This report addresses the requirement of Minnesota Statutes, Section 257.0725 for a report on the number of children in out-of-home placement. This report includes data for 1988 through 1992.

MINNESOTA'S CHILD WELFARE POLICY

In 1992, the total number of children in out-of-home placements in Minnesota reached a new high of 18,096, an increase of 54 percent over the past five years. This report documents who these children were, why they entered care, where they were placed, how long they spent in care, and the reasons given for why they left.

In reviewing these data, it is important to remember that Minnesota's child welfare policies are governed by several important principles. The following statement contained in the Minnesota Family Preservation Act (Minnesota Statutes 256F) is the central tenet on which this public policy is based.

"The public policy of this state is to assure that all children, regardless of minority racial or ethnic heritage, live in families that offer a safe, permanent relationship with nurturing parents or caretakers."

The law further says:

"To help assure children the opportunity to establish lifetime relationships, public social services must be directed toward:

- (1) preventing the unnecessary separation of children from their families by identifying family problems, assisting families in resolving their problems, and preventing breakup of the family if it is desirable and possible;
- (2) restoring to their families children who have been removed, by continuing to provide services to the reunited child and the families;
- (3) placing children in suitable adoptive homes in cases where restoration to the biological family is not possible or appropriate; and
- (4) assuring adequate care of children away from their homes, in cases where the child cannot be returned home or cannot be placed for adoption."

Two other legislative mandates govern the child welfare system. At the federal level, the Adoption and Child Welfare Assistance Act of 1980 (P.L. 96-272) promotes the importance of keeping families together. Specifically, it requires states to:

- Use "reasonable efforts" to prevent the unnecessary removal of children from their homes:
- Initiate "reunification efforts" to minimize the length of time children spend in out-of-home placements, if such placements are unavoidable;
- Return children to their own homes as quickly as possible;
- Maintain efforts to help strengthen families; and
- When reunification is not possible, arrange for the child to have a permanent living arrangement (e.g., adoption).

Minnesota reaffirmed family preservation as the cornerstone of its public policy in 1986 with passage of the Permanency Planning Grants to Counties Act. The legislation supported county efforts to develop an array of family-based program models to help families with children at risk of placement, all with the goal of family preservation.

According to the National Commission on Children,

"At every age, among all races and income groups, and in communities nationwide, many children are in jeopardy. They grow up in families whose lives are in turmoil. Their parents are too stressed and too drained to provide the nurturing, structure, and security that protect children and prepare them for adulthood. Some of these children are unloved and ill-tended. Others are unsafe at home and in their neighborhoods. Many are poor, and some are homeless and hungry... The harshness of these children's lives and their tenuous hold on tomorrow cannot be countenanced by a wealthy nation, a caring people, or a prudent society. America depends on these children too." Beyond Rhetoric, A New American Agenda for Children and Families, 1991, page xvii.

WHY CHILDREN NEEDED OUT-OF-HOME PLACEMENTS

The reasons most frequently reported for why children needed out-of-home placements in 1992 were the following:

- need for protection
- parent's condition or absence (includes parental substance abuse)
- delinquent (adjudicated)
- parental rights relinquished
- child's disability
- status offenders

THE SETTINGS IN WHICH CHILDREN LIVED

The kinds of living arrangements in which children were placed most frequently in 1992 were the following:

- foster family homes
- emergency shelters
- group homes
- residential treatment facilities
- non-final adoptive homes

WHY CHILDREN LEFT OUT-OF-HOME PLACEMENTS

The reasons most frequently given for why children left out-of-home placements in 1992 were the following:

- reunited with child's own parents
- placed with non-parental relatives
- ran away
- finalized adoption
- reached maturity
- placed with non-relative legal guardian
- discharged to another agency



MORE CHILDREN ENTER OUT OF HOME CARE EACH YEAR IN MINNESOTA


The total number of children in out—of—home care continues to increase. In 1992, 18,096 children were in out—of—home care, the highest number ever reported. For Minnesota, in the nine years from 1984 to 1992, the number grew from 11,725 to 18,096, an increase of 54 percent. Between the end of 1986 and 1991, the national increase was 53.2 percent.*

THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN IN OUT-OF-HOME CARE CONTINUES TO INCREASE.

