PLEASE READ ALL OF THIS SYNOPSIS CAREFULLY

This is not a complete set of hunting laws, but contains the information you are most likely to need in hunting big game. Separate pamphlets are being issued to cover waterfowl seasons and small game hunting and trapping

MINNESOTA TRESPASS LAW

100.273 Subdivision 1. For purposes of this section "agricultural lands" mean lands containing plowed or tilled fields, standing crops or their residues, or lands with a maintained fence for the purpose of enclosing domestic

Subdivision 2. No person shall enter upon the agricultural lands of another with the intent of hunting big or small game nor shall any person intentionally enter upon the agricultural land of another for the purpose of pleasure driving, including snowmobiling or operating any motorized vehicle, unless and until the permission of the owner, occupant, or lessee is obtained.

Subdivision 3. No person shall enter upon any land not his own regardless if it is agricultural land with intent to take any wild animals after being notified not to do so, either orally by the owner, occupant or lessee, or by signs erected pursuant to subdivision 6.

Subdivision 4. No person shall enter or leave the lands of another, or pass from one portion of another person's land, through a closed gate without returning the gate to its original position, nor shall any person destroy, cut or tear down any fence, building, grain, crops, any sign erected pursuant to subdivision 6 or live trees, or wound or kill any domestic animals.

Subdivision 5. No person shall take any wild animal with a firearm without the written permission of the owner or occupant of the premises on any private agricultural land not his own or any public right-of-way within 500 feet of any building occupied by a human being or by livestock or within 500 feet of any stockade or corral containing livestock, nor shall any person take any wild animal with a firearm within 200 feet of any building occupied by a human being on any land other than agricultural land without the oral permission of the owner or occupant of the premises, or within 500 feet of any burning area.


Subdivision 6. No person shall erect "no hunting," "no trapping," "no fishing," "no trespassing," or other signs prohibiting trespass upon any lands or waters in which he has no right, title, interests, or license. The owner, occupant, or lessee of any private land, or a duly constituted legal authority of public land, may erect signs prohibiting trespassing, hunting, trapping, or fishing if the signs bear letters not less than two inches high, are signed by the owner, occupant, or lessee, and are posted at intervals of not more than 1000 feet upon the boundaries of the area so protected.

Subdivision 7. In taking raccoon, bobcat, coyote or fox when treed or at bay on private land with the aid of dogs, a person while on foot may, without permission of the landowner, enter such private land to retrieve any dogs and then shall immediately leave the premises. During the season for taking big or small game, a hunter may on foot retrieve a wounded big or small game animal from agricultural land of another which is not posted pursuant to subdivision 6, without permission of the landowner, and shall then leave as soon

Subdivision 8. All conservation and peace officers shall enforce provisions of this section.

Subdivision 9. Violation of any provision of this section is a misdemeanor. Upon a person's conviction for violating any provision of this section, any license issued to him pursuant to Chapter 98, or any registration pursuant to section 84.82, under which he was exercising or attempting to exercise a privilege while violating this section shall immediately become null and void.

NOTE — This law does not give any person permission to enter onto posted land or to remain on private land after the landowner has requested that they leave. LEGISLA!

1984 BIG GAME SEASONS

Deer season information - Please read all of this folder Bear season information — issued earlier.

Moose season information - no season in 1984.

LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

Resident licenses may be issued only to U.S. citizens or resident aliens. who have maintained a legal residence in Minnesota for a period of 60 days immediately preceding the date of application for a license.

Residents serving with the U.S. Military or Naval forces, or the reserve components thereof, who are stationed outside the state may obtain a free deer license and free bear seal from county auditors when in Minnesota on regularly granted leave or furlough provided that they have proper leave or furlough papers on their person.

A license and tag to take deer shall be issued without charge by county auditors to Minnesota veterans who have a 100% service connected disability.

A license is required to hunt big game regardless of the hunter's age; a person under the age of 16 must have a firearm hunter safety certificate on his person to purchase a big game hunting license. Enrollment in a firearm safety course is not sufficient to qualify.

A person under age 12 may not hunt big game. Residents under age 14 must be accompanied by a parent or quardian when using firearms for any purpose. Residents over 14 but under 16 may hunt or possess firearms by themselves only if they have a firearm safety certificate in their possession.

"Guardian" is a legal guardian or any person over the age of 18 who has been selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under age 16.

A nonresident child under the age of 21 of a resident of Minnesota may take. buy, sell, transport or possess wild animals as a resident.

Nonresidents attending schools in Minnesota are required to purchase a nonresident license for hunting deer or bear in Minnesota.

PURCHASE OF DEER LICENSE: All firearms deer licenses including those for the special muzzleloader season and bow and arrow deer license (bow hunters, see panel 11) must be purchased on or before November 2, 1984. except: A resident who is discharged from the military or naval forces of the United States, or any active reserve or component thereof, during the regular season for taking deer by firearm or within ten days before its commencement, may be issued at any time during the firearm deer season and upon a showing of his official discharge paper, a license to take deer with firearm.

AGENT'S FEE - An additional charge of \$1.00 will be made for issuing deer licenses and 75 cents for all other licenses listed above.

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To purchase more than one firearm deer license and one bow and arrow deer license in any one calendar year.

LEGAL ARMS

LEGAL FIREARMS FOR DEER AND BEAR: A firearm or ammunition may be used to take big game if it meets the following requirements:

- (1) Handguns, rifles, shotguns and all projectiles used therein shall be at least 23/100ths of an inch in caliber;
- (2) All firearms shall be loaded only with ammunition containing single projectiles (buckshot or fine shot is not legal);
- (3) All projectiles shall be of a soft point or an expanding bullet type;
- (4) All ammunition shall have a case length of at least 1.285 inches; and
- (5) Muzzleloaders must be incapable of being loaded at the breech. Smoothbore muzzleloaders shall be at least .45 caliber and rifled muzzleloaders shall be at least .40 caliber. Only metallic open and "peep" type sights are legal during the Special Muzzleloader Hunt

It is unlawful to take big game with a .30 caliber M-1 carbine cartridge or with any other firearm or ammunition which does not meet the requirements provided in clauses (1) to (5).

HANDGUNS: State law provides that persons 18 years of age or older may carry a handgun in the woods or fields or upon the waters of this state for the purpose of hunting or target shooting. The carrying of handguns elsewhere in the state or in motor vehicles or by persons under the age of eighteen years is subject to special restrictions and may require a handgun permit. Questions concerning the carrying of handguns and handgun permits should be directed to your local police or county sheriff.

All species of big game may be taken with a handgun. Handguns shall not be used for taking big game in those parts of the state and in those times when only shotguns may be used, except that a person suffering from a physical disability rendering him/her incapable of using a shoulder fired gun but capable of using a handgun and possessing a doctor's statement to this effect may take big game with a handgun statewide.

RIFLE-SHOTGUN BOUNDARY: See small inset map on reverse side.

LEGAL BOW AND ARROW FOR BIG GAME: Bows must have a pull of no less than 40 pounds at or before full draw. The bow may not be drawn, held, or released by a mechanical device.

Arrow heads for big game hunting must be made of all steel barbless design, the blade or blades of hicarbon steel not less than one inch wide for single two edge blade and not less than three inch circumference for three or more blades, minimum weight of all types of 110 grain. Provided, that arrow heads with blades of mill tempered spring steel containing a plastic core or ferrule, conforming to the above dimensions, and with a minimum weight of 90 grain may be used. All arrow heads used for big game hunting must be kept sharp.

TRANSPORTING ARMS

Except for a handgun carried in compliance with MS 624.714 and 624.715. it is unlawful - To transport any firearm including muzzleloading firearms in a motor vehicle or airplane or snowmobile unless: 1) the firearm is unloaded in both barrels and magazine and contained in a gun case expressly made for that purpose which is fully enclosed by being zipped, snapped, buckled, tied or otherwise fastened, with no portion of the firearm exposed; or 2) the firearm is unloaded and in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed

A muzzleloading firearm with a flintlock ignition is fully unloaded if it has no priming powder in any pan and a muzzleloading firearm with percussion ignition is fully unloaded if it has no percussion cap on any nipple.

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To transport a bow and arrow in a motor vehicle, airplane or snowmobile unless unstrung or completely contained in a case or contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed.

OTHER ARMS RESTRICTIONS — Within any area where deer may be taken by firearms, it shall be unlawful during the period beginning the tenth day before the open firearms season and ending the second day after the close of the season, inclusive, to have any firearm or ammunition in possession out of doors other than:

- (1) Shotguns using shot:
- (2) Handguns and rifles using .22 caliber short, long and long rifle cartridges;
- (3) Firearms described as legal for taking big game subject to weapon zone restrictions as prescribed by the commissioner, provided the bearer has a big game license on his person and is afield during the time and within the area the big game license is valid.

Except for pistols and revolvers carried in compliance with MS., sections 624.714 to 624.715 and firearms in possession upon target ranges operated under a permit from the commissioner, all firearms carried out of doors other than in conformity with these provisions must be unloaded and contained in a case or unloaded and contained in the trunk of a car with the trunk door closed.

DEER BAG LIMIT

No person may tag more than one deer in any calendar year even if he has both a firearm and a bow and arrow license. Except for persons hunting as a party as described below, no person may shoot a deer for any other person or tag a deer shot by any other person.

REGULATIONS FOR 'PARTY' HUNTING

- 1. A party is any group of two or more licensed deer hunters all of whom are afield hunting together at the same time all using firearms or all using bow and arrow. Therefore, a mixed weapons group would be two separate parties.
- 2. Any member of a party may kill a legal buck for any other member of the party who has an unused tag. Any member of a party may tag a legal buck killed by any other member of the party.
- 3. Antierless deer may be shot or shot at only by party members licensed to take antierless deer. Antierless deer may be tagged only by party members licensed to take antierless deer.

ILLEGALLY KILLED ANIMALS

Any hunter finding an illegally taken animal shall leave it where he finds it and contact a Conservation Officer, Sheriff's Office or the Highway Patrol.

WANTON WASTE

Except as expressly permitted, no person shall wantonly waste or destroy any usable part of any protected wild animal.

1-800-652-9093, Metro Area: 297-3999: You can remain anonymous - a code number will be used instead of your name. Note: Please do not use this telephone number to obtain hunting regulation information.

SAFETY PROVISIONS

IT IS UNLAWFUL - To hunt, trap, or assist therein, in any zone open for the taking of deer by firearms, unless the visible portion of the cap and outer garments, above the waist excluding the sleeves if any and excluding gloves, are BRIGHT RED OR BLAZE ORANGE color or covered therewith. Blaze orange includes a camouflage pattern of at least 50 percent blaze orange within each foot square. The State law that requires all hunters and trappers to wear red or blaze orange during an open firearms deer season is not suspended in those areas where the discharge of a firearm is restricted by local ordinance.

IT IS UNLAWFUL -

- To discharge any firearm or bow and arrow upon, over or across any improved public highway at any big game animal, or when within the limits of the right-of-way of any improved public road.
- To hunt protected wild animals with firearms or bow and arrow while visibly intoxicated, under the influence of narcotics, or if a habitual user of narcotics.

HUNTING METHOD RESTRICTION

IT IS UNLAWFUL - To take deer or moose from any artificial scaffold, platform, or other construction higher than nine feet above the ground. The height restriction does not apply to portable stands that are chained, bolted, clamped or tied with rope. On Wildlife Management Areas only portable stands may be used and they must not be left overnight.

IT IS UNLAWFUL -

- To take any wild animal with the use of a two-way radio except they may be used to take unprotected wild animals by permit.
- To carry any firearm while hunting big game with bow and arrow.
- To shoot any wild animal from a motor vehicle except by disabled persons possessing a permit.

WARNING ON USE OF LIGHTS

IT IS UNLAWFUL -

- To throw or cast the rays of a spotlight, or other artificial light on any highway, or in any field, woodland, or forest, for the purpose of spotting, locating or taking any wild animal, while having in possession any firearm, bow or other implement whereby big game could be killed, unless guns and bows and arrows are unloaded and unstrung and encased and contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. If the vehicle has no trunk, the firearm or bow must be placed in the rear-most location in the vehicle.

IT IS UNLAWFUL -

- Between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. from September 1 to December 31, (with or without a weapon) to cast the rays of a spotlight, headlight or other artificial light in any field, woodland or forest for the purpose of spotting, locating or taking any wild animal except for taking raccoons (see small game regulations). It is not a violation of this paragraph for any person to carry out any agricultural, occupational or recreational practice, including snowmobiling, which is not related to spotting, locating or taking any wild animal.

FIREARMS DEER SEASON REGULAR

GENERAL

SHOOTING HOURS — One-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

LIMIT — One deer per person per calendar year.

LEGAL BUCK — A deer having at least one antier not less than 3 inches long. Fawn bucks, sometimes called nubbin bucks or button bucks, are not legal bucks.

ANTLERLESS DEER — Does and fawns, including male fawns with nubbins or antlers less than 3 inches long.

REGISTRATION — You must register the deer you have tagged before 48 hours after your deer hunting license expires.

WHERE HUNTING IS ALLOWED — Deer season regulations permit hunting statewide with the following provisions:

- 1. Zones, areas, and time periods for various kinds of hunts are limited by these regulations. Please read all of this synopsis.
- 2. Refuges and state parks are closed to hunting except as specifically opened by these regulations.
- 3. Cities, villages, and some townships have ordinances prohibiting the discharge of weapons. Variance may be only by permit. Check with the office of your local government unit - especially if you are within or adjacent to a metropolitan area.
- 4. The owners of property private, corporate, or public agency have the right to prohibit hunting on their land.

