shall be by ballot except for such town officers as may be directed by law to be otherwise chosen.

Sec. 6. Eligibility to hold office. Every person who by the provisions of this article is entitled to vote at any election and is 21 years of age is eligible for any office elective by the people in the district wherein he has resided 30 days previous to the election, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, or the constitution and law of the United States.

Sec. 7. **Official year of state.** The official year for the state of Minnesota commences on the first Monday in January in each year and all terms of office terminate at that time. The general election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in each even numbered year.

Sec. 8. Election returns to secretary of state; board of canvassers. The returns of every election for officeholders elected statewide shall be made to the secretary of state who shall call to his assistance two or more of the judges of the supreme court and two disinterested judges of the district courts. They shall constitute a board of canvassers to canvass the returns and declare the result within three days after the canvass.

Sec. 9. Campaign spending limits. The amount that may be spent by candidates for constitutional and legislative offices to campaign for nomination or election shall be limited by law. The legislature shall provide by law for disclosure of contributions and expenditures made to support or oppose candidates for state elective offices.

ARTICLE VIII IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVAL FROM OFFICE

Section 1. **Impeachment powers.** The house of representatives has the sole power of impeachment through a concurrence of a majority of all its members. All impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, senators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the senators present.

Sec. 2. Officers subject to impeachment; grounds; judgment. The governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general and the judges of the supreme court, court of appeals and district courts may be impeached for corrupt conduct in office or for crimes and misdemeanors; but judgment shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit in this state. The party convicted shall also be subject to indictment, trial, judgment and purishment according to law.

Sec. 3. Suspension. No officer shall exercise the duties of his office after he has been impeached and before his acquittal.

Sec. 4. Service of impeachment papers. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he has been served with a copy thereof at least 20 days previous to the day set for trial.

Sec. 5. Removal of inferior officers. The legislature of this state may provide for the removal of inferior officers for malfeasance or nonfeasance in the performance of their duties.

Sec. 6. A member of the senate or house of representatives, an executive officer of the state identified in section 1 of article V of the constitution, or a judge of the supreme court, the court of appeals, or a district court is subject to recall from office by the voters. The grounds for recall of a judge shall be established by the supreme court. The grounds for recall of an officer of the duties of the office or conviction during the term of office of a serious crime. A petition for recall must set forth the specific conduct that may warrant recall. A petition may not be issued until the supreme court has determined that the facts alleged in the petition are true and are sufficient grounds for issuing a recall petition. A petition must be signed by a number of eligible voters who reside in the district where the officer serves and who number not less than 25 percent of the number of state that a petition has been signed by a least the minimum number of eligible voters, a recall election must be conducted in the officer of series, a recall election or who resigns from office after a petition for recall sets than six months before the end of the officer stern. An officer who is removed from office by a recall election or who resigns from office after a petition for recall issues may not be appointed to fill the vacancy that is created.

ARTICLE IX AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

Section 1. Amendments; ratification. A majority of the members elected to each house of the legislature may propose amendments to this constitution. Proposed amendments shall be published with the laws passed at the same session and submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a general election. If a majority of all the electors voting at the election vote to ratify an amendment, it becomes a part of this constitution. If two or more amendments are submitted at the same time, voters shall vote for or against each separately.

Sec. 2. **Constitutional convention.** Two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature may submit to the electors at the next general election the question of calling a convention to revise this constitution. If a majority of all the electors voting at the election vote for a convention, the legislature at its next session, shall provide by law for calling the convention. The convention shall consist of as many delegates as there are members of the house of representatives. Delegates shall be chosen in the same manner as members of the house of representatives and shall meet within three months after their election. Section 5 of Article IV of the constitution does not apply to election to the convention.

Sec. 3. **Submission to people of constitution drafted at convention.** A convention called to revise this constitution shall submit any revision to the people for approval or rejection at the next general election held not less than 90 days after submission of the revision. If three-fifths of all the electors voting on the question vote to ratify the revision, it becomes a new constitution of the state of Minnesota.

ARTICLE X TAXATION

Section 1. **Power of taxation; exemptions; legislative powers.** The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects and shall be levied and collected for public purposes, but public burying grounds, public school houses, public hospitals, academies, colleges, universities, all seminaries of learning, all churches, church property, houses of worship, institutions of purely public charity, and public property used exclusively for any public purpose, shall be exempt from taxation except as provided in this section. There may be exempted from taxation personal property not exceeding in value \$200 for each household, individual or head of a family, and household goods and farm machinery as the legislature determines. The legislature may authorize municipal corporations to levy and collect assessments for local improvements upon property benefited thereby without regard to cash valuation. The legislature by law may define or limit the property exempt under this section other than churches, houses of worship, and property solely used for educational purposes by academies, colleges, universities and seminaries of learning.

Sec. 2. Forestation. To encourage and promote forestation and reforestation of lands whether owned by private persons or the public, laws may be enacted fixing in advance a definite and limited annual tax on the lands for a term of years and imposing a yield tax on the timber and other forest products at or after the end of the term.

Sec. 3. Occupation tax; ores. Every person engaged in the business of mining or producing iron ore or other ores in this state shall pay to the state an occupation tax on the valuation of all ores mined or produced, which tax shall be in addition to all other taxes provided by law. The tax is due on the first day of May in the calendar year next following the mining or producing. The valuation of ore for the purpose of determining the amount of tax shall be ascertained as provided by law. Funds derived from the tax shall be used as follows: 50 percent to the state general revenue fund, 40 percent for the support of elementary and secondary schools and ten percent for the general support of the university.

Sec. 4. **Motor fuel taxation.** The state may levy an excise tax upon any means or substance for propelling aircraft or for propelling or operating motor or other vehicles or other equipment used for airport purposes and not used on the public highways of this state.

Sec. 5. Aircraft. The legislature may tax aircraft using the air space overlying the state on a more onerous basis than other personal property. Any such tax on aircraft shall be in lieu of all other taxes. The legislature may impose the tax on aircraft of companies paying taxes under any gross earnings system of taxation notwithstanding that earnings from the aircraft are included in the earnings on which gross earnings taxes are computed. The law may exempt from taxation aircraft owned by a nonresident of the state temporarily using the air space overlying the state.

Sec. 6. **Taconite taxation.** Laws of Minnesota 1963, Chapter 81, relating to the taxation of taconite and semi- taconite, and facilities for the mining, production and beneficiation thereof shall not be repealed, modified or amended, nor shall any laws in conflict therewith be valid until November 4, 1989. Laws may be enacted fixing or limiting for a period not extending beyond the year 1990, the tax to be imposed on persons engaged in (1) the mining, production or beneficiation of copper, (2) the mining, production or beneficiation of nickel. Taxes imposed on the mining or quarrying of taconite or semi-taconite and on the production of iron or econcentrates therefrom, which are in lieu of a tax on real or personal property, shall not be considered to be occupation, royalty, or excise taxes within the meaning of this amendment.

Sec. 7. (Repealed, November 5, 1974).

Sec. 8. **Pari-mutuel betting.** The legislature may authorize on-track pari-mutuel betting on horse racing in a manner prescribed by law.

ARTICLE XI APPROPRIATIONS AND FINANCES

Section 1. Money paid from state treasury. No money shall be paid out of the treasury of this state except in pursuance of an appropriation by law.

Sec. 2. Credit of the state limited. The credit of the state shall not be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association or corporation except as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. Internal improvements prohibited; exceptions. The state shall not be a party in carrying on works of internal improvements except as authorized by this constitution. If grants have been made to the state especially dedicated to specific purposes, the state shall devote the proceeds of the grants to those purposes and may pledge or appropriate the revenues derived from the works in aid of their completion.

Sec. 4. **Power to contract public debt; public debt defined.** The state may contract public debts for which its full faith, credit and taxing powers may be pledged at the times and in the manner authorized by law, but only for the purposes and subject to the conditions stated in section 5. Public debt includes any obligation payable directly in whole or in part from a tax of state wide application on any class of property, income, transaction or privilege, but does not include any obligation which is payable from revenues other than taxes.

Sec. 5. Public debt and works of internal improvement; purposes. Public debt may be contracted and works of internal improvements carried on for the following purposes:

(a) to acquire and to better public land and buildings and other public improvements of a capital nature and to provide money to be appropriated or loaned to any agency or political subdivision of the state for such purposes if the law authorizing the debt is adopted by the vote of at least three-fifths of the members of each house of the legislature;

(b) to repel invasion or suppress insurrection;

(c) to borrow temporarily as authorized in section 6;

(d) to refund outstanding bonds of the state or any of its agencies whether or not the full faith and credit of the state has been pledged for the payment of the bonds;

(e) to establish and maintain highways subject to the limitations of article XIV;

(f) to promote forestation and prevent and abate forest fires, including the compulsory clearing and improving of wild lands whether public or private;

(g) to construct, improve and operate airports and other air navigation facilities;

(h) to develop the state's agricultural resources by extending credit on real estate security in the manner and on the terms and conditions prescribed by law;

(i) to improve and rehabilitate railroad rights-of-way and other rail facilities whether public or private, provided that bonds issued and unpaid shall not at any time exceed \$200,000,000 par value; and

(j) as otherwise authorized in this constitution.

As authorized by law political subdivisions may engage in the works permitted by (f), (g), and (i) and contract debt therefor.

Sec. 6. Certificates of indebtedness. As authorized by law certificates of indebtedness may be issued during a biennium, commencing on July 1 in each odd-numbered year and ending on and including June 30 in the next odd- numbered year, in anticipation of the collection of taxes levied for and other revenues appropriated to any fund of the state for expenditure during that biennium.

No certificates shall be issued in an amount which with interest thereon to maturity, added to the then outstanding certificates against a fund and interest thereon to maturity, will exceed the then unexpended balance of all money which will be credited to that fund during the biennium under existing laws. The maturities of certificates may be extended by refunding to a date not later than December 1 of the first

full calendar year following the biennium in which the certificates were issued. If money on hand in any fund is not sufficient to pay all non-refunding certificates of indebtedness issued on a fund during any biennium and all certificates refunding the same, plus interest thereon, which are outstanding on December 1 immediately following the close of the biennium, the state auditor shall levy upon all taxable property in the state a tax collectible in the ensuing year sufficient to pay the same on or before December 1 of the ensuing year with interest to the date or dates of payment.

Sec. 7. **Bonds.** Public debt other than certificates of indebtedness authorized in section 6 shall be evidenced by the issuance of bonds of the state. All bonds issued under the provisions of this section shall mature not more than 20 years from their respective dates of issue and each law authorizing the issuance of bonds shall distinctly specify the purposes thereof and the maximum amount of the proceeds authorized to be expended for each purpose. The state treasurer shall maintain a separate and special state bond fund on his official books and records. When the full faith and credit of the state has been pledged for the payment of bonds, the state auditor shall levy each year on all taxable property within the state a tax sufficient with the balance then on hand in the fund to pay all principal and interest on bonds issued under this section due and to become due within the ensuing year and to and including July 1 in the second ensuing year. The legislature by law may appropriate funds from any source to the state bond fund. The amount of money actually received and on hand pursuant to appropriations prior to the levy of the tax in any year shall be used to reduce the amount of tax otherwise required to be levied.

Sec. 8. **Permanent school fund; source; investment; board of investment.** The permanent school fund of the state consists of (a) the proceeds of lands granted by the United States for the use of schools within each township, (b) the proceeds derived from swamp lands granted to the state, (c) all cash and investments credited to the permanent school fund and to the swamp land fund, and (d) all cash and investments credited to the internal improvement land fund and the lands therein. No portion of these lands shall be sold otherwise than at public sale, and in the manner provided by law. All funds arising from the sale or other disposition of the lands, or income accruing in any way before the sale or disposition thereof, shall be credited to the permanent school fund.

Within limitations prescribed by law, the fund shall be invested to secure the maximum return consistent with the maintenance of the perpetuity of the fund. The principal of the permanent school fund shall be perpetual and inviolate forever. This does not prevent the sale of investments at less than the cost to the fund; however, all losses not offset by gains shall be repaid to the fund from the interest and dividends earned thereafter. The net interest and dividends arising from the fund shall be distributed to the different school districts of the state in a manner prescribed by law.

A board of investment consisting of the governor, the state auditor, the state treasurer, the secretary of state, and the attorney general is hereby constituted for the purpose of administering and directing the investment of all state funds. The board shall not permit state funds to be used for the underwriting or direct purchase of municipal securities from the issuer or the issuer's agent.

Sec. 9. **Investment of permanent university fund; restrictions.** The permanent university fund of this state may be loaned to or invested in the bonds of any county, school district, city or town of this state and in first mortgage loans secured upon improved and cultivated farm lands of this state, but no such investment or loan shall be made until approved by the board of investment; nor shall a loan or investment be made when the bonds to be issued or purchased would make the entire bonded indebtedness exceed 15 percent of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the county, school district, city or town issuing the bonds; nor shall any farm loan or investment be made when the investment or loan would exceed 30 percent of the actual cash value of the farm land mortgaged to secure the investment; nor shall investments or loans be made at a lower rate of interest than two percent per annum nor for a shorter period than one year nor for a longer period than 30 years.

Sec. 10. Exchange of public lands; reservation of rights. As the legislature may provide, any of the public lands of the state, including lands held in trust for any purpose, may be exchanged for any publicly or privately held lands with the unanimous approval of the governor, the attorney general and the state auditor. Lands so acquired shall be subject to the trust, if any, to which the lands exchanged therefor were subject. The state shall reserve all mineral and water power rights in lands transferred by the state.

Sec. 11. **Timberlands set apart as state forests; disposition of revenue.** School and other public lands of the state better adapted for the production of timber than for agriculture may be set apart as state school forests, or other state forests as the legislature may provide. The legislature may also provide for their management on forestry principles. The net revenue therefrom shall be used for the

purposes for which the lands were granted to the state.

Sec. 12. **County, township or municipal aid to railroads limited.** The legislature shall not authorize any county, township or municipal corporation to become indebted to aid in the construction or equipment of railroads to any amount that exceeds five percent of the value of the taxable property within that county, township or municipal corporation. The amount of taxable property shall be determined by the last assessment previous to the incurring of the indebtedness.

Sec. 13. **Safe keeping state funds; security; deposit of funds; embezzlement.** All officers and other persons charged with the safekeeping of state funds shall be required to give ample security for funds received by them and to keep an accurate entry of each sum received and of each payment and transfer. If any person converts to his own use in any manner or form, or shall loan, with or without interest, or shall deposit in his own name, or otherwise than in the name of the state of Minnesota; or shall deposit in banks or with any person or persons or exchange for other funds or property, any portion of the funds of the state or the school funds aforesaid, except in the manner prescribed by law, every such act shall be and constitute an embezzlement of so much of the aforesaid state and school funds, or either of the same, as shall thus be taken, or loaned, or deposited or exchanged, and shall be a felony. Any failure to pay over, produce or account for the state school funds, or any part of the same entrusted to such officer or persons as by law required on demand, shall be held and be taken to be prima facie evidence of such embezzlement.

Sec. 14. A permanent Minnesota environment and natural resources trust fund is established in the state treasury. The principal of the environment and natural resources trust fund must be perpetual and inviolate forever, except appropriations may be made from up to 25 percent of the annual revenue deposited in the fund until fiscal year 1997 and loans may be made of up to five percent of the principal of the fund for water system improvements as provided by law. This restriction does not prevent the sale of investments at less than the cost of the fund, however, all losses not offset by gains shall be repaid to the fund from the earnings of the fund. The net earnings from the fund shall be appropriated in a manner prescribed by law for the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's air, water, land, fish, wildlife, and other natural resources. Not less than 40 percent of the net proceeds from any state-operated lottery must be credited to the fund until the year 2001.

ARTICLE XII SPECIAL LEGISLATION; LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Section 1. **Prohibition of special legislation; particular subjects.** In all cases when a general law can be made applicable, a special law shall not be enacted except as provided in section 2. Whether a general law could have been made applicable in any case shall be judicially determined without regard to any legislative assertion on that subject. The legislature shall pass no local or special law authorizing the laying out, opening, altering, vacating or maintaining of roads, highways, streets or alleys; remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures; changing the names of persons, places, lakes or rivers; authorizing the adoption or legitimation of children; changing the law of descent or succession; conferring rights on minors; declaring any named person of age; giving effect to informal or invalid wills or deeds, or affecting the estates of minors or persons under disability; granting divorces; exempting property from taxation or regulating the charters thereof; granting to any private corporations, association, or individual any special or exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever or authorizing public taxation for a private purpose. The inhibitions of local or special laws in this section shall not prevent the passage of general laws on any of the subjects enumerated.

Sec. 2. **Special laws; local government.** Every law which upon its effective date applies to a single local government unit or to a group of such units in a single county or a number of contiguous counties is a special law and shall name the unit or, in the latter case, the counties to which it applies. The legislature may enact special laws relating to local government units, but a special law, unless otherwise provided by general law, shall become effective only after its approval by the affected unit expressed through the voters or the governing body and by such majority as the legislature may direct. Any special law may be modified or superseded by a later home rule charter or amendment applicable to the same local government unit, but this does not prevent the adoption of subsequent laws on the same subject. The legislature may repeal any existing special or local law, but shall not amend, extend or modify any of the same except as provided in this section.

Sec. 3. Local government; legislation affecting. The legislature may provide by law for the creation, organization, administration, consolidation, division and dissolution of local government units and their

functions, for the change of boundaries thereof, for their elective and appointive officers including qualifications for office and for the transfer of county seats. A county boundary may not be changed or county seat transferred until approved in each county affected by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Sec. 4. **Home rule charter.** Any local government unit when authorized by law may adopt a home rule charter for its government. A charter shall become effective if approved by such majority of the voters of the local government unit as the legislature prescribes by general law. If a charter provides for the consolidation or separation of a city and a county, in whole or in part, it shall not be effective without approval of the voters both in the city and in the remainder of the county by the majority required by law.

Sec. 5. **Charter commissions.** The legislature shall provide by law for charter commissions. Notwithstanding any other constitutional limitations the legislature may require that commission members be freeholders, provide for their appointment by judges of the district court, and permit any member to hold any other elective or appointive office other than judicial. Home rule charter amendments may be proposed by a charter commission or by a petition of five percent of the voters of the local government unit as determined by law and shall not become effective until approved by the voters by the majority required by law. Amendments may be proposed and adopted in any other manner provided by law. A local government unit may repeal its home rule charter and adopt a statutory form of government or a new charter upon the same majority vote as is required by law for the adoption of a charter in the first instance.

ARTICLE XIII MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS

Section 1. Uniform system of public schools. The stability of a republican form of government depending mainly upon the intelligence of the people, it is the duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools. The legislature shall make such provisions by taxation or otherwise as will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools throughout the state.

Sec. 2. **Prohibition as to aiding sectarian school.** In no case shall any public money or property be appropriated or used for the support of schools wherein the distinctive doctrines, creeds or tenets of any particular Christian or other religious sect are promulgated or taught.

Sec. 3. University of Minnesota. All the rights, immunities, franchises and endowments heretofore granted or conferred upon the university of Minnesota are perpetuated unto the university.

Sec. 4. Lands taken for public way or use; compensation; common carriers. Land may be taken for public way and for the purpose of granting to any corporation the franchise of way for public use. In all cases, however, a fair and equitable compensation shall be paid for land and for the damages arising from taking it. All corporations which are common carriers enjoying the right of way in pursuance of the provisions of this section shall be bound to carry the mineral, agricultural and other productions of manufacturers on equal and reasonable terms.

Sec. 5. **Prohibition of lotteries.** The legislature shall not authorize any lottery or the sale of lottery tickets, other than authorizing a lottery and sale of lottery tickets for a lottery operated by the state.

Sec. 6. **Prohibition of combinations to affect markets.** Any combination of persons either as individuals or as members or officers of any corporation to monopolize markets for food products in this state or to interfere with, or restrict the freedom of markets is a criminal conspiracy and shall be punished as the legislature may provide.

Sec. 7. No license required to peddle. Any person may sell or peddle the products of the farm or garden occupied and cultivated by him without obtaining a license therefor.

