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# A Message from the Commissioner


Our focus over 2017 was continuous improvement. Here are a few highlights from the last fiscal year:

- The Minnesota Veterans Home announced plans for a fixed dental clinic at the Minneapolis Campus — the first of this model in the country; the Homes also reached out to create an educational partnership with St. Catherine University to benefit Residents and help recruit Health Care workers in the future
- During the last fiscal year our benefits and claims divisions launched the Discharge Access Database system (DADs) to securely house military discharge documents — the first of its kind in the country
- Minnesota Military Radio is now reaching a quarter of a million listeners across the state
- A Better Government Award was presented to the Luverne Veterans Home for the Music and Memory program, which has improved the quality of life for our Veterans
- Luverne and Silver Bay Veterans Homes earned Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) certification
- The Higher Education Veterans Program Team opened its 70th Campus Resource Center

As I look back on 2017, I naturally find myself shifting from reflecting to contemplating. Now is not the time to rest. For this reason we recently presented our leadership team with operational goals that will guide us over the next two years and beyond. This plan is based on five pillars; business practice improvement, information technology, specialty healthcare improvement, enterprise improvement and integration and employee development. It is rooted in our core values — Veterans, Excellence, Trust, Ethics, Respect, Advocacy, and Nation Leading Stewardship.

In closing, I want to thank our partners. We could not achieve our mission of serving Minnesota Veterans and their families without the support and commitment from the private, public and non-profit organizations who put Veterans first.

# Our Heroes and the Staff Who Proudly Serve Them

## A Privilege to Serve Those Who Served So Bravely

The Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) is honored to provide services that benefit Minnesota's more than 337,000 Veterans. The services for Veterans and their families range from helping with overdue electricity bills to 24/7 nursing and end-of-life care.

The efforts are led by Commissioner Larry Shellito, Deputy Commissioner of Programs and Services Brad Lindsay and Deputy Commissioner of Veterans Health Care Douglas Hughes. MDVA delivers comprehensive programs that maximize the health and quality of life of every Minnesota Veteran. Services include housing, medical care and access to educational, financial and employment assistance.

In Fiscal Year 2017 (FY17), MDVA spent roughly \$126 million on Minnesota Veterans, an increase of almost \$10 million over FY16. Eighty-three percent of the budget is dedicated to the Health Care Division, providing help with medical issues, skilled nursing and domiciliary care.

In 2017, Veterans represented 6.1% of Minnesota's population. Roughly 7% were female and 93% were males.


Over the next 20 years, female Veterans are projected to increase to almost 13%. By 2036, 11% of Minnesota Veterans will be African-American. Other minority populations will double.

These demographic changes will bring new opportunities and challenges. MDVA is prepared to proactively meet all those changing needs.





# Minnesota Veterans Health Care



The MDVA Health Care Division maintains five State Veterans Homes in Minnesota, located in Fergus Falls, Hastings, Luverne, Minneapolis and Silver Bay.

MDVA provides care to Veterans and non-Veteran Residents in a variety of ways. These include skilled nursing care, domiciliary care (board and care, also known as DOMS) and an advanced Adult Day Health Care medical model.

## Exceptional Care

Continuous improvements to quality of care and facilities are ongoing at Minnesota's five Veterans Homes to improve usability, energy efficiency, Resident comfort, safety and activities, and to maintain and upgrade the physical structure of the Homes.

Ongoing staff training is critical to ensure MN Veterans Homes provide Veterans and their families with the best and most effective care possible. A number of education and training programs were in place at each Veterans Home in 2017 to help staff gain and improve skills needed to successfully serve Residents. Examples of this are dementia-specific training, end-of-life training and Healthcare Academy training.



## Safety

In 2017, MDVA reported a **reduction** in Veterans Home incidents. Once again the total incidents rate came in under the target number projected for the year.