FIREARM SEASON CHOICES

- The firearms deer hunter has several options from which to select a hunting period and zone. A hunter's choice will be indicated by a hole punched in his license at the time of purchase. All of the alternatives are mutually exclusive and do not allow hunting under any choice other than the one selected and punched on the license.
- All of the options fall within the month of November except the special muzzleloader hunt. That is a special hunt on designated lands and allows for taking deer of either sex. Details of that season are given on panels 13-15 of this folder.
- Hunters who choose any of the November options may hunt with muzzleloading guns but must follow regular firearms rules and cannot hunt in the special muzzleloader season.

See map on reverse side for season choice details.

TYPES OF PERMITS AVAILABLE

- Antierless Deer Permit (allows taking deer of either sex)
- Special Area Permit (allows hunting in special areas)

INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS

Some requirements are the same for both types of permit. They are listed below. In addition, each type of permit has some special requirements. They are listed below the general requirements and on panels 9 and 10.

NOTE: Over 20,000 permit applications are rejected each year because they are filled out improperly or incompletely. The most common mistakes are incorrect driver's license or identification numbers, incorrect birthdates, and unsigned applications. Time deadlines do not allow these to be returned for corrections. Please check your application carefully before sending it in.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

To apply for either an Antlerless Permit or Special Area Permit -

- You must first purchase a 1984 deer license to obtain the application card required to make application for any permit. This means you must hunt in the option chosen regardless of whether or not you receive a permit. - You may NOT apply for both an Antleriess Permit and a Special Area
- Permit. You may apply for only one Antierless Permit or only one Special Area Permit, Bow and arrow permits are not included in this restriction - Your application for a permit must be filled out as requested or it will
- not be accepted. - Both Minnesota residents and nonresidents are eligible for permits.
- A permit is not transferable between persons or between permit areas.
- Special requirements that differ between Antierless Permit applications and Special Area Permit applications are listed below and on panels 9

ANTLERLESS DEER PERMITS

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS - See above.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS -

- Antierless Permits limit the number of people who are allowed to take does and fawns within a permit area. The number of buck hunters is not limited. - Antierless Permit applicants may NOT apply as a party. The volume of
- applications requires processing which cannot handle variable size groups to be treated as one. Do NOT mail in envelope.

AREAS OPEN -

- The areas open for antierless deer are identified on the firearms deer season map (opposite side of this sheet) by numbers. Some parts of the state are not open for antierless deer hunting and such areas do not have a number within their boundaries or are listed for zero permits. Areas marked with an asterisk on the quota table were undersubscribed last year.

APPLICATION DEADLINE -

- Application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered to the DNR License Center, 625 North Robert Street, St. Paul, no later than September 17, 1984,

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION -

- If applications for permits exceed the area quotas, computerized drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.
- For Permit Areas requiring a drawing the following procedures will be in effect.
- All applicants for antierless permits who will reach their 18th birthday by September 17 must provide their Minnesota Driver's License or Minnesota Identification Card number. Also, anyone under 18 who wishes to gain preference for the 1985 or any future drawings, if they are unsuccessful in the 1984 drawing, must provide one of these numbers.
- However, people who will not reach their 18th birthday by September 17. 1984, can be in a special drawing for an antierless permit by providing their Firearms Safety Training Certificate number. These people will not gain any preference for the 1985 drawing if unsuccessful in the 1984 drawing. Neither will they be excluded from the 1985 drawing if they are drawn in 1984.
- This special youth drawing is being held to accommodate young people who cannot obtain a driver's license or who do not wish to purchase the I.D. card. They are being allowed to enter the special drawing until they are 18 years old at which time they must either obtain a driver's license or I.D. number to apply for an antierless permit.
- The number of antierless permits available for the special youth drawing will be determined by the proportion of youths applying for a permit using their Firearms Safety Training Certificate number versus the total number of antierless permits available for that area, as follows:

- Although the youths will not gain any preference, this system gives them the opportunity to apply and be drawn on the same basis as they would have had prior to the preference system because they are all competing for the youth share of the permits each year.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Permits will be mailed no later than October 23, 1984.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE -

- A hunter receiving an Antlerless Permit is allowed to hunt antlerless deer only in the area for which he has received a permit. However, he may hunt bucks throughout the zone and during the time punched on his license.
- An Antierless Permit is not transferable between persons or between Antlerless Permit areas.

PARTY HUNTING WITH ANTLERLESS PERMITS -

- See panel 5.

SPECIAL AREA PERMITS

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS - See panel 8.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS -

- Special Area Permits limit the number of people who are allowed to hunt within a designated Special Permit Area. Deer of either sex may be taken under such permits
- Special Area Permit applicants (1 to 4 persons) are allowed to apply as parties. Properly completed applications which are submitted in a single envelope will all be selected or none selected.
- Your application for a Special Area Permit must follow the instructions given below or it will not be eligible.

AREAS OPEN -

- See panels 22, 23 and 24 (Muzzleloader hunters see panels 13-15).

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS FOR SPECIAL AREAS -

Except special bow hunt areas.

- Application for Special Permits must be made on the Antlerless Permit application provided with the deer license.
- Write "Special" above the arrow on the form and write the number of the Special Area you choose in the spaces at the point of the arrow.
- Indicate your choice of hunt periods available by writing the dates in the space above birth date.
- Cross out the address on the back of the application and mail in an envelope to the address given where the Special Area is described. Up to four persons may apply as a party.

APPLICATION DEADLINE -

- Envelopes containing application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered no later than September 17, 1984.

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION -

- If applications for permits exceed the number allowed, drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.
- Since a Special Area Permit restricts who can enter an area to hunt, allowing applications by party (1 to 4 persons) is an essential feature. Currently, preference cannot be given in drawings with party applications because of the complexities of the preference system and limited computer capability. Therefore the Special Area Permit drawings will be separate from the preference system. Success or failure in either an Antlerless Permit or a Special Area Permit drawing in some previous year will have no effect on an applicant's chances for a Special Area Permit this year.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Special Area Permits will be mailed no later than October 23, 1984.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE -

- A hunter receiving a Special Area Permit is allowed to hunt deer of either sex or any age within the designated area and time by regular firearms, or muzzleloader depending upon the type of hunt for which the permit is valid. The permit holder with a regular firearms license may also hunt bucks in the zone for which his license is valid. Only one deer may be taken per hunter.

SHOOTING HOURS — One-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

NOTE: All licensed big game hunters who are hunting with bow and arrow shall have their bows unstrung or cased during the time they are licensed to take big game while in the field between 30 minutes after the close of shooting hours and 30 minutes before the start of shooting hours, daily. The 30 minute period before and after shooting hours is not extra hunting time.

 No licensed bow hunter shall occupy any elevated deer stand between sunset and one hour before sunrise.

LICENSING RESTRICTIONS —

- A license to take deer with bow and arrow issued after the opening of the bow and arrow deer season shall not be valid until the fifth day after it is issued.
- No license to take deer may be issued after November 2, 1984.

ZONES

DAYS OPEN

SOUTHWEST MINNESOTA

Zone 4 south of I-94 and State Hwy. 23 (Fargo-St. Cloud) Sept. 15 - Nov. 30, either sex. except see NOTE below.

BOW & ARROW DEER SEASON

NORTHERN MINNESOTA

Zone 1, that part of Zone 2 north of State Hwy, 95, and that part of Zone 4 north of I-94 and State Hwy. 23 (Fargo-St. Cloud) Sept. 15 - Dec. 9, either sex. except see NOTE below.

SOUTHEAST MINNESOTA

Zone 3 and that part of Zone 2 south of State Hwy, 95 (St. Cloud-Taylors Falls)

Sept. 15 - Dec. 31, either sex. except see NOTE below.

NOTE: Bow hunting for either sex permitted, except that only legal bucks may be taken within a regular firearms zone when there is a regular firearms season open therein, unless specifically authorized. Where an area is closed to firearms hunting within a firearms zone that is open, bow and arrow hunters are still limited to bucks only hunting within the area closed to firearms.

BOW KILL REGISTRATION

Bow and Arrow Deer must be registered with a Conservation Officer or other authorized agent within 48 hours after being taken. No part of the deer carcass except entrails shall be removed until after the animal has been registered. A separate list of facilities open for bow and arrow deer registration is contained in the Deer Registration Station List available for viewing at license agents and County Auditor's offices.

STATE GAME REFUGES OPEN ONLY TO **BOW AND ARROW HUNTING OF** DEER AND BEAR

NOTE: Most game refuges contain privately owned land upon which the right to hunt (if open) may be prohibited by the landowner.

SPECIAL AREAS OPEN TO HUNTING DEER WITH BOW ONLY BY PERMIT

PERMIT APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS -

- Application for a special bow hunt area permit must be made on a form supplied separately by each special bow hunt area. No other form of application will be accepted.
- Send your request for the application form with a stamped, selfaddressed business envelope to the address listed for the special bow hunt area where you wish to hunt.

FIREARMS DEER KILL REGISTRATION

SEE LICENSE AGENTS FOR COMPLETE LISTINGS OF DEER REGISTRATION STATIONS

Your deer will be illegal unless registered.

Registration is required by Commissioner's Order, Registration will be certified by a locking POSSESSION TAG that will be issued at the time of registration. The hunter's license number and the year of issue will be written on the POSSESSION TAG by the registration agent.

The Commissioner's Order requires the POSSESSION TAG to be locked around the deer's leg just as the license seal is. This must be done immediately after receiving the TAG.

The hunter registering the deer must sign the statement on the back of the registration slip certifying: 1) that he has personally presented the animal for registration; 2) that his license number appears on the seal and possession tag; and 3) that both the seal and tag are affixed to the animal as specified on panel 18.

KILL REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

Every person taking a deer with firearms during the regular firearms season shall present the deer for registration at an official deer registration station and obtain a POSSESSION TAG before any of the following

- before the deer is removed from the zone in which it is taken,*
- before the deer is processed either privately or commercially.
- before 48 hours after the expiration of his/her firearms deer hunting license

CAUTION -

- The head of the deer must remain attached to the carcass until the deer is registered
- All deer must be transported so that inspection by enforcement officers is readily accomplished.
- No person may process a deer unless it has been registered as attested by an attached and properly sealed POSSESSION TAG.
- * Deer taken by firearms may also be presented for registration at an official station within a city or village through which a zone boundary passes or at an official station across the road but adjacent to the zone where taken.

TAGGING AND TRANSPORTING DEER

AFFIXING OF SEALS: No deer or moose taken in this state shall be transported or possessed unless the seal issued with the license and bearing the license number of the owner and the year of its issue has been affixed to its carcass between the tendon and the bone and around the bone of a hind leg so that such seal cannot be removed. The seal must be placed and locked at the time the deer or moose is brought into any hunting camp, dwelling, farm yard, or other place of abode of any kind occupied overnight, or before being placed wholly or partially on a motor vehicle of any kind, or upon a conveyance towed by a motor vehicle of any kind. See separate regulations for bear.

TRANSPORTATION OF DEER: A licensed resident may transport. only within the boundaries of the state, during his individual open season and the next following two days one deer which has been lawfully taken and possessed, and may transport the head or hide of such deer for mounting or tanning purposes to a place within or outside the state. WHEN SUCH DEER IS TRANSPORTED BY OTHER THAN COMMON CARRIER. THE LICENSEE MUST ACCOMPANY SUCH DEER, EXCEPT AS PROVIDED BELOW:

NEW FOR 1984

A big game animal which has been registered by the licensee in accordance with requirements established by the commissioner may be transported by the most direct route from one location to another by a person other than the licensee, provided there is a tag attached to the animal marked in ink containing: 1) the address, license number, and signature of the licensee; and 2) the locations from which and to which the animal is being transported.

NOTE: All deer must be transported so that inspection by enforcement officers is readily accomplished.

POSSESSING BIG GAME

- Every person taking a big game animal must retain the license, seal, permit, and registration tag that make it legal as long as any part of the meat is in possession.

LICENSE REVOCATION

Upon conviction of any hunting violation, the license relating thereto is immediately revoked.

In addition, no big game license of any kind shall be issued to the violator for a period of three years from the date of conviction if the conviction is:

- 1. For a big game violation which is classified as a gross misdemeanor;
- 2. For doing an act without a big game license for which a big game license is required; 3. A second conviction within a three year period for any other big game
- 4. A conviction for taking any big game animal out of season.

The Trespass Law, which is set forth in panel 1, also contains penalty

provisions which can result in license and registration revocation.

USE OF SNOWMOBILES. OTHER VEHICLES

No person who has a valid deer license shall operate a snowmobile, three-wheel cycle or any other all-terrain vehicle, during legal shooting hours in any area open for the taking of deer by firearms on any day when the person is licensed to take deer within that area except during the period 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day. All-terrain vehicles include trail bikes, Cushman 6 wheelers, Cushman Tracksters, Bombadier J-5's and other similarly manufactured and homemade vehicles. This regulation applies to all lands and waters regardless of ownership, except that anyone using an all-terrain vehicle while pursuing his or her occupation on their own land and not in possession of a firearm is exempt. A permit to operate these restricted vehicles between one half hour before sunrise and sunset (other than during the period 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.) may be issued by a Conservation Officer in the event of an emergency or other unusual condition.

