Monthly Report - December 2003

Administration

- Lisa met with Chad to go over the budget reports to try to figure out a more useful report for us. They also discussed object codes and how earn codes relate to them.
- Lisa called to get locks fixed on both tape room doors. It took about 3 weeks, but they were finally repaired.
- Robbie attended the final meetings of the Legislative Benefit Book committee.
- Lisa posted the library aide position internally and on the internet.
- Lisa planned and made arrangements for the staff Holiday Party at Fabulous Ferns. This year the gift exchange was particularly spirited – much stealing back and forth. It was a great time, and thanks are due to all the managers who chipped in to buy the food.

Information Systems Activities

- Ruth finished up the initial work on the new Assignments database, designed to give us all easy access to who takes care of a myriad of duties in the Library. She put shortcut icons on public services staff computers and printed out the data for staff to check.
- *LegDB progress.* Ruth added missing committee names in the lookup table in LegDB for Paul. She met with Randi to look at the ASP file that needs to be changed for the LegDB web page. They are having problems displaying subcommittee names.
- Lisa attended to many workstation upgrades. She updated all staff computers with latest security patches from Microsoft, installed the Aleph Client for all staff who need it, and updated the public PC's and ghosted them
- Lisa did system state backups of the media, web and archive servers.
- Lisa did the quarterly review of the Harbor request lists to make sure that we are not including or excluding things that need to be in our network back-ups. This helps ensure we are paying as little as possible to Intertech each month.
- Kelly gave a short tutorial to Toshi on checking in newspapers and periodicals, as he will serve as her back-up.
- Kelly processed 54 Added Volumes, withdrew 8 items from the collection, and claimed 42 missing periodical issues.

I called the IRS, where they told me that it was out of stock, and that I should go to the "big library in the area which has microchips in the dungeon." Of course, I immediately thought of the UMN government publications library; they were able to fax me a copy within the hour."

- Paul took care of numerous end of year duties including the creation of the 2004 overdues dates, & statistics day lists for 2004.
- Many staff members were involved in pre-session projects. Ruth updated the Public Services picture sheet and recreated the PDF.
- We added access to PACER. The Public Access to Court Electronic Records system is a fee-based, but inexpensive, service provided by the federal judiciary for electronic access to federal court case information.
- Found info. on the opt out vs. opt in provisions related to data privacy and personal information. (pv)
- Found all the ST editorials related to stadiums since Jan. 1997. (pv)
- We need to know if the Senator's old high school teacher, Frances Schwartz, has died or not. (She's dead) (pv)

- Lisa continued to struggle with the reports coming out of the Statewide Accounting System. She actually managed to get our figures to exactly reconcile with those of the LCC for the first time since the beginning of the fiscal year.
- Lisa had some good budget news this month. "I just got a quote from McAfee about our site license for the next two years. I found out we were getting way more products in our license agreement than we used. I told him what we were specifically using and it turns out that it will cost us half of what we had budgeted for this renewal. The total is \$688.80. We had budgeted \$1,271 for this. A \$582 savings. This was a nice surprise."
- The Legislative Reference Library raised \$1,326 in pledges during the Combined Charities Campaign.
- The supervisors began doing the annual performance evaluations. Since salary adjustments were unlikely, this year's form was streamlined.

- **Data review!** Coordinated by Sarah and David, many staff reviewed records in both PALS and the new Aleph database, to discover the major problems encountered in converting the data. A most troublesome glitch is that Aleph does not recognize spaces within a call number. Every time it encountered a space in our call number in the item record, it merely wiped out the rest of the string.
- We decided to begin an 'up-to-\$5,000' pilot project with the MINITEX Contract Cataloging Service. David and Sarah worked with MINITEX staff to set up the necessary profiles.
- Kelly stopped processing added volumes using the shelflist, now that we have all of our items bar coded and can discontinue the paper system.
- Kelly processed 38 added volumes; withdrew 3 items from the collection, claimed 73 missing periodical issues: 15 were EBSCO, 33 were free, 21 were Minnesota Periodicals and 4 were order direct, and shelfread from HC107 .M62 E37 - HE309 .M6 M57 2001.

- The librarians met for session planning, to determine how to offer training and contact legislative users about updating their Inside Issues and Tables of

Contents profiles.

- The Public Services staff discussed the difficulty of determining with complete certainty when a law was first passed. As a result, we drafted (with the help of Mark Shepard) the following disclaimer to accompany answers to this sort of question: "Our research indicates that the language you asked about first appeared in Minnesota Statutes, section XX.xx in 19xx. General disclaimer: The legislature sometimes moves language from one section of statutes to another section. It is possible that the language you asked about, or similar language, may have existed previously in a different section of Minnesota Statutes."

- The public services staff met to discuss staffing issues, especially since Betsy left. We decided to keep our evening closing time to 4:30 through the end of the year, and that if an illness or training or vacation made the circ staff fewer, there would be fewer hours staffed at the circ desk.

- The LRL and Law Library librarians met for lunch. They discussed statistics, but decided that statistics were irrelevant, and what we really needed was marketing - and that our key marketing element should be the time we save.

- Paul found information on other states that have created legislative governing coalitions across party lines. I found a few states where it occurred. It wasn't usually long lasting.

- House member needed basic background data on issues currently of interest to Minnesota realtors. (pv)

- Senator wanted a list of all new videos the library has received in the past couple of years. (Ever since he checked out a copy of *Seasons* from the Science Museum he periodically checks to see if we have received any others like it.)(pv)

- Information on the trade deficit, especially with China. (rm)

- Information on RFIDs (radio frequency identification devices)(rm)

- Which other states have tax exemptions on corn burning stoves?(rm)

- Several questions on the "shield" law for newspaper reporters.(rm)

- Does MN have an official policy regarding who can lie in state in the Capitol Rotunda? (no, the governor decides. rl)

- Legislative history research included fair campaign practices, 2003 pharmaceutical pricing bill, 2002 real estate disclosure requirements, 2003 sexual predator bill, and the 1991 wetlands conservation act.

Robbie spoke with Linda Kane, the estimator from the Department of Administration, to get a preliminary idea of the costs involved in the change.

- The Minnesota Legislative Web Site won another national award, the *Digital Legislatures Survey 2003* (Second Annual), from the Center for Digital Government. The Minnesota Legislative Web Site tied for second, with South Dakota. Nevada was first. The application consisted of a series of questions about the features included on our Web site – can citizens locate their legislators online, is there a privacy policy, can citizens follow with the state's most current statutes and administrative code, how is computing used in legislative chambers, etc.

- Even more notable, the Minnesota Legislative Web Site won the *2003 Best of the Web* award in the state legislatures category, from the Center for Digital Government. The Minnesota Legislative Web site was first! This award had several categories; it was not limited to legislatures. Awards were given to several levels of government agencies. "State Legislature" was only one of eleven categories. This contest application was largely essay questions, aimed at innovation and use of Web-based technology, functionality and improved access, efficiency or time saved, and economy or money saved. We can be confident that part of the reason we won both these awards was the great job that Randi did in putting together the applications!

- Randi was interviewed, along with Mike Speiker, about the reasons we won the "Best of the Web" award.

- Randi revamped the LRL page pointing to House and Senate audio and video.

- Robbie updated the Legislative Web site handout.

- Ruth made a change in the acquisitions database to make the URL field larger.

- Ruth continued work on LegDB. Worked on LegDB. She added a subcommittee lookup table and added a subcommittee field to database. She created process to get committee names from the Tape Room database, and edited data entry form and created a main menu. She created a new data entry form to enter committees to Legislator records by committee, and edited the data entry form for photos (You only need to enter photo filename now instead of the whole file path). She updated the database chart and data entry procedures manual reflecting these changes.

- Leif wrangled with many thorny print quality issues on the color printer.

- We began to investigate the feasibility of using the MINITEX Contract Cataloging Service. With Betsy gone, and Sarah less able to take time off reference, it seemed a good idea to try to relieve the cataloging backlog. We drew up a proposal, and Robbie had a meeting with Edward Swanson from MINITEX.

for holdings records and PALS training for the cataloging module in ALEPH, both in Mankato.

- As a result of our bar coding project, our catalog records now have item records attached to them – the virtual equivalent of a physical shelf list. For years we hadn't needed shelf list cards for our monographs, and at one point we stopped getting second (redundant) copies of the cards. Finally, we will stop purchasing cards at all, in effect freezing the physical shelf list. (Also note the side benefit: saving money: \$20/month)
 - In anticipation of the new year, Ruth printed out 2004 labels for newspaper and district clippings for Carol.
 - Kelly processed 79 added volumes, withdrew 5 items from the collection, and claimed 47 missing periodical issues. She also finished weeding the Minnesota periodicals and the periodicals we keep for four years.
 - Several public services staff members went on a field trip to the Law Library, to learn of their experiences with the Aleph catalog. We were pleased to learn their experiences were generally positive.
 - Leif added Message Vault to the reference computer for all of our copies to self emails and other messages we currently save in email folders. Message Vault added an easy way to retrieve messages sent in the past, saving time and effort when another librarian may have answered a similar request in the past.
 - The librarians evaluated the current Aleph standard OPAC interface, to evaluate whether the search options should be collapsed from two to one, similar to MIT or the University of Iowa. (That was the consensus.) Robbie represented our librarians' views at the PALS User Group meeting.
- An example of patient listening on Paul's part, and of the "there's not much we can do about it" type of question: "Crazy question of the week: An elderly woman called quite upset over an article she had read in the Roseville paper. Something about a local company working with the U.N. & the Nepal government on issues related to INTELLECTUAL property rights. She didn't think it was right that the U.N. & Nepal government should be able to come to the U.S. and take our property. She felt that soon the whole country would be owned by foreigners & then it would be too late."*
- Paul also heard, "I'm writing a paper on the public funding of stadiums and need to know what statute lists the funds. I explained that there were several bills passed related to the different stadiums and that they each handled the funding in very different manners. I also pointed out that generally issues related to finances are not codified but could be found in the laws. She said, oh we all really hate this teacher, he always gives us assignments like this. He never researches them ahead of time. He thinks there's a quick answer and it turns out it's always more complicated than he thought."

This year Lisa, Leif, and Robbie met in early July and updated our responses to the Security Impact Analysis. We've (well, really Lisa and Leif and Syble, mostly) have done really well at meeting the goals we identified. Mostly, though, we should just be thankful that Lisa and Leif are ever vigilant to protect us from bad computer viruses and computer/network failures.
- Ruth worked on archiving records of the Library's listserv activities. She edited the control file report, replacing ~W to ~Y in archive section of a few lists, to make a yearly archive file instead of a weekly.
- Ruth worked on database documentation. She continued on data entry procedures for the Inventory database system, and finished documentation for the patron mailing list database.
- Ruth downloaded and evaluated a message database software called 'Message Vault' with Pegasus. Librarians could use this software to search email archives to research previously-answered questions. The software is pretty easy to use.
- Ruth helped Leif check computers for the MS Blast virus and to install patches on staff computers.
- Ruth began work on a database to track librarian responsibilities such as link pages, MN issues, Inside Issues topics, etc.
- Staff members who have periodicals routed to them are going to be part of an experiment. Each person is signed up to receive the Contents Pages electronically for the periodicals that were previously routed. We will try this method for two months and then reevaluate whether it is working. There may be some periodicals that are really much better routed. This electronic method should save some of Kelly's time and some of the aides time and make it easier for the everyone to find the professional periodicals.
- Kelly finished barcoding the Minn. Doc Serials - a great milestone in our

- Kelly weeded the periodicals we keep for 6 months, 1 year, 2 years, 5 years and 10 years. She began weeding the bulk of the periodicals we own, the ones we keep for 4 years.

Virus and Worm Battles

Friday, August 22, 2003

On the virus battle front...

Leif showed me that he has now blocked incoming mail from one entire network, and from 19 additional specific addresses, many of them State of MN or U of M addresses. If anyone – and this is a remote possibility – calls and complains because they are not able to send a message to us, we were being inundated with virus-laden messages from these addresses as the Sobig.F virus spun out of control. At one point we were receiving spoofed messages – supposedly from legislators, saying re: thank you. We were also receiving many

automated messages from mail servers, saying the messages we had apparently sent didn't go through.

It took up most of Leif's time this week to do damage control. As an example of the size of the attack, we usually receive a several hundred valid messages through our mail gateway in a day; we were receiving thousands. Leif had to shut down Pegasus a few times within the course of the day, as his 'deleted' message folder filled with thousands messages that contained viruses.

Our current mail server can't do real time virus scanning. Our new server box and the upgraded version of the Mercury Mail Transport software should be up and running already – if Leif hadn't spent the last two weeks troubleshooting the router switching problems and now this. As he said, "We can't seem to retreat from the front lines."

Once the new server is in place we will be able to do real-time virus scanning at the point the message comes in, and then choose what to do with the infected messages – delete, 'quarantine,' put in a folder, send on without the infected attachment, etc.

Most of this virus related activity took place on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. We think it is under control.

On the other battle front...

The Blaster worm had been out for about a week. We were safe from this worm due to the fact that the firewall was blocking the specific ports that this worm needed to do its dirty work.

However, late Wednesday, somehow the Blaster worm infected the Senate network very rapidly. The firewall blocked the worm just great from the internet, but we speculate that it crawled on to the Senate network when an infected laptop was hooked up to the network (behind the firewall) or, less likely, that it was sent in via a modem when a user dialed in to the network from home.

Leif was very worried on Thursday morning that the worm may have come to our part of the network. The LCC and Revisor's office also had a high probability of infected machines since we are all behind the same firewall. So Leif and Ruth went to each of our computers and checked for the signs that would indicate an infected machine. None found! Whew. They then made sure that the newest patch, MS03-026, was applied. An interesting note was that he had to call Lisa to figure out how to get in and check the public services computers. She has those babies locked down tight as a drum, to avoid any patron hacking.

I asked Leif what would happen if an evil library patron came up to one of the public computers and downloaded the Sobig.F virus from a message on his/her Hotmail account. He reassured me that the security restrictions on those machines would prevent the virus from being written to the Windows system folder.

So all was fine in the end, due to our diligent and constant patching and checking and setting firewall rules. It brings up some concerns, however. Right now we have some really big 'holes' through the firewall for the House network. Leif feels that before session we need to find out exactly what access is needed from/to the House, account for those uses, and close all the other open ports to

the House network.

We also need to be more diligent about keeping the Intrusion Detection System up to date because it can only detect intrusions that it knows to look for. Since we were several signature files versions behind on the IDS, it did not even know what the Blaster worm should look like so there was no way for it to give us advanced warning when the Blaster worm started floating around our network.

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - May 2003

A lot of people are glad that the legislative session wrapped up after a relatively short special session. Elizabeth's daughter Hannah will no longer have to say, "Mom, there's something on Channel 17 instead of Zoom and it's really bad."

Administration

- The results of the budget process (or budget non-process) were devastating to the Library's allocation. The 15% cut, on top of 18% cuts in the previous two years, puts the Library in the position of leaving positions open, and terminating other staff as well. Core services will be emphasized as the Library staff pull together and look to rebuild in the coming years.
- Lisa coordinated the annual physical clean-up day. Ruth took care of surplus the excess equipment.
- Lisa and Robbie worked with Michele Timmons and the LCC staff to begin using the Revisor's postal meter, instead of maintaining our own. This will be beneficial in that it is a bit cheaper, the Revisor's meter is newer and has more functions, and it will clear space in our crowded photocopier room. Lisa worked with the Revisor's office to set up their accounting of our postage and the LCC's postage after we start sharing their machine on July 1.
- We have worked hard to evaluate all our newspapers and periodicals to be sure we are getting the best values and the materials we need. Last year the EBSCO newspaper invoice was \$4,960.88 and this year it is \$4,803.71. So even though prices have increased a lot, we were able to lower our annual invoice for newspapers.
- Lisa met with Scott from IKON to set up the scanning on the new copier. He made sure it worked and then Leif set up the rest of the one touch buttons.

- Ruth updated Inside Issues and Scan program documentation.
- Ruth starting converting the Patron database to Access 2000.
- Save money when we can! Ruth created a MN Doc. Number index card for Kelly instead of Lisa ordering some from the Printers.
- Ruth deleted many patrons from the patron database. This reflects many session only staff finishing their tenure, but also some staff that were terminated in legislative offices.
- Nicole reported on the Table of Contents statistics for May. "There were 132 articles copied for Table of Contents users this month. A few more people have decided to start sending their requests in by printing them off and sending them in (18 this month). But we still have a majority of regular email responders."

- The bill abolishing the Profiles of Learning and establishing new standards referenced three documents with the new standards. Since they were likely to be needed by many interested parties right away, David scanned them and put them on our network. The committee administrators were able to link to them as soon as the bill passed.
- Ruth scanned a page of a MN Doc for David so he could put a page in color in our archived PDF version.

Reference activities

- A while back Robbie contacted Charlie Rogers at the State Archives about our print agency minutes, asking him if they still want them. We don't have a very complete set in print these days and it takes quite a bit of time for Kelly to box them and make a list. He replied that they would like the minutes, but we needn't make a list. That's a time-saver! Every little bit helps.
- Kelly finished barcoding the Non-Minnesota serials and the Library Archives collection, and started barcoding the Minnesota serials.
- Randi wrote the essay for *Just In* on tax burden and tax incidence studies in our collection.
- Robbie, Elizabeth, David, and Randi met with Shawn Rounds (Minnesota Archives) and MHS intern, Margaret Basket. Margaret will be writing a useful description of our project to keep digital archived copies of mandated documents. She is working with the State Archives this summer, analyzing how best to archive Web sites.
- We comply with copyright laws, and some of our patrons realize this. One representative, when asking for copies from a magazine, wrote, "I would be interested in copies of as much of this periodical as the Fair Use laws, and your good conscience, would permit. Warmly, xxx"
- Reference staff participated in a trial of Newsbank that will replace our Newslibrary access to the full text of the *Star Tribune*, *Pioneer Press*, *Duluth News Tribune*, and *Grand Forks Herald*. Newsbank access expands our options to include the *St. Cloud Times* and the *St. Paul Legal Ledger*. We will need to do some training so legislative staff and members know about the switch.

Are there any Republican Governors who have changed their minds & decided to support tax increases? (I found a couple.) (pv)

Did Randy Kelly vote for the legislative gift ban? (pv)

Improved Services Came With Our Scanner

An article for the NCSL Legislative Research Librarians Staff Section Spring, 2003, NEWSLINE.

The staff of the Minnesota Legislative Reference Library recently made a big change in how we provide the contents pages of new periodicals to our patrons. The Library has had a paper-based contents page service for as long as anyone can remember. We were inspired to move to the electronic delivery of contents pages when we got our first scanner. But the purchase of a copier that had scanning capabilities and could be linked to our network made this project more feasible. The Library switched to electronic delivery of our contents page service in February.

The contents pages of the new periodicals are scanned as soon as they arrive in the Library. Each scanned contents page is attached to an email that is sent to a listserv set up for that periodical's subscribers. The subscribers receive the contents pages for the periodicals they care about shortly after they arrive in the Library. The contents page subscribers can request articles of interest to them in a variety of ways but most just reply to the email.

The advantages are many. Electronic delivery speeds up this service dramatically, it saves at least an hour a day in staff time, it saves a lot of paper, and many of our patrons prefer receiving things electronically.

There are a few disadvantages. Patrons who receive notification of a lot of periodicals are sometimes annoyed at the number of emails they get during the busy legislative session. In addition, you can't cut and paste the citations into an email message since the scanned attachment is an image. We had some problems with file size, and some of our patrons don't really like receiving things electronically.

The scanner/copier has been great for a couple of other reasons. We have frequently used it to scan an article or short report and email it when we have a tight timeframe or when we need to get it to a legislator on the House or Senate floor. Also, we are working on a pilot project to electronically archive all mandated state documents. We scan mandated documents that aren't available on the web or in electronic format, archive them on our server, and link to them from our catalog. The high-speed feeder on the copier/scanner makes this process fast.

Reflections

It's time to say goodbye.

I am leaving the Legislature on May 2, after an unparalleled journey of 16 years, four months, and five days. It has been my fortune to meet some extraordinary people, and a few not so great. But that defines what society is — an amalgam of individuals from all walks of life who are very distinct in their beliefs and actions.

My time here has been educational, fulfilling, and gratifying in knowing that I always tried to give more than 100 percent of my commitment and dedication to public service by educating walk-ins, school groups, university students, and the general public about the legislative process and public policy.

While I was fortunate to teach a few lessons, I learned much more from outstanding instructors such as Chief Clerk Edward Burdick, House Journal Editor Pat Murphy, Rep. Mary Murphy with her demand for excellence, and the quiet and peace-loving Rep. Bernie Lieder. There are so many others to mention, but space will not permit.

And how could one forget former Rep. Dave Bishop, who was a stickler for "dotting the i's and crossing the t's?"

My recollections are many. They include meeting then-Czech President Vaclav Havel, playwright August Wilson, and sculptor Amerigo Brioschi, who with his father Carlo in 1938 created the arched wall behind the speaker's chair, "The Spirit of Government."

My journey has taken me in many directions, like having an office in the beautiful Capitol building, where my staff and I shared a private rest room with the lieutenant governor and her staff. I experienced seeing the "ghost" of former Associate Justice P.E. Brown, who died in office, and I observed lawmakers at work on the House floor from vantage points behind the ceiling of the elaborately decorated dome of the chamber.

I also traveled through state history to report on events in past "Reflections." One trek took place in a small southern Minnesota town where a lawmaker was on a handshaking tour during festival season. Each year, the participants — bands, floats, and tractors — had what they called a "stand still parade" where the spectators were the ones who walked by.



My columns took readers to all corners of the state, including the Northwest Angle — the northernmost point in the continental United States — where schoolchildren take boats or snowmobiles across Lake of the Woods to get to school. Another journey was to the most southwestern farm in the state where Dutch students and others came to learn more about American dairy farming and agriculture.

Thanks to the outstanding assistance from many staff in the Legislative Reference Library, I discovered that the Red River Valley was part of ancient Lake Agassiz some 10,000 years ago, and that of the 201 members of the Minnesota black population at the start of the Civil War, 100 volunteered to fight with the 1st Minnesota Regiment.

The library staff also pointed me in the right direction to find information about how the roots of Greyhound Lines, Inc. are in Hibbing. I also learned more about Joe Rolette, who stole the bill to make St. Peter the Capitol. He traveled from the far northwestern part of the state to pass laws in the Territorial Legislature. When Rolette arrived in St. Paul on a dog sled decorated with bells and bright ribbons, throngs of people would be on hand to greet the odd-looking lawmaker dressed in furs from head to toe.

The library staff often go unrecognized for their contribution to the legislative process, but I know all too well how our work could not be done without them.

During my tenure, the Minnesota Historical Society's State Capitol staff taught me quite a bit about Cass Gilbert's passion for the Capitol, as well as some little known facts about his building's interior.

I also connected the Legislature to the

hundreds of yellow school buses that visit in the spring, the Hale-Bopp Comet, and even detailed the original reason why Minneapolis and St. Paul are rival cities.

I will cherish all the memories and enlightenment I gained while here — particularly from so many staff, and especially those in House Public Information Services who put in long hours of dedication and excellence each week.

The journey has been extraordinary, but it's time to say goodbye. While it took some tough decision-making on my part, the outcome is a wise move. So as I leave, I challenge members, staff, lobbyists, and others at the Capitol to be honest, to always work to make a positive difference in the lives of others, and to be willing to stand up for convictions you know are for the greater good of all Minnesotans.

Goodbye, and Godspeed.

on tribal reservations nationwide.

Riverboat casinos began in 1991 in Iowa, the report notes, and "by 1998 there were over 40 riverboat casinos in operation in Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Iowa, and nearly 50 riverboat and dockside casinos in Louisiana and Mississippi."

New casinos are popping up in such states as New York, which recently signed compacts with the Seneca tribe for development of casinos near Niagara Falls, according to *International Gaming and Wagering Business*.

Tribal gambling brought in \$212 million, rising to \$6.7 billion in 1997, according to the commission.


Minnesota's tribal casinos total 18 in number and are exempt from state and federal

taxes. And like other states, they are governed by compacts between the state and the tribal governments. Minnesota's compacts do not provide tribal governments the exclusive right to conduct casino gaming in the state. The compacts do not require tribal casinos to contribute revenue to the state either, with the exception of recovering some inspection-related costs.

According to an NCSL brief about tribal gaming, a state can't tax tribal government gaming revenues, although tribes can agree to share a limited portion of their gaming money with state and local governments, subject to approval by the U.S. secretary of the interior. Some have done so, usually in exchange for the exclusive right to conduct casino-style

gaming within a state's borders.

The most prominent example is the Foxwoods Casino, operated by the Mashantucket Pequot Tribe near Ledyard, Conn. The original Pequot agreement with Connecticut stated the tribe's willingness to give the state either \$100 million or 25 percent of its net revenues annually, whichever was greater, so long as no non-tribal casinos were permitted in the state.

In Wisconsin, existing state-tribal gaming compacts were amended between February 1998 and March 1999 to begin providing tribal payments, which amount to approximately 7.6 percent of net revenues, though the number is not specified in the agreement.

The library serves as the official repository of legislative documents, such as reports, tape recordings of hearings, and minutes from hearings. In addition, the library keeps a number of other resources about the Legislature, including newspaper clippings, budget documents, and other publications produced by state agencies.

The library handles a number of inquiries from legislators, legislative staff, and the public. If you have a question about the Legislature, and you're not sure where to begin, the librarians are a helpful guide to the process.

Did you know?

Many of the Internet resources available on the Legislature's Web site are there because of the work of the library. Because it is the official repository of legislative documents and many state reports, it catalogs all of those resources and provides direct links to online versions where available.

In addition, library staff convert paper copies so that they may be accessed by the Internet. Many of the pieces of historical data about the

Legislature and state government are found in reference materials available in the library, but would not otherwise be available to the public and to legislators and legislative staff, if that conversion service were not provided.

The library also has access to thousands of other pieces of information via its network with other libraries in the state.

Loan privileges are only extended to legislators and legislative staff. However, the library is open to the public from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The library serves as the agency for central planning and direction of the Legislature's Web site. Library staff help establish a consistent look for all legislative Web sites. They maintain general information pages, including the frequently asked questions and youth pages, and help coordinate updates and changes to the design of the site.

In addition, patrons can access the library's catalog from its Web page and the vast Internet-based resources contained there. The popular "Links to the World" page contains useful links to various sources of information, including other state government sites, interest groups, and statistical services.

Monthly Report - April 2003

We answer questions from the public that come in to the Legislative Web site. Carol had a particularly great question this month. "I have a question regarding the general provisions for MN. My question is in regards to MN Stat 60A.08 Sub 9 Dept. procedure and my other question is in regards to MN Stat 65A.01 Subd 3. I look forward to your response."

Administration

- Lisa organized the annual "Electronic Clean-up Day," and brought in pizza for lunch. Many dead, useless files were cleaned up. Leif reported success, because no one even inadvertently deleted anything they had to use Harbor backup to restore.
- Budget issues were paramount this month. Robbie continued to monitor the unprecedented budget non-process.. Lisa figured out the 04-05 budgets based on a number of budget cut estimates, and examined the remaining expenditures for FY03 as well.
- Robbie and Lisa met with Chad Thuet and others regarding the possible migration of LCC accounting functions to the statewide accounting system.
- Lisa and Robbie met with Chad Thuet and Mary Temple to discuss moving to a three-way shared postage meter.
- When the Children, Families, and Learning Library was dismantled, Lisa went over and claimed some surplus Princeton files and kik-step stools.

Web

Development

- Leif held a meeting regarding Northstar Search engine and did much work on investigating index problems and parsing out search engine records. Randi, Syble, and Robbie attended.
- Syble completed backups of the Windows 2000 servers.
- Syble and Leif examined the North Star indexing, determined problem areas that could be corrected, and fixed them. Syble examined search engine reports and Legislative web-site pages for problem links that caused NorthStar to erroneously report multiple servers for various Legislative web-sites. She corrected the links or worked with the webmaster of the problem site to correct the problem links.
- Syble created a database to include search engine queries concerning the Legislative web- sites so that query patterns could be examined comprehensively, over a period of time, or by individual months. Previously legislative queries were extracted on a monthly basis, imported into a database and sent to Randi. The new database comprises queries for all months since January 2003 and is maintained and available online (ZONA).
- Syble continued work on the advanced searches for the Legislators Past & Present database. Particularly time consuming was incorporating data from additional city and county databases to provide correct results even though redistricting has changed some areas.
- Syble worked with Dell Tech Support to determine status of patches and lockdown needs for the Network Attached Storage server.
- Syble set up a new test server and retired the old one. She set up the web server software so that the test server continues to be not only a testing platform for proposed web site changes but it also stands as a back up web server. This server is also used to run the WebTrends reports.

- This is a short sentence that encompasses a LOT of work: Ruth finished converting Inside Issues and Scan programs into Access 2000!
- Leif worked several times with the LSIG-IRT (Incidence Response Team) on IDS updates and Sniffer baselining.
- Leif checked the time zone offsets on all network hardware and software after daylight savings time change.
- Lisa and Leif swapped out several printers.
- Leif downloaded, installed, and tested several RSS reader software packages; evaluation continues.
- Leif spent a lot of time dealing with the lack of a House system-wide address book.
- Ruth edited a couple of Everett's reports in Acq. relating to the budget. One showed how much is saved with patrons using Contents Pages instead of having their own subscriptions. The other report showed cost of standing orders for next fiscal year.

Collections
Activities

- Lisa set up new computers for Helen, Nicole, Alissa and Kelly.
- More positive news about the move to OCLC's Connexion cataloging software. Helen wrote, "I just compared my April 2003 cataloging statistics with my April 2002 cataloging statistics and I actually cataloged a few more items this year while using Connexion - so I beginning to think productivity using Connexion will be about the same as Passport. The macro scheduler has made data entry much more efficient and working in the MARC Text Area makes data entry much quicker than working in the MARC Template. Also, I noticed that OCLC has already corrected the software bug I discovered and reported to them. I felt very empowered when I noticed that, I didn't expect as a quick response."
- Kelly processed 51 added volumes, withdrew 7 items from the collection, added 2 and revised 8 Local Data Records using OCLC, and claimed 54 missing periodical issues. She continued to barcode the MLRA's.
- The librarians met to go over the list of EBSCO periodicals and evaluate whether any could be dropped. We review the list annually to be sure we are using our periodicals dollars in the best way possible. A very few were dropped, and others were earmarked to drop in future budget years. The discussion prompted the librarians to look into providing electronic tables of contents to electronic periodicals, a project for later this summer.
- Sarah reported, "April was the first month that my cataloging stats reached pre-Connexion switchover, pre-session, pre-Betsy's maternity leave levels-- just in time for summer vacations to begin. One thing that occupied a lot of time this month was puzzling over how to catalog the budget documents, since they are in a new format."

Reference activities

It seems impossible to believe now that we once operated without a fax machine, or computers on our desks, for that matter. We are beginning to feel the same way about our photocopy machine with scanning capabilities. Sarah said, "I will never fax again." Elizabeth relates out recent activities that take advantage of that technology to improve our services.

LRL has had a paper-based table of contents service for as long as anyone on staff can remember. We had considered moving to electronic delivery of the contents page service since we had a stand alone scanner. Last year, when we were in the market for a new copier, we found a copier that had scanning capabilities that could be linked to our network. That scanner/copier made this project more feasible for us. We switched to electronic delivery of our contents page service in February.

The contents pages of the newly arrived periodicals are scanned each morning. One of the library aides then attaches the scanned table of contents to an email that is sent to a listserv set up for that periodical. Most of our subscribers get the table of contents within an hour or so of the arrival of the periodical in the Library.

The advantages include--electronic delivery speeds up this service dramatically, it saves at least an hour a day in staff time, and many of our patrons really like receiving things electronically.

The disadvantages include--those patrons who want to receive notification of a lot of periodicals are sometimes annoyed at the number of emails they get during the busy legislative session, you can't cut and paste the citations into an email message since the scanned attachment is an image, we had some problems with file size, and some of our patrons don't really like receiving things electronically.

We are trying to figure out a way to automate the email part of it to save even more staff time. We have 131 subscribers and the part of the process that involves attaching the scanned document to the email can still take half an hour to an hour a day.

The scanner/copier has been great for a couple of other reasons--we have used it constantly to get an article or short report into a patron's hands quickly. Also, we are working on a pilot project archiving all the mandated state documents electronically. We scan those mandated documents that aren't available on the web or in electronic format from the agency. The high speed feeder on the copier/scanner has been very useful for this project.

- Nicole reported, "There were 189 TOC article requests for April. Two were called in (by the same person) and 23 TOC were sent in (rather than responding to the email.) There were a few problems with people opening attachments but in each case they were able to work it out. It seems to be going very well although a little slower now that the end of session is approaching.

- The experiment works.... In January, Paul and Nicole began shelving the newest books featured in "Just In" in the regular collection, just noting on the card that they should have a one-week checkout period for that month. It's worked beautifully, eliminating pulling and reshelving all of the featured books.
- Paul was reelected to the PALS ILL user group steering committee.

Monthly Report - March 2003

Randi had a few requests for Senator Spear's mourning dove recipe, noted on the floor during previous mourning dove hunting debates. She called him and he said he had no specific recipe - his point was that you would need about 33 birds to serve 4 people.

Administration

- Robbie and Lisa continued to examine all of our budget categories, looking for budget savings now and especially in the upcoming biennium. The budget process continued, but it was unlike any previous biennium. The subcommittee was not named until right before the first deadline week, and there is no LCC meeting scheduled to confirm those appointments.
- Lisa researched our copier and copier/scanner leases and the cost of purchasing them. We will purchase some of them with salary money saved in the hiring freeze time, and have *significantly* lower costs in the next biennium because we will pay only maintenance costs on them.
- Lisa had Andrew's and Theresa's phone lines disconnected, since there is little chance of filling those positions again.

- Ruth edited the LRL staff directory web page to make the mailto: refdesk point to our form, comments.asp, instead.
- Betsy added two links to our ZONA intranet page: a button to the Web interface of the Leg DB database, and a link to the Electronic Documents file structure. This link is under the Cataloging area of Zona and provides a list of all electronic documents as we get (or create) them.
- *Legislators Past & Present database development.* Syble continued programming, working on the city and county searching.
- The House and Senate have adopted the format of our e-mail forms on the bottom of Legislative Web Site pages. Syble worked with Mike Speiker in the House on their implementation of the coding.

- Leif dealt with several problems regarding the House email. Their filtering software is very sensitive, rejecting e-mails with ampersands in them and other innocuous words. Yet, the tables of contents for JAMA get through, even with this subject line "JAMA: Journal of the American Medical Ass." (It breaks there because of the 50 character maximum.)
- Syble implemented server changes. She set up the old web server to act as a dedicated media server, reinstalled Windows 2000 Server to the old "NT" server, and applied patches and security lock downs. She installed and set up Real Server and Windows Media Server, and transferred the archive media files to the server.
- Lisa and Leif cleaned out our off-site software drawer in the Capitol, to make space for the video backup CDs/DVDs. They threw out an amazing number of old floppy disks.
- Lisa applied software patches and upgrades to staff computers and the public computers.
- Lisa installed new computers for Ruth, Leif, Elizabeth, and herself. (These might be the last new computers in quite a while!)
- Ruth continued conversion of the Inside Issues database to Access 2000. She has completed about half of the Inside Issues and Scan databases conversion.
- Staff in legislative offices often share knowledge and provide troubleshooting for one another; this month, Ruth helped Linda Schmitt in the

Senate with Access issues.

- Leif met with Intertech regarding router replacement details and questions, worked with the House and Senate on video multicasting problems, worked on Intrusion Detection System problems, and met with Tim Orr regarding the Revisor's Xtend project development documents.
- Syble and Leif attended the Sniffer Distributed training provided by the contractor and completed the implementation.
- Leif developed a software update plan for all library workstations that Lisa will be applying.

Collections Activities

- The librarians met to discuss the EBSCO list of periodicals and pared down a few as a result of the evaluation. Plans to consider expanding our contents page service with electronic journals will be considered in the summer or fall.
- As of April 1, 2003, we have saved 49 mandated 2003 reports into our electronic archive directory. Many of these, mainly added volumes, already include the archived URL on the PALS record. Of the 49 reports, 44 were already available in PDF, 4 were non-MNDOCs and 1 is a scanned item. David is continuing to work on some problems with the mandated documents that are more difficult to save electronically.
- Barcoding - We are about half way through the smart barcoding of the MLRM holding library. Kelly is making great progress with the MLRA serial record barcoding.
- Helen reported on her experience with using the new cataloging software in the last month. "We have used OCLC Connexion for the last month. I have concluded that Connexion is still a work in progress. It is still quirky, and very mouse intensive. Completing an original catalog record on Connexion takes more time than completing a similar record on Passport. Kelly is now able to print labels, but she has told me she needs to check each label for proper alignment. On a positive note, Connexion's linked authority feature is really cool. I also think the feature that harvests metadata from a web site has some potential, but its usefulness depends on the quality of the web site's metadata."
- Sarah reported her experience with Connexion: "This was the first full month that I spent cataloging on Connexion. It seems like I cataloged more nonprint formats this month than books--Internet only resources, CD- ROMs, the library's first movie on DVD, and maps galore."
- Kelly processed 65 added volumes, withdrew 14 items from our collection, copied 10 contents pages, and claimed 54 missing Periodical issues.
- We were happy to fill in a gap in our old statutes with a copy of the 1923 General Statutes, compliments of the Attorney General's Library.

Reference activities

- Just a reminder: we have many users of our primary notification services. As of March 11, Ruth reported that we have 279 Inside Issues subscribers and 161 Contents Page subscribers.
- It is interesting to monitor the responses to the new electronic delivery of the Contents Pages service. 242 TOC articles were copied from Feb 28th- March 31st, just a bit more than the usual number for this month. Two requests were called in this month, rather than submitted via e-mail response. 14 contents pages were printed out and sent through interoffice mail rather than responding to the email. Two legislators switched their emails to be received by their LA so they could be printed and delivered to the legislator in that form.
- The reference staff utilized a free trial of the Public Affairs electronic research collection from Congressional Quarterly and realized how much better the electronic and print resources we have collected suit our needs.
- Librarians met to shift collections around in the Reading Room. Legislative notebooks were moved to the back, Blue Books from the states were weeded,

making room for our ever-expanding collection of Laws, Statutes, Rules and Journals.

Sarah provided a nice overview of types of questions this month. "The "contact your legislator" e-mail got a workout this month, as people wrote in expressing their opinions on pending legislation, especially the Women's Right to Know bill, the state employee salary freeze, and the bill proposing to make mourning doves a game bird. It also appears that high school and graduate students alike are beginning their final projects: I received several inquiries from students that would require huge amounts of research, such as a legislative history of welfare (state and federal), or the total number of immigrants entered into Minnesota, 1970-2000."

Monthly Report - February 2003

Administration

- Robbie worked primarily on budget issues and budget preparation. Many staff helped with ideas and information. Lisa and Leif were key in figuring out how to pare our non-salary lines.

Web

Development

- Using forms for submitting questions to the Web Site has made a significant dent in the junk mail received, but not eliminated it completely. One of the benefits of using a form to submit a questions is that the librarian can see which page the requestor was viewing when the question was made. In some cases, the requestor can be easily directed to the correct page. In other cases, the requestor's question or comment might cause us to reevaluate the site navigation scheme.
- The reference librarians have put up with a few notable virus messages, that come by the hundreds. One had the tag line "Great Apple Pie Recipe" and another was "Dear Class of 1983." David relates their usual response to virus messages, "Whenever I saw anything over 100K, I deleted it without paying much attention. We still get junk mail for free porn, viagra alternatives, and Nigerian money schemes. Today we received a Nigerian money scheme email but it was in German."
- A number of people met to talk about the next phase of the legislator database project. Syble is working on the search screen decisions hatched at that meeting. Due to staff shortages, however, data entry isn't possible now.
- Syble and Lisa finished backing up the House and Senate audio files. Syble made the initial copies on to CDs and DVDs, and Lisa made one more copy.

Activities

- Leif met with other IS department heads and Intertech staff to discuss the implementation of a redundant router connection to Intertech. This will prevent interrupted Web service in the case of a problem with the connection to the Helga router at Intertech. The problem will be solved with the implementation of the catchy sounding "Hot Standby Router Protocol."
- Lisa finished upgrading the computers in the Reading Room to WINDOWS 2000. There were a few computers waiting to go to surplus, and Lisa prepared them by formatting and cleaning up the hard drives (as the Department of Administration now requires in no uncertain terms!) She reinstalled the virus scan software on all the staff computers to fix some lingering problems. Everyday computer problems and upgrades also kept Lisa busy - mouse problems and printer drivers and software questions.
- Lisa continued work on getting the Harbor backup to only back up what we truly want and getting the costs reduced. She was able to cut the costs about 70% last month.
- Ruth began converting the Inside Issues database to Access 2000.
- Ruth converted Senators' email addresses to internal addresses in our patron database.
- Fixing, fixing....Ruth fixed some of Lisa's payroll reports in the personnel database since we are now on a different pay schedule. She fixed some quirky problems with printing statistics reports that appeared when we switched to Windows 2000.
- Leif dealt with several problems regarding the House email filtering software. Staff are mystified when their messages don't go through, and it

often turns out to be a word or symbol that you would never suspect (like ! or 1-2 in a date).

- Leif spent much time working on House and Senate multicasting video problems.
- Leif and Robbie met several times to develop a network server migration plan. Leif researched, specified, and ordered two new servers.
- Leif worked on IP authentication problems that were the result of web pages being cached on the statewide proxy/caching server.
- Leif worked on IDS signature updates and configuration tweaking with the LSIG Incident Response Team.
- The final portion of the governor's budget was released on the 18th, and we received six of the VERY FEW print copies that were made. Our copies received heavy use in the Library. We also reserve one copy that can be checked out by members of the public.
- The budget cuts mean we look everywhere to pare, including our materials budgets. We asked one researcher about an expensive item we purchase, and he uses. He wrote that he could do without it. "The department of commerce gets it, so I can get them to make me a copy of whatever part I need. That's not ideal, but I can live with it."
- Jess managed to open an account with the Library of Congress, from which we primarily purchase cataloging guides. Ever since the anthrax attacks, LC has not used the U.S. mail and required us to send prepayments for all materials by Federal Express! Now they will be able to just ship our items and use money in the deposit account – *much* more efficient, and cheaper.

The Centennial Library, housed at Minnesota Planning, closed as of February 26, 2003. When the end of the library was announced, Larry Lockway, Librarian for the collection, wrote and offered as many items to our library as we want. David, Sarah, Carol, and Robbie evaluated the collection and chose the following types of items:

- Minnesota Planning documents from the agency's earliest years that were not in our collection. David did two PALS searches of Planning documents in our collection and in theirs, and identified the items we did not have.
- Current monographs and reference books that are appropriate for the Legislative Reference Library's collection.
- Items in the Centennial Library collection that are not readily at other libraries, and we feel are important to preserve and to make available. An example of this are sets of multi-year, multi-volume annual reports of the Environmental Monitoring and Ecological Studies Program from the 1970s, for the Prairie Island Nuclear Generating Plant and the Monticello plant.
- Alissa and Sarah worked together on adding LRL archive URLs to bibliographic records on PALS.
- Helen and Sarah attended Connexion training at the U of MN. This new Web-based cataloging interface from OCLC is very different from the traditional OCLC interface. Nearly immediately thereafter we switched to this new OCLC interface.
- Switching to the Aleph system will mean many changes, and – inevitably – some increases in cost. When we move to Aleph software as part of the MNLINK migration, we will have to pay export fees to put our records on the system – 43 cents per record. This would amount to about \$450/year.
- In February Kelly processed 60 Added Volumes, withdrew 2 items, copied 208 Contents Page Articles, claimed 56 missing Periodicals, and continued to barcode periodicals.

Reference activities

- Carol, Betsy, and Sarah completed a useful "Minnesota Issues" guide to resources on Prairie Island nuclear waste storage.
- The Contents Pages Electronic Notification project began. We are saving a ton of paper and a fair amount of time by converting this to electronic delivery. It is a much more timely service since the emails are sent out within an hour of the receipt of the periodical. We received mostly positive comments with just a couple of people confused by the new system. One committee administrator wrote merely, "Sweet!" Because the aides are doing the email part of it and Nicole is doing the copying of the articles it frees up Kelly to do a lot more barcoding. And that's a good thing. Dave and Nicole and Elizabeth hosted a demonstration of the new system. Elizabeth and Leif wrote procedures for the system.
- We didn't realize that 35 libraries still receive *Just In* in print. Ruth sent those libraries messages with the February issue of *Just In* telling them we no longer planned on sending them in paper and alerting them to the electronic delivery of our acquisition list. That should save paper, postage, and some time for our staff.
- Legislators and staff were offered the chance to switch to electronic delivery and many switched. We received several favorable comments about the electronic version. One legislative office director wrote, "You've done a terrific job with the e-version. It is so much handier to use than the paper version (which was good too, just not as good!)."
- David, Randi and Elizabeth met to discuss the project to digitize mandated reports. The details of this pilot project are still being worked out. Leif set up the copier, network rights, and the directory structure for the files.
- Ruth printed out the packets for Contents Pages and Inside Issues to send to nonusers asking them if they would like to participate. We have completed asking our current service users if they would like to make changes to their profiles.

- Tape Room research included U of MN regent selection, 2002 transportation bonding, St. Paul sales tax, groundwater issues, Anderson windows lawsuit, voluntary leaves of absence for state workers, no credit for time served in juvenile facilities, & low income housing.
- Ten minutes after the Legislative Advisory Comm. meeting on unallotment ended, two people (state agency & the press) were in the Tape Room looking for the tapes. (We were actually able to track them down & make them available. In addition I asked Barry if he could get the video on the Web quickly. He did it in 15 minutes. Our patrons were very impressed.)
- Paul assisted the Senate with compiling examples of committee minutes for their Committee LA training.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- We gave a lot of tours to new legislative staff, college classes, and the occasional member of the public. Sarah described one tour. "I gave a tour to some fellows from the Education Policy Fellowship Program of the U of M--six in all, seven including Dan Loritz, the co-coordinator. He had a lot of fun pulling out his personality file--he was Perpich's legislative liaison. They loved the library, and were thrilled when I showed them the bill tracking features on the website. They actually gasped when I showed them they could view and listen to tapes of committee hearings for the past few years. It was most refreshing."
- Robbie was a panelist at a Minnesota E-Democracy sponsored forum, "The New & Elections and Online Advocacy in Minnesota." The attendees were very appreciative of the Legislature's Web site. One person said that if cuts were anticipated that would affect the site, people should "storm the Capitol."
- Robbie spoke on the Library's resources and the Legislative Web Site at a Hamline graduate school class on the legislative process, taught by Professor David Schultz.

Training and meetings attended by staff

- Syble and Randi attended a state webmaster group presentation on XML.
- All staff who had not attended sexual harassment training in the last five years attended a session.
- Leif attended a Revisor's XML project meeting. This project is now called Xtend.

Fan mail!

