

Dedicated to improving the health and quality of life for Veterans and their families, the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) meets these needs by providing services through its two divisions—MDVA Health Care and MDVA Programs & Services.



MDVA HEALTH CARE FOR VETERANS

The MDVA Health Care division operates five Veterans Homes located in Fergus Falls, Hastings, Minneapolis, Luverne and Silver Bay.

These Homes provide high-quality medical and primary psychological health care to meet the long-term needs of aging Veterans and their families. In addition to health conditions unique to Veterans (such as traumatic brain injuries and post traumatic stress), the MDVA Homes also provide rehabilitation and work therapy, treatment for chemical dependency, as well as transportation, spiritual and recreational services, and much more.



MDVA PROGRAMS & SERVICES FOR VETERANS

MDVA's Programs & Services division aids eligible Minnesota Veterans, plus their dependents and survivors, in attaining both the **federal and state benefits** they have earned. Areas of assistance include **financial**, **educational** and **medical benefits**, as well as programs for **housing** and **employment**, **memorial** and funeral needs, and in some cases **financial assistance** for Veterans undergoing a serious fiscal crisis.

Who MDVA SERVES



There are approximately 369,149 Veterans in Minnesota – 7% of the state population



Veterans currently comprise 21% of the state's 65 years old or older population, and 24% of the state's 75 years old or older population



Since 9/11, over **66.000** Minnesotans have been discharged from active duty, with 43.000 having served in a combat zone

How MDVA SERVES



Appointed as the 17th Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) in January 2011, Larry Shellito heads up a staff of 1,345 with the assistance of Acting Deputy Commissioners Robin Gaustad, MDVA Health Care, and Brad Lindsay, MDVA Programs & Services.



Ninety-one percent of those employed with MDVA provide speciality skills to treat and care for our Veterans health needs. These skills, administered through one of five MDVA Veterans Homes, include doctors, nurses, therapists, pharmacists, dieticians and other specialized services.

Nine percent of MDVA staff provide Veterans with technical and administrative services, available through the MDVA Programs & Services division.

VVhy MDVA SERVES

Veterans from every conflict and era face challenges and struggles. Many return with visible and often devastating combat injuries such as amputated limbs. Many more carry the invisible wounds of war such as traumatic brain injury and post-traumatic stress disorder. Nearly every Veteran faces the stress of transitioning back to their lives.

Less publicized than a Veteran's health needs, perhaps, are the transitional issues Veterans face after service – struggling to find jobs, grappling with poverty, the number facing homelessness, and the lack of adequate services available to earlier service eras.

FACT On any given night in Minnesota, there are more than 300 Veterans without safe, stable or affordable housing. Overall, homeless Veterans tend to be male, however female Veterans are becoming a fast growing segment of the homeless population.

FACT Young Veterans experience unemployment at a higher rate than the general population. Transitioning military skills to civilian occupations often makes this more difficult, requiring additional training and education all which can delay or extend the transition process.

While current needs remain great, the future demand for the comprehensive services MDVA provides is projected to be **even greater** due to two key factors:

- ANTICIPATED REDUCTION IN FORCE Since the Department of Defense projects a continued troop reduction over the next months and years, the need continues to rise.
- AGING OF THE VETERAN POPULATION The number of Veterans over the age of 75 in Minnesota is projected to increase by approximately 9% over the next 20 years.

The needs have always been great for Veterans, and will remain so for the foreseeable future. Therefore, the mission of MDVA remains clear and strong – to meet the needs of our Minnesota Veterans.