Minnesota counties continue to report increases in the number of children in out—of—home care. From 1991 to 1992, the rate of increase was 7.9 percent. From 1988 to 1992, the out—of—home care increase was 27.8 percent.

MORE CHILDREN ENTER OUT-OF-HOME CARE THAN LEAVE.

From 1991 to 1992, the number of children entering care increased 14 percent, while the number of children leaving care increased only 2.8 percent.

The number continued from the prior year does not match the number of children in care at the end of any year because each year is reported independently. Corrections made at counties, including late reports of children entering and leaving care, which affect prior year data are not reported to the state agency until the next report period. Prior report period data are not updated to reflect these changes.



HALF OF ALL CHILDREN IN CARE LIVE WITH FOSTER CARE FAMILIES

One out of every two children in out—of—home placement lived in family foster care (50 percent). One out of four children (28 percent) had their last or only out—of—home placement in an emergency shelter. One out of five children lived in either a group home (12 percent) or a residential treatment facility (8 percent).


- ♦ Forty-nine percent of all children who left care in 1992 did so within one month.
- ♦ Another 24 percent of children spent at least one month in care and left within six months.
- ♦ Eighty-five percent of all children left care within one year.

MOST CHILDREN STILL IN CARE HAVE SO FAR HAD ONLY ONE PLACEMENT.

The majority of children (57 percent) who were in care at the end of the year have experienced only one placement. The proportion of children with one placement has varied little (55 percent to 57 percent), with no apparent trend.

THE NEED FOR CHILD PROTECTION IS A MAJOR REASON FOR OUT-OF-HOME CARE.

The need for child protection was the reason given for one third (34 percent) of all the 8,309 children for whom a reason was reported. Another 18 percent of these 8,309 children entered care because of a parent's condition or absence. These conditions include such things as illness, disability, temporary absence, substance abuse or abandonment.



MOST CHILDREN ARE REUNITED WITH PARENTS.

During 1992, 3 out of 4 children who left care (75 percent) were reunited with their own parents. Another 8 percent found homes with relatives. Thus, reunification with parents or other relatives was a reality for 83 percent of children who left out—of—home care in 1992. This is an improvement from 1988 when it was reported that 66 percent of children were reunified with parents and 6 percent found homes with non—parental relatives.

CASELOAD BY RACE/HISPANIC HERITAGE



DISPROPORTIONATE NUMBERS OF AFRICAN—AMERICAN AND AMERICAN INDIAN CHILDREN ARE IN CARE.

As Table VIII shows, most (63 percent) children in out—of—home care in 1992 were reported to be White (11,337). African—American and American Indian children were disproportionately represented.

- ♦ African—Americans constitute about 3 percent of the state's child population, but African—American children in out—of—home care (3,459) account for 19 percent of the total number of children in care.
- American Indians represent 2 percent of the State's child population, but American Indian children in out—of—home care (2,130) account for 12 percent of all placements.
- ♦ Hispanics account for 2 percent of the State's child population and Hispanic children in out—of—home care (412) were 2 percent of this population.
- Asian and/or Pacific Islanders constitute 3 percent of the state's child population. Asian and Pacific Islander children in out—of—home care (304) account for 2 percent of the total number of children in care. (Some of the Asian and Pacific Islanders are reported as refugee unaccompanied minors. Those children are not available for permanent placement since they are here without parents.)

Fifty-two percent of those in out-of-home care in 1992 were adolescents from 13 to 19 years old. Twenty five percent were children under six years of age.



THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN ENTERING CARE WAS ABOUT EVENLY DIVIDED BETWEEN BOYS AND GIRLS, REFLECTING THE AGE/SEX DISTRIBUTION OF ALL CHILDREN IN THE STATE.