Sec. 8. Veterans bonus. The state may pay an adjusted compensation to persons who served in the armed forces of the United States during the period of the Vietnam conflict or the Persian Gulf War. Whenever authorized and in the amounts and on the terms fixed by law, the state may expend monies and pledge the public credit to provide money for the purposes of this section. The duration of the Vietnam conflict and the Persian Gulf War may be defined by law.

Sec. 9. Militia organization. The legislature shall pass laws necessary for the organization, discipline and service of the militia of the state.

Sec. 10. Seat of government. The seat of government of the state is in the city of St. Paul. The legislature may provide by law for a change of the seat of government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by Congress for a seat of government. If the seat of government is changed, the capitol building and grounds shall be dedicated to an institution for the promotion of science, literature and the arts to be organized by the legislature of the state. The Minnesota Historical Society shall always be a department of this institution.

Sec. 11. **State seal.** A seal of the state shall be kept by the secretary of state and be used by him officially. It shall be called the great seal of the state of Minnesota.

ARTICLE XIV PUBLIC HIGHWAY SYSTEM

Section 1. Authority of state; participation of political subdivisions. The state may construct, improve and maintain public highways, may assist political subdivisions in this work and by law may authorize any political subdivision to aid in highway work within its boundaries.

Sec. 2. **Trunk highway system.** There is hereby created a trunk highway system which shall be constructed, improved and maintained as public highways by the state. The highways shall extend as nearly as possible along the routes number 1 through 70 described in the constitutional amendment adopted November 2, 1920, and the routes described in any act of the legislature which has made or hereafter makes a route a part of the trunk highway system.

The legislature may add by law new routes to the trunk highway system. The trunk highway system may not exceed 12,200 miles in extent, except the legislature may add trunk highways in excess of the mileage limitation as necessary or expedient to take advantage of any federal aid made available by the United States to the state of Minnesota.

Any route added by the legislature to the trunk highway system may be relocated or removed from the system as provided by law. The definite location of trunk highways numbered 1 through 70 may be relocated as provided by law but no relocation shall cause a deviation from the starting points or terminals nor cause any deviation from the various villages and cities through which the routes are to pass under the constitutional amendment adopted November 2, 1920. The location of routes may be determined by boards, officers or tribunals in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 3. **County state-aid highway system.** A county state-aid highway system shall be constructed, improved and maintained by the counties as public highways in the manner provided by law. The system shall include streets in municipalities of less than 5,000 population where necessary to provide an integrated and coordinated highway system and may include similar streets in larger municipalities.

Sec. 4. **Municipal state-aid street system.** A municipal state-aid street system shall be constructed, improved and maintained as public highways by municipalities having a population of 5,000 or more in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. **Highway user tax distribution fund.** There is hereby created a highway user tax distribution fund to be used solely for highway purposes as specified in this article. The fund consists of the proceeds of any taxes authorized by sections 9 and 10 of this article. The net proceeds of the taxes shall be apportioned: 62 percent to the trunk highway fund; 29 percent to the county state-aid highway fund; nine percent to the municipal state-aid street fund. Five percent of the net proceeds of the highway user tax distribution fund may be set aside and apportioned by law to one or more of the three foregoing funds. The balance of the highway fund; and the municipal state-aid street fund in accordance with the percentages set forth in this section. No change in the apportionment of the five percent may be made within six years of the last previous change.

Sec. 6. **Trunk highway fund.** There is hereby created a trunk highway fund which shall be used solely for the purposes specified in section 2 of this article and the payment of principal and interest of any bonds issued under the authority of section 11 of this article and any bonds issued for trunk highway purposes prior to July 1, 1957. All payments of principal and interest on bonds issued shall be a first charge on money coming into this fund during the year in which the principal or interest is payable.

Sec. 7. County state-aid highway fund. There is hereby created a county state-aid highway fund. The county state-aid highway fund shall be apportioned among the counties as provided by law. The funds apportioned shall be used by the counties as provided by law for aid in the construction, improvement

and maintenance of county state-aid highways. The legislature may authorize the counties by law to use a part of the funds apportioned to them to aid in the construction, improvement and maintenance of other county highways, township roads, municipal streets and any other public highways, including but not limited to trunk highways and municipal state-aid streets within the respective counties.

Sec. 8. **Municipal state-aid street fund.** There is hereby created a municipal state-aid street fund to be apportioned as provided by law among municipalities having a population of 5,000 or more. The fund shall be used by municipalities as provided by law for the construction, improvement and maintenance of municipal state- aid streets. The legislature may authorize municipalities to use a part of the fund in the construction, improvement and maintenance of other municipal streets, trunk highways, and county state-aid highways within the counties in which the municipality is located.

Sec. 9. **Taxation of motor vehicles.** The legislature by law may tax motor vehicles using the public streets and highways on a more onerous basis than other personal property. Any such tax on motor vehicles shall be in lieu of all other taxes thereon, except wheelage taxes imposed by political subdivisions solely for highway purposes. The legislature may impose this tax on motor vehicles of companies paying taxes under the gross earnings system of taxation notwithstanding that earnings from the vehicles may be included in the earnings on which gross earnings taxes are computed. The proceeds of the tax shall be paid into the highway user tax distribution fund. The law may exempt from taxation any motor vehicle owned by a nonresident of the state properly licensed in another state and transiently or temporarily using the streets and highways of the state.

Sec. 10. **Taxation of motor fuel.** The legislature may levy an excise tax on any means or substance used for propelling vehicles on the public highways of this state or on the business of selling it. The proceeds of the tax shall be paid into the highway user tax distribution fund.

Sec. 11. **Highway bonds.** The legislature may provide by law for the sale of bonds to carry out the provisions of section 2. The proceeds shall be paid into the trunk highway fund. Any bonds shall mature serially over a term not exceeding 20 years and shall not be sold for less than par and accrued interest. If the trunk highway fund is not adequate to pay principal and interest of these bonds when due, the legislature may levy on all taxable property of the state in an amount sufficient to meet the deficiency or it may appropriate to the fund money in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated.

CONGRESSIONAL ACT OF ADMISSION

Acceptance by Congress is the final act in the process of being admitted as a state. A bill for the admission of Minnesota into the Union was submitted to Congress in December of 1857.

The bill for admission encountered several obstacles. The Minnesota bill was coupled with the bill for the admission of Kansas. It was customary to admit states in pairs to preserve the balance of power in Congress: a state which permitted slavery would be linked with a state which prohibited slavery. Minnesota was to be a free state, Kansas a slave state. The proposal to admit Kansas was made under its fraudulent Lecompton constitution. The fraud in the adoption of the Kansas constitution was so glaring that admission under it was abandoned, delaying the Minnesota bill for several months. Minnesota's bill also met with general opposition from congressmen from southern slave states.

On May 11, 1858, the bill for the admission of Minnesota was passed by Congress and approved by President James Buchanan. However, word of its passage did not reach St. Paul until almost two weeks later. Minnesota had no telegraph lines or railroads, so a telegram was sent to Prairie du Chien,

Wisconsin, and carried up the Mississippi River to St. Paul by steamboat. On May 24, 1858, the state officers took their oaths of office and Minnesota's state government began to function.

This ended the long trek toward statehood, which had seen the area of the state of Minnesota under four nations: France, Spain, Great Britain and the United States, and under nine territories: Northwest, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Louisiana, Missouri, Iowa and Minnesota.

ACT OF ADMISSION INTO THE UNION

AN ACT FOR THE ADMISSION OF MINNESOTA INTO THE UNION. [Passed May 11, 1858.]

Whereas, An act of Congress was passed February twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to authorize the people of the Territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states"; and, whereas, the people of said Territory did, on the twenty-ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by delegates elected for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and state government, which is republican in form, and was ratified and adopted by the people at an election held on the thirteenth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, for that purpose; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the State of Minnesota shall be one, and is hereby declared to be one, of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states in all respects whatever.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That said State shall be entitled to two representatives in Congress, until the next apportionment of representatives among the several states.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That from and after the admission of the State of Minnesota, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within that State as in other States of the Union; and the said State is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Iowa, shall be established; the judge, attorney and marshal of the United States of the said district of Minnesota shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney and marshal of the district of Iowa; and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the supreme court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be district of Minnesota, or to the supreme court of the State of Minnesota, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require; and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Minnesota Territory, as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same, and to award mesne or final process therein.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Preamble. We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I

Section 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives.

Sec. 2. The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states, and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the

whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every 30,000, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose 3; Massachusetts, 8; Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, 1; Connecticut, 5; New York, 6; New Jersey, 4; Pennsylvania, 8; Delaware, 1; Maryland, 6; Virginia, 10; North Carolina, 5; South Carolina, 5; Georgia, 3.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

Sec. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

The vice president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their own officers, and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law.

Sec. 4. The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meetings shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall, by law, appoint a different day.

Sec. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same; excepting

such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

Sec. 6. The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States which shall have been created or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

Sec. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return; in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

Sec. 8. The Congress shall have power:

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform through the United States;

To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish a uniform rule of naturalization and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish post offices and post roads;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times, to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses, against the laws of

nations;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

To provide and maintain a navy;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States; and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards, and other needful buildings; and

To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

Sec. 9. The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight; but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or ex post facto law, shall be passed.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

No preference shall be given, by any regulation of commerce or revenue, to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States, and no person holding any office of profit and trust under them shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

Sec. 10. No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts laid by any state on imports or exports shall be for the use of the treasury of the United

States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the Congress.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice president, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the Congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates; and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be appointed, if such a number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states. and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice president.

The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president; and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Sec. 2. The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided twothirds of the senators present concur, and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The president shall have power to fill all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

Sec. 3. He shall, from time to time, give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

Sec. 4. The president, vice president, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

Sec. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state or the citizens thereof add foreign states, citizens or subjects.

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Congress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury, and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

Sec. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attained.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

Sec. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labor in one state under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

Sec. 3. New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States, and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

Sec. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in the Union a republican form of government; and shall protect each of them against invasion, and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which in either case shall be valid, to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; provided, that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution, but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

AMENDMENTS

In addition to, and amendment of, the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress and ratified by the Legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original Constitution.

AMENDMENT I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

AMENDMENT III

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

AMENDMENT IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war and public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI

In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

AMENDMENT VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court in the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

AMENDMENT VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

AMENDMENT IX

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

AMENDMENT X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states, respectively, or to the people.

AMENDMENT XI

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

AMENDMENT XII

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice president, one

of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballot the person voted for as vice president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president and of all persons voted for as vice president, and of the number of votes for each; which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit, sealed, to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president; if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president the vote shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states; and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of votes as vice president shall be the vice president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then, from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

AMENDMENT XIII

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Sec. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIV

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice president of the United States, representatives in Congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

Sec. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in Congress or elector of president and vice president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each house remove such disability.

Sec. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Sec. 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

AMENDMENT XV

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any state, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XVI

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

AMENDMENT XVII

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

AMENDMENT XVIII

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Sec. 2. The Congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIX

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex.

Sec. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XX

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Sec. 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Sec. 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the

House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Sec. 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

AMENDMENT XXI

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

AMENDMENT XXII

Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President, during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President, or acting as President, during as President, during the remainder of such term.

AMENDMENT XXIII

Section 1. The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the states, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XXIV

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice President, for electors for President or Vice President, or for Senator or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State by reason of failure to pay any poll tax or other tax.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XXV

Section 1. In case of the removal of the President from office or of his death or resignation, the Vice President shall become President.

Sec. 2. Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of the Vice President, the President shall nominate a Vice President who shall take office upon confirmation by a majority vote of both Houses of Congress.

Sec. 3. Whenever the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that he is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, and until he transmits to them a written declaration to the contrary, such powers and duties shall be discharged by the Vice President as acting President.

Sec. 4. Whenever the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive departments or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit to the President pro

tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall immediately assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting President.

Thereafter, when the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that no inability exists, he shall resume the powers and duties of his office unless the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive department or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit within four days to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office. Thereupon Congress shall decide the issue, assembling within forty-eight hours for that purpose if not in session. If the Congress, within twenty-one days after receipt of the latter written declaration, or, if Congress is not in session, within twenty-one days after Congress is required to assemble, determines by two-thirds vote of both Houses that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall continue to discharge the same as Acting President; otherwise, the President shall resume the powers and duties of his office.

AMENDMENT XXVI

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XXVII

No law, varying the compensation for the services of the Senators and Representatives, shall take effect, until an election of Representatives shall have intervened.

NOTE: The Constitution was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, by the unanimous consent of the states present in the convention appointed in pursuance of the resolution of the Congress of the confederation, of the twenty-first of February, 1787, and was ratified by the conventions of the several states, as follows, viz.: By convention of Delaware, Dec. 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, Dec. 12, 1787; New Jersey, Dec. 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2, 1788; Connecticut, Jan. 9, 1788; Massachusetts, Feb. 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788; New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789; Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.


The first ten of the amendments were proposed at the first session of the First Congress of the United States, Sept. 25, 1789; and were finally ratified by the constitutional number of states Dec. 15, 1791. The eleventh amendment was proposed at the first session of the Third Congress, March 5, 1794, and was declared in a message from the president of the United States to both houses of Congress, dated Jan. 8, 1798, to have been adopted by the constitutional number of states. The twelfth amendment was proposed at the first session of the Eighth Congress, Dec. 12, 1803, and was adopted by the constitutional number of states in 1804, according to a public notice thereof by the secretary of state, dated Sept. 25, 1804.

The thirteenth amendment took effect December 18, 1865. The fourteenth amendment took effect July 28, 1868. The fifteenth amendment took effect March 30, 1870. The sixteenth amendment took effect February 25, 1913. The seventeenth amendment took effect May 31, 1913. The sighteenth amendment took effect August 27, 1920. The nineteenth amendment took effect August 27, 1920. The twentieth amendment took effect February 6, 1933. The twenty-first amendment took effect December 5, 1933. The twenty-third amendment took effect April 3, 1961. The twenty-firlth amendment took effect February 4, 1964. The twenty-firlth amendment took effect February 23, 1967. The twenty-sixth amendment took effect Fully 5, 1971. The twenty-sixth amendment took effect May 18, 1992.

CHAPTER TWO

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

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Representative Henry Kalis, traditionally the first candidate to file for office, spent the night outside the door of the Secretary of State's office in anticipation of the opening of the filing period for the 1996 state general election.

MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE

Senate Information, 231 State Capitol, St. Paul 55155, (612)296-0504. House Information, 175 State Office Building, St. Paul 55155, (612)296-2146.

Constitution provides: To be elected a state senator or representative, a person must be a qualified voter, twenty-one years old, a resident of Minnesota for one year, and a resident of the legislative district for six months immediately preceding the election (Article IV).

Term: senator - four years; representative - two years. Exception: Senators are elected for a two-year term to begin a new decade when redistricting occurs and population boundaries change.

Compensation: \$29,657 annually; round trips between home and state capital; per diem allowance for living expenses during session.

Membership and apportionment: The state of Minnesota is divided into sixty-seven senate districts, each of which is divided into two of the one hundred and thirty-four house districts. Each senate district is entitled to elect one senator and each house district is entitled to elect one representative.

The Minnesota Legislature enacted a legislative redistricting plan on May 29, 1991, coded as *Minnesota Statutes, sections 2.043* to 2.703. The plan was corrected by order of the Minnesota Special Redistricting Panel on December 9, 1991, *Cotlow v. Growe*, No. C8-91-985. The state panel's plan was temporarily superseded by a plan drawn by the United States district court for the district of Minnesota on February 19, 1992, *Emison v. Growe*, 782 F. Supp 427, but the federal court's order was stayed by the United States Supreme Court on March 11, 1992, *Growe v. Emison*, No. 91-1420, and reversed on February 23, 1993, leaving the state panel's plan in place for the 1992 and subsequent elections. The largest Senate district had a population of 66,336, the smallest a population of 64,103, for an overall range of 3.42 percent. The largest House district had a population of 33,427, the smallest a population of 31,502, for an overall range of 5.90 percent.

Organization: Members of the Minnesota Legislature are nominated and elected with party designation. At the November 5, 1996 general election, Minnesota voters elected legislators affiliated with the state's two major political parties: Democratic-Farmer-Labor (DFL) and Republican (R); and one Independent (IND). The DFL caucus organized both houses of the legislature during the 1997 session, Presiding officers: Senate members elect the president of the senate from among their members. The president presides over the senate and shares with the speaker the chairmanship of the Legislative Coordinating Commission. The speaker of the house is both a voting member of the house and the presiding officer. The speaker also presides over joint sessions of the house and senate.

Senator Allan H. Spear is president of the senate. Representative Phil Carruthers is speaker of the house. Each house elects top staff members. The secretary of the senate, Patrick E. Flahaven, and the chief clerk of the house, Edward A. Burdick, are the highest ranking staff officers in each body.

Committees: In 1997, the speaker created a committee on committees to advise him. The speaker appoints committee chairs and members for each committee. Lead minority representatives are appointed to serve on specific committees with chairs and vice-chairs. The speaker works closely with the house majority and becomes a leading spokesman for caucus policies.

In the senate, the chair of the committee on rules and administration, normally the leader of the majority group, has similar power. A senate committee names the committee members and chairs.

The committee system is a vital component of the legislative machinery. The volume of legislation pending before a single session is too great to permit all legislators to work closely with all proposals. Committees hear testimony from proponents and opponents of legislation before they make recommendations to the full legislature. A committee may decide the fate of any legislative proposal. After study, hearing, research, and deliberation, a committee may amend, recommend passage, re-refer to another committee, or table a bill.

The number of committees in each house and the number of members serving on each committee varies from session to session as state concerns and problems dictate. In addition to the standing committees which operate during each session, some committees continue to study specific problems during the legislative interim to report findings to the next legislative session.

Convening the legislature: On the first day of a regular session both houses of the legislature convene at noon. The lieutenant governor, having already taken the oath of office, calls the senate to order and presides until a president has been elected and has taken the oath of office. The house is called to order by the secretary of state who presides over that body as its convening authority until a speaker is elected and has taken the oath of office is administered to all members of each house.

Special sessions: The legislature may be called into special session at any time by the governor. Special sessions become necessary when legislative action is needed to meet emergencies or when legislative work is unfinished at the end of a regular session. The governor is the only official empowered to call a special session. The governor does not have the power to limit the length or scope of the session.

Functions and powers: The principal legal task of the legislature is to make law by which public policy is established. Legislative activity affects a wide range of state programs and resources including agriculture, conservation, crime prevention, consumer protection, contracts, education, economic development, elections, environment, finance, forestry, health, highways, human rights, insurance, labor relations, natural resources, property, pollution control, recreation, safety, taxation, transportation, utilities, unemployment compensation, veterans' affairs, and worker's compensation.

Additional legislative functions include proposing amendments to the state constitution for approval by the electorate, electing regents of the University of Minnesota, confirming certain gubernatorial appointments (senate) and performing legislative oversight or review.

The legislature possesses a judicial function. It judges the election and qualifications of its members, may punish or expel members for contempt or disorderly behavior, and may impeach or remove from office members of the executive and judicial branches.

Each legislative body has a rules committee which directs the operating procedures of the legislature. The rules the two houses adopt, their joint rules, Minnesota Statutes, and the state constitution provide the guidelines under which the legislature conducts legislative business.

Regular sessions: The Minnesota Legislature convenes in regular session each odd-numbered year on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January. The 1972 flexible session amendment to Article IV of the constitution authorized the legislature to meet in regular session in both years of the biennium, for a total of 120 legislative days, providing that the legislature cannot meet after the first Monday following the third Saturday in May of any year.

The temporary adjournment between the session of the first year and the second year of the biennium is not a final adjournment, as the biennial session is considered to be one continuous session. For this reason the journal pages of both houses are numbered consecutively through both years and bills are numbered consecutively in order of introduction through both years.

Three test cases were brought in district court for declaratory judgments to determine whether three bills passed on the last day of session in 1973 were valid enactments of law by the legislature. The district court ruled and the supreme court affirmed that the 1973 session and the 1974 session were technically one session separated by a temporary adjournment.

