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STATE OF MINNESOTA

Significant changes and improvements were undertaken by the Minnesota State Agricultural Society during fiscal 1980 . . . changes which will set the tone for the decade to come.

The fair's outside gate fee schedule was altered in a major departure from the norms of the exposition industry. Dependence on vehicle parking as a source of revenue was eliminated . . . in recognition that such fees are considered by the public to be "hidden costs." Admission charges are now applied to people only.

The fair is encouraging, and the public is responding to, greater use of mass transit as a means of getting to the exposition. Such response is of benefit in energy conservation and in the avoidance of traffic congestion. It also clearly denotes that dependence on parking fees is a poor market strategy in an era of declining automobile use.

The fair's fine arts show, a significant educational and competitive forum and one of the most popular public exhibits on the grounds, was moved from the upper chambers of the Grandstand to a functional, ground-level home in a period restoration structure immediately north of the 4-H Building. Benefits were two-fold. The fine arts department gained a modern, easily-accessible exhibit facility and; the public enjoyed the view and use of an authentically restored example of exposition architecture from the turn of the century. Again, the keynote of this exercise was conversation. The useful life of a 75-year-old building was extended and improved to the public benefit.

Again in 1980, as in several years just passed, weather provided uncooperative. Seven days of rain occurred during the 12-day run of the fair and particular impact was felt on two highly-important weekend days. The fair must "live" with weather which is not to say that rain can be discounted. Its effects during 1980 were extremely detrimental to crowd potential as well as gross receipts. Fully \$350,000 was unrealized because of heavy rainfall during the exposition. Another \$28,000 in storm damage was sustained by the physical plant during summer thunder showers and fall hail storms.

As we move into 1981 and the years beyond, challenge and opportunity abound. It is our collective responsibility to hold at eye level the mirror of social and economic change and to keep in focus the image of educational and business progress so abundant in this great state. We must further provide competition and a reasonable measure of family entertainment.

Meanwhile, economic distress, inflation and a depressed leisure market are terms which accurately describe the prevailing financial climate as we embark on our journey through the '80s. The question at hand is whether the fair can successfully find its way through the maze of opportunity and business difficulty that lies ahead. Your counsel and support will be required as we face the future.

It is with a sense of loss that I acknowledge the impending departure of Mr. Larry Haeg, who has served with distinction as a member of the Society Board since 1969 and as its able president over the past two years. Mr. Haeg has provided outstanding stability and guidance to our management team over this period and, although his input and sage advice will be missed, he has provided contributions to the society that will remain viable through the years to come.

BOARD

Policy for the administration of the Minnesota State Fair is set by the board of managers of the Minnesota State Agricultural Society, governing body of the fair. The board of managers is composed of 10 members—one representative from each of the state's nine regional districts and a president.

Managers on the board are elected to alternating three-year terms by the society's authorized delegates who are representatives of the state's county agricultural societies and various agribusiness and industrial associations. The president, nominated from the members of the board, is elected by society delegates to a one-year term. The board's two vice presidents, from the fourth and fifth districts, are elected by the society to alternating two-year terms.

In addition to serving as a policy setting body, the board appoints the secretary-general manager, supervises various departments and deals with specific areas of operation through a number of committees.

