Books and other materials are loaned for one week or two weeks, depending on need. Members of the Legislature and research workers in the Legislature may borrow materials. Others are expected to use them in the Library.



FILM ABOUT THE MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE

During the 1971 Session of the Legislature a color-sound 16 mm film about its operation was made. It is called "There Oughta Be A Law". A citizen meets a problem (such as broken glass in a stream) that causes him to exclaim "There oughta be a law!" The film then depicts the steps that must be gone through in the State Legislature in order to get a law to remedy that type of problem (or any type of problem).

Bookings of the film for use by Legislators and by community groups are made in the Legislative Reference Library. If groups make requests to the Library they are referred to a legislator from the District where they are. When the Legislator asks for the booking it is made.

Bookings for SCHOOL USE should be made at the MINNESOTA HIS-TORICAL SOCIETY. Copies of the film were given to the Film Library there so they could offer this film as part of their on-going film service to schools.

The copies of "There Oughta Be A Law" in the Legislative Library are meant for general community use and not ordinarily for showings to school classes. May we urge that bookings be made as far in advance as possible? Avoid disappointment by getting the film scheduled as early as you can.

A SCANNING LIST FOR LEGISLATORS

Since The Library Star is only in its second issue, its purpose should be specified again. Knowing how busy all members of the Legislature are, it is not expected that they will have time to more than scan any list of publications that may be given to them. Once each month during the Session this publication will list a selection of materials. Time and space would not make listing possible in depth. The aim is more that of a sample case, to give some idea of the variety of publications available in the Library.

If each member of the Legislature will run through this list each month he may find something listed that will be useful to him right now. At any rate, he will be increasing his knowledge of what resources the Library may have available to supply information to him at a time when he needs it.

It is hoped that both Legislators and research workers may find on these lists publications that will be pertinent to consideration of bills before the Legislature. If information that is wanted may be in printed form the Legislative Library is the service agency to search for it.

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NEW YORK and CHICAGO TELEPHONE BOOKS

In each house of the Legislature there is a rack of telephone books from all Minnesota communities. A Washington, D.C. book is also filed in these racks.

New York and Chicago books are available in the Legislative Library. These are useful when needing phone numbers or addresses of organizations or persons in those cities. For New York the Library has the Manhattan and Brooklyn directories. Books for suburban areas of these cities are not stocked, because Legislative use is mostly for organizations or agencies in the central cities.

THE LEGISLATIVE PAST

A principal event in the opening of each new Legislative Session is the appearance of the Governor before a Joint Session of both houses. The purpose is to hear a Message from the Governor.

Such a Message has been traditional from the first Legislature, as required by Article V, Sec. 4 of the Minnesota Constitution. Such Messages focus on a "state of the state" and indicate problem areas where legislation is needed.

Did you know that once it was felt necessary to print copies in foreign languages so that Members could distribute them to immigrants who could not read English?

In the Minnesota Senate Journal, 1876 (at p. 84) is recorded:

"Mr. Armstrong offered the following resolution: "Resolved, that the committee of printing be instructed to procure the translation and printing of the Governor's message and inaugural, for the use of the Senate, as follows:

"1000 copies in German, 1000 in Norwegian, 1000 in Swedish, 500 in French." (adopted February 2, 1876; p. 99).

In the House, on February 12, 1876 (Minnesota House Journal, 1876; at p. 192) Mr. Good introduced the following resolution:

"Whereas, there are more than twenty thousand persons in this State, born in Sweden, a great majority of whom are unable to read the English language, but take a lively interest in the public affairs of the State, a synopsis which can best be obtained by the able and instructive messages lately delivered by Governors Davis and Pillsbury, and

"Whereas, Since the Senate has sent in her orders for printing 1000 copies of said messages, in said language, and an additional number thereof can be procured at a much reduced price,

"Resolved, That the clerk of the House be instructed to procure for the use of the members, one thousand copies of the Governor's message in the Swedish language, provided they can be obtained for not more than one hundred and sixty-five dollars."

Amendments were offered to secure copies also in German and French -- and Mr. Bassett moved to amend by inserting 1000 in the Chinese language!

The resolution was not adopted in the House.

The very next matter discussed was a resolution to appoint a committee "to enquire into the expediency of offering a State bounty for the destruction of grasshoppers and their eggs." The resolution for the committee was adopted.

So it has always been -- a legislature mirrors the people and the problems found in the State. These change from Session to Session, but the concern of the Legislature is always on the people of Minnesota and their needs and problems.

