Dear Senator Ranum:

The Minnesota Department of Human Rights (MDHR) submits a semi-annual report to the Legislature summarizing the results of its investigation and resolution of human rights complaints. Reports detailing the Department's activities during the period of January 1, 2002 to June 30, 2002 are attached to this letter.

From January 1, 2002– June 30, 2002, MDHR the number of new charges filed increased 20% from the previous six-month reporting period. During the current reporting period, the department closed a total of 823 cases. On June 30, of the 856 cases needing a determination, no cases (0%) were older than 12 months. The average investigator caseload per enforcement officer (does not include the cases dismissed or resolved through mediation) remained manageable, at 25 cases per full-time equivalent.

Meeting our statutory directive to make a determination on a case within one year of filing, while maintaining manageable caseloads, remains a top priority. During this reporting period, the average time from filing a charge to issuing a determination of no probable cause was 329 days, and from filing to a probable cause determination was 327 days.

The Legislature also tasked the Department to achieve 75% of Department dismissals within six months. I am pleased to report that during this reporting period, 87% of our dismissals were accomplished within six months of the charge filed date.

Due to budget limitations, the Department did not renew its mediation contract with the Office of Dispute Resolution (ODR) and brought administration of the program in-house in August of 2001. The Department has continued to work with, and expand, the pool of volunteer mediators previously utilized by the ODR. The attached report shows that from January 1, 2002 to June 30, 2002, 80 cases (10% of the total number of cases filed) were referred to mediation rather than being immediately assigned for extended investigation. Mediations were conducted on 15 cases resulting in 9 settlements. The Department is waiting for withdrawal forms from the charging parties in 3 additional cases settled during the reporting period; and as of June 30, 8 more cases were being scheduled for mediation sessions.

During the reporting period, MDHR recovered over \$2.5 million for aggrieved charging parties and their representatives. In addition, MDHR has modified its procedures to promote increased use of predetermination settlements (PDS) to expedite case processing and recovery of damages. Since January 1 of this year, 50 cases have been satisfactorily resolved prior to a determination. This is an increase of 20%, compared to the preceding six months; and as of June 30, 20 cases without determinations were in PDS status (i.e. settlement negotiations are underway).

The attached reports detail our case activity during the past six months. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact my office.