Bills which have not become law or been defeated by legislative action or vetoed by the end of the first half of the session are still available for possible action in the second half of the session. This means standing committees may hear such bills in the interim recess and make recommendations on their passage.

Passage of laws: All revenue (tax measures) must originate in the house. All other matters may originate in either the house or the senate. There is no stated time schedule; speed is often related directly to the legislative support a proposal gathers.

Committee meetings are open to the public, and anyone wishing to speak for or against proposals being considered is given a chance to be heard. The house and senate index offices in the capitol keep a file of bills by number, and anyone may visit these offices to request information and obtain a copy of a bill.





ENACTMENT OF LEGISLATION

A bill for an act is an idea for a new law or an idea to change or abolish an existing law. Ideas follow ten steps on their way to becoming Minnesota laws:

1. **The idea:** Anyone can propose an idea for a bill-an individual, a consumer group, corporation, professional association, a governmental unit, the governor-but most frequently ideas,come from members of the legislature.

2. **The chief author:** Each bill must have a legislator to introduce it. The chief author's name appears on the bill with the bill's file number as identification while it moves through the legislative process.

3. **Other authors:** The chief author of a bill, under legislative rules, may select other authors, but no more than a total of five in the house and five in the senate. These authors' names also appear on the bill.

4. **The revisor of statutes:** The revisor puts the idea into the proper legal form as a bill for introduction into the house of representatives or the senate, usually both. The revisor also updates Minnesota Statutes after the legislative session to include all new laws.

5. **Introduction:** When introduced in the house, a bill receives a house file number (H.F. 2312, for example); in the senate, a senate file number (S.F. 503, for example). These numbers indicate the bill's chronological order of introduction in each body.

6. **Committee consideration:** Next the bill has its first reading (the Minnesota constitution requires three readings for all bills on three separate days), and the presiding officer of the house or senate refers it to an appropriate standing committee.

All committee meetings are open to the public. A committee may:

- * recommend passage of a bill in its original form.
- * recommand passage after amendment by the committee.
- * make no recommendation, in which case a bill may die when the session ends.
- * refer a bill to another committee (one requiring funds to the finance committee, for example).

After acting on a bill, the committee sends a report to the house or senate, stating its actions and recommendations.

7. **General orders:** After adoption of the committee report in the house and senate, the bill has its second reading and goes onto "general orders of the day". Acting as a committee of the whole legislators discuss bills on general orders. They may debate the issues, adopt amendments, present arguments on the bills, and they may vote to recommend:

- * that a bill "do pass".
- * that a bill not pass.
- * postponement.
- * further committee action.

8. **The calendar:** The calendar is a list of bills the committee of the whole recommends to pass. At this point a bill has its third reading. Amendments to the bill must have the unanimous consent of the entire body and legislators vote on it for the final time.

By committee recommendation, bills of a noncontroversial nature can by-pass general orders and go directly onto a "consent calendar", usually passing without debate.

Every bill requires a majority vote of the full membership of the house and senate to pass. Voice votes may be used in house and senate votes until the bill is being voted on in final passage. That final vote and vote on any amendments are roll call or recorded votes.

9. **Conference committee:** When the house and the senate both pass the same version of a bill, that bill goes to the governor for his approval or disapproval. If the house and senate do not agree, a conference committee, including members of both houses, meets to reach an agreement. If both bodies then pass the bill in compromise form, it goes to the governor.

10. The governor: When a bill arrives, the governor may:

- * sign it and the bill becomes law.
- * veto it (return it with a "veto message" stating objections) to the body where it originated.
- * pocket veto the bill (after final adjournment of the legislature).
- * exercise the right to line veto portions of appropriations bills.

If the governor does not sign or veto a bill within three days after receiving it, while the legislature is in session, the bill becomes a law.

Arne H. Carlson (Republican)

Biography: Born to Swedish immigrants September 24, 1934, New York City. Received a full scholarship to Choate (private high school) in Connecticut, graduated 1952. Earned a full scholarship to Williams College, Massachusetts, graduated 1957 with a bachelors degree in history. Moved to Minnesota in 1957. Attended graduate school at the University of Minnesota. Worked for Control Data (1962-64), and served on the Minneapolis City Council as Majority Leader (1965-67). Served in Minnesota House of Representatives (1971-78). Elected State Auditor in 1978, 1982, 1986. Since taking office in 1991, Governor Carlson has lifted the state out of an inherited \$2.2 billion dollar deficit and brought it to a \$2.3 billion dollar surplus. He accomplished this by working with the legislature to balance the state's budget and improve Minnesota's business climate by cutting taxes. casting vetoes to block new taxes and spending, and reducing workers' compensation rates. His commitment to long term financial planning and conservative debt management practices prompted Financial World Magazine to name Minnesota as the fourth-best managed state in the nation. It also earned Minnesota a AAA bond rating from Moody's Investor Service, a nationally recognized rating service. The Governor developed and signed the most comprehensive wetlands protection bill in the nation and was recognized by the National Audubon Society for his leadership on Great Lakes water quality issues. He was a key player in the creation of a 1992 comprehensive health care reform initiative known as "MnCare," which controls costs and provides health care access to all Minnesotans. In 1994, he launched an innovative welfare reform plan called the Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP). This program has led the nation in moving long-term welfare recipients into the workplace. He created a new state agency, the Department of Children, Families and Learning, to develop a single integrated agenda for all state children's programs and initiatives. Elected 37th governor of Minnesota in 1990, re-elected in 1994 by the largest margin of any governor in 50 years; married to Susan Carlson, three children, Arne Jr., "Tucker" (1057) "Tucker", (1967); Anne (1968); and Jessica (1983). Elected: 1990, 1994. Term expires: 1999.

THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE IN MINNESOTA

The primary duties of the governor are to oversee all operations of state government and to take the lead in shaping public policy by proposing ideas to the legislature. The operation of government is carried out through more than 20 major departments whose heads are appointed by the governor. These department heads, along with the lieutenant governor, make up the governor's cabinet. The departments of revenue and finance are the governor's chief advisors on financial matters; the departments of health, human services and corrections advise the governor on various social policies; and the departments of pollution control, natural resources and waste management and others carry out the governor's environmental policies.

The governor appoints people to state boards and commissions, and appoints judges for all court systems when vacancies occur. The governor chairs the state executive council and the legislative advisory commission, both of which deal with extraordinary matters when the legislature is not in session. He also serves on the land exchange board and the state board of investments. As commander in chief of state military forces, the governor can dispatch the national guard for emergency duty.

The governor reviews all bills passed by the legislature and has the power to veto those of which he disapproves. On occasion, the governor may appear before the legislature. Because of the separation of powers required by Minnesota constitution, a governor may appear in legislative chambers only with the permission of the legislature. Only the governor has the power to call a special session of the legislature.

Governor Carlson entered office facing an economic recession and a massive budget shortfall created during the 1980s when growth in state spending dramatically exceeded the rate of inflation. His proven leadership has resulted in a \$2.3 billion surplus and a state budget that is structurally balanced through the year 2002. Working with Lieutenant Governor Joanne Benson, the Governor has submitted a budget for 1998-99 that is a focused, long-term investment in the future. The Governor's priorities include: ensuring that government is accountable and affordable, placing students first in education, preparing young people for work, the safety and well-being of our families and communities, and integrating technology in our lives and work.

THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN MINNESOTA

The lieutenant governor serves as an extension of the governor and assists the governor in carrying out the functions of the executive branch. She represents the governor and is prepared to act in the governor's place in the event of his absence or disability. The governor may delegate to the lieutenant governor any powers, duties, responsibilities or functions as prescribed by law to be performed by the governor by filing a written order with the secretary of state.

Lieutenant Governor Benson is a key member of governor's cabinet and is involved in major policy and budget decisions. A former state senator, she remains active in legislative issues, particularly education, criminal justice, public safety, health care and family services. As lieutenant governor, Benson serves as a member of the State's Executive Council, and chairs the Tourism Advisory Committee, the Capitol Area Architectural Planning Board and the Affirmative Action Council. She also is co-chair of the Governor's Task Force on Violence as a Public Health Problem, a member of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors' Executive Committee and past chair of the NCLG's Education Task Force, and a member of the Council of State Governments' Finance Committee.

THE SECRETARY OF STATE IN MINNESOTA

The secretary of state serves with the other constitutional officers on special state policy boards: the Executive Council and the State Board of Investment. In order of gubernatorial succession the secretary of state follows the lieutenant governor, president of the senate, and speaker of the house.

Minnesota law provides that this office maintains many official records of the state, oversees the administration of elections in the state, charters and registers corporations and maintains annual reports for foreign and domestic corporations. The office provides and administers a statewide database for voter registration, and administers a statewide database for the filing of liens under the uniform commercial code.

As chair of the state canvassing board, the secretary of state compiles and certifies state election results. The office publishes the election law book, election judge training guides, official election results, Minnesota Legislative Manual and Minnesota Elected Officials booklet. As keeper of the great seal of the state of Minnesota, the secretary of state certifies the authenticity of official records, documents, proclamations and executive orders of the governor, and acts of the legislature.

DIVISIONS OF THE OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE

Election Division: administers the election responsibilities of the secretary of state, provides advice on election procedures and publishes the state voters guide and other election information. Business Services Division: reviews, approves and files articles of incorporation and amendments for all business, non-profit, foreign, professional, cooperative, banking and insurance companies doing business in the state. It records trademarks, assumed business names, limited partnerships, and limited liability companies. The division also holds copies of the original land survey records of the state, is the agent of substituted service of process on corporations and registers international student organizations. Uniform Commercial Code & Certification Division: maintains the financing records filed under the uniform commercial code. These records contain information on collateral that has been pledged to secure loans and on state and federal tax liens. Supervisor: Cheri Smith (612)297-9102

Fiscal Operations Section: maintains a centralized system for handling all incoming mail, receipting and tracking all incoming revenue, and providing the accounting, financial reporting, purchasing, payroll processing, accounts payable, and general accounting functions for the office. Human Resources Section: administers the office's personnel and labor relations program including recruitment, selection, classification, and compensation, benefits administration, affirmative action, employee development, and health and safety. THE STATE AUDITOR IN MINNESOTA

The Office of the State Auditor is a constitutional office which serves as a watchdog for Minnesota

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taxpayers and helps to assure integrity, accountability, and cost-effectiveness in government throughout the state. The State Auditor has oversight responsibilities for approximately 4,300 units of local government throughout the state. Through financial and compliance audits, special investigations, and other forms of oversight, the Office assures Minnesotans that their tax dollars are being spent in accordance with Minnesota Law. Through its analytical reports, educational initiatives and research, the Office provides local governments with the necessary information to evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of the services they deliver.

The State Auditor serves on the State Executive Council, State Board of Investment, Land Exchange Board, Public Employees Retirement Association Board, Minnesota Housing Finance Agency Board, Rural Finance Authority Board, and the Board of Government Innovation and Cooperation.

DIVISIONS OF THE OFFICE OF THE STATE AUDITOR

Audit Practice: conducts annual financial and legal compliance audits of all Minnesota counties, the three first class cities, component units affiliated with these counties and cities, and other entities as required by statute. The office performs approximately 230 audits per year. This division establishes uniform reporting standards and provides technical assistance and education to local units of government which strengthens local accounting practices and promotes cost-effectiveness and efficiency in local government.

Deputy State Auditor for Audit Practice: Greg Hierlinger (612)296-7003

Single Audit: is responsible for ensuring that subrecipients of federal funds have audits in accordance with the Federal Single Audit Act. The Office reviews subrecipient annual reports for timeliness and compliance with the federal reporting standards. This division prepares the Statewide Single Audit in a cooperative effort with the Minnesota Department of Finance, the Minnesota Office of the Legislative Auditor and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Office of the Inspector General. Legal Compliance: serves as a resource to review and assess whether local government expenditures have complied with Minnesota laws. This division provides legal assistance to staff and clients. Deputy State Auditor, Constitutional Office/Legal Counsel: Deno Sterzinger Howard (612)297-3673

Special Investigations: works to ensure integrity and accountability in local governments by investigating allegations of malfeasance, misfeasance or nonfeasance on behalf of taxpayers in the State of Minnesota. This division supports field staff auditors when evidence of suspected wrongdoing is discovered during financial and compliance audits of local government. A 1992 law also requires public employees and elected officials to report evidence of theft, embezzlement, and unlawful use of public funds or property to the Office of the State Auditor. The division evaluates allegations brought to its attention and, when appropriate, provides specialized auditing services, initiates independent investigations, or refers the matter to the appropriate oversight authority.

Tax Increment Financing Division: promotes legal compliance and accountability through examination and audit of political subdivisions' use of tax increment financing (TIF). To achieve this end, the division reviews annual reporting forms containing financial information from over 1,600 TIF districts and performs legal compliance audits on TIF districts throughout the state. 

THE STATE TREASURER IN MINNESOTA

The state treasurer receives and issues receipts for all monies paid into the state treasury. The treasurer also transfers funds to pay warrants presented by banks. The treasurer transacts about \$150 billion in receipts and disbursements annually. The treasurer's office controls funds held in state bank accounts so that the maximum daily amount can be invested by the State Board of Investment. Collateral accounts are monitored to assure the safety of state funds held by others.

The treasurer's office maintains records, provides accounting services, and directs principal and interest payments on 150 separate bond accounts (authorizations and issues), and certificates of indebtedness. The state's vault is in the treasurer's office for safekeeping of assets.

The treasurer is a member of the Executive Council and the State Board of Investment.



THE ATTORNEY GENERAL IN MINNESOTA

The attorney general is the chief legal officer for the state and is the legal advisor to the governor and all of the constitutional officers. His duties arise from the Constitution, state statutes and common law. Every board, commission and agency of the state receives its legal counsel and representation from the attorney general.

The attorney general has authority to initiate legal actions he deems necessary for the enforcement of the laws of the state, the preservation of order and the protection of public rights. He regularly provides legal assistance to local officials, such as county attorneys and sheriffs, in their efforts to enforce laws, and his Criminal Division prosecutes difficult or complex criminal cases at the request of local prosecutors, especially serious crimes against persons. He serves as the state's principle consumer advocate through specialized divisions focused on consumer protection, charities oversight, antitrust enforcement and utilities regulation.

As a statewide elected official, the attorney general also serves as the people's attorney, advocating a wide range of policy initiatives and legal reforms to protect Minnesotans and enhance our quality of life. Priority issues for the attorney general's policy agenda include criminal justice, government and fiscal reform, children's advocacy, environmental protection and consumer protection. In the criminal justice area, he has initiated legislation to toughen penalties for violent criminals, expand victims' rights and reform the juvenile justice system. As part of his fiscal reform efforts, he initiated an aggressive program to collect more of the \$350 million in unpaid child support taxpayers have paid out in welfare costs. He also filed a landmark lawsuit against the tobacco industry to recover millions of dollars the state expends on health care costs for diseased and dving smokers. His work on behalf of children such as the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program, the Partnership for A Drug Free Minnesota, and the Education Now and Babies Later (ENABL) curriculum have focused on preventing the root causes of social problems. Among the environmental issues he has initiated, the Land Recycling Act and an environmental self-auditing bill have gained national recognition. On the consumer front, he has focused on efforts to enforce laws banning tobacco sales to children, combating senior fraud, gambling oversight, and telemarketing fraud. Initiatives in the areas of civil rights and health care typically round out the attorney general's ongoing policy agenda.

The attorney general is also a member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Investment, the Pardon Board and the Land Exchange Board.

THE JUDICIARY IN MINNESOTA

Constitution provides: The judicial power of the state is vested in a supreme court, a court of appeals, if established by the legislature, a district court and such other courts, judicial officers and commissioners with jurisdiction inferior to the district court as the legislature may establish (Article VI, section 1).

Jurisdiction: The Minnesota constitution provides that the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as are prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, but there shall be no trial by jury in the supreme court.

Justices: The constitution provides for one chief justice and from six to eight associate justices. Justices are elected by the people of the state to six-year terms; vacancies are filled by governor's appointment. Justices are elected without party designation. Candidates file for a specific judicial office which is designated on the ballot by seat number. Functions: The chief justice of the supreme court is the administrative head of the judicial branch and supervises the work of all courts. A state court administrator, supreme court administrator/clerk of the appellate courts, and state law librarian are appointed by the court. The court has power and duties to promote effective utilization of judicial officers and conduct continuing study of the court system.

Salary: \$103,835 chief justice; \$94,395 associate justices.





Jurisdiction: The Court of Appeals has jurisdiction of appeals from all final decisions of trial courts other than conciliation courts except for appeals in certain election contests, convictions of murder in the first degree, and from administrative agencies except appeals from the workers' compensation court of appeals and the tax court. All of these exceptions go directly to the supreme court.

Judges: The Court of Appeals has sixteen judges. Judges are elected by the voters to six-year terms; vacancies are filled by governor's appointment. Judges are elected without party designation and candidates file for a specific seat. All judges of the court are subject to statewide election, but one seat on the court is designated for each congressional district. One year's residence in the district is required for appointment or election to a congressional district seat. The governor designates one of the judges as chief judge, who, subject to the authority of the chief justice, has administrative authority for the court.


DISTRICT COURT

Jurisdiction: Minnesota has one district court, divided into ten judicial districts. The chief justice of the supreme court has the power to assign judges from one district to serve in another. The constitution provides that the district court has original jurisdiction in civil and criminal cases and such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. In Hennepin and Ramsey counties the district courts have juvenile court jurisdiction.

Judges: Each district has three or more judges. Judges are elected by the voters of the district to sixyear terms; vacancies are filled by governor's appointment. Judges are nominated and elected without party designation. Candidates file for a specific judgeship. Judges of each district elect a chief judge and assistant chief judge to exercise general administrative authority over the courts of the district.

Salary: \$87,669 chief judges; \$83,494 judges.



COUNTIES IN MINNESOTA

The State of Minnesota has 87 counties. Ramsey county is the smallest in land area, encompassing less than 170 square miles. St. Louis county has the largest land area with over 6,000 square miles. County populations vary from 1,000,000 in Hennepin county to 4,000 in Cook county.

Law provides: Counties are governed by a board of commissioners and administrative officers elected by the people to four year terms; alternate forms of government may be adopted, chiefly to allow for an elected executive, a manager or administrator, or appointive administrative officers (*Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 375A*).

Functions: Counties are responsible for property tax assessment, tax administration, elections, record keeping, transportation, planning and zoning, solid waste management, environment, parks and water management, law enforcement, courts and health and human services.

CITIES IN MINNESOTA

Law provides: Cities are governed by home rule charters or by the city code; of the 856 cities in Minnesota, 108 are home rule charter cities and 748 are statutory cities (*Minnesota Statute, Chapters 410, 412*).

Form of government: Home rule cities may establish any form of government they choose in their charters. Typical forms include: council-manager, commission, strong mayor, and mayor-council. Statutory cities may choose a form of government from three alternatives: the mayor-council plan with either an elected clerk (standard plan), an appointed clerk (plan A), or the council-manager plan (plan B). Most statutory cities are plan A or standard plan.

Functions: Police and fire protection, street maintenance, sewer and water, parks and recreation are traditional city services. Cities may choose to provide utilities, sell liquor, operate a hospital, maintain an airport, and provide ambulance service, among other options.

Law provides: The three member board acts on all boundary adjustments between a city and the adjacent land and rules on incorporation and consolidation of cities. (*Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 414*). Executive Director: Christine M. Scotillo.

TOWNSHIPS IN MINNESOTA

Law provides: Townships are governed by a board of supervisors elected by the people for three year terms, and administrative officers elected/appointed for two year terms at the annual town meeting held in each town on the second Tuesday of March. Optional forms of organization may be selected by the voters (*Minnesota Statutes, Chapters 365, 368*)

Functions: Townships have authority for planning, subdivision control, zoning, maintenance of public works, parks, cemeteries, and hospitals in addition to regular duties such as elections, tax levies and public roads.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN MINNESOTA

Law provides: The school districts of Minnesota provide for the education of students from kindergarten through grade twelve.

