



# INTRODUCTION TO THE REGION NINE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The Region Nine Development Commission, authorized by the Regional Development Act of 1969, was organized by local officials in 1972 "to facilitate intergovernmental cooperation and to insure the orderly and harmonious coordination of state, federal and local comprehensive planning and development programs for the solution of economic, social, physical and governmental problems of the state and its citizens."

(Minnesota Statutes, Section 462.383; Subdivision 2)

Forty-two leaders from across the region serve on the RNDC. This includes 34 elected officials representing nine counties, 72 cities, 147 townships, school districts and the Minnesota Valley Council of Governments. The eight representatives of special interest groups include: agriculture; commerce; crime prevention; environmental quality; health and human welfare; minority populations; tourism and recreation; and transportation.

The Region Nine area is comprised of nine south central Minnesota counties: Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca and Watonwan. Their combined population is 222,790 of the state's 4,919,479 people according to the 2000 Census. Fairmont, North Mankato, New Ulm and Mankato are the four largest cities with populations respectively from 10,889 to 32,427.

It is a pleasure and a great opportunity to be at Region Nine. Each year brings an end to achieved heights and the beginning of new challenges. The year 2001 marks the year that the United States is challenged by the overwhelming fear and sorrow created in the aftermath of September 11, 2001 "Attack on America."

In the midst of this national scare, Americans are equally engaged in the daily struggles of farmers getting their products to market and new immigrants finding homes in a seemingly foreign American neighborhood. All subregions of the United States share in this whirlwind of devastation including the Midwest, the state of Minnesota and Region Nine (the south central region of Minnesota). Nevertheless, in the spirit of achievement set forth by the "Great Generation", survivors of WWII and the Great Depression, leaders from both maturing Baby-Boomers and growing Generation-Xers find opportunities for success and hope.

Region Nine Development Commission, in its 29th year of service, plays a significant role in the success and hope of citizens in south central Minnesota. Its mission is to promote the development of the region through intergovernmental cooperation, community and human development, long-range planning and technical assistance. In pursuit of this mission, Region Nine policy makers and staff have made a difference in the lives of citizens scattered over 9 counties, 72 cities, and 147 townships in the fields of economic, social and physical land development and governance.

Joseph Schumpeter, renown economist, coined the term entrepreneur as, "One who introduces economic innovation – such as introducing new commodities or qualitatively better versions of existing ones; finding new markets, new methods of production and distribution and the like. Also, the one who focuses <sup>\*</sup> on getting things done." This definition describes a set of characteristics that parallel the efforts of Region Nine.

For example, this past year Region Nine made a difference by:

- Working across jurisdictional lines "a Gaylord couple was awarded a loan from the Revolving Loan Fund to start a convenience store in New Auburn. That store is now up and running, which prevents citizens from needing to drive 10 miles to the next nearest store."
- Working with municipalities and townships "the city of Springfield was assisted with its housing and will soon have an additional 24 rental housing units to help with business retention" and "the city of Kiester has made needed improvements to their water system."

- Collaborating across sectors "A caregiver undergoing radiation treatment in one county, while living in another county, was assisted through the coordination of a volunteer organization to go to the hospital and stay with the care-receiver while the caregiver (spouse of care-receiver) went to radiation treatment. This was a much safer option than the one considered, which was to leave the care-receiver in the car, while the caregiver receives treatment."
- Facilitating leadership cooperation –
   "Throughout the year, 42 elected and appointed officials regularly come together to share ideas and develop policy for Region Nine."

While Region Nine provides a variety of services and planning in areas of community development, transportation, small business development, prevention and health, aging, economic development, research and data analysis and new emerging regional projects, it is the above-mentioned differences that matter in the end.

Over the next few years the region will be more acutely challenged by its changing demographics, economy, physical and social landscape. Between the years 1990 and 2000 in Region Nine the average family size has increased from 2.59 per household in 1990 to 3.03 in 2000, the Hispanic/Latino population has risen by 4,991 (220%), and housing increased by 5,162, but yet in year 2000 there was only a 1.4% vacancy rate. To meet the demands of a changing area, Region Nine must continue to work with an entrepreneurial spirit. Region Nine must remain committed and unified with other jurisdictions and sectors in making a difference in the lives of our shared citizenry.

The September 11th event has taught us that we cannot predict what social, economic or physical calamity may occur tomorrow, therefore we must collectively prevent and prepare for such events by making differences and building capacity in the lives of all citizens on a daily basis.

### Program Objectives:

• The Planning, Development, and Finance (PDF) Division works in the areas of community development, economic development, transportation, disaster assistance, land use, planning and zoning, and other forms of local technical assistance. The overall objective is to keep our communities healthy, viable places in which to live and work. For the purpose of this report, the department is divided into the Community Development, Economic Development and Transportation programs.

