The highlight of the evening was a presentation by David Fisher, Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Administration. Commissioner Fisher discussed the Administration's view of technology in the future, and the need for high-speed access to the internet in rural Minnesota. In his address, he put forth a three year plan that he hoped would ensure the latest technology and access to all of the citizens of the state, both commercial customers and private citizens.



## Arts Council Annual Report

Fiscal Year 2001 was another success for the East Central Arts Council (ECAC.)
Additional qualified volunteer members were named to the Arts Council Board. The Annual Image Art Show was held in October at the Ogilvie High School, a number of artists were able to display their work and receive awards. The Arts Council initiated a new Fellowship program for artists.

In addition, the Council reviewed a number of grants according to program criteria. Of those applications, 36 organizations received grants for a total of \$63,153. Artists throughout the region received funds in the amount of \$10,916. These grant funds have a huge economic impact on our region; they also provide a tool in increasing our community development and leadership tools in organizations. Most importantly, it means that art projects are thriving here!

## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S NOTES

This issue of the agency newsletter represents the FY 2001 Annual Report. You'll notice that we have been extremely busy with many new projects. This is largely as a result of spending more time with local units of government and non-profit groups in the region promoting our programs and services. The agency staff has done a super job over the past few months of promoting, improving, and expanding the services we provide in Region 7E. Fiscal year 2001 was truly a turning point for the agency.

You'll notice in this newsletter that the Regional Arts Council and Arts Program Director Mary Minnick–Daniels made 57 grants during this fiscal year to artists and art programs totaling over \$69,000.

In addition to the appointment of Area Agency on Aging Director Penny Simonsen, the AAA also expanded its services by hiring Elissa Martinson as the AAA Outreach Coordinator. It's also interesting to note that about \$161,000 was granted out to support Senior Dining site programs in our five counties and \$87,000 in home delivered meals.

The Geographic Information System (GIS) program is gaining in popularity as well. GIS Planner, Sarah Morton, is in the process of completing the Cambridge parcel-mapping project and will soon be starting a project for the City of Princeton. The Cities of Mora and Wyoming have also expressed interest in utilizing the RDC for their GIS projects as well.

Sara Treiber, our Community/Economic Development Planner, has been busy with Technical Assistance Planning grant applications, Northern Technology Initiative (NTI), revolving loans, and is beginning comprehensive planning processes in the Cities of Willow River and Sandstone.

During 2001, the Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) and Bob Bollenbeck, Region 7E Transportation Planner, prioritized \$600,000 in federal transportation projects in this region. We also tabulated, analyzed, and reported the

results of a County-wide transit study to the Chisago County Board.

On the horizon, Minnesota Regional Development Organizations (MRDO) will be holding its annual conference on October 4-5, 2001 at Cragun's resort near Brainerd. Various Commission members and staff have already signed up to attend. The EC RDC is coordinating a break out session on October 4 on the subject of "Technology and Rural Growth". Russell Cox of the Minnesota Department of Administration will be the speaker for the event.

The staff and I are quite enthusiastic about the kinds of projects that the EC RDC is taking on and the direction the organization is headed. It is my intention, to continue visiting with our member counties, cities, and townships to develop ways in

which our agency can assist in local and regional planning initiatives.

## Older Americans Act Funding

Have you heard about the Older Americans Act? It is the major vehicle for the organization and delivery of supportive and nutrition services to older persons, authorizing funding through Area Agencies on Aging to local public and non-profit organizations to develop or expand services for older persons.

Area Agency on Aging funding provides for the expansion of community based programs and services designed to make it possible for persons to remain in their own home (rather than a nursing home, or other alternative), to fill gaps in existing services and to contribute to the development of a comprehensive and coordinated system of services to older persons.

Here in East Central Minnesota funds support several programs in Region 7E. The programs that fall into "supportive services" include the Mille Lacs Health System Hospice, Chisago-Isanti Heartland Express, East Central Legal Services and the Fairview Lakes Rush City Clinic. The other programs belong to the "nutrition services" category. Congregate (group meals usually served in a senior center or retirement community setting), home-delivered meals, and other services are offered by Catholic Charities, Rush City Mobile Meals, South Chisago County Meals on Wheels and Family Pathways' Grocery Shopping Project.

This autumn brings an opportunity for organizations to apply for Older American Act funding through the East Central Area Agency on Aging. October 1<sup>st</sup> will mark the beginning of the application process for supportive and nutrition services for the year 2002. 

## Comprehensive **Planning**

The RDC has contracted with two Pine County communities to help with their comprehensive planning.

The City of Sandstone will be updating their 1995 Comprehensive Plan to accommodate

unexpected development and to plan for future growth.

> They have recently closed their airport (157 acres) and have a proposal for a Motor Sports Park. Additionally, their

Sandstone Minnesota school district, East Central School District, has decided to build

a new K-12 building outside the city limits near Banning State Park. Their existing buildings will be empty and the future uses for the properties will need to be determined.

The Planning Commission, together with City Staff, will begin the process in September at their regularly scheduled meeting, where the existing comprehensive plan will need to be reviewed. RDC Staff, Sara Treiber and Sarah Morton, will be working on the project and assisting the City of Sandstone.




The City of Willow River has also contracted with the RDC to begin the process of creating a Comprehensive Plan for their community of 300 persons. Future growth and economic development are some issues already identified as discussion items for the Comprehensive Plan.

A Comprehensive Plan Taskforce will be selected in September to begin the community visioning process. RDC Staff Members, Sara Treiber and Sarah Morton, will be working with the Willow River Taskforce to create a comprehensive plan for their community.

This Cambridge Streetscape project is an example of a project using federal funding prioritized through the RDC.


This past fiscal year the Transportation Program was involved in a wide variety of planning activities on behalf of region 7E.

One of the major activities was the solicitation, prioritization, and bringing forth local projects as candidates for federal transportation funding. A total of ten projects, over \$10,000,000 in requested funds, were prioritized and submitted to Mn/DOT Area Transportation Partnerships. Significant funding was allocated to a number of projects in the region supporting transit and road or bridge

reconstruction.

- EC RDC staff also provided assistance to the Pine County Citizens Committee on Aging in their application for a new vehicle through Mn/DOT. The good news is that this request was funded.
- Various transportation studies were either underway or started in the region. These included efforts on TH 65, TH 169, and TH 8. We are pleased to report that the RDC participated in these studies.
- A transit study was conducted in Chisago County and the RDC was asked to compile, analyze, and present the results.

Staff participated in pertinent meetings and conferences related to transportation issues. It is important the Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) plays a large role in providing the EC RDC recommendations for funding as well as planning for the region. The TAC is comprised largely of local stakeholders in transportation. The RDC role will be to continue to respond local and regional needs.

## New GIS Planner

Sarah Morton recently began her duties in early June as Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Planner with Region 7E, replacing Scott Marlin. She received her GIS degree from Alexandria Technical College and previously worked for the Douglas County Surveyor's Office, Cloud Cartographics and, most recently, for the City of Alexandria for seven years.

Immediately, Sarah will begin working on the base parcel map for Cambridge that was not completed before Scott left. "It will contain information on each parcel in the city limits, lot dimensions, parcel identification numbers, and addresses." Sarah says. "There is no limit to the data that can be attached to a parcel ID. Creating maps and attaching the data associated with the parcels allows for a more accurate and efficient visual information system." Other upcoming projects include the Cities of Princeton, Mora and Wyoming base parcel maps, as well as some Comprehensive Plan mapping for the Cities of Sandstone and Willow River.
