Subject: 2024-25 Biennial Budget Update - Federal Fund Changes

This memo is to advise you and your colleagues of revisions to the Governor's biennial budget for federal funds. Since the Governor's original submission on January 24, 2023, several agencies have changes to their anticipated federal grants. The attached list of revised federal funds is being submitted for review under Minnesota Statute 3.3005, Subdivision 2 and 2a. The revised agency federal funds list is in order of agency and federal grant with amounts shown by fiscal year. This document is also published to the FY 2024-25 Governor's Budget Recommendations webpage.

The federal fund changes will be approved for spending in 20 days unless an LAC member requests further review or provides a negative recommendation for a specific grant in writing by Tuesday, April 4, 2023.