- Our interlibrary loan service is appreciated. Alissa alerts the borrowers when materials come in, and frequently receives thank you notes like this recent one, "Thank you very much. You LRL folks are the best! I'll walk over now to pick it up."
- A happy Senate LA wrote to Alissa, "Thanks so much, could you just stick it in interoffice mail? Thank you, thank you, thank you!" Another Senate LA wrote to Elizabeth, "Thank you very much for your quick response to my request. Have a great day!"
- Sometimes the thanks we get is so nice, but seems effusive for just providing some statistics or an article the person needed. Carol heard, "Thank you! Everyone in the library is awesome!" Some such responses that Robbie received in February were, "Wow! Excellent and prompt Robbie! Many thanks!" "Perfect! Thanks!" and "Thank you Robbie you are sooooo efficient."
- As in almost any library, we get calls from anxious parents helping their children with school reports. Here's a very grateful response from one mom. "Dear Nicole: Hannah and I would like to thank you so much for all your help. I had to go out for the evening, but now that I've returned, I've just gone to the websites you suggested and printed out the info for Hannah to read. She is in bed or I'd have her writing this personally she was so relieved to finally get an answer. We really appreciate the time and effort you put in toward Hannah's project. And thanks for providing the info so quickly. We have some agates that Hannah's great grandfather polished himself and pictures that we took while camping along the North Shore, so I think her project will be a success. We will be sure to give you a lot of credit! It is so nice to find someone so willing to go the extra mile and help another person out. Take care and thanks again. Sincerely, Mary"
- David heard from a researcher, "Thanks again, David, for the valuable info you have provided me on this topic. You sure can cut to the chase in locating any and all relevant info on every topic we can think of! That's really helpful. Thanks again."
- Carol helped genealogists: "Dear Carol Blackburn, I'm a little slow responding but no less appreciative of your response to my request for the Tax List legislation. It was just what I needed. You will find your reference in the next issue of the "Minnesota Genealogist." Thank you again for your help. Erv Chorn"
- Paul wrote to all our staff, "Our hard work is appreciated. I was just assisting Rep. -- with a question and before he left he said "You guys are so great up here."

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - January 2003

It's a new year, a new session, and a time of change due to lower staffing – in the Library and in the Legislature. Lots of Library staff have been making trips to the Capitol because of the lack of House and Senate pages to deliver materials. Scott Magnuson (of Senate Information) said it is too bad that the high school and college kids who normally do it don't have this great opportunity to learn about the Legislature by working here, but that everyone in the Senate is getting more exercise by delivering materials themselves.

Administration

- The Department of Administration finished the new Lot D parking lot, so the last of our staff parking across the street and in outlying lots were able to move close to the SOB. Also, Leif and Elizabeth were *so nice* and gave up spots on the ramp roof so that staff from the LCC commissions could have more ramp parking. (Commission staff members have *never* had a fair share of ramp spaces.)
- Robbie and Lisa helped with the final preparations for the legislative Horizons conference. Lisa coordinated the signup, maintained lists of attendees, and made the name tags. Robbie helped with planning and registration. Sarah and Jess attended. The conference had fewer attendees than anticipated, but everyone who had the chance to hear the keynote speaker, David Gergen, were well-rewarded.

Saving money...

- This category will include instances of new ways we have found to save money, to stretch our budget dollars. Looking for ways to save money is not a new Library activity – really, no one can touch Lisa in the “stretch the supplies and equipment dollars” category! But in this budget-paring time, it is good to let staff know what is being done. As background, a document detailing overall Library budget-cutting strategies, “Budget Cuts 2003,” is included with this report.
- David worked with staff at DocuComm to save money for state agencies paying for microfiche of their documents through the State Documents Program. We discovered that up to 1993, the resolution was at 40 frames per fiche, a much more economical resolution than the current 26 frames per fiche. We asked DocuComm to change the resolution back to 40 per fiche; agencies will need fewer fiche per document and save money.
- We need to transfer a years' worth of committee hearing audiotapes to the State Archives each year, and have to buy special audiotape boxes, to the tune of several hundred dollars. Robbie and Randi met with Bob Horton, the State Archivist, and agreed that we could use cut down bankers boxes instead (provided by the Archives). This will mean more work for Paul in transferring them, and won't be as convenient for Archives staff and patrons to use, but seems a reasonable solution for now. Hopefully in the future we can get the hearings digitized and we won't need the boxes at all! (Another budget challenge....)

Web

Development

- Leif switched the Library's Website over to the new shorter domain name, www.lrl.leg.mn.
- Syble finished making CD backups of all the Senate audio archives from 2002, with the exception of two sessions that will have to wait to be put on DVDs – they are too large for one CD! Lisa is following up, making a

second copy. (We are very serious about keeping backups of this irreplaceable data.)

- Syble created a form for the web site that will be substituted for the mailto links on the footer of the each page. Rather than "mailto:www@library.leg.state.mn.us" we will have a link to "Comment Form" where the user will be taken to a comments form. This will be sent to webmaster@lrl.leg.mn. The "www" alias will be deleted when this goes live to help eliminate some of the spam the refdesk is receiving. Because the current www e-mail address has been harvested so many times, the reference desk staff have to wade through more than a hundred junk mail messages each day.(!) The change should happen in February.
- Syble updated, improved, and tested the programming that drives the asp pages. She also deleted test and other extraneous files on the web server.
- We are now running asp pages for everything but the LNET and Zona web sites. All of these asp pages depend on files called "includes". These includes are the files that are edited and other portions of the web page that are consistent on every page, such as the footers. When we change these include files the pages change automatically. This makes our web site more consistent and easier to manage. It also allows the web server to operate more efficiently.
- *(Project update on the Legislators Past & Present database.)* Syble updated programming for the LegDb interface to include most term data information. She updated the database on the web server to include the latest data entries so that staff can search the full database that includes Andrew's data entry.
- Leif, Syble, Randi, and Robbie attended the January 29 LNET meeting. Syble handed out updated Web Site statistics.

Security Activities

- Leif ran and Syble attended an LSIG meeting.
- Leif spent many hours working on with Jana and Troy on implementing and configuring the new IDS (intrusion detection system).
- Syble updated the network diagram and met with other LSIG- Incident Response Team members to go over the newly installed Intrusion Detection System device.
- Leif worked on several firewall problems, one of which was why the primary firewall went out to lunch and failed over to the secondary firewall... Leif noted, "It's a good thing we have two firewalls setup in hot standby mode."

Information Systems Activities

- Lisa's biggest accomplishment in January, and the activity that took up most of her time, was upgrading all staff computers to Windows 2000. Each person's configuration is standardized and up to date. This meant ghosting the new configuration onto a new box for each user and then configuring their personal options. There is more IS administration with Windows 2000 than there was with Windows 98, but it was a critical upgrade for library staff in order to be able to run all software needed to their jobs.
- Ruth made many changes to the patron address database because of all the new staff in the House and Senate offices. She also made a global change, shortening all the House e-mail addresses to '@house.mn.'
- Lisa installed a replacement printer in the Reference staff area, and set up printer drivers for all reference staff to access the new printer.
- Lisa researched a problem that circulation staff were having keeping default printer settings after they logged into the taperoom and circ desk computers as themselves. She found a way to address this by editing their registries.
- Leif set up and configured 2 new network attached storage servers. One is currently in use for video archives and electronic documents.
- Leif worked with Intertech on several IP authentication problems.

Collections Activities

- Leif attended a Revisor's XML IT meeting (project is now called XTEND).
- Most reports mandated by the Legislature are due in January or February, and Jess reported that they began to stream in. Remarkably, they seem to be labeled more clearly this year than in past years.
- We receive lots of 'gifts' when there is an election and those leaving office donate many materials as they clean out their offices. Jess reported, "A fierce stream of gifts was flowing in constantly too, especially from Moe and Ventura's offices, and some cool stuff came in."
- This January, we began a project to save or scan all mandated documents in a given year, so that the full text will be available through our online catalog. We will also scan other documents – older Minnesota documents, for example – if requested. This project will give us experience for the possible future option of keeping all state documents in electronic format. *January activities:* Leif, Syble, Elizabeth, Helen, Sarah and David met several times to discuss a file structure and naming convention for the saved documents. Randi, Elizabeth and David met several times to discuss the logistics, philosophy and workflow of the project. It was decided that we would save. The naming convention of the files includes using the MNDOC number or an assigned accession number for non-MNDOC mandated documents. Leif is putting the finishing touches on the scanner and Randi, Elizabeth and David are meeting soon to wrap up some workflow issues.
- Sarah met several times with Alissa to work on copy cataloging as well as train her to edit MARC records on PALSTAC. Alissa will add and modify URLs in the catalog as needed, making it easy for our users to get to the electronic version of a document when it exists.
- Several legislative offices produce fine reports and we acquire them and keep them for future generations of researchers. House Research has a notable number of fine reports, including a new series of "Short Subjects" this year. Jess commented, "The main thing that was out of the ordinary in January was finishing up creating INDIVIDUAL RECORDS for the House Research Short Subjects...I think there are about 121 or so at last count? They are sharing a PALS record, but needed individual item records. A real pain."
- Barcoding is continuing, albeit at a slower pace due to session. Alissa is continuing in the circulating collection. The reference librarians are sometimes squeezing in a few minutes early in the mornings. David worked on various barcoding problems. He predicted, "When this project is done, our database will be the cleanest it has ever been."

Reference activities

- Randi, Betsy, and Elizabeth assisted Lee Meyerson with training of the new senators. It was fun to meet the new Senators and tell them about the Legislature's web site (not just the Senate's web page!) and services the Library offers.
- To make the ongoing task of publishing "Just In" annotations on the Web, Carol created a document in G:Share\Ref titled "JustInWriteups." It is a handy place to go for instructions if you forget the procedure, and a place to store annotations for future use.
- Alissa noted that, "Interlibrary loan requests from our patrons (and from other libraries) have been increasing, presumably with the start of Session and a new semester."
- David, Randi, and Elizabeth met several times to figure out how to handle the distribution of Andrew's responsibilities. They tried to spread out his responsibilities so no one person took too big a hit. Randi was able to reduce the number of materials that we file because they are now available electronically (PUC orders are one of those things.)

- In order to catch articles in our new magazines for our personality files, anytime an article appears in any periodical on a legislator or commissioner or constitutional officer, the scanners will note the topic, "Minnesota personalities." Nicole will receive the list of citations as an Inside Issues subscriber and have them copied for the files. This will enable us to be more consistent in getting articles on legislators and others in periodicals such as *Hmong Times*, etc. into the files. Ruth made this change to the database, and also added a couple of other topics that are being scanned specifically for individual legislators.
- During the past interesting gubernatorial administration, Sarah faithfully documented the events (antics?). We will keep a copy of the now-complete timeline on the Web and in the reference collection. So if you ever need to know when something happened, in order to go to the clippings, you could just search the timeline. When was the reference to the Bunny Ranch? When did he have the tiff with Carol Molnau, or Senator Dean Johnson? You can find out quickly.
- During session the House pages work on group projects, doing their research in the Library. A few years ago we discovered it worked much better to have a guide ready for the students, rather than answer the same questions 20 times over. This month they researched the .08 BAC issue. Carol and Betsy put together a handy guides to help the students get the materials they needed.
- Sarah edited Minnesota Issues pages, as they came in. With the beginning of session, Issues pages editing has been necessarily sidelined in favor of more pressing demands (only Paul and Sarah were able to meet the original December 31 deadline). At a recent reference meeting, we set a loose deadline for end of session, with an agreement to update the pages as new information is released, and Randi added the Issues to the Link Check to take care of any broken links.
- The reference librarians have created and verified many historical lists and posted them on the Web. Governor Pawlenty's new Web site uses (and credits the Library for) our historical list of governors on its "Governor's Office and History" page.

- Elizabeth reported, "I got a call from someone in state government who called about the bill she received for the microfilming of reports she had sent to the Library. I told her about what the six copies are for and how the depository libraries get the microfilm and how it is available around the state, etc., expecting to be reamed about how much it cost her agency. But her response was, "what a great system!""
- Elizabeth talked to the aides about their additional duties and they told her that the folding of the many publications we send out was very time consuming and tedious. Robbie talked to House Duplicating again and the end result was that the aides are going to be using House Duplicating's folding machine a couple of times a week. The aides are happy to be rid of that tedious job (and we don't have to look into buying a folding machine!).

- Legislative history research this month included the Atty. Gen. Off. review of Allina, Target Center, vulnerable adults, athletic trainers, photographic evidence for traffic signal violations, employment age discrimination, & numerous requests related to the Amateur Youth Golf Course dollars allocated in 1998.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- The librarians gave an incredible number of tours to new staff and members and interns, and even some members of the public; 96 people in all. About the biggest group, Sarah noted, "I gave a tour to some 30-odd senate interns this morning, who laughed at my jokes and listened attentively to my spiel. It was very refreshing."
- Robbie spoke (for the fourth year in a row) on the Legislative Web Site to a Continuing Legal Education Seminar on "The Legislative Process." "The highest praise I received was when Doug Kelly, who was also a speaker, said he was impressed how I handled the situation when the local firewall prevented my getting into the Revisor's system. "I've never seen anyone so calm with technical difficulties," he said." About 115 new people learned about the Legislature's information on the Web.

- Robbie attended the PALS Deans/Directors meeting, where the discussion of possible HESO budget cuts to MNLINK, the new statewide online catalog system, was unremittingly grim.
- Paul attended a MnLINK ILL Policy Subcommittee meeting.
- Randi attended the Attended Special Libraries Association Leadership Summit in New Orleans (Note: Paid for by SLA; Randi is currently president of the Minnesota chapter of SLA.)
- Randi attended an SLA chapter board meeting and tour of the St. Paul Public Library.

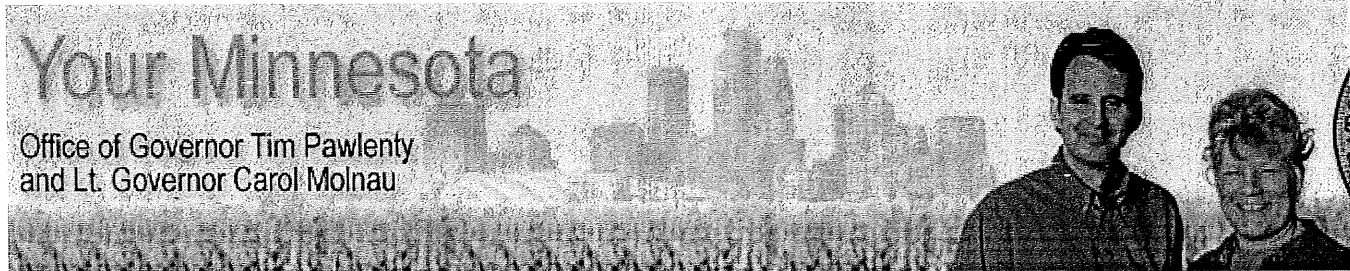

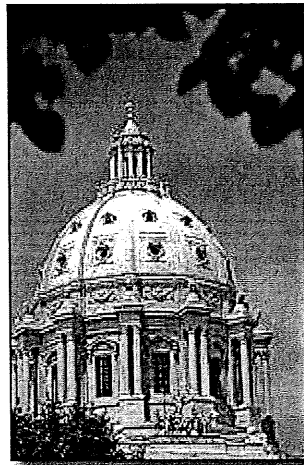

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report – December 2002

Administration

- The building engineers were not able to coordinate our new keypad access to the Library with the handicapped access switch. As a result, we now have a switch to the handicapped access mechanism that has to be turned off at night when closing down the Library.
- Robbie, Ruth, and Lisa continued planning and helping with the January Horizons conference for legislators and staff. Ruth created name badges.
- In preparation for the switch to a biweekly payroll in January, staff members attended meetings and planned their choices as to how to manage the 'payback' of ten days of work.
- Ruth took care of a biennial task. She updated the patron database, taking off the non-returning legislators and adding the new.
- Several staff members at the Historical Society are coordinating an oral history project to try to capture the experiences and expertise of key government officials. Robbie was invited to a focus group meeting, along with several former legislators, a couple of lobbyists, and several Historical Society staff.

Web Development Activities

- Randi worked with Syble and reference staff to merge the LRL Internet and Intranet sites. With Syble's coding, Randi's organization and coordination, and librarians' editing of the various pages, we now have a combined site to serve our internal clientele and the public at large. Some links to fee-based services are visible only to our primary clientele.

Collections activities

- The Librarians discussed our 'holding library' scheme – a topic that is so confusing and fraught with complications due to decisions made in years past. This time we decided that Helen will apply her logic and expertise to the quandary, and recommend the best course to follow.
- Several staff met to discuss retaining documents in electronic format. As a result, a task force is determining an appropriate file naming scheme for storing documents on our archived storage server in an organized manner. We will attempt to retain as many mandated reports as possible

in digital format, on our server, beginning with those received in January, 2003.

- Ruth edited and updated the Magazine Guide and the Subject Guide to the Magazine Guide.
- David spent a lot of time with fixing barcoding problems. He noted, "Barcoding really forces you to confront all the historical nuances of a collection."
- Ruth edited her reports that create the 3 state agency periodical lists to have links to the other 2 pages.
- Ruth created labels of MN Doc numbers so they can be used in place of the number stamper. The numbers will be clearer, and can be applied/assigned by more than one person. An efficiency improvement – small, but useful.
- Kelly processed 39 Added Volumes, withdrew 3 items from the collection, copied 138 Contents Page Articles, claimed 41 missing Periodical issues, and continued to barcode the added volumes of Minnesota documents.
- David worked on the new *Magazine Guide* and contents page service letter.
- David finalized the first shipment of consultant's reports to the Minnesota Library Access Center (MLAC). The little-used older consultant's reports will be available within a short time period.

Reference activities

- We switched from paper delivery to electronic only access for Minnesota Tax Court decisions, Workers Compensation Court of Appeals decisions, and the Department of Administration Advisory Opinions. In all three cases the Web sites will be cataloged. Staff time will be saved in filing these infrequently used materials, as well as the time spent regularly weeding them. Thanks to Randi and David for coordinating this.
- Ruth, Robbie and Elizabeth discussed creating weekly reports of new agency reports to send to committee administrators. Ruth created data entry screens and a report, so that Robbie and Elizabeth and Robbie could identify which agencies fell into the jurisdiction of each committee. (Note: This project was halted when it was deemed not valuable enough in light of how much time it would take.)
- With Andrew's departure, Elizabeth arranged for his filing duties to be covered by other staff. Toshi will take over the filing of EAWs, Office of Health Facility Complaints Investigative Reports, Administrative hearings, and Board of Medical Practice certification of disciplinary actions.
- Ruth created reports to use with the new Contents Page

listserv service. She first created the reports in Access but had problems and had to recreate in R&R. :(She edited the Contents Page system menu screen and added a button to update the listserv files.

- Ruth sent 140 letter to current Contents Page users letters, asking for updates and if they would like to receive the pages through email.
- Ruth edited the Just In web page to include the essay at the beginning. We did this so that our legislative users could choose to view the Web page instead of receiving the printed version. They will still receive the valuable essay.
- Ruth created a form to be attached to the next edition of *Just In*, asking patrons if they would prefer email notification instead of the printed version.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Randi, Elizabeth, and Betsy participated in PC training for new senators, focusing on Web research, the Legislative Web site, and the Library's Web site.

Training and meetings attended by staff

- Paul participated in the MnLINK ILL policy meeting. He placed follow up calls to libraries that did not complete the ILL survey, and edited and suggested changes to the partners list document.
- Robbie participated in an NCSL conference call of the Technology Committee members.

Staff news

- Andrew resigned to move to Albuquerque.
- The staff enjoyed traditional holiday celebrations. An afternoon gathering at Fern's, where some notable White Elephant gifts made a reappearance. The annual taco potluck was held the week before Christmas. On December 11 staff brought in cookies for all our clients to enjoy.

Paul compiled a list of Minnesota Governors and their ages when they assumed office ages when they took office, for a Star Tribune reporter. The information was used in an article and the reporter wrote, "This is a great document. Thanks again Paul and cc this to your boss. The public is served!"

Administration

- Robbie, Randi, and Syble attended a breakfast sponsored by MACAE, the Minnesota Association of Continuing and Adult Educators. They accepted an award on behalf of LNET. The Minnesota Legislative Web Site won the "Outside Contributor's Award," as a excellent resource for adult education.
- Randi prepared for Betsy's return from maternity leave.

Web Development Activities

- Right after the election Randi and Elizabeth created a great page on the turnover statistics.
<http://www.leg.state.mn.us/lrl/histleg/turnover.asp>
- Randi convened a meeting to discuss the combination of our LRL Internet site and the Intranet we provide for legislative use. We decided to merge the sites, and use IP restriction to allow legislative users to have access to the cost-based services.
- Ruth added photos of the Representatives to the LegDB.
- We discovered that several organizations are using our LINKS TO THE WORLD on their sites, usually with attribution, but sometimes without attribution, and sometimes without having the most updated list. In general, we don't mind other sites using our LINKS, but we appreciate attribution.
- The new North Star portal went live this month. Randi is one of the content managers for the government page. She spent time testing the new interface.

Collections activities

- We are being required to switch to OCLC's new Connexion cataloging software, and Helen has been working with the preparations. She reported, "I worked with Lisa on getting labels to print using OCLC Connexion and the OCLC labeling program. Lisa did a great job of figuring how to use the new program. I also created constant data records on Connexion and now I need to meet with Sarah and Alissa to decide when to switch the cataloging production to

Information Systems activities

Connexion.”

- Kelly finished barcoding the Reference Collection and started barcoding the Circulating Collection.
- The House changed its network address translation , which means Leif had to make sure that all the services we deliver to House computers via IP range were changed. Later, House staff had problems accessing Newslibrary, and it turned out that they are using an IP range that they did not report to us initially. We contacted Newslibrary, and got the service up and running again. A benefit of this was that several House staff learned that it was the Library that is paying for the service.
- The librarians are discovering that scanning to a pdf file is a quick and easy way to send information to requestors.
- Ruth edited the Inside Issues - Books & Reports and Just In reports. She added a new statements if the document is cataloged as internet only.
- Lisa upgraded the Public PC's 3 and 4 to Windows 2000 with IE 6, Adobe reader 5.0. Because the public PC's no longer have to log into the file server, we will have a more secure environment. Lisa has a ghosted image of each machine and can put that back in place should someone figure out a way to hack our public computers.

Reference activities

- We received several requests for the CORE Reports, as it was rumored that Governor-elect Pawlenty may use them in his plans for restructuring government. We scanned the short ones and portions of others. Carol and Randi wrote a Minnesota Issues Guide on CORE, available on the Library's Web site.
- The librarians will visit all the new legislators, minus those new senators who were former House members. Each librarian has a list of ten, and they sent out an initial welcome letter shortly after the election. David had the first legislator tour, on November 15. Robbie received responses from two new legislators and provided them with information they requested.
- Elizabeth convened a session planning meeting, to deal with all the annual publications and projects that are conducted each year.
- Elizabeth, Sarah, Carol, David, Paul, Helen, Randi, and Robbie reviewed the Web sites of several state agencies, to see whether there are documents available online that we have not received in the Library. Our discoveries were as expected. Some agencies are very thorough in sending their

documents; others are very derelict!

- Paul completed the LRL portion of the MNLINK ILL policy survey.
- Ruth changed Inside Issues topic Environment to Environment/Natural Resources. Also added the Forestry subtopic.
- Sarah and Robbie edited the 2003-2004 library brochure. Lisa did the layout of the brochure and business cards in Pagemaker and arranged for the printing.

- Paul, Jess, Randi, Sarah, David, and Robbie attended a useful seminar for legislative staff on the revised format of the biennial budget documents from the Department of Finance.
- Carol and Sarah attended the annual State Data Center conference, with updates on all the latest census information.
- Randi attended ASP training.

- And another unsolicited e-mail about the Legislative Web site, "Thank You for the well done site. I appreciate good work. John Brogger, Northfield, 55057-5440"
- Another e-mail from a satisfied member of the public: "Dear Carol, Thanks for the quick assistance. I appreciate the help. I will start with the link you provided to see what the state statutes are, then move to local ordinances with help from the county if I can't get my question answered from the state statutes. - After Robbie helped a newly-elected legislator, she wrote, "Thank you for your assistance. I appreciate your promptness."

Pawlenty at 42: He'll be state's youngest guy since the '70s

Gov.-elect Tim Pawlenty, who will be the youngest Minnesota governor since Wendell Anderson took office in January 1971, turned 42 Wednesday.

Pawlenty subtly emphasized his relative youth during his campaign, but he is not among the youngest to serve as the state's governor. Fifteen of Minnesota's 38 governors since statehood in 1858 were younger than 42 when they were sworn in, according to the Legislative Reference Library.

The youngest by far was Republican Harold Stassen, known as the Boy Governor, who began a distinguished career in state and national politics in January 1939, at age 31.

In the past half century, other governors younger than Pawlenty, and their age on the first day in office, include: DFLer Anderson, 37, 1971; DFLer Orville Freeman, 36, 1955, and Republican C. Elmer Anderson, 39, 1951.

A spokesman for Pawlenty's transition team, Tim Morin, said Pawlenty spent the day in meetings with his staff. He planned to celebrate his birthday quietly at his Eagan home in the evening with his wife, Mary, and their two daughters.

Today, Pawlenty and his family will be delivering Thanksgiving dinners with the Meals on Wheels program, Morin said.

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report – October 2002

When sad or momentous events occur, we move a television out to the Reading Room so that staff and visitors can follow the latest news. What a sad occasion it was this month to bring it out on the day of Senator Wellstone's death.

Administration

- Robbie attended the NCSL Legislative Research Librarians Professional Development Seminar in Bismarck. "I was chair of the group, and this PDS was my responsibility. Luckily, it was in North Dakota and Marilyn Johnson did a fabulous job with local arrangements. We had a great turnout – attendees from 22 states. The conference sessions were interesting, informative, and interactive. The same could be said for the social functions!"
- Robbie also attended the NCSL Legislative Staff Coordinating Committee meeting in Maine. She was appointed to the technology committee and will be spending time this year working on the development of NCSL's 50-state bill tracking system, and improvement of the NCSL Web site in general.
- Lisa set up caller ID for the few staff members who were interested. She worked with Chad on getting caller ID on the second line. If implemented, all staff will automatically have this feature.

Web Development Activities

- The new, improved FAQ was made available on the legislative web site at <http://ww3.house.leg.state.mn.us/leg/faqtoc.asp>. Mike Speiker, House Webmaster, provided the coding; writing and editing was done by Randi, Betsy, and Carol (and Michele Kibinger from the House Public Information Office). Randi completed a follow-up project that involved deleting all the files that were no longer needed because of the FAQ. She also did a lot of link clean-up.
- Due especially to the hard work of Randi, Syble, and Andrew, all of the LRL Web pages moved to .ASP format. This allows a standardized format and the ability to make one change to a sidebar, header, or footer, and have it appear – uniformly – on ALL the pages.
- The sidebar changes were rolled into a larger project of implementing a new server and moving the files. It went amazingly smoothly, but that was due to much planning and

preparation. Beforehand, Leif worked with Syble, Randi, and Lisa on the server and workstation tasks that needed to be accomplished before/during the web site transition. During the transition, Leif held a meeting with interested staff to explain the changes and the reasons they were needed.

- Randi joined the North Star Theme Managers group for the government theme. Joel Ludwigson of Finance and Elizabeth Kemling of the Office of Technology are also working on this theme. This time, the revamp of the North Star site may actually come to fruition sometime in November. Randi's expertise will be of great help to this executive branch Web portal, and she can ensure that the Legislature is highlighted and linked to appropriately.
- Randi convened a meeting to discuss whether we need to continue offering a separate intranet for legislators and staff, or whether the specialized content of the intranet could be incorporated into the public LRL site. For now, we will make links between the library Intranet for the legislature and our Internet site, and make necessary updates to both sites. We will reconsider the combining issue after the 2003 session.
- Robbie spoke with Deb Ricci about the Legislative Web site. The LNET group will be receiving an award from MACAE, the Minnesota Association of Continuing and Adult Educators, for the Legislative Web site and its value to adult learners.
- Leif worked with Syble to figure out backup issues for the web site.

Collections activities

- David announced in mid-October, "Carol finished the MLRA smart monograph barcodes!!!!" Now that the circulating collection is finished, staff will begin barcoding Minnesota documents.
- David, Jess, and Robbie spoke with John Heinz from the Department of Finance about obtaining state documents from the agency. He volunteered to be a contact, to get us on all the e-mail notification lists for new items, and to conduct a seminar for librarians on budget documents throughout the whole budget cycle.
- The barcoding process has uncovered several problems with old Minnesota documents, and serials in which some items are in print, and some in microfiche. It arises from 30 years of history, and occasional changes in cataloging practices. It makes for difficult troubleshooting, and meetings in which Elizabeth is forced to say, "This discussion makes me

agitated.”

- During the barcoding we weeded many items, which had a happy side effect. Elizabeth reported, “The weeding that has occurred as part of the barcoding project has made Nicole very happy. The shelves are no longer packed full and bursting out onto the floor. It has made it easier for her to shelve books and it is easier for everyone to find books. Nicole has been working hard on keeping the shelves straightened. They look great!”
- OCLC cataloging software is changing; Helen gives the following synopsis: “Connexion is OCLC's new cataloging system. At this time it is accessible via a web browser. A Windows version of Connexion is scheduled for release next Spring. Passport, our current OCLC software, will retire on December 31, 2003. We are just starting to migrate to Connexion. Lisa and I have started working on label production. After Lisa and I get labels to print, then Sarah and I will set up our constant data records. We hope to migrate to Connexion in the next several months, so that we are comfortable with Connexion before we migrate to Aleph. Unfortunately, from what I've seen of Connexion so far, I am not impressed with the system. I think (it is possible I've missed something) that we will lose our ability to spell check and our ability to program function keys. OCLC Connexion is not an enhancement of Passport, it is a totally different type of system.”
- David, Sarah, and Helen figured out a way to add internet-only records to our new publications notification. A standard line will be added to these records, asking users to call a librarian if they need help with a site.
- Barcoding affected Kelly's job. She continued to barcode the Reference Collection added volumes. She also withdrew 119 items from the collection. That number is high because the circulating collection was being weeded while being barcoded. No use barcoding items we don't even need!
- Ruth created labels saying 'Fiche Only, Do Not Give This Paper Copy Away' for Kelly to put on the extra copies of MN docs. that will only be kept in fiche. We realized that when we choose to keep some documents 'fiche only' we don't have ANY access to them until the fiche come back from DoccuCom – we need to ensure that the spare paper copies are around until the fiche come back.
- Planning began in earnest for the conversion of analog audiotapes of House and Senate floor debates and

activities

committee hearings into digital format. The eventual goal is to give our users access to all of our legislative history materials on the Web. We will begin by conducting tests to see just how long it will take to convert the tapes. We purchased two high-speed tape decks, and will hook them to computers with conversion software. Will it go quickly? Will it be relatively easy to monitor? How long will it take to convert a year or biennium of old tapes? We'll find out! - or at least be able to make more educated guesses. Lisa began work on some of the details of the conversion process. How can we strip off dead space? Will we be required to do some manual post-processing for the tapes? Once Lisa has figured out a good process, she will turn over the next steps to Paul.

- Ruth created a draft report of newly acquired docs sorted by agency for a new project we may start to notify committee staff of reports by agencies under their jurisdiction.
- Leif prepared our server rack for Computer room getting cleaned and painted.
- Leif set up Terminal Services on the new WIN2000 server, LEG-LRL-SQL. This will allow remote access for server and database administration.
- Leif worked on the MAPI protocol in an attempt to get R&R report Writer to work with our email gateway. He has not found an optimal solution yet.
- Lisa ordered four new workstations for staff.

Reference activities

- The librarians concluded several months of handling requests sent in to the North Star site (for a staff person who was on medical leave). Elizabeth Kemling wrote, "Thanks, Randi, for all the help you and your staff provided while I was out."
- Randi and Elizabeth figured out how to put the legislator turnover data on the Web. We wanted it up before the election. Syble and Andrew did the technical work.
- Elizabeth and Leif continued planning for the conversion of the Table of Contents service to electronic delivery.
- This is a heavy month for newspaper coding, with all the election coverage. As we have learned, electronic access may not always be dependable, and our paper files are a valuable historical resource.
- The librarians received several questions regarding polling places, so Elizabeth drafted a "canned e-mail" that could be customized for questions on the topic. We often compose standard answers to frequently asked questions.
- The reference librarians met to discuss writing new

- “Minnesota Issues” guides, and editing the existing guides.
- The public services staff met to discuss pre-session preparations.
- Elizabeth, David, Paul, Alissa, and Robbie spoke with Dave Paulson and Candace Lund from MINITEX. It was a very interesting and far-ranging discussion of interlibrary loan electronic and print delivery, the University archive facility (MNLAC), and Ariel document delivery software. We were told that we are very good at sharing our resources. We lend about 200 items a year, and always respond within three days.
- Randi listened to online presentation on the OCLC Digital Library initiative. OCLC has been developing the capacity to store digital documents at a permanent URL. “It sounded rather promising,” she reported.
- Several staff met to discuss the next steps in the development of the Legislators Past & Present database. It was decided that Andrew would continue with data entry for legislators in the biennia back to 1990. This should take until about March, at which time we can evaluate whether there is enough data to offer it over the public Web. We will work on refining the display screens in 2003.

- Is Rick Kahn related to Representative Kahn? Paul wrote: "Elizabeth & I were able to determine that he wasn't her son but couldn't tell if he was related in any other way. I called her to find out, here's her response: Rep. Phyllis Kahn just called the circ desk and informed me that she is NOT related to Rick Kahn. She was laughing and suggested that perhaps we take a survey, to see if the people who are asking sound hostile or not."

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Tape Room research included auto glass company incentives, the 1995 House salary study, tax increment financing, campaign finance (Pawlenty case), card clubs at the race track, and tax exemptions for low income housing.
- Ruth continued work on the Tape Room database. She created new 'audio digital file' and 'video digital file' fields since we often have both formats.
- Paul and Leif met to discuss the procedural details of the audiotape digital conversion project. Leif worked with Lisa, figuring out the technical details of the conversion.

Training and meetings attended by staff

- David gave a library tour to a temporary House Research assistant.
- Paul participated in the MnLINK ILL subcommittee meeting. They finalized plans for the ILL policy survey.
- Paul and Alissa attended the PALS/ILL user group meeting. Leif attended the Systems meeting, David the Reference User Group meeting, and Sarah the Catalogers User Group meeting.
- Leif and Robbie attended two user needs meetings convened by the Revisor's Office for the XML bill drafting system project.
- Leif and Robbie attended a content management seminar. It was useful for general concepts.
- Leif met with Greg Hubinger, Director of the Legislative Coordinating Commission, on the Security policy and other technology issues.
- Lisa attended Windows 2000 Server training at Benchmark.
- Paul and Elizabeth attended a seminar held by Mid-American Business Systems on new scanning technology for libraries. They concluded that the technology is moving in the right direction, but is still so expensive and geared towards very large operations. The scanners may be more affordable in the coming years, and we should consider a purchase then.

- David answered a question for a Senate staff person, and heard back, "Thanks, great work!! I showed Pat Flahaven and he was very impressed."
- An Illinois legislative librarian needed help finding information on library catalog issues. She wrote to Robbie, "Robbie, Thank you so much! I found the thread that discussed the automation issue. I really appreciate your help and assistance."
- Elizabeth received this thank you: "Thank you again for your diligent efforts to get the information needed about this issue....you were the best source and we appreciate all your hard work!!!!"
- A Harvard researcher was very pleased with the research we provided on party affiliations of legislators from 1945-1971. He wrote, "Thanks Robbie! This is great! We really appreciate all your help!"

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - September 2002

Administration

- Robbie sent off copies of our job descriptions to the Texas Legislative Library, where they are redrafting theirs. We're happy to comply with the request, because we worked on ours so long and hard, and think they are well-crafted.
- Robbie and Lisa met with Jenny Nash about LRL logo and letterhead design. Later, a larger group met to discuss the letterhead and logo ideas.
- Lisa met with staff from LCC, House and Senate to plan our Combined Charities event. Distributed materials for the Combined Charities Campaign and collected pledge forms from staff.
- Lisa attended an open enrollment meeting and reported changes to staff.

Web Development Activities

- Randi was a key member in a group that met and developed a common House-Senate list of subject terms. The index offices of the House and Senate now have a unified thesaurus for indexing bills. This will be used to provide people with topical updates on legislative activities through the web site. This common list will form the basis of a new Legislative Web service to be notified of bill actions by topic. Users will be able to sign up for topics and be notified whenever a new bill is introduced or a action is taken on an existing bill.
- Ruth started work on converting her automatically generated web pages to ASP format, with 'include" files. She decided this was a good time to convert remaining reports in R&R format to Microsoft reports.

Collections activities

- Robbie worked with House and Senate staff to change the requirement that we retain older bills in paper. Now that they are reliably available on the Web, and kept in paper elsewhere, the bills were not needed here and created work for the House and Senate staff to prepare and shift. Another great benefit? Ruth was able to send four filing cabinets to state surplus, freeing up valuable space in our meager storage room. Paul has been advocating this change for years, and setting the groundwork. It was a great change. Also, Toshi recycled all the bills by himself!
- Alissa began work on some trickier serials barcoding – enthusiastically. She must have enjoyed the challenge because

she said of the experience, "This is awesome!" She made good progress throughout the month.

- Each month Kelly reports the number of added volumes she processes (in September, 79). Added volumes are new editions of reports that we receive periodically. When the new edition of *Minnesota Crash Facts* comes in for example, it needs to be added to the collection and noted on the cataloging record.

Information Systems activities

- Ruth continued work on the Legislators Past and Present database – "Renamed ATLD to LegDB. Attended a LegDB meeting. Finished entering Senate photos into LegDB."
- Carol and Ruth worked on problems with missing codes in the codebook and getting it ready for printing.
- Ruth helped Linda Schmitt in the Senate Information Systems Office create an Access database for the Senate's policies and procedures document. Ruth created a sample database as a start for her.
- David and Robbie began planning a project to strengthen our contacts with state agencies and improve our acquisition of state documents.
- Leif dealt with 2 minor virus issues. Worked with Lisa to reconfigure the network virus scanning.
- Lisa started working on an update to the WINDOWS2000 ghost that will be used in the upcoming weeks to upgrade staff computers.

Reference activities

- We continued to help out the executive branch. The person assigned to answer general questions addressed to the North Star Website remained on leave, and our reference librarians continued to answer those questions.
- Carol worked with Toshi and Dave to update the newspaper coding guidelines, and the three of them held a seminar for other staff. Carol also prepared them to put on Zonanet. This was precipitated by her vacation preparation – the time when the Aides wish Carol was back and they didn't have to deal with all the inconsistent coding done by other staff.
- Sarah finished up the LINKS TO THE WORLD editing project.
- Robbie coordinated the choices for the annual Best Minnesota Documents list for the Minnesota Library Association conference. Sarah coordinated the final editing, working out many problems with inconsistent annotations, missing documents, bad urls. She ended up delivering an excellent document to the conference site at the Excel Center. Helen attended the entire conference; Robbie, David, Sarah,

Carol had to search through the newspaper clipping files covering hunting for the past several years, and noticed a pattern of press coverage for each year. The beginning of the year featured policy and legislative articles, followed by articles about licenses, then articles about the upcoming hunting season, and then articles about dead and injured hunters!

- Does the library have a copy of Skip Humphrey's budget plan when he ran for governor in 1998? (pv)
- Information on former Rep. Walt Perlt for his obituary.
- Can you find me information on that one religious group that supports choice? (It was the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice) (pv)
- What party were the state auditors from prior to 1922? (Was only able to determine it back to 1891) (pv)
- Didn't there used to be a council or something that was made up of the U of MN president, the chancellor of the state universities, the chancellor of the community colleges, the chancellor of the technical colleges, the Education commissioner, the private college council head, etc.? They would get together to discuss policy. (Higher Education Advisory Council) (pv)
- Background information on phosphorus in dishwasher detergent. (ds)
- Information on higher education finance regarding high tuition/high aid issue. (ds)
- Found information on Andrew Jaspers, who was cybersquatting on domain names taken from Minnesota legislators and legislative candidates and posting anti-abortion information instead. This was not the more publicized case of the person who was using "MYCoca-Cola.com" and "MinneapolisPublicSchools.com," but someone else, and I was only able to find the information by begging KSTP for the paragraph from their web archive. (Jaspers committed suicide shortly after the websites were published.) (sq)
- Information on state-run or -funded boot camps and "wilderness experiences" for wayward, unruly, or criminal juveniles. (sq)
- Salaries of a professor in the U of M Law School and the director of the Institute of Race and Poverty. (sq)
- Numerous questions about vehicle lights, glazing, etc., from an emergency first-responder. (sq)
- How many, and which cases argued before the Supreme Court (U.S. or Minnesota) were about freedom of speech,

obscenity and/or pornography, and originated in Minnesota? I'm certain this is why our Lexis bill was a little large this month, even though Lexis themselves devised the search strategy. I did find one interesting case that went before the MN Supreme Court in 1967, where Arnold Rose, a Representative from 1963-1964, sued for libel after being accused of being a Communist collaborator and sympathizer. (sq)

Monthly Report – August 2002

August is State Fair time. Sarah, Jess, and Lisa all worked at the House Information booth; Robbie worked for the Senate Information booth. Sarah reported, "We got a lot of positive comments about the "Do Not Call" legislation, and, as always, angry comments about taxes."

Administration

- Robbie and Carol met with a group of librarians from government, academic, and public libraries to choose notable state documents from the past year. Each year we coordinate this activity, produce a bibliography to distribute in print at the Minnesota Library Association Conference, and post the list on our Web site.
- Robbie and Lisa met with Jenny Nash, a graphic designer from the Senate, about a new logo for the Library. The last time our stationery as updated was more than 15 years ago. Jenny will produce some ideas for the staff to evaluate.
- The managers finished up the last of the staff performance reviews and Robbie completed the final paperwork for the annual raises.
- Leif, Lisa, and Ruth assembled old and dead equipment for disposal on the Department of Administration's clean-up day.
- Robbie participated in a conference call to plan the final details of the upcoming NCSL Professional Development Seminar in Bismarck.

Web Development Activities

- Randi attended several House/Senate Index topic alignment meetings. This project is underway to create a uniform list of topics for a new Web service. From the Legislature's Web site, users will be about to sign up for a bill tracking service by topic.
- Work continues on the Legislators Past and Present database. Each month Ruth makes many small changes to the tables and programming. Examples from August include adding the new 2003 districts to the tables, and adding a committee lookup table so Andrew can pick from a list of committees on the data entry screen when adding a new committee. Even though the project is far from complete or ready for public roll-out, the work done so far has proved valuable. Ruth helped Randi answer a reference question with the data already entered; she created a report of all House members who became Senate members.
- Randi diligently followed up some problems with the

Legislative Web Site search engine. Many session laws were not being indexed. A complete re-indexing of the site solved most of the problems, but the issue will require ongoing monitoring.

Collections activities

- In addition to the usual statistics on added volumes, withdrawals from the collection, articles copied from the contents page service, and missing magazines she claimed, Kelly tracked another statistic. In order to help Elizabeth figure out just how many contents pages were sent each day to some of our biggest users of the service, Kelly tracked how many she copied each day for three weeks. This was part of Elizabeth's research into changing the table of contents service to electronic delivery.

Information Systems activities

- It is not easy to maintain our legislative-wide staff directory because it is so difficult to get the information from the House and Senate, but great progress was made this month. Ruth updated the patron database using a direct link to House's SQL database. She also updated the Senate information from a list Elizabeth got.
- Our new printer has scanning capabilities. Leif set up a macro and wrote up instructions for scanning documents on the CanonIR5000i copier and saving them for sending with an e-mail message. It is a slick new feature!
- Leif dealt with Security Policy and IDS/Sniffer proposal issues for LSIG.
- Maybe no more staff members should get married or change their names. Leif and Lisa had a tricky time changing Ruth's network identity. It was way more difficult than creating a new user!

Reference activities

- Sarah edited the bibliography of readings on the Legislature used for interns by the Senate Information office.
- Every time there is a redistricting, it becomes difficult to file news clippings on the members. Since they are arranged by district, you have to decide whether to place election articles about an incumbent in the present district, or in the file of the new district. Elizabeth wrote about the decisions we made: "Because of redistricting and elections this year the placement of district clippings becomes a little more complex. Some legislators are running in a different district that they are currently representing or moving from house to senate within districts. It was decided at a reference meeting that we would not just double all the articles that are impacted by these

situations. Instead there will be a chart posted near the district clippings files that shows these alterations in district (retirements and redistricting) and there will also be a sheet of paper in the 2002 files directing patrons to other possible district files of interest. To cover all bases there will also be a sticker placed on the outside of the 2002 folders with the same information."

"For this one I contacted former INFOTERRA colleagues in those countries and got silence from everyone except Germany, which provided some good web sites in English and an apology for the slowness of the 'bureaucratic jungle'."
- Assisted members on the flood task force with finding materials related to historical flood relief efforts, solutions, & suggestions. (pv)
- tracked down many deformed frog articles for House Research staff. (pv)

Legislative History Activities

- Tape Room research included expert review certification for professional malpractice actions, comprehensive municipal planning in the Twin Cities, use of consultant contracts when state employees are available, jet skis/hours of operation, mercury in dental fillings, & domestic abuse.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Randi gave a tour to the students attending NCSL's Legislative Staff Management Institute, held annually at the Humphrey Institute.
- Robbie met with SeongYi Yun, a political science professor from Gyeongsang National University in South Korea, to

demonstrate the capabilities of the Legislative Web site and discuss e-democracy efforts by the Legislature. - Robbie attended a meeting of the ad hoc Library Leadership Coalition; the group had been meeting over the summer to discuss issues raised by the cutbacks in the Library Development Services office.
- Randi, Syble, Leif, and Robbie attended an XML seminar held by the Revisor's Office in conjunction with their pilot project for a new bill drafting and tracking system.

Staff news

The staff held a shower for Ruth, recently returned from her honeymoon in Reno.

Monthly Report - July 2002

With several people on vacation and many staff members enjoying flexible scheduling, the Library seemed quiet during much of July. That's deceptive, however, since much was accomplished on major projects, like bar coding and work on the "Legislators Past & Present" database.

Administration

- Robbie edited the Library's section on "agency purpose" for the Department of Finance budget documents. The budget process is beginning earlier than usual this year.
- Lisa stopped service on the old reference desk online searching telephone line so that we can save that cost on our phone bill each month.
- Lisa made a zip zone chart for the postage meter and wrote up instructions on how to use the new zip zones.
- Lisa set up copier training for the new IR5000i. She installed the printer driver for it on her own computer and on Ruth's. Lisa and Leif met with the technician from Ikon who showed them how to install the scanning portion of the copier functions.
- Lisa arranged for the installation of a new reference desk and a new reference desk computer. She and Leif managed to coordinate this smoothly and with minimum disruption to our main point of patron contact.
- Robbie attended the National Conference of State Legislatures Annual Meeting in Denver and began her tenure as the chair of the Legislative Research Librarians staff section.

Web Development Activities

- Ruth's continuing work on the Legislators Past & Present database included fixing the date fields to save the slashes in the data. She finished working through the blue cards - checking names and service span fields. Randi, Elizabeth, Carol, and Syble met to clear up wording questions for ATLD search and results pages. Syble worked a lot on programming - meeting with Randi & the team, programming searching and layout methods. Syble explained, "the site is entirely built around ASP which means it is programming from the bottom up. Different pieces include database connections, formulating specific queries, handling the returned data in ways that preserve the integrity of the data and format layout so the resulting web page is professional, easy to use, and attractive. This

required quite a bit of programming/reprogramming/programming some more!"

- Syble worked with the LSIG website, including a restricted area for the Legislative Incident Response Team.

Collections activities

- Bar coding continued as several staff diligently took time out from their other tasks to take their turns. David continues to have an optimistic attitude to the project, telling Paul, "There are no bar coding problems – only challenges!"

Information Systems activities

- Lisa and Leif met with Patty Anderson and Tom Holder from Intertech to try to figure out the increase in our Harbor network backup services invoice. After looking at the logs more closely they discovered that it had to do with our new network virus scanning software. We are still trying to come up with a good solution to take care of this problem.
- Lisa spent most of the month setting up new computers for staff. She set up new computers for the reference desk, circulation desk, Sarah, Carol, and the Tape Room.
- Lisa and Leif attended a demonstration of LaserFiche document management software at Office Automations.
- Leif attended a demo of Sniffer network diagnostic and monitoring software.
- Leif held an LSIG meeting and coordinated a Cisco IDS demonstration to happen at the meeting.
- Leif and Syble worked on multimedia server issues. They set up new host names for media.leg.mn and media.leg.state.mn.us.
- Leif prepared for and worked with Lisa and Alan (from Ikon) on getting the scanning features of the new copier working. Our mail gateway denied the copier from sending email outside the library, due to relay restrictions we have in place to prevent our mail gateway from being used for sending junk email. - Randi attended two meetings of the index crews from House and Senate to try to coordinate their thesauruses so we can use index terms to push actions on bills by topic to subscriber lists for the web site.
- Sarah, David, and Robbie attended the annual CALCO lunch.
- Robbie and Leif attended user input meetings for the Revisor's XML pilot project.
- Leif and Syble attended a LSIG Security Policy meeting.

