The Minnesota State Arts Board believes that arts are vital to our individual and collective lives. We are driven by the desire to help all Minnesotans participate in and benefit from arts experiences that are meaningful to them. For young people, the arts provide an outlet to develop self-awareness, self-expression, and self-confidence, not to mention their own talents and ingenuity. For older adults, the arts can help decrease isolation, convey a lifetime of stories and experiences, and offer magical experiences to share with children and grandchildren. Arts help us learn about and build relationships with our neighbors through traditional music, stories, dance, and other forms of cultural expression. At their core, the arts inspire, uplift, explore, and share what makes us human. Arts activities also produce important public benefits such as community pride, academic achievement, improved health outcomes, tourism, and economic development for communities and individuals.

The Arts Board strives each day to bring these important benefits to Minnesota residents and communities. We are grateful for the ongoing support that we receive from the Governor and Minnesota Legislature. During fiscal year 2025, the State of Minnesota appropriated \$58,321,000 to the Minnesota State Arts Board. Of that amount, \$7,787,000 came from the state's general fund and \$50,534,000 came from the state's arts and cultural heritage fund. This report offers glimpses of how the Arts Board used those funds.

Grant making

Grant making continues to be the Arts Board's primary activity. In FY 2025, the board offered six competitive grant programs: Accessible Arts, Arts Education, Arts Experiences, Cultural Expression, Creative Individuals, and Operating Support. It received and reviewed more than 1,500 grant applications and awarded 996 grants totaling \$38,684,439.

The following are the grant programs offered, and a few examples of grantees and their activities that were supported in fiscal year 2025. A complete list of all grants awarded is available on the Arts Board Web site at https://www.arts.state.mn.us/grants/2025/

Accessible Arts

People with disabilities face significant barriers to the arts as creators, participants, and attendees. Accessible Arts grants are intended to increase the capacity of the arts sector to make arts experiences

more accessible. Funds can be used for investments that will have a longer-term impact on the applicant, such as professional development related to accessibility (i.e., staff or volunteer training, etc.), and hiring accessibility consultants to conduct accessibility audits and/or develop accessibility plans, etc. Funds may also be used for small physical or equipment investments that will make programming more accessible (i.e. assisted listening or captioning equipment, grab bars, etc.).

The Arts Board received 45 applications in this program requesting more than \$800,000. It was able to award 37 Accessible Arts grants totaling \$686,873.

The following are just a few examples of those investments:

- The Loft (Minneapolis) received a grant to contract with WeCo, a local digital accessibility company, to conduct an accessibility audit of the Loft's website, e-mail promotions/e-newsletters, and the Submittable submissions platform used by the organization for various program applications.
- Dawson-Boyd Arts Association (Dawson) provides unique, high-quality performances to everyone in its rural community. Recognizing its aging audience, as well as the opportunity to attract new patrons, the organization requested funding to build capacity through accessibility enhancements including signage and hearing assisted devices.

Headwaters Music & Arts

A 2025 grant helped support Headwaters Music & Arts in a comprehensive accessibility audit across the organization's physical environment, policies and procedures, and digital presence. The effort was focused on identifying barriers and creating a more welcoming and supportive experience for every patron and visitor. Initiatives included staff development and awareness training, and physical improvements to music lesson studios to support cleaner and calming learning environments.

- zAmya Theater Project (Minneapolis) received a grant to engage arts accessibility consultants to lead creative listening sessions for program participants and troupe members with mental health conditions and devise recommendations for integration in existing practices and a training playbook.
- Theatre L'Homme Dieu (Alexandria) is committed to enhancing accessibility in the arts for Minnesotans. With community input, the organization used its grant to gain in-depth knowledge of accessibility barriers in order to implement practical improvements into its site planning.
- Artistry (Bloomington) received support to conduct an accessibility audit, offer accessibility training for the eight arts organizations housed at Bloomington Center for the Arts, and launch sensory-friendly performances.

Arts Education

This program makes grants to help Minnesotans develop personal relationships with an art form(s) by supporting learning experiences for individuals of all ages and abilities. Project grant funds may be used for age-appropriate classes, workshops, camps, after-school programs, online education programs, community arts education, school residences or partnerships, etc.

