Message from the Director:

Fiscal year 2017 was the eight year that the Lake Region Arts Council received Arts & Cultural Heritage funding. This additional source of funding has made a huge impact on the grants and services we offered our constituents. Please note that we have split our reporting into two separate focuses, one for the Base Legislative appropriation and one for the Arts & Cultural Heritage funding, to more easily report the differences between the two sources of funding.

LRAC celebrated 40 years as a Regional Arts Council and we are excited and encouraged to have this opportunity to report on the growth that the Lake Region Arts Council has experienced this past year.

2017 Lake Region Arts Council activities:

- The LRAC awarded an Arts Legacy City Grants to the City of Moorhead, bringing the number of cities in the LRAC region, receiving the designation of "Arts Legacy City" to ten. These cities have changed their city government structure to include an arts advisory committee.
- This year the LRAC Board implemented a strategic, long range goal of broadening our concept of providing grants and services. The Board is supportive of the concept that LRAC is part of a statewide arts support system and more emphasis was placed on connecting artists and arts organizations in our region with statewide resources, not just what is available through LRAC. The FY17 activities that support this goal are; support of the Springboard for the Arts, Lake Region, Fergus Falls office, and Artist Work Sample Improvement Project.
- In FY 17 was our second year of our "Surviving to Thriving" program, designed to help regional arts organizations work on capacity building. Our "Surviving to Thriving" program has resulted in a cohort of 16 organizations identifying priority areas of funding, marketing and community engagement and the best ways for LRAC to support their capacity building in these areas.

During fiscal year 2017, the Lake Region Arts Council awarded grants as shown above. A detailed listing of all grants awarded has been submitted to the MN State Arts Board in a separate document.

Summary of Grants Awarded

This year 56% of the requests were funded, down from 59% in FY 16 and 56% of the dollars requested were funded, up from 37% in FY16.

These figures indicate that we are not able to sufficiently meet the need that exists. This inability to adequately fund the requests we receive has existed since these statistics have been tracked beginning in 1999.

OTHER SERVICES

Website: In FY 17, the LRAC website was completely redesigned. The website continues to be a heavily used vehicle for sharing information about LRAC and all regional arts activities. All grant applicants are now directed to our website to access our online grant application process. Visitors to the website may access any of our services such as the Arts Calendar, Artist Registry, Newsletter, Workshop registration and information on our Galleries. Constituents reported in the satisfaction survey that they highly value this resource.

Arts Calendar: In FY 17 the Arts Calendar received a major overhaul. The result has been a more user friendly format, easier search options and the ability to display featured arts events. The revamp has made it easier to cross promote Arts Calendar events to the LRAC Facebook page.

Monthly newsletter: The monthly newsletter, Art Headlines, was sent via email to a mailing list of 1,438 households compared to 1,772 households in FY 16. A PDF of the Art Headlines is included with this report.

Facebook: LRAC's Facebook page helps promote our grants, services and arts activities. The Facebook Page also appears on our website and the Face Book page now has 6,414 "likes". In Fiscal Year 2017, our expanding Facebook presence enabled us to help promote events and activities of our regional arts organizations, as well as arts activities at area public schools and colleges throughout the region. On almost any given week, LRAC's Facebook page is viewed by more people, has more engagement, and continues to grow with more new followers than all the other regional arts councils' and the Minnesota State Arts Board's Facebook pages combined.

Artist Registry: Through the LRAC website artists can now apply and upload work sample images online. The Artist Registry can be accessed and searched by the public online. At the end of FY 17 there were 209 individual artists listed compared to 198 in FY 16.

Technical Assistance: The LRAC staff provided technical assistance and site visits to arts organizations in and beyond the region. This assistance was offered through consulting in the office, site visits, and by phone.

Workshops: The LRAC provided eleven grant writing workshops, one prior to every grant round. The LRAC provided the following workshops, Alcohol Inks, Matting & Framing, Creative Enhancement, Landscape Painting in Oils, Holiday Painting, Community Theatre. 92% of participants reported meeting or exceeding their expectations.

OTHER SERVICES, Cont.

Artist Work Sample Improvement Project: In FY 17 LRAC worked with 7 artists to improve their work sample photographs by providing photo sessions with professional photographers and classes on how to take your own work sample photographs. 100% of those responding to the satisfaction survey reported that the quality of their work samples had improved and 100% reported they had taken action or indented to take action in the next 6 months, to use the new work samples to further their career goals.

BIENNIAL PLAN FY 16-17 GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The LRAC goals, as specified in the FY 16-17 Biennial Work Plan, regarding both the Base Legislative appropriation and the Arts and Cultural Heritage funding, are dealt with separately in this final report. Each of the two work plans has a corresponding outcome evaluation report. The base legislative appropriation work plan and outcome evaluation is presented first, pages 7-8, followed by the Arts and Cultural Heritage work plan and outcome evaluation on pages 9-12.

These goals are in addition to the ongoing provision of grant programs, technical assistance, and other services such as grant writing workshops, the monthly newsletter, resource information, and technical services.

