

AGING PROGRAM SUMMARY

The Southwest Regional Development commission's Aging Program awarded \$538,508 in federal funds for services to Older Americans during the Calendar Year 1989. These federal funds generated an additional \$505,602 in participant contributions, \$199,755 in local match, and \$303,179 from other sources. Direct service programs served a total of 33,939 persons under the various programs. This is not an unduplicated count as one person may have utilized two or more services.

Other highlights of activities include a strong legislative program. The Aging Advisory Council, members of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), Southwest Senior Federation, Veterans, RSVP, and citizens concerned about senior citizens issues worked together on legislative issues. A successful "Day on the Hill" was held with 50 seniors and most of the representatives and senators from our Region.

The Aging Program held numerous meetings and gave technical assistance to expand and coordinate county transportation programs and develop a regional transportation coordination project. Nobles County and the WESCAP service area projects were started in early 1990. It is hoped to see the remaining three counties receive funding yet in 1990.

In cooperation with the Southwest Minnesota Initiative Fund and the Area Agencies on Aging in Upper Minnesota Valley (6W) and Mid-Minnesota (6E) an Aging Trust Fund was approved. This Aging Trust Fund will guarantee a private source of funding for programs and services for the older population.

ENVIRONMENTAL AND LAND USE

The objective of this work area is to assist local units of government in physical resource planning with regards to environmental issues, growth management policies, and comprehensive planning. Over the past year, we have accomplished the following: conducted a county-by-county landfill rate survey to make all counties aware of the landfill fees, the various other fees charged, taxes, and the status of recycling in each county; authored a floodplain management ordinance for the County of Murray; provided assistance to the nine counties with the creation of their county water plans; technical assistance to various units of local government and/or businesses in the solid waste management area; and initiated the Middle Des Moines Watershed District Clean Water Partnership Application.

PRAIRIELAND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

The primary purpose of the Prairieland Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) is to serve as a Certified Development Company (CDC) pursuant to Section 503 of Title V of the Small Business Investment Act of 1958, as amended. A CDC is a private/public sector non-profit corporation whose purpose is to contribute to the economic development of its area of operation. The CDC is a conduit which allows private funds, guaranteed by SBA, to flow into community business.

The SBA's Certified Development Company program provides eligible small businesses with 10- or 20-year financing for the acquisition of land and building; machinery and equipment; construction; and modernization, renovation or restoration of existing facilities and sites.

TRANSPORTATION

The SRDC Transportation Program coordinates with the Minnesota Department of Transportation, other state organizations, the Area Agency on Aging, and Local Units of Government in the planning and development of a comprehensive transportation system in the Region. Funding from a Mn\DOT grant of \$27,000 has allowed the Region to work in the following major areas over the past year: Transit, Highways, and Technical Assistance.

The Commission has assisted toward the development of a coordinated transportation effort which will establish and/or enhance transit services and coordination throughout the region. We annually submit the Region's candidate road projects to Mn\DOT Districts 7 and 8, for upgrade and maintaining the highway network. Other Transportation issues we continue to work with include spring weight restrictions, market arteries, and a lack of stable highway improvement funds continue to suppress development in Greater MN. The SRDC has initiated a regionwide transportation plan update, to help to assess transportation by looking at what has been accomplished in the past and what areas will be concentrated on in the future. The Region continues to provide technical assistance to local units of government. Examples of technical assistance this year have included assisting: townships with road jurisdiction isa township with data necessary to begin the process of removing a historical bridge; cities and townships with the Transportation Study Board Survey; and to counties and interested persons on Mn\DOT Road and Bridge plans.

PROGRAM REPORTS (continued)

THE COMMUNITY COOPERATIVE

The SRDC began a new program in 1990 called the Community Cooperative Program. Many communities throughout the region were in need of municipal planning services. but could not afford to hire a full-time planner. The SRDC recognized this as a problem and therefore began the Cooperative Program to address this need. The Cooperative is designed to provide a community with a person to be emplaced in their community on a contract basis. This planner can be either quarter time, part time or whatever the community feels is necessary to address their specific needs. Many communities have expressed an interest in this program and have found it to be very successful. It provides communities with a cost effective way to plan for their future.

The City of Pipestone was the first community to utilize this program. The city hired a planner from the RDC to author a Local Assessment Improvement Policy. This planner worked directly with the Pipestone Planning and Zoning Commission resulting in the adoption of the Improvements Plan.

