

AGING

The federal Older Americans Act (OAA) of 1965, as amended, provides the guidance and philosophical foundation for the NWRDC Area Agency on Aging (AAA) and the 669 AAA's throughout the United States. OAA funding for our Region is received through the Minnesota Board on Aging for the purpose of providing advocacy and supporting services which assist the older citizens of Region I in maintaining dignity and independence.

The services of the NWRDC AAA include regional planning, direct project funding, information and coordination, technical assistance and special projects. We have described the highlights of those services below.

Planning: Planning functions of the AAA include identification of needs and the regranting of funds to meet priority needs. Needs assessments questionnaires completed by seniors throughout the region were analyzed and compiled into a report for distribution to seniors and service providers in 1991. Preliminary results were used by the AAA for setting priorities and developing funding and program development goals and objectives.

Follow-up planning assistance was provided to County Committees on Aging in the development of 1991 plans, and will be ongoing, as requested.

Project Funding: The 1991-1992 Area Plan on Aging was approved for funding by the Minnesota Board on Aging and grants to local agencies were provided for nutrition, in-home, access, and legal services. (See listing page 9). Nutrition is a priority service and AAA staff work closely with LSS and the Nutrition Project Council.

Coordination and Information: Dr. Stanley Sahlstrom provided the keynote address to the 330 in attendance at the 16th Annual Fall Conference on Aging held at UMC August 28, 1990. He discussed seniors as a powerful, untapped community resource. "Granny", Dorothy Stager of Pipestone, entertained following the noon meal with her hilarious brand of aging humor. The theme of the Conference was:

"Sensational Seniors = Positive Force"

Policy: Review of legislation and comment on policies that affect seniors were priorities of AAA advocacy activities in FY'91. A legislative forum featured all six area legislators and provided seniors with the opportunity to discuss issues of concern.

Technical Assistance: Trainings on how to write a life plan and organize one's personal records were provided and 350 "I Have Put My House in Order" brochures were distributed at Senior Option Showcase '91 in Fargo. "A Directory of Resources and Programs for Older Persons in Northwest Minnesota" was also distributed at Senior Options and throughout the region. "The

Caregiver", written and published by a coalition of service providers, was distributed with assistance from the AAA. Technical assistance, training, education and information coordination remain priority activities.

Workshops on Coya Knutson, Informed Charitable Giving, Seasoned Leaders, Stress Management, Music Therapy, Physical Fitness, Microwave Cooking, Planning Ahead, Legal Rights and Communication gave seniors additional information and service providers were able to obtain clock hours and CEU's. An expanded resource display and drawing for door prizes, a new feature, added interest and variety.

The day concluded with two short plays, "If You Live You Get Old" and "Running Away From Home" by the Prairie Wind Players of Barrett. The presentations involved audience participation on issues of aging and services available to seniors to help maintain independence.

Special Projects: The Aging Advisory Committee awarded Jane Croeker a plaque in appreciation her outstanding service in the Senior leadership Development Project and senior representatives shared their experiences with the project at the Fall Conference. The project, funded by the NWMIF, completed it's tasks in 1991.

A brochure of higher education opportunities for region I seniors was developed and distributed.

A series of Supplemental Security Income Seminars were organized and videotaped for distribution, through cooperation with the Grand Forks Regional Social Security Office and Northwest Minnesota Legal Services. The NWRDC AAA received an Outstanding Community Services Award from the Social Security Administration for the cooperative efforts.

Funds were secured from the Otto Bremer Foundation to enhance information coordination in the Bremer Bank communities of Region I.

ARTS

Promoting, stimulating, and supporting arts activities are the goals of the multi-disciplinary Arts Council of the Northwest Regional Development Commission. Technical Assistance and financial resources are provided to non-profit tax-exempt organizations, schools, and units of government for art projects. The Council's mission to expand the skills and capabilities of arts organizations us supported by funding from the Minnesota State Legislature and the McKnight Foundation's Arts Funding Plan.

Matching grants of up to \$3,000 were provided to organizations for arts projects. In Fiscal Year 1991, Local/Regional Arts Development funds in the amount of \$12,926.00 were awarded to area arts organizations with funding from the State of Minnesota.

ECONOMIC & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of the Economic and Community Development Program of the Commission, is to assist both private and public sector efforts to create new jobs and to improve the quality of life in Northwestern Minnesota. Funding for these programs comes from the Federal Economic Development Administration, the local tax levy and contracts with local units of government.

The Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) is the document that contains the work program that guides staff throughout the year. Local input and direction for the OEDP is accomplished through contacts with local government officials, state legislators, government staff, business leaders, manufacturers and others through the Commission's Economic Development Planning Committee and NWRDC staff.

The Economic Development Planning Committee, which serves as the vehicle for local input, is made up of two persons from each County who are recommended for membership by their respective Board of County Commissioners.