The Arts Board received 216 applications in this program requesting more than \$6.3 million. It was able to award 155 Arts Education grants, totaling \$4,702,415.

The following are just a few examples of those investments:

- Northwoods Young Writers
 (International Falls) hosted a
 camp to connect award-winning
 Minnesota authors to girls who have
 a passion for writing. The camp
 supports teen girls in developing
 their passion for writing and to
 become self-reflective, collaborative
 community members.
- Aurora Center for the Arts
 (Fosston) received support to offer
 a series of art classes to adults,
 children, and youth bringing
 new and expanded arts education
 experiences to participants,
 including watercolor, leather work,
 and paper arts.
- Twin Cities Jazz Workshop
 (Minneapolis) requested a grant to
 expand beyond its summer program
 to offer weekly music education
 workshops in spring and fall 2025.
 During the workshops, students play
 in small ensembles, receive instruction
 from jazz professionals, and learn a
 varied jazz repertoire.
- Ecumen Meadows of Worthington used its grant to collaborate with Artmobile to develop the artistic skills of 70 senior residents in ceramics, drawing, painting, and more, in their own homes.
- Pangea World Theater(Minneapolis) collaborated with Higher Ground Academy, Turtle Theater Collective,

and Ubah Medical Academy to conduct free public theater residencies that foster skills in working as an ensemble, performance, and devising new work.

- The Wyoming Area Creative Arts Community (Wyoming) received support to offer free art education programming to seniors in the community and senior living facilities, held at Hallberg Art Center and other accessible locations, promoting arts access and education through different mediums, including painting, printmaking, and sculpture.
- Minnesota Center for Book
 Arts (Minneapolis) engaged
 Minnesotans in meaningful in
 person and virtual book arts
 education programs, including
 affordable workshops in
 bookbinding, letterpress printing,
 papermaking, and paper marbling,
 taught by a diverse team of
 teaching artists.
- Minnesota Ballet (Duluth) used its grant to present high quality recreational and preprofessional dance instruction; adaptive ballet lessons for individuals with disabilities; and interactive workshops, classes and performances in Duluth and surrounding communities.
- Atlas of Blackness (Saint Paul) requested funds to offer a multimedia storytelling and filmmaking program, with ethnographic and photovoice research, for youth affected by the foster care and juvenile justice systems. The project culminated in a public showing of the completed film.

Red Wing Arts

A 2025 grant helped Red Wing Arts create the new community driven program "Community Saturdays" designed to promote arts accessibility for all. Attendees were invited to stop in, explore, and try hands-on art activities ranging from throwing clay on a pottery wheel to creating polymer clay buttons or beaded brooches. Led by RWA's teaching artists and guest instructors, these mini lessons encouraged creativity and introduce participants of all ages and abilities to clay and mixed-media art forms.

- Waawaate Programs (Ely) received funding to offer live classes in traditional music, dance, art, and craft to Bois Forte Band members to help restore the ancestral connection with the land and Ojibwemowin culture.
- Zeitgeist's Minnesota Media Arts School (Duluth) offered classes and workshops for beginner and experienced filmmakers and media artists, and will develop new teaching locations throughout northeast Minnesota.

Arts Experiences

Arts Experiences grants support individuals and organizations that provide meaningful arts experiences for Minnesotans within their communities. Funds may be used for a variety of arts programming such as creating and/or presenting concerts, plays, tours, exhibitions, arts festivals, public art, or other kinds of activities that provide Minnesotans opportunities to engage in arts activities that are instilled into community or public life.

The Arts Board received 400 applications in this program requesting more than \$11 million. It was able to award 198 Arts Experiences grants totaling \$5,719,801.

The following are just a few examples of those investments:

• Trilingua Cinema (Saint Paul) received support for its summer film series at the East Side Sculpture Park and to pilot an employment training and filmmaking program for youth ages 16-24.

