TRESPASS

This is only a summary of the Minnesota Trespass Law relating to taking wild animals. The complete text of this law is found in Minnesota Statutes Sections 97B.001 and 97A.315. In addition, there are other state laws pertaining to trespass that may apply. Consult local law enforcement authorities if you have questions. GENERAL RESTRICTIONS (Note: See below for exceptions. definitions, and posting requirements.)

- 1. Permission Required to Enter Agricultural Land. A person may not enter agricultural land to hunt or trap or to operate a motor vehicle for pleasure purposes, without permission.
- 2. Entering Land Prohibited After Notice. A person may not enter any private land to take a wild animal after being orally notified not to do so.
- 3. Entering Posted Land Prohibited. A person may not enter any legally posted land to take a wild animal, without permission.
- 4. Taking With Firearms Near Occupied Buildings or Corrals.
- (A) On another person's agricultural land or on a public right-of-way, a person may not take a wild animal with a firearm within 500 feet of a building occupied by a human or livestock, without written permission.
- (B) On land other than agricultural land, a person may not take a wild animal with a firearm within 200 feet of a building occupied by a human, without oral
- (C) On any land a person may not take a wild animal with a firearm within 500 feet of a stockade or corral containing livestock, without permission.
- 5. Destruction of Property. A person may not wound or kill another person's domestic animal or destroy, cut, or tear down another person's fence, building, grain, crops, live tree or sign legally posting the land.
- 6. Gate Closing. A person may not pass through another person's closed gate without closing the gate.

EXCEPTIONS TO GENERAL RESTRICTIONS

- 1. Retrieving Wounded Game From Agricultural Land. A hunter, on foot, may retrieve wounded game, during the season for the game, from agricultural land that is not legally posted, unless the person has been orally notified not to enter the land. The hunter must leave immediately after retrieving the game.
- 2. Retrieving Dogs From Private Land. A person may, without permission, enter private land on foot to retrieve a dog that has treed or is at bay with a raccoon, bobcat, covote or fox. This includes private agricultural land, legally posted land, and land the person has been orally notified not to enter. After retrieving the dog, the person must immediately leave the premises. Note: This exception does not authorize the taking of the raccoon, bobcat, coyote or fox without


DEFINITIONS AND POSTING REQUIREMENTS

Agricultural Land means land: (1) that is plowed or tilled; (2) that has standing crops or crop residues; or (3) within a maintained fence for enclosing domestic

Permission To or Notification Not To enter private land or take wild animals near occupied buildings or corrals may only be given by the owner, occupant,

Legally Posted Land. The owner, occupant or lessee of private land, or an authorized manager of public land may prohibit unauthorized hunting, trapping, fishing, or trespassing on the land by posting signs that: (1) display letters at least two inches high; (2) are signed by the owner, occupant, lessee or authorized manager; and (3) are at intervals of 1,000 feet or less along the boundary of the area, or in a wooded area where boundary lines are not clear, at intervals of 500

"no fishing", "no trespassing", or another sign that prohibits trespass on land or water where the person does not have a property right, title, or interest to use

PENALTIES

Criminal Penalties. A person is guilty of a gross misdemeanor if the person: (1) knowingly disregards signs prohibiting trespass; or (2) trespasses after personally being notified by the landowner or lessee not to trespass. A person who violates any other provision of this law relating to trespass is guilty of a misdemeanor, except a person convicted of violating this law more than once in a threeyear period is guilty of a gross misdemeanor.

License Revocations. If a person is convicted under this law of trespassing while exercising or attempting to exercise an activity licensed under the game and fish laws or requiring snowmobile registration, the applicable license and registration are null and void. A person convicted of a gross misdemeanor under this law may not be issued a license to take game for two years after the conviction.

ENFORCEMENT

Conservation Officers and peace officers must enforce the trespass laws.

DEER LICENSE PURCHASE

- A person may not take deer without a license. A person must have a firearms deer license to take deer with firearms and an archery deer license to take deer by archery.
- A person may not purchase more than one firearm deer license and one bow and arrow deer license in any one calendar year, except for "bonus deer" areas.
- A person under the age of 16 may not obtain a license to take big game unless the person possesses a firearms safety certificate. A certificate may not be issued to a person under age 12. A person under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian to hunt big game.
- "Guardian" is a legal guardian or any person age 18 or over selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under age 16.
- Resident licenses may be issued only to (1) citizens of the United States or resident aliens who have maintained a legal residence in the state at least the immediately preceding 60 days; (2) a nonresident under the age of 21 who is the child of a resident; or (3) a person in the armed forces of the United States that is stationed in the state.
- Nonresidents attending schools in Minnesota are required to purchase a nonresident license for hunting deer or bear in Minnesota except a non-resident that is a full-time foreign exchange student at a high school in the state and resides with persons in the state may obtain a resident license to take deer by archery by providing proof of foreign exchange student status as prescribed by the commissioner.

MILITARY AND VETERANS

- A resident that is in the armed forces of the United States, stationed outside of the state, and in the state on leave, may hunt deer or hear without a license if the resident possesses official military leave papers. The resident must obtain from a county auditor the seals, tags, and coupons required of a licensee which must be furnished without charge. See Commissioner's Order re: antlerless deer.
- A resident that is discharged from the United States armed forces during, or within ten days before, the firearms deer season may, upon showing the official discharge paper, obtain a firearm deer license during the season
- A person authorized to issue licenses must issue, without a fee, a license to take deer with firearms or by archery to a resident that is a veteran and that has a 100 percent service connected disability as defined by the United States Veterans Administration upon being furnished satisfactory evidence.

- All firearms deer licenses including those for the special muzzleloader season and bow and arrow deer licenses must be purchased on or before November
- Licenses are obtainable from County Auditors or their agents. Each applicant for a license must appear in person before the agent.

LEGAL FIREARMS

- A person may take big game with a firearm only if: (1) the rifle, shotgun, and handgun used is a caliber of at least .23 inches; (2) the firearm is loaded only with single projectile ammunition: (3) a projectile used is a caliber of at least .23 inches and has a soft point or is an expanding bullet type; (4) the ammunition has a case length of at least 1.285 inches; (5) the muzzleloader used is incapable of being loaded at the breech; (6) the smooth-bore muzzleloader used is a caliber of at least .45 inches; and (7) the rifled muzzleloader used is a caliber of at least .40 inches.
- A person may not take big game with a .30 caliber M-1 carbine cartridge.
- Only metallic open and "peep" type sights are legal during the Special Muzzleloader Hunt.
- Rifled barrels on shotguns are legal statewide.

HANDGUNS: State law provides that persons 18 years of age or older may carry a handgun in the woods or fields or upon the waters of this state for the purpose of hunting or target shooting. The carrying of handguns elsewhere in the state or in motor vehicles or by persons under the age of eighteen years is subject to special restrictions and may require a handgun permit. Questions concerning the carrying of handguns and handgun permits should be directed to your local police or county sheriff.

All species of big game may be taken with a handgun, except deer may not be taken with a handgun (including muzzleloading handguns) at any time in the Shotgun Zone. A person suffering from a physical disability rendering him/her incapable of using a shoulder fired gun but capable of using a handgun and possessing a doctor's statement to this effect may take deer with a handgun in the Shotgun

POSSESSION OF FIREARMS

- A person may not possess a firearm or ammunition outdoors during the period beginning the tenth day before the open firearms season and ending the second day after the close of the season within an area where deer may be taken by a firearm, except: (1) during the open season and in an area where big game may be taken, a firearm and ammunition authorized for taking big game in that area may be used to take big game in that area if the person has a valid big game license in possession; (2) an unloaded firearm that is in a case or in a closed trunk of a motor vehicle; (3) a shotgun and shells containing No. 4 buckshot or smaller diameter lead shot or steel shot; (4) a handgun or rifle and only short, long, and long rifle cartridges that are caliber of .22 inches; (5) handguns possessed by a person authorized to carry a handgun under sections 624.714 and 624.715 for the purpose authorized; and (6) on a target range operated under a permit from the commissioner.

TRANSPORTATION OF FIREARMS

- "Unloaded" means, with reference to a firearm, without ammunition in the barrels and magazine, if the magazine is in the firearm. A muzzle loading firearm with a flintlock ignition is unloaded if it does not have priming powder in a pan. A muzzle loading firearm with percussion ignition is unloaded if it does not have a percussion can on a nipple

LEGAL BOW AND ARROW

- A person may not take big game by archery while in possession of a firearm.
- Bows must have a pull of no less than 40 pounds at or before full draw.
- Arrowheads used for taking big game must be sharp and have a minimum of two metal cutting edges, be of a barbless broad head design, and must have a diameter of at least seven-eighths inch.
- A person may not hunt with a bow drawn, held, or released by a mechanical device, except with a disabled hunter permit issued under MS. Sec. 97B 106 or as provided by the following: A person may use a mechanical device attached to the bowstring if the person's own strength draws, holds, and releases the
- A person may not hunt deer or turkey with a crossbow except by special permit issued to persons unable to hunt by archery because of a permanent disability that is verified in writing by a licensed physician.

TRANSPORTATION OF BOWS

- A person may not transport an archery bow in a motor vehicle unless the how is (1) unstrung; (2) completely contained in a case; or (3) in the closed trunk of a motor vehicle

USE OF ARTIFICIAL LIGHT WITH FIREARMS AND BOWS

- A person may not cast the rays of a spotlight, headlight, or other artificial light on a highway, or in a field, woodland, or forest, to spot, locate, or take a wild animal (except pursuant to 97B.621 and 97B.931), while having in possession. either individually or as one of a group of persons, a firearm, bow, or other implement that could be used to kill big game.
- This subdivision does not apply to a firearm that is: (1) unloaded; (2) in a gun case expressly made to contain a firearm that fully encloses the firearm by being zipped, snapped, buckled, tied, or otherwise fastened without any portion of the firearm exposed; and (3) in the closed trunk of a motor vehicle.
- This subdivision does not apply to a bow that is: (1) completely encased or unstrung; and (2) in the closed trunk of a motor vehicle.
- If the motor vehicle does not have a trunk, the firearm or how must be placed in the rearmost location of the vehicle.

WITHOUT FIREARMS OR BOWS

- Between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. from September 1 to December 31, a person may not cast the rays of a spotlight, headlight, or other artificial light in a field, woodland, or forest to spot, locate, or take a wild animal except pursuant to 97B.621 and 97B.931. It is not a violation of this subdivision for a person to carry out any agricultural, occupational, or recreational practice, including snowmobiling that is not related to spotting, locating or taking a wild

SAFETY PROVISIONS

- A person may not hunt or trap during the open season in a zone or area where deer may be taken by firearms, unless the visible portion of the person's cap and outer clothing above the waist, excluding sleeves and gloves, is bright red or blaze orange. Blaze orange includes a camouflage pattern of at least 50 percent blaze orange within each foot square.
- A person may not discharge a firearm or an arrow from a bow on, over, or across an improved public highway at a big game animal. A person may not discharge a firearm or bow and arrow within the right-of-way of an improved public highway at a big game animal.
- A person may not take protected wild animals with a firearm or by archery while under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance.

HINTING METHOD RESTRICTION

- A person may not take deer from a man-made platform or other structure higher than sixteen feet above the ground. The restriction does not apply to a portable stand that is chained, belted, clamped or tied with rope. On Wildlife Management Areas, only portable stands may be used and they must not be left
- A person may not use radio equipment to take a protected wild animal, or to take unprotected wild animals without a permit.
- A person may not shoot any wild animal from a motor vehicle. Disabled persons possessing a permit are excepted.

REGULATIONS FOR 'PARTY' HUNTING

- 1. A party is any group of two or more licensed deer hunters all of whom are afield hunting together at the same time all using firearms or all using bow and arrow. Therefore, a mixed weapons group would be two separate parties.
- 2. Any member of a party may kill a legal buck for any other member of the party who has an unused tag. Any member of a party may tag a legal buck killed by any other member of the party.
- 3. Any member of a party may kill an antlerless deer for any other member of the party who has an unused tag valid for an antlerless deer. Antlerless deer may only be tagged by party members licensed to take antlerless deer.

LICENSE REVOCATION

Upon conviction for any big game hunting violation, the license relating thereto is immediately revoked.

In addition, no big game license of any kind shall be issued to the violator for a period of three years from the date of conviction if the conviction is:

- 1. For a big game violation which is classified as a gross misdemeanor; 2. For doing an act without a big game license for which a big game license
- 3. For a second violation within a three year period for any other big game

The Trespass Law, which is summarized in panel 1, also contains penalty provisions which can result in license and registration revocation.

REPORTING VIOLATIONS

If you witness a violation or find an illegally taken animal leave it where you find it and contact a Conservation Officer, Sheriff's Office, or the Highway Patrol. Turn In Poachers. You can remain anonymous — a code number will be used instead of your name. Call 1-800-652-9093, Metro Area: 297-3999. Please do not call these numbers to obtain hunting regulation information.

GENERAL

SHOOTING HOURS — One-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

LIMIT — One deer per person per calendar year. Exception — See panels 11-12.

LEGAL BUCK — A deer having at least one antler not less than 3 inches long. Fawn bucks, sometimes called nubbin bucks or button bucks, are not legal bucks.

ANTLERLESS DEER - Does and fawns, including male fawns with nubbins or antlers less than 3 inches long.

REGISTRATION — You must register the deer you have tagged within 48 hours after your deer hunting license expires.

WHERE HUNTING IS ALLOWED — Deer season regulations permit hunting statewide with the following provisions.

- 1. Zones, areas, and time periods for various kinds of hunts are limited by these regulations. Please read all of this synopsis.
- 2. Refuges and state parks are closed to hunting except as specifically opened by
- 3. Cities, villages, and some townships have ordinances prohibiting the discharge of weapons. Variance may be only by permit. Check with the office of your local government unit - expecially if you are within or adjacent to a
- 4. The owners of property private, corporate, or public agency have the right to prohibit hunting on their land.

FIREARM SEASON CHOICES

- The firearms deer hunter has several options from which to select a hunting period and zone. A hunter's choice will be indicated by a hole punched in his license at the time of purchase. All of the alternatives are mutually exclusive and do not allow hunting under any choice other than the one selected and punched on the license.
- All of the options fall within the month of November except the Special Muzzleloader Season. That is a special hunt on designated lands and allows for taking deer of either sex. Details of that season are given on panels 15-16
- Hunters who choose any of the November options may hunt with muzzleloading guns but must follow regular firearms rules and cannot hunt in the Special Muzzleloader Season.
- A firearms deer hunter may apply for an Antlerless Permit or a Special Area Permit for the area of his choice within the zone he is licensed for. The various permit areas are listed on the map side of this folder and on panels 15-16 and 21-24. The separate procedures to be followed in applying for either Antlerless Permits or Special Area Permits are described on panels 8-10.

See map on reverse side for season choice details.

TYPES OF PERMITS AVAILABLE

- Antlerless Deer Permit . . . required to take an antlerless deer (either sex) . issued by a drawing that recognizes several levels of preference. Preference levels are determined by the number of unsuccessful applications since last receiving a permit. Some applicants will receive permits two years in a row if some permits remain after higher levels are filled. Some top level applicants can fail to receive a permit if a drawing at the highest level is necessary.
- Special Area Permit . . . required to enter certain areas for hunting . . . issued by a random (no preference) drawing.

INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS

Some requirements are the same for both types of permit. They are listed below. In addition, each type of permit has some special requirements. They are listed below the general requirements and on panels 9 and 10.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS — ALL PERMITS

To apply for either an Antlerless Permit or Special Area Permit -

- You must first purchase a 1988 deer license to obtain the application card required to make application for any permit. This means you must hunt in the option chosen regardless of whether or not you receive a permit.
- You may NOT apply for both an Antlerless Permit and a Special Area Permit. You may apply for only one Antlerless Permit or only one Special Area Permit. Bow and arrow permits are not included in this restriction.
- Your application for a permit must be filled out as requested or it will not be
- Both Minnesota residents and nonresidents are eligible for permits.
- A permit is not transferable between persons or between permit areas.
- Special requirements that differ between Antlerless Permit applications and Special Area Permit applications are listed below and on panels 9 and 10.

-ANTLERLESS DEER PERMITS-

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS — See above.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ANTLERLESS PERMITS -

- Antlerless Permits limit the number of people who are allowed to take does and fawns within a permit area. The number of buck hunters is not limited.
- Antlerless Permit applicants may NOT apply as a party. The volume of applications requires processing which cannot handle variable size groups to be treated as one. Do NOT mail application in envelope.

AREAS OPEN FOR ANTLERLESS PERMITS

The permit areas are identified on the firearms deer season map (other side of sheet) by white numbers within a solid white boundary line. Note that some permit areas are subdivided into registration blocks by white dotted lines and have several numbers within the solid line boundary. This subdivision of permit areas has been done only to allow deer registration from the hunting map and does not affect where you can hunt within the permit area. These permit areas have a single antlerless permit quota as shown by a bracket within the permit table on the upper right corner of the map. You may use any one of the numbers within the same solid boundary to apply for an antlerless permit. The permit will be valid for all blocks within that solid boundary and bracketed together in the permit table.

APPLICATION DEADLINE - SEPTEMBER 8, 1988

- Application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered to the DNR License Center, 500 Lafayette Rd., St. Paul, 55155 no later than September 8, 1988.

Information regarding the Antlerless Permit drawing and individual applications will not be available until after October 26.