School facilities are supplied by the 355 independent school districts, two special districts, two common districts, three intermediate districts, three secondary cooperative districts, and 19 charter schools. In addition, many students have the opportunity to enroll in schools outside their own district through various attendance options programs. School districts are governed by an elected school board. Minnesota law provides that public education shall be free and no pupil can be denied an education because of economic hardship and the inability to provide the books and supplies necessary to complete the requirements for graduation (*Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 120*).

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





1997 Permanent Rules of the Senate

Parliamentary reference

1. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure shall govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules and orders of the Senate and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

Hour of convening

2. The Senate shall convene on days of meeting at 8:30 a.m. unless the Senate directs otherwise.

President

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Senate adjourned. The President shall immediately call the members to order and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall proceed with the regular order of business. The President shall preserve order and decorum, may speak on points of order in preference to members, and shall also decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Senate by a member. An appeal is decided by a majority vote of those present and voting. Upon an appeal from the decision of the President, the question is, "Shall the decision of the President be the judgment of the Senate?"

Substitutes for the President

4. The President may call a member to preside. In the absence of the President the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration, or the Chair's designee, shall preside over the Senate. In the absence of the President and the Chair, a member may be selected by the Senate to perform the duties of the President. Substitutions do not extend beyond adjournment.

Absence of members

5. No member or officer of the Senate shall be absent from a session of the Senate unless excused by the Senate.

Decorum during business

6. When the President puts a question, or addresses the Senate, no one shall walk out of or cross the Chamber. When a member is speaking, no one shall pass between the member speaking and the President. No member, or other person, shall proceed to or remain by the Secretary's desk while the yeas and nays are being called or counted. No member may speak without using a microphone. All remarks during debate shall be addressed to the Presiding Officer, however, a member may turn toward other members when speaking, rather than facing the Presiding Officer.

Order of business

7. The order of business is as follows:

Petitions, letters, remonstrances. Executive and official communications. Messages from the House of Representatives. First reading of House bills. Reports of committees. * From standing committees.

- * From select committees.
- Second reading of Senate bills.

Second reading of House bills.

- Motions and Resolutions.
- Calendar.
- Consent Calendar.
- General Orders.
- Introduction and first reading of Senate bills.
- Announcements of Senate interest.

Under the order of business of Motions and Resolutions the Senate may by a majority vote of the whole Senate temporarily revert or proceed to any other order of business. A message from the House of Representatives that a Senate bill has been amended, and the amendment, must be printed and placed on the members' desks before a member may move to concur in the House amendment. If the amendment has been printed in the House Journal for a preceding day and is available to the members, the Journal copy may serve as the printed copy.

Calendar

8. The Secretary shall make a Calendar of all bills, resolutions and other matters coming before the Senate for final action. The Secretary shall place them on the Calendar in the order in which they have been acted upon in Committee of the Whole. The Calendar shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one calendar day before the matters on it are considered.

Consent Calendar

9. If a committee determines that a bill it recommends to pass is of a routine nature or otherwise of a nature which likely will not be opposed, it may in its report recommend that the bill be placed on the Consent Calendar. If the report is adopted, the bill shall be printed and placed on the Consent Calendar after its second reading. On the question of adoption of the report the question of accepting the recommendation that the bill be placed on the Consent Calendar may be divided from the question of adopting the report in other respects.

A majority of the whole Senate, or the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration, may order a bill on General Orders to be placed on the Consent Calendar.

The Consent Calendar consists of bills placed on it. Senate bills shall be positioned ahead of House bills. The Consent Calendar shall be printed and placed on the members' desks at least one calendar day before the matters on it are considered.

If a member objects to consideration of a bill on the Consent Calendar at any time during its consideration in the Senate before the question on final passage is put, and that objection is supported by at least two other members, the bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, and shall be placed at the bottom of General Orders subject to Rule 11, except that it need not lie over one calendar day before consideration in the Committee of the Whole.

Special Order

10. The Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration or the Chair's designee may designate a special order for a bill that has been given its second reading.

A special order shall provide that the bill be considered immediately, at a time certain, or after specific other business is completed. During consideration of a special order, Rule 20 is suspended. As nearly as applicable, debate on the bill and all proceedings including amendments and substitutions shall be that of the Committee of the Whole.

On any question a member may call for the yeas and nays which shall be entered in the Journal.

Unless it is otherwise disposed of, after consideration a bill on Special Orders of the Senate shall immediately proceed to its third reading and final passage.

A bill may not be made a special order if the chief author has declined on three previous occasions to take the bill up after it was designated a special order.

General Orders

11. The Secretary shall make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other proceedings of the Senate, which are referred to the Committee of the Whole, and which are not made the order of the day, for a particular day, and number them. The lists are called the "General Orders". They shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee.

General Orders, together with all bills included on it required to be printed under the rules or orders of the Senate, shall be printed and placed upon the members' desks at least one calendar day before being considered in Committee of the Whole.

Motions

12. When a motion is made it shall be stated by the President. If it is in writing it shall be handed to the Secretary and read to the members.

13. A motion or amendment shall be written if the President or a member requests. In that case it must identify the member or committee offering it.

14. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it is in possession of the Senate, but may be withdrawn by the author at any time before decision or amendment.

Precedence of motions

15. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, except:

To adjourn. To recess. To reconsider. To lay on the table. For the previous question. (Motions numbered 1, 2, 4 and 5 above shall be decided without debate.) To refer. To postpone to a day certain. To amend. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions have precedence in the foregoing order; but when a motion for the previous question has been seconded, or the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table is not in order.

A motion to postpone to a day certain, to refer, to postpone indefinitely, or to amend, having been decided, shall not again be put on the same day, nor at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

Motion to adjourn

16. A motion to adjourn is always in order, and also a motion to adjourn to a time certain. The latter motion is debatable solely as to the time. When either motion is rejected it shall not be renewed until further business has been transacted.

Amendments to rules and suspension of rules

17. Every proposition to amend a rule of the Senate shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration. The proposition shall not be acted upon until the report of the committee is received by the Senate. A rule shall not be suspended except by at least two-thirds vote of the whole Senate. A motion to suspend the rules for the purpose of advancing a bill shall be made only under the order of business, "Motions and Resolutions".

Order in debate

18. When a member is about to speak in debate, or deliver a matter to the Senate, the member shall rise and respectfully address "Mr. (or Madam) President". The member shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the President. The member shall speak only to the question under debate and avoid personality. The member may inform the Senate of the Governor's position on a bill and on its status in the House of Representatives. In discussing a resolution, each member is limited to ten minutes.

19. When a member is called to order, the member shall be silent until it is determined whether or not the member is in order. If a member is called to order for words spoken in debate, the words excepted to shall be taken down in writing by the Secretary immediately.

20. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question on the same day without leave of the Senate.

Committees not to be absent

21. Committees shall not be absent from the Senate without permission of the Senate. The names of the members excused shall be printed in the Journal.

Members to vote unless excused

22. Every member who is in the Senate Chamber during a roll call shall vote upon the request of another member unless, for special reasons, excused by the Senate.

A motion by a member to be excused from voting shall be made before the question is put. A member wishing to be excused from voting may make a brief statement of the reason for making the request and the question on the motion shall be taken without further debate.

When members have had an opportunity to vote and fail to do so, a majority of all the members of the Senate may, by motion, direct the President to close the roll. The vote on a motion to close the roll shall be taken without debate and no member is required to vote on the motion.

Call of the Senate

23. A member may impose a call of the Senate requiring the attendance of all members before any further proceedings occur except a motion to adjourn. Upon the imposition of a call, a record of those present shall be obtained upon the request of any member, and the Sergeant at Arms instructed to bring in the absent members. When the Senate has been placed under call, a member may demand that the doors be closed and no member permitted to leave the Chamber until the matter or question, if any, under consideration at the time of the call is disposed of, or until the call is lifted by a majority vote of all the members of the Senate may excuse from attendance members of any other of any committee the class.

A call cannot be made after voting has commenced.

Questions-how stated and decided

24. Questions shall be distinctly put. The President shall declare all votes but if a member rises to question a vote, the President shall order a division.

Only members present to vote

25. Upon a division and count of the Senate on a question, only members present in the Senate Chamber shall be counted. No member may vote on a question except at the member's own seat in the Chamber.

Any member may demand yeas and nays

26. At any time prior to the start of voting on a question, a member may call for the yeas and nays which shall be entered in the Journal. A call for the yeas and nays cannot be interrupted except as provided in Rule 22.

Authorized electrical voting device

27. Unless otherwise ordered, a vote, except upon elections, may be taken by means of the electrical voting system which is under the control of the President.

Certificate for money

28. No certificate authorizing the payment of money appropriated by the Legislature shall be issued by the Secretary by virtue of a motion or resolution, unless the motion or resolution is voted for by a majority of all members of the Senate upon a call of the yeas and nays.

The previous question

29. Unless the motion for the previous question is made specifically applicable to a subsidiary motion, the previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect is to put an end to all debate, and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon all pending amendments in their order and then upon the main question.

On a motion for the previous question a call of the Senate is in order before the President submits the question to the Senate.

On a previous question there is no debate. All incidental questions of order, arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending the motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

Division of question

30. A member may call for a division of the question when the question will admit of it. A motion to strike out and insert is indivisible. A motion to strike out being lost does not preclude an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

Reconsideration

31. When a motion or question has been once put and carried in the affirmative or negative, it is in order for a member who voted with the prevailing side to move for reconsideration on the same day on which the vote was taken or within the next two calendar days or, if later, the first day the Senate meets after the vote was taken. The motion takes precedence over all other questions except a motion to adjourn or recess. When a motion to adjourn is adopted prior to the disposition of the motion for reconsideration, a motion for reconsideration shall lie over until the next succeeding day the Senate meets except as provided in this rule. When notice of intention to move reconsideration of the final action of the Senate on a question is given by a member, the Secretary shall retain the subject of the notice until after the expiration of the time during which the motion can be made.

During the six calendar days before the first Tuesday following the third Saturday in May of any year a notice of intention to move for reconsideration is not in order, but a motion to reconsider may be made and have priority over all other business except a motion to adjourn. A motion for reconsideration having been once voted on shall not be put again nor reconsidered.

Introduction of bills

32. Bills, memorials, concurrent or joint resolutions may be introduced by a member or by order of the Senate on a report of a committee. An original and three copies are required for introduction. The number of authors shall not exceed five. A member or a committee desiring to introduce a bill, memorial or concurrent or joint resolution shall place it in the hands of the Secretary, and the Secretary shall promptly deliver all the bills, memorials or concurrent or joint resolutions to the President who shall present them to the Senate.

The name of the author or authors shall be prefixed to each bill, memorial or resolution and the name of a committee introducing a bill, memorial or resolution shall be endorsed on it.

A bill prepared by a department or agency of state government shall be introduced and given its first reading three weeks before the first committee deadline in odd-numbered years and two weeks before the first committee deadline in even numbered years. Upon its introduction, the first author of the bill shall deliver a copy of the fiscal note on the bill to the chair of the standing committee to which the bill has been referred.

Recess Bill Introductions

33. During the period between the last day of the session in any odd-numbered year and the first day of the session in the following year, a bill filed with the Secretary for introduction shall be given a file number and may be unofficially referred by the President, with the approval of the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration, to an appropriate standing committee of the Senate. All bills filed for introduction during this period shall be presented to the Senate when it reconvenes and shall be referred to the standing committees previously indicated by the President, subject to objection under Rule 35.

Reporting of bills

34. Every bill, memorial, order, resolution or vote requiring the approval of the Governor shall be reported to the Senate on three different days previous to its passage. The first report, called the first reading, is made when it has been received for introduction; the second report, called the second reading, is made when it has been considered by all the necessary standing committees and is ready for debate; the third report, called the third reading, is made when it is ready for final passage.

Referring of bills

35. All bills shall be referred by the President without motion to the proper standing committee unless otherwise referred by the Senate. A bill introduced by a committee need not be referred to a standing committee unless a question arises but rather shall lie over one day before being given its second reading. When a question arises concerning the proper reference of a bill during the order of business of first reading on the day of introduction or at the time of report on it by a standing committee to which the bill was previously referred, the bill shall be referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and Administration, to report the proper reference, and upon adoption of the report of the Committee on Rules and Administration, it shall be referred accordingly.

All bills appropriating money, or obligating the state to pay or expend money, or establishing a policy which to be effective will require expenditure of money, when referred to and reported by any other than a committee on finance, shall, before passage, be referred to a committee on finance.

All bills delegating rulemaking to a department or agency of state government and all bills exempting a department or agency of state government from rulemaking, when referred to and reported by any other than the Committee on Governmental Operations and Veterans, shall, before passage, be referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations and Veterans.

All bills creating a new commission, council, task force, board, or other body to which a member of the legislature will be appointed shall, before passage, be referred both to the Committee on Governmental Operations and Veterans and to the Committee on Rules and Administration.

All bills authorizing or increasing a sentence of imprisonment to a state correctional institution shall be referred before passage to the Committee on Crime Prevention. Upon request of the chair of a budget division of a policy committee, the chair of the policy committee shall refer a bill in that committee to the division.

36. No bill or resolution shall be referred to committee or amended until it has been given its first reading. No bill or resolution shall be objected to on its introduction.

Amendments to be germane

37. An amendment proposed to the Senate or to the Committee of the Whole that is not germane is out of order. A non-germane amendment includes one that relates to a substantially different subject, or is intended to accomplish a substantially different purpose than that of the original bill to which it is proposed. An amendment to insert a constitutional amendment is not germane to a bill that does not already include a constitutional amendment.

Whether an amendment is germane is a question to be decided by the President, who may put the question to the body if the President chooses.

A motion to remove an amendment placed on a House bill under Rule 49 is out of order if removal of the amendment would make a portion of the House bill not germane to the Senate companion for which it was substituted.

Amendments to bills

38. In drawing an amendment to a bill or resolution reference shall be made therein, first to the number of the bill, then to the page, and then to the line or lines from which matter is to be stricken or in which new matter is to be inserted.

Amendments to title

39. The title to a bill may be amended at any time the bill is amended by the Senate.

Recall from committee

40. With the concurrence of the first author of the bill, before the deadline for committee action on the bill a majority of the Senate and after the deadline for committee action on the bill 60 percent of the Senate may recall a bill from any committee and re-refer it to any other committee or place it on General Orders. With the concurrence of the first author of the bill, a majority of the Senate may at any time take a bill from the table and place it on General Orders.

By a report of the Committee on Rules and Administration adopted by the Senate, the Committee on Rules and Administration, on request of the first author, may remove a bill from committee and re-refer it to any other committee or place it on General Orders.

Distribution and printing of bills

41. To the extent practical the Secretary shall provide a copy of any bill to the public and may charge a reasonable fee.

Unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, all Senate bills which have been reported upon favorably or without recommendation by a committee shall be printed prior to consideration by the Senate or the Committee of the Whole. A House bill amended by the Senate must be unofficially engrossed and printed when placed on General Orders. A bill may be printed by order of the Secretary when amended after second reading. A bill shall be printed when ordered by a majority vote of the Senate. Action by the Senate on a bill which has not been printed is a waiver of the printing requirement.

Committee of the Whole

42. All bills, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the Governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in Committee of the Whole before they are finally acted upon by the Senate, except as provided for in Rules 9 and 10.

43. The President may call a member to the Chair when the Senate resolves itself into the Committee of the Whole. The rules observed in the Senate govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings of the Committee of the Whole, and the Chair of the Committee of the Whole has the powers of the President, as appropriate. However, a member may speak more than twice on the same subject and a call for the previous question cannot be made. The yeas and nays shall be taken only upon the request of three members, and when taken shall be recorded in the Journal along with the amendment.

44. The recommendations of the Committee of the Whole shall be reported to the Senate. If a recommendation contains a proposed amendment of a bill, that amendment shall be noted on a separate piece of paper but when reported need not be read by the President unless required by one or more of the members. The question is on the adoption or rejection of the report, and no other question shall be admitted. The question may be divided to permit separate Senate action on the report as to any bill. On adoption of the report of the Committee of the Whole all bills recommended to pass shall be placed upon the Calendar.

Amendment on third reading

45. No amendment is in order on third reading without the unanimous consent of the Senate unless it fills a blank, amends the title as provided by Rule 39, is proposed to the chief author of the bill by the Revisor of Statutes to correct technical defects found by the Revisor while engrossing earlier amendments to the bill, or is proposed to a bill on the Consent Calendar before the bill is given its third reading.

In filling blanks, the largest sum, the longest time and the greatest distance shall be first taken.

Motion to refer

46. A bill or resolution may be referred to committee at any time prior to its passage, and if an amendment is reported on the referral to any other than the Committee of the Whole, it shall again be read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, read the third time and placed on final passage. If the referral is to the Committee of the Whole it shall be placed at the head of General Orders, except when the referral is under Rule 9.

Final passage

47. The final question upon a bill or other matter requiring action by both Houses after its first and second reading, and after the consideration in Committee of the Whole, is upon its final passage.

Transmitting of bills to the House

48. Except as provided in Rule 31, immediately after the passage of a bill or other matter in which the concurrence of the House of Representatives is requested, the Secretary shall transmit it to the House. On the concurrence of a bill or other matter of the House by the Senate, or on the concurrence or disagreement in a vote of the House, the Secretary shall notify the House.

Comparison and substitution of bills

49. Unless there is a motion by the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration or objection under Rule 35, a House bill, after its first reading, shall be referred as follows:

(a) If there is no Senate companion bill, the House bill shall be referred to the appropriate standing committee;

(b) If there is a Senate companion bill, the House bill shall be referred to the standing committee possessing the Senate companion;

(c) If the Senate companion bill has been reported to the Senate, the House bill shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration, which shall report whether the House bill is identical to the Senate companion bill. If the bills are identical, the report shall recommend that the House bill be given its second reading and substituted for the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill be indefinitely postponed. If the House bill is not identical to the Senate companion bill, the report of the committee shall so state and recommend an amendment to the House bill that when adopted will render the House bill be given its second reading and substituted for the Senate companion bill, the report of the committee shall so state and recomment an amendment to the House bill that when adopted will render the House bill be given its second reading and substituted for the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill be given its second reading and substituted for the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill and the Senate companion bill shall be indefinitely postponed.

Reports of the Committee on Rules and Administration pursuant to this rule shall be prepared and submitted on behalf of the committee by the Secretary.

A House bill placed on the Calendar by substitution shall not be given its third reading on the same day as the substitution.

Engrossing and enrolling of bills

50. All engrossing and enrolling of bills shall be done at the direction and under authority of the Senate.

Every bill, memorial, order or resolution originating in the Senate shall be carefully engrossed before being transmitted to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

All bills shall be carefully enrolled under the supervision of the Committee on Rules and Administration, which may report to the Senate at any time on the enrollment of bills.

Disposition of bills on adjournment

51. Adjournment of the regular session in an odd-numbered year to a date certain in the following year shall be equivalent to daily adjournment, except that a bill on the Calendar, Consent Calendar, or General Orders shall be returned to the standing committee other than the Committee on Rules and Administration from which it was last reported to the Senate, unless otherwise provided for by motion prior to adjournment. Bills returned to committee pursuant to this rule shall, upon request of the author, be given priority for consideration by the committee ahead of all other bills in the order in which they appeared on the Calendar, Consent Calendar, or General Orders.

Petitions and other communications

52. In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance or other communication addressed to the Senate, a member shall only state the general purpose of it.

Every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee, shall have an appropriate title, and the name of the member presenting it written on it.

Resolutions

53. Memorial resolutions addressed to the President or the Congress of the United States, or a house or member of Congress, or a department or officer of the United States, or a state or foreign government, joint resolutions, and resolutions requiring the signature of the Governor shall follow the same procedure as bills before being adopted. A resolution may not be changed to a bill, and a bill may not be changed to a resolution.

Upon a member giving notice of intention to debate a resolution not required to follow the same procedure as bills and not offered by the Committee on Rules and Administration, the resolution shall lie over one calendar day without debate or other action. Upon the request of a member, the resolution shall be referred to the proper committee. Whenever a question arises concerning the proper reference the procedure provided by Rule 35 applies.