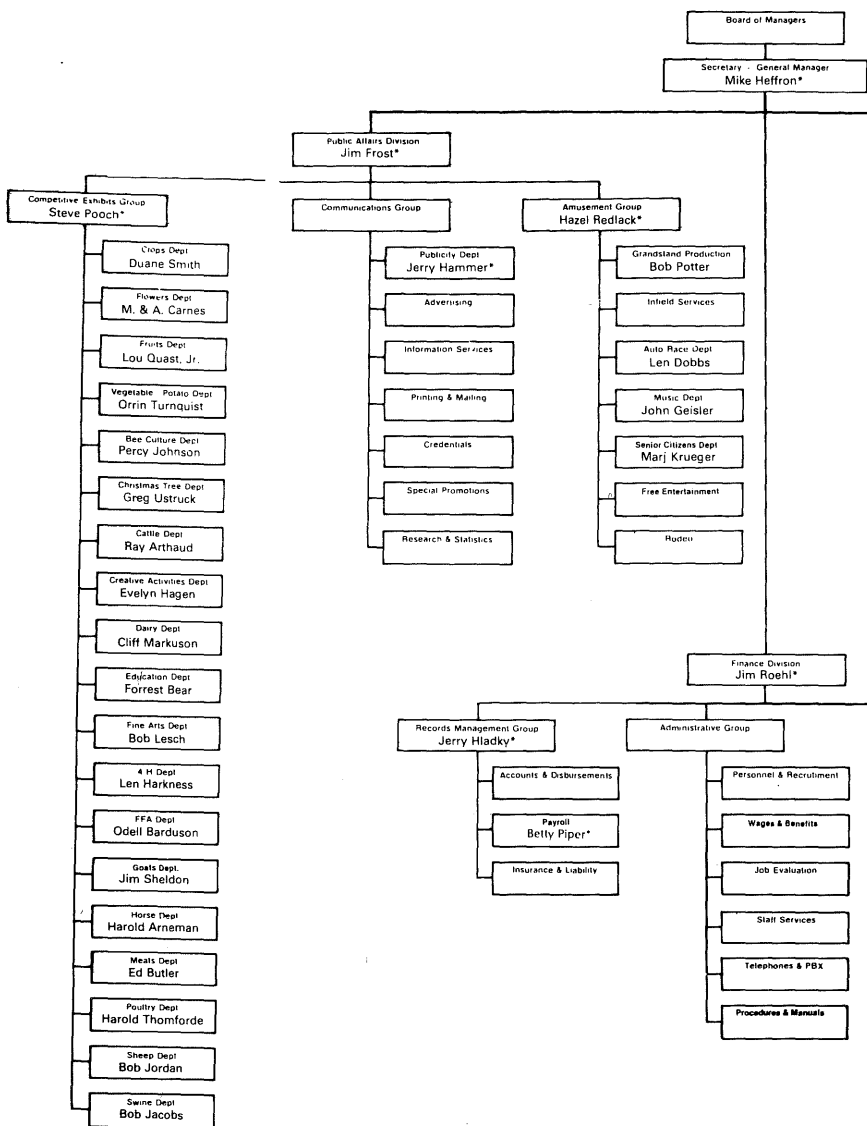

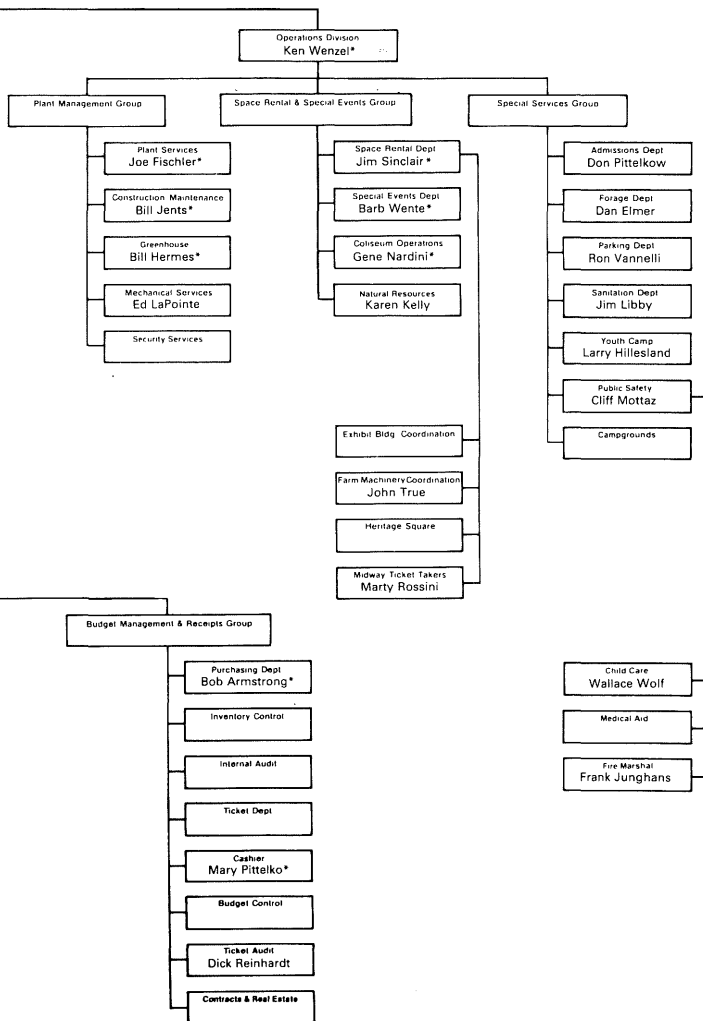

MANAGEMENT

The policies of the board of managers were implemented under the direction of the secretary-general manager by a full-time staff of 39, plus 39 part-time superintendents and a seasonal staff that reached nearly 2,400 during the fair.

Effective organization and appropriate delegation of responsibility are essential to an operation as broad and diversified as the State Fair. To meet these needs, the secretary-general manager has organized the operation of the exposition into three divisions, each headed by a director. Seventy-seven different areas of responsibility are divided among the three divisions and many of these areas are departments of the fair, headed by a superintendent.

Working through group coordinators, directors and the secretary-general manager, the superintendents direct activities within their departments. The size and scope of several departments require full-time superintendents.

1980 STATE FAIR

The 1980 Minnesota State Fair attracted 1,325,360 visitors, the fifth-highest attendance mark in the history of the exposition. Although attendance declined from 1979's all-time record of 1,405,669, the '80 fair was successful in spite of the damp and threatening weather that prevailed throughout the fair, Aug. 21 through Labor Day, Sept. 1.

According to data gathered by the Future Farmers of America at the fairgrounds a total of 1.79 inches of rain fell during seven days of the fair. Rain that failed to materialize was forecast for two other days, as well.

A single-day attendance record was set Thursday, Aug. 28, the second of two Senior Citizens Days, when 111,987 visitors attended the exposition.

Outside gate admission fee for adults was \$3, a \$1 increase from the price of the previous five years; children 5 through 15 were charged \$1 (no increase); and children under 5 were admitted free. On Senior Citizens Days, Aug. 21 and Aug. 28, persons 65 and over were admitted free. Fairgoers 15 and under were admitted without charge on Children Days, Aug. 22 and Aug. 29. The exposition also offered a discount in admission for adults who rode a bike to the fair on two Bicycle Days, Aug. 22 and Aug. 29. Admission was \$1 for those 16 and over who parked their bikes in a designated area. As part of the Bicycle Days promotion, 50 free 10-speed bikes were given away.

In a change from past years the parking fee for all fairgrounds lots was removed. In addition to providing free parking at the exposition site, the State Fair leased Midway Stadium from the City of St. Paul and offered free parking at the stadium every day of the fair with bus service to the fairgrounds.

Precipitation figures in the accompanying table were recorded on the grounds by the FFA; temperature figures were obtained from the National Weather Service.

COMMERCIAL

Income from the rental of commercial space totaled \$1,449,106.45 and accounted for nearly one-fourth of the State Fair's gross income for 1980. The figure represents a decline of only one percent from 1979's record space rental income.

Three types of space rental contracts were issued for the 1980 State Fair; concession (firms or individuals that sold products or services from their booths), exhibits (displays or demonstrations only—no cash exchange) and gratis (service organizations and educational exhibits). The average space rental fee for concessions was \$29 per front foot. (Certain attractions such as the Sky Ride, Space Tower and Giant Slide paid fees on a percentage basis.) Comparable fee for an exhibit contract was \$23 per front foot.

The space rental department issued 1,237 contracts in 1980—768 concession, 349 exhibit and 120 gratis. Income from concession contracts totaled \$1,332,125.45 and exhibit contract income was \$113,306.00.

While commercial space rental serves as a financial mainstay of the exposition, it also provides the exhibitors and the fair-going public with an opportunity to reach each other. For the businesses exhibiting at the State Fair, the exposition offers a large and diverse audience to examine the appeal of their products and services. The public benefits from the vast and varied compliment of businesses and service organizations represented at the State Fair. At the 1980 exposition, for example, the Minnesota House of Representatives operated an educational display in the Machinery/State Exhibits Building that offered members of the House a chance to meet their constituents while giving the public an opportunity to learn about their government.

The exposition utilizes four million square feet of outdoor exhibit space and 300,000 square feet indoors for commercial space rental. The bulk of indoor space is located in 11 major buildings on the fairgrounds. With the assistance of the local Camp Fire organization, the State Fair conducted a survey of the pedestrian traffic generated by each of the buildings. Survey results show that the buildings most popular with the public include the Food Show Building, Grandstand exhibit areas and the Agriculture-Horticulture Building. Complete, detailed results of the survey are available from the State Fair publicity department.

COMPETITION

NEARLY 13,500 people participated in various competitions at the 1980 State Fair. In a year highlighted by changes and improvements, over 34,000 animals and objects were entered in the fair's 19 competitive departments and a record \$391,367.41 in premiums were awarded to the winning exhibitors.

One of the most significant changes in 1980 took place in the fine arts department. After 26 years in the Grandstand's third floor gallery, the fine arts exhibition moved into the sparkling "new" Arts Center, formerly Machinery Hall. The vintage structure, built in 1907, underwent extensive remodeling and renovation to restore the exterior to its original appearance and convert the building's interior into a flexible, ultra-modern gallery. The change was greeted with enthusiasm by fairgoers and the arts community—the latter reflected in an increase of 500 entries in the fine arts competition.

Four other major changes occurred in the exposition's livestock program. They were: inclusion of market livestock in the 4-H competition; moving the Future Farmers of America events from the final four days of the fair to the first four days; consolidation of the open class swine show from eight days to four days; and the addition of an open class dairy goat show. In past years, the 4-H and FFA shows ran concurrently. The addition of market livestock to the 4-H show allowed the FFA show to be moved up and FFA show records were set in a number of areas including total livestock entries.

The exposition's English and Western horse shows once again played an integral part in the fair's competitive program. Exhibitors from such distant venues as Arlington, Texas, traveled to the exposition site to compete in the State Fair's highly-rated horse shows. Coliseum attendance for horse shows, combined with Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association rodeos, rose to 52,695—an increase of over 4,000 from 1979. Appearing during intermission at English and Western shows were the Figure 8 Chariot Racers.

In other events, the Bussler Durocs farm in Brownton, Minn., had the winning entry in the swine department's largest boar competition with the winning hog weighing in at 960 pounds. The sheep department again featured a ladies lead class and Brenda Stoen of Starbuck, Minn., won first place.

ENTERTAINMENT

Visitors to the 1980 Minnesota State Fair were treated to a vast and diverse array of free entertainment, highlighted by music, comedy and novelty acts at a variety of locations around the grounds.