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION-

- If applications for permits exceed the area quotas, computerized drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.
- For Permit Areas requiring a drawing the following procedures will be in effect.
- All applicants for antierless permits who will reach their 18th birthday by September 8 must provide their Minnesota Driver's License or Minnesota Identification Card number. Also, anyone under 18 who wishes to gain preference for the 1989 or any future drawings, if they are unsuccessful in the 1988 drawing, must provide one of these numbers.
- However, people who will not reach their 18th birthday by September 8, 1988, can be in a special drawing for an antlerless permit by providing their Firearms Safety Training Certificate number. These people will not gain any preference for the 1989 drawing if unsuccessful in the 1988 drawing. Neither will they be excluded from the 1989 drawing if they are drawn in 1988.
- This special youth drawing is being held to accommodate young people who cannot obtain a driver's license or who do not wish to purchase the I.D. card. They are being allowed to enter the special drawing until they are 18 years old at which time they must either obtain a driver's license or I.D. number to apply for an antlerless permit.
- The number of antlerless permits available for the special youth drawing will be determined by the proportion of youths applying for a permit using their Firearms Safety Training Certificate number versus the total number of antlerless permits available for that area, as follows:

No. With Firearms Safety No. X No. of Permits for Area = No. of Youth

- All applications for the Area
- Although the youths will not gain any preference, this system gives them the opportunity to apply and be drawn on the same basis as they would have had prior to the preference system because they are all competing for the youth share of the permits each year.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Permits will be drawn and mailed no later than October 26, 1988.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE —

- A hunter receiving an Antlerless Permit is allowed to hunt antlerless deer only in the area for which he has received a permit. However, he may hunt bucks throughout the zone and during the time punched on his license.
- An Antlerless permit is not transferable between persons or between Antlerless

PARTY HUNTING WITH ANTLERLESS PERMITS—

- See panel 6.

-SPECIAL AREA PERMITS-

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS - See panel 8.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR SPECIAL PERMITS—

- Special Area Permits limit the number of people who are allowed to hunt within a designated Special Permit Area. Deer of either sex may be taken under such
- Special Area Permit applicants (1 to 4 persons) are allowed to apply as parties. Properly completed applications which are submitted in a single envelope will all be selected or none selected.
- Your application for a Special Area Permit must follow the instructions given below or it will not be eligible.

AREAS OPEN — (Special Areas are not shown on map.)

- See panels 21-24 (Muzzleloader hunters see panels 15-16).

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS/SPECIAL AREAS— (Except special bow hunt areas — see panel 14)

- Application for Special Permits must be made on the Antlerless Permit application provided with the deer license.
- Write "Special" above the Zone arrow on the form and write the number of the Special Area you choose in the spaces at the point of the Permit Area arrow.
- Indicate your choice of hunt periods available by writing the dates in the space above birth date.
- Cross out the address on the back of the application.
- MAIL IN AN ENVELOPE (up to four persons may apply as a party) to the address given where the Special Area is described.

APPLICATION DEADLINE —

- Envelopes containing application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered no later than September 8, 1988.

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION

- If applications for permits exceed the number allowed, drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.
- Since a Special Area Permit restricts who can enter an area to hunt, allowing applications by party (1 to 4 persons) is an essential feature. Currently, preference cannot be given in drawings with party applications because of the complexities of the preference system and limited computer capability. Therefore, the Special Area Permit drawings will be separate from the preference system. Success or failure in either an Antlerless Permit or a Special Area Permit drawing in some previous year will have no effect on an applicant's chances for a Special Area Permit this year.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Special Area Permits will be drawn and mailed no later than October 26, 1988.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE —

- A hunter receiving a Special Area Permit is allowed to hunt deer of either sex or any age within the designated area and time by regular firearms, or muzzleloader depending upon the type of hunt for which the permit is valid. The permit holder with a regular firearms license may also hunt bucks in the zone for which his license is valid. Muzzleloader permit hunters in the special season may hunt in the area for which they receive a permit as well as in any area open without special permits. Only one deer may be taken per hunter, except as provided in panels 11-12.

BONUS DEER REGULATIONS

A Bonus Deer is a legal second deer permitted by the 1988 season regulations. A second license at the regular fee must be purchased.

BONUS DEER LICENSES WILL BE AVAILABLE—

- in some undersubscribed Antlerless Permit Areas
- in some Special Permit Areas
- in the Metro Bonus Bow Area

PURCHASE IS AUTHORIZED—

- by a certificate issued to randomly drawn antierless permit holders in undersubscribed areas.
- by all permit holders for Special Areas where Bonus Licenses are available,
- as a second bow hunting license for the Metro Bonus Bow Area.

RESTRICTIONS

- All bonus licenses are valid for antierless deer only.
- No person may hunt deer by any means in firearms Zone 1 who is in any way licensed to tag two deer. This applies to firearms, bow and arrow, and muzzleloader hunters.
- No person may tag more than two deer in any calendar year.
- No person may tag two deer by using the regular Bow and Arrow Deer Hunting License tag and the regular Firearms Deer Hunting License tag.

- If you receive a certificate for a Bonus Deer License you are not required to purchase that second license unless you wish to hunt for a Bonus deer.
- Either the bonus or the regular license tag may be used first but if you wish to tag a deer on your regular Firearm Deer Hunting License (as a buck elsewhere in the zone) or on your regular Bow and Arrow Deer Hunting License you should use your Bonus Deer License tag first. If you use your regular license tag for your first deer in a Bonus Deer area you must also take the second deer in that area because the Bonus Deer tag is not valid elsewhere.

UNDERSUBSCRIBED ANTLERLESS PERMIT AREAS

After the Antlerless Permit drawings, Bonus Deer Licenses may be authorized where the number of applications is less than the quota. Persons authorized to purchase a Bonus Deer License will be drawn from the original antlerless permit applications. Therefore, no separate application is necessary. Applicants selected will receive, in addition to an Antlerless Permit, a nontransferable certificate that may be presented at a County Auditor's Office to purchase a Bonus Deer License and tag at the regular deer license fee.

The Bonus Deer License is valid only in your Antlerless Permit Area and is valid for antlerless deer only.

SPECIAL PERMIT AREAS

Bonus Deer Licenses are available for certain state parks and other special areas where drawings for permits are held. Applications for permits to hunt must be made as explained in panel 10.

Applicants drawn for a Special Permit Area will be offered a Bonus Deer License when they register for the hunt at the Special Area Headquarters but purchase of a Bonus License is not required. The Special Area Permit allows taking a deer

of either sex within the special area. If the Bonus Deer license is purchased, it is valid only for an antierless deer. This Bonus License is valid only within the special area and will be so marked.

TRANSPORTATION & REGISTRATION

DEER LEG TAG

The tag must be attached to the deer when: (1) the animal is in a camp, or a place occupied overnight or the yard surrounding the place; or (2) the animal is on a motor vehicle (self-propelled vehicle or any vehicle propelled or drawn by a self-propelled vehicle). Therefore you must —

- 1. Detach the leg tag from the deer license.
- 2. Scratch off the date of kill.
- 3. Insert the tag between the tendon and the bone of a hind leg.
- 4. Remove the tag's adhesive backing, and
- 5. Seal the adhesive side of the tag together around the leg bone.

-IMPORTANT-

Mark the date on the leg tag carefully, more than one date marked makes the tag invalid.

POSSESSING BIG GAME

 Every person taking a big game animal must retain the license, tag, permit, and registration tag that make it legal as long as any part of the meat is in possession.

TRANSPORTATION PERIOD RESTRICTED

- A person may transport lawfully taken and possessed deer, bear, or moose during the open season and the two days following the season.
- When such deer, bear, or moose is transported by other than common carrier (commercial transportation) the licensee must accompany it, except as provided below:

TRANSPORTATION BY PERSON OTHER THAN LICENSEE

— A person other than the licensee may transport deer, bear, or moose that the licensee has registered as prescribed by the commissioner. A tag must be attached to the animal and marked in ink with the address, license number, signature of the licensee, and the locations from which and to which the animal is being transported.

HEADS, HIDES AND CLAWS

— A resident that has a license to take deer, bear, or moose may transport the head or hide of the animal within or out of the state for mounting or tanning. The hides of deer, bear, and moose, and the claws of bear legally taken and with the tags that are required, may be bought, sold, and transported at any time.

TRANSPORTATION CAUTIONS

- The head of the deer must remain attached to the carcass until the deer is registered.
- All deer must be transported before and after registration so that inspection by enforcement officers is readily accomplished.

WANTON WASTE

 Unless expressly allowed, a person may not wantonly waste or destroy a usable part of a protected wild animal.

Your deer will be illegal unless registered. SEE LICENSE AGENTS or COUNTY AUDITORS

KILL REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

Every person taking a deer shall present the deer for registration at an official deer registration station and obtain a POSSESSION TAG before any of the following occur—

- before the deer is removed from the zone in which it is taken,*
- before the deer is processed either privately or commercially,
- before 48 hours after the expiration of his/her firearms deer hunting license;
 or for deer taken by bow, within 48 hours after taking.

Registration is required. Registration will be certified by a POSSESSION TAG

 A person may not process a deer unless it has been registered as attested by an attached POSSESSION TAG.

that will be issued at the time of registration. The hunter's license number and the year of issue will be written on the POSSESSION TAG by the registration agent. POSSESSION TAG must be attached around the deer's leg just as the license

POSSESSION TAG must be attached around the deer's leg just as the licer tag is. This must be done immediately after receiving the TAG.

The hunter registering the deer must sign the statement on the back of the registration slip certifying: 1) that he has personally presented the animal for registration; 2) that his license number appears on the license tag and possession tag; and 3) that both tags are affixed to the animal as specified for the license tag. It is the hunter's responsibility to insure that the deer is properly registered.