STATE GAME REFUGES

A state game refuge is closed to firearms hunting of deer and bear unless listed below.

The following game refuges are open to hunting of deer and bear during established seasons for the zones in which they are located. (See Small Game Hunting and Trapping regulations for refuges open to small game hunting and trapping and waterfowl hunting.)

NOTE: Most game refuges contain privately owned land upon which the right to hunt (if open) may be prohibited by the landowner.

STATE GOOSE REFUGES & STATE WATERFOWL REFUGES

State goose refuges and waterfowl refuges are closed to hunting of geese or waterfowl as indicated. Other forms of hunting and trapping are permitted during the established seasons and in the zones in which they are located.

STATE FORESTS

The public land within State Forests is open to hunting. State Game Refuges within State Forests are not open to big game hunting unless listed as open in this synopsis. Agricultural or posted private land within a State Forest may be hunted only with permission of the owner.

STATE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

All areas identified as wildlife management areas, except any portion thereon which may be posted against entry by "State Game Refuge," or "No Trespassing" signs, are open to big game hunting during established seasons for the zones in which they are located.

However, specific regulations will apply to certain areas as follows:

For Special Muzzleloader Hunts — See Muzzleloader Section.

The Lac qui Parle Game Refuge in Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties is open as follows: Those portions of the refuge within the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site, or which are posted with "Do Not Trespass" signs, are closed to hunting or the carrying or possession of firearms or bows and arrows unless the firearm is unloaded and completely encased or unloaded and contained in the trunk of the car and the trunk door closed and the bow is unstrung or completely contained in a case or contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. The remainder of the refuge is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons therefor in the zones in which it is located. From September 20 to December 1, both dates inclusive, no unauthorized person shall trespass for any purpose whatsoever on any part of the refuge which is posted with signs prohibiting trespass during this period. No unauthorized person shall trespass on Rosemoen Island at any time during the year. See Muzzleloader section for Special Hunt Permits.

The Bayport Wildlife Management Area is closed to the possession of all firearms unless unloaded and contained in a case, except for designated hunting areas during the season for the taking of small game when shotgun with fine shot only is permited. Possession and use of bow and arrow is limited to the designated hunting areas during established hunting seasons.

MOTOR VEHICLES ON WILDLIFE AREAS

On the following wildlife management areas motor vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on established roads, and no vehicles may be driven beyond a sign prohibiting vehicular use or beyond any manade vehicle parrier:

- 1. Carlos Avery Wildlife Area (Anoka and Chisago Counties)
- 2. Hubbel Pond Wildlife Area (Becker County)
- 3. Mille Lacs Wildlife Area (Kanabec and Mille Lacs Counties)
- 4. Red Lake Wildlife Area (Beltrami and Lake of the Woods Counties)
- 5. Roseau River Wildlife Area (Roseau County)
 6. Thief Lake Wildlife Area (Marshall County)

On all other wildlife management areas vehicles are prohibited except vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on those routes designated by signs as being for travel purposes.

No vehicle shall be parked where it obstructs travel.

No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle, all-terrain cycle, hang-glider, air boat, or hover craft in a wildlife management area. No person shall operate a snowmobile in any wildlife management area without the written permission of the agent in charge thereof in the part of the state lying south and west of a line described as follows: U.S. Highway No. 2 from East Grand Forks easterly to Bemidji; thence southerly along U.S. Highway No. 71 to Wadena; thence easterly along U.S. Highway No. 10 to Staples and U.S. Highway No. 210 to the east boundary of the state.

OTHER USES OF WILDLIFE AREAS

Camping is allowed only in designated areas or by permit from the Area Wildlife Manager.

No part of any wildlife management area may be entered or used during the hours 10:00 P.M. to 5:00 A.M. if so posted at the major access points. Target, skeet, trap or promiscuous shooting is prohibited.

STATE PARKS

State Park vehicle permits are required on all vehicles taken into Minnesota State Parks.

All State parks are refuges by law but may be opened by Commissioner's Order. In 1984 the following regulations apply:

STATE PARKS OPEN WITH ZONE REGULATIONS

ITASCA STATE PARK in Becker, Clearwater and Hubbard Counties is open to firearms hunting for legal bucks only by Zone 2 license holders and for antierless deer by Area 236 permit holders, except where posted as closed, during the Zone 2 firearms season.

STATE PARKS OPEN ONLY WITH SPECIAL PERMIT

Certain parks are open to a limited number of deer hunters by Special Area Permits and the proper license. In each state park thus opened a permit holder must first register at the park office before beginning to hunt and he/she must register any deer taken at the park office before leaving the park. Parks open by Special Permit for bow and arrow hunting are listed on panel 12. Parks open by Special Permit for muzzleloader hunting are listed on panel 14. The parks listed below are open as described for regular legal firearm hunting. See panel 10 for application instructions.

FORESTVILLE STATE PARK in Fillmore County is open for either sex hunting on Nov. 17-19 by special permit. One hundred (100) permits will be issued. This is Special Area number 397.

FRONTENAC STATE PARK in Goodhue County is open for either sex deer hunting on Nov. 17-19 by special permit. Thirty (30) permits will be issued. This is Special Area number 390.

HELMER MYRE STATE PARK in Freeborn County is open for either sex deer hunting by special permit. Fifty (50) permits will be issued for Nov. 3-4 and fifty (50) permits will also be issued for Nov. 10-11. This is Special Area number 499.

NERSTRAND WOODS STATE PARK and Game Refuge in Rice County is open for either sex deer hunting by special permit. Eighty-five (85) permits will be issued for Nov. 3-4 and eighty-five (85) permits will also be issued for Nov. 10-11. This is Special Area number 497.

O.L. KIPP STATE PARK in Winona County is open for either sex deer hunting on Nov. 17-19 by special permit. One hundred (100) permits will be issued. This is Special Area number 393.

LAKE BRONSON STATE PARK in Kittson County is open for either sex deer hunting by special permit. Twenty (20) permits will be issued for Nov. 3-5 and twenty (20) permits will also be issued for Nov. 10-12. This is Special Area number 294.

FEDERAL AREAS

VOYAGEURS NATIONAL PARK

Hunting and trapping wild animals on public land, within the boundaries of Voyageurs National Park is prohibitied.

Maps showing the boundaries of the park are available from Box 50, International Falls, Minnesota 56649.

FEDERAL WATERFOWL PRODUCTION AREAS AND NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

Federal Waterfowl Production Areas are open in the fall to public hunting except where posted otherwise. Migratory birds, upland game birds, small game and big game may be hunted and furbearers trapped in accordance with applicable State and Federal regulations.

Motorized vehicles are prohibited on National Wildlife Refuges and Waterfowl Production Areas except: 1) On access roads and parking areas designated by sign; 2) on public roads; or 3) by permit obtained from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Refuge and Wetland Management District offices.

NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

GENERAL — The following National Wildlife Refuges are open to big game hunting as hereinafter provided, in accordance with State and Special Federal regulations. A Minnesota state Hunting License punched with the appropriate option is required. Hunting maps and regulations are available through each refuge office or by writing to: Regional Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Building, Fort Snelling, Twin Cities, MN 55111.

NOTE: Some of these refuges are Special Permit Areas, some are Antierless Permit Areas, some are both and one requires only a regular deer license for the appropriate hunt. Please read details carefully.

AGASSIZ NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Marshall County is open only to firearms deer hunting in accordance with established State seasons in all areas except those designated by "Area Closed" signs or as delineated on a map available at Refuge Headquarters, Middle River, MN 56737. This is in Antierless Permit Area number 203 which includes the Elm Lake, Eckvoll and Mud Lac State Wildlife Areas.

BIG STONE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Big Stone and Lac qui Parle Counties is open to bow and arrow and firearms deer hunting in accordance with established State seasons on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or as delineated on a map available at Refuge Headquarters, 25 N.W. 2nd Street, Ortonville, MN 56278. See Muzzleloader section for Special Area Permits. This is part of Antlerless Permit Area number 430.

RICE LAKE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Aitkin County is open only to firearms either sex deer hunting only on November 10 thru 12, 1984 to those persons with a valid Special Area Permit (see panel 10 on Special Area Permits for application procedures). A total of 100 Special Permits will be issued. Maps delineating the open areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Route 2, McGregor, MN 55760. This is Special Permit Area number 151.

SHERBURNE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Sherburne County is open to bow and arrow deer hunting in Areas A and B during the established State seasons. Firearms deer hunting is allowed in Areas A, B and C for legal bucks and antierless deer by permit during the established State season November 3-12, 1984. This is Antierless Permit Area number 224. Maps delineating hunting areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Route 2, Zimmerman, MN 55398 or call 612/389-3323.


TAMARAC NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Becker County is open to bow and arrow and firearms deer hunting during the established State seasons. This is Antlerless Permit Area number 251. Maps delineating the open areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Rural Route, Rochert, MN 56578.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE AND FISH REFUGE is open to bow and arrow and firearms deer hunting during the established State seasons on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area." Hunting is permitted on those portions of the Refuge posted as "Area Closed" beginning with the first day following the close of the duck season. Maps delineating the open areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, Rm. 101, 51 East 4th St., Winona, MN 55987.



MINNESOTA TRESPASS LAW

100.273 Subdivision 1. For purposes of this section "agricultural lands" mean lands containing plowed or tilled fields, standing crops or their residues, or lands with a maintained fence for the purpose of enclosing domestic livestock.

Subdivision 2. No person shall enter upon the agricultural lands of another with the intent of hunting big or small game nor shall any person intentionally enter upon the agricultural land of another for the purpose of pleasure driving, including snowmobiling or operating any motorized vehicle, unless and until the permission of the owner, occupant, or lessee is obtained.

Subdivision 3. No person shall enter upon any land not his own regardless if it is agricultural land with intent to take any wild animals after being notified not to do so, either orally by the owner, occupant or lessee, or by signs erected pursuant to subdivision 6.

Subdivision 4. No person shall enter or leave the lands of another, or pass from one portion of another person's land, through a closed gate without returning the gate to its original position, nor shall any person destroy, cut or tear down any fence, building, grain, crops, any sign erected pursuant to subdivision 6 or live trees, or wound or kill any domestic animals.

Subdivision 5. No person shall take any wild animal with a firearm without the written permission of the owner or occupant of the premises on any private agricultural land not his own or any public right-of-way within 500 feet of any building occupied by a human being or by livestock, or within 500 feet of any stockade or corral containing livestock, nor shall any person take any wild animal with a firearm within 200 feet of any building occupied by a human being on any land other than agricultural land without the oral permission of the owner or occupant of the premises, or within 500 feet of any burning area.

Subdivision 6. No person shall erect "no hunting", "no trapping", "no fishing", "no trespassing", or other signs prohibiting trespass upon any lands or waters in which he has no right, title, interests, or license. The owner, occupant, or lessee of any private land, or a duly constituted legal authority of public land, may erect signs prohibiting trespassing, hunting, trapping, or fishing if the signs bear letters not less than two inches high, are signed by the owner, occupant, or lessee, and are posted at intervals of not more than 1000 feet upon the boundaries of the area so protected.

Subdivision 7. In taking raccoon, when treed on private land with the aid of dogs, a person while on foot may, without permission of the landowner, enter such private land to retrieve any dogs and then shall immediately leave the premises. During the season for taking big or small game, a hunter may on foot retrieve a wounded big or small game animal from agricultural land of another which is not posted pursuant to subdivision 6, without permission of the landowner, and shall then leave as soon as possible.

Subdivision 8. All conservation and peace officers shall enforce the provisions of this section.

Subdivision 9. Violation of any provision of this section is a misdemeanor. Upon a person's conviction for violating any provision of this section, any license issued to him pursuant to Chapter 98, or any registration pursuant to section 84.82, under which he was exercising or attempting to exercise a privilege while violating this section shall immediately become null and void.

ABOUT THE BEAR SEASON

BEAR SEASON

DATES AND HOURS -

SEPTEMBER 4 through OCTOBER 23, 1979 - sunrise to sunset

 Holders of a valid 1979 bear hunting license may take bear statewide by legal firearms or bow and arrow.

SEPTEMBER 29 through OCTOBER 23, 1979 - sunrise to sunset

 Holders of a valid 1979 bow and arrow deer hunting license may take bear statewide by bow and arrow.

SPECIAL NOTE -

THE FIREARMS DEER SEASONS ARE CLOSED TO THE TAKING OF BEAR.

BAG LIMIT —

— No person shall take more than one bear during any calendar year whether by firearms or bow and arrow, which bear may be of either sex or any age except that cub bear may not be taken at any time.

RESTRICTIONS ON WHERE BEAR MAY BE TAKEN —

- No person shall take or molest any bear in a den.
- No person shall take or attempt to take bear within one-quarter mile of a refuse dump or a designated municipal or county garbage collection point.

RESTRICTIONS ON BAITING —

- No person shall take by using solid waste containing bottles, cans, plastic, paper, metal or any other materials that are not readily biodegradable as a bait or lure for attracting bear.
- No person shall establish any bait station for attracting or taking bear without first registering the site with a Conservation Officer. Description of site shall show the township, range and section number on forms provided or sketch or verbal description of details of location.

OTHER PROVISIONS

- Firearms: No person shall take bear with any firearm which does not conform to the legal standards set for the taking of deer and moose. See panel 19, LEGAL ARMS, for details.
- Bow & Arrow: No person shall take bear with any bow or arrow which
 does not conform to the legal standards set for the taking of deer and
 moose. See panel 19, LEGAL ARMS, for details.
- No person shall have any firearm in his possession while hunting bear with bow and arrow.
- No person shall take or attempt to take bear with the aid of dogs.