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - May/June 2002

Work continues on the Library's database of biographical information on legislators of the present and past. We began a contest to name the database –immediately recognizable and short enough to fit on a Web page sidebar. So far, some suggestions are serviceable: 'Legislator Database' and 'Legislators Past and Present.' Others are more fanciful, like: 'Dead Members,' 'Legislators: Fast & Furious,' 'BioLeg,' and "Legis-Later!"

Administration

- Lisa created the annual performance review packets for staff, distributed them, and collected the completed forms. The managers began staff reviews.
- Our annual "Physical Clean-up Day" was held in May. Lisa distributed the memo with the ground rules in it and fielded questions as they arose. Thanks to Leif, Kelly and Nicole, the crawl space is the cleanest it has ever been. IS staff discarded many 5.25" floppies and old versions of software. Clearly, it was time!
- Lisa sent data to OCTanner for upcoming anniversaries of LRL staff. This will be the first time we used OCTanner for our anniversary awards. Several staff anniversary notices by e-mail. However since Leif has so impressed on them not to open URLs in e-mail from unknown sources, those who received the message were afraid to click on the URL!
- We decided to make some changes to streamline our very detailed inventory control procedures. Rather than tracking every piece of paneling and wastebasket to individual staff members, we decided to maintain an overall inventory. All of the 'product' will be tracked as "Product in Use" or "Product in Storage". Not having to track the location of product, such as desks and panels, will save Ruth much time and headache, and still allow us to know quickly whether we have a piece in storage that could solve a future need in the Library.

Web Development Activities

- Lisa ordered a new reference desk, keyboard tray and chair for the reference desk area. We have been putting off this important ergonomic change for quite some time. Happily, we were able to make the change inexpensively once we realized it cost less to have a plain desk made out of 'product' than to purchase a furniture-type desk from a catalog. Lisa then added a new computer with a flat screen. The area looks professional and is a much better ergonomic arrangement.
- Leif, Lisa, Robbie, Ruth, Dave and Toshi attended a demonstration of a new copier with scanning capabilities. We were more impressed than we anticipated, and very happy that we will be able to add this capability with our new contract.
- Lisa and Leif met with a Panasonic sales person to learn about their document management systems.
- Lisa helped Chad set up modem and telephone database software on his new computer so that he could access the telephone system. They found a problem with the telephone system in the process and worked together to solve it.
- Leif and Robbie signed up for the mn.leg domain name for five years. Note: This is the only VISA transaction Robbie does on a regular basis with Mongolia!
- ATLD (the All-Time Legislator's Database). In May, a meeting was held to discuss the long record display; later, Ruth, Leif, and Syble met to discuss details. Ruth continued work on queries, and Syble continued work on the search screens. At the very end of June, several staff met to look at prototypes of search pages, and to discuss the progress of the data entry and quality control checking for the "blue cards," covering legislators serving in the past 30 years. After Andrew finished the initial data entry Ruth started working on checking the lastname, firstname and service span fields against the blue cards. We've been able to make amazing progress on this project since Andrew returned from a leave and has had time to do the crucial data entry.
- Several CALCO librarians participated in the development of the main page of the new North Star state portal. When the project was complete, Andrew Koebrick, president of CALCO, singled out LRL and our librarians who helped, in an e-mail message: "Many thanks to the CALCO librarians (Randi, Darlene, Sunny, Barb, Eileen (did I miss anyone?)) who took topic areas under their stewardship. Special thanks to the LRL, who's link collection was plundered for content." He did miss someone – Carol also helped!

- The Library owns software to track and analyze Web site traffic, and Syble has used it to help many legislative offices track the usage of their pages. Recently, she created specialized individual Web Trends reports for the Commissions: LCC, LCSEW, LPR, GIS, & LCMR. She created reports for the 4th Quarter of 2001, 1st Quarter of 2002, and set up ongoing weekly reports that are emailed to the different commissions. She also created quarterly Web Trends reports for House Research.
- Leif and Robbie met with Michele Timmons for an overview of the XML bill drafting system pilot project. Leif and Robbie attended a user input meeting for the XML system.
- Syble worked with Anelia Milbrandt (GIS) on programming for the maps Web pages.

Collections activities

- Barcoding is underway. David discovered a bug in PALS that was preventing changes to the item record from sticking, so he changed our procedures so we avoid the bug. The reference librarians collaborated to weed and bar code the reference collection. Alissa and Nicole have been barcoding items that didn't get on the smart barcode run. Kelly has been busy barcoding serial items that new editions coming in as added volumes. David wrote up directions for applying smart barcodes and is coordinating all of the staff volunteers. Andrew will barcode the reference serials. The barcoding has revealed some errors – some old cataloging errors, some holding library errors.
- In May, Kelly processed 67 added volumes, withdrew 1 item from our collection, copied 146 Contents Page articles, updated 4 and made 7 New Local Data Records, claimed 87 Missing Periodical Issues: 25 were EBSCO, 31 were Free, 29 were Minnesota Periodicals and 2 were Order Direct. In June, she processed 92 added volumes, withdrew 34 items from the Circulating Collection, copied 2,546 Contents Pages, copied 222 Contents Page Articles. She continued the annual periodical weeding.

Information Systems activities

- Security monitoring is never-ending, and increasingly time-consuming. Many new viruses are appearing weekly. Leif noted a recent situation: "Dealt with several network security issues. Found that I had SQL server running in the background on my workstation (as a result of doing the default installation of Visio). This came to light when my workstation was being probed by the new SQL port 1433 worm. After resolving this I wondered how this attack had

gotten past the firewall. It turns out that a rule allowing unrestricted access to my workstation had inadvertently been left in the firewall rule set after troubleshooting problems with the PALS DepCon software. Crazy stuff!"

- Leif did the research for a Tape Room digitization proposal. We purchased hardware to convert the legislative history audiotapes to digital format, and will be planning the project this summer.
- Lisa and Leif worked on resolving some problems with our Harbor/LAN Backup service.
- Leif upgraded the network hubs to brand new shiny network switches. This is an improvement that is not visible but it really enhances network uptime and reliability.
- Elizabeth, Leif, and Nicole met to create a project plan for the Table of Contents electronic delivery pilot project. As background, Kelly copied 2,419 Tables of Contents pages to send out during May. We are evaluating switching this service to scanned images delivered to users via e-mail. Much paper would be saved, and delivery would be much faster. We are contemplating a switch before the next legislative session.
- Lisa and Leif installed, configured, and tweaked Netshield virus scanner on the file server.
- Leif modified the Just In listserv configuration and created the new MN State Docs discussion listserv.
- Lisa and Leif came up with a new plan to rotate computers and place new computers on staff desks. All staff computers have now been upgraded to 19" monitors (at 1024x768 resolution) and sound systems were upgraded as needed.
- Ruth converted the Contents Pages database to Access 2000.
- Lisa & Syble met to plan users & groups on the NT in preparation for the web site migration to NT.
- Syble's work on the NT server included working with Lisa on the Harbor upgrade, and refining configurations and installing patches and upgrades. She also configured emergency alerts to email and Leif's pager.
- Syble and Leif continued work with LSIG on the Security Policy; the draft policy is complete.
- Syble worked with GIS on programming issues on the Legislative District finder pages.

Reference activities

- We provide great service to members of the public – in person, on the phone, and via e-mail. Sometimes they feel they need to then contact us regularly with additional questions. The most frequent submitter of e-mail questions these days is a person who signs with the nom de plume “Butterfly for life.” (!)
- All the librarians helped a particular House Research staff member divest of ten boxes of documents she had stored. Most reports were already in the collection, but we added a few others that we felt would be important historically.
- David signed us up for a CCH online State Tax Guide trial. (We learned about usefulness of the online version from the NCSL Librarians electronic list, just as our print edition was up for renewal.) He gave Nina Manzi a tutorial on it so that House Research staff could evaluate the online product. As a result of the trials, we will be purchasing the electronic version and discontinuing the print.
- The reference librarians (plus Jess and Paul) weeded the reference collection and barcoded the collection at the same time, all in one afternoon. Our collection is in much better shape because of this effort.
- Elizabeth and Randi spent several frustrating afternoons trying to get ProCite and EndNotes to work for the lengthy bibliographies they were preparing for different legislative auditor studies. Sarah also took a look at these products. They agreed that something like them would be useful but those products weren’t quite right. Randi and Elizabeth will look for other products or improvements in these products before the next round of legislative auditor studies.
- The reference librarians began using their new reference desk in June. The new flat monitor is cool – cool in looks, which is fine, but more importantly cool in temperature. The old monitor used to send up enough heat to trip the nearby thermostat. The Library would be freezing because the thermostat thought it was warm enough already!
- Robbie and Elizabeth edited portions of the Revisor’s bill drafting manual, the sections dealing with finding other states’ laws and finding general research information. Paul Marinac wrote, “Your rewrite is great! It was exactly what we were looking for..... Thanks again to you and your staff for helping us revise the manual.”
- Elizabeth gave a one-on-one tutorial on the Legislative Web Site to an agency commissioner. Afterwards, he wrote, “Thank you so much for the instruction on the legislative website. I learned many features that will be immensely useful in my work. Thanks again. ...”

Monthly Report - April 2002

A very successful reception was held in the Library on April 17 to celebrate the Council of State Governments Eagle Award for the best Legislative Web Site. Many guests came to admire the Waterford crystal eagle, see a slide show with legislative Internet pages over time, and eat cake and appetizers. Thanks are due to all the staff who helped plan, brought food, and of course, to everyone who provides the content and technical expertise for our great Web Site.

Administration

Web Development Activities

- Randi, Syble, Carol, David, Ruth, and Robbie met at different times to discuss and develop enhancements to the State Documents Web page on the Library's site. Syble converted the documents from last summer's state documents focus group to pdf to add to the page. Ruth developed procedures for producing a biweekly list of new state government document acquisitions.
- Randi and Syble met with House Webmaster Mike Speiker to work on the revamping of the general information pages on the Legislative Web Site.
- Randi & Syble set up a project plan for moving the web files, currently on the Netscape Enterprise Server (Netware), to the Windows NT server. They are targeting early this fall for the full implementation.

Collections activities

Barcoding Activities:

- David, Alissa, Kelly, Sarah, Nicole and Helen attended barcode training all day on May 4th. Doris Selover from PALS was the trainer.
- David reported that The barcoding team met several times to discuss barcoding plans and other barcoding issues. We have a rough draft of smart barcoding plan which we think will work.
- Helen, Sarah and Alissa are now barcoding all newly cataloged items. Sarah noted, "I had the honor of entering the very first item record in conversion mode. I changed our OCLC constant data records, adding a local 949 field ("the barcode field") and even found the time to load a few item records. Kelly is barcoding added volumes and placing barcodes on new items as part of the processing procedures.

When barcoding an added volume, Kelly is taking all the volumes in the serial and conversion barcoding the older editions as well. Nicole and Alissa are barcoding the items cataloged after the smart barcode tape run and the start of the new item barcoding.

- David spent a lot of time on a PALS barcoding bug. On I discovered what was happening, I reported it to PALS and we are now taking steps to avoid the problem.
- Leif installed 5 bar code readers for staff involved in barcode project planning.
- David contacted Charlie Rogers at the State Archives about their need for the agency Minutes we ship to them. It turns out they consider our copies "a luxury" they use to fill in gaps. Since the Archives does not rely on our copies, we have decided to move to electronic only access to the minutes that are available in that format, cutting down on work in the Library.
- Lisa printed a huge 996 page document for the collection. It was a document that was put out by the Department of Administration detailing all of the Executive Branch salaries. The report was mandated, but the Department would not supply a print copy. We are concerned that it will not be retained permanently on the agency's Web site.
- Kelly processed 144 added volumes, withdrew 5 items from the collection, copied 258 Contents Page articles, copied 2,915 Contents Pages, claimed 31 Missing Periodical issues: 12 were EBSCO, 14 were Free and 5 were Minnesota Periodicals.

Information Systems activities

- Our annual electronic cleanup day was a success – again! Everyone cooperated to clean out their own directories, and the shared directories on the network. Syble created an "orphans" report for the web site in anticipation of cleanup day. Thanks to Lisa for bringing Papa Murphy's pizzas for everyone to enjoy and making all the arrangements for the day.
- We are very conscious in the Library of backing up important information.
- Syble updated the legislative network diagrams. She met with the LSIG Security Policy group and continued updating the policy.
- Leif worked with Gary Lundin from PALS on installing and setting up DepCon software that will let us print reports directly from the PALS mainframe. He spent many hours working with Jana in the Revisor's office and Intertech to resolve connectivity problems with the firewalls and routers

between us and the PALS mainframe.

- Syble and Leif met to plan web server architecture and directory structure.
- Lisa and Leif worked on streamlining the VirusScan and SpeedDisk utility functions for Win2000.
- Worked with Charlie Fastner on resolving problems with the Senate Video Multicast.
- Leif dealt with an extended power outage. That was the first time that the network and some of the servers have been turned off for almost a year!
- Leif diagnosed and resolved a very mysterious problem with MS-Access database control files. This problem was preventing multiple users from accessing both ACQ and SCAN.
- Lisa started scanning the network drives for viruses more frequently, especially user pmail directories. Keep the dat files as up to date as possible. She installed the new windows virus scanning software and cleaned a virus off of Randi's hard drive.
- Ruth finished documentation of the Inside Issues - Books and Reports system. Ruth also wrote procedures for Just In and Docs on Fiche. Made a few fixes on the system in the process. Documented the new database system. We take documentation of our systems and processes seriously – so this is great!
- Ruth had to recreate the codebook report from scratch to fix the nonprinting subject problem. Carol has a few changes to make and then we will reprint the codebook again.
- Ruth continued working on programming queries for the All-Time Legislators Database.

Reference activities

- We had some problems with access to the electronic newspapers via Newslibrary this month, on an afternoon when Elizabeth was gone, and the rest of us were unsure whom to contact. Now that's fixed! – both the access and taking care of future problems. Elizabeth wrote a great guide to past problems and who to contact in case of new problems, available to all staff on the intranet.
- Leif downloaded and installed a trial version of EndNote software for Randi, Elizabeth, and Sarah. Randi is also evaluating a trial copy of the latest version of ProCite. The reference librarians are testing these two software packages that help create polished bibliographies.
- Randi Presented LexisNexis dot commands at a reference meeting.

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - March 2002

With so much focus on electronic resources and projects, it is interesting to note that paper is good – still! A legislative employee stopped by to sing the praises of our old clippings files. Her daughter had a high school assignment and needed news clippings with pictures of the teachers strike in the 70s. Microfilm quality at the Historical Society was poor. They had tried several libraries but none had paper copies of the articles.

Also, the recent Supreme Court Tasini decision means that free-lance articles in newspapers and magazines are largely gone from online databases. Our paper clipping files will take on added importance since the electronic files are no longer comprehensive.

Administration

- The Department of Administration announced that mail would only be delivered once per day, due to budget cuts. Because we get so much mail, and our users are accustomed to early morning delivery of so many magazines and newspapers, we now send an Aide to get our mail each morning after the Library opens.
- Lisa wrote up guidelines for this year's upcoming electronic clean up day and physical cleanup day.

Web Development Activities

- Several members of the ARLD team met to discuss which reports should be generated from the database of information on legislators. They also discussed how to come up with a good methodology for advanced searching of the data. Ruth followed up by creating a couple of queries for Syble to try out on her web forms. Ruth worked on creating a date range query using the start and end term dates.
- Randi, Betsy, and Mike Speiker met to consolidate the general information about the legislature on the legislative web site. They also decided to review the current Legislative FAQ. Betsy is responsible for reviewing the 19 page FAQ for needed updates and incorporating several individual Web pages into it. The intent is to have a searchable FAQ database.
- Syble added links on the Intranet to the live video streaming from the House & Senate. These sidebar links are useful for in-house library users to access the webcast floor sessions,

too.

- Randi posted the newly revised privacy policy to the Legislature's web site. You can view it at <http://www.leg.state.mn.us/leg/help.htm#privacy>
- Ruth took the email links off the Library and Senate staff directory web pages. (This was pursuant to a concern voiced at the previous LNET meeting, that 'spammers' might harvest the names and inundate staff with junk mail.)
- Ruth met with Robbie and David about creating a list of mandated reports from the Inside Issues Books and Reports system to put on the new mandated reports web page.
- Syble worked a lot with the NT and web server to resolve connection problems between the Intranet web pages and the content "include" files. To resolve the connection problem I had to create a new web directory, "intranet", and delete the "intranet". This resulted in some confusion with web editors but all was resolved and it's working well.

Collections activities

- Barcode preparation! Leif worked with David to plan for and set up the necessary hardware and software for barcode training. Leif configured, tested, and installed new barcode reader hardware.
- Helen, David and Sarah began discussing the issues associated with cleaning up the database for the planned migration.
- David was busy planning for our barcode training. The dumb barcodes have arrived and Leif has configured the barcode scanner.
- Our latest "Just In" looked great. Ruth, Jess and David have been making small changes after each publication and each edition gets better.
- Kelly processed 57 added volumes, copied 2,038 Contents Pages, copied 161 Contents Page Articles, shelfread from HD 4975 – HE 336. She claimed 50 Missing Periodical Issues: 21 were EBSCO, 12 were Free and 17 were Minnesota Periodicals.
- Leif conducted an LNET meeting; Robbie, Randi, and Syble attended. Randi took the minutes; Syble posted them on the LNET Web site.

Information Systems activities

- Lisa and Leif worked through several WIN2000 workstation configuration issues.
- Lisa re-ghosted Leif's machine and is waiting for him to move all of his apps to it so she can swap that machine for the older computer at the reference desk.
- Lisa set up new computers for Andrew, Public 0, Public 2

and Public 3.

- Leif talked with LCC IS staff about how we would get more network connections in the taperoom. It was determined we would just run long patch cords to the wiring closet behind the taperoom as needed.
- Leif and Lisa resolved problems with MediaPlayer software and the printer at the circulation desk. They also attempted, with Syble, to resolve a problem that Syble has running version 4 of Pegasus. The problem is still not resolved.
- Lisa set up Shockwave Player on the reference librarians' PCs and Robbie's for Lexis/Nexis interface.
- Lisa changed all the rights to our users pmail folders so that the public could not see our user directories when they logged in.
- Because of printer driver problems, Ruth edited the Acquisitions system's mandate letter reports to set them to the default printer. She created reminders in the system to check the paper tray before printing letters.
- Ruth finished converting the old MN Docs database to Access 2000 and now pulls data from the Acq. system. She started creating a user manual for the system.
- Ruth finished documenting the Codebook system.
- Syble moved the "old" NT server to her desk to use as a backup server for the NT server in the basement server room and installed a KVM (keyboard, video, mouse) switch so I could use my monitor and keyboard with both computers.
- Syble continued meeting with the LSIG (legislative-wide) Security Policy group and integrated agreed-upon changes.

Reference activities

- To bring things "up to snuff" Nicole weeded the lost slips in the circulation file. She reported, "I compared the yellow slips to what Elizabeth had as "lost books". There were 64 that didn't match up! 9 of them we had replaced or gotten back, 7 of them were withdrawn from PALS but we still had the slip and the rest still had PALS records but were not on the shelf (I checked all of them) or were a copy 2. Things seem to be in good order now. I also weeded the periodical slips to bring things up to date."
- Nicole reported that there have been a ton of greater Minnesota clippings from newspaper clipping service the in the last few weeks. "Too bad I get all the news about a week and a half later than it happens."
- Leif held a brief question and answer session with the Public services staff regarding the capabilities of the new public workstation behind the reference desk.

- Number of museums, symphony orchestras, & opera houses in Berlin. (pv)
- When was the last Governor elected with no previous elected experience? (LeVander) (pv)

- Examples of Minnesota school districts that had multiple bonding requests as part of their 2001 levy request (bh)
- The recent history (last 10 yrs.) of Senate action on stadium bills. (bh)
- Redistricting media coverage around the state in 2001- how much or how little? (bh)
- How many Division 1 schools have women athletic directors? Also, the number of Final Four teams coming from schools with a woman athletic director. This was a fun question. (bh)

Monthly Report - February 2002

Web Development Activities

- Robbie, David, Betsy, Randi, and Helen met to discuss adding a page to the Legislative Intranet, describing the Library's role in tracking mandated reports.
- Randi and Syble did a great job of pulling together the electronic materials from the legislative Horizons Conference, held in late January. The Web page they set up includes links to biographies and pictures of all the speakers, and a link to video of the conference.
- Randi and Betsy analyzed and revised the "General Information" and "Citizens E-Guide" pages on the Legislative Web site.
- Randi, Leif, Robbie, Syble and Ruth met to discuss the output screens for the All-time Legislators Database. Ruth began work on an all-fields report. The group met a second time to further discuss the reports and searching needed.
- Randi worked with Revisor's Office staff to clean up several small navigation problems with the Revisor's pages.
- In January & February Syble spent a lot of time on programming the new Intranet. These pages are a real departure from our normal web page process and use Active Server Pages programming. They are all hosted on our Windows NT server and are dynamic in that they are generated "on-the-fly" by scripts on the server. Our web editors are having to learn a new, but more streamlined way to edit these pages. The pages use "include" files, which are text files on the regular web server. The content on pages like <http://venus.library.leg.state.mn.us/intranet/> is brought in from three main include files - 2 on the NT server that brings in the heading and left navigation bar and the one that has the real content from our web server: WWW. This is a real first step in making our web site truly dynamic.
- Syble updated the drop down box code on the legislative pages.

Collections activities

- David planned for the upcoming bar coding project. Helen helped him with a number of issues, including estimating the number of added volumes in the collection.
- Kelly processed 73 added volumes, withdrew 2 items from our collection, copied 296 Contents Page articles, copied 2,360 Contents Pages, and claimed 73 missing Periodical

issues. She finished shelfreading the Reference Collection and shelfread the Circulating Collection from HA 201 - HD 4973.

- It's that time of year! Sarah reported, "The library has received an influx of mandated documents, so I've been kept busy cataloging these."

Administration

- Lisa set up a method to collect money for the pay copy machines. She wrote up procedures and collected the first month's dollars and deposited them back into our budget.

Information Systems activities

- Ruth converted Lisa's software dbase database to Access 2000.
- Leif and Syble were finally able to move the NT1 server back down to the computer room. Lisa, Syble, and Leif reinstalled the Harbor LAN backup software on the server.
- Leif and Lisa performed the quarterly review of our Harbor backup files. They trimmed a fair amount of files from the backup list. Some groups of files will get copied off to CD-Roms (now that we can burn CD-Roms).
- Syble convened the LSIG policy group twice and edited the policy.doc to include our changes. The firewall part is finished now and will be distributed to LSIG members for approval.
- Syble, Leif, and Lisa worked on many WIN2000 conversion issues. Leif figured out the obscure Micro\$oft utility called SYSPREP which allows us to prepare WIN2000 in such a way that we can keep just one standardized image of WIN2000 and apply that to all the different types of PC hardware that we have.
- Lisa and Leif tweaked the configurations out at the Public PC's.
- Leif resolved a very strange routing issue that was preventing some folks at the North Dakota Legislature from emailing us and accessing our web site. It turns out there were multiple firewall and router configuration issues at their end.
- Leif followed up on problems with the .MN domain names.
- Lisa and Leif resolved a very strange problem with our system wide distribution lists in Pegasus.
- Leif created a private and secure listserv for the members of the LSIG Incident Response Team.
- Lisa set up a backup system for email.
- Problems! Lisa worked on a problem with Syble's email. It required re-ghosting her machine and much time

troubleshooting. She worked on some phone problems, including changing Leif's phone alias so he would quit getting phone calls for the department of transportation. (His number was the same as the one where VERY ANGRY citizens call to get the drivers' licenses reinstated.) She also worked with a man from McCleod to fix a problem with her phone's fax line. It was a bad connector in the phone closet.

Reference activities

- Elizabeth, Carol and Sarah began work on a "Minnesota Resources" guide to budget materials.
- Ruth added 23 new Inside Issues users. We now have 316 users, really a terrific proportion of our possible audience.
- Toshi was a great help to Nicole in getting the *Duluth News Tribune* issues coded. It had piled up for quite a while and he quickly whittled the pile down to nothing!

- List of states with primary or secondary seat belt enforcement laws and accident rates by state. (pv)
- How did MN vote (in 1865) on adding the 13th amendment to the U.S. Constitution? Was the amendment *really* ratified? Is slavery really illegal in Minnesota? (It turns out, slavery has been prohibited in MN since the Louisiana purchase and the Northwest Compact days, and there was prohibition of slavery as part of the original MN constitution. But an extra amendment never hurts.) (sq)
- Is it legal for police to question 10-year-olds when no crime had been committed and without the presence of a guardian? (sq)
- The text of JFK's speech about civil rights. (For former

legislator now working for the federal government.) (sq)

- I had a question regarding the amount two lobbying groups spent on lobbying. Monthly Report - January 2002

A good story..... Jess gave Nicole, our newest Library Assistant, a tour of the capitol. Jess reported, "Pat Murphy saved the day again and gave us a stellar and informative tour of the House chambers, and told us the story about when Ed Burdick began as a page SIXTY years ago. He was instructed to go up in the gallery for a half hour to observe, then come downstairs and start working. When he got his first page call, he went up to the legislator that signaled for him and the legislator said 'I just dropped my keys in that spittoon. I'd like you to fish them out for me.'"

Administration

- Robbie spent a great deal of time combing through the Fiscal Year 03, 04, and 05 budgets to find places to cut and determine the effects of severe cuts in the coming years. Lisa and Elizabeth were invaluable in brainstorming and considering alternatives.
- Lisa placed ads for our 15 hour per week Library Aide position, took calls, answered questions about the job, and sent out requested applications. Elizabeth began interviewing candidates.
- The company that ran our pay copy machine, the only company in the Twin Cities that provided the service, announced that it would no longer provide that service. We were forced to purchase the machines, after spending much time figuring out how to pay for them, and finding out whether we could – legally – collect money for the copies. Luckily, the Department of Finance said it was allowed. Lisa set up a new system to collect money for the copy machines. We will now be collecting the money and depositing it back into our account.
- Robbie helped with last minute planning and arrangements for the Horizons Conference (and then wasn't able to attend because she was en route to an NCSL meeting.)
- Robbie continued work on the LCC Compensation Study, working with a subcommittee of LCC directors to determine the allocation of available funds to LCC employees.
- Robbie participated in the interview team to hire a new Research Director for the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources.

Web Development Activities

- Randi convened an Intranet planning meeting for the web group.
- The updated Intranet for the Legislature was implemented. It has a clean, updated look, but the coolest changes were made 'under the covers,' with SSI (server side includes) being used for displaying the sidebars.
- Many documents on the Legislative Web Site are in pdf format, and users should be directed to obtaining Adobe software to

download these documents. Also, there should be links to readers and tools for the disabled. Randi researched and wrote standard language for this access for all relevant Legislative Web Site pages.

- Betsy created a new Intranet form for tours requests.
- The "What's New" electronic mailing list on the Legislative Web site, maintained by the Library, has increased to over 300 subscribers.
- Randi attended a meeting between CALCO and North Star. She also attended a meeting between webmasters and North Star. They are soliciting help for adding content to their system. Carol and Randi participated in a group of state agency librarians who prepared spreadsheets with categorized Web sites for them. This information will form the core of the links off the main page of the new North Star portal. (As a result of this, one of the North Star consultants wrote, "Carol, I've started taking a look at this and it looks great! Thank you so much for your help - this is the crucial part of the portal and we appreciate your time and effort on this. Thanks again!!! Kristina")
- Randi worked on an updated privacy policy for the Legislative Web site with an LNET subgroup.
- Randi set up a page on the Legislative Web Site for the Horizons conference, linking to the agenda and the video archive of the proceedings.

Collections activities

- January is the heaviest time for arrivals of mandated reports. Jess said, "I've gotten completely buried with the usual January influx of reports, and have yet to extricate myself." Sarah reported that her cataloging statistics are up, trying to keep pace with the reports streaming in.
- The first issue of "Just In," our new publication to replace "Introductions" and "Minnesota Resources," was published. David and Ruth deserve kudos for straightening out all the inevitable glitches in the production process. The new publication will serve our users better, and alert them to materials, like reference books and added volumes, that were not previously publicized.
- Helen corrected URL's from the PALS list of broken links.
- Helen continued to teach Alissa the finer points of copy cataloging.
- The first month of the year kept Kelly busy. She processed 83 added volumes, withdrew 39 items, copied 214 Contents Page Articles, copied 2,133 Contents Pages. 52 scheduled periodicals did not arrive, and Kelly called to check on their status. She shelfread the Circulating Collection from GV 546.3 to HA 201, the Speech Collection, and the Reference Collection from AE

.A23 to KFM 5890. She also weeded the periodicals scheduled for weeding every six months, and recycled the oldest issues of the Federal Register.

- David, Helen, and Sarah met to work out some cataloging consistency issues and some item-specific issues.

Information Systems activities

- The Legislative firewall is now in place, and it was accomplished in a timely manner. There were several installation glitches and Leif met with Intertech, AvNet, and CISCO several times about the streaming video problems. Leif said, "Even though the firewall isn't visible to staff, it's the most important thing we've done as staff."
- Hardware problems are inevitable each month. This month Leif replaced the CPU cooling fan in Public PC#3 and replaced a case cooling fan in the problematic NT server.
- At a monthly meeting Leif admonished staff to be extra careful about opening e-mail attachments. There is a recent rash of six new viruses.
- Lisa set up a fourth public pc the day before session, and it's already being heavily used.
- Ruth made some fixes to the personnel database system.
- Ruth finished creating the database and reports for the new publication *Just In*. She started creating the first edition, working with David and other librarians on the design aspects.
- Ruth converted Lisa's filing database to Access 2000.
- Ruth added the Minn Doc number and URL to *Inside Issues Books and Reports* database and report. This will really help out the circulation staff responding to requests.
- Lisa finalized the Windows2000 configuration to ghost and moved her computer to the new Windows 2000 configuration.
- Lisa had to work on the reference desk computer so often it looked like she had a new reference librarian position. She ended up setting it up from scratch again, and we are working on getting a newer machine out there soon.

Reference activities

- Ruth added "Children/Youth--Early Childhood/Brain Development" to the Inside Issues topics.
- 590 Inside Issues letters and forms were sent to non users. Ruth sent out the materials, and 14 new users responded so far (a quick response).
- Eagle-eyed Jess found an error in a new Minnesota Historical Society Press book about Cass Gilbert---they had labeled a photo of the Supreme Court chamber "Senate Chamber". Sarah is adding a note about the error somewhere in the book.
- Robbie, Randi, David, Elizabeth, and Sarah participated in a brainstorming session about electronic access to mandated

documents. We hope to guarantee access on the Web to all the reports mandated by the Legislature, and increase notification options for our users. A pilot program is in the works.

- Carol, Sarah, and Elizabeth began work on a “Resources on Minnesota Issues Guide” to budget materials.
- Elizabeth and Randi divided the responsibility for updating the ZONA notebooks of legislative statistics and information. This will mean more frequent updating and less duplication.
- Elizabeth led a tour of the clippings storage room for public services staff.

- Jess reported some Tape Room excitement. “I had a patron in the taperoom start to pass out, though she seemed initially okay and the guy with her helped her into the hallway for some fresh air eventually...I realized as soon as she walked out that were someone to throw up in there it would be the WORST possible

venue...we'd never be able to go down there again! When she returned to the taperoom, she acted as if NOTHING had happened...and seemed slightly annoyed when I asked her if she was okay."

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Paul presented a legislative history overview to the MN State Bar Association's continuing legal education seminar, "The Legislative Process in Minnesota." Robbie presented a session on the Legislative Web Site. See the attached evaluation from the seminar. The legislative information was very well received!
- Many Library tours were given in January – to House Information writers, to new research staff, to legislative assistants and interns. Once again the House pages are touring the Library each week. The reference librarians prepared guides for the research they do each week to make their brief time at the Legislature more productive.
- Syble convened meetings of an LSIG subgroup to draft and review security policies.
- Carol and Betsy held a training session on library resources for 13 Legislative Assistants. Their first two sessions were so popular that they held a third by request, the week before session started.
- Leif held an LSIG meeting.
- Paul participated in the training session for about 25 Senate Committee L.A.s, focusing on the compilation of minutes and describing users needs. (He planted the seed that they may want to start considering putting their minutes on the Web.)
- Paul provided an overview of the tape recording and log procedures to approximately 30 House Pages.
- Robbie spoke on the Legislative Web Site at a class on legislative information put on by the Department of Employee Relations.

- Betsy, Randi, Leif, and Syble attended an LNET meeting on Jan. 10.
- Randi and Betsy attended a Special Libraries Association Board meeting and monthly meeting (with a tour of the Andersen Library).

- Leif attended a SNAP meeting of state agency webmasters.
- Paul, Carol, and Jess attended the Horizons conference.
- As Chair-elect of the NCSL Legislative Research Librarians Staff Section, Robbie attended the Legislative Staff Coordinating Committee meeting in Santa Fe.
- As Chair of the Minnesota Chapter of the Special Libraries Association, Randi attended the SLA winter leadership development program in Chicago.

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - December 2001

Administration

- Robbie attended the final meetings of the Benefits Book Committee, to wrap up the proposed changes to the 2002-2003 plan.
- Robbie attended several meeting of LCC directors, working on the formulas for distributing equity adjustments from the compensation study in the fairest way possible.
- Lisa attended the training for the new Legislative service award program. It is web-based, and will allow employees who are reaching one of the milestone anniversaries to choose a recognition award online. Lisa also attended a meeting to set up the web page for the program. She developed a template in Microsoft Excel for the library, House and LCC to use when sending our length of service data to the vendor, OC Tanner.
- Lisa attended a meeting at Intertech dealing with phone service. The topic - where do we want to go with phone technology in the future?
- It was a full month of treats. The annual Christmas party at Fabulous Fern's was a success; the most coveted and stolen white elephant gift was an elegant back-scratcher. The eighth (?) annual taco lunch was a good counterpart to the annual cookie day, when we bring cookies for our library patrons. Finally, the month was rounded out with a combination pizza party/farewell party for Theresa, who left us for a position at the DNR Library.
- We finally received the final go-ahead to calculate the annual raises for staff. Robbie determined the total awards, and Lisa did a great job getting the numbers crunched. Lisa brought them to the fiscal services office as quickly as possible so that staff members could see the bigger paychecks as soon as possible!

Big Projects!

- The All Time Legislators Database. Many, many staff members have been involved since last June in planning the All Time Legislators Database. Leif and Randi and Elizabeth were part of the original planning team (using the post-it method of project management that Leif and Randi learned a few years ago) and the project has involved nearly all the staff in the library over the last seven months. Many people were involved in brainstorming what information

will be needed, what reports we will need to draw from this database, and how can we systematize data entry using several different sources for the information. Brainstormers included Robbie, Betsy, Carol, Sarah, Paul, Andrew, Alissa, Jess, Elizabeth, Randi, Jess, Leif, Ruth, and Syble. Ruth, as always, did a remarkable job taking everyone's ideas into consideration and turning them into a great structure with easy-to-use data entry screens. Many people were also involved in testing the system: Andrew was the main tester but Robbie, Elizabeth, Randi, David, Carol, Betsy, Sarah, and Syble also tested the system. Ruth also accepted, with grace, everyone's last-minute changes both in structure and design. The resulting interface has been proclaimed "slick." This has been a great collaborative product and it is now ready to go. The data entry team will be led by Andrew when he returns from Thailand.

- "Just In," A Revamped Library Publication. A "Just In" task force (Randi, David, Elizabeth, Theresa, Sarah, Helen, Carol, Jess, Ruth) met, to hash out the details of combining our two publications, *Introductions* and *Minnesota Resources*. From October through December, many staff from every part of the Library brainstormed to try to figure out how to handle a bunch of inter-related issues originally stemming from putting *Minnesota Resources* publications on reserve at the circulation desk, but ended up with the revamping of *Introductions* and *Minnesota Resources* into a single publication, the elimination of a lot of data entry on Andrew's part, and a streamlining of our processes. This involved looking at the surprisingly complex *Minnesota Resources* procedures, evaluating the need for multiple publications and the need for a separate database. Thanks to everyone who helped brainstorm about this complex issue. There were thoughtful questions from Theresa, insights from Helen on the process, logistical work on David's part, and incredible work from "never-say-can't" Ruth.

Web Development Activities

- Leif and Syble met with Barry LaGrave and Mike Speiker to establish a procedure for the transfer of House archived videos. Syble drafted the formal agreement which was then sent to Barry, Mike, Leif, Robbie & Syble.
- Randi sorted through a variety of Intranet statistics trying to figure out if they were complete and accurate. It seems difficult to get useful statistics on web page accessions.
- Randi, David, and Elizabeth examined all of Andrew's tasks and arranged for them to be completed while he is on leave.

- Syble worked on the improved Intranet design.
- Syble mounted the Intranet web site on the NT server, created a process for 'server side includes.' Web editors can edit content portions of the page via a local hard drive while the web browser would pull that content into the page served from the NT.
- Syble investigated an Adobe PDF convert-to-text utility where web users can request any pdf document be converted to a text document online.
- Syble programmed new Active Server Pages. She acquired a username and password for the Revisor's Office system so that she can check new web pages on their terminals.

Collections activities

- Our new combined publication listing new materials will be called "Just In". Also, by eliminating the need for an extra database it will achieve the long time goal of using our acquisitions database for the data for our publications. The new workflow procedures will be implemented Jan. 2, 2002 with the goal of producing the new publication by the end of January. Ruth is currently working on the database end of this goal.
- David worked with Kelly to identify electronic periodicals in our collection. Email periodicals will be sent to an alias.
- Kelly processed 66 added volumes, withdrew just one title from the collection this month, copied 2,214 contents pages, and copied 193 Contents Page articles. She also examined the shelves between the call numbers E78 - GV482.6, to be sure the items were in order.
- Helen continued training Alissa on copy cataloging.
- Helen helped Pat Fenton at the DTED Library with several questions about the PALS unmatched headings list.
- Helen talked with Theresa and Sarah about the 651 (geographic headings) list in OCLC. Helen reported, "We divided the list and I have started working on reviewing and if necessary correcting my portion (we are not working on the large Twin Cities Metropolitan Area chunk, which we considered ok)." Helen and Sarah will make the corrections, which will help with migration to Aleph.
- David arranged to have an e-mail alias set up to get online versions of minutes. That way, the delivery of library materials will not be to an individual, who may or may not be present on a given day.

Information Systems activities

- Leif and Syble were involved in the firewall installation and implementation, and the VPN installation. They participated in MANY LSIG meetings throughout the month. Leif worked on the job position and the hiring of a

month. Leif worked on the job position and the hiring of a firewall administrator, coordinated all the details with the vendor, set up the rack and all the hardware involved, planned the implementation. He participated in the installation, testing, and debugging of the inevitable problems. Syble created network diagrams for the firewall & VPN. She also investigated implementation of RADIUS or TACACS servers to provide VPN user authentication possibilities.

- Ruth created the 2002 editions of the Magazine Guide and the Subject Guide.
- Lisa continued to work on the Windows 2000 configuration for our workstations. She ghosted a machine from the base system. She will apply all of the software to set up a workstation for herself and then do the same to a machine for Ruth.
- Ruth added Environment--Noise Pollution to the choice of Inside Issues topics
- Ruth updated the patron database to print out lists of potential Inside Issues and Contents Pages users. We send letters to nonusers each year.
- Leif coordinated an LSIG meeting on December 5 to discuss Security Policy. Leif and Syble continued work on Security Policy.
- Syble continues to try to get the NT server going. She reported, "Worked with Adaptec tech support on the NT1 server. Got the server running, re- formatted hard drives, recreated array and prepared server for re-installation of NT Server program. ongoing....."
- Leif tracked down and dealt with two people (one at the Science Museum and the other at the Pinewood School District) who had virus infections on their computers that were flooding our email gateway with bounced mail.
- Leif set up up new email aliases for receiving "minutes", "reports", and "periodicals".

Reference activities

- Several staff went to an Ariel/Prospero software demonstration at MINITEX. Theresa, David, Elizabeth, and Randi brainstormed later in the month about possible library uses for Prospero (the free software). They came up with a possible pilot project for our Contents pages service but ran into technical difficulties downloading the software. We will explore this software further when Leif gets back from vacation.
- Alissa reported some interlibrary loan news. "Things were steady in December for ILL. We now have the option of

receiving access to articles electronically (via email). Randi was very happy to receive her articles this way, as it can prove to be much faster than waiting for them to arrive via courier.” We occasionally receive questions and requests for materials from overseas. This month Alissa sent an article to a library in Australia.

