Members of the Press,

Governor Dayton and Lt. Governor Smith have proposed <u>a \$103 million plan</u>¹ that would begin to address Minnesota's economic and racial disparities – helping build an economy that works for all Minnesotans, everywhere in Minnesota by expanding economic opportunity, making higher education more attainable, and improving housing security for thousands of Minnesotans of color across our state.

This comprehensive approach is a dramatic contrast to the inadequate **\$25 million proposal** for economic and racial disparities that Speaker Daudt and House Republicans have proposed. This approach does little to close economic and racial disparities in Minnesota, while failing to build an economy that works for all Minnesotans.

HOUSE REPUBLICANS MUST DO MORE TO HELP ALL MINNESOTANS SUCCEED

In response to Speaker Daudt and Republicans' inadequate proposal to expand economic opportunity, Representative Rena Moran and 30 House DFLers, including Minority Leader Paul Thissen, <u>are now pushing Speaker Daudt increase his target to at least \$50 million</u>. Their leadership and the equity proposals put forward by the Governor and Senate have exposed the inadequacy of the House Republicans' approach.

NUMBERS SPEAK FOR THEMSELVES

Below is a side-by-side of the Governor and Lt. Governor's proposed investments to expand economic opportunities for Minnesotans of color, help support high school and college completion, and work to close Minnesota's homeownership gap and how Speaker Daudt's approach stacks up.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ON EQUITY

Speaker Daudt and Republican legislators are arguing that the \$6.4 million in proposals from their "Jobs Bill," (which actually could could jeopardize \$1.2 billion in private investment and 6,000 jobs)," and \$19.3 million from their education bill will help close these economic and racial inequities. Here is what you need to know.

- It is true that House Republicans support a number of the Governor's education equity proposals, including \$120,000 for free GED testing, \$2.8 million to support disciplinary reform in Minnesota schools, and funding to address Minnesota's teacher workforce shortage. However, these proposals alone aren't enough to close economic and racial disparities.
- House Ways and Means Chairman Jim Knoblach continues to market his <u>private school-voucher system</u>⁴, as a solution for racial disparities. However, he has not explained how a \$1,500 tax credit that wouldn't come close to covering the \$10,000 annual average cost of private tuition⁵ would close economic and racial disparities. In fact, for some schools tuition can cost up to \$24,000 a year. His proposal oversimplifies the problem and doesn't address that the vast scope of disparities that perpetuate inequality.
- Speaker Daudt and House Republicans would pay for \$6.4 million of their equity investments in their "Jobs Bill" through \$4 million in cuts to Minnesota's Dislocated Worker Program, which helps unemployed Minnesotans back to work more quickly, including the thousands of Iron Range workers and their families who went months without benefits earlier this year.
