# CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

Citizens of Southwestern Minnesota,

The Southwest Regional Development Commission has completed another successful year of service to the local units of government and to the citizens of southwestern Minnesota.

The programs of the SRDC have provided many accomplishments and achievements during the past year. Through the technical assistance services, six cities in southwestern Minnesota received \$3.9 million for construction projects with funds from the Small Cities Development Grant Program. Economic development assistance has been given for industrial park improvements, downtown revitalization, expansion of existing businesses and location of new businesses. The Prairieland Economic Development Corporation recently received certification from the Small Business Administration's 503 program and will soon provide financing to eligible small businesses. The SRDC assisted the cities of Lakefield, Pipestone and Round Lake in their land use projects. Under the developmental disabilities program, the SRDC assisted eight developmental achievement centers, two sheltered workshops and an independent living center in increasing work for almost 100 adults with disabilities and in placing 67 adults with disabilities in community jobs such as dishwashing, table setting, janitorial assistance, and child care. Through the Southwestern Area Agency on Aging, \$102,010 has been awarded to various social service agencies to provide transportation, hospice, home health, and advocacy for the elderly population in the region. An additional \$80,815 was awarded for multipurpose senior centers in Ellsworth, Fulda, Adrian, Luverne, and Heron Lake. The Area Agency on Aging also distributed funds totaling almost \$300,000 for congregate meals, \$50,000 for homedelivered meals and \$24,140 in McKnight funds for self-help projects and senior center renovation.

The Commission is looking forward to another year of service and dedication to the people of southwestern Minnesota.

## PLANNING ACTIVITIES

#### TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

While technical assistance is not a requirement of the Regional Development Act, it is an important service to local government units by the Southwest Regional Development Commission (SRDC) staff. Technical assistance has long been identified as a needed service by the commission and has its own appropriation

Technical assistance is information, it is problem solving, and it is grant writing. Over the past year, SRDC staff has discussed the Minnesota Small Cities Development Grant Program with over twenty-five cities and counties on an individual basis. The commission also provides information on available programs through mailings and to local units of government and new releases to the media. The Southwest Regional Report, the Commission's Quarterly Newsletter, provides information on available programs to over 1,400 local elected officials and organizations throughout the region.

Another part of technical assistance is problem solving. The SRDC has provided assistance to all local units of government or public spirited groups who have requested assistance. This assistance has included identifying alternative solutions or potential sources of funds through telephone conversations or meetings with local civic groups, city councils, and county boards. The SRDC has become increasingly active in assisting communities identify and solve local problems. In FY 1984, the SRDC staff completed detailed needs assessments and surveys in several communities and discussed local strategies with each community, which identify the tools available to communities to resolve their problems. In addition, SRDC staff has discussed with several local chambers of commerce and business associations downtown improvements and how to plan and finance such improvements.

A third aspect of technical assistance is grant writing and administration. Requests for assistance from local governmental units have ranged from going over applications for completeness to assisting the applicants, do the research, writing, and offer information and advice necessary to make sound decisions. The SRDC staff has, directly assisted communities with applications ranging from rural fire protection grants to Minnesota Small Cities Development Program Grants (SCDG). Assistance has been provided to nineteen cities on the Minnesota SCDG program administered by the Minnesota Department of Energy and Economic Development in FY 1984. Six cities are receiving the rewards of these efforts, which will result in 3.9 million dollars of construction projects in the region. Since 1975, the SRDC has assisted local governmental units with SCDG applications; and these efforts have resulted in over 20.9 million dollars in construction projects in the region. SRDC staff continue to provide follow-up assistance to past grant recipients to avoid problems in administration and program assessments.

The commission also continues its involvement in the funding process for several other programs. The Minnesota Rural Development Council Grant Program and the LAWCON/LCMR Parks and Recreation Grant Program each allow the opportunity for SRDC ranking of applications. The SRDC has shown a strong interest in providing these rankings to the funding agencies.

In FY 1985 the commission will be sponsoring additional workshops on programs available and topics of interest to local units of government. A workshop on the Minnesota SCDG program will be conducted in a timely manner for local units of governments interested in the program. The staff will also continue to assist communities with grant writing and problem solving. SRDC staff will continue to offer input on the state administration of the SCDG program to avoid problems that could hinder the funding effectiveness at the local level. In addition, the SRDC is currently planning to provide assistance to local government units interested in computer software for the following functions: utility billing, budgeting, payroll, spreadsheet for budget planning, liquor store inventory and control, and word processing.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

One of the priority policies of the Southwest Regional Development Commission's (SRDC) Comprehensive Regional Development Guide is to encourage the expansion of employment opportunities available to residents of the region, Implementation of this policy is being pursued by assisting small businesses in expansion and creation through the provision of long-term fixed asset financing, as well as a number of other avenues.

