

Dear Chairs Stauber, Tinquist and Commissioners:

The Annual Report of the Inspector of Mines for 2014 is herewith submitted.

Overall, 2014 turned out to be a strong economic year for mining in Northern Minnesota. A total of 41,301,098 tons of natural ore and taconite were shipped from area operations. Reported mining related employment in 2014 was 4,387 people, which is approximately 14 percent higher than the 10-year average. The work hours reported for area mining operations totaled 9,438,050 for the year.

Significant progress was made by several operations toward the objective of growth during the coming years. These include the Magnetation Plant #4 startup in Itasca County and Essar Steel's continued construction on their facility near Nashwauk. On the copper/nickel/precious metal mining front, Polymet submitted its Environmental Impact Statement {EIS} to the DNR this year and is pursuing the final permits necessary for their North Met Project. Closer to Ely, Twin Metals completed the project's pre-feasibility study toward the objective of semi-precious metal mining.

Of note is the continued work by the MnDOT and stakeholders concerning the future relocation of Highway 53 in Virginia. In accordance with the provisions of a 1960 agreement, United Taconite and RGGS Land and Minerals gave notice to the state concerning a previously established easement required for the current route of Highway 53 between Highway 135 and Second Avenue in Virginia. This year, after a study of several options, the E-2 alternative was recommended. This alternative will re-route the highway to the north and is scheduled to include a 1,100-foot bridge across the Rouchleau Pit.

During 2014, area mining operations reported a total of 29 lost time or serious accidents which is identical to the number experienced in 2013. Zero fatalities were reported in 2014. The continued commitment to the safety of all those who work in the mining industry is our shared goal.

St. Louis County Mine Inspectors successfully completed all required inspections of area operations, which are mandated by Minnesota State Law Chapter 180, Section 180.03 during 2014.

Acknowledgement and appreciation is extended to both Labor and Management for their continued interest, efforts and cooperation in the field of safety and health throughout the mines and plants in St. Louis and Itasca counties.

Excerpts from the Law On

INSPECTOR OF MINES

CHAPTER 180

MINNESOTA STATUTES

SECTION 180.05

INSPECTOR, POWERS; OWNER, DUTIES

It shall be lawful for the inspector of mines or assistant inspector to enter, examine, and inspect any and all mining operations and machinery belonging to the mine owner, operator, or agent at all reasonable times by day or by night, but so as not to obstruct or hinder the necessary workings of the facility. At the request of the inspector of mines, the owner, operator, or agent of a mining operation shall furnish for inspection:

(1) all maps, drawings, and plans of the mining facility, together with the plans of all contemplated changes;

(2) a suitable person, who shall be chosen by the inspector from a list containing at least three candidates, submitted by a majority of employees of the mine, to accompany the inspector through the mining operation;

(3) any necessary equipment to make a proper inspection; and

(4) all necessary facilities for such entry, examination, and inspection.

Upon receipt of a written request made by the inspector of mines, refusal to permit the inspection, or to furnish the necessary facilities for entry, examination, and inspection, shall be deemed a gross misdemeanor.

No lost time accidents

PLANT 2:

Millwright, Date of Accident - February 27, 2014. Injured was standing on a ladder, when the injured's calf erupted in pain. Days Lost - 4

Truck Driver, Date of Accident - March 4, 2014. Injured claimed that driving the equipment caused inflammation to scrotum. Days Lost - 6

Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident - July 23, 2014. Injured was putting side cutters on backhoe bucket and felt pain to lower back. Days Lost - 2

NORTHSHORE MINING COMPANY

BABBITT:

Mine Maintenance Technician, Date of Accident - March 24, 2014. Injured was getting out of a boom truck. As his left foot touched the icy ground, it slipped from underneath him. His foot twisted and he fell to the ground. As a result of this fall, he suffered a fracture to his ankle. Days Lost - 2

Mine Operations Technician, Date of Accident - May 10, 2014. Injured was performing a pre-op inspection on a grader. After employee completed the inspection and was accessing the steps to descend the grader, he lost his hand hold at the same time he tripped on the rear tire. Injured fell onto cement floor which resulted in fractured hip. Days Lost - 33

SILVER BAY:

Pellet Plant Operations Technician, Date of Accident - June 11, 2014. Injured was jumping on a pry bar to break loose a coupling that controlled an unloading gate on a rail car. When the coupling came loose, the bar fell and he landed on his left leg jarring his knee which resulted in a ligament tear. Days Lost - 71

USS CORPORATION, MINNESOTA ORE OPERATIONS

MINNTAC:

MEO- Shovel Operator, Date of Accident- January 9, 2014. The day shift shovel operator assigned to the #38 Shovel in the West Pit was 'hot relieved' at the shovel and then drove the #1086, 2013 Chevrolet pickup truck eastward, back towards the Mine Annex. He traveled on the Ontario Haul Road until it branches off to form the Rock Cut Road and the #30 Dump Road. At this intersection the operator drove what he thought was the #30 Dump Road, but actually entered an area of new road construction. He drove approximately 100 feet over very rough terrain, hit and cleared a 6 foot plus truck dump berm, and became air borne for approximately 50 feet before hitting the roadway below. The operator sustained back and other injuries. Days Lost – 180

