Clause a: GENERAL STATEMENT OF BOARD ACTIVITIES

At the beginning of the F.Y. 1988-1989 biennium the Board adopted a completely revised set of rules which were necessitated by the amended Podiatric Medicine Practice Act passed by the Legislature in 1987. The rules provide for post-graduate training, clinical examinations, renewal of license, continuing education, and grounds for discipline

The rule amendments were initiated in the preceding biennium. However, unexpected opposition to the proposals forced a hearing. Consequently, final adoption was delayed until after the close of the biennium.

The new law requires podiatrists to complete one year of post-graduate practical training and to pass a clinical examination before becoming licensed. As a result, in this biennium 14 podiatrists applied for and were granted temporary permits to provide podiatric medical services under supervision of a licensee, and 15 applicants took the clinical examination, which was developed by the Virginia Board of Podiatric Medicine and sold to the Federation of Podiatric Medical Boards before the end of F.Y. 1989.

Prior to F.Y. 1989, administrative services to the Board were provided by the staff of the Board of Nursing. When new responsibilites were added to the Board of Nursing, it could no longer provide services to the Board of Podiatric medicine. The administration of the Board was then transferred to the staff of the Board of Psychology. Because the Board of Psychology did not have the resources to provide the services without reimbursement (unlike the Board of Nursing), fees paid by licensees had to be increased to cover the cost of services - 20 percent of full-time for an Executive Directoor, 25 percent of full-time for a Clerk Typist 2. The fee increases became effective in time for the renewal period ending June 30, 1989.

The fee increase resulted in a net loss of approximately 20 licensees who resided out of state but who had continued their Minnesota licenses because the fees were so minimal. The loss represents 14 percent of the number licensed before the fee increase. Although there is an increasing number of new licensees, attrition due to age, retirement and death has kept the number of licensees fairly constant at around 120.

The Board also began to work on a revision of the rules, the primary purposes of which are to institute a biennial renewal cycle (half the licensees renewing each year) and to permit risk management as an acceptable continuing education topic. In addition, the revision is designed to streamline the rules and make them easier to understand. The process was not completed by the end of the biennium, but is expected to be completed by June, 1991.

Two licensees were disciplined during the biennium for violation of MS 153.19.

COMMENTS

Because MS 214.06 requires a board's fees to as closely as possible match the board's expenditures, it is important to include the costs of services provided by the Attorney General's office, which a board must raise revenue for but which are not included in board's appropriations. Without the inclusion of those figures, it appears that the Board raises much more revenue than it needs, giving a false picture of board finances.

It should be noted that the large increase in appropriations and expenditures between F.Y. 1989 and F.Y. 1990 was due to the cost of purchasing staff services from the Board of Psychology. Prior to that, the Board of Nursing provided staff services without charging for them.

Clause f: SUMMARY OF RULES PROPOSED OR ADOPTED IN FY 89, FY 90

On August 8, 1988, the Board adopted a new set of rules that were needed to implement the new Podiatric Medicine Practice Act passed in 1987. The rules were published in the State Register on November 21, 1988, Volume 13, Number 21, pages 1219 to 1258. The rules became effective on November 26, 1988.

The Rules established requirements for post-doctoral training, renewal of license, continuing education, clinical examinations, and grounds for disciplinary action, and set fees for temporary permits, licensure, renewal, and late renewal.

A fee increase was initiated on September 23, 1988, to cover the added cost of staff services provided to the Board by the Board of Psychology. The proposed fees were published in the State Register on February 6, 1989, Volume 13, Number 32, pages 1891-1954. Final adoption occurred on March 25, 1989, and the notice was published in the State Register on May 1, 1989, Volume 13, Number 44, pages 2667-2706. Effective date was May 7, 1989, in time for the notices of license renewal to be sent to all licensees. The rule raised the renewal fee from \$100 per year to \$225 per year.





Permits are granted for a period of one year to podiatrists who hold the degree of Doctor of Podiatric Medicine and who have been accepted into approved residencies, preceptorships, or othe graduate training opportunities. This type of data does not appear in any of the previous clauses because a Temporary Permit is not licensure to engage in practice, although many permit holders take the PMLexis exam during their training period, and are included in those data.

Clause q: For all health-related boards except the Board of Veterinary Medicine, per Minn. Stat.
