On behalf of the Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council, it is my honor to present a bill jacketed for introduction incorporating the Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council's recommendations for FY 15 appropriations from the Outdoor Heritage Fund, as required by law. This proposed legislation contains the Council's sixth annual appropriation recommendations to protect, enhance, and restore Minnesota's prairies, wetlands, forests, and habitat for fish, game, and wildlife which are consistent with and effectively address the Council's strategic statewide and regionally-based conservation and habitat priorities from the Outdoor Heritage Fund's 25-Year Framework.

The council received 56 requests totaling over \$269 million from a cross-section of public and non-profit organizations and levels of government. The Council's FY 15 recommendations include 38 proposed appropriations with expenditures totaling \$109 million.

The Council's recommendations are consistent with constitutionally-specified uses of the Outdoor Heritage Fund and promise to have lasting and positive impact on the state's natural resource based habitats. The following outputs are associated with these recommendations:

- 14,627 acres of wetlands and wetland systems protected, restored, and enhanced;
- 24,045 acres of prairies and prairie systems protected, restored, and enhanced;
- 5,999 acres of forest protected, restored and enhanced; and
- 9,670 acres of aquatic habitat protected, restored, and enhanced.

Restoration and enhancement of public lands accounts for the majority of acres impacted by these recommendations. Over 54,000 acres are to be affected and will improve habitat for a range of species, from duck habitat in the prairie pothole region, to pheasants in the tall grass regions, to trout streams in the southeast and northeast, to habitat in metropolitan regional parks and open spaces. Habitat restoration and enhancement activity puts money on the ground by creating and supporting jobs in local economies.

The council remains focused on recommending funding for those programs with the potential greatest impact on habitat heritage for future generations. Several on-going programs focusing on the prairie regions of the state are recommended for funding, including the Accelerating the Wildlife Management Area program, the Minnesota Prairie Recovery Project, and the Accelerated Prairie Restoration and Enhancement on DNR Lands. Together, these programs support the work of the Minnesota Prairie Conservation Plan and will have a powerful impact on prairie and prairie systems. These programs are recommended for a combined total of \$15.82 million and will affect 14,697 acres.

The Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council is confident its recommendations will be broadly supported by the citizens of Minnesota. The Council stands prepared to provide any assistance and additional information necessary during the legislative session.

On behalf of the Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council, I thank you for the opportunity to serve the people of Minnesota in improving our state's great outdoors habitat heritage.