BEAR REGISTRATION STATION LIST

These stations have agreed to register bear in the period September 4 through October 25, 1979. Open hours are not listed due to lack of space and uncertainty of the gasoline supply situation. Please check with your most likely registration stations just before you go bear hunting.

SPECIAL MUZZLELOADER DEER HUNT

DATES AND HOURS —

DECEMBER 1 through DECEMBER 16, 1979 — sunrise to sunset

 Antlerless deer and legal bucks may be taken by hunters who have selected this option at the time of license purchase.

OPEN AREAS —

— The Special Muzzleloader Season is open only on public land within the boundaries of the following listed wildlife management areas and refuges. Any inholdings of private land within areas opened for this special season are closed by law.

CLOTHING —

 All hunters and trappers using the muzzleloader hunt areas December 1-16, 1979 must meet the legal requirement for wearing bright red or blaze orange. See panel 20.

*Persons hunting deer with muzzleloaders on the Lac qui Parle Refuge must first check in at the headquarters to obtain a map and additional instructions. The federal Waterfowl Production Area located in Section 4, Township 119 N., Range 43 W., adjacent to the Lac qui Parle WMA, is open to the hunting of deer by muzzleloader during the established season.

FIREARMS DEER SEASON

CHOICES AVAILABLE -

- The firearms deer hunter has several options from which to select a hunting period and zone. A hunter's choice will be indicated by a hole punched in his license at the time of purchase. All of the alternatives are mutually exclusive and do not allow hunting under any choice other than the one selected and punched on the license.
- All of the options fall within the month of November except the muzzleloader hunt in December. That is a special hunt on designated public lands and allows taking deer of either sex. Details of that season are given on panel 10 of this folder.
- Hunters who choose any of the November options may hunt with muzzleloading guns but must follow the regular firearms rules and cannot hunt in the December muzzleloader season.
- The firearms deer license (except for the December muzzleloader choice) by itself allows only buck deer hunting. Antlerless deer (does and fawns) may be hunted only by those who have received a permit through the computerized drawing. Details on antlerless permits are given on panel 12 of this folder.



ANTLERLESS DEER PERMITS

AREAS OPEN -

— The areas open for antierless deer hunting are identified on the firearms deer season map (opposite side of this sheet) by peach colored numbers. Some parts of the state are not open for antierless deer hunting and such areas do not have a peach colored number within their boundaries.

HOW TO APPLY FOR A PERMIT —

- You may apply for an antlerless permit before you buy a deer license. If you wish to apply you must obtain an application card from a license agent or DNR office and complete the form, making sure to fill in all requested information.
- Caution: No one may submit more than one application for an antlerless permit.
- Deadline: Application cards must be postmarked or hand delivered to the DNR License Center, 625 North Robert Street, St. Paul, no later than Friday, September 14, 1979.
- Both Minnesota residents and nonresidents are eligible for antlerless permits.

WINNER SELECTION AND NOTIFICATION —

- If applications for permits exceed the area quotas, computerized drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits.
- An antierless permit application will become a valid permit when it carries the official validation marks and the successful applicant purchases a firearms deer license for a zone and dates that match the permit received.
- Only successful applicants will be notified. Permits will be mailed no later than October 17, 1979.

CONDITIONS OF PERMIT USE —

- A hunter receiving an antlerless permit is allowed to hunt antlerless deer only in the area for which he has received a permit. However, he may hunt bucks throughout the zone and during the time punched on his license.
- A hunter unsuccessful in the antlerless permit drawing, or one who is successful but decides not to use the permit, may purchase a license to hunt bucks only in any one of the zone and time options available.
- An antlerless permit is not transferable between persons or between antlerless permit areas.

PARTY HUNTING WITH ANTLERLESS PERMITS

 Anyone in a party with an antlerless permit may shoot an antlerless deer for any other party member who also has an antlerless permit for the same permit area. Persons without antlerless permits are not allowed to shoot antlerless deer for party members who have antlerless permits.

LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

Resident licenses may be issued only to U.S. citizens who have maintained a legal residence in Minnesota for a period of 60 days immediately preceding the date of application for a license.

Residents serving with the U.S. Military or Naval forces, or the reserve components thereof, who are stationed outside the state may obtain a free deer license and seal from county auditors when in Minnesota on regularly granted leave or furlough provided that they have proper leave or furlough papers on their person.

A license is required to hunt big game regardless of the hunter's age: however, a person under the age of 16 must have a firearm or hunter safety certificate on his person to purchase a big game hunting license. A person under age 12 may not hunt big game.

Residents under age 14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian when using firearms for any purpose. Residents over 14 but under 16 may hunt or possess firearms by themselves only if they have a firearm safety certificate in their possession.

"Guardian" is a legal guardian or any person over the age of 18 who has been selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under

A bow and arrow deer hunting license permits the licensee to hunt with bow and arrow during the entire bow and arrow deer season including during the firearms season.

An alien spouse or a nonresident child under the age of 21 of a resident of Minnesota may take, buy, sell, transport, or possess wild animals as a

Nonresidents attending schools in Minnesota are required to purchase a nonresident license for hunting deer or bear in Minnesota.

PURCHASE OF DEER LICENSE: All firearms deer licenses including those for the December muzzleloader season and bow and arrow deer licenses must be purchased on or before November 2, 1979, except those for a resident who is discharged from the military or naval forces of the United States, or any active reserve or component thereof. These persons may be issued a firearms deer license any time during the firearms deer season upon showing their official discharge papers.

WARNING—Only one license of each kind may be purchased in any year. SPECIAL NOTE — A restricted or an unrestricted form of any license may be purchased. A restricted license is valid statewide, or within zones where such apply, except on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation. While hunting in the Leech Lake Reservation all persons required to hold a Minnesota license for hunting deer or bear must have on their person an appropriate unrestricted license or an appropriate restricted license with a Leech Lake Stamp affixed.

Amounts listed below are for restricted licenses. The fee for an unrestricted license is \$2.00 extra for residents and \$3.00 for nonresidents. For those persons who purchased a restricted license and later desire to hunt on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation a \$3.00 resident or a \$4.00 nonresident stamp must be purchased.

AGENT'S FEE — An additional charge of 75 cents will be made for issuing deer licenses and 50 cents for all other licenses and Reservation stamps.

TAGGING AND TRANSPORTING

AFFIXING OF SEALS: No deer or moose taken in this state shall be transported or possessed unless a locking seal bearing the license number of the owner and the year of its issue has been affixed to its carcass between the tendon and the bone and around the bone of the leg so that such seal cannot be removed without breaking the lock. The seal must be placed and locked at the time the deer or moose is brought into any hunting camp, dwelling, farm vard, or other place of abode of any kind occupied overnight, or before being placed wholly or partially on, or towed by a motor vehicle.

TRANSPORTATION OF BIG GAME: A resident may transport, only within the boundaries of the state, during his individual open season and the next following two days one deer which has been lawfully taken and possessed, and may transport the head or hide of such deer for mounting or tanning purposes to a point within or without the state. WHEN SUCH DEER IS NOT TRANSPORTED BY COMMON CARRIER. THE LICEN-SEE MUST ACCOMPANY SUCH DEER.

ANTLERLESS DEER MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY HUNTER WITH VALID ANTLERLESS PERMIT AND BE REGISTERED IN THE PERMIT AREA WHERE TAKEN, BEFORE BEING REMOVED FROM THAT

NOTE: All deer must be transported so that inspection by enforcement officers is readily accomplished.

REGISTRATION REQUIRED — your deer and bear will be illegal unless registered

Registration is necessary to provide the information needed to manage big game and establish hunting regulations that will give you the best hunting opportunity each year. It is important enough so that special measures have been taken to assure registration of all deer and bear taken by hunters.

Registration is required by Commissioner's Order. Registration will be certified by a locking POSSESSION TAG that will be issued at the time of registration. The hunter's license number and the year of issue will be written on the POSSESSION TAG by the registration agent.

NOTE: A statement on the POSSESSION TAG says that it is to be locked through the loop of the metal deer seal. However, it is permissible to lock this tag around the deer's leg just as the metal seal.

SEE LICENSE AGENTS FOR COMPLETE LISTING OF DEER REGISTRATION STATIONS LICENSE REVOCATION

Upon conviction of any hunting violation, the license relating thereto is immediately revoked.

In addition, no big game license of any kind shall be issued to the violator for a period of three years from the date of conviction if the conviction is:

- 1. For a big game violation which is classified as a gross misdemeanor;
- 2. For doing an act without a big game license for which a big game license is required; or
- 3. A second conviction within a three year period for any other big game

The Trespass Law, which is set forth in panel 3, also contains penalty provisions which can result in license and registration revocation.

KILL REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

BEAR KILL REGISTRATION

All Bear Hunters: Bear must be registered at an official bear registration station within 48 hours after the bear is taken.

A list of all bear registration stations is provided on panels 8 and 9 of this

DEER KILL REGISTRATION

Bow and Arrow Hunters: Deer must be registered with a Conservation Officer or other authorized agent within 48 hours after being taken. No part of the deer carcass except entrails shall be removed until after the animal has been registered.

November Firearms Hunters: Deer must be registered at an official registration station within 48 hours after license expires. Head must remain attached to carcass until registered.

CAUTIONS: Antlered buck deer must be registered in the zone where taken and cannot be legally transported or possessed outside of the zone prior to registration. Antlerless deer must be registered in the permit area in which they are taken and cannot be legally transported or possessed outside of that area prior to registration. Antlerless deer taken in permit areas 9, 10, 11, 69, 97, 100, 155, and 300 may be transported outside of the permit area boundaries in order to reach the registration stations (unit headquarters) provided the most direct route is used.

NOTE: Deer taken by firearms may also be presented for registration at an official station within a city or village through which a zone or area boundary passes or at any official station across the road but adjacent to the zone or area where taken.

December Muzzleloader Hunters: Deer taken during this season must be registered at the Headquarters Office of the Wildlife Management Area in which they are taken for the following areas:

> Carlos Avery WMA Red Lake WMA Lac qui Parle WMA Thief Lake WMA Mille Lacs WMA Whitewater WMA

Offices for the Wildlife Management Areas listed above will be open for registration from 8 A.M. to 8 P.M. each day during the Special Muzzleloader Hunt in December.

Muzzleloader hunters in the Big Stone National Wildlife Refuge should check with the headquarters office (25 N.W. 2nd St., Ortonville) during regular business hours to determine when deer may be registered.

Muzzleloader hunters in the Moose Willow Wildlife Management Area must register deer taken there at Manthey's 66 Station at the junction of U.S. 169 and Hwy. 200.

LATE-HOUR STATIONS

Last year a list of registration stations that agreed to be open daily for later hours than most other stations was provided. This year, however, the gas supply situation has caused enough uncertainty about hours that an accurate list cannot be provided.

A complete list of registration stations can be read at any license dealer or county auditor's office.

Because of the uncertainty of service station hours, we urge you to take the following steps:

- 1. Sometime before you go on your hunting trip make a list of the preferred registration stations between your home and your hunting area.
- 2. On your way to your hunting area, or shortly before then, stop at several of these stations to determine their hours. At that late date they should be able to tell you when they will be open.

LEGAL ARMS

LEGAL FIREARMS FOR DEER AND BEAR: No deer or bear may be taken with any rifle of smaller than .23 caliber, nor with any rifle that uses a cartridge less than 1% inches in length, unless the gun is of .35 caliber or larger. All cartridges must contain a soft point or expanding bullet. Shotguns may be used with a single slug (buckshot or fine shot is prohibited).

Within any firearms deer hunting area it is unlawful to have in possession out of doors any rifle, except a .22 rimfire for taking small game only, 10 days before and 5 days after the firearms deer season. This does not apply to rifles on shooting ranges operated under permit or rifles unloaded and contained in cases.

LEGAL BOW AND ARROW FOR BIG GAME: Bows must have a pull of no less than 40 pounds at or before full draw. The bow may not be drawn, held, or released by a mechanical device. Arrow heads shall be of barbless, edged design and shall have steel blades with either a maximum width of at least one inch or a maximum circumference of at least three inches. Arrow heads constructed entirely of steel shall weigh at least 110 grains. Arrow heads with a core or ferrule made of a material other than steel shall weigh at least 90 grains. All arrow heads shall be kept sharp. Arrows carrying poison or explosives shall not be used.

MUZZLELOADERS: Firearms that are incapable of being loaded at the breech are legal arms for taking of deer statewide in accordance with regulations. A smoothbore muzzleloader must be no less than .45 caliber and rifled muzzleloaders must be no less than .40 caliber.

ARMS IN VEHICLE

IT IS UNLAWFUL—To transport any firearm in a motor vehicle, unless the same is unloaded in both barrels and magazine and completely contained in a gun case expressly made for that purpose which is fully enclosed by being zipped, snapped, buckled, tied, or otherwise fastened, with no portion of the firearm exposed, or unless unloaded and contained in the trunk of the ear with the trunk door closed.

A muzzleloading firearm with a flintlock ignition is fully unloaded if it has no priming powder in any pan and a muzzleloading firearm with percussion ignition is fully unloaded if it has no percussion cap on any nipple.

— To transport a bow and arrow in a motor vehicle unless unstrung or completely contained in a case or unless contained in the trunk of the car with trunk door closed.