Results

OF MDVA SERVICES

Throughout 2014, MDVA staff and our partners have remained committed to **providing excellent service** to Veterans and their families. Here is just a quick overview of some of the results from these efforts:

Increase in compensation/pensions

The number of MN Veterans and their dependents receiving federal VA compensation or pensions increased 8%



Increase in MDVA representation

The number of Veterans and their dependents who have MDVA as their accredited representative to the Federal VA **increased nearly 14%**



Increase at Veterans Resource Centers

The number of new individuals served at the Veterans Resource Centers through the Higher Education Veterans Program **increased over 12%**



Increase satisfaction with CORE program

Veteran CORE program participants that were satisfied with the services received, and how their needs were met, **increased by 7**%




High ratings for MDVA cemetery services

Burial services at Little Falls Veterans Cemetery received a **rating of 100%** from Veterans and their families as either **satisfied** or **extremely satisfied**



Veterans Homes receive high satisfaction rating

To determine satisfaction levels, MDVA Residents and their families at all five Veterans Homes are surveyed on a monthly basis by the independent rating service, *Pinnacle Quality Insight*. Fifteen areas are monitored, including nursing care, response to needs, therapy, safety, cleanliness and more. With a scale of **1**, indicating *Not satisfied*, to a high rating of **5**, indicating *Extremely satisfied*, MDVA achieved a rating of **4.64** for 2014.



Veterans Homes earn "Best in Class" rating

Based on the survey results performed by *Pinnacle Quality Insight* comparing nursing homes from across the country, in 2014, Minnesota Veterans Homes earned **forty-nine** "Best in Class" certificates, given only to facilities that exceed the national average

SERVICES OF MDVA

In recognition of service and sacrifices above and beyond, a number of **state** and **federal** programs are available to Veterans and their families – programs that care for their health needs, defray burial costs, and assist with returning to jobs and communities. **The mission of the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) is to be the resource** that Veterans and their families can turn to regarding what programs are available, and how to access these earned benefits. The assistance offered to Veterans by MDVA is through two divisions of service: *Health Care* and *Programs & Services*.



Established in 1887, in the early days, Minnesota Veterans Homes were not primarily designed as medical facilities. But as the health care needs of returning Veterans changed, so, too, has the mission of the MDVA Veterans Homes. Today, MDVA facilities serve a range of health needs, including *skilled nursing care, special care units* for specific conditions such as dementia and Alzheimer's, 24/7 *domiciliary care* and *adult day center* services.

Minnesota Veterans Homes are located in:

- Fergus Falls
- Hastings
- Luverne
- Minneapolis*
- Silver Bay
- * MDVA's Minneapolis campus also provides Adult Day Center services.

The areas of care MDVA Homes provide include:

- Primary medical care
- Occupational and physical rehabilitation & fitness
- Recreational and work therapy
- Drug and alcohol treatment
- Mental health services
- Dental and optometry care
- Diet and nutrition services
- Pharmaceutical services
- Social and behavioral services
- Volunteer programs

Through the MDVA Programs & Services division, Minnesota Veterans from all eras are connected to important benefits and resources earned through service. Collaborating with partners in the Veterans services community, MDVA's key areas of assistance include *financial*, *educational*, and *medical* benefits. These benefits are administered through six specific program sections:

- Claims and Field Operations
- Veterans Education and Employment Division
- State Veterans Cemeteries and Memorial Affairs
- State Veterans Benefits Division
- Homelessness Prevention
- MDVA Grant Programs

MDVA **HEALTH CARE**

For 127 years, the mission of MDVA Health Care division has been to care for the mental, physical, and spiritual well-being of Veterans and their families. Guiding this goal has been the promise to deliver needed care in a community environment built on respect and with dignity – so no Minnesota Veteran from any era of service is alone during times of need.



Workforce Development

Professional growth of MDVA's clinical staff has a tremendous impact on recruitment and retention.

To enhance core clinical competencies, MDVA has enlisted membership in the Twin City Health Care Partnership, a collaborative for clinical training and education.

Federal nursing recruitment and retention grant proposals, along with state matching funds, will provide the additional funding needed to focus on workforce development.

A workforce development initiative has also been submitted for this legislative session.

Telemedicine - Care at Home

MDVA is among the *first state Veterans Homes* to partner with **Veterans Affairs Medical Center (VAMC)** on the *implementation of a telemedicine program*. This program will allow our Veterans to remain in their home setting while receiving excellent consultation services

with physicians and providers at VAMC clinics.

