

WOMEN AND GIRLS IN SPORTS



High School Athletics:

Sports activity is important to the **physical, social, mental and developmental health of children** and adolescents. Children who report no exercise are **twice as likely** to have mental health problems related to anxiety and depression. ¹

When it comes to daily activity, **26%** of 9th and 11th grade boys are physically active for 60+ minutes each day, compared to **12%** of girls of the same age.²

Track and Field is the most equally played sport by gender in Minnesota. ³

Those who play sports as children and adolescents also reap the benefits throughout life. An active childhood also is associated with **lower rates of obesity, smoking and drug use**, and **higher rates of college attendance, test scores**, and even **annual earnings later in life**.¹

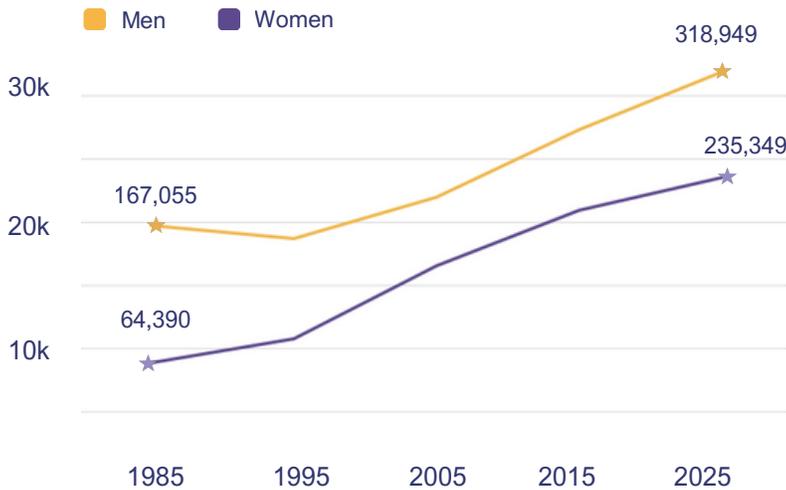

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Collegiate Athletics



Nationwide since 1985, the number of girls participating in NCAA sports has **increased by 170,959**.

In 1985, **27%** of college athletes were women.

In 2025, **42%** of college athletes are women. ⁴

Title IX:

Title IX is part of the Education Amendments of 1972 and “**prohibits discrimination based on sex in education programs that receive federal financial assistance**”. Provision of equal athletic opportunity is one part of what Title IX aims to achieve. Title IX does not require that institutions offer identical sports for men and women, but that men and women have an **equal opportunity to play**.⁵

In Minnesota in **2023**, 43% of all collegiate athletes were women.⁶