Confirmations

54. Every gubernatorial appointment requiring the advice and consent of the Senate shall be referred by the President to the appropriate committee. If a question arises as to the proper committee, the appointment shall be referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and Administration for a report making the proper reference.

The final question on the appointment is, "Will the Senate, having given its advice, now consent to this appointment?" The question shall not be put the same day the appointment is received or on the day it is reported by committee unless by unanimous consent.

Signing of acts, resolutions

55. In addition to the duties under Rule 3, the President shall sign all acts, memorials, addresses and resolutions. All writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the Senate shall be signed by the President and attested by the Secretary. Upon a finding by the Committee on

Rules and Administration that the President refuses or is unable to sign any of the documents described in this rule, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration, or some other member selected by the committee shall assume the duties of the President under this rule until the President is able to sign the documents described or until the Senate elects a new President, whichever occurs first.

Appointment of committees

56. A member may not serve as the chair of the same standing committee or the same division of a standing committee, or a committee or division with substantially the same jurisdiction, for more than two consecutive Senate terms. This limit does not apply to the Committee on Rules and Administration. This limit applies to time served as a chair in the seventy-eighth legislature and thereafter.

The majority and minority shall each be represented on all standing committees of the Senate substantially in proportion to their numbers in the Senate. The majority group shall assign the number of positions the minority group will hold on each committee. The minority group shall be given adequate notice about its positions prior to the commencement of the session. Both the majority and minority group shall appoint their own members to fill the number of positions each group will hold on each committee. The minority group shall transmit notice of its assignments to the majority group within ten calendar days after receipt of the notice of positions available. The minority group may designate a ranking member for each committee. Nothing prohibits a member of the minority group from serving as chair or vice chair of a committee, subcommittee, division, or commission. If the minority group for any reason fails to make its appointments pursuant to this rule, the majority group may make all the committee assignments.

The majority and minority committee assignments are subject to the uniform criteria governing committee assignments applicable to both the majority and minority. The uniform criteria shall be promulgated by the majority group and transmitted to the minority group together with notification of committee positions available to the minority.

Committee assignments as made by the majority and minority groups shall be followed by the Senate in the resolution establishing representation on all Senate standing committees.

After the organization of the Senate and after consultation and advice from the minority leader, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration may add members to or delete members from the standing committees. All conference committees of the Senate and members of commissions to be appointed by the Senate authorized by rule, statute, resolution or otherwise, shall be appointed by the Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration, unless otherwise provided, subject to confirmation by the Senate. In the appointment of members of conference committees between the two houses, the Subcommittee on Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate shall appoint those who are in accord with the position of the Senate, and whenever practical, give preference to authors of bills in dispute and to members of standing committees in which the bills were considered.

Standing committees

57. The standing committees of the Senate are as follows:

Agriculture and Rural Development Children, Families and Learning Commerce Crime Prevention Education Finance Election Laws Environment and Natural Resources Governmental Operations and Veterans Health and Family Security Human Resources Finance Jobs, Energy and Community Development Judiciary Local and Metropolitan Government Rules and Administration State Government Finance Taxes Transportation

The Committee on Rules and Administration may constitute a standing Subcommittee on Committees, the report of which within its jurisdiction has the effect of a report of the main Committee on Rules and Administration. The subcommittee shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a member of the minority group.

Each standing committee of the Senate, including a subcommittee or division of the committee, is authorized at any time to sit and act, to investigate and take testimony on any matter within its jurisdiction, to report hearings held by it, and to make expenditures as authorized from time to time by the standing Committee on Rules and Administration. A standing committee, but not a subcommittee or division, may require by subpoena or otherwise the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the production of correspondence, books, papers, and documents, in the manner provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 3.153.

Committee meetings

58. All meetings of the Senate, its committees, committee divisions, and subcommittees are open to the public. A meeting of a caucus of the members of any of those bodies from the same political party need not be open to the public. A caucus of the Hennepin county, Ramsey county, or St. Louis county delegation is open to the public. For purposes of this rule, a meeting occurs when a quorum is present and action is taken regarding a matter within the jurisdiction of the body.

To the extent practical, meetings of all committees, subcommittees, and divisions shall be announced to the public at least three calendar days prior to convening. The notice shall state the name of the committee, subcommittee, or division, the bill or bills to be considered, the place and time of meeting.

The notice shall be posted on all Senate bulletin boards in the Capitol and the State Office Building. A notice shall be sent to the House of Representatives for posting as it deems necessary. If the three-day notice requirement cannot be met, known proponents and opponents of the bill shall be given simultaneous notice of the meeting as soon as practicable.

A Senate committee, subcommittee, or division shall adjourn no later than 11:00 p.m. each day, unless two-thirds of the members present vote to suspend this requirement.

Quorum in committee

59. A majority of its members constitutes a quorum of a committee, subcommittee, or division.

Report of vote in committee

60. Upon the request of a member of a committee, subcommittee, or division to which a bill has been referred, or upon the request of the author of the bill, a record shall be made of the vote on the bill in the committee, subcommittee, or division, including the vote on any amendment or proposed amendment to it, in the committee, subcommittee, or division to which the bill was referred.

Upon request of three members of the committee before the vote is taken, the record of a roll call vote in a standing committee shall accompany the committee report and be printed in the Journal.

Committee action

61. No report of any committee shall be made to the Senate unless it reports action taken at a regular or special meeting of the committee. A report in violation of this rule is out of order.

Employees authorized in the Senate

62. The Committee on Rules and Administration shall establish positions, set compensation, appoint employees, and authorize expense reimbursement for employees as it deems proper to carry out the work of the Senate. At the request of any committee member, an action of the committee shall be submitted as a Senate resolution for adoption by the Senate. A roster of all employees of the Senate, including positions and compensation, shall be kept by the Secretary and shall be open for inspection by the public. The Secretary shall post, in a public place in the Capitol, a notice of every vacant position on the permanent staff of the Senate. The notice must remain posted for at least two weeks, and no vacancy may be filled until the period of posting has elapsed.

Budget and expenditures

63. The Committee on Rules and Administration shall adopt an operating budget for the Senate.

All propositions for the appointment and payment of employees of the Senate or for expenditures on account of the Legislature, other than those provided by law, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration without debate.

Authority over employees

64. Except as otherwise provided in these rules, the Committee on Rules and Administration has full and exclusive authority over, and charge of all employees, officers and clerks of the Senate both elective and appointive. The committee has the sole and exclusive power and authority to assign them to duties other than for which they were elected or appointed as the committee may from time to time provide. The committee may make rules and regulations for the government of the employees, officers and clerks as they see fit. In case of violation of an order of the committee by an employee, officer or clerk, or in case of a violation of a rule or regulation made by the committee, or in case of misconduct or omission by an employee, officer or clerk, the Committee on Rules and Administration may hear complaints and discharge the employee, officer or clerk or impose other punches and Administration employee.

Duties of Secretary

65. The Secretary shall keep a correct Journal of the proceedings of the Senate and shall perform other duties assigned to the Secretary. The Secretary shall not permit Journal records, accounts or papers to be taken from the table or out of the Secretary's custody, other than in the regular mode of business. If a paper in the Secretary's charge is missing, the Secretary shall report the fact to the President, so that inquiry may be made. The Secretary shall superintend the recording of proceedings in the Journal, the engrossing, transcribing and copying of the bills and resolutions, supervise the assistants, clerks and stenographers under the direction of the Committee on Rules and Administration, and generally perform the duties of Secretary, under direction of the President. The Secretary shall keep a record of all Senate and House bills showing the state, condition, and progress of each bill pending, until its final passage.

The Secretary shall cause to be recorded on magnetic tape the proceedings of the Senate, the Committee of the Whole, and each standing committee, subcommittee, and division. Each tape shall be clearly labeled to show the name of the body whose proceedings are recorded and the dates the proceedings occurred. Each tape of the proceedings of the Senate and the Committee of the Whole shall be accompanied by a log showing the number of each bill considered and the places on the tape where consideration of the bill occurred. Within two working days after each day the Senate is in session the Secretary shall make a copy of the tape and corresponding log of proceedings of the Senate and the Committee of the Whole and deliver the copies to the Legislative Reference Library. Within one week after each meeting of a standing committee, subcommittee, or division, the Secretary shall deliver a tape recording of the meeting to the Legislative Reference Library, together with an agenda showing bills considered and any action taken on them. Upon completion and approval of the minutes of the meeting, a copy of the minutes shall be promptly delivered to the Legislative Reference

Library. The Secretary shall keep a record of each session of the Senate and the Committee of the Whole, each meeting of a Senate standing committee, subcommittee, or division and the date on which a tape recording of the session or meeting was transmitted to the Legislative Reference Library. The Library shall keep a similar record of all tapes received. The Library shall provide committee staff with reasonable access to Senate tapes and shall provide the public with convenient facilities to listen to the tapes. Copies of Senate tapes shall be available to the public from the Secretary, for a fee determined by the Secretary to be adequate to cover the cost of preparing the copies. A copy shall be provided free to a member of the Senate upon request for use in legislative business. The original tape and log of each session of the Senate and the Committee of the Whole shall be kept by the Secretary until the end of the period for which the members of the existing House of Representatives have been elected, at which time the tape may be preserved or disposed of as the Secretary sees fit. Tapes, logs, and minutes forwarded to the Legislative Reference Library shall be kept by the preserved or disposed of as the Library sees fit. It is the intention that testimony and discussion preserved under this rule not be admissible in any court or administrative proceeding on an issue of legislative intent.

Journal-how approved

66. The Journal of each day's proceedings is open for correction at any time during the session of the next day the Senate meets. Unless corrected on that day, the Journal stands approved.

Secretary may correct errors

67. The Secretary of the Senate and Engrossing Secretary, in all proper cases, shall correct all mistakes in numbering the sections and reference to them, whether the errors occur in the original bill or are caused by amendments to it.

Purchasing supplies and services

68. The Secretary is the agent of the Senate for the purchase of supplies and services. The Secretary's records on purchase of supplies and services are open for inspection during normal business hours. The Secretary shall adopt administrative controls to ensure that each member is accountable for the member's own long distance telephone calls and that Senate telephones are used only for Senate business.

By the 15th day of April, July, October, and January of each year, the Secretary of the Senate shall submit a detailed report of Senate expenditures during the previous quarter to the Committee on Rules and Administration.

Duties of the Sergeant at Arms

69. The Sergeant at Arms shall execute all orders of the President and perform all assigned duties connected with the police and good order of the Senate Chamber; exercise supervision over the entry and exit of all persons to and from the Chamber; see that messages are promptly delivered; see that the hall is properly ventilated and the temperature properly regulated, and that it is open for the use of members of the Senate at the time fixed; and perform all other services pertaining to the office of Sergeant.

Persons privileged to the floor of the Senate

70. No person shall be admitted within the Senate Chamber, but a member, an officer, the constitutional officers, ex-Governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the House, judges of the trial and appellate courts and members of Congress. Those who have been members of Congress or of the state Legislature who are not interested in any claim or directly in a bill pending before the Legislature may be personally admitted by a member of the Senate. An employee of either house may be admitted at the request of a member or an officer of the Senate. The head of a department of state government may be admitted by the President. When a member-elect is sworn in, the member-elect may request that one guest be admitted. When the Senate is not meeting, a person not a member may be admitted to the floor at the request of a member or officer. No public hearings shall be held in the Senate Chamber. The retiring room of the Senate is nesterved for the exclusive use of the members of the Senate at all times. The Sergeant at Arms shall strictly enforce this rule.

Privilege of reporters

71. Provision shall be made for news reporters on the Senate floor in limited numbers, and in the Senate gallery. Because of limited space on the floor, permanent space is limited to those news agencies which have regularly covered the legislature, namely: The Associated Press, St. Paul Pioneer Press, Star Tribune, Duluth News-Tribune, Fargo Forum, Rochester Post-Bulletin, St. Cloud Daily Times, WCCO radio, KSTP radio, and Minnesota Public Radio. An additional two spaces shall be provided to other reporters if space is available.

One person from each named agency and one person from the Senate Publications Office may be present at the press table on the Senate floor at any one time.

Other news media personnel may occupy seats provided in the Senate gallery.

The Committee on Rules and Administration may, through committee action or by delegating authority to the Secretary, allow television filming on the Senate floor on certain occasions.

The Secretary of the Senate shall compile and distribute to the public a directory of reporters accredited to report from the Senate floor. The directory must include each reporter's picture and news organization and a brief biography. The Secretary must issue each accredited reporter an identification badge showing the reporter's name and news organization.

Disorderly conduct

72. In case of a disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobbies or galleries, the President may order them cleared. Picture taking by persons other than accredited news reporters, picture taking with floodlights or flash units, hand clapping, demonstrations, and food and beverages, are prohibited in the Senate Chamber and in the galleries.

Introduction of visitors

73. No introduction of a visitor or visitors in the galleries shall be made from the floor or rostrum of the Senate.

Smoking

74. No person is permitted to smoke in the Senate Chamber, Retiring Room, hearing rooms, or other spaces under the control of the Senate. There shall be no smoking in the visitors section of the galleries.

Ethical conduct

75. The Subcommittee on Committees shall appoint a Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct of the Committee on Rules and Administration consisting of four members, two from the majority and two from the minority.

The subcommittee shall serve in an advisory capacity to a member or employee upon written request and shall issue recommendations to the member or employee.

The subcommittee shall investigate a complaint by a member of the Senate in writing under oath received during a legislative session regarding improper conduct by a member or employee of the Senate. Improper conduct includes conduct that violated a rule or administrative policy of the Senate, that violated accepted norms of Senate behavior, that betrayed the public trust, or that tended to bring the Senate into dishonor or disrepute.

Within 30 days after receiving a complaint, the subcommittee must meet and either make a finding of no probable cause, vote to defer action until a certain time, or proceed with its investigation. If criminal proceedings relating to the same conduct have begun, the subcommittee may defer its own proceedings until the criminal proceedings have been completed.

The subcommittee has the powers of a standing committee to issue subpoenas pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 3.153. In order to determine whether there is probable cause to believe that improper conduct has occurred, the subcommittee may, by a vote of three of its members, conduct a preliminary inquiry in executive session to which the requirements of Rule 58 do not apply. The executive session may be ordered by a vote of three of its members whenever the subcommittee determines that matters relating to probable cause. Upon a finding of probable cause are likely to be discussed. The executive session must be limited to matters relating to probable cause. Upon a finding of probable cause, further proceedings on the complaint are open to the public. To minimize disruption of its public proceedings, the subcommittee may require that television coverage be pooled or be provided by Senate media services.

The subcommittee may appoint special counsel to provide expert advice on how to conduct its proceedings. The subcommittee may appoint a suitable person to conduct the investigation and report findings of fact and recommendations for action to the subcommittee. If, after investigation, the subcommittee finds the complaint substantiated by the evidence, it shall recommend to the Committee on Rules and Administration appropriate disciplinary action.

Members shall adhere to the highest standard of ethical conduct as embodied in the Minnesota Constitution, state law, and these rules. A member shall not publish or distribute written material if the member knows or has reason to know that the material includes any statement that is false or clearly misleading, concerning a public policy issue or concerning the member's or another member's voting record or position on a public policy issue.

Lobbyists

76. A lobbyist shall not appear before a Senate committee pursuant to the lobbyist's employment unless the lobbyist is in compliance with the law requiring lobbyist registration, Minnesota Statutes, sections 10A.03 to 10A.06. A lobbyist, when appearing before a committee, shall disclose to the committee those in whose interest the lobbyist speaks and the purpose of the lobbyist's appearance. A lobbyist shall not knowingly furnish false or misleading information or make a false or misleading statement that is relevant and material to a matter before the Senate or any of its committees when the lobbyist knows or should know it will influence the judgment or action of the Senate or any of its committees thereon.

The Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct shall investigate a complaint by a member of the Senate in writing under oath received during a legislative session regarding improper conduct by a lobbyist. Improper conduct includes conduct that violated a rule or administrative policy of the Senate, that violated accepted norms of Senate behavior, that betrayed the public trust, or that tended to bring the Senate into dishonor or disrepute. The investigatory procedures of Rule 75 apply.

Open meeting complaints

77. Any person may submit to the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration a complaint that members have violated the open meeting requirements of Minnesota Statutes, section 3.055. A member of the Senate may submit the complaint either orally or in writing; others must submit the complaint in writing. Whether the complaint was written or oral, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration shall immediately forward it in writing to the Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct without disclosing the identity of the complainant. The complaint must not be further disclosed without the consent of the complainant, except to the members against whom the complaint was made, unless the complaint was made by a member of the Senate in writing under oath, in which case the investigatory procedures of Rule 75 apply.

1997 PERMANENT RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

ARTICLE I - DAILY BUSINESS

1.01 CONVENING OF THE HOUSE.

Unless otherwise ordered, regular sessions of the House shall convene at two-thirty p.m. The Speaker shall take the chair at the hour at which the House convenes and the House shall then be called to order. A prayer shall be said by the Chaplain or time allowed for a brief meditation. Then, on the first legislative day in any calendar week, it shall be followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag

of the United States of America. Then a roll of members shall be called and the names of members present and members excused shall be entered in the Journal of the House.

1.02 READING OF THE JOURNAL.

A quorum being present, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Chief Clerk unless otherwise ordered. The House may correct any errors in the Journal of the preceding day.

1.03 ORDER OF BUSINESS.

After the reading of the Journal, the order of business of the day shall be:

- (1) Presentation of petitions or other communications.
- (2) Reports of standing committees.
- (3) Second reading of House bills.
- (4) Second reading of Senate bills.
- (5) Reports of select committees.
- (6) Introduction and first reading of House bills.
- (7) Consideration of messages from the Senate.

(8) First reading of Senate bills.

- (9) Consent Calendar.
- (10) Calendar for the day.
- (11) General Orders.
- (12) Motions and resolutions.

Conference committees on House bills and the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration may report at any time except when the House is in the Committee of the Whole.

1.04 SECOND READING OF BILLS.

Every bill shall require a second reading.

Except as otherwise ordered, every bill requiring the approval of the Governor shall, after a second reading, be considered in a Committee of the Whole before it shall be finally acted upon by the House.

1.05 COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

The Committee of the Whole is a committee of the entire membership of the House. The Speaker may appoint another member as chair to preside over the Committee of the Whole.

When the House arrives at the General Orders of the Day, it shall resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider bills on General Orders.

A bill considered in the Committee of the Whole shall be reported and then debated by sections, with the title considered last. All amendments shall be typewritten and five copies shall be submitted to the Chair who shall report them to the House.

1.06 RULES TO APPLY TO COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

The Rules of the House shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as may be applicable except that the previous question shall not be forced or speaking limited.

Upon demand of 15 members, the yeas and nays shall be called, the question voted on, and the yeas and nays recorded in the Journal of the House.

In the Committee of the Whole no amendment increasing the amount of any appropriation shall be passed without the yeas and nays recorded in the Journal of the House.

A motion that the Committee arise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

1.07 GENERAL ORDERS OF THE DAY.

The Chief Clerk at the direction of the Speaker shall prepare the General Orders of the Day, which is a list of all bills which have not been made Special Orders or placed on the Consent Calendar, numbered according to their order at second reading. Unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the Committee, items on General Orders shall be taken up in numerical order.

The Chief Clerk shall see that a copy of each bill printed under the Rules or Orders of the House is placed in each member's file, which is to be kept at the member's desk in the chamber, at least 24 hours before the bill shall be considered in the Committee of the Whole.

If a bill is progressed three times it shall be placed at the end of General Orders.

Except during the last five days in any year on which a bill may be passed, a bill amended in the Committee of the Whole shall not be given its third reading until it is engrossed and reproduced as amended.

1.08 THIRD READING OF BILLS.

No amendment shall be received after the third reading without the unanimous consent of the House, except to fill blanks or to amend titles.

At any time prior to its passage any bill or resolution may be referred or re-referred by a majority vote of the whole House. If the committee, other than the Committee of the Whole, to which it was referred or re-referred reports an amendment on it, it shall again be given its second reading, considered in Committee of the Whole, given its third reading and placed upon its final passage.

