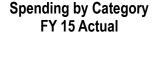
### **PURPOSE**

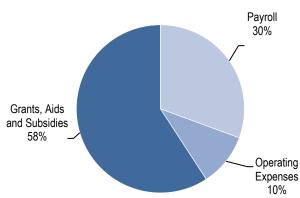
The mission of the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council (MIAC) is to enhance the sovereignty of the 11 Minnesota Tribes and to ensure the well-being of American Indian citizens throughout the state. Established in 1963, the MIAC serves as a liaison office between sovereign tribal nations and state government. The Council also advises and makes recommendations to the Governor and Legislature. The MIAC proposes the yearly agenda for the annual Governor/Tribal Leaders summit. The MIAC also fulfills duties under MS 307.08 and MS 138.00, through its Cultural Resource program. The Cultural Resource program works in collaboration with the office of the State Archaeologist to protect American Indian gravesites and burial mounds statewide.

The Minnesota Indian Affairs Council contributes to numerous if not all statewide outcomes by partnering with agencies focused directly on the statewide outcomes of the following: Strong and stable families and communities; a thriving economy that encourages business growth and employment opportunities; Minnesotans have the education and skills needed to achieve their goals; all Minnesotans have optimal health; a clean and healthy environment with sustainable uses of natural resources; and people in Minnesota are safe.

The MIAC contributes to the statewide outcomes by close partnerships with state agencies, citizen outreach through quarterly board meetings, public outreach, providing liaison services between governments, participating in and making recommendations in the development of reports and data for policy development.

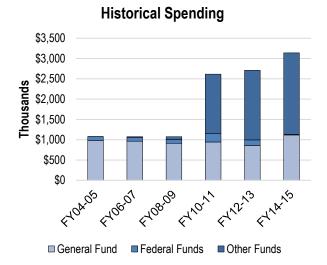
#### BUDGET

The Minnesota Indian Affairs Council has a total biennial budget of approximately \$2.7 million. The biennial General Fund support is approximately \$1.1 million. Legacy Funding consisting of grants to communities for Dakota and Ojibwe Language Revitalization is approximately \$1.4 million.

#### **STRATEGIES**

To accomplish its mission, the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council uses the following strategies:

- Through the interaction with the MIAC executive board and bring together the eleven tribal leadership with state government officials and program staff.
- Make policy recommendations to the Governor and State Legislature.
- Educate the public and local governments on issues important to indian tribes and people.
- Citizen and public outreach
- Promote the revitalization of Dakota and Ojibwe Language preservation through the grants program.
- Educate the public and state employees with use of the Why Treaties Matter Exhibit.

# **RESULTS**

Through the interactions of our executive board that represents tribal nations within Minnesota and by the appointed state Commissioner's and Legislative appointments, the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council maintains its unique role as being a liaison between the state and with the tribal nations. Through working with other state agencies and their tribal liaisons we help bring forth issues that can directly benefit.

#### Recommendation:

The Governor recommends additional funding of \$15,000 in the FY2018-2019 biennium to maintain the current level of service delivery at the Indian Affairs Council.

# Rationale/Background:

Each year, employer-paid health care contributions, pension contributions, FICA and Medicare, along with other salary and compensation-related costs increase. Other operating costs, like rent and lease, fuel and utilities, and IT and legal services also grow. This cost growth puts pressure on agency operating budgets that remain flat from year to year.

Agencies face challenging decisions to manage these costs within existing budgets, while maintaining the services Minnesotans expect. From year to year, agencies find ways to become more efficient with existing resources. However, cost growth typically outstrips efficiencies, and without additional resources added to agency budgets, service delivery erodes.

### Proposal:

The Governor recommends increasing agency operating budgets to maintain the delivery of current services. For the Indian Affairs Council, this funding will cover expected and anticipated employee compensation growth, including anticipated compensation increases and employer-paid pension costs.

# Results:

This proposal is intended to allow agencies to continue to provide current levels of service and information to the public.
