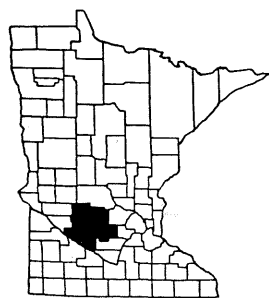

Technical Assistance

According to language in the Regional Development Act, the commission may offer technical assistance to local units of government. One of the objectives of the commission is to increase the planning and programming capability of local units of government by working with them to help assess their needs and overcome or avoid the problems. The existence of the commission has no effect on the authority or responsibility of local units of government to do their own planning and programming to meet the needs and desires of their citizens.

Requests for technical assistance are initiated by local units of government and public/semi-public agencies. The commission provides assistance on a time available basis. The emphasis of technical assistance is to provide assistance in the area of total community and economic development.

Communities are encouraged to update or develop comprehensive plans and land use ordinances. Also, they are offered technical assistance in forming or reactivating local development corporations. Sixteen communities have been assisted over the past ten years to develop a comprehensive plan and new zoning and subdivision ordinances. In addition, one community is in the process of

developing a comprehensive plan and ordinances and seven communities were assisted with plan and ordinance updates. Each year many communities are assisted with various grant applications. During Fiscal Year 1984, staff assisted with seven community development block grant applications and 27 open space/recreation applications. Also, assistance was given on a variety of individual projects such as clean lakes, tax increment finance districts, railroad rehabilitation, housing market surveys, community business surveys, business start-up, business expansion, hot water district heating, Star Cities Program, clinic start-up, capital improvement budget and ordinance codification.

For a number of years the commission has been redrafting township base maps whenever there was time between other projects. This year, two part-time drafting students from the Willmar Area Vocational Technical Institute were able to complete the project. This project consists of 82 township base maps at a scale of four inches equals one mile. These maps are useful to record fire district boundaries, school bus routes, county zoning, road maintenance and construction projects, location of public lands and school district boundaries.

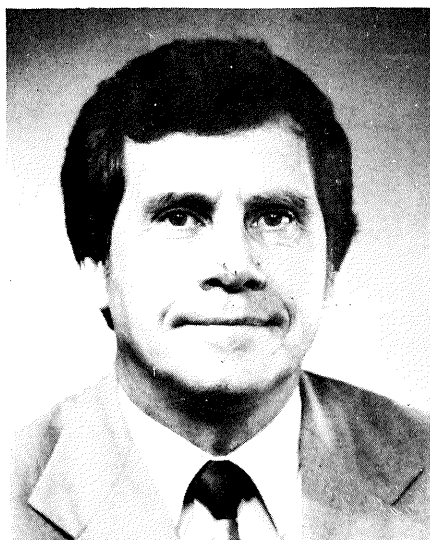

Director's Message



On May 16, 1984, I celebrated my tenth anniversary with the commission. Ten years on the same job is no big accomplishment in life, but it so happens that I'm the senior executive of the RDC's in the state and also, this is the only commission to still employ its original executive director.

How does it happen that I'm still around while others in similar positions have taken other employment? I think the answer is obvious. West Central Minnesota is a good place to live, work, play and raise a family. I'm proud to be employed by an organization that is working to make this an even better area in which to live.

Comprehensive Development Plan Activities

The commission has attempted to set up its work program along the lines or requirements in the State Statutes that require the commission to "prepare and adopt, after appropriate study and such public hearings as may be necessary, a comprehensive development plan for the region." State Statutes go on to say, "The plan shall consist of a compilation of policy statements, goals, standards, programs and maps prescribing guides for an orderly and economic development, public and private, of the region. The comprehensive development plan shall recognize and encompass physical, social or economic needs of the region, and those future developments which will have an impact on the entire region including, but not limited to, such matters as land use, parks and open

space land needs, the necessity for and location of airports, highway, transit facilities, public hospitals, libraries, schools, public and private housing and other public buildings." The commission adopted a Comprehensive Development Policy Plan on June 24, 1981. The plan consists of 37 goals, 106 objectives and 389 policies. The following list of work program categories forms the basis for the Comprehensive Development Policy Plan. Each category was treated as a separate but integrated component of the plan. Special studies, reports and plans have been completed by the commission for 12 of the 18 elements. Information has been gathered for the other six elements but no individual documents have been written.

