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Region Nine Development Commission

The Region Nine area is comprised of nine south-central Minnesota counties: Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca, and Watonwan. Their combined population is 220,914 of the state's 4,192,973 people, according to estimates made by the Minnesota State Planning Agency in 1985-86. North Mankato, Fairmont, New Ulm, and Mankato are the four largest cities with populations respectively from 10,000 to nearly 30,000.

The 36 elected officials serving on the Commission represent nine counties, 72 cities, 147 townships, 45 school districts, nine soil and water conservation districts, and the Minnesota Valley Council of Governments. A representative of the region's business and industries also serves on the Commission.

The Commission, authorized by the Regional **Development Act of** 1969, was organized by local officials in 1972 "to facilitate intergovernmental cooperation and to insure the orderly and harmonious coordination of state. federal and local comprehensive planning and development programs for the solution of economic. social, physical and governmental problems of the state and its citizens." (Minnesota Statutes, Section 462.383; Subdivision 2.)

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
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
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
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Minnesota Development Regions



Today's challenge of providing planning and other coordinated efforts with less and less state and federal dollars available is being met through increasing local revenues collected for specific services.



Program Objectives:

- The primary objectives of the Region Nine Economic Development program were to stabilize and increase the number of jobs and income within the Region. Four primary means were used to accomplish this mission:
 - <u>Assistance to Businesses</u> Through the Small Business Administration, State/Federal funding programs, Initiative Fund and other programs, Region Nine staff helped match a project with available low interest, long term loans. The staff also prepared the application forms for the business. Region Nine staff also referred businesses to other agencies, which can serve their specific needs.
 - <u>Assistance to Communities</u> At times a barrier to economic development is lack of sewer or water capacity, streets or industrial land. The Region Nine staff can assist with state and federal grant/loans to put those facilities into place.
 - <u>Community Education</u> At times communities are interested in establishing an economic development program but don't know how to get started. The Region Nine staff assists communities assess their situation and take positive steps to improve their local economy.
 - <u>Areawide Cooperation</u> The lagging economy is an areawide problem calling for cooperation of many communities and organizations. Region Nine works closely with all state and local agencies involved with economic development.
- A major thrust in FY '88 was to establish a full working relationship with the federal Economic Development Administration. This thrust will in FY '89 culminate in the designation of Region Nine as an Economic Development District. To achieve this status, the Region prepared a lengthy Overall Economic Development Plan.

As a result of District Designation status, counties within the Region are eligible for EDA programs including EDA funded revolving loan funds (RLF) and grant programs for public facilities.

Currently, five counties are eligible for revolving loan funds -- Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Sibley, and Watonwan. Region Nine is in the process of establishing an areawide \$800,000 RLF for business expansion and start-up in these counties.

Four counties are eligible for EDA public facilities grants -- LeSueur, Martin, Sibley, and Waseca. The expansion of the egg processing plant in Gaylord was made possible by an EDA public facilities grant prepared by the Region Nine staff.

In addition, district designation of Region Nine makes it eligible for ongoing EDA funding to support all of its economic development efforts.

- Another thrust was to establish a Region Nine Economic Development Subcommission. This group, comprised of local officials, economic development professionals, and citizens provides guidance to the Region Nine economic development staff. At its organizational meeting, the Subcommission listed the following priority areas of involvement for Region Nine:
 - Education of local economic development groups.
 - Clearinghouse on economic development (ED) programs and information.
 - Marketing the area for tourism and economic development.
 - Development of new sources of capital.
 - Represent the Region's ED effort to the Governor, state agencies, and legislature.
 - Identify and promote agricultural opportunities.
 - Area comprehensive economic development plan.

- Developed region-wide EDA Overall Economic Development Plan.





• The variety of activities the Agency is involved in allows for the coordination of services to older people. As an example, one of its objectives was to effectively encourage public and private services/resources that would improve the system of family and informal caregivers.

Fiscal Year 1988 Projects:

- Advocated for the needs of older people and their service providers through state and federal legislative hearings.
- Provided training opportunities for service providers.
- Sought the further development of senior centers by requesting and receiving Southeastern Minnesota Initiative Fund moneys to re-grant to area groups.

What is the Area Agency on Aging?

An Area Agency on Aging is an agency designated to develop a coordinated system for delivering needed services to older persons in a specific geographic area. An Area Agency on Aging receives funds from the federal Older Americans Act to carry out this responsibility.

What agency serves as the Area Agency on Aging for southcentral Minnesota?

The Region Nine Development Commission (RNDC) was designated as the Area Agency on Aging for southcentral Minnesota by the Minnesota Board on Aging in 1976. The area served by RNDC includes Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca and Watonwan Counties.

What are the specific responsibilities of an Area Agency on Aging?

Area Agencies on Aging have a major responsibility for granting Older Americans Act funds to organizations, agencies and units of government that will provide social services and nutrition services to the elderly. They are also responsible for monitoring these organizations, to ensure that Older Americans Act funds are spent in an effective and efficient manner. In addition, Area Agencies serve as a focal point for the concerns of older persons in their region.