Also in 2017, a Slip, Trip and Fall Prevention program and training was developed and implemented at all Veterans Homes; DOT/HazMat training for State Cemeteries was implemented; and a new Workplace Violence Prevention program is currently under review.

# Looking Ahead: MDVA Health Care in 2018

*MDVA's State Veterans Homes will be implementing a number of new programs in 2018.*

As Veterans age and different era Veterans become Residents, we are prepared to meet the challenges of those changing needs. MDVA continues to expand and introduce new programs designed to best meet the current, ongoing and upcoming needs of all Minnesota Veterans. Caring for and maximizing the overall health, welfare and quality of life of the **Minnesota Veteran population is the top priority for the MDVA Health Care Division.**



## Oral Health Focus

MDVA will introduce a focus on oral health in 2018, part of ongoing partnership work with Delta Dental Foundation of Minnesota and Veterans Service Organizations (DAV and V4V). A fixed dental clinic is under construction on the Minneapolis campus with the goal to eventually expand this fixed dental clinic model to all of the State Veterans Homes in greater Minnesota.

## Program Quality Improvements

Dementia is a chronic Health Care issue affecting many Minnesota Veterans, posing challenges for both those experiencing memory loss and their families. Each Home is developing comprehensive strategies to improve dementia care competency. It includes staff education, unique care models and an ongoing focus on innovative memory care programs.

A new Quality Applications Software Manager will coordinate software applications statewide to improve overall quality, efficiency and delivery of services at every Veterans Home.

## Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Compliance Rating

Luverne is now CMS certified, making it the third of four skilled nursing sites within MDVA to achieve the certification. Fergus Falls is expected to finalize its CMS certification by early 2018. This will bring 100% CMS certification to all Minnesota State Veterans Homes.





## Workforce Development

As the need for staff to support various Veterans facilities grows, MDVA will focus on new models of staffing and creative position classifications. This includes using the Enterprise Scheduling and Timekeeper Software Systems and adding a Clinical Education Liaison to further partnerships with universities and other training programs.

## Partnerships

- MDVA maintains valuable relationships with academic institutions, including **St. Catherine University** and **St. Scholastica**. This supports clinical student experiences at Veteran Homes. These key partnerships support quality in each facility and help with recruitment efforts.
- **LeadingAge** provides consultation on state and federal Health Care issues and the development of policies and procedures.
- **Health Care Academy** is an online clinical training system for staff training and specialized classes. In 2017 MDVA added an E-interact course to assist with a variety of skilled nursing issues and standards.
- **Hospice and End-of-Life Care.** Staff members attended classes offered through a Twin Cities Health Professionals Education Consortium. The result was certification for end-of-life care teaching. Minnesota Veterans Homes created its own training classes based on this information.

## Pharmacy Services

MDVA now provides all scheduled medications from its central pharmacy located on the Minneapolis campus. Purchasing medications at Federal VA prices has drastically reduced medication costs. Continuing efforts are underway to maximize eligible Resident benefit enrollment, determine the best Medicare D plan and achieve the highest reimbursement allowed. These new initiatives have helped cover the costs of MDVA medication.

## Facility Improvements

In 2018, MDVA will dedicate and open Building 22, a state-of-the-art 100-bed skilled nursing center on the Minneapolis campus. The dedication of Building 22 will mark the culmination of a three-phase project that began in 2012.

**\$12.851 million** will be dedicated to upgrading State Veterans Homes and refurbishing the historic truss bridge over Minnehaha Creek. Both projects will be completed with state bonding funds.

### Hastings

In 2017, the Hastings Veterans Home completed work with the City of Hastings on the bike/hiking trail connector between the city park trails on either side of campus, including installing a new bridge over the Vermillion River gorge.

### Luverne

In 2017, the dining room at the Luverne Veterans Home was completely remodeled, with new décor and other amenities refreshed. The adjacent dining room deck was also replaced to continue to provide Residents with a high-quality dining experience. Other facility improvements included replacing lighting in Resident rooms and remodeling shower rooms for greater ease of use.

