SUBJECT: MINNESOTA CALENDAR YEAR 1986 STATE REPORT ON CHILDREN IN

SUBSTITUTE AND ADOPTIVE CARE AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY.

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this bulletin is to send the attached EXECUTIVE SUMMARY on Minnesota 1986 Substitute and Adoptive Care to concerned agencies and persons.

II. BACKGROUND

The EXECUTIVE SUMMARY should meet the informational needs of most persons and agencies regarding MINNESOTA SUBSTITUTE AND ADOPTIVE CARE data for 1986. One copy of a separate detailed 1986 ANNUAL STATE REPORT is being sent to each county human service agency and each licensed private child placing agency. Agencies receiving this report may reproduce all or parts of the publication.

The EXECUTIVE SUMMARY and THE ANNUAL STATE REPORT combined meet the reporting requirements of Minnesota Statutes sections 257.01 and 257.355. Similar information is available for 1979, 1981, 1983, 1984 and 1985. However most of the available historical data are summarized on pages 1 - 6 of the attached 1986 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY.

1986 MINNESOTA - EXECUTIVE SUMMARY REPORT OF CHILDREN IN SUBSTITUTE AND ADOPTIVE CARE

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NOTE: This EXECUTIVE SUMMARY plus the MINNESOTA 1986 SUBSTITUTE AND ADOPTIVE CARE - STATE REPORT have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of MINNESOTA STATUTES 257.071 and 257.355.

HIGHLIGHTS

MINNESOTA'S SUBSTITUTE CARE CASELOAD

The total unduplicated caseload for 1986 was 11,681 children. This number has remained at this level during recent years.

In 1986 and 1985 children leaving substitute care outnumbered children entering substitute care. In 1984 and 1983 the opposite was true. (See chart 1 page 5.)

CHILDREN ENTERING CARE

The unduplicated number of children entering care during 1986 was 6,031. Sixty-eight percent of these were new entrants (children reported to have no substitute care in the 12 months prior to entering). This proportion is slightly lower than prior years. (See chart 2 page 6.)

Of all children entering substitute care in 1986 most (55%) were ages 12 and older while 24% were under age 5.

CHILDREN WHO LEFT SUBSTITUTE CARE

The unduplicated number of children leaving substitute care during 1986 was 6,063.

During the last four years reunification was the primary reason children left substitute care (ranging from 65% to 73% of all outcomes). Aging out was the outcome for 7% to 8% each year. Running away was the outcome for 5% to 6% each year. Finalized adoptions accounted for 4% to 5% each year. (See chart 3 page 7.)

CHILDREN IN SUBSTITUTE CARE IN MINNESOFA AT THE END OF THE YEAR

From 1979 to 1986 the number of children in substitute care at the end of the year decreased from 7,271 to 5,616.

The decline in year end caseload with no comparable decline in total unduplicated caseload may reflect increased turnover or changes in reporting periods and methodology. (See notes below table 1.)

For the last four years children in substitute care at the end of each year were predominately:

white - ranging between 73% and 78%

Had no prior placements - ranging between 61% and 71%

Age 12 or over - ranging between 65% and 67%

Placed in foster family homes - ranging between 52% and 56% (See chart 4 page 8.)

Had no known disabilities - ranging between 53% and 54%

Male - ranging between 54% and 55%
Note: Some prior reports incorrectly identified an increase in the proportion of girls compared to boys in the year end caseload.

HIGHLIGHTS - continued

CHILDREN FREE FOR ADOPTION WITH THE GOAL OF ADOPTION AWAITING ADOPTION PLACEMENT

As of 12/31/86 one half of the children with a plan of adoption who were not yet in an adoptive home had been awaiting placement for one year or more. The proportion of these children waiting one year or more has generally increased each year for the last four years.

As of 12/31/86 children awaiting adoption placement were more often minority (33% compared to 26%) and much more often under age 12 (53% compared to 35%) when compared to the total children in substitute care 12/31/86.

As of 12/31/86 children awaiting adoption placement were more often minority (33% compared to 24%) and much more often age 12 or older (46% compared to 11%) when compared to children with adoptions finalized during calendar year 1986.

CHILDREN IN FOSTER FAMILY HOMES BY RACE OF FOSTER PARENT(S)

For both Black and Indian children the proportion with same race foster parents decreased from 1985 to 1986 (66.9% to 62.7% and 54.4% to 50.8% respectively). For Black children this was the third consecutive year with a decrease.