Biennial Goals FY 2016-17, Base Legislative Appropriation:

Four goals with accompanying objectives were adopted to accomplish our mission and address the organizational and individual artist needs through our base legislative appropriation.

Goal: Provide financial and technical support to artists.

Objective A: Provide Career Development, Artist Quick Start, Artist Mentor and Fellowship grants to individual artists.

Objective B: Offer artist registry, Art Headlines newsletter, resource library, LRAC Gallery, LRAC website, and workshops for artists.

Objective C: Increase regional awareness of LRAC grants and services.

II. Goal: Provide financial and technical support to organizations.

Objective A: Offer Project, Operating Support, and Organizational Small grants to organizations.

Objective B: Offer artist registry, Art Headlines newsletter, resource library, LRAC website, and workshops for organizations.

Objective C: Increase regional awareness of LRAC grants and services.

III. Goal: Maintain strong communication between LRAC and the MN Legislature.

Objective A: Keep region's Legislators informed about current activities and issues.

Objective B: Support Arts Advocacy Day.

Objective C: Maintain memberships in Minnesota Citizens for the Arts and Americans for the Arts.

IV. Goal: Act as responsible stewards of public funds.

Objective A: In FY 16-17 work with our arts delivery partners to develop a strategic plan for best use of the amendment funding, based on feedback from the state's citizens.

Objective B: Develop methods to increase our system's level of accountability, including but not limited to peer review, checks and balances, and public involvement.

Objective C: Maintain a strong and highly functional Board of Directors.

Outcome Evaluation Base Legislative Appropriation:

- I. Goal: Provide financial and technical support to artists.
- II. Goal: Provide financial and technical support to organizations.

A. In FY16 and FY17, of those receiving grants and services from the LRAC, 75% will indicate that their project was artistically successful, reached the target constituency and had community impact. This will be measured by the final reports.

Results: 95% of the grantees indicated that their projects met or exceeded their project goals to be artistically successful, reach the target constituency and have community impact.

III. Goal: Maintain strong communication between LRAC and the MN Legislature.

A. In FY16 and FY17 their will be at least 5 staff and constituent interactions with each of the LRAC legislators. This will be measured by letters, emails and phone calls from staff and constituents, attendance at Arts Advocacy Day and responses to calls for action from Minnesota Citizens for the Arts.

Results: There were 10 direct contacts with legislators. Announcements of grants awarded in their districts after each grant round, monthly newsletters, invitation to LRAC 40th Anniversary Celebration and Arts Advocacy Day.

IV. Goal: Act as responsible stewards of public funds.

A. In FY16 and FY17, 75% of constituents will signify a satisfaction level of acceptable to superior when asked if the LRAC has acted as responsible stewards of the public funds they administer. This will be measured by a constituent survey.

Results: Based on FY17 Needs Survey, 86% reported they felt LRAC had either, achieved, exceeded, or highly exceeded accountability as responsible stewards of the public funds they administer.

Biennial Goals FY 2016-17, Arts and Cultural Heritage fund:

Five goals with accompanying objectives were adopted to accomplish our mission and address the organizational and individual artist needs through our Arts and Cultural Heritage fund.

I. Goal: <u>Increase Access to the Arts</u> by supporting Minnesota artists and arts organizations in creating, producing, and presenting high-quality arts activities; to overcome barriers to accessing high-quality arts activities; and to instill the arts into the community and public life in this state.

Objective A: Provide financial support to eligible individual artists and organizations for activities that support access to the arts.

II. Goal: <u>Increase Art Education</u> by supporting life long learning and appreciation of the arts, including but not exclusive to K-12 activities.

Objective A: Provide financial support to eligible individual artists and organizations for activities that support life long Arts Education.

III. Goal: <u>Increase Arts &Cultural Heritage activities</u> by supporting events and activities that represent the diverse ethnic and cultural arts traditions, including folk and traditional artists and art organizations, represented in this state.

Objective A: Provide financial support to eligible individual artists and organizations for activities that support arts and cultural heritage.

IV. Goal: Provide Services and Support to individuals and organizations that provide arts activities in our region.

Objective A: Provide Publicity/Public Awareness services to support and increase the visibility and understanding of the arts.

Objective B: Provide networking opportunities to share best practices and build relationships.

Objective C: Provide workshops to increase knowledge and expertise of individual artists and organizations.

Objective D: Provide individualized support through one on one meetings with LRAC staff to explore how to best utilize Arts & Cultural Heritage funds.

Objective E: Provide "LRAC Arts Organizational Development Program: From Surviving to Thriving", focused on building capacity in the areas of financial management, strategic planning, evaluation, publicity and board leadership.

Objective F: LRAC will provide an "Artist Work Sample Improvement Program" designed to improve artists' ability to apply for and receive grants and enter juried competitions.

V. Goal: <u>Achieve Accountability of Arts and Culture Fund</u> by acting as responsible stewards of pubic funds.

Objective A: Work with our arts delivery partners to develop and refine a strategic plan for best use of the amendment funding, based on feedback from the state's citizens. (cont.)