OTHER RESTRICTIONS

CARRYING FIREARMS DURING NOVEMBER: No person who has purchased a 1979 firearms license may carry a firearm, lawful for the taking of deer, in any area open for the taking of deer by firearms, except within the zone and during the days which that person's license is valid for taking deer. This does not apply to firearms on target ranges operated under a permit from the Commissioner nor to firearms unloaded and contained in a gun case.

SHOTGUN SLUG RESTRICTION: No slugs may be possessed in any open firearms deer hunting area without a valid firearms deer or bear hunting license.

SAFETY PROVISIONS

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To hunt, trap, or assist therein, in any territory open for the taking of deer by firearms, unless the visible portion of the cap and outer garments, above the waist excluding sleeves if any and excluding gloves, are BRIGHT RED OR BLAZE ORANGE color or covered therewith.

- To discharge any firearm or bow and arrow upon, over or across any improved public highway at any big game animal, or when within the limits of the right-of-way of any improved public road.
- To hunt protected wild animals with firearm or bow and arrow while visibly intoxicated, under the influence of narcotics, or if a habitual user of narcotics.

HUNTING METHOD RESTRICTION

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To take deer or moose from any artificial scaffold, platform, or other construction higher than six feet above the ground. On Wildlife Management Areas only portable stands may be used and they must not be left overnight.

- To use a pistol or revolver for taking protected wild animals except by disabled persons possessing a permit.
- To take any wild animal with the use of a two-way radio except they may be used to take unprotected wild animals by permit.
- To carry any firearm while hunting big game with bow and arrow.
- To shoot any wild animal from a motor vehicle except by disabled persons possessing a permit.

ILLEGALLY KILLED ANIMALS

Any hunter finding an illegally taken animal shall leave it where he finds it and contact a Conservation Officer, Sheriff's Office or Highway Patrol.

WANTON WASTE

Except as expressly permitted, no person shall wantonly waste or destroy any usable part of any protected wild animal.

WARNING ON USE OF LIGHTS

It is unlawful to throw or cast the rays of a spotlight, or other artificial light on any highway, or in any field, woodland, or forest, for the purpose of spotting, locating or taking any wild animal, while having in possession any firearm, bow or other implement whereby big game could be killed, UNLESS GUNS AND BOWS AND ARROWS ARE UNLOADED AND UNSTRUNG AND ENCASED AND CONTAINED IN THE TRUNK OF THE CAR WITH THE TRUNK DOOR CLOSED. IF THE VEHICLE HAS NO TRUNK, THE FIREARM OR BOW MUST BE PLACED IN THE REARMOST LOCATION IN THE VEHICLE.

USE OF SNOWMOBILES

No person who has purchased a 1979 firearms deer license shall operate a snowmobile between 7:00 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. in any area open for the taking of deer on any day during which that person's license is valid for taking deer.

Hunters who use snowmobiles should acquaint themselves with the rules and regulations pertaining to their use. These may be obtained from the Department of Natural Resources, 625 N. Robert Street, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101.

STATE GAME REFUGES

A state game refuge is closed to the hunting of deer and bear unless listed below.

NOTE: Some game refuges contain privately owned land upon which the right to hunt (if open) may be prohibited by the landowner.

The following game refuges are open to hunting of deer and bear during established seasons for the zones in which they are located. (See Small Game Hunting and Trapping regulations for refuges open to small game hunting and trapping and waterfowl hunting.)

STATE GOOSE REFUGES & STATE WATERFOWL REFUGES

State goose refuges and waterfowl refuges are closed to hunting of geese or waterfowl as indicated. Other forms of hunting and trapping are permitted during the established seasons and in the zones in which they are located.

STATE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

All areas identified as wildlife management areas, except any portion thereon which may be posted against entry by "State Game Refuge", or "No Trespassing" signs, are open to big game hunting during established seasons for the zones in which they are located.

However, specific regulations will apply to certain areas as follows:

The Lac qui Parle Game Refuge in Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties

is open as follows: Those portions of the refuge within the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site, or which are posted with "Do Not Trespass" signs, are closed to hunting or the carrying or possession of firearms or bows and arrows unless the firearm is unloaded and completely encased or unloaded and contained in the trunk of the car and the trunk door closed and the bow is unstrung or completely contained in a case or contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. The remainder of the refuge is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons therefor in the zones in which it is located. From September 20 to December 1, 1979, both dates inclusive, no unauthorized person shall trespass for any purpose whatsoever on any part of the Refuge which is posted with signs prohibiting trespass during this period. No unauthorized person shall trespass on Rosemoen Island at any time during the year.

The Bayport Wildlife Management Area is closed to the possession of all firearms unless unloaded and contained in a case, except for designated hunting areas during the season for the taking of small game when shotgun with fine shot only is permitted. Possession and use of bow and arrow is limited to the designated established hunting seasons.

MOTOR VEHICLES ON WILDLIFE AREAS

On the following wildlife management areas motor vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on established roads, and no vehicle may be driven beyond a sign prohibiting vehicle barrier:

- 1. Carlos Avery Wildlife Area (Anoka and Chisago Counties)
- 2. Hubbel Pond Wildlife Area (Becker County)
- 3. Mille Lacs Wildlife Area (Kanabec and Mille Lacs Counties)
- 4. Red Lake Wildlife Area (Beltrami and Lake of the Woods Counties)
 5. Roseau River Wildlife Area (Roseau County)
- 6. Thief Lake Wildlife Area (Marshall County)

On all other wildlife management areas vehicles are prohibited except vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on those routes designated by signs as being for travel purposes.

No vehicle shall be parked where it obstructs travel.

No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle, hang-glider, air boat, or hover craft in a wildlife management area. No person shall operate a snow-mobile in any wildlife management area without the written permission of the agent in charge thereof in that part of the state lying south and west of a line described as follows: U.S. Highway No. 2 from East Grand Forks easterly to Bemidji; thence southerly along U.S. Highway No. 71 to Wadena; thence easterly along U.S. Highway No. 10 to Staples and U.S. Highway No. 210 to the east boundary of the state.

OTHER USES OF WILDLIFE AREAS

Camping is allowed only in designated areas or by permit from the Area Wildlife Manager.

No part of any wildlife management area may be entered or used during the hours 10:00 P.M. to 5:00 A.M. if so posted at the major access points. Target, skeet, trap or promiscuous shooting is prohibited.

Signs, posts, fences, buildings, trees, shrubs, vines, plants, or other property may not be destroyed or removed except that marsh vegetation may be used to build blinds on the area, and edible and decorative portions of plants may be picked for personal use.

CAMP RIPLEY

A bow and arrow season for Camp Ripley was not established at the time this synopsis went to press. An announcement on Camp Ripley and any other special bow hunts will be made later.

STATE PARKS

State Park vehicle permits are required on all vehicles hunting within Minnesota State Parks.

All state parks are refuges by law. The following state parks are open to deer hunting as hereinafter provided and in accordance with state regulations.

Itasca State Park in Becker, Clearwater and Hubbard Counties, is open to the hunting of deer, except where posted as closed, during the November firearms season.

Nerstrand Woods State Park and Game Refuge in Rice County is open to deer hunting with legal firearms on November 10, 1979 only by special permit and proper license. A total of 110 permits will be issued. License must be valid for Zone and date. Permit applications must be postmarked or hand-delivered no later than August 31, 1979. Address: Nerstrand Deer Hunt, Department of Natural Resources Hdqtrs., 2300 Silver Creek Road NE, Rochester, MN 55901. Standard postcards are to be used. Applications must include hunter name, address, and birth date. Two or more persons desiring to hunt together may apply together by submitting their applications in one envelope. No person shall submit more than one application. Permits will be mailed to successful applicants before the start of the season.

COUNTY PARKS

CARVER PARK RESERVE - SPECIAL HUNT

- Carver Park Reserve in Carver County (near Victoria) is being opened for the November 23-25, 1979 firearms deer season. It will not be open for the earlier buck only hunt. A total of 125 permits will be issued through the regular antlerless drawing that selects hunters for antlerless permit areas in the State. Only permit holders will be allowed in the park during the hunt.
- Carver Park Reserve has been designated Permit Area 300. Applications for the Carver Park hunt are to be made on the same forms and by the same deadline as applications for other permit areas
- Hunters who obtain permits for Carver Park will be required to attend a pre-season orientation session and will be assigned to a hunting zone within the park. Hunters who obtain such permits must buy a firearms deer license for Zone 3 and the November 23-25, 1979 period (Option 3B). Hunters must purchase a Park Reserve District season parking permit to participate.
- Additional regulations regarding the hunt and information about the park itself can be obtained by calling 612/473-4693.

CROW-HASSAN PARK RESERVE - HENNEPIN COUNTY

— A special permit bow and arrow deer hunt is scheduled for Crow-Hassan Park Reserve between October 19 and 30, 1979, inclusive. A total of 160 participants will be selected in a drawing conducted by the District. Further information on the hunt and an application form can be obtained by writing Hennepin County Park Reserve District Bow Hunt; Box 296, Maple Plain, MN 55359, or by calling 612/473-4693.

NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

The following National Wildlife Refuges are open to big game hunting as hereinafter provided, in accordance with State and Special Federal regulations. Hunting maps and regulations are available through each refuge office or by writing to: Regional Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Building, Fort Snelling, Twin Cities, Minnesota 55111.

ENERAL

No person shall enter or leave a refuge except by access roads which may be so designated; and all hunters must comply with further regulations which the Refuge Manager may prescribe.

AGASSIZ NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Marshall County is open to firearms deer hunting during the established November deer season. Approximately 56,500 acres of the refuge are open to hunting. Areas closed to hunting are posted as "Area Beyond This Sign Closed" and are shown on maps available at Refuge Hdqtrs., Middle River, MN 56737.

BIG STONE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Big Stone and Lac qui Parle Counties is open to the hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or as delineated on a map available at Refuge Headquarters, 25 N.W. 2nd Street, Ortonville, Minnesota 56278. A special muzzleloader deer hunt will be allowed concurrent with special muzzleloader season in other areas in the State. Hunting, except deer hunting during the special muzzleloader hunt, is not permitted after November 30, 1979.

RICE LAKE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Aitkin County is open for deer hunting November 16, 17, and 18, 1979 only by persons with validated antlerless permits for Permit Area 69 and Firearms Deer Licenses for Zone 1. This refuge will not be open for deer hunting prior to Nov. 16, 1979. Maps showing open areas are available from Refuge Hdqtrs., Route 2, McGregor, MN 55760.

SHERBURNE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Sherburne County is open to the hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area". The open area comprises 19,840 acres. Maps are available at Refuge Hdqtrs., Route 2, Zimmerman, MN 55398.

TAMARAC NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Becker County is closed to the hunting of deer in 1979.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI RIVER WILDLIFE and Fish Refuge is open to the hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area". Hunting is permitted on those portions of the Upper Mississippi Refuge posted as "Closed Area" beginning with the first day following the close of the duck season.

FEDERAL WATERFOWL PRODUCTION AREAS


Federal Waterfowl Production Areas are open in the fall to public hunting except where posted otherwise. Migratory birds, upland game birds, small game and big game may be hunted and furbearers trapped in accordance with applicable State and Federal regulations.

Motorized vehicles are prohibited on federal Waterfowl Production Areas except: (1) on accesses and parking areas designated by signs or (2) by permit obtained through U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Wetland Management District Offices.

VOYAGEURS NATIONAL PARK

Hunting and trapping of all wild animals within the boundaries of Voyageurs National Park is prohibited.

1977 BIG GAME HUNTING REGULATIONS

This is not a complete set of hunting laws, but contains the information you are most likely to need in hunting big game. Separate pamphlets are being issued to cover waterfowl seasons and small game hunting, and trapping seasons. They are available at license agents and DNR headquarters.

TRANSPORTATION OF BIG GAME

A resident may transport, only within the boundaries of the state, during his individual open season and the next following two days one deer which has been lawfully taken and possessed, and may transport the head or hide of such deer for mounting or tanning purposes to a point within or without the state. WHEN SUCH DEER IS NOT TRANSPORTED BY COMMON CARRIER. THE LICENSEE MUST ACCOMPANY SUCH DEER.

ANTLERLESS DEER MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY HUNTER WITH VALID ANTLERLESS PERMIT AND BE REGISTERED IN THE AREA

All deer must be transported so that inspection by registration agents or enforcement officers is readily accomplished.

SUNRISE AND SUNSET TIME SCHEDULE LONGITUDE OF **MINNEAPOLIS**

Variation approximately 4 minutes to each degree. Add to determine time for points west, and subtract for points east of Minneapolis. See deer zone map for longitude degree markings.



EARLY FIREARMS DEER SEASON

BOW & ARROW DEER SEASON

Deer hunting with bow and arrow is open statewide from October 1 through November 28 for either sex except for a restriction to bucks only in Zones 1 and 3 when and where there is an open firearms deer season. A later bow and arrow season for either sex deer is open from December 3 through 18 in Camp Ripley and the Southeastern Archery Zone. All dates are inclusive. The Southeastern Archery Zone is that part of Firearms Deer Zone 1 that lies south of State Highway 95 from Taylors Falls to St. Cloud.

BEAR SEASON

One adult bear, of either sex, may be taken per person per year. Cub bear may not be taken at any time. Size and weight are distinguishing features. Cubs normally weigh less than 55 pounds live weight.