Black children in foster family homes are more likely to have same race foster parents than other minority heritage children. While half of Indian children in foster family homes have same race foster parents only two out of ten Asian children do. Hispanic children are even less likely to have a same race foster parent. (See chart 6 on page 14.)

ADOPTIONS FINALIZED (FROM ADOPTIONS SUBSYSTEM) COMPARED TO CHILDREN IN FOSTER FAMILY HOME 12/31/86 BY RACE OF ADOPTIVE OR FOSTER PARENTS

For three of the four minority races the proportion of children with same race foster parents exceeds the proportion of children with same race adoptive parents.

Black same race - adoptive parents 42% - foster parents 63% Indian same race - adoptive parents 40% - foster parents 51% Asian same race - adoptive parents 1% - foster parents 20% Hispanic same race - adoptive parents 4% - foster parents 0%

If only adoptions of Minnesota born children are included in the adoption data (i.e. Foreign born and children born in other states are excluded) then only Indian children more frequently have same race foster parents than have same race adoptive parents.

Black same race - adoptive parents 75% - foster parents 63% Indian same race - adoptive parents 44% - foster parents 51% Asian same race - adoptive parents 33% - foster parents 20% Hispanic same race - adoptive parents 38% - foster parents 0%

Unfortunately it is not possible to separate Minnesota born foster children from other foster children to have more comparable data.

SELECTED MINNESOTA/US COMPARISONS

The most recent national statistics are contained in <u>Characteristics of Children In Substitute And Adoptive Care Based on FY 84 Data prepared by the American Public Welfare Association (APWA), June, 1987. (Note: Minnesota data is based on year ending December 31, while the federal report is predominately based on year ending September 30. This difference is especially significant for point in time data.)</u>

Minnesota substitute care prevalence rates exceed national average. The national average for 9/30/84 was 3.6 children in care per 1,000 children under age 21 while Minnesota had 4.4 for 12/31/84. The difference was even greater for children entering care during 1984 (4.1 Minnesota - 2.4 national). The greater rate for entering care in Minnesota may reflect Minnesota's higher substitute care recidivism rate (30.2% of children entering were replacements in Minnesota compared to 20.4% nationally).

Nationally, protective service was the reason over half (56%) the children entered substitute care in 1984. Protective service was the reason for only 23% of children entering care in Minnesota for 1984. This increased to 31% in 1986 but comparable national data is not yet available. Conversely 41% of the children entered substitute care in Minnesota during 1984 due to child's conduct or condition compared to 12% nationally.

Over seven out of 10 substitute care children (73%) were reunified in Minnesota during 1984 compared to 62% nationally. Nationally 10% and 9% were adopted or aged out respectively compared to 4% and 7% in Minnesota.

Children in care at the end of the report period were more likely to have a goal of reunification nationally (51%) than in Minnesota (44%) although children in Minnesota are more likely to be reunified (See above). This difference may be due to Minnesota's large proportion of children in care at the end of the report period with goal unknown (17%) compared to less than 3% nationally.

Nationally data from 27 states was reported regarding special needs status of children with adoptions finalized during 1984. Over all 57% of these had one or more special needs compared to 31% in Minnesota. This proportion increased to 41% in Minnesota for 1986 but comparable national data is not yet available.

For adoptions finalized in 1984 Minnesota had 8% adopted by relative petitioners compared to less than 3% nationally. Nationally over 30% of adoptive parents were former foster parents compared to 12% in Minnesota.

NOTES: In Minnesota many adoptions are handled by private agencies; these adoptions are omitted from this report. Minnesota instructions require reporting a petitioner as a relative if related and separating non relative petitioners into former foster parents and other non relatives. The federal instructions do not specify how to report a relative who is a foster parent, therefore this difference may be due to reporting methods rather than differences in placement practices.



Children entering and leaving care during the year were first required in 1983 and have been required annually since then.


Year end caseload was reported for the 12 month periods ending October 1, 1981 and September 30, 1979 prior to the start of annual reporting with calendar year 1983.

SUBSTITUTE CARE CHILDREN (Thousands)















These pie charts indicate that minority children are more often placed with same race foster parents than with same race adoptive parents. It is highly probable that some or all of this apparent difference is due to a higher proportion of foreign born children in adoptive care compared to substitute care. (See "Chart 6" on the prior page.)

Other data differences between the two subsystems include the following:

Adoption data includes both public and private agencies while substitute care data includes only public agencies.

Substitute care data is for children in care at the end of the year while adoption data is for children with decrees granted during the year.

Adoption data is preliminary only, having been partially edited and excluding 80 incomplete March 1986 records.