1.09 SPECIAL ORDERS.

A bill may be made the Order of the Day for a special time and be placed upon a separate list known as "Special Orders."

The Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration may by committee report designate as a Special Order any bill which has had its second reading.

Any member may move to make a bill a Special Order by giving notice at least two legislative days in advance of and specifying the day on which the member will so move. The notice shall include the number and title of the bill and the day and time certain for the Special Order. Only the member giving such notice, or another member designated in writing by the member who originally gave notice of the Special Order to the Speaker, may make the motion for the Special Order. A two-thirds vote of the whole House on such motion is required to make a bill a Special Order.

The time set for the motion may not be extended, and failure to make the motion on the specified day forfeits the right to make the motion.

A motion to make a bill a Special Order, when made according to the procedures herein prescribed, shall be a privileged motion, shall take precedence over all other motions except a motion to adjourn or to set the time to adjourn and questions of personal privilege, and may be made at any time on the day designated in the notice. A three-fourths vote of the whole House is required to suspend the motion.

Any Special Order, or any part of it, may be continued or postponed by two-thirds vote of the whole House at the time of such Special Order; however, a Special Order designated by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration may be continued or postponed by a majority vote of the whole House at the time of such Special Order. If a bill on Special Orders has been continued three times by the author or coauthor a motion for continuance shall not be in order and the bill shall be returned to General Orders.

When the time arrives for the consideration of any Special Order, the House shall consider each bill upon the Special Order in the order in which it is listed. After consideration it shall immediately be read the third time and placed upon final passage.

1.10 FINANCE AND REVENUE BILLS GIVEN PRECEDENCE.

Any bill relating to taxes or raising revenue and any finance bill, which has had its second reading, shall be acted upon whenever requested by the Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means or by a designee of the Chair or, for any bill relating to taxes or raising revenue, by the Chair of the Committee on Taxes or a designee of the Chair.

1.11 CONSENT CALENDAR.

Any bill of a non-controversial nature for which the committee report recommends placement upon the Consent Calendar shall be given its second reading after the report is adopted and placed upon the Consent Calendar. The bill shall be printed and placed in the members' files at least one day before it can be considered. The bill shall be placed upon the Consent Calendar in the order in which it is given its second reading.

The Consent Calendar shall immediately precede the order of business known as "Calendar for the Day." Every bill on the Consent Calendar shall be debated, given its third reading and voted upon, provided, however, that at any time prior to third reading, ten members may object to any bill as being controversial. Any bill so objected to shall be stricken from the Consent Calendar and be immediately placed upon General Orders, taking its place in the usual order.

1.12 SUSPENSION OF RULES TO ADVANCE A BILL.

Every bill shall be reported on three different days, except that in case of urgency, a two-thirds majority of the whole House may suspend this Rule. A motion for suspension of the Rules to advance a bill for consideration out of its regular order is in order under the order of business "Motions and Resolutions" or at any time the bill is before the House. The motion must be presented to the Speaker in writing and must state the present position of the bill.

1.13 MINORITY REPORTS.

Any minority report shall be made separately from the majority report and shall be considered before the majority report. If the minority report is adopted the majority report shall not be considered. If the minority report is not adopted the majority report shall then be considered.

1.14 COMMITTEE REPORT LAID OVER.

The report of any committee may be laid over one day and printed in the Journal, if so ordered by the House.

1.15 RECALLING BILL FROM COMMITTEE OR DIVISION.

In regular session, except after the deadline for committee reports on bills originating in the House, any bill or resolution may be recalled from any committee or division at any time by majority vote of the whole House, be given a second reading and be advanced to General Orders. A motion to recall a bill or resolution shall be in order only under the order of business "Motions and Resolutions."

1.16 TIME LIMIT FOR CONSIDERATION OF BILLS.

If 20 legislative days after a bill has been referred to committee or division (other than a bill in the Committee on Ways and Means, the Committee on Taxes or a division of the Committee on Taxes, a finance committee, or a finance division of a standing committee) no report has been made upon it by the committee or division, its chief author may request that it be returned to the House and the request shall be entered in the Journal for the day. The committee or division shall have ten calendar days thereafter in which to vote upon the bill requested. If the committee or division fails to vote upon it within the ten days, the chief author may, at any time within five calendar days thereafter, present a written demand to the Speaker for its immediate return to the House. The demand shall be entered in the Journal of that day and shall constitute the demand of the House. The bill shall then be considered to be in the possession

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of the House, given its second reading and placed at the end of General Orders.

The bill is subject to re-reference by a majority vote of the whole House. If the motion to re-refer is made on the day of the demand or within one legislative day thereafter, the motion shall take precedence over all other motions except privileged motions and shall be in order at any time.

1.17 DISPOSITION OF SENATE BILLS.

Any Senate File received by the House, accompanied by a message announcing its passage by the Senate, shall be referred to the appropriate standing committee in accordance with Rule 5.05. However, if a Senate File is received which is stated by a member to be identical to a House File already reported by a standing committee of the House and placed on General Orders, Calendar, Consent Calendar, or Special Orders, the Senate File shall be referred to the Chief Clerk for comparison. If the Chief Clerk reports that the Senate File is identical with the House File, the Senate File may by majority vote be substituted for the House File and take its place. The fact that the bills are identical shall be entered in the Journal and the House File is then considered withdrawn.

Any Senate File which has been amended on the floor of the House, except at time of final passage, and any Senate File which has been reported to the House with amendments by a House standing committee, shall be unofficially engrossed and reprinted by the Chief Clerk. Amendments to unofficial engrossments of a Senate File may be offered.

1.18 RECORDED FLOOR PROCEEDINGS.

All proceedings on the floor of the House shall be recorded on magnetic tape or similar recording device under the direction of the Chief Clerk. All taped proceedings of the House floor sessions shall be delivered to the Director of the Legislative Reference Library and there maintained on file for use by any member of the public in accordance with the rules of the Legislative Reference Library. Tapes delivered to the Legislative Reference Library shall be kept by the library for eight years after which they shall be delivered to the Director of the Minnesota Historical Society.

Any person may obtain a copy of any such tape during the biennium in which it is recorded upon payment of a fee determined by the Chief Clerk to be adequate to cover the cost of preparing the copy.

Discussion preserved under this rule is not intended to be admissible in any court or administrative proceeding on an issue of legislative intent.

1.19 QUESTION SESSIONS.

The House, by resolution, may reserve time at occasions during the legislative session for the Governor to appear to answer questions from House members. Before each question session, the House shall notify the Governor of issues to be covered at that session. The Governor may bring staff to a question session to assist in answering questions.

ARTICLE II - VOTING

2.01 AUTHORIZING ELECTRIC VOTING SYSTEM.

Except for a vote upon elections, any vote may be taken by means of the electric voting system which shall be under the control of the Speaker of the House. No member may vote on a question except at the member's own seat in the chamber.

2.02 CALL OF THE HOUSE.

Ten members may demand a call of the House at any time except after voting has commenced. When such call is demanded, the doors shall be closed, the roll shall be called, the absent members shall be sent for, and no member may be permitted to leave until the roll call is suspended or completed. During the roll call, no motion shall be in order except a motion pertaining to matters incidental to the call. Proceedings under the roll call may be suspended by a majority vote of the whole House. After the roll call is suspended or completed the Sergeant at Arms shall no permit any member to leave the Chamber unless excused by the Speaker. A call of the House may be lifted by a majority vote of the whole House.

2.03 DEMANDING YEAS AND NAYS.

Yeas and nays shall be ordered without demand upon final passage of bills and upon adoption of resolutions or motions directing the payment of money. In all other cases the yeas and nays shall be ordered only upon demand of 15 members.

2.04 EXPLAINING OR CHANGING VOTE.

No member shall be allowed to explain a vote or discuss the question while the yeas and nays are being taken, nor be allowed to change a vote after the yeas and nays have been announced from the chair by the Speaker.

2.05 EVERY UNEXCUSED MEMBER TO VOTE.

Any member who is immediately interested in the question being voted on shall not vote.

Every other member present before a vote is declared from the chair shall vote for or against the matter before the House, unless the House excuses the member from voting. However, no member is required to vote on any matter concerning a resolution except for a resolution relating to the internal business of the House or the Legislature.

A member who declines to vote on a call of the member's name shall be required to state reasons for so declining. After the vote has been taken but before the chair has announced the vote, the chair shall submit to the House the question, "Shall the member, for the reasons stated, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate. Any other proceedings in reference thereto shall take place after announcement of the vote.

ARTICLE III - MOTIONS AND AMENDMENTS

3.01 AMENDMENTS AND OTHER MOTIONS.

No amendment or other motion shall be debated until after it is stated by the Speaker.

After an amendment or other motion has been stated by the Speaker it is in possession of the House, but the mover may withdraw it at any time before amendment or decision. Unless a motion, resolution or amendment is withdrawn on the day it is made, it shall be entered in the Journal, together with the name of the member offering it.

The Speaker may require any amendment or other motion be typewritten and that five copies be given to the Chief Clerk.

3.02 PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received except the following, the first four of which shall be decided without debate:

(1) To fix the time of adjournment.

(2) To adjourn.

(3) To lay on the table.

(4) For the previous question.

(5) To refer.

(6) To postpone to a day certain.

(7) To amend.

(8) To postpone indefinitely.

(9) To pass.

The motions shall have precedence in the order listed. However, if the motion for the previous question has been seconded and the main question ordered, the motion to lay on the table shall not be in order.

3.03 MOTION TO ADJOURN.

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except during roll call.

When a motion to adjourn is made it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state reasons which would seem to render adjournment improper at that time. Such a statement shall not be debatable and shall be limited to not over two minutes.

3.04 MOTION FOR RECONSIDERATION.

When a question has been decided either in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move its reconsideration, provided that the motion is made either on the same day the vote was taken or within the following two days of actual session of the House. A motion for reconsideration can be made at any time in the Order of Business and shall take precedence over all other questions except the motion to adjourn and the notice of intention to move reconsideration. The motion ro notice shall not be in order if the document, bill, resolution, message, report or other official action on which the vote was taken has left the possession of the House.

When a member gives notice of intention to move reconsideration of the final action of the House on any bill, resolution, message, report or other official action, the Chief Clerk shall retain the same until after the matter is disposed of or the time has expired during which the motion for reconsideration can be made. Notice of intention to move reconsideration is subject to the deadline in Rule 9.03.

On the last day allowed for the motion to reconsider, it shall be in order for any member who voted on the prevailing side to make the motion, unless the matter has been already disposed of.

A motion for reconsideration having been voted upon and lost shall not be renewed.

3.05 ORDER OF PUTTING QUESTION.

Except in the case of privileged questions, all questions, whether in committee or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved. When filling blanks, a motion for the largest sum or the longest time shall be put first.

3.06 DIVISION OF A QUESTION.

Any member may request the division of a question which contains several separate and distinct points. A motion to strike out and insert shall not be divisible. If a motion to strike out is lost it shall not preclude another motion to amend or to strike out and insert.

3.07 THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

The motion calling for the previous question must be seconded by 15 members. If the motion for the previous question is ordered by a majority of members present, it shall have the effect of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to direct vote upon the question or questions.

The previous question may be moved and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the Rules, or an amendment or amendments; or it may include all authorized motions or amendments, including a vote on final passage of a bill.

On a motion for the previous question, but prior to its being ordered, a call of the House shall be in order. After a majority has ordered the previous question, no call shall be in order prior to the decision on the main question.

When the previous question is decided in the negative, the main question remains under debate until disposed of by taking a vote either on the question or in some other manner.

All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question and prior to the vote on the main question shall be decided without debate.

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3.08 AMENDMENTS TO AMENDMENTS.

An amendment may be amended, but an amendment to an amendment may not be amended.

3.09 MOTIONS AND PROPOSITIONS TO BE GERMANE.

No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under guise of its being an amendment.

3.10 AMENDMENT NOT TO ANNEX ANOTHER BILL.

Except in a standing committee no bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing or incorporating any other bill or resolution.

3.11 RESOLUTIONS AND MOTIONS INVOLVING EXPENDITURE OF MONEY.

Any resolution or motion involving the expenditure of money out of the legislative expense fund shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration before being acted upon by the House. A majority vote of the whole House, determined by a roll call, is required to pass any such resolution or motion.

3.12 AMENDMENTS TO APPROPRIATION AND TAX BILLS.

No amendment increasing an appropriation and no amendment increasing a tax shall be declared passed until voted for by a majority of the whole House determined by a roll call vote.

3.13 MOTION TO LAY ON THE TABLE.

A motion to lay on the table shall not be in order on a motion to amend, except that a motion to amend the Rules may be tabled.

3.14 MOTION TO RESCIND.

The motion to rescind shall not be in order at any time in any proceeding in the House or in any committee of the House.

3.15 SUSPENSION OR AMENDMENT OF THE RULES.

The concurrence of two-thirds of the whole House is required to suspend, alter, or amend any Rule of the House, except that any amendment to the Rules reported by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration may be adopted by a majority of the whole House.

Except as provided in Rule 1.12, a motion to suspend, alter, or amend any Rule of the House must be made under the order of business "Motions and Resolutions." If the motion is made at any other time, unanimous consent is required before the Speaker can entertain the motion.

A motion to suspend the Rules, together with the subject matter to which it pertains, is debatable, but the previous question may be applied to the motion.

ARTICLE IV - DEBATE AND DECORUM

4.01 ABSENCE OF MEMBERS AND OFFICERS.

Unless illness or other sufficient cause prevents attendance, no member or officer of the House shall be absent from any session of the House without first having obtained from the Speaker permission to be absent.

4.02 DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

Members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces adjournment.

Every member, before speaking, shall rise and respectfully address the Speaker and shall not speak further until recognized by the Speaker. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall designate the member to speak first.

4.03 QUESTIONS OF ORDER.

If any member of the House transgresses the Rules, either in speaking or in any other way, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call the member to order. A member so called to order shall immediately sit down unless another member moves to permit the member who was called to order to explain. In either case, the House, if appealed to, shall decide without debate. Only if the decision is in favor of the member called to order shall that member be at liberty to proceed. A member called to order shall be liable to censure or such other punishment as the House may deem proper.

4.04 ORDER IN DEBATE.

No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every other member wishing to speak on the pending question has had an opportunity to do so.

4.05 NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DEBATE A RESOLUTION.

Any member may give notice of intention to debate a resolution, except one introduced as a house file or a senate file under Rule 5.02 or one offered by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration or the Committee on Ethics. The notice may be given at any time before the vote is taken on the resolution. If the notice is given, the resolution shall be laid over one day without debate or any other action.

4.06 OFFENSIVE WORDS IN DEBATE.

If any member is called to order for offensive words in debate, the member calling for order shall report the words to which exception is taken and the Clerk shall record them. No member shall be held to answer or be subject to censure of the House for any language used in debate if exception is not taken before any other member has spoken or any other business has taken place.

4.07 ORDER DURING SESSION.

No member shall walk out of or across the Chamber when the Speaker is putting the question. No member shall engage in private conversation while another member is speaking or pass between the speaking member and the Chair.

4.08 NO ONE TO REMAIN BY THE CHIEF CLERK'S DESK.

No member or other person shall remain by the Chief Clerk's desk while the yeas and nays are being called.

4.09 WHO MAY BE ADMITTED TO THE FLOOR.

No person shall be admitted within the House Chamber, except members themselves, properly authorized employees, the Chief Executive and ex-governors of the State of Minnesota, members of the Senate, heads of departments of the state government, judges of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, and District Courts, members of Congress, properly accredited representatives of radio and television stations, newspapers and press associations, as herein provided for, and none other. When a former member of Congress or the Minnesota Legislature or any other person is issued a permit by the Speaker good for the day, that person shall be provided with a seat near the Speaker's rostrum, and at no time shall a conversation be carried on so as to disturb the business of the House. Before issuing the permit, the Speaker shall make certain that the person does not seek the floor of the House for the purpose of influencing decisions of the House.

The alcoves shall be kept for the use of members only, and the Sergeant at Arms shall keep them cleared.

It shall not be in order for the Speaker to entertain a request for the suspension of this Rule, or to present from the Chair the request of any member for unanimous consent unless an extraordinary condition exists, in which event the Speaker may consent to entertain a motion for its suspension.

During the period extending from one hour prior to the time the House is scheduled to convene until one hour after the House adjourns for the day, the retiring room shall be reserved for the exclusive use of the members and employees of the House. No committee meetings shall be held therein except for emergency meetings authorized by the Speaker of the House. The Sergeant at Arms is charged with the duty of strict enforcement of this provision.

4.10 PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS.

Any petition, memorial or other paper presented to the House shall include the name of the member introducing it and a brief description of its contents and shall be presented by the Speaker, who shall state briefly its contents.

4.11 NO SMOKING IN HOUSE CAPITOL AREA.

Smoking is prohibited in areas of the Capitol and State Office Building under the jurisdiction of the House of Representatives, including the House Chamber and Retiring Room and galleries, hearing rooms, minor corridors and offices, private offices, and lounges.

4.12 CODE OF CONDUCT.

The Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, upon recommendation from the Committee on Ethics, shall establish and maintain a code of conduct for members, officers and employees of the House.

ARTICLE V - BILLS

5.01 BILL AND RESOLUTION FORM.

No bill or resolution shall be introduced until it has been examined and approved by the Revisor of Statutes as to form and compliance with the Joint Rules of the House and Senate and the Rules of the House. Approval as to form shall be endorsed on the bill or resolution by the Revisor of Statutes. A bill that is divided into articles may include or be accompanied by a table of contents.

5.02 INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS.

A bill, advisory bill or resolution offered for introduction shall be placed in the hands of the Speaker at least 24 hours prior to the convening of the daily session. Every bill, advisory bill and resolution shall be introduced in quadruplicate and each copy shall contain the signature of the member or name of the committee introducing it. No bill, advisory bill, memorial or resolution shall have more than five authors. A statement of facts being forwarded for action to a governmental official, agency, or body or other similar proposal is a memorial and shall be introduced in the same form as a bill and take the same course as a bill. No resolution shall authorize the expenditure of monies from any source other than the legislative expense fund. Department and agency bills are subject to the deadlines in Rule9.03.

5.03 RECESS BILL INTRODUCTIONS.

During the period between the last day of the session in the odd-numbered year and the first day of the session in the following even-numbered year, any bill filed with the Speaker for introduction shall be given a file number and may be unofficially referred to an appropriate standing committee of the House of Representatives.

5.04 ADVISORY BILLS.

An advisory bill may be introduced by any member in the same manner as a bill except that the requirements of Rule 5.01 shall not apply.

Each advisory bill shall be typewritten on a form provided by the Chief Clerk. It shall have a title not exceeding 12 words in length and shall contain a specific proposal for the initiation, termination or alteration of a law or program of the state or any of its subdivisions. It need not be drafted in a form appropriate for enactment into law.

An advisory bill may be considered only in committee and shall not be given a second reading or be otherwise considered by the House, except that the committee may report its recommendation for re-referral to another committee.

5.05 FIRST READING AND REFERENCE OF BILLS.

Each bill, advisory bill and resolution shall be reported and given its first reading upon its introduction. No bill, advisory bill or resolution shall be objected to upon its introduction.

Except as provided in Rule 1.17 and Rule 5.06 each bill, advisory bill or resolution shall, after first reading, be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate standing committee or division thereof.

Congratulatory resolutions are exempt from this rule and may be adopted by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration without further consideration by the House.

Except as otherwise provided in these Rules, after a bill, advisory bill or resolution has been referred by the Speaker, a majority vote of the whole House shall be required for a re-referral of the bill, advisory bill or resolution by the House.

5.06 COMMITTEE BILLS.

A committee bill shall be read for the first time and may be referred by the Speaker to any standing committee. If it is not so referred, it shall be laid over one day. It shall then be read for the second time and placed upon General Orders, or, if recommended by the Committee, upon the Consent Calendar.

5.07 PRINTING OF BILLS.

Every bill shall be printed after it has been given its second reading. A bill may be printed at any other time a majority of the House so orders.

