#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Community Development activities included:

NEEDS ASSESSMENT: A needs assessment involving community leaders from the Region 5 area was conducted for the Central Minnesota Initiative Fund.

GRANT APPLICATIONS: As an integral part of Region 5 assistance to small cities in financing capital improvements such as water and sanitary sewer systems, the Commission prepared an application to the Community Development Block Grant Program for Hewitt (Todd County).

The Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation Board also has a program for assisting communities in economic development and capital improvements. A project profile for the Serpent Lake Sanitary Sewer District (Crow Wing County) has been completed.

Region 5 also assists communities in financing recreational facilities through the Outdoor Recreation Grants Program. An application for the City of Buckman (Morrison County) has been completed and submitted to the Department of Trade and Economic Development.

<u>COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS</u>: The Commission facilitated a brainstorming session for the Browerville Hospital Committee to generate ideas on how to utilize the hospital building for economic and community development.

Informational assistance was provided in the start-up phase of the PAC-4 Development Group located in Cass Lake.

The Commission is in the process of completing a Comprehensive Plan for Morrison County.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS: A major area of interest is in the use of the Central Minnesota area's increasingly sophisticated telecommunications network for development purposes. Region 5 a project developed coordination with the Mid-state Educational Telecommunications Cooperative, Freshwater Educational District. Minnesota Extension, Institute's and Brainerd Community College, and the regional libraries to use the interactive television system to hold a series of town meetings among eighteen central Minnesota communities to develop a regional approach to development issues. The telecommunications network is crucial to community-to-community communication and to developing the necessary interdependence among local communities which can lead to successful development initiatives. Seven town meetings were held, covering such topics as community development, small businesses, rural education, and agriculture.

#### PROGRAMS FOR OLDER PERSONS

The Minnesota Board on Aging has designated the Region 5 Development Commission as the official Area Agency on Aging for Cass, Crow Wing, Morrison, Todd, and Wadena Counties. As such, the primary mission of the Region 5 Area Agency on Aging is to plan, coordinate, and advocate for the development of a comprehensive service delivery system to meet the short and long-term needs of older persons. The Area Agency on Aging's responsibility is to ensure that the genuine needs of older persons are being served in a cost effective and equitable manner.

To guide its activities, the Region 5 Area Agency on Aging has prepared a four-year plan, 1987-1990. Based on the priorities established in this plan, Table 1 shows the services which are projected for 1988.

The activities of the Region 5 Area Agency on Aging are guided by a fifteen-member advisory Council on Aging. The Council on Aging is comprised of representatives for older persons and service providers. They develop policies and priorities, recommend action on grant applications and conduct the Annual Conference on Aging.

The Region 5 Development Commission takes final action on major policy decisions, budget approvals, and grant awards. The total project costs for the grants awarded by the Region 5 Development Commission annually amount to approximately \$1.4 million. Table 2 identifies the type of funds used to finance a wide array of services:

Several important projects and activities were either initiated or completed during the year. The Sixth Annual Conference, "Get Up and Do It" held in Wadena, was attended by a crowd of 200 persons. Topics covered included: Be a Heart Savor, Save A Heart!; Using Psychology To Avoid Tension; Toy Making; Etc. Funding was awarded to Pierz Senior Citizens Center for construction of an addition onto their present building.

Quarterly, the Region 5 Area Agency on Aging draws together the presidents of the County Councils on Aging, County Coordinators on Aging, and other appropriate providers. The purpose of these meetings is to share information, coordinate our activities, and form another necessary link between the Area Agency on Aging and the individual counties.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Economic Development staff wrote a \$110,000 Small Cities Economic Development Grant Application for the City of Pillager.

The staff supported the work of the regional loan fund corporation, the North Central Economic Development Association, Inc., which has approved 15 loans totaling \$320,000.

The staff worked with the City of Clarissa and the Clarissa Development Corporation to help local businesses access state programs.

Staff worked with businesses throughout the region in their efforts to obtain financing.

Staff assisted the City of Cass Lake to form an Economic Development Group, cooperated with Central Minnesota Initiative Fund in providing technical assistance to businesses for loan packaging. Staff also participated at informational meetings for businesses in Pine River, Deerwood, Wadena, Clarissa, Bertha, Walker, Pillager to provide information on loan programs and other business services available.

MINNESOTA MARKETPLACE: Minnesota Marketplace is an economic development program designed to create jobs and retain dollars in the local economy. We do this by helping businesses find local suppliers for the goods and services they are currently or will be purchasing in the next year. This program has been in place since May 1, 1987 in Region 5.

To date we have created 1 job, retained 20 jobs and assisted in contract awards of \$112,000 to local suppliers.

Primary funding for this program is the Blandin Foundation, with supplementary funding from the McKnight Foundation.

#### PHYSICAL RESOURCES

The Commission, through its Transportation Council (TC), has continued to monitor local, state, and federal transportation programs and legislation that has regional significance. It also acts as a liaison between the Minnesota Department of Transportation and the legislature on transportation issues in Region 5.

A Supplemental Passenger Survey Report for the Economic Impact Study of the Brainerd-Crow Wing County Airport was completed. This report examined the accuracy of the passenger surveys completed for the study. The Region 5 Highway Jurisdiction Study that examined the appropriateness of road ownership and potential impacts of jurisdictional transfers was completed in July, 1987.

Region 5 has been assisting MN/DOT in their Market Artery Study through reviewing preliminary results and publicizing public hearings. Region 5 also assisted in promoting the Legislature Transportation Finance Study Commission's meeting that was held at Breezy Point.

