Dear Sir or Madam:

Pursuant to 2000 Minnesota Laws, Chapter 488, Article 6, section 7, enclosed is the annual report on the activities of the Minnesota Auto Theft Prevention Program.

This past legislative session the Minnesota Legislature abolished the Auto Theft Prevention Board and director and assigned the administration of the program to the Department of Public Safety. The Office of Drug Policy and Violence Prevention, a Division of the Department of Public Safety provides for the administration of the program.

The 29 agencies receiving grants through this program continue to demonstrate effective methods for preventing auto theft in Minnesota.

#### **AUTO THEFT PREVENTION PROGRAM**

2000 Minnesota Laws, Chapter 488, Art. 6, Section 8 January 1, 2001

#### How the Program Works

In 1996 the Minnesota Legislature created the Auto Theft Prevention Program. The Statute creating the program established an account to be used only for the Auto Theft Prevention Program. From this account, the program makes money available through a competitive grant process for activities to address the problem of auto theft in the State of Minnesota. The funds for this account come from a surcharge that is collected from automobile insurance carriers that provide comprehensive insurance coverage issued in the State of Minnesota. The amount of the surcharge is 50 cents per vehicle for every six months of coverage.

#### Mission

To reduce motor vehicle theft and its consequences in the State of Minnesota by funding programs which aid in the:

- Identification of Critical Issues
- Education and Awareness
- Investigation and Prosecution

#### **Extent of Auto Theft in Minnesota**

In 1999 there were 13,142 vehicles stolen that had a value of \$51,392.00.

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### How the Money is Utilized

Annually a competitive grant application process solicits applications from state or local law enforcement agencies, local prosecutors, judicial agencies, neighborhood organizations and community organizations. Applications may be submitted for the following types of projects:

- 1. Training (criminal justice, citizen and business, etc.)
- 2. Public Education (public meetings, literature, public service announcements, neighborhood and business watch promotions, etc.)
- 3. Programs designed to improve or expand the resources of existing auto theft prevention, investigation, apprehension, or prosecution activities.
- 4. Multi-jurisdictional projects combining the resources of different agencies in the task force approach to combat auto theft.
- 5. Long term specialized training to further develop the expertise of auto theft investigators or prosecutors.