- Elizabeth and Randi devised an equitable assignment of Zona notebook management to various reference staff.
- Elizabeth composed, and Ruth sent out, a letter to the current users of the Inside Issues service, asking them if they want to change any of their topics.
- Sarah and David prepared to teach a class on December 12 on "Amazing Resources on the Legislative Web Site," which, alas, was cancelled due to lack of interest. (I have a feeling that attendance would be boosted if treats were offered.)

during this month in previous years

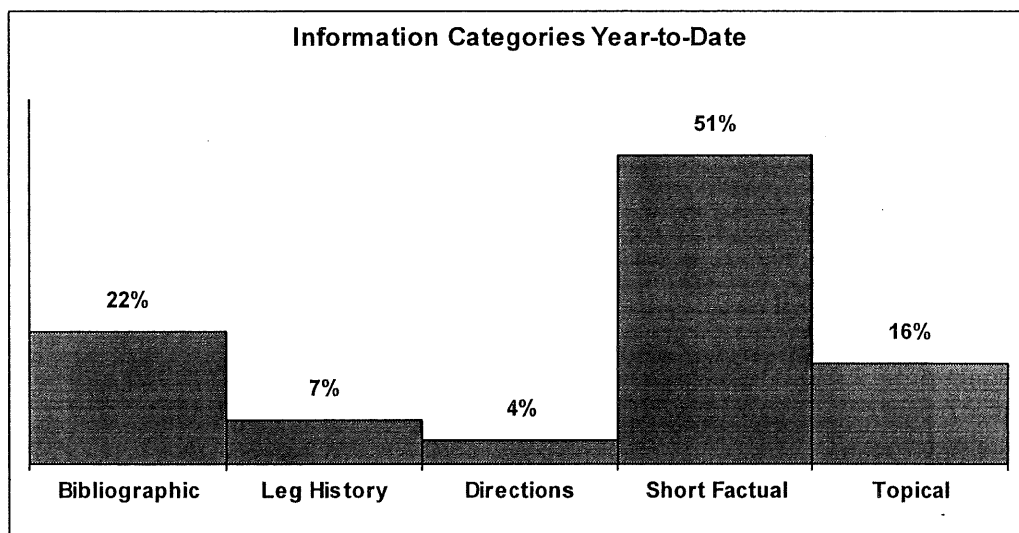
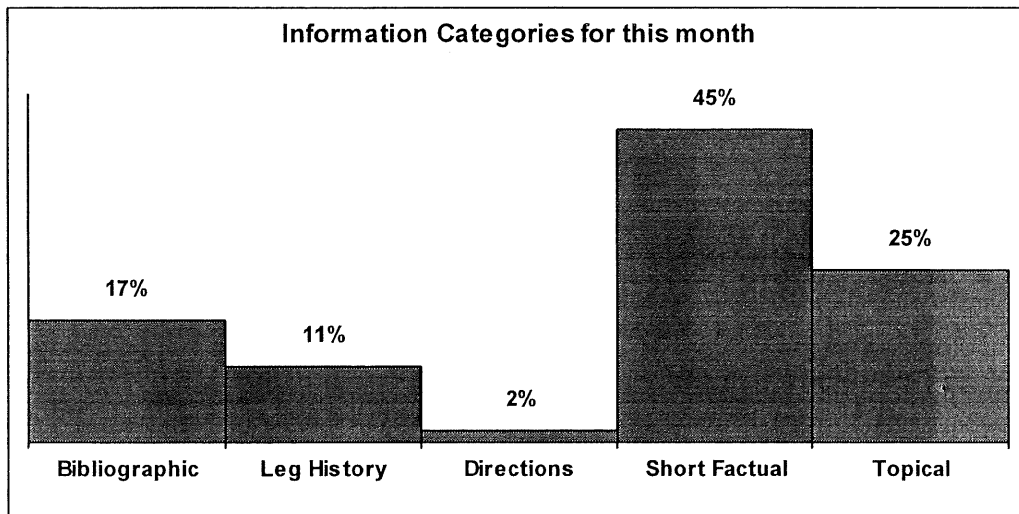


Number of Questions asked
on each survey day



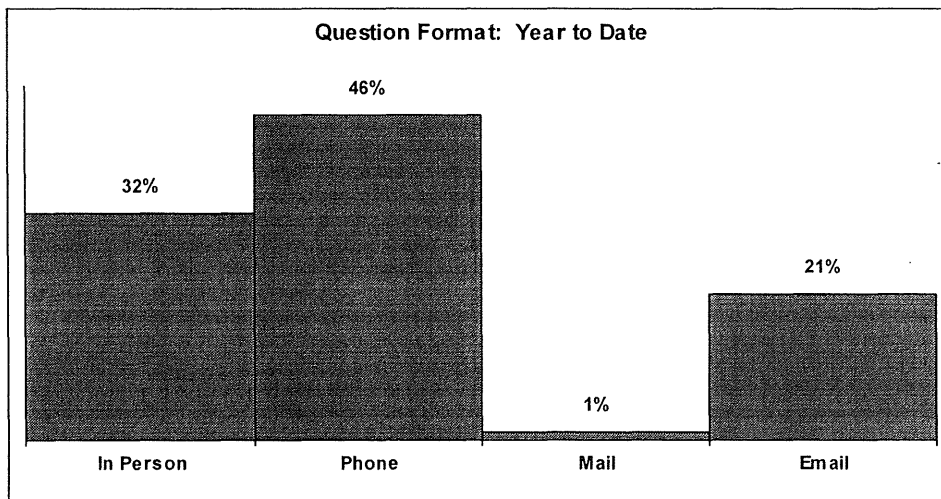
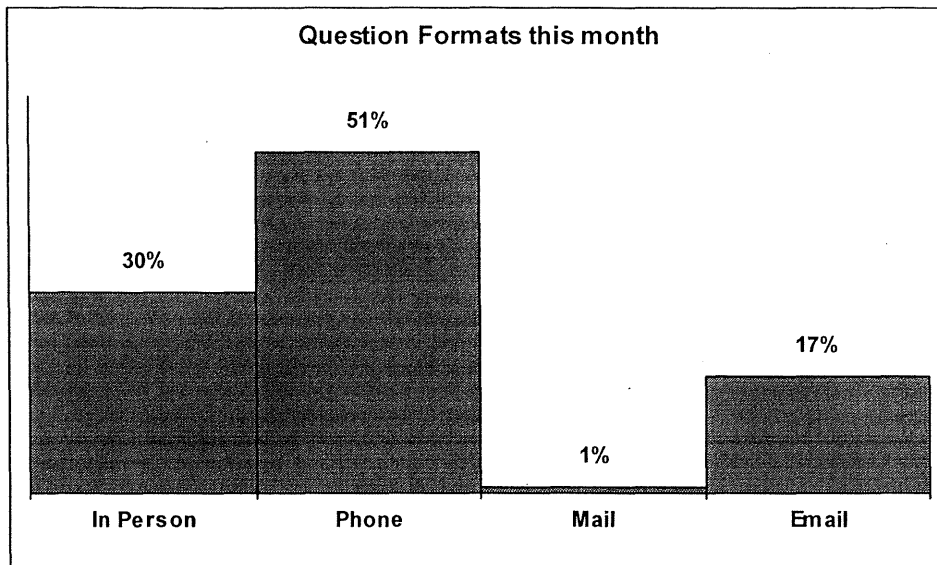

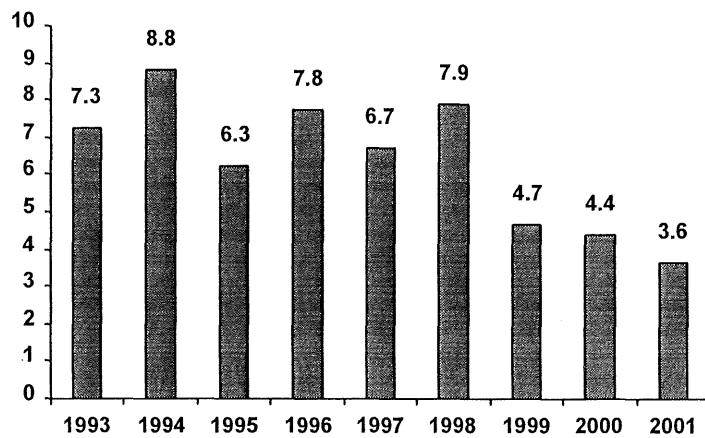
TAPE ROOM REPORT: Questions Asked for this Month

Questions for this Month by Year

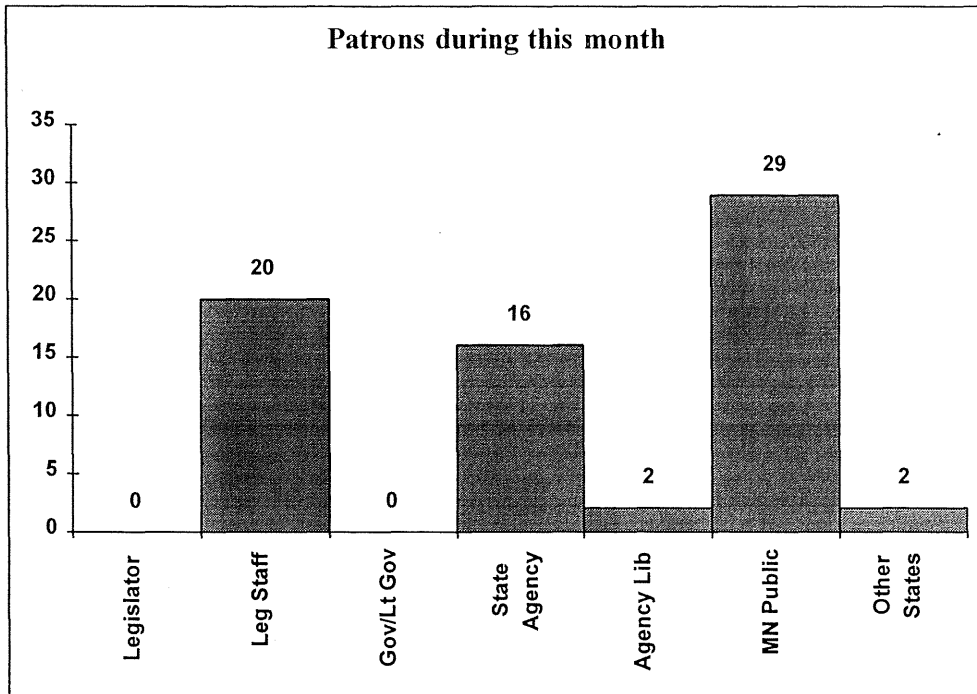

for this month**

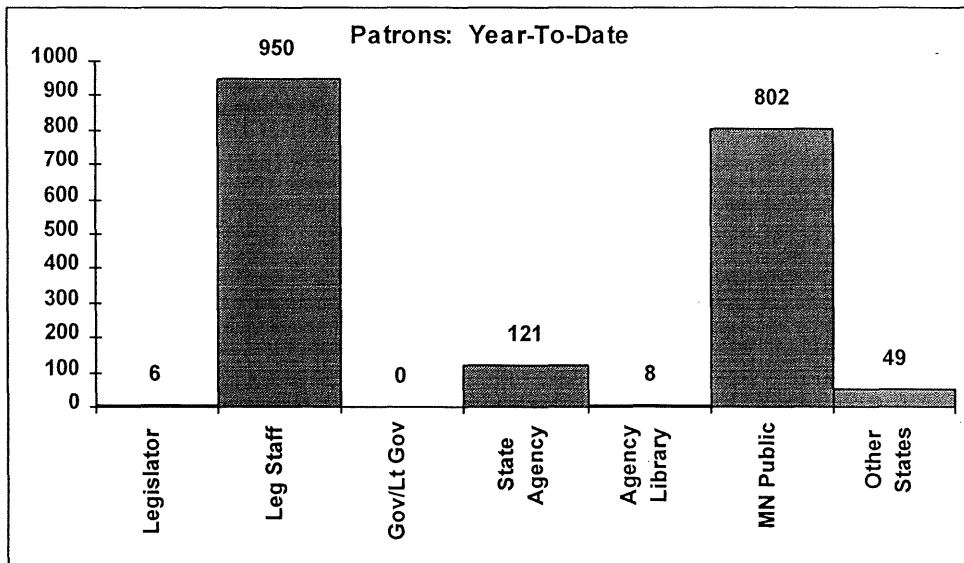

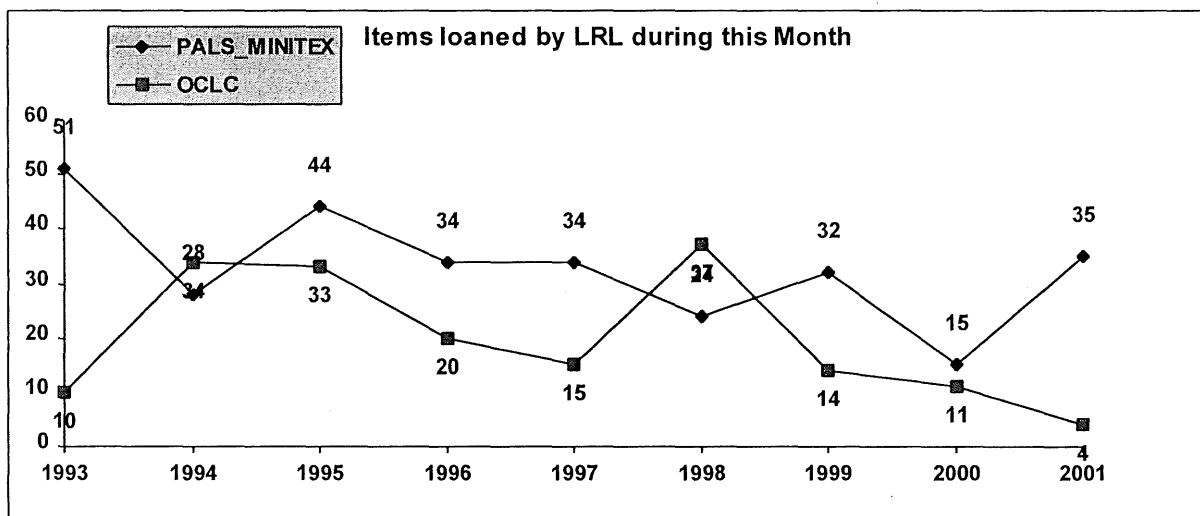
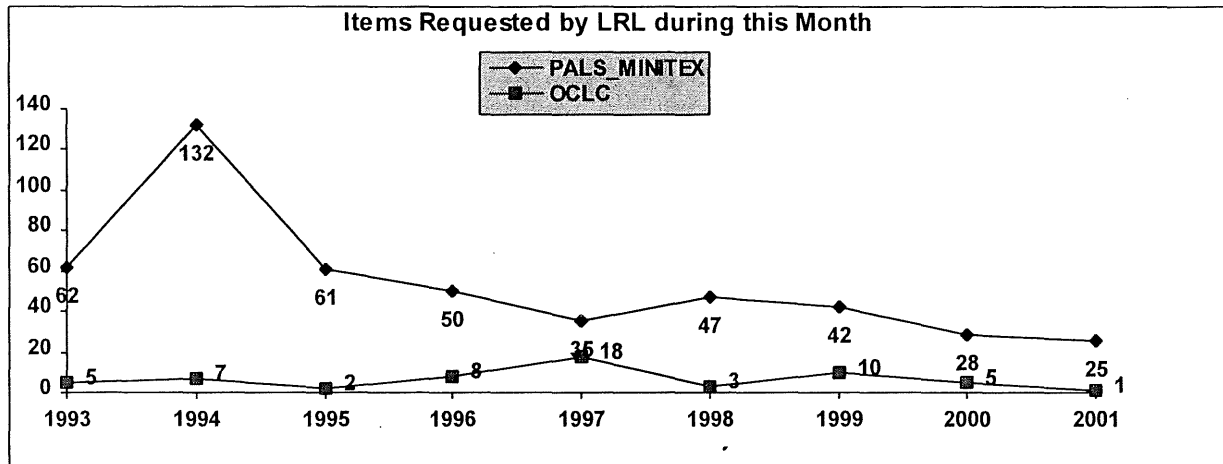
INTERLIBRARY LOAN RATIOS: Requests to Loans

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - November 2001

Administration

- Robbie attended several meetings regarding the Compensation Study.
- Lisa placed the ad for the vacant library assistant position, received the applications, set up the interviews, and created interview packets for the hiring team (Elizabeth, Paul, and Carol).
- Lisa made the reservation for our holiday party at Fabulous Ferns.
- Lisa helped organize the Combined Charities kick off event for joint agency staff. As usual, she was kind enough to pick up the dozens of donuts and she worked at the event.

Web Development Activities

- Randi held a meeting of the Web group met to discuss the Intranet and other upcoming projects.
- Randi attended a CALCO Web group meeting, to discuss CALCO involvement with the North Star portal.
- Syble created a web site for LSIG, and worked with Rand Hove (Senate) on LSIG Security Policy Documents.
- Syble created a new Session Laws search button. She also developed some new buttons for legislative use: New, Go, and Now Available (2 of each: green, gold and red versions) She created a web page for the buttons so that each office can access them easily.

Collections activities

- Jess was finally able to generate mandate letters after catching up with recent mandates, which led to an influx of reports and also explanation letters for missing reports. Several agencies reported that reports are much delayed or not being done at all as a result of the potential government shutdown and the strike. A couple of agencies have skipped mandated progress reports and will be completing just a final version of them for the legislature. Jess made notes in the Acquisitions database whenever she received more info from the agencies.
- Alissa searched the 2001 Table 2 for repealers that involved reports. David reviewed the repealers, made notes in the acquisitions database, and gave the appropriate ones to the catalogers for to make changes in the online catalog. Helen added the 2000 and 2001 repealers to the PALS records.
- Kelly and David have noted numerous problems with EBSCO, our provider of newspapers and periodicals. Even

though EBSCO insists that they are paying the publishers, we keep getting cancellation notices for various titles.

- Helen started training Alissa on OCLC searching and producing on Library of Congress records.
- David held a Minnesota Resources/Introductions workflow meeting. Helen commented on the workflow draft document.
- In looking at the November acquisitions statistics David noticed that the number of "begs" did not look right. He went back and fixed some records in the acquisitions database (Sept. through November) to accurately reflect reality. He then re-ran the monthly acq. reports for those months. Since monthly acquisitions reports are snapshot reports, the year to date statistical report may show minor differences from previous reports.
- Kelly processed 39 added volumes, withdrew 3 items from the circulating collection, copied 217 Contents Page articles, and copied 2,098 Contents Pages. She claimed 65 missing periodical issues: 26 were EBSCO, 15 were Free and 24 were Minnesota Periodicals.
- Kelly 'shelfread' from AS6 to E78, which means she went through the collection, and looked at the call numbers for each item to ensure they were on the shelf in the correct order. This *really* makes a difference, and all the public services staff appreciate being able to retrieve materials as needed, without massive hunts.

Information Systems activities

- Lisa continued work on preparing for the migration to WINDOWS 2000. She is "trying to get a base machine to ghost," meaning she is trying to get the setup just right on one machine so that it can be duplicated on all the other workstations with a minimum of custom work.
- Ruth continued working on the data entry screen for the All-Time Legislators Database. She created a 'termdate' table for Alissa to enter 30 years of election and term dates and session years, and created a button to automatically put these dates in the record depending on session number and body.
- Ruth created a report from the acquisitions database showing mandated reports received during Jan. 2001 for Randi and David. Our intent was to see how many of the reports were in electronic format as well as print. There were MANY FEWER reports in electronic format than we had anticipated.
- Ruth created 447 November MN Resources, and created the corresponding Web page. She also sent the file to NCSL.

Our new acquisitions lists are available via the NCSL Web site, as well as our own.

- Ruth added some new topics to our Inside Issues service: Corrections--Cybercrime, Terrorism, and Terrorism—Bioterrorism.
- Leif and Syble attended several LSIG meetings, including an AVNET whiteboard session in preparation for the firewall installation.
- Syble upgraded WebTrends Enterprise Suite to WebTrends Advanced Analysis Suite, and customized the legislative offices' reports to take advantage of new features.
- Syble copied Senate Archive media files to CD for backup and permanent storage.

Aides News

- Dave Gatchell began working as a Library Aide.
- The remarkably efficient Aides got caught up on their work. A long list of projects was developed for them so they wouldn't run out of work but they quickly accomplished all those tasks as well. We are lucky to have them to do a lot of short-term and cleanup projects now, before the crush of session begins.

Reference activities

- We now send out notices to Inside Issues subscribers about books and reports in their topic areas, as well as magazine articles. Last month Mark Shepard noted that he has his interests so narrowly focused that when he received his list, all the reports were BY him.
- The reference librarians had a breakfast meeting to discuss the content of the "Services for Legislators" intranet Web page. They also discussed the requirements for a better reference desk.
- A former state architect sent some Legislative Building Commission reports and documents to Robbie last summer. After evaluating them, and deciding that only one document would have broad public policy interest for our collection, we sent the remainder to the State Archives. Charlie Rogers was happy to receive them, and will add them if they are not duplicated.
- Elizabeth, Betsy, and Randi met to plan upcoming training about the library.
- Elizabeth held a session planning meeting, to organize all the end-of-the-year projects.

Reference questions – A sample

- **Paul made an understatement in his monthly report, “The stadium questions are back.”**
- Sometimes the answer to a reference questions is no further away than one of the staff. David was asked for the name of the famous attorney from Hibbing. Lisa had the answer, of course, and David write back, “You must be referring to Vincent Bugliosi - Author/Attorney (Helter Skelter, The Sea Will Tell). The Hibbing Chamber of Commerce website has a list of other famous people from Hibbing as well: http://www.hibbing.org/historical_info.html”
- Someone from the public sent an email wanting to know if it was true "oral sex" was illegal in MN. David emailed back the relevant Statute and a link to the recent court case ruling the Statute unconstitutional. He emailed me back, thanking me for the information, but still wanting to know if it was illegal. I responded that I was not able to advise on the legality of this or any other activity.
- Request for articles on health insurance costs and articles on mental health coverage parity. (ds)
- Information on drug offender criminal histories. (ds)
- Information on libraries in Minnesota (rm)
- A list of all U.S. cities that have each of the 4 professional sports franchises: football, baseball, basketball and hockey, and their media market rankings - I found 11 cities. (bh)
- Betsy had several requests from out of state for unique Minnesota - specific reports.
- Sarah fielded (so to speak) numerous questions about the Twins: the "Contact your Legislator" canned e-mail got a workout. She also researched the yearly salary of Hall-of-Fame baseball slugger and 1969 American League MVP Harmon "Killer" Killebrew (1954-1975) (for a senator) (answer: it never topped \$120,000).
- Sarah hunted down the identity of a judge from "somewhere around Sibley County," jurisdiction unknown, named Something Alexander or Alexander Something, and who served between 1901 and 1960. (For a courts administrator.) (Poss. answer: Fred A. Alexander, Owatonna, serving 1938 to 1959).
- Which countries supply the U.S. with oil & what % of our total does each country supply? (pv)
- Does MN have a mandatory child vaccination law? (Sort of, especially if you want to attend school, there are exemptions. Ch. 299 from 1903/MS 144.12 & 121A.15)(pv)

Legislative History Activities

- Jess reported that she “worked on an interesting (and highly involved) legislative history for an out-of-state attorney. He was working on behalf of a firefighter who was dying of cancer, and needed information from us because in MN it is considered to be an occupational hazard if a firefighter develops cancer and it can be proven to be a result of their employment. That is not the case in Oregon, and this firefighter's dying wish was to alter the statute in OR to change workers' compensation benefits for subsequent cases. Primarily he was searching for expert testimony from MN's addition in 1988, so I found some possible meetings for him to look at and ultimately suggested that me might try contacting a couple of representatives who were active in the bill's passage. He had been contemplating an expensive trip here to do research, and was thrilled with the help.”
- The 1991-92 Senate materials & House minutes were transferred to MHS.
- Tape Room research included: child pornography, sexual orientation's addition to the human rights statute, Prairie Island nuclear waste storage, gender reassignment surgery, sex offender registration, & stadiums.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Robbie gave a talk on the Legislative Web site to a meeting of the Minnesota Governmental Relations Council (the lobbyist group). Boy, were they appreciative of all the information provided on the site!
- Our training statistics reveal that we have conducted training or tours for 581 people so far in 2001.
- Elizabeth gave a tour to two new Senate Legislative Assistants.
- David and Sarah taught the class, "Amazing Resources on the Legislative Website", to Senate staffers on 11/29. The class was attended by three staff from the Republican caucus, two from the DFL caucus and one staff from Senate Counsel & Research.

Training and meetings attended by staff

- The Legislative Reference Library hosted the November meeting of CALCO, the Capitol Area librarians group. Betsy attended the meeting.
- David attended the PALS Deans/directors meeting on 11/16. (Robbie was in one of the MANY compensation study meetings.)
- Randi and Syble attended the state webmasters meeting, where they discussed the proposed North Star portal software.

- Randi attended a North Star end user experience meeting, where the consultants were taking input on what the users would want.
- Leif, Syble and Randi attended an LNET meeting.
- Sarah attended a two-day OCLC/CONSER serials cataloging workshop, sponsored by MINITEX (and reported, "I even got a fancy certificate!").

- Jim Lee finished his short tenure at LRL, and went off to become a Dairy Queen owner. He was great, and we'll miss him.

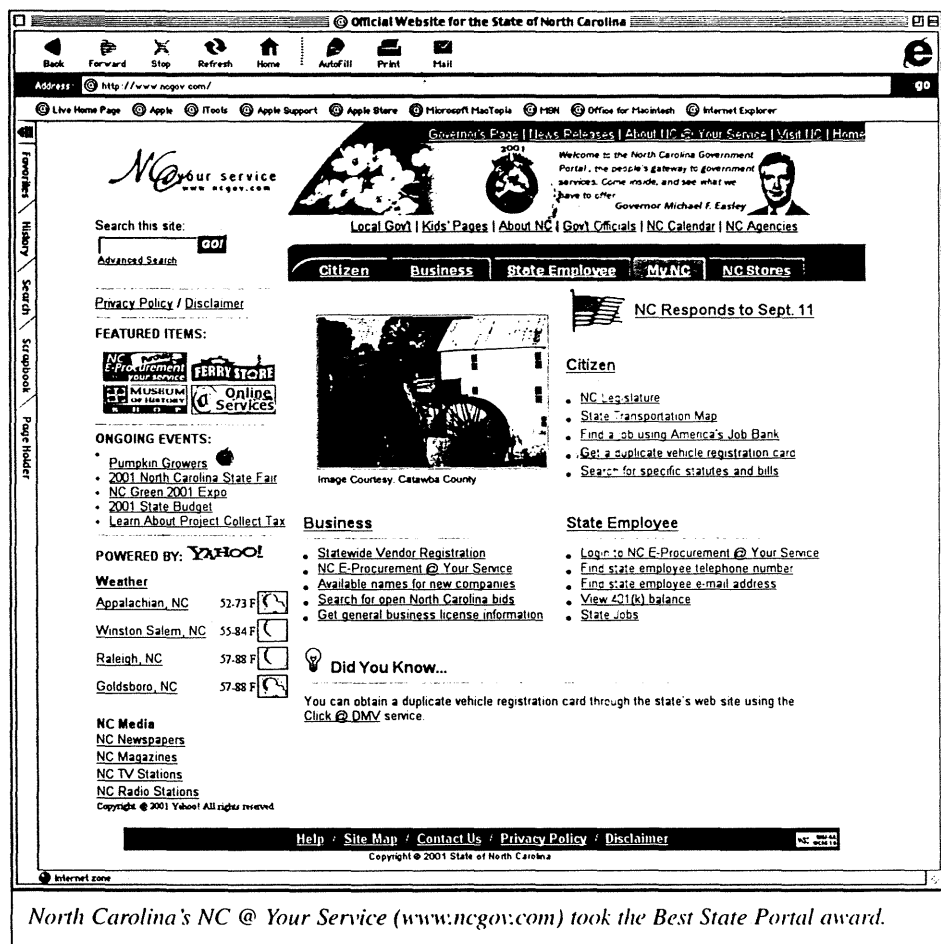
Georgia, Minnesota, North Carolina and North Dakota are among the award-winning states in The Council of State Governments' Second Annual Eagle E-Government Awards program.

The Internet is drastically changing the way state governments do business. Because of these changes, states can reach out to more people and deliver better service to constituents and businesses. CSG's Eagle E-Government Awards program identifies outstanding e-government initiatives each year and highlights how the states are successfully meeting the growing demand for online government services.

A recent report by the Council for Excellence in Government, a nonprofit organization that promotes good government, shows that 73 percent of Americans think our leaders should make e-government a domestic priority. The Eagle E-Government Awards program reveals that many states already are making great strides in using the Internet to create a more responsive and accessible government.

Here are the winners in the categories of Best Executive, Legislative and Judicial Branch Sites, and Best State Portal.

Georgia's Secretary of State Web site (www.sos.state.ga.us) won the Best Executive Branch Web site award with its

well-designed home page and wide range of online services offered to people and businesses. Visitors to this site can search for and register corporate names, obtain voter information and voter registration forms, search for registered charities and renew professional licenses online. Other sites that won an Eagle Award of Excellence in the Executive Branch category are Illinois' Criminal Justice Information Authority, Virginia's VATAXOnline, and eMaryland Marketplace. eMaryland Marketplace also won a CSG Innovations award this year (please see accompanying article).

The Best Legislative Branch Web site award went to the **Minnesota State Legislature** (www.leg.state.mn.us). This site offers many valuable features including a bill-status tracking function and live Web casts of legislative sessions. It has an archive of past Internet broadcasts as well as legislative calendars and a wide range of legislative information, including complete biographical and contact information for each legislator. The Alaska State Legislature and the Louisiana Legislature Web sites also won Awards of Excellence in this category.

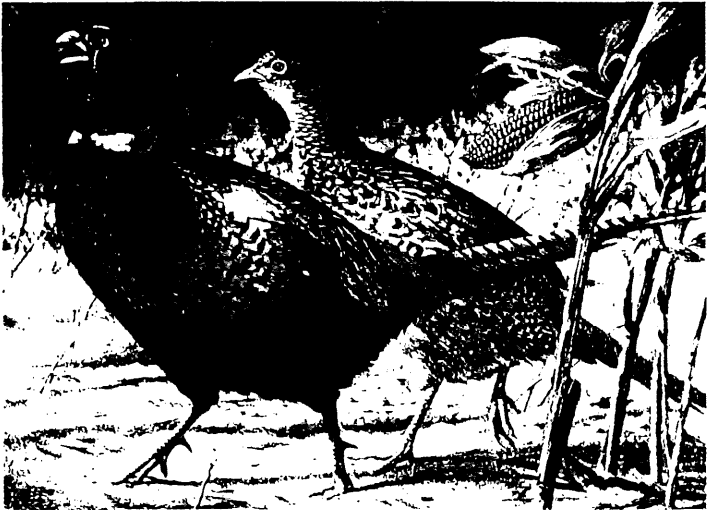
Enhance outreach with library links

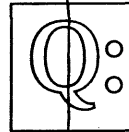
Pheasant Stamp 2002

IN THE WORKPLACE

Ethics is a regular feature prepared by DNR Human Resources Bureau staff designed to discuss ethical issues and determinations of special interest to DNR employees.



Particularly at this time of year vendors and other businesses give gifts to customers. Which, if any of those, can I accept without being in violation of ethics law and rules?

The state's code of ethics for executive branch employees prohibits acceptance of a "gift, reward, gratuity" from any source for activities related to the employee's duties except gifts of nominal* value, textbooks, plaques or similar mementos. This prohibition includes seasonal gifts from vendors, especially in cases where the employee getting the gift is directly or indirectly a decision-maker about the choice of provider, contract requirements or criteria, evaluation of products or services or similar processes.

This means that where it could be construed that acceptance of a gift from a profit or nonprofit organization influenced or will influence decisions about purchasing products or contracting for services, that gift should be refused. The best time to make such a refusal is when the

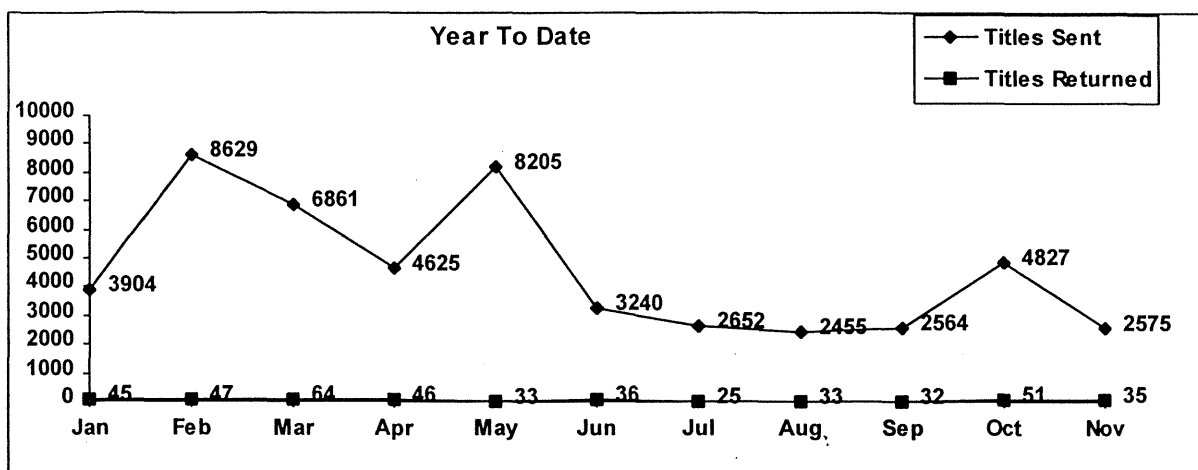
gift is offered, by saying something such as, "Thank you for the thought but state law prohibits me from accepting gifts."

If, on the other hand, the gift is truly a gift—that is, is not related to seeking or repaying business—particularly when it is given to an entire office or job site—not an individual—it may be accepted.

*Nominal value is not defined by the law but is generally construed to mean without market or retail value. For example, a book autographed by the author to you would have little resale value for someone else.

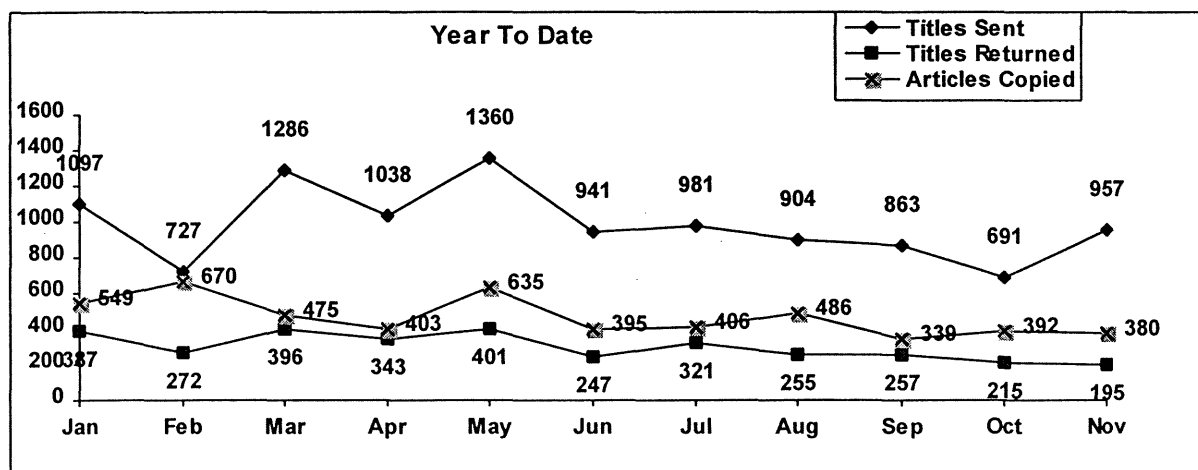

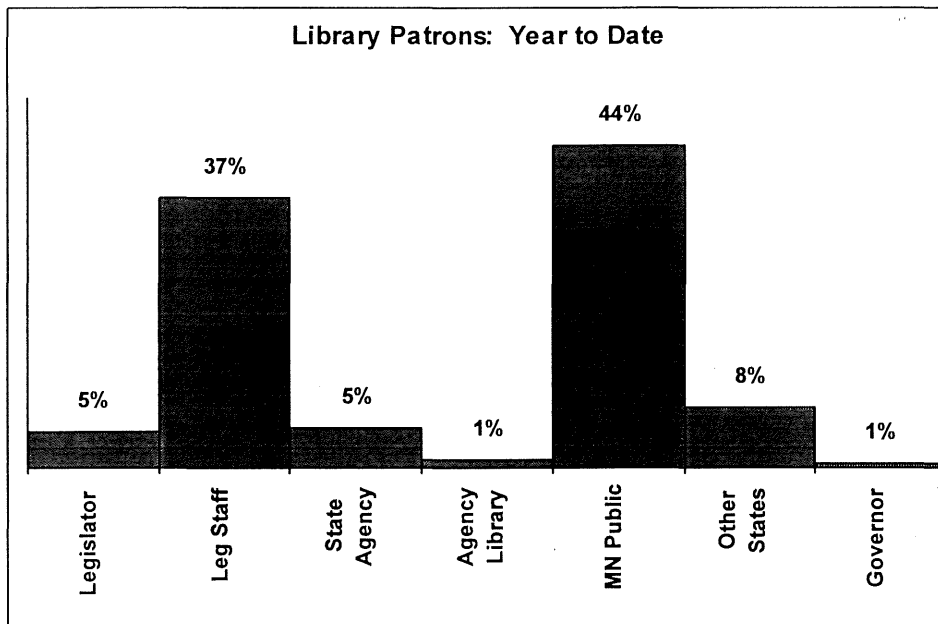
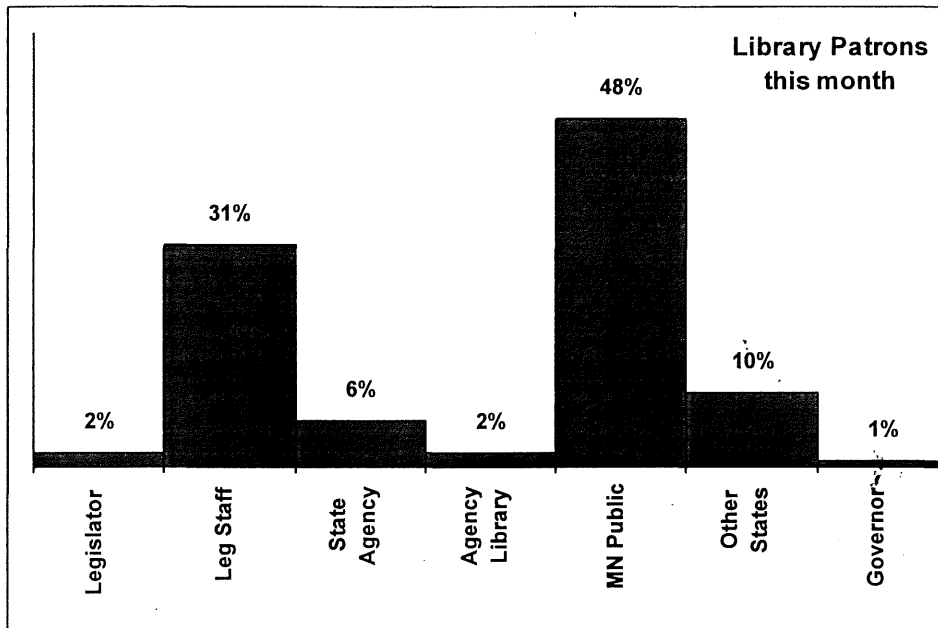

Monthly Report - October 2001

The state employee's strike caused some interesting situations, but little disruption of the Library's work. Several staff members were uncomfortable crossing the picket line. Betsy was involved in the Capitol Area Library Consortium presentation at the Minnesota Library Association Conference. - AWARD! The Minnesota Legislative Web site was selected by the Council of State Governments as the 2001 winner for the best Legislative Branch Web site. As part of this award, Leif was going to get his way paid to the CSG conference in Anchorage to pick up the Crystal Eagle award. Unfortunately, the terrorist attacks caused the conference to be cancelled. The awards will now be presented at the spring CSG meeting.
- Randi and Andrew worked to streamline and update the governor's veto pages on the Legislative Web Site. The information is complex and difficult to summarize in a clear table; they did a great job!

- The Legislative Youth Pages revision was completed. Randi coordinated the project; Betsy and Syble in the Library, and staff from the House and Senate all contributed to the new look and content.

Collections activities

- Randi held a web group meeting to plan enhancements to the Intranet site and define the scope of the project.
- David had to call the Congressional Joint Economic Committee regarding the publication *Economic Indicators*. The staff person told him they would be happy to send them to us but it may be awhile since all their mail is "frozen" due to the anthrax situation.
- Alissa completed downloading MARC records for the first batch of old consultant reports to send to the MNLAC Archives at the University.
- Alissa has marked all 2001 repealers that deal with reports. That information will now be added to Acq. and Pals.
- Jess finished entering the 2001 mandates.
- Problems with EBSCO, our periodicals vendor, seem to run in cycles. This month David had to deal with several problems, including a cancelled subscription due to their failure to pay the publisher.
- The cataloging backlog is gone! It is great to have our cataloging staff at full complement. Of course, this is the quietest time of year for adding new items to the collection, but we will be able to catalog the hundreds of state documents and mandated reports that arrive in 2002 in a very timely fashion.

Information Systems activities

- By the end of October, Leif and Syble had arrived at a stable and secure setup for the NT server. Unfortunately, *hardware* problems continue. Part of the testing phase turned into a stress test for the whole LRL network. The new server was handling everything we could throw at it – several staff were instructed to stream several video feeds simultaneously.
- Leif reported that there has been a lot of virus activity and many network security issues in the past few months.
- Lisa spent most of the past two months trying to learn Windows 2000 desktop management, and trying to discover any issues we might encounter when migrating to 2000.
- Leif set up remote e-mail access for Theresa and Robbie.
- Leif tested Netscape 6.1 and it failed, in his book. We will wait for 6.2 before considering a change.
- Leif dealt with several problems with the color printer.
- Lisa reworked the exclude lists on our harbor backups to make sure we are getting the most efficient use of our CPU time with Harbor and therefore the lowest costs possible. She also attended the annual Harbor Backup Seminar.
- Ruth helped Lisa convert a small dBase database to Access

2000 and set up a label report.

- Ruth set up an Inside Issues - Books and Reports shortcut on Helen's computer.

Reference activities

- The MN Issues group finished creating 3 new guides: Firearm Carry Laws, Legal Age, and Legislative Ethics. All are available on the Library's Web site. Carol has been analyzing our lack of style guidelines for Minnesota Issues and has come up with some additional proposed guidelines.
- David, Betsy, and Sarah, the *Introductions* team, have decided to use the Inside Issues topics for Introductions, instead of the old *Minnesota Resources* topics.
- Sarah finished a procedures manual for Inside Issues Books & Reports. She also trained in Helen as her substitute during her vacation.
- Several staff – David, Helen, Carol, Paul, Randi, Theresa, Sarah, Elizabeth, and Ruth - held two meetings to work out the thorny question of whether ACQ database entries could be used to generate Minnesota Resources and Introductions. It was decided that it was possible, and further, that the publications should be combined. A subgroup will be meeting in November to determine how the Minnesota Resources workflow can be streamlined. Once their work is complete, Ruth can work on a form/system (like we use for sending out Inside Issues for Books and Reports). The group will also be looking at increasing the likelihood that URLs will be added both to the ACQ database and the catalog record.
- Several staff – Helen, Sarah, David, Leif, Syble, Carol, Randi, Betsy, and Robbie – met on the last day of the month to discuss electronic services.
- Paul provided a basic Circ. Desk tutorial for the Library Aides.

- Tape Room research this month included tobacco sales to minors, profiles of learning, light rail transit, blue lights as a part of the rear brakes on vehicles, children in need of protective services for mental illness, response time limits for state agencies & local governments, and vulnerable adults.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Robbie and Randi spoke at length about the Minnesota Legislature's Web efforts with a Dutch researcher, Dr. Martin van As. He is part of a team that is investigating the best way the Dutch government can utilize ICT (information and communications technology) "to ensure the future of democracy in a modern and high-tech society."

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - September 2001

As the events of September 11 unfolded, quiet and somber staff members gathered around the Library's televisions and watched in horror. The State Office Building was locked down, but only one person from outside the Legislature tried to come to the Library. That person called first, and we suggested the following day might be a better choice.

Administration

- Robbie met with Greg Hubinger, Michele Timmons, and Sharon Harper to discuss the ongoing compensation study and possible modifications to the salary ranges for LCC employees.
- Elizabeth met with House, Senate, and other LCC staff on the legislatively-mandated parking ramp study. Several meetings occurred in September.
- Robbie participated in the planning process for a proposed Horizons Conference for legislators in January. Kathy Novak, Pat McCormack, Amy Vennewitz, Tim Edman, and Robbie planned a panel presentation; "In their own Words: Voices from Changing Minnesota." The plan is to have 'real people' talk about how changing demographics affect their communities.
- Robbie met with LCC directors and House and Senate fiscal analysts to discuss the LCC budget process recently completed, and how it could be improved in future biennia.
- Robbie met with Greg Hubinger, Chad Thuet, Michele Timmons, and Sharon Harper to discuss LCC payroll and timesheet policies, to make sure they are uniform across LCC offices.
- Lisa planned the Combined Charities Campaign kickoff event with staff from the Senate, House, Revisor and LCC.

Web Development Activities

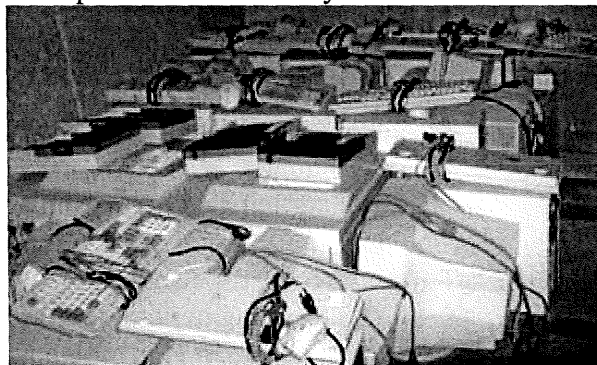
- Leif and Syble met with Senate Media about the transferring the Senate video archives to the Library's server.
- Leif and Syble several LSIG meetings; they included discussions and demonstration of firewall options and network design. Robbie attended LSIG policy-related meetings.
- Syble created a template for the Youth Pages and worked with Randi and Betsy on content.
- Randi evaluated a new page on the NCSL Web site with links to state legislative offices and e-mailed suggestions for additions to Doug Sacarto.

Collections activities

- Jess continued to enter records from reports mandated during the 2001 regular and special sessions. Her report merely stated, "mandates, mandates, mandates."
- Jess ran an ACQ purge that went considerably more smoothly than last summer. With this process, she deleted records of the items we have ordered and received more than a year ago. (All these items should be in the online catalog at this point.) She created a folder/notebook to keep examples of some of the reports and numbers of items purged. She deleted 5 non-recurring mandates, 239 ordered items and their associated order records, 17 cancelled orders, 637 received items with no associated order records, 96 consultant's report records, 488 nonrecurring MN document records, and 60 consultant's contracts with no associated item record, for a grand total of...1542!
- David discovered a glitch in our acquisitions database that created incorrect annual totals for our acquisitions statistics. To correct it, Ruth added Order and Beg radio buttons to Acq. item screens and updated the queries for statistics reports.
- Alissa has started the consultant's report project. (We are transferring some of the oldest, lowest-interest reports to the MNLAC storage center at the U.) She is pulling the shelf-list cards and then David will train her to use the MARC editor in PALSTAC.
- David met with Helen to discuss her goals for the next year and training issues regarding Alissa and Theresa.
- Teresa Wolner joined the staff as a cataloger, and the catalogers had a meeting to discuss items that are of interest to catalogers.
- Helen received authority corrections from PALS, and assigned portions of the list to Theresa and Sarah. She started working on correcting authority errors.
- Kelly processed 36 added volumes, withdrew 6 Items from the collection, copied 179 Contents Page articles, copied 1,872 Contents Pages, claimed 37 Missing Periodical Issues: 21 were EBSCO, 8 were free and 8 were Minnesota periodicals.

Information Systems activities

- Many staff met for further planning of the All-Time Legislators Database. This project includes staff from all areas of the Library. Many staff are involved – testing Ruth's screen designs and thinking of problems during the testing stage, such as coming up with defunct counties. This shows that it is tricky to provide a set list of counties when we get to entering data for the older biennia. Based on decisions of the planning group, Ruth continued on the code for creating data entry screens.
- Leif worked with reference staff to set up some e-mail filters to automatically delete virus-laden e-mails from repeat 'offenders.'
- Leif spent a large amount of time doing research and working out technical and political issues regarding the proposed firewall system. This included meeting with Intertech staff, attending hardware and software demonstrations, and meeting with the LSIG group.
- Leif planned for and dealt with a planned campus-wide power outage. He also dealt with an *unplanned* outage several days later.
- Ruth (with Leif's help) surplused badly outdated computer equipment that the library has accumulated over the years, and updated the inventory database.



- Ruth installed a touchpad on Kelly's computer and showed her how to use it.
- Ruth created 448 August/September Minnesota Resources and updated the State Documents Web page.
- Leif and Syble installed memory into the new NT server. Syble installed additional software on the NT such as a manager for the RAID controller, the KVM switch and the UPS. Extensive troubleshooting was needed.
- Syble created some new banners for the House.
- Syble upgraded WebTrends, our statistical software for analyzing Web use.

Reference activities

- Senate Media Services asked if we could hold several legislative-related videos and circulate them to the public. They thought they would be more accessible from our library open to the public than from their office. Although most of our materials circulate directly only to state employees, we were happy to make this exception to get the great Senate videos in the hands of organizations and teachers who want to use them.
- Elizabeth, Randi, and Betsy met to plan for upcoming training classes for legislative offices, ranging from introductory overviews of library services to advanced Web searching classes.
- Betsy was interviewed by Kristen Allen who is working with the Dept. of Applied Economics at the University of MN on an evaluation of their department Web site. Betsy was able to advise her on what makes a Web site a good resource, as well as the types of reports the Library collects from the Dept.
- We added a new topic to the Inside Issues scanning service, "security issues." Ruth updated the data entry form and Web page.
- Sarah wrote an essay on the economic and safety aspects of the Air Transportation industry for the September issue of *Introductions*.
- David completed a Web information guide on firearm carry Minnesota issues. He met with Jim Cleary to make sure the guide is complete and correct; Jim had a lot of helpful suggestions.
- Carol participated in jury duty, giving many staff an opportunity to code each day's papers. The aides, as usual, preferred Carol's coding!
- It is interesting to note when our Web Minnesota Issues guides are used. This month a posting on the "Minnesota Politics" listserv mentioned the chronology in our Northwest Airlines guides, and even included the text.
- Sarah updated the 2000 redistricting notebooks with copies of clippings.

- Tape Room topics included: drive-by shootings, gas wholesalers, profile of learning, & sports stadiums.
- Jess helped researchers working for the Indian Poverty Law Center with an interesting legislative history from last year. The bill they were researching passed during the regular session. Then it was picked up again in special session, where the only change they made was to add the term "involuntarily" to the prior amendment. It was great because it so clearly delineated the process by changing it in two specific increments. They were really happy because they had been using the statutes online, but didn't know about Table 2, so they didn't have the most recent version, and the change made in special session benefited them and their work a lot.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Paul provided an informational session on legislative history to Aviva Breen's law school class of approximately 50 students at Wm. Mitchell Law School.
- Jim Lee and Theresa Wolner, our newest staff members, received training in all areas of library activities. We like to have our new staff feel at home as soon as possible and that was helped along with a Capitol tour. Jess reported she "gave Jim and Theresa a tour of the capitol complex, and really lucked out by stopping by the Governor's office

where Linda Feist popped out and took us on an extensive tour through all the offices up and downstairs in the capitol...including the wall of glossy photos downstairs, one of which shows Eartha Kitt doing a handstand on the Governor's desk. Then we went to the House chambers, where Pat Murphy (of the Capitol Offenders softball team fame) was working on editing the journals. He brought us in and gave us a tour of the chamber and the receiving room, including a lesson in its natural acoustics. Jim even got to hit the gavel!"

- Nearly every staff member participated in Theresa and Jim's training. Thanks to everyone for helping to train two staff person in at once.
- Randi escorted SLA Global President Hope Tillman to many events, including an SLA meeting. Gave her a tour of LRL.
- Sarah reported on a tour. "I gave a tour yesterday to a new employee from Senate Republican Research. He had nothing but good to say of the library, and mentioned several times that we have an excellent reputation among his colleagues."

Staff training, meetings, and professional activities

- David attended the PALS DDC/User Council meeting as a substitute for Robbie.
- Syble attended the annual NCSL NALIT (National Association of Legislative Information Technology) conference in Springfield, Illinois – a great learning experience, she reported.
- Robbie wrote the final report of the Minnesota Library Association Library Management Round Table activities for the annual conference.
- LRL hosted the September meeting of Minntrodocs, the group of Minnesota government documents librarians. The meeting included a very interesting overview of the Minnesota State Law Library's Service to Prisoners program.
- Lisa attended training at Benchmark on Windows 2000 workstation. She reported picking up many good tips.

- The Minnesota Library Association requested nominations for the "Paraprofessional of the year" award in its newsletter. Paul came to mind right away. The managers put together a nomination and submitted it; hopefully the judges will see the wisdom of our choice.
- Robbie met with LCC and Revisor's Office staff to discuss LCC Payroll and time sheet policies.
- Lisa was busy with many personnel activities. She posted the Library Aide position, Library Assistant position, and the cataloger position (for the second time). She set up interviews for vacant Library Assistant position, and sent the resulting rejection letters. After hiring, she prepared orientation packets for Jim Lee and Theresa Wolner.

Web Development Activities

- Ruth began creating the tables and data entry forms for the ATLD (All-Time Legislators Database).
- Randi arranged a meeting of legislative staff interested in working on a revision of the Legislature's Youth Pages. Betsy and Syble participated. The youth pages were delayed by the state fair and vacations, but should be ready by mid-September.
- Syble met with Jenny Nash to discuss Senate media archives. The Senate is shifting their entire archives of video coverage to the Library.

Collections activities

- Jess is working hard to enter records for all of the reports mandated by the 2001 session. As she put it, "special session did me no favors."
- Kelly processed 20 added volumes, copied 269 Contents Page articles, claimed 51 missing Periodical issues: 5 were EBSCO, 26 were free and 20 were Minnesota Periodicals. She also copied 1,896 contents pages for the month of August.
- Ruth created a Word label document for Kelly for periodical weeding. She set up a shortcut to enter the text "Current issue

on display" to cut down on typing. Kelly had been typing these on a typewriter. Ruth also looked for other shortcuts keys for her in Word.