A special bear hunting license (\$7.50) authorizes the taking of bear statewide with legal firearms or bow and arrow from September 6 to October 25, both dates inclusive, from sunrise to sunset each day. Holders of a valid 1977 deer firearms or bow and arrow hunting license may take a bear in the same time and manner as is valid for taking deer.

No person shall take bear within one-quarter mile of a dump or kill or molest any bear in a den. No person shall take or attempt to take bear with the aid of dogs. No person shall take bear using solid waste containing bottles, cans, plastics, paper, metal or any other materials that are not readily biodegradable as a bait or lure for the purpose of attracting the bear.

MUZZLE LOADER DEER SEASON

Only shoulder-fired guns of not less than 45 caliber smooth bore and not less than 40 caliber rifled bore that are incapable of being loaded at the breech are legal arms.

A regular firearms deer license must be purchased from County Auditors only or the DNR License Center in St. Paul, by November 5, and the muzzle loader option selected. Those who select the muzzle loader option will not be able to hunt in the regular November firearms deer season.

One deer of either sex may be taken in the period December 3-18, inclusive, on public lands only within the following areas: George Washington State Forest, Itasca County; Mille Lacs Wildlife Management Area, Mille Lacs and Kanabec Counties; Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area, Anoka and Chisago Counties; and Karl F. Rolvaag Wildlife Management Area, Olmsted, Wabasha, and Winona Counties. Any inholdings of private land in these areas are closed by law.

All hunters and trappers using these special areas December 3-18 must meet the legal requirements for wearing red or blaze orange.

NOTE: A muzzle loading firearm with a flintlock ignition is fully unloaded if

NOTE: A muzzle loading firearm with a flintlock ignition is fully unloaded if it has no priming powder in any pan and a muzzle loading firearm with percussion ignition is fully unloaded if it has no percussion cap on any nipple.

ILLEGALLY KILLED ANIMALS

Any hunter finding an illegally taken animal shall leave it where he finds it and contact a Conservation Officer, Sheriff's Office or Highway Patrol.

LATE FIREARMS DEER SEASON

HUNTER MUST CHOOSE ONE ZONE

ANTLERLESS PERMIT APPLICATION

A firearms deer license must be purchased by September 15 to obtain an application form. The form must be used to apply for an antlerless permit. An application can be made for only one of the numbered areas within a zone selected (either Zone 1 or Zone 3). Only Minnesota residents are eligible for antlerless permits. If applications for permits exceed the area quotas, computerized drawings will be held to determine who will be issued permits. All antlerless permit applications must be postmarked on or before September 15,

A separate supplemental map provided with this synopsis shows the permit areas in detail and lists the number of antlerless permits available for each $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right)$

Written descriptions of zone and permit area boundaries are contained in the Commissioner's Order that may be read at each County Auditor's and license agent's office.

AFFIXING OF SEALS: No deer or moose taken in this state shall be transported or possessed unless a locking seal bearing the license number of the owner and the year of its issue has been affixed to its carcass between the tendon and the bone and around the bone of the leg so that such seal cannot be removed without breaking the lock. The seal must be placed and locked at the time the deer or moose is brought into any hunting camp, dwelling, farm yard, or other place of abode of any kind occupied overnight, or before being placed wholly or partially on, or towed by a motor vehicle.

ANTLERLESS RESTRICTIONS

A hunter receiving an antlerless permit is allowed to hunt antlerless deer only in the area for which he has received a permit. He may, however, hunt bucks in any permit area in the zone indicated on his license.

An antierless deer must be registered within the permit area where it is taken. No unregistered doe or fawn may be possessed or transported outside of the area for which the permit is valid.

IMPORTANT NOTE

Hunters deciding whether to buy a license for an early buck-only season or a later season that gives the chance for an antierless permit should consider that those who are not successful in the drawing for antierless permits will be restricted to hunting bucks only during the late season selected at the time of

A hunter unsuccessful in the antlerless permit drawing may hunt antlered bucks throughout the combined permit areas of the Zone indicated on his license during the late season date(s) on his license. Note that portions of Zone 1 are not open for any firearms deer hunting during the late season.

REGISTRATION REQUIRED

The information obtained through registration of deer killed is necessary to establish regulations each year that will provide the hunter with the best possible opportunities.

LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

Residents license may be issued only to U.S. citizens who have maintained a legal residence in Minnesota for a period of 60 days immediately preceding the date of application for a license.

Residents serving the U.S. Military or Naval forces, or the reserve components thereof, who are stationed outside the state may obtain a free deer license and seal from county auditors when in Minnesota on regularly granted leave or furlough provided that they have proper leave or furlough papers on their person.

A license is required to hunt big game regardless of the hunter's age, however, a person under the age of 16 must have a firearm or hunter safety certificate on his person to purchase a big game hunting license. A person under age 12 may not hunt big game.

Residents under age 14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian when using firearms for any purpose. Residents over 14 but under 16 may hunt or possess firearms by themselves only if they have a firearm safety certificate in their possession.

"Guardian" is a legal guardian or any person over the age of 18 who has been selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under age 16.

A bow and arrow deer hunting license permits the licensee to hunt with bow and arrow during the entire bow and arrow deer season including during the firearms season.

All non-residents, regardless of age, are required to procure an appropriate hunting license before attempting to hunt in Minnesota.

Non-residents attending schools in Minnesota are required to purchase a non-resident license for hunting deer or bear in Minnesota.

PURCHASE OF DEER LICENSE: All firearms deer licenses including those for the December muzzle loader season and bow and arrow deer licenses must be purchased on or before November 5, 1977 except those for a resident who is discharged from the military or naval forces of the United States, or any active reserve or component thereof. These persons may be issued a firearms deer license any time during the firearms deer season upon showing their official discharge papers.

LICENSE FEES

WARNING Only one license of each kind may be purchased in any year

SPECIAL NOTE — A restricted or an unrestricted form of any license may be purchased. A restricted license is valid statewide, or within zones where such apply, except on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation. While hunting in the Leech Lake Reservation all persons required to hold a Minnesota license for hunting deer or bear must have on their person an appropriate unrestricted license or an appropriate restricted license with a Leech Lake Stamp affixed. Amounts listed below are for restricted licenses. The fee for an unrestricted license is \$1.00 extra. For those persons who purchased a restricted license and later desire to hunt on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation a \$2.00 stamp may be purchased.

 ${\bf AGENT'S}$ ${\bf FEE}$ — An additional charge of 75 cents will be made for issuing deer licenses and 50 cents for all other licenses.

LEGAL ARMS

RIFLE - SHOTGUN BOUNDARY - See map on reverse of this sheet

LEGAL FIREARMS FOR DEER AND BEAR: No deer or bear may be taken with any rifle of smaller than .23 caliber, nor with any rifle that uses a cartridge less than 1¼ inches in length, unless the gun is of .35 caliber or larger. All cartridges must contain a soft point or expanding bullet. Shotguns may be used with a single slug (buckshot or fine shot is prohibited).

Within any firearms deer hunting area it is unlawful to have in possession out of doors any rifle, except a .22 rimfire for taking small game only, 10 days before and 5 days after the firearms deer season. This does not apply to rifles on shooting ranges operated under permit or rifles unloaded and contained in cases

CARRYING FIREARMS DURING NOVEMBER: No person who has purchased a 1977 firearms deer-bear license may carry a firearm, lawful for the taking of deer, in any area open for the taking of deer by firearms, except on the days during which that person's license is valid for taking deer. This does not apply to a person who is carrying a firearm unloaded and contained in a gun case.

SHOTGUN SLUG RESTRICTION: No slugs may be possessed in any open firearms deer hunting area without a valid firearms deer or bear hunting license.

LEGAL BOW AND ARROW FOR DEER AND BEAR: Arrow heads for big game hunting must be kept sharp and made of all steel barbless design, the blade or blades of hi-carbon steel not less than one inch wide for single or two edge blade and not less than three inch circumference for three or more blades, minimum weight of all types 110 grain. It is also legal to take deer with arrow heads having blades of mill tempered spring steel containing a plastic core or ferrule, conforming with the above dimensions, and with a minimum weight of 90 grain. The bow must have a pull of not less than 40 pounds at or before full draw, using the arrows carried by the hunter.

IT IS UNLAWFUL: To transport a bow and arrow in a motor vehicle unless unstrung or completely contained in a case or unless contained in the trunk of the car with trunk door closed

MUZZLE LOADERS: Firearms that are incapable of being loaded at the breech are legal arms for taking of deer statewide in accordance with regulations. A smoothbore muzzle loader must be no less than .45 caliber and rifled muzzle loaders must be no less than .40 caliber.

NOTE: A muzzle loading firearm with a flintlock ignition is fully unloaded if it has no priming powder in any pan and a muzzle loading firearm with percussion ignition is fully unloaded if it has no percussion cap on any nipple.

NOT LAW — BUT ETHICS

Hastily firing several quick shots at fleeing game is a poor practice. It is in direct conflict with the ethics of sport hunting and the concept of making a clean, quick, deliberate kill with the first shot. Nobody should take a shot for which the odds are in favor of only crippling an animal. Instead, pass up such a shot and try for a better one. When a person buys a hunting license, he is given only a permit to hunt — he is not guaranteed meat or a trophy head.

SAFETY PROVISIONS

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To hunt, trap, or assist therein, in any territory open for the taking of deer by firearms, unless the visible portion of the cap and outer garments, above the waist excluding sleeves if any and excluding gloves, are BRIGHT RED OR BLAZE ORANGE color or covered therewith.

- —To discharge any firearms or bow and arrow upon, over or across any improved public highway at any big game animal, or when within the limits of the right-of-way of any improved public road.
- —To hunt protected wild animals with firearms or bow and arrow while under the influence of narcotics or intoxicating liquors.

HUNTING METHOD RESTRICTION

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To take deer or moose from any artificial scaffold, platform, or other construction higher than six feet above the ground. On Wildlife Management Areas only portable stands may be used and they must not be left overnight.

- —To use a pistol or revolver for taking protected wild animals except by disabled persons possessing a permit.
- -To take big game animals with the use of a two-way radio.
- -To carry any firearm while hunting deer or bear with bow and arrow.
- -To shoot any wild animal from a motor vehicle.
- —To transport any firearms in a motor vehicle, unless the same is unloaded in both barrels and magazine and completely contained in a gun case expressly made for that purpose which is fully enclosed by being zipped, snapped, buckled, tied, or otherwise fastened, with no portion of the firearm exposed, or unless unloaded and contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. NOTE: A muzzle loading firearm with a flintlock ignition is fully unloaded if it has no priming powder in any pan and a muzzle loading firearm with percussion ignition is fully unloaded if it has no percussion cap on any nipple.
- It is unlawful to take any big game with the aid of dogs or horses.
- It is unlawful to take any wild animal on any agricultural land with a firearm within 500 feet of any building occupied by a human being or by livestock, or within 500 feet of any stockade or corral containing livestock without the consent or permission of the owner or occupant of such premises, or within 500 feet of any burning area.

During the seasons for taking small game or big game no person shall enter upon the lands of another which are being used to raise agricultural products or upon land enclosing domestic stock of any kind for the purpose of hunting the above mentioned game unless and until the permission of the owner or lessee is obtained. Wooded areas other than tree farms shall in no case be construed to be agricultural lands within the meaning of this statute.

USE OF SNOWMOBILES: No person who has purchased a 1977 firearms deerbear license shall operate a snowmobile between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. in any area open for the taking of deer on any day during which that person's license is valid for taking deer.

Hunters who use snowmobiles should acquaint themselves with the rules and regulations pertaining to their use. These may be obtained from the Department of Natural Resources, 625 N. Robert Street, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101.

WANTON WASTE. Except as expressly permitted, no person shall wantonly waste or destroy any usable part of any protected wild animal.

STATE GOOSE REFUGES & STATE WATERFOWL REFUGES

State goose refuges and waterfowl refuges are closed to hunting of geese or waterfowl as indicated. Other forms of hunting and trapping are permitted during the established seasons and in the zones in which they are located.

STATE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

All areas identified as wildlife management areas, except any portion thereon which may be posted against entry by "State Game Refuge", or "No Tresspassing" signs, are open to big game hunting during established seasons for the zones in which they are located.

However, specific regulations will apply to certain areas as follows: The Lac Qui Parle Game Refuge, Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties, except the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site and the area posted with state "Do Not Trespass" signs, is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons therefor, in the zones in which it is located. No person shall fish, boat or trespass in any manner, from September 20 through December 20, 1977, on any part of the Lac qui Parle Game Refuge including Lac qui Parle Lake, which is posted with state "Do Not Trespass" signs.

The Bayport Wildlife Management Area is closed to the possession of all firearms unless unloaded and contained in a case, except for designated hunting areas during the season for the taking of small game when shotgun with fine shot only is permitted. Possession and use of bow and arrow is limited to the designated hunting areas during established hunting seasons.

The following regulations apply to the use of motor vehicles on Wildlife Management Areas:

On the following wildlife management areas motor vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on established roads, and no vehicle may be driven beyond a sign prohibiting vehicular use or beyond any man-made vehicle barrier:

- 1. Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area (Anoka and Chisago Counties)
- 2. Hubbel Pond Wildlife Management Area (Becker County)
- 3. Mille Lacs Wildlife Management Area (Kanabec and Mille Lacs Counties)
- 4. Red Lake Wildlife Management Area (Beltrami County)
- 5. Roseau River Wildlife Management Area (Roseau County)
- 6. Thief Lake Wildlife Management Area (Marshall County)

On all other wildlife management areas vehicles are prohibited except vehicles may be operated, not in excess of 20 mph, only on those routes designated by signs as being for travel purposes.