PARKS AND RECREATION

The SRDC has provided technical assistance to numerous communities over the past year with relation to the Celebrate Minnesota 1990 and Outdoor Recreation Grants. These State Park and Recreation grants are to assist communities with park improvements and development in preparation for Minnesota's centennial year, and to improve the parks as a whole. In addition, the SRDC has provided technical expertise to the City of Lamberton in developing their Park Plan. This will provide the Community of Lamberton with a document which can direct future park development.

SCORE BILL

A comprehensive recycling bill (SCORE) was passed by the MN Legislature during FY90. Passed during the special session, the Legislation called for a 6% sales tax on garbage collection and disposal. The tax is expected to raise about \$30 million over the next two years and about 75% of this money will be returned to Minnesota's 87 counties to assist in funding recycling programs.

The money a county receives under the SCORE legislation may only be spent on solid waste management programs that: reduce waste, recycle the maximum amount of solid waste technically feasible, develop markets for recycled materials, remove problem materials from the waste stream and develop proper disposal options, and inform and educate the public about proper solid waste management practices.

How did some of the requirements in the SCORE Legislation affect you?

- * The 6% sales tax was implemented on January 1, 1990. Your garbage bill now has a sales tax on it, and refuse taken to the landfills must also be charged the sales tax.
- * A goal of 25% waste reduction/recycling is to be reached by 1993 in rural Minnesota. The county must keep track of the volume of waste being recycled or kept out of the landfill.
- * By October, 1990, each county must have their Solid Waste Management Plans amended to include the means of achieving the 25% recycling goal, and each county must have at least one recycling center.
- * Town boards, county boards, and city councils are authorized to prohibit unlawful deposit of solid waste and require landowners to cleanup or be charged.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The SRDC is the State and Federally designated Economic Development District for the Southwest Region. As a result of this designation, the SRDC provides the primary staff to implement the Economic Development Administration (EDA) Development District Work Program. A grant of \$50,000 from EDA for economic development planning included the following work program elements:

- Research various means of stabilizing and expanding existing employment.
- Assist local units of government with public facilities needed to ensure public welfare and enhance the climate for private investment.
- Sponsor and co-sponsor coordinating groups and open forums or subjects related to economic development.
- * Provide data and technical assistance to local governments, community organizations, development corporations, and private businesses in business development or expansion.
- * Coordinate activities with State, Federal, and local agencies and programs and adjacent Development Districts and attend useful meetings.
- * Provide professional staff services to the Prairieland Economic Development Corporation for screening, processing, closing, and servicing loan projects.
- Assist local agencies and regionwide programs in obtaining private foundation grants and assistance.

SRDC UNDERTOOK PLANNING AND ZONING UPDATES

During FY 90, the SRDC entered into contractual agreements with: the City of Pipestone to update their Comprehensive Plan; and the County of Murray to bring the County Zoning Ordinance into compliance with the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) regulations.

In addition, staff authored the City of Milroy's Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance, and will be the City's Zoning Administrator; provided technical assistance to the City of Fulda in the preparation of their Comprehensive Plan, and the City of Lamberton in the development of their Park Plan.

The SRDC anticipates providing future Land Use Planning assistance to Local Units of Government with relation to updating Comprehensive Plans and Zoning Ordinances. Areas of plans and ordinances that may need updating due to recent legislation pertain to Shoreland Management and Recycling can be addressed by the staff of the SRDC.

HOUSING SURVEY

Housing was an issue addressed by the Area Agency on Aging. A survey of all multi-unit housing facilities was conducted in the region by the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP). The information was compiled and put into a Housing Guide. A Housing Forum was also held to address issues in housing arrangements for senior citizens and problems faced by Housing Manager and HRA Directors in rural Minnesota

The Area Agency has helped many senior citizens clubs to become focal points in their community by assisting with By-laws, incorporation, leadership development, and grant-writing.

ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS (continued)

SMALL CITIES DOLLARS HELP LOCAL COMMUNITIES

Several communities in the Southwest Region have received funding through the DTED Small Cities Program. This program provides funding for projects such as wastewater treatment facilities, water system improvements, housing rehabilitation, and park and recreational facilities.

Two of the communities that received funding through this program in 1990 were the Communities of Lake Benton and Wilder.