Information Systems activities

- Ruth finished converting the personnel database to Access 2000, and then began the inevitable corrections and changes.

Monthly Report - July 2001

Administration

- Leif moved several workstations for staff desk height adjustments, ADK staff adjusted the work surface heights, and then Leif put the workstations in order again. This turned out to be an inexpensive ergonomic adjustment that several staff have felt was very beneficial.
- Ruth started making list of surplus items, largely old chairs. We purchased several new chairs in June. Some were so old and bad that surplus did not want them and we had to pay for disposal!
- The managers and director completed most staff reviews.
- Lisa put out the advertisement for the ILL position, set up the interviews, prepared the interview packets, and sent out the rejection letters.
- On July 31, the Library was the scene of a going-away party for the long-time Director of the Legislative Commission on the Economic Status of Women, Aviva Breen.

Web Development Activities

- Randi convened a multi-legislative-office task force to work on the Youth pages for the legislative web site. Randi, Syble, and Betsy joined staff from other legislative offices to evaluate the present offerings on the site and plan additional content and improved design and access.
- Randi attended a meeting of state agency librarians (CALCO) about Web issues. She volunteered to help revamp the library information on North Star.

Collections activities

- Helen finished updating a draft of the cataloging procedures. David has also been working on cataloging and acquisitions procedures.
- Kelly claimed 25 missing periodical issues: 10 were EBSCO, 4 were free, 10 were Minnesota periodicals and 1 was an order direct. Kelly processed 94 added volumes, copied 180 Contents Page Articles, and copied 2,266 Contents Pages.
- Ruth spent some time looking into an Acquisitions statistics problem with Minnesota Documents. She may have to add new fields to the database.

Information Systems activities

- Leif and Syble met with Intertech for information discovery related to the Network Architecture study, a 'whiteboard session.' Leif worked with LSIG on many issues regarding the network architecture study and the implementation of a firewall.

- Many staff took part in several All-time Legislators Database discussions about the data dictionary and definitions. Several staff tried to find members with the most complex histories (i.e. served in more than one body, discontinuous service, served in the territorial Legislature, etc.). Work on describing the fields is complete; Ruth has begun work on coding data entry screens. She also converted Marion Matter's common databases to Access 2000 to use with ATLD. Marion had begun work on the ATLD some years ago.

- Leif and Lisa developed a workstation migration plan (which is proceeding ahead of schedule!).

- Leif dealt with several network security and virus issues. July was a busy month for email virii!

- Leif dealt with a weekend network outage that was caused by some construction in the DOT building (and poor coordination by Intertech so that the outage could have been prevented).

From now on, based on the outcome of our discussion with you, and by seeking views and advice of domestic experts, among others, NTT Data Corp. intends to deepen our e-democracy arguments in an effort to construct a better-ever e-government.

Democracy is a political process that should be kept checked and improved, while its value accrues when it is in practice. For this reason, we believe your activity, outstandingly pragmatic, should highly be evaluated. We hope this acquaintance of ours might help us enjoy collaboration with you in our commitments to e-democracy. Also, we would be happy if we could have a chance to be of any help to you.

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biometric and face-recognition entry devices now on the market. It found that none of the seven finger scans that it tested allowed an unauthorized user to have access (false positives), although some denied access to authorized users (false negatives). The magazine staff tried to fool face-recognition software with a mask, but both devices rejected the attempt when they were set on higher security settings. "Iris recognition technology is generally considered the most accurate of biometrics," but its expense and awkward set-up may inhibit widespread use, according to "Bio-Keys," June 12, 2001.

□ The Minnesota Legislative Reference Library has compiled a useful reference list of privacy-related resources, at www.leg.state.mn.us/lrl/issues/privacy.htm.

□ Privacy aficionados in Arizona have a new resource. The Society for the Study and Advancement of Consumer Privacy is a think-tank that focuses on consumer protection and policy advisement for corporations. It was founded by Willy Bills, a legally-trained activist focusing on collection and abuses of Social Security numbers (P.O. Box 44326, Tucson, Ariz. 85733, 520/322-9117).

□ For the first time in its eight years, the Clinton Administration reported a decrease in its record-breaking use of electronic surveillance. There were 479 federal installations in 2000, as compared to 601 in 1999 and 340 in the year before Clinton took office. The Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts, which is required to compile the data, added a category of "portable devices" among the targets of wiretap orders, and it discovered that this new category accounted for 75 percent of all the surveillance reported. The 2000 Wiretap Report is available at www.uscourts.gov/wiretap00/2000wt.txt.pdf. A table displaying results of past wiretap reports since 1968 is at www.epic.org/privacy/wiretap/stats/wiretap_stats.html.

□ The regular survey by the American Management Association (AMA) reveals that workplace surveillance continues to rise. Its 2001 Annual Survey on Workplace Monitoring and Surveillance finds that nearly 80 per cent of all major U.S. companies carry out some form of employee monitoring, a dramatic increase from 35 in 1997. Approximately 63 per cent review employees' Internet use and 43 percent monitor e-mail. Furthermore, 25 per cent of companies say they have fired employees and 65 per cent have disciplined employees for misuse of these

services. Other common forms of surveillance include telephone monitoring and video surveillance. A summary is available at www.amanet.org/research/pdfs/ems_short2001.pdf.

□ "The amount of personal information collected via the Internet may ultimately be dwarfed by what will be collected through [handheld] wireless technology," writes Ontario Privacy Commission Ann Cavoukian in her 2000 Annual Report, "Privacy, Access, You Need Both." (45 pages, from IPC, 416/326-3333, www.ipc.on.ca). In a section on "privacy goals for a wireless world," she wrote, "Organizations need to introduce strict controls for what is collected and introduce automated purging procedures deleting anything beyond the basic information needed to conduct a particular transaction. . . . Users should be able to select and activate privacy and security technology that is independent of the particular cell-phone manufacturer or carrier."

□ In "Protecting Privacy With Deceptive Trade Practices Legislation," St. John's University Professor of Law Jeff Sovern traces the developing use of federal and state laws against deceptive practices as a weapon against on-line abuses of personal information by businesses, 69 *Fordham Law Rev.* 1305 (2001).

□ *Hack Attacks Revealed: A Complete Reference With Custom Security Hacking Toolkit* (944 pages with CD, \$59.99) and *Hack Attacks Denied: A Complete Guide to Network Lock-down* (491 pages with CD, \$54.99) by networking engineer John Chirillo have been published by Wiley Computer Publishing, www.wiley.com/compbooks).

□ "Mobilizing Information and Technology to Improve Health Care Quality: Resources for Administrative Simplification" is a reference guide for health-care providers to comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Administration Act (83 pages from Massachusetts Health Data Consortium, 781/890-6040, www.mahealthdata.org).

□ "Current technology allows a single cyber-marketing company to send half a billion personalized ad mails via the World Wide Web everyday," says a report by the European Commission, which estimates that Internet subscribers are paying the equivalent of \$11.8 billion in hidden costs as a result. A group called CAUCE, Coalition Against Unsolicited Commercial E-Mail, has been formed to represent the interests of small businesses in curbing un-

I am very happy that the Special Session has ended, and that our budget has been set. I can only imagine how thrilled *you* are to be finished.

Beside sending the monthly report, I want to highlight a couple of cool things underway.

The All-Time Legislators Database

We have resumed work on a project we first began discussing in 1989 – the creation of an All-Time Legislators Database. When the database is completed, anyone will be able to search the Web for information on legislators from statehood to the present. You will be able to search for information on individuals, or find all the members ever from a particular city, or all women Democrats, or the names of all members born in Norway. I have included a description of the project. The description sounds deceptively simple; tracking legislative information is very complex. This is a huge project, but the time is right.

Tracking for cost of Reports

We added a new field in the database we use to track reports required by the Legislature, for the cost of the report. Agencies are required to include the cost of preparing a report (MS 3.197). By adding this information to our database, we will be able to compile a list of the total cost of all reports submitted by Human Services in a year, for example. (Right now we would have to look up and pull all the reports from our shelves in order to pull together the information.)

Administration

- News reporters, both from the Twin Cities and Greater Minnesota, are regular library users. Carol received this thank you: "Wonderful. How did we do this before the Internet? Thanks for your efforts, Carol. ----- Jeff Pieters Reporter Post-Bulletin."
- David received ane-mail from a legislative staffer. "Thanks again, David. You LRL folks are real professionals and great colleagues."
- Former legislators still call with occasional questions. Robbie received the response, "I've been absolutely absorbed with the information you sent me on Carver's Cave - it is fabulous. Thank you very much. Cheers."
- At the end of session so many of our requests are very time-sensitive; actually, many people seem frantic. Sarah

received this e-mail, "Thanks Sarah - excellent work and very timely too."

- With e-mail thank you notes so common these days, Betsy was surprised to receive two handwritten notes. A legislator and one of the Speaker's staff took time out to write and thank Betsy for locating just the materials they needed.

Leif, Carol, Toshi, Alison, Sarah, Clayton, Randi, and Elizabeth moved many boxes of newspaper clippings from the bottom shelves to the Revisor's storage room until the carpet dried out. It was a mess!
- We held two "clean-up" days. May 5 was electronic clean-up day, when staff were encouraged to clean out their documents and e-mail folders. Shared folders were scrutinized and un-needed files deleted. On May 25, staff cleaned their offices and common areas and were rewarded with pizza!
- Plans were made for a nice send-off for Diane, and plans were made for posting her position and interviewing the candidates. Diane worked for the Library for 15 years, and leaves a legacy of high-quality records in our catalog, which will help researchers for many years to come.

handle the circulation of reference materials through the Inside Issues for Books and Reports service. They came up with a workable solution.

- The reference librarians held a Friday afternoon informal weeding session on May 19, and came up with many items to cull (and NOT have to transfer to the new MNLINK system next year). There shouldn't be any problem with getting rid of things like the Frommer guide to Minneapolis/St. Paul - 1988 - or *Strengthening the Arkansas Legislature* from 1972.
- Charlie Rogers from the State Archives gave a lunchtime talk on our materials over at the Archives that most public services staff were able to attend. We have an amazing amount of material at the Archives. There are 178 boxes of House Minutes, 258 boxes of House tapes, 197 boxes of Senate Committee books, and 91 boxes of Senate tapes, just to mention one type of material.
- Alissa worked hard to keep up with the clippings on greater Minnesota legislators from the clipping service; she made an alphabetical list of the legislators to make it easier to code. She no longer has to flip through the green book when she is unsure of a legislator's district number.
- Reference librarians applauded the passage of Chapter 179, which repeals the requirement that agencies proposing rules must research the legislators who were responsible for the passage of any statutory authority for the agency's rulemaking authority. Over the years *many* agency staff have spent *much* time trying to research laws passed long ago, and identifying legislators who have long since left legislative service.

Sarah reported a story that nicely illustrates how interesting legislative research can be. "Misha and I have been performing some heroic ILLs for a patron at the legislative auditor's office. This patron is doing research on grant management accountability, a topic which has gotten significant attention from tiny UK agencies but almost none in the U.S., and so the items that she has been requesting are only owned by three British libraries, or, in the case of one 1981 report, no longer extant on this or any other planet. I've been begging and borrowing transatlantically, which has resulted in jpegs of tables of contents, and other aid from fine British librarians. Plus this: "Forget the photocopying charges as myself and my colleagues are being made redundant and leave ... this Friday! I'll do it for you in the next couple of days and send it to you." (From a librarian at a UK nonprofit.)

Training and tours conducted by staff

Monthly Report - April 2001

Administration

- April began with our budget hearing with the Library Subcommittee. Sen. Higgins was not able to attend, but Representatives Mary Murphy and Bruce Anderson, and Senator Dennis Frederickson seemed interested and supportive; they approved the budget as presented. Robbie and Leif continued to attend hearings as the appropriations bills continued through the committee process, ready to answer any questions about the Library's needs.
- Lisa met with a salesperson from CSI ergonomics about chairs and keyboard trays. We will be getting new chairs and keyboard trays for those who were determined to be the most needy on the ergonomics survey done by the Department of Employee Relations. Tester chairs are going around for those people right now.
- Lisa prepared an orientation packet and met with Alison Doane to do new employee orientation. Alison is our newest Library Aide.

Web Development Activities

- Randi created a legislative web page consolidating subscription lists offered by various legislative offices.
- Betsy created a page for the Legislative Web Site with all the district finder options.
- Randi, Leif & Syble worked on the suggestion made by Mike Speiker to create a mailing list for the "What's New" information on the Legislative Web Site. Syble created the html, and set up and coded the Active Server Page so that we could offer an online form for users to subscribe to the list. Syble and Leif set up the list welcome, farewell, and signature messages that subscribers would receive.
- Randi worked with the Revisor's office to solve miscellaneous problems with older legislation on the web.
- At a recent meeting of LNET, the legislative webmasters agreed to collect referrer field statistics on the log files for a few weeks. This helps Webmasters analyze what other sites are linking to the Legislature, or how users move through the Legislative Web Site. The data has not been completely analyzed yet. One interesting thing that showed up was a large number of referrals from the Minnesota Twins Web Site. Twins fans were referred to the Legislature's Web Site for information on the Twins Stadium bill. Syble worked

with Webmasters on setting up the collection of statistics and tailoring the reports to reflect the new information.

Collections activities

- Diane and Helen continued to attack the glut of state documents that are submitted at the beginning of each year. Diane experienced some computer problems, both at OCLC and with feeder access to Minnesota.
- David changed our OCLC profile so we get only one set of catalog cards. (Every time we can save a few dollars, it's a good thing!) Once we migrate to Aleph and bar code the collection, we won't need any.
- In anticipation of bar coding next year, we are working to clean up our collection as much as possible. We don't want to spend staff time processing items we don't want, nor spend the cash on the bar codes. David arranged for a 'quick and dirty' weeding on a Friday afternoon. The reference librarians pulled two carts of materials in short order, and Kelly withdrew the 305 items.
- David and Robbie evaluated consultants reports from the 1970s for possible storage at the MNLAC storage center at the University. There were many interesting reports – worthy of long-term retention, but likely to be used so seldom that waiting a day for them won't present a problem. *Effects of Ozone and Sulfur Dioxide and In Mixture on Soybean Cultivar Hodgson and other major Soybean Cultivars of Minnesota* isn't needed every day! Nor is the interesting 1970s series of reports done for the Department of Corrections, recommending various industries as possibilities for prisoners to undertake - sewing, making prescription eyeglasses, laundry and housekeeping supplies, and book binding.
- Kelly processed 174 added volumes, copied 2,330 Contents Pages, copied 293 Contents Page Articles, and claimed 21 missing periodicals.
- Ruth created an Access report for David showing all our orders for Amazon.com and total cost. This was part of our long, horrible negotiations with Amazon. We are NOT continuing a relationship with them.
- Andrew learned the procedures and began preparing Minnesota documents for microfilming.
- It will be challenging to keep up with the cataloging load once Diane has gone, and her replacement is being hired. However, Sarah reports, "I'm continuing to increase the speed and output of items that I catalog. While I'm not yet at the level of a Diane or a Helen, I'm feeling a lot more confident, and hope, over the month of May, to start

cataloging "solo" so there won't be a huge disruption when Diane leaves."

Information Systems activities

- Leif and Lisa finalized the latest software upgrade plan, and Lisa upgraded software on most of the staff computers. This was a 90 minute to 3 hour project at each workstation, depending on the computer. (Upgrading is complex, even with standard workstation configurations, and Leif and Lisa found themselves troubleshooting at many turns.)
- Lisa searched the internet and found the best prices for our planned purchase of the following software: Flash, additional copies of Dreamweaver, MS Project, and Macromedia Fireworks Studio.
- Ruth worked on the Publications database and made a few minor changes. She updated the Docs on Fiche form to abbreviate titles and publisher names to fit on fiche headers. She created Andrew's Minnesota Resource worksheet for URL's sorted by agency. She is researching linking the publications database to the Acquisitions system to cut down on data entry for Andrew. She created a test data entry screen.
- Ruth created a Codebook User Manual and gave to Carol to review.
- Ruth created 404 March/April 2000 *Introductions*, and 453 April *MN Resources*.
- Leif resolved IP authentication problems accessing ProQuest in the Taperoom.
- Leif worked out the specifications for new server hardware to upgrade our NT4 server.
- Leif worked on the SIA (Security Impact Analysis) commonalities and confirmed with each leg. office that it was OK to make it public within the legislature.

Reference activities

- We subscribe to a clipping service for news articles on legislators from Greater Minnesota papers. During session, there are lots of clips! Alissa reported, "April was a busy month, being inundated with clippings. I was caught up with the ones from the clipping agency, only needing copies to be made so that I could continue to code. When Toshi came back, I received so many of the clippings back that they didn't even fit in my mailbox! It has been my mission to get these back to the aides as soon as possible so that I can see my desk."
- Andrew, Randi, and Elizabeth met to discuss the turnover and retirement notebooks. They decided it would be best to

merge the two notebooks into one. Randi, Elizabeth, and David were all under the mistaken impression that all the Zona notebooks were cataloged but it turns out that only the subject notebooks (the blue ones) are. This team is slowly working on getting these notebooks in shape. Andrew finished the work on merging these notebooks and filling in the gaps. Randi, David, and Elizabeth are trying to figure out whether to renumber the whole set.

- Betsy and others continued to give tours to new high school pages. Betsy has really been the key page-tour-giver this year.
- Paul and Elizabeth considered not putting the Minnesota Resources documents on reserve and in doing so opened a can of worms. No one has looked at the whole Minnesota Resources process for awhile and there are some confusing and duplicative pieces of the process. This process has been streamlined a little bit but because so many of the processes will change next year with MNLink it may not be worth implementing major changes.
- **Library Aides News**
 - Toshi returned from Japan. We really missed him and his speedy work (although his speedy work overwhelmed Alissa!).
 - Michael helped out when Toshi was gone and then decided to stay on a more limited basis. It fits in with his new job working at a law firm. Welcome back Michael.
 - Alison Doane started as an aide. She plans on beginning a library degree at St. Catherine's next fall and will be working as an aide while pursuing that degree. She is the sister of former aide Josh Doane.

The .leg hits just keep on coming

Look at the number of hits for the first quarter of 2001 and you can conclude one of two things about the Minnesota legislative Web site: Either huge numbers of people are getting information about the legislative session through the site or one guy in his basement is typing <http://www.leg.state.mn.us> on his computer and hitting the reload button millions of times.

In the first three months of 1996, the Web site recorded 141,000 hits. For the same period in 2001, there were 11.6 million. About 25 percent of those hits come from legislative staff, another 25 percent from state agencies, and the rest from "Joe Public," said Leif Eischen, information systems manager for the Legislative Reference Library.

Using the computer to get information *should* reduce the costs for paper, but Eischen said some people still prefer the old methods, particularly with copies of legislative bills.

"They kind of like to see that official engrossment in their hands," he said.

Meanwhile, if you need witnesses for the Finance Committee hearings, look no further than William Mitchell folks!

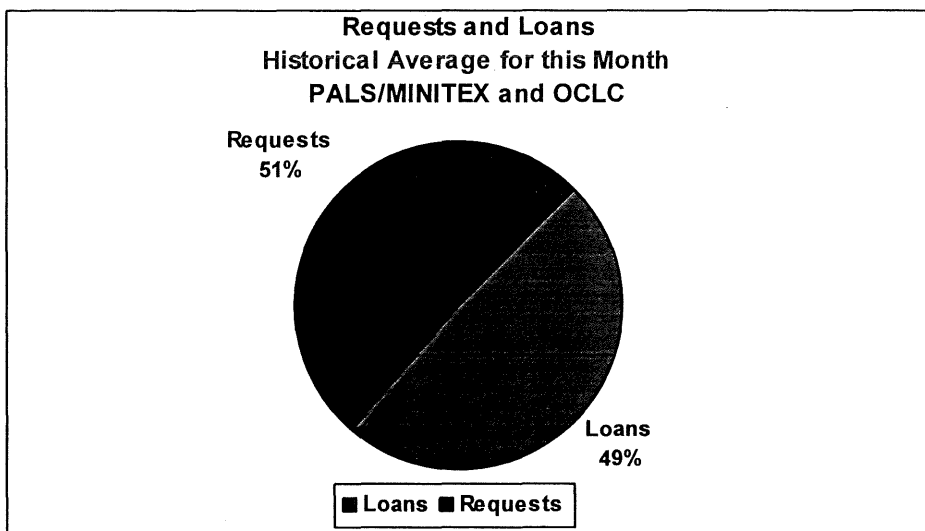
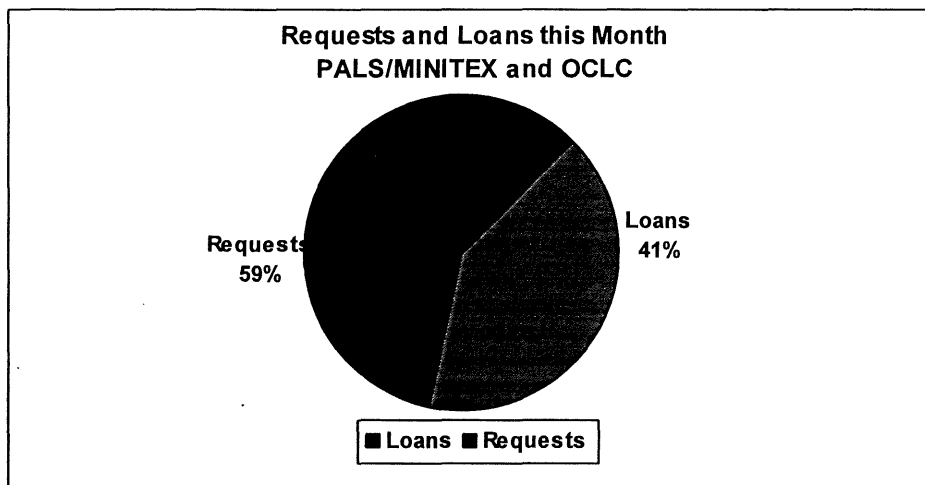

Monthly Report - March 2001

Administration

- The Manager's Team met to go over the quarterly project planning process and note progress made.
- The Library's Subcommittee was appointed. The members are Representatives Bruce Anderson and Mary Murphy, and Senators Dennis Frederickson and Linda Higgins. All except Senator Higgins have served on the subcommittee before.
- Planning for the Library's budget request continued. Leif met with Greg Hubinger several times to discuss LCC technology initiatives. Greg was also helpful in examining all the lines of the Library's budget. Lisa set up the Library Subcommittee meeting for budget review, for April 4. This was no easy task! During this busy time, it was almost impossible to find a time to suit all the members.
- Robbie met with an LCC task force to create a technology acceptable use policy. The group chose to use existing House policy as a model, enhancing and augmenting it for our situation. The policy was ratified by the LCC at its March 16 meeting.
- Lisa met with House, Senate and LCC staff to discuss change of vendor for service awards. We put out a request for proposal for a new vendor since Creative Promotions has not been performing very well.

Web Development Activities

- The group OMB Watch released a report comparing state legislative Web Sites; an embargoed copy was made available to state web producers via NCSL. It was a cursory job, done last summer, and filled with inaccuracies. On behalf of the Minnesota Legislature, Randi, Syble, and the Web Team put together an excellent response, pointing out the errors and omissions regarding Minnesota's site.
- Randi talked to Pioneer Press Reporter Debra O'Connor for two hours. O'Connor wrote a feature article on citizen use of the Legislative Web Site.

Collections activities

- In the first three months of 2001 we received 244 reports that were mandated by the Legislature. We received 468 mandated reports in all of 2000, so you can see that over half come at the beginning of the year. For those of you who aren't familiar with this process, I have appended a copy of our form letter requesting a mandated document. On the back of the letter is the title page of the document that was submitted, just one of *many* that came last week.

Information Systems activities

- Sarah has been working about two to three hours a week with Diane on cataloguing, with Helen providing ready reference in Diane's absence. Sarah reported, "I am picking up the volume of original items catalogued. In March I catalogued fifteen items (twelve original and three copy), a fifteenfold increase over February's total of zero."
- Jess and David worked with Ruth to put URL fields in most of the Acquisition Database records.
- David wrote procedures for a systematic method of adding URLs to MNDOC records. We have been trying to make sure if a print publication has an electronic equivalent, that the URL is on the online catalog record, so users could just click on a link and go the document right from the catalog.
- Amazon.com has become the new bane of Jess's existence. "Their billing system is such that it is nearly impossible to track a problem after the fact. I have spent hours upon hours trying to track a problem from our end, including going back over every single book we have ordered from them since I started in this position, but to no avail. I am currently waiting to hear their response to my latest message which outlines for them the dates and amounts of the checks that they claim not to have received that they have ALREADY CASHED. We will not be ordering from them ever again if it is in ANY way avoidable."
- Diane fielded questions from library staff at the Intertechnologies Group on shelving and filing of call numbers. (Our catalogers are often called on as experts.)
- Leif, Robbie, Syble, and Lisa met with Intertech and Esperia, security consultants, for the library's Security Impact Analysis debriefing.
- Leif's comment about his March activities: "Security, budget, security, budget, security, budget." Leif was especially caught up in the Security Impact Analysis report. We are planning our internal improvements, and he is working with a group of legislative technical staff to plan a legislative-wide perimeter firewall project. The new group has been dubbed LSIG, for Legislative Security and Infrastructure Group.
- Lisa updated the Public PCs with a new version of CLIENT 32. Computers 2 and 3 would not accept the new version of CLIENT 32, so she just made some modifications to them to make them run a little better. She ran Virus scan and Speed Disk on the PC's and cleaned off the temp files.
- Leif and Robbie met with Paul Schweizer and Dennis Kern to discuss the House's long term IS plans.
- Leif worked with Intertech and the other legislative offices to devise a tight set of access control rules for the router. These have been applied as a first line of defense while we work on implementing a firewall.

Reference activities

- Leif worked with Intertech on getting some additional computers scanned for security vulnerabilities. Basically, he requests that Intertech staff do their best to hack our computers, to be sure we have not missed any important precautions.
 - Leif replaced a CPU cooling fan in the Taperoom workstation.
 - Leif shut down the servers to do swap around the UPS's (Universal Power Supplies) because the battery was failing on the one attached to our main server.
 - Leif worked on legislative wide address book issues with the Revisor's office, the OLA, the LCC, and the House.
 - Leif and Elizabeth have been driven to distraction trying to solve the IP authentication problems for FirstSearch databases – so we can make them available to all legislative staff. What should have taken a half hour took many hours on Leif's part, and many contacts with FirstSearch staff, to straighten out.
 - Lisa and Leif reviewed our Harbor/LAN backup profiles for each server. The backup profiles are reviewed often, to be sure we are not paying to back more than is needed.
 - Leif planned computer training for several staff.
-
- Michael O'Gara, who had worked for the Library as an Aide for a year and a half, resigned. Elizabeth posted the job ad for new Library Aides. Rep. Erhardt came in and asked if he could apply for the library aide job we had posted. He said it would probably pay more than his job. Even though Michael resigned, Elizabeth pressed him back into service when Toshi was called back to Japan due to his father's death.
 - Sarah wrote a great 'canned response' to send to folks who send us e-mail messages requesting us to pass laws on this or that topic, not realizing that librarians don't have much power to change laws! The message directs the writer to his or her members, and helps them identify who those people might be.
 - Paul had a good idea—to make slips to count circulation statistics that often go unreported – such as giving extra copies of state documents instead of checking them out, copying short reports instead of checking them out, printing a report off the Internet rather than checking it out if it is in our collection, letting someone check out something "for a minute" without filling out a checkout slip, etc. The slips are both at the circulation desk and the reference desk..
 - Alissa pitched in for several staff this month. She helped with Minnesota document processing after Laura left, and entered Inside Issues requests when Kelly was gone. News clippings about legislators from Greater Minnesota papers have been coming in droves, and when copies needed to be made, they were back on her desk in short order. "Toshi is a very fast and efficient copier," she noted. Finally, she helped by scanning magazines near the end of the

- Several questions regarding the recommendations of the Early Care and Education Finance Commission (sq)

▪ Several questions regarding lawyer-client disputes (one woman expressed deep frustration at all the "goddamn lawyers" in the Minnesota Bar Association) (sq)

▪ Elizabeth was asked for some statistical information about all the townships and cities within the Taconite Tax Relief Area. "I made a few calls and was surprised that no one in the Revenue Department or at the IRRRB had this information at their fingertips--don't they need to know? (Actually the IRRRB had a staff member who was on vacation who was rumored to have a list but she was going to be gone for several weeks.) The Legislative GIS office did not have a list but they did have a great map. The map made it immediately clear why this list was not easy to come by--the Taconite Tax Relief Area is comprised of the school districts in which mining activity occurs and school districts definitely do not follow township lines.

▪ Elizabeth spent a long time tracking down the proportion of the state budget appropriated to K-12 education over the last 40 years. There are a lot of reasons why this information is not readily available-- Minnesota miracle changes in funding in the early 1970s, weird budget things going on in the early 1980s, changes in the amount the state funds, etc--but a researcher in the Finance Department helped Elizabeth get apples-to-apples numbers for the legislator.

▪ Carol and Jess had an interesting reference question late one Friday at about 5:15. Jess reported: "I got a call from an L.A. looking for the names of mayors from 3 obscure Minnesota cities. The League of MN Cities info. that they (and we) had was pre-election, and they wanted rush information by 5:30. Carol found two of them quite brilliantly on the web, and then we were left to simply start calling numbers in the city until we reached a person. I ended up calling a community center, figuring that people might be 'communing' on a Friday evening, got an auctioneer from out of town who claimed to be one of two guys in the entire city who didn't know the answer to that question, though he knew the name of the old mayor. He said that the guy who would know had just gone to the bathroom, so I stalled him in an attempt to wait out the missing man. When I asked if he knew of a place where I would find someone who DID know, he suggested the liquor store and looked up the number for me, and then gave me the name and number of the old mayor, at which point the smart friend came out of the bathroom. He triumphantly announced the mayor's name to me, and it was typically Scandinavian, so I had to ask "I don't suppose you know if that ends in -sen or -son?" and he said "NO, but I'll look it up for ya!". We finally called the L.A. back and stunned her with our expertise, and still managed to escape by 6pm."

- What does Parliament use instead of Mason's or Robert's Rules of Order? (My favorite question of the year!) Seems to be "Standing Orders", which is like a combined Mason's and Rules of the House or Senate. (rm)

- Articles on diseases in bear and moose populations in Minnesota.
- Information on the Renaissance Zones in Michigan and the Keystone Opportunity Zones in Pennsylvania. (rm)

- Hot topics in the Tape Room included: the bill to raise the penalties for harming pets, the 1991 wetlands/waters legislation, privacy issues related to motor vehicle data, multi-party candidacy, & peeping toms who use recording devices.
- Paul began boxing up the 1992 House tapes (to transfer to the State Archives.)
- Jess reported, "The taperoom has been incredibly hectic, and very steadily so. Lots of traffic in and out, particularly for recent years' information."
- Paul updated the online Step-By-Step guide to better reflect additional information available on the Web site, including links to the committees that are putting their minutes online.

Training and tours conducted by staff

- Randi and Elizabeth taught Good Stuff on the Web for the Senate. Carol, Randi, and Elizabeth taught two classes on the Library's magazine and newspaper indexes. Jim Greenwalt attended one of them and said he doesn't think the legislators have any idea how much information the Library provides access to. (A lot of the staff do know.) The class on the legislative web site that David and Betsy were going to teach was cancelled due to [the Senate training coordinator] Lee Meyerson's father's death. Additional training sessions will be held for the Senate after the committee deadline rush is over.
- Robbie gave a presentation on the Legislative Web Site and library resources to a group of Greater Minnesota reporters as part of House Information's Media Day. As a result, we were asked to present a workshop on the Legislative Web Site at a technology continuing education workshop in Willmar in August.
- On her off-time, Diane teaches cataloging MOTSE cataloging classes. This month she attended a Minnesota Library Association board meeting to discuss the future of MOTSE and other continuing education programs in Minnesota.
- Be sure to look over the attached list of tours and training delivered since the beginning of the year.

Training and meetings attended by staff

- David attended a PALS User Council meeting and a PALS User Group Meeting. He completed his term as the Reference User Group representative to the PALS User Council.
- Paul, David, Leif, and Helen attended various PALS User Group meetings in St. Cloud. Leif declined re-election to the user Council from the Systems Group, the first time in MANY years. Paul was elected as the state agency representative to the ILL steering committee.
- Part of the User Group meetings was a demonstration of the new statewide library system. Since we will be migrating to the new ExLibris software system in May of 2002, Betsy, Carol, Randi, and Sarah took a field trip to see the demonstration of the new system as well. Happily, everyone who saw the demonstration was impressed with the system. Helen commented, "I thought the ExLibris product looked great - and walked away with a positive reaction."
- Robbie attended a Citizen's League lunch where Steve Clift discussed online democracy. During his talk he noted that the Minnesota Legislature "rocks online."
- As SLA Continuing Education Chair, Betsy planned, advertised, and attended an SLA Video Conference.
- Robbie attended TWO meetings of the MNLINK Ad Hoc Budget Task Force in St. Cloud in March. It is difficult and thorny to come up with a funding formula that treats various types of libraries fairly: that will enable current PALS libraries to afford the new system, and make the pricing attractive to new libraries so they will join. Our annual costs will likely rise from almost \$10,000 to nearly \$15,000. However, our PALS costs have been artificially low for several years, since PALS has had no recapitalization costs built in and had income from other sources. There is no way we could touch a new system on our own for \$15,000, so even though it is a steep increase for us, it is a reasonable cost.
- Sarah attended MOTSE training, cataloging training sponsored by the Minnesota Library Association.
- Sarah and Robbie attended the briefing on library-related legislation, part of the Minnesota Library Association's Legislative Day.
- Leif attended a SNAP meeting. This is a statewide network administrators' group.
- Leif, Robbie, Syble, Randi, and Betsy attended an LNET meeting.

Staff news

Andrew Beccone began his full-time Library Assistant position with the Library. Randi coordinated his training; everyone on staff has played at least a small part in his training schedule.

CONNECTING THE DOTS

Following the intricate ins and outs of a particular bill is only a click away, on the Minnesota state legislative Web site.

You are a parent concerned about education spending, a motorist worried about racial profiling, a daughter wondering about nursing-home care, a business owner fretting about property taxes, a Twins fan ready to cheer in a new stadium — all hot issues at the Legislature this year.

You read the paper, listen to the radio and watch the news, but you'd like to find out more about your issue, or even follow it blow-by-blow as it moves in and out of committees, floor sessions, conference committees and ultimately onto the governor's desk.

You can do that using the Minnesota legislative Web site. If you only need the basic information, such as summaries of bills on your topic of interest, it can be found quickly. If you want more, you can get amendments on bills as they are being debated live on the House floor while you watch on your computer or your television set. You can read weekly House and Senate summaries of high-interest bills. For the first time this year, over the Internet you can watch floor sessions and committee hearings that already have happened, even if — as in the case of racial profiling — the hearing ran more than five hours. You can trace the history of legislation and read expert analysis of the fiscal impact of individual bills.

You also can let your legislators know what you think via e-mail and, if you really get worked up, find out how to testify in person before a committee.

When you log on, you'll be part of a growing group: So far this year, the legislative Web site has had 7.8 million hits (the number of times someone has accessed the site); that compares with 3.8 million hits in the first 11 weeks of the 1999 legislative session. Last year, a total of 30.9 million visits were made, compared with 2 million in 1996, the year it started.

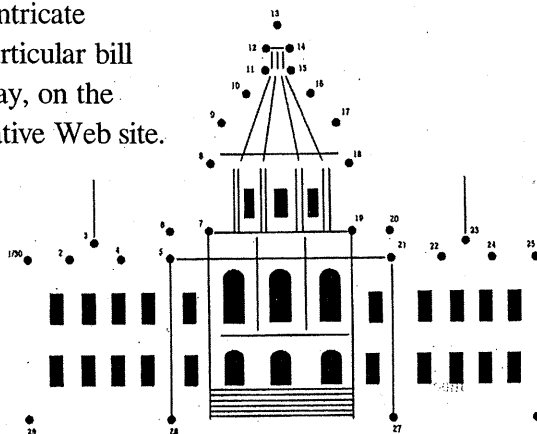
Although many of those hits are from people who do this for a living — and whose lives have been made immeasurably easier having the Web site replace stacks of paper bills and hours of phone calls — the site shines a lot of light on the legislative process.

"What are we doing all this for, if not to let people know about it?" said Randi Madisen, who manages Web site content for the Legislative Reference Library.

Here's an example of how a Minnesota resident might use the Web site:

Meredith, whose parents are aging, is concerned about long-term care. Her parents are in relatively good health, but she can foresee that they may soon need more help than her family can provide. She has heard that there is legislation pending about nursing homes and alternatives to nursing homes, and wants to keep track and perhaps express her opinion.

First, she wants to find out which bills relate to her area of interest. She goes to the Minnesota State Legislature page — www.leg.state.mn.us — and clicks on Legislation and Bill Status. From there, she can click on House Bills or Senate Bills, then

What you can find on these sites

- "Hit List": the latest action on the most popular bills.
- Bill text, authors, companion bills, long and short descriptions, action thus far.
- House committee meeting minutes.
- House and Senate video, live and archived.
- House and Senate journals — searchable summary of floor sessions including votes.
- Fiscal analysis tracking spreadsheets for certain committees, which show the governor's budget, House and Senate proposed spending in committee and on the floor, conference committee results and what actually becomes law.
- Fiscal notes, which give the administration's estimate of the potential costs and/or savings from the bill.
- Youth Pages, which includes a video of how a bill becomes a law.
- House and Senate weekly newsletters, which are searchable and often thorough explanations of major bills and legislative action.
- General information on the legislative process, including a glossary and a program to identify and contact your legislators.
- User-friendly explanations of the information contained on a page.

Topic Search Pages in the House and Senate, select the nursing-home topic, and look through brief descriptions of all the nursing-home bills.

She settles on two bills of interest, House File 1220 and its companion, Senate File 1070, which lay out recommendations of an extensive long-term care task force report, and H.F. 376 and S.F. 411, which concern community-based

options for long-term care.

Back on the main legislature page, Meredith clicks on House (and later on Senate), from which she gets options to watch Web coverage of committee hearings. From there, she also clicks on committees, chooses the House Health and Human Services Committee (and the Senate Health and Family Security Committee on the Senate side), and subscribes to

their listservs, so she automatically gets e-mails when these committees meet.

From the House and Senate page, Meredith also searches Senate Briefly and the House's Session Weekly to read in-depth coverage of floor and committee action on her bills. She feels so well-informed she decides to e-mail her legislators, and finds out who and where through General Information on the main legislature page. She looks at the Journals to see how her senator and representative voted.

After checking the broadcast schedule, she finds she can watch certain committee hearings; she catches up with video archives available 48 hours after television coverage. After watching one hearing, she is emboldened to try to testify, and signs up through the Citizen's e-guide under General Information.

For money matters, she goes to the committee page and clicks on fiscal analysis, where she can track spending proposals that include her bills. For some bills, she can also get fiscal notes; the administration's estimate of the cost and/or savings of a bill.

She finds out the day her bills are taken up in floor sessions by checking the daily calendar, available on the House and Senate pages, and watches live on television or her computer. During the House floor sessions, she can even get amendments on the Web site as they're being heard on the floor.

Finally, she goes back to Bill Status to see if the governor has signed the bill.

Monthly Report - February 2001

Administration

Alissa began working for the Library last summer so she is going through her first legislative session. She reported this month, "February was very, very busy and hectic." Yep, that's what happens!

A note from Robbie: I really appreciated the great Open House that staff provided on February 21. An amazing number of staff and members and librarian friends attended. My kids came too, and my son was duly impressed by the turnout to congratulate his mother. Elizabeth reported, "The party for Robbie was a huge success. We had a huge sheet cake about the size of one of the reading room tables, punch, coffee, there were about five pounds of cheese, including Gjetost, the Norwegian goat cheese Robbie likes so much, about ten boxes of crackers, about 15 dozen cookies and brownies, a huge platter of fruit, a big platter of taco dip, about five huge bags of chips, vegetables and lots of other food. The place was packed and all the food was gone! The next morning there were three crackers and a bit of the Gjetost left."

Much of the month was devoted to extensive budget planning; starting from scratch and determining the Library's needs for the next two years. The most challenging aspects are predicting the technology needed to continue our great services and to leverage our internal databases and make more information available via the Web. Leif and Syble researched hardware, software, and training prices.

Ergonomics! Lisa met with vendors and obtained loaner chairs for Jess, Diane and Helen. They were identified as having the worst chairs in the ergonomic study conducted by the consultant from the Department of Employee Relations. She ordered a chair for Jess. She also worked with Kelly to get her office set up more ergonomically, and purchased a more adjustable keyboard drawer for Kelly's desk.

All the staff attended wrap-up meetings with the consultant from Hay, regarding the LCC's Compensation Study.

Web Development Activities

Syble met with Linda Schmitt in Senate SIS about Web Trends capabilities and the specialized report services we could provide the Senate.

The Web Group staff met and discussed possible future web site design goals. Syble answered questions about the technical feasibility of possible Web site enhancements to make the site more interactive, XML ready, and database driven.

Syble fine tuned and updated the weekly Webtrends reports she

modify and program our Library information to be available to users outside the Library via Web-based services. Ruth set up a shortcut on Alissa's computer to start the Publications database and printed out instructions for her. She is helping out with the data entry for MN Docs.

Ruth created a new LCC address book export file and sent it to Mike Paton.

The new color printer has been helpful on a number of occasions, to print out reports that include shaded tables or graphs. Ruth was able to scan a map of Metropolitan Council districts and print it in color for a member. In past years we have actually driven to Kinko's when a color copy is needed.

Even fully functioning systems need occasional fixes. This month Ruth fixed some reports in the Training Statistics database, and fixed the reference book notation in the Inside Issues – Books and Reports database.

Reference activities

Betsy and Robbie wrote the "Page One" essay and an accompanying Minnesota Issues guide on privacy resources. Additional editing credit should be given to Carol!

Leif and Elizabeth spent a fair amount of time trying to figure out why Firstsearch would not work outside the Library walls. We worked around the problem and now all members and staff have access to several more magazine indexes through the Library's intranet.

Aides news includes:

- Toshi has been doing a great job on the copy basket. Several staff have mentioned his fine work.
- Reanne has been speedily sorting and filing clippings.
- The aides have been copying and sending out the articles requested through our Inside Issues service on a daily basis. It doesn't seem to be taking any additional time on their part.
- Brian will be leaving us but not until the end of May. He will be going to Malaysia to study languages. He'll be working here until his big trip.

Tax Resources on the Internet

In "Internet time," finding tax forms and instructions online is a long-standing tradition. But have you explored the tax information sites recently? Here's a quick tour before tax season hits its frenzied peak!

Visitors can navigate the site based on their status (individuals, business, tax professionals) or choose a "what's hot" link such as tax forms or electronic filing. For individuals, content includes forms and instructions, tax information (fact sheets, newsletters, revenue notices), help and contacts, electronic filing and payment, FAQs, and compliance forms and instructions. Business information includes registration, education and volunteer opportunities, business registration, and electronic filing and payment. The "what's hot" announcement ranges from fact sheets on various taxes to an announcement of mandatory electronic filing and payment. Professional preparers, legal professionals, software developers, policy links highlight popular items such as the 2001 withholding tables and formula. The DOR site has a sparse, fast-loading design. All forms and most publications on this site are in PDF format and require Adobe Acrobat software.

Internal Revenue Service

The front-page motif of "The Digital Daily" presents IRS information with an upbeat attitude. Suffice it to say, there is much more available than we can cover in this brief review. Forms and publications are accessible via a link at the bottom of the page. You can browse or search several ways: by number, keyword, date, or topic. Download options include PDF, PCL, PostScript, and SGML text. Publications and IRS provides links to state forms and electronic filing. The FAQ section has been revised and expanded for the 2000 tax season, with navigation by category or an alphabetical keyword list. The "Tax Info for You" section focuses on individual forms. The "Tax Info for Business" offers resources for small and large companies, including Internal Revenue Bulletins, educational material on this site includes TAXInteractive, with a goal of educating "teenagers about the U.S. tax system, the effect of taxes on their day-to-day lives, and new electronic ways to file tax returns."

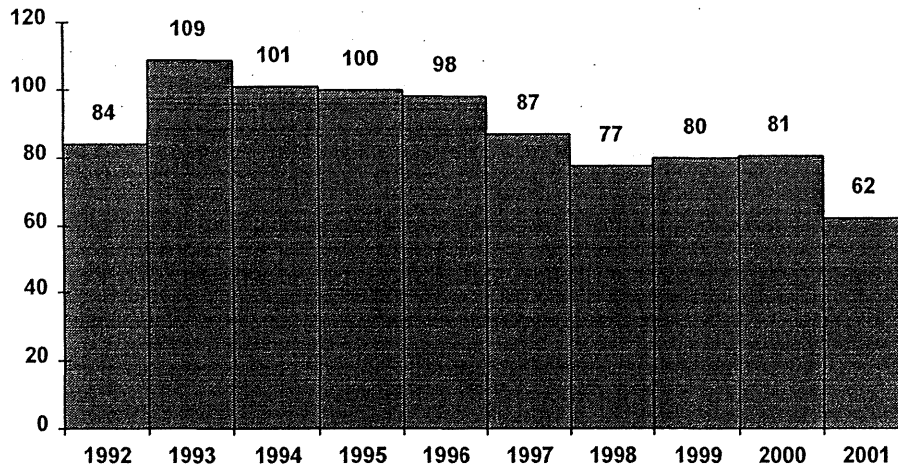

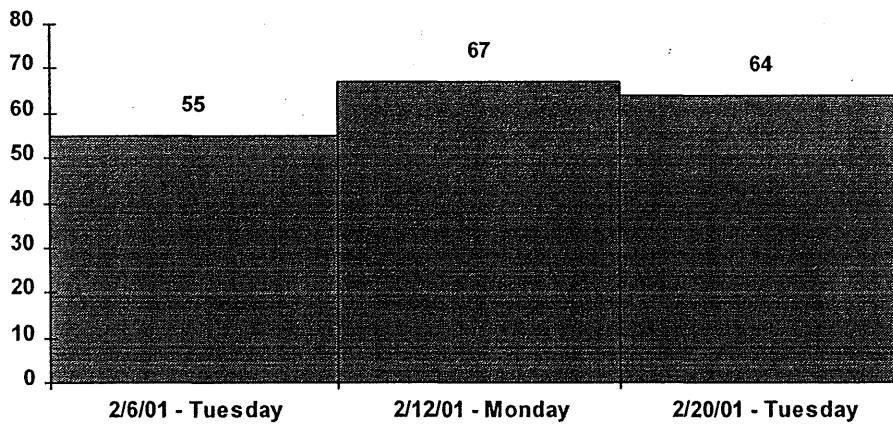
REFERENCE REPORT: Questions Asked

during this month in previous years

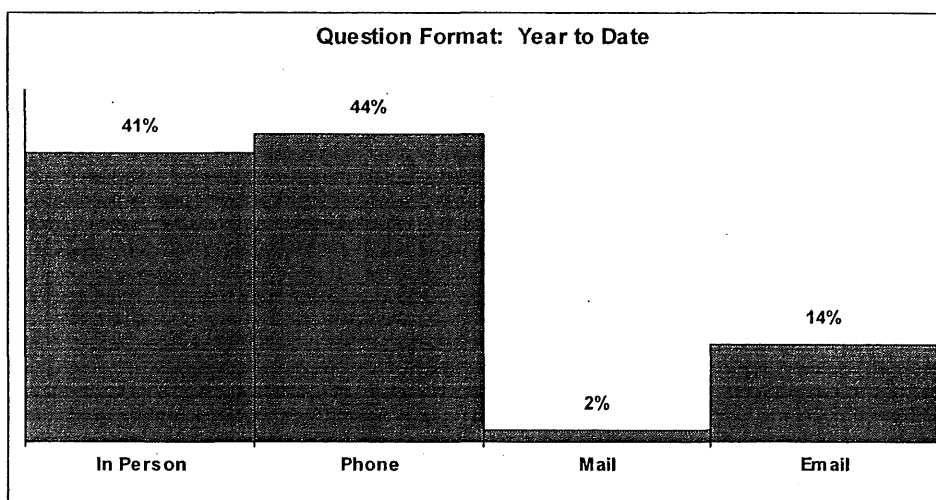
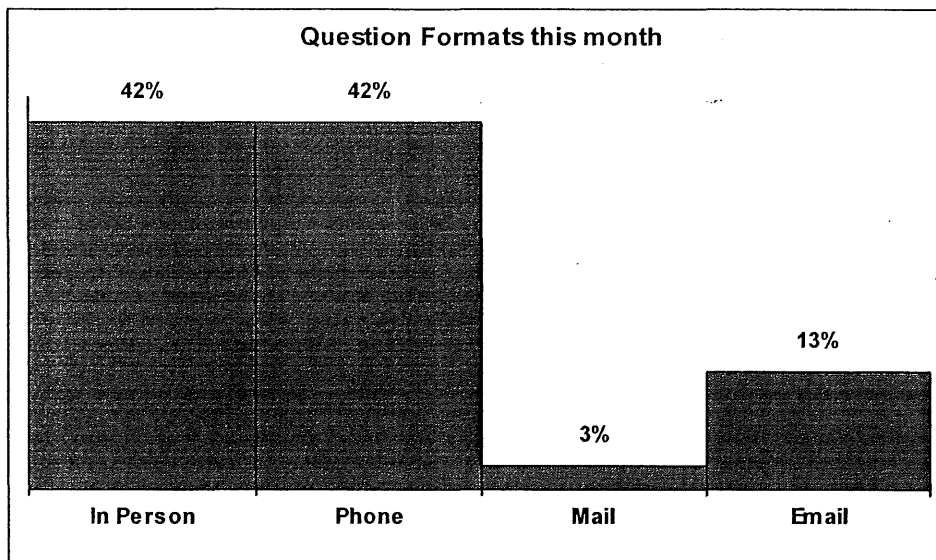


Number of Questions asked

My recent note said I would send along our monthly report. This is just for you to read as much or as little as you like.