### Minneapolis

The site upgraded a number of items to enhance Resident care and well-being, including adding 12 ceiling lifts in Building 21, installing new hall flooring on all floors of Building 19 and adding a Circle of Honor and POW flag area to honor all branches of the Armed Forces.

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Fergus Falls, established in 1997, is located in Ottertail County in northwestern Minnesota, nestled in beautiful lake country.

The facility is noted for the longevity of its staff and managers, who bring a wide variety of experience to their work. After the retirement of a 20-plus year employee, a new Administrator has now joined the staff on campus, along with a new Director of Nursing, complementing existing expertise with new ideas and energy.

Residential features of the Home include an old town-styled Main Street, village rooms that look like homes and attractively landscaped courtyards. Residents and their families also have access to a variety of personal spaces at Fergus Falls, including a family kitchen, Family Inn dining area, general store, barbershop, library and lounges. Fergus Falls also has an on-site Veterans Village Dementia care unit.

In 2017, the facility added a new open-model Nutrition Room to its dining options, featuring a wheelchair-accessible bar counter where Residents can stop to receive healthy snacks or beverages throughout the day. Other recent facility improvements included new flooring in 10 Resident rooms and upgraded lighting to increase energy savings.

## Caring for Residents

Fergus Falls implemented new staffing patterns in the facility in 2017, which resulted in more accessibility to nurses to provide primary registered care nurses for Residents. The facility also increased the number of registered nurses to provide primary care at the site and added a Unit Nurse Manager, all to improve Resident care and comfort. In addition, the site partnered with an outside dental service to bring a dentist directly into the Home to provide services.

Over the last 12 months, the facility also reduced overall usage of psychotropic medication for Residents. Psychotropic medications are often prescribed to affect, control or alter behavior, but use of these drugs can be minimized with alternative methods of managing behavioral issues stemming from an underlying medical condition.

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Hastings, established in 1978, is located on a scenic 128-acre wooded campus on the Vermillion River, just minutes from the Twin Cities. This facility is one of five Veterans Homes in the nation to offer domiciliary care (board and care, also known as DOMS), which provides a supportive and structured rehabilitative community to eligible Veterans. While the four skilled nursing Veterans Homes are open to Veterans and eligible spouses, the DOMS program is available exclusively to Veterans.

The Hastings location provides Veterans with multiple opportunities to retain an active and engaged lifestyle, with features that include nature trails, a biking trail, a pavilion, horseshoe pit and more. A wood shop also provides Veterans with a therapeutic environment in which to learn and excel at the woodworking trade. A greenhouse on site was also expanded and rebuilt in 2017 to offer Veterans a chance to continue or expand on an interest in gardening.

The Hastings facility worked closely over the past year with the Minneapolis Veterans Home, MDVA's other site that offers domiciliary care, to ensure that best practices from both sites were incorporated into the DOMS program to ensure the most favorable outcomes for Veterans.

## Caring for Residents

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Hastings introduced a number of new programs in 2017 to enhance Veteran care and quality of life. These included:

- A Veteran Wellness program that focuses on medical/cancer screenings, weight loss, diabetes management, positive life approach and aromatherapy
- New Veteran/Staff walking program
- Increased/Upgraded recreational activities
- Increased employment opportunities for Veterans outside the campus
- Addition of a Therapeutic Drumming Circle for Veteran Residents
- Increased health services staff for more flexibility/availability and attention
- Hired a Director of Nursing, full-time social worker and dining coordinator

## 2017 Achievements and Awards

Hastings had successful care surveys with both the Federal VA and Minnesota Department of Health.


The Luverne Veterans Home offers a number of attractive amenities. This includes a backyard pond complete with fishing. There is also a party room that can hold up to 50 guests for special family celebrations.

The facility also offers three distinct living spaces to meet each Resident's unique needs, including a 17-bed special care unit for those with advanced dementia. Each living space features a living room, dining room, kitchenette, laundry room and several sitting/conversation areas. A computer and gaming room are also available for Resident use.