Since its construction in 1970, the Bandshell has grown increasingly popular. Even with a seating capacity of 3,000, overflow standing room crowds frequently spill out onto the adjoining streets. This trend continued in 1980, a bumper year for entertainment at the Bandshell. Appearing Aug. 21-26 were Doug Kershaw, the Jack D'Johns, the Mugelstons and the Note-Ables. On stage Aug. 27-Sept. 1 were the Kimberlys, the Barbary Coast Banjo Brass, the Wright Brothers and Paul New and Steel City. Performing evenings at the Bandshell were Ray Komischke's State Fair Orchestra and the Minneapolis Chapter Commodore Chorus, SPEBSQSA (Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America).

Following the early evening performances, the Eighth Annual State Fair Amateur Talent Contest was held with semi-finals the first 11 nights of the fair and finals on Labor Day. The J. D. Steele Singers of Minnetonka captured grand prize honors in the amateur showcase, winning \$1,000 and an opportunity to perform at the 1981 exposition.

Another popular spot at the fair was the circus lot, west of the Dairy-Animal Products Building, where the Hanneford Aerial Thrill Circus, sponsored by Hamm's Beer, performed for the fourth consecutive year. Featured in the 1980 edition of the thrill circus was Hugo Zacchini, the human cannonball.

Fairgoers took a stroll through the past at Heritage Square, the exposition's early America theme area. Adding to the pioneer atmosphere was music with an old-time flavor, provided by the Blue Rock Bluegrass Band and the Memories, Aug. 22-26 and the Great Western Band and Sunshine Special, winners of the 1979 amateur talent contest, Aug. 27-Sept. 1. Heritage Square's additional entertaining and educational attractions included the Fisher Brothers Log Rolling Show, Third Annual Old Time Fiddlers Contest, State Fair History Museum, Now and Then programs, Rafel Pioneer Family and blacksmith Joe De La Ronde.

State Fair mall parades were continued in 1980 and once again featured the state high school marching band competition, won by Red Wing High School (Class AA) and Monticello High School (Class A). Floats, farm machinery, animals and novelty units (including Mulleague and Company, the "new Laurel and Hardy") rounded out the parades.

Machinery Park echoed with the merry strains of polka music during the exposition. Frankie Yankovic, America's polka king, performed Aug. 21-26 and the Chmielewski Fun Time Show entertained Aug. 27-Sept. 1.

At Natural Resources Park, ethnic music and dance were performed by American Indian Dancers Aug. 21-26 and the American Balalaika Company Aug. 27-Sept. 1. Also appearing at the park were the Minnesota Over 60 Band, McDonald's All Star High School Jazz Ensemble and various area high school and concert bands.

Baldwin Hall in the Education Building was yet another site of diverse, continuous entertainment. Among acts appearing in Baldwin Hall were the Jackson Marionettes, Charley Disney table tennis demonstrations and the Northern Lights Show Troupe.

Free entertainment was also provided in the Senior Citizens Building with performances by Mulleague and Company, Paul and Archie, the Renville County Senior Citizens Lawrence Welk Group, Reedy Family Singers and Bob Larson.

Demonstrations of canine care and training were featured along with exotic breed displays at the Dog Exhibit Building. Among the most popular demonstrations at the Dog Exhibit Building were the scent hurdle races, held Aug. 30 outside the building. Farm animal demonstrations were also presented at the FFA Children's Barnyard. Additional demonstrations ranging from rug braiding to feeding a crowd were staged at a variety of locations, including the Creative Activities Building, Territorial Pioneers Log Cabin and the Agriculture-Horticulture Building.

The State Fair also continued its involvement in several recognition programs. Minnesota's outstanding senior citizens, Pearl Hotvedt of East Grand Forks and Albert Pierson of Willmar, were named at special recognition ceremonies on Senior Citizens Day, Aug. 28, at the Bandshell. Outstanding senior citizens from throughout the state were recognized at the ceremonies, sponsored by the State Fair, Minnesota Federation of County Fairs and the Minnesota Board on Aging.

The 50 Year Award, new in 1980, was presented to 23 people Aug. 24, commemorating a half-century of involvement with the exposition for each of the recipients. The Century Farm program, honoring persons whose farms have been in continuous family ownership for the past 100 years, was continued in 1980. Two hundred forty farms received designation in the program, sponsored by the fair and The Farmer Magazine. Cecelia Quaife, a third and fourth grade teacher in Mounds View, was named Minnesota's Teacher of the Year at recognition ceremonies Aug. 24. Sponsorship of the Teacher of the Year program is shared by the State Fair and the Minnesota Education Association.

GRANDSTAND

Eleven evenings of top-name entertainment and six afternoons of motorsport action attracted 159,916 people to the State Fair Grandstand during the 1980 exposition.

Attendance at the evening Grandstand presentations totaled 127,078, an average of 7,475 people at each of the 17 performances. The record average attendance of 8,093 was set during the 1979 State Fair.

Ticket prices for evening shows were scaled at \$7-6-5-2 and \$6-5-4-2, based on the fair's cost for each act. Listed below are performers, audited attendance and number of performances.

The diverse motorsport program attracted 32,830 race and demolition derby fans. Included in the program were two days of U.S. Auto Club-sanctioned Super Vee racing, two days of American Speed Association National Circuit of

Champions late model stock car racing (a third day was rained out), an afternoon of late model sportsman stock car racing and a championship demolition derby.

Peter Kuhn, Chatham, N.J. (below, with trophy), swept the Super Vee series, winning both 125-lap feature races Aug. 23 and Aug. 24. Kuhn's Aug. 24 victory was achieved in a State Fair track record time for 125 laps of 47 minutes, 13.57 seconds.

In ASA competition, Bob Senneker of Dorr, Mich., won the AMS/OIL 300 on Sept. 1 to capture the \$5,000 first prize in the \$34,000 Labor Day classic. Winners in the Aug. 30 ASA events were John Boegeman, Shakopee (50-lap semi-feature), Mark Lamoreaux, Bloomington (50-lap semi-feature) and Joe Shear, South Beloit, Ill. (35-lap feature). Mark Martin, North Liberty, Ind., set the late model stock car one-lap track record during qualifying with a time of :18.971 (94.84 mph). Martin was the ASA's 1980 national champion. Twin 100-lap features scheduled for Aug. 31 were cancelled due to rain.

Winners in the late model sportsman stock car competition Aug. 28 were Lynn Peterson of Lakeville (40-lap feature and 10-lap heat race), Steve Murgic of Rosemount (10-lap heat race) and Joe Berthiaune of Osseo (10-lap heat race and 12-lap trophy dash).

In the championship demolition derby Aug. 21, Lowell Evans of Austin emerged as the victor, winning the \$750 first prize. Evans also won a State Fair demolition derby in 1979.

OFF-SEASON

While the fifth largest crowd in State Fair history visited the 1980 exposition, an additional 641,000 persons took part in a variety of off-season events during the past year. Over 80 special events were held at the fairgrounds throughout the year as many organizations and businesses found the exposition site ideal for meetings, sales, shows and other activities.

Off-season events produced a net revenue of \$283,306.19. This figure is based on an income of \$522,106.68 and expenses of \$238,800.49, and compared to a 1979 net revenue of \$222,179.53.