I started this staff report format – readable, newsy, fairly detailed – for a number of reasons.

- It gives staff an idea of what their colleagues have been doing, when they might not work with them closely.
- It's an opportunity to highlight the work of staff who are 'behind the scenes.' Their contributions make the Library work well, and I want to be sure their work is recognized.
- It's a good way for me to know the scope of what is happening.
- Each staff person reports to his/her supervisor and to me. The supervisors then have a good record of accomplishments when it comes time to annual reviews.
- The reports become a good long-term record of library activities.

Many of the items may be a bit cryptic to you (or boring), but I hope you enjoy reading some of it to get a flavor of our activities. The 'fan mail' section at the end is always fun to read!

I look forward to seeing you at our budget subcommittee meeting. As far as I have heard, we don't even have House members appointed yet, so I don't know when it will be.

Legislative Reference Library

Monthly Report - January 2001

Administration The LCC Compensation Study continued. Robbie, Leif, and Elizabeth helped with job level reconsideration requests for Syble, Paul, Lisa, and Ruth. The requests were very valid and reasonable, and were all granted.

Leif and Robbie began meeting regarding network documentation and future server needs – a part of thorough budget planning for the upcoming biennium. Our technology needs and server needs have grown as the complexity of the Legislative Web Site and accompanying technology have grown. Leif also created a short term hardware plan and modified the software update plan and prepared for implementing it.

Lisa and Robbie examined all budget categories thoroughly to determine how closely our bills will meet our expectations, and to estimate needs for the rest of the fiscal year.

Lisa met with Barb Vail (Revisor's Office) and Chad Thuet (LCC) to help Barb figure out how to use the new Time and Leave System. The Revisor's office just started using it in January and Barb wanted to know how Lisa used it to track hours and what process we followed for approvals from there.

Lisa arranged for demo chairs for Jess, Diane and Helen. The ergonomics specialist had noted theirs as tops on the list to be replaced.

Web Development Activities

Randi and Syble worked with Senate Media staff to add Senate Media's streaming video to the Legislative Web site. Syble and Randi met again with Senate Media staff to discuss future collaboration on Web Site additions.

Syble created the new pages on the Legislative Web Site's Youth pages for the Senate's streaming video features, "Discover the Capitol" and "Rules, Laws, and Process."

Randi, Syble, and Leif made many small tweaks and additions to the legislative web site main pages. Randi worked with Revisor's Office programmers to make some fixes – the inevitable consequence of both changing the interface and starting a new session. Syble and Leif debugged the enhanced Legislative Web Site search pages.

Collections Activities

Release of the Governor's Budget books meant a lot of scrambling for Jess. We distribute copies to the University of Minnesota, St. Paul Public Library, and St. Paul Public Library, but our procedures

from previous staff had very little information about how exactly to do it. Jess set about rectifying that situation when it became apparent that four of the boxes of budget books were missing, somewhere between the Library and the Department of Finance. She spent many hours searching the building and making phone calls trying to figure out where 4 boxes of the volumes could have gone. She eventually gave up and went to Finance with a cart (with Andrew's able assistance) and retrieved replacements. Note from Jess: the tunnels provide a wonderful workout, both cardiovascular and auditory, when you are hauling 3 large boxes of books on a cart!

The Level K Consultants' collection was set up where we used to keep the State Auditor's Reports. Jess implemented the new procedures for adding the consultant's reports with minimal cataloging. This change in 2001 will streamline consultant report cataloging.

Jess edited and updated information we had posted near the Auditor's reports. They are now shelved by the Legislative Manuals in the Reference Collection.

Helen, Diane, David and Jess met to discuss url's in association with documents we are receiving, how hard we should work to get the information, at what stage of the process it should be pursued, how best to pursue it, etc.

Diane reported that the Library of Congress has a new official subject heading that is timely for our collection - Racial profiling in law enforcement. Diane added it to two older records that needed it and cataloged the new Public Safety report with the heading.

Kelly processed 87 added volumes, withdrew 8 items from the collection, copied 212 Contents Page articles, and copied 2,004 Contents Pages. She shelfread the Reference Collection from AE5 - HV98, and shelfread the Circulating Collection from HV6787 - HV9305. She sent the *2001 Subject Guide to Newspapers and Periodicals* to existing Contents Page Patrons.

Information Systems Activities

Leif spent several late nights resolving hardware problems on the web server. It first appeared that a hard drive had failed but turned out to be a failed channel on the controller card. He also replaced several internal cooling fans that had failed and were causing alarm situations. As Leif noted, "I haven't spent that much time on the phone tech support for many years..."

Session began, and everyone wanted access to the House and Senate video coverage. Leif had to resolve several WIN98 registry problems related to upgrading Media Player software.

Syble and Leif continued work on the NT server. Syble set up the NT server to host streaming video files. This was an important accomplishment because we are testing how to serve up video of the House and Senate floor debates *after* session, part of our

the House and Senate floor debates *after* session, part of our investigation into long term digital storage instead of audio tapes.

Syble set up WebTrends and automated weekly Web statistics reporting for the Legislature, Library, House, Senate, LCC, as well as specialized reports for House Research, Session Daily, and the Youth site.

Ruth fixed the programming on some statistics reports, finished the formatting and printed the new Codebook; and formatted, updated and printed the 2001 Magazine Guide.

Reference Activities

We decided to establish a similar process to the Inside Issues for articles service to alert people systematically to new books in their interest areas.

The first month of session was an incredibly busy month for tours. Elizabeth planned tours on a new improved schedule this year, offering them each day of the first week in January, and on Wednesdays thereafter. The reference librarians gave many other tours, both ad hoc and scheduled. David reported he gave a tour to the most enthusiastic intern he ever met. At the end the intern sincerely thanked David for the "exciting" tour.

The aides and Ruth began real-time (almost) Inside Issues article delivery on January 1. That means that when a patron requests an article through the Inside Issues Service, Ruth enters the request in the database and prints out the requests at the end of each day. The aides fill the requests and put them in interoffice mail the next day. This speeds up the whole process dramatically.

We launched a new service to systematically alert Inside Issues subscribers to new books and reports. Ruth worked very, very hard to set up the new Inside Issues for Books and Reports. The new service began on January 1 and is printed every other week. It is being printed on peach paper--a nod to the similar but less extensive service we once offered on orange cards. Elizabeth, Carol, Ruth and others have been planning this new "orange card" service for the past year or two. For years we have been alerting staff and legislators to new books in areas that we know will interest them (originally on orange cards but more recently by email) but we missed those staff and members we didn't know well. We decided to establish a similar process to the Inside Issues for articles service to alert people systematically to new books in their interest areas. Sarah has been matching the new books and reports that are cataloged and processed each day to the subject headings established as part of the Inside Issues service for articles. The circulation staff have done a great job filling the large number of requests for books that have come in as a result of this new service. It'll be interesting to see if the circulation statistics increase because of this new alerting service.

Carol and Ruth have been working on transferring the codebook to Access so Carol can edit it without Ruth's intervention. We all got new codebooks that are easier to use! Misha and Kelly (and maybe others) worked on data entry.

maybe others) worked on data entry.

Betsy created a Zononet page off of the Reference section that contains all of the canned email responses. (These are templates for responses to questions we often receive from the public, and include our 'we are not lawyers' disclaimers.) This is better than having the responses on each computer because any edits to the message would be available for everyone.

Alissa codes the news clippings we receive from the greater Minnesota smaller papers from the Minnesota Clipping Service. She is getting about twice as many as usual now that session has begun. Even though she has only been here a little over six months she is learning about all the legislators in short order. She reported, "Laura and I were in the DOT cafeteria when I spotted Sen. Dick Day. I was able to say who he was, what district he represents, his party affiliation, and what city he is from without having to look in the red book. It is exciting getting into the elevators now, knowing who the people are standing by me just from coding the clippings!"

David was interviewed by Channel 11 news regarding websites like dumblaws.com. They also asked questions about LRL's role in the legislative process. Pieces of the interview will air as part of a special on the Legislature sometime in February.

Robbie spoke about library resources with Harlan LaFontaine, who once worked for the House as a Page. He is now on the Indian Affairs Council and teaching a class at the University on Indians and the legislative process. This is just another case of 'you never know where library pages turn up next!'

Sarah is keeping a Jesse Ventura timeline, brief sentences about his newsworthy activities. This will help researchers of the future sort through his files. Misha is starting to put together the Governor's notebooks for his first two years.

Legislative History – Tape Room Activities

Paul provided orientation & training related to the legislative history materials to the House Committee Legislative Assistants. A new biennium means it is time to change many records and guides. Paul updated the Tape Room table, inventory sheet, & Step-By-Step Guide.

Legislative history research projects this month included covenant marriage and agricultural hemp.

There were some very busy days in the Tape Room near the beginning of session. Jess reported that at one time, “There were four people at the counter looking at bills (two omnibus), one looking at bills on the microfilm reader, one looking at hard copies of minutes, and then the phone started ringing.”

Training and tours conducted by staff

Library staff gave tours or introductions to the Library to 143 people in January! This included regularly scheduled tours, introductions to groups in Senate interns, and instruction on legislative history materials to committee secretaries.

Robbie delivered a presentation on the Legislative Web Site as part of a Continuing Legal Education seminar on the legislative process. About 180 lawyers were in attendance, including a former Senator who remembered when the Legislative Reference Library was first created.

Diane taught a cataloging class in the new series presented by MELSA. There were 20 attendees (including 3-4 state employees)

Training and meetings attended by staff

Randi attended several NorthStar process meetings, including a cool demo of a portal system that Pennsylvania uses.

Sarah, Randi, and Paul went to free Bell and Howell training. David, Elizabeth, and Betsy went to Gale database training. Both these training sessions were held at Metro State University to provide training for the Minitex-funded magazine/newspaper databases.

Several public services staff attended the Revisor's Office seminar on redistricting on January 14.

David attended a CALCO meeting on 1/17/01. One of the consultants conducting the LDS MN Library Structures study was there to ask if CALCO wanted to be part of the study. CALCO members gave a resounding "NO!" David wasn't sure if this is what the consultant expected, but it was the sensible response, since CALCO is a user group of state agency libraries gathered to address similar training challenges and share information, not a statewide library structure.

David and Robbie attended a PALS Deans/Directors/User Council meeting on 1/18/01.

Robbie attended a meeting of the Ad Hoc Budget Committee, a committee that is examining the costs of implementing the MNLINK system and how the costs should be apportioned.

Randi attended the midwinter SLA Leadership Development Institute in Savannah. She is the president-elect of the state chapter this year so the Special Libraries Association paid for her to attend leadership training. She reported that the training was very good, and the weather nice and warm!

Betsy and Syble attended an Special Libraries Association program on library marketing; it focused on the Cargill Library's professional packaging of their research for customers.

Elizabeth reported, "The reference librarians had a reference librarians breakfast at the Highland Grill. We haven't done this since before David was hired so it has been three years since the last one. We discussed possible new reference desk setups. (We also discussed who played which instruments as children. It would make a good game for the next staff party.)"

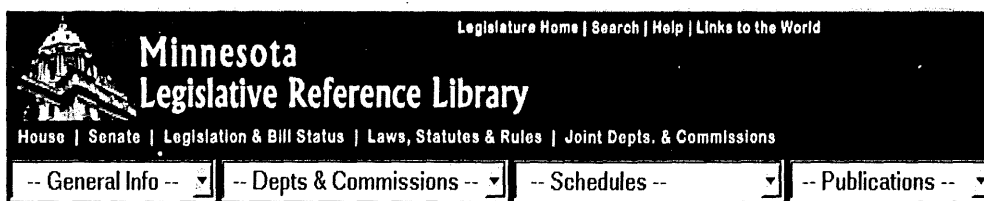

The Minnesota Legislative Reference Library was established in 1969. Its primary mission was to provide access to the information resources needed by members and staff of the Minnesota Legislature. That is still its mission, but access to the cyberspace world and the advances in technology have made it possible for its resources to be available to all citizens through the world wide web. The website address of the library is www.leg.state.mn.us/lrl/. Of course, if you have the time you can visit the library at its location in St. Paul. We provide the address in our side column.

The legislative reference library has a wealth of information that can be used to research issues and find out about other states. The website includes a highlight of the topics that can be accessed. Among many other topics, the library's collection includes:

1. A public policy collection of over 40,000 books and reports, including a comprehensive collection of Minnesota state documents (many of which are mandated by the Legislature) and consultants' reports.
2. An extensive reference collection, with a focus on state-level statistics and state-by-state comparisons
3. Approximately 700 magazine and newsletter subscriptions
4. Copies of 31 newspapers from Minnesota, surrounding states and the nation (with access to hundreds more electronically) as well as news clipping files by subject, since the 1970's to the present and news clipping files on current legislators, former legislators, and prominent Minnesotans
5. Library staff maintain subject-based links to relevant public policy Internet sites that link you to the world
6. Electronic guides to information in the Library and the Internet on pertinent legislative issues in Minnesota as well as legislative statistics (Many historical data tables are available online.)
7. Minnesota Session Laws since 1871, statutes since 1927 and House and Senate Journals since 1909.

If you decide to visit the library personally, the hours of operation are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. During the legislative session, the Library maintains extended hours: 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Note: The Minnesota legislative session generally runs from January through the third week of May in odd-numbered years and mid-February through mid-April in even-numbered years. ■

SAVE Legislation

The Minnesota Legislature passed a law last session that mandates the application of the SAVE software program to applicants for benefits administered by the state Department of Human Services. This law will be effective July 1, 2001. Here is some information you should know about this legislation and the impact it may have in our community.

What does SAVE stand for?

SAVE is an acronym for Systematic Alien Verification for Entitlements. It is a program that the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) has created which contains a database of information of immigration status. This program is administered by the INS and consists of approximately 60 million records

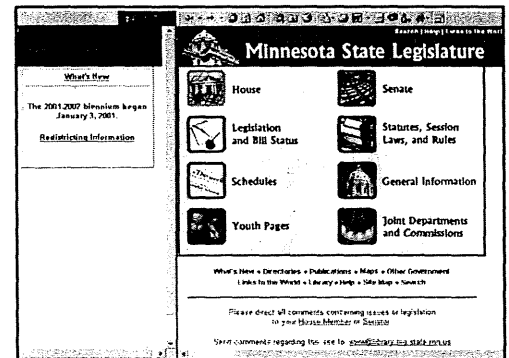


Our Council will continue to monitor pending legislation and will keep you informed.

From the Road..

The 2001 legislative session is now about one month old. Not everyone, including myself, is able to follow all the legislative activity in person. However, for those of you who are political junkies, you can follow the session from a distance by visiting the Minnesota State Legislature's web site.



The Minnesota State Legislatures Home page - www.leg.state.mn.us.

The Legislature's website was recently redesigned and is very user-friendly and informative. At the site, you can learn more about the Minnesota House of Representatives, the Senate and joint legislative departments and commissions. Committee schedules are available and constituents can subscribe to receive email updates on committee schedules. You can even see live or taped web casts of committee meetings by visiting the House's TV coverage site at ww3.house.leg.state.mn.us/hvtv/schedule.asp.

To follow legislative bills that are introduced for consideration during the session, click on the "Legislation and Bill Tracking" section. In this section, you can look up current House and Senate bills, see legislative bills from previous years, see other information related to legislative bills and learn how a bill becomes a law.

Bills can be search by either file number (for example, HF1 or SF1) or key words. Once you locate the bill, you can review the bill's text, see the authors of the bill, and learn of the bill's current status in the Legislature.

Technology certainly does make the state law making process more accessible to the public. But there are some drawbacks. With the large number of bills that are introduced for consideration during session, not all of the bills' statuses are updated on a timely basis. Also, during the final weeks of the session, when there is a flurry of legislative activity, the best way to receive updated bills is by being present at the Capitol. Finally, if you want to hear a human voice, you can call the House Public Information Office, (651) 296-2146 or (800) 657-3550, to learn about a legislative bill's status. Until next month, this is Mario A. Hernandez coming to you from the road.

Monthly Report

December 2000

December was a month of preparations for the upcoming legislative session. As Alissa reported, "December was a busy, busy month! Some things that I have been working on are getting the folders ready for session and updating the legislator cards (and sheets in the legislator three-ring binders)." There are a myriad of Library files, databases and electronic lists that needed to be updated with the names of newly elected and former legislators.

Another huge disruption and blessing was the culmination of the phone project and the installation of the phone system. There were many inevitable glitches: phones ringing at the wrong desks, phone numbers being routed to other state agencies, etc., but the McLeod staff were diligent in fixing the problems and helping staff learn the features of the new phones. Lisa did a tremendous job of tracking all of the problems and ensuring that they were rectified.

Our newest librarian, Sarah Quimby, began work on December 11. Her previous position was with the Environmental Protection Agency in Washington, D.C. Everyone in the Library contributed to Sarah's training.

Library Administration

- Work continued on the LCC Compensation Study. Al Bunnett of Hay Associates came to speak with staff about the LCC compensation study on December 6 and the placement of staff positions on the grid of job responsibility levels. Leif, Robbie, and Elizabeth helped four staff (Syble, Lisa, Paul, and Ruth) prepare reconsideration requests, as their positions were incorrectly placed in responsibility levels. These reconsideration requests documented how their positions should be more fairly placed in levels closer to other, comparable, LCC positions.

Web Activities

- Randi convened a meeting of several public services staff to discuss revised patron pages. We switched to using the same pages for both the Intranet interface and the Public PC interface rather than maintaining two sets of pages – a great timesaver! As a part of this project, Syble created a new footer for the Patron PCs and added code to the Intranet page so it would send an abbreviated footer to the Patron PC without changing the normal footer on all other PCs. This was done so that the computers in the Reading Room would NOT include the footer with links to the internal House and Senate intranets.
- Randi prepared the new legislation and bill status information page, ready for the switch to the new biennium. She worked with the Revisor's Office computer staff to ensure citizens would find the right information as soon as the 2001 bills began to be introduced.

- Syble created banners and templates for the Auditor's Office to use in their adoption of the new Legislative design. Leif also worked on technical issues regarding the Auditor's office switching their website to the new look and feel. (Note: We were thrilled when the Legislative Auditor's Office decided to adopt the same look and feel as the other Legislative Web Site pages, and so happy to help them accomplish the switch.)
- Betsy added useful pages to the Library's internal intranet (ZONAnet), including one with standard responses for popular public e-mail requests and a list of key mandated documents.
- Leif helped Charlie Fastner from Senate IS troubleshoot and ultimately resolve a instability problem with the Senate web server.

Information Systems

- Intertech began the Security Impact Analysis for the House, Revisor's Office, Library, and Commission offices. Leif, Robbie, Lisa, and Syble were interviewed by the Intertech team. Later in the month, the Intertech team began the analysis, trying to invade the legislative computer systems. Leif ended up dealing with mail server problems, here and in the Revisor's office, which resulted from the SIA network scanning.
- Syble applied patches and updates to the Windows NT Server.
- Syble created a chart for the Revisor's Office showing changes in server utilization over time.
- Leif setup, configured, and documented the new QMS color printer. The network configuration is quite a bit different than the usual HP network printer setup. We waited a long time before purchasing a color printer for the Library, but it became necessary when so many of the reports we print include colored tables and graphics. Since the printer was installed, there have been many instances it was necessary. He also set up a new printer for the reference desk area (finally, double-sided copies out there!).
- Leif documented the setup for remote email retrieval.
- Leif dealt with 2 minor computer viruses. Diane received one from an OCLC listserv (of all places!) and Leif received one attached to some bounced email.
- Ruth worked on the coding for the new Inside Issues - Books system. Robbie, Elizabeth, and Paul and Ruth met about the new system and how the statistics should be tracked.
- Ruth made many changes to the legislative staff directory as new staff came on board in the House and Senate.

Collections Activities

- Jess caught up on orders, after spending much of the fall entering records for mandated reports. This year we cross-referenced our list of mandates (from Robbie reading the session laws) with Mark Shepard's more limited report. Mark had identified some reports we did not find, and we found several that Mark had not noted. It's not always easy to identify what is a mandate for a report when the language is sometimes ambiguous.

- Kelly was busy with many tasks that keep the Library running smoothly. She processed 41 added volumes, withdrew 3 items from the collection, copied 106 Contents Page Articles (after sending out 1,820 tables of contents), claimed 67 Missing Periodicals: 19 were EBSCO, 28 were free, 18 were Minnesota Periodicals and 2 were Order Direct. She also shelfread the collection from HJ4227 - HV6787.

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- Randi gave a tour to the new, session-only House Information writers. The Library's resources are valuable to the Session Weekly writers, so a Library tour is always an important part of their training.
- New legislative staff were hired and we were called upon to give tours small and large. The day we came back to work after the Christmas holidays there were two large tours at the very same time. A series of scheduled tours were planned for January--every day during the first week of session and then weekly through January.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- Randi a North Star process group meeting. Over the past few months Randi and Syble have been attending meetings convened by the Department of Administration in their attempt to update and improve the North Star main state Web pages. Randi has supplied expert advice on format and structure; Syble has been a great addition to the team looking at the new design. It has been important to have this connection with the North Star teams to be sure that the Legislature's information is prominent on the main state pages and easily accessible to citizens.
- Robbie, David, and Leif attended a PALS User Council meeting.
- The Revisor's office held an interesting seminar on state bonding; nearly all the public services staff were able to attend.

Tape Room Activities

- Paul crammed the 1999-2000 paper copies of the Senate Files into the overcrowded storage room.. (Luckily the electronic access to current bills is becoming so reliable that we don't have to store all the paper that was necessary in past years.)

Reference Activities and Questions

- December was filled with new year/new session activities. Paul took care of many circulation annual tasks: he established the 2001 due dates, created the 2001 schedule of overdue notices, and did the random selection of the 2001 statistics days. He also sent out the annual reminders of our check-out policies during the session, and the need to have interns sign in. Ruth printed out the annual Inside Issues current users letters and forms so that members and staff could revise their lists of topics if needed.
- The reference librarians sent out materials to new legislators and planned to give them tours. Betsy put together a 1/2 page sheet on the Library Intranet to include in the letter. Robbie spoke to new senators about library services at a training session in the Senate Chambers.

- Two new aides--Toshi and Nicole--began on December 4th. Toshioki Hara was a reporter in Tokyo before traveling to the United States to study. Nickole Gary attended Spelman College before transferring to the U of M. She most recently worked in a day care center, and is happy to now be at the Legislative Library – where she can speak with adults!
- The new Aides helped us handle all the backlog of aides stuff. Before the month was over Nicole had been called to jury duty. Randi has been called to jury duty in late February. (This caused Elizabeth to reflect, “Doesn't it seem that a disproportionate number of staff get called to jury duty?”)
- Elizabeth contacted the Minnesota Clipping Service with the names of the new legislators to track. Alissa codes the articles as they arrive from the service, and she said, “I'm getting ready now to memorize new faces with their districts while coding the clippings :)”.

- Question: Has MN ever had a "faithless elector"? No. There have only been nine over the course of history (plus 1 for the recent DC abstaining elector?) (bh)

- We tried a new format for the annual Christmas party: we went to Fabulous Fern's for a late afternoon gathering. The traditional white elephant gift exchange provided the anticipated number of crazy things and the trading was cutthroat. 'Heart': Census numbers are really history

This is the fifth of seven excerpts from Bill Holm's "The Heart Can Be Filled Anywhere on Earth" (Milkweed Editions, \$13.95), the new selection of the Talking Volumes regional book club. Excerpts will run daily through Sunday in Variety.

Here's the census:

Minneota

1880 — 113
1880 — 325
1890 — 777
1900 — 954
1910 — 819
1920 — 894
1930 — 918
1940 — 1,065
1950 — We don't have.
1960 — 1,297
1970 — 1,320
1980 — 1,469
1990 — 1,417

The census numbers give you the whole history of the town and of a thousand towns like it, if you know how to read them. Numbers are like metaphors that way. You must bring everything you know and feel as a human being to reading them, otherwise they lie inert, only decorations on a page.

Here is a list of dates to illuminate the numbers:

1870 — Emptiness, only tall grass, wind, and passers-by: Dakota Indians, buffalo, wolf, coyote, crow.

1871 — The first Norwegians settle along the south branch of the Yellow Medicine River.

1872 — The tracks of the Saint Peter and Winona Railroad arrive. The first post office, called Nord-

land, is established — the virgin try at naming Minneota.

1875 — The first Iclander arrives to take land on the river north of Minneota. The Saint Peter and Winona Railroad files the official real estate plat for Nordland Village. Now lots can be sold, commissions earned.

1878 — The still unincorporated village holds an election to name itself. The post office decrees too many Nordlands. The railroad refers to their little settlement as Yellow Medicine Crossing in honor of the stone railroad bridge over the river.

By this time, Minneota has two prominent businessmen, proprietors of general stores: Nils Jaeger, a Norwegian immigrant and Lutheran minister's son, and T.D. (Doc) Seals, a Yankee and self-proclaimed Civil War surgeon with a shadowy career selling "patent medicines" to the local Indians.

Seals fancies the Dakota name Minneota, probably for onomatopoeia, and certainly for humor and eccentricity. The rest of the town, already sunk in pious conventionality even before incorporation, prefers Jaegersville (after Seals' competitor), or Horton (after another prominent settler), or Oslo. Minneota drops off the ballot.

On election day in February, just after the voting, with Jaegersville almost certainly the winner, a cable arrives from Washington announcing that the post office has already been legally changed from Nordland to Minneota, an accomplished fact.

Now the story enters the world of myth. In one version, a pal of Doc Seals' steals the cigar box of uncounted ballots, trampling them into a mud puddle on Main Street. In another, Doc Seals knows somebody who knows somebody in Washington and quietly effects the name change single-handed. No one will now ever know the truth.

Local scuttlebutt recounts that Doc Seals hid from the angry Norwegians for a long time afterwards, keeping a loaded revolver close at hand. I like the tissue of lies, skulduggery and thwarted piety that led to the naming. We should all be so lucky in our handles.

1879 — The bulk of the Icelanders, including two of my great-grandfathers, arrive, mostly from the district of northeast Iceland around Vopnafjörður. By implication, I suppose, I arrived, though I didn't get around to being born until 64 years later. The English and the Irish arrived, too. Next year, the Belgians and the Dutch. What multicultural delights in the tallgrass!

1881 — The winter of 1880-81 was the worst in the history of Minneota — so far. It came early, hit hard, and stayed long. It is probably best to get a certain

number of disasters out of the way early. They can fuel myth-making and give your history a little ballast and weight.

On Oct. 16, 1880, Sam Kile started off to the barn to do chores. On the way the blizzard blew off his hat. Though warned by the other men, he raged off into the whirling snow in pursuit of the hat. No one ever saw him alive again.

Minneota, now officially named, grew to the lordly population of 113 in the 1880 census — give or take Sam Kile. The citizens petitioned the state to become a legally incorporated village, and in January 1881, presumably in the middle of another howling blizzard, it was so decreed.

Any events in the next 100 years? The usual: wars, depressions, bank panics, droughts, floods, plagues, births, marriages, deaths — all the while the population advances (with a little glitch from 1900 to 1910), until the present. The 1990 population clock begins winding down a bit to 1,417.

The citizens now average well over 60 years in age. One by one the 19th-century buildings sink back under the tangled roots of the tall grass to join the 113 corpses from the 1880 census; those from 1890 are gone, too. A few stragglers from 1900 are still above ground, not many more from 1910. No matter how much the population grows — or declines — it can't keep up with the real demography, the highway downward into the eternally

beating black heart of the prairie.

So there you have them, some numbers, some dates, a tiny history, an odd christening. This freight traveled a circuitous information highway to arrive at your consciousness. What do you make of it? What use can it possibly be to a New Yorker or an Englishman or a Chinese or a Nigerian?

Think twice. How different, give or take the eccentric details, is it from your own history? Aren't all histories a multitude of tributaries feeding an enormous river surging toward some still undiscovered ocean either inside the consciousness or in the universe?

But where is Minneota? We still don't know.

Yet another letter arrives, this one from the Legislative Reference Library, which had inquired for information from the Land Management Information Center in the Minnesota Planning Agency. This gift of information renewed my faith in the state; they knew where we were all the time. Minneota was never lost.

The latitude of Minneota is 44 degrees, 33 minutes, 46 seconds north, only a few minutes south of the great invisible belt that twice encircles the globe, 45 degrees, halfway between equator and pole. The longitude of Minneota is 95 degrees, 58 minutes, 56 seconds west, only about 6 minutes past 90 degrees, the midpoint between Greenwich and the international date line, 12 hours from yesterday, 12 hours from tomorrow.

What my father and mother told me turns out to be not only metaphorically but mathematically true. Minneota and their farm 8 miles north are, in fact, the center of the universe from which all points diverge, an omphalos of much water inhabited by Icelanders, inhabited by me!

I had arrived at the center, when for years I thought my life had been lived at the margin. From one angle, the solipsist view of reality turned out to be literally true. In my case and in yours, too. And yours. And yours.

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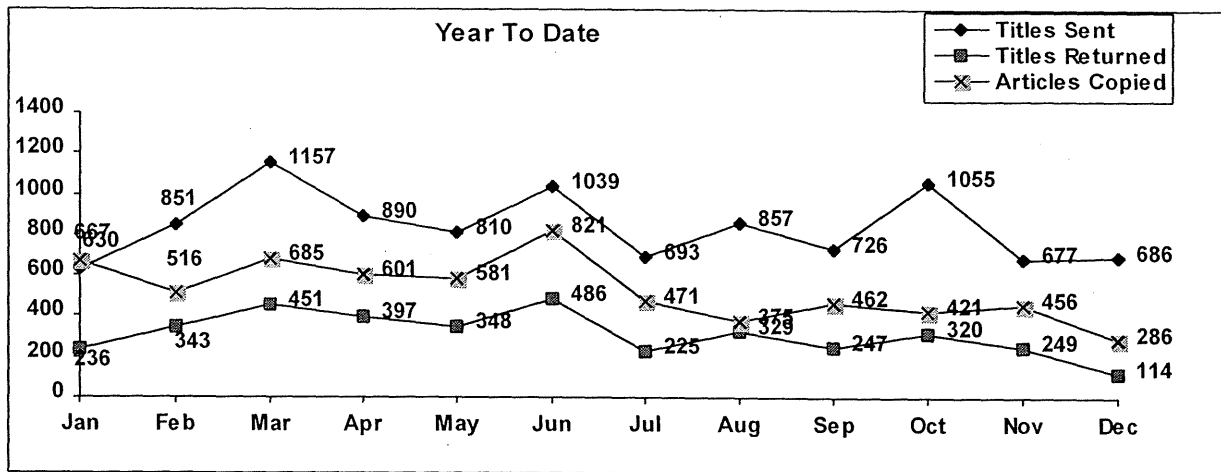

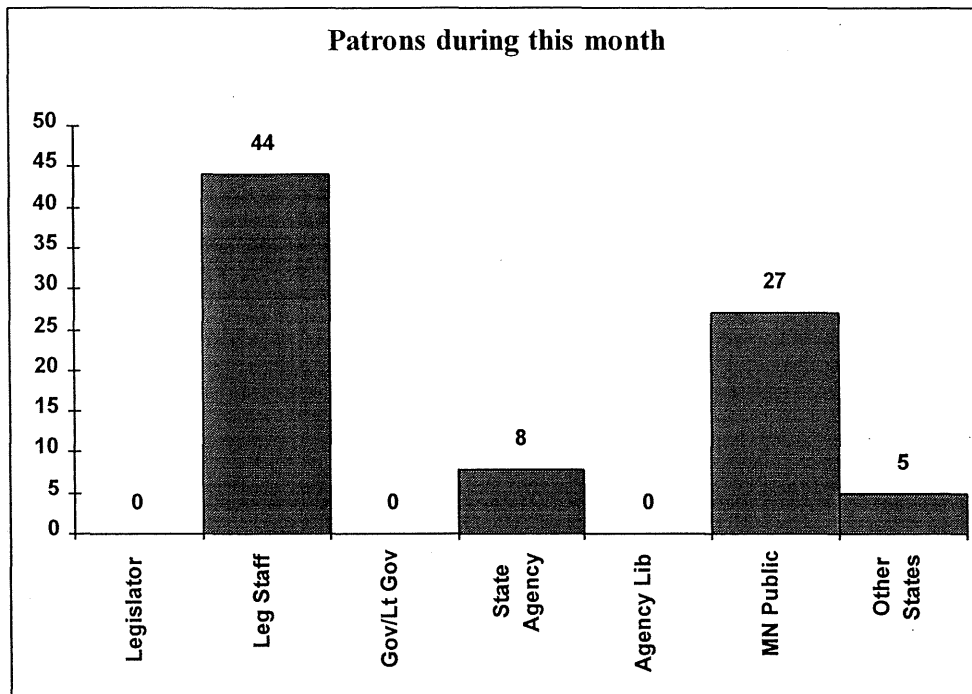
INTERLIBRARY LOAN RATIOS: Requests to Loans

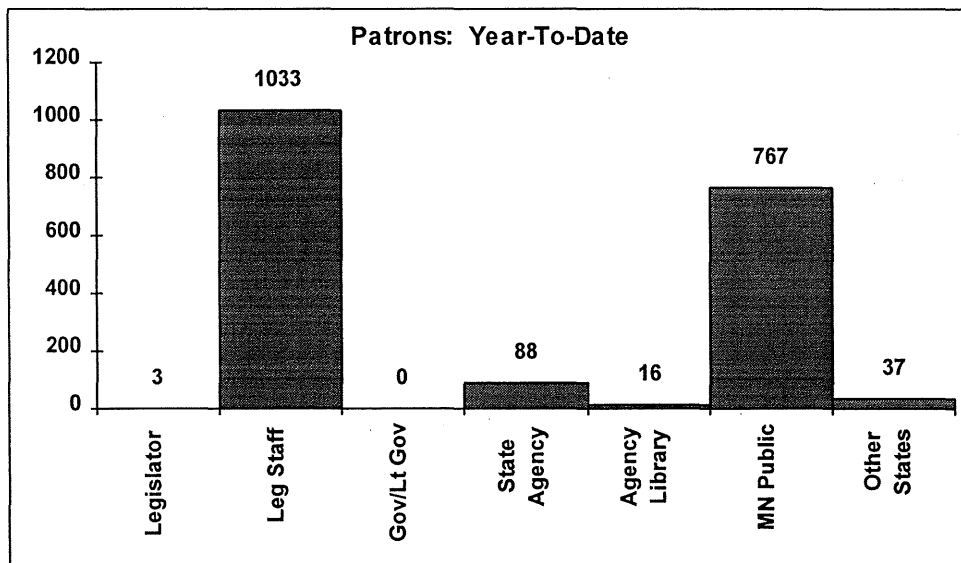

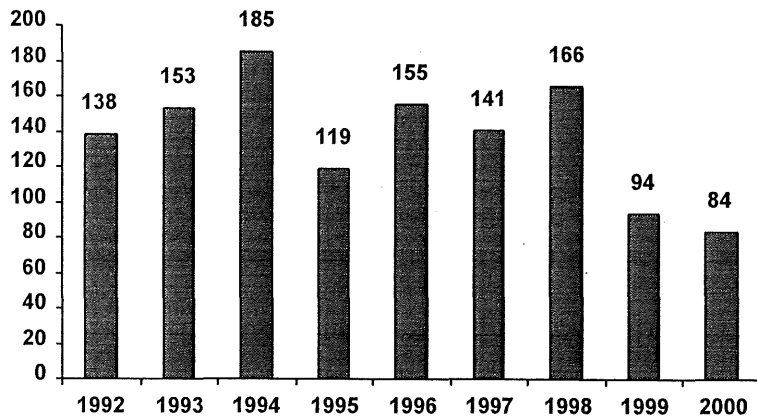

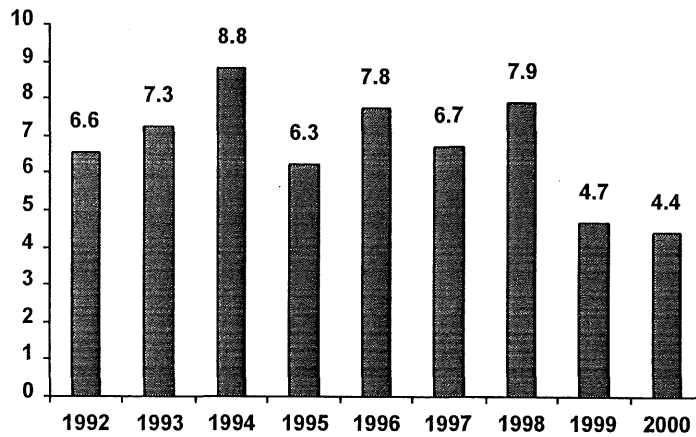

Questions for this Month by Year

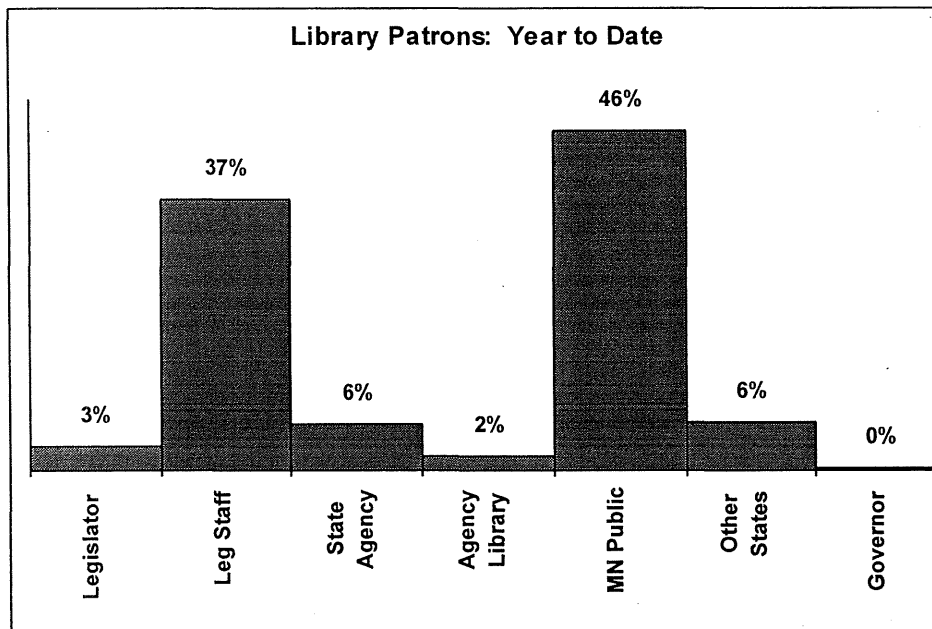
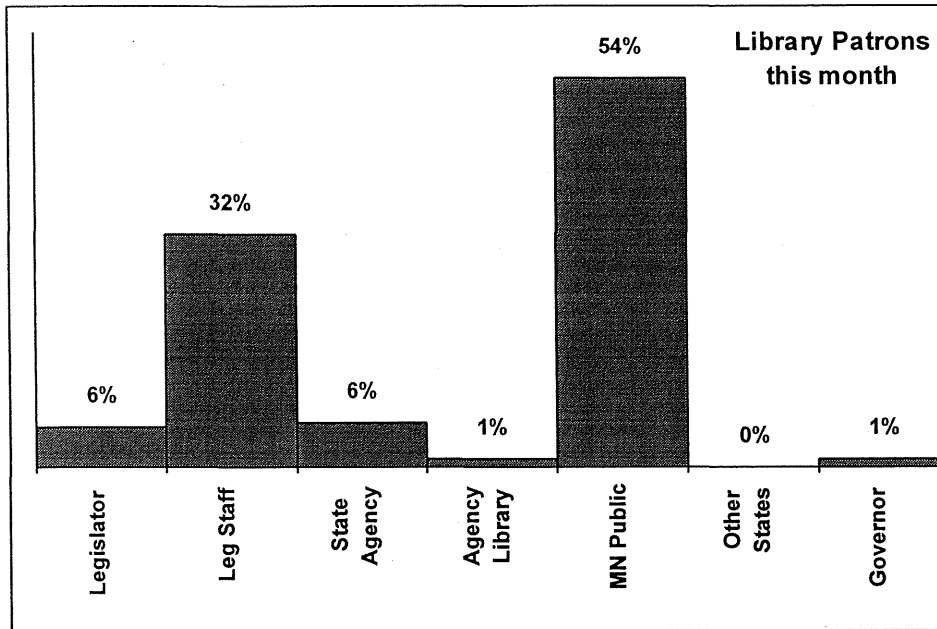


**Average Number of Daily Questions

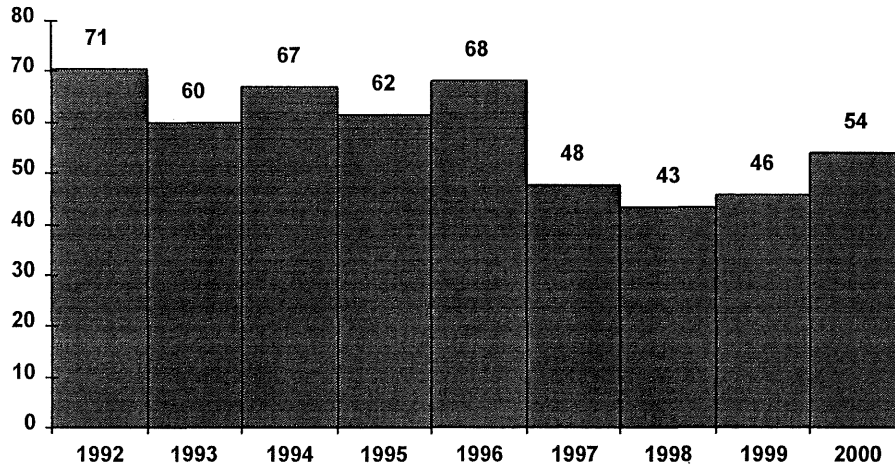

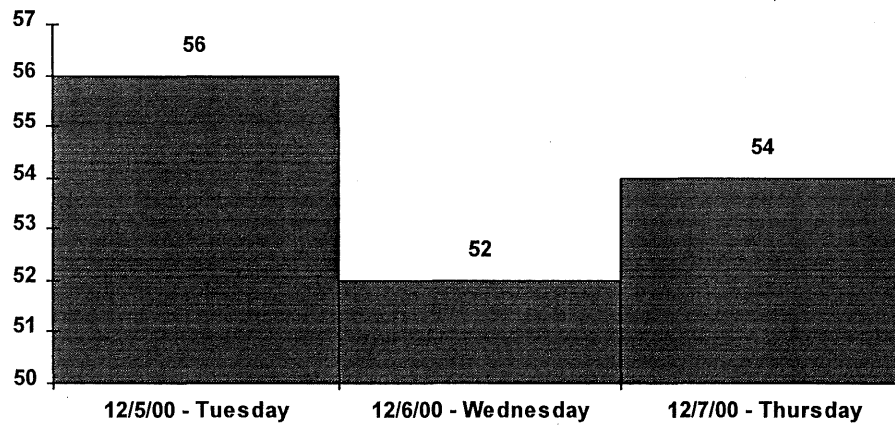

during this month in previous years



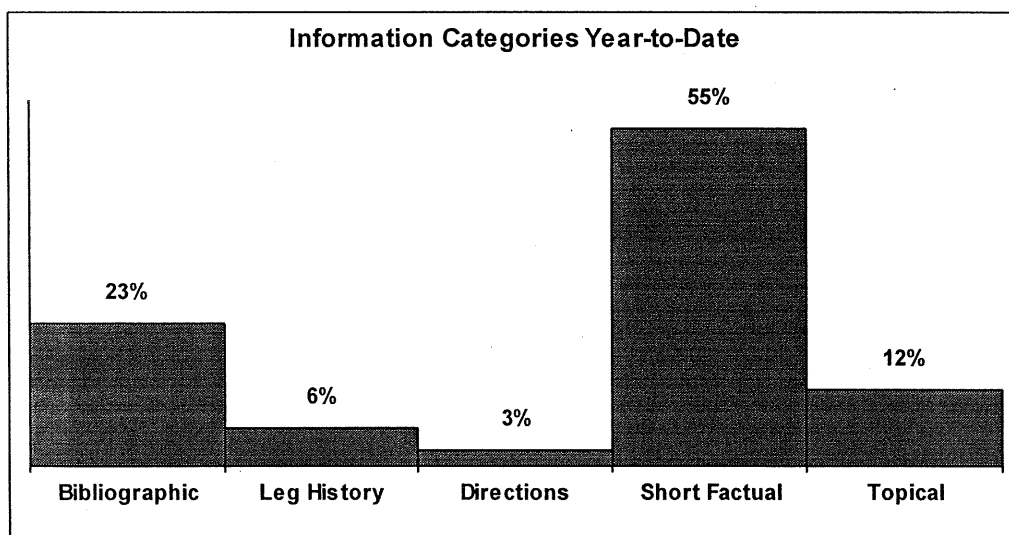
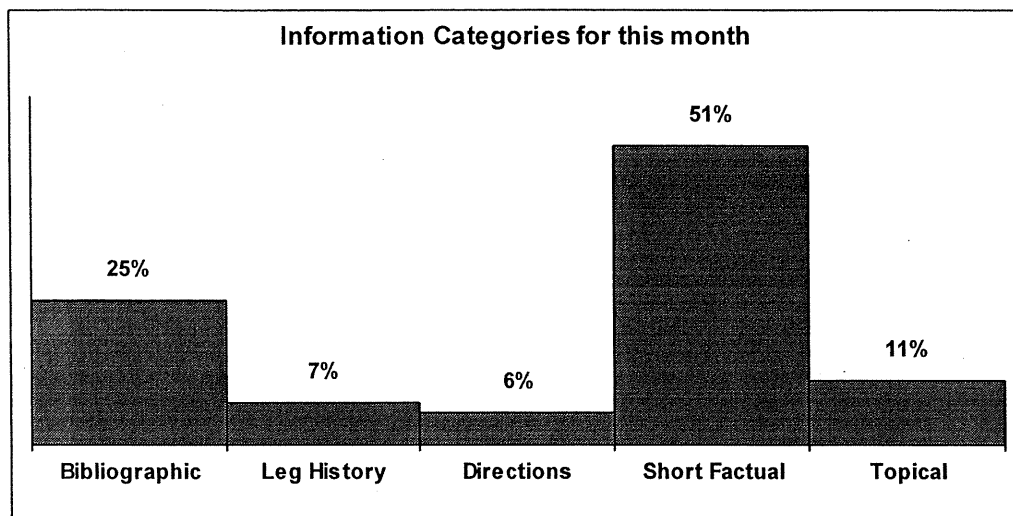

on each survey day

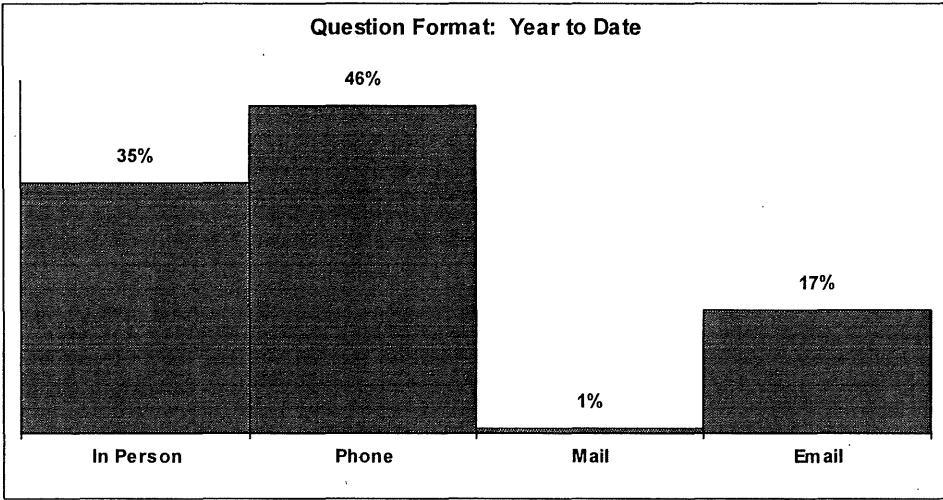
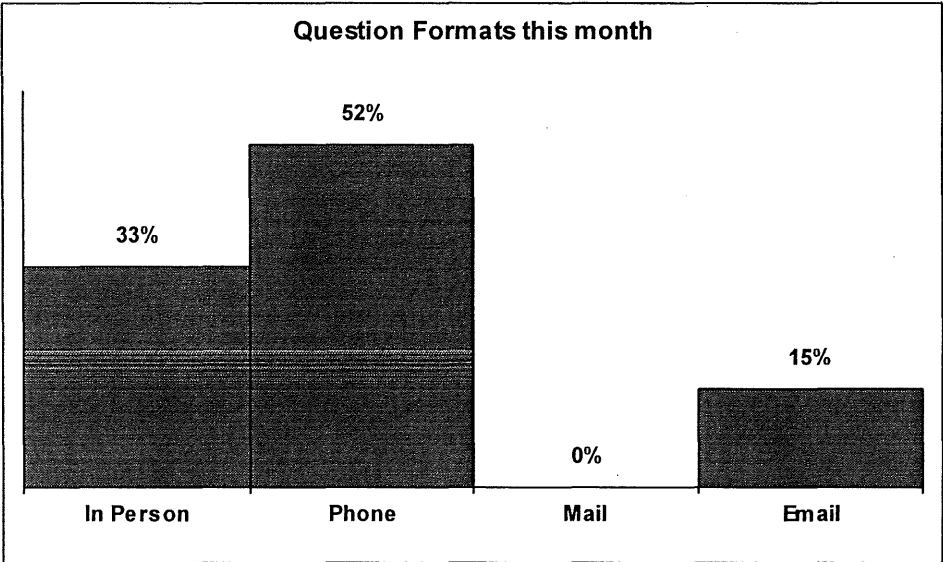


