The Minnesota Department of Human Rights (MDHR) submits a semi-annual report to the Legislature, summarizing the results of its investigation and resolution of human rights complaints. A report detailing the Department's activities during the period of July 1, 2001 to December 31, 2001 is attached to this letter.

Department results for this reporting period reflect a significant impact from the AFSCME and MAPE work stoppage. Case investigations were suspended during the strike, resulting in an increase in average time required to resolve cases and an inventory of 14 cases that were older than 12 months. MDHR has implemented a "catch up" plan to focus resources on completing investigations at the expense of screening cases for early resolution.

The work stoppage also affected the number of charges filed during the reporting period. Department charges had been trending upward for over a year prior to the strike with 1,405 charges filed in FY 2000 compared to 1,286 the previous fiscal year. During the month the work stoppage occurred, we received almost 1,000 fewer inquiries than normal. Complaint intake activity in November and December has rebounded, and we are now ahead of last year in all intake categories.

Despite the impact of the strike, the Department does have positive results to report. From July 1, 2001— December 31, 2001, MDHR closed a total of 713 cases. On December 31, of the 855 cases needing a determination, only 14 (fewer than 2%) were older than 12 months. Caseloads also remained manageable, increasing from 25 to 28 cases per full-time-equivalent enforcement officer.

Meeting our statutory directive to make a determination in a case within one year of filing remains a top priority. During this reporting period, the average time from filing to a determination of no probable cause was 361 days; the average time for probable cause cases was 360 days.

The Legislature also directed the Department to achieve 75% of Department dismissals within six months. I am pleased to report that during this reporting period, 86% of our dismissals was accomplished within six months of the charge filed date.

Due to budget limitations, the Department did not renew its mediation contract with the Office of Dispute Resolution (ODR) and brought administration of the program in-house. The Department has continued to work with, and expand, the pool of volunteer mediators previously utilized by the ODR. The attached report shows that from July 1, 2001 to December 31, 2001, 48 cases (7% of the total number of cases filed) were referred to mediation rather than assigned for extended investigation. Mediations were conducted on 21 cases resulting in 19 settlements (pending receipt of paperwork on 4 cases).

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During the reporting period, MDHR recovered a total of \$777,539 for aggrieved charging parties. The Department has also increased the number of cases settled prior to investigation. During this reporting period 36 such cases were satisfactorily resolved and another 30 cases are currently being negotiated.