The following is a summary of work activities carried out in 1991 using the major work program categories as established in the OEDP:

Regional Planning: The Overall Economic Development Program was updated and the County Summaries completed. Staff presented the 1991 update of the OEDP to each of the County Boards and each County approved the updated version. Staff is in the process of gathering information for a Directory of Manufacturers in the region. The purpose of this directory is to encourage better networking of industries and for use as a tool for marketing local industry outside the area.

Local Planning: Staff developed "Blueprint for Betterment" A Condensed Approach to Planning for Smaller Communities. The purpose of this program is to provide a planning approach that is designed to meet the needs of individual communities. An Economic/Community Development Video Library has been started to provide communities with a resource for leadership development and to motivate communities to take an active roll in determining their futures. Staff continued working on the Roseau County Growth Management Process, assisted North and Norden townships with township zoning, and had contact with over 80 units of government, individuals, and groups providing information on a variety of subjects.

Grant Writing: Assistance was provided to Thief River Falls, Warroad and Roseau on the preparation of pre-apps for EDA Public Works funding. The Roseau and Thief River Falls full applications were approved. Additional assistance was given to Roseau on the preparation of a State Economic Development Grant. Assistance was provided to Red Lake Falls, Shelly, St.

Hilaire, Crookston, Stephen, Strandquist, Halstad, Plummer, Warroad, Roseau, Warren and Crookston on Community Development Block Grant applications to serve a variety of community development needs. Successful applicants included Crookston and Strandquist. Seventy-one contacts were made with communities or groups on funding issues.

Innovation: The School Innovation Project was developed to foster the development of home-grown industry in the Region. "Operation Earmuff", encourages and teaches young people, parents and teachers to think innovatively. This project was launched in January with 12 schools participating. This ongoing project is a cooperative effort by three area agencies, namely the Northwest Regional Development Commission, Northwest Medical Center and the Northwest Educational Cooperative Service Unit.

Financing Industry: Fifty-nine contacts were made dealing with a variety of industrial and business concerns. Issues ranged from simply providing information to providing extensive assistance on the packaging and organization of an expansion or start-up. Initial work on the re-capitalization of the loan fund was completed. Commitments are in the process of being obtained.

Agricultural Value Added: The Commission entered into an agreement with the Mn Rural Development Board to assist in the allocation of approximately \$42,000 in state grant funds for the purpose of promoting agricultural value added and alternative crops. Seven groups or individuals were awarded grants of up to \$10,000 to help move their project closer to the financing and/or marketing stage. Staff have continued working with Northern Produce in terms of promoting the growing and processing of vegetables.

Tourism: The 1991 Edition of the Northwest Minnesota Visitor's and Recreation Guide was completed and distributed throughout the Region. Seven communities have been given information and/or assistance regarding Park and Recreation Grants. Staff met with the Riverland and Borderland Tourism groups providing them with information and marketing suggestions.

International Trade: The Commission received notice that the EDA Technical Assistance funding had been approved for the Red River Trade Corridor Project. Initial work on development of a data base and a marketing piece to promote the Corridor have been completed. Staff met with members of the Eastern Manitoba Regional Development Corporation in an effort to better understand each others programs.

TRANSPORTATION & NATURAL RESOURCES


The NWRDC Transportation Program provides services to the local area and the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MN/DOT) in relationship to local aspects of transportation planning. The Commission's Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) provides the policy input for those services by making recommendations on a variety of subjects. The following is a review of the major activities which took place during the year in the Transportation:

Planning: The Transportation Advisory Committee and staff completed the update of the Regional Transportation Plan. The Transportation Plan reviews all the available transportation modes and systems in the region and uses that information to determine where the region is lacking, needs improvement or should be left alone. The plan gives consideration to both local input by residents and factual information about the condition and use of highways.

The Plan includes a listing of the Regional recommendations for State highway construction projects as well as recommendations on facets associated with local units of government. The Regional Transportation Plan is available for review and comment.

The prioritization system which is used to rank state highway projects was given extensive review. This review resulted in modifications which will clarify the reasoning behind the system and increase the objectivity of the system.

Technical Assistance: Staff provided assistance to MN/DOT Department of Transit and a local service agencies with 16(B)(2) applications, participation on the 16 (B) (2) review committee to for 1991 grant applications, monitoring and reporting of Transportation Study Board Activities, and assisting in the creation of the Red Lake County Transit Task Force.



Assistance was provided to a variety of local groups in relationship to improving state highways. Highway 75 seemed to be the big concern this year both in the northern and southern parts of the Region but there were a number of new problem areas which were pointed out.