REFERENCE REPORT: Information Format by Category

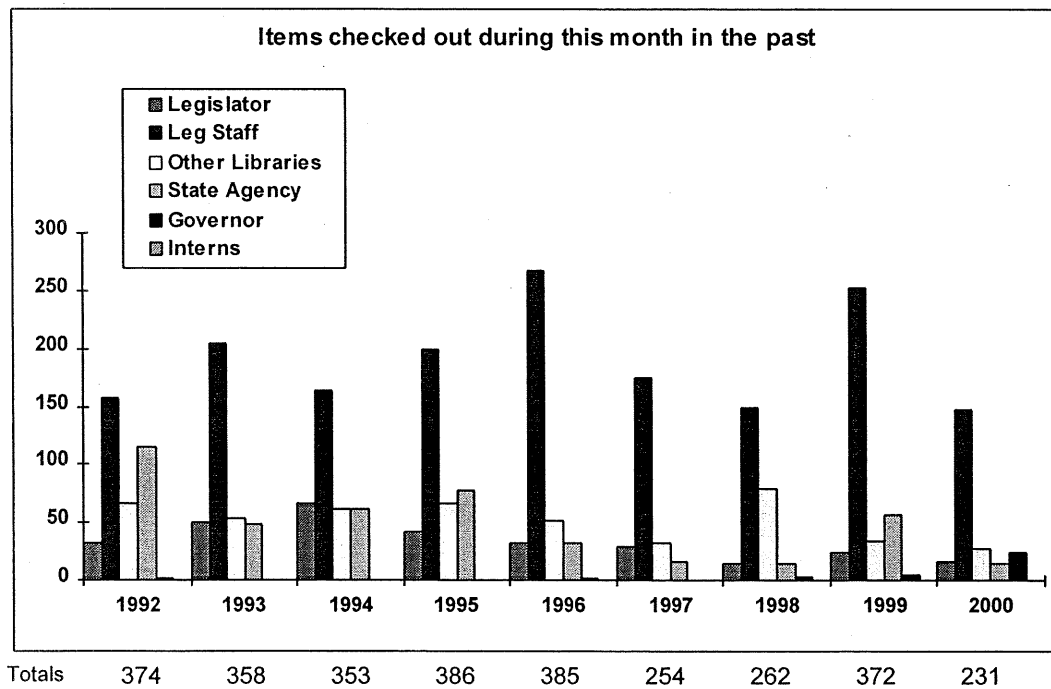
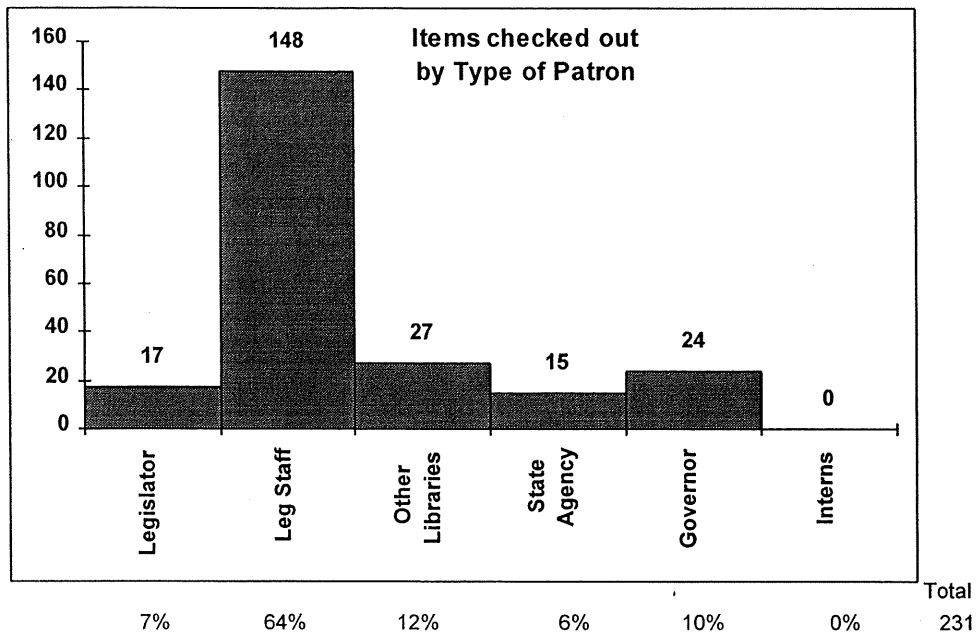


REFERENCE REPORT: Question Format

There has been much pre-session activity – preparing materials for and meeting with new legislators, giving many tours to new staff, and making sure that the Legislature's main Web pages will be in order when session begins. For example, all of the references to the current session will no longer be to 1999-2000, but to 2001-2002. And of course the staff are responding to more requests as legislators and staff prepare for writing and presenting bills.

Personally, I am beginning to prepare in earnest for the budget session. The increasing costs of technology present a particular challenge. I think it is not so difficult to justify the necessity of software and equipment to provide increasingly sophisticated information to the Legislature and the public, but it is sure difficult to predict just what the costs will be! Of course you'll be hearing more from me about this in the coming months.

Monthly Report

November 2000

Library Administration

- Lisa met with Chad Thuet from the LCC to discuss Maintenance Contracts. The LCC is looking into combining their contracts with ours to gain some cost savings. Lisa created a list of all of our maintenance contracts to give to Chad.
- Kathy Shearer, the ergonomics expert from DOER, visited the Library for a second time to talk with the staff who were not present the first time she came. Lisa updated the ergonomic report for Robbie with all of Kathy's recommendations. (We will take action on the recommendations as the money is available and we decide which actions are most important to take.)
- Robbie continued work with the LCC Directors on the Compensation Study.

Web Activities

- Now that the Legislature's pages are up with the new look and feel, it was time to revamp the content of the Library's pages on the public Internet. Randi divided the pages among several librarians. An initial meeting early in the month kicked off the discussion.
- Syble used our new Web statistical analysis package, Web Trends, to help Michele Kibinger in the House Public Information Office analyze the use of their "Session Daily" page during last session. The results are published at: <http://www.leg.state.mn.us/lnet/reports/sessiondaily/> (It turns out that it had *many* hits and they will be continuing it again this year.)
- Randi convened a group of several staff to discuss revamping the public pc pages, the interface our users in the Library see. Rather than maintain a separate set of pages, we decided to use the pages maintained for the Intranet for the Legislature, with the addition of a page of general library information. It might not sound like a big change, but it was a great leap in efficiency.
- Randi, Leif, Betsy, and Syble attended an LNET meeting.
- Syble created new search pages for the Legislative Web Site with the updated design. She worked with Steve Lime on the format and was able to send him the code in a format that he could just drop it in to the directory. This kept Steve from having to work the code around and gave us the new pages more quickly.
- Syble worked on code for Leg, LRL, Search pages, and the banner graphics to eliminate problems with the display of pages on 1024x768 monitors.
- Randi and Syble worked on the bill status results page template.
- Syble worked on the code for the pages on the Library's Web site that are automatically generated from a database (for example, directory pages, or lists of legislative information kept in database format).

Information Systems

- Lisa created an electronic log for our troubleshooting problems. Leif, Ruth, Syble and Lisa will be recording problems they encounter when they help people with on their computers, so if there are recurring problems they will quickly know how to solve them.
- Lisa created an electronic log for maintenance calls made that is pointed to from the IS page on the intranet. This allows Leif, Syble and Ruth access to it in Lisa's absence.
- Ruth maintains the legislative-wide address staff directory on the Web and reported that many pre-session changes are starting to come.
- Lisa created a map of the library with phone numbers for each office on it for the telephone installers.
- Ruth continued work on the codebook conversion project. She met with Carol to show her the new system so far, finished programming the body of the Codebook and imported the records from dBase. She created a temporary database for entering cross references in records that didn't transfer; Kelly, Misha, Laura, and Alissa entered the missing cross references.
- Ruth worked on the Orange Card system (the name is a holdover from cards we sent out in the early eighties); it is an improved way to alert users to new books and reports by subject in the same way we tell them about new articles. She met with Elizabeth and Carol to demonstrate the system and show them the reports. She decided to put into Access 2000 since it will be a stand-alone application. She installed Arpeggio, the version of R&R Report Writer to work with Access 2000, so she could easily create the Orange Cards report.
- Lisa ghosted Laura's machine. She put a new hard drive in Laura's computer; her old hard drive was defective.
- Lisa worked a lot on fine-tuning our harbor backup so that we back up only what we need to preserve. We want the most cost efficient backup that we can possibly have while still backing up the critical files. (Note: After one of Lisa's many communications with Patty Anderson at Intertech about this issue, Patty wrote, "Personally, I think you are doing an outstanding job in trying to become an expert on how this works and how to save costs.")

Collections Activities

- Diane and Helen completed their investigation of CORC records and minimal cataloging of consultant's report for discussion with librarians.
- Ruth created 2 "Docs on Fiche" lists covering state documents. She showed Laura how to proofread and process the Docs on Fiche so she can help in the future.
- The librarians decided to begin sending older, little-used, consultants reports to the MNLAC storage center at the University after three years. New consultants reports will be evaluated for full or minimal cataloging. During the first months of 2001 the librarians will evaluate consultants from 1979 to the present for possible shifting. Older consultants reports stored at the University facility will be easily accessible and can be retrieved in a day. Moving these little used

documents will help in the bar coding process this summer and in general will ensure that the materials we have easily at hand are the ones our patrons need most.

Kelly processed 87 added volumes, withdrew 5 items from our collection, copied 162 Contents Page articles, copied 2,462 Contents Pages, and shelfread the collection from HE5620 - HJ4191. She claimed 57 Missing Periodical issues: 24 were EBSCO, 17 free, 15 were Minnesota Periodicals and 1 was an Order Direct. Jess finished up entering the mandates from the 2000 Session Laws into the Acquisitions database. She ran mandate letters for the first time in almost 2 months (we were waiting until the 2000s were in) and the, as Jess reported, "fielded questions from frantic agency folks who thought we were going to send the report police to get them if they didn't get everything done on time."

Training, Tours, and Visitors

Elizabeth and Carol presented a class on Library resources for the Senate Republican staff.

Dennis Kern in the House gave us the opportunity to take computer classes for House staff free of charge if there were spaces. Lisa attended an introduction to EXCEL class that was given to House staff. She reported, "It was a nice review of the materials and you can't beat it when it is free!!! If they ever have an intermediate class I would like to attend!"

Many of the public services staff attended the informative seminar on the state budget process given by the Revisor's Office.

Syble attended a week-long training session for Interdev, Web Application design and development.

Robbie gave a presentation on the Legislative Library and its special collections to a College of St. Catherine Information Studies class.

Professional Activities/Meetings

Diane was elected Chair-Elect of Technical Services Section of the Minnesota Library Association. Congratulations Diane!

Betsy attended the Internet Librarian Conference in Monterey, CA. She found it well run and informative.

Randi and Robbie attended a meeting of state agency records managers to hear about the results of a study commissioned by the Historical Society on the use of metadata by state agencies.

Robbie, David, and Leif attended the PALS Deans/Directors and User Council Meeting on November 16.

Robbie was appointed to a (short term) MNLINK Ad Hoc Budget Task Force; the first meeting was on November 29.

Legislative History/Tape Room Activities

Legislative history research topics this month included: Several people working on sex crimes/sex offender community notification, tax increment financing, gift

certificates as unclaimed property, 1991 redistricting, & bathroom usage dialogue when sexual orientation was added to the human rights law.

Paul began boxing up the 1991 House tapes.

Minutes continue to pour into the Tape Room. Staff has been busy processing them. It's quite an undertaking getting them into our standardized order.

Paul, Leif, and Robbie met with House and Senate Media staff about their plans for providing video coverage of House and Senate proceedings. Eventually the Library would like to have digital records of the House and Senate floor debates and committee hearings in place of audiotapes. It is important to track what the media offices provide so that we can evaluate how it might work for archival storage.

Reference Activities and Questions

Elizabeth and Carol delivered a presentation on library services and resources for the Senate Republican staff.

Alissa continued work on the 1999-2000 overview notebook on the Legislature for which Carol has been collecting information.

Paul updated the circulation procedures related to former legislators.

As I'm sure you have heard, I was recently chosen as the Director of the Legislative Library. The last interview, with leadership, took place on September 20 and the announcement was made shortly after that.

I feel very energized by the challenge and look forward to guiding the Library and serving the Legislature. I would enjoy speaking with you at any time about the work of the Library and future issues. Please don't hesitate to give me a call or stop in my office at any time.

One of the things I have done in the past year is combine the various monthly reports done by staff in the Library into one readable and informative report. It is intended to serve a number of functions:

- Inform staff members about the work being done by other staff, so that everyone will feel involved and informed
- Use it as a vehicle to recognize staff accomplishments
- Document the work of the Library over time

This is strictly an *internal* document, but I thought I would send it to you as well. You are welcome to read as much or as little as you like. Reading about software being installed can be quite dull, but the 'fan mail' section is fun, and it can be interesting to read about some of the topics on which people have requested information.

Monthly Report

October 2000

Web Activities

- The unveiling of the Legislative Web pages with their new structure and graphics took place on October 20 – the target date set in late spring. It is an incredible feat to meet a technology deadline like that, given all the bumps in the road to redesign. Syble commented, “What a momentous feeling!” Several unsolicited favorable comments were sent to the Webmaster e-mail address, and only one cryptic one saying Minnesota should be more like Florida.
- Before the new Legislative pages were unveiled, Randi did a lot of behind-the-scenes work making sure that the content of the Legislative main pages was updated, and plans are in place for the changes that need to be done before the new session begins in January.
- Randi formed a “FAQ Task Force” of people from various legislative offices to work on the “General Information” pages on the Legislative Web site. The goal was to make sure that useful information about the Legislature is available to citizens and that House, Senate, and Library staff don’t create redundant pages.
- Syble’s time was primarily taken up with redesign activities. She worked on templates, graphics and fixes up to the final moment. Since then she redesigned the redesign to fix bugs and worked on enhanced graphics.
- Laura spent a lot of time in Oct. helping out transferring files over to the new website and updating html code.
- The ZONAnet (our internal intranet) was unveiled and placed as the home page on everyone’s workstations. With handy links to internal documents and the most frequented Internet sites and search tools, it was immediately indispensable. Many staff are continuing to work on additional documents and pages to add.
- Randi, Leif and Syble met with staff from the Revisor’s Office regarding changes needed for the Revisor’s Web pages.
- Leif, Randi, Robbie, and Betsy attended an LNET meeting.
- Helen finished checking the metadata on our *Links to the World* pages, and gave Randi a list of corrections for Laura to make.
- Randi worked with Nina Manzi (House Research) and Rick Almer (Senate Index) on re-formatting the bill status results page, in consultation with Joe Hardy (Revisor’s Office) to make sure their proposal could be implemented. The goal of the re-formatting was to make the bill status results page more user-friendly. They also developed a page that explains what’s on the bill status results page for addition to the HELP section of the web site. Syble and Brenda VanDyck (House Research) provided technical help.

Information Systems

- Syble and Leif worked on NT server configuration and security issues. Syble continued work on Web forms.

- Leif set up another network ethernet switch and reconfigured all of the cabling mess.
- Leif installed a new text editor called TextPad. (PFEEditor, our current text file editor software) does not deal with long filenames so we are switching.)
- Leif found a Netware4.x compatible version of WhoHasIt. (WhoHasIt is a piece of software that lets you check to see who has files open and the status of those file locks.)
- Leif researched Windows2000 compatibility issues.
- Leif finally got the ball rolling on the Network Security Audit with Intertech – it wasn't us who had been procrastinating, but Intertech staff who were not responding. We were quite concerned about getting the audit done before session, both because there would not be time during session and the results might have budget implications. Since we feel quite sure the audit will question the physical security of the servers, Leif began to research options available for secure ventilated cabinets to house them. (In the best of all worlds, we would rather have our equipment in the Revisor's equipment room, which is climate-controlled, secure, and fireproof.)
- Leif worked with Lisa on some problems with the new version of AllClear (flowcharting software). They decided to stick with old version for now; Syble will test the new version further as the opportunity arises.
- Lisa ordered 4 new computers and 4 new monitors and 2 new printers, one a new color laser printer.
- Lisa installed PDF software on her computer. She created PDF Files for Org Chart and Responsibility Levels Chart so that they could be linked to from the intranet.
- Lisa attended a Harbor Backup Seminar. (This is the software we use via the Department of Administration to back up all of our computer data.) As a result she restructured our back-up profile to make it as cost efficient as possible.
- Lisa ran a virus scan on the network drives. There were several new viruses to check for this month. (Each month she checks our virus software to make sure we have the most up-to-date information.)

Collections Activities

- The librarians met to discuss CORC cataloging of Internet resources into the online catalog, a discussion which led to larger considerations of minimal and full cataloging of materials in the collection and how we could change our procedures to catalog all materials in a timely manner and at a level that would meet our patrons' needs. Helen and Diane began an investigation of minimal, full, and CORC cataloging standards in order to make recommendations.
- Diane reported that it was a usual month for cataloging activities, except for the computer problems on Friday the 13th!
- David, Randi, and Elizabeth met to figure out how to make the full-text periodicals available from EBSCO more accessible.
- Misha has finished the other state Legislative Manual project. We received about 14 manuals out of the 50 requests.

- Kelly processed 83 added volumes, withdrew 2 items from the collection, copied 164 Contents Page articles, copied 2,328 Contents Pages, updated 3 New LDR's and added 4 new LDR's, and shelfread from HD9688 to HE5620. She claimed 60 missing periodical issues: 20 were EBSCO, 16 were free, 24 were Minnesota Periodicals and 3 were order direct.

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- We are very pleased that the House has offered us any extra spaces in any of the computer training courses they run for house staff. We get the calendar, wait until the last day, and if there is space we can sit in. This doesn't cost the House any more money and it saves us from buying some of the classes we need. David took advantage of a beginning Access class this month.
- Ruth attended Intermediate and Advanced Access 2000 training at AppDev for 3 days. She also attended the House's advanced Access 97 training.
- Randi spoke to two classes of grade schoolers from Seward School in Minneapolis.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- Syble completed her activities with the North Star (the state's Web interface) Redesign group. She attended the meeting where the new interface was presented with recommendations to Reggie David.
- Robbie and David attended a meeting with Hennepin County library department heads regarding possible joint projects using CORC, a new OCLC program/software for cataloging Websites. The discussion was wide-ranging and may lead to cooperative projects in the future.
- Elizabeth, Helen, Leif, and David attended the inaugural MNLINK User Groups. David, Leif, and Elizabeth stood for election to the next governing level in their groups, but couldn't squeak it out.
- Leif attended the NALIT conference, the computer professionals' staff section of the National Conference of State Legislatures.
- The main topic discussed at this month's all staff meeting was the unveiling of ZONAnet.
- David attended the PALS Reference Users Group meeting in St. Cloud. He volunteered to be on a database selection task force, to make recommendations to PALS on which databases to purchase with an extra \$350,000.
- Helen attended the PALS Cataloging User Group meeting in St. Cloud; Leif attended the Systems User Group meeting.
- David attended a Minitex Reference Symposium on surveying reference user satisfaction.
- Elizabeth and Robbie attended the NCSL Legislative Research Librarians Professional Development Seminar in Baton Rouge. The content was very good and the Southern hospitality was simply amazing.
- Besy attended a Minitex FirstSearch seminar on database features and Administration module.

Tape Room/Legislative History Activities

- Alissa finished her initial legislative history training and reported the following experience. "Monday, October 30, was the first day that I was in the tape room alone, and when problems arose, Paul was right there on the phone, guiding me through the process. I have actually only run into one problem so far that completely baffled me, and that was when a woman, who had been working in the tape room for three hours, looked at one of the last committee books and remarked, "You know, that's my bill number, and that's the bill's author, but I don't think that's my bill anymore.""
- We get legislative researchers not only from Minnesota but from around the country as well. A Texas user was appreciative when Paul sent out needed tapes promptly, writing "Thank you for acting so quickly on the legislative history matter. The material came this morning."
- Paul proofread and updated the legislative history guide on the Web.
- A *Star Tribune* reporter was helped by library staff with legislative history research on funeral monument regulations. A senator was accused of a conflict of interest related to the bill. He listened to the tapes before speaking with her. (Article ran on 10/24/00.)
- Staff assisted a reporter with legislative history research on the 1998 change that assisted MN Brewing in St. Paul with their expansion to ethanol production. Of course it was buried in an omnibus bill!

Reference Activities

- Robbie sent letters to all legislators and staff soliciting family connections in the Legislature. We received tons of responses. We had forgotten many obvious family connections in our initial list but the institutional memory of the staff and legislators brought many more family connections to our attention. The reference librarians checked the accuracy of the suggested family connections and Laura turned the results into a web page. The November election produced an addition to the list--Julie Sabo will become a Senator in January--her father was in the Minnesota Legislature before running for his U.S. House seat.
- LRL began participating in the MEDD pilot project through Minitex. The project provides electronic access to articles instead of the traditional delivery of a paper copy. The project hasn't been a huge success for us--many of the requested articles end up coming in paper anyway--but this may be the way Minitex fulfills orders in the future.
- October was a month of session planning. That meant a lot of web editing and updating for most of the reference staff. November will bring other session related tasks such as letter writing, compilation of election statistics, etc. Carol, David, Elizabeth, and Ruth met to discuss the orange card system we plan on implementing in January.
- Carol updated the Library's entry for the new *Guidebook to State Agency Services*. As a piece of that project Alissa updated the list of the Minnesota State Document Depository libraries. Many of the colleges have changed their official names, and she added phone numbers as well.

- Elizabeth and Randi wrote two new 'canned' responses to questions that the Library often receives, one on voting records and one on notaries public.
- Randi compiled a bibliography and wrote a "Page One" essay on workforce issues.
- Alissa worked with Carol to put together the session overview notebook from 1999-2000.
- Laura continued work on compiling legislative ratings guides done by various organizations. (Many more are available electronically than in previous years.)

- Randi reported a reference coup: A patron was looking for a Minnesota Statute 66.082, about regulation of cable television by municipalities. She discovered that it really was a *Wisconsin* statute.

Library Administration

- Ruth continued work on Library inventory.
- Lisa and Ruth evaluated photocopiers to replace the one for public use (well, legislative folks and state employees). Amazingly, photocopier technology keeps improving so that we can get more features for nearly the same monthly lease charge.

- Lisa finished converting remaining documents Lisa reformatted the LRL Handbook in Word, made all of the table of contents entries clickable to bring you right to that portion of the document, and put it in the g:\docs so that all staff can easily reach it on the intranet.
- One of the goals of the ZONAnet is to have as much (non-sensitive) administrative information on the intranet as possible. This month Lisa created a Word document of maintenance vendors contact information - serial Numbers, etc. - so the information will be easily obtainable and convenient to update.
- Lisa placed an ad for the Reference Librarian position in the newspapers and at all the appropriate EEO places. She collected resumes, created the resume checklist and gave the resumes to the interview committee to review.
- Robbie continued work with the LCC Compensation Study group, made up of Directors from the various LCC offices, and met with Al Bunnnett, the Consultant from Hay, regarding the library's positions.

Monthly Report

September 2000

Library Administration

- Robbie was appointed as Director of the Library.
- All Library staff attended job validation interviews as a part of the LCC Compensation study.
- Ruth pulled together some repetitive strain injury and ergonomic web sites for the ZONANET.
- Syble, Ruth and Lisa finished up giving WORD training. The next step is customized training to be delivered as staff request it. Lisa created a list of functions from which staff can choose.
- The LCC telephone working group, in which Lisa and Robbie participated, came to a decision, to install a PBX system as an overlay to the existing state Centrex system. We will retain 5-digit dialing, and be able to make changes to phone assignments within the offices without contacting Intertech. Other benefits include nine distinctive rings to choose from, vastly improved customer service, a voicemail indicator light on the phones, and two-line receiving. It was the more costly proposal, but our open position will allow us to absorb the capital costs. We do not anticipate higher ongoing monthly costs. The phones should be in place *well* before session, probably late November.
- Lisa worked on converting documents in the Tech Services directory on L:\zona and was able to convert most of it to WORD. Other staff will be weeding through the remaining files alerting Lisa if additional conversion is needed.
- Lisa began investigating how to create reports from the new LCC time and leave automated system.
- Lisa worked on planning a kick off event with the House, Senate and LCC for the Combined Charities Campaign. She pulled together the packets for the campaign, distributed them to staff, and collected staff contribution forms.
- Lisa coordinated a visit from the ergonomics specialist from DOER. Kathy met with each staff member and made recommendations for changes that would make work areas more ergonomically correct. She will be returning to visit with the five staff who were not in the Library on her first visit. Lisa wrote a report for Robbie on the recommendations that Kathy made for each of the areas. The number one problem that people had were bad chairs. She is looking into the chairs recommended by the state and will be getting in some chairs for a test run as soon as possible.

Web Activities

- Leif spent much of his time on LNET issues such as the new web page templates and the guidelines.

- Syble spent most of her time working on the new Legislative Design Templates for the House, Senate, and LCC. This wasn't easy, since many last minute problems cropped up. When the Unix browsers in the Revisor's Office did not properly display the drop-down boxes, Syble worked with Linda Schmitt on a solution. And it wasn't easy for the staff in many offices to come to agreement on how the banners should look; Syble made many revisions. An LCC staff member recognized Syble's hard work in an e-mail, "Just wanted to say thanks for making the three extra banners for the trustees, regents, and employee relations. I appreciate your efforts and time." Mike Speiker wrote, "Have I told you great those plain banners look? This is going to look so good when it is all done."
- Randi, Leif and Syble substantially edited the Web Design Guidelines; Syble posted them on the LNET Web site. Randi worked with LNET people to plan the Help page for the legislative web site.
- Paul helped Revisor's Office staff by reviewing possible changes to the bill status screen. Randi worked with Nina Manzi and others to rearrange the bill status results on the web in a more useful way.
- Betsy continued work on the ZONANET, the intranet for internal staff use. Randi, Leif, Syble, Lisa and Betsy met to plan for the release of the new interface to staff. Lisa continued conversion of documents to a format that could be used on the intranet. Leif solved the problems with loading our Library Access databases directly from the Web page.
- Syble attended North Star Redesign meetings, one of which hosted Phil Kragnes as he talked about designing accessible websites. Much discussion has surrounded aspects of design that need to be considered and whether to recommend and inside or outside source developer to design the new web pages. The group looked at the submissions of one outside designer but decided that we have at least as much as, and perhaps more, talent within the state. The Design group should be winding down in October with recommendations written. The "Process" group will start after that looking into recommendations for implementation of the design recommendations.

Information Systems

- Leif spent much time trying to resolve the web server instability that results when we turn on file parsing. We purchased a memory upgrade to try to solve the problem. The memory upgrade had a very positive effect on server response time, but did not solve the parsing problem.
- Leif replaced the old Logitech mice at the front desks with new MS wheel mice, loaded the drivers, and configured them for our standard functions.
- Leif researched software and hardware options and prices. We ordered new workstations, printers, monitors, and a battery power supply, items which had been scheduled for purchase on our Technology Plan.

- Ruth created 468 September *Minnesota Resources* and the accompanying web page. (Note: We have many subscribers outside the Legislature – primarily libraries - to our lists of Minnesota documents. For faster service and to save postage and paper, most of them have opted to look at it online; we send them an e-mail notice that it is available.)
- Ruth installed Total Visual Agent 2000 and used for first time to automatically compact and repair Access databases. It caused a rights problem with a file with the in our Acquisitions system. Leif fixed the file and got system to work.
- Ruth continued working on the conversion of the Codebook from the old dBase to Access 2000.
- Leif and Syble installed Adobe Acrobat and installed PDF Writer on selected PCs so users could quickly create PDF documents. For example, they installed it on Ruth's computer and she created a PDF for Minnesota Issues from Pagemaker. This would have taken a great deal of time to convert into a Word document. Creating the PDF took less than 5 minutes.
- Lisa worked on the upgrade to Speed Disk, a software which scans our hard drives and performs clean-up functions each day when we boot up our computers.
- Syble helped Carla Riehle in the Revisor's Office, who needed a chart showing the biennium totals for the Web Statistics for the Revisor's Office, including the gopher server. Syble took totals from the Web Statistics spreadsheet, created biennium totals, created 2 charts in Power Point and output them to a pdf file. Carla was very pleased with the result.
- The MNDOCs (Minnesota Documents) Process group decided on a course of action that will streamline the process and hopefully reduces errors in database entry. The new process flowchart is available on Zononet.

Collections Activities

- Kelly processed 82 added volumes, withdrew 10 items from the collection, copied 241 Contents Page articles, copied 2,228 Contents Pages, updated 34 LDR Records, and added an LDR to 8 Periodical Records.
- Kelly shelfread the Circulating Collection from HD7116 - HD9685, one of the densest parts of our collection.
- Kelly shifted a major section of the periodical collection; we were running out of room for some periodicals. Alissa went through the stacks to help figure out which areas still need to be shifted
- The librarians decided to no longer keep the News Releases from various agencies in print, with the exception of the Governor's press releases, which serve as a useful record of the governor's daily activities. Robbie went through the existing press releases. She pulled some that mentioned new reports, new offices, or new commissioners, and wrote up scanning guidelines. Laura started scanning the press releases as they arrive to augment our files or to have Jess check for new reports. We had been sending copies of some of the news releases to some of our Tables of Contents users, so Laura informed them of the change and told them how to get them electronically. One user wrote back, "I no longer have any need for them. Thanks anyway, Laura. But let me take this opportunity to thank you and all your LRL colleagues for all the great assistance that you all routinely

provide us fellow staff. You're all so bright and talented and resourceful. (But then, someone has to raise our average on those qualities - - it might as well be the LRL folks!)”

- Kelly claimed 58 missing Periodical issues: 21 were EBSCO, 18 were free, 18 were Minnesota periodicals and 1 was an order direct.
- David and Jess completed the last step of the dreaded purge of old order records from the Acquisitions database. Jess said, “Hopefully we have rooted out the problems in the system and it will go much more smoothly next time.”
- Jess entered the 2000 mandates into the ACQ system that Robbie had noted in the MN Laws. Se reported, “This process is a lot more complicated than it would appear to be! Some of the changes in law are confusing, and seemingly obsolete, and tracking down new groups to contact about their responsibilities can be sticky!”
- We encountered three instances where EBSCO, our periodicals provider company, had incorrectly handled our orders, causing our subscriptions to end in October rather than December. David was not happy with our contact’s lack of a solution, and dealt with EBSCO managers until they promised the problem would be remedied.

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- These weren’t visitors to the Library, but several staff members went down to the first floor for a glimpse of Phil Donahue and Ralph Nader during Mr. Nader’s press conference.
- Randi attended a Supervisor Training class, which she described as useful and characterized as “rah rah supervisor training.”
- Randi gave a tour to a new staff person in the House Republican Caucus, Brent Walsh.
- David gave a tour of the Library to 12 librarians. They visited the library as part of a Capitol area library tour at the Minnesota Library Association annual conference.
- A Romanian researcher came to the Library and spoke with Robbie and Elizabeth on separate days.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- Helen, David, Carol, Diane and Robbie attended portions of the Minnesota Library Association Annual Conference at River Centre. Diane received a 25 year membership award at the Awards reception.
- Paul met with Clayton Larson (Revisor’s Office) and Charlie Fastner (Senate) several times to discuss the Senate committee minute index needs.
- Syble attended the state Webmasters meeting – there was much discussion about graphically pleasing vs. disability accessible websites.
- Leif, Robbie, and Paul attended a meeting with House and Senate television and IS staff to discuss the video streaming project they will undertake during session. We hope to begin a pilot project to store audio of the floor debates and committee hearings in digital format. (At our Manager’s meeting we all agreed that the

archival storage of video is really not so valuable when the picture is so tiny. David suggested we wait until we can get holographic images of all the members right in the room with us.)

- Robbie met with a group of government agency librarians to choose the "Best State Documents of the Year." The librarians wrote annotations, Robbie produced a print bibliography, and Randi created a web version. The bibliography was handed out at a government documents booth at the Minnesota Library Association Conference, and it is available on our internet site as well. <http://www.leg.state.mn.us/lrl/mndocs/best.htm>
- Betsy attended the monthly CALCO meeting at the Department of Transportation Library.
- Randi and Betsy attended the Special Library Association board meeting and meeting.
- Betsy attended a Minnesota Association of Law Libraries meeting on Intranets/Portals.
- Leif attended a PALS User Council meeting.
- Randi and Robbie attended a presentation at the History Center by Datachannel, a company which is currently designing an XML-based legislative information system for the Texas Legislature.
- David and Robbie attended a Library Planning Task Force meeting, at which it was announced that Ex Libris was selected as the new library catalog for the state universities and the university and state government libraries.

Reference Activities and Questions

- Laura helped update the legislator "Family Connections" list in anticipation of asking legislators and staff about additions to the list.
- Carol deals with Codebook updating on a regular basis. Mergers in the corporate world mean that companies need new headings (and as Elizabeth points out, when they change their sensible names to meaningless syllables), like: Minnesota Power to Allete, NSP to Excel, and US West to Qwest.
- Robbie updated the bibliography "Readings on the Legislature" which the Senate Information staff distributes to new interns each year.
- Elizabeth and Randi began examining and updating some of the Legislative notebooks. Laura updated historical information pages on the Web site and in the notebooks.
- Paul began Alissa's legislative history training. As Alissa reported, "I am learning how to track bills with Paul in the Tape Room, and am also becoming familiar with the journals, tapes, reels, and minute books." It's not an easy process!
- The reference librarians and Paul worked on updating various "Minnesota Issues" publications.

AgNIC

AgNIC — the Agriculture Network Information Center — lives up to its name with a Web site so fact-full you might need to return a few times to get through it all. AgNIC is a voluntary alliance of the National Agricultural Library, land grant universities and other ag organizations. Monthly Report

August 2000

Library Administration

- Interviews of the three final candidates for the Director's position were held. Elizabeth was part of the search team; Paul and Carol gave the candidates tours of the Library and Tape Room.
- Many staff attended one of two employee information sessions regarding the LCC Compensation Study.
- We take the health and safety of our employees very seriously and have worked to ensure that everyone's workstations are ergonomically correct. To follow up on this, Lisa set up an appointment with a state ergonomics specialist from DOER who will come out and assess our work area in September. Also, all staff filled out an ergonomic checklist. Lisa will review them and meet with individuals who need changes.
- Lisa arranged for the new digital copier to be delivered and attached to our network and set up training for staff. She arranged for a new copier to be delivered to tape room as well.
- Lisa attended training for Combined Charities Campaign, which she coordinates for the Library each fall.

Web Activities

- Betsy, Syble, Randi, Leif, and Robbie attended the LNET meeting.
- Syble and Betsy met to continue work on the ZONAnet.
- Randi worked with the web group to implement metadata in Legislative Web site templates. Helen worked with Syble on developing a metadata template for the legislative web site. She supplied name authorities for the various legislative offices and identified which Dublin Core fields the offices should complete and which fields would be completed on the template.
- Syble continued work on the template web pages for the redesigned Leg. web site. Leif met with Yvonne Fritchie from the LCMR about LCC concerns about the templates.
- Several staff worked on updating various "Minnesota Issues" pages on the Library's web site.
- Leif and Robbie attended vendor meetings with House and Senate television staff and House and Senate IS staff regarding video streaming of House and Senate proceedings in 2001.

Information Systems

- Ruth attended training for the new copier including learning to print from her computer. She has printed *MN Resources* and *Introductions* from the copier so far, but hasn't been able to get it to work for Inside Issues.

- Lisa continued work on moving documents to g:\docs and deleting all prehistoric documents from the network, updating the g:\docs directory as she works. (Many people have good-naturedly complained that they are tired of answering Lisa's questions about whether this or that ancient document is still needed.) This is a very time consuming project, but will be worth the effort. She also handed out worksheets to staff to fill out about where they will be needing rights in the g:\docs directory. (This was tedious to do, but important.) She then assigned rights to staff who turned their worksheets.
- Every month Lisa takes care of some important housekeeping jobs for our computer network, scanning the network drives for viruses, and updating the Harbor backup log files.
- Leif and Syble reinstalled the NT server software, configured the Internet Information Server, and began other configurations. They mapped the shared drive and established a gateway from the Novell server to the NT. Leif figured out how to get NT to see Netware drive mappings, this will allow dynamic database driven web applications to be hosted on the NT server with data coming off the Netware server. They tried different methods for Server Side Includes and server side javascript.
- Syble re-configured the web server for users/groups, access control & logging.
- Several staff attended copier training + printer training in order to fully use the capabilities of the new digital copier/printer.
- Leif gave new user training to Alissa and Laura, getting them up to date on their workstations and the network.
- Leif continued work on figuring out how staff can access our network remotely.

Collections Activities

- Diane trained Laura on URL correction in PALS records.
- Laura took care of many updating details in electronic and paper files. She updated the state symbols webpage and notebook and updated the ratings notebook. She weeded many of the documents that we keep for a limited time period - EAWs, Vulnerable Adult Reports, Administrative Hearings, and PUC Orders.
- Jess put a dent in catching up on orders, which she found had piled up a great deal during her July vacation.
- David, Ruth, Diane, Helen, and Jess met to discuss the workflow of processing Minnesota documents.
- Jess worked on purging old records from ACQ with David; a yearly event, but apparently one that was not functioning properly before. They spent a great deal of very frustrating time trying to figure out how the system was presently working, how it was intended to work, and how it might ideally work. They are close to having it straightened out, but managed to create a lot of extra work for Ruth who has diligently repaired portions of the database.
- Kelly processed 102 added volumes, copied 188 Contents Page articles, updated 5 LDR records, added an LDR to 4 Periodical records, shelfread the Circulating Collection from HC110 - HD7116, and claimed 59 missing Periodical issues: 18

were EBSCO, 12 were free, 28 were Minnesota Periodicals and 1 was an order direct. She copied 2,489 contents pages.

Alissa received training on scanning for Inside Issues. While Elizabeth was on vacation she scanned periodicals for articles relevant to things such as taxation, government finance, and Elizabeth's offbeat topic, the Netherlands. ("I have yet to find any articles on the Netherlands, but I have made it my goal to do so!" Alissa reported.) She has also begun coding the articles from the clipping service about legislators. Many of them are about elections right now, and she said that every time she sees a sign for Jerry Janezich on the road, she now automatically thinks of the number 5.

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- Ruth, Lisa, and Syble geared up to provide WORD 2000 training to the rest of the staff.. Ruth gave Word 2000 training to Leif. Syble trained Robbie and Diane. Lisa trained Paul, Jess, and Carol.
- Ruth trained Alissa to enter Inside Issues requests, and Laura how to do the data entry for *Introductions*.
- Randi, Paul, and Elizabeth planned training for Alissa and Laura. They performed much of the training personally and coordinated sessions with other staff as well.
- Elizabeth gave a tour to eight people attending the Humphrey Institute NCSL-sponsored Legislative Staff Management Institute.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- Paul, Jess, Lisa, and Betsy worked at the Minnesota State Fair in the House of Representatives booth. Robbie worked in the Senate booth. Fairgoers told Jess some interesting things: people who have gotten a DWI should be shot, people in MN with seizure disorders are treated worse than criminals with a DWI on their record, a few people mentioned being quite disenchanted with Ventura, and one woman shouted about how she had named her dog after him. (Jesse) She pointed out that the name also worked for a boy or a girl, which was an added perk.
- Randi and Betsy attended the SLA Board Meeting. This coming year Randi is the President-elect and Betsy is the Networking Chair and Continuing Education Chair for this Minnesota organization of librarians in special libraries.
- Syble met with the North Star Redesign group, and called 3 meetings for her graphics subcommittee.
- Leif attended a SNAP meeting. SNAP is a group of IS folks from all the state agencies.

Publications

- Ruth created 479 June/July/August 2000 *Minnesota Resources* and web page, and printed 424 July/August *Introductions* and web page.

Tape Room Activities

- Paul coordinated the transfer of the 1989-1990 House & Senate legislative tapes & minutes to the MHS.

Research topics in the Tape Room this month included homestead tax exemptions, capital equipment sales tax, sales representatives, & teacher's retirement.

Monthly Report

July 2000

Library Administration

- We received great news regarding our copiers. When we leased a new digital copier with many more functions and network capabilities, it turned out to cost only slightly more than our previous copier. And this one will allow Ruth to print large jobs directly to the copier, saving money on printer consumables and wear and tear. Then the IKON folks discovered they had been overbilling us for many months – something we had questioned before but were unable to resolve – and it turns out we will receive nearly a \$7,000 credit. The credit was larger than we anticipated because they decided not to bill us for maintenance in all those months because they had screwed up the billing.
- Robbie continued participating in the LCC Director's group to select a consultant for the Compensation Study, and continued work on revising the job descriptions in anticipation of the project.
- Lisa, with Ruth's help, coordinated the hiring process for our two newest employees – scheduled interviews, sent out letters, prepared the paperwork for the interviewees.

Web Activities

- Work continued on the Legislative website. Syble added an html page for the Excel Web Statistics spreadsheet so they would be available to the entire group. She also posted the Usability Study Report to the LNET page.
- Syble, Leif and Randi attended the LNET meeting.
- Syble assembled various color choices for the legislature's banners and posted them on the LNET site. Legislative folks were encouraged to vote, as we tried to find a democratic compromise.
- Randi, Syble, and Betsy completed the "Guidelines for Creating an Accessible Website" and posted it on the LNET website.
- Randi convened an LNET subgroup to discuss the general information pages for the legislature. Syble and Betsy met with the subgroup.
- Syble continued evaluating and testing the WebTrends Enterprise Suite and made a recommendation to purchase. (It is on order.)
- Betsy, Randi, and Elizabeth updated portions of the library's intranet for the legislature.
- Randi, Betsy, Lisa and Syble met to discuss the format and content of the new Zononet, our upcoming, improved internal web page for staff access to Library information.
- Randi served on the North Star Portal Redesign Group, and received an appreciation letter for her hard work from Mel Boynton, Assistant Commissioner of the Office of Technology. (A copy follows this report.) Syble is continuing to serve on the group working on the graphics for the new statewide site.

Collections

Public vendor demonstrations were held in July by the two companies bidding on the statewide online catalog system (the process known as VET2). Elizabeth was on the OPAC evaluation committee, so she attended both meetings and participated in the report of that subgroup. David and Robbie attended the first meeting (Ex Libris), and David also attend the Endeavor demonstration. Happily, both systems appeared to be strong contenders.

Information Systems

- Leif and Syble continued work on the web server. They tested "server side includes" (ssi) and made some modifications including limiting access to the LNET web site to Leg IP addresses. We did have the ssi working but it slowed the current version of the web server down too much so it was disabled. We are installing the upgrade version of Netscape Enterprise Server for Netware 4.11 to try. They tested server-side Javascript and determined we do not want to do that.
- Ruth updated the House staff directory.
- Ruth created a new email export file for the Revisor's office.

Collections Activities

- Jess found herself digging out of heaps of documents upon her return from a long vacation.
- Kelly was kept busy as usual. She processed 80 added volumes, withdrew 1 item from our collection, copied 123 Contents Page articles, copied 2,504 Contents Pages, updated 5 LDR Records, added an LDR to 1 Periodical Record. She shelfread the Circulating Collection from HA201 - HC110. She claimed 72 missing periodical issues: 16 were EBSCO, 26 were Free and 30 were Minnesota Periodicals.
- Diane spoke with Julia Wallace, Gov Docs UofM, about their continuing battle to get cataloging records for MN DOC fiche. Suggested a new possibility which she will investigate.
- Diane worked with DNR's Char Feist to edit a problem record which we wanted to use. It was a MN DOC serial record which had been poorly done by a temporary cataloger. Char knew it was bad, but didn't have the expertise to fix it.
- Helen wrote a memo listing the various ways the library has dealt with backlogs of uncataloged material and gave it to Robbie, David and Randi. This is a problem we need to address again.