Region 5 has continued to place emphasis on providing transportation technical assistance. Projects in the last year provided assistance to organizations applying for federal 16(b)(2) funds for the purchase of vehicles for transit services for the elderly and handicapped.

Region 5 has been assisting the Ski-Gull downhill ski area in the development of a comprehensive plan and development guide to assist the Ski-Gull Board of Directors in making planned improvements of the ski area. The Ski Gull Comprehensive Plan and Development Guide was completed in April, 1988. Assistance has also been provided for communities in applying for the Outdoor Recreation Grants program.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE: Townships continue to receive assistance in re-recording their roadway easements through the Region 5 Road Recording Program. Region 5 updates fire department and township fire maps, and city and township street, zoning and other specialty maps. Nineteen townships have completed re-recording roadway easements and two others are in various stages of completion. Several governmental units have had fire maps constructed or revised in the past year, and one developed a zoning map.

#### CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The Region 5 Arts Program awarded \$36,445 in FY88. This included \$6,800 of McKnight Foundation funds for semi-professional arts organizations. Also awarded was \$29,645 of Minnesota State Arts Board grant funds for sponsorship or arts development in Region 5. The organizations which received these funds are listed in Tables 1 and 2.

The Region 5 Arts Program staff provides technical assistance to individuals and groups on such matters as grants writing, availability of funds, resource lists, and other technical help with arts projects.

It also produces a monthly newsletter about arts activities of interest to people of the region.

#### COORDINATION

During Fiscal Year 1988, Region 5 has contracted with other agencies for the provision of basic administrative services. Those services include but are not limited to the following:

CASS-TODD-WADENA-MORRISON COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES: The Cass-Todd-Wadena-Morrison Community Health Services Board of Health has contracted with Region 5 for provision of administrative services including basic clerical services, meeting notices, minutes, financial reporting requirements. These services are provided on an ongoing basis.

SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION BOARD: The Minnesota Department of Agriculture contracts with Region 5 to provide to the District Office of the Soil and Water Conservation Board basic clerical and telephone answering services. These services include miscellaneous typing, newsletter production and telephone service.

BLOCK GRANT ADMINISTRATION: During FY88 the Cities of Browerville and Buckman contracted with Region 5 for administrative services related to the Small Cities Development Grants they received. The services include basic administration of the grant relating to environmental concerns, Davis-Bacon laws, fair housing, and equal opportunity requirements as well as financial services including accounting, requests for cash and payment of bills, and quarterly reporting and assistance with audits.

REGION 5 LEGISLATIVE MEETINGS: The Counties of Cass, Crow Wing, Morrison, Todd and Wadena have enlisted the services of Region 5 to coordinate meetings between the five county boards and the area legislators on a bi-monthly basis. The purpose of the meetings are to share information and provide input on Region-wide concerns. These services include meeting notices, minutes and forwarding of resolutions and other concerns to state agencies and legislature.

#### INFORMATIONAL SERVICES

Region 5 Development Commission is a Regional Information Center for many types of information including but not limited to management and administration, community development, economic development, transportation, health issues, programs for older persons, cultural activities, developmental disabilities programs and census data.

The information is available through various methods including a library, a computer modem linking Region 5 with the data-net service bank at the state level, referrals and two newsletters published and distributed on at least a bi-monthly basis by Region 5.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROLS (ACCOUNTING AND ADMINISTRATIVE)
BASED ON A STUDY AND EVALUATION MADE AS A PART OF AN EXAMINATION
OF THE GENERAL PURPOSE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND THE
ADDITIONAL TESTS REQUIRED BY THE SINGLE AUDIT ACT

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Region 5 Regional Development Commission for the year ended June 30, 1987, and have issued our opinion thereon dated November 20, 1987. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the internal control systems, including applicable internal administrative controls, used in administering federal financial assistance programs to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the systems as required by generally accepted auditing standards, the standards for financial and compliance audits contained in the Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities, and Functions, issued by the U.S. General Accounting Office, the Single Audit Act of 1984, and the provisions of OMB Circular A-128, Audits of State and Local Governments. For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal accounting and administrative controls used in administering federal financial assistance programs in the following categories:

The management of the Region 5 Regional Development Commission is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control systems used in administering federal financial assistance programs. In fulfilling that responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of internal control systems used in administering federal financial assistance programs are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that, with respect to federal financial assistance programs, resource use is consistent with laws, regulations, and policies; resources are safeguarded against waste, loss, and misuse; and reliable data are obtained, maintained, and fairly disclosed in reports.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting and administrative controls used in administering federal financial assistance programs, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the systems to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study included all of the applicable control categories listed above. During the year ended June 30, 1987, Region 5 Regional Development Commission expended 100 percent of its total federal financial assistance under the following major and nonmajor federal financial assistance programs:

With respect to internal control systems used in administering these major and nonmajor federal financial assistance programs, our study and evaluation included:

- considering the types of errors and irregularities that could occur.
- determining the internal control procedures that should prevent or detect such errors and irregularities,
- determining whether the necessary procedures are prescribed and are being followed satisfactorily, and
- evaluating any weaknesses.

Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the internal control systems used in administering the federal financial assistance programs of the Region 5 Regional Development Commission.

Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the internal control systems used in administering the federal financial assistance programs of Region 5 Regional Development Commission. Further, we do not express an opinion on the internal control systems used in administering the major federal financial assistance programs of the Region 5 Regional Development Commission.

Also, our examination, made in accordance with the standards mentioned above, would not necessarily disclose material weaknesses in the internal control systems used solely in administering nonmajor federal financial assistance programs.

However, our study and evaluation disclosed no conditions that we believed to be a material weakness in relation to the federal financial assistance programs of Region 5 Regional Development Commission.