- Kicks Band of Fargo Moorhead (Moorhead) received a grant to host a summer park concert series in Moorhead and Detroit Lakes.
- More Than a Single Story (Saint Paul) presented readings, public conversations, and writing workshops, engaging BIPOC writers with communities as a way to balance public discourse and provide a forum for cross-cultural empathy and understanding.
- Aitkin County Friends of the Arts (Aitkin) received a grant to host local, regional, and national touring musical and performing arts acts, transforming Aitkin County into a music and performing arts destination.
- Selby Ave JazzFest (Saint Paul) featured a day of live jazz, kids' activities, and artist demonstrations, surrounded by an inclusive community vibe in Saint Paul's Rondo neighborhood.
- Mankato and North Mankato
 ACT on Alzheimer's (Mankato)
 used its funds to provide
 meaningful, community based
 arts engagement activities designed
 for people living with Alzheimer's
 disease and related dementias and
 their care partners.
- Bluff Country Studio Art Tour (Lanesboro) received support to plan, organize, and present a high quality studio art tour experience benefitting the residents and artists in greater Minnesota.

- Contempo Physical Dance (Shoreview) used its funding to host an international choreography residency, which included a series of workshops, premiere of a full-length work, and a subsequent tour to bring Brazilian contemporary hip hop dance to new audiences.
- The City of Battle Lake's Art Advisory Committee (Battle Lake) requested a grant to create a self-guided 1.5-mile tour of thirty of the city's most prominent points of interest, including artist led community created works of art, mosaics, national registry sites, and sculptures.

Cultural Expression

This program supports activities that share, explore, pass on, express, or celebrate culture through the arts. Culture may be defined by a common ethnicity, tribal affiliation, geographic or regional identity, occupation, language, or recreation. Traditional and contemporary forms of cultural expression may be funded in this program. Funds could be used to support practicing a cultural art form; presenting cultural festivals, community celebrations, performances, media or exhibitions; offering demonstrations, etc. Funds could also be used to deepen or pass on cultural traditions through apprenticeships or documentation.

Minnesota Marine Art Museum

A 2025 grant helped the Minnesota Marine Art Museum with its "Seasonal Saturday" program designed to eliminate barriers that prevent Winona's rural community from engaging with the museum. These lively days include artmaking, artist demonstrations, live music in the galleries, curator-led tours, special community partnerships, and the popular gallery search-and-find game, "Bingo Overboard." Each quarterly event offers new exhibitions and activities to promote exploration and engagement.

The Arts Board received 211 applications in this program requesting more than \$5.9 million. It was able to award 52 Cultural Expression grants totaling \$1,576,354.

The following are just a few examples of those investments:

- India Association of Minnesota (Saint Paul) received support for IndiaFest 2025, a free event showcasing the arts and culture of India with live Asian-Indian dance performances by professional and community groups, held on the grounds of the State Capitol.
- Rick Kagigebi (Detroit Lakes) requested funds to create a new body of work while teaching Anishinaabe culture and blanket making to Indigenous youth, and engaging with their families and community through artist talks and informal studio visits.
- Gustavo Boada (Minneapolis) a
 master puppeteer and papier-mache
 sculptor, engaged participants and
 audiences in Minneapolis and
 around the state through the magic
 and color of the Latinx folk art
 tradition of alebrijes.
- Funny Asian Women Kollective (Saint Paul) received a grant to present The Super Hmong Show, a performance of live standup comedy, videos, sketches, and storytelling that centers Hmong women's stories to celebrate and reflect on the fifty-year anniversary of the Hmong migration to Minnesota.

Yellow Tree Theatre

A 2025 grant for Operating Support helped Yellow Tree Theatre with its mission of producing inclusive professional theatrical work with an emphasis on access for audiences including underserved communities in North Minneapolis and the surrounding suburbs. One of its season highlights was Steel Magnolias, set in a Louisiana beauty salon with a colorful cast of regulars and employees facing trials and triumphs with a shared sense of humor and community togetherness.

• The Saint Peter Good Neighbor Diversity Council (Saint Peter) presented a cross-cultural signature event in May featuring dance, music, and foods from the area's growing Somali, Latino, and Native communities.