Growing Partnerships

To advance our mission, exceeding standards and meeting the changing needs of Minnesota Veterans, MDVA will continue to establish and build on our partnerships with VAMC, VISN, VSOs, CTF, the Commissioners Healthcare Task Force, as well as community stakeholders and providers.

Continued Quality Improvements

As we look forward—clinical quality, operational quality, employee satisfaction, and safety, all remain MDVA areas of focus and improvement for our Homes. Specific projects to achieve this include the implementation of the *continuity of operations* program, innovative *energy saving plans*, as well as *preventive maintenance* programs.

Standards of Practice

Development of the standards of care for physicians and providers at MDVA Homes are also at the forefront, as we look forward to further enhancing the best practices in treatments, medications and protocols for medical staff.

Pharmacy Services

MDVA's **Central Pharmacy will continue to grow** and expand, completing a statewide implementation and automation of pharmacy services.

CMS Compliance

Clinical and operational performance continues to improve as we work to *meet the* Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Certification in each of MDVA's skilled nursing Homes. This compliance affords MDVA an additional opportunity to bill and collect revenues, used to offset ongoing increases in the cost of programs and the overall delivery of care.

Facility Improvements

A needs assessment and strategic plan for the MVH-Hastings and the domiciliaries at the Hastings and Minneapolis Homes are areas of focus for MDVA facilities, as we move forward.

Scheduled is the construction and bed replacement of the former Building 17 at MVH-Minneapolis.

Located in a tranquil community, just minutes from the Twin Cities, is the Hastings Veterans Home. Surrounded by 128-acres of forest, Residents are afforded an active lifestyle with facility features that include nature trails, a biking path, outdoor pavilion, year-round heated screen porch and more.

UNIQUE TO THE HASTINGS VETERANS HOME PROGRAM

- · Veterans Woodshop provides a therapeutic working environment to learn and excel in the woodworking trade
- Special Services include sobriety maintenance, vocational rehabilitation, mental health care, and educational services
- · Highly-engaged with the Hastings community, recreational and social programs for Veterans are plentiful, as well as Veterans volunteer opportunities to work with groups that include Meals on Wheels, Animal Ark, Hastings Family Services, the Veterans Choir, Regina senior living and nursing centers, Adopt a Highway and Feed My Starving Children, just to name a few.

2014 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Developed a "Bucket List" program that fulfills the request of a Veteran residing in the Hastings Home, nearing the end of life. The Bucket List request that was honored in 2014 included a two-day weekend stay at Lake Superior to enjoy the scenery and activities. Funding for this program is financed through donations.
- The Community Transition House has been updated, affording Residents from the Veterans Home a second level of transitional assistance before reaching complete independent living. Leases are individualized and range up to two years, depending on the Veteran's needs.
- The **Domiciliary Program**, a rehabilitative program that enables Residents to achieve their highest level of independence, continued to expand and improve. Emphasis in 2014 was on increasing employment opportunities, reestablishing family support where desired, and resolving legal and financial barriers.

Women Veteran Program

In February of 2014, the Claims and Field Operations re-launched the Women Veteran Program by reestablishing relationships with community partners with similar interests, and activating a network of personal and private representatives skilled in women Veteran issues and considerations.

Claims and Field Operations coordinated and held the 2014 Women Veteran Conference.

Gold Star Family Program

In February of 2014, the Claims and Field Operations assumed responsibility for the *Gold Star Family Retreat*. It was immediately decided the Agency would dedicate resources to transform the Gold Star Family event into a program providing support and resources to the surviving families.

The position of Gold Star Family Representative was created and filled in 2014.

The 2014 Gold Star Family retreat was a success in terms of record attendance and feedback from the families attending.

Plans to provide *annual* workshops with counseling services on site is in full development for 2015.

CVSO

Maintaining a strong partnership with the CVSO Association is a valuable accomplishment, because it provides a *coordinated team approach* when representing MDVA clientele.

