



As you read this report you will see that some new programs have been initiated and other programs remain the same. The capacity of the Region to adopt changes in programs to meet local needs is a continuing goal.


Economic Development continues to increase in importance and the Emergency Medical Services programs is off to a good start. Other programs continue to improve with experience.

INTRODUCTION TO REGION NINE AND THE REGION NINE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

In 1972 the Region Nine Development Commission (RNDC) was organized by local elected officials as authorized by the Regional Development Act of 1969. Its purpose according to the legislation is "to facilitate intergovernmental cooperation and to insure the orderly and harmonious coordination of state, federal and local comprehensive planning and development programs for the solution of economic, social, physical and governmental problems of the state and its citizens." (Minnesota Statutes, Section 462.383; Subdivision 2.)

The nine counties that make up the Region Nine area, specifically Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca and Watonwan have a population of 204,010 of the state's 4,075,970 persons according to the 1980 census. The area is stable and prosperous with a strong economy, good facilities and services and has three major cities over 10,000 population, Mankato, New Ulm and Fairmont.


Serving on the RNDC are elected officials who represent 9 counties, 72 cities, 147 townships, 45 school districts, 9 soil and water conservation districts and the Minnesota Valley Council of Governments. They are joined by a representative of business and industry in the region.

The 35 member RNDC meets monthly to respond to the need for counties, cities, townships, school districts and other groups to work together on a regional basis to address economic, social, physical and environmental problems. About 300 citizens of Region Nine are actively involved in regional planning as advisory council, committee and subcommission members. Each year since 1972 has noted an increase in citizen and elected official participation as more people discover how they can best assist with the planning programs and be served by the RNDC.

With its many planning functions, the RNDC has a professional planning staff to assist itself, subcommissions and committees in carrying out the activities they have defined. The staff consists of the executive director, deputy director and specialists in the fields of recreation, land use, community/economic development, housing, transportation, water quality, energy, solid/hazardous waste, cable television, aging, arts and developmental disabilities. They are assisted by an accountant, a public information coordinator, a bookkeeper, secretaries, a graphics coordinator and interns.

Physical Development Planning

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT SUBCOMMISSION

The Physical Development Subcommission is advisory to the Region Nine Development Commission in establishing Physical Development policies and priorities for the rgion. In this capacity, the Subcommission reviews plans, policies and activities in a variety of program areas including land use, housing, community development, economic development, transportation and recreation. Membership consists of 14 persons including one representative from each of the nine counties, one representative from each of the cities of Fairmont, Mankato and New Ulm, one representative from the Soil and Water Conservation Districts of Region Nine.

Many diverse physical planning activities were addressed by the Physical Development Subcommission last year: review of the Small City Development Grant Program applications; review of the Governor's Council on Rural Development grants; discussion of the hazardous waste siting program; the conduct of all required reviews; and the review of all of the physical development programs and initiatives.

During Fy1985, the Physical Development Subcommission will continue its efforts as outlined. It is expected that new concerns, including business and rural development, will be addressed as they arise.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Regional Development Act mandated that regional commissions "shall prepare and adopt, after appropriate study and such public hearings as may be necessary, a comprehensive development plan for the Region." Region Nine formally commenced its effort in July of 1978 and has completed long term goals and polices for the Commission. The annual Overall Program Design serves as the work program.

Also, as part of this program area, Region Nine completed the annual salary survey which was then forwarded to interested local units of government.

LAND USE

The primary emphasis of the Land Use Program has been in providing technical assistance to local units of government. The staff has assisted communities with a variety of land use matters ranging from minimum tillage concerns to capital improvement considerations.

Technical Assistance

Last year, Region Nine assisted a number of communities in developing new maps to depict zoning modifications.

A major project was the formulation of an assessments policy manual for the City of Elysian.

Minimum Tillage

The Tri-County Conservation Tillage Program applied for and received second year funding for their program from the Governors council on Rural Development.