Of the 12 State Fair buildings used for special events, the Coliseum was by far the busiest. During the winter months, the Coliseum is equipped with a regulation-size skating rink and over 100,000 people attended various skating events at the facility. Figure skaters, longblade skaters and leisure skaters utilized the Coliseum, as did local high school and college hockey teams for games and practice sessions. After the Coliseum's ice sheet was removed in late March, the building hosted a variety of events including 10 horse shows, two dog shows, a cat show, a collector car auction and a circus.

The Merchandise Mart was also a popular facility in 1980 and was the site of the KTCA TV Action Auction, Nordic Trading Ski Equipment Sale, Lift Ski Sale and the National Ski Patrol Equipment Sale and Swap. Other buildings utilized for off-season events included the Dairy-Animal Products Building (JY Sale and Twin Cities Youth for Christ Halloween House), Home Improvement Building (State of Minnesota Pre-priced Garage Sale), Grandstand (Furniture Barn Warehouse Sale) and the Dog Exhibit Building (In Town Apple Sale).

The size and scope of some off-season events required the use of the entire fairgrounds. Among these activities were the Family Motorcoach Association International Convention and the City of St. Paul Fourth of July Fireworks Presentation. The fireworks show originated in the Grandstand, but the entire grounds were used for spectators and parking.

Many of the off-season events held at the State Fairgrounds varied in length from a few hours (such as police recruit training sessions, picnics and workshops) to year-around (University of Minnesota student parking).

1980 ANNUAL MEETING

The 121st annual meeting of the Minnesota State Agricultural Society commenced with a day-long registration period Sunday, Jan. 20, at the Radisson Hotel in St. Paul. First general business session, chaired by President Lawrence F. Haeg, was held at 9:30 a.m. Monday for the purpose of appointing credentials and resolutions committees; these committees met to conduct business at 10:15 a.m. Monday.

Summary of accounting policies

Assets and liabilities and income and expenses are recognized on the accrual basis of accounting. Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Donated materials and services are valued at their estimated fair value at the date they are donated.

Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Costs of newly acquired items, including renewals and replacements which add to the original value or materially extend the useful lives of the related assets, are capitalized and written off as depreciation charges over their estimated useful lives. Costs of assets and the related accumulated depreciation are eliminated from the accounts in the year of sale or retirement.

Gain or loss on disposal of the assets is included in current operations. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The provision for depreciation is calculated based on the following lives:

Personal property	Five to 10 years
Structures and improvements	20 to 50 years
Electrical system	30 years
Fence & guard rails	20 years
Gas distribution system	30 years
Sewer system	20 years
Sidewalks	20 years
Streets, parking lots, curbs & gutters	20 to 30 years
Water distribution system	50 years

Vacation leave is charged to operations only after leave is used rather than as it is earned. The amount of vacation leave earned but not reflected in the financial statements is estimated to be \$41,000.00.

Changes in accounting methods

1. Fixed assets

For the year ended Nov. 30, 1979, and prior years, governmental accounting methods which were considered acceptable for fixed assets and depreciation accounting were consistently followed. Beginning with the current fiscal year, the accounting methods have been changed to comply with generally acceptable accounting principles. The change in accounting methods was also applied retroactive to the fiscal year ended Nov. 30, 1979. This resulted in a reduction of State Fair equity and book value of fixed assets on Nov. 30, 1979, of \$5,194,087.85. Depreciation expense was increased and net profit was decreased by \$60,459.87.

2. Allowance for doubtful accounts

Formerly, accounts receivable of doubtful collection were charged to the allowance account and expense when they were reported to the executive council of the State of Minnesota for cancellation. Beginning Dec. 1, 1979, accounts were charged to the allowance account and bad debt expense when deemed to be of doubtful collection. A review of accounts which were not of the required six year delinquency to be reported to the executive council but were deemed to be of doubtful collection resulted in a retroactive adjustment of the allowance account and a reduction of State Fair equity on Nov. 30, 1979, of \$44,257.06. The change did not affect 1979 income. The Nov. 30, 1979 financial statements are restated to reflect these changes in accounting methods.

Note 5

Contract for deed payable — The contract is dated Nov. 30, 1979, and the rate of interest is six percent. The contract is to be paid in not more than 18 annual installments, each of which shall be equal to or exceed the greater of the following amounts: the interest due on the unpaid balance, or 33 1/3 percent of the gross annual receipts generated by University of Minnesota vehicle parking.

Note 6

Ticket sales, gas and electrical sales and employee cafeteria receipts are shown net of Minnesota sales tax collected; 1980—\$143,761.04, and 1979—\$131,374.14.

Note 7

Off-season rentals — Beginning with the 1980-1981 winter storage season, receipts for storage were collected in advance rather than as stored items are removed from the fairgrounds. This change in payment procedure has resulted in revenue of \$75,266.80 for the 1979-80 storage season and revenue of \$73,525.00 for the 1980-81 season. Both of these totals are included in the 1980 off-season rental income of \$522,106.68.

We have conducted a financial audit of the State Agricultural Society (SAS) for the year ended November 30, 1980. Our audit was conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and was completed on January 28, 1981.

We have issued a qualified opinion on the SAS financial statements due to the accounting policies followed in accounting for personal property items, for the change in method of applying generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) to depreciation of fixed assets and the determination of uncollectible accounts, and for the current method of presenting the financial statements. The value of the personal property account cannot be readily substantiated because of current inventory procedures, and the method of applying GAAP the depreciation of fixed assets and the determination of uncollectible accounts was on a basis not consistent with the previous year. The presentation of financial statements included detailed information not necessary for the fair presentation of financial position and results of operations in conformity with GAAP, did not include one of the required statements, and did not distinguish between operating and non-operating income (loss).

STATE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY
INTRODUCTION

The State Agricultural Society, established under the authority of Minn. Stat. Chapter 37, is the organization responsible for holding the annual State Fair. The Society is composed of members of agricultural societies which hold annual fairs, delegates from counties where no agricultural society exist, honorary members as the result of eminent service in agriculture, and delegates from various agricultural associations. The management and control of the affairs of the Society is vested in a board of managers consisting of a president and nine other members. The Secretary-General Manager is responsible for administration of the State Fair and reports to the board of managers. Michael D. Heffron has served as Secretary-General Manager since October 1, 1976. The organization of the State Fair has been divided into three divisions: the Public Affairs Division; the Operating Division; and the Financial Division.

The Society has operated a State Fair since 1859. These fairs have been held at various locations, and in 1885 Ramsey County donated the current 200 acre site to the Society. Since 1949, the State Fair has been self-sustaining and has invested almost \$9 million in the fairgrounds. The State Fair has grown steadily so that in 1980, receipts totaled \$6,043,541 with an attendance of 1,325,360.

STATUS OF PRIOR AUDIT RECOMMENDATIONS

RECOMMENDATIONS

PROGRESS TOWARD IMPLEMENTATION

The fixed asset, accumulated depreciation, and retained earnings accounts are materially misstated on the SAS balance sheet for the year ended November 30, 1979.

1. SAS should analyze their fixed asset accounts and determine those assets which are presently being utilized, their historical cost, and the date of purchase. — Implemented
2. All improvements should be removed from the structures account and recorded in a separate building improvement account. SAS should then determine an estimated useful life for these assets and begin to depreciate them based on the new life. — Implemented
3. Each fixed asset account should be adjusted to show the historical cost of existing assets. — Implemented
4. Accumulated depreciation should then be adjusted by applying the straight-line method of depreciation in accordance with GAAP. — Implemented
5. A retirement accounting system should be developed by SAS, to ensure the cost and related accumulated depreciation of assets which are destroyed, sold, or traded in are removed from the books. — Partially implemented -
6. A written capitalization policy should be established which includes a minimum dollar amount limit per item. — Implemented
7. The correction of accounting errors described above should be disclosed in the financial statements as a prior period adjustment. — Implemented

The net accounts receivable balance shown on the balance sheet is materially overstated.