No vehicle shall be parked where it obstructs travel.

No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle, hang-glider, air boat, or hover craft in a wildlife management area. No person shall operate a snowmobile in any wildlife management area without the written permission of the agent in charge thereof in that part of the state lying south and west of a line described as follows: U.S. Highway No. 2 from East Grand Forks easterly to Bemidji; thence southerly along U.S. Highway No. 71 to Wadena; thence easterly along U.S. Highway No. 10 to Staples and U.S. Highway No. 210 the east boundary of the state.

Camping is allowed only in designated areas or by permit from the Area Wildlife Manager.

No part of any wildlife management area may be entered or used during the hours 10:00 P.M. to 5:00 A.M. if so posted at the major access points.

Target, skeet, trap or promiscuous shooting is prohibited.

Signs, posts, fences, buildings, trees, shrubs, vines, plants, or other property may not be destroyed or removed except that marsh vegetation may be used to build blinds on the area, and edible and decorative portions of plants may be picked for personal use.

CAMP RIPLEY

Camp Ripley will be open for bow and arrow hunting only of deer from December 3 to 18, inclusive, under such rules and regulations as may be established by the Commissioner of Natural Resources or his agent.

STATE PARKS

All state parks are refuges by law. The following state park is open to deer hunting as hereinafter provided and in accordance with state regulations.

Itasca State Park in Becker, Clearwater and Hubbard Counties, is open to the hunting of deer, except where posted as closed, from November 5 to November 20, 1977, both dates inclusive.

VOYAGEURS NATIONAL PARK

Hunting and trapping of all wild animals within the boundaries of Voyageurs National Park is prohibited.

Maps showing the boundaries of the park are available from Box 50, International Falls, Minnesota 56649.

NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

The following National Wildlife Refuges are open to big game hunting as hereinafter provided, in accordance with State and Special Federal regulations. Hunting maps and regulations are available through each refuge office or by writing to: Regional Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Building, Fort Snelling, Twin Cities, Minnesota 55111.

Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge in Marshall County is open to the hunting of deer during November and to moose during December. (Approximately 57,600 acres of the refuge are open to hunting.) Areas closed to hunting are posted as "Area Beyond This Sign Closed".

Big Stone National Wildlife Refuge in Big Stone and Lac qui Parle Counties is open to the hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area". (The open area comprises approximately 4,000 acres.)

Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge in Sherburne County is open to the hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area". (The open area comprises 18,360 acres.)

Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge in Becker County is open to the hunting of deer during November in areas as shown on maps available at refuge head-quarters. No taking of black bear or bow hunting is permitted on any portion of the refuge.

Upper Mississippi River Wildlife and Fish Refuge is open to the hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area". Hunting is permitted on those portions of the Upper Mississippi Refuge posted as "Closed Area" beginning with the first day following the close of the duck season.

No person shall enter or leave a refuge except by access roads which may be so designated; and all hunters must comply with further regulations which the Refuge Manager may prescribe.

Federal Waterfowl Production Areas are open in the fall to public hunting except where posted otherwise. Migratory birds, upland game birds, small game and big game may be hunted and furbearers trapped in accordance with applicable State and Federal regulations.

WARNING ON USE OF LIGHTS

It is unlawful to throw or cast the rays of a spotlight, or other artificial light on any highway, or in any field, woodland, or forest, for the purpose of spotting, locating or taking any wild animal, while having in possession any firearm, bow or other implement whereby big game could be killed, UNLESS GUNS AND BOWS AND ARROWS ARE UNLOADED AND UNSTRUNG AND ENCASED AND CONTAINED IN THE TRUNK OF THE CAR WITH THE TRUNK DOOR CLOSED. IF THE VEHICLE HAS NO TRUNK, THE FIREARM OR BOW MUST BE PLACED IN THE REARMOST LOCATION IN THE VEHICLE.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Conservation officers and authorized agents of the Department of Natural Resources may arrest, without a warrant, any person detected in the violation of the game and fish or water laws. They may enter upon any lands and may open, enter and examine camps, vessels, boats, wagons, automobiles, airplanes, suitcases, valises, packages, crates, boxes and other receptacles and places where they have reason to believe wild animals, unlawfully taken or possessed, are to be found.

It is unlawful to refuse to submit any wild animals, firearms in the field, or motor vehicle, boat, aircraft or other conveyance, or license for inspection, or to hinder, resist or obstruct a Conservation Officer or agent of the Department of Natural Resources in the performance of their official duties.

REGISTRATION OF KILL REQUIRED

Registration information is necessary to establish hunting regulations which will give you the best hunting opportunity each year.

Registration station operators are not required to inspect every animal being registered but are required to make intermittent spot checks to assure compliance with regulations.

All deer must be transported so that inspection by registration agents or enforcement officers is readily accomplished.

BEAR KILL REGISTRATION

ALL BEAR HUNTERS: Bear taken in the Sept.-Oct. season must be registered at an official bear registration station within 48 hours after the bear is taken. Bear taken during November may be registered at deer registration stations.

DEER KILL REGISTRATION

BOW AND ARROW HUNTERS: Deer must be registered with a Conservation Officer within 48 hours after being taken. No part of the deer carcass except entrails shall be removed until after the animal has been registered.

DECEMBER MUZZLE LOADER HUNTERS: The registration slip attached to the license should be filled out by successful hunters and mailed to Surveys and Statistical Services, Section of Wildlife, 390 Centennial Bldg, St. Paul, MN 55155. The space that asks for location of kill should be marked GWF for the George Washington State Forest, MLA for the Mille Lacs Wildlife Management Area, CAA for the Carlos Avery Area, and RWA for the Karl F. Rolvaag Wildlife Management Area

NOVEMBER FIREARMS HUNTERS: Deer must be presented for registration at an official registration station within 48 hours after license expires. Head must remain attached to carcass until registered.

CAUTIONS: Antiered buck deer must be registered in the zone where taken and cannot be legally transported or possessed outside of the zone prior to registration.

Anterless deer must be registered in the permit area in which they are taken and cannot be legally transported or possessed outside of that area prior to registration.

NOTE: Deer taken by firearms may also be presented for registration at an official station within a city or village through which a zone or area boundary passes or at any official station across the road but adjacent to the zone or area where taken

LOCATION OF REGISTRATION STATIONS

Registration stations will be set up at gas stations and other businesses. A full listing of all registration stations is available at license vendors and DNR offices

SPECIAL LISTINGS OF LATE-HOUR STATIONS

For the convenience of those traveling later in the day, a list of selected registration stations that are open daily for later than usual hours is provided here. A complete listing of all registration stations is available at license vendors.

1975 BIG GAME HUNTING REGULATIONS

This is not a complete set of hunting laws, but contains the information you are most likely to need in hunting big game. Separate pamphlets are being issued to cover waterfowl seasons and small game hunting, and trapping seasons. They are available at license agents and DNR headquarters.

If you have any questions, contact any Conservation Officer or other Department of Natural Resources fieldman.

PURCHASE OF DEER LICENSE: All firearms deer licenses and bow and arrow deer licenses must be purchased on or before November 1, 1975 except a resident who is discharged from the military or naval forces of the United States, or any active reserve or component thereof, during the regular season for taking deer by firearm or within ten days before its commencement, may be issued, at any time during the firearm deer season and upon a showing of his official discharge papers, a license to take deer.

LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

Resident license may be issued only to U.S. citizens who have maintained a legal residence in Minnesota for a period of 60 days immediately preceding the date of application for a license.

Residents serving the U.S. Military or Naval forces, or the reserve components thereof, who are stationed outside the state may hunt without a license when in Minnesota on regularly granted leave or furlough provided they have proper leave or furlough papers on their person. To hunt deer, a free seal must be obtained from the county auditor.

A license is required to hunt big game regardless of the hunter's age; however, a person under the age of 16 must have a firearm or hunter safety certificate on his person to purchase a big game hunting license. A person under age 12 may not hunt big game.

Residents under age 14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian when using firearms for any purpose. Residents over 14 but under 16 may hunt or possess firearms by themselves only if they have a firearm safety certificate in their possession.

"Guardian" is a legal guardian or any person over the age of 18 who has been selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under age 16.

A bow and arrow deer hunting license permits the licensee to hunt with bow and arrow during the entire bow and arrow deer season including during the firearms season.

All non-residents, regardless of age, are required to procure an appropriate hunting license before attempting same in Minnesota.

Non-residents attending schools in Minnesota are required to purchase a non-resident license for hunting deer or bear in Minnesota.

SPECIAL NOTE — A restricted or an unrestricted form of any license may be purchased. A restricted license is valid statewide, or within zones where such apply, except on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation. While hunting in the Leech Lake Reservation all persons required to hold a Minnesota license for hunting deer or bear must have on their person an appropriate unrestricted license or an appropriate restricted license with a Leech Lake Stamp affixed.

LICENSE FEES

Listed amounts are for restricted licenses. The fee for an unrestricted license is \$1.00 extra. For those persons who purchased a restricted license and later desire to hunt on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation a \$2.00 stamp may be purchased.

LEGAL ARMS

LEGAL FIREARMS FOR DEER AND BEAR: No deer or bear may be taken with any rifle of smaller than .23 caliber, nor with any rifle that uses a cartridge less than 1¾ inches in length, unless the gun is of .35 caliber or larger. All cartridges must contain a soft point or expanding bullet. Shotguns may be used with a single slug (buckshot or fine shot is prohibited).

NOTE: It is now lawful to use .22 rimfire short, long or long rifle for taking small game during any firearms deer season.

Within any firearms deer hunting area it is unlawful to have in possession out of doors any rifle, except a .22 rimfire, 10 days before and 5 days after the firearms deer season. This does not apply to rifles on shooting ranges operated under permit or rifles contained in cases or unloaded and broken down.

CARRYING FIREARMS DURING NOVEMBER: No person who has purchased a 1975 firearms deer-bear license may carry a firearm, lawful for the taking of deer, in Deer Zone 1 from November 1 through November 30 except on the days during which that person's license is valid for taking deer. This does not apply to a person who is carrying a rifle unloaded and contained in a gun case.

SHOTGUN SLUG RESTRICTION: No slugs may be possessed in any open firearms deer hunting area without a valid firearms deer or bear hunting license.

LEGAL BOW AND ARROW FOR DEER AND BEAR: Arrow heads for big game hunting must be kept sharp and be made of all steel barbless design, the blade or blades of hicarbon steel not less than one inch wide for single or two edge blade and not less than three inch circumference for three or more blades, minimum weight of all types 110 grain. It is also legal to take deer with arrow heads having blades of mill tempered spring steel containing a plastic core or ferrule, conforming to the above dimensions, and with a minimum weight of 90 grain. The bow must have a pull of not less than 40 pounds at full draw, using the arrows carried by the hunter.

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To transport a bow and arrow in a motor vehicle unless unstrung or completely contained in a case or unless contained in the trunk of the car with trunk door closed.

SAFETY PROVISIONS

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To hunt, trap, or assist therein, in open deer territory, during the deer season, unless the visible portion of the cap and outer coat be of a BRIGHT RED OR BLAZE ORANGE color or covered therewith. This applies in the firearms deer zones.

To discharge any firearms or bow and arrow upon, over, or across any improved public highway at any big game animal, or when within the limits of the right-of-way of any improved public highway.

To hunt protected wild animals with firearms or bow and arrow while under the influence of narcotics or intoxicating liquors.

HUNTING METHOD RESTRICTION

IT IS UNLAWFUL — To take deer from an artificial structure higher than six feet above the ground.

To use a pistol or revolver for taking big game animals except by disabled persons possessing a permit.

To take big game animals with the use of a two-way radio.

No person shall carry any firearm on his person while hunting deer or bear with bow and arrow.

To shoot at any wild animal from a motor vehicle (however, waterfowl may be taken from a floating craft including those propelled by motor, sail and wind, or both, if the motor is shut off and the sails are furled, the progress of the craft caused by such propulsion has ceased, and the craft is drifting, beached, moored, resting at anchor, or is being propelled by paddle, oars, or pole).

To transport any firearms (including muzzle loading firearms), except a pistol or revolver, in a motor vehicle, unless the same is unloaded in both barrels and magazine and completely contained in a gun case expressly made for that purpose which is fully enclosed by being zipped, snapped, buckled, tied or otherwise fastened, with

no portion of the firearm exposed, or unless unloaded and contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed.

USE OF SNOWMOBILES: No person who has purchased a 1975 firearms deer-bear license shall operate a snowmobile in any area open for the taking of deer between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. on any day during which that person's license is valid for taking deer.

Hunters who use snowmobiles should acquaint themselves with the rules and regulations pertaining to their use. These may be obtained from the Department of Natural Resources, 625 N. Robert Street, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101.

AFFIXING OF SEALS: No deer taken in this state shall be transported or possessed unless a locking seal bearing the license number of the owner and the year of its issue has been affixed to its carcass between the tendon and the bone and around the bone of the leg so that such seal cannot be removed without breaking the lock. The seal must be placed and locked at the time the deer is brought into any hunting camp, dwelling, farm yard, or other place of abode of any kind occupied overnight, or before being placed wholly or partially on, or towed by a motor vehicle.

-- IMPORTANT -REGISTRATION REQUIRED

Registration stations will be set up at gas stations and sporting goods stores. See list of stations at license vendors or Department of Natural Resources offices.