100 YEARS AGO IN THE LEGISLATURE

Did you know that in the Law Library there is a complete set of the <u>Journals</u> of the <u>House of Representatives</u> and of the <u>Senate</u> in the <u>Minnesota Legislature</u> from <u>Territorial days?</u>

What are they good for? As a record -- as history -- of course. To get a glimpse of the past we checked the volumes for 1873 -- just 100 years ago. Legislative procedures were already well established for this was the 15th Session. The contents are very similar to what is found in our Journals today.

Some of the Committees had names more or less the same as today: Finance, Judiciary, Education, Elections, etc.

But some were much more specific than today, as:

Committee on Hospital for Insane Committee on Military Affairs

"Institute for Deaf and Dumb, "Indian Affairs
and Blind "State Prison
"State Reform School "State Library
"Soldiers' Orphans "Immigration

Both the Senate and the House had a standing committee with the name given as noted above. But only the Senate had this one: Committee on Retrenchment and Reform!

The Legislature being a mirror of the times, naturally there were bills introduced in 1873 that would not be needed today, as bills to:

- Ask Congress to pass a law granting pensions to persons disabled in the Indian war of 1862 and 1863.
- Prohibit the ball and chain, and the punishment of criminals in public.
- Promote immigration.
- Restrain stallions and other animals from running at large.

Some subjects of bills then are still subjects today, as on liquor, rail-road taxes, even on wolves.

It was a big surprise to find the matter of equal rights for women being discussed in the Minnesota Legislature 100 years ago. The House Journal (at p. 208) records the offering of the following resolution:

"Whereas, many female teachers in our public schools are required to do equal work, and assume equal responsibilities with male teachers for much less remuneration than is allowed male teachers, and

Whereas, such discrimination is unjust, inequitable, and not in accordance with the spirit of the age, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the House of Representatives, that the committee on education be, and are hereby instructed to report a bill compelling all school officers not to discriminate between the sexes as to the pay of teachers, where the same duties and responsibilities are demanded from the female as the male."

Pretty modern, don't you think?

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



A NOTABLE GIFT

The Legislative Reference Library has received a gift of distinction, two original volumes of <u>DEBATES AND PROCEEDINGS</u> of the <u>MINNESOTA CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION</u>, of <u>1857</u>. One is headed <u>THE Debates and Proceedings</u>, while the other is called merely <u>Debates and Proceedings</u>. Puzzled? That is because there were two rival groups, and each met separately. How we managed to get one Constitution from this unique situation is a marvel.

The two books were the gift of former Senator Clifton Parks, who served in the Minnesota Legislature as Senator from St. Paul from 1963 through 1969. Earlier he served as a member of the House of Representatives from 1953 through 1961. At one point in earlier years the two volumes had belonged to Senator Charles N. Orr (who served in the House 1911-1913 and in the Senate 1915-1947). Senator Parks felt there was an especial legislative association to these two particular copies because they had belonged to two persons who had served in both bodies of the Legislature. For that reason he felt that the Legislative Library was an appropriate place for them.

Yes, it worked out that the Democrats and Republicans each held separate sessions. Not only did each carry on its own proceedings, but each published its own volume of $\underline{\text{DEBATES AND}}$ PROCEEDINGS.

Now the Library can show you these two unique volumes. You can read the incredible story in source material.

A "Reporter's Preface" (on page 1 of <u>THE</u> "Debates...") says: "A portion of the Delegates-elect to the Convention, representing one of the great political parties of the Territory, not only refused to co-operate with the Convention in its proceedings, but constituted for themselves a rival organization, leaving the body composed entirely of Democratic members."

The other group was the Republicans, but WOW!, read the melodramatic story back of this split as described in their "Debates and Proceedings", on pages 30-32.

Now you know what a treasure these volumes are for a library such as the Legislative Reference Library. We know that all the members of the Legislature and of the staff would want us to include them in most hearty thanks to Senator Parks for this notable gift.

A RATHSKELLER IN THE CAPITOL?

One of the questions that arose in recent months was whether it is true that what is now the Cafeteria was once a German beer garden. Yes, it was.

In the Minnesota Legislative Manual for 1909 there is a description of the still-new Capitol written by Julie C. Gauthier. On page 219 there she reports:

"Cafe. A restaurant for the use of legislators and employees of the building occupies quarters at the extreme end of the north corridor upon the ground floor; it is designed after a German cafe called a Rathskeller. German quotations are inscribed over each arch, and Belgian bay trees are placed here and there. The rooms are effective and interesting."