HOUSING

The regional Housing Program in FY1984 primarily focused on activities oriented toward effective implementation of the Region Nine Housing Plan, and on the provision of technical assistance to local units of government and the general public. Greater emphasis has been placed on the availability and utilization of local, state and federal housing assistance programs as a result of escalating housing costs and interest rates.

RNDC staff are continuing to work closely with representatives from Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Minnesota Housing Finance Agency (MHFA), Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) and local housing and redevelopment officials in attempting to satisfy the housing needs of area residents.

The Region Nine Housing Plan has been updated to reflect 1980 census information.

TRANSPORTATION

The Transportation Committee concentrated its attention on the movement of agricultural and commercial products, on improving the mobility of its citizens and on other concerns of the region. At the Transportation Committee meetings a variety of transportation experts gave presentations. Some of the issues dicussed were:

- -Mn/DOT 1984-85 transportation projects in the region
- -Developments on the Norwood/Hanley Falls rail line
- -Mn/DOT State Rail Bank Program
- -Functional classification of public roads in Minnesota
- -Highway Patrol-portable scales, civil weights

The Transportation Committee reaffirmed these transportation issues:

- -Support of Mn/DOT's effort to create a 10-ton route system
- -Request to local road authorities to determine if some roads should be legally abandoned
- -Support for commercial transportation within 10 miles of each person in Region Nine

The Transportation Committee also reaffirmed issues that were adopted 4 years ago.

During FY1985, the Committee will update the Regional Transportation Plan and will continue to carry out its responsibilities in the areas noted above. These activities will be expanded to include any emerging issues or areas of concern which the Committe sees as significant to the Region.

SBA 503 LOAN PROGRAM

The 503 Loan Program, offered through the federal government's Small Business Administration, is administered locally by the Region Nine Development Corporation. The program makes joint federal and private sector financing available to small and medium size businesses. Its purpose is to stimulate growth and expansion of small businesses by combining the incentives of long term (15-25 years), low down payment (10%), and reasonable rates (near long term U.S. Treasury bond rates) to business development projects.

Within the past year, the Region Nine Development Corporation has received approval of four loans through the 503 program:

-Dietz Super Valu, Mapleton

-Frost Drug Store, North Mankato

-Mathes Printing, Mankato

-Sar, Inc., New Ulm

The total dollar amount of both the private and public financing has been \$990,000 of which \$440,000 was financed through the Region Nine Development Corporaion. This effort has resulted in creating 15 additional jobs and increasing the tax base in Nicollet, Blue Earth and Brown counties.

The Corporation has seen a steady increase in both activity and interest. Two additional applications have been submitted to SBA for approval and staff is presently working with several businesses which have expressed an interest in the program.

RECREATION

The Region Nine Recreation Program is focused primarily on the development and promotion of the area's outdoor recreation resources. In fiscal year 1984, development was achieved through grant programs such as the LAWCON/LCMR program which provides

matching grant monies to local jurisdictions for parks and open space. Promotion of the area's outdoor recreational facilities has been accomplished through tourism advertising and soon a recreation atlas.

Recreation Grants

The Department of Energy and Economic Development offered matching grant money to local units of government in the form of a LAWCON/LCMR grant program. RNDC staff advertised the program, provided technical assistance to many of the grant applicants, assisted in the production of 2 applications for the cities of Kiester and New Auburn, and completed an application for Blue Earth County.

Local ranking criteria which have been developed by the Region Nine Development Commission were used to promote the area's outdoor recreation needs. This ranking is used on a 50/50 basis with a ranking done at the state level to determine sites to be programmed for funding. This process has proved successful in promoting the outdoor recreation needs of the Region Nine area. The total amount of programmed costs for parks in Region Nine was \$111,752.

Another grant program, spawned by the Federal Emergency Jobs bill, became available in the spring and summer of 1983. It was the Small Business Administration's Parks and Recreational Area Development Program. RNDC staff provided assistance to 27 units of government requesting information on the program.