Past efforts to provide technical assistance to businesses in the region have resulted in a coordinated framework for business assistance. Coordination and cooperation with the MN Department of Energy and Economic Development and the Small Business Development Center at Southwest State University have resulted in high quality assistance to area businesses and in-

The Commission has been involved in assistance activities including industrial park improvements, downtown revitalization programs, needs assessment, the MN Star Cities Program, expansion of existing businesses and location of new businesses.

A new component of the assistance program is the establishment of the Prairieland Economic Development Corporation. The corporation is made up of 27 members representing private lenders, chambers of commerce, local industrial development corporations and local elected officials. The Corporation was officially designated as a SBA 503 Certified Development Corporation this past spring and is now capable of providing financing assistance to eligible small businesses.

The 503 program allows the corporation to provide longterm, reduced interest, fixed-asset financing for expansion or start-ups of small businesses in southwest Minnesota. As of this time, several prospective deals have already begun. With this inflow of potential economic development activity the Corporation will be able to provide financing through the 503 program or respond through a number of other business/industrial financing or management assistance options. As Prairieland continues to mature and grow it may be able to undertake additional tasks such as industrial promotion, prospecting for new businesses and processing of other state and federal loan programs.

A final component of the Commission's economic development acitivity has been its involvement with the Minnesota Star Cities Program. The program, sponsored by the MN Department of Energy & Economic Development, is a capacity building exercise for local communities to encourage them to develop the tools necessary to pursue a local economic development program. Commission staff have provided expertise to prospective Star Cities ranging from program explanation and start-up to training on available financing tools to consulting on planning economic development strategies and labor market surveys.

It is through these various activities and the maintenance of a strong economic development program that the SRDC will continue to pursue and achieve its goals of expanding employment opportunities, creating new jobs, and enhancing the tax base

of Region 8.

#### HOUSING

The lack of adequate and affordable housing continues to plague the citizens of Southwest Minnesota in 1984. Although interest rates have decreased, they remain high. With high interest rates, it seems the problem will not be alleviated in the immediate future. The lack of housing opportunities has caused the Southwest Regional Development Commission (SRDC) to continue planning and assistance in the area of housing. In FY 1984, housing activities of the SRDC were directed toward implementing the Commissions Comprehensive Regional Development Guide and the Rural Development Strategy.

Several developers and elected officials consulted with the SRDC and requested assistance before submitting housing development applications to the delivery agencies. The majority of the inquires were for multi-family and elderly housing and included the following cities: Hendricks, Lynd, Marshall, Redwood Falls, Slayton, and Worthington. SRDC staff is currently planning to provide assistance in completing housing market studies for area developers interested in the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Rural Rental Housing Program. In addition, further attempts at obtaining Minnesota Small Cities Development Grants (SCDG) will be undertaken. The City of Taunton was the only city to receive SCDG funds for housing rehabilitation in FY 1984. Assistance and information was also provided to counties, Community Action Agencies, and various organizations on housing issues including establishing Housing Redevelopment Authorities, setting up SCDG programs, and housing rehabilitation proposals. The SRDC also provides information and discussed the Minnesota Finance Agency's Loan program with several non-participating lenders.

In FY 1985 the SRDC will continue to pursue the implementation of the housing section of the Comprehensive Guide and the Rural Investment Strategy and explore new and innovative means

of alleviating part of the housing problems.

LAND USE / ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

In Fiscal Year 1984, the Southwest Regional Development Commission (SRDC), continued the land use planning and environmental assistance program that commenced in 1979. Since that time, land use plans, zoning and subdivision regulations and model ordinances have been prepared and/or amended for local units of government throughout the region. During F.Y. 1984, land use plans were completed for the cities of Lakefield and Round Lake. As a means of implementing these plans, amendments to the zoning code of the City of Lakefield were approved, while the City of Round Lake adopted its first zoning ordinance. Work also began on revisions to the zoning and subdivision ordinances of the City of Pipestone.

