### *Article 2—Proceeds of Stripper Well Litigation*

Provisions would appropriate money received by the state from the settlement of stripper well litigation.

### *Article 3—Year of the City*

Provisions would create a program for the revitalization of urban housing and provide financing.

### *Article 4—Judicial System*

Provisions would provide for the state to assume some costs

of the Trial Court System and certain court revenues to be redirected from counties to the state.

### \*\*Amendments would:

- make technical changes and clarifications;
- appropriate \$40,000 for an acquisition in Sibley State Park;
- appropriate \$1.2 million for the Reinvest in Minnesota programs.

## Tuesday, May 9

### Secretary of state—changes

HF127/SF232 (Milbert, DFL-South St. Paul)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*  
(SF passed Senate)

Would simplify filings and enhance record keeping in the Secretary of State's Office; would modify the definition of address to include zip codes and change the recipients of certain notices.

\*\*Amendments would make technical changes and clarifications.

### Poachers—new penalties

HF215/SF299 (Rukavina, DFL-Virginia)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*  
(SF passed Senate)

Would require money collected from restitution be used by the commissioner of natural resources for replacement, propagation, or protection of wild animals.

\*\*Amendments would make technical changes and clarifications.

### Dept. of Administration—changes

HF257/SF257 (Williams, DFL-Moorhead)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*  
(SF on Senate Floor)

Would make changes and clarifications in the Department of Administration which pertain to land transfers, insurance, audits, the Small Business Procurement Advisory Council, the Socially and Economically Disadvantaged Business (SED) Program, building operation, telecommunications,

revolving funds, rules to mark state vehicles, and report summaries.

**\*\*Amendments would:**

- require the governor to set the salary rate within certain ranges for certain positions;
- make technical changes and clarifications.

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**Hazardous substances—emergency planning system**

HF341/SF1099 (Trimble, DFL-St. Paul)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*

(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

Would require local and county governments to participate in a hazardous substance emergency planning system; would require compliance with the federal Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act.

**\*\*Amendments would:**

- change the number of representatives to the emergency response commission;
- require at least four of the appointed members to reside outside the metropolitan area;
- make technical changes and clarifications.

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**Check cashing services—regulation**

HF357/SF353 (Jefferson, DFL-Mpls)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*

(SF passed Senate)

Would regulate businesses offering check cashing services; would direct the commissioner of commerce to approve or disapprove rates charged for cashing checks.

**\*\*Amendments would appropriate funds to the commissioner of commerce.**

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**Small business—toll-free referral system**

HF607/SF625 (Pelowski, DFL-Winona)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*

(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

Would expand and define the duties of the commissioner of trade and economic development to include informational services, a toll-free business assistance phone number, and financial assistance.

**\*\*Amendments would:**

- delete sections relating to technical assistance;
- delete sections relating to capital access account;
- make technical changes and clarifications.

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**Real estate appraisers—licenses**

HF624/SF1076 (Morrison, IR-Burnsville)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*

(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

Would require real estate appraisers to be licensed.

**\*\*Amendments would:**

- appropriate funds to the commissioner of commerce;
- make technical changes and clarifications.

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**State claims bill**

HF785/SF736 (Lieder, DFL-Crookston)—recommended to pass as amended.

(SF passed Senate)

Would provide for payment of various claims against the state; would appropriate money.

**\*\*Amendments would make technical changes and clarifications.**

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**Public safety—smoke detectors**

HF892/SF1548 (Brown, DFL-Appleton)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*  
(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

Would change the definition of “dwelling,” authorize more stringent local smoke detector requirements, and create the position of public fire safety educator.

\*\*Amendments would appropriate funds.

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**Pipeline safety—inspection guidelines**

HF907/SF879 (Orenstein, DFL-St. Paul)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*  
(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

\*\*Delete-everything amendment would provide restructuring of the interstate pipeline companies and would provide authority to regulate pipelines.

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**Drivers licenses—commercial trucking**

HF927/SF1200 (Lasley, DFL-Cambridge)—heard; referred to Agriculture, Transportation & Semi-State Division.  
(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

Would change commercial motor vehicle regulations and appropriate money.

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**Salvage yards—inspection fees**

HF1046/SF1198 (A. Johnson, DFL-Spring Lake Park)—recommended to pass.  
(SF in Senate Finance Committee)

Would require a \$20 inspection fee for inspection of a vehicle for which a salvage title has been requested; would prohibit any other fee for the issuance of a salvage title except the vehicle registrar’s filing fee.

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**International Registration Plan; installment payments**  
HF1280/SF1105 (Lieder, DFL-Crookston)—recommended to pass.  
(SF passed Senate)

Would make fleet owners subject to suspension of license plates and international fuel tax permit if they are more than 30 days delinquent in making payments under the International Fuel Tax Agreement or in paying proportional taxes under the International Registration Plan; would allow owners of a vehicle taxes under proportional registration or a reciprocity agreement to pay a tax of more than \$400 in installments.

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**Minnesota Educational Computing Corp.—changes**  
HF1332/SF1020 (L. Carlson, DFL-Crystal)—recommended to pass as amended.\*\*  
(SF passed Senate)

Would permit the Minnesota Education Computing Corporation (MECC) Board to entertain MECC’s sale of assets or ownership.

\*\*Amendments would:

- state that no cumulative sale of more than 50 percent of the assets of the corporation shall occur unless authorized by law, and also state that it is the intention of the Legislature to take action relating to the sale of the corporation during the 1990 legislative session;
- state that the sale is contingent on the corporation getting an opinion from the attorney general that the sale binds the buyer in certain situations;
- make technical changes and clarifications.

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

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

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
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
