RE: Disaster Assistance Contingency Account Transfers and Payments

The purpose of this memo is to provide information about the current balance of the disaster assistance contingency account, transfers to the disaster assistance contingency account from unused disaster appropriations and payments made from the disaster assistance contingency account in calendar year 2023, in accordance with the requirements under M.S. 16A.28 subd. 9 and M.S. 12.221 subd. 6.

Current Disaster Assistance Contingency Account Balance

As of January 1, 2024, the unencumbered available balance in the disaster assistance contingency account was \$30,288,834.

Transfers to the Disaster Assistance Contingency Account

The Disaster Assistance Contingency Account was last replenished in calendar year 2023 when \$40,000,000 was transferred from the general fund to the disaster assistance contingency account as directed by 2023 Session, Chapter 26, Section 1.

During calendar year 2023, 20 transfers from 20 disaster appropriations totaling \$1,223,978 were made to the disaster assistance contingency account in accordance with M.S. 16A.28 subd. 9 and M.S. 12.221 subd. 6. Individual amounts that comprise these totals can be provided by written request.

Calendar Year 2023 Expenditures

The table below details spending from the disaster assistance contingency account in calendar year 2023 in accordance with the requirement under M.S. 12.221 subd.6(d). A total of \$18,717,719 has been allocated in 2023 for federal and state declared disasters. Of that amount and previous years' transfers, \$17,223,661 was expended in 2023.

The reason for the difference between the amounts transferred for specific disasters and the actual spending is cycle time. The typical fiscal life cycle for a state disaster, from declaration to closeout, is 18 months, and 72 months for a federal disaster. Once the Department of Public Safety's Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) determines the amount to be spent on each event, they establish a specific disaster sub-appropriation and transfer the necessary amount from the disaster assistance contingency account. The amount transferred from the disaster account for each declared disaster is based on formal, on-the-ground, documented damage assessments and is not a general estimate. The figures are generally more accurate for state disasters, which are much easier to budget for because of their more limited scope and minimal changes to the project worksheets. The practice of establishing a separate appropriation for each disaster and setting aside the amount needed to pay the state's obligation gives a clearer picture of the progress towards closing out each disaster and knowing how much funding is available for future events.

The table below shows the disasters that received funds from the disaster assistance contingency account in calendar year 2023. Incidents named with an "SD" are state declared disasters and incidents named with a "DR" are federally declared disasters. Preliminary damage assessments include both state and non-state responsibilities.