## Special Recognition for Luverne

The Veterans Home in Luverne received the 2017 "Governor's Continuous Improvement Award" for its Music and Memory Program. The program works to help people living with a wide range of cognitive and physical challenges find renewed joy in life through musical favorites. Research has found that music helps reduce depression and anxiety, and can also recover memories and improve quality of life.



## Caring for Residents

Luverne implemented the GEMINI Dementia Firefly Program. It employs activities to reduce the frequency and intensity of dementia behavioral symptoms. The program encourages meaningful projects to help Residents maintain a sense of purpose. It offers activities that help Residents recall memories through photos and other items.

The Luverne Veterans Home also received a "Deficiency Free" rating in the 2017 surveys conducted by the Minnesota Department of Health and the Federal VA.

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Silver Bay, established in 1991, is located on the stunning North Shore of Minnesota overlooking the expanses of Lake Superior.

The facility offers four distinct neighborhood living spaces with a North Woods lodge feel. Each includes a living room, dining room and kitchen. There are a wide variety of private spaces where Residents and their families can visit and relax. There's a large game room, craft shop, four-season porch and private dining areas. Outdoor activities abound, including boating, fishing, hunting and gardening.

The Silver Bay facility implemented an onsite specialty service area in 2017 consisting of three offices used by area medical providers to enhance Resident care. Services provided include chiropractic, optical, dental and podiatry. In addition, the facility added an Occupational Therapist and a full-time Nurse Practitioner to assist in enhancing Resident care outcomes.

## Special Recognition for Silver Bay

The American College of Health Care Administrators (ACHCA) identified the Silver Bay Administrator as a top performer with its Eli Pick Facility Leadership Award, sponsored by ABILITY Network. Silver Bay was also recognized as one of the “Top Nursing Homes” in Minnesota with a five-star rating.

## Caring for Residents

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Silver Bay, uses a number of programs to improve Resident care and comfort.

- **Memory Loss Validation** focuses on the meaning of words. It teaches best-practice communication approaches to meet the needs of dementia and Alzheimer's Residents.
- **The Music and Memory Program** helps people living with cognitive and physical challenges to find renewed joy in life through musical favorites.

- **The GEMINI Firefly Program** provides positive interactions to help reduce anxiety and frustrations among dementia Residents.
- **The Life Enrichment Program** is a life engagement program to enhance quality of life and quality of care outcomes.
- **Pressure Mapping** helps to prevent skin damage due to repeated exposure to identified pressure points. The facility is pressure mapping all seating options. It helps to choose materials and structures that promote positive skin outcomes.

## Partnerships

In partnership with the School of St. Scholastica, senior-level nursing students are developing a PTSD educational program for the Silver Bay facility. This program will help develop PTSD plans of care to support Veterans/Residents.

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Minneapolis, established in 1887, is located on a 53-acre wooded campus tucked next to Minnehaha Falls on the Mississippi River, and conveniently located near the Minneapolis VA Medical Center.

The facility provides multiple levels of care – including a 291-bed skilled nursing facility, 50 beds dedicated to domiciliary care (board and care, also known as DOMS), and an Adult Day Health Care program. Personalized interdisciplinary care, including a state-of-the-art rehabilitation services program and on-site medical staff services, is the goal of each program on campus.

In 2017, the facility initiated a strategic goal for an enhanced focus on the oral Health Care needs of Residents. This included establishing a new contract Vendor for onsite dental services and an initial proposal for an on-site fixed dental clinic. The goal for the next year is to increase the services offered on campus which will allow for more advanced procedures.

The Minneapolis campus also has a special focus on dementia care, with programs such as the Music and Memory Program, which uses music to help people living with a wide range of cognitive and physical challenges find renewed joy in life through musical favorites.