Reference Activities

- The reference librarians evaluated the collection of e-books for which MINITEX has contracted. Even though the collection did not seem to be especially relevant for our audience, Randi set up a login and password for us to access the books when needed.

- Robbie spoke with William Madigan with LEXIS about; he was looking for ideas for possible new law surveys they might publish. She suggested Indian law in Minnesota, and he seemed quite interested.
- Ruth worked on the new Codebook database and met with Carol to discuss her progress. She will be able to test the data entry part soon.

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- Carol gave an impromptu talk about the Library to about 25 people who visited the Library on July 13.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- Betsy planned the annual summer lunch for the CALCO librarians.
- David attended a LPTF (Library Planning task Force) meeting on July 12th. The announcement was made that OCLC would not be fulfilling the ILL part of the Gateway. It is not clear what will happen with that function in the future.
- Syble attended "Supporting, Troubleshooting, and Optimizing Windows NT", a two-day course on July 26 & 27.
- Randi attended a State Data Center session on our census product needs. (Data Center staff are working on what types of Minnesota statistical products would be most useful to produce once the decennial census data is available.
- Robbie spoke at a MinntroDocs meeting at the University about planning for changes to the state document system.

Aides News

- The Aides did their clipping in the staff lounge from 11-12 on July 10 – so they could watch Jesse Ventura's appearance on "The Young and the Restless" (and they gave him mediocre reviews).
- Andrew and Michael finished shifting many of the files in the Library. The vertical files and the personality files are now consolidated into fewer drawers, the minutes and association files have been moved, and the district files have been expanded. The district files now have more years in the reading room rather than in storage.

Tape Room Activities

- Ric from Senate Index asked to meet with Paul to discuss a "bill filming crisis". They probably won't be able to add the unofficial status information to this biennium's bills as they were able to do last time. Paul told him it was no big deal since that information is now archived on the computer.
- Don Crosby called to ask about the attachments to the House Minutes. He was concerned since the Chief Clerk's Office is supposed to get them to us according to House Rules. I told him that the Committee L.A.s should be submitting them with their minutes. I will let him know if that doesn't occur.
- Paul finished boxing up the 1989-1990 minutes & tapes.

Paul met with House Research & several House staff members to discuss information on the bill status screens. The House will attempt to add see & see also references to the bill tracking screens. They will only do so after session & mainly for the omnibus bills. It will not be comprehensive.

Monthly Report

June 2000

Library Administration

- Two of the Minnesota documents that Robbie nominated for the NCSL Notable Documents Award won! Congratulations to House Information for *Session Weekly* and to the Senate fiscal analysts for *The Minnesota Budget: A Fiscal Policy Analysis*.
- The managers completed the annual performance reviews; Lisa prepared the packets of information.
- Lisa and Robbie participated in the trials of the time and leave electronic system. Near the end of the month several staff attended a class on how to implement the system. Leif worked with Lisa and the LCC on technical details regarding the implementation of the new Time and Leave system.
- Lisa and Ruth went to see a demonstration of a cool, new digital copier we might lease to replace one of the production copiers. The digital copier has the capability to be attached to the network as a printer, so Ruth may be able to use it for production of *Minnesota Resources* and *Introductions*. The general copying quality is much higher also. Lisa is checking the prices, but it looks like we might be able to swing many new features for a very small increase.
- Robbie met with the LCC Directors Group for a bidder's conference for consultants who were interested in bidding on the LCC Compensation Study.
- Robbie and Lisa met with an LCC working group examining a new telephone system. Later in the month Lisa attended a McLeod telephone system demonstration with the LCC group looking at new phone systems, and was quite interested in all the features. Chad is following up on compatibility issues with the state system. We should ALL keep our fingers crossed that our old phones don't die while we are examining new phones.
- Lisa does a consistently great job of squeezing pennies and looking for deals for the library. She recently switched our postage meter account to one that earns us free postage on the balance we keep in the account. She reported, "We will earn 2% of our account balance per year, so if we continue to keep the \$5000 in our account, we will earn \$100 in free postage per year, what a deal!!"
- Leif and Lisa worked with workmen to rework Carol's, Jess', Syble's and Betsy's spaces.
- Lisa worked a lot on procedures, converting them to Word and then to HTML. She still has the Technical Services procedures left to conquer. She also worked on the directory structure for documents that will be on the intranet and other miscellaneous shared LRL documents.
- Lisa investigated the costs and features of pagers and ordered one for Leif.
- Robbie worked with Liz Wade to arrange a tour of the Legislative Reference Library as a part of a tour of State Capitol area libraries at the Minnesota Library Association Conference. (MLA is in St. Paul this year.)
- The process for hiring a new Library Director began.

Web Activities

- Syble created a web site for the LNET group to share information, ideas, and prototype pages. Leif added a standard footer which will be added to all LNET listserv messages, with the location of the web site and information on subscribing.
- Syble, jointly with Shao Lee from the Senate, conducted a website Usability Test with 10 testers, including 4 from within the Legislature and 6 "external" users of various ages and backgrounds. The overall results were positive. Problems found were somewhat minor and indicate that some reorganization of pages and additional helps would be very useful. A full report is being prepared and will be posted on the Internet. One tester, who is blind, specifically expressed appreciation for our consistent use of alt tags. Leif and Randi helped with LNET-sponsored Usability Study.
- Syble tested WebTrends Enterprise Suite that generated analysis reports for the LRL and Legislative-wide websites. We have submitted a proposal to the LCC, asking money for this software from the LCC Technology Fund, as it will benefit all the Legislative offices.
- Syble and Randi worked with the navigation and graphics subgroups of the legislative web site redesign committee. Betsy participated in the navigation subgroup. Robbie participated in the Graphics subgroup. We're close to having a design, which will then have to be developed into a template. Leif participated in many of the meetings as well.
- Randi, Leif, Elizabeth, Betsy, and Robbie attended the LNET meeting; Leif coordinated and ran the meeting.
- Betsy continued work on the Zononet; Randi helped plan and they implemented some of the techniques Randi learned at the project management seminar. Betsy met with many Library staff for content and design ideas.
- Updating the Veto page was more complex than ever. Robbie did the original research; Paul double-checked the information. Ruth generated a new page with links to veto details. Syble reformatted the veto details table for the web and a new directory under Leg; she updated the graphics links and placed the new veto pages there; and deleted the old pages and changed all links to correctly reference the new location.
- Helen finished metadata for main youth page, main Minnesota issues page and Minnesota issues: baseball stadium page. The metadata on the baseball stadium page will serve as a model for other Minnesota issues pages.
- Robbie worked (with Michele Timmons, the Revisor) at a Revisor's Office booth at the Minnesota Bar Association Conference in Duluth to promote the Legislative Web Site and try to elicit comments and suggestions for enhancements. In general, attorneys and judges are *very happy* about access to information on the site, although I was able to get a few good criticisms and teach a few nonusers about its availability.
- Leif worked with Syble on issues with adding metadata to PDF files.
- Leif spoke with LCC staff about putting the Benefits book online. They have produced a PDF and will be putting it on the LCC intranet.

Information Systems

- Lisa created a Word 2000 tutorial document and Ruth edited it.
- The managers discussed and revised the Technology Plan.
- Leif prepared for and dealt with a planned power outage.
- Finally after many months of effort on Leif's part, the Security Impact Analysis appears to be moving forward on a legislative wide basis.
- Leif worked with the LCC on setting up Mercury mail gateway software to facilitate the use of listservs amongst the Commissions.

Collections Activities

- David and Jess spent a good deal of time straightening out problems with the EBSCO bill. The record keeping in the past seemed somewhat arbitrary, so they had been trying to decode some problems in our system and also with EBSCO. Suffice it to say that the EBSCO billing department won't be trying to pull any fast ones over on LRL!
- David and Jess finally unraveled a problem that we have been having with Baker and Taylor, and hopefully *we won't* have to cancel all of our "real" standing orders with them.
- Jess discovered that we have been receiving two copies of the *Washington Information Directory*, one for reference, the other for the Acquisition Tech's workspace. Jess wrote, "Once I figured out that that was *me*, and that I NEVER use it, we decided to eliminate one of these \$120 books from our order list." She also managed to sweet-talk the publisher into taking back the extra copy.
- The group appointed to examine the MN-Docs process had its first meeting--- some good ideas came out of a discussion of what is truly a complex process, which makes imagining it being done differently initially difficult. (David, Diane, Rob, Ruth, Helen)
- Kelly processed 46 added volumes, withdrew 31 items from the collection, copied 215 Contents Page Articles, copied 2,773 Contents Pages, updated 162 LDR's, added LDR's to 51 periodical records, cancelled holdings on 29 Periodicals that we no longer have in our collection, claimed 39 Missing issues of Periodicals: 17 were EBSCO, 12 were free, 9 were Minnesota Periodicals and 1 was an Order Direct.
- Kelly shelfread the Circulating Collection from AS6 - HA201. (Kelly always does a great job with this, and *everyone* who looks for books on our shelves benefits from this task!)

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- Randi gave a tour to two new OLA staff- Alan Frasier & Leah Goldstein
- Richard Yarnall from the Library of Congress visited LRL, and met with Elizabeth, David, Randi, and Robbie. He wanted to tell us what kinds of things LC collected and what they did with them. Many of our documents are both bound for the LC collection and a copy is also sent to the Congressional Research Service. He also had a list of thing to beg.

- Leif attended Novell 5.1 training sponsored by the Senate.
- Leif and Randi attended a very useful two-day project management seminar, paid for by the Senate.
- Robbie gave an informal tutorial on creating tables at a regular Wednesday meeting of the librarians, and later for a couple of other staff.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- Randi discussed metadata in Minnesota government with META Group consultants at MHS.

- Elizabeth attended a VET2 meeting and spent time doing various searches on Ex Libris and Endeavor systems after doing them on PALS - to be prepared as a member of the OPAC committee (part of the selection process for a MNLINK vendor).

- Ruth created and sent out 434 May/June *Introductions*.
- Ruth finished converting AmiPro documents to Word 2000.
- Robbie wrote this month's "Page One" essay on Genetically Modified Food issues. Robbie finished and Betsy edited the Minnesota Issues pathfinder on the same topic.
- Elizabeth and Robbie went to former Rep. Fred Norton's office to see if there were materials we would like for the Library among his personal archives. (We found a few things.)

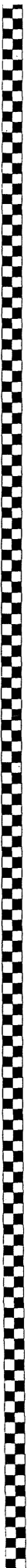

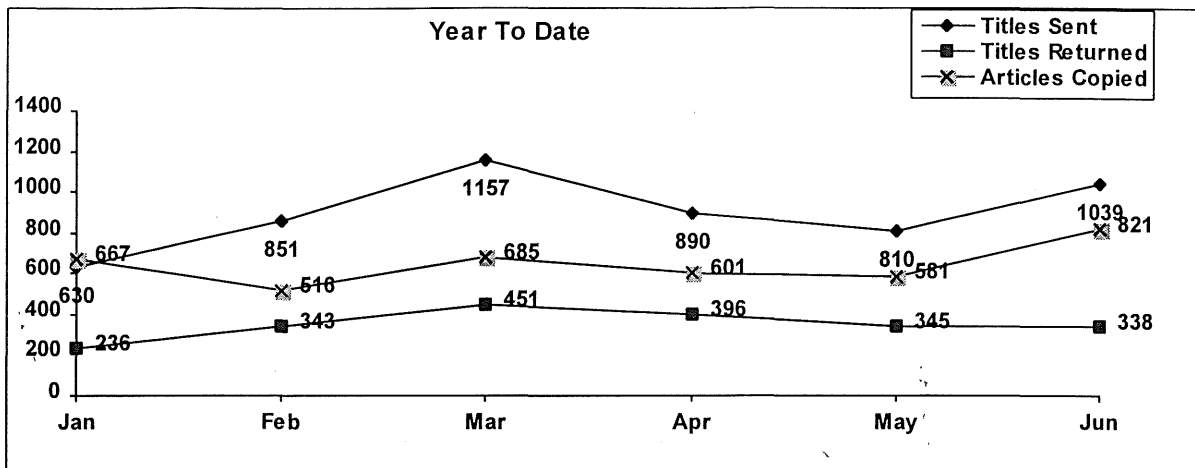

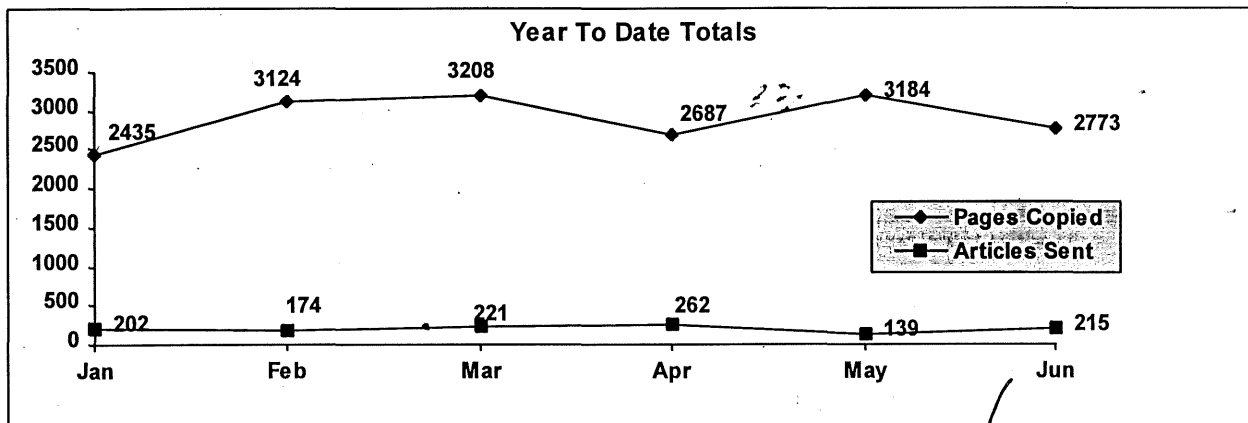

Monthly Report

May 2000

Library Administration

- The staff worked hard to plan their summer schedules to take advantage of the flexible hours option yet still cover the Library's vital activities. This meant Elizabeth and Paul worked especially hard to make sure the reference and circulation desks were fully covered. Lisa did a great job of posting everyone's schedules on the ZONA intranet.
- The managers discussed the performance evaluation forms and made some minor changes. Lisa put together packets of materials for staff, in anticipation of the reviews being done in June.
- Lisa and Robbie attended an LCC meeting to discuss the purchase of new telephones. Our phones at the front service desks are hanging on by a thread. Leif worked with Chad Thuet to try to fix them temporarily.
- Robbie attended an LCC Director's meeting to discuss the upcoming LCC Compensation Study. The directors heard about the experiences of the House and Senate when they undertook compensation studies.
- Leif, Elizabeth, and several aides moved lots of stuff in the basement to clear the way to the electrical panels. Interestingly, no one had mentioned the panel to us in the past ten years, so we had no idea we were blocking important access.
- Lisa created an outline of a new directory structure for documents that the intranet will be pointing at, and made a detailed outline to give to the managers to review.

Web Activities

- Ruth struggled with updating the Vetoes pages on the Internet site. Jesse Ventura's numerous vetoes and line-item vetoes did not neatly fit the mold of the database entries she had used in previous years.
- Randi, Leif, Elizabeth, and Robbie attended the LNET Legislative Web Site redesign kick-off meeting. Randi chaired the effort, and created two subgroups to start work. Randi, Leif, and Elizabeth will participate in a subgroup to examine navigation issues; Syble and Robbie will participate in a group looking at graphics.
- Randi worked with staff in the Revisor's Office on their new online index to the Statutes.
- Randi and Syble attended several North Star meetings. They have chosen the words for the buttons on the main page, going with the action verb theme. Thus "Visiting", "Working", "Governing", etc.
- Randi, Syble, and Shao (from the Senate SIS office) began work on a usability study of the Legislative Web site.
- Betsy and a small group started work on the organization of the Zonanet.
- Many staff members worked hard on Links updating including the new project of adding metadata.

- At one of the regular reference staff meetings the public services staff met with Syble to talk about enhanced web statistics.
- Leif provided information on Web statistics to David Maeda, a House Information writer who wrote a piece for the *Session Weekly*, "One Million Hits."

Information Systems

- Ruth created a "fill-in-the-blank" FAX form for staff to use, modeled on a fax form Elizabeth received from another state. It's a wonderful option, and easily found on the ZONA intranet. Ruth also converted the annual performance review documents to WORD.
- All the staff embraced "Electronic Spring Cleaning Day" with enthusiasm and guided by Lisa's able instructions got rid of scads of documents – and even whole directories – that were no longer needed. It was an important first step in organizing the information on the Library's shared directories.
- Another supplier record was deleted in the Acquisitions system so Ruth had to fix the affected records. This is a very thorny and tedious problem to solve, so to prevent it happening again she removed the selection bar on supplier record data entry screen to prevent deletion of future records.
- Ruth installed Total Access Analyzer 2000 for Access 2000.
- Ruth converted business cards from AmiPro to Pagemaker 6.5 (tried Word 2000, too hard to do)
- Sort of going backwards.....One of the public service computers had a breakdown and was no longer able to run Windows98 without crashing all of the time. Lisa tried several configurations, but had to finally settle on reinstalling Windows95 Now it works and is up and running again!
- (Why we all wish we had someone like Lisa at home...) Lisa fixed Helen's computer. Windows was corrupted and she copied over her system files from backup and got her back in business again. The reference desk computer would not load many programs in Windows, so Lisa restored Windows and it worked fine after that. Lisa reinstalled Word on the tape room computer - it was corrupted.
- Leif dealt with two power outages – one planned, one unexpected.
- Leif worked on reconfiguring the NT server. This was not successful, and he will need to do a complete reinstall.
- Leif worked with Lisa on linking problems between Netscape and Word. This issue was not resolved and the decision was made to do procedures in HTML instead Word documents.
- Leif kept abreast of the many electronic virus and security threats that turned up in May.
- Leif worked with the Revisor's office on email addressbook issues.

Collections Activities

- Jess was very busy with acquisitions work. She worked extensively on some sticky billing for materials we ordered from Unicef and the United Nations. They had no record of our orders, though we had cut checks that were never cashed.

She eliminated most of the backlog of orders dating back to when Marilyn was still here, and started re-contacting suppliers from whom we had ordered materials that we had never received. And she also discovered that if you ask the Minnesota Bookstore to mail something interoffice, they will charge us \$3 for shipping and handling!!!

- Jess finished the backlog of MULS updating MULS. Kelly will be doing the ongoing MULS reporting from now on.
- Our EBSCO Online service began this month. In May we had access to a 30 day trial of the entire database. Starting in June we will have access only to our free subscriptions.
- Helen finished adding metadata to her Links pages and wrote a memo explaining metadata editing for the Links pages so that others could do the same. She distributed the memo to staff and fielded a few questions.
- Kelly processed 53 added volumes, withdrew 4 items from our collection, copied 139 Contents Page articles, and copied 3,184 Contents Pages. She claimed 35 Missing issues of Periodicals: 12 were EBSCO, 10 were free and 13 were Minnesota Periodicals.
- It's always great to get the shelves in order. Kelly's shelfreading this month included the Speech Collection and the Reference Collection from AE5 -HG1628.
- Kelly changed 24 Minnesota Periodical records from a 4 to a 5 using MULS (which means we no longer have these periodicals in our collection and added a note to the LDR that says Holdings have been transferred to MHS Archives)
- Kelly added a note to 55 Minnesota Periodical Records using MULS that says "Holdings have been transferred to MHS Archives."
- Kelly finished weeding the Minnesota Periodicals. (The older Minnesota Periodicals are sent to the State Archives for permanent retention.)

Training, Tours, and Visitors

- A representative from EBSCO demonstrated the EBSCO Online system for Betsy, Robbie, and David. This system will give us access to the electronic text of many of the journals we purchase, in addition to the print.
- Betsy attended Dreamweaver training.
- Ruth and Lisa attended advanced WORD training. It was an especially fruitful day for Ruth, since she had been frustrated with WORD. All the problems she had encountered meant she was ready with lots of questions!
- Robbie gave a short tutorial on creating tables in WORD for interested staff.

Professional Activities/Meetings

- The librarians participated in an informational/brainstorming session with staff from the State Archives, examining metadata by discussing it conceptually and then looking at a couple of implementations of metadata use. The meeting was held to give our staff information and begin the process of examining possible technical projects and the revamping of the State Depository System. A follow-up meeting with Bob Horton, Randi, Elizabeth, Diane, and Robbie was held a

week later. The next step will be to plan a brainstorming and informational meeting with House Research staff.

- Betsy attended the May CALCO meeting.
- Robbie attended the MINITEX Open House and toured the new MNLAC – the archival storage center.
- Robbie participated in a committee to choose the winners of the NCSL Notable Librarian and Notable Library awards.
- Robbie attended the monthly Information Policy Council meeting, where a security specialist talked about (scared us to death about) computer security. A result was that we delayed no longer in getting a pager for Leif.
- David attended a Minitex workshop on ILL communication protocol and copyright in the digital age.
- Leif attended a PALS user council meeting. (He is the delegate from the Systems Group to the User Council.)
- Randi attended an SLA annual business meeting. She was elected president-elect/president of the organization. This coming year as president-elect she will be the program co-chair.

Publications/Projects

- The list of summer projects was distributed.
- One summer project, the editing of LINKS TO THE WORLD pages, is nearly complete.
- Ruth created 476 May *Minnesota Resources*.
- David and Elizabeth met to talk about the state agency appointment notebooks and how they should be updated and maintained.

PROFILE OF LEARNING

Ambitious standards had trouble from start

■ Early miscues led to confusion, anger among educators

In 1993, state lawmakers ordered education officials to build a state-wide testing system to propel Minnesota into the future. Minnesota had required students to earn 20 credits to graduate from a public high school, but there was no uniform way to judge what Minnesota students were learning.

Teaching methods and expectations for students varied dramatically. Any sophomore could point out the hard teachers and the pushovers. Lawmakers wanted some way to smooth it out and to raise the bar.

Basic skills tests in reading, math and writing would ensure students graduated with at survival-grade skills. Picking higher standards was harder. The answer? Performance standards.

For instance, instead of granting a credit for U.S. history, Minnesota wanted to show they understood the principles of the Constitution. Local districts would decide how kids met the standard, but the state wanted schools to grade uniformly, on a scale of 1 to 4, using detailed plans known as "performance packages."

The packages contained tasks for students. If it was impossible to compare an A in American History from one district to another, Profile supporters believed they

- Leif got Harbor/LAN backup software installed and working on the new NT server. (Note: This was a great achievement since we have been planning to get our network backups via Intertech started for many months.)
- Lisa continued her struggles with the public pcs. Public 2 had a hard drive failure. Lisa thought she had fixed the problem but it continued to happen. She tried a new hard drive and the problem continued which narrowed it down to the motherboard. After staff consultation, it was decided to go with three Publics instead of 4 for now until we have money to buy more computers and we can shift an older one out front. (Note: Frustratingly enough, Public 3 began acting up too. Lisa is still in the process of diagnosing and correcting this problem.)
- Lisa created a log that she updates daily on how much data we are backing up to Intertech with Harbor Backup.
- Leif spent many hours setting up the necessary network protocols and software needed for testing the new LCC HRVantage and TimeCard systems. He finally managed to get Office97 to run under WIN98 while Office2000 is installed. The HRVantage program needed to run the time and leave software from the LCC requires an earlier version of Access than the one we run.

Collections Group

- Kelly processed 44 added volumes, withdrew 6 items from our collection, copied 262 Contents Page articles, and copied 2,687 Contents Pages. She claimed 54 missing issues of periodicals: 14 were EBSCO, 17 were free, 21 were Minnesota periodicals and 2 were order direct.
- Jess and David began to update our MULS records. As soon as they have the procedures figured out Kelly will learn the procedures and begin entering MULS records also.
- Reference librarians discussed the EBSCO list—it hardly took any time and there were few disagreements, causing us to ponder the times when it did. David sent in the EBSCO annual renewal list after the review. We saved \$430 in subscriptions that were not renewed.
- Jess and Kelly attended a MULS training class. The class itself was far too advanced for their purposes and it proved a very frustrating afternoon. David and Jess then slogged through trying to learn how to update MULS with the least amount of hassle and with minimal information. Jess has been working on getting us caught up on the backlog so that they can eventually hand the task over to Kelly.
- Jess reported that the main thing of note is that after sending out mandate letters this month she received back a flurry of somewhat hostile responses from agencies, and had to do a good deal of explaining of our policies to people wondering why they kept getting these letters.

- Jess met with John Rajkowski from the Department of Trade and Economic Development to discuss mandated reports and to attempt to calibrate our two lists of materials.
- And along the vein of friendly vendor relations, Jess reported that "I think I have finally broken Cynthia Colucci's bad mood, and convinced her that she likes me (our Baker and Taylor agent---kind of a sourpuss)."
- Diane conducted an OCLC tutorial for Jess and Kelly.
- Diane followed up with Rob on broken fixing broken URLs in PALS. Rob has the process down and it is being done.

Reference Activities

- Paul finished boxing up the House 1989-1990 minutes. Kelly finished weeding the Periodicals that go to MINITEX.
- Chasing down overdue books is an onerous, ongoing task, and Christy does a great job tracking them down. Christy and Robbie had a small victory last month, with a book we had written off as hopeless. The person would never return Christy's calls, but when Robbie called - with a new name he did not recognize - he actually took the call (and returned the book).
- Reference meetings continue each Thursday with debates about whether ex-legislators have borrowing privileges, whether we should hold once a month paper coding events, reminders to count casual users (like John Helland) in the statistics, and other topics.

- Randi and Elizabeth taught a "How to Find the Good Stuff on the Web" class to Senate Staff; Robbie taught a class on "Mastering the Legislative Web Site," and Carol, Randi and Elizabeth taught a class on "Indexes on the Web."
- Robbie began planning with other CALCO libraries to include LRL in a tour of local libraries during the MLA Annual Conference in St. Paul next September.
- Syble attended the Web Design Conference in Minneapolis on Apr 27-28.

- David and Robbie attended the PALS Annual meeting on the 7th.
- Diane taught a MOTSE course on LC classification with Dennis Skrade on the 25th.
- Betsy attended the annual State Data Center Conference and gained lots of knowledge about the Census.
- Syble and Randi attended several Northstar planning meetings at the Technology Planning Bureau.
- Randi, Syble, and Leif attended an LNET meeting (at which the Kids site developed by Library staff received quite favorable initial response).

March 2000

Library Administration

- Lisa worked with Sandy to encourage the LCC to develop a car pooling policy for the LCC.
- Lisa prepared a budget forecast for Robbie to try to predict the status of various budget categories at the end of this fiscal year.
- Lisa and several affected staff met with the space designer to consult on the minor changes needed since the large rework of space.
- Lisa prepared questions to ask when deciding whether a document should be created, converted or maintained in HTML or Word format.
- Lisa met with Chad Thuet and others regarding the new time and leave module. She is going to be on the group that will be testing the new system.

Web Activities

- Syble created some informative pages for the Legislative web site for users who encounter an error – they actually explain the problem and suggest what to do next!
- Web Group members met three times, and considerable progress was made on the kids site pages.
- Helen continued entering Dublin Core metadata. She learned more about TagGen, and discovered how to edit records and load defaults. She checked the relevancy ratings on completed pages. The ratings went up for four pages and down for one page. She rewrote the annotation for the page that went down. Checking the rating for that page again, the rating is now the same as it was before the metadata was done. So, the relevancy ratings went up on four pages and stayed the same for one page. She is now starting to enter Dublin Core metadata for her links pages.
- As the newest member of the Web Group, Rob received much training from all staff, and especially Randi and Paul. Randi reports, "He's doing great!"
- Syble worked on the Youth Page graphics.
- Betsy and Randi worked on organizing Zononet content, files, and formats.
- Syble and Elizabeth worked to provide new photos with names on the intranet for all public services staff.
- Randi spoke with key people in the legislature about sending department representatives to metadata training with Eileen Quam.

Information Systems

- Ruth created 479 February and 478 March Minnesota Resources and 440 Jan/Feb Introductions.

Ruth created a new House email export file. She also reformatted the phone numbers in the Pegasus directory. She took off the area code so the whole phone number shows in list. Charlie from the Senate requested this. (Once again, we are responsive!)

- Ruth worked on improvements to the stats system. This time she limited the range of time to 10 years. (Some of the charts were getting too crowded.)

- Ruth updated the Public Services picture sheet and printed it out, and updated the Poverty Guidelines 'cheat sheet' and printed it out.

- Ruth converted Lisa's dBase Hourly Staff database to Access 2000. Lisa was having problems with the year 2000 showing as 1900. Lisa tested the new database and it worked great. The new database is an improvement over the outdated dBase system. Lisa easily entered the data for March in the new system.

- Ruth installed Total Access Detective 2000 on her computer.

- Leif and Syble installed NT Server software on the new PC.

- The managers discussed and updated the Library's Technology Plan, a document which is reviewed each quarter. Robbie updated the format with tables and additional narrative.

- Leif, Lisa, and Neil Esposito from Harbor, installed the Harbor Backup Client on all of our servers. This was an entire day process. Leif reported having peace of mind now that we have backup again! Lisa will be the backup administrator from now on. She has been monitoring backups and has been making sure all important information is being backed up. She will also be monitoring the costs for the back ups.

- Lisa installed a new sound card and speaker in the tape room computer. They have sound again. Other 'fix-ups' this month included having the Accent lettering machine repaired and bringing in the postage meter for its annual meter check.

- Leif changed the network hub configuration (using donated hub from Revisor's office) to allow all workstations to connect to our 100Mb ethernet backbone.

- Leif attended a House Technology subcommittee to help Mike Speiker get some formal technology policy approved for the House.

- Leif worked with Mike Paton to show him how to set up search pages for the web sites on the Commission's web server.

- Leif worked with Syble on setting up security on the new web server.

- Leif set up Cataloger's Desktop and Classification Plus software and data on the network for Helen and Diane to use and evaluate.

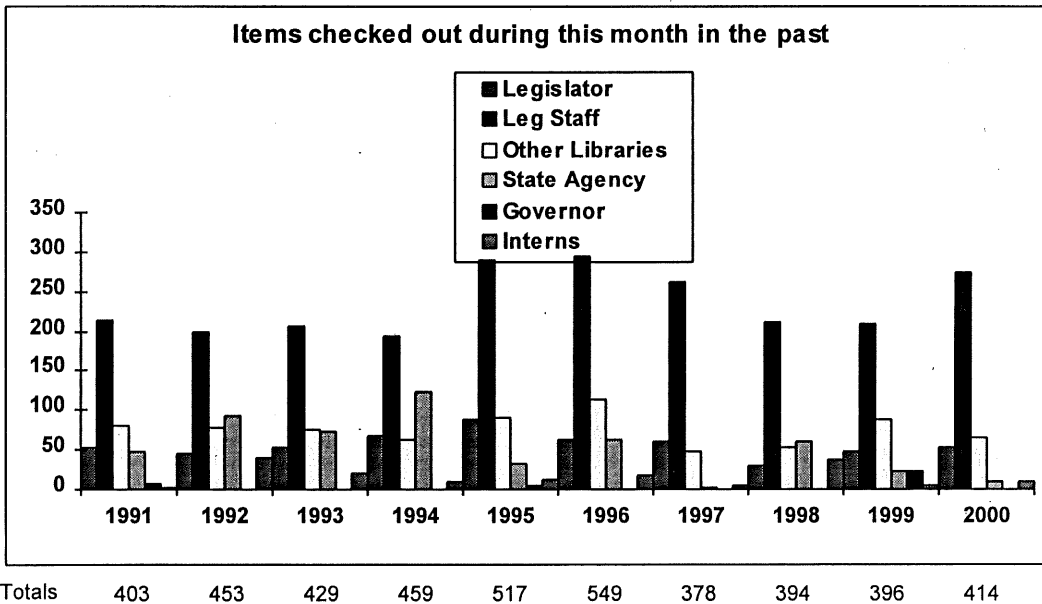
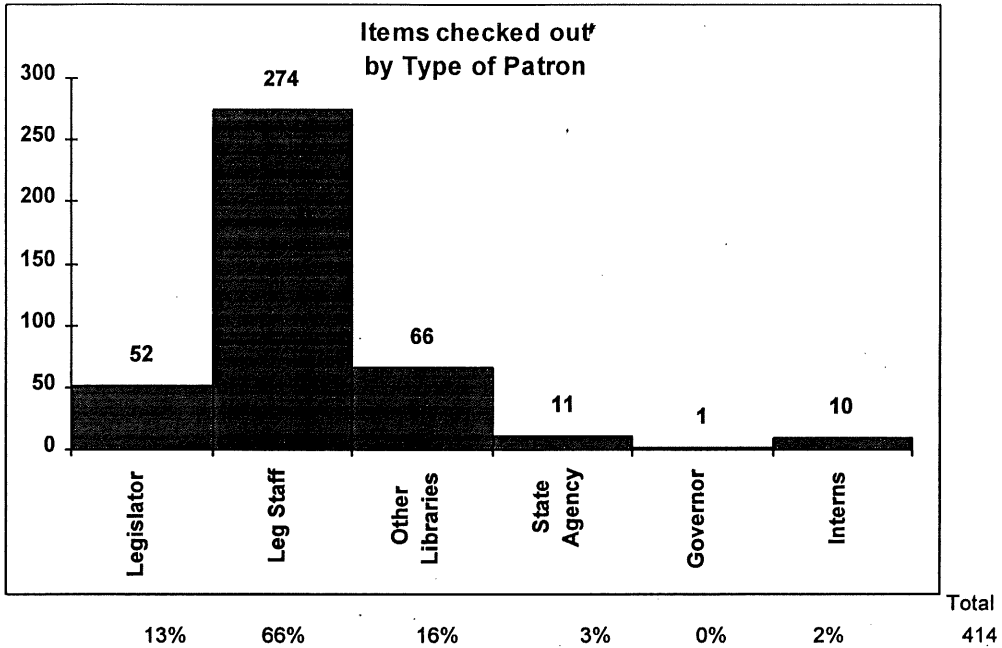

LRL in the Press

(PP, 2/25/00) Also in the *Pioneer Press* on February 25, "Legislative Reference Library staff found several instances in which a controversial appointee had bowed out, but none in which the Senate had voted down a nomination."
- In the first e-mail messages sent out to people who subscribed to the "Virtual Hearing Room" discussion on the unicameral legislature, the moderator suggested our Hot Topics guide to the issue. "Below is an excellent overview of policy resources on the Unicameral debate compiled by the Legislative Reference Library."
- Pioneer Press, 2/23/00, in "Ventura won't give State of State address." "Since at least 1980, it has been common for governors to deliver an address each year, according to librarians in the state Legislative Reference Library. There was on apparent exception – the library had no record that former Gov. Rudy Perpich gave an address in 1986."
- In the Feb. 11 issue of SESSION WEEKLY, their "What's on the Web" featured Links to the World. It began, "The Legislative Reference Library maintains an exceptionally thorough and useful links page that provides easy access to a massive amount of information on issues related to politics and government."

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January Reference Report

Our good work doesn't go unnoticed.

The staff worked incredibly hard on the tons of questions which came in. Happily, many of our equally busy and stressed patrons thank us and appreciate our work. Sen. Pat Pariseau and Ed Cook expressed thanks to the entire staff through Jon. Several people jotted a note of thanks on the bottoms of their Inside Issues topic change sheets. Eunice Johnson from the University's Government Publications Library told me she tells many people about our Links to the World pages. Likewise, Mike Bull from House Research said that more and more House Research people are using the Links page as their home page.

- ☆ The reference librarians went through scads of gifts - the inevitable result of office cleaning after an election. The reference staff found homes for several sets of 1994 Statutes.
- ☆ Work started on a series of pathfinders.

Library Administration

- Most of Lisa's month was taken up with the planning of the move - getting carts, planning when work would take place, how things would be accomplished, working with ADK to make sure everything was installed correctly. She worked on tracking down problems, getting list of things that still need to be completed, ordered missing product, etc.

- Marilyn and Lisa and Leif spent Veteran's Day and the evening prior to the holiday moving furniture, unplugging computers, packing and moving boxes, answering questions and resolving problems. Lisa and Marilyn coordinated various lists of missing items, tasks remaining to be accomplished, etc. Leif disassembled all the workstations and stored them, removed all the network and phone cables, installed all the network and phone cables again, and reassembled all the workstations, some of them 2 or 3 times. Information Systems

- Ruth created 481
October/November *Minnesota Resources*.

- Lisa set up new machines with Windows 98 for Kelly, Misha, and herself. She figured out how to get Ruth's scanner to work with Windows98. It took many attempts with many different drivers and some tricks to make it work.

- Ruth created new R&R text files for the paper version of the *Magazine Guide* and the subject list for Contents Pages.

- In preparation for the new millennium, Ruth printed out labels for the new 2000 newspaper clipping files and district files.

- Ruth's troubleshooting helps keeps library operation keep running smoothly. She fixed the print preview window size in the Acquisitions reports so that you can see and use the scroll bars, fixed some statistics reports, and straightened out some data entry forms.

- Syble spent a great deal of time developing and refining the new Intranet page. We tried out several rollover effects, color schemes, and designs. She talked with NewsLibrary several times about the customized user interface for our patrons. They

consented to hosting a customized "Minnesota only page" and have been working on the search programming for it.

- Leif worked with Syble on how to process, record statistics, and archive all the web server log files.

- Syble took over performing link checks and set up a regular schedule to do that. Several reports have been sent for Links to the World, the rest of the www.leg.state.mn.us, and the patron interface.

- Syble began evaluating several WYSIG web authoring software packages, including Dreamweaver, HotMetal Pro, and Homesite. She installed HotMetal Pro on Betsy's computer for her to try as well.

- Leif worked with Mike Speiker on testing and debugging their new listserv software. He gave Mike feedback on how to convert and configure the old House schedules listserv to the new software.

- Leif helped the House with several Mercury mail gateway questions.

Collections Group

- Misha attended OCLC training and has began copy catalog training with Diane.

- Diane gave a cataloging overview to Betsy.

- Marilyn worked on Acquisitions. In particular she went through the pending standing orders and determined which items had new editions, which had new editions and could either be downloaded or ordered via the Internet (a suprisingly large number) and which ACQ records needed to be edited because there were no new editions. 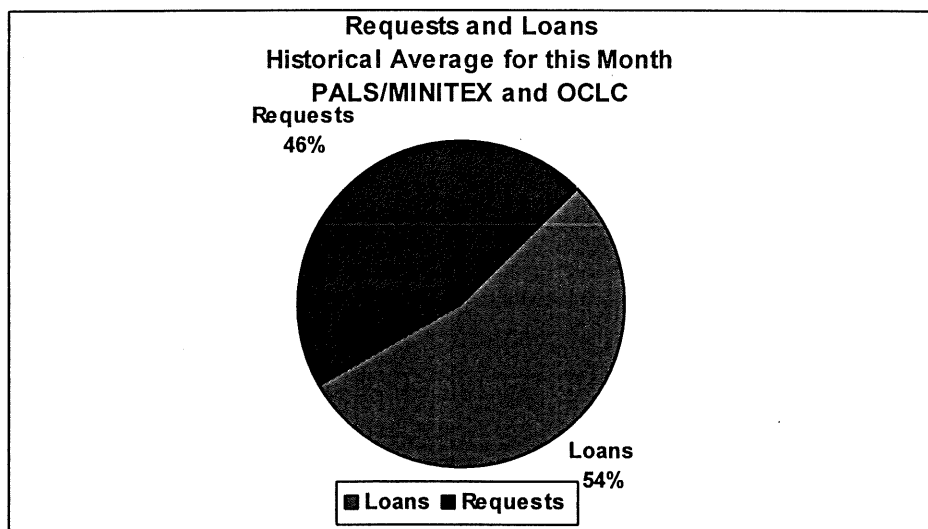
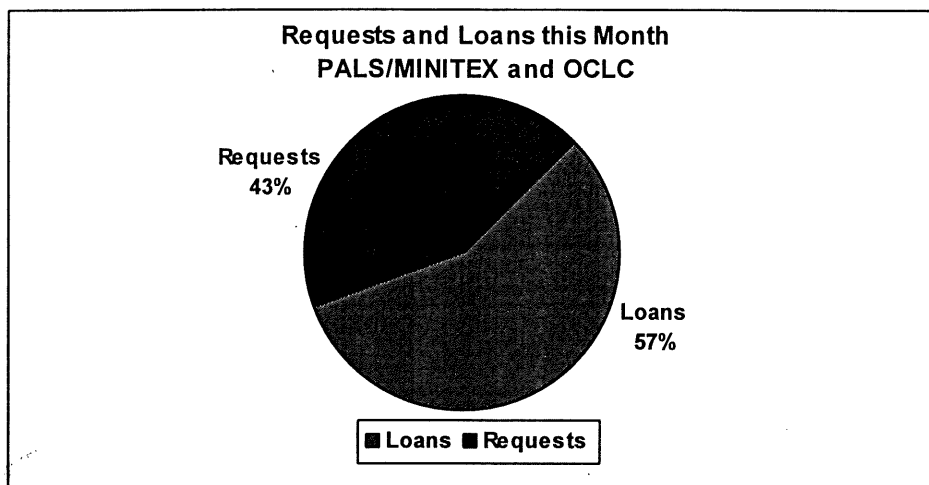

Monthly Report October , 1999

Library Administration

- Robbie attended an LCC Benefits Book meeting, and Elizabeth attended the next in Robbie's absence.

Web Activities

- Robbie created a page with links to various governmental units to replace the Northstar link. (We didn't think a lot of people knew what Northstar means.) The new "Other Government" page is designed to link users to other Minnesota government offices more quickly than layering through the Northstar site.

- Jess's report was an interesting list of all the back-up she did for other staff this past month -- back-up scanning

for Elizabeth and Carol, checking in periodicals for Kelly, coded papers for Carol, and put in many Tape Room and circ desk hours while the new staff were being trained in. She's *particularly* happy we are back to full staffing.

- Syble had much training by many staff. By the end of the month she was digging right in to the tasks at hand -- link checking for one, and developing the Intranet for our legislative users.

- Ruth spent time trying to figure out how some Inside Issues cites were deleted. Staff were frantic! She created a batch file to backup the data midday, and eventually discovered the records were accidentally moved to another table.

- Software and hardware changes continued. Leif installed, learned, configured, added Office 2000 and latest version of Netscape, and then created a standardized LRL copy of WIN98. He worked on the new servers to achieve standard configurations and stability, stress-tested the new servers, found some problems, added software patches to correct the problems. He added Netscape web server software to new secondary server, stress-tested again, more problems, fixed the problems.

It varies widely but Wisconsin just renegotiated their tribal-state compacts and the big change was changing the legal age for casino gambling to 21 from 18. - How many licensed and unlicensed child care providers are there in Minnesota. You can get a current number of licensed child care providers from DHS. It is around 15,000. Obviously, no one knows exactly how many unlicensed child care providers there are but CFL keeps track of registered legal unlicensed child care providers--a subset of unlicensed child care providers. A child care provider can be unlicensed and legal but need to register so that their clients can be part of government programs like WIC. (el)
- I had a question on whether a particular company had received a state grant. Although I wasn't able to rule out a state grant altogether I discovered that DTED is finishing up a database of all the grants their department has granted over the last few years. (el)
- A question on all day kindergarten. The perfect information is in a book that LRL has ordered but is also available in full text on the web entitled, Key State Education Policies on K-12 Education, by the Council of Chief State School Officers. (el)

It was in a column called Dodge's E-conomy that is only on the web version and is not indexed by their own internal search engine. I don't know what the lesson to be learned is--but I am going to send a letter to WSJ to tell them we pay to get access to their paper both in print and through Dow Jones and it made me mad that I was still unable to get what I needed.

Sec. 3. [14.116] [NOTICE TO LEGISLATURE.]

When an agency mails notice of intent to adopt rules under section 14.14 or 14.22, the agency must make reasonable efforts to send a copy of the same notice and a copy of the statement of need and reasonableness to the following:

(1) all people who are still legislators and who were main authors, or supporting authors, of the law granting the agency the statutory authority the agency relies upon as authority to adopt the proposed rule; and

(2) the chairs of the legislative policy and budget committees with jurisdiction over the subject matter of the proposed rules.

Although this probably won't come up a lot--it is time consuming when it does. I can certainly see the value in alerting the committee members but it seems really dumb to alert legislators who happened to be the authors of giant omnibus bills that amended the law in the slightest way. (As was the case in this case.)

(DS) (In 1995, the MN Legislature voted to suspend primaries until after the year 1999. Gov. Carlson considered a veto but it was attached to a larger bill he signed. There was a primary in 1991 but the delegates ignored the results. Prior to that there have been no MN presidential primaries since the 50s.)
- ◆ Names of dog tracks in Des Moines and Council Bluff, IA and Winnipeg. (DS)
- ◆ What year was the MN statute repealed that limited the actual number of hours females could work in a week? (DS. Answer: 1974, but Federal anti-disc law in 1969 had superceded State law.)
- ◆ MN sentencing guidelines for 1980 and 1995. (DS)
- ◆ Information on the Dome Club and Rotunda Club. Used for a Star Tribune obit. for Francis Munger. Carol located the info in the vertical file under Clubs. (DS)
- ◆ Newspaper articles on other states laws on "revolving door lobbying" (time limits on public officials lobbying after leaving office). (DS)
- ◆ Is there a monument in MN of Joe Rolette? (DS. There is a life size portrait in the Capitol.)
- ◆ Request for the speech in which Pres. Bush referred to the "Thousand Points of Light" and the "New World Order". These turned out to be separate speeches and were found on the Pres. Bush Pres. Library website. I called the archivist there and he was of great help even though the library's dedication was in two days. (DS)
- ◆ Which legislators signed the anti-tax pledge for the MN Family Council? Of those legislators, which voted in favor of the stadium issue? (bonus points if you can guess who asked this) (HH)
- ◆ Several questions on ATM fees which made me happy I had pulled together materials to put in a binder in the VF. (B4, EL) If it works out I'll write the December *Introductions* essay on this topic.
- ◆ I needed to find out whether the Historical Society had received a recent edition of the Thief River Falls paper and they actually retrieved it and had it put aside for me! I was stunned. (EL)
- ◆ I was working on putting together materials on the widening income gap for a legislator and in the process found mention of a conference on the topic he might be interested in--but realized he was on the panel and was preparing for that conference. (EL)
- ◆ Information about the state treasurer in Texas who won by stating she would abolish the position. She won and was successful in getting it on the ballot as a constitutional amendment which passed. There are plans in Minnesota to abolish the position here, too. (EL)
- ◆ I welcomed the reprieve from stadium questions and I got lots of education related questions and a couple of airport questions. (EL)
- ◆ A list of the heavy metals (Try searching this on the Internet: Metallica, AC/DC, etc. Not much chemistry. RM)
- ◆ A list of tax practitioners in District 22B. (Thanks to the Internet. RM)

Monthly Reference Report June, 1997

Training and Meetings:

- The reference librarians had one of their traditional, but very occasional, breakfast meetings - the last time Andrea will be around to join us.
- Carol, Paul, Elizabeth, and Robbie met with the Public PC committee to discuss how the transition went (Swimmingly!) We made some minor style changes and added an encyclopedia page.

Other Activities.....

- Finally - the education finance bill was passed during a one-day special session. Predictably, we received frantic calls that morning. While on the desk from 8-10 that morning, Robbie received two panic-level questions (neither of which was difficult to answer). Can you guess who asked them?

It was two of our regular users; see answer at end of the report.

Interesting/Notable Questions:

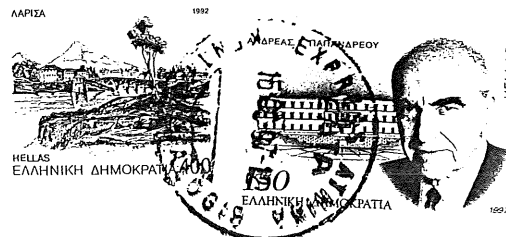
