## MINNESOTA BOARD OF PARDONS

#### Introduction

The Minnesota Board of Pardons is made up of the Governor, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the Attorney General. The board is authorized to grant several types of extraordinary relief to persons who have been convicted of crimes. A pardon is an act of forgiveness which exempts the convicted person from the punishment imposed by the law. A commutation is the substitution of a lesser type of punishment for the original sentence. A pardon extraordinary is a type of clemency granted after the applicant has served his/her sentence. When a pardon extraordinary is granted, the court issues an order to set aside the conviction and the person to whom the pardon extraordinary is granted is no longer required to report that he/she was convicted of the crime. #### Legislative Report

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. \$638.075 (1992) the Board of Pardons is required to file a written report with the legislature reporting the number of applications received during the preceding calendar year for pardons, commutations and pardons extraordinary; the number of applications granted by the board for each category; and the crimes for which the applications were granted by the board, the year of each conviction, and the age of the offender at the time of the offense. The tables below provide the required information.