## Caring for Residents

The Minnesota Veterans Home – Minneapolis trained staff in a number of new initiatives to ensure the ongoing safety, comfort and care of Residents. These included:

- Enhanced training in electronic medical records
- Antibiotic Stewardship Program with certified infection preventionists
- End-of-Life Training
- Addition of on-staff medical providers

The Adult Day Center, established in 2012, is located near picturesque Minnehaha Falls in a beautiful, historical 1887 building, the location of Minnesota's original "Old Soldiers Home" on the Minneapolis Campus. The facility has been completely renovated and modernized, while retaining the historic charm of the original building.

The Center is one of only two State Veterans Home Adult Day Centers in the nation, and has a highly dedicated, professional staff specially trained to meet the individual needs of each Participant.

There are regular events such as a monthly Nurses Corner gathering where a Registered Nurse presents information on topics requested by Residents. There is a monthly Dietician Corner providing food tastings as well as diet and nutritional information. There is an Artist-in-Residence program available where an artist teaches watercolor techniques. A full-time chef is on staff as well as a physical therapist and a behavioral health specialist.

## Special Recognition for Adult Day Center

In 2017, the Adult Day Center's recreation therapist won the Department of Human Services Aging and Disabilities Odyssey Award, one of four winners out of 68 statewide nominations. She was honored for her exceptional dedication and innovative programming for Residents.

In addition, the Adult Day Center "Operation: Sight and Sound" program won the 2017 LeadingAge award for innovation.

## Heroes on Horseback

The innovative program "Heroes on Horseback" through the Adult Day Center offers Participants the opportunity both to learn to ride a horse, and also teaches them the basics and practical information about caring for a horse. This program has helped Veterans achieve goals and experience life in ways they thought were no longer possible.

## Resources for Caregivers

The Adult Day Center houses the Alzheimer's Association. A staff social worker supports a monthly caregiver's support group. It is also a referral service so caregivers and families can navigate the challenges in caring for a loved one with dementia or other memory disorder.

## Higher Education Veterans Program

MDVA's Higher Education Veterans Program helps connect Veterans with educational benefits and resources to succeed in college.

MDVA supports the success of Veterans, current military members and their families at Minnesota's colleges and universities by providing on-site comprehensive information about benefits and resources, as well as creating institutional readiness in support of the unique needs of these students.

## On-Campus Veterans Resource Centers

On-campus Veterans Resource Centers are unique to Minnesota and provide an environment where Veterans, military members and their families feel welcome. Staff at colleges and universities throughout Minnesota help identify and remove barriers to Veterans enrollment and access to benefits, as well as create and manage campus Veterans resource centers.

Most Minnesota state institutions and many private, not-for-profit institutions, serve as resource centers for Veterans.

## Training/ Outreach Events

Training and outreach events for 2017 included a Career Fair, faculty and staff training and CVSO training.

## Minnesota GI Bill Expands

In 2017, the Minnesota GI Bill was expanded to include coverage of testing, licensing and certification fees. In addition, changes to the timing and permissible per-year total expenditures for apprenticeship and on-the-job training will allow increased flexibility for recipients.

## MN GI Bill

The Minnesota GI Bill program provides assistance to eligible Minnesota Veterans, currently serving military, National Guard and Reserve members who served after Sept. 11, 2001 and eligible spouses and children.

The program provides a maximum **benefit of \$10,000, up to age 62.**

Eligible participants can use the benefit for higher education, on-the-job training (OJT)/apprenticeship or license and certification.

## State Approving Agency (SAA)

The SAA oversees and monitors certified higher education, apprenticeship and OJT programs in Minnesota. The SAA also verifies that programs meet all licensing and certification requirements. The SAAs are authorized by Title 38 of the United States Code.

Benefits may be used in high schools and adult education centers. It is also for employers who provide on-the-job training, vocational centers and post-secondary education facilities.