DEER MUST BE REGISTERED BY THE NUMBERED REGISTRATION BLOCKS SHOWN ON THE MAP IN THIS SYNOPSIS.

*Deer may also be presented for registration at an official station within a city or village through which a zone boundary passes or at an official station across the road but adjacent to the zone where taken. Bow and arrow deer registration is not restricted to location except where so designated for special area hunts.

USE OF SNOWMOBILES, OTHER VEHICLES No person who has a valid deer license shall operate a snowmobile, three-wheel

cycle or any other all-terrain vehicle, during legal shooting hours in any area open for the taking of deer by firearms on any day when the person is licensed to take deer within that area except during the period 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day. All-terrain vehicles include trail bikes, Cushman 6 wheelers, Cushman Tracksters, Bombadier J-5's and other similarly manufactured and homemade vehicles. This regulation applies to all lands and waters regardless of ownership, except that anyone using an all-terrain vehicle while pursuing his or her occupation on their own land and not in posession of a firearm is exempt. A permit to operate these restricted vehicles between one half hour before sunrise and sunset (other than during the period 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.) may be issued by a Conservation Officer in the event of an emergency or other unusual condition.

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^{*}Metro Bonus Bow Licenses are valid for permittees in these hunts.

STATE GAME REFUGES

A state game refuge is closed to firearms hunting of deer and bear unless listed

STATE GOOSE REFUGES AND STATE WATERFOWL REFUGES

State goose refuges and waterfowl refuges are closed to hunting of geese or waterfowl as indicated. Other forms of hunting and trapping are permitted during the established seasons and in the zones in which they are located.

STATE FORESTS

The public land within State Forests is open to hunting. State Game Refuges within State Forests are not open to big game hunting unless listed as open in this synopsis. Agricultural or posted private land within a State Forest may be hunted only with permission of the owner.

STATE SCIENTIFIC AND NATURAL AREAS

These areas are closed to hunting unless opened by Commissioner's Order. In 1988 the following areas are open:

ITASCA WILDERNESS SANCTUARY in Itasca Park is open to firearms deer hunting under Itasca State Park Regulations.

IRON SPRINGS BOG SNA in Clearwater County is open to firearms and bow deer hunting, consistent with regulations.

STATE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

All areas identified as wildlife management areas, except any portion thereon which may be posted against entry by "State Game Refuge," or "No Trespassing" signs, are open to big game hunting during established seasons for the zones in which they are located.

However, specific regulations will apply to certain areas as follows:

For Special Muzzleloader Hunts - See Muzzleloader Section.

The Lac qui parle Game Refuge in Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties is open as follows: Those portions of the refuge within the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site, or which are posted with "Do Not Trespass" signs, are closed to hunting or the carrying or possession of firearms or bows and arrows unless the firearm is unloaded and completely encased or unloaded and contained in the trunk of a car and the trunk door closed and the bow is unstrung or completely contained in a case or contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. The remainder of the refuge is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons therefor in the zones in which it is located. From September 20 to December 1, both dates inclusive, no unauthorized person shall trespass for any purpose whatsoever on any part of the refuge which is posted with signs prohibiting trespass during this period. No unauthorized person shall trespass on Rosemoen Island at any time during the year.

The Bayport Wildlife Management Area in Washington County and the Raguet WMA in Scott and Carver Counties are closed to the possession of all firearms unless unloaded and contained in a case, except for designated hunting areas during the season for the taking of small game when shotgun with fine shot only is permitted. Possession and use of bow and arrow is limited to the designated hunting areas during established hunting seasons.

MOTOR VEHICLES

The following regulations apply to the use of motor vehicles on Wildlife Management Areas other than on Federal, State, County or Township roads:

On the following wildlife management areas motor vehicles may be operated. not in excess of 20 mph, only on established roads, and no vehicle may be driven beyond a sign prohibiting vehicular use or beyond any man-made vehicle barrier: Carlos Avery (Anoka and Chisago Counties), Hubbel Pond (Becker County), Mille Lacs (Kanabec and Mille Lacs Counties), Red Lake (Beltrami and Lake of the Woods Counties), Roseau River (Roseau County), and Thief Lake (Marshall

On all other wildlife management areas vehicles are prohibited except vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on those routes designated by signs as being for travel purposes.

No vehicle may be parked where it obstructs travel.

No person may operate an all-terrain vehicle, all-terrain cycle, hang glider, air boat or hover craft in a wildlife management area. No person may operate a snowmobile in any wildlife management area without the written permission of the agent in charge thereof in that part of the state lying south and west of a line described as follows: U.S. Highway No. 2 from East Grand Forks easterly to Bemidii; thence southerly along U.S. Highway No. 71 to Wadena; thence easterly along U.S. Highway No. 10 to Staples and U.S. Highway No. 210 to the eastern boundary of the state.

Unauthorized use of aircraft below 1000 feet AGL (above ground level) over a wildlife management area is prohibited except in emergencies.

No part of any wildlife management area may be entered or used during the hours of 10:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m., if so posted at the major access points.

Camping is prohibited except in designated areas or by permit from the Area

Target, skeet, trap or promiscuous shooting is prohibited.

Wildlife Manager.

Signs, posts, fences, buildings, trees, shrubs, vines, plants or other property may not be destroyed or removed except that marsh vegetation may be used to build blinds on the area, and edible and decorative portions of plants may be picked for personal use.

Wildlife Management Areas - continued

Disposal or abandonment of garbage, trash, spoil, sludge, rocks, vehicles, or other debris or personal property on any wildlife management area is prohibited. Boats, decoys, and other equipment must not be left unattended overnight except traps on those wildlife areas open to trapping.

No person may construct or maintain any building, dock, fence, billboard, sign, or other structure on any wildlife management area, except that duck blinds may be erected but shall not become private property or be used to pre-empt hunting rights. It is unlawful to construct, occupy or use any elevated scaffold or other elevated device for the purpose of hunting, watching for or killing big game, except that portable tree stands may be used for this purpose provided they are removed each day at the close of hunting hours and do no permanent damage to trees in which they are placed.

Livestock, horses and other domestic animals, except dogs being used for hunting purposes, are not permitted on wildlife management areas except under cooperative agreement or permit prepared by the wildlife manager.

STATE PARKS

For Bonus License Hunts - See Bonus Section (panels 11-12)

For Special Muzzleloader Hunts — See Muzzleloader Section (panels 15-16). State Park vehicle permits are required on all vehicles taken into Minnesota State

All State parks are refuges by law but may be opened by Commissioner's Order. In 1988 the following regulations apply:

STATE PARKS OPEN WITH ZONE REGULATIONS

ITASCA STATE PARK in Becker, Clearwater and Hubbard Counties is open to firearms hunting for legal bucks only by Zone 2 license holders and for antierless deer by Area 287 permit holders, except where posted as closed, during the Zone

STATE PARKS OPEN ONLY WITH SPECIAL PERMIT

Certain parks are open to a limited number of deer hunters by Special Area Permits and the proper license. In each state park thus opened a permit holder must first register at the park office before beginning to hunt and he/she must register any deer taken at the park office before leaving the park. Parks open by Special Permit for bow and arrow hunting are listed on panel 14. Parks open by Special Permit for muzzleloader hunting are listed on panel 16. The parks listed below are open as described for legal firearm hunting. See panel 10 for application instructions.

LAKE BRONSON STATE PARK in Kittson County is open for either sex deer hunting by special permit. Forty (40) permits will be issued for Nov. 5-7. Bonus Deer Licenses will be available, see panels 11-12. This is Special Area No. 294. Address: Lake Bronson Deer Hunt, Box 9, Lake Bronson, MN 56734

ZIPPEL BAY STATE PARK in Lake of the Woods County is open for either sex deer hunting by special permit. Fifty (50) permits will be issued for Nov. 5-7. This is Special Area No. 298. Bonus licenses will be available.

CROW-HASSAN PARK RESERVE in Hennepin County is open to either sex deer hunting. See panel 14.

MURPHY-HANREHAN PARK RESERVE and CLEARY LAKE REGIONAL PARK in Scott County are open to either sex deer hunting. See panel 14.

COUNTY PARK FIREARMS HUNTS

See panel 10 for detailed information on Special Area Hunts.

ELM CREEK PARK RESERVE - Hennepin County. Open to either sex deer hunting by legal firearms on Nov. 19-20 by permit only. Hunters applying for Elm Creek should purchase a license for Zone 3B. Hunters who elect to hunt in Elm Creek may only hunt bucks elsewhere in Zone 3 during the Nov. 19-25 season. One hundred sixty-five (165) permits will be issued. This is Special Permit Area

FEDERAL AREAS FEDERAL WATERFOWL PRODUCTION AREAS AND NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

Federal Waterfowl Production Areas are open in the fall to public hunting except where posted otherwise. Migratory birds, upland game birds, small game and big game may be hunted and furbearers trapped in accordance with applicable State and Federal regulations.

Overnight camping and overnight parking are prohibited on all Waterfowl Production Areas, including designated parking areas. Additional information, including maps of open and closed areas, is available from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Route 1, Box 26A, Fergus Falls, Minnesota 56537.