—Economic Development—

Economic development has always been one of the main concerns of the Regional Development Commission. In previous years it supplied the staff necessary to prepare Overall Economic Development Plans (OEDP) for Renville, Kandiyohi and Meeker Counties. The preparation of these OEDP's has qualified these counties to be eligible areas for federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) programs. On December 1, 1979, the Regional Development Commission submitted a

305-page District OEDP to the Chicago EDA office. In June, 1981, a 456-page revised copy of the District OEDP was submitted to the Chicago EDA office. In December, 1983, a 169-page addendum was submitted to the Chicago EDA office. The commission utilizes an Economic Development Advisory Committee to identify problems, analyze programs and suggest solutions. Staff assistance is focusing on financial packaging in both the public and private sector.

—Aging—

The Six East Regional Development Commission became a partner in a tri-regional 18-county Southwestern Area Agency on Aging on July 1, 1977. During 1979, the Six East Regional Development Commission was approved as a separate four-county agency, effective January 1, 1980. As a part of this approval, a transition plan was developed which included evaluating and monitoring the nutrition programs being administered by the Six East Community Action Agency. The evaluation and monitoring previously had been conducted by the Minnesota Board on Aging. Although the Area Agency on Aging is officially the Six East Regional Development Commission, most of the responsibility and credit goes to the 13-member advisory council. In 1983, a new three-year plan was written

regarding the operation of the agency. Guidelines have been developed for administration of direct service grant money. Priority areas for direct service funds are transportation, information and referral, in-home services (homemaker/chore services, health services), nutrition (congregate and home delivered meals), multipurpose senior centers, coordination/advocacy and legal services. At the present time the aging program provides funding for 16 congregate meal sites and 12 home delivered meal sites. The funding basis for the program is the Older Americans Act with a match provided by the RDC for the administrative portion. McKnight Foundation funds have become an important aspect of the program for senior center renovation.

—Transportation—

A contract with the Minnesota Department of Transportation resulted in the development of a "Highway Jurisdictional Study." An advisory committee working with staff helped prepare the document which subsequently was adopted by the commission after a public hearing was held. The study began to focus on the problems that may be associated with the state turning back roads to counties and the counties subsequently turning

back roads to townships and cities. The commission received a grant from the Minnesota Department of Transportation to conduct a study regarding township roads. The preliminary draft was completed during the fiscal year. The study involved researching the recording of township road easements. It was basically a fact finding study and no conclusions were drawn.

—Developmental Disabilities—

The four counties of Region Six East became part of an 18-county Developmental Disabilities Council in 1972. In 1976, it became part of a tri-regional program and on October 1, 1980, a four-county program was formed. A comprehensive plan was adopted on May 27, 1981, which inventories facilities and services, analyzes needs and makes recommendations regarding meeting the needs of certain individuals. A report was printed in 1982 entitled "Resource Guide for Developmental Disabilities."

The Developmental Disabilities Program is a contract program with the Governor's Council on Developmental Disabilities. A local Developmental Disabilities Advisory Committee assists the commission with this program. The Governor's Council contracted with the RDC for a 12-month period beginning October 1, 1983, to provide assistance to four developmental achievement centers. The assistance provided was working with designated clients on behavior modification.

—Housing—

This past year, the commission allocated resources to update its housing report. The update developed into a new report rather than an update due to the existence of new data and new programs. It should be a useful tool to both housing developers and public officials for purposes of

analyzing programs and needs. It contains housing unit characteristics from the 1980 Census, housing household data and household income data. It also contains information on needs. In addition, there is a brief outline of 21 different housing programs.

Project Notification and Review System (PNRS)

On June 4, 1975, Governor Wendell Anderson designated the Six East Regional Development Commission as the official A-95 clearinghouse review agency for the region. The commission has adopted, published and distributed an "A-95 Clearinghouse Procedural Manual." Subsequently, it has published a manual on the Project Notification and Review System (PNRS) which is a federal directive which supercedes the A-95 process.

Section 462.391, Subdivision 3 of the Regional Development Act states in part, "The commission shall review all applications of governmental units, independent commissions, boards or agencies and colleges or universities, for public facilities, studies or any other purposes if the application clearly is related to the region, whether or not such review is required by the Federal Government." In 1976, the commission initiated a policy that it would review and process all applications but would comment only on those which have regional significance.

After the RDC is notified regarding an application, it notifies all local units of government, public agencies and semi-public agencies which may be concerned with or affected by the proposal. Also, the RDC notifies the State Clearinghouse which may be concerned with or affected by the proposal. The RDC does not have the authority to approve or disapprove applications. It acts as a coordinating agency for purposes of review and comment.

Ideally, the commission should base its review and comment on that element of an adopted comprehensive development plan that relates to the application. The commission now has an adopted Comprehensive Development Policy Plan and uses the goals, objectives and policies in its review and comment process.