In 2014, due to deployments, illness, extended leaves and vacancies, Claims and Field Operations assisted the CVSOs by temporarily staffing the county offices in: Lyon, Redwood, Pope, Stevens, Wright, Swift, Lake, Winona and Carver:

Tribal Veterans Service Officer (TVSO)

MDVA works in regions such as Red Lake and Grand Portage helping American Indian Veterans apply for the benefits they have earned. The TVSO program is operated in partnership with Governmental and Tribal agencies, the Governor's Office, Minnesota State Legislators and the Minnesota Native American Nations.

State Approving Agency (SAA)

The Minnesota State Approving Agency (SAA) ensures *quality education* and *training programs* for Veterans by approving education, training (OJT and Apprenticeship), flight licensing and certification programs that meet the requirements of Title 38 USC.

The SAA:

- Continuously monitors approved institutions to ensure continued compliance with the law
- Assists the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in preventing fraud, waste and abuse of the Federal GI Bill benefits

HIGHLIGHTS

Approval of Programs



In Minnesota, there are 262 active facilities where at least one beneficiary received federal GI Bill funding. Within these facilities, the Minnesota SAA oversees 1,973 individual programs, and took action on 197 programs.

Compliance Surveys



The SAA met the federal VA requirements, conducting and completing 77 facility compliance surveys

Technical Assistance, Outreach & Liaison



State Approving Agency employees conducted **84** technical assistance **training** actions, **43** outreach **events**, and **57** liaison **activities**

Minnesota GI Bill

The Minnesota GI Bill provides postsecondary education assistance and on-the-job training (OJT) and apprenticeship to eligible Veterans and their dependents.

Higher Education Veterans Program

The **Higher Education Veterans Program** was created in 2006. The program's goal is to assist Veterans and current military members, and their families, with their higher **educational needs** so they are able to succeed in their chosen careers.

This MDVA program continues to be a national model by providing colleges and universities throughout Minnesota with staff members who help to identify eligible Veterans and remove barriers to enrollment or access to these benefits. *Unique to Minnesota* is the **On-Campus Veterans' Resource Center** which provides student Veterans and their families a welcoming environment, as well as an opportunity for interaction and networking with other Veterans and families.

HIGHLIGHTS



With the expansion of the Minnesota GI Bill to Veterans from all eras, and their eligible dependents, the program has seen an 11% increase.



Partnerships with other state agencies such as the Office of the Governor, Minnesota State College and University System (MnSCU), Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED), Minnesota National Guard, and the Office of Higher Education (OHE), continue to strengthen



MDVA staff assisted over 1,130 students with the Federal Tuition Assistance program, providing over \$3.5 million in federal funding to Minnesota institutions of higher learning



Higher Education Veterans Program Coordinators conducted 68 outreach training events, providing instruction to over 2,700 individuals



The On-Campus Veterans Resource Centers continue to be a referral source for student Veterans by providing 3,466 referrals to outside agencies that include the Department of Employment and Economic Development, County Veterans Service Officers, Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans, Federal Veterans Administration, and other service organizations

Veterans Employment

MDVA is committed to assisting students as they move from their academic career to the workforce, linking all Veterans to programs and resources available to transition from military to civilian employment. To achieve this goal, MDVA provides resources and training to Veterans, private businesses, public employers, and Veteran business owners.

HIGHLIGHTS



Completed year-long grant, in collaboration with the National Governors Association, that focused on building bridge programs for targeted military career fields at local institutions of higher learning

Amended legislation for Veterans who were in the military police career field, allowing them to take the Police Officer Standards Test (POST) after four years of active duty service

Partnered with Twin Cities Public Television on the Veterans Electronic Resources for Transitioning into Civilian Life (VERTICL) project. The project's focus is to develop an outreach, recruitment, training and retention plan to create a pathway to sustainable STEM careers in manufacturing for Veterans. VERTICL's goal is to improve the overall employability of military Veterans and active duty service members, thereby increasing the number of Veterans entering manufacturing career pathways.