MTM- Crane Crew, Date of Accident – February 20, 2014. Three employees were in the process of changing the cable on the West 247-06-1 Waste Gas Fan Crane. The spool of new cable and reeving roller stand were located in the back of the 1075 Chevy 2500 pickup. The truck was parked 10' East of the crane block. The crane block was resting on blocks on the floor. As the employees were feeding the cable by hand through the block and equalizer sheaves the cable spool rolled out of the reeving roller stand, out of the truck bed, and struck the injured employee in the back of the left ankle. Days Lost-26

MTE- Electrician, Date of Accident – August 13, 2014. Employee was removing the balance weight from a 350 HP Crusher Motor Rotor after balancing the rotor on the balancing machine. The employee was using a 1/2 inch box wrench to remove the weight, while turning the wrench downward/away from the body the employee felt a pop in right shoulder and a burning sensation. Days Lost – 24

Lab Technician, Date of Accident – December 22, 2014. Employee was out sampling the 50 column tails in the Concentrator. When he completed this job, he had to carry a half full 5 gallon pail back to the lab for work up. This pail weighed 15.4 pounds. This travel required him to go up and down several flights of stairs. He was descending the final flight stairs and carrying the pail in his right hand. He was maintaining three points of contact by using his left hand on the hand rail. The Employee missed the second to the last step and fell forward to the concrete floor (Vertical height of fall was 23"), catching himself with his left arm and falling on the pail with the right side of his body. Days Lost – 30

KEETAC:

MEO- Shovel Operator, Date of Accident – January 7, 2014. Employee passed heater and felt it was not putting out sufficient warm air. He climbed onto the heater platform and opened the door to the unit. He attempted to open the observation hatch to check the flame. As he raised the hatch, flame shot out, engulfing his hands, wrists, face, and neck. He sustained second and third degree burns to his face, wrists, and neck. Days Lost - 26

Fire Attendant, Date of Accident – September 22, 2014. The injured and his partner began task to conduct annual fire extinguisher inspections on mine production equipment. The injured had completed an inspection of a 240-ton production truck and proceeded to perform an inspection on the 4988 Drill Water Truck. As the injured leaned into the compartment to unlatch the bracket holding the extinguisher, the injured tipped the extinguisher out of the bracket and grabbed it with both hands to bring it to the ground to perform the inspection. While bringing it to the ground, the injured felt pain in his lower back. Days Lost – 6

UNITED TACONITE:

Warehouse person, Date of Accident – March 2, 2014. Employee was working to clear snow with a forklift. He needed to exit his machine to move a roller when he tripped over a partially buried broken pallet falling on his left shoulder. The employee injure his rotator cuff. Days Lost – 76

Welder, Date of Accident – July 22, 2014. Employee had a metal liner fall onto top of foot while replacing the liner. The employee suffered a contusion to the foot. Days Lost – 12

Supervisor, Date of Accident – November 13, 2014. Employee tripped and fell while descending a berm. The employee injured rotator cuff. Lost Days – 21

HIBBING TACONITE:

Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident - February 3, 2014. An equipment cleaner, with 22 years of experience, was cleaning out pits under the carrying rollers for F drum. This task involved using a shovel and scraper to remove built up grease and cake. It also required awkward positioning in a crouching position along with twisting, prying, and lifting causing back strain. Days Lost -1

Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident – February 6, 2014. An MMG, with 3.5 years of experience, was struck by a boom from the Mill Lining Machine (Par machine). Injured was in the mill #7 to assist in hooking up and lining up the liner that was laying on the rock as well as applying Nordbac to the mill where the liner was to go. The other MMG inside the mill was operating the mill lining machine and swung the machine to the right, as it was getting close to the liner, and attempted to extend the boom at the same time. When this was done, the boom of the machine suddenly jerked quickly and forcefully to the left, and struck the employee in the lower chest area causing a contusion and bruising to chest. Days Lost – 17

Cable Crew, Date of Accident – March 4, 2014. A cable crew employee, with 24 years of experience, was struck by the right rear outrigger on the 523 cable truck. The labor crew was assigned to pick up cable with the cable truck at the BE repair site/maintenance yard and move it to the 61 shovel substation area. At the BE site, the labor crew members noticed the right rear outrigger was chained to the boom hooks they needed to fairlead the cable and spool on the truck. The crew discussed removing the chain that was securing the right rear outrigger from the boom and re-securing it so they utilize the boom for fairleading. The cable crew member that unhooked the chain securing the outrigger was standing in the path of the descending outrigger. The right outrigger fell contacting the employee on the right side of the hard hat and shoulder area causing bruising to right shoulder, chest and jaw. Days Lost – 1