The 1990 census indicated that Minnesota's children with age ranges from under one year to sixteen years were about evenly divided between boys (51 percent) and girls (49 percent). Within a three percent range, the gender distribution for children entering care reflects the same pattern. However, for ages 8 through twelve years, boys are slightly overrepresented. For example, of 11 – and 12-year-olds in care, 58 percent are boys. In contrast to this, girls are overrepresented among fifteen-year-olds in care.






COMPARISON OF CHILD & FP RACE FOR 175 API* CHILDREN with FP RACE KNOWN

COMPARISON OF CHILD & FP RACE FOR 166 HISPANIC CHILDREN W/ FP RACE KNOWN



MORE AFRICAN – AMERICAN CHILDREN LIVE WITH FOSTER FAMILIES OF THE SAME RACE AND ETHNICITY THAN DO CHILDREN FROM AMERICAN INDIAN, HISPANIC AND ASIAN/PACIFIC ISLANDER FAMILIES.

When comparing the race and ethnicity of foster parents with that of children placed in their homes, it is important to note that some counties did not report this information for all children in foster family homes. Comparisons can only be made for children for whom this information is known. In cases where a child's race and ethnicity were reported as well as those of foster parents, Table XI shows the following data:

- ♦ Seventy-nine percent of the 1,455 African-American children living with foster parents whose race was known, lived with African-American foster parents.
- ♦ Sixty-five percent of the 818 American Indian children with foster parents whose race was known, lived with American Indian foster parents.
- Fifteen percent of the 175 Asian/Pacific Islander children living with foster parents whose race was known, lived with foster parents of the same race.
- Almost eleven (10.8) percent of the 166 Hispanic children living with foster parents whose race was known, lived with Hispanic foster families.



OF THE CHILDREN WHO LEFT CARE IN 1992, MOST HAD ONLY ONE PLACEMENT.

About eight out of ten children (81.1 percent) had had only one placement when they left care in 1992. The proportion of children leaving who only had one placement varies from a high of 86.5 percent for African—American children to a low of 74.9 percent for Hispanic children. Except for Hispanic children, less than three percent of any group had six or more placements during a period of continuous care. Among Hispanic children who left care, 5.6 percent had had six or more placements when they left care.



Among those who left care in 1992, African—American children had the shortest stays in out—of—home care (61.5 percent of African—American children who left out—of—home care in 1992 spent less than a month in out—of—home care). Only children for whom race was not reported had shorter stays (68.9% less than one month). Of the children who left care in 1992, one out of every five Hispanic children (20.0 percent) and about one out of every four Asian/Pacific Islander children (27.1 percent) spent one vear or more in out—of—home care.

Of those children who left care in 1992 the following proportions had spent thirty months or more in out—of—home placements: 5.2 percent of non—Hispanic white children; 3.9 percent of American Indian children; 2.7 percent of African—American children; and 6.0 percent of Hispanic children. Fifteen (15.0) percent of Asian/Pacific Islander children who left care in 1992 had spent 30 months or more in out—of—home care. Some of these children were refugee unaccompanied minors.

MINNESOTA STATUTES, SECTION 257.0725 REPORT ON CHILDREN IN OUT-OF-HOME PLACEMENT

"257.0725 SEMIANNUAL REPORT.

The commissioner of human services shall publish a semiannual report on children in out-of-home placement. The report shall include, by county and statewide, information on legal status, living arrangement, age, sex, race, accumulated length of time in placement, reason for most recent placement, race of family with whom placed, number of families from the child's own culture in the placement pool during the period for which data is provided, and other demographic information deemed appropriate on all children in out-of-home placement. The commissioner shall provide the required data for children who entered placement during the previous guarter and for children who are in placement at the end of the guarter. Out-of-home placement includes placement in any facility by an authorized child-placing agency. By December 1, 1989, and by December 1 of each successive year, the commissioner shall publish a report covering the first six months of the calendar year. By June 1, 1990, and by June 1 of each successive year, the commissioner shall publish a report covering the last six months of the calendar year."