• Somali Youth and Family
Development Center (Minneapolis)
requested support for traditional
Somali dance, henna, and fashion
workshops in Minneapolis and Saint
Paul. These activities help preserve
Somali cultural traditions and shared
them with the broader Minnesota
community.

Creative Individuals

This program awards project grants to help individual artists and culture bearers develop or sustain their creative practices and meaningfully engage with Minnesotans. Grantees may use funds to support their creative practice and meaningfully connect to and engage with audiences, participants, students, and/or communities during the grant period.

The Arts Board received 491 applications in this program requesting more than \$4.7 million. It was able to award 361 Creative Individuals grants, totaling \$3,522,128.

The following are just a few examples of those investments:

• Marian Hassan (Woodbury) received support to collect traditional Somali children's songs and lullabies from elderly community members,

- transferring them from oral to written form, preserving these cultural literacies for future generations of Somali-Minnesotan children.
- **Kristi Fernholz** (Appleton) created a new series of photo encaustic artwork about rural life on the prairie and displayed it in galleries in western Minnesota.
- Frank Garcia (Apple Valley) received a grant to prepare, rehearse, and perform original Latin music in live performances at various venues in 2025. Funds also helped him establish his artist website and purchase needed sound equipment.

- Elizabth Barrett (Red Lake) requested funds to create ribbon clothing and regalia, developing her artistic skills and deepening connections with Indigenous communities in Minnesota.
- Jesse Simon (Saint Paul) a Minnesota jazz drummer, requested a grant to collaborate with Omar Abdulkarim to bring Muslim and Jewish musicians together to perform free concerts at Twin Cities synagogues and mosques, showcasing the power of jazz music as a medium of healing and unity.
- Indira Lorick (Cambridge) hosted a breakdancing workshop featuring local and national artists, highlighting the art form's history and contemporary cultural relevance, contributing to development of a children's show on breakdancing through motion capture and mixed media.
- Rosy Simas (Minneapolis) requested funds to organize a daylong Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) film festival to share Haudenosaunee culture with Native filmmakers, and Native and general audiences from Mni Sota Makoce.
- Heidi Newbauer (Mankato) used her grant to offer two historical fiction writing workshops and public readings at the Minnesota Discovery Center, featuring immigrant stories of the first miner families of the area.

• Cody Masback (Minneapolis) received funding to produce a series of paintings that reclaim the historically fraught practice of portraiture by depicting trans and LGBTQIA+ Minnesotans through a collaborative process that uplifts their stories and celebrates their lives.

- **Bodhi Werner** (Duluth) requested funds to complete a 3D animated short film based on his first novel, livestream a reading from his novels, and make a multimedia online curriculum showing how to make a 3D animated short film.
- Maitzeng Chang (Saint Paul) used her grant to interview Hmong elders and develop a script based on lived experiences from survivors of the Vietnam War.
- Emy Wick (Grand Marais) using a traditional Scandinavian krokbragd pattern, Wick used her grant to design and weave large tapestries to display in rural northern Minnesota. She also developed and taught a class on krokbragd tapestry technique.
- Lane Powell (Harmony) requested a grant to compose and distribute free copies of concert band music to public schools in Minnesota that celebrate the history of African American music in the United States.

Operating Support

Operating Support grants provide a vital financial foundation that enables arts organizations to focus on mission driven priorities, sustain core programs, and engage new audiences. The program supports small organizations such as Rumriver Art Center (Anoka), Headwaters Music and Arts (Bemidji), Watermark Art Center (Bemidji), The Crossing Arts Alliance (Brainerd), Chatfield Center for the Arts (Chatfield), Giving Voice Initiative (Edina), Ely's Historic State Theater (Ely), Northern Lights Music Festival (Gilbert), Lanesboro Arts (Lanesboro), Great River Arts (Little Falls), Hopewell Music Cooperative North (Minneapolis), Minnesota Prison Writing Workshop (Minneapolis), Indigenous Roots Cultural Arts Center (Saint Paul), New Native Theatre (Saint Paul), Young Dance (Saint Paul), Teatro del Pueblo (Saint Paul), and The Barn Theatre (Willmar). It supports midsized organizations including Austin Area Arts (Austin), Lakes Area Music Festival (Brainerd), Historic Holmes Theatre (Detroit Lakes), Fairmont Opera House (Fairmont), North House Folk School (Grand Marais), Commonweal Theatre Company (Lanesboro), 826 MSP (Minneapolis), Cantus (Minneapolis), The Cedar Cultural Center (Minneapolis), Red Wing Arts (Red Wing), Paramount Center for the Arts (Saint Cloud), FilmNorth (Saint Paul), Forecast Public Art (Saint Paul), History Theatre