The PDF Division obtains funding through a variety of state and federal grants, charges for services, and a portion of the Commission's levy amount. In the past year it generated over \$180,000 in grants to provide its services, including:

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Governing Body: Region Nine Development Commission

### **Program Objectives:**

• The objective of the Region Nine Community Development program is to provide assistance to local units of government in the areas of land use planning and zoning, infrastructure development, project financing, and other technical assistance. Much of the effort goes into seeking funding for necessary community projects. Communities are urged to contact the Community Development staff whenever it has unmet development needs. The staff can then research the best solutions to the needs. In today's world of high costs and much competition for state and federal dollars, this is a valuable service.

In 2000, the staff obtained a \$50,000 grant from Minnesota Planning to assist local units of government with a variety of planning efforts. The grant allowed the Commission to write down by one third the cost of local planning projects. This allowed communities to undertake plans that they would otherwise be unable to afford.

- Henderson Growth Management Study
- Springfield Housing Study

- Waseca County Comprehensive Plan

### **Completed Projects:**

• City of Trimont - Rental housing survey/study.

• Sleepy Eye Public High School - MHFA grant application for construction trades class for funding to build a house, which will provide an affordable housing unit to a resident of the area.

• Administration of **Frost** and **Dunnell** public facilities waste water collection and treatment Small Cities Development Program projects.

• Administration of the MHFA housing disaster loan program in **St. Peter, Comfrey, LeCenter** and in rural areas within the region.

### **Cost of Development Study:**

In FY 2001, a successful grant application was made to the Board of Governmental Innovation and Cooperation to develop a Cost of Development Study using LeSueur County as a model. By using the DIAMaTR methodology developed by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture, the study will determine the actual costs of providing governmental services to different residential scenarios. The costs of services will then be compared to the taxes generated by the development. The results of the study will help local units of government in their planning and zoning efforts. The study will be completed in FY 2002.

### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Governing Body: Region Nine Development Commission

### **Program Objectives:**

• The primary objective of the Economic Development Program is to stabilize and increase the number and quality of jobs in the region. To accomplish this, the staff works with the businesses, local units of government, and state and federal agencies.

- Assistance to Businesses

The Commission administers four revolving loan funds (RLF): - Six County RLF

- Nine County RLF
  - Tornado RLF
  - Rural Outbuilding RLF

The intent of these pools is to provide a good source of longterm, low interest loan funds for business expansion and start up. All loans have the participation of a local lending institution and owner equity. Very often, the loans also receive assistance from other local, regional and state revolving loan funds. All loans are reviewed by the Region Nine Loan Review Committee to insure they meet eligibility standards.

Since the inception of the RLF program in 1989, the Commission has made more than 136 loans with a total dollar value of \$7,987,871.

In FY 2001, the Commission approved 10 loans valued at \$579,200. The breakdown of loans is as follows:

The Commission also assists businesses by helping them gain access to state and federal funds through the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development, the Small Business Administration and other sources.

### - Assistance to Communities

At times, a community has difficulty with economic development activities because of lack of adequate sewer, water or road systems. The Region Nine staff can help communities access state/federal grants or loans to improve those systems, thus increasing the opportunities for economic development. If conditions warrant, the staff can assist in the development and funding of industrial park creation or expansion.

At other times, communities need other types of assistance to make economic development projects become a reality. Such assistance may come in the form of surveys, special studies, organizational assistance, or assistance with land use planning.

The Economic Development staff also provide assistance to communities during times of crisis. The Commission was able to assist businesses though disaster revolving loan funds in response to flooding in 1993 and 1997 and after the tornado in 1998.

#### - Areawide Cooperation

Improving the economy of the region is a challenge which<sub>#</sub> requires the cooperation and coordination of many agencies and organizations. Region Nine staff works closely with all providers of economic development services to insure that businesses and communities within the region get the best assistance possible. The providers include local economic development authorities, the Initiative Fund of Southeastern and South Central Minnesota, the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development, the U.S. Economic Development Administration, utilities, and special interest groups.

#### Fiscal Year 2001 Project Highlights:

• Completed the 2001 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) which enables the Commission to receive \$57,000 in federal assistance from the Economic Development Administration.

Recapitalized the revolving loan funds by selling a portion on the secondary market. A total of 16 loans totaling \$657,367 were sold. This amount is 96% of the original outstanding balance. By selling the loans it allows Region Nine to lend money to start-up and existing businesses looking to expand. Some qualified applicants looking to Region Nine for assistance were turned away up until this point due to lack of funds.

• Prepared a recovery strategy to assist the city of **St. Peter** overcome the distress of the Onan plant closing and the loss of 360 jobs.

• Prepared study of plant closings and large scale layoffs in the Region Nine area.

• Provided assistance to the city of **North Mankato** in the effort to attract a large warehouse operation.

• Met with businesses throughout the Region about loans and other assistance.

• Assisted the city of **Kiester** to obtain funding for water system improvements.

