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RE: STATEMENTS ABOUT THE ARTICLE 7 MEED JOBS PROGRAM

1. Goals and Objectives-Results. Fifty (50%) percent of all people working in MEED are in private for profit jobs. As the program continues, private sector jobs will be a larger share of all new jobs.

Thirty-eight (38%) percent of all participants served through July, 1984 are female. This is lower than our 50% goal, but is within our qualified goal to serve females at least according to their incidence in the eligible applicant population.

Since our last quarterly report, a total of 4,039 new people have enrolled in MEED. Our expenditures have increased a total of \$17,659,415 (from \$27,935,663 to \$45,595,078).

2. Private for Profit Jobs. Our priority continues to be private for profit marketing and contract development. For profit businesses are contacted through employer brochures, radio and television spots and local initiatives by employment administrators.

The MEED Office works closely with the Department of Economic Development, and MEED is marketed as an economic development tool. MEED's value to employers is enhanced when combined with the federal Targeted Jobs Tax Credit. MEED may serve as the employer's solution to cash flow problems. MEED may serve as the catalyst necessary to start a business.

3. Article 8 Coordination. The MEED Office works closely with the Department of Economic Security and the Department of Public Welfare in the operation of the employment allowance and general assistance provisions under Article 8 of the Act. 38.9% (6310) of all MEED participants are General Assistance eligible.

\$200,000 of MEED Article 7 central office administrative funds were allocated to Economic Security to assist with administration of Article 8.

4. MEED's Enrollment Performance (Attachment 1). This report provides information on program performance by employment administrator. This information is updated weekly.
5. Applicant/Participant Information (Attachment 2). This report provides more information about program participants. This report is updated monthly.
6. Article 7 MEED Jobs Expenditures (Attachment 3). This report is a statement of program expenditures through a given month. The top half lists expenditures by service delivery area. The bottom half is a summary of program expenditures by cost category. This report is updated monthly.

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7. Discretionary Allocations. Hennepin County was allocated an additional \$100,000 in discretionary funds to supplement funding of their customized Copy Repair Technician Program. This program will train 20 MEED eligible persons as copy machine repair technicians. The training period for these individuals is five and one-half months long. Job Training Partnership Act funds pay for training. MEED subsidizes the employees' wages up to \$4/hour for up to six months. The employer hired the trainees as full-time employees prior to the beginning of the training.

1. 83,642 applicants were eligible for the Article 7 MEED Jobs Program.
2. 17,870 people have been enrolled.
3. 50% of all jobs to date are private sector.
4. Of the 10,319 people who left the program, 4,556 (44%) have found unsubsidized jobs.
5. Since May 4, 1984, 70% of all new job placements have been in the private sector.

RE: APPLICANT/PARTICIPANT INFORMATION THROUGH JULY, 1984

1. 67% of all people in Article 7 MEED jobs are in a priority category.
2. 14% of all participants are veterans.
3. 52% of all people served in the program have left the program;
43% of those who left found a job.
4. 38% enrolled in the program are females.
5. Of 851 who were in a private sector subsidy, and who received follow-up 60 days after leaving MEED, 85% were still employed.