Other land use related activities during the past year were in the area of environmental concerns. This included monitoring further developments relative to the operation of the Northern Border pipeline project, as well as the State of Minnesota's efforts in selecting a site for underground storage of hazardous waste. This prompted the Commission to act in opposing all underground storage of hazardous waste, and specifically within the Minnesota River Valley; on the basis of potential impacts upon groundwater supplies and agricultural productivity. In addition, the issues surrounding solid waste management and planning in the region were examined more closely. A series of meetings were initiated by the SRDC, bringing together state agency staff, local government officials and private landfill owners/operators to discuss the reasons for increasing management and planning efforts; as well as to address solid waste legislation. Technical

assistance was also provided in the areas of flood control and water quality.

The Commission has reaffirmed its desire to make professional land use and environmental planning expertise available to local units of government in southwestern Minnesota. It is anticipated that the planning assistance program will remain as a priority of the Commission in future years. This will allow for continued implementation of regional policies in the local plans which are developed.

#### PARKS AND RECREATION

In Fiscal Year 1984, the Southwest Regional Development Commission's parks and recreation planning activities continued to focus on implementation of the policies contained in the

Comprehensive Regional Guide.

The Commission assisted applicants for Federal LAWCON/State LCMR Parks and Outdoor Recreation Grants in both preliminary and final application stages. To provide for local funding review, members of the SRDC Parks and Recreation Committee visited project sites and ranked them according to the criteria developed by the Parks and Recreation Grants Unit of the MN Department of Energy and Economic Development (DEED). These rankings were then compared to DEED's evaluations and a combined priority list was then developed to determine funding.

Involvement was also maintained in the state's recreation

Involvement was also maintained in the state's recreation policy formation and decision making processes through Commission representation on the State Outdoor Recreation Planning

and Advisory Committee (ORPAC).

In Fiscal Year 1984, the Commission will continue to pursue opportunities to provide local input into recreation policy and funding decisions and will support efforts to emphasize the tourism aspects of southwest Minnesota.

#### TRANSPORTATION

Transportation planning, research and technical assistance remained a high priority and continued to be emphasized as part of the comprehensive activities of the Southwest Regional Development Commission. A multi-faceted approach was taken to address the critical issues in transportation in southwest Minnesota. This included monitoring further developments relative to the operation of the Hanley Falls to Norwood rail line; which resumed in the spring of 1984, and which had received technical assistance from the SRDC in the past.

Following denial for a special study grant from the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MN/DOT), the Commission approved the funding of a study to research and document cost-containment practices used by counties and townships to address roadway maintenance costs. The proposal was generated by discussions of the SRDC Transportation Committee, following

MN/DOT's denial.

Although public transit may not be as high a priority in this region as others, interest remains by several communities and counties, to maintain or expand services. In addition, the Commission has provided technical assistance to those organizations pursuing transit projects.

Of course, highway improvements and maintenance remain a high priority of the SRDC. The Commission has continued to monitor the Trunk Highway 60 review process and maintain its support for complete improvement. In addition, the SRDC Transportation Committee met periodically over the year to address such issues as: the accelerated phased-in transfer of the state vehicle excise tax from the general fund to the transit and highway user funds, the designation of highways in the region as 10 ton routes, the 1985-1989 MN/DOT program of major construction/reconstruction projects and resurfacing/reconditioning candidates in the region, as well as updating its own regional highway improvement priority list. The committee also began to look at the impacts from proposed jurisdictional change and turnback of state highways to local governments in the region. Throughout the year, the Commission maintained its close relationship with district managers and the central office through its regional MN/DOT representative. This on-going relationship allowed the parties involved to discuss the region's concerns and priorities in an effective and resolute manner.

In summary, the Southwest Regional Development Commission will continue to strive for an improved and well-balanced transportation system necessary for the economic and social well-being of the residents of the region.

#### CENSUS DATA CENTER

During Fiscal Year 1983 the Southwest Regional Development Commission was designated as one of twenty-five affiliates to the Minnesota Census Data Center network.

The purpose of the affiliate program is to provide multiple locations around the state where Census Bureau reports are on hand, assistance in the use of these reports is available and where resource persons can provide information about the census-data-related services available in Minnesota.

Information available from the SRDC includes the 1970 Census for Minnesota and adjoining states, 1980 Census information currently published, Minnesota economic censuses, County Business Patterns, and a variety of reports from the State Demographers Office. Through a special computer run, most population, housing, and economic data from the 1980 Census is available for all cities and townships in the region, a level of detail not available in the regular published census reports.

