Clause a: GENERAL STATEMENT OF BOARD ACTIVITIES

The purpose of the Board of Dentistry is to ensure that citizens of Minnesota receive quality oral health care by licensing professional, competent dentists and dental hygienists and by registering dental assistants whose fitness to practice has been tested and whose training and other qualifications meet the standards established by the Board. In addition, the Board receives, investigates and resolves complaints filed by consumers and others. The Board also registers professional corporations and approves sponsors for continuing dental education.

During the two year report period, the Board initially licensed 185 dentists and 296 dental hygienists; initially registered 791 dental assistants and 24 professional corporations; reinstated 18 dental licenses, 19 dental hygiene licenses and 103 dental assistant registrations; approximately renewal issued 22,630 annual certificates; acted on 584 consumer complaints; participated in approximately 80 state, regional and national examinations for dentists, dental hygienists and dental assistants; participated in 6 accreditation site visits at dental, dental hygiene, and dental assisting schools; and reviewed approximately 22,000 continuing education courses.

The Board adopted rules concerning continuing education in infection control as well as rules increasing fees for annual renewal of licenses and registration, initial license and registration and licensure by credentials.

Clause f: SUMMARY OF BOARD RULES PROPOSED OR ADOPTED

Fee Increases

In November, 1992, the board adopted rules increasing annual license and registration fees from \$110 to \$120 for dentists, from \$40 to \$45 for dental hygienists, and from \$26 to \$30 for registered dental assistants.

Fees were also increased by rules adopted in October, 1993. These rules increased initial application fees for dentists and registered dental assistants; annual license and registration fees for dentists, dental hygienists, and registered dental assistants; licensure by credentials fees for dentists and dental hygienists; and reinstatement fees for dentists and registered dental assistants.

Continuing Education in Infection Control

Rules on continuing education in infection control were adopted in August, 1993. The rules require that during each five-year continuing education cycle, licensees and registrants must complete a minimum of five clinical hours of continuing education in the subject of infection control, including blood borne diseases.

Additional Rule Changes

In 1993, the board undertook a systematic effort to review all of its existing rules for the purpose of identifying ones that needed updating or revising to reflect current standards of practice. The board also identified areas where consideration should be given to adding new provisions to fill gaps in the existing rules.

The board began the process by publishing in the April 5, 1993 edition of the <u>State Register</u> a notice that the board is seeking information or opinions from sources outside the board in preparing to propose non-controversial amendments.

The board subsequently identified areas where changes were needed. After having compiled a list of suggested changes, the board surveyed the Minnesota Dental Association, the Minnesota Dental Hygienists' Association, the Minnesota Dental Assistants Association and other dentistry-related groups and organizations and asked them to indicate, with respect to each proposed change, whether in their opinion the change was needed and whether it would be controversial. The board's Rules Committee subsequently held a public meeting on July 16, 1993 to review the proposed changes and the survey responses. Based on the input provided by the various groups, the survey results, and the comments received at the meeting, the committee placed the proposed changes into several categories. Category 1 changes were given the highest priority; category 2 changes were ones that were seen as needing more time to develop;

changes in category 3 were ones that would need extensive work before being ready to propose; in category 4 were changes for which the need was not clearly established.

The first set of rules proposed under this process were adopted in February, 1994. The rules eliminated the special provisions for licensing graduates of non-accredited schools; provided additional detail about the requirements for licensure by credentials; added a new requirement to licensure by credentials that requires candidates to have earned at least five hours of continuing dental education in the subject of infection control including blood borne diseases in the preceding five years; required dentists, dental hygienists and registered dental assistants to comply with existing requirements on hazardous waste and ionizing radiation; allowed dental hygienists and registered dental assistants to remove and place arch wires on orthodontic appliances; and revised the provisions on limited registration for dental assistants with equivalent education by adding requirements on fees and continuing dental education.

Clause h: ADMINISTRATION OF EXAMINATIONS BY THE BOARD.

The Board of Dentistry accepts the results of examinations offered by the following organizations:

Joint Commission on National Board Examination

Dentists and dental hygienists must successfully complete these examinations to become eligible for licensure in Minnesota. The examinations are offered semiannually at three sites in Minnesota. The examinations are written examinations.