Continued to support and present at Yellow Ribbon Company summit events held around the state. The initiative continues to bring in new companies located in cities throughout Minnesota. The latest company to receive the Governors Proclamation is Southwest State University in Marshall.

Through the multi-state agency and private businesses collaboration, **Project Patriot** was launched to *assist companies in the hiring and retention* of Veteran talent.

During "Hire a Veteran" month in July, the MDVA/DEED partnership sponsored Veterans employment initiatives with radio spots, advertisements, and the annual Veterans Career Fair.



FY 14 PREFERRED BURIAL CHOICE




RECOGNITION



Veterans Preference Act (VPA)

Under the Veterans Preference Act (VPA), Veterans are entitled to *limited preference benefits regarding employment hiring*, as well as *protections pertaining to layoffs and discharges*. The Veterans Preference statutes also give private employers the authorization to grant preferences to Veterans when hiring. MDVA's role is to provide information about VPA to both Veterans and public employers.

While MDVA cannot provide legal advice, if a Veteran's rights have allegedly been violated or denied, MDVA will help guide both parties through the review process steps.







2014 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

State Soldiers Assistance Program (SSAP)

The **State Soldiers Assistance Program (SSAP)** provides numerous benefits for Veterans and their dependents, including grants for *housing, dental, optical, education, subsistence, disaster relief,* and *special needs*. Based on the type of benefit the Veteran is seeking, varying income and asset qualifications may apply.



The State Soldiers Assistance Program distributed over **\$4.3 million** in funding throughout Minnesota during FY14



3,294 households applied for **4,879 benefits** in FY14 Of the 3,294 households that applied, **1,427 households** had **never applied for state benefits** through MDVA before

HIGHLIGHTS

Improved Case Management

Ongoing training of the Benefits staff in FY14 resulted in improved efficiencies in the processing and effectiveness of case management

New Solutions

The MDVA Benefits team initiated work on a number of program improvements that will serve to:

- increase efficiencies in the administration of its public programs
- improve transparency and access to information
- implement a *multi-layered SharePoint site* that CVSOs can access to obtain up-to-date information and on-line training
- become 100% paperless through a document repository system

Emergency Relief Grants

The SSAP administered an *Emergency Relief Grant* that provided over \$120,000 in relief funds to *Veterans in 22 counties* recovering from severe storms experienced in June 2013

Dental Funding

The MDVA assisted **296 Veterans in need of dentures**, but unable to afford them, at a total cost of over **\$650,000**

Assisting the Homeless

Over a million dollars has been spent in FY14 by SSAP assisting 751 Veterans and their dependents with shelter costs

SSAP grants helped 708 Veterans families remain in their homes

Heading Home: Minnesota's Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness sets the goal of ending Veteran homelessness in 2015 through appropriate, effective solutions delivered on a Veteran-by-Veteran basis. While ending homelessness does not mean that a Veteran will never experience a housing crisis, this initiative would help to ensure a rapid response to prevent and address homelessness among Veterans, whenever possible.

Since 1991, Wilder Research performs a study every three years on "Homeless Veterans in Minnesota." The most current data, from November 2013, noted the following:



Support Our Troops License Plate Program

MDVA and the Minnesota Department of Military Affairs help military families and underserved Veterans throughout the state by contributions made through the **Support Our Troops** Program. With purchases made from Support Our Troops license plates, the program provides grants and enables military families, homeless and underserved Veterans to receive support, counseling, emergency financial assistance, secure shelter and access to benefits they deserve.



Veterans Service Organizations (VSO) Grants

Grants are provided to Congressionally Chartered Veterans Service Organizations in Minnesota that assist Minnesota Veterans and their families in receiving all federal, state and local benefits to which they are entitled.