## Veterans Employment

Veteran unemployment in Minnesota continues to decline and is now **3.6%**, which is lower than the State at **3.8%**. Nationally, the unemployment rate is **4.3%** and the Veteran unemployment rate is **4.6%**.

By helping provide a seamless transition from a military career to permanent, full-time employment through approved education and training programs, MDVA continues to support Veterans in a variety of ways. This includes providing access to military education benefits, helping students successfully receive credits for prior learning and education, and On-the-Job-Training (OJT)/Apprenticeship programs.

MDVA also helps private businesses and public employers hire and train Veterans.

## Veterans Career Fair

The Minnesota Veterans Career Fair was held July 11 in Bloomington. One-hundred and eighty employers participated, and 625 job-seekers attended.

## Targeted Military Fields

A number of career fields have been identified as promising options for Veterans. These include military medic, law enforcement, construction trades, manufacturing and agriculture.

## Helmets to Hardhats

During the 2017 regular Legislative session, Helmets to Hardhats legislation was introduced as part of the Jobs and Economic Growth Bill (CHAPTER 94 --S.F. 1456) to assist Veterans in finding jobs in the construction trades.

Helmets to Hardhats received **\$400,000** from the Workforce Development Fund for grants to the Construction Careers Foundation to promote the trades. MDVA partnered with Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) and the Department of Labor and Industries in this effort.

The MDVA Tribal Veterans Service Officer initiative operates in partnership with various government agencies and the Minnesota Native American Nations.

- Filed **223** state benefit applications
- Spent over **500** hours providing information at community events



## County Veterans Service Officer (CVSO) Education & Coordination Program

MDVA is responsible for coordinating and educating CVSOs on matters that affect the Minnesota Veteran population.

County Veterans Service Officers (CVSOs) are located in every county throughout Minnesota. Veterans and their families can receive valuable, personal assistance from CVSOs to access available state and federal services and benefits.

With the help of their local CVSO, Veterans can apply for state benefits (dental, optical, subsistence programs, housing) or federal benefits (compensation, pension, medical treatment). CVSOs can also provide information and assistance on issues such as medical, pay, housing and education benefits.

### Highlights of 2017 Activities

- Spent **708 hours** working in CVSO offices to assist with vacancies.
- Conducted six VA System Trainings in various locations, including St. Paul, Sioux Falls, Fargo, Duluth, Camp Ripley, Rochester and Marshall.
- Board of Veterans Appeals Chief Law Judge John Crowley attended the MDVA Spring Conference and addressed the MACVSO in Education and training on pre-hearing conferences.

## Memorials

**Gen. John W. Vessey Jr.** was buried at the Minnesota State Veterans Cemetery – Little Falls on Sept. 1, 2016. He enlisted in the Minnesota Army National Guard in 1939 at the age of 16; received a battlefield commission during WWII; and also served in Korea and Vietnam. In 1982, he was appointed as the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff by President Ronald Reagan.

Gen. Vessey is the first Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff who chose to be buried outside of Arlington National Cemetery.

This area ensures that Veterans and their families are honored for their service and sacrifice to the Nation through lasting tributes in their final resting place. The State Cemeteries strive to be the model of excellence for burial and memorials for Veterans and their families.

## Updates on New Veteran Cemetery

In January 2017, MDVA received an **award of "Engineering Excellence"** from The American Council of Engineering Companies of Minnesota for design excellence associated with Phase I development of the State Veterans Cemetery in Preston.

**In April 2017, construction began on the third State Veterans Cemetery, which will be located near Duluth.**


The 104-acre site, when fully developed will have more than 15,000 burial sites.

Phase I development includes **1,257** casket burial sites, **1,078** in-ground cremation burial sites and **720** above-ground columbarium niches.

Facilities will include an administration building, committal service shelter, flag assembly area, maintenance building and memorial walkway. **The cemetery is scheduled to open in the summer of 2018.**

### Veterans Preference Act (VPA)

The VPA provides Veterans a limited preference in seeking Minnesota state and local government employment and protection against unfair termination or layoff. The Minnesota VPA also allows, but does not require, private employers to give Veterans preference when hiring.