Auto Mechanic, Date of Accident March 29, 2014. While changing the cutting edge on the 16H grader #336, the auto mechanic was using a bar to secure one end of the cutting edge segment to assist in installing a bolt. When the mechanic leaned back to grab a bolt, the bar slipped allowing the cutting edge to fall to the ground. It then bounced off the ground and landed on the tops of both feet which were about a foot and a half away from where the cutting edge landed before bouncing. Employee sustained bruising, swelling and soreness to both feet. Days Lost -13

HIBBING TACONITE COMPANY (cont)

Reliability Technician, Date of Accident April 2, 2014. The injured was using a hose to clean pellets at the bottom of a stairway on line 2. While winding up the fire hose located on the south end of D-1B conveyor, the hose was not aligned with the reel. The employee went to realign the hose, and felt a pop in the left knee while planting foot on the floor. The employee was diagnosed with a torn meniscus and received surgery as a result of the injury. Days Lost - 13

Separator Attendant, Date of Accident – May 5, 2014. An employee was hosing tailings on the northwest side of the Hydro Main Pump house. The employee took a couple of steps back, stumbled, and ran into the corner of an oil tank. The employee impacted right side in the area of the ribs. The employee noticed a pain, but continued working. Later, as the employee began to shovel tailings, they felt a pop and then constant pain in the rib area. Employee received a fracture to a right rib as a result of injury. Days Lost - 30

Separator Attendant, Date of Accident - May 28, 2014. A laborer was hosing pellets out from under P1 and P2 conveyors in the Phase 1 North Truck Aisle of the Pellet Plant. Due to a water leak from above, the employee was unable to hose from the normal location and instead kneeled under a staircase. After hosing for approximately 1.5 hours, the employee stood up and hit head on the stairs causing cervical strain. Days Lost -2

Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident – June 4, 2014. While on inbound lane to work (dayshift) on the HTC access road, two employees were involved in a vehicle accident. This caused both vehicles to lose control/fishtail and go off the road resulting with both vehicles in the ditch. The vehicle that was struck from behind rolled before landing in the ditch. Injury resulted in fracture to vertebrae. Days Lost – 65

Electrician, Date of Accident - June 8, 2014. A shift electrician, with 4 years of mining experience, over 20 years of electrical experience, and holding a masters electrician license went to the P3 substation alone to investigate the cause of the P3 conveyor belt system and other equipment going down. The electrical monitoring equipment (multilin) reported a current imbalance fault. While troubleshooting, the electrician entered the 4160v building, racked out the switchgear that supplies power to the P3 belt, opened the front panel of that switchgear, defeated the safety mechanism used to prevent energizing the switchgear while open, racked it back in, and used a 600v handheld meter to verify that all three phases were present. An arc flash occurred as a result of this contact. The electrician was kneeling in front of the switchgear at the time of the arc flash and was holding the 600v meter in their hands. Injury resulted in 2nd and 3rd degree burns to hands, 1st and 2nd degree burns to face and neck. Days Lost – 23

HIBBING TACONITE COMPANY (cont)

Janitor, Date of Accident - August 1, 2014. A janitor was attempting to retrieve cleaning supplies from a shelf on the south wall of the pellet plant tool crib. To reach the box of supplies, the employee needed to move a box of parts located at the front of the shelf. While moving these parts, the employee reported feeling a pain in the groin area and lower right abdomen. Injury resulted in inguinal hernia. Days Lost – 39

Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident - August 14, 2014. An MMG was removing a 6ft. section of handrail along the double dump valve (DDV) floor. The handrail needed to be removed to install new guards. After cutting the last upright, the handrail tipped towards the valves and began heading down the dribble hopper. The mechanic reached and grabbed ahold of the handrail to prevent it from falling and sliding down to the dribble belt. When the mechanic grabbed the handrail, a strain in the lower back occurred. Days Lost - 6

MINING RESOURCES:

Plant Operations, Date of Accident – November 18, 2014. Employee was working to remove a pump impeller. When the impeller broke loose, he felt an object strike his hand inside of the pump casing. The injury resulted in a laceration and broken bones within his pinky finger. Days Lost – 3

ARCELORMITTAL MINORCA MINE INC:

Production Truck Driver, Date of Accident - November 25, 2014. Employee got off 34 haul truck to remove some small rocks from the haul road. He threw one rock and as he started to throw the second rock, his right ankle slipped and twisted. This resulted in a severe dislocation, partially torn ligament and spiral fracture of the right ankle. Days Lost - 18, still off.

Crusher Maintenance Process Coordinator, Date of Accident - December 22, 2014. Employee was going down steps to bottom floor of fines crusher. He stepped onto last step which was concrete and his legs gave out. He fell forward into person in front of him and then collapsed to the ground level. The steps were dry. Employee was diagnosed with a torn quadricep in his left leg. Days Lost - 5, still off.
