LEGISLATIVE REPORT

MINNESOTA BOARD OF PARDONS

INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §638.075 (1994), the Board of Pardons is required to file a written report with the legislature summarizing actions it took during the previous year.

The Minnesota Board of Pardons is made up of the Governor, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the Attorney General. The board is authorized to grant the following types of extraordinary relief to persons who have been convicted of crimes:

- pardon an act of forgiveness which exempts the convicted person from the punishment imposed by the law.
- commutation the substitution of a lesser type of punishment for the original sentence.
- pardon extraordinary statutorily created relief granted after the applicant has served the sentence. When a pardon extraordinary is granted, the court issues an order to set aside the conviction and the person to whom the pardon extraordinary is granted is no longer required to report the conviction.

1995 ACTIVITIES

The information summarizing the past year's activities is provided in chart form. It includes the number of applications submitted, the number of applications returned because the applicant was not eligible and the number of pardons, commutations and pardons extraordinary granted. In addition, the chart provides more detailed information about the pardons extraordinary that were granted, includes the crime(s) for which the applicant was convicted, the year of the conviction and the age of the applicant at the time of the conviction.

During 1995, staff of the Board of Pardons sent out 137 applications for pardon extraordinary and 20 for pardon or commutation. When anyone calls to request an application, staff carefully explain the eligibility requirements and make every effort to

determine whether the interested individual is eligible before an application is sent. This careful screening appears to be accomplishing its purpose because the number of applications returned due to ineligibility remains very low.

Of the pardons extraordinary granted, four were for individuals who had applied earlier and were told by the board to reapply after several more years. Although the eligibility requirement for non-violent offenses is five years, the board did not grant a pardon extraordinary to anyone with less than seven years of law-abiding conduct since the completion of the sentence.