In the mid 1980's Lake Benton began experiencing problems with their water storage system. Their water storage tank was old and deteriorating, as well as inadequate for the amount of storage that the city needed to meet fire protection insurance standards. Faced with this problem the city turned to the Small Cities Program to provide some of the financing that was needed to construct a water storage tank. The city hired the engineering firm of Banner and Associates to conduct the feasibility study for such a project. The city also contacted the Southwest Regional Development Commission to write the Small Cities application for them. The application was successfully funded in 1989 and construction began on the project in the Spring of 1990. Since that time the storage tank has been completed and the city now has adequate storage to meet their water needs.

The Village of Wilder had a severe contamination problem with their water system and turned to the Small Cities Program for a grant to hook up to the Red Rock Rural Water System. The village was successful in obtaining the Small Cities grant and was able to hook up to the Red Rock System in the Spring of 1990. The village now has safe drinking water for its citizens. The SRDC wrote and administered the Small Cities funding for the village.

Many other communities in the region have turned to the Small Cities Program as a source of funding for their various needs. Both the Cities of Heron Lake and Ellsworth have received funding from this program and will begin construction in 1991. Heron Lake will be improving their water system to eliminate the problems they have with radium in their drinking water. The Small Cities Program will be contributing a small percentage towards a wastewater treatment facility project in the City of Ellsworth.

The SRDC continues to work with communities in finding and utilizing sources of funding for their various projects. There are many other programs other than the Small Cities Program available, including the Farmers Home Administration, the MN Housing Finance Agency, and the Public Facilities Authority.

REGIONAL CONFERENCE ON AGING

The 10th Annual Conference on Aging "Seniors - A Framework for the Future" was held Saturday, May 19th at the Tracy High School.

Well over 200 persons attended the conference and many stated it was the best conference yet. Starting off the day with an uplifting message was John Behrends, an educator from Mankato, Minnesota. He spoke to the audience on gaining confidence in themselves, leadership skills, and living a happier healthful life. Several workshops were also offered on Memory and Aging; Care for Caregivers. Hearing Loss: Effect on the Individual and Those Around Them; Leadership in Senior Centers; Medicare and Supplemental Insurance Issues; Arthritis is...; and the Gift of Grandparenting. Many agencies had tables so seniors could discuss programs and pick up literature of interest to them.

SMALL BUSINESS SUCCESS

While many communities across the nation are continually trying to find solutions to business expansion, many small rural communities in Southwest Minnesota are trying to find solutions to business retention. With the help of the State Bank of Lucan, the Small Business Administration, the Southwest Minnesota Initiative Fund and a private individual, the small town of Vesta was able to retain a small ornamental concrete manufacturer in their Community.

Development Commission Regional packaged applications for funding to the State Bank of Lucan/Small Business Administration and the Southwest Initiative Fund to enable a former resident of the area to buy an existing business in Vesta. Country Ornamental Concrete, purchased by Del and Bonnie Preuss, has over 400 different molds and manufactures over 300 different concrete ornaments, both custom made, and stock for wholesale and retail distribution; they have wholesale clients in Minnesota, and North and South Dakota. The total project of \$200,000 was projected to retain five jobs and create two new positions. To date the business has retained these five jobs and created an additional five full-time equivalent positions. The business has been under new ownership since February, but has been in Vesta for several years. The retention of this business and the jobs makes it a success story in itself, let alone the fact that it is growing and adding new employees. It is small businesses like this that benefit not only Vesta, but our entire region.

WESTBROOK TO BE HOME OF FRONTIER INDUSTRIES

The City of Westbrook has received grant funds from the MN Department of Trade and Economic Development under the Small Cities Economic Development Program, to loan to Frontier Industries.

Frontier Industries is a Minnesota Corporation formed in 1987 by Jerry Monson and Dennis Clark. The Corporation was created to manufacture and distribute portable ice fishing shelters and other compatible High-Tech ice fishing equipment.

At its inception, Frontier Industries acquired the rights to manufacture and distribute the "Clam", a widely accepted portable ice fishing house. The "Clam", a two-person ice fishing house, has since been complimented by a one person "Clam Junior". These two products are the anchor items of the business.

Frontier Industries sought funds to expand the business into Westbrook. With this expansion, Frontier Industries hopes to create eleven new full time jobs and add an additional \$100,000 to the area's economy over a vear's time.

The SRDC assisted the City and business in writing the application to the MN Department of Trade and Economic Development and also administered the project. This project will have a very positive impact on Westbrook and the surrounding area.