DEER-FIREARMS HUNTER: Deer must be registered at an official registration station within the zone where taken within 48 hours after license expires.

DEER-BOW AND ARROW HUNTER: Deer must be registered with a Conservation Officer within 48 hours after being taken. No part of the deer carcass except entrails shall be removed until after the animal has been registered.

WARNING — NO UNREGISTERED DOE OR FAWN MAY BE POSSESSED OR TRANSPORTED IN ZONE 2. ANTLERLESS DEER TAKEN UNDER SPECIAL PERMIT IN AREAS A, B, OR C OF ZONE 9 MUST BE REGISTERED WITHIN THE AREA WHERE TAKEN.

BEAR-FIREARMS HUNTER: Bear must be registered at an official bear registration station within 48 hours after the bear is taken.

BEAR-BOW AND ARROW HUNTER: Bear must be registered with a Conservation Officer or official bear registration station within 48 hours after being taken.

Deer may be registered at any official station within a city or village through which a zone boundary passes or at any official station across the road but adjacent to the zone in which taken.

TRANSPORTATION OF BIG GAME

A resident may transport, only within the boundaries of the state, during his individual open season and the next following *two days* one deer which has been lawfully taken and possessed, and may transport the head or hide of such deer for mounting or tanning purposes to a point within or without the state. WHEN SUCH DEER IS NOT TRANSPORTED BY COMMON CARRIER, THE LICENSEE MUST ACCOMPANY SUCH DEER.

SEASON DESCRIPTIONS MOOSE SEASON

LIMIT: One moose per party of four. Drawing was held July, 1975, to select 750 parties for twenty zones. It was limited to Minnesota residents.

BEAR SEASON

LIMIT: One bear, of either sex or any age, per person per year except that cub bear may not be taken at any time. A cub is defined as any bear of the year; size and weight are distinguishing features. Cubs normally weigh less than 55 pounds live weight (less than 45 pounds dressed weight). In November a few cubs may weigh up to 75 pounds. Another guide — cubs are smaller than a 100 pound sack of potatoes. If there is any doubt as to whether or not the bear is a cub, don't shoot!

LICENSE: A special bear hunting license (\$5.00) authorizes the taking of bear statewide with legal firearms or bow and arrow from September 1 to October 21, both dates inclusive, between sunrise and sunset each day.

Holders of a valid 1975 deer-bear firearms or bow and arrow hunting license may take bear only during the period, within the zone, and in the same manner as is valid for taking deer.

SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS: No person shall take bear within one-quarter of a mile of a dump or kill or molest any bear in a den.

No person shall take or attempt to take bear with the aid of dogs.

No person shall take bear by using solid waste containing bottles, cans, plastic, paper, metal or any other materials that are not readily biodegradable as a bait or lure for the purpose of attracting the bear.

DEER SEASON

DEER LIMIT: One deer per person per year.

FIREARMS DEER HUNTING: Hunters must indicate the zone they wish to hunt in when purchasing their license and they must hunt only in their selected zone.

If the zone selected permits a choice of dates, the hunter must indicate his choice when buying the license. Only the starting date will be indicated on the license. The starting date and zone selected determine each hunter's season and he can hunt only during those dates.

In all zones except 2 and 9 deer of either sex or age may be taken. Zone 2 is limited to the taking of bucks (must have at least one visible polished antler). Zone 9 combines buck-only hunting with a quota of antlerless deer to be taken by special permit from each of three areas (A, B, C) within the zone.

Dates open for hunting vary with zones. In zones 1 and 3 the hunter may select the opening weekend, November 1 and 2, or any 5 consecutive days between November 5 and November 30, inclusive. NOTE — NOVEMBER 3 AND 4 ARE CLOSED TO FIREARMS DEER HUNTING EXCEPT IN ZONE 2. Zone 2 is open for buck-only hunting from November 1 through November 16. Zones 4 and 7 are open for hunting deer of either sex on November 8 only. Zones 5, 6, and 8 are open for hunting deer of either sex on both November 8 and 9. Zone 9 gives a choice between the opening day, November 1, and a 3-day period, November 6–8 for buck only except by special permit.

All legal firearms may be used to hunt deer in zones 1, 2, 4, and 5. Shotguns with single slug or black powder muzzle-loaders are the only arms permitted for hunting deer in zones 3, 6, 7, 8 and 9. **EITHER SEX PERMITS:** An application card for obtaining an either-sex permit in area A, B, or C of zone 9 will be available from license agents at no additional cost at the time when a firearms deer-bear license is purchased. Only residents of Minnesota are eligible. Incomplete applications will not be considered. Applications must be mailed and postmarked before midnight August 30, 1975. A computerized lottery will select the applicants to be given the limited number of permits. Each hunter will be permitted to hunt antlerless deer only in the area (A, B, or C) for which he has a valid either-sex permit. All hunters choosing zone 9 can hunt bucks anywhere within zone 9 on the date(s) selected.

Antlerless Quotas — Zone 9 Area A (western area) — 1565 permits Area B (central area) — 400 permits Area C (eastern area) — 675 permits

WARNING — ANTLERLESS DEER MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY HUNTER WITH VALID EITHER SEX PERMIT AND BE REGISTERED IN THE AREA (A, B, OR C) WHERE TAKEN.

BOW AND ARROW HUNTING: Deer hunting with bow and arrow is open statewide from October 4 through November 30 for either sex. Zone 3 is also open December 1 through December 14.



ZONE 7: Beginning at the western boundary of the state on U.S. Highway 10; thence along U.S. Highway 10 to State Trunk Highway 32; thence along State Trunk Highway 32 to State Trunk Highway 34; thence along State Trunk Highway 34 to Interstate Highway 94; thence along I-94 to U.S. Highway 59, south of Fergus Falls; thence along U.S. Highway 59 to Morris; thence along State Trunk Highway 9 to Benson; thence along U.S. Highway 12 to Montrose; thence along State Trunk Highway 25 to the north bank of the Minnesota River; thence along the north bank of the Minnesota River to the western boundary of the state; thence northward along the western boundary of the state to the point of beginning on U.S. Highway 10.

46, Ottertail County; thence along CSAH 46, Ottertail County to Parkers Prairie; thence along State Trunk Highway 235 to Urbank; thence along CSAH 38 to State Trunk Highway 78; thence along State Trunk Highway 78 to Battle Lake; thence along State Trunk Highway 210 to Interstate Highway 94; thence along I-94 to U.S. Highway 59, south of Fergus Falls; thence along U.S. Highway 59 to Morris; thence along State Trunk Highway 9 to Benson; thence along U.S. Highway 12 to the northwesterly bank of the Crow River at Delano; thence along the northwesterly bank of the Crow River to State Trunk Highway 101; thence along State Trunk Highway 101 to the point of beginning at Elk River.

ZONE 9: Zone 9 is comprised of areas A, B, and C described below.

AREA B of ZONE 9: Beginning on the southern boundary of the state at State Trunk Highway 22; thence along State Trunk Highway 22 to Wells; thence along County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 29, Faribault County, to CSAH 3, Waseca County; thence along CSAH 3, Waseca County, to State Trunk Highway 30; thence along State Trunk Highway 30 to State Trunk Highway 83; thence along State Trunk Highway 83 to State Trunk Highway 22; thence along State Trunk Highway 22 to U.S. Highway 14; thence along U.S. Highway 14 in Mankato to the north bank of the Minnesota River; thence along the north bank of the Minnesota River to State Trunk Highway 4; thence along State Trunk Highway 4 to St. James; thence along State Trunk Highway 30 to State Trunk Highway 15; thence along State Trunk Highway 15 to the southern boundary of the state; thence eastward along the southern boundary of the state to the point of beginning at State Trunk Highway 22.

CAMP RIPLEY

The Camp Ripley Game Refuge, Morrison County, is open to the hunting of deer, raccoon, skunk, bobcat, badger, coyote, woodchuck and fox with bow and arrow only from November 1 to November 30, inclusive, under such rules and regulations as may be established by the Commissioner of Natural Resources or his agent.

NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES

The following Wildlife Refuges are open to deer hunting as hereinafter provided and in accordance with state regulations.

Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge is open to the hunting of deer and bear during November.

Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge is open to the hunting of deer during November on areas as shown on maps available at refuge headquarters. All refuge lands south of the north line of Sections 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18, Township 140 North, Range 39 West and Sections 13 and 14, Township 140 North, Range 40 West, Becker County are open to the hunting of deer in accordance with State regulations but no taking of black bear or bow hunting is permitted.

Upper Mississippi National Wildlife Refuge is open to hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area." Hunting is permitted on those portions of the Upper Mississippi Refuge posted as "Closed Area" beginning with the first day following the close of the duck season.

Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge is open to hunting of deer on areas posted as "Public Hunting Area".

Portions of each refuge open to hunting will be posted "Public Hunting Area" except as described otherwise for Upper Mississippi Refuge above. In addition, no persons shall, for the purpose of hunting enter or leave a refuge except by access roads which may be so designated; and all hunters shall comply with further regulations which the Refuge Manager may prescribe.

STATE PARKS

All state parks are refuges by law. The following state parks are open to deer hunting as hereinafter provided and in accordance with state regulations.

Itasca State Park is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons therefor in the zone in which it is located.

St. Croix State Park, Pine County, is open to the hunting of deer with bow and arrow only from November 1 to November 30, both dates inclusive, under such rules as the commissioner may prescribe.

O. L. Kipp and John Latsch State Parks, Winona County, will be open to the hunting and trapping of wild animals during the established seasons therefor in the zone in which it is located.

Nerstrand Woods State Park and Game Refuge is open to the hunting of deer with legal firearms or bow and arrow by permit only during the season established for the zone in which it is located. Permit applications postmarked no later than September 2 must be mailed to: Nerstrand Deer Hunt, Department of Natural Resources Headquarters, 2300 Silver Creek Road N.E., Rochester, Minnesota 55901. Standard postcards are to be used. Applications must include hunter name, address, and birth date. Successful applicants will be mailed a permit before the start of the season.

Forestville State Park, Fillmore County, is open to the hunting of deer with bow and arrow by permit only during the season established for the zone in which it is located. Permit applications postmarked no later than September 2 must be mailed on standard postcards to: Forestville Deer Hunt, Department of Natural Resources Headquarters, 2300 Silver Creek Road N.E., Rochester, Minnesota 55901. Applications must include hunter name, address, and birth date. Successful applicants will be mailed a permit before the start of the season.

Note: Hunters must buy a state parker "sticker" to use state parks.

Voyageurs National Park

No hunting is permitted on National Park Service lands. At present these holdings are in scattered unmarked tracts. Maps showing the location of these closed areas are available from Voyageurs National Park, Box 50, International Falls, Minnesota 56649.

STATE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

All areas identified as a wildlife management area, except any portion thereon which may be posted as "State Game Refuge", or "No Trespassing", are open to big game hunting during established seasons for the zones in which they are located.

However, specific regulations will apply to certain areas as follows:

The Lac qui Parle Game Refuge, Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties, except the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site and the area posted with state "Do Not Tres-



pass" signs, is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons therefor, in the zones in which it is located. No person shall fish, boat or trespass in any manner, from September 20 through December 20, 1975, on any part of the Lac qui Parle Game Refuge including Lac qui Parle Lake, which is posted with state "Do Not Trespass" signs.

HUNTING ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

A hunting license does not give a hunter the right to enter on private land. Many "No Trespass" signs have been put up because a few hunters did not respect private property.

Always ask permission to hunt on agricultural lands. Standing grain, such as corn, is specifically protected by law against trespass and does not require "No Trespassing" signs.

Be sure to close gates; do not damage fences; do not cut live trees; do not discharge your gun near buildings or livestock.

If a landowner asks you to leave and you do not do so immediately, or if you do not obey signs prohibiting hunting you are guilty of a misdemeanor.

OTHER AREAS

Wooded areas other than tree farms are not considered agricultural lands. However, permission should be obtained whenever the wooded area is in farming country or the likely owner lives nearby.

On the other hand, any person other than the duly constituted legal authority who posts any public lands, including tax forfeited lands, against trespass or hunting shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Resolve now that the deer crop is for law-abiding hunters, not for outlaws or for waste. Plan to become additional eyes and ears for our law enforcement service.

- 1. If convenient, talk with the local Conservation Officer and ask him how you can be of most help in law enforcement.
 - 2. Carry a pencil and small notebook.
- 3. When a violation occurs, jot down the car license number, a brief description, location, time, and any other identifying information.
- 4. Get to a telephone and call the local Officer's number or the Operator and ask for Zenith 7000 so your message can be radioed to the nearest Officer.
- 5. Be willing to testify in court. Convictions establish respect for the law. Draw on your courage to accept this civic responsibility. Law and order is dependent upon the individual citizen.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Conservation officers and authorized agents of the Department of Natural Resources may arrest, without a warrant, any person detected in the violation of the game and fish or water laws. They may enter upon any lands and may open, enter and examine camps, vessels, boats, wagons, automobiles, airplanes, suitcases, valises, packages, crates, boxes and other receptacles and places where they have reason to believe wild animals, unlawfully taken or possessed are to be found.

It is unlawful to refuse to submit any wild animals, firearms in the field, or motor vehicle, boat, aircraft or other conveyance, or license for inspection, or to hinder, resist, or obstruct a Conservation Officer or agent of the Department of Natural Resources in the performance of their official duties.