8. SAS management should review all outstanding accounts to determine a reasonable estimate for uncollectables. — Implemented
9. Entries should be made to the allowance account at least at the end of each fiscal year so the balance as stated on the balance sheet reflects a current estimate of uncollectible accounts. — Implemented

SAS did not make required footnote disclosures of significant accounting policies followed, and other material financial matters which affect the financial statements.

10. SAS should include in the notes to the financial statements a summary of significant accounting policies, and a description of any material financial matters which affect their financial position and results of operation. — Implemented

Procedures for handling mail receipts do not provide for good control and sometimes result in delays in depositing receipts.

24. Space rental checks should be handled by an individual independent from the posting of related accounting reports. In order to be accountable for checks handled, this individual should prepare an adding machine tape of each day's receipts and submit the tape and the checks to the cashier each day for verification and deposit. — Implemented
25. The cashier should prepare a transmittal listing of all space rental receipts. — Implemented
26. Space rental ledgers should only be updated using transmittal lists with validated deposit slips attached. — Implemented
27. Entry department assistants should prepare an adding machine tape of applications received each day. An individual independent from entry should periodically compare these tapes to the corresponding deposit. — Not implemented -
28. SAS management should make a continuous effort to improve controls over cash receipts. — Implemented

The implementation of a computerized bookkeeping system has resulted in a limited number of staff being assigned several incompatible accounting functions.

29. SAS should require their computer services bureau to maintain a permanent history file on magnetic tape of all transactions entered into the computerized system during the fiscal year. A copy of all other computer files used to produce year-end financial statements should also be retained on magnetic tape. — Recommendation withdrawn

SAS does not provide for adequate separation of duties in some accounting areas.

30. The hiring and check distribution function for fairtime payroll should be handled by individuals independent daily supervisory and timekeeping functions. — Not Implemented
31. Reconciliations of bank accounts should be made by individuals who are not responsible for preparing checks, or recording disbursements. — Implemented
32. A comparison of authorized computer input to output should be made by an individual who is independent from the processing of daily accounting transactions. — Implemented

RECOMMENDATIONS

PROGRESS TOWARD IMPLEMENTATION

Disbursement supporting documentation is not cancelled after final authorization for payment is made on each invoice cover sheet.

33. Immediately after the Finance Director authorizes a disbursement, all supporting documentation should be cancelled with a date stamp and the initials of the individual cancelling the documents. — Implemented

The Finance Director does not review expenditure account classifications prior to final authorization for payment.

34. Account numbers should be recorded on invoice cover sheets before the Finance Director's review and authorization. — Implemented

CURRENT FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

We have examined the financial statements of the State Agricultural Society (SAS) for the year ended November 30, 1980. As part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the SAS system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing, and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but no absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgments by management.

Our study and evaluation of SAS internal accounting control for the year ended November 30, 1980, which was made for the purpose set forth above, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system. However, such study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that we believe to be weaknesses for which corrective action should be taken by management.

The value of the personal property account cannot be readily substantiated.

Total recorded costs of fixed assets for SAS including land, property and equipment was \$9,008,000 net of accumulated depreciation at November 30, 1980. Of this amount, personal property was reported as \$465,700, less accumulated depreciation of \$241,754, for a net balance of \$223,946. We were unable to substantiate the amount because accounting records did not specifically identify each item. SAS has not conducted a systematic annual physical inventory at least in the last five years, nor was any reconciliation made between the control account and detailed inventory records. In the fall of 1979, an inventory of items within each building was conducted, but records of that inventory indicates mainly non-capitalized items such as brushes, brooms and pails were counted.

In our review of ten items purchased during FY 1980, we noticed that only four of the items were recorded on inventory record cards.

The failure to accurately record purchases on the inventory cards, to complete a systematic annual physical inventory, and to reconcile the control accounts to the detailed records has resulted in an account balance for personal property that cannot be readily substantiated.

Recommendations:

1. A systematic physical inventory should be completed on an annual basis.
2. The inventory cards should be updated and reconciled to the physical inventory annually.
3. The amount in the personal property control account should be reconciled to the inventory cards.
4. A written policy should be established indicating what items are to be included in the account, and procedures for recording them on the inventory cards and completing an annual physical inventory.

The current presentation of the financial statements does not provide the necessary information as required by GAAP.

In our review of the financial statements, we noted the following deficiencies:

- There is no separation of operating and non-operating revenues in the income statement.
- The income statement includes unnecessary detailed information.
- There is no retained earnings statement.

The income statement is a statement that summarizes business activities for a given period and reports the net income or loss resulting from operations and from certain other defined activities. This statement is to be directed to many different groups who need to evaluate the results of the business activities. To evaluate the results of the business activities, revenue should be segregated into operating and non-operating income. The income statement of the SAS for fiscal year 1980 includes the sale of property in operating income that reduces the operating loss by \$126,000. The inclusion of the sale of property distorts the results of operations, and is not reflective of the normal operating activities of the SAS. In order to provide the readers of the statements with sufficient information to evaluate the results of operation, the sale of property should be included in the non-operating section of the income statement.

Another element necessary to provide the various readers with means to evaluate the organization is a proper summary of material revenues and expenses in the income statement. This is necessary to provide the reader with essentials so that he can readily discover the important facts of interest. Unnecessary detailed information of all revenues and expenses does not allow the reader the ability to discern important data from non-important data, and provides detailed information not required by various readers. The SAS has included all sources of revenue and objects of expenditures in their income statement resulting in over 150 line items. Preferred practice would be to present only the summary of material revenues and expenditures. Accounting Principles Board (APB) Statement #4 states that supplemental schedules may be provided with the statements to enhance the usefulness of the financial report. The basic financial

statements should present only material information necessary for the reader to make an evaluation of the operations for the year.

Financial statements are the means by which the information accumulated and processed in financial accounting is periodically communicated to those who use it. There are four statements generally issued to present this information: the Balance Sheet, the Income Statement, the Retained Earnings Statement, and the Statement of Changes in Financial Position. The Retained Earnings Statement is necessary in order to present changes in retained earnings resulting from net income provided by the income statement, and adjustments to income of prior periods. The SAS did not include a Statement of Retained Earnings with the other three financial statements. APB Statement #4 requires the inclusion of this statement to communicate the necessary financial information to the users of the statements.

Recommendations:

5. The operating and non-operating income and expense should be segregated on the Income Statement.
6. The Income Statement should be condensed to provide a summary of revenues and expenses for the year. Supplemental schedules containing greater detail supporting these summaries may be included with the basic financial statements in the annual report.
7. A Retained Earnings Statement should be included with the presentation of the other three statements to provide all the information required by generally accepted accounting principles.

Procedures for premium fund activities are not adequate to provide reasonable assurance receipts and disbursements are properly handled and recorded.

During the 1980 State Fair, there were 28 departments providing competition in various activities. For many of these activities, the competitors must submit an entry fee ranging from \$.25 to \$100. Upon completion of the judging, premiums are awarded to winners, and checks are disbursed by SAS.