Recreation Promotion

A series of tourism ads, part of the "Explore Minnesota" promotion, were produced for the City of Elysian by Region Nine staff. The advertisements were printed in numerous major papers in the State of Iowa.

Information for the production of a recreation atlas or brochure has been fully compiled and it will be printed either as an independent product or as part of an existing publication,

such as the items produced by Pioneerland.

High transportation costs coupled with increasing pressure on our existing outdoor recreation base is a recreation problem of regional significance. Region Nine will continue to promote the addition of facilities in this area through grant programs such as LAWCON/LCMR while promoting our local parks through a recreation atlas and tourism publications. This will not only reduce pressure on heavily used areas by alerting people to little used facilities, but will decrease the amount of travel out of the Region for recreational activities which duplicate similar activities existing within the Region Nine area.

Communication with such agencies as the Department of Energy and Economic Development and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will continue and technical assistance will be provided

CABLE TELEVISION

The Region Nine Cable Program was developed as a result of the fact that Regional Development Commissions have the responsibility to review cable territory requests in their respective geographic areas. A cable policy document has been formulated for use when territory requests come before the Region for consideration.

During the coming year, Region Nine will continue to monitor the federal legislation. Also, staff will be available to assist small communities in the development of their cable ordinances and services.

COMMUNITY/ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Over the past year the Region Nine Development Commission has greatly expanded its involvement in community/economic development programs. The present staff offers comprehensive, professional expertise to communities and individual businesses seeking to accomplish development projects. A sample of the programs and skills which are available include:

- -Development and implementation of tax increment finance plans
 -Research for and writing of Small Cities Development Block
 Grants and Urban Development Action Grants
- -Financial analysis and application for small business loans
 -Preparation of community development plans and implementation
 of corresponding commercial rehabilitation bond programs.
- A partial list of the accomplishments in the past year include:
- -Met with the city councils of each city in the Region to discuss the Region and its programs
- -Worked with Blue Earth County to develop guidelines for their Economic Development Grant Program

Human Resource Planning

HUMAN RESOURCE SUBCOMMISSION

The Human Resource Subcommission is advisory to the RNDC in planning and policy development related to human resources. In this capacity, the Subcommission reviews plans and policies recommended by the advisory councils on aging, arts, developmental disabilities, emergency medical services and employment and training. Membership consists of 12 citizens, one from each county and one from each city over 10,000, who are

appointed by the RNDC.

The HRS has been assigned responsibility for coordination of planning efforts in human resources. As part of this responsibility, HRS members regularly attend meetings of the aforementioned advisory councils, as well as the meetings of organizations providing human services in the region, such as Human Service Boards and mental health boards. Specific activities conducted in FY1984 under this coordinative role included: review of all plans and recommendations developed by RNDC advisory councils in human resources; other grant reviews, i.e., Community Health Service Plans, Community action Agency grants, etc.; recommendations on appointments to advisory councils.

AREA AGENCY ON AGING

The Region Nine Development Commission has been designated as the Area Agency on Aging (AAA) for the nine counties of southcentral Minnesota since 1976. The Area Agency receives its funding from the federal Administration on Aging under the Older Americans Act as administered through the Minnesota Board on

The Area Agency on Aging is expected to fulfill the many responsibilities outlined in the Older Americans Act:

- -to serve as a focal point on aging
- -to disseminate information on aging in the nine county area
- -to coordinate and co-locate services to older people
- -to seek private financial and human resources
- -to provide training to the aging network
- -to advocate on behalf of older people
- -to plan for services by identifying needs and matching resources to those needs
- -to make grants for new expanded services
- -to ensure the maintenance of priority services in region

1984-86 Area Plan

The Region Nine Area Agency on Aging is required under the Older Americans Act and by the Minnesota Board on Aging to regularly assess the needs of older persons in the region. The assessment of these needs and the plan for action that addresses them is known as the Area Plan on Aging. The Plan acts as a guideline for the Area Agency's activities.