(Saint Paul), Theatre Mu (Saint Paul), Walker West (Saint Paul), GREAT Theatre (Waite Park), White Bear Center for the Arts (White Bear Lake), and Great River Shakespeare Festival (Winona). And it supports our largest arts institutions including the Children's Theatre Company (Minneapolis), Minneapolis Institute of Arts (Minneapolis), Minnesota Orchestra (Minneapolis), Ordway Center for the Performing Arts (Saint Paul), and the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra (Saint Paul).

During fiscal year 2025, the Arts Board supported 193 organizations through this program; combined grants totaled \$22,476,868.

These organizations engage audience and participants of all ages, nurture new artists and art forms, attract visitors, generate income for their communities, and enhance Minnesota's reputation as an exceptional place to live and work.

Minnesota's regional arts councils

Minnesota has a two-tier public support system for the arts that includes the Arts Board and eleven regional arts councils. Together, the board and councils ensure that state dollars reach and serve all 87 Minnesota counties:

As directed by Minnesota Statutes, the Arts Board acts as fiscal agent for state funds, making block grants to each regional council. During fiscal year 2025, \$16,541,190 was awarded to the eleven regional arts councils. With these funds, the councils together awarded 1,758 grants and provided programs and services tailored to the needs of their geographic regions.

Partnerships I Service I Professional development

The Minnesota State Arts Board expands its capacity and extends its reach by working in collaboration with other agencies and organizations that share similar goals. The following are key partnerships that were in place during fiscal year 2025.

Percent for Art in Public Places

Minnesota's art in state buildings statute (Minnesota Statutes § 16B.35) allows that up to one percent of the total budget appropriated for construction of new or renovated state buildings may be used to purchase or commission works of art. The Percent for Art in Public Places program enacts the legislation established by the Minnesota Legislature in 1984. It operates under the auspices of the Minnesota Department of Administration and is managed by the Minnesota State Arts Board.

During fiscal year 2025, one new project was completed. Walker West Music Academy received \$4.1 million from the State of Minnesota's capital investment budget to acquire property, predesign, and design a new facility at 650 Marshall Avenue, Saint Paul to support its music education programs. The new building, a focal point for the Rondo community, will serve 500-600 students a week.

A selection committee was formed to guide the project. Members included: Earl Ross, Walker West; Mac McLaughlin, Walker West; Ashley Adamma Ochiagha Meeks, FMYH Studio; Christopher Harrison, visual artist; Claudius Toussaint, Metropolitan Council; Joanne Jones-Rizzi, Science Museum of Minnesota; and Mychael Wright, Golden Thyme Coffee.

A request for proposals was issued in January 2025. The committee reviewed proposals submitted and selected two artworks to purchase: *Visual Jazz 1 and 2* by Saint Paul artist Miko Simmons. The works are two oversized, vibrant, abstract paintings, both 6' tall x 9' wide. They consist of acrylic paint and mixed media on canvas, displayed in custom wooden frames, with two custom projected digital media files. *Visual Jazz 1* and its corresponding digital media file depict Miles Davis performing. *Visual Jazz 2* depicts an amalgamation of female jazz performers, highlighting Alice Coltrane. Its corresponding digital media file depicts Alice Coltrane performing. The artworks were installed in April 2025, just prior to the grand opening of the new facility.

Poetry Out Loud

Poetry Out Loud is a national poetry recitation project cosponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts and The Poetry Foundation. Through Poetry Out Loud, high school students learn about great poetry through memorization, recitation, performance, and competition. Fiscal year 2025 was the twentieth year that Minnesota has participated in the program.