5.08 FINANCE AND REVENUE BILLS.

Any bill, whether originating in the House or Senate which directly and specifically affects any present or future financial obligation on the part of the State or which directly and specifically affects state revenues, after being reported to the House, shall be referred, or re-referred to the appropriate finance committee, standing committee with a finance division for consideration by the finance division, or the Committee on Taxes, for action. Once action has been taken by that committee, the bill shall be thereafter re-referred to the committee on Ways and Means. A bill, other than a major revenue or finance bill referred to in Rule 5.12, which carries an appropriation shall include an appropriation section. This rule does not apply to a bill recommended for passage by the Committee on Capital Investment under Rule 5.09.

5.09 BILLS AFFECTING DEBT.

The Committee on Capital Investment shall have jurisdiction over debt obligations issued by the State. A bill which authorizes the issuance of debt of the State shall be referred or re-referred to the Committee on Capital Investment.

The Chair of the Committee on Capital Investment shall assign to each finance committee or finance division of a standing committee the responsibility to develop a bill on state public debt within its jurisdiction. The bill shall be referred to the Committee on Capital Investment by Friday, March 6, 1998, for further disposition.

A bill recommended for passage by the Committee on Capital Investment shall be accompanied by a statement of its fiscal impact and shall be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means for review and action by that committee.

5.10 BILLS AFFECTING STATE GOVERNMENT POWERS AND STRUCTURE.

Any bill, whether originating in the House or the Senate, which creates or reestablishes any new department, agency, commission, board, task force, advisory committee or council, or bureau, or any other such entity, or which substantially changes or alters the organization of or delegates rulemaking authority to or exempts from rulemaking any department or agency thereof of state government, or substantially changes, alters, vests or divests official rights, powers, or duties of any official, department or agency of the state government or any institution under its control, after being reported to the House, shall be referred, or re-referred, as the case may be, to the Committee on Governmental Operations for action by that committee. Prior to the deadline set by Rule 9.03, any committee other than the Committee on Governmental Operations. After the deadline set by Rule 9.03, a report shall recommend re-referral to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

This rule does not apply to the major finance and revenue bills referred to in Rule 5.12. But, if those bills contain provisions that would create, abolish, or reestablish a department, agency, commission, board, task force, advisory committee or council, or other such entity, then the chair of the Committee on Taxes or the chair of the appropriate finance committee or standing committee with a finance division, must communicate the inclusion of the provision to the chair of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration prior to consideration of the floor.

All other bills in finance committees or referred out of finance divisions of standing committees and bills in the Committee on Taxes are also exempt from this rule except for bills to create, abolish, or reestablish a department, agency, commission, board, task force, advisory committee or council, or other such entity. Prior to the deadline set by Rule 9.03, those bills shall be re-referred to the

Committee on Governmental Operations. After that deadline, the bills shall be re-referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

5.11 BILLS AFFECTING TAXES.

Any bill whether originating in the House or Senate, which substantially affects state tax policy or the administration of state tax policy, after being reported to the House, shall be referred, or re-referred to the Committee on Taxes for action by that committee. Any standing committee other than the Committee on Taxes to which such a bill is referred shall, in its report, recommend re-referral to the Committee on Taxes.

5.12 WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE; RESOLUTION; EFFECT ON EXPENDITURES AND REVENUE BILLS.

The Committee on Ways and Means shall hold hearings as necessary to determine state expenditures and revenues for the coming fiscal biennium.

In regular session, not later than 15 days following the last available state general fund revenue and expenditure forecast for the coming fiscal biennium prepared during the session, the Committee on Ways and Means shall adopt a budget resolution. The budget resolution shall set the maximum limitation on expenditures and revenues for the coming fiscal biennium for the general fund and an amount to be set aside as a cashflow account. The limitation is effective, if adopted, unless the Committee on Ways and Means adopts a different limitation in a subsequent budget resolution that accounts for increases or decreases in general fund revenues and expenditures anticipated for the current fiscal biennium.

Upon adoption of the budget resolution, the Committee on Ways and Means shall reconcile finance and revenue bills and upon request shall certify to the House that such bills do not exceed the limitation specified in the budget resolution.

A bill described in Rule 5.08 other than a major revenue or finance bill shall not be given its second reading until each major finance and revenue bill has received its second reading. However, a bill other than a major finance or revenue bill may be given its second reading after the House has received from the Committee on Ways and Means a statement certifying that the fiscal impact of the bill is or will be reconciled and within the guidelines of the budget resolution. All statements and certifications required by this rule may be reported orally by the Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means or a designee of the Chair. Major finance and revenue bills are: the higher education finance bill; the K-12 education finance bill; the family and early childhood education finance bill; the environment, natural resources and agriculture finance bill; the transportation and transit finance bill; the judiciary finance bill; the omnibus tax bill.

Each finance committee, finance division of a standing committee, the Committee on Capital Investment, or the Committee on Taxes, upon recommending passage of any bill described in Rule 5.08, shall provide to the Committee on Ways and Means a fiscal statement on the bill.

5.13 BILLS PROPOSING MEMORIALS.

Any bill or amendment that proposes to have a memorial erected in the Capitol area shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

5.14 BILLS PROPOSING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

Any bill, whether originating in the House or Senate, which proposes a constitutional amendment, after being reported to the House, shall be referred, or re-referred, as the case may be, to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration for action by that committee. Any committee, other than the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, to which such bill has been referred, shall, in its report, recommend re-referral to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

ARTICLE VI COMMITTEES POWERS AND DUTIES

6.01 COMMITTEES.

Standing committees of the House shall be appointed by the Speaker as follows: Agriculture Capital Investment Commerce, Tourism and Consumer Affairs Economic Development and International Trade Divisions: Economic Development Finance Housing and Housing Finance Education Divisions: Family and Early Childhood Education Finance Higher Education Finance K-12 Education Finance Environment and Natural Resources Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture Finance Financial Institutions and Insurance General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Elections

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Governmental Operations Division: State Government Finance Health and Human Services Divisions: Health and Human Services Finance Judiciary Divisions: Civil and Family Law Judiciary Finance Labor-Management Relations Local Government and Metropolitan Affairs Regulated Industries and Energy Rules and Legislative Administration Taxes Divisions: Property Tax and Tax Increment Finance Sales and Income Tax Transportation and Transit Division: Transportation and Transit Finance Ways and Means

6.02 COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP.

No less than 30 days prior to the opening of a regular session of the Legislature, the Speaker-designate shall provide the minority group with a list of the standing committees proposed for the session. The Speaker-designate shall also designate the number of minority members to be appointed to each committee and may require general membership guidelines to be followed in the selection of committee members.

If the minority leader submits to the Speaker-designate, at least 15 days prior to the opening of the session, a list of proposed committee assignments for the minority group, which complies with the numbers and guidelines provided, the Speaker shall make such proposed assignments with the purpose of attaining proportionate representation on the committees for the minority group.

No committee of the House shall have exclusive membership from any one profession, occupation or vocation.

A member may not serve as the chair of the same standing committee, or a standing committee with substantially the same jurisdiction, during more than three consecutive regular biennial sessions. Service as the chair before the 79th legislature does not count in applying this limitation. Service during a biennial session for less than three months does not count in applying this limitation. This rule does not apply to service as chair of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration or the Committee on Ways and Means.

6.03 COMMITTEE MEETING SCHEDULE.

The Speaker shall prepare a schedule of committee meetings, fixing as far as practicable the day of the week and the hour for the regular meeting time of each committee. The schedule of committee meetings shall officially be made available to the news media. The chair of any committee holding a special meeting or making a change in the regular schedule of meetings shall give written notice which may be announced from the desk and shall be posted on the bulletin board at least one day in advance of the change. The chair of each committee, division, or subcommittee shall as far as practicable give three days notice of any meeting. The notice shall include the date, time, place and agenda for the meeting.

No committee may meet between 12:00 midnight and 7:00 in the morning.

6.04 COMMITTEE PROCEDURES.

Meetings of all committees of the House shall be open to the public except for any executive sessions which the committee on ethics deems necessary under Rule 6.10. For purposes of this requirement, a meeting occurs when a quorum is present and action is taken regarding a matter within the jurisdiction of the committee, except that this requirement does not apply to a meeting of a caucus of members of a committee from the same political party.

A majority of members of any committee shall constitute a quorum.

The Rules of the House shall be observed in all committees wherever they are applicable.

Any member of any committee may demand a roll call on any bill, resolution, report, motion or amendment before the committee. Only upon such demand being made shall the roll be called and the vote of each member on the bill, resolution, report, motion or amendment be recorded in the committee minutes, together with the name of the member demanding the roll call.

A committee may reconsider any action so long as the matter remains in the possession of the committee.

A committee member need not have voted with the prevailing side in order to move reconsideration.

6.05 SUBCOMMITTEES.

The chair of a committee shall appoint the chair and members of each subcommittee with the advice and consent of the Speaker. The chair or the committee may refer bills to subcommittee. Any subcommittee may make such investigation or exercise such authority as is delegated to it by the chair or the committee.

6.06 COMMITTEE RECORDS.

The chair of a standing committee shall cause a record to be kept, in the form prescribed by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, which shall include the record of each bill referred to the committee and the minutes of the committee. The minutes shall include:

a. The time and place of each hearing or meeting of the committee;

b. Committee members present;

c. The name and address of each person appearing before the committee, together with the name and address of the person,

association, firm or corporation in whose behalf the appearance is made;

d. The language of each motion, the name of the committee member making the motion, and the result of any vote taken upon the motion, including the yeas and nays whenever a roll call is demanded;

e. The date on which any subcommittee is created, the names of its members and the bills referred to it;

f. The record of each subcommittee meeting, including the time and place of the meeting; members present; the name of each person appearing before the subcommittee, together with the name of the person, association, firm or corporation in whose behalf the appearance is made; and the language of each motion, together with the name of the member making the motion, and the result of any vote taken upon the motion, including the yeas and nays whenever a roll call is demanded;

g. Other important matters related to the work of the committee.

The minutes shall be approved at the next regular meeting of the committee.

Copies of the minutes, after approval by the committee, shall be filed with the Chief Clerk and shall be open to public inspection in the Chief Clerk's office. At the end of the biennium they shall be delivered, together with the other committee records, to the Director of the Legislative Reference Library, where they shall remain open for public inspection during regular office hours. A copy of any page of any committee minutes may be obtained upon payment of a fee determined by the Chief Clerk to be adequate to cover the cost of preparing the copy.

The magnetic tape recording of any committee meetings shall be retained by the chair until the minutes of that meeting have been approved by the committee. The recording shall then be filed with the Director of the Legislative Reference Library. A copy of the committee recording shall be filed within 24 hours if written request is made to the committee. Tapes filed with the Legislative Reference Library shall be kept by the library for eight years after which they shall be delivered to the Director of the Minnesota Historical Society.

Any person may obtain a copy of such tape during the period in which it is maintained in the Legislative Reference Library upon payment of a fee determined by the Chief Clerk to be sufficient to cover the cost of the copy. Testimony and discussion preserved under this rule is not intended to be admissible in any court or administrative proceeding on an issue of legislative intent.

6.07 COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The chair of a standing committee reporting to the House the action taken by the committee upon any bill or resolution referred to it shall do so upon the form provided for such reports. Each bill or resolution shall be reported separately and the report shall be adopted or rejected without amendment.

The report shall contain the action taken by the committee and the date of such action and shall be authenticated by the signature of the chair.

Before a committee reports favorably upon a bill or resolution, the chair shall see that the form of the bill or resolution conforms to the Joint Rules of the House and Senate and these Rules.

Except during the last seven legislative days in any year, the committee report and any minority report shall be placed in the hands of the Chief Clerk at least four hours prior to the convening of the daily session.

The Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration may report at any time.

If a majority of the members of a standing committee finds a bill referred to the committee to be of a non-controversial nature, the report to the House may recommend that the bill be placed upon a separate calendar to be known as the Consent Calendar.

6.08 COMMITTEE BILLS.

Any standing or special committee of the House may introduce a bill as a committee bill on any subject within its purview.

6.09 SUBSTITUTION OF BILLS.

No standing or special committee nor any of its members shall report a substitute for any bill referred to the committee if the substitute relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, or would require a title essentially different from that of the original bill. Whenever the House is advised that a substitute bill reported to the House is in violation of this rule, the report shall not be adopted.

6.10 THE COMMITTEE ON ETHICS.

The Speaker shall appoint a Committee on Ethics consisting of four members. Two members from the majority group, two from the minority group and one alternate from each group shall be appointed to the Ethics Committee. The committee shall adopt written procedures, which shall include due process requirements, for handling complaints and issuing guidelines.

A complaint may be brought for conduct by a member that violates a rule or administrative policy of the House, that violates accepted norms of House behavior, that betrays the public trust, or that tends to bring the House into dishonor or direpute.

A complaint regarding a member's conduct must present with specificity the factual evidence supporting the complaint. A complaint must be in writing, under oath and signed by two or more members of the House, and submitted to the Speaker. Before submitting the complaint to the Speaker, the complainants shall cause a copy of it and any supporting materials to be delivered to any member named in the complaint. Not later than seven days after receiving a complaint, the Speaker shall refer the complaint to the Ethics committee for processing by the committee according to its rules of procedure.

The existence and substance of a complaint, including any supporting materials, and all proceedings, meetings, hearings, and records of the Ethics Committee are public; except that the committee, upon a majority vote of the whole committee, may meet in executive session to consider or determine the question of probable cause, to consider a member's medical or other health records, or to protect the privacy of a victim or third party.

A complaint of a breach of confidentiality by a member or employee of the House shall be immediately referred by the Speaker to the Ethics Committee for disciplinary action. The committee shall act in an investigatory capacity and may make recommendations

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regarding complaints submitted to the Speaker prior to adjournment sine die. The committee may, with approval of the Speaker, retain a retired judge or other nonpartisan legal advisor to advise and assist the committee, as the committee deems appropriate and necessary in the circumstances of the case, in conducting the proceedings and obtaining a complete and accurate understanding of the information relevant to the conduct in question.

Ethics Committee recommendations for disciplinary action must be supported by clear and convincing evidence and shall be reported to the House for final disposition.

6.11 CONFERENCE COMMITTEES.

A conference committee may report at any time. No committee except a conference committee or the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration shall sit during any daily session of the House without leave.

A conference committee report shall include only subject matter contained in the House or Senate versions of the bill for which that conference committee was appointed, or like subject matter contained in a bill passed by the House or Senate. The member presenting the conference committee report to the House shall disclose all substantive changes from the House version of the bill.

6.12 COMMITTEE BUDGETS AND EXPENSES.

The Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration shall establish a budget for each standing committee of the House for expenses incurred by the committee, its members, or its staff in conducting its legislative business. Per diem expense allowances paid to members during sessions or at times set by the Speaker shall not be charged against the budget. No committee shall incur expenses in excess of its authorized budget.

Employees shall be reimbursed for actual expenses in the same manner as state employees.

During sessions, for travel away from the Capitol, members shall be reimbursed for actual expenses in the same manner as state employees in addition to per diem expense allowances.

All charges against the committee budget must be approved by the chair before payment is made.

6.13 PUBLIC TESTIMONY.

Public testimony from proponents and opponents shall be allowed on every bill or resolution before a standing committee, division or subcommittee of the House.

6.14 OPEN MEETING ENFORCEMENT.

Any person may submit to the Speaker a complaint that a violation of the open meeting requirements of Rule 6.04 has occurred. The complaint must be submitted in writing. Upon receiving a complaint, the Speaker, or a person designated by the Speaker, shall investigate the complaint promptly. If the Speaker concludes, following investigation, that a violation of the open meeting rule may have occurred, the Speaker shall refer the complaint to the Committee on Ethics for further proceedings.

6.15 APPOINTMENTS TO BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS.

Upon the convening of the biennial session, the Speaker shall notify all members of the House of each board or commission to which a member of the House may be appointed by the Speaker. The Speaker shall request advice from the minority leader regarding these appointments.

ARTICLE VII OFFICERS OF THE HOUSE

7.01 DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE SPEAKER.

The Speaker shall preside over the House and shall have all the powers and be charged with all the duties of the presiding officer. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum. The Speaker or the chair of the Committee of the Whole may order the lobby or galleries cleared in the case of disorderly conduct or other disturbance.

Except as provided by rule or law, the Speaker shall have general control of the Chamber of the House and of the corridors, passages and rooms assigned to the use of the House.

The Speaker shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas of the House or issued by order of the House. The Speaker shall sign all abstracts for the payment of money out of the legislative expense fund of the House; but no money shall be paid out of the fund unless the abstract is also signed by the Controller of the House. Abstracts for compensation for members shall be signed by the Chief Clerk pursuant to law.

The Speaker shall appoint the Chief Sergeant at Arms or shall designate that officer from among the Sergeants at Arms elected by the House or appointed by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

When an elected office of the House becomes vacant, the Speaker shall designate a person to exercise the powers and discharge the duties of the office as necessary until a successor is elected by the House.

7.02 SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE.

The Speaker shall appoint a member to preside, whenever the Speaker is absent, as Speaker pro tempore. In the absence of the Speaker and Speaker pro tempore, a member selected by the Speaker shall preside until the return of the Speaker or Speaker pro tempore. If desired, the Speaker may appoint cospeakers pro tempore.

7.03 DUTIES OF CHIEF CLERK.

The Chief Clerk shall have general supervision of all clerical duties pertaining to the business of the House. The Chief Clerk shall

perform under the direction of the Speaker all the duties pertaining to the office of Chief Clerk and shall keep records showing the status and progress of all bills, memorials and resolutions.

During a temporary absence of the Chief Clerk, the First Assistant Chief Clerk shall be delegated all the usual responsibilities of the Chief Clerk and is authorized to sign the daily journal, enrollments, abstracts and other legislative documents.

7.04 ENGROSSMENT AND ENROLLMENT.

The Chief Clerk of the House shall have supervision over the engrossment and enrollment of bills. The Chief Clerk shall cause to be kept a record by file number of the bills introduced in the House which have passed both houses and been enrolled.

7.05 BUDGET AND FINANCIAL AFFAIRS.

The House Controller shall prepare a biennial budget for the House which must be approved by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration before it is submitted to the Committee on Governmental Operations for consideration by the State Government Finance Division. By the 15th day of April, July, October, and January of each year, the House Controller shall submit a detailed report of House expenditures during the previous quarter to the Speaker and the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

The House Controller shall arrange for the purchase of goods and services. The Controller shall seek the lowest possible prices consistent with satisfactory quality and dependability. A contract of the House, or an amendment to a contract, authorizing an expenditure in excess of \$500 must be signed by the Speaker or the Controller. A contract, or an amendment to a contract, authorizing an expenditure of up to \$500 may be executed by an employee authorized and directed in writing by the Controller to act for the Controller with respect to the contract or type of contract. A contract or amendment entered into in violation of this rule is not binding on the House.

7.06 BULLETIN BOARD.

The Chief Clerk shall prepare a bulletin board upon which shall be posted a list of committee and subcommittee meetings and any other announcements or notices the House may require.

7.07 INDEX.

The Index Clerk, under the supervision of the Chief Clerk, shall prepare an index in which bills may be indexed by topic, number, author, subject, section of the code amended, committees, and any other subject that will make it a complete and comprehensive index. The index shall be open for public inspection at all times during the session and shall be printed in the permanent Journal of the House.

7.08 DUTIES OF THE SERGEANT AT ARMS.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to carry out all orders of the House or the Speaker and to perform all other services pertaining to the office of Sergeant at Arms, including maintaining order in the Chamber and other areas used for the business of the House and its committees and members and supervising entering and exiting from the Chamber and the other areas and the prompt delivery of messages.

7.09 SUCCESSOR IN OFFICE OF SPEAKER.

When the office of Speaker becomes vacant, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration shall exercise the powers and discharge the duties of the office as necessary, until a Speaker is elected by the House or until a speaker-designate is selected as provided in this Rule. The House shall elect a Speaker when the House is next called to order. If the Legislature is not in session, within 30 days after the office of Speaker becomes vacant the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration shall meet and select a speaker-designate to exercise the powers and discharge the duties of the office as necessary until a Speaker is elected by the House.