ARTS

The Region Nine Arts Council is a volunteer group of citizens representing a broad base of regional arts interests from each county and from each city over 10,000 in the region. The Council reviews grant applications submitted by arts organizations within the region and forms arts policies, goals and priorities in the region. The Council members also provide technical assistance to those local arts organizations and serve as advocates for local and regional arts development.

The regranting of funds allocated by the Minnesota State Legislature was again the major activity of the Arts Council in FY1984. Two grant review rounds were held combining the reviews for sponsorship, production and McKnight applications. The criteria for the sponsorship and production grants are: artistic merit of the project, the ability of the organization to successfully complete it, and the need for the project within the designated area. The applicant is required to provide at least 50% match for the project.

Production Project Assistance Grants - provide funds for local/regional arts development and enhancement of artists or arts resources within a community or region.

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DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

The Region Nine Developmental Disabilities Program, which has been in existence for 11 years, is funded through a grant from the Governor's Council on Developmental Disabilities. (Developmental disabilities are severely handicapping conditions that begin early in life and substantially limit the ability of persons to develop normally and perform normal activities.)

The Developmental Disabilities Advisory Council is comprised of developmentally disabled persons or their parents, service providers and members of consumer groups. The Council reviews programs and proposals, provides training and information and promotes the provision of services in the least restrictive environment.

During the past year, topics such as Welsch vs. Levine, the criminal justice system as it relates to the developmentally disabled and the Title XIX waiver were addressed. In support of this year's grant focus on day programs, four workshops on vocational training alternatives were held. The workshops dealt with training developmentally disabled clients to perform real work in non-sheltered environments.

The D.D. Program responds to numerous requests for information from service providers and consumer groups and is represented on task forces serving hearing impaired persons and other disability groups

The MA Waiver Bill passed last year created some confusion about how services will be changed and how they will be provided under the new law. To provide answers, the Council sponsored an informational forum on the bill and its possible effects. Although the waiver has not yet been implemented, its potential effects on the service system are being studied.

The D.D. Council and the Minnesota Valley Social Adaptation Center received a McKnight Foundation grant for developing behavior management services in the region. The behavior specialist and project director has worked with 12 facilities in 7 communities, as well as provided direct client consultation to 30 individuals.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The Southcentral Emergency Medical Services Joint Powers Board has contracted with the Region Nine Development Commission for technical assistance and staffing toward implementing improvements in the EMS system in the region. Last year the Joint Powers Board contracted with RNDC to develop the first year implementation plan. The Joint Powers Board is comprised of one county commissioner from each of the nine counties, and is responsible for the use of EMS implementation funds available from the Minnesota Department of Health.

To advise it in its planning and implementation activities, the Joint Powers Board has established an Advisory Committee, a Critical Care Subcommittee and a Radio Communications Subcommittee. Each group has members from throughout the region, representing various aspects of the EMS system. The groups played a major role during the planning stage of the project, assisting the Joint Powers Board in examining the needs in the area and developing an implementation plan to begin addressing those needs.

Priority I activities scheduled for completion during the first year of implementation include:

- -Trained Personnel: assist first responder squads; encourage EMT training: encourage EMS dispatcher training.
- -Transportation: develop ambulance trip report forms.
- -Radio Communications: encourage compliance.
- -Public Involvement: design public information tool; establish pilot Good Neighbor program.
- -System Management: designate medical directors; reorganize committees.

Priority II activities are:

- -Trained Personnel: assist ACLS training; encourage medical personnel training.
- -Radio Communications: develop radio communications plan; provide purchasing assistance; provide 911 assistance.
- -Public Involvement: provide newsletter, news releases, coordination.
- -Facilities: assess trauma patient data; assess cardiac patient data.
- -System Management: manage grant; assess RFP process.

Priority III includes:

- -Trained Personnel: assess EMT-1 training needs; conduct. regionwide EMS conference.
- -Transportation: analyze trip report data.
- -Public Safety Coordination: examine disaster plans.
- -Facilities: categorize hospitals; assist Critical Care (directory, ER log, ACLS, ATLS).