The Arts Board selected South Central Service Cooperative (SCSC) of North Mankato to manage the Minnesota competition. SCSC is one of nine regional service cooperative agencies in the state. One of its key functions is to engage students and lifelong learners in academic pursuits. SCSC plans and facilitates many student academic enrichment events both regionally and statewide, reaching thousands of students annually. SCSC is well versed in competition procedures that result in fair play, organized and efficient delivery of services, and comprehensive communication to participants.

Students in thirty-three schools participated in the program during the 2024-2025 academic year. Five regional competitions were held in February, based on the geographic location of the schools (northern, central, southern, and two metro).

Two students from each region advanced to the state competition, which was held in person on February 21, 2025, on the campus of Minnesota State University Mankato. Sofia Skuza Rivera, a tenth grader from Saint Paul Academy and Summit School, was named the state of Minnesota's Poetry Out Loud champion. Percy Jones, a sophomore at Washburn High School, took second

place, and Hannah Christenson, a junior at Mound Westonka High School, took third place in the state competition.

Sofia Skuza Rivera went on to compete in the Poetry Out Loud national finals that were held in Washington, DC, in early May.

Professional Development – Evaluation

The Arts Board hosted a series of four training sessions on Evaluation Capacity Building for the Arts. The trainings were supported by Management Analysis and Development, the State of Minnesota's internal management consulting division.

The topics of the four trainings were:

- Understanding evaluation and outcomes: Introduction to basic evaluation principles and defining strong outcome statements.
- How to evaluate: Developing an evaluation plan and an introduction to common evaluation techniques including surveys, interviews, and observation.
- Evaluation on a shoestring budget: Additional evaluation techniques that may be lower cost or more innovative.
- Data sensemaking and sharing results: Analyzing data, communicating results, and using data for decision-making.

Community Engagement

The Arts Board believes that lives across the state are enriched by participating in the arts. We recognize, though, that for some Minnesotans, barriers caused by geography, ability, age, and historic resource imbalances have prevented full access to art enjoyment.

The String Queens

A 2025 grant supported the Ordway Center for the Performing Arts in the Arts Partnership, composed of the Minnesota Opera, the Ordway, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, and the Schubert Club in hosting a free outdoor video of the String Queens in July as part of the Ordway Inside Out series. The String Queens are a dynamic trio with a repertoire spanning from Baroque to jazz to today's popular music.

The board issued a request for proposals and, from proposals submitted, selected five individuals or firms to conduct community engagement activities within targeted communities. The intent of this work was to better understand the barriers individuals in these communities face that inhibit their ability to engage in and enjoy the arts.

The consultants included: Vietnamese Community of Minnesota, working with Minnesotans of Asian heritage; Dr. Artika Tyner, working with Minnesotans of African heritage; Amanda Young, working with members of the American Indian community; Hispanic Advocacy and Community Empowerment Through Research (HACER), working with Minnesotans of Latine heritage; and Tammy Anderson, working with Minnesotans with disabilities.

The consultants surveyed, interviewed, and conducted focus groups with members of their respective communities to find out how members of the communities currently participate in the arts or creative expression, how they would like to participate, and what barriers prevent them from participating in the ways they would like.

Each consultant provided a summary of their work and key themes for the board to consider.

A TWENTY-FIVE-YEAR ARTS LEGACY FOR MINNESOTA

Vision

In twenty-five years, Minnesotans will have made a significant investment in the arts. As a result ...

In Minnesota, the arts define who we are. This is a place where people are transformed by high quality arts experiences and see the arts as essential to their communities. The arts are integrated into all aspects of our lives, connecting people of all ages and cultures, fostering understanding and respect. Arts are broadly understood to mean the products of creative expression produced by professional artists, arts organizations, and the creative expression practiced every day by Minnesotans of all ages, backgrounds, and vocations.

Arts and culture are central to Minnesota's educational system and lifelong learning opportunities. The arts develop creative minds that maximize new opportunities and find solutions to life's challenges.

In Minnesota, the arts industry is an integral part of the economy. Because of the arts, Minnesota communities are successful, dynamic, attractive places to live and work.