In fiscal year 1980, 34,378 entries were submitted totaling \$64,000 in entry fees. Disbursements amounting to \$391,367 were awarded to the winning exhibitors. Because of the nature of premium fund activities, one person was assigned to administer the activity, receive and record cash, record the awards, and issue the checks. Ideally, the functions of cash receipts, accounting, and disbursements should be segregated for better internal control. If this is not practical, alternate procedures should be implemented to ensure all fees are recorded, deposited, and premiums are disbursed properly.

Fair officials told us they are aware of the risks of this situation, but feel it is impractical to separate the duties among several people. They stated they have conducted independent internal reviews on a spot-check basis as an alternate control procedure. However, no documentation evidencing such reviews was prepared.

Also, we noted there are no written procedures for the financial management of the premium fund. As an element of internal control, written procedures would help ensure adherence to managerial policies. Without such procedures, the risk of errors or irregularities is increased. Also, written procedures would greatly aid in training new employees.

During our audit, we observed blank checks were stored openly in a room which is accessible to many people. In order to prevent theft, loss or other misuse of checks, they should be kept in a locked file cabinet or safe.

Recommendations:

8. Independent internal reviews of premium fund receipts, disbursements and account records should be documented for post-audit purposes.
9. Written procedures should be established for premium fund administration to provide a reference and a source of instruction for new employees.
10. To provide security over blank checks, they should be stored in a locked cabinet or safe.

There is a need for improved cut-off procedures to determine an accurate accounts payable figure as of November 30.

Accounts payable, which totaled \$86,000 for fiscal year 1980, are those liabilities originating from the purchase and receipt of goods and services. The method used by SAS to determine the amount of payables at November 30, 1980 was to consider invoices paid on December 10, 1980 as accounts payable, assuming the goods and services were received prior to November 30. This method fails to accurately reflect items received by SAS prior to November 30, but not yet billed, and items received in early December but already billed and therefore included in the payments on December 10. Out of the 47 payments reviewed by us, we found two items totaling \$6,500 which were incorrectly included because the goods were not received until after year-end. In a review of purchase orders and receiving reports, we also noted twelve transactions that were omitted totalling \$11,428. These transactions represented goods and services received prior to year-end but for which no invoice had been received by December 10. The net effect is an understatement of liabilities of \$4,928. SAS officials state that at year-end there is a limited time to do a thorough review of accounts payable and to complete all the adjustments to the financial statements. The time required, however, is not great in our opinion. The procedure we used to determine the correct balance of the accounts payable figures took approximately three hours to complete.

Recommendation:

11. SAS officials should develop procedures to determine an accurate cut-off of accounts payable at November 30 each year, including a review of purchase orders and receiving reports as well as invoices.

Internal controls over the administration of fair-time payroll could be improved.

Payroll is a major expenditure of the State Fair, amounting to about \$2 million for fiscal year 1980. There were employed approximately 40 full-time employees with total salaries of \$733,500, and 2,200 fair-time and part-time employees who were paid a total of \$1,265,500 during 1980. In our review of internal control, we concluded that control over regular payroll was adequate. There are no written policies or procedures for the administration of fair-time payroll. The department managers are responsible for the hiring of fair-time employees, maintaining time records, and the distribution of checks. There are insufficient controls to compensate for this lack of segregation of duties. SAS officials feel greater segregation of duties would involve unnecessary cost and staff. We concur with this conclusion; however, alternate procedures such as a spot-check of the distribution of the checks should be considered and implemented.

In our test of fair-time payroll time sheets, we noted a significant number of time sheets not signed by either the employee or the supervisor. Our review of 88 time sheets disclosed that the supervisor had failed to sign 11, and the employees failed to sign 38. In the review of control procedures, we found no written policy communication to the department managers and timekeepers requiring signatures on time sheets. A written policy should help to reduce this problem, as well as provide greater assurance that managerial policies will be followed properly.

Recommendations:

12. Written policies and procedures for fair-time payroll should be established and distributed to provide a source of reference for current and future employees, and to provide greater assurance that managerial policies will be followed properly.
13. Alternate control procedures, such as a spot-check of the distribution of payroll checks, should be considered to mitigate the effect of the lack of segregation of duties in handling fair-time payroll.

We have examined the balance sheets of the State Agricultural Society as of November 30, 1979 and 1980, and the related statements of income and changes in financial position for the years then ended. Except as stated in paragraph one below, our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

1. A complete physical inventory of personal property capital items had not been taken as of November 30, 1980. Due to the condition of the inventory records, we were unable to satisfy ourselves as to the value of the personal property items at November 30, 1980 by means of other auditing procedures.
2. As explained in Note 1 of the changes in accounting methods, there has been a change in the method of determining the value of fixed assets and the corresponding depreciation expense. Because of the change in the method of determination of the value of the assets, there is a lack of consistency between fiscal years 1979 and 1980.
3. The method of determining the uncollectible accounts, as explained in Note 2 of the changes in accounting methods, has been changed to more accurately reflect current collectibility. As a result, \$44,257 should have been included in the operating statement for fiscal year 1980, increasing the net loss to approximately \$52,000.
4. The income statement for fiscal year 1980 includes the sale of property in operating income. This increased operating income by \$126,000. The income statement has not been adjusted to reflect the correct results of operation including the amount described in item 3. The net operating loss for the year, therefore, was approximately \$178,000.
5. There is no retained earnings statement included with the financial statements. Generally accepted accounting principles require the presentation of a retained earnings statement to provide readers with the necessary information to evaluate the results of operation.

In our opinion, except for the matters discussed under items 4 and 5, and subject to the effects of the adjustment, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to determine the value of personal property on hand at November 30 1980, as discussed under item 1 above, the financial statements present fairly the financial position of the State Agricultural Society at November 30, 1979 and 1980, and the results of operation and changes in financial position for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, except for the changes (in which we concur) for the method of depreciating fixed assets and determining uncollectible accounts discussed above in paragraph 2 and 3.

Summary of accounting policies

Assets and liabilities and income and expenses are recognized on the accrual basis of accounting. Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Donated materials and services are valued at their estimated fair value at the date they were donated.

Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Costs of newly acquired items, including renewals and replacements which add to the original value or materially extend the useful lives of the related assets, are capitalized and written off as depreciation charges over their estimated useful lives. Costs of assets and the related accumulated depreciation are eliminated from the accounts in the year of sale or retirement. Gain or loss on disposal of the assets is included in current operations. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The provision for depreciation is calculated based on the following lives:

Vacation leave is charged to operations only after leave is used rather than as it is earned. The amount of vacation leave earned but not reflected in the financial statements is estimated to be \$41,000.00.

Changes in accounting methods

1. Fixed assets

For the year ended November 30, 1979, and prior years, governmental accounting methods which were considered acceptable for fixed assets and depreciation accounting were consistently followed. Beginning with the current fiscal year, the accounting methods have been changed to comply with generally acceptable accounting principles. The change in accounting methods was also applied retroactive to the fiscal year ended November 30, 1979. This resulted in a reduction of State Fair equity and book value of fixed assets on November 30, 1979, of \$5,194,087.85. Depreciation expense was increased and net profit was decreased by \$60,459.87.

2. Allowance for doubtful accounts

Formerly, accounts receivable of doubtful collection were charged to the allowance account and expensed when they were reported to the executive council of the State of Minnesota for cancellation. Beginning December 1, 1979, accounts were charged to the allowance account and bad debt expense when deemed to be of doubtful collection. A review of accounts which were not of the required six year delinquency to be reported to the executive council but were deemed to be of doubtful collection resulted in a retroactive adjustment of the allowance account and a reduction of State Fair equity on November 30, 1979, of \$44,257.06. The change did not affect 1979 income. The November 30, 1979 financial statements are restated to reflect these changes in accounting methods.