County Veterans Service Officers (CVSO) Grants

Grants are distributed to Minnesota's 87 counties so they, in turn, can provide outreach to the Veterans in their locale for:

- reintegration
- collaboration with community social service agencies, educational institutions, and organizations to enhance the services offered to Veterans
- reducing homelessness among Veterans in their county
- enhancing the operations of the County Veterans Service Office

Completely redesigned in 2013, the MinnesotaVeteran.org Website has achieved the key goal set forthto help Minnesotans differentiate the services of the MDVA from the Federal Department of Veterans Affairs. This distinction was achieved through the use of video and multimedia elements, a pressroom, virtual tours, a FAQ Veteran support portal (LinkVet), updated activity calendars for the Veterans Homes, and many more site features. Implementing the "Plain Language" directive of Governor Mark Dayton, MinnesotaVeteran.org provides users with current, immediate information that is easy to understand, easy to access – all resulting in an irreplaceable benefit to Veterans and their loved ones, as well as an important resource to state and federal leaders, members of the media, and the community at large.

HIGHLIGHTS

More than 80,000 individuals accessed the website over 165,000 times, viewing more than half a million pages

With an average of 3.02 pages viewed per session, and session duration of three minutes, twenty-two seconds, users are able to quickly locate and understand the information they seek

If a site visitor has questions or needs help, MinnesotaVeteran.org provides the option of participating in a live chat with the LinkVet support staff, which resulted in 2.675 live chats in 2014

RADIO: Minnesota Military

Minnesota Military Radio is a weekly public affairs program covering information from the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs, the Minnesota National Guard and Beyond the Yellow Ribbon. Vietnam Veteran and volunteer host Tom Lyons seeks to create a bond and make a difference to the families, Veterans and members of our armed forces. Minnesota Military Radio is about telling the stories of those currently serving, those who have served, and the families and communities who have supported them, and features a weekly message from MDVA Commissioner Larry Shellito.



 This year's Minnesota Veterans Day event was kicked off with an early addition of Minnesota Military Radio Show, and featured a variety of special guests, including Minnesota Secretary of State, Mark Ritchie, Maj. Gen. Rick Nash and Commissioner Larry Shellito.

Minnesota Military Radio airs Sunday mornings at 7 a.m. on Twin Cities News Talk AM 1130, and on nearly 20 stations throughout Minnesota. A list of current stations, schedules, and a coverage map are available online. Listen to recent episodes at Minnesotamilitaryradiohour.com

LEGISLATIVE ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF MDVA

It was another wonderful year for Minnesota Veterans. Once again, MDVA received **great support from the Governor** and the **legislature** during what was termed the "Unsession," referring to work that was needed in order to clean-up antiquated laws to make Minnesota's government leaner and more efficient for the citizens. Traditionally, however, it was the bonding year of the biennium, so in keeping with the normal order of business, the legislature was also able to **pass a substantial bonding bill to ensure the states' critical capital improvements were sufficiently funded.**



2014 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Minneapolis Veterans Home

The bonding bill included \$2,000,000 for asset preservation to the 50+ MDVA buildings statewide, and \$700,000 for restoration and repairs of the Minneapolis deep tunnel.

Taxes

Amended this year was the law pertaining to the homestead of disabled Veterans or family caregivers that allows for a tax exclusion for Veterans with an honorable discharge, and a service connected disability of 70-100%.

The surviving spouses' qualification period was also expanded from five years post death to eight years.

This new law is effective for taxes payable in 2015, and applies to homesteads that initially qualified for the exclusion for taxes payable in 2009 and thereafter.

Veteran-Owned Small Business

This session yielded gains to Veteran small businesses. A new law now **authorizes** and enables Veteran-owned small businesses to receive state level certification using the rules already in place for small businesses, socially disadvantaged small businesses, or economically disadvantaged area small businesses. This will lighten the burden on Veteran business certifications, as the state can now perform the required certifications to compete for state funded business. Funding to make this an efficient process will now need to be sought in the next budget year.

