


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A Conversation with the MDVA Commissioner Larry Shellito


THE HEROES WE SERVE

Over 369,000 Veterans called Minnesota home in 2015, ranking Minnesota as the 24th state in Veteran population. Sixty-eight percent of Minnesota's current Veteran population is over the age of 55, with the majority having served during the Vietnam era. With this aging population comes the accompanying issues of age that include an increase in health care – a need MDVA helps to provide.

Females make up 7% of Minnesota's heroes, but that number is projected to increase to 9.5% in less than ten years, and to 12% by year 2035. The result of this trend is MDVA's expanded focus on the needs specific to Women Veterans.

Almost 14% of Minnesota's Veterans own businesses, while hundreds struggle with homelessness. These are just two of the challenges that Veterans face when transitioning back to civilian life, and they are just two of the many services and programs MDVA can offer Veterans and their families, in an effort to give back to our heroes.


VETERAN POPULATION MN VETERAN BY RACE


STAFF WHO SERVE

In 1943, under Minnesota Statutes, Chapters 196, 197, 198; Minnesota Rules, Chapter 9050, Chapter 9055, MDVA was established. Sixty-four years later, the Minnesota Veterans Homes merged with MDVA, affording Veterans coordinated access to more comprehensive services.

Since January of 2011, MDVA has been under the watch of Larry Shellito, the 17th Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs. Heading up a staff of 1,345, Commissioner Shellito is assisted by Acting Deputy Commissioners Robin Gaustad, overseeing MDVA's Health Care, and Brad Lindsay, managing the Programs & Services Division.

Ninety-three percent of MDVA's staff provide specialty skills to treat and care for the health needs of our Veterans. Administered through one of five state Veteran Homes, the staff includes doctors, nurses, therapists, pharmacists, dietitians and other specialized services.

Seven percent of MDVA's staff provide the technical and administrative services available to Veterans through the MDVA Programs & Services Division.

In accordance with the State of Minnesota's Lean Initiative, MDVA espouses the Lean philosophy and management system. As a Lean organization, MDVA's goal is to provide Veterans the best in care and services with zero waste. This system challenges MDVA's staff to ask each day, "How can we make our services better for our Veterans?"

In addition to creating a better atmosphere of service for our Veterans, this management system has also increased productivity. Through employee training that empowers the staff to continuously improve on how our work gets done, MDVA has been able to achieve the following in 2015:

- save on the cost of materials and services







ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN EDUCATION

ADVANCING VETERANS EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Working with the Federal VA and the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities (MnSCU), a new program is in place to track the graduation and retention rates of Post 9-11 Veteran students who are first time users of the GI Bill

As a member of a 13 state collaborative, Minnesota received a \$10,000 grant, each year for the last two years, for a project to make it easier for Veterans to receive educational credits for military service

Through a partnership between MDVA and MnSCU, the Veterans Education Transfer System (VETS) allows Veterans military career field, pay grade and years in service be applied for credits. VETS calculates these factors into the number of credits each campus will offer. Since 2010, over 140,000 credits for military service have been granted, making it easier for Veterans to move through the Minnesota educational system, reducing benefit costs

MDVA's Higher Education and State Approving Agency Programs were showcased at two Veteran Administrator Conferences this year, expanding recognition and networking opportunities for the department



VETERAN EMPLOYMENT CONTINUES STRONG

The Veteran unemployment rate continues to fall in Minnesota, from nearly 5% in spring of 2014 to 3.7% by July 2015

On-the-job training and apprenticeships for Veterans remain virtually unlimited in Minnesota. Currently 4.5% of Minnesota's apprenticeships are filled by Veterans. That number is expected to increase through an MDVA initiative with the Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry (MNDOLI) and Joint Apprenticeship and Training Centers (JATC). Through these programs, MDVA is able to connect more Veterans not wishing to pursue higher education with high paying opportunities

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES FOR VETERANS EXPANDS

MDVA continues to focus on the medic, license practical nurse and law enforcement career fields through the creation of bridge programs, designed for individuals who held similar positions in the military. This program applies credits to Veteran students, affording them permanent employment about six months earlier

Funding was allocated to create a program for Veterans interested in getting into the agriculture career field

Troops to Trades continues to be a growing program option available to Veterans pursuing the trades

MDVA ALWAYS INVOLVED

Training sessions, workshops and referral programs continue to be provided to assist Minnesota service members before they ship to boot camp, as well as Veterans separating from service. Topics covered in 2015 ranged from compliance to understanding benefits, as well as career and life planning. These programs, in part, were created as a collaboration between MDVA and MNDOLI, MnSCU and Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED)

MDVA became a member and participated in the *Veterans Employment Resource Group* which brings together Veteran employment leaders through bi-monthly working groups

PRESTON is Minnesota's newest State Veterans Cemetery. expected to serve over 50,000 Veterans who reside within 75 miles of its' Fillmore County location. The cemetery is projected to provide over 350 burials annually



IMPROVED VPA PROGRAM

In 2015, the procedures, policies and statutory requirements for the Veterans Preference Act (VPA) were updated. Internal and external communications, and VPA administration materials underwent review and updates as well, with additional VPA training performed. Through these efforts, public employers are better meeting obligations, with more Veterans accessing and receiving VPA rights


Under the State Soldiers Assistance Program (SSAP), MDVA approved the SSI / SSDI Outreach, Access & Recovery (SOAR) pilot program to assist disabled Veterans with Social Security Disability funds, and homeless Veterans with attaining stable income to meet their housing needs

Ongoing Benefits staff training continues to show improved efficiencies in the processing of benefits and effectiveness of case management

VETERANS PREFERENCE ACT (VPA)

The Veterans Preference Act entitles Veterans limited employee preferences, as well as protections pertaining to layoffs and discharges. The VPA statute also gives private employers authorization to grant preferences to Veterans when hiring.