Note 5

Contract for deed payable — The contract is dated November 30, 1979, and the rate of interest is six percent. The contract is to be paid in not more than 18 annual installments, each of which shall be equal to or exceed the greater of the following amounts: the interest due on the unpaid balance, or 33 1/3 percent of the gross annual receipts generated by University of Minnesota vehicle parking.

Note 6

Ticket sales, gas and electrical sales and employee cafeteria receipts are shown net of Minnesota sales tax collected, 1980—\$143,761.04, and 1979—\$131,374.14.

Note 7

Off-season rentals — Beginning with the 1980-1981 winter storage season, receipts for storage were collected in advance rather than as stored items are removed from the fairgrounds. This change in payment has resulted in revenue of \$75,266.80 for the 1979-1980 storage season and revenue of \$73,525.00 for the 1980-1981 season. Both of these totals are included in the 1980 off-season rental income of \$522,106.68.

RESPONSE TO AUDITOR'S REPORT

Per your request, I am providing herewith a written response to certain findings as summarized in your preliminary audit report on the Minnesota State Agricultural Society for the year ending November 30, 1980.

The evaluation of Society personal property accounts covered in recommendations 1-4 of your report is currently under study by this agency. Said recommendations will be implemented to the greatest extent possible given that the cost of integrating such procedures should not exceed the benefits to be derived therefrom.

The problems inherent in the taking of an annual physical inventory include allocation of labor costs and time to accomplish such a task. Our current accumulation of furniture and fixtures, office and service equipment, vehicles, machinery and tools is summarized on over 1,500 inventory cards and; such assets are located in 50 buildings plus a number of outdoor locations. To complicate the

process, these assets are regularly moved from place to place as use patterns change.

Moreover, we have experienced difficulty with inventory identification labels becoming dislodged with heavy use and; finally, many older inventory cards do not contain information on acquisition costs making it impossible to accurately reconcile the true value of some assets to the personal property control account.

A complete physical inventory will be taken in 1981, and the process will be repeated (at least) every third year. A specific written policy statement is being prepared to cover procedural matters in this regard.

Your recommendations 5-7 will be implemented.

The procedures recommended in 8-10 are now in place.

Our finance division will provide for a more accurate cutoff on accounts payable as specified in your recommendation 11.

With regard to recommendations 12-13, and as we agreed during audit exit conference of 2-5-81, a written policy/procedure on fair-period payrolls will be prepared for distribution to department superintendents; further, an internal audit and "spot-check" process on the distribution of payroll checks will be implemented with documentation provided for post audit.

I appreciate your cooperation in dealing with Society fiscal matters. If I can be of any assistance in the ongoing audit process, please let me know.

NO CONCESSION/EXHIBIT MAY BE OPEN FOR BUSINESS IN ADVANCE OF 6 A.M. THE FIRST DAY OF THE ANNUAL STATE FAIR WITHOUT THE PRIOR WRITTEN CONSENT OF THE SPACE RENTAL SUPERINTENDENT.

Beginning the Saturday preceding the first day of the Fair and continuing through 6:00 a.m. on the Fair's first day, the Fairgrounds will be closed to all persons not involved in preparation for the Fair.

Persons entering the grounds between Midnight and 6 a.m., in addition to paying the established fee, will be required to provide appropriate proof of their having business on the grounds during non-operating hours.

AMPLIFIERS AND LOUDSPEAKERS:

No loudspeaker, amplifier, radio or other broadcasting device will be permitted on the Fairgrounds, unless permission is first obtained from the Space Rental Superintendent.

Cross Country Catering be confirmed based on a concern for sufficient space and an obvious duplication of products this application would represent. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mr. David L. G. Jones appeared before the meeting to request reconsideration of his application, denied by the Space Rental Department on March 3, 1980. It was moved by Mr. Scow, seconded by Mr. Lilliquist and carried that if acceptable space in an appropriate location were to become available for the 1980 State Fair, Mr. Jones' application be given further consideration (Aye-4; Nay-0).

The application for a Maid-Rite Shop concession submitted by Mr. Ron Kiffmeyer was presented to the meeting for further consideration along with the comments and further product description of Mr. Kiffmeyer. It was moved by Mr. Scow, seconded by Mr. Carnes and carried that the initial decision of the Space Rental Department regarding this application be confirmed unless appropriate space were to become available for the 1980 State Fair. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mr. Sinclair appraised the Committee of circumstances surrounding the application for rental space of Mr. DuWayne O. Lohrke, Sr. as well as the fact that Mr. Lohrke had been a concessionaire at the 1978 and 1979 State Fairs. Relative to Mr. Lohrke's request for the opportunity to change the products he offers at the State Fair, which had been previously denied by the Space Rental Department, a motion was made by Mr. Lilliquist, seconded by Mrs. Roehlke and carried that Mr. Lohrke be allowed to sell wood roses from the concession location he held at the 1978 and 1979 Fairs (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Upon a motion by Mr. Carnes, seconded by Mr. Scow and carried, the decision of the Space Rental Department relative to the application of Chadha Imports-Exports was confirmed based on a concern for geographic balance and duplication of products similar to those applied for by Mr. Chadha. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mr. Sinclair presented a letter from C.M.B. Enterprises requesting that the decision of the Space Rental Department to deny its application be given further consideration. Concern for sufficient space, duplication of similar products and the geographical balance of such items on the State Fairgrounds prompted a motion by Mr. Carnes, seconded by Mr. Lilliquist and carried, to confirm the previous decision of the Space Rental Department regarding this application (Aye-4; Nay-0).

It was moved by Mr. Carnes, seconded by Mrs. Roehlke and carried, that the committee take a position on the Space Rental Application of Mr. Leo C. Kasinak analogous to the decision made on a similar application by Mr. Kasinak in 1979. This position being, that the miniature train Mr. Kasinak would like to place on the State Fairgrounds is attractive and would be an asset to the Fair. Moreover, should appropriate and esthetically acceptable space become available for such an operation, the application of Mr. Kasinak should be given every consideration possible. Until such time, the decision of the Space Rental Department is confirmed. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

A request by Mrs. Betty L. Miller for the reconsideration of the application she submitted to the Space Rental Department on February 12, 1980 was reviewed by the Committee. Mrs. Miller received a brief explanation of the basis upon which approval of her application was withheld. A motion by Mr. Carnes, seconded by Mr. Scow and carried to give every further consideration to Mrs. Miller's application should space appropriate to her operation become available was approved. Mr. Ted Quick of Royal Prestige of Iowa, Inc. appeared before the committee to request review of the Space Rental Department's earlier decision to deny his application. After a brief explanation by Mr. Sinclair as to why this applicant had been denied and Mr. Quick's further insight into the products and services of his firm, a motion was made by Mr. Lilliquist, seconded by Mr. Scow and carried that the earlier decision of the Space Rental Department be upheld due to concern for sufficient space, duplication of similar products at the State Fair and the resultant regard to geographic balance of products. Transfer of the Big Outdoors People, Inc., geodesic dome structure located in Block 44 to Andrew Rush for the presentation of an oceanographic exhibit/display was given lengthy discussion and decision deferred for further consideration at a scheduled meeting of the Space Rental Committee on Wednesday, June 18, 1980 after interim study by State Fair Staff. A. Limbeck, broken auto windshield, \$178.48; Ralph Nelson, bent trailer hitch, \$207.50. Four claims, involving property damage sustained by Leslie Frishman, Kevin Hohn, Charles Tierney and Roger Czerniak, were rejected on the basis that negligence was not established (Aye-9; Nay-0).