Honorary Naming

The bridge over the Mississippi River on Trunk Highway 60 at the city of Wabasha was designated as the "Michael Duane Clickner Memorial Bridge." Sergeant Clickner was the only resident of Wabasha killed during the Vietnam War.

The southwestern border of Chisago City to the eastern border of Center City was designated as the "Nicholas Patrick Spehar Memorial Highway." Special Warfare Operator Petty Officer 2nd Class (SEAL) Nicholas Patrick Spehar of Chisago City was killed in combat operations in Afghanistan on August 6, 2011.

Temporary Licensing for Former and Current Members of the Military

A variety of licensing boards were appropriated funding, ranging between \$1,000 to \$44,000, and directed to establish procedures to expedite licenses and to issue temporary licenses to qualified active duty military members, their spouses, and honorably discharged Veterans who have left service in the prior two years.

To qualify for a temporary license, an individual must have a current, valid license, certificate or permit without a history of disciplinary action, and must pass a background check.

County Veterans Service Office Operational (CVSO) Enhancement Grant

During the 2013 Legislative Session, the structure of the County Veterans Service Office grant program, administered by MDVA, was modified and the state funding increased to \$1.1M annually. This program is designed to enhance the operations of the County Veterans Service Office, as well as provide outreach services to the county's Veterans. The previous Operational Improvement Grant that was on a three-year rotating cycle was replaced with an annual base grant to all 87 counties in the amount of \$7,500. In addition to the base grant, each county is eligible for an additional amount, as determined by the USVA, based on the county's Veteran population.

To be eligible for the grant, the lead CVSO in each county must be certified through continuing education courses to ensure they are trained and proficient in their duties. In fiscal year 2014, the Operational Enhancement Grant provided \$915,000 to qualified counties. To assist in the certification of mandated County Veterans Service Officer training and accreditation, and the costs associated with reintegration services, the Minnesota Association of County Veterans Service Officers receives \$50,000 annually from this grant program. The commissioner is authorized to use any unexpended funding for this grant program to provide training and education for the CVSOs. In fiscal year 2014, \$6,250.31 was used for this purpose.

Military and Veteran Resident Tuition Rates

Although Minnesota's state colleges are very supportive of Veteran students, and already had internal policies to ensure tuition rates for Veterans are at the most affordable level. a new law was passed to codify the fact that Veterans from across the nation with an honorable discharge can take advantage of Minnesota's public post-secondary education opportunities at an in-state tuition rate.

Veterans Memorials

\$450,000 was designated to complete the design and construction of a memorial in the Capitol Area to honor all Hmong-Lao who were allied with the American forces during the Vietnam War.

The city of Edina and North St. Paul received \$225,000 and \$100,000 respectively for Veterans memorials.

The Veterans Voices Program

\$125,000 was appropriated from the arts and cultural heritage fund for the Veterans' Voices Program to educate and engage the community regarding Veterans contributions, knowledge, skills, and experiences.

Of this amount, \$25,000 is allocated to the Association of Minnesota Public Education Radio Stations for statewide programming to promote the Veterans' Voices program.

Camp Ripley/ Veterans State Trail

Within the final Capital Investment bill, \$1,732,000 was appropriated to further develop the Camp Ripley/Veterans Trail. This is one of Minnesota's newest state trails, authorized by the Minnesota Legislature in 2009. The trail is envisioned as a multi-use system, accommodating a variety of motorized and non-motorized uses, linking the Soo Line Trail south of Little Falls, MN, to the Crow Wing State Park and the Paul Bunyan State Trail.

De-Escalation Training

\$50,000 was again appropriated in fiscal year 2015 to the Peace Officer Standards and Training Board (POST). This funding is to train Minnesota Veterans following their return from active military service in a combat zone, as state and local community safety personnel, assisting in crisis de-escalation.

New Veterans License Plates

Two new laws were created relative to Veterans specialty licenses plates. The first one is for a smaller motorcycle version of the existing "Combat Wounded Vet" license plate.


The second plate gained this session is the "Woman Veteran" license plate for both automobiles and motorcycles.