Motorized vehicles and motorized watercraft are prohibited on National Wildlife Refuges and Waterfowl Production Areas Except: (1) On access roads and parking areas designated by sign: (2) on public roads; or (3) by permit obtained from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Refuge and Wetland Management District Offices. Motorized watercraft are allowed without permit on the Tamarac and Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife Refuges.

VOYAGEURS NATIONAL PARK

Hunting and trapping wild animals on public land, within the boundaries of Voyageurs National Park is prohibited.

Maps showing the boundaries of the park are available from Box 50. International Falls, Minnesota 56649.

NOTE

Lands belonging to the Red Lake Band of Chippewa Indians in Beltrami. Koochiching, Lake of the Woods and Roseau Counties are closed to non-Bandmembers except by special authorization of the tribal council.

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NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

GENERAL — The following National Wildlife Refuges are open to big game hunting as hereinafter provided, in accordance with State and Special Federal regulations. A Minnesota State Hunting License punched with the appropriate option is required. Hunting maps and regulations are available through each refuge office or by writing to: Regional Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Federal Building, Fort Snelling, Twin Cities, MN 55111.

NOTE: Some of these refuges are Special Permit Areas, some are Antlerless Permit Areas, and some are both, and one requires only a regular deer license for the appropriate hunt. Please read details carefully.

AGASSIZ NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Marshall County is open only to firearms deer hunting in accordance with established State seasons in all areas except those designated by "Area Closed" signs or as delineated on a map available at Refuge Headquarters, Middle River, MN 56737. This is in Antlerless Permit Area number 203 which includes the Elm Lake, Eckvoll and Mud Lac State Wildlife

BIG STONE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Big Stone and Lac qui Parle Counties is open to bow and arrow and firearms deer hunting in accordance with established State seasons on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or as delineated on a map available at Refuge Headquarters, 25 N.W. 2nd Street, Ortonville, MN 56278. See Muzzleloader section for Special Area Permits. This is part of Antlerless Permit Area No. 432-433-434.


MINNESOTA VALLEY NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE is open to bow and arrow deer hunting by special permit during the established state seasons and according to local ordinances on areas (including Louisville Swamp and Carver Rapids State Wayside) delineated on a map available at Refuge Hdqtrs., 4101 East 80th St., Bloomington, MN 55420. Permits will be issued from August 15-September 16, 1988, at Refuge Hdgtrs.; or call (612) 854-5900.

RICE LAKE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Aitkin County is open only to firearms either sex deer hunting only on November 12-14, 1988 to those persons with a valid Special Area Permit (see panel 10 on Special Area Permits for application procedures). A total of 100 Special Permits will be issued. Maps delineating the open areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Route 2, McGregor, MN 55760. This is Special Permit Area No. 151.

SHERBURNE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Sherburne County is open to bow and arrow deer hunting in Areas A and B during the established State seasons. Daily entrance fees are charged. Firearms deer hunting is allowed in Areas A. B and C for legal bucks and antierless deer by permit during the established State season. This is Antlerless Permit Area No. 224. Maps delineating hunting areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Route 2, Zimmerman, MN 55398 or call 612/389-3323.

TAMARAC NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Becker County is open to bow and arrow and firearms deer hunting during the established State seasons. This is Antlerless Permit Area No. 251. Maps delineating the open areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Rural Route, Rochert, MN 56578.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE AND FISH REFUGE is open to bow and arrow and firearms deer hunting during the established State seasons on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area." Hunting is permitted on those portions of the Refuge posted as "Area Closed" beginning with the first day following the close of the duck season. Maps delineating the open areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Rm. 101, 51 East 4th St., Winona, MN 55987.



TRESPASS

This is only a summary of the Minnesota Trespass Law relating to taking wild animals. The complete text of this law is found in Minnesota Statutes Sections 97B.001 and 97A.315. In addition, there are other state laws pertaining to trespass that may apply. Consult local law enforcement authorities if you have questions. GENERAL RESTRICTIONS (Note: See below for exceptions, definitions and posting requirements.)

- 1. Permission Required to Enter Agricultural Land. A person may not enter agricultural land to hunt or trap or to operate a motor vehicle for pleasure purposes, without permission.
- 2. Entering Land Prohibited After Notice. A person may not enter any private land to take a wild animal after being orally notified not to do so.
- 3. Entering Posted Land Prohibited. A person may not enter any legally posted land to take a wild animal, without permission.
- 4. Taking With Firearms Near Occupied Buildings or Corrals.
- (A) On another person's agricultural land or on a public right-of-way, a person may not take a wild animal with a firearm within 500 feet of a building occupied by a human or livestock, without written permission.
- (B) On land other than agricultural land, a person may not take a wild animal with a firearm within 200 feet of a building occupied by a human, without oral permission.
- (C) On any land a person may not take a wild animal with a firearm within 500 feet of a stockade or corral containing livestock, without permission.
- 5. Destruction of Property. A person may not wound or kill another person's domestic animal or destroy, cut, or tear down another person's fence, building. grain, crops, live tree or sign legally posting the land.
- 6. Gate Closing. A person may not pass through another person's closed gate without closing the gate.

EXCEPTIONS TO GENERAL RESTRICTIONS

- 1. Retrieving Wounded Game From Agricultural Land. A hunter, on foot. may retrieve wounded game, during the season for the game, from agricultural land that is not legally posted, unless the person has been orally notified not to enter the land. The hunter must leave immediately after retrieving the game.
- 2. Retrieving Dogs From Private Land. A person may, without permission, enter private land on foot to retrieve a dog that has treed or is at bay with a raccoon, bobcat, coyote or fox. This includes private agricultural land, legally posted land, and land the person has been orally notified not to enter. After retrieving the dog, the person must immediately leave the premises. Note: This exception does not authorize the taking of the raccoon, bobcat, coyote or fox without permission.

DEFINITIONS AND POSTING REQUIREMENTS

Agricultural Land means land: (1) that is plowed or tilled; (2) that has standing crops or crop residues; or (3) within a maintained fence for enclosing domestic livestock.

Permission To or Notification Not To enter private land or take wild animals near occupied buildings or corrals may only be given by the owner, occupant, or

Legaliv Posted Land. The owner, occupant or lessee of private land, or an authorized manager of public land may prohibit unauthorized hunting, trapping, fishing, or trespassing on the land by posting signs that: (1) display letters at least two inches high; (2) are signed by the owner, occupant, lessee or authorized manager; and (3) are at intervals of 1,000 feet or less along the boundary of the area, or in a wooded area where boundary lines are not clear, at intervals of 500 (continued on page 3)

Special Notes

- 1. Zone 1 deer hunting is no longer prohibited for those who have a bonus license. For example: Metro Bonus Bow License.
- 2. The ANTLERLESS PERMIT APPLICA-TION deadline is Thurs., September 7.
- 3. This year there are separate antlerless permit quotas for Zones 4A and 4B.
- 4. Public input meetings for hunting and trapping are held each March throughout the state. Details will be announced in January.

feet or less. A person may not erect a sign that states "no hunting", "no trapping", "no fishing", "no trespassing", or another sign that prohibits trespass on land or water where the person does not have a property right, title, or interest to use the land.

PENALTIES

Criminal Penalties. A person is guilty of a gross misdemeanor if the person: (1) knowingly disregards signs prohibiting trespass; or (2) trespasses after personally being notified by the landowner or lessee not to trespass. A person who violates any other provision of this law relating to trespass is guilty of a misdemeanor, except a person convicted of violating this law more than once in a three-year period is guilty of a gross misdemeanor.

License Revocations. If a person is convicted under this law of trespassing while exercising or attempting to exercise an activity licensed under the game and fish laws or requiring snowmobile registration, the applicable license and registration are null and void. A person convicted of a gross misdemeanor under this law may not be issued a license to take game for two years after the conviction.

ENFORCEMENT

Conservation Officers and peace officers must enforce the trespass laws.

DEER LICENSE PURCHASE

- A person may not take deer without a license. A person must have a firearms deer license to take deer with firearms and an archery deer license to take deer by archery.
- A person may not purchase more than one firearm deer license and one bow and arrow deer license in any one calendar year, except for "bonus deer"
- A person under the age of 16 may not obtain a license to take big game unless the person possesses a firearms safety certificate. A certificate may not be issued to a person under age 12. A person under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian to hunt big game.
- "Guardian" is a legal guardian or any person age 18 or over selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under age 16.
- Resident licenses may be issued only to (1) citizens of the United States or resident aliens who have maintained a legal residence in the state at least the immediately preceding 60 days; (2) a nonresident under the age of 21 who is the child of a resident; or (3) a person in the armed forces of the United States that is stationed in the state.
- Nonresidents attending schools in Minnesota are required to purchase a nonresident license for hunting deer or bear in Minnesota except a non-resident that is a full-time foreign exchange student at a high school in the state and resides with persons in the state may obtain a resident license to take deer by archery by providing proof of foreign exchange student status as prescribed by the commissioner.