According to clippings from St. Paul newspapers in 1930, "These mottoes, in flourishing German script, were painted in the murals when the Capitol was erected on designs prepared by Cass Gilbert, noted architect. But the mottoes, because they were in German, were erased in the World War (I) by order of J.A.A. Burnquist, the war governor.

"Blank spaces have been on the walls where two score mottoes once stood, and Governor (Theodore) Christianson has ordered their return to the walls, although coffee instead of beer or wine is now in vogue."

Early in January 1931 the paper reported: "The Minnesota State Capitol is going dry. No longer will mottoes on the walls of the cafe in the basement urge drinking on the readers. Governor Theodore Christianson today announced that he had ordered three of the mottoes, which drew criticism because of their wetness, changed.

"His action is a result of scores of protests which came to his office... The W.C.T.U. led in the fight for the change after it was discovered that some of the sayings to be restored advocated drinking. Gov. Christianson pointed out that when he ordered the mottoes restored, he did not know what they contained, as they were written in German, and was merely attempting to return the cafe to its appearance of pre-war days.

"Of the three mottoes which were ordered changed one was:

'Better be tipsy than feverish' -- altered to:

'Temperance is a virtue of men.'"

XXX

The Library has a list of 29 of the original mottoes in both German and English.

We have a Xerox copy of a post card showing the original Rathskeller. There were table cloths, arm chairs, painted garlands of vines that look like grape vines on the ceiling. The German mottoes were in decorative bands painted on the walls in each arched area.

QUESTION: Whatever happened to Governor Christianson's purged mottoes? When was the metamorphosis from Rathskeller to modern Cafeteria made? Maybe we can answer that in the 1974 Session!

On July 1, 1974 I will retire from the post of Director of the Legislative Reference Library.

Newer members of the Legislature and newer staff members found the library service operating when they came. Those who have been here longer remember that the Legislative Reference Library first came into existence only five and one-half years ago.

During these years the foundations have been built for this special service. A pattern of organization was developed, materials were acquired and organized so that the Library's purpose of supplying information in printed form to the members of the Legislature and to those who do research for them can be fulfilled.

The Library now has extensive files of news clippings going back to 1969. It has files of some 500 titles of magazines and newsletters, with a subject file of articles from magazines. Some 9,000 pamphlets are cataloged and filed by subject. These are such items as U.S. Government publications and reports on subjects of legislation from other states. It has a good collection of Minnesota documents from the last five years. It has good coverage on Federal legislation as well as on that of our own Legislature. It is now receiving House Committee Books as well as tapes of hearings and of floor sessions in the House. It has a good collection of reference books that have been found to be necessary, and the foundation of a book collection tailored to current needs. The book collection will doubtless be kept on the small side because arrangements have been worked out for excellent cooperation from other libraries in the Twin Cities with a courier service that includes the Legislative Reference Library in its daily round from cooperating libraries.

The Library is an activity of the Joint Coordinating Committee, part of the Office of Legislative Research. Library address: State Capitol, Room 111, St. Paul, Minnesota 55155. Phone (612)296-3398.

During the past five years space has been the principal problem of the Library. Materials are now in several rooms on the first floor and in the basement of the Capitol. Already there are plans for use of a House hearing room for an enlarged reading room when there are no hearings scheduled. Looking to the future, it is anticipated that the quarters will continue to improve. The more accessible materials can be made, the speedier service can become.

As I leave, may I thank all the members of the Legislature, and the staff in both Senate and House research units, and in other Senate and House offices, and in all other Legislative services and in the offices of the Governor and others in the Capitol. And we do not forget the help contributed by our colleagues in the State Law Library and departmental libraries, in the local public libraries, and the Hill Library, in the local college libraries, and in the Minitex library service at the University of Minnesota in making books and information freely available.

A very special note of thanks goes to all the members of the Legislative Reference Library staff, all of whom are service-oriented. A library is only partly publications and materials. A good staff is what makes the wheels go 'round and produces the needed service. This Library staff can be counted upon to carry on the service and to continue to develop the Library in usefulness to the members of the Legislature and to researchers and others who use the Library.

Once more, to all - - thank you for everything in the Library's past. Now, then, here's to an ever-better future!

This new tort liability would be applicable to any enterprise — corporate or non-profit, including professional groups and individuals — that systematically creates risks of personal injury.

"...enterprise liability would be true no-fault liability, blind to the fault of both the injurer and the injured."