If information requested is not available locally, requests may be directly referred to other agencies in the data center network such as the State Demography Unit, the Minnesota Analysis and Planning System (MAPS), the Department of Education Information Center, or the Land Management Information Center (LMIC).

Commission staff have filed data requests from cities, counties, local government agencies, schools, consulting engineers, chambers of commerce/development corporations, private businesses, and individuals. Assistance and expertise in interpretation and analysis of data has accompanied many of these requests.

In the coming year the Commission will continue to respond to the information needs of the region. Training sessions for data users are also in the planning stages. The Commission will also begin participation in the process of planning for the 1990 Decennial Census and will continue to serve as a liaison between the Census Bureau and the local governmental units of Region 8.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

The Southwest Developmental Disabilities Program concentrated its effort in the past year to increase work and employment opportunities for adults with severe mental or physical

disabilities. Working extensively with eight developmental achievement centers, two sheltered workshops and REAL, an independent living center, the DD Program offered training workshops as well as individualized on-site assistance to the agencies to increase the number and type of industrial subcontacts or prime products they now have and to offer part-time or full-time jobs for their clients in their own communities.

Three workshops have been given for the staff of nine agencies who seek to increase the work they now offer at their developmental achievement center or sheltered workshop. The workshops included information on assessing the client's skills, assessing existing work products, marketing products, determining legal and accurate bids for subcontracts and developing contracts. With the assistance of the workshop training and the on-site consultation from DD program staff, agency staff have been able to obtain more work hours and more wages for 99 of their adult disabled clients.

Four developmental achievement centers, two sheltered workshops and REAL participated in the training program regarding community employment. Four workshops have been offered including such topics as assessing client's skills, assessing job market opportunities, available state or federal resources, approaching businesses, client interviews, co-worker sensitivity and adaptive equipment for the disabled. With the assistance of the workshop training and on-site consultation, agency staff have been able to place 67 of their disabled clients in such community jobs as dishwashing, truck unloading, janitorial assistance, child care assistance, raking lawns, shoveling snow, laundry service, table setting at restaurants.

The twenty-one member Developmental Disabilities Committee has been active in providing input into the employment training program, commenting on twenty-three local grant applications for state and federal funds affecting persons with disabilities, and reviewing and commenting on five state and federal regulations. During the past year the twelve consumers and nine service providers and general public representatives of the DD Committee recommended three legislative recommendations on accessibility, obsolete language in statutes and preschool services. The accessibility and obsolete language issues were enacted during the state legislative session but preschool services for the developmentally delayed childred has been referred for further action at the next legislative session.

DD Program staff offered information and referral to consumers and their families as well as technical assistance in grantwriting, data information, fund raising, personnel issues to various human service agencies providing service to persons with disabilities. Staff attended 85 meetings during the past year with county welfare boards, family service directors, developmental achievement centers, county commissioners, statewide developmental disabilities groups, residential facilities, educators, social workers, other elected officials and various interagency groups to ensure that the priorities of the DD Committee were coordinated with other actors in the developmental disabilities service network. Twelve public presentations were made to advisory groups, county welfare boards, chambers of commerce, and other public groups. The Region 8 Community Resources for Persons with Disabilities was revised and distributed to 115 service providers, consumers and elected officials.

#### SOUTHWESTERN AREA AGENCY ON AGING

1984 marked the beginning of a new three-year planning cycle for the Area Plan for Programs on Aging. The plan serves as a "blueprint" of goals - activities for the Aging Program of the Southwest Regional Development Commission (SRDC). New goals and objectives were established in the areas of Advocacy, Service Development and Systems Development. In addition, new

funding priorities were established as follows: Transportation, Congregate Meals, Multipurpose Senior Centers, Homemaker Services, Home Health Aide.

Title IIIB grants totaling \$102,010 were made during SRDC Fiscal year 1984. Grants were made for such services as transportation, Home Health Aide, Legal Services, Hospice, Program Development, and Advocacy. In July of 1983 a total of \$80,815 was awarded for Multipurpose Senior Center projects in Ellsworth,

Fulda, Luverne, Heron Lake and Adrian.