MILITARY AND VETERANS

- A resident that is in the armed forces of the United States, stationed outside of the state, and in the state on leave, may hunt deer or bear without a license if the resident possesses official military leave papers. The resident must obtain from a county auditor the seals, tags, and coupons required of a licensee which must be furnished without charge. See Commissioner's Order re: an-
- A resident that is discharged from the United States armed forces during, or within ten days before, the firearms deer season may, upon showing the official discharge paper, obtain a firearm deer license during the season.
- A person authorized to issue licenses must issue, without a fee, a license to take deer with firearms or by archery to a resident that is a veteran and that has a 100 percent service connected disability as defined by the United States Veterans Administration upon being furnished with satisfactory evidence.

- All firearms deer licenses including those for the special muzzleloader season and bow and arrow deer licenses must be purchased on or before November 3,
- Licenses are obtainable from County Auditors or their agents. Each applicant for a license must appear in person before the agent.

LEGAL FIREARMS

- A person may take big game with a firearm only if: (1) the rifle, shotgun, and handgun used is a caliber of at least .23 inches; (2) the firearm is loaded only with single projectile ammunition; (3) a projectile used is a caliber of at least .23 inches and has a soft point or is an expanding bullet type; (4) the ammunition has a case length of at least 1.285 inches; exception: 10 mm. cartridge that is at least 0.95 in. long; (5) the muzzleloader used is incapable of being loaded at the breech; (6) the smooth-bore muzzleloader used is a caliber of at least .45 inches; and (7) the rifled muzzleloader used is a caliber of at least .40
- A person may not take big game with a .30 caliber M-1 carbine cartridge.
- Only metallic open and "peep" type sights are legal during the Special Muzzleloader Hunt.
- Rifled barrels on shotguns are legal statewide.

HANDGUNS: State law provides that persons 18 years of age or older may carry a handgun in the woods or fields or upon the waters of this state for the purpose of hunting or target shooting. The carrying of handguns elsewhere in the state or in motor vehicles or by persons under the age of eighteen years is subject to special restrictions and may require a handgun permit. Questions concerning the carrying of handguns and handgun permits should be directed to your local police or county sheriff.

All species of big game may be taken with a handgun, except deer may not be taken with a handgun (including muzzleloading handguns) at any time in the Shotgun Zone. A person suffering from a physical disability rendering him/her incapable of using a shoulder fired gun but capable of using a handgun and possessing a doctor's statement to this effect may take deer with a handgun in the Shotgun Zone.

RIFLE-SHOTGUN BOUNDARY: See small inset map on reverse side.

POSSESSION OF FIREARMS

- A person may not possess a firearm or ammunition outdoors during the period beginning the tenth day before the open firearms season and ending the second day after the close of the season within an area where deer may be taken by a firearm, except: (1) during the open season and in an area where big game may be taken, a firearm and ammunition authorized for taking big game in that area may be used to take big game in that area if the person has a valid big game license in possession; (2) an unloaded firearm that is in a case or in a closed trunk of a motor vehicle; (3) a shotgun and shells containing No. 4 buckshot or smaller diameter lead shot or steel shot; (4) a handgun or rifle and only short, long, and long rifle cartridges that are caliber of .22 inches; (5) handguns possessed by a person authorized to carry a handgun under sections 624.714 and 624.715 for the purpose authorized; and (6) on a target range operated under a permit from the commissioner.

TRANSPORTATION OF FIREARMS

- compliance with sections 624,714 and 624,715.
- "Unloaded means, with reference to a firearm, without ammunition in the barrels and magazine, if the magazine is in the firearm. A muzzle loading firearm with a flintlock ignition is unloaded if it does not have priming powder in a pan. A muzzle loading firearm with percussion ignition is unloaded if it does not have a percussion cap on a nipple.

LEGAL BOW AND ARROW

- A person may not take big game by archery while in possession of a firearm.
- Bows must have a pull of no less than 40 pounds at or before full draw.
- Arrowheads used for taking big game must be sharp and have a minimum of two metal cutting edges, be of a barbless broad head design, and must have a diameter of at least seven-eighths inch.
- A person may not bunt with a bow drawn, held, or released by a mechanical device, except with a disabled hunter permit issued under MS. Sec. 97B.106 or as provided by the following: A person may use a mechanical device attached to the bowstring if the person's own strength draws, holds, and releases the bowstring.
- A person may not hunt deer or turkey with a crossbow except by special permit issued to persons unable to hunt by archery because of a permanent disability that is verified in writing by a licensed physician.

TRANSPORTATION OF BOWS

- A person may not transport an archery bow in a motor vehicle unless the bow is (1) unstrung; (2) completely contained in a case; or (3) in the closed trunk of a motor vehicle.

USE OF ARTIFICIAL LIGHT WITH FIREARMS AND BOWS

- A person may not cast the rays of a spotlight, headlight, or other artificial light on a highway, or in a field, woodland, or forest, to spot, locate, or take a wild animal (except pursuant to 97B.621 and 97B.931), while having in possession, either individually or as one of a group of persons, a firearm, bow, or other implement that could be used to kill big game.
- This subdivision does not apply to a firearm that is: (1) unloaded; (2) in a gun case expressly made to contain a firearm that fully encloses the firearm by being zipped, snapped, buckled, tied, or otherwise fastened without any portion of the firearm exposed; and (3) in the closed trunk of a motor vehicle.
- This subdivision does not apply to a bow that is: (1) completely encased or unstrung; and (2) in the closed trunk of a motor vehicle.
- If the motor vehicle does not have a trunk, the firearm or bow must be placed in the rearmost location of the vehicle.

WITHOUT FIREARMS OR BOWS

 Between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. from September 1 to December 31, a person may not cast the rays of a spotlight, headlight, or other artificial light in a field, woodland, or forest to spot, locate, or take a wild animal except pursuant to 97B.621 and 97B.931. It is not a violation of this subdivision for a person to carry out any agricultural, occupational, or recreational practice, including snowmobiling that is not related to spotting, locating or taking a wild animal.

SAFETY PROVISIONS

- A person may not hunt or trap during the open season in a zone or area where deer may be taken by firearms, unless the visible portion of the person's cap and outer clothing above the waist, excluding sleeves and gloves, is bright red or blaze orange. Blaze orange includes a camouflage pattern of at least 50 percent blaze orange within each foot square.
- A person may not discharge a firearm or an arrow from a bow on, over, or across an improved public highway at a big game animal. A person may not discharge a firearm or bow and arrow within the right-of-way of an improved public highway at a big game animal.
- A person may not take protected wild animals with a firearm or by archery while under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance.

HUNTING METHOD RESTRICTION

- A person may not take deer from a man-made platform or other structure higher than sixteen feet above the ground. The restriction does not apply to a portable stand that is chained, belted, clamped or tied with rope. On Wildlife Management Areas, only portable stands may be used and they must not be left overnight.
- A person may not use radio equipment to take a protected wild animal, or to take unprotected wild animals without a permit.
- A person may not shoot any wild animal from a motor vehicle. Disabled persons possessing a permit are excepted.

REGULATIONS FOR 'PARTY' HUNTING

- 1. A party is any group of two or more licensed deer hunters all of whom are afield hunting together at the same time all using firearms or all using bow and arrow. Therefore, a mixed weapons group would be two separate parties.
- 2. Any member of a party may kill a legal buck for any other member of the party who has an unused tag. Any member of a party may tag a legal buck killed by any other member of the party.
- 3. Any member of a party may kill an antlerless deer for any other member of the party who has an unused tag valid for an antlerless deer. Antlerless deer may only be tagged by party members licensed to take antlerless deer.

REPORTING VIOLATIONS

If you witness a violation or find an illegally taken animal leave it where you find it and contact a Conservation Officer, Sheriff's Office, or the Highway Patrol. Turn In Poachers. You can remain anonymous - a code number will be used instead of your name. Call 1-800-652-9093. Please do not call this number to obtain hunting regulation information.

GENERAL

SHOOTING HOURS -- One-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

LIMIT — One deer per person per calendar year.

Exception — See panel 11.

LEGAL BUCK — A deer having at least one antier not less than 3 inches long. Fawn bucks, sometimes called nubbin bucks or button bucks, are not legal bucks.

ANTLERLESS DEER — Does and fawns, including male fawns with nubbins or antlers less than 3 inches long.

REGISTRATION — You must register the deer you have tagged within 48 hours after your deer hunting license expires.

WHERE HUNTING IS ALLOWED — Deer season regulations permit hunting statewide with the following provisions.

- 1. Zones, areas, and time periods for various kinds of hunts are limited by these regulations. Please read all of this synopsis.
- Refuges and state parks are closed to hunting except as specifically opened by these regulations.
- Cities, villages, and some townships have ordinances prohibiting the discharge of weapons. Variance may be only by permit. Check with the office of your local government unit especially if you are within or adjacent to a metropolitan area.
- The owners of property private, corporate, or public agency have the right to prohibit hunting on their land.