ARTICLE VIII EMPLOYEES OF THE HOUSE

8.01 APPOINTMENT OF EMPLOYEES.

The Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration shall designate the position of and appoint each employee of the House and set the compensation of each officer and employee. A record of all such appointments, including positions and compensation, shall be kept in the office of the House Controller and shall be open for inspection by the public.

The Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, by resolution, shall establish the procedure for filling vacancies when the Legislature is not in session.

Any employee of the House may be assigned to other duties, suspended or discharged at any time by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.

8.02 CAMPAIGN ACTIVITIES.

An employee of the House may not participate in campaign activity during working hours. No employee may be obliged to participate in campaign activities as condition of employment. A member is not an employee of the House for purposes of this rule. House equipment may not be used for campaign activities. The committee on rules and legislative administration shall define and implement the terms of these provisions.

ARTICLE IX GENERAL PROVISIONS

9.01 RULE AS TO CONSTRUCTION.

As used in these Rules the terms "majority vote" and "vote of the House" shall mean a majority of members present at the particular time. The term "vote of the whole House" shall mean a majority vote of all the members elected to the House for that particular session of the Legislature.

Singular words used in these Rules shall include the plural, unless the context indicates a contrary intention.

9.02 MEDIA NEWS REPORTERS.

Accredited representatives of the press, press associations, and radio and television stations shall be accorded equal press privileges by the House. Any person wishing to report proceedings of the House may apply to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration for a press pass and assignment to suitable available space.

Television stations shall be permitted to televise sessions of the House. Media representatives shall be allowed access to both wells in the gallery of the House chambers.

9.03 DEADLINES.

A bill prepared by a department or agency of state government shall be introduced and given its first reading in regular session no later than ten days before the date of the first committee deadline specified in this rule.

In regular session in 1997, committee reports on House files favorably acted upon by a committee after Wednesday, April 9, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration for disposition. In regular session in 1998, committee reports on House files favorably acted upon by a committee after Wednesday, April 9, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration for disposition. In regular session in 1998, committee reports on House files favorably acted upon by a committee after Friday, February 13, committee reports on Senate files favorably acted upon by a committee after Friday, February 20, shall be referred to the Committee and Legislative Administration for disposition. However, referral is not required after first deadline when, by the second deadline, a committee acts on a bill that is a companion to a bill that has then been acted upon by the first deadline in the Senate. A finance or revenue bill referred to in Rule 5.08 is exempt from the first and second deadlines.

A finance bill other than a major finance or revolue bill referred to in Rule 5.12 in finance committees and standing committees with finance divisions and the Committee on Taxes, that includes provisions that create or reestablish a commission, board, task force, advisory committee or council, or other entity, shall be re-referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration if it remains in committee after the deadlines set by this rule.

In regular session in 1997, notice of intention to move reconsideration shall not be in order after Monday, April 14. In regular session in 1998, notice of intention to move reconsideration shall not be in order after Monday, March 2.

Committee reports on finance bills that are favorably acted upon by a committee after Friday, April 18, in regular session in 1997, and after Friday, February 27, in regular session in 1998, shall be referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration for disposition. This deadline does not apply to the House Committees on Capital Investment, Taxes, and Ways and Means.

In Regular session in 1997 after Friday, May 2, and in regular session in 1998 after Friday, March 20, the House shall not act on bills other than those recommended by conference committee reports, the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, or the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, or the Committee on Ways and Means, and those bills contained in messages from the Senate or from the Governor.

In regular session in 1997 except after Monday, May 12, and in regular session in 1998 except after Monday, March 23, a written copy of a report of a conference committee shall be placed on the desk of each member of the House 24 hours before action on the report by the House. If the report has been reprinted in the Journal of the House for a preceding day and is available to the members, the Journal copy shall serve as the written report.

9.04 DISPOSITION OF BILLS.

Adjournment of the regular session in the odd-numbered year to a day certain in the following even-numbered year shall be equivalent to daily adjournment except that any bill on the Consent Calendar, Calendar, Special Orders or General Orders shall be returned to the standing committee last acting on the bill.

9.05 AUTHORIZED MANUAL OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE.

The rules of parliamentary procedure contained in "Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure" shall govern the House in all applicable cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Rules, the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Representatives, or established custom and usage.

ARTICLE X ETHICS

10.01 SOLICITATIONS DURING LEGISLATIVE SESSION.

No member of the House, nor the member's principal campaign committee, nor any other political committee with the member's name or title, nor any committee authorized by the member which would benefit the member, shall solicit or accept a contribution on behalf of the member's principal campaign committee, any other political committee with the member's name or title, or any political committee authorized by the member which would benefit the member, from a registered lobbyist, political committee, or political fund during the regular session of the House.

No member may accept compensation for lobbying.

10.02 ACCEPTANCE OF AN HONORARIUM BY A MEMBER.

No member may accept an honorarium for any service performed for an individual or organization which has a direct interest in the business of the House, including, but not limited to, registered lobbyists or any organizations they represent. The term "honorarium" does not include reimbursement for expenses incurred and actually paid by a member in performing any service. Alleged violations of this rule shall be referred to the Committee on Ethics under Rule 6.10. Upon finding that an honorarium was

Alleged violations of this rule, shall be referred to the Committee on Ethics under Klue 0.10. Upon many that an honorarum was accepted in violation of this rule, the Committee on Ethics shall direct the return of the funds. If the funds are not returned, the committee may recommend disciplinary action under Rule 6.10.

10.03 ACCEPTANCE OF TRAVEL AND LODGING BY A MEMBER OR EMPLOYEE.

A member or employee of the House shall not accept travel and lodging from any foreign government, private for-profit business, labor union, registered lobbyist, or any association thereof, except for expenses that relate to the member's or employee's participation as a legislator or legislative employee in a meeting or conference. This rule does not apply to travel and lodging provided to a member in the regular course of the member's employment or business.

10.04 DENIAL OF COMPENSATION.

A member of the House may not receive compensation, milage, or living expenses while the member is incarcerated or on home detention due to a criminal conviction.

Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Representatives

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Article I Joint Conventions

How governed

Rule 1.01. The Speaker of the House shall preside at all conventions of the two houses of the Legislature and shall call the members to order. The Chief Clerk of the House shall be the Secretary and the Sergeant at Arms of the House shall be the Sergeant at Arms of the Convention.

President's duties

Rule 1.02. The President of the Convention shall preserve order and decorum. He may speak on all points of order in preference to other members and shall decide question of order, subject to an appeal to the Convention by any member. He shall rise to put a question

but may state it while seated.

President's right to vote

Rule 1.03. The President shall have the right to vote in all cases except appeals from his decisions. He shall vote last on all questions.

Stating questions

Rule 1.04. Questions shall be put to the Convention in the following form: "As many as are of the opinion that (the question) shall pass, say 'Aye'." After an affirmative vote is expressed the nays shall be called as follows: "As many as are of the contrary opinion say 'No"." If the President is in doubt or a division is called, those in the affirmative shall rise first and those in the negative afterward.

Order of debate

Rule 1.05. When any member wishes to speak to the Convention on any matter, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, and not speak further until recognized. He shall confine himself to the question under debate and avoid personal remarks. When two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall designate the member to speak first. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission of the Convention.

Calling member to order

Rule 1.06. If any member of the Joint Convention is call to order for offensive words in debate, the member calling him to order shall report the words to which exception is taken and the Secretary shall record them. No member may be called to order for any language used in debate if exception is not taken before any other member has spoken or any other business has taken place. A member called to order shall immediately sit down unless another member moves to permit him to explain. In any case, the Joint Convention, if appealed to, shall decide without debate. Only if the decision is in favor of the member called to order shall he be at liberty to proceed.

Call of the Convention

Rule 1.07. Five members may demand a call of the Convention at any time except after voting has commenced. When such a call is demanded, the doors shall be closed, the roll shall be called, the absent members shall be sent for, and no member may be permitted to leave the Chamber, unless excused by the President, until the call is lifted. Proceedings under the roll call may be suspended by a majority vote of all the members of the Convention. A call of the Convention may be lifted by a majority vote of all the members of the Convention.

Elections

Rule 1.08. In all elections by the Joint Convention, members shall vote viva voce and the roll of Senate members shall be called first. Whenever there is an election of any officer in Joint Convention, the result shall be certified by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House and announced by them to their respective houses. The result shall be entered on the Journal of each house and communicated to the governor by the secretary of the Convention.

No smoking

Rule 1.09. No person is permitted to smoke in the Chamber or in the gallery during a Joint Convention.

Parliamentary procedure

Rule 1.10. The rules of the House shall be the Rules of the Joint Convention of both houses in all cases in which the foregoing rules are not applicable.

Article II Bills

Form

Rule 2.01. The title of each bill shall clearly state its subject and briefly state its purpose. When a bill amends or repeals an existing act, the title shall refer to the chapter, section or subdivision.

Reference shall be made to Minnesota Statutes for the provisions appearing therein unless reference to previous session laws is required for some special reason.

Bills shall refer to Minnesota Statutes as follows: "Minnesota Statutes....., section....." Bills shall refer to the session laws as follows: "Laws...., chapter...., section....."

A bill for the amendment of a statute shall contain the full text of the section or subdivision to be amended as it appears in the latest edition of Minnesota Statutes unless it has been amended, in which event it shall contain the full text as amended.

The words and characters constituting the amending matter shall be inserted in the proper place in the text and underscored. The words and characters to be eliminated by the amendment shall be stricken by drawing a line through them. The text of a new section or subdivision shall also be underscored when a bill amends an existing chapter or section by adding a new section or subdivision. In the omnibus appropriation bills required by Joint Rule 2.02, sections making an appropriation or transfer and not amending a statute or session law need not have new material underscored. Before a committee favorable reports upon a bill, the chairman of the committee shall see that the bill conforms to this rule. When a bill is printed in the Journal, the new matter shall be in italics or underscored and the matter to be eliminated shall be capitalized and in parentheses or stricken by drawing a line through it. A bill drafted by the Revisor of Statutes for the purposes of correcting errors in Minnesota Statutes need not comply with the provisions of this paragraph if the bill is labeled "REVISOR'S BILL" immediately below the title, and if there is attached thereto a memorandum of information explaining the

reasons for the bill.

If the bill is for an original law and not for an amendment of an existing law, the sections and subdivisions shall be arranged, subdivided, and numbered in like manner as Minnesota Statutes. If such a bill assigns to the sections thereof headnotes or identification by the decimal system of numbering used in Minnesota Statutes, such headnotes and decimal identification may be submitted by standing committee chairmen to the Revisor of Statutes for examination. Any such headnotes shall be capital letters enclosed in brackets, and shall be subject to the provisions of Minnesota Statutes 648.36.

All numbers in titles shall be expressed in figures. All numbers of section or chapter of law shall be in figures. In the body of a bill numbers in excess of ten shall be in figures, except for a special reason they may be written, but when written they shall not be followed by numbers or parentheses.

Appropriating money

Rule 2.02. The same bill shall not appropriate public money or property to more than one local or private purpose.

No clause appropriating money for a local or private purpose shall be contained in a bill appropriating money for the State government or public institutions. All resolutions authorizing the issuing of abstracts by the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the House for the payment of money shall be upon the call of "yeas" and "nays."

In odd-numbered years, at least eighteen calendar days prior to the last day of the Legislature can meet in regular session, the Committee on Finance of the Senate and the Committee on Ways and Means of the House shall report to their respective houses, unless directed by concurrent resolution to report different appropriation bills, appropriation bills for the two succeeding fiscal years as follows:

(a) A bill appropriating money for the general administrative and judicial expenses of the State government, including salaries, office expenses and supplies and other necessary expenses connected therewith;

(b) A bill covering appropriations relating to health and human services;

(c) A bill appropriating money for the support and maintenance of State educational institutions;

(d) A bill appropriating money for aid to school districts;

(e) A bill appropriating money for the protection and improvement of the State's environment and natural resources; (f) A bill appropriating money for the Department of Transportation and other agencies;

(g) A bill appropriating money for criminal justice;

(h) A bill appropriating money for community development;

(i) A bill covering all appropriations providing for the payment of claims against the State of Minnesota which may have been allowed by the Finance Committee of the Senate or the Ways and Means Committee of the House.

No other appropriations shall be contained in any of said bills but all other appropriations shall be contained in separate bills.

Deadlines

Rule 2.03. (a) Except as provided in paragraph (b), in odd- numbered years, committee reports on bills favorable acted upon by a committee in the house of origin after the sixth Friday before the last Friday the Legislature can meet in regular session, and committee reports on bills originating in the other house favorable acted upon by a committee after the fourth Friday before the last Friday the Legislature can meet in regular session, shall be referred in the Senate to the Committee after the fourth Friday before the last Friday the Legislature can meet in regular session, shall be referred in the Senate to the Committee and Administration, and in the House of Representatives to the Committee and Legislative Administration for disposition. Referral is not required when a committee after the earlier date and by the later date set by this paragraph acts on a bill that is a companion to a bill that has met the earlier deadline in the ohuse.

(b) Committee reports on bills containing an appropriation that are favorable acted upon by the policy committee in either house after the third Friday before the last Friday the Legislature can meet in regular session, shall be referred in the Senate to the Committee on Rules and Administration, and in the House of Representatives o the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration for disposition. This rule does not apply to the Senate Committees on Finance and on Taxes and Tax Laws, and the House Committees on Ways and Means and on Taxes.

(c) Conference committees on the major appropriations bills specified in Joint Rule 2.02 shall have their reports on the members' desks by the last Thursday on which the Legislature can meet in regular session. After the last Friday on which the Legislature can meet in regular session, neither house shall act on bills other than those contained in: 1. Reports of Conference Committees; 2. Messages from the other house; 3. Reports of the Committee on Rules and Administration in the Senate or the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration in the House; or 4. Messages from the governor.

(d) In even-numbered years the Legislature shall establish by concurrent resolution deadlines based on the date intended to be the date of adjournment sine die.

Amending bills originating in other house

Rule 2.04. Either house shall have the power to amen any bill, memorial, or resolution passed by the other house.

Receding from position

Rule 2.05. Prior to a Conference Committee on any matter, either house may recede from its position on any difference existing between the two houses. In order to recede, and if the matter is not in the possession of a house, that house shall request return of the matter from the other house. To recede, a majority of a house shall govern, except in cases otherwise provided in the Constitution. If the question is put and lost, it shall not be put again on the same day. A reconsideration of the question shall in all respects be regulated by the rules of that house.

Conference Committees

Rule 2.06. In all cases of disagreement between the Senate and House on amendments adopted by either house to a bill, memorial or resolution passed by the other house, a Conference Committee consisting of not less than three members nor more than five members from each house may be requested by either house. The other house shall appoint a similar committee.

The manner of procedure shall be as follows: The house of origin passes a bill and transmits it to the other body. If the other body adopts an amendment to the bill and passes it as amended, it shall return the bill with a record of its actions to the house of origin. If the house of origin refuses to concur in the amendment, it shall ask for a Conference Committee, appoint such a committee on its part, and transmit the bill with a record of its action to the other house. If the other house adheres to its amendment, it shall appoint a like committee and return the bill to the house of origin.

All Conference Committees shall be open to the public. As much as practical, meetings of Conference Committees shall be announced as far in advance as possible and actions taken shall be agreed upon in an open meeting. At an agreed upon hour the Conference Committee shall meet. The members from each house shall state to the members from the other house, orally or in writing, the reason for their respective positions. The members shall confer thereon and shall report to their respective houses the agreement they have reached, or, if none, the fact of a disagreement.

If an agreement is reported, the house of origin shall act first upon the report. A Conference Committee report must be limited to provisions that are germane to the bill and amendments that were referred to the Conference Committee. A provision is not germane if it relates to a substantially different purpose from that of the bill and amendment that were referred to the Conference Committee. If the report is adopted and repassed as amended by the Conference Committee by the house of origin, the report, the bill and a record of its action shall be transmitted to the other house.

Except after the last Thursday on which the Legislature can meet in regular session in odd-numbered years and after the last Thursday on which the Legislature intended, when it adopted the concurrent resolution required by Rule 2.03, paragraph (b), to meet in regular session in even-numbered years, a written copy of a report of a Conference Committee shall be placed on the desk of each member of a house twelve hours before action on the report by that house. If the report has been reprinted in the Journal of either house for a preceding day and is available to the members, the Journal copy shall serve as the written report. The member presenting the Conference Committee report to the body shall disclose, either in writing or orally, the substantial changes from the bill or the amendment as they were last before the body.

Enrollment and signature

Rule 2.07. After a bill or memorial has been passed by both houses, it shall be carefully and properly enrolled by the Revisor of Statutes under the direction of the Secretary of the Senate for a matter originating in the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the House for a matter originating in the House. The Revisor of Statutes shall obtain the signatures and certificates of the proper officers to the enrolled copy of the bill or memorial and present it to the governor for his approval.

A bill or memorial may be prepared for presentation to the governor on good quality paper approximately 8 1/2" x 14" in size and may be produced by means of a copying machine. An enrolled bill shall be labeled "An Act" and it shall be identical to the bill passed by the Legislature. An enrolled bill which is amendatory of any existing law or constitutional provision shall indicate deletions and additions in the manner provided in Rule 2.01 for printed bills.

Article III General provisions

Suspension of joint rules

Rule 3.01. Either house may suspend the Joint Rules of the Senate and House by a vote of two-thirds of its members.

Odd year session adjournment

Rule 3.02. Adjournment of the regular session in any oddnumbered year to a date certain in the following year shall be equivalent to a daily adjournment, except that upon adjournment in any oddumbered year to a date certain in the following year:

(a) Any bill being considered by a Conference Committee shall be returned to the house of origin, laid on the table, and the Conference Committee shall be discharged;

(b) Any bill referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration in the Senate or the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration in the House pursuant to Joint Rule 2.03 shall be returned to the standing committee to which it was last previously referred; and

(c) Any bill returned by the governor to the house of origin with his objections following such adjournment shall be laid on the table.

Interim committee and commission reports

Rule 3.03. Except as otherwise provided by law, the report of any interim committee or commission to the Legislature shall be submitted on paper 8 $1/2^n \times 11^n$ in size, spiral bound, stapled, or punched on the left edge to fit a standard size three ring binder intended for that size paper. A bird summary of the recommendations of the commission or committee shall appear first and be clearly separated from its finding, discussions, and exhibits. If the report contains legislative recommendations, a copy of any proposed legislative, particularly if extensive in character, shall if possible be attached as an exhibit at the end of the report.

Article IV Election of Regents

Joint Committee

Rule 4.01. By May 7 of each odd-numbered year, or at a date agreed to by concurrent resolution, a Joint Committee shall meet to recommend nominees for Regent of the University of Minnesota to be presented to a Joint Convention of the Legislature. The members of the Joint Committee are the members of the Senate and House Committees on Education. A majority of the members from each house is a quorum of the Joint Committee.

The Joint Committee shall determine the number of persons, and the person or persons to be recommended for each open seat. Each person recommended by the Regent Candidate Advisory Council is considered to be nominated. Other persons may be nominated by a member of the committee at the meetings. Nominations may be made by committee members only. Nominations must be made for a specified congressional or student seat, or for any at-large seat.

The roll shall be called viva voce on the recommendation of Regents. A majority vote of the members of the Joint Committee is required for a candidate to be recommended.

Joint Convention

Rule 4.02. At the Joint Convention of the Senate and House of Representatives called to elect Regents, the Joint Committee shall report the name of the person or persons recommended for each seat. There persons are considered to be nominated. Any member of the Legislature may submit additional nominations. If there is more than one at-large seat to be filled, all candidates for an at-large seat run for any of the at-large seats.

The roll shall be called viva voce on the election of Regents. The roll must be called first on congressional district seats until they are filled, then on the student seat, and then on the at-large seats. The candidate for each seat receiving a majority of the votes cast must be declared elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast for a seat, on each succeeding ballot the candidate with the fewest votes must be dropped from consideration and the votes cast again until a majority vote is achieved. Any candidate with fewer than 20 votes on any ballot shall also be dropped on succeeding ballots.

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