Central Regional Dental Testing Service

Dentists and dental hygienists must successfully complete these examinations to become eligible for licensure in Minnesota. The examinations are offered 16 times at nine test locations within the eleven states comprising the central region. The examinations are offered semiannually in Minnesota. The examinations are both written and practical.

EVALCOR

Dental assistants must successfully complete the Minnesota Registration examination to become eligible for registration in Minnesota. The examination is offered 20 times each year at 12 locations throughout the state. The examination is a written examination.

In addition to the above noted examinations, the board is required to administer an examination covering the dental practice act and board rules. This examination is offered while students are in school and may also be taken any business day at the Board office. The examination is a written examination.

Clause o: SUMMARY OF COMPLAINTS REFERRED TO IN CLAUSE N BY SPECIFIC CATEGORY

The tables found on the next four pages present descriptive data related to complaint filing and resolution during the period July 1, 1992 to June 30, 1994. The tables are similar in that they report data on complaint resolution activities that occurred during the two-year reporting period, but they are different in two respects: 1) the method of gathering additional information about the complaint is categorized according to whether a letter of inquiry or a referral to the Attorney General's office was used and 2) whether the complaint was filed prior to or during the reporting period.

In each table, the column headed "Primary Complaint" refers to the twelve grounds for disciplinary action according to Minnesota Statutes and Rules pertaining the the practice of dentistry in Minnesota. Although complainants often allege more than one type of violation in a single complaint, these tables list complaints only by the <u>primary type</u> of allegation for each complaint.

The remaining three columns in each table describe the resolution of each complaint: Dismissal (which is not public data); reprimand or corrective action (which is public data, but is not considered disciplinary action); stipulation and order (which is public data and is considered disciplinary action), and open (not yet resolved, and therefore, not public data).

Combined data found in the four tables show that a total of 584 new complaints were filed between July 1, 1992 and June 30, 1994. Nearly 68 percent of these complaints were resolved by the end of the reporting period. In addition, 252 complaints filed prior to July 1, 1992, were still open during the reporting period and of those, nearly 63 percent were resolved by the end of the reporting period. Of those complaints filed during the reporting period, 10 were determined to be non-jurisdictional.

Finally, it should be noted that the numbers in each table refer to the number of complaints filed. They do not refer to the number of regulated persons against whom complaints were filed. In other words, the number of regulated persons against whom complaints were filed is less than 596.

Clause p: STATE ANY OTHER OBJECTIVE INFORMATION WHICH THE BOARD MEMBERS BELIEVE WILL BE USEFUL IN REVIEWING BOARD ACTIVITIES

As health care reform and health issues affecting patients continue to be in the media, so too will patients continue to increase their awareness of what to expect when they receive dental treatment. In order to make the Board's complaint resolution process as "userfriendly" as possible, the Board is constantly updating and improving written information sent to complainants so that their concerns can be addressed expeditiously. Greater coordination between the Board and the Attorney General's Office regarding cases referred for investigation is expected to result in more cost-effective legal and investigative services.

The Board has continued to meet the requirements of legislation passed in 1992 regarding infection control measures utilized in clinical dental settings and monitoring of licensed health care professionals to prevent the transmission of HBV and HIV.

Just as it was a national leader in mandating continuing dental education requirements several years ago, the Minnesota Board of Dentistry is currently in the forefront regarding the development of computer simulations of clinical situations. The "Video Disc Project" conducted jointly with the University of Iowa is a more objective assessment of licensees' clinical knowledge base. These simulations are intended for use in a number of settings to assure continued competency of licensed dental health professionals.

The Board's "GROW" project is being developed jointly with several professional dental organizations to promote healthy relationships and behaviors amongst providers, officer personnel and patients.

During the biennium, the Board has continued information exchange with such agencies as the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Department of Defense and the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension in an effort to curtail illicit use and distribution of controlled substances. Since September 1990, the Board has reported all disciplinary action to the National Practitioner Data Bank (NPDB), an agency established by the federal government to serve as a national clearinghouse for disciplinary actions in all 50 states. The Board continues to make routine inquiries of the NPDB on all applicants for licensure who hold licenses to practice in other states, and to follow-up on all malpractice reports received from the NPDB regarding Minnesota dentists.