Minnesota is a recognized national arts leader. It attracts, nurtures, and sustains creative people and organizations and recognizes them as assets. It is a magnet for arts enthusiasts and a destination for tourists. Residents and visitors are assured a world-class, quality arts experience.

Every Minnesotan appreciates, creates, attends, participates, and invests in the arts. Minnesota's effective, innovative, vibrant, public-private support for the arts is the strongest in the country. Universal support and appreciation for the arts help ensure the state's exceptional quality of life.

Guiding Principles

Decisions that the Minnesota State Arts Board and the regional arts councils make about how best to use funds will be grounded in the following guiding principles:

- STATEWIDE APPROACH The needs and interests of the entire state will be considered when determining how best to allocate funds.
- **DEMOGRAPHIC AND GEOGRAPHIC FAIRNESS** Minnesotans of all types, in rural areas and communities of all sizes, will recognize and experience the tangible results of the arts and cultural heritage fund. Special attention will be given to underserved areas or underrepresented groups.
- COMPREHENSIVE A broad, inclusive, evolving definition of art will be used—from indigenous to emerging forms. The full spectrum of arts providers and arts disciplines will be considered when determining how best to serve Minnesotans with these funds.
- SUSTAINABLE Some arts activities are meant to be one-time or short term; others are meant to exist and thrive over time. All are valuable and will be eligible for support. In the latter case, funds will be allocated strategically so that the activity or organization funded can be successful into the future, beyond the life of the arts and cultural heritage fund. Funds also will be used to create a sustainable climate in which artists can live and work.
- ANTICIPATORY AND FLEXIBLE Decisions about how best to allocate funds will be reassessed on a regular basis and will adapt as needs and opportunities change.
- TRANSPARENCY AND PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT Broad public input and engagement in decision making will be vital to produce the outcomes that Minnesotans' expect.
- O ACCOUNTABILITY AND STEWARDSHIP Public funds belong to Minnesotans. The Arts Board and regional arts councils will use them in the most effective manner possible and will routinely report the outcomes achieved through the uses of the funds. The board and councils will act with integrity, ensuring that all constituents are treated in an ethical, fair, and consistent manner.

RULES CHANGES

The Minnesota State Arts Board did not propose new rules, repeal obsolete rules, or make amendments to its existing administrative rules (Minnesota Rules, chapter 1900) during fiscal year 2025.

COMPLAINTS / CONCERNS

The Arts Board's appeal process is outlined in Minnesota Rules, chapter 1900, section 1110. https://www.revisor.mn.gov/rules/1900.1110/

The process states "There is no right of appeal for disputes of decisions with respect to interpretation of review criteria. An appeal may be made only if it is asserted that the board, or its staff, or advisory panels, did not follow the policies and procedures as provided by this chapter."

The board received one appeal at the end of fiscal year 2024 that carried over and was resolved during fiscal year 2025.

- On June 5, 2024, Patrick Wandersee submitted an appeal, asking the board to reverse a determination that his FY 2025 Creative Individuals grant application was ineligible.
- The board considered the appeal at its July 12, 2024, meeting. It determined that the appellant had not provided evidence that the board had failed to follow its policies and procedures; it denied the appeal on the basis that the appellant had not shown sufficient cause for an appeal.
- The appellant disputed the board's decision, so the matter was referred to the Office of Administrative Hearings for a contested case proceeding.
- A contested case hearing was held on September 27, 2024. The Administrative Law Judge determined that the board and its staff did not violate the board's policies and procedures with respect to the appellant's application and recommended that the board affirm its earlier denial of the appeal.
- The board held a special meeting on October 21, 2024, to consider the Administrative Law Judge's report and the official record of the contested case. The board voted to reject the ALJ's recommendation and instead allow the appellant's application to be considered by a grant review panel.
- The application was considered by a panel on November 7, 2024. It did not receive a score high enough to be recommended for funding.

MINNESOTA STATE ARTS BOARD

FY 2025 Members

Eleven private citizens, appointed by the governor for four-year terms, comprise the Minnesota State Arts Board. The board must have at least one member from each of the state's eight congressional districts. The board meets every month to establish policies, monitor agency programs, and act upon grant recommendations.