FIREARM SEASON CHOICES

- The firearms deer hunter has several options from which to select a hunting period and zone. A hunter's choice will be indicated by a hole punched in his license at the time of purchase. All of the alternatives are mutually exclusive and do not allow hunting under any choice other than the one selected and punched on the license.
- All of the options fall within the month of November except the Special Muzzleloader Season. That is a special hunt on designated lands and allows for taking deer of either sex. Details of that season are given on panels 15-16 of this folder.
- Hunters who choose any of the November options may hunt with muzzleloading guns but must follow regular firearms rules and cannot hunt in the Special Muzzleloader Season.
- A firearms deer hunter may apply for an Antlerless Permit or a Special Area Permit for the area of his choice within the zone he is licensed for. The various permit areas are listed on the map side of this folder and on panels 15-16 and 21-24. The separate procedures to be followed in applying for either Antlerless Permits or Special Area Permits are described on panels 8-10.

See map on reverse side for season choice details.

TYPES OF PERMITS AVAILABLE

- Antlerless Deer Permit . . . required to take an antlerless deer (either sex) . . . issued by a drawing that recognizes several levels of preference. Preference levels are determined by the number of unsuccessful applications since last receiving a permit. Some applicants will receive permits two years in a row if some permits remain after higher levels are filled. Some top level applicants can fail to receive a permit if a drawing at the highest level is necessary.
- Special Area Permit . . . required to enter certain areas for hunting . . . issued by a random (no preference) drawing.

INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS

Some requirements are the same for both types of permit. They are listed below. In addition, each type of permit has some special requirements. They are listed below the general requirements and on panels 9 and 10.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS — ALL PERMITS

To apply for either an Antlerless Permit or Special Area Permit —

- -- You must first purchase a 1989 deer license to obtain the application card required to make application for any permit. This means you must hunt in the option chosen regardless of whether or not you receive a permit.
- You may NOT apply for both an Antlerless Permit and a Special Area Permit.
 You may apply for only one Antlerless Permit or only one Special Area Permit.
 Bow and arrow permits are not included in this restriction.
- Your application for a permit must be filled out as requested or it will not be accepted.
- Both Minnesota residents and nonresidents are eligible for permits.
- A permit is not transferable between persons or between permit areas.
- Special requirements that differ between Antlerless Permit applications and Special Area Permit applications are listed below and on panels 9 and 10.

— ANTLERLESS DEER PERMITS —

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS — See above.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

FOR ANTLERLESS PERMITS —

- Antlerless Permits limit the number of people who are allowed to take does and fawns within a permit area. The number of buck hunters is not limited.
- Antlerless Permit applicants may NOT apply as a party. The volume of applications requires processing which cannot handle variable size groups to be treated as one. Do NOT mail application in envelope.

AREAS OPEN FOR ANTLERLESS PERMITS

The permit areas are identified on the firearms deer season map (other side of sheet) by white numbers within a solid white boundary line. Note that some permit areas are subdivided into registration blocks by white dotted lines and have several numbers within the solid line boundary. This subdivision of permit areas has been done only to allow deer registration from the hunting map and does not affect where you can hunt within the permit area. These permit areas have a single antlerless permit quota as shown by a bracket within the permit table on the upper right corner of the map. You may use any one of the numbers within the same solid boundary to apply for an antlerless permit. The permit will be valid for all blocks within that solid boundary and bracketed together in the permit table.

APPLICATION DEADLINE - SEPTEMBER 7, 1989

 Application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered to the DNR License Bureau, 500 Lafayette Rd., St. Paul, 55155-4026 no later than September 7, 1989.

NOTE

Information regarding the Antlerless Permit drawing and individual applications will not be available until after October 26.

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION —

 If applications for permits exceed the area quotas, computerized drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.

FOR PERMIT AREAS REQUIRING A DRAWING THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURES WILL BE IN EFFECT:

- All applicants for antlerless permits who will reach their 18th birthday by September 7 must provide their Minnesota Driver's License or Minnesota Identification Card number. Also, anyone under 18 who wishes to gain preference for the 1990 or any future drawings, if they are unsuccessful in the 1989 drawing, must provide one of these numbers.
- However, people who will not reach their 18th birthday by September 7, 1989, can be in a special drawing for an antlerless permit by providing their Firearms Safety Training Certificate number. These people will not gain any preference for the 1990 drawing if unsuccessful in the 1989 drawing. Neither will they be excluded from the 1990 drawing if they are drawn in 1989.
- This special youth drawing is being held to accommodate young people who cannot obtain a driver's license or who do not wish to purchase the I.D. card. They are being allowed to enter the special drawing until they are 18 years old at which time they must either obtain a driver's license or I.D. number to apply for an antlerless permit.
- The number of antlerless permits available for the special youth drawing will be determined by the proportion of youths applying for a permit using their Firearms Safety Training Certificate number versus the total number of antlerless permits available for that area, as follows:

No. With Firearms Safety No.

All applications for the Area × No. of Permits for Area Permits for Area

- Although the youths will not gain any preference, this system gives them the opportunity to apply and be drawn on the same basis as they would have had prior to the preference system because they are all competing for the youth share of the permits each year.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Permits will be drawn and mailed no later than October 26. 1989.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE —

- A hunter receiving an Antlerless Permit is allowed to hunt antlerless deer only in the area for which he has received a permit. However, he may hunt bucks throughout the zone and during the time punched on his license.
- An Antlerless permit is not transferable between persons or between Antlerless Permit areas.

PARTY HUNTING WITH ANTLERLESS PERMITS —

- See panel 6.

- SPECIAL AREA PERMITS -

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS — See panel 8.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR SPECIAL PERMITS—

- Special Area Permits limit the number of people who are allowed to hunt within a designated Special Permit Area.
- Special Area Permit applicants (1 to 4 persons) are allowed to apply as parties.
 Properly completed applications which are submitted in a single envelope will all be selected or none selected.
- Your application for a Special Area Permit must follow the instructions given below or it will not be eligible.

AREAS OPEN — (Special Areas are not shown on map.)

- See panels 21-24 (Muzzleloader hunters see panels 15-16).

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS/SPECIAL AREAS — (Except special bow hunt areas — see panel 14)

- Application for Special Permits must be made on the Antleriess Permit application provided with the deer license.
- Write "Special" above the Zone arrow on the form and write the number of the Special Area you choose in the spaces at the point of the Permit Area arrow.
- Indicate your choice of hunt periods available by writing the dates in the space above birth date.
- Cross out the address on the back of the application.
- MAIL IN AN ENVELOPE (up to four persons may apply as a party) to the address given where the Special Area is described.

APPLICATION DEADLINE —

 Envelopes containing application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered no later than September 7, 1989.

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION

- If applications for permits exceed the number allowed, drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.
- Since a Special Area Permit restricts who can enter an area to hunt, allowing applications by party (1 to 4 persons) is an essential feature. Currently, preference cannot be given in drawings with party applications because of the complexities of the preference system and limited computer capability. Therefore, the Special Area Permit drawings will be separate from the preference system. Success or failure in either an Antlerless Permit or a Special Area Permit drawing in some previous year will have no effect on an applicant's chances for a Special Area Permit this year.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Special Area Permits will be drawn and mailed no later than October 26, 1989.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE —

— A hunter receiving a Special Area Permit is allowed to hunt deer within the designated area and time by regular firearms, or muzzleloader depending upon the type of hunt for which the permit is valid. The permit holder with a regular firearms license may also hunt bucks in the zone for which his license is valid. Muzzleloader permit hunters in the special season may hunt in the area for which they receive a permit as well as in any area open without special permits. Only one deer may be taken per hunter, except as provided in panel 11.

BONUS DEER

A Bonus Deer is a legal second deer permitted by the 1989 season regulations.

A second license at the regular fee must be purchased.

BONUS DEER LICENSES WILL BE AVAILABLE —

- in some undersubscribed Antlerless Permit Areas
- in some Special Permit Areas
- in the Metro Bonus Bow Area

PURCHASE IS AUTHORIZED -

- by a certificate issued to randomly drawn antlerless permit holders in undersubscribed areas,
- by all permit holders for Special Areas where Bonus Licenses are available,
- as a second bow hunting license for the Metro Bonus Bow Area.

RESTRICTIONS

- All bonus licenses are valid for antlerless deer only.
- No person may tag more than two deer in any calendar year.
- No person may tag two deer by using the regular Bow and Arrow Deer Hunting License tag and the regular Firearms Deer Hunting License tag.

NOTES

- If you receive a certificate for a Bonus Deer License you are not required to purchase that second license unless you wish to hunt for a Bonus deer.
- Either the bonus or the regular license tag may be used first but if you wish to tag a deer on your regular Firearm Deer Hunting License (as a buck elsewhere in the zone) or on your regular Bow and Arrow Deer Hunting License you should use your Bonus Deer License tag first. If you use your regular license tag for your first deer in a Bonus Deer area you must also take the second deer in that area because the Bonus Deer tag is not valid elsewhere.

UNDERSUBSCRIBED ANTLERLESS PERMIT AREAS

After the Antlerless Permit drawings, Bonus Deer Licenses may be authorized where the number of applications is less than the quota. Persons authorized to purchase a Bonus Deer License will be drawn from the original antlerless permit applications. **Therefore, no separate application** is **necessary**. Applicants selected will receive, in addition to an Antlerless Permit, a nontransferable certificate that may be presented at a County Auditor's office to purchase a Bonus Deer License and tag at the regular deer license fee.