Outcome Evaluation Arts and Cultural Heritage fund:

- I. Goal: <u>Increase Access to the Arts</u> by supporting Minnesota artists and arts organizations in creating, producing, and presenting high-quality arts activities; to overcome barriers to accessing high-quality arts activities; and to instill the arts into the community and public life in this state.
- **II. Goal:** <u>Increase Art Education</u> by supporting life long learning and appreciation of the arts, including but not exclusive to K-12 activities.
- **III. Goal:** <u>Increase Arts &Cultural Heritage activities</u> by supporting events and activities that represent the diverse ethnic and cultural arts traditions, including folk and traditional artists and art organizations, represented in this state.

For Goals I, II, III:

A. In FY16-17, of those receiving grants and services from the LRAC, 75% will indicate that their project was artistically successful, reached the target constituency, and had community impact. This will be measured by the final reports.

Results: Overall, of those who have completed final reports, 99% felt the project's goals were either met or exceeded.

IV. Goal: <u>Provide Services and Support</u> to individuals and organizations that provide arts activities in our region.

A. In FY16-17, the LRAC will provide publicity/public awareness services to minimum of 15 grant recipients. This will result in an increased awareness of the arts in the LRAC region. This will be measured by staff tracking of publicity releases.

Results: Through the LRAC newsletter, arts calendar, Face Book, publicity releases, and website, LRAC provided publicity for 45 grant recipients.

B. In FY 16-17 the LRAC will provide resources for arts organizations and artists to attend a minimum of 2 networking opportunities with 75% attendees responding that they were impacted favorable.

Results: LRAC provided a Networking Meeting for Regional Theatre Organizations, 20 representatives attended. 90% of those attending responded that they were impacted favorably by their attendance. LRAC provided scholarships to attend the Rural Arts and Cultural Summit, 8 scholarships were awarded and 85% said they were impacted favorably.

C. In FY 16-17 LRAC will provide resources for arts organizations and artists to attend a minimum of 2 workshop opportunities, through scholarships or by holding workshops, with 75% attendees responding that they were impacted favorable. This will be measured by an exit survey.

Results: In FY 17 LRAC provided the following workshops: Alcohol Inks, Matting & Framing, Creative Enhancement, Landscape Painting in Oils, Holiday Painting, Community Theatre. 92% of participants reported meeting or exceeding their expectations.

Outcome Evaluation Arts and Cultural Heritage fund:

- IV. Goal: <u>Provide Services and Support</u> to individuals and organizations that provide arts activities in our region. (cont.)
 - D. In FY16-17 there will be a minimum of 20 individual support meetings held with constituents interested in the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund.

Results: In FY16 LRAC staff provided 368 support meetings, in person, by email or editing of applications by email. 253 meetings pertaining to Legacy.

E. In FY 16-FY 17 at least 75% of the arts organizations participating in the "LRAC Arts Organizational Development Program: From Surviving to Thriving", will report an increase in their ability to successfully manage their organizations. This will be measured by a participation satisfaction survey.

Results: 98% of the organizations participating felt the "LRAC Arts Organizational Development Program: From Surviving to Thriving", met or exceeded their expectations.

F. In FY 16-17 at least 75% of the artists that participate in the "Artist Work Sample Improvement Program" will report an increase in the quality of their work samples.

Results: 100% of those participating reported an increase in the quality of their work samples.

V. Goal: Achieve Accountability of Arts and Culture Fund by acting as responsible stewards of public funds.

A. In FY16-17, 75% of constituents will signify a satisfaction level of acceptable to superior when asked if the LRAC has acted as responsible stewards of the public funds they administer. This will be measured by a constituent survey.

Results: Based on FY17 Needs Survey, 86% reported they felt LRAC had either, achieved, exceeded, or highly exceeded accountability as responsible stewards of the public funds they administer.


What better way to celebrate 40 years of supporting the arts in west central Minnesota, than to invite everyone we know to a big party?





FY2018 Artist Initiative

The Artist Initiative grant program is designed to support and assist professional Minnesota artists at various stages in their careers by encouraging artistic development, nurturing artistic creativity, and recognizing the contributions of individual artists to the creative environment of the state of Minnesota. Grants will be awarded for career building and the creative development of artists.

There are two deadlines for the FY 2018 Artist Initiative grant application, depending on discipline:

- · Literary Arts and Performing Arts: Friday, May 19, 2017
- Visual Arts: Friday, August 4, 2017



FY2018 Folk and Traditional Arts Program

Folk and traditional arts refer to artistic traditions that come from and are rooted in the cultural life of a community. Community members may share a common ethnicity, geographic location, occupation, language, or tribal affiliation. Folk and traditional arts are learned and passed on through community based systems of training and education where younger generations learn and attain mastery of a form by observation and practice or through apprenticeships with elders and masters.

A folk and traditional arts project may be a single event or activity, or a series or combination of multiple events or activities. Apprenticeship projects, where a master artist passes on skills to a promising apprentice, also are encouraged. Projects may include creation of work, field research, documentation, and presentation of folk and traditional art forms. All projects must have a community component such as a concert, exhibition, workshop, or other activity that engages members of a larger audience in the work of Minnesota's folk and traditional artists.
