


STATE of MINNESOTA

WHEREAS:	Major advances have made HIV disease preventable, treatable, and stoppable since World AIDS Day was first recognized in 1988; and
WHEREAS:	The risk of transmitting HIV currently can be reduced by 96% when viral suppression is achieved; and
WHEREAS:	Medical science continues to unlock new tools in the prevention and treatment of HIV including diagnostic tests and medications with fewer side effects, less frequent dosing, and lower drug resistance; and
WHEREAS:	Federal guidelines recommend routine HIV screening for people aged 15 – 65 and antiretroviral therapy for infected individuals; and
WHEREAS:	An estimated 55% of all Minnesota residents with HIV live in Hennepin County, and 25% of new cases in the state are identified at Hennepin County's Public Health Clinic; and
WHEREAS:	Nearly 40% of people living with HIV are not accessing care and disproportionately impacted communities continue to face significant stigma, greater barriers to care, and related health disparities; and
WHEREAS:	POSITIVELY HENNEPIN was created to ensure access to care, and retention, and engage disproportionately affected communities with the goal of stopping the spread of HIV; and
WHEREAS:	POSITIVELY HENNEPIN increases access to testing and medication, connects newly diagnosed people with services, identifies and engages those who are not currently accessing care, raises public awareness, and reduces stigma in disproportionately affected communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MARK DAYTON, Governor of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim Thursday, December 1, 2016, as:
