

CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

TO: Citizens of Southwest Minnesota

FROM: John J. Maurer, Chairman of the Southwest Regional Development Commission

Another year has passed, not to mention another decade, and the activities of local government, including planning, administration, and service delivery are becoming increasingly expensive and complex. Consequently, this demands new ventures in intergovernmental cooperation leading to cost effectiveness.

The Southwest Regional Development Commission is dedicated to assisting local units of government to meet the challenge of balancing declining revenues with increasing service demands. To address this, the Commission is assisting local units of government in preparing plans to maximize local investments and guide development decisions. Also, the Commission assists local units in grantsmanship, emphasizing leveraging public with private investments. Beginning this year, the Commission will be responsible for administering the Older American's Act Nutrition Program funds. This will allow for elected official control of the program and, hopefully, increase coordination with other services to the elderly, thereby maximizing federal program expenditures.

These activities are examples of the past and future commitment of the Commission to assisting local units of government in their activities. I am sure the 1980's will bring about new challenges in the local public sector and the SRDC will stand as a willing partner ready to assist local units of government to meet those challenges in a responsible manner.

PLANNING ACTIVITIES

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

One of the priority policies from the Southwest Regional Development Commission's Comprehensive Regional Guide is to encourage the expansion of employment opportunities available to residents of the region. Implementation of this policy is being pursued through several avenues.

Work is progressing on the Regional Overall Economic Development Program which will make available federal Economic Development Administration funds for employment generating activities. The OEDP will also provide a mechanism for guiding and coordinating the efforts of local individuals and organizations

concerned with the economic development of the region.

Cooperation and coordination of activities were already important components of the Commission's relationships with the Minnesota Department of Economic Development, the University of Minnesota Extension Service and the Southwest State Universities Technical Assistance Center and Small Business Development Center. With the disbanding of the Region 8 Businessmen's Association in September, the Commission is exploring alternatives for establishing a linkage between the private and public sectors to compliment the economic development process.

The Commission has been involved in several technical assistance activities in the area of economic development. Assistance has ranged from identifying potential sources of funds for business expansion and development to downtown beautification

and redevelopment projects.

In 1980, the SRDC will be exploring additional avenues for implementation of the policy of encouraging expansion of employment opportunities and increasing overall awareness of the economic development tools available to Southwest Minnesota.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

While technical assistance is not a requirement of the Regional Development Act, it is an important service to local government by the Southwest Regional Development Commission Staff. Technical assistance has long been identified as a needed service by the Commission and has its own appropriation in the budget.

Technical assistance is information, it is problem solving, it is also grant writing. To provide information to local units of government, the Commission has co-sponsored several workshops in 1979. Representatives of the Department of Housing and Urban Development put on a workshop in Slayton to explain the Community Development Block Grant Program. The Staff of the Minnesota Energy Agency put on a day long workshop to explain the Federal and State Energy Grant Programs and the

Federal Building Temperature Restrictions. The Commission also provides information on available programs through mailings to local units of government, news releases to the media, and weekly radio programs on three area stations. The switchover of the Commission's newsletter, The Southwest Regional Report, from bi-monthly to monthly publications has further enhanced the timeliness of information on available programs. The newsletter is mailed to over 1400 local elected officials and organizations throughout the region.

Another part of technical assistance is problem solving. The SRDC has provided assistance to all local units of government or public spirited groups who have requested help. This assistance has included identifying alternative solutions or potential sources of funds through telephone conversations or meetings with local

leaders.

A third aspect of technical assistance is grant writing. Assistance requests from local units have ranged from going over applications for completeness to helping the applicants fill out the required forms.

The Commission has also continued its involvement in the funding process for several programs. The Minnesota Rural Development Council Grant Program, the State Land Use Planning Grant Program, and the LAWCON/LCMR Parks and Recreation Grant Programs each allow the opportunity for RDC ranking of applications. The Southwest Regional Development Commission has shown a strong interest in providing these rankings to the funding agencies.

In 1980 the Commission will be sponsoring additional workshops on programs available to local government. The feasibility of establishing an information sharing forum for local govern-

ments will also be explored.

PARKS & RECREATION

The Southwest Regional Development Commission's parks and recreation planning activities in 1979 focused on information disemination and plan implementation. The SRDC and the Minnesota State Planning Agency co-sponsored a workshop on the LAWCON/LCMR Outdoor Recreation Grants Programs. Staff from the SPA Parks and Recreation Grants Section explained the programs, the pre-application forms and process and answered questions about individual applications. In addition, the Commission assisted several local units of government in preparing pre-applications for funds. To provide for local funding recommendations, the SRDC's Parks and Recreation Committee diligently reviewed the pre-applications, visited the proposed project sites, and recommended funding priorities to the State. Negotiations were held with the State Planning Agency to agree upon a recommended priority list.

The Commission realized opportunities to implement the policies in the Parks and Recreation Section of the Comprehen-

sive Regional Guide. Management plans for two State Parks. Blue Mound and Kilen Woods, were reviewed for consistency with RDC policies and comments provided to the Department of Natural Resources.

Also during 1979, the State Outdoor Recreation Advisory Council was reorganized. Appointment of a representative to this body has allowed the SRDC to provide input into the State recreation policy formation and decision making processes.

In 1980 the Commission will continue to pursue implementation of the Parks and Recreation Section of the Comprehensive Guide and to alleviate the deficiencies in recreational opportunities available within Southwest Minnesota.

HOUSING

The lack of adequate and affordable housing continued to plague the citizens of Southwest Minnesota in 1979. With interest rates rising at an alarming rate, it seems the problem will not be alleviated in the immediate future. This lack of housing opportunities has caused the SRDC to continue it's planning effort in the area of housing.

In 1979, housing activities of the SRDC were directed toward implementation of the Commission's Comprehensive Regional Development Guide. A needs list of communities in need of elderly and family housing was compiled and submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Comprehensive Guide was used extensively when developing the needs list.

A meeting was held with Farmers Home Administration officials in September to discuss priorities for the funding year. The Commission continued coordinating with the Minnesota Association of Regional Commissions (MARC) Housing Advisory Committee by attending its meetings regularly.

The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency's home Improvement Grant and Loan Programs operated in the Region in 1979. A total of \$693,000 or 6% of the State's total Grant Program funds. were allocated to the six grant administration centers throughout the Region. The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency's Loan Program was allocated \$1,464,000 in 1979. A total of 24 lending institutions are participating within the Region.

Several developers or elected officials consulted the SRDC before submitting housing development applications to the delivery agencies. The majority of the inquiries were for multifamily housing, and included the following: Fulda, Edgerton, Slayton, Currie, Windom, Heron Lake, and Adrian.

In 1980 the SRDC will continue to pursue the implementation of the housing section of the Regional Development Guide in an attempt to alleviate part of the housing shortage problem.

LAND USE

The Land Use Planning Program of the SRDC was expanded

during 1979. Many of the priority policies identified by the Commission were land use related. Therefore the Commission, in July of 1979, increased participation in the area of land use planning. Agreements for land use planning services were signed with four communities within the Region and several other communities have expressed interest in utilizing the service. The work currently in progress includes assisting local communities in development of land use plans, a housing assistance plan, and developing and revising existing zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations. It is the desire of the Commission to make professional planning expertise available at a reasonable rate to the local units of government in Southwest Minnesota. It is anticipated the new land use planning service will continue to be a priority of the Commission in future years and allow for future implementation of Regional policies.

Another area of activity related to land use planning included review of the 42" Alaskan Natural Gas Pipeline Project. The Proposed Pipeline is slated to cross six counties in Southwest Minnesota in late 1980 or 1981. The SRDC was instrumental in forming a special Pipeline Committee consisting of County Board Members and Land Use Committee Members from each county. Because Martin County was the only county outside the Region that would be impacted in Minnesota, the SRDC contracted with Martin County to be involved in the Pipeline Review Process. The SRDC petitioned the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to be involved in the Federal Certification Process to ensure local input into project planning. The Pipeline Committee identified over 15 issues and positions from the agricultural perspective for inclusion in State and Federal Review Procedures. The SRDC was also instrumental in convincing the Pipeline Company, Northern Border Inc., to hold public meetings for landowners in Southwest Minnesota. Over 500 landowners and concerned citizens attended the five meetings held in the Fall of 1979. It is felt that information generated during the review process will allow as many concerns as possible to be satisfied during project planning.

During 1979 the SRDC reviewed two Environmental Assessment Worksheets (EAW's). The EAW's are required by the Minnesota Environmental Quality Board on projects that have the potential to adversely impact the environment. The Commission reviewed the EAW's for consistancy with adopted policies contained in the Comprehensive Development Guide. Comments of the SRDC were provided to the EOB and Project Proposers. Reviewing EAW's affords the SRDC the opportunity to implement the policies identified during the Planning Process. The SRDC has accepted its responsibilities to review projects that could adversely impact the environment.

Another area of land use activity during 1979 was participation in the Minnesota Association of Regional Commissions (MARC) Natural Resources Committee. This participation allows the SRDC, along with other RDC's, to impact State and Federal Agencies that make decisions affecting land use.

Land Use issues in Southwest Minnesota are likely to increase in complexity in the future. As such, the SRDC is committed to providing an intergovernmental planning process to resolve those issues.

TRANSPORTATION

Because of the strong agricultural economy of the Region, Southwest Minnesota needs an efficient and adequate transportation system. Farm to market movements of agricultural commodities and movement of agricultural supplies into the Region are primary concerns. Production of grain in the Region is predicted to increase substantially in future years thus accentuating the need for reliable transportation services.

Planning for efficient transportation system improvements requires an intergovernmental process. The Minnesota Department of Transportation (MN/DOT) is the lead agency for transportation in the State. The SRDC, during 1979, worked with MN/DOT providing a forum for local and regional involvement in policy and programming decisions. Reviews and recommendations were made on the MN/DOT Programming Process, the 1980 Transportation Improvement Program, a vehicle registration study, and a truck weight enforcement study. Adopted policies contained in the Comprehensive Regional Development Guide served as the basis for recommendations.

During 1979 the SRDC developed a project proposal to the State Planning Agency (SPA) and MN/DOT to complete a Regional Transportation Action Plan. The Proposal was submitted to State Planning Agency in December. The Action Plan would be a pilot study to determine the proper level of local and regional input to State transportation programming decisions. A large part of the Proposed Project would be to gather data on the Region's trunk highway system. Deficiencies in the system would be noted and an action plan for selecting projects would be developed. Through the proposed project geographic characteristics of the Regions trunk highways would be documented and recognition of unique characteristics could be understood.

Railroad issues continued to surface during 1979. SRDC helped organize rail users on the Tracy - Gary, S.D. and Lismore - Worthington lines. Both lines were proposed for abandonment. Technical assistance was also provided to other branchline users pointing out available State and Federal Rail Assistance Programs.

During 1979 the SRDC, through the Southwestern Area Agency on Aging, provided technical assistance and funding for elderly transit programs. Murray and Pipestone Counties received funding for a Volunteer Transportation Program. Redwood and Lyon Counties received assistance for a mini-bus. The Worthington Adult Day Care Center also received assistance.

During 1979 the SRDC continued to advocate a balanced transportation system for the citizens and industries of Southwest Minnesota.

WATER RESOURCES

Water as a natural resource can be viewed as an asset to or a constraint on local and regional development. Recognizing that in most areas of Southwest Minnesota water acts as a constraint to development, the SRDC has placed priority on water resources planning. Although the Region has adequate amounts of water, the location of supply in relation to demand and the relatively poor quality increase the need for sound planning, During 1979 the SRDC concluded involvement in State Water Quality Management Planning activities. The State Water Quality Plan was completed in late 1979 after three years of research and recommendations culminating in a public meeting held during November in Slayton. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency was the lead agency for the planning effort with the SRDC providing public and local official input into the Planning Process. Review and recommendations were made on non-point source topics including agricultural erosion, urban runoff, pesticides, feedlots, and roadside erosion. Information about the water quality planning effort was provided to groups and individuals interested in the Program.

During 1979 the SRDC also reviewed documents generated for the State Water and related Land Resources Framework Plan. The State Water Planning Board was the lead agency for the Framework Plan. By having completed water resource policies as part of the Comprehensive Regional Development Guide, the SRDC was able to have those policies addressed during the two major State Water Resource Planning activities.

Lake Management activities were expanded somewhat during 1979. The SRDC continued to provide technical assistance to the Murray County Lakes Improvement Advisory Board. The Lakes Board advised the Murray County Commissioners on lake problems. Assistance was provided to local groups interested in lake problems as requested. Assistance was provided to groups from Lincoln, Nobles, Jackson, and Murray Counties. Preliminary discussions have taken place about the feasibility of putting together a joint application for Federal "Clean Lakes" funds for several lakes in the Region. Discussions will continue with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and local officials.

Technical assistance was provided during 1979 to enable local units of government deal more effectively with their water problems. SRDC Staff developed several applications for State and Federal Funds for water projects.

The SRDC, recognizing the significance that water resources have on regional development, will continue to provide information and assistance to the local governments and citizens of the Region about water resources. The SRDC will also continue to act as an intergovernmental forum to seek solutions to water resource problems.

COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING

Nineteen hundred and seventy nine was the first full year since the SRDC officially adopted the Comprehensive Regional Development Guide (CRDG). Therefore, comprehensive planning activities were geared more toward implementation of adopted policies. Adopted policies in the various functional areas of the CRDG serve as a foundation for on-going planning activities.

It became obvious to the Commission, soon after plan adoption, that efforts to implement 180+ policies would need to be prioritized in order to maximize effectiveness. During 1979 various policy implementation strategies were developed. The initial phase of strategy development which was concluded during 1979 was prioritizing the 180+ policies contained in the CRDG. The 180+ policies from all seven functional areas were ranked and the top 31 priority policies were selected for future implementation emphasis.

The next phase of implementation strategy development included a joint SRDC/MN Rural Development Council Seminar held in July. The Rural Development Council includes members representing State and Federal Agencies that make decisions impacting the region. The purpose of the joint seminar was to discuss and "brainstorm" actions that could be taken to implement the selected policies contained in the CRDG. Potential action strategies for each of the top priority policies were developed through small group and large group discussions. Many ideas and suggestions were recorded and the joint seminar enabled SRDC members and representatives of state agencies to share ideas. The results of the seminar were summarized and provided to State and Federal Agency Representatives to encourage the building of a continued inter-governmental Planning Process.

The development of policy implementation strategies based on a Comprehensive Planning Process is a unique method of decision-making. The Regional Development Act mandated the SRDC to prepare and adopt a CRDG. However, procedures for implementation of the policies contained in the CRDG were less clearly spelled out in the Act. The SRDC does not view the lack of clarity as a total constraint but anticipates adding a fresh new perspective to intergovernmental decisionmaking at the State, Federal, and local level. The SRDC will continue to emphasize building relationships between the various levels of government in order to provide for orderly and harmonious growth and development within the Region.

EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING PROGRAMS

With Region 8 receiving around \$2.5 million in adult and youth employment and training programs, the Regional Employment and Training Advisory Committee, the Region 8 Youth Council and the Title VI Review Committee have been very

active in the planning and development of various CETA programs.

The major activity of the regional advisory committees has been the development of the Fiscal Year 1980 Region 8 Strategic Employment and Training Plan. After analyzing the economic conditions and trends, identifying employment opportunities, and assessing the needs of low-income persons, the Advisory Committees recommended that displaced homemakers, older workers in the pre-retirement age, handicapped, offenders and ex-offenders be prioritized as most in need of adult employment and training services, Approximately \$635,000 of the Fiscal Year 1980 Title II program has been allocated for the adult employment and training program with another \$85,000 concentrated on low-income youth in high school. The Regional Employment and Training Advisory Committee was also involved in the expansion of older worker programs in Region 8, the development of a displaced homemaker program in the northern counties of Region 8, the planning of a CETA / private business program to generate jobs for low-income people and the development of a CETA / Education project for high school dropouts and potential dropouts.

The Region 8 Youth Council monitored the Governor's Youth Program, the Summer Youth Employment Program, the Youth Employment and Training Program and the Youth Community Conservation and Improvement Program, The Governor's Youth Program, operated by the Department of Economic Security Offices in Marshall and Worthington, provided summer employment for youth with a budget of \$130,000. The Summer Youth Employment Program with its budget of almost \$300,000 was operated by the Community Action Agencies in Marshall and Worthington and provided summer employment for low-income youth. The Marshall and Worthington CETA Centers were allocated about \$185,000 to operate the Youth Employment and Training Program. The Youth Community Conservation and Improvement Program, operated by the Southwest Minnesota Opportunity Council in Worthington, provides year-round employment in community projects for unemployed youth. The Region 8 Youth Council prioritized handicapped, unwed parents, offenders and ex-offenders as youth most in need of employment and training services for Fiscal Year 1980.

Of the \$550,000 allocated to Region 8 for public service employment programs, \$305,000 was allocated for the individual county programs with the remaining \$245,000 for regional community projects. The Title VI Review Committee was responsible for reviewing all CETA Title VI Community Project applications and for prioritizing them for funding. The projects funded during 1979 included park renovation, weatherization program, housing demolition, counseling to unwed parents, library reorganization, senior center renovation, counseling to terminally-ill persons, integration of handicapped youth into classrooms, and prevocational program of basic skills.

AGING SOUTHWESTERN AREA AGENCY ON AGING

This is the second full year of the Aging Program of the Southwest Regional Development Commission. The aging program has served an eighteen county area through the cooperation of the Six East and Upper Minnesota Valley Regional Development Commissions. This year has been a year of transition with the completion of the plan to transfer funding and monitoring authority for the Nutrition (meal-site) Program for the elderly to the Southwestern Area Agency on Aging. A Nutrition/Grants Manager was added to the Aging staff in December, 1979, to assume this new responsibility. With the increased work-load and funding of the nutrition program, the respective development commissions were awarded separate designations as Area Agencies on Aging as of January 1980.

The sixteen member, tri-regional Advisory Council, which represented the eighteen county area, was disolved and held their last meeting in June. Region VIII continues to have its own Advisory Council, which met 7 times during 1979. Its main activities were to conduct grant review, make funding recommendations, assist in the needs assessment and provide input and direction for the 1980 Area Plan for Programs on Aging.

Grant-making in 1979 consisted of awarding \$68,211 in federal funds for social service programs, and \$45,285 for multipurpose senior centers. A two-county volunteer transportation program was initiated January, 1979, and five continuing social service projects funded with services such as transportation, home health aide, homemaker, county coordinator on aging and adult day care. Grants to renovate and expand multi-purpose senior centers were awarded to Chandler, Lake Benton, Brewster and Tracy.

The Area Agency on Aging sponsored 4 training workshops for persons who work with the elderly, with topics on lay advocacy legal training, leadership and advocacy in aging programs, working with the elderly and physiological aspects of aging. These workshops trained approximately 450 persons.

The last year was a time of expended technical assistance to local agencies. Beyond the development and monitoring of the directly-funded projects, the aging staff has successfully helped secure private foundation funds for a multipurpose senior center, provided assistance in organizing evaluation procedures for a senior volunteer program, helped establish long-range planning guidelines for the nutrition program for the elderly and was instrumental in expanding employment opportunities for older persons in Region VIII through the Green Thumb Program and Minnesota Department of Economic Security.

The aged in Region VIII are served by a variety of human service agencies. To promote coordination regular contact has been maintained with the county welfare departments, community action agencies, public health nursing, and mental health

centers. The aging staff is active on various boards including the Minnesota Association of Regional Commissions Human Resources Committee, Southwest Minnesota Opportunity Council Older Workers Employment Board, Health Systems Agency Six Project Review Committee, Nutrition Project Council, Minnesota Gerotological Society, and the Minnesota Board on Aging Training Task Force.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE Region E Advisory Council

Since the initial passage of the federal Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1978, both the staff and membership of the Region E Advisory Council have continually reaffirmed their commitment of upgrading the quality of criminal justice services in southwestern Minnesota. With the passage of the Minnesota Crime Control Planning Board Act of 1977, Southwest Regional Development Commission accepted the role of sponsorship and cooperative program management of this vital planning effort. SRDC support, together with the cooperation of the Upper Minnesota Valley and Six East Regional Development Commissions furthered the successful operation of this program during 1979.

From the creation of a regionwide drug investigation unit to the establishment of emergency juvenile shelter care networks in Lyon, Lincoln, Murray, Pipestone, Rock and Nobles County, the Council staff has annually assessed local criminal justice problems, provided needed technical assistance and assisted area juvenile justice, law enforcement, courts and corrections agencies in securing federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, federal Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act and Minnesota Youth Intervention Act funds.

During 1979, Region E secured and awarded \$206,116 in state and federal criminal justice grant in aid monies. Significant 1979 SRDC projects include the Region E Drug Investigation Unit (Redwood County), Worthington Crime Prevention Unit (City of Worthington), Fifth Judicial District Records Management Project (Redwood County), Rural Juror Utilization Project (Fifth and Eighth Judicial Districts), Lyon County Jail Treatment Program (Lyon County), Southwest Minnesota Youthworker Training Project (Lyon County), Redwood Youth Commission (City of Redwood Falls), Family Care Project (Lyon County Residential Facility, Inc.), Emergency Juvenile Foster Care Program (Region VIII North Welfare) and the Tri-County Juvenile Shelter Care Program (Pipestone County).

Technical assistance projects lead to the development of a statewide cooperative purchasing program for the procurement of law enforcement radio communications equipment and a series of on-site court security evaluations conducted with the assistance of the Kansas City Regional Office of the United States Marshals Service. Assistance was also provided in securing alternative funding for area family violence programs and in the areas

of jail programming and facility planning.

Based upon an annual assessment of regional criminal justice needs, the staff and membership of the Region E Advisory Council are firmly committed to expanding their 1980 planning activities to include additional emphasis on upgrading area jail facilities, juvenile detention, conducting a regionwide assessment of family violence services, the development of comprehensive community crime prevention programs and the implementation of a regionwide peace officer training program.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

The Developmental Disabilities Advisory Committee completed a number of activities during the year 1979. Work continued in gathering information for the comprehensive plan. A newsletter, published monthly, detailed activities and programs for over 500 persons in the area. A training program in public information was developed with the actual training to be carried out in 1980. In cooperation with other regional programs, the committee co-sponsored a training session on human sexuality. Two subsequent sessions have been held in the state.

The committee assisted on five occasions in the planning for workshops dealing with educational rights of handicapped students. The committee planned and sponsored two seminars on prevention held in Willmar and Worthington.

The Legislative Subcommittee was very active reviewing bills during the 1979 Minnesota Legislative Session. The committee urged the RDC's to support approximately 20 bills and contacted legislators requesting support. In the latter part of the year the committee developed legislative position statements addressing eight different issues. With the support of the Regional Development Commissions, the legislators from the area have been informed of the position statements.

In an effort to identify the needs of the school-aged disabled, the committee launched an effort to gather information through the schools. An effort to determine the need for parental relief services was also begun with the cooperation of a myriad of service agencies.

Technical assistance was provided to several agencies and reviews were conducted at the request of the Regional Development Commissions.