MDVA provides both Veterans and public employers with information regarding VPA in the workplace. If necessary, it can also help guide both individuals and employers through the review process for potential violations.

### SOAR



SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access and Recovery (SOAR) is a program designed to increase access to SSI/SSDI for eligible adults who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness and have a mental illness, medical impairment and/or a co-occurring substance use disorder.

#### Over the First 18 Months of SOAR

- **32** Veterans approved for Supplemental Security Income (SSI)/Social Security Disability Income (SSDI)
- **Over \$36,000** in monthly benefits (combined) for those Veterans
- **Over \$116,000** in back pay collected (combined) for those Veterans
- MDVA received over **\$83,000** in reimbursements from the Department of Human Services for SSI/SSDI claims processing

### MOVE

The Minnesota Operation for Veterans Empowerment (MOVE) program temporarily assists homeless Veterans at the Union Gospel Mission in St. Paul, MN. Assistance includes one-on-one case management with an MDVA Outreach Representative and a paid bed at the Mission during case management. Veterans work with the case manager to select the various types of resources needed in order to help empower them to move beyond their current situation.

### Top Priorities for the Homeless Veteran Registry

The Minnesota Homeless Veteran Registry ensures Veterans experiencing homelessness have access to appropriate housing and services.

- Support increased communication and synchronization among a wide variety of data systems.
- Work with Homeless Veteran Registry Partners to identify Veterans at risk of homelessness. Work with communities in establishing benchmarks for ending homelessness.
- Increase outreach, education and identification of at-risk Veterans. This works through local communities and Veteran Service Organizations.

### Key Accomplishments in 2017

In January 2017, the Minnesota Interagency Council on Homelessness updated **Heading Home: Minnesota's Plan to Prevent & End Homelessness**. As part of this plan, MDVA continues to lead efforts to improve homelessness prevention for Veterans, applying the lessons learned for ending Veteran homelessness to other populations.

The **Southwest, Northwest, and West Central Minnesota Continuums of Care (CoC)** have cleared their housing waiting lists for homeless Veterans. The U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, HUD and the VA determined the 40 counties served by these CoCs have put systems in place to address any Veteran who is at-risk or experiencing homelessness.

MDVA has **expanded the Social Security Outreach Advocacy and Recovery (SOAR) program** as a means of assisting Veterans at-risk of or experiencing homelessness to increase their incomes and overall stability.

For the second consecutive year in Minnesota, the **Twin Cities StandDown** included a Housing Team staffed by numerous organizations serving homeless Veterans, including MDVA. As part of this event, Veterans were immediately connected with staff who could facilitate a housing plan for Veterans.

The VA, MDVA and MACV partners presented at the **National Coalition for Homeless Veterans (NCHV) conference** in Washington, D.C. on June 1st to highlight the successes of collaborative efforts to end Veteran homelessness in Minnesota.





# Legislative Accomplishments



## State Government Finance Bill

### CHAPTER 4 -- S.F. 1, 2017 1st SPECIAL SESSION

- **Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) Agency Funding:** Approximately **\$150 million** was appropriated for agency operations: Central office, Programs & Services and Veterans Health Care/Veterans Homes.
- **New Minnesota Veterans Cemetery - Duluth Operations:** An increase of **\$1 million** to MDVA funding for operations of the new state Veteran's cemetery in Duluth. This will be the third state-operated Veteran's cemetery after Little Falls and Preston.
- **Minnesota GI Bill Expanded Uses:** Eligible recipients may now **use the MN GI Bill to pay for items** such as testing, licensure and certifications. In addition, changes to the timing and permissible per-year total expenditures for apprenticeship and on-the-job training will allow increased flexibility for recipients.
- **Veterans Journey Home:** One-time grant funding of **\$700,000** to be used to support the development of new or rehabilitated affordable housing dedicated for low-to-moderate income Veterans and their families.
- **Veterans Defense Project:** One-time grant funding of **\$500,000**, which must be used to support, through education and outreach, Veterans who are involved with the criminal justice system. Grant funds to be administered by the Minnesota Humanities Center.
- **Veterans Benefits Services Notification ('Disclosure Statement'):** Minnesota now requires that private providers of Veterans benefits services include language in their representation agreements and advertising that **informs Veterans of existing Veteran benefit service assistance offered at no charge through VSOs, CVSOs and MDVA**. This does not preclude those private providers from representing those seeking Veterans benefits services or otherwise limit their ability to continue to provide services.