Mr. Blustin showed committee several of the products he proposed to offer if granted concession space as well as an artist's drawing to his proposed concession booth. Upon considering the information and materials supplied by Mr. Blustin, it was moved by Mr. Scow, seconded by Mrs. Roehlke and carried that the initial decision of the Space Rental Department to deny Mr. Blustin's application be upheld due to concern for duplication of products and lack of appropriate space. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Space Rental application of Mr. John Isaksen for Discover Minnesota was placed before the committee for consideration along with samples of products supplied by Mr. Isaksen. Upon consideration of comments made by the staff relative to Mr. Isaksen's present interest in the State Fair and Mr. Isaksen's comments relative to the application he had submitted, a motion was made by Mr. Carnes seconded by Mr. Ramberg and carried that application be denied based on Mr. Isaksen's present interest in the State Fair and the considerations initially stated by State Fair staff in their first consideration of said application i.e. location requested, lack of appropriate space at the time of application. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Upon a motion by Mr. Scow, seconded by Mr. Carnes and carried, the committee directed the Space Rental Department to make every effort to accommodate the request of Mr. Michael Reed Pinkus to sell Haagen Dazs Ice Cream at the Minnesota State Fair. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

It was moved by Mr. Ramberg, seconded by Mr. Scow and carried that the decision of the Space Rental Department relative to the application for rental space of Mr. Gary Bidne under the name Impulse Products, Inc. for the sale of t-shirts and transfers be upheld based on a concern for duplication of products, geographic balance and lack of sufficient space available. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

A motion was made by Mr. Ramberg, seconded by Mr. Scow and carried that Mr. Arthur Desplenter be advised that t-shirts do not fit the committee's conception of a novelty item under the terms of the State Fair's contract for space rental with Mr. Desplenter and that any such locations Mr. Desplenter has been operating as t-shirt concessions should be converted to the traditional committee conception of a novelty operation or Mr. Desplenter should divest himself of such locations on the Minnesota State Fairgrounds. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mr. James Bennyhoff was presented to the Committee per his request for review of the Space Rental Department's decision to deny his application for rental space and on a motion by Mr. Carnes; seconded by Mrs. Roehlke and carried, the staff was directed to make every effort to accommodate Mr. Bennyhoff with space for his color analysis computer at the 1980 Minnesota State Fair. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mrs. Georgene Dowell and Mrs. Mary Wagner appeared before the committee for reconsideration of their application for The Treat Truck. After discussion regarding the products offered as per the application, the committee felt it best to uphold the initial decision of the Space Rental Department to deny said application based on a concern for duplication of products, balance and lack of sufficient space to accommodate an operation of the size proposed. Moved by Mr. Ramberg, seconded by Mr. Scow and carried (Aye-4; Nay-0).

It was moved by Mr. Scow, seconded by Mr. Ramberg and carried that the application of North Star Beverages, Inc. — The Pop Shoppe, brought before the committee for review by Mr. E. John Zavitz be denied as per earlier Space Rental Department action due to the late date at which said application was received by the Fair. (Aye-4; Nay-0).

The Space Rental application of F.A.S.T. Computer Portraits was submitted by Mr. Terry Flaherty for reconsideration by the Space Rental Committee. After discussion with Mr. Flaherty, it was moved by Mr. Ramberg, seconded by Mrs. Roehlke and carried that the decision of the Space Rental Department relative to this application should be upheld based on a concern for over saturation of the Fair market with operations similar to that proposed by Mr. Flaherty (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mr. Sinclair presented a letter from Hydraulic & Heavy Equipment, Inc. to the committee along with comments on the Space Rental Department's inability to accommodate said applicant based on lack of space of a size necessary to accommodate the applicant. On a motion by Mr. Ramberg, seconded by Mr. Carnes and carried, the staff was directed to give said application every consideration possible if appropriate space should become available for the 1980 Minnesota State Fair (Aye-4; Nay-0).

Mr. Donald Rush and Mr. Dennis Kelly appeared before the committee pursuant to the Space Rental Committee decision at their June 13, 1980 meeting to defer action on the transfer of The Big Outdoors People, Inc. geodesic dome structure located in Block 44 on the State Fairgrounds to Mr. Andrew Rush for an oceanographic exhibit. At this time, Messrs. Rush and Kelly advised the committee of their inability to come to an agreement for transfer due to Mr. Rush's concern over the lack of time to develop a suitable exhibit for the 1980 Fair. Based on said concern, Mr. Kelly withdrew his proposed request for transfer to Mr. Rush and advised the committee that he would present an exhibit of geodesic dome structures along with information and product literature on same at the 1980 State Fair and would make every effort to improve and enhance the look and appearance of this facility for the 1980 Fair.

Meeting was called to order by Mr. Korff at 9:30 a.m.

Sinclair presented figures comparing income from beer sales, percentage attractions and carnival receipts in 1980 to those in 1979. Income from beer sales at the 1980 State Fair exceeded that of 1979 by \$13,335.16. At the same time, percentage attractions showed a decrease in receipts of \$63,765.32 from 1979 to 1980. For the most part, those percentage attractions which experienced receipt increases owed them to changes in ticket prices; with the exception of the Sky Ride which did not operate during one day of the State Fair for maintenance reasons and the carnival which probably experienced its decrease due to inclement weather. Carnival income from game/concession footage increased by \$16,545.00 from 1979 to 1980 due to an increase in rate of \$3.00 per front foot. (1979 carnival footage rate was \$32.00 per front foot while the 1980 rate was \$35.00.)

A picture of budgeted income for the Space Rental Department as related to actual revenue was also presented to the committee indicating \$64,073.25 more was earned than had been projected.

Information relative the total number of concession/exhibit/gratis contracts issued in 1980; the renewal process for rental space at the 1981 State Fair (underway at the time of this meeting); letters which were sent to six exhibitors/concessionaires who could be denied the opportunity to renew space for the 1981 Fair and; correspondence to several other concessionaires/exhibitors requesting that they undertake substantial improvement of their operations for the 1981 State Fair before they are allowed to renew were also brought to the attention of the Committee.

Discussion was undertaken regarding proposed sale of the Sky Ride by Group Amusement Ownership Plan, Inc. pursuant to a meeting Heffron and Wenzel had with Messrs. Bart Blinstrup and John Reibold, October 29, 1980. It was noted that Group Amusement would like to actively seek sealed bids through local and trade publications for potential buyers with the understanding that the attraction would either continue to operate on the State Fairgrounds or be removed from same for the 1981 State Fair. Moreover, the Committee was advised that a full understanding of what is being bought and sold plus the fact that any potential buyer must be knowledgeable that Space Rental contracts for the Fair are granted only on a one year basis was reiterated at the October 28 meeting.

The Committee expressed concerns pertaining to the possible dormancy of the Sky Ride and whether it might be torn down and removed from the Fairgrounds. Significance was also given to the fact that this attraction has become a "landmark" and an integral attraction of the Fair and that the Fair in any event must use utmost care in approving a potential buyer who would continue to operate the Sky Ride in a qualified, competent and concerned manner with proper ride maintenance and safety in the best interest of the fair and the fair-going public.