MDVA's role is to provide both Veterans and public employers information regarding the implementation of VPA in the workplace. While MDVA cannot provide legal advice, if a Veteran's rights have allegedly been violated or denied, MDVA will help guide both the Veteran and employer through the steps of the review process.



GRANT FUNDING & CVSO PARTICIPATION INCREASES

The Operational Enhancement Grant provided \$997,500 to qualified counties, a 3.4% increase from 2014. The number of counties receiving the CVSO base grant remained at 26, while the number of counties qualifying for additional funds increased 5%, resulting in an additional \$6,765 funds distributed in FYI5 used for training and operations, as well as reintegration services and programs.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS

VETERAN REGISTRY LAUNCHED

To bolster progress ending Veteran homelessness, MDVA developed and launched the award-winning Minnesota Homeless Veteran Registry. MDVA's goal is to ensure every Veteran has the support needed to obtain and maintain stable housing. When Veterans join the Registry, they authorize a team of public and nonprofit service partners to work together on housing solutions specific to each Veteran. Through the Registry, MDVA is able to monitor the progress so that strategies and responses can be adapted as needs change and evolve.

The Registry launched in Hennepin and Ramsey counties on December 8, 2014 and expanded statewide on January 22, 2015. Since its launch, the number of Veterans housed per month grew from 10 in February 2015 to 66 in December 2015. Participation is voluntary, and anyone can refer a Veteran to join by calling LinkVet at 888-LinkVet (546-5838). To learn more, visit Minnesota Veteran.org/Homeless Registry.

PARTNERS CONVENED TO FIND & HOUSE VETERANS

The power of the Registry rests in local partners who identify Veterans and implement housing solutions. Since the Registry's launch, over 50 organizations and individuals have helped identify Veterans experiencing homelessness and signed them up. Nonprofit and public service providers meet regularly several times per month to implement housing plans for every Veteran. Over a dozen organizations have dedicated staff time and resources to this effort on an ongoing basis.

LANDLORD ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS LAUNCHED

Recognizing the critical role that landlords play in housing Veterans facing homelessness, on March 6, 2015 MDVA expanded the capability of the Registry to identify landlords specifically interested in housing Veterans exiting homelessness. This new capacity was announced as part of a broader public awareness campaign about the Registry.

CURRENT SNAPSHOT

REGISTRY WINS STATE INNOVATION AND TEKNE AWARDS

The Homeless Veterans Registry was among ten winners honored with a Minnesota State Government Innovation Award in July 2015. In November 2015, the Registry received a Tekne Award for collaboration for community impact, honoring innovation in science and technology.

LANDLORD INCENTIVE PROGRAM LAUNCHED

On Veterans Day 2015, MDVA, Minneapolis Mayor Betsy Hodges, and Saint Paul Mayor Chris Coleman invited landlords interested in joining the effort to house Veterans to an event called Keys for Heroes. Several landlords were recognized for their efforts to house homeless Veterans, and MDVA launched the Keys for Heroes incentive, offering \$1,000 to property owners signing a lease with a Veteran on the Registry by the end of January 2016.

LEVERAGING CORE PROGRAM

In September 2015, MDVA expanded the service scope of the CORE Program operated by Lutheran Social Services through a partnership with Hearth Connection. Through this program, homeless Veterans on the Registry in Saint Paul have access to rental assistance and supportive services.

Reports on federal Medicare reimbursements received, and how SOT grant funds are used, are to be provided annually.

Verification of small businesses that are majority-owned and operated by a Veteran will now be certified by MDVA.

Appointed trustees of the Big Island trust can be dismissed by a majority vote of the trustees, and with the consent of the Commissioner of Veterans Affairs.

The Honor and Remember Flag is the recognized symbol to acknowledge the ultimate sacrifice made by a fallen member of the US armed forces in the line of duty.

A Veterans Home cannot be closed unless specifically authorized by law.

Through the Veterans Preference Act, Veterans facing a pending discharge can file a written request for a hearing to be performed in one of three methods:

- a civil service board or commission
- a merit authority, or
- a three-person panel If the Veteran does not select a method, it will be selected for him/her.

Who is responsible for the costs of a discharge hearing are as follows:

- If heard by a civil service board, the Veteran is only responsible for the fees of the attorney representing him/her.
- If heard by a three-person panel, all parties equally pay the hearing cost. The Veteran also pays the fees for the attorney representing him/her.

If the discharge is reversed and the Veteran prevails, reasonable fees for the Veteran's attorneys will be covered. APPROXIMATE EFFECTIVE DATE: MAY 23, 2015

VETERANS INTEREST

Customized training programs specifically targeting retired and disabled Veterans are being developed for skilled manufacturing jobs. Training for these positions are planned for in the workplace and at MnSCU institutions.

Parks, trails and recreation areas on Big Marine Lake are scheduled for development by the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp Association.