Boarder Crossings: The Transportation Advisory Committee worked with local groups to keep close watch and provide input concerning the issues surrounding the Ports of Entry in Noyes, Lancaster, Roseau and Warroad. The threat of a reduction of services at some of these ports seems to require a constant pressure directed towards documenting the importance of U.S./Canadian traffic.

Air Services: The quality of commercial air services was a topic of special concern during the year. Input from local residents and businesses was gathered and passed along to the air services and State with the goal of creating a system to provide good feedback to local commercial air carriers.

Information: Improved mapping for highway projects, a newsletter related to township transportation issues, contact with state legislators, working with county engineers and providing information on new programs in highway signage were all areas addressed during the year.

Natural Resources

Water Planning: All seven counties in Region One have received grant funding for implementation of their Comprehensive Local Water Plans. The Northwest Regional Development Commission is assisting one county with implementation. The NWRDC will provide planning, coordination, and facilitation of meetings as well as assisting with finding additional funding sources for implementation.

The NWRDC staff is involved in a ground water study being conducted by the United States Geological Survey, Polk, Red Lake, Pennington, and Marshall counties. This is a four year project that began last summer by studying the surficial aquifers in the area, their interconnections, quality, quantity, recharge areas, and discharge areas.

Solid Waste: The NWRDC staff is involved in a multi-county Recyclable Materials Cooperative Marketing Technical Advisory Committee. The primary function of this committee will be to conduct a feasibility study to explore ways counties in Northwestern Minnesota can work together to reduce costs and increase efficiency of recycling operations. The ultimate goal of this committee is to develop a regional forum to address all solid waste issues and their economic development potential.

Land Use: Preliminary work was done on increasing the Commission's capacity in the areas of land use analysis and planning. This was in response to an increasing number of requests for services related to land use and increasing concern with protecting the quality of the natural resources in the Region. Plans are underway to improve NWRDC services in this area in upcoming years.

REGIONAL FORUM

Regional Development Forum is the program of the Commission which supports the operation of the Commission itself and where efforts are made to address a variety of emerging issues in the Region. This activity is supported through discretionary funding of the Commission and is directed through the input of the NWRDC Commission and Board. The following is a summary of the main activities in the program during the past year.

RRTC: One of the most significant developments of the year was the passage of the Red River Trade Corridor (RRTC) Program to a new home. The RRTC effort has been a major thrust of the Commission over the past few years, with the goal of insuring a place for Region One in the international trade market. The leadership of the Commission in this project resulted in the development of an extensive system of international contacts and cooperative relationships with Canada and North Dakota. This program will now be moved forward for the area by the University of Minnesota.

New Issues: The Commission started the shift to new regional issues with efforts related to distribution of the 1990 Census information, operation of the Rural Rehabilitation Pilot Grant Program in conjunction with the State Rural Development Board and the Northwest Minnesota Initiative Fund, assistance with the

re-capitalization of the Northwest Regional Enterprise Fund Loan Fund, addressing the need for a dead animal service in the Region, planning for new relationships with the State Department of Trade and Economic Development, helping in the re-organization of Small Business Development services and the on-going task of establishing new cooperative programs with local units of government, State agencies and Federal agencies.

Next Year: The operation of our approach to regional issues for the next year will be greatly impacted by the legislative and executive decisions in Minnesota this year. We anticipate a demand for new approaches and cooperative relationships which will make for an interesting and busy year in 1992.



Northwest Regional Enterprise Fund

In 1985, the Northwest Regional Enterprise Fund was established to operate a revolving loan fund in Region I. The goal of the Loan Fund is to strengthen and diversify the economy by providing a source of lower interest, gap financing to new and expanding businesses.

During Fiscal Year 1991 the following six businesses received financing assistance through the loan program:

- D&D Commodities, Ltd., Stephen
- E.G.F. Hardware, East Grand Forks
- Dee Inc., Crookston
- Terog Manufacturing, Stephen
- Lancaster Building Supply, Lancaster
- May Corporation, Grygla

To date, \$1,466,927 has been loaned out to assist 12 new businesses and 11 business expansions. Job creation is a major emphasis of the program with over 248 full time jobs created in our area. This number is even greater during the summer due to the seasonal nature of some of the businesses. The projects which have been funded show a good prepayment rate and as the loans are repaid additional funds become available for re-lending.

Financing for this program originated through federal funding from the Economic Development Administration (EDA) in the amount of \$975,000 with local matching funds of \$248,000. Efforts to secure additional funding through EDA have begun with the first step of raising the required local match. Contributions and support from the seven counties in this re-capitalization effort has been very good thus far and we hope to complete the recapitalization effort in 1992.

FY'92 Work Program - Outlines work activities, goals and objectives of the Commission in each of the program and planning areas.





INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S OPINION

Board of Directors Northwest Regional Development Commission

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Northwest Regional Development Commission, as of and for the year ended June 30, 1990, as listed in the table of contents.