## Legacy Finance Bill

### CHAPTER 91 -- H.F. 707, 2017 REGULAR SESSION

- **Medal of Honor Memorial: \$250,000** to aid in the construction of a memorial to Minnesota Medal of Honor recipients on the grounds of the Capitol. The funds will be available once matching funds have been raised through non-state donations.
- **Veterans Voices: \$200,000** to the Minnesota Humanities Center for their Veterans-focused programming.
- **Vietnam: Minnesota Remembers: \$650,000** grant to Twin Cities Public Television to produce content telling the stories of Minnesota's Vietnam Veterans.
- **Camp Legionville: \$222,000** for programming for youth, Veterans and the public related to Minnesota's cultural, historical and recreational activities.
- **Big Marine Lake Veterans Rest Camp: \$278,000** to develop and build a welcome center that supports the mission, programs and safety of the Veterans Rest Camp in Big Marine Lake.
- **Rice County Veterans Memorial: \$30,000** to complete the Rice County Veterans Memorial in Faribault. This is in addition to the \$30,000 in money from the bonding bill.
- **Waseca County Veterans Memorial: \$50,000** to Waseca County to complete the Waseca County Veterans Memorial.

## Environment and Natural Resources Bill

### CHAPTER 93 -- S.F. 844, 2017 REGULAR SESSION

- **Disabled Veterans State Park Permit:** A Veteran with proof of any level of service-connected disability shall be issued a **free annual park permit**.
- **Bear Hunt Raffle:** If there is a limit for bear hunting permits in a certain area, **first preference must be given to a Resident of a Minnesota Veterans Home** to obtain a permit.

## Jobs and Economic Growth Bill

### CHAPTER 94 -- S.F. 1456, 2017 REGULAR SESSION

- **Helmets to Hardhats: \$400,000** from the workforce development fund for grants to the Construction Careers Foundation.

## Higher Education Bill

### CHAPTER 89 -- S.F. 943, 2017 REGULAR SESSION

- **Veterans-to-Agriculture: \$350,000** of renewed funding for a pilot program to facilitate the entrance of Veterans into careers related to agriculture and food production, processing and distribution through intensive four- to eight-week academic trainings.

## Tax Bill

### CHAPTER 1 -- H.F. 1, 2017 1ST SPECIAL SESSION

- **Disabled Veteran Homestead Market Value Exclusion: Eliminated annual application;** added the permissibility of retroactive application for surviving spouses / DIC recipients of eligible Veterans.
- **Veterans' Service Organization Property Taxes:** Reduced class rate to **1%**.

## Omnibus Capital Investment (Bonding) Bill

### CHAPTER 8 -- H.F. 5, 2017 1st SPECIAL SESSION

- **MVH-Minneapolis Historic Truss Bridge Repairs: \$7.851 million** to repair the bridge that spans Minnehaha Creek and gives access to the campus at the Minnesota Veterans Home -- Minneapolis.
- **MDVA Asset preservation: \$5 million** to repair critical infrastructure projects at Minnesota Veterans Homes throughout the state.
- **Rice County Veterans Memorial:** Another **\$30,000** to aid non-state funding to finish a memorial in Faribault. This is in addition to the \$30,000 in money (mentioned above) from the Legacy bill.