Other specific responsibilities of an Area Agency are as follows:


- 1. Assessment of older persons' needs in the community.
- 2. Identification of deficiencies in services available for the elderly.
- **3.** Identification of solutions to meet the needs and fill gaps in the service delivery system.
- 4. Interaction with public and private agencies to ensure coordination of services offered for the elderly.
- 5. Advocate to introduce change in stereotypes, legislation and agency policies which impact negatively on the elderly.
- 6. Development of an Area Plan on Aging that identifies and prioritizes needs of older persons in its service area.
- 7. Disseminate information on aging throughout the area.

What is the Older Americans Act?

The Older Americans Act was first passed by Congress in 1965 to provide funds to states to set up a variety of programs to meet the needs of older persons. The Act also created a specific federal office to address concerns of the elderly. This office is called the Administration on Aging.

What is the "Aging Network"?

This is a term used to describe the various units of government and organizations involved in providing services to senior citizens. The following graphic display demonstrates how funds from the Older Americans Act are channeled from Congress through the Aging Network to local community programs.



What is the RNDC Advisory Council on Aging?

The Region Nine Advisory Council on Aging is comprised of representation from persons over 60 (50%), private, non-profit and public agencies, and county social service/public health nursing agencies. The Council meets monthly and has responsibilities in areas such as developing the region's plan on aging, advising the Region Nine Development Commission on aging issues, development of regional goals and priorities on aging and allocation of the Older Americans Act.



Program Objectives:

- The Region Nine arts program is designed to promote the arts in the nine-county area through funding for artistic growth opportunities, organizational development, public exposure, and quality arts experiences.
- Through citizen participation and by providing for technical assistance, public information, planning, grantswriting workshops, and administrative assistance it increases the visibility of the arts.
- During FY 1988, the program also assisted local arts organizations address their own development.
- A new addition this year was the Region Nine Small Arts Grant Program. This provided \$900 per county in matching funds to be used for numerous smaller projects funded at a maximum of \$300 each.







<u>Awards</u>:

The Region Nine Development Commission received three Innovative Awards from the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO). Annually the awards are presented for special projects using private/public financing which address and help to solve the economic development issues of an area.

The Innovative Awards were presented for the following projects:

Rural Leadership Project

<u>Summary Description</u>: Region Nine Development Commission, Mankato, MN; September 1986 to June 1987; Funding: Minnesota Women's Fund - \$10,000 and Region Nine Development Commission - \$3,500 (in-kind). Sponsored by District 9 of Minnesota Women for Agriculture, the project provided leadership development training to rural women in each of the region's counties. At least 75 women participated in a series of six-to-twelve hour workshops covering organizational development, fund-raising and initiation of change. Nine women were recognized with Agri-Woman Leadership Awards at a Leadership Reception and invited to participate in a Farmer Leader Conference meant to focus on developing new policy options for rural communities.

Region Nine Training Seminars/Conferences

<u>Summary Description</u>: Region Nine Development Commission, Mankato, MN; 1987; Funding: Registration fees from participants. Several training sessions organized in response to local economic development needs identified by market research aimed at target audiences such as elected officials. Goal was to bring communities up to speed on economic development strategies and techniques. Workshops held for newly elected officials and other local leaders. Topics included economic development, the Small Business Administration Section 503/504 program, tourism, existing programs to assist community development, and marketing for non-profits. Resulted in regular meetings of a business advocacy group and an economic development professionals group.

"Madelia Story"

<u>Summary Description</u>: Region Nine Development Commission, Mankato, MN; October 1985 to April 1986; Funding: Internalized by existing programs. Identified the impact of the agricultural crisis on a total rural community (business, education, social services, health care, housing, employment, population, etc.) and defined necessary steps to deal with issues for future community/economic development. Findings reported in <u>Congressional Record</u> and mass media coverage drew national attention. KSTP-TV sent reporter and photographer to live in Madelia for 10 weeks and produced an hour-long documentary entitled "Foreclosing on a Dream". One result was employment opportunities in Minneapolis/St. Paul area for the local unemployed.

Special Recognition:

- Region Nine Development Commission executive director **Terence** "**Terry**" **Stone** was the first Minnesotan to receive the J. Roy Fogle national award as Executive Director of the Year.
- Kristin Juliar, Region Nine Development Commission economic development planner received recognition from <u>The Farmer</u> magazine. She was one of three Minnesotans named as "Emerging New Rural Leaders".
- Kathie Davis, Region Nine Development Commission public information coordinator received statewide recognition with the Minnesota Community Improvement Program award for outstanding work for community improvement.

FY 88 REVENUES - AGENCYWIDE


FY 89 REVENUES - AGENCYWIDE






FY 88 REVENUES - GENERAL GOVERNMENT













FY 89 REVENUES - ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT









FY 89 REVENUES - TRANSPORTATION










FY 88 REVENUES - AGING







FY 89 REVENUES - ARTS


FY 88 REVENUES - EMS