• Provided economic development technical assistance to several communities.

• Participated in state and national economic development advisory groups.

• Prepared a Board on Intergovernmental Innovation and Cooperation grant to assist the local units of government in **LeSueur County** judge the cost of providing services to various types of residential developments.

• Worked on several transportation projects that will provide better access for the region's businesses.

## TRANSPORTATION

**Governing Body:** Region Nine Development Commission **Advisory Body:** Transportation Advisory Committee

### **Program Objectives:**

• The overall objective of the Region Nine Transportation Program is to work with Mn/DOT and local units of government to maintain and improve the transportation network of Region Nine. The transportation network includes highway, transit, railroads, trails and aeronautics. In Region Nine, most of the concern is with highways although there is a growing concern for transit and trails.

• By contractual agreement, Region Nine assists the Minnesota Department of Transportation (Mn/DOT) with substate transportation planning and programming. It accomplishes this by actively participating in the District 7 Area Transportation Partnership (ATP), providing input into Mn/DOT District 7 and statewide plans and programs, and preparing the Commission's own planning documents.

• TEA-21, the federal transportation program, calls for input by local elected officials and citizens into all aspects of transportation planning. Region Nine, through its Transportation Advisory Committee and its participation in the ATP, provides opportunities for local involvement.

# SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER

### **Governing Body:**

Region Nine Development Commission Minnesota Dept. of Trade and Economic Development Small Business Administration

### **Program Objectives:**

• The Small Business Development Center provides free customized consulting services to businesses within the nine-county region. Services, which are offered to both start-up and existing businesses include: business planning, marketing planning, market research, financial analysis, loan packaging, e-commerce, assistance with advertising and promotions, human resource issues and financial record keeping. The staff also provides general information to businesses, such as industry statistics, trade association listings, business directory listings and information on regulatory and tax requirements.

• The Small Business Development Center staff is required each year to:

- complete 2,500 hours of consulting
- complete 50 loan packages
- deliver 8 seminars and workshops

In addition, the staff is required to raise approximately 40% of the annual budget through local sources.

### Calendar Year 2000 Projects:

• In 2000, 537 clients were served throughout the region, 52 loan packages were completed and 16 training seminars were attended by 259 people. The majority of the clients came to the SBDC seeking assistance in the areas of business planning, finance and marketing. Of the 2000 clients, 17% were service businesses, 4% were retail, 7% were manufacturing, 68% were start-up companies and the balance were wholesale and construction firms.

• The Small Business Development Center has been successful in its fundraising efforts. In 2000, contributors included banks, utility companies, cities, counties, economic development authorities and private foundations within the region. In addition to local financial support, the SBDC receives \$135,000 in federal and state funding.

The Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Consortium (FASC) of South Central Minnesota is a voluntary association of individuals and agencies interested in preventing fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) and fetal alcohol effects (FAE). Funding for the consortium is provided through a grant from the Minnesota Department of Health.

FASC has five committees that work to prevent FAS/FAE:

- There is a <u>Speaker's Bureau</u> whose members include parents of FAS/FAE children, service providers and professionals who diagnose conditions related to fetal alcohol. Upon request, a Speaker's Bureau member will give a presentation on FAS/FAE prevention depending upon availability.
- The <u>Youth Committee</u> is responsible for coordinating FAS/FAE prevention events with the assistance of area youth.
- The <u>Media Committee</u> members assist with public service announcements and an annual media campaign which surrounds Mother's Day and Father's Day. Also, through the use of the FASC resource library, items such as posters, brochures, videos, books, and other information can be distributed to community members within the FASC service area.
- The members of the <u>Conference Planning Committee</u> are responsible for coordinating training workshops for professionals.
- Members of the <u>Legislative Efforts Committee</u> work with local and state officials to emphasize the importance of FAS/FAE prevention.

Throughout 2001 the Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Consortium (FASC) of South Central Minnesota has:

• Held workshops for daycare providers, educators, chemical dependency providers, social service providers, law enforcement officials, and health care professionals.

• Provided material such as books, infant simulators, videos, and professional journal articles through the FASC Resource Library check-out system.

• Distributed educational material such as brochures, posters, bookmarks, and table tents to area schools and health care facilities.

• Presented to more than 1,500 individuals regarding FAS/FAE prevention throughout the service area.

• Provided Spanish written materials to the Latino population through local outreach efforts.

• Referred families to local FAS/FAE service providers.

• Coordinated a successful media campaign (100,000 napkins with FAS prevention messages on them were distributed to establishments that serve alcohol and provide meals within the county seats of the FASC service area).

• Donated FAS/FAE books to the libraries within the FASC service area.

• Presented at local conferences and provided information through exhibits.

• Worked with area youth to distribute FAS prevention materials that interest youth.

• Conducted a Needs Assessment of area service providers (results posted on the FASC website).