The SWAAA received \$24,140 from the Minnesota Board on Aging as its first year allocation of a three-year McKnight Foundation grant. The McKnight Foundation awarded funds to the Minnesota Board on Aging for senior center renovation and senior self-help projects state-wide. During FY84, senior center renovation grants were awarded to: Wilmont, Chandler, Brewster, Cottonwood, Steen and Adrian. Self-help grants were awarded to the Plum Creek Library System for the purchase of large print books and to the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) for the development and sale of winter survival kits.

The Congregate Nutrition Program was awarded \$231,918 in new federal Title IIIC-1 funds and \$60,490 state funds effective January 1, 1984. During the past year, two new mealsites were opened in Ruthton and Cottonwood. The program served an

average of 750 to 800 meals per day.

The Home Delivered Meals program was awarded \$49,407 in new federal Title IIIC-2 funds effective January 1, 1984. The project has also initiated service in several communities that previously had no home delivered meal service. These include Garvin, Currie, Ruthton and Cottonwood. The program served

an average of 125 to 150 Home Delivered Meals per day.

Some changes were made in the statewide nursing home Ombudsman program in FY84. The Minnesota Board on Aging determined that better service could be provided if the Southwestern Ombudsman service area (regions 6E, 6W, 8 and 9) were split. Consequently, regions 6W and 8 now form the southwestern service area, with Region 8 assuming the responsibility as lead agency in administration of the program. The Southwest Regional Development Commission (SRDC) awarded funds to Western Legal Services in Marshall to provide ombudsman service in the two regions. The ombudsman assists in resolving complaints, provides training for residents, families and staff of nursing

homes and also monitors laws and regulations related to nursing homes and their residents.

The Southwestern Area Agency on Aging (SWAAA) sponsored its fourth annual regional Conference on Aging in October, 1983. The theme for the conference was "Aging: The Best is Yet to Come." Over 220 older persons and service providers attended this event. Workshops were held on such topics as: Mental Health, Funeral Planning, Aging in USSR and China, HMO's: a Rural Reality?, Older Women's League, Medicare, and films on aging. In addition to the regional conference, the SWAAA sponsored a workshop on Senior Center Management in June, 1984. The workshop covered leadership, program planning, fundraising and other operating issues. A total of 75 senior citizens attended this training.

In order to improve coordination of aging services in the region, the SWAAA began holding quarterly "Aging Network" meetings. The meetings enable those who work in aging to share information, concerns, ideas and to avoid duplication of efforts through better coordination and communication. Over 150 persons representing county social service, health service, nursing homes, hospitals, and other aging service providers are invited to attend.

The technical assistance role of the SWAAA included assisting several communities in applying for foundation grants, providing input in the development of CSSA plans, assisted in the development of two new hospice programs, provided assistance and training to independent home delivered meals providers, assisted in the development of new mealsite locations and other activities

related to aging service development.

The SWAAA continues to promote coordination of the variety of human services agencies which serve the elderly in Region VIII. Regular contact has been maintained with the county welfare departments, community action agencies, public health nursing and mental health centers. The agency staff is active on the Southwestern Minnesota Opportunity Council (SMOC) Senior Citizens Community Services Employment Program Board, Nutrition Project Council, Minnesota Association of Area Agencies on Aging, Minnesota Gerontological Society, National Association of Area Agencies on Aging, and the Worthington Community College Human Services Advisory Board.



# SUMMARY OF THE REPORT OF THE STATE AUDITOR ON THE FINANCIAL AFFAIRS OF THE SOUTHWEST REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The auditor's opinion letter states "the combined financial statements . . . present fairly the financial position of the Southwest Regional Development Commission, at June 30, 1983, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year."

Date field work completed: September 28, 1983. Date audit opinion letter signed: September 28, 1983.

The following recommendations were stated in the Management and Compliance Letter:

#### INTERNAL ACCOUNTING CONTROL

"The Commission should maintain a tax levy and settlement record book . . . which would include collections of delinquent taxes and taxes receivable at June 30."

Action Taken: The financial officer has set up a tax levy and settlement record book and has established a tax form which was sent to all counties to complete for year-to-date information.

#### LEGAL COMPLIANCE

"Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 462.396, Subd. 6, the Commission should from time to time designate one or more national or state banks as official depositories."

Action Taken: A motion was made and approved "to designate People's State Bank, Norwest Bank and Twin City Federal of Slayton as depositories" at the May 10, 1984 Board of Director's meeting.

There were no recommendations to resolve from FY 1982's audit.