The Bonus Deer License is valid only in your Antlerless Permit Area and is valid for antlerless deer only.

In 1988 the following areas were undersubscribed and had bonus licenses available: 339, 343, 401, 405, 406, and 407.

SPECIAL PERMIT AREAS

Bonus Deer Licenses are available for certain state parks and other special areas where drawings for permits are held. Applications for permits to hunt must be made as explained in panel 10.

Applicants drawn for a Special Permit Area may be offered a Bonus Deer License when they register for the hunt at the Special Area Headquarters but purchase of a Bonus License is not required. If the Bonus Deer license is purchased, it is valid only for an antlerless deer. This Bonus License is valid only within the special area and will be so marked.

SUNRISE AND SUNSET TIME SCHEDULE LONGITUDE OF MINNEAPOLIS

Variations approximately 4 minutes to each degree or 1 minute for each 12 miles. Add to determine time for points west, and subtract for points east of Minneapolis.

Times shown are Central Daylight Savings Time through OCTOBER 28, 1989 and Central Standard Time thereafter. The schedules shown are the ones to be used for hunting purposes.

The 30 minute period before and after shooting hours is not extra hunting time.

 No licensed bow hunter shall occupy any elevated deer stand between sunset and one hour before sunrise.

LICENSING RESTRICTIONS —

TRANSPORTATION & REGISTRATION

DEER LEG TAG

The tag must be attached to the deer when: (1) the animal is in a camp, or a place occupied overnight or the yard surrounding the place; or (2) the animal is on a motor vehicle (self-propelled vehicle or any vehicle propelled or drawn by a self-propelled vehicle). Therefore you must—

- Detach the leg tag from the deer license.
- 2. Scratch off the date of kill.
- 3. Insert the tag between the tendon and the bone of a hind leg.
- Remove the tag's adhesive backing, and
- 5. Seal the adhesive side of the tag together around the leg bone.

— IMPORTANT —

Mark the date on the leg tag carefully, more than one date marked makes the tag invalid.

POSSESSING BIG GAME

 Every person taking a big game animal must retain the license, tag, permit, and registration tag as long as any part of the meat is in possession.

TRANSPORTATION

- A legally registered animal may be transported any time during or after the deer hunting season.
- When such deer, bear, or moose is transported by other than common carrier (commercial transportation) the licensee must accompany it, except as provided below:

TRANSPORTATION BY PERSON OTHER THAN LICENSEE

— A person other than the licensee may transport deer, bear, or moose that the licensee has registered as prescribed by the commissioner. A tag must be attached to the animal and marked in ink with the address, license number, signature of the licensee, and the locations from which and to which the animal is being transported.

HEADS, HIDES AND CLAWS

— A resident that has a license to take deer, bear, or moose may transport the head or hide of the animal within or out of the state for mounting or tanning. The hides of deer, bear, and moose, and the claws of bear legally taken and with the tags that are required, may be bought, sold, and transported at any time.

TRANSPORTATION CAUTIONS

- The head of the deer must remain attached to the carcass until the deer is registered.
- All deer must be transported before and after registration so that inspection by enforcement officers is readily accomplished.

WANTON WASTE

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 Unless expressly allowed, a person may not wantonly waste or destroy a usable part of a protected wild animal. YOUR DEER WILL BE ILLEGAL UNLESS REGISTERED.

DEER MUST BE REGISTERED BY THE NUMBERED REGISTRATION BLOCKS SHOWN ON THE MAP IN THIS SYNOPSIS.

KILL REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

Every person taking a deer shall present the deer for registration at an official deer registration station and obtain a POSSESSION TAG before any of the following occur —

- before the deer is removed from the zone in which it is taken,*
- before the deer is processed either privately or commercially.
- before 48 hours after the expiration of his/her firearms deer hunting license; or for deer taken by bow, within 48 hours after taking.
- A person may not process a deer unless it has been registered as attested by an attached POSSESSION TAG.

Registration is required. Registration will be certified by a POSSESSION TAG that will be issued at the time of registration. The hunter's license number and the year of issue will be written on the POSSESSION TAG by the registration agent.

POSSESSION TAG must be attached around the deer's leg just as the license tag is. This must be done immediately after receiving the TAG.

*Deer may also be presented for registration at an official station within a city or village through which a zone boundary passes or at an official station across the road but adjacent to the zone where taken. Bow and arrow deer registration is not restricted to location except where so designated for special area hunts.

USE OF SNOWMOBILES, OTHER VEHICLES No person who has a valid deer license shall operate a snowmobile, three-

wheel cycle or any other all-terrain vehicle, during legal shooting hours in any area open for the taking of deer by firearms on any day when the person is licensed to take deer within that area except during the period 11 a.m. to 2 p.n. each day. All-terrain vehicles include trail bikes, Cushman 6 wheelers, Cushman Tracksters, Bombadier J-5's and other similarly manufactured and homemade vehicles. This regulation applies to all lands and waters regardless of ownership, except that anyone using an all-terrain vehicle while pursuing his or her occupation on their own land and not in possession of a firearm is exempt. A permit to operate these restricted vehicles between one half hour before sunrise and sunset (other than during the period 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.) may be issued by a Conservation Officer in the event of an emergency or other unusual condition.

NOTE — All-terrain vehicle use is not allowed in state parks.

STATE GAME REFUGES

STATE GOOSE REFUGES AND STATE WATERFOWL REFUGES

State goose refuges and waterfowl refuges are closed to hunting of geese or waterfowl as indicated. Other forms of hunting and trapping are permitted during the established seasons and in the zones in which they are located.

STATE FORESTS

The public land within State Forests is open to hunting. State Game Refuges within State Forests are not open to big game hunting unless listed as open in this synopsis. Agricultural or posted private land within a State Forest may be hunted only with permission of the owner.

STATE SCIENTIFIC AND NATURAL AREAS

Scientific and Natural Areas (SNAs) are closed to hunting unless opened by Commissioner's Order.

In 1989 the following areas are open:

ITASCA WILDERNESS SANCTUARY in Itasca Park is open to firearms deer hunting under Itasca State Park Regulations.

IRON SPRINGS BOG SNA in Clearwater County is open to firearms and bow and arrow deer hunting, consistent with regulations.

STATE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

All areas identified as wildlife management areas, except any portion thereon which may be posted against entry by "State Game Refuge," or "No Trespassing" signs, are open to big game hunting during established seasons for the zones in which they are located.

However, specific regulations will apply to certain areas as follows:

For Special Muzzleloader Hunts - See Muzzleloader Section.

The Lac qui Parle Game Refuge in Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties is open as follows: Those portions of the refuge within the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site, or which are posted with "Do Not Trespass" signs, are closed to hunting or the carrying or possession of firearms or bows and arrows unless the firearm is unloaded and completely encased or unloaded and contained in the trunk of a car and the trunk door closed and the bow is unstrung or completely contained in a case or contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. The remainder of the refuge is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons in the zones in which it is located. From September 20 to December 1, both dates inclusive, no unauthorized person shall trespass for any purpose whatsoever on any part of the refuge which is posted with signs prohibiting trespass during this period. No unauthorized person shall trespass on Rosemoen Island at any time during the year.

The Bayport Wildlife Management Area in Washington County and the Raguet WMA in Scott and Carver Counties are closed to the possession of all firearms unless unloaded and contained in a case, except for designated hunting areas during the season for the taking of small game when shotgun with fine shot only is permitted. Possession and use of bow and arrow is limited to the designated hunting areas during established hunting seasons.

ELEVATED STANDS IN WMAS

It is unlawful to construct, occupy or use any elevated scaffold or other elevated device for the purpose of hunting, watching for or killing big game, except that portable tree stands may be used for this purpose provided they are removed each day at the close of hunting hours and do no permanent damage to trees in which they are placed.

OTHER USES OF WMAS

Motor vehicles, camping, and other uses of Wildlife Management Areas are regulated. Please read the regulation signs posted on WMAs to avoid violating.

STATE PARKS

For Bonus License Hunts - See Bonus Section (panel 11).

For Special Muzzleloader Hunts — See Muzzleloader Section (panels 15-16). State Park vehicle permits are required on all vehicles taken into Minnesota

All State parks are refuges by law but may be opened by Commissioner's

ELEVATED STANDS IN STATE PARKS

It is unlawful to construct, occupy or use any elevated scaffold or other elevated device for the purpose of hunting, watching for or killing big game, except that portable tree stands may be used for this purpose provided they are removed each day at the close of hunting hours and do no permanent damage to trees in which they are placed.

ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES

All-terrain vehicle use is not allowed in state parks.

STATE PARKS OPEN WITH ZONE REGULATIONS

ITASCA STATE PARK in Becker, Clearwater and Hubbard Counties is open to firearms hunting for legal bucks only by Zone 2 license holders and for antierless deer by Area 287 permit holders, except where posted as closed, during the Zone

STATE PARKS OPEN ONLY WITH SPECIAL PERMIT

Certain parks are open to a limited number of deer hunters by Special Area Permits and the proper license. In each state park thus opened a permit holder must first register at the park office before beginning to hunt and he/she must register any deer taken at the park office before leaving the park.
